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




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

HIGH COOL FACTOR

### YOUR OWN LITTLE FACTORY

had a blast playing with this Dremel Idea Builder 3D printer. The learning curve was relatively low-you need to be computer literate but you don't need to be a software engineer. Here's how it works: The raw material is a filament pulled off a spool and fed into a hot extruder. The extruder moves around laying down layer upon layer of tiny plastic thread.

You can either create your own 3D image to build (plenty of free software for that), or go online and download one of the gazillion shapes other people have created and shared. The image then needs to be reformatted in the free Dremel software and saved on a memory stick or an SD card. All that's left is to plug the memory stick into the printer, follow the directions on the touch screen, and watch this modern marvel go to work.

The printer can be plugged into a computer or operated over Wi-Fi as well.

Everyone asks, "What practical objects can be created with a 3D printer?" But I think 3D printing is as much about learning, creating and having fun as it is about practicality. My first attempts were a monogrammed Christmas ornament for my granddaughter, a big fat letter "M" for my son (his university emblem) and this cool pencil holder for me. The spools come in many different colors and cost about \$30 apiece. One spool would create about five or six of these pencil holders. A shape this size takes about 13 hours to print. This 3D40 model is available for \$1,299 at online retailers or by calling Dremel at (844) 800-3736.

#### A woodworking luxury

use a router for most of my woodworking projects. I leave my monster 3-hp router in the router table for the big stuff and prefer to grab a compact trim router for freehand routing. I recently bought a Ridgid 18-volt Brushless Compact Router to "possibly" replace my corded model. I knew I would love not having to worry about shredding a cord or having it get hung up on a corner. But I was a little concerned that a cordless router

would be top-heavy or lacking in power–I saved my receipt just in case.

It turns out my worries were unfounded: The router felt balanced and comfortable in my hand, and I noticed no measurable difference in power. Setting the bit height and dialing in the depth were easy and intuitive. The on-off switch took a little getting used to, but that wasn't a deal breaker. And never having had a router with an LED light before, I found it a bonus to be able to see what I was cutting. It even has variable speed! The Ridgid 18-volt **Brushless Compact Router** costs \$120 without the battery (the 5.0 Ah battery works best) at The Home Depot.

## NO-MESS PAINT LID

ainting is not my favorite chore. I'm a fan of any product that can make the job cleaner, faster and less frustrating. That's why I love this paint can lid from Shurline. It has a spout, so there's no spilling or splashing when you pour paint into a roller pan, and the paint doesn't ooze out all over the front of the can. And never again will I have to clean out the rim before replacing the lid—hallelujah!

The spout folds down, so I can still stack my cans, and the nonstick surface means latex paint drips or runs just peel right off. Reuse one for each paint job or buy enough of them to permanently replace all your steel lids. If you go that route, be sure to transfer the paint color information from the lid to the can itself. The Shur-line paint can lid costs about \$3 at home centers.


#### Remove stripped nuts and bolts

discovered a new way to remove nuts and bolts that I've rounded over beyond all recognition. I reach for a Kobalt Steel Grip socket. Steel Grip sockets have little fingers, or cams, inside that will grab onto the most mangled surface. And the harder you turn the socket, the tighter they lock into place.

The fingers also grab onto a nut or bolt like a magnet, which is perfect for getting bolts started in hard-to-reach nooks and crannies. When I change the oil on my truck, I use one to prevent my oil drain plug from dropping down into a slimy pool of dirty oil. These sockets don't like impact drivers (I wrecked one that way), so they won't replace your standard set of sockets, but \$15 for an eight-piece set is a small price to pay if it gets you out of even one jam. The Kobalt Steel Grip sockets are available at Lowe's.

#### A NEW SAWHORSE, FAT ON FEATURES

hen I was a siding installer, my crew used to pull out and pack up at least six sawhorses every day. The metal folding sawhorses we used worked OK, but they were finger pinchers, the feet were weak and tended to fold over under heavy loads, and the legs flopped out when you hauled the sawhorses around. This new pony from DeWalt doesn't have any of those problems. The feet are tough and have slip-resistant pads. The legs fold out easily and lock into place. And unlike other folding sawhorses, the DeWalt features a top with a V-groove for cutting pipes. The pad at the end prevents boards from slipping while you cut them to length, and the top metal bar works great for clamping. But what I like best is that you can strap two together and carry them as one. Each DWST1115 sawhorse is rated at 1,000 lbs. and costs about \$40 at some home centers and hardware stores.

