## EMBELLISH GLASS

Inking, etching, painting, and marbling—we upgrade six plain glass pieces to one-of-a-kind statement-makers for your home.

**GET INKED** Acid-free, highly pigmented, and fast-drying, alcohol inks are a great match for nonporous surfaces like glass. To get this look on a glass candleholder, *this photo*, start by placing cardboard under the project (the ink will run). Drip colored and metallic inks onto the glass, then drip alcohol blending solution over them and watch the inks spread and run together. To further blend the colors, spray a light mist of rubbing alcohol. Let dry.



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




**STAIN GAME** Bring the timeless beauty of stained glass into your home, left. To get this look, discard the backing from a used or new picture frame. Remove glass from the frame and clean it. Using a selfadhesive lead strip, unroll the leading. The leading comes with a crease in the center; it can be torn in half if a thinner leading strip is preferred. Snip the center of the leading with scissors. Once started, it is easy to tear apart by hand. Adhere your leading design to the glass. Paint colors onto glass using Vitrail glass paint (A). Mix paint with a lightening medium if you desire more translucent color. The paints are mixable and can be made more pastel by adding white. When dry, reinsert the glass in the frame.

**SPIT PERSONALITY** Use Unicorn Spit—a nontoxic paint, glaze, and stain all in one—to create a faux marble look on a glass tabletop, left and below. To start, squeeze a base layer of color onto the table. (We chose white.) Use a brush or your fingers to spread it evenly across the surface. Drip different colors of paint over the base color. Spray with water to mix the colors. Drag a toothpick through the dark paint and into the light paint to create the look of marble veins. Continue respraying with water to keep the paint liquid while you work. When you're pleased with the design, let dry. Seal with a few coats of spray lacquer for shine.

#### THE MAKER:

#### LAURA GALVIS

The Cruda Soaps owner helps others limit their plastic footprint and works to share some natural goodness with the world.

**Q:** How did you come up with the name?

A: In Spanish, *cruda* is the feminine word for raw. All the ingredients I use are raw materials, so that's where the name comes from.

How does using natural ingredients make a difference in the product?

A: They give it quality. If you use natural, rich, raw ingredients, you see the difference in your skin. Even if I don't put on any moisturizer or oil, my skin is already moisturized, nourished, and glowing because I use soap made with 100 percent natural oils. Products made with chemicals are super harsh and dehydrating.

Q: What prompted you to take a more sustainable approach to your business and in your life?

A: In Belgium, all the tools to live a zero-waste lifestyle were provided for me, so I didn't really need to make an effort for it. But when we moved to Miami, I was shocked with the amount of plastic in everything. Buying anything without plastic involved is complicated and pricey, which makes avoiding plastic in your daily life a hassle. As I started learning more about the zero-waste movement, it made me wonder what changes can be done. You don't have to have a zero-waste lifestyle to contribute a little to the environment. You just need to make small changes in your daily life. It all adds up!







#### **BARE NECESSITIES**

Laura makes each product using organic ingredients—like extra virgin olive oil, raw shea butter, and coconut oil—that are all sourced in the U.S. Instead of artificial additives, she beautifies her soaps with dried flowers and natural pigments, such as cocoa, spinach, and sandalwood powders. To uphold her plasticfree promise, Laura packages the products with reusable or recyclable materials including compostable labels, glass bottles, and recycled cardboard. Cruda Soaps has expanded its all-natural offerings beyond soaps to include moisturizers, bath salts, body oils, and more. Browse all the products at crudasoaps.com.

#### **MAKE IT**

#### HOMEMADE SOAP

#### **MATERIALS**

- Solid oils (like coconut oil)
- Liquid oils (like olive or canola oil)
- Kitchen scale
- Distilled water
- Heat-resistant glass pitcher
- Lye
- Quart canning jar
- Thermometer
- Immersion blender
- Soap mold

Step 1 Choose your oils. Measurements will vary depending on the oils you pick, so find a good formula online and base your measurements on that.

Step 2 Measure the distilled water into a glass pitcher and weigh the lye in a separate container, using a kitchen scale for precision. In a wellventilated area, pour the lye into the water and stir until dissolved. Caution: The solution will heat up and produce fumes, so stand back while stirring and take care not to inhale the fumes. Allow the lye solution to rest and cool while you prepare the oils.

tep 3 Using a microwave or a double-boiler, melt the solid oils. Measure and mix them with the liquid oils in the quart canning jar. When the lye solution has cooled to about the same temperature, pour the lye into the oils. Blend until the mixture reaches a creamy texture. Add color or fragrance if desired. TIP: Stir in the color first, as some fragrances can cause the mixture to harden quickly.

Step 4 Pour the mixture into the mold and tap it on the counter a few times to break up any air bubbles. Let the soap sit for 24-36 hours. When it's hard enough to cut, remove the soap from the mold and slice it into bars. Let the soap cure four to six weeks before using.

TIP: To prevent soda ash (a harmless chemical that forms and creates an ashy appearance on the soap), spray soap surface with rubbing alcohol shortly after the soap has hardened slightly in the mold.

#### SAFETY NOTE

**WORKING WITH LYE** Lye is a dangerous chemical that can cause severe burns. Soapmaking requires protective gear including rubber gloves, long sleeves and pants, closed-toe shoes, and safety glasses. Work in a well-ventilated area with no children or pets around.





### MODERN LANDSCAPES BY Norlle Phares

Noelle Phares is an environmental scientist turned modern artist, who brings a unique perspective to her work by combining abstract detail and realistic subjects. She's partnered with Paintbrush Studio Fabrics to create Modern Landscapes, a collection of her paintings recreated on fabric! The cotton basecloth is perfect for quilting, but also can become a stunning wallhanging in three easy steps!

Take your panel, and fold the side and bottom edge over 1/4 inch. Pin and sew all three edges. Optional: attach a matching fringe or tassels to the bottom edge!

Take a dowl rod (or a curtain rod for a more decorative option!) and check the width. Double that number, and fold your top edge over that amount. Sew a straight line, leaving the sides open, and slide your panel over the rod.

#### 3. Display!

Tie a matching cord to the edges of the rod. Attach a hook to your wall, and hang and display your new tapestry!


THERE'S NO ONE WAY TO MACRAMÉ! KNOT, LOOP, AND TIE VARIOUS LENGTHS OF ROPE IN DIFFERENT CONFIGURATIONS TO MAKE A ONE-OF-A-KIND CREATION.

