


VASE LIFT Beautify bland bud vases with dribbles of ink, above. For the effect shown in green, rotate a cylinder as you hold an ink dropper against its surface and squeeze out ink to create a ring of color (use tape to achieve a crisp top line). Excess ink will drip to create stripes (A). Repeat with other colors, moving the dropper for each ring. Drip on blending solution to alter inks further. The purple vase is done using a 2-inch paintbrush. Brush ink and blending solution onto a vase to create a soft marblelike pattern.

HANG TIME Showcase your colorful creativity by turning glossy paper into wall art, above. (We used Yupo paper, but photo paper works, too.) Let it all hang out by experimenting with metallic blends, rubbing alcohol, forced air, and felt applicators (see "Tips & Techniques," right). Let design dry before framing.



ANTIQUE ALLURE

Simple drops of ink possess the power to give knobs the iridescent appeal of Tiffany Favrile glass, opposite. Add a drop each of green and blue ink to the front of a vintage-style glass knob (A). Spread the ink evenly with a felt applicator or small brush. Let dry. Repeat using purple ink on the back of the knob. Finish with water-base sealer and let dry.

TIPS & TECHNIQUES
Give your inked design extra oomph with these easy application methods.



METALLICS

Create luminous metallic highlights. Because metallics are thicker than alcohol ink, they don't blend easily on their own. Add drops of blending solution or rubbing alcohol to boost blending power.



RUBBING

ALCOHOL Use rubbing alcohol to dilute alcohol inks. Spray alcohol onto applied inks to create a marbled effect. Use a cotton swab dipped in alcohol to remove dye and leave clear dots behind.



FORCED AIR

Purse your lips and blow on alcohol ink to spread it across your surface. Spray rubbing alcohol over the ink, then blow to get a repeating wave pattern. Blow through a straw to concentrate air onto one spot and create whimsical splats.



FELT APPLICATOR

Dot ink or blending solution from the bottle onto an applicator—a stamper with a felt rectangle attached via hook-and-loop tape. Pounce the ink onto a clean surface to create a bubblelike pattern.

LIGHT THE WAY Swirls of ink add artistic appeal to plain pillar candles, left. Squirt ink onto waxed paper. Roll a candle in the ink until covered. Ink the top with a felt applicator or brush. Starting at the rim, drip different colors of ink—as well as a metallic blendonto the candle exterior (A). Drip on blending solution to help spread the metallic. Spritz alcohol to further marble the applied colors. Let dry 24 hours before use.



FEATHERY FASHION Strut your stuff with linens that show peacocks in all their glory, *opposite*. Use alcohol-base markers (such as Sharpies) to draw a peacock displaying his tail feathers on a white cotton or linen napkin (A). When you're done, spray the tail feathers with rubbing alcohol to blend the hues. The more alcohol you spray, the more the ink will bleed. (We used less alcohol on the head and body so they would remain in sharper detail.) Let the napkin dry for several days to set the colors; then rinse it until water runs clear.

WASH, DRY, FOLD

Make laundry day less of a chore with these ideas and tips to trick out even the tiniest of laundry rooms.

STICK ON Attach magnetic organizers, including a paper towel holder and spice tins to hold mending supplies, onto appliances to keep stain-fighting tools and other necessities handy. Magnetic stainless-steel paper towel rack, \$18; silver magnetic mesh bins, \$5–\$7; magnetic spice tins, \$9 for three; *containerstore.com*



BUY IT

HOOK 'EM This sleek wall-mount rack has five flip-down hooks that recess out of the way when not in use. Mount it inside or outside your laundry work space for hanging and sorting clean clothes. Flip 5 Hook White, \$30; umbra.com

SPACE-SAVER Stacked appliances make limited square footage more functional. All full-size, front-loading Samsung laundry appliances, including the 5500 washer and dryer, are stackable with a \$40 kit. Washer, \$899; dryer, \$899; samsung.com









SMALL SPACE TRICK A drop-leaf table gives you counter-height work space for treating stains and folding, and then folds against the wall, leaving a narrow ledge sufficient for stay-there storage of detergent and canisters. Use the folded-out tabletop as an ironing board by layering on an insulated ironing mat to safely press clothing without damaging the melamine surface. 





