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


But tackling a porch makeover seemed daunting and expensive. So Katie got creative. Rather than replacing the entire floor, for example, she tore out only the worn sections along the perimeter and replaced them with composite decking, then painted and stenciled the existing floorboards for a look that's fresh and unique. She screwed two (free!) pallets together and attached casters for a coffee table that offers more storage than store-bought versions. Flora from her backyard served as templates for inexpensive sun-print wall art. And the dreamy porch swing? Made from a single sheet of plywood and a bit of trim. (You can make it, too! Check out page 74.)

Now Katie has a porch that provides a fitting welcome for guests, and more importantly, a happy place for her family.

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



### Let there be light

RIGHT: Add soft light to your living space with a round pendant. In a bowl, mix 11/2 cups warm water, 1 cup flour, 1 cup cornstarch, 1 cup crafts glue (we used Elmer's Glue-All), and 1 teaspoon salt. Stir until the mixture resembles runny pancake batter (a). Drop a roll of twine into the bowl, leaving one end out. Tape a paintbrush securely across the bowl, and pull the twine through the bristles, removing much of the gooey adhesive (b). As you pull the twine through, wrap it around a round balloon, rotating it as you go and leaving a small opening for inserting the lightbulb. Once the balloon is mostly covered, knot the twine ends and let dry for 24 hours. Make sure the twine has hardened before popping the balloon. Insert the lightbulb and cord kit through the opening. TIP: We tied the cord to the pendant with a few pieces of twine so the lightbulb would hang at the pendant's center. A low-wattage lightbulb should be used for safety reasons.

### The writing's on the wall

OPPOSITE: Express your inner lovebird with easy-to-make wall art. Drop thick natural-fiber rope into a mixture of 1½ cups warm water, 1 cup flour, 1 cup cornstarch, 1 cup crafts glue, and 1 teaspoon salt. Shape the rope into a word and a frame, laying the design on a piece of plastic wrap (a). Use light-gauge wire to add stability and form tight letter shapes. TIP: Write your word on the plastic wrap using a permanent marker first as a guide for the design. The letters should harden within about 24 hours. When dry, tack the lettering on the wall, attaching decorative birds or other embellishments.





### Coiling point

LEFT: Say good-bye to a cold, wet floor and hello to a new, vibrant rug. Working on a hard surface, begin coiling braided polypropylene rope as tightly as possible. (We used a two-tone option, available at home improvement stores, for a fun patterned effect.) As you go, attach heavy-duty white duct tape to hold the coil securely in place (a). Once you've coiled the entire rope to the desired rug size (our %-inch-diameter rope was 90 feet long, and our finished rug is 3 feet wide), add an extra layer of duct tape all in the same direction, trimming any untidy tape ends. Turn over, so tape is on the back. TIP: Place a nonslip rug pad underneath to prevent the rug from sliding.

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
### Bird is the word


BOTTOM: Feather your nest with this accessory inspired by nature. Soak twine in a mixture of glue with about 2 tablespoons each of flour and water. Form the nest by coiling and shaping wet twine into a smaller, plastic-lined bowl (a). To create a layer of frayed twine, run the blade of a scissors against sections of dry twine (b). Add the frayed pieces to the nest with hot glue. Place two small faux eggs in the nest.

### Get the memo

OPPOSITE: Make an old picture frame into a keepsake board. Measure increments along the back of the frame, marking where each string will be. Cut lengths of twine that will reach across the back of the frame. At each mark, place a dot of hot glue on the frame, then push the twine into the glue with a metal awl (a). Hold for a few seconds until the glue dries. Directly across the frame, place a dot of glue and attach the opposite end of twine, making sure it is taut. Hang the frame on your wall. Use clothespins (b) to display photos and ephemera.



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# weather worthy

Enjoy the outdoors under a canvas canopy you build and waterproof yourself. Equip it with stylish accessories treated to withstand the elements.

### What we did...

OPPOSITE: We tested a variety of weatherproofing products on a collection of outdoor projects. The portable canvas canopy (see how to build and weatherize it on <u>page 20</u>) received a 50:50 blend of melted beeswax and paraffin. ABOVE LEFT: Even fabrics specially made for the outdoors can benefit from additional weatherproofing. The pillows were sewn with outdoor fabric and given extra protection with water repellents and UV (ultraviolet) blockers (we like Trek 7 brand; see below). LEFT: We treated the chair canvas with a UV protectant to prevent fading. Spraying the solution onto the fabric and lightly wiping it with a damp sponge ensures even coverage. When the canvas feels dry, spray it with a waterproofing product, wipe lightly, and let dry. ABOVE: We rubbed Otter brand fabric wax onto the stool canvas. TIP: Use a blow dryer to soften and spread the wax evenly into the fabric, forming a waterproof seal.



### ready-made solutions

**For convenience.** Waterproofing products make it easy to extend the resilience of outdoor fabrics and reapply protection as needed. A bar of plant-base Otter wax *(otterwax.com)* rubs onto canvas, denim, and other fabrics in quick swipes. The wax may darken the fabric color slightly. Water-base fabric protectants from Trek 7 *(trek7.com)*, including Ray Bloc and Aqua Armor, are made without harsh chemicals and help prevent fading and stains. **For Resources see** *page 108*.

### how to make a waxed-canvas canopy

What you'll need:

- \_ Duck canvas tarp
- \_\_Textile paint (We used Jacquard Textile Color.)
- \_\_ Transparent base extender
- \_\_ Brushes
- \_\_Iron
- \_\_ Refined beeswax
- \_\_ Paraffin
- \_ Double boiler
- \_\_ Blow dryer
- PVC pipes and fittings
- Spray paint for plastic (We used Krylon Fusion.)
- \_\_ Rebar
- \_\_ Hook-and-loop tape

.....

Step 1 Gather materials to paint and wax the canvas (a). Our tarp is 6x10 feet. Customize the canopy's size and color as you wish. Work on a hard surface protected with a drop cloth. Blend equal parts textile paint and extender; add water for less intense color. Paint both sides of the canvas (b). Let paint dry overnight.