WHY KNOT To make these knotted hanging planters, first measure the height of the pot you'll be wrapping and decide the length of the hanging portion plus desired tassel. Cut eight lengths of this measurement from rope. Group rope ends and make a gathering knot by folding the end of one rope down, then wrapping a second piece of rope (we used an 18-inch piece) around the gathered ropes and looping through the folded end to secure (A and B). Trim any excess rope. Decide where you'll want the knots to begin on the pot, then begin the knotting process: Gather two ropes and tie them in a knot (C), then separate the ropes and tie each one in a knot with the opposite neighbor rope. Continue alternating ropes to make evenly spaced knots in a diamond pattern (D) the length of the planter. Finish with another gathering knot to hang.

2 LOOP DE HOOP Want a minimalist look? This simple plant hanger is a breeze to make. Measure your pot and choose an embroidery hoop that cradles the pot appropriately (we used an 8-inchdiameter hoop), then decide how long you'd like the hanger to be. Double that length and cut three pieces from rope, then fold each in half and attach to the hoop with lark's head knots—pull the loose ends through the folded loop around the hoop until tight (E). Gather cord ends, knot, and hang.

**LEATHER LOOK** Cut two 1×54-inch strips of faux leather or vinyl. Wrap the end of one strip around an O-ring. Use a rotary punch to punch two holes through both layers, and secure with a spot of industrial-strength glue and rivets. Repeat with the other end of strip to create a loop that hangs from O-ring. Repeat steps with the second strip to create two loops that intersect. Use glue and rivets at bottom intersection to attach the two loops perpendicular to each other. Cut four 30-inch lengths of cording. Fold each section in half and tie to the O-ring (F). Bring all cords together and knot. Cut another 1-inch-wide strip of faux leather to the diameter of your chosen pot. Place pot into hanging planter, then secure the horizontal strip with glue and rivets where it intersects the vertical strips. If desired, cut a cork round (or use a coaster) to support the pot inside the hanger.

frames a fuzzy refresh, this photo. Starting at the bottom of the frame, affix a row of pom-pom trim using a hot-glue gun. Repeat the process, slightly overlapping the previous row of pom-poms. Continue until the frame is covered. For a playful look, alternate colors or sizes of pom-pom trim.



TO FILL ANY HOLES, SNIP INDIVIDUAL POM-POMS FROM EXTRA TRIM AND USE HOT GLUE TO SECURE THEM SEPARATELY.







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#### **STRIKE A CORD**

Transform a plain planter with ribbon and cotton cording, right. If desired, start by spray-painting the planter. Using waterproof crafts glue, secure the end of eight lengths of ribbons to the bottom of the pot, spacing evenly between each ribbon and varying colors and sizes as desired. Hot-glue cotton cording at the base of the pot and wrap horizontally around, alternating under and over the ribbons and gluing as needed. Repeat the next row, switching the under-over method in a weaving pattern. Continue in this manner, keeping the cording tight, and finish by gluing just over the top edge of the planter. Finish the inside edge with jute ribbon.



TO KEEP CORDING AND RIBBON FROM SLIPPING AND MOVING WHILE YOU WEAVE, DAB HOT GLUE ALONG CORDING EVERY COUPLE OF WRAPS.

#### **BIAS TAPE WALL ART**

#### **MATERIALS**

- ½ yard cotton muslin
- Heavyweight iron-on adhesive
- Embroidery hoop
- Corkboard
- Pins
- Two packages each of ½-inch singlefold bias tape in three colors
- Weaving diagram
- Large-eye yarn needle
- Iron and pressing cloth
- Hot-glue gun and glue sticks

Step 1 Cut both the muslin and iron-on adhesive to roughly 2 inches larger than the embroidery hoop. Attach muslin to adhesive sheet, then pin to a corkboard, muslin side down. Remove adhesive top sheet (A).

Step 2 Trace the embroidery hoop shape onto the adhesive (B), then cut strips of bias tape to about 1 inch larger than the circle. Pin strips side by side across muslin (C).

Step 3 Following a weaving diagram (easily found online), use a yarn needle to start weaving a different color of bias tape between the pinned tape (D). Repeat with a third color (E) if the pattern calls for it.

Step 4 Cover with a pressing cloth, then press with a warm iron to flatten and secure the tape in place (F). Place the weaving in the embroidery hoop and tighten the screw. Trim the muslin as needed, then fold it onto the back of the hoop and secure with hot glue.





## PILLOWS

Ready to try your hand at machine sewing? Hone those beginner skills with this simple envelope pillow for a project that you'll be proud to show off.

#### **MAKE IT**

#### ENVELOPE PILLOW

#### **MATERIALS**

- Sweatshirt (or fabric for front of pillow cover)
- Kraft paper
- Straight pins
- ½ yard of fabric for back of pillow cover (stiff cotton such as canvas)
- Pillow form (ours is 18 inches square)
- Tailor's chalk pencil
- Sewing gauge
- Iron
- Sewing machine
- Thread

Step 1 Use kraft paper to create a pattern the size of the pillow form. Mark the top center of pattern.

Step 2 Lay sweatshirt flat on work surface. If needed to make the body lay flat, cut off sleeves and waistband. Mark top center of shirt design. Center pattern over the design, aligning the marks (A). Pin in place, trace with marker, and cut out (B).

Step 3 Cut two pieces of stiff cotton for back of pillow cover. The width of the back pieces matches the pillow front (ours is 18 inches). For length of back pieces, use this equation: (front length + 6)/2. Ours is (18+6)/2 = 12, so we marked and cut two pieces, each 18×12 inches (C).

Step 4 With one back fabric piece right side down on your work surface, use a sewing gauge and iron to fold up and press 1 inch of one 18-inch edge (D). Fold the raw edge into the pressed fold to create a ½-inch fold. Pin in place (E) Machine-stitch 1/4 inch from fabric edge (F), securing hem. Repeat for second back piece.

CONSTRUCTED WITH "RIGH SIDES TOGETHER," WHICH ME THE WRONG SIDE, OR BACK, THE FABRIC IS FACING OUT. O COMPLETE, YOU TURN THE I' RIGHT SIDE OUT AND THE RAW EDGES OF YOUR SEAM ARE HIDDEN INSIDE THE FINISHED PROJECT.

