1 Conversation starter Vintage ephemera can often be found for pennies at garage sales, thrift stores, online shops, or eBay. Sift through the offerings for old postcards; pick a few choice messages or interesting scenes and use double-stick tape to cover bottle labels or attach to containers.

#### 2 On the boards

With a bit of sewing, retro bingo cards disguise ordinary vessels. Sew the long edges of three or four bingo cards together by hand or with a sewing machine using a zigzag stitch. Slide the covers over jars, vases, or other containers.







**3** Sell and serve Kitsch meets clever with the reuse of vintage advertisements. Colorful magazine pages add pizzazz to clear glass serving bowls and platters with flat bottoms. Trace the bottom of the dish and trim the page to size. Use a small foam brush and decoupage medium (a) to adhere the paper to the underside of the dish. Smooth out any bubbles, beginning from the center and working toward the edges.

- **4** Eye level Rosettes made from sheet music or book pages become a stunning overhead focal point. (See page 15 for rosette assembly instructions.) Vary page and fold sizes and number of sheets to create different looks. Hang on fishing line at varying heights.
- **5** New is nice This vintage-look table runner is actually new gift wrap printed with a retro pattern. Tape several sheets together to cover a table.
- 6 Raid your stash Board games with missing pieces, toy packaging, and other items around your house can become free party decor. On this tabletop, play money from a game adds pattern to glass votives.







**7** Take a seat Graphic and colorful, vintage playing cards are easily personalized to become place cards. Write each person's name on one side of a card. Hot-glue lollipop sticks or straws to card backs; insert the straws or sticks into the holes of wood spools of thread in hues that match your palette (a).

**8** A place at the table Neutral tabletop accents such as linen napkins work with a variety of party and decorative themes. To accent them, create miniature versions of the large hanging rosettes on page 12. Accordion-fold three book pages (or three small strips cut from book pages), then fold in half, hot-gluing the edges together to make a fan (a). Glue the edges of three fans together to create a rosette. Attach a bottle cap to the center of the rosette using a dab of hot glue, and trim the rosette if desired. Wrap a length of wired burlap ribbon around the center of the napkins; hot-glue or tape the rosette to the ribbon. Adorn with rosemary sprigs and faux or fresh berries.



If you're building or remodeling a bathroom, plan built-in cubbies and cabinets between wall studs. Maximize vertical storage by letting shelving, towel bars, and other units climb the walls. Put pretty bath items like soaps and towels on display; tuck the rest away or in stylish containers.

Though typically small, bathrooms can pack an impressive storage punch. Utilize a petite, freestanding unit, opposite, and stock it with basic wares. We painted the back of the cabinet blue so white textiles and pretty glass containers would shine.







While there are many ways to make pompoms, we like the uniformity a pompom maker achieves. Go to BHG.com/Pom-Pom to learn how to make pom-poms with a wooden fork.

## HOW TO MAKE A POM-POM

#### WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Yarn
- Scissors with
- Clover Pom-**Pom Maker**
- sharp tips

**step 1** Gather your materials (a).

**step 2** Open both arms of the pompom maker. Beginning at the end of one arm, wind yarn around the arm toward the hinge. Continue winding yarn onto second arm, working from the hinge to the end of the arm (b). Trim yarn to separate from ball.

**step 3** Close the pom-pom maker (c). Hold the pom-pom maker firmly in one hand. Using the tips of the scissors, snip through the side of the yarn wraps. Use the groove in the side of the tool as a guide for the scissors (d).

**step 4** Cut a length of yarn. If your pom-pom will be attached with a hanging string, cut a generous length. Wrap the yarn around the pom-pom maker, inserting it into the groove in the side of the tool. Tie the yarn in a single knot. Pull the yarn ends firmly to tighten the knot (e). Tie again to secure. Open the pom-pom maker arms (f).

**step 5** Pull the center of the tool apart and remove the pom-pom (g). Trim yarn tails with scissors, unless you plan to use the tails for attaching (h). If needed, shape the pom-pom with scissors.



#### **DEAR HANDY GIRL,**

The lightbulb in my living room lamp burned out. I know I should find an energy-efficient replacement, but I'm confused by all the new lingo. Help!

#### DEAR READER,

You're smart to replace the standard and halogen incandescent bulbs in your home with energy-efficient options. While CFLs (compact fluorescent lightbulbs) and LEDs (light-emitting diodes) have gotten a bad rap in the past for having poor light quality and high price tags, they're getting better (and more affordable) all the time and provide more savings in the long run. See the chart, below left, to compare the overall cost to purchase and power each kind over 10 years.

What's the difference? CFLs—the goofy-looking pigtails—last up to 10 years and cost a few bucks in a multipack. LEDs look more like a bulb, last 15–25 years, and cost \$10 and up. CFLs and LEDs use 25–80 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs.

Read each bulb's consumer information on the newly required Energy Star labels. To select a suitable replacement for your current fixture, compare lumens, the measure of light given off by the bulb, instead of watts. For a standard incandescent, 40 watts = 450 lumens; 60 watts = 800 lumens; and 75 watts = 1,100 lumens.