CURTAIN CALL Can't find a shower curtain you love? Make your own design by stenciling a drop cloth, above. Cut the canvas to 76×73 inches (for a standard-size bathtub). Lay the fabric flat. Adhere a stencil, lightly dip a foam roller brush into paint, and roll over the stencil. Carefully lift the stencil and repeat the pattern all over the fabric, along the edges, or sporadically to create a design you love. When dry, fold any raw edges under $\frac{1}{2}$ inch and sew. Fold the top over $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches and sew. Make 12 evenly spaced marks across the top edge. Cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch line at each mark and add a set of curtain rings for hanging.







DEAR HANDY GIRL,

Help! My dog took a paw to a cabinet door, leaving big scratches. What's an easy remedy?





- Cover the doors' insets with wallpaper or adhesive contact paper in a pretty pattern or color.
- Paint the insets with chalkboard paint.
- Replace the doors' insets with another material, such as screen or glass. A hardware store can cut pieces to size.
- Remove the doors, which works best with upper cabinets. You might have to paint the cabinet frame and fill the screw holes.



FOR SCRATCHES AND GOUGES:

If the scratch barely scrapes the surface and is not obvious, fill in with a touch-up paint or stain pen; wipe off any excess with a cloth. For deeper marks, fill the spot with a wood fill product. Once dry, lightly sand smooth, then apply stain or paint to blend with the surrounding door. Lightly cover the spot with polyurethane.



FOR DENTS: A dent means the cabinet piece is still there—it's just been pushed inward, and you need to make it level with the surrounding area. Remove the door and put a few drops of water on the dent. Cover the dented area with a damp rag, then apply an iron at the cotton setting to the rag. Move it continuously over the spot and check after a minute; the combination of water and heat should pull the dent out.

DEAR HANDY GIRL.

We love our home—except the wretched popcorn ceilings. Every time I look up, ugh. But scraping them to remove the texture? The mess would drive me crazy. Is there anything else I can do?

OH, DEAR READER, In my previous house, my husband convinced me that scraping the second-floor landing's ceiling would be a piece of cake. I spent the next week cleaning drywall dust out of every—and I mean every—crevice. So unless you're tag-teaming another dirty renovation project, the mess of scraping that popcorn texture off may not be worth the effort.

But here's the tricky thing about revamping popcorn ceilings: In general, adhesives used with most products don't work with that pesky popcorn texture because they don't have anything to stick to. So if you're tempted to buy peel-and-stick ceiling tiles and call it a day, you'll be sorely disappointed. Instead, try one of these options:



CEILING-GRADE GYPSUM BOARD Traditional drywall boards (also called gypsum, wallboard, or plasterboard) are super heavy and can be thick, but this ½-inch option is significantly lighter, which helps eliminate installation hassles and potential sagging.

PROS

CONS

Once you secure panels to the existing ceiling framing, then tape and float the seams and screws, you'll have a perfectly smooth ceiling. The thinner boards also make it easy to cut holes for light fixtures. Big panels—most start at 4×8 feet—make quick work of covering a ceiling with a minimum of seams.

You'll need ladders and a helper, and you have to tape and mud, which can be time-consuming. If you have crown molding or trim, you'll have to remove and reinstall it.

SCREW-IN WOOD PLANKS OR METAL CEILING TILES Both options, which are secured to the ceiling joists, add character over a dated popcorn ceiling.

PROS

CONS

Usually less than 5/16 inch thick, the tiles and planks barely affect ceiling height. Plus, installation is easy: Apply adhesive to the back of the plank/tile to hold it in place as you screw into the joists. (For long planks, trim into manageable lengths before you start.)

Block out plenty of time (those planks/tiles don't cover big areas all at once like drywall) and find a helper. If you don't stain or paint planks beforehand, you'll have to do it once installed. (I guess that's another way to build shoulder muscles?)

CEILING SYSTEM Don't shudder: These are a design-smart update of the acoustical-style systems of old (think 1970s paneled basements).

PROS

CONS

Spaced along a ceiling, slim metal rods act as anchors for patterned and colored planks or tiles. The pieces click into the system for straightforward installation.

Both those long metal pieces and the tiles/ planks lower the ceiling more than the other two options. And it takes time—a lot quicker as a two-person job.



DEAR HANDY GIRL,

Our vacuum is on its last legs, and I want to be prepared. What's out there and what is best for different types of floors?

