MINERAL PATTERNS

Explore the softer side of agates with our pillow ideas. For the rectangular pillow, scan agates and print the images onto iron-on transfer paper. Trim the images and apply them to a pillow cover using an iron and following the transfer paper instructions. For the square pillow, we created a repeating design using a scanned agate image, then we had Spoonflower print it on Eco-Canvas fabric. (Find our design at spoonflower.com/profiles/ doityourselfmagazine.) Cut two squares of fabric to fit your pillow form and sew them with wrong sides together, leaving an opening along one side. Turn right side out, insert the pillow form, and use a hidden stitch to close the opening.

YOU'VE BEEN FRAMED

Accentuate your artwork by upping your frame game. Hot-glue clusters of small agates to the corners of a basic white frame. (Choose one with a wide edge for the most pleasing look.) We selected agates in pinks and purples to complement the landscape artwork, but they'd also go well with a black-and-white photo, a line drawing, or abstract art.

WHERE TO FIND AGATES

Don't know where to look? Check out this treasure trove of possibilities.

TRY LOCAL. We found many of the agates used in these projects for only \$1 each in the gift shop of our local science center.

HIT THE WEB.

Search for "agate slices" on Amazon, eBay, or Etsy and find bundles of smaller stones at affordable prices. If you need large quantities for a big project, look into online rock wholesalers that may require a minimum order.

HACK HOME GOODS. Hit up discount stores for agate products. A coaster, bookend, or napkin ring can offer project possibilities.

HUNGUP

These 10 projects and products shift ordinary doors into extraordinary storage that occupies zero floor space.

A COUNTERSINK DRILL BIT TOPS OFF A PILOT HOLE WITH AN ANGLED DIVOT SO THE SCREWHEAD SITS FLUSH WITH THE SURROUNDING WOOD. DRILL BIT AND COUNTERSINK; \$5; DEWALT.COM

Cut a 1x4 board to the desired length to fit your door. Use painters tape to create crisp lines, and paint each section; let dry thoroughly between colors. Drill pilot holes into the board with a countersink bit. Drill corresponding pilot holes into the door, then screw the board to the door. (If your door has a hollow core, use anchors, below right, to keep the rack secure.) 3M Command Large Modern Metal Hooks (\$6 each; command.com) hide the screws and create hanging spots.




GET IN THE SWING

Loop bags, belts, and other lightweight accessories from this three-armed hanger. It hooks over the door, and the arms separate and swing to make finding your finishing touches a breeze. Swinging Accessory Hanger; \$18; dormco.com



STICK-ON STORAGE Urbio's ultramodern Sabi collection of caddies and hangers installs in a snap: You can use the high-strength, moisture-resistant, self-adhesive tape that comes with each product (best for smooth walls and tile), or opt for screws and anchors to mount the elements to any door. \$40–\$55; myurbio.com





ANCHORS AWEIGH

Most interior doors in American homes have a hollow core, which means that mounting anything heavy-ish—towel bars, hooks, frames—requires more holding heft than a few nails or screws can muster. E-Z Ancor anchors are specially suited for hollow doors (and they're self-drilling in drywall), holding up to 40 pounds. \$2 for a four-pack; homedepot.com





RUB-A-DUB TUBS

Two ice cube bins spray-painted black and mounted on the bathroom doorseparate his grooming gear from hers. Krylon Fusion for Plastic Spray Paint (\$4 at Walmart) grabs onto slippery surfaces and won't let go, which is ideal for containers getting lots of use in a humid space. For labels, we affixed adhesive letters to the containers before spray-painting, then carefully removed them when the paint was dry. Attach the containers to the door by drilling holes through one long side of the bins to hang from rubber-covered cup hooks.







CAPTAIN HOOK

Stash hats, bags, and other small items on this contraption, which stretches the full length of a door and attaches securely both over and under it. Six hooks slide wherever you want and lock into place for customized storage. It requires no tools to install and can hold up to 3 pounds per hook. Door Hook; \$15; containerstore.com





CHANGING STATION

Wish you had a valet (à la Downton Abbey) to dress you each morning? Perhaps our door-mounted (nonhuman) version can be of service. Use it to assemble your outfit, from shirt and skirt to bracelet and bag, so you can view the entire ensemble, then add or subtract pieces with ease. (It's also handy for those overachievers who lay out their clothes the night before. #wardrobegoals)

To make your own, paint a 4-foot 1x2 board (4 feet is a standard length at most hardware stores and home centers) and let dry. Spray with polyurethane. Fasten a folding hook near the top with screws and a couple of knobs near the other end for accessories. Attach the whole assembly to the center of your door.





ALMOST INSTANT Don't know about you, but we're always wary when a product promises insta-anything, but the InstaHanger really delivers. When mounted to a door in a closet, laundry room, or utility room, it lifts open to reveal hanging space for just-ironed shirts or clothes you're packing for a trip. Press it closed when you're finished, and it's nearly invisible. InstaHanger; \$18; containerstore.com

GREAT FOR quick cuts, cutting down large sheets, and portability.

BOTTOM LINE While not as precise as other saws, circular saws speed through straight rip cuts and crosscuts.

WHAT IT IS Just over half the size of a standard circular saw, this compact tool cuts through a 2×4 with ease.

Unprimed wood canvases are constructed of a basswood panel on a frame. This wood's smooth, knot-free surface is suited to woodburning projects and painting. Frame depths range from % to 13/4 inches. Costs vary from \$8 for a 6x6-inch canvas to \$21 for a 12×36-inch version. Our favorite sources include walnuthollow.com (we used Walnut Hollow's square versions), dickblick.com, and michaels.com.