The Kelvin (K) number, which measures the light color, is also important. If you prefer the warm yellow light of an incandescent bulb, look for warm white or soft white CFL or LED bulbs (about 2700K). If you prefer a cool, white light, look for daylight bulbs with at least 5000K. (The higher the number, the brighter and whiter the light.)

## **DEAR HANDY GIRL.**

What's up with new thermostats on the market? Some of them actually look cool! Is it easy to replace my old thing with something higher tech?

## DEAR READER.

Absolutely. Programmable thermostats reduce energy costs—good for both your budget and the environment. See my picks, right, to find a high-tech model that's right for your home.

First, ask your energy provider about an energy audit—several do it for free and might install a reduced-price thermostat for you.

To do this yourself, shut off the power at the main fuse box and grab a screwdriver and level. Remove the housing from the old model, then remove the old thermostat. Tuck the wires safely to the side—I like to fold a piece of labeled tape around each wire to keep them from slipping inside the wall. Pull the wires through the new wall plate, mount the plate securely to the wall, and check that it's level.

Hook up the wires clockwise around the terminals and push any excess back into the wall, according to manufacturer's instructions. Attach the body to the cover plate and follow the programming instructions.

## **DEAR HANDY GIRL,**

the plumbing thing myself?

The last two times I've thrown a dinner party, my sink has clogged and bill made the bash twice as expensive. How can I unclog this

## DEAR READER,

If your disposal motor shuts off during operation, it's probably overloaded. Wait a few minutes for the unit to cool, then push the red button to reset the motor (a). If a solid object has caused a jam, turn off the power and use a disposal turning tool (b) to turn the grinder back and forth. Remove the obstruction, replace the splash quard, turn on the cold water, and test.

If water is draining sluggishly, there's probably an obstruction in the drain. Grab your pliers, screwdriver, wire hanger, plastic drain stick, plunger, wet rags, bucket, a pipe wrench, bottle brush, and plumbing snake. Here we go:


**ONE** Pull out the sink stopper by turning it with your fingers. Also remove the strainer or screen if you have one. Clean off both and check for a blockage at the top of the drain. Toss the yuck into a bucket as you work.


TWO Insert a plastic drain stick or a bent clothes hanger into the drain to hook and remove other clogs. Run hot water to wash away the gunk you stirred up. If the water drains well, replace all. If not, grab the plunger.


THREE Using a small sink plunger, work to shift whatever is clogging that pipe. Try it when the sink is both dry (block the overflow hole with wet rags to create a vacuum) and wet (fill the sink with a few inches of water, and plunge). Keep it up until it drains freely. No change? Steel yourself. We're going into the drainpipe.


FOUR A sink's P-trap captures debris or dropped items. Place your bucket beneath to catch water and gross stuff as you disassemble the pipes. (Newer sink traps might have a removable square or hexagon plug at the base of the U that lets you access the trap easier.) For metal traps sans plugs, use a pipe wrench to loosen the couplings, or if it's a PVC pipe you can probably just loosen it with your hands. Clean the trap and adjacent pipe using a bent wire or a bottle brush. Reassemble and flush with hot water to make sure that baby's clear. If water still isn't draining well, remove the trap and twist a plumber's snake or cable auger (c) into the pipe between the trap and wall to grab and remove that beast.









## **DEAR HANDY GIRL,** I love my new-to-me house that was built almost 100 years ago, but it's crazy drafty. It's like a wind tunnel in here! Got any tips before winter?

## DEAR READER,

Creating a tight seal at all doors, windows, and anything else that opens would help. Here's how to do it with caulk and weather stripping.

**CAULKING** Caulk fills gaps where materials meet (baseboards, chimney and siding, door and window frames, light canopies, pipes, service lines, etc.). You might need to fill wide gaps with closed-cell foam backer strips or foam sealant. To load your caulk gun, invert and pull the plunger handle all the way back, insert the caulk tube, and then push the plunger forward (a). Hold the gun at a 45-degree angle and pull it toward you in a smooth, steady stroke while maintaining even pressure on the trigger. At the end of a stroke, lift the tip with a twist, then guickly release the plunger. Remove excess caulk from the nozzle. Finish by smoothing the bead in one stroke with a moist fingertip. It takes a little practice, so try it in an inconspicuous area first. Save partial tubes by sealing them with a nail or a screw.

**WEATHER-STRIPPING WINDOWS** Rolled vinyl, foam, and other gasket-type weather-stripping products seal two surfaces that

meet each other. When a window closes, the weather stripping compresses to seal air leaks. For double-hung windows, attach a strip to the bottom of the upper sash (b). For casement windows, attach strips to the sash or to the casing and the sill, whichever provides a tighter squeeze.

**WEATHER-STRIPPING DOORS** Install a seal to exterior door thresholds. A door sweep (not pictured) installs at the bottom of the interior side of the door, a shoe makes a seal underneath, and a drip cap installs on the bottom of the exterior side (c). If you see gaps in the weather-stripping around the door, it's time to replace. You'll need about 30 minutes per door. To install metal-and-vinyl strips, close the door. Cut pieces to fit using tin snips or a hacksaw. Apply to the stop so it just touches the door (d). Drive the screws provided into the center of each slot so you can adjust the position if needed. You also can add spring metal (not pictured) along each side. Nail each strip to the jamb inside the stop, with the open end facing the exterior. On the latch side, notch-cut the strip to fit around the strike plate.