Step 2 Use an iron on the cotton setting to heat-set the paint (c) and ensure its colorfastness.

step 3 Safely melt equal amounts of beeswax and paraffin in a double boiler or similar water bath over low heat (d). (We used 1 pound each of beeswax and paraffin for our 6x10-foot tarp.) TIP: Natural beeswax produces a darker, more yellowish result than refined beeswax.

5tep 4 Brush the melted mixture lightly onto the fabric (e). Hold a blow dryer close to the fabric at medium to high heat (f), working over a small area at a time, until the wax melts into the canvas and the fabric appears dry.

5 Make a frame to fit your canopy, using 3/4- and 1/2-inch-diameter PVC pipes, 3/4×3/4×1/2-inch Y fittings, and 1/2-inch adapters. Spray-paint pipes to cover their labels (g). Hammer rebar into the ground to anchor the frame when setting up the canopy (h). Stitch 3-inch-long hook-and-loop tape tabs to the canvas perimeter at 1-foot intervals to secure the canopy to the frame.

Repurposing interesting finds is a fun way to add character to your home. Putting those objects to work containing clutter makes it all the more satisfying. But beware—it's hard to stop once you start rescuing cans and cartons from the recycle bin. After all, you can only store so much!

Why spend a fortune purchasing storage bins and boxes if you don't have to? Simply look at objects in a new way, and you'll discover all kinds of creative containers just waiting to organize your life. We framed this wire baking rack, opposite, to make a magnet board. Start your repurposing adventures today!

1. Farm fresh After cleaning and sanitizing this old galvanized chicken feeder, we let it organize stationery atop a desk. We scored our 4-foot trough feeder for \$12, then adorned it with labels made from magnetic ink-jet paper. You can find new feeders for about \$25.



2. Food for thought Rescuing food containers such as tea tins and soup cans from your recycling bin is not only a thrifty storage solution, but it's also eco-friendly. Cover them with pretty scrapbooking or gift-wrapping paper, then fill to the brim. For extra functionality, look for containers with lids.



3. Walk this way This large sheet pan comes out of the kitchen to contain shoes at the back door. The raised edges corral debris, and the metal surface is easy to wipe clean. Look for full sheet aluminum pans, which you can pick up for less than \$15; stainless steel could cost you more than twice that.

5. Spa treatment Salvage shops often stock displaced dresser drawers, which have tons of uses. This drawer with a divider serves as a wall shelf in a bathroom. A dowel threaded through screw eyes serves as a towel bar.

6. Dish it up Pretty dishware serves to contain jewelry, crafts supplies, or any small items. Although this bowl and compote are reproductions, you can find similar vintage tableware for a song at garage sales or thrift shops. Look for statement pieces with pleasing details or patterns.





7. Pretty little things From muffin pans to mint tins, little metal containers get a new purpose holding tidbits and treasures inside drawers. On containers with lids, use pretty labels to identify contents.

8. Make your case Turn old suitcases into underbed storage by adding a set of casters. Handles make them easy to access, and lids keep contents dust-free. A coat of paint is optional, especially on cases flaunting lots of charm.



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

### **DEAR HANDY GIRL,**

Help! The moving van left a tire-width divot on my formerly perfect lawn. How do I patch it with seed so I don't feel like I've ruined the place already?



you protecting your home's curb appeal, you're heading off what could develop into a tripping hazard. First, loosen the soil

DEAR READER,

surface with a garden fork—insert the tines and pull back repeatedly. Next, add bagged soil to the divot to level the surface with the surrounding area. Work that dirt until it's fluffy, so when you sprinkle it with seed, the

seed makes good contact with the soil. After you've seeded, carefully press the area with the back of a garden rake, and water thoroughly. Finish by applying a starter fertilizer, following label directions, and watering it in.

Keep this patch moist until the seed germinates; times vary by seed type. You'll know it's well-rooted—and will no longer need frequent watering—when you can tug on the grass and it resists. You can mow the spot when the grass reaches 3-31/2 inches tall.



I have several trees and shrubs on my property but don't have the budget for landscaping service. Are there general rules of pruning so I can do it myself?

### DEAR READER,

Not knowing exactly what's in your yard, I'll leave you with general guidelines that hold true whether you're pruning trees or shrubs:

Choose the right tool. Use a pruning saw on branches larger than 11/2-2 inches in diameter. Use loppers on branches an inch or so in diameter. Pruners work best on the smallest branches. Whatever you use, make sure it's clean and sharp.

Select the right time. Late winter is the best time to prune many trees or shrubs because they're dormant and it's easy to see what needs to be pruned. But there are exceptions:

- Prune spring-flowering trees and shrubs right after they finish flowering.
- · Remove dead branches in summer when they are easy to spot.
- Trees and shrubs that bloom during summer and into fall are best pruned in late winter or early spring, as soon as annual growth begins.
- Avoid fall pruning. It stimulates new growth that could be killed by winter cold. You can prune the following anytime: suckers (shoots from the trunk base or roots); water sprouts (multiple soft, fast-growing branches that rise from a trunk or large limbs); branches that are dead, diseased, or damaged. Happy pruning!











DEAR HANDY GIRL,

The wood deck on the back of my house is in good shape—except for a single board that's split. Can I replace just the damaged board or will that hurt the structure of the deck?



You can definitely replace a single deck board without hurting the structure, as long as you do it correctly.

Start by unscrewing the fasteners and removing the board. Cut a new board to size—if you don't have a saw, a lumber store can cut the board for you. You can either stain and seal the new board to match the rest of the decking, or scrub it with a solution of 1 cup baking

soda and 1 gallon water to give it a weathered look. (Test first on a scrap piece to make sure you like the result.) Now attach the new board, using the same type of fasteners used on the rest of the deck. Good as new.

### DEAR HANDY GIRL,

The concrete slab in my driveway has developed a crack. It's not long or deep and the rest of the concrete looks fine—the hard winters and hot summers where I live have probably just taken their toll. How do I fix it?