TRAY CHIC At your service: A 12×16×1½-inch basswood canvas gets enlisted as a serving tray with the addition of paint, peel-and-stick wallpaper, and cabinet drawer pulls, above left and opposite. For the handles, mark the positions of the drawer pull's screw holes onto the outer face of the canvas's two short sides. Clamp scrap wood blocks along the inside edge for splinter-free exiting of the drill bit (A). Drill holes. Prime and paint the canvas. Cut wallpaper to line the tray bottom. We used a custom-size peel-and-stick Woven Wallpaper from Spoonflower, but shelf liner, a decal, or any surface with an easy-to-clean, protective coating works, too. Smooth in place. Attach drawer handles with a screwdriver and you're ready for tea and company.

LIGHT BRIGHT Illuminate a hallway or mantel with a night-light, opposite, fashioned from a $12 \times 12 \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ -inch basswood canvas and white LED string lights. TIP: Score a deal by purchasing the lights after the holiday season. Download our design at BHG.com/DIYLight, or create your own. (We traced small plates to help fashion our starburst.) Plot dots evenly on the pattern, making sure the number of dots doesn't exceed the number of lights on the string. To transfer a design to the face of the canvas, trace it using transfer paper or use an awl to gently press pilot holes at the dots (A). Practice on scrap wood first if desired. Protect your work surface with a scrap of thick wood or a cutting board. This board also acts as a bumper for when the drill bit bores through. To prevent splintering, drill pilot holes at the awl marks using a bit slightly smaller than the individual lightbulb (B). Next, using a drill bit the size of the bulbs, enlarge the holes. Poke lights through the design from the back (C). Plug in.

GET IN GEAR Showcase curious collectibles from your junk drawer as a slick, painted shadow box, opposite, inspired by the found-object sculptures of Louise Nevelson. Gather an assortment of items with intriguing shapes, profiles, or three-dimensional relief surfaces. Invert a basswood canvas and plot items inside, in layers (A). Snap an image for a visual record. Remove the objects, then glue them in place in layers using a heavy-duty construction adhesive (ours is from Loctite). Allow each layer to dry. Cover everything in an all-surface, spray-on primer. When dry, coat with copper spray paint. Attach a picture hanger to the smooth side of the canvas. For the small shadow boxes, above, prime, then spray-paint metallic green. Spray-paint the items in copper. Line the interior of each box in a pretty paper. Adhere objects to the paper, let dry, and attach picture hangers to the back.









DROP BOX Make peace with a busy back entry: Utilize wood canvases as organizers. Have young family members personalize square basswood frames with paint to designate their coat and backpack hooks. Glue a small, unframed mirror from a crafts store into an $8 \times 8 \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ -inch canvas, then mount it inside a $12 \times 12 \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ frame, *opposite*. Stick cork letters onto another $12 \times 12 \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ -inch canvas for posting reminders, *opposite*. Stash keys on press-on hooks and phones in a small mesh cup (hang it from a small brad or two), *left*. Coat another canvas in chalkboard paint for jotting reminders, *below left*. Hang canvases on the wall using hook-and-loop strips or screws.

Want to make life easier? These quick tricks and easy fixes are a breath of fresh air for a home improvement-weary do-it-yourselfer.

RUBBER BANDS TO THE

RESCUE Those pesky stripped screws are beasts to remove. Traction and tension are nearly impossible if the head of the screw is all mangled. Try this trick, courtesy of a trusty office supply: Place a wide rubber band between the screw head and the screwdriver, then unscrew slowly and carefully. The rubber band provides just the right amount of fill to get the screw moving.

WHAT A STEEL

Rather than stocking up on special cleaners, I use cream of tartar to spiff up stainless-steel surfaces. In a bowl, mix 1 part cream of tartar with 4 parts distilled white vinegar to make a paste. Apply it to the stainless-steel surface with a cloth, then wipe off with warm water.

I CAN SEE CLEARLY NOW Look,

I'll admit it: Washing windows isn't my favorite task. Before I'd flip the window out, take it apart, wash it, and put it back together only to notice a streak. While I can't always eliminate streaks, I do use this trick to make finding them a snap. On the inside, I wipe windows horizontally; on the outside, I wipe them vertically. That way, if I see streaks, I know which side to refresh.




HAMMER TIME

How many times have you fumbled with nails in one hand, hammer in the other? Not exactly the easiest balancing act, right? Do this instead: Superglue a magnet to the bottom of the hammer's handle and use it to keep nails close at hand.





RUG Baking soda is a rock star when it comes to the toughest home maintenance chores. That outdoor rug that you thought was too trashed to rescue? Wet the rug down and sprinkle it liberally-really liberallywith baking soda. Work the baking soda into the rug with a nylon deck brush—softer bristles are better for this chore—then spray the rug clean with the garden hose. Leave it in the sunshine to dry.



DETAIL WORK Next time you're cleaning

windows, don't overlook those teensy, tiny crevices where all manner of dirt, grime, and bugs get stuck. Make the job easier by putting cotton swabs to work. PS: They're also perfect for cleaning your remote control, computer keyboard, the back of your hairdryer where lint builds up, and the detergent compartment in your washing machine.

HOLE IN ONE If you're fixing a drywall hole that's about the size of a coin, you shouldn't just fill it with drywall compound, which isn't very resistant to pressure. For best results, the drywall compound needs a filler to adhere to. I like to fill the gap with a chunk cut from a small foam cosmetic wedge or sponge. Cut it just a wee bit bigger than the hole, insert, spackle the hole, dry, sand, and paint—hole fixed, wall beautiful, home Zen returned.

ranks right up there as one of my least favorite maintenance tasks. Here's a trick I've learned to clean them in place: Grab an old sock or two. Mix equal parts warm water and vinegar. Slide your hand in the sock, dip it in the water-vinegar mix, squeeze out excess, and gently clasp each blind in the sock, running your hand along the length to clean. Rinse the sock as needed.