TIP: To make your stitches hold, stitch forward for three or four stitches, reverse three or four, then forward again at the start and end of each run of stitches.

Step 5 Lay front piece right side up on work surface. Lay back pieces right side down, matching outside edges and overlapping hemmed edges in center (this is your envelope opening). Pin together around outside edges (G).

Step 6 Stitch pinned outside edges with ½-inch seam allowance.

TIP: Stitch with cotton side up; the sweatshirt material stretches if it's on top.

Step 7 Cut the corners at an angle, careful not to cut the stitching (H). Turn the cover to right sides out and iron, avoiding any decals or design that might melt. Stuff with pillow insert.



#### ANATOMY LESSON

The first commandment of learning to sew: Know thy machine. Here's a look at all the important parts on any machine—budget beginner to pro-style.







#### **PRESSER FOOT**

This holds the fabric down while you're sewing. Several styles may come with your machine.



#### **FEED DOGS**

These metal teeth grip the fabric and move it with each stitch.



#### **BOBBIN COVER**

The bobbin (a plastic or metal disk of thread) can either be a drop-in type or front-loading.



#### THREAD GUIDE

Follow the manual to be sure you're threading correctly.



#### UPPER TENSION CONTROL

Adjust the tension (tightness or looseness) of the upper thread.



#### SEWING SPEED CONTROLLER

Set the maximum speed your machine will go—a good idea if you have a lead foot.



#### NEEDLE POSITION BUTTON

Set the needle to automatically stop when the needle is at its highest or lowest point.



#### SPOOL PIN

The thread spool sits on a horizontal or vertical pin and feeds into the needle via a series of guides.



#### **BOBBIN WINDER**

Wind thread onto a bobbin to use for the lower thread in the machine.



#### **HANDWHEEL**

Use this wheel to manually raise or lower the needle.



#### **STITCHES**

Machines vary widely in the number of built-in stitch types offered.



#### FOOT CONTROLLER

This pedal activates the machine while you guide the fabric with your hands.

**HANG OUT** In lieu of bulky lockers or cubbies, give every family member a hook. This sleek version is strong enough to hold heavy backpacks and winter coats. Richelieu Contemporary Metal Wall Hook, \$7; wayfair.com



**INSIDE JOB** Turn an old trunk into a stylish seat. Paint the exterior as desired, then add furniture pads on the bottom to prevent floor scratches. Hot-glue a seat cushion to the top, running a line of glue around the entire perimeter to secure.







**BIN THERE** Handles on these stackable wire baskets make it easy to transport them to the kitchen table, front porch, or wherever you work or play. Use them for bills, permission slips, and mail—or stow toys or pet supplies inside. Taupe Stacking Wire Bins, starting at \$10; containerstore.com

**TOP SHELF** Upgrade basic hardware store shelving with this rustic tutorial. Cut a ½-inchthick melamine shelf to your desired unit length, then cut one 1x3 plank of reclaimed wood 2 inches beyond the shelf length. Cut two more pieces of reclaimed wood to 2 inches beyond the melamine shelf width, then miter corners and nail or use building materials adhesive to attach planks to shelf, aligning the tops for a smooth transition. For instructions on building the crate unit, see opposite.



CRATE MATE Stack crates to determine desired arrangement, then measure total height. Match ladder and crate height (we included a flea market stool to boost our crates). Nail or screw crates together for stability, then screw crate tower and ladder to wall. Place melamine shelf on top and screw to both crates and ladder. Add finishing touches to crate cubbies—like a corkboard, a whiteboard, and charging stations for electronics—to create the ultimate drop zone.

# **DECORATIVE MUSHROOMS**

#### **MATERIALS**

- Driftwood (or tree branch)
- Garden snips or handsaw
- Chipboard
- Stretch velvet
- Hot-glue gun and glue sticks
- Batting
- Needle and matching thread

Step 1 For a stem, cut a 2–3-inch length from driftwood. From chipboard, cut a circle to a size proportionate to the stem. From velvet, cut a circle about twice as large in diameter than the chipboard circle.

Step 2 Using hot glue, adhere the stem to the center of the chipboard circle (A). On the opposite side of the chipboard,

glue a ball of batting at the center (B).

Step 3 Stitch a continuous running stitch around the perimeter of the velvet circle about 1/4 inch from the edge (C). Lay the velvet circle over the batting and chipboard and draw the thread tight on the underside. Pull taut around the stem and tie a knot to secure (D).





# WORKING WITH VELVET

To make velvet projects fuss-free, follow these tried-and-true tips.

PILE 101 Because velvet pile shifts, mark and cut from the back of the fabric to ensure accuracy. Notice the direction of the pile before you cut. The fabric will appear darker if it is cut with pile running up than if cut running down (which makes it smooth and shiny). Be consistent with the direction of the pile unless changing it is part of your desired design. If the pile gets crushed, hang the fabric and steam a few inches from the back of the velvet

while using a soft, clean toothbrush to brush the pile softly back in place.

**SNIP, SNIP** Use sharp scissors and cut pieces in a single layer. For increased accuracy, use a sharp rotary cutter and a straightedge.

pins to hold pieces together, testing pins first to make sure holes aren't visible when removed. Hand-basting instead of pinning may be worth the extra time. Consider using a walking foot on your sewing machine to help feed the fabric through smoothly when sewing thick layers or stretch fabric.

GET STEAMY Do not iron velvet or you will crush the pile, unless it's intentional as with the stamped design on page 48. If you need to remove wrinkles, place velvet facedown on a terry cloth towel or needle board and carefully steam a few inches above the back of the fabric, moving in the direction of the pile.



**GOING FULL CIRCLE** Kick back in high style with a plush patchwork of happy color, *above*. For projects requiring a large circle (ours is 40 inches in diameter), here's a terrific technique to create a pattern. Drive a screw in the center of your plywood. Tie string to a pencil and tie a loop at the opposite end so the total string length is half the diameter of the desired circle (our string was 20 inches). Place the loop over the screw, pull string taut, and place pencil lead on plywood. Rotate pencil around screw to draw a full circle.