## HOW TO MAKE DRINKING-STRAW ORNAMENTS

## WHAT YOU'LL NEED (A):

- Patternedpaper strawsCrafts knife
- Embroidery floss
- Cutting mat
- Embroidery needle

**Step 1** To make a diamond shape, cut straws into twelve 2-inch pieces using a crafts knife. Cut a 36-inch length of embroidery floss and use the needle to string on four straw pieces, leaving a long tail at the end. Pull straws tight, shape into a diamond, and knot floss (b).

-----

**Step 2** String two straw pieces onto the knotted floss (c), pushing them to the bottom of your diamond. Loop the floss around the top of the diamond and pull tight to secure the straws. Add two more straws to complete the opposite side of the second diamond (d). Tie the floss at the top of the ornament (e).

-----

**step 3** Insert the needle back through one straw to the middle of one side where two straws meet (f). Thread the floss through four more straws to make a diamond around the center of the ornament, looping the floss around the corners to secure them (g). Thread the needle back through a straw to the top of the ornament and make a loop (h).

## Wooden wonders

LEFT and BELOW: Balsa wood is easy to work with (we like 1/16-inch-thick sheets for this project) and makes these custom critters look oh-so-modern. Print and cut out the shield, head, and antler templates from BHG.com/DIYOrnaments. Trace the shapes onto balsa wood and cut out with a crafts knife. Paint backgrounds as desired. Use the knife to cut out holes as marked, and assemble each animal. Hang with embroidery floss.



## Seasonal stripes

BELOW: Think outside the ready-made ornament box by making a custom set in less than an hour. Pick up papier-mâché ornaments at the crafts store and paint sections in favorite colors. Hang to dry, then use on a tree or in a clear vase as a festive centerpiece. Bonus: Repaint the ornaments each year if you like to switch the color palette of your holiday decor.



## Branch out

ABOVE: Use modeling clay and thread to make a set of darling decorations. Roll out white polymer clay (we used Sculpey) to 1/4 inch thick. Cut out circles using a cookie cutter or the open end of a drinking glass. Punch patterns of holes into the clay with a frosting tip or lollipop stick. Bake according to package directions. Cool and finish with glaze made for polymer clay; let dry. Embroider star, square, and sunburst designs using embroidery floss and a needle. Use floss to hang the ornaments on yarn-wrapped branches. (We tucked our branches in a tall vase filled with pebbles to provide support.)



## Sequin forest

RIGHT: Dress up a mantel, side table, or dining table with a set of sparkly conifers. Work in sections to cover 5×133/4-, 4×10-, and 3x7-inch papier-mâché or foam cones with hot glue; roll in sequins. Continue until the cone is covered. Vary the size of the sequins according to the size of the tree (small for small, medium for medium, etc.) if desired.









## HOW TO PAINT MARBLED ORNAMENTS

## WHAT YOU'LL NEED (A):

- Hacksaw
- Small log
- Sandpaper
- Tack cloth
- Crafts paint (We used four

**Step 1** Cut 3/4-inch-thick slices from a log that is about 4-6 inches in diameter. Sand flat surface until smooth, and wipe clean with tack cloth.

**Step 2** Starting with the darkest color of paint, squeeze a little on the center of the slice. Working outward, make rings of paint around the initial dab with other colors (b).

**step 3** Blow up a balloon, press it against the wet paint, and twist to create a marbled effect (c); let dry.

**Step 4** Drill a 1/4-inch hole (d), thread ribbon through, and hang.

Square up To make a tiered pendant, cut thirty-seven 3-inch wood squares from 1/4-inch-thick red oak boards; lightly sand them. Make a whitewash with 1 part paint and 4 parts water, apply to one side of the squares, and let dry. Use painter's tape to mask off all but the bottom 1 inch of each square. Gather three intensities of the same spray-paint color: dark, medium, and light (we used green). Use the darkest shade to paint the bottom inch of 16 squares, the medium shade for 12 squares, and the light shade for 9 squares. Next, cut an 18-inch piece from a 1/4×3-inch poplar board, then cut 14-inch and 10-inch pieces from 1/4×2-inch poplar. In the center of the 18-inch piece, drill a 1¾-inch hole with a hole saw drill bit.

Measure 1 inch in from both ends of the 10-inch board and mark with a pencil. Measure to center of each of the three boards and mark. Line up the centers of all boards, then drill a hole through all three at the 1-inch markings on the 10-inch board using a 5/32-inch drill bit. Next, spray-paint the inner ring of an 18-inch guilting hoop and the 18-inch poplar board in the dark shade. Spray-paint the inner ring of a 14inch quilting hoop and the 14-inch poplar board with the medium shade, then paint the inner ring of a 10-inch embroidery hoop and the 10-inch poplar board with the light shade. (You won't need the outer rings that have tightening screws.) Let dry. Attach the 18-inch board across the middle of the 18-inch hoop using wood

glue. Clamp and let dry. Repeat with the remaining boards and hoops. Hot-glue 16 dark squares onto the 18-inch quilting hoop, even with the top edge of the hoop and spaced about 1/4 inch apart. Repeat with 12 medium-color squares on the 14-inch hoop, and 9 light-color squares on the 10-inch hoop. Screw one nut onto each of two No. 10-24×24-inch threaded rods and slide the 18-inch hoop layer on using the two drilled holes. Screw another nut on each rod to secure it to the 18-inch layer. Repeat this process until the rod has been secured to each layer. Use a level to ensure layers are even; tighten nuts to secure layers. Use a coping saw to remove excess rod if desired. Affix pendant light cord to the 18-inch board and hang.