PAINT PREP WORK I like painting. It's part meditation, part home improvement rolled into one. But I'm not a fan of the annoying aspects of painting—like losing my paintbrush or roller in a paint tray or cleaning the tray afterward. Here are two tricks that I can't paint without. First, instead of cleaning my paint tray or buying an expensive liner, I just line the tray with aluminum foil. The foil doesn't move and when I'm done—easy peasy, I just ditch the foil. Then, I cut up an inexpensive foam roll—the kind used to insulate pipes—and put a section on the top edge of the paint tray. I cut a slit in the foam as a place to rest the handle of a roller or brush to stop it from sliding into the tray.

TAPE MEASURE TRICKS This workhorse does more than measure. Notice that cutout at the end of the tape measure? If you want to get an exact measurement, hook it over a nail or screw for a tight hold; it makes a one-person measure easy. The serrated edge? Use it to mark a measurement if you don't have a pencil. Plus, did you know the body—the part that holds the tape measure when it's wound up—can be used to measure, too? Look on the bottom and you'll find a measurement—say 3 inches: That's how long the tape measure body is. So if you're doing a measurement that forces you to bend the tape, you can just use the body to find a beginning to end, or corner, number.



STRAIGHTEN UP

Are you cool, calm, and collected when applying caulk? Me neither. My hands give an ever-soslight quiver when I'm concentrating on getting it just right. Luckily I've started putting my favorite painting tool—painters tape—to work in all sorts of ways. When I caulk, I simply place a strip of it to each side of the caulk line, fill in, smooth with my finger or a slightly damp cloth—and presto! The neatest caulk job ever.

SCUFFS BEGONE

Shoes, chairs, random objects—all sorts of items can scuff a floor. And, like small drywall holes, floor scuffs are one of those annoying, unattractive home abuses that you'd love to get rid of. Here's how: Just grab a tennis ball and rub it over the spot until it's gone. In a word? Easy.



ADDED LEVERAGE

I've got muscle, but there are some jobs that just need some serious oomph. Take installing hooks-from big hefty bike hooks to small cup hooks-into wood beams. Here's how I get the job done without calling in help. First, I drill a pilot hole that's slightly smaller in diameter than the threaded end of the hook. Then, push the hook into the pilot hole, and twist it clockwise a couple times to get it started. Next, insert a wrench for added leverage. Choose a wrench size based on your hook size. The bigger the hook, the bigger





Start with an orientation class and safety training before signing up for a membership.

1 CONFETTI CHIC

Make work fun with a festive accent wall. First, roll on deep blue latex paint; let dry. Next, trim the end of a foam brush into an oval (A); dab a metallic paint mixture (we used two parts Modern Masters Antique Bronze, one part Black Pearl) onto the wall. Rotate the brush tip, clustering strokes at the top and spacing them apart toward the bottom.





WIRED UP Keep mementos in view by clipping them to a wire grid. Using heavy-duty wire snippers, cut a steel remesh sheet (found at home improvement stores) to your desired size (B). (If rusty, sand and prime before painting.) Spray on high-gloss white enamel paint; let dry. Repeat to cover all angles. Attach memorabilia with mini bulldog clips.



CUTTING EDGE

TAKE A SEAT Give a shapely chair a new attitude with fabric. Remove legs, and put the chair on a protected table. Place fabric over the chair, smoothing it flat. Cut fabric roughly the shape of the chair. Apply a thick layer of decoupage medium to the fabric; it will cling to the chair and stiffen as it dries. Trim the fabric again, leaving about an inch of excess (A). Brush on a second coat of decoupage medium; let dry. Using a pen, trace the chair's edge on the wrong side of the fabric. (Hold a piece of light cardboard against the right side of the fabric to steady the pen.) Carefully cut along the line (B). Seal the seat and edges with a final coat of decoupage medium. Spray-paint the legs gold; reattach when dry.





4 DOT-TO-DOT
CURTAINS Upgrade
curtains in seconds without
sewing a stitch. Press or
steam curtain panels sized
to fit your windows, then
lay them flat on a table.
Apply a dot pattern using a
dimensional paint (such as

Organize pencils, pens, and other supplies in a pretty pencil holder that sparkles with energy. Cut your chosen stencil to fit the vessel (B). (We used a ceramic toothbrush holder.) Adhere the stencil with painters tape, and mask the rest of the holder to protect it. Spray lightly with metallic gold paint. Let dry; remove stencil and tape.

CRATE EXPECTATIONS

Give plain-Jane pine crates an authentic industrial-chic patina by distressing them with your favorite shop tools. Sand sharp corners to create rounded ones. Scrape crate edges with a hammer. Hit the sides of the crates with a bag of screws. Hammer random holes with an awl. Once you've done enough damage to simulate decades of wear, use a natural-bristle brush to coat the wood with a penetrating oil-base stain (A). (The stain helps highlight the distressed areas, right.) Wipe off extra stain with a rag. Once the crates are dry, stack them in your desired configuration, and screw them together.

MEET THE HOMEOWNERS

Sarah and David Dorsey shared this twobedroom apartment in Knoxville, Tennessee, with their two dogs—beagle-Jack Russell mix Annabelle and Yorkie-dachshund mix Charlotte.

David Dorsey's job with a construction company has moved him and his wife, Sarah, from Tennessee to California to Ohio, back to Tennessee, and most recently to Maryland.

While crisscrossing the country, the couple has signed many short-term leases but never accepted the style restrictions of renting. "Renting doesn't mean we can't make our space our own," says Sarah, an interior designer for model homes.

Their most recent rental—this two-bedroom apartment in Knoxville, Tennessee—had wall-to-wall carpet and forgettable builder basics. Undeterred, the couple turned the bland beige box into a colorful home with some ambitious DIY projects and clever thrift store upgrades.

Sarah shares the couple's handiwork on her popular blog, sarahmdorseydesigns.blogspot .com. She also shares shopping tips (her favorite haunts are IKEA, Goodwill, and Craigslist) and simple ideas for creating affordable, portable style.