#### **MAKE IT**

## COLOR-BLOCK OTTOMAN

#### **MATERIALS**

- Jigsaw
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inch-thick plywood
- Spray contact adhesive
- 4-inch-thick upholstery foam
- Serrated knife
- 1-inch-thick batting
- Needle and thread
- Pattern, available at BHG.com/Velvet
- Upholstery-weight velvet in 12 colors
- Straight pins
- Thread to match velvet colors
- Sewing machine
- Staple gun and staples
- Four 6–8-inch furniture legs and brackets
- Drill/driver and screws

Step 1 Cut a 40-inch-diameter circle from plywood. Using contact adhesive in a well-ventilated area, adhere upholstery foam to plywood, piecing as necessary. Flip over and use a serrated knife to trim foam equal to edges of plywood circle.

Step 2 Place plywood on top of batting and cut around perimeter to get a 40-inch circle of batting. Cut an 8-inch-wide strip of batting long enough to wrap the perimeter of the plywood circle. Lay the batting circle on the top of the foam and wrap the 8-inch-wide strip of batting around the perimeter of the circle. Whipstitch the pieces of batting together, catching the foam every once in a while.

Step 3 Print pattern, and cut velvet pieces allowing for 1/4-inch seam allowance. With right sides facing, pin pieces together and sew into pieced strips (A). Remove pins, then pin the seams open (B) and topstitch each side of the seam using matching thread (C). Remove pins. Repeat to sew all of the strips together to form the top of the ottoman and to sew the side pieces into a strip. To finish the cover, sew the side strip to the top, making sure to match colors. Turn cover right side out.

Step 4 Lay the velvet cover atop the batting on the plywood circle and flip project upside down. Pull one edge of the cover taut to the underside of the plywood and staple to secure. Repeat directly opposite the first staple and then again halfway between the first two staples. Continue pulling taut and stapling evenly around the entire circle. Trim excess velvet from the underside.

Step 5 Mark intersecting lines to divide the circle into quarters. Where each line reaches the perimeter, install a leg bracket about 1½ inches from the outside edge (D). Screw legs into brackets and flip ottoman right side up.

**SHOW YOUR STRIPES** Velvet ribbons give this pillow hip design, opposite. For the pillow back, cut a piece of fabric the size of your pillow form plus 1/4 inch on all sides for the seam allowance. For the pillow front, quarter the pillow form size, add 1/4-inch seam allowance on all sides, and cut four pieces of fabric this size. Cut lengths of velvet ribbon slightly longer than the quartered pieces. Pin a ribbon to the fabric and topstitch along both edges using matching thread and removing pins as you sew. Repeat until ribbons are attached to all four smaller fabric pieces. With right sides together, pin two of the pieces so ribbons are perpendicular as shown and sew together. Repeat with the remaining two smaller pieces, and then sew the ribbon-covered pieces together to finish the pillow top. With right sides together and leaving an opening for turning, pin and sew pillow front to pillow back. Trim excess fabric from corners and ribbon from seams, turn right side out, insert pillow form, and whipstitch closed.

THE VERY REASON YOU DON'T IRON VELVET (YOU'LL CRUSH THE PILE) IS WHAT MAKES THIS PROJECT POSSIBLE. HEAT FROM THE IRON CREATES THE IMPRINTED DESIGN.

FIRST IMPRESSION Use water and a rubber stamp to add subtle design to velvet, right. Cut two pieces of velvet to the size of your pillow form plus 1/4 inch on all sides for seam allowance. Spray water onto a rubber stamp and lay one piece of velvet facedown on top of wet stamp. With iron heated to wool setting, press over the wet area until it is dry. Pull velvet from the stamp and repeat as desired to create the pillow front. With right sides together, pin pillow front to pillow back and sew together, leaving an opening for turning. Trim excess fabric from corners, and turn right side out. Insert pillow form and whipstitch opening closed.



# Let it roll

# **BUTTON HEADBOARD**

#### **MATERIALS**

- Circular saw
- ½-inch-thick plywood
- Serrated knife
- Straightedge
- 3-4-inch-thick upholstery foam
- Spray contact adhesive
- ½-1-inch-thick batting
- Upholstery-weight velvet
- Measuring tape
- Straight pins
- Needle and thread
- Sewing machine
- Eighty 2-inch button blanks
- E6000 adhesive
- 1×3 pine slightly shorter than plywood width
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inch screws
- 1½-inch screws


Step 1 Cut plywood 30 inches tall by the width of your mattress. Use a serrated knife and straightedge to cut upholstery foam to the size of the plywood, piecing together as needed. Working in a well-ventilated area, secure foam to plywood with spray contact adhesive.

Step 2 Using a serrated knife, trim the top corners of the foam so they are gently rounded (A). Cut and piece batting to fit over the foam and adhere using contact adhesive, cutting excess batting from top corners and smoothing flat.

Step 3 Cut a piece of velvet to cover the back of the plywood and a piece to cover the foam-covered front, adding ½ inch for seam allowance plus ½ inch on sides and an extra inch for hem along the bottom of each piece. With right side down, lay the top fabric over the front of the headboard and pin the corners to fit the curve of the foam (B). Remove fabric from headboard and sew corners, fashioning a dart in the fabric. With right sides together, pin the front piece to the back piece along the sides and top, and sew. Sew the bottom hem. Trim excess velvet from corners, then turn right side out and fit over the headboard.

Step 4 Follow button manufacturer directions to cover about 80 button blanks in velvet, cutting velvet circles (C), wrapping fabric around the top blank, and snapping the back in place (D). Arrange buttons on the headboard as desired and attach using E6000 adhesive.

Step 5 Make a French cleat by cutting a 1x3 pine board lengthwise at a 45-degree angle. Use 3/4-inch screws to attach half of the pine board to the back of the headboard with the angle facing down and toward the headboard. Use 11/2-inch screws to attach the other half to the wall with the angle facing up and toward the wall so the two boards fit into one another to securely hang the headboard.







**WALL FLOWERS** This natureinspired wreath brings blooms indoors year-round, left. Print and cut out flower and leaf patterns, available at BHG.com/ Velvet. Trace leaves on the back of multiple shades of green velvet and cut out. Flip pattern and trace and cut a second set of leaves. With wrong sides together, pair leaves from first and second cutting. Cut lengths of 18-gauge wire 2 inches longer than a set of leaves. Sandwich wire between a set of leaves and use fabric glue on back of leaves to adhere the pieces. Repeat with remaining leaf sets and let dry. Secure leaves around an 18-inch metal macramé hoop by twisting wire ends around the hoop, overlapping and bending to desired shape (A). Trace flowers on the back of light pink velvet and cut out. Flip pattern and repeat tracing and cutting a second set of flowers on the back of darker pink velvet. Use fabric glue on the back of velvet to adhere light and dark flowers. Let dry, then pull petals up and hot-glue to create a three-dimensional flower. Cut fringe from a strip of yellow velvet, roll up, and hotglue inside the flower. Hot-glue flowers around the wreath.