When you're done, the dried glue just peels right off. The silicone also holds your board or project in place while you sand or rout it. And it's super soft, so it won't scuff finished parts. 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




# Handy Hints Clever solutions from our readers






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#### WINE RACK TOWEL HOLDER



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# DIY Essentials

Our best tips for getting your project done right. By Jeff Gorton

Foolproof Dadoes & Rabbets

adoes, grooves and rabbets are the workhorses of cabinet and bookcase construction. They're used in woodworking projects to make stronger joints.

**Dadoes** and **grooves** are flatbottomed recesses that strengthen supporting shelves and connecting panels. A dado runs perpendicular to the grain of the wood while a groove runs parallel to the grain. A **rabbet** is like a dado that's missing a side. It's essentially a notch cut into the edge of a board or piece of plywood.

You can cut dadoes, grooves and rabbets in many different ways. In this article, however, we're going to show you a simple, foolproof cutting method that requires only a router, a pattern bit and two straight guides.




#### DIY ESSENTIALS



#### **HOW A PATTERN BIT WORKS**

The bit we're using is called a top-bearing pattern bit or top-bearing flush-trim bit. The bearing follows along the straight router guide as the cutters carve out the recess. Since the bearing and the cutters have the same diameter, you just line up the edge of the guide or pattern with the marks for the dado, groove or rabbet and run the router bit along the guide. Using two guides as we show here allows you to cut an exact size dado for any wood thickness that's greater than the bit diameter. The router bit can't go off track either, since it's trapped between the guides.

Most home centers and hardware stores don't stock top-bearing pattern bits, but they're readily available online and at woodworking stores. The bits come in different diameters and lengths. Make sure to buy a bit that's narrower than the thickness of the spacers (Photo 4). We're using a 1/2-in.-diameter bit with 1-in.-long cutters (Freud No. 50-102; \$23).





#### HOW TO CUT PERFECT DADOES



#### **MAKE TWO** STRAIGHTEDGE GUIDES

The dado cutting method we show here requires two perfectly straight guides. You can make your guides any length you want, and whatever thickness is required for your router bit. Since the bit we're using has relatively long cutters, we needed a 1-in.-thick guide to give the bearing something to ride against and the clearance necessary for the bit to reach the bottom of the dadoes.

To make guides like those shown here, cut four 6-in.-wide by 4-ft.-long strips of 1/2-in.thick plywood. Glue pairs together to make two 1-in.-thick strips. When the glue is dry, use a table saw or circular saw and straightedge to trim the guides and create one perfectly straight edge. Draw an arrow toward the straight edge of each strip to remind you which edge you should use for the guide (Photo 3).

When you're done trimming the edges, check the straightness of the guides by placing them next to each other on your workbench, with the arrows facing, and press them together. The guides should fit tight with no gaps. If there is a gap, recut one or both pieces until they fit tightly together.





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


#### 2. MARK THE LOCATION OF THE DADO

You only need to mark one edge of the dado. Then draw an "X" to indicate which side of the mark the dado goes on. A good tip is to make three, not just two, marks across the workpiece. Then when you line up your straightedge with the marks, if one of the marks doesn't line up, you'll know you've made a layout mistake.



#### **CLAMP THE FIRST GUIDE**

The method we're using requires two guides, one for each side of the dado. This allows you to cut a perfect-width dado regardless of the thickness of the material. Line up the guide with the marks and clamp it securely. Be careful to position the clamps where they won't interfere with the router base as you're cutting the dado.



# ADD SPACERS When you're cutting out the parts for your cabinet or bookcase, save a few scraps of the material. Then use those scraps as spacers. This ensures that the thickness of the material you're using will match the dado widths perfectly.