"Before you're in your forever home, most people rent at some point," she says. "People don't want to spend a ton of money, but they want it to be a reflection of themselves. If you can't paint, draperies and area rugs are the easiest ways to add personality and make a space



how to make a wall panel

To add interest to a large wall while sparing it a lot of nail holes, cover it with fabric. Use spray adhesive to attach 2 or 3 yards of fabric to a drop cloth. Fold and glue the fabric around the edges of the canvas on each side for a finished look. Fold the top edge over a thin wood strip and staple in place (A); repeat along the bottom edge. Screw the canvas to the wall (using screws in just the corners reduces the amount of touch-up work required later).





feel like you're not renting. It's also great if you change your mind a lot, which I tend to do."

After years of the rentand-run lifestyle, the Dorseys recently purchased a home near Washington, D.C. However, they are still sticking with white walls and filling the space with some of their favorite pieces from past rentals, including the tufted headboard and starburst artwork from this Knoxville apartment. "When I reuse something it means I really like it," Sarah says. Sarah continues to fill her blog with DIY projects but expects them to become larger and take longer to produce. "With renting, we were only there a short time, so we were never afraid to just try something," she says. "With our home, we take longer to make decisions because they are bigger and more expensive. We want to make sure we'll love them for years to come."

how to make a sofa table

MATERIALS

- 12 feet of 1×12 poplar
- Compound miter saw
- 2-inch screws
- Wood glue
- Clamps
- Four hairpin legs

Step 1 Cut the poplar wood (good side up) at a 45-degree angle into a 5½-inch length, a 60-inch length, another 5½-inch length, and a second 60-inch length. TIP: Cut the pieces in this order so the wood grain lines up.

Step 2 Using a 90-degree angle, cut three 4-inch sections of poplar for the center dividers.

Step 3 Attach the dividers with 2-inch screws through the underside of the 60-inch bottom board into the dividers.

Step 4 Glue and clamp the top 60-inch board in place atop the dividers. Glue and clamp the side pieces in place. Let glue dry fully, following manufacturer instructions.

Step 5 Remove clamps. Seal the box with clear wax.

Step 6 Screw a hairpin leg into each bottom corner.



how to make pom-pom curtains


Use inexpensive pom-pom trim to dress up basic curtain panels (Sarah used IKEA's Lenda panels). Sew the trim to each panel's long inside edge, or attach it using no-sew, iron-on adhesive.

CAN'T INSTALL A CURTAIN ROD? PLACE A LINE OF PAINTERS TAPE AT THE DESIRED HEIGHT AND INSTALL CLEAR HOOKS WITH REMOVABLE ADHESIVE BACKING EVERY 8–12 INCHES. REMOVE TAPE. ADD CORRESPONDING LOOPS OF UPHOLSTERY THREAD FOR HANGING ALONG THE TOP AND BACK OF THE FABRIC.



how to refresh a side table

A \$15 thrift store find looks gorgeous when you replace the wood spindles with brass. Sarah Dorsey's version required six top nuts. 15 washers, three threaded zinc rods, six brass tubes, three regular nuts, and three cap nuts. If needed, use a drill with a masonry bit to enlarge the holes in the marble to accommodate the new rods. TIP: Drill underwater to keep the marble from cracking. Place top nuts on the top marble tier, screw in threaded rods from underneath and add washers. Cover rods with tubes (A) and finish with washers. Slide on second marble tier, then washers. tubes, washers, and final marble tier. For legs, add regular nuts over the bottom washers before covering the remaining rods with short segments of tubes. Finish with cap nuts.



4 MOD SQUAD

Although it was dark, bulky, and had a laminate top, Sarah couldn't pass up this midcentury dining table for \$7 at a thrift store. After removing some trim and spray-painting it bright white, it's now a perfect complement to her prized Chinese Chippendale chairs. "The look is really fresh and modern," she says.

5 OFF THE GRID

Rather than painting an accent wall in her temporary dining room, Sarah created a large framed canvas to serve as a focal point. She built a simple grid frame out of 1x2 boards and painted it white. After painting cheap artist canvas dark bronze, she stapled the fabric to the back of the frame. The piece is so lightweight, it takes only two screws to hold it in place—and that means only two holes to fill at lease end.

6 MATCH SET

When Sarah found a marble slab (originally a backsplash) on Craiglist, she jumped at the offer and decided to use it as a tabletop. She lucked into an affordable Overstock.com console table that was nearly the same size. In place of the wood top, she substituted the marble slab and two thin strips of marble on either side.








how to make a lacquered table lamp

Transform a brass lamp into a showstopper. Tape off the socket and cord and sand the base with medium-grit synthetic steel wool until the surface is rough. Smooth the surface with fine-grit synthetic steel wool. Remove dust after all sanding with a damp washcloth. Spray two coats of metal primer; sand with 320-grit sandpaper. Add two coats of high-gloss spray paint; sand between each coat with 400-grit sandpaper. Add another coat of paint; sand with 600-grit sandpaper. Finish with three coats of spray lacquer. (Note: Apply primer, paint, and lacquer in thin layers. Let each coat dry before sanding or applying another coat.)



how to make scalloped curtains

Add interest to simple drapery panels with scalloped edges and petite pom-pom trim. Draw a line across the middle of a plastic yogurt lid (A). Use the lid as a guide to draw scallops in pencil along the long inside edge of each panel. Cut out the scalloped edge. Attach tiny pom-pom trim on the top side of the fabric with fabric glue (B). Cut individual




strips of trim for each scallop to avoid bunching. Hang the panels from a curtain rod or follow rod-less hanging tip on page 57.




how to upgrade dining chairs

After a three-year search, Sarah found a pair of Chinese Chippendale chairs on Craigslist for just \$60. To showcase the fretwork. she removed the upholstered chairbacks, including hundreds of staples. After unscrewing the upholstered seats, she covered all staple holes and other flaws with wood filler. When dry, she sanded chairs with a foam sanding block and thin sanding pads to even out the wood filler and remove any finish. She applied two thin coats of spray primer (A) and finished with several coats of bright white glossy spray paint. Seat cushions re-covered in beige metallic linen provide a finishing touch.