### THE MOYSA FAMILY (GEOFF, BRI, GREYSON, AGE 12, EMERSON, 9, AND DOG CHOPPER) SHARE A TWO-BEDROOM, ONE-BATHROOM 1.000-SQUARE-FOOT CONDO—AND FOR GOOD REASON.

"Southern California is crazy expensive, and this is what we can afford ... we can't see ourselves too far from the ocean, and with that location comes an expense," Bri says of their thoughts when deciding to buy a home instead of rent. "Do we move inland and get more house for our money, or do we stay here and make it work? We chose to stay and make it work."

Investing in their condo was worth it, thanks to a few fabulous features: the condo's location (just 15 minutes from Dana Point), outdoor space (a nice-size backyard), and a nearly blank slate for transformation.

But that also meant seeing past dated rooms in a sea of baby blue—on carpet, vertical blinds, even the toilet seat!—to what the condo could be, once clad in interior stylist Bri's signature tans, grays, blacks,

and whites. She is quick to credit Geoff for being an excellent teammate—the perspiration beside her inspiration—and tackling every project that came their way. Together they tore out carpet, spruced up the concrete underneath, overhauled the kitchen, installed benches and a vanity, beefed up baseboards, and crafted wood shelves for nearly every room. The cozy condo makes the most of every inch, and it all bears the Moysas' modern, fit-for-a-family fingerprints.

"There's a pride that comes with knocking these things out yourself and knowing you singlehandedly made your home what it is," Bri says. "It's all on us to get it done." The result is totally worth the give-and-take.

**UP THE WALLS** Bri's husband, Geoff, crafted a display ladder out of \$9 worth of lumber, above right, to gather an arrangement of beautiful blankets. Shallow ledges on another wall barely intrude into a pathway through the room but still showcase favorite artwork.

This Southern California family passed on a home with more space and bathrooms, instead choosing a compact condo near the coast. It may be small, but it's also unmistakably modern—and emphatically theirs.

# DO IT BETTER

"I WANTED THE BATHROOM TO HAVE SOMETHING EXTRA TO IT,"
BRI SAYS, "SO THESE STICK-ON FLOOR PANELS WERE A GREAT OPTION." THEY MIMIC EXPENSIVE CEMENT TILES BUT WITHOUT THE THICK PROFILE, HIGH MAINTENANCE, AND TRICKY INSTALLATION—THESE CUT WITH SCISSORS AND APPLY LIKE STICKERS.



**SINGLE SPACE** The home's one bathroom, *above*, doesn't sacrifice style for function. The IKEA vanity, built-in mirrored medicine cabinet, and floating shelves stash towels, toilet paper, and other necessities just where they're needed. For a cohesive scheme throughout the home, Bri repeated elements from other rooms (the black faucet, for example, and the round mirror).







**MODERN ART Black**and-white artwork, a pair of plants, and a guitar-a Christmas gift for Greyson—cluster on the wall nearest his bed for an inspiring but not-too-busy display, left. To give each child some personalization in the room they share, his bedding includes more blues and olive greens, while Emerson's blushes with some pink.

# 3-D WALL GALLERIES

Bri Moysa has a knack for creating cool, threedimensional displays on the walls throughout the condo, nudging unusual items into art territory. Here's how she creates an unforgettable arrangement.

#### MAKE IT PERSONAL.

There's nothing wrong with store-bought art, but you can elevate a gallery with one or two personality-filled pieces. In the Moysa home, Chopper the dog pops up in pictures, for example, and people love the enlarged photo of a young Geoff surfing.

#### MAKE IT YOURSELF.

Creating your own art, whether it's with paint, photography, calligraphy,

or whatever, is a surefire way to put your stamp on each room. It's also a savvy system for filling a gap with whatever an arrangement might be missing.

INCLUDE PLANTS. Bri confesses that she has a hard time keeping plants alive, "but they're so important to have in interiors," she says. "They add so much life to a space." They also bring dimension to an otherwise flat installation.

A staghorn fern and hanging planter feel like sculpture when mounted among framed photos.

#### **LEAVE EMPTY SPACE.** In

a small house, too much stuff—even beautiful stuff—can overwhelm the decor, so Bri wisely leaves several walls empty "to give the eye a place to rest," she says. White space, as it's called, can be just as powerful as a striking display if it's implemented intentionally.

Step 1 Create the low shelf's front and back trim pieces by measuring the distance between the inside edges of the front legs of your science table and cutting two poplar boards to fit. Repeat, using the distance between the inside edges of the front and back legs, for the two side pieces.

Step 2 Determine how many shelf slats you will need by first deciding the size of gap you would like between each slat; ours is ½ inch. Measure the distance between the outside edges of the front table legs. Subtract 2 inches to account for the side pieces and a slight inset, then divide that number by the sum of 2½ inches (the slat width) and your desired gap size. Subtract your gap size measurement from your result. If you get an uneven number, adjust your gap width to accommodate the number of whole slats.

Step 3 Determine the length of the shelf's slats by measuring the distance between the outside edges of the front and back legs, then subtract 2 inches from that measurement to account for the shelf's front and back trim pieces and a slight inset from the legs. Cut slats to length.

Step 4 Drill two pocket holes on each end of the front, back, and side trim pieces.

Step 5 Measure table leg dimensions. Subtract 1 inch to account for the shelf's trim pieces and a slight inset. Use that measurement to cut notches on each end of two slats to fit around legs.

Step 6 On your work surface, set front and back trim pieces parallel to each other on a ¾-inch side. Arrange slats inside the trim pieces, using spacers cut to your gap size for consistency and positioning notched slats correctly. Glue, nail, and clamp the slats to the front and back pieces.

Step 7 Glue and screw the shelf to table legs so the shelf sits at your desired height. Attach the side trim pieces with screws and glue. When dry, sand, prime, and paint the unit.