DEAR READER, I feel your pain. I had a vacuum die the day we were taking down our Christmas tree. Cleaning up needles, plus the typical load of hair from my dog and cat, removed any last jolly spirit from my holiday season. To choose the just-right vacuum, consider power, convenience, and extras. Here's a breakdown.

UPRIGHT	Both bag and bagless options. Bagless saves bag costs, but must be cleaned or filters replaced more frequently. The tilt range might not be enough to reach under low spots like the sofa. Small messes and small areas, especially if the wand on a stick vacuum disconnects to convert into a handheld option.	Super slim, super simple to tote around. Keep one in a kitchen for midweek cleanup. Not good for regular, powerful cleaning or on carpets; small capacity and might be noisy. If battery-powered, may need frequent charging; both corded and cordless options available.
ROBO	Most are bagless. Runs at surface level, so no tilt necessary.	Midweek cleanup that you don't have time to attend to.	Models have difficulty working their way around lots of items on the floor. DEAR HANDY GIRL.

I clean my bathroom every week—I promise! But last time through I noticed a black spot on the wall just outside the shower. I scrubbed it away, but it looked like mold. Should I be worried?

OH, DEAR READER, Isn't it the worst when you discover ugly, creepy mold in your bathroom? Yuck.

However, your case doesn't seem like much cause for worry. First, know mold is inescapable: It's all around us, all the time, and does plenty of good. (Hello, cheese and penicillin!) And mold loves humid spaces, which is why bathrooms are its match made in heaven. Scrubbing any spots thoroughly once you find them is the best remedy for isolated instances.

That, however, is different from the mold you've probably read about: the kind overtaking whole rooms or houses and causing unrelenting health problems. It grows when water leaks—either from outside or inside the house—are left unchecked and rooms are not well-ventilated. If that mold takes hold, it can disintegrate building materials and create thousands of spores that can travel to humans, causing allergic reactions and other health problems.

The best mold medicine? Prevention and attention.

The *Do It Yourself* she shed began in collaboration with Classic Buildings, a custom shed builder based in Kansas City, Missouri. Working from a plan in the company's library, we customized our structure to fit our wooded suburban lot, adjusted door and window placement, and selected finishes. We upgraded our material choices for wall, ceiling, and floor panels to new durable products from LP Building Products. (See *page* 59 for details.) Five weeks later our

practical getaway. "I wanted the overall look to be modern, light, and industrial, so I mixed different patterns, textures, and materials," she says. "The vibe is confident, playful, and, most important, feminine." Berger's projects relied on home center staples—paint, drywall, iron pipe, and nominal lumber, along with a few splurges like a basket chair and patterned outdoor fabrics.

To boost the shed's versatility, we developed the surrounding yard as additional living space. A paverand-pebble patio, borders and steps made of Belgian pavers, and metal tanks filled with flowers and edibles complete the look. Time to gather a few friends and celebrate!



how to build a rolling cart

MATERIALS

- 1×12×36-inch boards, need 3
- Masking tape
- Drill and 11/8-inch drill bit
- 3/4×3-inch black iron pipes, need 2
- 3/4-inch black iron couplings, need 19
- ³/₄-inch 90-degree black iron elbows, need 2
- 3/4×11/2-inch black iron nipples, need 14
- 3/4×8-inch black iron pipes, need 4
- 3/4-inch black iron caps, need 6
- 3/4×18-inch black iron pipes, need 4
- 1×12×5-inch boards, need 2
- 11/4-inch wood screws
- 3-inch swivel-plate locking wheels, need 4
- Stain (optional)
- Cloth

Step 1 Stack the three $1\times12\times36$ -inch shelf boards. Hold the stack together with masking tape. Measure and mark placement for four holes on the top board; center two marks at each short side 7 inches apart and 1 inch from the edge. Drill $1^1/8$ -inch holes at each mark through the stack; remove tape.


Step 2 To make the handle, attach 3-inch-long pipes to opposite ends of a coupling. Attach an elbow to each pipe end. Attach a nipple to each elbow, then add a coupling to the end of each nipple (A). Attach a nipple to each handle end.

Step 3 Thread the handle nipples down through the holes of one board and attach a coupling to each nipple on the bottom of the board. Attach an 8-inchlong pipe to each coupling. Attach a coupling and a nipple to the end of each pipe.