CLAMP THE SECOND GUIDE
Press the second guide against the spacer blocks and clamp it. Again, make sure the clamps won't interfere with the router base. Remove the spacers and you're ready to cut the dado.

### 6. ROUT THE FIRST SIDE OF THE DADO

Since the dado we're cutting is a little less than 3/4 in. wide, and we're using a 1/2-in. bit, it will take two passes, one along each router guide, to complete the dado. First adjust the router depth. This will be the thickness of the guides plus the desired depth of your dado. We set the router to cut a 1/4-in.-deep dado. If you're positioned as shown in this photo, start at the left side and move the router left to right, keeping the guide bearing pressed against the guide farthest from you. The rule of thumb is to rout inside cuts like this in a clockwise direction.

### 7 FINISH UP WITH A SECOND PASS

Complete the dado by moving the router right to left, keeping the guide bearing in contact with the guide closest to you. Before you remove the clamps and guides, inspect the dado to make sure both edges are straight and smooth. If you find any imperfections, run the router over that area again. That's all it takes to cut a perfect dado.

#### HOW TO CUT PERFECT RABBETS



#### **POSITION THE GUIDE**

There's more than one way to cut a rabbet, including buying a special rabbeting bit. But since you already have the guide and a pattern bit, why not use them to cut rabbets, too? Here we're cutting a 1/4-in. x 1/4-in. rabbet in the back of a cabinet side to accept the 1/4-in. plywood back. Use a scrap of the same plywood to set the position of the guide, then clamp the guide into place.

ROUT THE RABBET

Starting at the left end, run the router left to right along the guide to cut the rabbet. You can use this same technique to cut wider rabbets like the one along the top edge of the cabinet (see photo on p. 21), but you'll have to make one pass along the guide, and then clean up the remaining wood using the router freehand. That just means holding the bearing a tad away from the straightedge to remove the rest of the wood. Be sure to keep the router base tight to the guide at all times.

Magnetic field-powered induction cooktops have been around for decades, but only recently has there been a real rise in demand. The slow acceptance is surprising because there are advantages to inductive cooktops, two of the biggest being better temperature control and speed. Some inductive stovetops can boil a pot of water in 90 seconds! The surface of the cooktop stays relatively cool, which has obvious safety benefits, and spills won't cement themselves to the surface. 

#### ... and See-Through Refrigerator Doors

Matte black stainless steel is definitely the appliance finish *du jour*. People love it because it's better at hiding smudges and fingerprints, and it just looks cool.

Many manufacturers are also offering refrigerators with see-through doors. The idea is that you'll waste less electricity because you don't have to open the door in order to stare slack-jawed into the fridge for minutes at a time. And because all your food is on display for the world to see, you'll be motivated to keep the contents neat and organized...right? Prices for an InstaView model like this one from LG start at about \$3,700.



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### Double-Duty Sheathing

Plywood and OSB (oriented strand board) are being melded with all sorts of materials. Roof sheathing is available with a thin aluminum coating to keep attics cooler (Georgia Pacific Thermostat). Fireresistant coatings are available, and there's even a sheathing designed for sheds that is primed on the outside and has a prefinished surface on the inside (LP SmartFinish).

This R-Sheathing from Huber **Engineered Woods is laminated** with 1 in. to 2-1/2 in. of foam, which prevents heat from being conducted through solid building components like drywall, studs and siding. Installing R-Sheathing is easy because the foam (up to R-9) is attached to the sheathing, making it a one-step process. And



R-Sheathing is part of Huber's ZIP System, which means the exterior side has a weather-resistant barrier. which takes the place of house

wrap. After it's on the wall, only the seams need to be sealed. R-Sheathing is available at lumbervards nationwide.



#### Contemporary Exteriors



### It's a great weekend project

You could cut all the plywood parts with a circular saw, but we recommend using a table saw for greater accuracy and to speed things up. If you want to include the slots–grooved shelves with plywood dividers–you'll need a router and a 1/4-in. straight bit to make the dadoes. And a brad nailer is handy for tacking the parts before adding the screws.