# MUG HOLDER

#### **MATERIALS**

- 3/4×22×24-inch piece of Baltic birch
- Drill press or standard drill
- 5/8-inch spade bit
- Two <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>×6×23<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-inch Baltic birch boards
- Two <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>×6×24-inch Baltic birch boards
- Wood glue
- Pin nailer
- Four 11/4-inch-thick wood scraps
- Nine 5/8×51/2-inch dowels
- Wood filler
- Sandpaper
- Desired finish (paint, stain, or sealer)

Step 1 Set a 22×24-inch piece of birch in a portrait position on a flat surface. Map out the shelf's peg locations (see peg diagram, right). From the bottom left-hand corner, measure 7½ inches up and 4½ inches to the right. Mark the location with a pencil. Place a second mark 6½ inches above the first and a third mark 6½ inches above the second. From the first mark, measure 6¾ inches to the right and mark the location. Above this mark, make two

more marks in line with the second and third measurements. From your fourth mark, again measure  $6^{3}$ /4 inches to the right, mark the location, and add two additional marks above as before.

Step 2 Using a %-inch bit, drill holes at each mark.


Step 3 Lay two 6×23½-inch boards parallel to each other on their short edges. Set two 6×24-inch boards inside to form the four sides of a box, creating butt joints at the corners. Glue and nail boards.

Step 4 With the frame resting on your work surface, set 1½-inch-thick wood blocks inside the frame along each edge. Insert the 22×24-inch panel into the frame, allowing the wood blocks to hold it 1¼ inches above the work surface. Glue and pin nail the panel to the frame.

Step 5 Apply glue inside a drilled hole and insert a dowel, pushing it through until it meets the work surface. Repeat with the remaining dowels. Allow to dry.

Step 6 Fill nail holes and sand. Apply desired finish. (We used a clear sealer on ours.)



ALISON ALLEN NEEDED A BREAK. NOT FROM THE NONSTOP HOUSE UPDATES SHE SHARES ON HER BLOG, *DEUCE CITIES HENHOUSE*. INSTEAD, SHE AND HER HUSBAND, JEFF, WERE LOOKING FOR A WEEKEND RETREAT TO GET THEIR KIDS OUT OF THE CITY (THEY CALL MINNEAPOLIS HOME) AND INTO THE WOODS.

"Our sons, Finn and Gus, are 10 and 7, and we wanted to find a spot to get together but also get away from it all," Alison says.

Enter a circa 1968 chalet-style A-frame located about two hours away in Hayward, Wisconsin. With a secluded, tree-covered lot overlooking a private lake, the property resembled something out of a favorite storybook.

The home's interiors, on the other hand, were not worth writing home about. A dilapidated kitchen and wall-to-wall shag carpet made for a dark, dated, and somewhat smelly house.

But with 10 years of DIYing under her belt, Alison was undeterred. "I immediately saw the potential here," she says. "And I knew we could stay on a budget if we embraced the rustic elements of the home rather than try to update them."

Out went the old and in came a whole-house palette of black, white, and dark green that let the cabin's rough-hewn character shine. Room by room, Alison mixed elbow grease and ingenuity to create inviting spaces that felt comfy but not cabin clichéd. The result: a cozy, woodsy retreat. Just like the family had been pining for.

**EYE OPENER** The home's biggest eyesore was a bank of upper cabinets obscuring the view between kitchen and dining space, *opposite*. Crowbar in hand, Alison tackled the demo in an afternoon. "With those out of the way, I knew my vision for an open living area could become a reality," she says.

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#### **TURN THE CORNER**

Alison didn't want to miss out on cozy family movie nights at the cabin. But she also refused to spend a ton on a hulking (and ugly!) media console for the great-room's one available corner. She finally found her fix, installing Sektion wall cabinets from IKEA in a floating corner configuration,

left. Maple plywood was applied to the tops and sides for a more rustic look. Come Christmas, the television is swapped out for festive panels Alison created using stained plywood with holes drilled in the shape of a tree. Batterypowered lights add sparkle to the look.

MAPLE PLYWOOD COSTS MORE THAN ITS PINE COUNTERPART, BUT IT IS ALISON'S GO-TO WHEN SHE WANTS A NATURAL WOOD ELEMENT ON THE QUICK. "IT DOESN'T REQUIRE SANDING OR STAINING TO LOOK FINISHED," SHE SAYS. "IN THE END, YOU PROBABLY SAVE!"

#### **STYLE UNDERFOOT**

In the kitchen, right, vinyl tiles in black, white, and two-shades of gray were laid at a 45-degree angle to bring a punchy look to the cook space for less than \$150. On the stairs, far right, after removing about "one million" staples, Alison freed the cabin's stairs of the 40-yearold shag carpet. She installed a budgetfriendly runner crafted from buffalo-checked doormats, tack strips, and a staple gun. (To ensure comfort and durability, she placed cut-to-fit rug pads under the mats.)

Alison's cabin innovating took a logistical turn when she reimagined the former master bedroom as a bunk room, left, for her two sons and the family's frequent houseguests. "This room was originally set up with a full-size bed," she says. "The minute I walked in, I knew that we could fit more people comfortably with bunks and a better layout."

**WASH OUT** Alison's DIY moxie might best be on display in the cabin's tiny half bathroom, above. From the vinyl tile floors to the freshly painted ceiling, no surface went untouched. But her prized project is the board-and-batten paneling. Modeled after the home's exterior siding, she crafted it over a weekend using pine boards and a miter saw. The woodsy green paint was left over from the kitchen cabinets.

**LOFTY GOALS** Thoughtful, space-saving details give this bedroom an open feel, *above*. Wall-mounted nightstands built with just a few boards free floor space; ladder shelving leans against the wall and provides open storage for books, pictures, and plants; and a rolling rack keeps shoes tucked away under the bed. Minimalist artwork shines above the bed, and an industrial-inspired pendant made from two cylinders of painted wire garden fencing provides bedside lighting.

#### **MAKE IT**

#### ADDER

#### **MATERIALS**

- Table saw
- Four 1×8 boards, 8 feet long
- Miter saw
- Speed square
- Sander
- Drill and drill bits
- Pocket-hole jig
- Wood glue
- Twenty #8 1½-inch pocket screws

Step 1 Using a table saw, rip two 1×8s to 63/4 inches wide. Cut two 72-inch lengths from the ripped boards for the side rails. Save a scrap piece of wood to use as a template.