8 UNIQUE RETREAT Their apartment was a carbon-copy of neighboring units, but the Dorseys did their best to make it their own with pops of color, pattern, and texture. Sarah filled the top of a dresser with art, lighting, and accessories that reflect her personality and preferences.



how to dress a closet door

Upgrade builder-basic closet doors by adding temporary grass-cloth panels. Create a frame for the door panel with 2-inch synthetic trim (cut the pieces with a crafts knife and join the corners and attach the center piece with fast-drying epoxy). Cut grass-cloth wallpaper to fit inside the frame and attach it to the back of the trim with heavy-duty tape. Attach the completed frames to the closet using removable adhesive strips (A).

how to make a tufted headboard

MATERIALS

- 1/2-inch plywood cut to 48×66 inches (for a queen-size bed)
- 2x4 boards, two 66 inches long and two 44 inches long
- 2×8 boards, two 60 inches long and two 12 inches long
- Screwdriver and screws
- Two 12x60-inch pieces of mediumweight chipboard (look at art and shipping supply stores)
- Staple gun and staples
- Drill with %-inch bit
- 2-inch-thick upholstery foam
- Spray adhesive
- Upholstery needle
- 3 yards of 54-inch-wide upholstery fabric
- Button-cover kit and buttons
- Upholstery twine

Step 1 To create the frame, reinforce plywood by attaching a 2×4 frame to the back (66-inch lengths across the top and bottom; 44-inch lengths down each side). Add wings by screwing 60-inch 2×8 boards perpendicular to the 2×4s, flush with the top of the plywood. Add

legs by attaching 12-inch 2×8 boards to the 60-inch 2×8s below the plywood.

Step 2 Staple the outside edge of chipboard along the inside edge of each wing. Curve the board and staple the other edge to the plywood.

Step 3 Measure and mark desired hole placement for tufting on plywood and chipboard. Drill all the holes.

Step 4 Cut foam to fit top and legs and attach with spray adhesive. From the back, poke an upholstery needle through the tufting holes and cut each hole with scissors.

Step 5 Use button kit to cover half of your buttons with headboard fabric (the other half will be used on the back of the headboard).

Step 6 Place fabric across headboard and around wings with at least 10 inches overlap on all sides. To cover the legs, add a panel of fabric to each, folding top edge under to create a straight seam.




Step 7 Thread twine onto the needle, add uncovered button to end, and knot in place. Starting with the middlemost hole, push the needle from the back of the headboard to the front, pulling the button tightly in place in back. On the front, thread the needle through the hole on the back of the covered button, loop around, and return through the hole in the headboard to the back side. Pull the button as tight as possible, and tie into a secure knot. Repeat this process for remaining tufts. Staple excess fabric snugly in place around the back of the headboard.


OMPLEX COMPOSITIONS

Inspired by a Pinterest post, Sarah devised a plan to create this striking starburst artwork. When she turned to David for help, however, he didn't share her excitement. "Cutting and sanding all those pieces wasn't fun," he says. Similarly, the tufted headboard was the couple's most difficult upholstery project to date. Although the projects were challenging, Sarah and David were so happy with the results that both pieces are among the few things to make the move to their new home.

MIXED BAG "When thrift store shopping, be certain of your style and know exactly what you need," Sarah says. This approach allowed her to quickly pull the trigger on purchasing a campaign dresser and two similar but not matching nightstands. She loved them, knew where she could use them, and was certain they could be updated to feel cohesive.








how to make starburst art


Craft an abstract starburst from plastic corner molding. Cut the pieces to various lengths using a saw or utility knife and, using a belt sander, sand the ends at an angle for a finished look. Use epoxy to attach the first, outermost layer around the edge of a simple wood frame (A). Add additional layers on top, working toward the middle, to achieve your desired design. Secure the pieces to each other with epoxy, using tape to hold them in place while the glue sets.



how to rehab a dresser

Take a laminate campaign dresser from cheap to chic with a few simple tricks. Remove the corner plates with a pointed trowel (A) and unscrew the drawer pulls. Clean and polish the hardware using Bar Keeper's Friend. On the dresser cabinet, reinforce the drawers and other joints with wood glue. Cover any holes or scratches with wood filler. Use a random orbital sander with 100-grit paper to make the entire surface paintable. Remove dust, then add two thin coats of primer. Lightly sand with a foam sanding block and wipe clean. Apply three thin coats of white acrylic latex interior paint. When the paint has cured, reinstall the hardware.









how to turn a scarf into art

A vintage Vera scarf becomes stunning wall art. To create the frame, have a hardware store cut two pieces of acrylic 4 inches taller and wider than your scarf. Gently drill holes into the corners of each acrylic piece and sandwich your scarf between the pieces. Place a washer on a flat-head bolt, thread it through the hole (B), add a washer on the underside, and finish with a coupling nut. Attach it to the wall using smaller screws that fit inside the nuts (C).

ROLLING UP

Make your own wheel trellis by gathering four to six bicycle wheels in various sizes. Check with your local recycling or salvage center for lowor no-cost wheels. Coat the rims and tires with spray paint for a pop of color. Let dry. Arrange the wheels in a rough rectangular shape so each wheel is touching at least two other wheels. Attach the wheels to each other at their points of contact by drilling holes and securing hex-head bolts, washers, lock washers, and nuts, opposite and above. Measure the rectangular shape created by the attached wheels. Add 3 feet to the length measurement. That additional length will be partially sunk into the ground to support the trellis. Form a frame, based on your measurements, from plated steel slotted angle, found at home improvement stores. Use hex-head bolts, washers, lock washers, and nuts to connect the slotted angle at each corner, working carefully to ensure the corners are square. Then connect the bike tires to the frame using bolts.