### DEAR READER,

As long as the crack isn't from an extended tree root or something that will continue to cause damage, patching the concrete will solve your problem.

Start by cleaning the concrete surface

using a pressure washer (you can rent them from home improvement stores) and masonry cleaning solution. If the crack is ½ inch wide or less, use a sand mix or concrete resurfacer. If the crack is more than ½ inch deep or wide, use standard concrete, which contains gravel. Mix the concrete to the consistency of cookie dough, using a mixing paddle chucked in a heavy-duty low-RPM drill (you can rent these). Pour the mixed concrete into the crack and use a flatedge trowel, *right*, to work the mixture in, and then to smooth the surface. Dry overnight. To finish, consider applying a concrete resurfacer to the entire surface to preserve the pad even longer.

DEAR HANDY GIRL.

When hauling my window screens up from the basement, I snagged one on a nail and now it's got a little rip. Do I need a new screen, or can I fix this on the cheap?

### DEAR READER,

You can fix it by applying a screen patch, but I'm not crazy about how that looks. I'd rather replace the screen. It'll take a morning—less if you buy supplies beforehand.

Measure the screen size and hit the local hardware store, where they'll cut you a replacement screen while you shop for a small roll of vinyl screen spline and a spline roller—altogether, these purchases should cost you less than \$30. At home, remove the spline from the damaged screen. You'll probably need a screwdriver or pliers to get it started, then you

can remove it by hand. Remove the old screen and put the new one in place; it should overlap the screen frame. Use the round end of the spline roller to press the new screen into the frame grooves. Then use the grooved end to press the spline in place, beginning at a corner and keeping the screen tight as you advance. Cut off the excess screen and spline with a utility knife, and you're good as new.

By the way, an old-school hardware store will fix the screen for you for about double the supply price.

### RIGHT PLANT. RIGHT PLACE

A table overflowing with delicious fresh produce begins with a great growing site. Get started with these tips.

Deciding what to plant in your backyard garden is a lot like making a grocery list. What produce does your family like to eat? What is commonly in your shopping cart? Many vegetables are easy to grow in a home garden. Tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers are some of the most popular, but don't overlook beans, melons, and flavor-rich herbs.



**SUNLIGHT** Vegetables, fruits, and herbs require at least six hours of direct sunlight per day to produce ample fruit and foliage. The best edible garden location is bathed in eight or more hours of sunlight every day. When selecting a location, consider nearby trees and buildings. Although they may appear benign, they can shade the garden for several hours in the morning or afternoon. When faced with choosing between a spot with ample morning sun and a plot with generous afternoon exposure, choose the site with sunlight in the afternoon. The intensity of the afternoon rays will be more beneficial to fruit production.

**SOIL** The best garden soil is the color of chocolate and has the texture of brown sugar. It will clump together when squeezed, but clods easily break apart when you rub them between your fingers. Soil with this coloring and texture is rich in nutrients and has a structure that will nourish plant roots. If your garden site doesn't score high marks in color or texture, add compost. Boost the soil nutrients while improving structure by incorporating a 2-inch layer of well-decomposed compost to the top 12 inches of



soil. Repeat annually. If you are gardening in containers, choose a potting soil mix that is designed for vegetable gardening.

WATER Edible gardens are most productive when they receive about 1 inch of water per week. When rain doesn't fall, supplement soil moisture by watering the garden. Easy access to water makes this weekly garden chore a cinch. Choose a planting location that is near a hydrant or hose bib on the exterior of your home. You can choose from a watering can, a wand, or a hose for watering. You are most likely to keep up with watering in the dog days of summer if water is readily accessible.

### PLAN YOUR PATCH

Size matters when it comes to edible gardening. When in doubt, plant a small garden rather than a large one. An 8×8-foot plot is a just-right size for a first-time gardener. It is enough space to grow several tomato and pepper plants and a few rows of onions or green beans. Add early-season greens and broccoli, and you'll have months of garden-fresh produce. No space for a plot? Plant an edible garden in containers. Look for large containers with drainage holes at your local garden center. Fill the pots with quality potting soil, and plant your favorite vegetables, starting plants from seed or transplants. Container gardens dry out quickly, so plan to water pots daily.

### how to make a garden bed

What you'll need:

5tep 1 Using a garden hose, outline the shape of your garden bed. Strive for a shape that allows easy access to plant rows. Mark the shape of the bed with flour or marking paint (a) and remove the hose.

5tep 2 Remove the sod with the help of a sod cutter (b) or a sharp spade. Work diligently to remove the turf's entire root zone. This will make for minimal weeding later in the season.

step 3 Loosen the soil in the garden bed with a spade (c). Sink the spade into the top 6-8 inches of soil and turn it over. Use the spade to break up clods as you go.

step 4 Spread a 2-inch layer of well-decomposed compost over the entire garden bed. Use a spade to mix the compost into the top 6 inches of garden soil. Rake the mixture smooth in preparation for planting (d).

### MARKET FRESH GARDEN PLAN

Measuring merely 8×8 feet, this vegetable garden is just the right size for a small landscape. When growing plants up vertical structures, place poles and trellises at planting time to avoid damage to root systems.

This easy-care garden grows up instead of out. Snap peas scramble up trellises on one side of the garden. Tomatoes grow up tall stakes; new, young branches are tied to the stakes every few days. The result of this diligent tomato staking is large, round fruit that is less likely to be plagued by pests and diseases. Finally, cucumbers are trained up a tepee to prevent sprawling across the garden.





### how to plant seeds

5tep 1 Read the planting information—recommended planting time, depth, and spacing—on the back of seed packets. Use this valuable information to lay out your garden, ensuring mature plants have adequate space.

5tep 2 Place a string line where you would like to make a garden row. Make a string line by tying each end of the string to a garden stake. Use the hoe to create a furrow along the line (a).

**step 3** Drop seeds in the furrow, spacing them as directed on the seed packet (b). Gently cover the seeds with soil (c). Label the row with an identifying marker (d).

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### TIME MANAGEMENT

Plant. Water. Weed. Harvest. After the initial prep and planting, tending an edible garden requires just a few minutes of effort a day to produce a table full of flavor-rich delights.