Stick 'em up Paint one side of 40–50 paint stir sticks with white latex paint and let dry. Make a whitewash with 1 part paint and 4 parts water, apply to the opposite side of each stick, and let dry. Paint the inner rings of two 14-inch embroidery hoops white and let dry. (You won't need the outer hoops that have tightening screws.) Cut a 3x¼-inch poplar board to 14½ inches long. Drill a hole in the center of the board with a 1¾-inch hole

saw drill bit. Paint the board white; let dry. Hot-glue the board to the underside of one embroidery hoop. Then, hot-glue that hoop 1 inch from the top of the paint sticks, whitewash side out and notched side up. Glue the second embroidery hoop 1½ inches from the bottom of the sticks. Use painter's tape to mark off two triangles on opposite sides of the shade and spray-paint desired color. Let dry and remove tape. Tape off two more triangles,

slightly overlapping them with the first two triangles. Spray-paint desired color, let dry, and remove tape. Tape off two more triangles, slightly overlapping them with the others, and paint in a third color. Let dry and remove tape. Insert a pendant light cord through the hole in the poplar board, following instructions to assemble and hang.


## What we did...

Paint has the power to transform a room, and this artsy office is a prime example. We used spray paint to make several accessories—the swing-arm lamp, magazine holders, and clipboards from the office store—match the decor. Chalkboard paint in several shades of blue turned an empty wall into an organizational tool. Learn more about the projects in this space on the following pages.



THIS PHOTO: Sturdy countertop brackets provide support for this DIY desktop. Decorative paper gives white rolling cabinet frames some panache. Apply a thin coat of decoupage medium to the cabinet, working on one side at a time. Set paper in place and use a brayer to remove bubbles. To seal the paper, apply three coats of decoupage medium to the entire side with a paint roller, allowing to dry completely between coats. OPPOSITE, TOP LEFT: A single coat of gray stain gives the wood top a weathered look.





## HOW TO TURN PINE PLANKS INTO A DESKTOP

## WHAT YOU'LL NEED (a):

- Three 1×7×56inch pine boards
- Sander with 100-grit sandpaper
- Drop cloth
- Gloves
- Water-base wood stain (We used Minwax Slate.)
- Cotton rags
- Two 1x2x20inch pieces of scrap wood
- Drill with a 1/4-inch bit
- Twelve #6 wood screws
- Two 20-inch countertop brackets with hanging hardware

**step 1** Sand the pine boards so all sides are smooth (b). Use a cotton rag to apply stain to the boards, wiping in the direction of the wood grain (c). Wipe off excess stain with a clean rag. First, you may want to test stain on scrap pine to ensure you like the color and to determine how many coats are required to achieve the desired opacity.

**step 2** Secure the three pine planks together by attaching a support board toward each end. Using a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inch bit, drill six holes (two into each pine plank) through each support. Add #6 wood screws to the holes (d). These screws

are slightly smaller than the pilot holes, but the heads are large enough to keep the screws in place. This method allows some movement in case the wood planks expand over time.

**step 3** Hang metal brackets on the wall at a comfortable desk height, about 30 inches. If you'll be adding storage under the desk, hang the brackets high enough to accommodate the carts underneath. It's best to screw the brackets directly into wall studs; if that's not possible, use anchors designed to hold the weight of the desktop. Screw the desktop in place on top of the wall brackets.







## What we did...

OPPOSITE, CLOCKWISE FROM TOP LEFT: Trick out a cabinet by spray-painting the pulls gold and adding labels written in gold paint pen. Remove the seat of a secondhand chair before sanding the frame with fine-grit sandpaper. Apply paint using a cotton cloth for a distressed look. Cover the seat cushion with a fabric remnant, stapling it in place on the bottom. To add labels to white metal mail files, we masked off all but a 1-inch strip using painter's tape and covered the area with several coats of blue chalkboard paint. For creative storage jars, mask a portion with painter's tape and cover the open area with frosted-glass spray paint (which acts as a primer). When dry, add a coat of gold spray paint. Apply double-sided tape and coat with glitter. ABOVE: To make a chalkboard wall calendar, lay out the grid using a tape measure, ruler, level, and color pencil. Ours is 32×45 inches with a half-inch space between each 6-inch square. Tape off every third square with 1-inch delicate painter's tape. Use a 4-inch roller to apply three coats to each taped-off square, allowing drying time between coats. When dry, carefully remove the tape. Repeat the process on the remaining squares until finished. When the paint is fully cured, add numbers to the blocks with chalk markers. ABOVE RIGHT: A spray-painted paper holder, originally for a children's art easel, keeps a doodling surface nearby. RIGHT: Weave long strips of torn fabric through the holes of a wire basket. Tie knots on the back of the basket to secure each strip.