GARDEN VIEW

Suspended from a porch beam, vintage windows create a pretty trellis and view into the landscape beyond. Begin by collecting several old window frames. Remove glass if necessary. Measure the length and width of the space where your trellis will hang. Using the measurements as a guide, arrange the window frames on the ground, leaving several inches between each frame. After the layout is set, attach the top window to the beam or ceiling using four screw eyes and two S hooks, above right. Check for level and adjust the screw eyes as necessary. Continue attaching windows together with screw eyes and S hooks, above left. Attach the lowest window to the porch floor with four screw eyes and two hook binders, right, which will limit overall

movement of the trellis.

NO NEED FOR A SCREEN

An old screen door, purchased at a vintage shop, and salvaged wood combine to create a trellis with rich patina. Begin by removing the screen from the door. Gather lumber, preferably vintage pieces with eye-catching color or texture. Use a table saw to cut the lumber into 2-inch-wide strips. Cutting the strips to length as necessary, create a simple geometric pattern or two inside the door frame. Nail the salvaged wood to the door frame, above. You can seal the finished trellis with varnish to preserve the wood, or leave it unfinished and allow it to weather naturally. Anchor the trellis to the ground by attaching it to two 4-foot-long U-channel posts that are sunk 2 feet into the ground.

GREAT GARDEN VINES

Long stems and twining tendrils make these vining plants perfect candidates for trellises. For quick color, choose an annual flowering vine. If you would like a vine that returns year after year, go with a perennial vine.

ANNUAL VINES



HYACINTH BEAN is a longblooming and easy-to-grow vine that will decorate a trellis with flowers until the first frost in fall.

VEGETABLE VINES



cucumber vines are easy to train to a trellis. Using soft pieces of cloth—an old T-shirt cut into strips works well—tie the young tendrils to the trellis. Soon the vine will take off and begin climbing on its own.

PERENNIAL VINES



CLEMATIS boasts blooms in many colors and flower types. Choose your favorite cultivar and water regularly during the first year to help the plant get established.



MORNING GLORY unfurls its circular blossoms when the sun comes up and then closes them in the heat of the day. Soak seeds over night before planting to soften their hard seed coats.



POLE BEANS are known for their copious production of French, Roma, or shelling beans. Many bean varieties are available as a climbing plant; look for "pole bean" on the package.



CLIMBING HYDRANGEA is an elegant vine for shade. It has clusters of fluffy white flowers for several weeks in summer.



SWEET PEAS are prized for their fragrance, and the blossoms make wonderful cut flowers. Plant seeds in early spring and enjoy blossoms in early summer.



SUGAR SNAP PEAS thrive when planted in early spring and harvested in early summer. Or plant a fall crop in late summer and harvest in midfall.



HOPS rapidly produce
15- to 20-foot-long vines that
are decorated with yellow-green
pinecone-shape flowers. The vine
dies back to the soil in winter.
Prune old growth.

7 GRIT & GLITZ

For this custom headboard, we installed leftover laminate flooring on ¹/₄-inch plywood cut to span the bed. We cut hardboard strips to match the flooring pattern, wrapped them in thin copper sheets, *opposite*, and affixed them with construction adhesive. A frame of white trim with miter-cut corners finishes the piece, which is hung on the wall with a French cleat.

8 SHINY SILHOUETTE


We traced a pretty profile onto a thin sheet of copper using a fine-point permanent marker, then cut out the image using detail scissors. Sketch a floral background on thick crafts paper with a metallic paint pen (we used a Sharpie in Bronze) and attach your head-turning likeness with construction adhesive.

9 PIPE NIGHTSTAND Spend some time in the plumbing aisle combining pipe and elbows (the curved pieces) to fashion a cubical table base. You can have your pipe cut at most home improvement stores, or do it yourself with a pipe cutter. We used the laminate flooring and painted trim from the headboard project to fashion the tabletop, then connected the base and top with U clamps (A). TIP: If you want copper pipe to stay bright and shiny, finish it to stop oxidation. Scratch the metal with emery paper, then seal it with spray polyurethane.











(10) AT YOUR SERVICE
We made this entry butler from a 11×16-inch wood slice and an array of hardware and office store standards that function as clamps for test tube vases and a hang bar outfitted with S hooks.

(11) FANCY FEET To take a console table from fine enough to fancy, tape 6 inches from the bottom of each leg and spray with a coat of primer for glossy surfaces, then two coats of copper spray paint.


HERRINGBONE ◀PANEL WALL

"The mood in this room is nothing short of inspiring," Lindsay Ballard says of the panel wall in her home office. To get the look, calculate the number of planks needed to make a herringbone pattern on your wall; divide planks into three equal piles. Wipe on wood conditioner with a lint-free cloth. Let sit for 15. minutes; remove excess. Stain each pile a different shade of brown; let dry. Find the wall's center point and draw a 45-degree angle with a framing square and a level. Line up one board on the mark and secure it to the wall using a power brad nailer and two %-inch brads in each board Place three more boards, fitting the tongue and groves together and attaching with brads. Continue placing boards to build a herringbone pattern (A). At the floor, mark 45-degree angles on the boards at the bottom. Trim with a miter saw.



▲ PAINT BY NUMBERS

▲CHEVRON WALL

To re-create the high-contrast look of Lindsay's master bedroom, paint the entire wall the lighter of two colors. Cut a chevron template from foam-core board. Tape off stripes using the template, a laser level, and 1-inch painters tape. Use a foam brush to dab the light base color along the edge of the tape that marks the color transition; let a little paint seep underneath. Smooth the paint with the brush and let it dry completely, which seals the tape and prevents the second color from bleeding. Paint inside the tape lines with the second color. Remove the tape before the paint dries.






▲LAYERED FRAMES

Lindsay's interconnected collection of frames makes a big impact in a small space. Gather your own group of frames in various sizes and designs. Measure the space on the wall and lay out paper in a corresponding size. Remove any artwork and glass from the frames, prime, and let dry. Arrange frames on the paper (A) and trace layout. Label each outline and frame with corresponding numbers, then paint the frames as desired and let dry. Hang the template on the wall with painters tape, position and hang all the base frames with nails (B). To layer a frame, drill a hole in the back of the top frame, and insert a small finishing nail with the head clipped off. Hammer the top frame into place. After your top layer is in place, take down the entire piece, flip it over on a towel-covered work surface, and drive additional nails through the frame backs to secure the top layer. Remove the paper template and rehang the display, using adhesive poster strips for extra security.