Stay ahead of weeds and keep tabs on plant growth by spending about five minutes in the garden every other day. Stroll around the tomatoes and peppers in the morning and pluck weeds as you go. Or visit at night, as the sun is setting, watering and weeding as needed. The plants will be healthier and more productive when you take the time to enjoy the fruit of your labor.



### WATCH FOR PESTS


Good news-pest control is rarely necessary in an edible garden! Visit BHG.com/DIYPestControl for a wealth of information on identifying and controlling garden pests. Staff at your local garden center can help, too. Most often the pest will depart the garden in short order, leaving only cosmetic damage behind. If damage is ongoing and significant, control the pest with the least toxic method available.

### ADD MULCH

Organic mulch, such as shredded bark or grass clippings, is an easy way to suppress weeds. Most weed seeds need light to germinate. A 2-inch layer of mulch fights weeds by blocking light, preventing germination. Spread mulch over the garden after seedlings emerge and when planting transplants. Prevent disease by maintaining a 2- to 3-inch mulch-free ring around the base of plants. Moist mulch in contact with stems creates a portal for fungi and bacteria to enter the plant. At the end of the season, use a spade to mix mulch into the top 8 inches of soil. The mulch will decompose and add nutrients to the soil.

### WATER SMART

Edible plants thrive when they are provided about 1 inch of water per week. When it doesn't rain, make the most of every drop with efficient watering practices. Water deeply. Your goal is to send moisture 6-8 inches into the soil to encourage greatest root growth. Cover soil with a 2- to 3-inch layer of mulch to reduce soil moisture evaporation. Be vigilant about eliminating weeds.

### **HARVEST HINTS**

Capture the best flavor from your garden by recognizing the cues each crop gives when it is prime for picking. Visit the garden every couple of days to check your plants' progress.

Perfectly ripe tomatoes and crisp peppers are the reward for thoughtfully tending a garden plot. Summer is the prime harvest season for many popular garden vegetables, but the bounty can begin in spring and extend into fall with a little planning.

This crafty couple took matters into their own hands to create a haven their young family enjoys every day.

When Ashley and Jamin Mills purchased a little builder-grade home, they didn't plan to be there long. It wasn't their style. It wasn't their dream home.

So they left the brown and beige house in Montgomery, Alabama, as it was, until one day Ashley decided to stop pining away for the beautiful farmhouse kitchen she wanted so badly and to make this home into one she could love.

The makeover began with paint. No room was left untouched as the couple embraced their new philosophy: "Down with the brown, hello eclectic farmhouse love," Ashley says.

Ashley majored in art and is a graphic designer by trade, so it makes sense that she began to use their home as a canvas. "Color should be used or balanced like you would in a piece of art," she says.

Ashley took another natural step when she got tired of seeing frames with painfully high price tags that didn't

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come in the colors or sizes she wanted. The couple's solution? Make their own. "Anything you see on our wall, we've done to try to bring that super personal aspect in," Ashley says.

Ashley and Jamin make it a goal to incorporate family photos into nearly every room, such as the collage of Instagram pictures in the living room.

"From spaghetti-covered hands to Lego men, merry-go-rounds, and spilled Froot Loops, all of the little photos brought a real punch to our space with depth and warmth and fun color," Ashley says. "We catch our kids on a regular basis standing on the couch to get a better view of themselves."

Being the stars of the home's artwork isn't the only role Aiden, Emerson, and Malone play in the design process.

Ashley likes to look at the space from their perspective and think about what will be fun for them.

"The kids always have a say," Ashley

says. "It's not all about me because I share that space with our family."

As Jamin and Ashley kept gaining
DIY skills and crafting a home they
loved, Ashley started her blog, The
Handmade Home (thehandmadehome
\_net). It's so popular that Ashley now
works as a full-time lifestyle blogger.

"We broke a few conventional 'rules' to live life in our home like it was our last one," Ashley says. "And it was liberating."







### What they did...

LEFT: Scored for \$25 each, reclaimed planks from an old peanut barn became striking shelves in the dining room when placed on metal supports welded by a friend. Ashley used her beloved overhead projector to trace a damask pattern on a long skinny board before painting it and hanging it on the wall between two shelves. What looks like a large mirror is actually a series of small affordable glass tiles affixed to medium-density fiberboard (MDF) and framed. Another large handmade frame fills the wall opposite the windows. Cutouts in a large painted board showcase cork tiles and 8x8-inch photos mounted on MDF blocks for a dimensional display. The couple balances big projects with easy upgrades, such as the simple cloth for the table. ABOVE LEFT: Baskets along the bottom shelf hold china, napkins, and other entertainment supplies. ABOVE: Ashley and Jamin made this wood box and painted it with checks and stripes. When filled with jars of flowers, it's a high-impact centerpiece. It also holds art supplies during crafts sessions.

Ashley painted it with magnetic primer and chalkboard paint. RIGHT: The large pin board by the kitchen table is one of the first projects Jamin and Ashley attempted. ABOVE: The boys share a custom loft bed complete with rope ladder. Monograms identify each brother's side. Ashley stitched curtains and hung them from a copper pipe to hide the bed's legs and create a fun nook for the boys to play. The couple made the toy box, and Ashley painted the "mills bros." sign. 





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### Recycled wreath

OPPOSITE: Most gardeners gather bumper crops of plastic nursery pots and cell packs each year at planting time. Here's a creative way to reuse them, no matter their shape, size, or color. The wreath is designed to tough it out in the rain or sun. To make a hanger for it, bend a 3-inch length of wire into a U shape. Dab the ends of bent wire in glue and poke them into the back of the wreath near the top center. LEFT: When attaching a flower to the wreath using a floral pin or nail, add a dot of hot glue to secure it.



### how to make a nursery pot wreath

What you'll need:



step 3 Download and print the flower and leaf patterns. Cut the nursery pots and cell packs using the patterns (d). Bend the plastic shapes for dimension.