Step 4 Attach a coupling and a nipple to each end of the two remaining 8-inchlong pipes. Thread one nipple end of each pipe up through the opposite holes in the board from Step 3. Attach a cap to each nipple on top of the board (B).

Step 5 Thread the nipples at the end of each 8-inch pipe down through a second board. Attach a coupling to each





of the four pipe ends on the bottom of the second board.

Step 6 Attach an 18-inch-long pipe to each coupling. Add a coupling and nipple to each pipe end. Thread the nipples down through the third board, and add a cap to each nipple on the bottom of the third board.

Step 7 Place cart with handle side down. Screw a 5-inch length of 1x12 crosswise just inside the caps on each short end. Screw two wheels to each block.

Step 8 If desired, wipe stain on each board; let dry.



AT YOUR SERVICE A rolling cart can be many things—a food and drink hub, a place for art supplies, a spot to stash your favorite tomes, even a planting station. Make your own industrial-style cart by fitting together black iron pipes and furniture-grade wood panels, *above* and *opposite*.

COMFORTS OF HOME

An upgrade to operable windows, *right*, encourages cross-ventilation and increases the shed's livability. A cornice above each window is simply fabric-wrapped foam mounted with hooks secured to the back that rest on tooth hooks on the wall (A). Below the window, folding metal pipe stools hang on the wall and are ready to use as guest seats.


To make a stool, use a bit specifically for metal to drill holes through the centers of four 18-inchlong black iron pipes. Using Loctite Threadlocker adhesive to connect all pieces, attach a 3/4-inch iron elbow to one end of each pipe, and a cap to the opposite end. Connect a 10-inch-long pipe between the elbow ends of two 18-inch pipes to make one leg. Repeat to make a second leg. Sew a $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hem along each long edge of a 10×26-inch piece of heavyweight fabric or canvas. Turn under and sew a 4-inch-wide casing at each narrow end. Insert a leg through each casing to make the seat. Connect the legs, inset, with a 3-inch carriage bolt, washers, and a nut through each set of holes.





IN PERSPECTIVE

Create a focal point with a custom-printed and embroidered canvas photograph that you then frame as wall art, *left*. Stretch and staple the fabric onto stretcher bars (assembled, our stretcher bars measured 2×3 feet). then use embroidery floss to outline the desired areas of the photograph with backstitches, leaving long floss tails. Cut and miter 2-inch-wide cedar boards to create a frame. Use a handsaw to cut shallow grooves into the frame sides where the tails meet the frame. Place the tails in the channels and let the ends extend toward the floor.



ON THE FRINGE Glam it up while casting a soft evening glow with a stunning three-tier fringe chandelier, right. Cut the shade off an inexpensive lampshade, leaving the top ring with mounting rods intact, then hang the inner circles from two graduated sizes of wood embroidery hoops from the top circle with clear fishing line. Using superglue, adhere the tape edge of fringe trim to each ring.





CARVING OUT SPACE A fold-down table made from an 18×79-inch hollowcore closet door and mounted on two hinged L-brackets, opposite, folds flat against the wall when not in use. To mount it, screw a 79-inchlong 2×2 board onto the wall horizontally and into studs. Mount one long side of the door to the board with one 30-inch piano hinge at the center and two 12-inch piano hinges at each end. On the wall under the 2×2 , screw into the studs vertically two 1×1 boards the same length as the L-brackets. Mark and drill holes on each L-bracket to align with piano hinge holes and attach a 12-inch hinge with hinge screws; attach each hinge to a 1×1 on the wall. Cap screw ends if desired. Use pieces of scrap wood to reinforce where the door rests on brackets: do not attach brackets to the door.



CONTAIN YOURSELF

Three galvanized stock tanks serve as industrialstyle planters, above. Under the windows, hanging planter boxes constructed from plumbing pipe, rope, and drywall mud pans hold herbs and annuals, right. To make the window box hanging rod, screw an elbow and a floor flange to each end of a $\frac{3}{4} \times 24$ -inch galvanized pipe, then screw the flanges to the window trim. Tie two pieces of rope onto the pipe, allowing enough length for an 18-inch drywall mud pan filled with plants to slide through the loops.