## GUNINIERS

Shimmery finishes, sparkling sequins, and other tiny touches of bling add just the right amount of glam to liven up everyday and entertaining spaces.

**Work space** Fashion a dazzling office or crafts area by adding small but sparkly touches to furniture and accessories, such as a rolling stool and bulletin board, *above*. See-through surfaces (thrifted acrylic sawhorse legs, a transparent lamp base) along with natural touches (an unstained wood desktop) provide a neutral foundation that allows glittered accents to shine. On the following pages, learn more about how to get your glitter on.









**2** Personal present Dip a paintbrush in decoupage medium to draw a cursive letter or special date on a gift tag, then sprinkle glitter and let dry.

### **3** Striped message board Treat a bulletin board to this fresh

Treat a bulletin board to this fresh effect. Measure and mark stripes with a straightedge and painter's tape (we used FrogTape brand). Paint exposed sections with white latex paint; let dry and remove tape. Tape off the center strip. Use a paintbrush to coat the strip with decoupage medium, then spread a light layer of glitter over it and let dry. (We used two shades of pink for an ombré effect.)

4 Glittery gift Dip a circular crafts sponge in decoupage medium and stamp it on a cardboard gift box. Shake glitter on the dots. To help the glitter stay put, top the dots with a thin layer of decoupage medium. Add ready-made sparkly ribbon.

**5** Sequined vase Give a vase a shiny makeover. Place painter's tape around the neck of the vase to form a loose guide, then dot clear superglue below the tape in a random pattern that trickles downward. Stick on sequins (use a toothpick to press into place) and let dry. Peel off the tape.

6 Lamp revamp Freshen an old lampshade by painting the lower third bright white. Then tape off a narrow stripe and apply decoupage medium before shaking on fine glitter. Repeat to add a hit of glitter to the inside of the shade, too. Combine with a pendant light to turn it into an overhead light fixture.

7 Gleaming hem Attach a batch of large sequins along a tablecloth hem to grab attention. Place adhesive dots (we used Glue Dots) on the cloth and press medium to large sequins in a cluster around the edge, or sew them on to boost durability.

- **8** Glam garland To make this modern bunting, string circles punched from glitter paper and yarn pom-poms (see *page 29*). Adhere letter decals to fabric triangles, then brush decoupage medium around the edges of the letters. Scatter on glitter, let dry, and then remove the decals. Swag the string, then staple it to the frame's back.
- **9** Patterned door Using a lace remnant as a stencil, apply three coats of gold Krylon Glitter Blast spray to the glass for a subtle shimmery effect.
- **10** Glitter bowl Mask a thin line around a glass bowl with painter's tape and apply decoupage medium with a narrow paintbrush. Layer on fine gold glitter; let dry before removing tape.

Using neutral colors and texture, a mother of four creates a high-end look for less in a rental while providing both family and personal spaces.

### What she did...

After painting the dresser cream, Wendy had mirrors cut to fit the drawer fronts and attached them with mirror mastic. A gallery of family photos showcased in white frames and mats makes the television less of a focal point. BELOW: A diamond drill bit is the secret to drilling holes for knobs in the mirrored drawer fronts. OPPOSITE: In the entryway, a striking gray console table (designed by Wendy and built by her father) is a modern departure from Wendy's eclectic-cottage style. What she did...

What's a designer and blogger to do when she can't find the perfect table, artwork, or pillow for her home? If she's Wendy Hyde, she makes it herself.

Wendy became a do-it-yourselfer when she dreamed up things for her Utah townhome that she couldn't find in stores. "I love to do things myself, but I hate to have things look DIY," Wendy says. "I like people to wonder, 'Did you do this yourself?""

To achieve a luxe look that suits her transitional-meets-cottage style, Wendy chooses materials wisely and takes time carefully considering her needs for each space.

"You can totally achieve something that looks high-end—it just takes a lot of elbow grease and patience," she says.

With four kids and three bedrooms, she has an added challenge of providing personal space for each family member in her rental.

"Even though being with family is great, I feel like you need a little space to call your own," Wendy says. "It's important to find ways to create storage."

While sons Brady and Bennett share a room, their bunk beds are their sanctuaries. An alcove in the hallway became a personal retreat for her oldest son, Budge, with the addition of a clever curtain system and a custom daybed with built-in storage. Daughter Emma's room is an all-out girlie retreat from the boys.

While the children's rooms get a touch of the color they love, a neutral color palette of grays and whites unifies the shared spaces in the home. "Bringing texture and a range of shades makes it interesting," Wendy says.

Wendy, who has a degree in fashion merchandising, loves sharing her DIY adventures on her blog, *shabbynest.blogspot* .com. "I had a passion for interior design and decorating and wanted to connect with likeminded people," she says.

Even as Wendy began working as a designer, she found she couldn't give up the blog. "It's almost like another one of my kids. I couldn't quit if I wanted to at this point. It's definitely time-consuming, but it always draws me back," she says.