5tep 4 Working outdoors, spray-paint the plastic flower and leaf shapes, using more than one color of paint, if you like. Allow the paint to dry for at least four hours or overnight.

step 5 Anchor each flower or leaf to the wreath using a floral pin, nail, or piece of floral wire (e). If necessary, use an awl to poke a hole in the shapes and secure with hot glue (f, g). Wire a bead in the center of some flowers (h).

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### how to form a sphere and pedestal

What you'll need (a):

- \_\_Three 4-foot lengths \_\_Vines (bittersweet, of 3/8-inch rebar
- \_\_Spray primer
- Exterior spray paint
- Pruners

**Step 1** Carefully bend one end of each rebar, arching it to form a pedestal for the vine sphere. We used a sidewalk crack to anchor the rebar end while bending it.


5tep 2 Spray the rebar with primer and let dry. Apply exterior spray paint to the rebar; let dry.

5tep 3 Gather vine prunings; strip off any leaves. Twist a length of vine into a circle the size of your desired sphere (b). Wrap and tuck the vine ends to secure them.

**Step 4** Make another circle of vine and fit the two circles together to form opposite axes, twisting and tucking the vine ends to secure them (c).

5 Add lengths of vine to round out the sphere, filling large gaps, and tucking the ends into place (d).

step 6 Coat the finished sphere with floral spray paint. When dry, place on the rebar base.





**step 3** Fit the terra-cotta pots inside the crate as snugly as possible, forming a pleasing pattern. Dab construction adhesive on the bottom of the pots to attach them to the crate (d). Turn some 2-inch pots over and use them as risers for other 2-inch pots. Glue the bottoms of the pots together, then glue the rim of one pot to the crate.

5tep 4 Tuck trinkets inside the terra-cotta pots.

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


### Winged wonders

LEFT and OPPOSITE: A bundle of lath, available at a building center, yields two wood canvases to bring a bit of color to a fence or wall, inside or out. It's also a great way to screen an unattractive view. Each palletlike canvas is lightweight yet sturdy when attached to a 2x2 frame. We hung ours from a wire attached to 3/4-inch wood screws at the top corners.

5tep 1 Place two 2x2s upright and 24 inches apart on a firm work surface. Lay the lath crosswise between the uprights; spaced at least 1/4 inch apart (b). Fasten the lath ends to the 2x2s using wire brads. Secure additional lath to the back at the top and bottom.

step 2 Roll outdoor acrylic paint onto the front of the lath canvas. Let the paint dry overnight.

step 3 Download and enlarge pattern to 20×20 inches (c). Spray repositionable adhesive on the back and secure it to poster board. Using a crafts knife, cut out black areas to make a stencil (d). Cut inside the lines to avoid cutting the connectors that hold the stencil together.

step 4 Brush grasslike stripes of paint onto the bottom portion of the lath canvas. Let the paint dry.

step 5 Position stencil on the lath canvas using repositionable adhesive. Paint image with a flat brush; let dry. Add a hanger to the back with screws and wire.


























### how to make a flower stake

What you'll need:

drill bit

- \_\_ 4-foot wood garden \_\_ Poster board \_\_Aluminum flashing
- \_\_Acrylic exterior paint \_\_Awl
- or stain \_ Drill and 3/16-inch
  - \_\_Scrap metal machinery part
- \_\_ Patterns from BHG .com/DIYGardenArt
- Decorative knob
  - \_\_Washer and nut

5tep 1 Paint or stain the wood stake. Drill a hole about 1 inch from the top of the stake.

5tep 2 Download the flower petal pattern. Cut a flower petal template from poster board and use it to cut desired number of petals out of aluminum flashing (c). Wear gloves and safety goggles when working with flashing.

step 3 Use the awl to poke a hole near the bottom of each petal, approximately 1 inch from the end (d).

5tep 4 If desired, distress the petals by laying them on a rough surface and rubbing them with a wood block (e). Score the center of each petal using the awl tip (f). Bend each petal along the scoring to add dimension (g).

step 5 Poke the threaded end of the decorative knob through the hole of the machinery part and each petal, then through the hole in the stake. Add a washer and nut to secure (h).

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We used wallpaper samples, available for a small fee from online wallpaper suppliers, to create the projects featured here. OPPOSITE: Covering the sides and lids of storage tins with wallpaper gives them pattern and personality. Use decoupage medium, such as Mod Podge Paper Matte, to adhere the paper. ABOVE: A smooth tabletop is the perfect spot for a colorful wallpaper makeover. Just cut the paper to fit, then adhere it with decoupage medium. To protect the surface, brush with decoupage medium or spray with clear acrylic sealer.




ABOVE: A plain round serving tray is anything but ordinary when it gets a makeover with wallpaper. We measured the diameter of the tray interior, then used a circle cutter to cut the paper to fit. We painted decoupage medium onto the tray surface, laid the wallpaper circle on top, then smoothed any wrinkles or air bubbles with a rubber brayer.



### What we did...

LEFT: A piece of wallpaper, folded accordion style, can turn a basic lampshade into a cleverly coordinated room accessory that easily slips into place.



### how to cover a lampshade

What you'll need:

- \_\_ Bone folder
- \_\_ Lampshade
- \_\_ Embroidery needle
- \_\_ Wallpaper
- \_\_ Embroidery floss
- \_\_Straightedge
- \_\_ Double-sided tape

**step 1** Measure around widest part of lampshade; multiply by 4.5. Measure height of shade; add ¼ inch. Cut wallpaper to these dimensions.

**5tep 2** Working on wrong side of wallpaper, mark a parallel line 1½ inches from each long edge. Mark ½-inch increments along each line (a).

**step 3** Use a straightedge and bone folder to score folding lines along length of paper at ½-inch increments (b).

**3tep 4** Fold paper accordion style along scored lines, turning paper over for each fold (c).

step 5 Use embroidery needle to pierce a hole between each fold, along marked lines (d). Stitch through holes along top with embroidery floss, leaving a 4-inch tail at each end. Repeat along bottom.


step 6 Secure short ends of shade together with double-sided tape. Slip over lampshade. Pull thread ends to gather shade at top and bottom; tie to secure.