PICK A SOURCE You have three basic ways to become a shed owner: Buy it readymade from a big-box store, find a dealer to build one for you, or build it yourself with a blueprint or purchased plan. Your choice will depend on how much customizing you want and how quickly you need your shed. Ready-made sheds offer little flexibility in design choices but can be placed in your yard within a few days. Local shed dealers offer upgrades in materials. Our builder, Classic Buildings (classicbuildingsales.com), helped us integrate extra windows and modify finish choices to match our style. Of course, if you're handy and have time, doing it yourself allows you the most control over the project.

CHOOSE A SITE Smart siting of your shed ensures levelness, proper drainage, and accessibility. An installer can often use blocks to level the structure on slightly uneven ground, but always verify whether this service is included in delivery costs. Also check door swings to make sure you can open your shed freely in your chosen spot.

ORIENT THE SHED A shed that is turned a few degrees rather than sitting squarely with the property lines can enhance the view from your house, giving the shed depth and visual interest. Another important factor to consider is sunlight, and how it hits the shed at different times of day.

PREP FOR DELIVERY After you choose the spot for your shed, think about the path it will follow at delivery. Take photos of your driveway and yard for the installer, who can provide feedback and instructions about delivery ahead of time. Plan to tie back branches, if needed.

Make your shed your own by focusing on these elements:

1. FLOOR Untreated plywood flooring can deteriorate when used on shed floors, but treated engineered flooring offers long-lasting performance and durability. LP ProStruct Floor with SmartFinish (*lpshed.com*) resists water, rot, and termites and offers a smooth surface for floor paint.

2. CEILING Say good-bye to hot and dimly lit sheds. LP ProStruct Roof Sheathing with SilverTech is an attractive, reflective surface that helps brighten our shed's interior, while also keeping out some of the sun's radiant energy to lower the interior temperature.

DETAILS Make your shed feel more substantial by extending the roof overhang. Our shed's 10-inch overhang

4. TOUGH THRESHOLD





For the cost of a roll or two of wallpaper and inexpensive crown molding, you can create a 45-square-foot art piece. Use self-sticking, easily removable wallpaper and damage-free hangers (like Command Strips) instead of nails, and this artwork can swap out with the latest trend.



TABLE IT For the 48×18-inch coffee table (upright, *opposite*, and upside down to show construction, *above right*), we used two pieces each of 16×40 -inch and 16×10 -inch lattice in the Moorish Circles pattern (*acuriolattice.com*), and 2×2 -inch posts cut to 17 inches tall for the base. The top is medium-density fiberboard (MDF) painted to match the white lattice. Supports cut from $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch plywood (15 inches and $38\frac{1}{2}$ inches long) reinforce the table base. A drill and $1\frac{1}{4}$ -inch screws secure the supports to the tabletop, lattice panels, and table legs.

RECORD HARMONY The vinyl resurgence means vintage album prices are on the rise, but you have an advantage over collectors because LP condition doesn't matter for this project, *this photo*. Finding albums at garage sales and in thrift store bins is more affordable (and fun!) than buying them in record stores. Check with relatives, like your '80s-loving uncle, to see if they will part with a few album covers from their stash.

how to make album frames

MATERIALS

- ³/₄-inch corner trim (allow 5 feet per frame)
- Miter saw
- Measuring tape
- Fine-grit sandpaper
- Wood glue
- Clamps
- 23-gauge pin nailer
- Spray paint
- Record album cover
- Putty knife/paint multi-tool
- Glazier points
- Hammer

Step 1 Gather materials (A). When purchasing trim keep in mind that material will be lost when you make your cuts. Purchase a piece of trim 1 foot longer than the perimeter of your frame. We allotted 5 feet per frame.

Step 2 Rough-cut the trim into four 15-inch lengths. Measure 13 inches and mark each piece (B).

Step 3 Set your miter saw* to a 45-degree angle. Cut the first piece of trim using the pencil mark you made as the end of the cut (C). Cut the angle in the opposite direction at the other end (D). The result should be trim that measures 13 inches on the long side and 12 inches on the short side. Continue measuring and cutting all four sides of the frame.

Step 4 Check to see that your pieces will fit together tightly. Use a fine-grit sandpaper to smooth the edges.

Step 5 Glue the four pieces together (E). Clamp the frame while the glue dries.

Step 6 Use a pin nailer to further secure all four corners (F).

