

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"Making Santa Collectibles and Christmas Ornaments in Wood" is first published 1993 by Fox Chapel Publishing. It contains some patterns from the author's previous book "Carving Christmas Tree Ornaments" which is now out of print.

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FOREWORD

The Christmas season always finds my workshop joyously busy as I go about designing and carving new ornaments for our Christmas tree.

Our collection started with a small airplane I carved in 1979. The airplane was patterned after a toy I received for Christmas when I was a boy. As I hung the ornament on the tree, I began telling my wife about the other toys I received in Christmases past. These toys led to new ideas, and we began planning next year's ornaments.

Many Christmases later we now have over 50 handmade ornaments in our personal collection.

Many of my friends and fellow woodcarvers have found these unique ornaments to be challenging wood carving projects as well as excellent gifts and additions to their collections.

While carving these projects, keep this thought in mind: Handmade ornaments are becoming increasingly popular and these small creations of Christmas Art may become the valued collectibles of tomorrow.

ABOUT THIS BOOK

As you begin carving the patterns in this book, you will find that antique toys make great carving projects.

Antique toys are usually not true to scale, and often contain exaggerated or make-believe parts. These relaxed dimensions were practiced by toy companies to ensure a low cost ease of construction. This aids the carver by allowing a great deal of freedom and a chance to use one's own imagination.

The patterns are arranged according to the dates in which we carved them, not necessarily as to how difficult they may be. Some patterns, like the Teddy Bear, are very easy and will require little time, while others, like the Ford Tractor, are very challenging and my require as much as ten hours. I would suggest you begin your collection by selecting one of the easier projects.

TOOLS AND MATERIALS

To carve the projects in this book you will need some type of soft wood suitable for whittling. I would suggest Basswood, if available. Other suitable woods are: Clear White Pine, Sugar Pine, or Poplar.

A good whittling knife, plus a few basic carving tools will be needed:

3mm V-Tool	~
6mm V-Tool	V
2mm Deep Gouge	J
4mm Deep Gouge	U
6mm Deep Gouge	Ũ
12 mm Shallow Gouge	

A coping saw or band saw is used to cut out the projects.

For painting your ornaments, you will need acrylic paints and a spray can of Deft Clear Wood Finish.



FINISHING

Christmas art work, for the most part, is done in bright and shiny colors. In holding with this custom, we have painted may of our ornaments in this fashion. Unlike other woodcarvings, where the artist wants a great deal of wood to show through, we prefer our Christmas ornaments to stand out against the background of a lighted tree. An occasional sparkle or highlight in the finish tends to remind us of the shiny new toys Santa leaves on Christmas morning.

Begin by sanding the ornament lightly with 220 sandpaper. Acrylic paint is then applied directly to the wood in bright colors. Sometimes lighter colors will require two coats.

Paint the smaller details on your ornaments, such as doll faces and other miniature details, which are too small to carve.

To obtain the effect of glass windows on toy vehicles, first paint the window light gray, then apply a few streaks of white, at a 45 degree angle, thus giving the illusion of light reflecting on glass.

When desired, a dark woodgrain finish can be obtained by painting an object medium brown, using burnt umber thinned with water, then streaking or woodgraining with darker burnt umber.

If you wish a natural wood finish like that used on handmade wooden toys, you need only to sand the ornament lightly and spray with clear wood finish.

After painting, we spray all our ornaments with at least three coats of Deft Clear Wood Finish. It is fast drying and will keep your ornaments clean and fresh looking for years to come.







FIG. 3 USE A COPING OR BAND SAW TO CUT AWAY EXTRA WOOD.


FIG. 4 BLOCK OUT ALL DIMENSIONS WITH A KNIFE OR GOUGES.




ROCKING HORSE










TENDER CAR


ADD ONE CAR EACH YEAR. EXTRA
PATTERNS INCLUDED FOR FREIGHT TRAIN.



PASSENGER CAR AND GONDOLA







TANKER, BOX CAR AND CABOOSE



I ESPECIALLY LIKE THE ONES THAT HAUL LUMBER AND LOGS.















HAIR TECHNIQUE IS APPLIED WITH 3MM V TOOL








DOLL BUGGY








FORDSON TRACTOR




JACK IN THE BOX







TUG BOAT




GLASS SANTA FACE








MIGHTY CLIMBING TRACTOR

KEY WIND LITHOGRAPH TIN CIRCA 1938
























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National Wood Carvers Association