Step 2 Using a miter saw, cut one end of a side rail at an 11-degree angle. Measure 703/4 inches from first cut, and make a second 11-degree cut that is parallel to the first. Repeat for second side rail.

Step 3 Cut one end of scrap wood from Step 1 at an 11-degree angle. Make a second parallel cut 11 inches from first cut to complete step-spacing template.

Step 4 From remaining 1x8s, cut five 20-inch lengths for the shelves. Using a table saw, rip one long edge of a shelf at an 11-degree angle. Place template at top of side rail, aligning top edges. Butt shelf perpendicular to side rail under template with angled edge flush with and to the front of side rail. Mark where shelf extends past side rail on back. Rip marked edge on back of shelf at an 11-degree angle. Repeat for each shelf.

Step 5 Place a speed square at the top of a side rail. Mark a 90-degree angle that is 1 inch from the edge that will lean against the wall (A); cut along line. Repeat for second side rail. Sand all pieces.

Step 6 Using a drill and pocket-hole jig, cut a pocket hole 11/2 inches from the front and back edges on the bottom of each shelf on both ends.

Step 7 Using template, mark shelf placement on side rails. Apply wood glue to shelf edges and fasten shelves to side rails with pocket screws (B).







#### **MAKE IT**

#### NIGHTSTAND

#### **MATERIALS**

- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>-inch-thick plywood
- Two 1x12 boards, 8 feet long
- Table saw
- Drill and bits
- Pocket-hole jig
- Sander
- Sandpaper
- Paintbrush and paint for accent color
- Clamps
- Wood glue
- 11/4-inch pocket screws
- Pin nailer
- 1½-inch pin nails
- Pocket-hole plugs
- Stain (optional)

Step 1 Cut all pieces following the cut list, below. Use a pocket-hole jig to drill three evenly spaced pocket holes along both ends of top and bottom pieces to connect to the frame sides. For phone caddy side, cut two pocket holes along each long edge. For phone caddy bottom, cut two pocket holes along one

10½-inch side. Sand all pieces. Paint plywood back with accent color; let dry.

Step 2 Lay out top, sides, and bottom for frame. The edges should be flush at front of frame. Glue pieces together and secure with clamps; let dry. Attach pocket screws through each pocket hole.

Step 3 Place phone caddy bottom and side in an L shape. Glue pieces and secure with clamps; let dry. Insert pocket screws.

Step 4 Attach phone caddy to frame with wood glue and pocket screws, making sure the front edges are flush with the front of the box. If desired, drill a hole through the side of the box for charging cords to fit through (A).

Step 5 Place cabinet facedown. Attach plywood backing to frame with pin nails.

Step 6 Fill pocket holes with plugs (B); sand smooth. Stain cabinet, if desired, and hang on wall.

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**FAUX FIREPLACE** No focal point? No problem. A fireplace surround adds instant architecture to an otherwise basic space, page 87. Start by building a hearth—cut a plywood sheet to desired size, cover with floorboards, and put in place. Before assembling the mantel surround kit, paint the pieces. We brushed on two coats of Rust-Oleum Chalked Ultra Matte Paint, which doesn't require primer and, when dry, followed up with two coats of Chalked Protective Topcoat in Matte Clear. Assemble the surround (A, B) and mount the mantel and legs to wall studs according to manufacturer's instructions. Trim foam-core board to the size of the firebox opening. We applied wallpaper to the board using a damp sponge to activate the glue (C). Tuck the board into the opening. Miter leftover floorboards and attach them to the inside of firebox to frame the opening on three sides and link the surround to the hearth.





**TEXTURED VASE** Give a cylindrical glass vase a handcrafted vibe with white air-dry modeling clay, left. With wet hands, knead clay (we used Das) until it becomes easy to work with. Keep a bowl of water handy to add moisture as needed. Roll the clay to a consistent thickness, and trim into a rectangular sheet that's slightly larger than the height and perimeter of your vase. Carefully wrap the clay around the vase, pressing the seam with water to seal it. Neatly fold over the clay around the top and the base of the vase, creating a stable surface. Using a clay sculpting tool, comb lines in the clay to add texture. Allow to dry 24 hours; the clay will go from gray to white. Once dry, sand the edges.

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




**BLOCK PRINTING Trace** and cut circles from a carving block, then them using a linoleum carving tool. Following dye manufacturer's instructions, add sodium alginate thickener to liquid dye or use a fabric paint (we used Jacquard Textile Color). Using a paper plate and a brayer, roll paint evenly onto circles. Press circles onto pillow cover, alternating the pattern and rinsing the block as needed. Let cover dry, and




bleach goes a long way.
Using a small brush,
"paint" dots randomly
onto a dark fabric pillow
cover. The longer the
bleach sits, the whiter the
dots will be. Repeat the
process several times to
achieve a nice combo
of white and light blue
dots. When finished, rinse
pillow cover thoroughly to
remove bleach.



dye onto white pillow covers. Combine hot water, salt, and dye powder in cups, following the dye manufacturer's instructions. Experiment mixing colors to achieve desired shade. Spray pillows or pillow covers with a water-soda ash solution (1 gallon to 1 cup); let sit 20 minutes. Using narrow and wide brushes, paint circles or stripes in varying sizes in a fluid motion. After dye sits for several hours, rinse in cold water until water runs clear.









**UPHOLSTERED OTTOMAN** A thrifted side table becomes funky extra seating with a new cushioned topper, below. Trace the top of the ottoman onto a ½-inch-thick plywood project panel, and cut with a jigsaw. Cut a 2-inchthick foam sheet to match, tapering the corners slightly for a softer look. Gather loose fiberfill, flat batting, and tie-dyed muslin (A); trim to size. Wrap the layers around the plywood and foam, pulling opposite sides taut, making pleats at the corners, and stapling in place as you go (B). Sand all wood surfaces of the ottoman base, and wipe away the dust. Brush on two coats of chalkfinish paint; let dry. For a naturally worn look, lightly sand the edges. Apply two coats of sealer. Once dry, screw the cushion onto the base from the inside of cabinet. To revive tarnished brass hardware, clean with water, then soak in a vinegar and salt solution and scrub with an abrasive kitchen sponge.