Step 7 Spray the frame with several light coats of paint (G), allowing the final coat to dry thoroughly overnight.

Step 8 Place album in the frame. Use a putty knife to gently push the tips of the glazier points into the frame (H). To avoid damaging the album, press into the wood instead of down toward the album. We inserted two glazier points per side.

*Note: You can use a hand or power miter saw, but if you are comfortable using a power saw we've found it will give you smoother, more accurate cuts.

how to make a crate planter

MATERIALS

- Wine crate
- Linseed oil
- Brush
- Stain-sealer combination
- Drill and bits
- Wine corks
- 11/4-inch wood screws
- ¾-inch wood screws
- Supamoss
- Potting mix and seeds or seedlings
- Micro-irrigation kit
- Soaker hose

Step I Apply linseed oil on the crate's interior and let dry; apply a second coat for a water-repellent, food-safe seal. On the crate exterior, apply a coat of stain-sealer (A).

Step 2 Drill at least two drainage holes in the crate's bottom. To make pot feet: Cut wine corks in half and attach each with a 1½-inch wood screw to a bottom corner of the crate (B). Reinforce the crate edges with 3¼-inch wood screws.

Step 3 Cut Supamoss, a natural moss-alternative liner, to fit the bottom and sides of the crate (C). Fill the lined crate with organic potting mix, and plant.

Step 4 To conserve water and ease your chores, add micro-irrigation to each planter, following product instructions. Give each planter its own soaker hose and connect with the main line (D). Add a timer to automate the works, if desired.





HIGH RISE A length of chicken wire, cut and bent into a cylinder that fits in a large pot, makes a sturdy tower, *right*, for climbing peas. Wear tough gloves and use needle-nose pliers to twist wire ends together (A), securing the cylinder. Copper spray paint elevates the 36-inch-tall plant support to garden ornament stature. Coax the pea plants to entwine the wire as they grow.




RACKING UP YIELDS The metal-mesh baskets in this nifty cart, *opposite* and *left*, are deep enough (3–5 inches) to accommodate moisture-holding liners, potting mix, and plants. We planted strawberries in the bottom basket, edible flowers (Anytime Pansiolas) in the middle container, and kale in the top. Casters make the cart easy to roll into sun or shade or under shelter if frost looms. Outdoor spray paint updates the basic metal to a pretty cream shade.

Every time the Jamison kids come home from school, they pile into a foyer gleaming in graphic gray, white, and black—a room they helped transform into the modern masterpiece it is today.



and added a red wire chandelier, but white walls pushed the color scheme from modern to cliche. "I brought in the gray, and it just worked," she says.

7 The playroom relies on Lindsey's go-to combination of clean white and dramatic black to bring it to life. The existing wainscoting got fresh white paint, while the wall above is coated in chalkboard paint to encourage doodling. 8 Rather than rip out the old floor tile, Josh and Lindsey laid luxury vinyl tile (LVT) in a gray-stained wood look right over it. "We used LVT because we could install the floor ourselves," she says. "It was a great way to save on installation costs, and it's a nice, durable alternative to hardwood. It's also more practical for children with messy art supplies and spilled drinks!" 9 A swatch of pegboard gives the kids a place to hang buckets of pencils and paintbrushes as well as scissors and other supplies.

10 Oak paneling and rooster wallpaper (of all things!) mercifully gave way to pale gray walls swept with a flock of triangle decals (Basic Trig Decals; *landofnod.com*) in Henry's bedroom. "I thought about painting a design, but then I found the decals," Lindsey says. "I didn't want it to be a whole wall of them; I just wanted a little taste of it." **11** An orange headboard supplies the knockout punch of color while white, black, and gray cloak the linens, walls, furniture, and floor.

12 The door to 7-year-old Betsy's room extols her many virtues. Lindsey swabbed a vintage door with black milk paint for a crackled appearance and added an old doorknob for even more charm. Then she applied white milk paint to the glass panel for privacy and a solid background for the lettering, which she painted using a stencil and a careful hand. 13 Lindsey bought pink and gray fabric to create a "house" on the wall behind Betsy's bed and adhered them using liquid starch.

CLEAN CUT

AVOID A JAGGED EDGE ON THE STATE BY CUTTING THE FOAM-CORE BOARD WITH A NEW BLADE IN YOUR CRAFTS KNIFE.