We used birch plywood for this project, but you could choose MDF (medium-density fiberboard) or less expensive plywood to save money. We shopped around at local home centers and found nice-looking birch plywood with B-grade face veneer for about \$40 per sheet. The entire project requires four sheets of 3/4-in. plywood and one sheet of 1/4-in. plywood.

### Build the cabinet box

Start by cutting out the parts, using **Figure C** on p. 47 and the Cutting List on p. 39 as a guide. You'll notice that some of the dimensions in the Cutting List have an asterisk indicating that you may have to adjust the size.


That's because plywood varies slightly in thickness. We used a table saw for ripping and a crosscut sled on the table saw to crosscut narrow parts. This allowed us to cut the parts accurately for tight-fitting joints.

**Photos 1 - 3** show how to get started building the basic box. Drill pilot holes for the screws to avoid splitting the plywood. Use the shelves (**Photo 2**) or temporary spacers (**Photo 3**) to hold the interior dividers in place while you secure them with screws. There are a few spots where dividers are aligned with each other, making it impossible to drive screws straight in. In these situations, start the screws alongside the part that's in the way and drive the screws at a slight angle, being careful to keep the screw tips from going through the opposite side of the plywood.

When you're done with the box, attach the casters.




Start with a three-sided box
Nail or clamp the two sides (A) to the bottom (B) and drill pilot holes for the screws. Place two screws about 1-1/2 in. from the edges, and add three more evenly spaced between them.



#### THREE OPTIONS: CHOOSE YOUR FASTENING METHOD

We assembled the parts with trim-head screws and covered them with wood filler, but there are other options. You could use screws and finish washers for a more industrial look (above left) or assemble the entire storage unit with pocket screws (above right). Pocket screw assembly would leave a lot of exposed pockets on the inside, but most would be covered once the cabinet was filled with tools, or you could buy wood plugs to fill the pockets.



**Build from the bottom up**Screw in the lower back (C), using the divider (E) and a shelf (F) to support it. Then add the horizontal middle divider (B). Set the upper back (D) and the top (B) in place and check the fit. You may have to trim a little from the top of D for a good fit. Use shelves (H) to support part D as you attach it with screws.

Start by building up the base with two strips of plywood so you can use 1-1/2-in. lag screws to attach the casters (**Photo 4**). We found good-quality 4-in. casters with locking ball-bearing wheels for about \$10 each at a home center. Buy good-quality casters because this cabinet could weigh hundreds of pounds fully loaded.

### **Build the drawers**

The drawers are simple boxes that slide on 3/4-in. square runners. The drawers are sized to allow about 1/16-in. clearance on the sides and 1/8 in. on top for easy movement. **Photos 5 and 6** show how to build the

drawers. Cut the 1/4-in. plywood bottoms accurately and make sure they're square so you can use them to square the drawer frame. Finish the drawers by attaching the fronts with screws (**Photo 6**).

Mark the location of the drawer runners on the sides of the cabinet (**Photo 7**). Then attach the runners with glue and 1-1/4-in. screws (**Photo 8**). We fabricated drawer pulls from 1/8-in.-thick aluminum angle (**Photos 9 and 10**). Attach the aluminum angles to the drawers with two screws through the top. If you've laid out your drawer runners correctly, there should be about 1/8 in. of space between all the drawers.

# Too Hot? Too Cool?

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
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Complete the cabinet assembly Add the four vertical dividers, Parts E, G and L. Use attach them. You'll need eight spacers, 16-7/8 in. long.



Assemble the drawer box Glue and tack the drawer sides to the front and back. Then add screws for more strength. Apply a bead of glue to the drawer and place the drawer bottom on the drawer box. Line up one edge of the drawer bottom with the drawer and nail it. Then square the drawer by lining up the remaining edges with the edges of the drawer bottom and nail the other three sides.

# Caster Supports Lag Screw 4" Caste

Add the casters First glue and screw four strips of plywood (P) to the front and back edges of the box. Then mark the caster screw holes and drill 3/16-in. pilot holes for the 5/16-in. x 1-1/2-in. lag screws. Attach all four casters with the lag screws.