SIGNED, SEALED, **DELIVERED** A mix of vintage and madeto-look-vintage correspondence will keep you inspired at your writing desk, this photo. What you need to get this look: removable adhesive dots, new stationery, old letters and envelopes, postcards, tea bags, and water. What you do: Soak new materials in tea about 30 minutes,

then remove and dry on a rack. For different shades, adjust the soaking time, or dunk the material again. To display, start low on the wall and move up. Stick in place with removable adhesive.

**SPIN A YARN** Keep the memory of a favorite city close to your heart with a yarn cityscape. Print out a fave cityscape, then adjust the scale to the rough size you want for your wall accent. Our tallest building is 5 feet. Mark a few spots at 12 inches from your floor, then use a level to connect the marks and draw a line that spans your city limits. Mark the base of your first building with a pencil, starting at the bottom left, then mark the top left corner. Using a level, draw a line between the marks. Mark the next corner of the building and use the level to draw another line. Continue until you finish your cityscape. Hammer 4D nails into all the corners of the drawn lines. Erase pencil marks. Tie yarn to the first nail and run the yarn from nail to nail, pulling for tension and wrapping the yarn around each nail before continuing on to the next. Tie the yarn to the final nail at the bottom right-hand edge.



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#### ORNAMENTAL SHUTTER

#### **MATERIALS**

- Poplar lumber (see Cut List, opposite)
- Table saw or track saw
- Triangle square
- Drill with 1/8-inch bit, countersink, and driving bits
- Pocket-hole jig and bit
- Sander with 120- and 180-grit sandpaper
- Pioneer Wood Patina
- Bar clamps
- #8 13/4-inch wood screws
- 11/4-inch fine-thread pocket-hole screws
- 2-inch mending plates (pack of four)

Step 1 Refer to the Cut List, opposite, to cut the lumber needed for one shutter. For additional shutters, multiply the part numbers as needed.

Step 2 Refer to the illustration, right, and use a triangle square to mark the 45-degree slat centerlines on the outside face of one inner frame side. Repeat to make a mirror version for the other side. Along the angled lines, drill ½-inch countersunk pilot holes ¾ inch from both edges. Add seven pocket holes along the edges, avoiding the diagonal lines (see illustration, right). At each end of the inner frame sides, drill two countersunk holes ¾ inch from the edge to attach the inner frame top and bottom.

Step 3 Sand and finish the inside frame top, bottom, sides, and slats. Mark the inside frame top and bottom at 4 inches, 13 inches, and 22 inches from one end on the outside face, then drill pocket holes at each mark. Clamp the top between the sides, extend the pilot holes, and screw the sides to the top.

Step 4 Use a triangle square to position a slat centered between the frame sides at the top diagonal marks. Extend the pilot holes into the slat and screw the slat to the sides. Repeat for the remaining slats and attach the inner frame bottom.


Step 5 Sand and finish the outer frame sides, top, and bottom. Drill pocket holes along the inside faces of the outer frame pieces—seven along the sides and three on the top and bottom. Screw the sides to the top and bottom.

Step 6 Drill pocket holes on the ends of the face-frame top and bottom, and screw them to the face-frame sides. Sand and finish the face frame.

Step 7 Lay the face frame upside down on a flat surface. Place the inner frame on the face frame and inset 1/4 inch from the face-frame edges. Pocket-screw the inner frame to the face frame. Screw the outer frame to the face frame with a 1/4-inch inset.

Step 8 Screw a mending plate to the top inside edge of each outer frame side so half of both plates extends above the top of the shutter. Position against the wall and screw the exposed end of the plate to the wall. (Add wall anchors as needed.)

#### **BACK OF SHUTTER**



**FIT FOR A QUEEN** We designed our plank headboard for a freestanding queen-size bed, below, but it would also work with a full. (If you have a king-size bed, adjust the Cut List, opposite, to accommodate an extra 6 inches in width.) Here's how to make this wall feature: Cut and paint the boards, then lay them on the floor in an offset arrangement that pleases your eye. Use painters tape to mark where the middle of the bed will be on each board so you can keep your design centered. Mount your boards—wood screws to studs—working up from the bottom. At the third board, use shelf brackets to attach purchased floating shelves for nightstands to the wall on either side of the bed. Once you hang all the planks, fill screw holes with paintable wood filler, let it dry, and sand smooth before priming and painting the spots with corresponding flat and gloss paint.







MEASURE UP When determining the board layout, calculate where the nightstands should hit next to your mattress. The thickness of the floating shelves will dictate spacing of the two boards above and below them (versus the 3/4-inch gap used elsewhere).

CUT LIST —

**SPACE EXPLORATION** Since the wood we used was ¾ inch thick, for ease we spaced our planks ¾ inch apart on the wall, *above*. Using this approach, just lay a board horizontally on the board below and mount the next on top. If you want more or less space between planks, cut two blocks to your desired size (one for each end) and use them for consistent spacing.



**GARDEN VARIETY** Create a welcoming entryway and home for a terrarium display with your own trellis wall, above. A thick baseboard and plate rail make a perfect connection with crisp squares that measure a tidy 2 feet each. Mix and match vintage and new terrariums for an eclectic finishing touch.

#### **MAKE IT**

#### **RELLIS WALL**

#### **MATERIALS**

- ½x1½-inch pine
- 3/4 × 31/2 inch pine
- Miter saw
- Sandpaper
- Primer
- Paintbrushes
- White semigloss paint
- 6-foot level
- Drill
- Wood screws
- Wood filler
- Putty knife
- Plant hangers
- Terrariums (hanging glass vessels, potting soil, charcoal, sand, and plants)

Step 1 Determine the size of your trellis wall (this will dictate the size of your squares and where you install the plate rail). Cut a square template to map out your design on the wall—ours is 22x22 inches.

Step 2 Cut, sand, prime, and paint your boards. Use your level vertically to mark spots across the wall for your 1x4 plate rail (ours is 5 feet above the baseboard) and then horizontally to connect the dots. Install your plate rail along the line.

Step 3 Mount boards at 45-degree angles from the baseboard, connecting the base and rail at intervals to match your template.

Step 4 Cut individual shorter pieces and install them at 90-degree angles to the longer boards to complete the squares.

Step 5 Fill screw holes with wood filler, let dry, sand, prime, and touch up with white semigloss paint.

Step 6 Install plant hangers on the intersections. Arrange and hang your terrariums.

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





















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