### What she did...

OPPOSITE: To give her oldest son his own space, Wendy used her ingenuity to turn an alcove in the second-level hallway into a makeshift bedroom dubbed "the loft." She stenciled the wall with a pattern inspired by a favorite fabric. A countertop found in the "as is" section at IKEA fits perfectly over the washer and driver. ABOVE LEFT: Since the boys' names all start with the same letter, numbers identify the baskets in which their clean clothes are stored until they're put away. RIGHT: Wendy carved out a small work space in her bedroom. To make a bulletin board less utilitarian, she covered it with linen and lined it with upholstery tacks.



### HOW TO APPLY TAPE TO A WALL

### WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- 50 mm washi tape (We used Pale Wisteria.)
- Tape measure
- Level
- Plumb line
- 15 mm washi tape (We used Silver Grid.)
- Crafts knife • Straightedge

**step 1** Find the center of your wall, marking that point where the wall meets the ceiling. From the center point, make marks at 15-inch increments to the left and to the right. Using the

plumb line as a vertical guide from these marks, make marks 30 inches apart until you reach the base molding. The marks are your diagonal guide and where your tape strips will intersect (a). Apply wide tape in diagonal strips (one direction at a time), cutting off excess at top and bottom. Work slowly, unrolling and smoothing tape in small sections. Allow strips to overlap.

**step 2** Repeat the process for the slim tape, but marking at 71/2 inches to the left and to the right of each wide strip. Where the slim tape overlaps the wide, don't press too firmly.

5tep 3 Trim the overlapping slim tape using a crafts knife and a small architect's triangle or straightedge (b).











Appoint a plain, flat-trim mirror with the look of carved wood using 2-inch-wide Greek-key trim made of PVC from O'verlays (myoverlays .com), above right. The ½-inch-thick trim cuts with scissors and adheres with epoxy glue, such as Loctite Epoxy Quick Set (loctiteproducts.com).

### Geometric side table

Corner the market on sophisticated yet affordable style: Glue accents made of ½-inch-thick PVC from O'verlays (myoverlays.com) to the inside corners of a side table, right and opposite. We built the table from two \$18 Parsons tables, attaching a fully assembled one to the top of the second, opposite. (Flip the assembled table on its top, place and align the second top, finished side facing down, onto its legs and screw together from the underside. Then flip the entire assembly.) Install the corner pieces using a two-step epoxy. Use clamps to ensure a snug, level fit where the appliqué corners and table meet. When fully cured, paint the table.

Stripe it
Alternate two or more shades of denim to create a striped effect across the rug.


1 On the fringe Start with a large section of denim, such as a leg piece. Cut 10-inch lengths for fringe. If your table is round, taper the pieces to fit the edge of a round tablecloth. To fringe, cut ½-inch-wide strips into the pieces, leaving 1 inch uncut at the top. Wash denim and tumble dry. Sew one side of a sleeping bag zipper to the tablecloth and the other side to the fringed denim pieces. Use more than one zipper if needed.

2 Perfect blend In a bucket, mix Denim Blue Rit Dye, ½ gallon hot water, and 1 tablespoon each of salt and laundry detergent. Dip three-quarters of a piece of white denim into the dye. Soak two minutes, then pull 1 inch out of the dye. Soak two minutes, then pull another inch out, and carefully add more dye. Continue until you achieve the desired effect. Rinse with cold water, dry, then sew into a pillow cover.

3 Lace it up Cut the leg from jeans and insert plastic between the layers. Spray the back of a lace stencil with stencil adhesive and position on the denim. Mask the rest with painter's tape. Squirt bleach from a spray bottle over the stencil, soaking the denim. Let dry in the sun. Repeat if needed. When dry, remove stencil. Wash denim in cold water and dry. Sew into a pillow cover.


4 Patched works Sew denim pieces into strips, then stitch strips together to make a rug. Iron seams open on back so the rug lies flat. Turn edges under and secure with fabric glue. Tape off one strip and paint an overall stencil design (we used Annie Sloan Chalk Paint). Paint another strip using a lace border stencil. Then paint stencils randomly (see page 93). Seal the painted areas with Annie Sloan Floor Lacquer.

5 Room to bloom Pretty flowers are the perfect accent to any room. These denim pom-poms bloom forever and never need watering. Attach them to branches using wire or string. We gathered branches from the backyard and painted them white (see page 93). For a more colorful bouquet, make pom-poms from colored denim. These pretties also are fun to use as an alternative to bows on gifts.



### HOW TO MAKE A DENIM POM-POM













### WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Denim
- Rotary cutter
- Cardboard

- Cutting mat Straightedge
- String

**step 1** Gather materials (a). For one pom-pom, cut denim to about 18×10 inches, avoiding any seams.

**step 2** Lay denim on a cutting mat. Using a rotary cutter and straightedge, start at one 10-inch edge (bottom) and cut a 1/2-inchwide strip, stopping ½ inch from the top. Move cutter over ½ inch and cut from the top to the bottom, stopping ½ inch from the bottom. Move cutter over ½ inch and repeat from the bottom to the top.