ABOVE: The intersecting surfaces and colorful wallpaper backgrounds of this DIY shadow box make a nifty way to display a collection of curios. We cut and assembled the pieces for the frame from 1×4 pine. Decoupage medium attaches wallpaper to the hardboard backing and shelf surfaces. ### how to make a paper flower

What you'll need:

\_\_Silk flower stem

\_\_3/4-inch gray

bias binding

step 1 Remove silk flower head from stem. Wrap stem with double-sided tape. Wind bias binding around the stem and secure the end with hot glue.

step 2 Print the downloaded petal patterns. Trace each shape five times on wrong side of wallpaper. Cut out the shapes (a).

otep 3 Print the leaf pattern and trace three times on wrong side of wallpaper. Cut out the shapes.

step 4 Beginning with smallest petals, wrap one petal around the end of the stem, securing with hot glue. Continue layering and gluing petals, trimming if needed, and overlapping petals as you work outward. Use largest petals on outside of flower.

step 5 Hot-glue three leaves along stem (b). Hot-glue green bead to center of flower.





### What we did...

ABOVE: Priceless collections aren't the only thing worthy of displaying under glass. Colorful patterned wallpaper strips, trimmed to varying lengths and arranged in an offset brick pattern, are an inexpensive way to add color and pattern to a room. We used decoupage medium to attach the pieces, smoothed out any air bubbles, and covered the dry paper with glass.

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I always wanted a front porch reminiscent of neighborhoods past. I longed for a place where warm summer breezes and tinkling wind chimes prevail, a spot where my husband, Mike, and I could swing and sip lemonade, watch our daughter play, and simply relax.

With dreams of a sun-filled outdoor space filling my head, I turned my attention to the front of our 1940s-era home. Our existing porch had potential, but it was gray and weathered and in desperate need of repair and personality. I was ready to take on the transformation, beginning with the floor.

With a carpenter's help, we cut out the deteriorated wood on the perimeter of the porch and replaced it with durable

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gray-brown composite decking. Because the rest of the boards were in good shape, I painted them blue. The new composite boards run perpendicular to the originals, framing the painted portion to create a ruglike effect for the seating area.

Although the beaded-board ceiling was peeling, I knew it could be fixed with sanding and a fresh coat of paint.

I brushed on the same cool blue paint as I'd used on the floor for a cohesive look.

And what is a porch without a swing? One sheet of plywood, high-gloss yellow paint, and strong rope came together into my long-awaited swing, which I designed to be deep enough for cozy afternoon lounging amid lots of pillows. Handmade furniture and accessories affordably add more style to the space.

Yes, porch days are back in full swing at our house. If you're looking for me this summer, you'll know where to find me.





### What she did...

What she did...

OPPOSITE: A sheet of marine-grade plywood was crafted into our cheery lemon yellow swing that offers ample space for lounging. A Moroccan-inspired patterned cushion, made with outdoor fabric and accented with teal piping, adds comfort.

LEFT: Instead of a typical hanging chain, heavy-duty rope was used to suspend the swing from ceiling-mounted eyebolts. Two S hooks per eyebolt safely support up to 700 pounds. BELOW LEFT: Taking inspiration from suzani textiles, I created a stencil and painted the pattern on the floorboards with high-gloss white spray paint. BELOW: When I saw two discarded shipping pallets beside the road, I envisioned them stacked to make a coffee table. Most anyone who has remodeled a kitchen realizes that a sense of humor eases the process. Fortunately, blogger Holly Burns' instinct is to see the light side. Her response to the dated kitchen of the San Francisco house she and husband Sean bought: "Hey, the '80s called—and they don't want any of this stuff back!"

She's also blessed with a good design eye. Looking past flowery wallpaper, dark cabinets, aging appliances, and dated tile, she saw a modern kitchen with a dining area for entertaining.

Budget and deadline for the remodel were tight. The couple tackled most of the work themselves, finishing in just under a month. Even that brief time frame seemed too long to Holly. "Those were the four longest weeks of my life," she says. The hurry-up schedule also meant major disruption: They were without a functioning kitchen—no sink or working appliances—and the floor was torn up for almost two weeks. "I think of this as my Bleak Period," Holly says with a laugh.



### What she did...

OPPOSITE: The large-scale world map in the dining room reminds Holly and Sean Burns of their many travels and inspires future vacation plans. Below the map rests a family heirloom: a well-traveled chest passed down from Holly's German grandmother. Holly found the table, chairs, and light fixture online. All are budget-savvy takes on modern classics. ABOVE: The IKEA apron-front sink and pullout faucet were affordable choices and easy to install. Holly chose a ceiling-mount pot rack to show off new cookware and free up cabinet storage space. Choosing a clay-color porcelain tile for the floor was one decision that the couple lingered over; they're happy with the warmth it adds. LEFT: Though the how-to of plumbing, electrical, and tiling was new to Holly, the remodel went smoothly. Now she regularly entertains family and friends in the refreshed space.

Before...

Most design decisions were made early, and much of the work went smoothly. They stripped the wallpaper and painted the dining room a cool gray and the kitchen's dark wood cabinets a bright white. The new brushednickel cabinet hardware they installed complements new stainless-steel appliances. Doing the work themselves left money in the budget for quartz-surfacing countertops, the only aspect they had professionally done.

White subway tile for the backsplash was a smart style and budget choice, even if grouting is now Holly's least favorite home improvement project. "I love the way the wall looks, but I'll be happy if I never hear the word grout again," she says.

Some decisions pushed the couple's limits: Deciding on the clay color for the floor tile was as tough as tearing out layers of linoleum and installing the new floor. But removing the backsplash and countertops with a sledgehammer allowed Sean to express his inner Hulk. Holly's release through the process was posting updates on her blog, Nothing But Bonfires. "Detailing our progress on my blog kept me sane," she says.