WALL STATEMENT For Texas art, *above left*, cut a mat board to fit your chosen frame. Glue a map to the board using spray adhesive. Print a picture of the state you'd like to feature. Cut out the shape, and trace it onto foam-core board. Cut out the state using a crafts knife, and apply gold leaf. Attach the state to the map with adhesive dots. Frame the artwork and hang. **HEART ART** The origami heart, *above right*, is made by simply folding 32 squares (A, *opposite*). Cut 4×4-inch squares from maps and cardstock (you choose how many of each). Fold each square in half diagonally to make a triangle (B). Arrange four triangles to form a square with folded edges on the outside and points together in the center (C). Use adhesive dots to secure to the wall. Repeat seven times; arrange the squares into a heart.

BASKET CASE Craft a 3-inch-square catchall to hold your sticky notes, above left and opposite. Cut nine 3×30-inch strips from a map. Fold each strip lengthwise in thirds. Use six strips to weave the base of the basket into a three-by-three strip square. Hot-glue at the four corners. Fold the ends of the strips upward to begin the sides of the basket. Weave the three remaining strips through the upright strips to form the sides of the basket. Use clothespins to hold the strips as you go. Hot-glue each horizontal strip where the ends overlap; trim excess. Fold alternating vertical strips over the basket top and tuck into the strip below it on the inside of the basket. Trim and glue the other vertical strips. For a larger finished size (like the basket holding rolls of tape), use wider strips or weave more strips to form the base.







REST STOP Put your feet up and take a load off after a long day on the road (or in the cubicle), courtesy of this adorable pout that you can make yourself. Start by choosing a 54-inch-wide decorator fabric that speaks to your adventurous side, perhaps something reminiscent of a contour map, *above*, or maybe a print or color that reminds you of the ocean or the night sky. After you make your choice, you'll need 2 yards of fabric and an old bedsheet (or 3 yards of 45-inch-wide muslin). BUT MIGHTY

Easy, affordable projects give this pint-size powder room some pep in its step.

When they concluded the commode was the only thing worth keeping, Phil and Jenny McLean knew it was time to update their '90s-era bath.

"It had brown linoleum, an old oak vanity, and a terrible light fixture. Then *somebody* painted it a weird color of green," Phil says. Jenny adds, "It was a blah tan before, but the green might have been a little too much."

While their first attempt at an update had left them with painter's remorse, the McLeans decided to give a makeover another go.

With a shared goal of modernizing and making the room feel bigger, the couple rolled up their sleeves and hit the home improvement store in search of budget, DIY solutions. In just a couple of weekends, no surface was left untouched, as they sheathed the ceiling, walls, and floor and replaced fixtures and accessories for less than \$800.





Phil and Jenny McLeans' first paint color missed the mark. Their second try—a deep grayish beige-gave them the drama they desired when paired with plenty of white. 2 A new pedestal sink's smaller footprint offers more room to maneuver. To safely secure the basin to the wall, Phil added a support board between the studs and then patched the drywall. 3 Sometimes thinking outside the bath aisle achieves more stylish results. Case in point: this chunky-frame mirror from HomeGoods. 4 When slipped in an 18×24 -inch frame, a \$5 sheet of decorative paper becomes simple art. 5 Swirl a few paint colors on white paper. When dry, punch circles from the sheet and arrange them on poster board.




6 For about \$60, Phil and Jenny built two shelves from 1×8 boards, $\frac{3}{4} \times 10$ -inch galvanized pipe nipples, caps, and flanges. Before assembling, they spraypainted all the fittings oil-rubbed bronze. When hanging, secure flanges to the studs when possible or use drywall anchors. 7 To create board-andbatten wainscoting, Phil and Jenny installed a 1×4 baseboard and a 1×3 chair rail using a nail gun, and then evenly spaced 1×3s around the room. If your wall is textured, consider installing smooth panels between the boards. Caulk the seams where the boards meet the wall before painting. 8 You only need a sharp utility knife and a straightedge to install luxury vinyl tiles that click together. 9 Disguise a popcorn ceiling with a beadedboard panel. To hold up the board while he nailed it in place, Phil made a T from 2×4s and wrapped a towel around the end to prevent scuffs. 10 A tile backsplash that extends as a border around the room offers a luxe look. Phil cut mosaic sheets in half and installed the tile with premixed mastic, using spacers to leave an even gap above the chair rail. Finish the top edge with wood trim, grout the tile, and touch up trim

paint as necessary.