Continue across the 10-inch width to create a continuous zigzag strip (b).

step 3 Cut a piece of cardboard about 5 inches wide and wrap the entire denim strip around it (c). Slide the strip off the cardboard and tie in the middle with string (d).

**step 4** Cut loop ends (e) and fluff into a pom-pom (f). Wash in the washing machine twice, tumbling dry after each wash to achieve the distressed look (at left).




6 Neat seat With so many variations, herringbone can suit everyone's style. This modern take on the classic pattern is easy to love—and easy to sew. The random colors and offset construction mean you don't have to painstakingly try to match colors or seams. Use a herringbone strip to boost a solid upholstery color like in this chair.



### HOW TO SEW A HERRINGBONE PATTERN













### WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Denim scraps Cutting mat
- Rotary cutter
- Sewing machine
- ironing board • Thread
  - Acrylic ruler

**step 1** Cut denim into strips about 2–3 inches wide by 6-7 inches long. Stagger strips to the left and sew together (a) using ½-inch seam allowances. Iron seams open (b).

**5tep 2** Place sewn strip on a cutting mat, aligning the top edge parallel to the top of the mat. Place an acrylic ruler at a 30-45-degree angle and cut (c). Use the angled lines on the mat as a guide (d). Repeat on the opposite

side of the strip so you have a strip with two clean edges.

step 3 Repeat steps 1 and 2, but stagger the denim strips to the right so your finished strips will be angled in opposite directions (e).

**step 4** Place sewn strips right sides together and sew using ½-inch seam allowances (f). Press open, and use on a chair, pillow, or other home accent.

**7** A little loopy After recycling most of your jean material into home accessories, put the remaining scraps to work on these clever little magnets. Cut three belt loops off a pair of jeans, stack, and hot-glue together to form an asterisk. Use metal snips to cut the button from the jeans, trimming as much off the shank as possible. Use hot glue to secure a rare earth magnet on the back and the button on the front (if needed to make the button lay flatter, cut a small slit into the center of the asterisk and fit the button shank into the slit).



8 Under wraps To cover a shapely lampshade, cut 3-inchwide denim strips 3 inches taller than your shade. Turn under one long edge of each strip and hem or glue. Place one strip on the shade, pull taut, wrap the top and bottom to the back of the shade and glue in place. Repeat with other strips, overlapping each to cover the raw edges. Embellish by wrapping several belts around the top of the shade.

**9** Pick pocket Jean pockets are perhaps the most fun part of the material to repurpose. Look for jeans with colorful stitching or embellishments. Cut them out, including the fabric behind the pocket, then attach them to a memo board to hold cards, pencils, or other supplies. Or attach pockets to pillows, place mats, and book covers. String them together as bunting, or sew them into a little purse.



10 Scrap happy Made from bits of denim scraps, this bird artwork is something to tweet about. Choose any motif you like: Experiment with flowers or other animals and use different colors of denim to achieve shading. This artwork is mounted on a clipboard, but you could frame your masterpiece instead.

### HOW TO CREATE BIRD-MOTIF ART FROM DENIM













### WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Denim scraps
- ironing board • Pattern
- Fusible web
- Iron and
- Marker
- Sewing machine

**step 1** Gather supplies (a). Print pattern and cut out shapes. Iron fusible web to the back of denim scraps according to package instructions (b).

**step 2** Place pattern pieces upside down on fusible web, trace, and cut out (c).

**step 3** Remove backing from fusible web and arrange the shapes denim side up on white

denim. Place the branch first and then remaining pieces to form the bird shape. Iron according to manufacturer's instructions to secure the pieces to the white denim (d).

**step 4** Sew random stitches on the shapes using white thread (e).

**step 5** Sew around the perimeter of the white denim. Remove threads to create fringed edges (f).

With a discerning eye and flair for fashion, this homeowner infuses character in her suburban abode.

### Abstract artwork

Gwen liked the textured canvas and simple frame of a piece of thrift store artwork. To make it fit her style, she brushed white and black paint over the original artwork for an abstract effect.

- Mantel decor Black paint refreshes metallic-frame mirrors that Gwen had grown tired of. "The black drew my eyes to the fireplace more than the metallic pieces," she says. To make the portrait, she traced a photo of her son, Xander, from her computer screen and filled the silhouette with green and blue watercolors.
- Built-in black In the same way a wardrobe needs a little black dress, Gwen believes every room should get a pop of the color. Instead of painting her built-ins, she cut foam-core boards to size with a crafts knife, spray-painted them black to avoid brush marks, and slipped them between the shelves.
- Copper lamp After spotting a high-end lamp online, Gwen re-created the look with copper pipes and metal funnels. She used a pop rivet punch to poke holes in the funnels.
- Pillow play Gwen scored a scrap of pricey designer fabric on eBay and stitched the colorful floral into pillows for the living room. "I had searched everywhere for something less expensive that had all the colors. It was a splurge, but it was my starting point," she says.

During stints owning a jewelry company and working in the fashion industry, Gwen Hefner learned accessories can make an outfit. When she began decorating the home, near Kansas City, Missouri, she shares with her husband, Micah, and their children, she realized accessories can also make a room.

"There is a difference between putting together an outfit that lasts 24 hours and a home that has to last lots of years," she says.