GEOMETRIC WALL

Mary Blair, the artist who designed Disney's Small World ride, is known for using bright colors and a profusion of simple graphic shapes. To mimic Blair's mod look, Lindsay painted an intricate mural on walls at her home's entry. To do this at your home, start by painting the wall a base color. Draw a grid using a pencil, laser level, and straightedge. Fill sections with geometric designs, varying the scale. Label sections with the intended paint colors. Cover nearby surfaces with taped drop cloths (A). Working with one paint color at a time, fill the design using artist brushes. (Lindsay used a ¹/₄-inch flat brush.)

■ WALL STENCIL

Lindsay livened up a small powder room with a wall stencil that's visible from her home's main hallway. To enrich your own small space, paint the base color and let dry. Secure the stencil to the wall with spray adhesive. Dip a mini roller into contrasting paint and roll it in the tray until it no longer looks wet. Roll out on a paper towel, then over the stencil four or five times. Remove the stencil, clean, and reposition, using spray adhesive. Touch up with a small paintbrush.

▲ BOLD STRIPES

Stripes add a bold punch to the playroom. To get a similar look, paint the wall the lighter color. Let dry. Slightly overlap two strips of painters tape applied vertically from ceiling to baseboard, using a corner or door frame to keep the line plumb. Mark the desired place for horizontal stripes across the two strips. Peel off one strip and reapply it across the wall, using a laser level to align marks. Use the laser level to guide the placement of horizontal tape on each pair of marks. Remove vertical tape. Press on the tape edges that mark the color transition. Dab on light paint with a foam brush and let a little seep under the tape: smooth the paint. Let dry to prevent the second color from bleeding under the tape. Paint two coats of the stripe color (A) and remove the tape while

wet. Touch up as needed.





▲ MARQUEE LETTERS

After seeing vintage marquee letters fetching high prices online and at flea markets, Lindsay made her own. You can, too. Trace letter shapes onto 3/4-inch plywood and cut out with a jigsaw. Drill holes for lights using a spade bit sized to fit the light base on a strand of party lights with removable bulbs. (Lindsay used a %-inch spade bit.) Wrap strips of aluminum roof flashing around the letter forms, tacking in place with staples. TIP: Wear gloves while shaping flashing. Trim excess flashing with tin snips. Prime and paint the letters with spray paint and let dry. Mount your letters on a piece of sheet metal or 1/4-inch plywood with construction adhesive. (Lindsay's plaque is a 24×36-inch piece of sheet metal wrapped in trim and treated with a distressed paint treatment.) Drill holes for lights through the backing piece. Thread lights through holes and secure. Tuck cords behind the plague, holding everything in place with cloth tape.

THIS PHOTO There's no need to buy new when redecorating a room. Homeowners Kim and Ray Metz painted an IKEA dresser from son Nathan's room the same shade of blue as the walls. Kim designed the playful space art on the computer.









Color, fun, and personal style were homeowner Kim Metz's prime priorities when it was

time to redesign her son Nathan's bedroom.
"I'm not big on store-bought if I can do
something myself," Kim, an art director,
says. "I prefer to make one-of-a-kind things."

While her husband, Ray, took care of building and painting tasks, Kim let loose her creativity with original space-theme art and accessories. Even Grandma got into the act, sewing a window valance that reflects the lively pops of green and orange that Kim sprinkled throughout the room.

They repurposed furniture and added a few thrift store finds. Most of the furnishings are neutral enough to grow into the future and adapt to decor changes. "We didn't want to spend a lot since we'll likely change it up in a few years," Kim says.



TOP Rather than paint directly on the wall, Kim created a moonscape on a hollow-core door painted the same blue as the walls. She applied swirls of white latex paint to simulate the craters of the moon, layering on texture while allowing some blue to show through. ABOVE LEFT A thrift store nightstand with a midcentury vibe gets a fresh new look with white paint on the cabinet and metallic silver on the drawers. ABOVE RIGHT Kim designed this constellation art on the computer, flipped it to a mirror image, and printed it on an ink-jet printer. She used decoupage medium to adhere the paper to a painted wooden block and transferred the ink. After the paper dried, she applied water and rubbed her fingers in a circular motion, removing the paper but leaving the transferred design on the wood.

OPPOSITE Taking up much less floor space than a conventional bookcase, these wall-hung book holders are painted basswood canvases turned backward and screwed to the wall. (See "What to Do with a Wood Canvas," page 22, for more ideas.) LEFT Colorful, oversize silicone bands are configured different ways to hold books, magazines, and important papers. BELOW LEFT Canning jars with labels give Nathan a visual reminder of how to begin managing his money. BELOW RIGHT Kim designed the Leo symbol art on the computer, printed it on fabric transfer paper, and then ironed it onto a pillow cover.





ABOVE Nathan's desk is really a budget-friendly shelf supported by brackets screwed to the wall. Freestanding wire cubbies were spray-painted silver (including the plastic corner-connector pieces) and fitted with various bins and boxes to hold toys and art supplies. As Nathan gets older, he can swap out the boxes for magazine holders or fill the bins with hanging file folders.

BELOW LEFT For the cost of paper and paint, you can create original watercolor art following Kim's tips. She began by drawing a grid of boxes in pencil, then painted colorful visions of the planets. "When doing a series of designs, vary the scale and position of what is inside the box," Kim says. "The beauty of watercolor is its organic, imperfect nature." She finished the design by outlining and labeling the boxes with a permanent marker. BELOW RIGHT Instead of attaching the ribbon-trimmed fabric valance to the window shade, Kim and Ray screwed it to the bracket above so it can be changed easily. "I'm big into not permanently attaching things, especially in kids' rooms," Kim says. "It's fun to reflect their personalities, but preferences change quickly."