1 Get the elegant look of etched glass using a plastic number stencil and glass etching cream. We love the Martha Stewart Crafts kit, which includes a brush for application. Make sure you place the stencils accurately before etching; it's permanent! 2 A thrift store score, this vintage window needed only a coat of paint to the back of the glass to be called into action in the entryway. Two pieces of wire pulled taut horizontally and wrapped around screw eyes work as a makeshift pocket near the bottom of the window for tucking magazines and more. A vertical strand of wire offers a place to clip invitations and ephemera. Use window markers (Crayola has lots of great colors) to write and erase with ease. 3 Gold spray paint dresses up a plain glass vase. Spray the outside and, while the paint is still wet, add texture by spraying on a half-and-half vinegar and water solution and mussing the surface with a paper towel. 4 Looking Glass spray paint from Krylon applied to the inside of clear vases achieves the pretty look of mercury glass at a fraction of the cost. Wider vessels work best-spraying in tight spaces is tricky.

how to make a mercury glass vase

MATERIALS

- Clear glass vase
- Krylon Looking Glass spray paint
- Paper towels
- Vinegar

Step 1 Apply a light and even coat of spray paint to the inside of a clean vase.

Step 2 Soak the corner of a paper towel in a mix of equal parts vinegar and water. Using a fingertip, gently swipe the wet corner along the paint. It works

best when the paint is still tacky—not too wet or dry—so it isn't wiped away completely but is still easily manipulated.

Step 3 After you achieve the desired level of "vintage," let the piece dry in a cool spot.





5 Raid your crafts stash to make a mini world using a few simple materials. Paper-andwire butterflies alight from a moss field inside this cloche. 6 Fill a cast-off sconce with a twilight scene fashioned from gold foil stars and felt hills. Nestle a tiny abode in the foreground. **7** Sea glass embellishes a wide frame mirror. Simply hot-glue sea glass in pretty pastel hues to make the mirror mantel-worthy. 8 Make a fast piece of wall art with nail polish. Add a little water to a shallow pan (wide enough to fit your piece of glass) and add nail polishes to the water's surface. Swirl colors with a toothpick or wood crafts stick. Holding the edges with the glass parallel to the liquid's surface, touch the glass to the surface without submerging. Lay the piece flat, dipped side up, to dry. For best results, use new nail polish and practice on paper first. You can remove the color from glass with fingernail polish remover if needed. 9 These handblown ornaments deserve to be on display all year. Enhance the clear glass balls with paint or gold leaf. (We used Martha Stewart Crafts Spray Paint Kit, Gilding Sheets, and Gilding Adhesive for our collection.)


11 Elevate the usual photo display. Print a picture on temporary tattoo paper and apply it to glass. We used an adhesive silk-screen kit to print this illustration on glass. A layer of tissue paper behind the glass adds a soft wash of color but maintains the translucence of the negative space.

12 Turn dinnerware into art with plate hangers and a gold marker. For an effective composition on the wall, hang elements of the same material (such as glass, *opposite*) but different colors, or incorporate different materials but in the same hue.

how to make a window panel hutch

MATERIALS

- 4 wooden window panels (with at least 2 pairs of matching dimensions)
- Nail gun
- 2 hinges
- ³/₄-inch plywood (the dimension depends on window size)
- 3/4-inch decorative molding
- 1×6 trim boards (length depends on window size)
- 4 legs
- Drill
- Screws (the size of the screw depends on the frame on the window)
- 4 shelf pegs



Step 1 Make a box with the windows, attaching the front window with hinges. Cut two pieces of plywood (for the top and bottom) that match the dimension of the window box.

Step 2 Using a nail gun, attach the plywood to the top and bottom of windows. Cut decorative molding to size and attach to plywood edge (A).

Step 3 Matching the size of the plywood, construct a rectangle from the 1x6 trim



boards, and attach legs. Position window frame on top. To attach, screw through plywood bottom into 1x6 frame.

Step 4 Add a removable shelf, if desired. Cut plywood to size, paint, and let dry. Measure and drill four holes to match the shelf peg size, drilling one hole near each corner of the cabinet to support the shelf. Insert pegs and rest shelf on top (B).