To achieve a look in her home that would stand the test of time, Gwen opted for a neutral base. She and Micah upgraded

the builder-grade oak finishes with dark hardwood floors on the main level and beefier millwork throughout. Walls in soft hues and classic furniture choices—some new, some passed down, and some thrifted—also provide versatility. Flea market finds and sophisticated do-it-yourself projects bring in layers of trendy color and pattern. Gwen, who blogs about her creative endeavors at The Makerista (themakerista.com), loves that DIY allows her to get a custom look with meaningful touches.

"I'm always willing to put in the time to get more bang for my buck," she says.







### **6** Cabinet upgrade

Micah removed a wall between the living room and kitchen to give the home a more open layout. Before painting the builder-grade cabinets white, the couple updated the veneer on the sides of the cabinets with beaded-board panels. They also installed a subway tile backsplash to give the kitchen a clean, bright, and classic look.

### 7 Luxe lampshade

Adding fabric or trim to inexpensive lampshades is one of Gwen's favorite decorating tips. She covered this shade with black velvet to give it a high-end look. To cover a lampshade, trace the shade on paper to make a pattern, trim your fabric to size, then adhere using fabric glue.

### **8** Collected volumes

Gwen scans thrift stores for books in colors she likes, but brings home only tomes on music, fashion, photography, or other topics that represent her interests. Small touches—such as new knobs and black tassels upgrade a discount store cabinet.

**9** Sitting pretty Gwen purchased a beautiful wood dining table and six chairs for \$100 on Craigslist. She scrubbed the pieces with Danish oil to revive the wood and re-covered the chair seats with black-and-white striped outdoor fabric to make the set feel more modern.

## **10** Affordable art To get large-scale art without spending a fortune, Gwen used wide brushstrokes to blend acrylic colors on butcher paper. The trick to creating sophisticated monochromatic art is using multiple shades, adding a little white, cream, black, and even yellow to the paint if necessary, to achieve depth.



### 11 Hexagon flooring

Gwen says the tile job was time-consuming but worth it. Using sheets of mosaic tile in black, tan, and white, she created a geometric flooring pattern in the master bathroom. To get the look, she selectively removed some six-sided tiles from the sheets of white tile and replaced them with black and tan tiles cut from other mosaic sheets.

### 12 Masterful mix

A matching set of dark wood furniture posed a decorating challenge in the master bedroom. To achieve a light and bright look, Gwen split up the set, moving the nightstands to another room and replacing them with golden bamboo-style side tables. Inexpensive sconces spraypainted in pretty periwinkle add a touch of whimsy to the space.

### **13** Pint-size storage

Sized just right, a petite antique secretary adds extra storage for perfume bottles, makeup, and extra towels in the master bath. Quirky yellow pulls give it an affordable update. The wood and brass tones contribute to a layered and collected look when combined with the black, white, and chrome finishes found elsewhere in the room.

14 Curtain call Gwen took advantage of the vaulted ceilings in daughter Milly's room by hanging handmade curtains close to the ceiling. Because she knew she'd need a lot of yardage for the project, she found an inexpensive floral at a local fabrics store. Black pom-pom trim keeps the feminine pattern from feeling too sweet. She filled the gap between the rod and the window with milk glass plates.

**15** Architectural detailing To visually ground the tall ceilings in Milly's room, Micah added beaded board and a chair rail to the bottom third of the walls. Crisp white paint softly contrasts with the light gray walls.

**16** Picture show Gwen backed an old frame with foam-core board covered in linen to create a memo board loaded with photos of Milly's grandmothers. The small purse, once belonging to a relative, now gets a place of honor.

### 17 Whimsical mobile

A handmade mobile, made from ripped strips of pink, black, and white fabric hanging from an embroidery hoop, coordinates with the pink and green bedding and pillows Gwen sewed.

A pretty memo board with photos of female relatives is a jumping-off point to talk to — children about the past.







### **18** Personal touches

Gwen monogrammed the pillow in son Xander's room by using fusible web to attach an X cut from fabric and stitched around it with yarn. She found a coat of arms for \$1 at a thrift store, and her father cut and painted a shield to mount it on. She painted the British flag artwork on vintage sheet music for a gallery wall.


### **19** Family heirloom

An antique dresser given to the family by Micah's parents finds a home in Xander's room. Gwen added ceramic knobs and removed the dresser's attached mirror, replacing it with one painted red and hung on the wall for a modern look. She spraypainted the lamp and covered the shade with fabric.

**20** Book storage Gwen turned an inexpensive crate from a crafts store into convenient book storage for Xander. She cut the crate in half vertically with a jigsaw, painted each piece white, and hung them low on the wall using drywall anchors.

### **21** Faux fireplace

Gwen and Micah turned an inconvenient crawlspace in the basement into a play area that the kids can call their own. Gwen applied chalkboard paint to the wall and Micah framed it with trim pieces to create the look of a fireplace and mantel. The silhouettes are drawn with chalk marker.

### **22** Striped chairs

To give the set of kid-size furniture a custom look, Gwen added strips of black washi tape to the chair backs. The tape is durable to withstand play but can easily be removed if Gwen tires of the look.