ABOVE: Removing the doors and back of the peninsula cabinet and painting the newly exposed space white brought more light to the interior kitchen without reducing storage space. OPPOSITE: Laughing has always come easily to Holly, as has making lists. So painting the narrow wall next to the refrigerator in chalkboard paint, floor to ceiling, was a natural choice. She uses the main section for grocery lists, and the frame above is reserved for dinner-party menus and to-do lists. Next up: remodeling the bathroom. "But only after a 300-year nap!" Holly says.

### What we did...

THIS PHOTO: Why wait for a special occasion to pamper your friends? We went all-out girlie with our palette of pinks and oranges, covering the table with flowers and take-home treats. We spruced up a plain linen table runner with ribbon attached with fabric glue. Painted wood blocks cut to different heights elevate arrangements without blocking the view.

















## how to make a dessert stand

What you'll need:

- Glass jars about 2–4 inches in diameter and height
- Clear glass saucers about 6 inches in diameterFrosted-glass spray paint
- \_\_Spray paint
- Adhesive for ceramic or glass (We used Elmer's ceramic and glass cement.)

.....

**step 1** Gather materials (a). Apply a coat of frosted-glass spray paint to the outside and inside of each jar and the bottom of each saucer. Let dry. Spray the outside and inside of each jar and the bottom of each saucer with spray paint (b). Note: Do NOT paint the top of the saucer, as it will come in contact with food. Most spray paints are not food-safe.

......

Step 2 Apply a thin bead of adhesive to the top of one jar and the bottom of one saucer (c). Attach the plate to the jar and allow to seal and dry (d). Repeat with remaining jars and saucers. TIP: Although many glues are dishwasher-safe once fully cured, it is best to hand-wash to protect the painted surface.

### What we did...

OPPOSITE TOP: Individual cake stands at each place setting encourage friends to indulge in a treat or two. OPPOSITE MIDDLE: Handmade tissue-paper flowers decorate the backs of chairs and hang from the window. OPPOSITE BOTTOM: We gathered supplies, like pink leather cord and silver rings, from the jewelry-supplies section of the crafts store to create these napkin rings that double as bracelets your guests can wear home. BELOW: Make a sweet centerpiece for a few dollars with lumberyard leftovers and crafts materials. Cut a 4x4-inch wood beam into lengths ranging from 2 to 6 inches. Coat the pieces in latex paint (we used shades of pink and orange). Fill spray-painted glass jars with flowers and set them atop the wood pieces. RIGHT: Spray-paint the handles only (most spray paint is not food safe) to create these fancy forks from thriftstore scores. BELOW RIGHT: Use a butterfly punch (available at crafts stores) and scrapbook paper to fashion butterfly name cards that perch atop champagne flutes.



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### What we did...

OPPOSITE and TOP: We arranged paper-covered tiles in a 25×37inch wood frame to create a trivet that runs the length of the table. Alternatively, set tiles directly on the table in any pattern you like. Details such as mismatched tableware in blue hues add to the comfy and casual vibe. ABOVE: Wood finials for curtain rods are painted and repurposed to hold cards designed to prompt engaging dinner conversation. TOP RIGHT: Patterned washi tape wrapped around clear glassware gives it a custom look.





### how to make decorative tiles

What you'll need:

- \_\_ Scrapbook paper (We used 12 patterns in shades of blue.)
- \_\_Twelve 6×6-inch white ceramic tiles
- \_\_ Foam paintbrush
- \_\_ Matte decoupage medium (We used Mod Podge.)
- \_\_ Small rubber roller
- \_\_ Clear acrylic sealer spray

step 1 Gather materials (a). Cut scrapbook paper so you have 12 pieces measuring 6x6 inches each.

5tep 2 Use the foam brush to apply a light coat of decoupage medium to the top of one tile (b). Place one paper square on top of the tile. Gently run the roller over the paper to smooth it.

5tep 3 Apply three thin coats of decoupage medium to the top of the paper (c), allowing 15 minutes of drying time between coats. Allow final coat to dry one hour before spraying on one coat of clear acrylic sealer (d). Let dry one hour. Repeat these steps for remaining tiles.
















### how to paint copperlook stemware

What you'll need:

- \_\_Glass stemware
- \_\_Painter's tape
- \_\_Kraft paper
- \_\_Frosted-glass spray paint
- \_\_Metallic spray paint in copper

**Step 1** Gather materials (a). Use painter's tape and kraft paper to cover all but the bottom half of the stem and all of the base (b).

**Step 2** Spray the exposed portion of the stem and base with frosted-glass spray paint. Allow 15 minutes of drying time. Apply a coat of metallic spray paint (c). When completely dry (at least 30 minutes), carefully remove the tape and kraft paper (d). TIP: Painted stemware should be

washed by hand.







### Double decker

OPPOSITE: Situated at the edge of a patio, this trickling double-decker fountain turns a small space into an exotic outdoor room. The larger pot sits on pot feet (painted to match), raising it enough for the pump's electrical cord to move freely from the bottom of the container. LEFT: The smaller pot fits easily inside the bigger one, allowing water to flow over its rim and recirculate. High-fired glazed pottery such as this proves ideal for a fountain because it is more durable than terra-cotta or glazed ceramic.

















### how to make a double-decker fountain

What you'll need (a):

- \_\_Glazed pots in two sizes (Ours are 18 and 8 inches in diameter.)
- \_\_170 gph pump and fountain kit
- \_\_Power drill and masonry bit
- \_\_Plumber's putty
- \_\_Clear silicone
- \_\_ Bricks
- \_\_Plastic nursery pot
- \_\_ Fieldstones
- \_\_ River rock
- \_\_Terra-cotta pot feet

**step 1** Fit the pump cord through the drainage hole of the larger pot (b). If needed, enlarge the hole using a power drill and masonry bit.

step 2 Leave 12 inches of cord inside the pot. Plug the drainage hole with plumber's putty, sealing the cord in place. After the putty dries, reinforce the seal with silicone applied inside and outside the pot (c), smoothing with a fingertip (d).

step 3 Set the pump on two bricks inside the large pot (e). Cover the pump with a sturdy, overturned plastic nursery pot. Fit the fountain tubing through the drainage hole in the bottom of the nursery pot (f).

step 4 Set the small pot on the nursery pot and extend the fountain tubing through the pot's drainage hole. Hold the pump in place with a few fieldstones (g).

step 5 Fill both pots with clean river rock and water (h). TIP: Rinsing the rocks thoroughly before adding them to the fountain will help prevent soil and other debris from clogging the pump. Place the fountain on pot feet painted to match the glazed pots. Plug the pump into a ground fault circuit interrupter outlet to prevent potential shocks.