Long stitches refresh a tired lampshade. Punch holes close together along the top and bottom edges and in 6-inch vertical sections through the center around the shade. Stitch light gray vertical background lines with yarn, then use dark gray yarn to stitch from the bottom half of one line to the top half of the next to create a zigzag, opposite. Switch colors and direction of stitches.

2 X FILES Shades of pink, coral, and gold create an ombré effect on this pillow. Plot a design on graph paper (we planned for ½-inchwide cross-stitches), poke a hole in the center of each X, then lay the paper on a purchased pillow cover with a loose weave. Transfer the pattern by marking each hole on the fabric. Cross-stitch the design, working the rows from dark to pale hues of floss.

Cherry tree branches extend across a pair of canvases. Stretch white linen across assembled 36-inch stretcher bars; staple to back of frame. Lay jute twine across the canvas and shape into branches, tack with small stitches, and wrap with gold cord. Trace the flower and birdcage patterns found at *BHG*. com/StitchPattern, and straight-stitch along the lines with assorted fibers.







4 SIMPLE GEOMETRY

Salvage a faded page from an old book (or photocopy one at a light toner setting), and use it as a background for this framed embroidery. Download the prism pattern at BHG.com/ StitchPattern. Mount the book page on cardstock and follow the pattern to pierce stitch holes through the paper with a sharp needle before stitching the outlines in aqua, black, and pink.

5 TIME TO ACCESSORIZE

Let embroidery floss be your medium for a scarf with a coloring-book look. Stitch shades of coral, orange, and green on the white areas of the black-and-white design, using both long and short straight stitches and selectively coloring a few blooms. Add French knots (see BHG.com/BasicStitches) to the flower centers for added texture.

6 PHOTO FINISH

Give a vintage photograph a modern edge with embroidery. Print a black-andwhite photo onto white cardstock, pencil beginning and ending points for diagonal lines around the subject, and connect the points with metallic threads, yarn, and embroidery floss. Straight, back, chain, stem, and running stitches are all good choices for stitching straight lines.







X marks the spot on a wooden bed frame turned bench that's adorned with simple cross-stitches. Using a drill bit sized wider than paracord, mark and drill an 8x14-inch grid of holes through the bench back, spacing the holes about 1 inch apart like a pegboard. Stitch in the desired pattern. For a modern Scandinavian style, limit the palette to three colors of paracord.

9 SCREEN TIME

Black and white fan-shape stitches enhance the honeycomb pattern on a purchased folding screen. Knot a 3-foot length of yarn 5 inches from the end, thread needle, insert from back of screen, and straight-stitch the center of the fan. Angle stitches on either side of the center stitch, and tie the yarn ends in a neat knot on the back.



Once the glue is dry, install the trim tile so it overlaps the wallpaper. Simple wall art starts with using a ruler and a pencil to mark dots about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches apart on an $8\frac{1}{2}\times11$ -inch sheet of art paper. Apply a colorful assortment of crafts paints to the marks with your fingers. Mat and frame for a polished look. RIGHT Add interest to a shower with a marble tile inset pattern. Draw an outline on the wall where the inset tile will go. Set the subway and thin liner tiles around the designated area. Install an industrial outdoor wall sconce centered above the vanity mirror. RIGHT Sand an unfinished wooden shelf. Prime and paint the shelf white so it doesn't compete with the bold walls. Finish with a polyurethane top coat to combat moisture. Frame a print you find online—or paint one yourself using watercolors.

how to make a tire table

MATERIALS

- Two same-size tires (clean and dry)
- Two unfinished wooden tabletop rounds (large enough to cover tire openings)
- Drill with 1/4-inch bit
- Eight bolts (at least 3 inches long) and nuts
- 36×45-inch natural-color cotton batting
- \bullet Staple gun and $^1\!/_2\text{-inch}$ staples
- 50 yards 1-inch-thick cotton cording (We used Wrights.)
- Hot-glue gun and glue sticks
- Cloth tape
- Glass round (diameter slightly smaller than tires)

Step 1 Gather supplies (A). Drill four evenly spaced holes around one tabletop 1 inch from the edge. Place the tabletop on a tire and drill through each hole into tire wall. Secure tabletop to tire with bolts and nuts (B). Repeat on second tire. Stretch batting tautly over one tire. Staple in place (C) and cut off extra batting.

Step 2 Stand covered tire on its side. Wrap cording around tire, leaving plenty of open space (D); secure cording as you work with hot glue. Wrap the second tire, but this time cover the tire with cording. When cutting the cording, wrap with cloth tape to prevent fraying (E).

Step 3 Stack the wrapped tires, placing the wood-round sides on the outside. Top with a glass round.

how to make a rug table

MATERIALS

- 4x8-foot sheet of ½-inch plywood or medium-density fiberboard, cut into two 24x36-inch rectangles (top), two 23x36-inch rectangles (sides), and two 24x24-inch squares (ends)
- Wood glue
- Clamps
- 1-inch nails
- Hammer
- Five 2×3-foot rugs (cut two into 2×2-foot pieces for the ends)
- 8 yards jute twine
- Tapestry needle

Step 1 Gather supplies (A). Attach the two plywood end pieces to one side piece, using glue and clamps to hold in place, and nail to secure. Add the second side piece, then the top in the same manner.

Step 2 Use clamps to create a rug slipcover. Place one full rug on top of the box, and clamp two full side rugs and two shortened end rugs in place (B). Thread needle with jute and, working around the top rug first and then down each side, secure the rugs to each other with a whipstitch (C).

Step 3 For tassels, thread an 8-inch length of jute into each top corner (D). Add three more 8-inch lengths of jute to each corner, then untwist and fluff. Secure the tassels by tying them in place with the first lengths of jute (E).