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OPPOSITE: A wavy watertight planter reflects the feel of the ocean when you paint the inside with acrylic outdoor paint in metallic blue, pink and green. Set the basin on an overturned nursery pot (see inset), which hides the pump. A 17-inch-diameter plastic pot saucer holds the assembly and a collection of plantings. ABOVE: Small houseplants-begonia, dracena, peperomia, fern, and polka dot plant-hide the nursery pot and make an instant garden. Preserved green moss neatly holds the

### What we did...

OPPOSITE: A great party starts with a fitting invitation. Download our invites at BHG.com/DIYPicnic, print, and use spray adhesive or double-sided tape to secure them to cardstock. Fold the cardstock to enclose the invite, and tie each with cotton twine. ABOVE: Preserve a moment of your picnic for posterity with a simple flower press. Cut two pieces of 1/4-inch plywood to 6x9 inches. Spray-paint the plywood, let dry, and use a hot-glue gun to embellish with fabric, ribbon, and trim. Cut cardboard into 10 rectangles of 5½×8½ inches. Sandwich the cardboard between the two pieces of plywood. Mark a hole 1 inch from each corner of the plywood, and using a %-inch drill bit, drill through all layers. Secure each corner with a 3-inch set screw with a wing nut on either end. To press flowers, place petals between two pieces of parchment paper and sandwich between the cardboard layers. Tighten the wing nuts, and press for about two weeks or until petals are dry. RIGHT: Guide your guests to your picnic spot with a printable sign. Cover a 10×12½-inch piece of foam-core board in patterned paper. Download and print the artwork from BHG.com/DIYPicnic, cut it out, and use spray adhesive to attach it to the paper-covered board. Cut a length of ribbon and glue the ends to the back for a hanger.





### What we did...

**OPPOSITE**: Trick out two store-bought trays by adding foldable legs and hinges to have a picnic-perfect table at the ready. The legs attach to the inside of each tray. When the legs are folded, hinges allow the table to fold in half for easier portability. When the legs are extended, the underside of the trays becomes the tabletop. RIGHT: Turn a plain tablecloth into a custom picnic blanket by masking off lines for stripes with painter's tape. Use a foam paintbrush and exterior latex paint to color the stripes. FAR RIGHT: Wildflower bouquets in rustic Mason jars invite nature to the table.





### how to build a picnic tray table

What you'll need:

- \_\_ Two large rectangular trays (Ours, from westelm.com, measure 18×28 inches.)
- \_\_ Painter's tape
- \_\_ Spray paint (We used Aubergine by Rust-Oleum.)
- \_\_\_ 1½-inch square poplar dowels (We used six 36-inch pieces.)
- \_\_ Sandpaper
- \_\_ Wood glue
- \_\_ 13/4-inch wood screws
- \_\_ Drill and corresponding drill bits
- \_\_ <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-20×2-inch elevator bolts
- \_\_ 1/4×1-inch nylon washers
- \_\_ ¹/₄-inch flat washers
- \_\_ 1/4-inch wing nuts
- \_\_ 2½-inch hinges


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**step 1** Protect the edges of each tray with painter's tape and spray-paint the bottoms.

5tep 2 To make four sets of legs (two sets per tray), cut the dowels into eight 13-inch pieces and four 14¾inch pieces. Sand the ends of each 13-inch piece. Paint the dowels.

**step 3** Using wood glue and a 1¾-inch screw, attach a 14¾-inch dowel 2 inches from the bottom of two 13-inch





legs to form a crosspiece. Repeat for each set of legs. On the other end of each 13-inch piece, measure in ¾ inch and drill a hole using a bit large enough to accommodate an elevator bolt.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

**Step 4** Place trays facedown on work surface. On the long sides of the trays, mark a spot 1 inch from both ends and 1¼ inches from the edge. Drill a hole using a bit large enough to accommodate an elevator bolt.

.....

**5tep 5** Working from the outside of the tray, insert an elevator bolt through the hole, add a nylon washer, push through the hole in a leg, and then add a flat washer and a wing nut. Tighten the wing nut until the leg is tight, but still rotates and isn't wobbly. Repeat for each leg.

step 6 Hinge the two trays together on the long sides so that the legs will be inside the table when closed (a).

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Carry by the built-in handles (b).





### What we did...

OPPOSITE: Packing food in pretty tins instantly upgrades your alfresco dining aesthetic. Simply spray-paint the exterior of the tins and let dry. Download the "Enjoy" label at BHG.com/DIYPicnic and print it on sticker paper or secure with spray adhesive or double-sided tape to the top of each tin. Fashion simple and eco-friendly bamboo utensils (available at thinkgamish.com) into designer dinnerware. Simply use a metallic paint pen (we like Krylon's Leafing Pens) to doodle on the handles to your hearts desire. LEFT: These custom cushions are comfy, plus they're stackable for easy stash-andgo access. To make one, place an 18×18-inch napkin or piece of fabric right side down on a work surface. Center a piece of 14x14-inch upholstery foam on top. Then center a piece of 12×12-inch plywood (we used %-inch-thick plywood) on top of the foam. Starting at the center on opposite sides, fold the fabric and foam over the plywood. Using 1/4-inch staples, staple around the perimeter of the board, stretching the fabric tightly. To finish the piece, center an 11×11-inch piece of 1/4-inch-thick plywood on the bottom of the seat and staple the corners using ½-inch staples. (This hides the folded corners of fabric and stabilizes the seat.) BELOW: When stacked between two boards and held together with 11/2-inch nylon webbing from the hardware store, the filled tins are fit to be tied and transported.