Add the drawer fronts The drawer fronts are the same width as the drawers, but a little taller. Line up the sides and bottom and attach the fronts with 1-1/4-in. screws.

### Add shelves

The plywood shelves rest on shelf clips attached to metal shelf standards (Photo 12). This allows you to customize the shelf heights to accommodate your tools. Some of the shelves have dadoes cut into them to accept plywood dividers. Photo 11 shows how to cut the dadoes with a router and router guide.

Build the guide by gluing a perfectly straight strip of 3/4-in. plywood (fence) to a strip of 1/4-in. plywood. Then mount a 1/4-in. straight bit in the router and run the router along the fence to cut off the excess 1/4-in. plywood. Now you can mark the dado locations on your shelves, line up the edge of the router guide to the marks

and clamp it, and rout the dadoes (Photo 11). It's easier to cut dadoes across a 16-1/2-in.-wide by 4-ft.-long piece of plywood first, and then cut the shelves to 11-9/16 in. deep after all the dadoes are cut (Photo 11).

To prevent stuff from falling off the narrow shelves, nail 3/4 x 1-1/4-in. plywood strips to the face of the shelves (Figure A).

We finished our rolling tool cabinet with two coats of satin polyurethane. If you plan to paint or finish your tool cabinet, you'll save time and get a better job by mounting the shelf standards and drawer pulls after you apply the finish.

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Mark for the drawer runners
Make a marking stick using the measurements in Figure A. Then use the stick to mark the positions of the drawer runners. Make marks at the front and back.



Install the runners
Drill pilot holes and attach the runners with glue and 1-1/4-in. screws. Use spacers to hold the runners. If necessary, make slight adjustments to keep the runners aligned with the marks.

### **SMOOTHER DRAWER RUNNERS**


You can make your drawers slide easier by applying melamine tape to the tops of the drawer runners. You'll find rolls of melamine tape at home centers, woodworking stores or online. FastEdge, a self-adhesive version, is available at fastcap.com. If you buy iron-on tape, apply it before you mount the runners in the cabinet.

Out aluminum with a miter saw Make drawer pulls by cutting aluminum angle to length. Many carbide blades are designed to cut nonferrous metals as well as wood-check the fine print on the blade or packaging to make sure.



**10.** Drill and countersink the pulls
Drill two holes in each aluminum pull. Place the holes 3 in. from the ends and 3/8 in. from the edge. Use a countersink in your drill to create a recess for the screws. Line up the edges of the aluminum angles with the back edge of the drawer fronts and attach them with small screws.





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






# Cut slots for plywood dividers Four shelves require slots for plywood dividers. To save time, cut the dadoes across all four shelves before ripping them to the correct width. Make a straightedge jig as shown and clamp it at the marks indicating your slot location. Then use a router with a 1/4-in. straight bit to cut the slot.



### NO-SLIPTIP ANCHOR THE SHELVES

Drive short pan-head screws into the bottom of the shelf, directly behind the shelf clips. This will prevent the shelf from slipping forward and falling off the supports. You only need two per shelf.

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# 1. HANG YOUR ROOFING TOOLS

Use spring clamps to keep your hoses, extension cords, and other tools and materials from sliding off the roof. Don't try this on brittle or scorching hot shingles or you may damage them. You can create a handier hook by sticking the clamp in a vise and bending up one of the handles.




### 2. CLAMP WITH A TIE-DOWN STRAP

If you need to clamp boxes together, a ratchet tiedown strap can often do the job just as well as band clamps. Just make sure to protect the wood under the ratchet and hooks with cardboard.

### 3. MIX CONCRETE **WITH A RAKE**

Try a garden rake instead of a hoe the next time you have to mix concrete. The rake won't splash as much water over the edge, and the tines do a good job of combining the water with the powder. With a hoe, you waste a lot of time just pushing powder around the tub. A medium mixing tub like the one shown costs \$7 at home centers.

# 6. NEED A HOLE IN HARD SOIL? USE A DRILL!

Have you ever waited too long to install your reflective driveway markers and discovered the ground was frozen? Or tried to install a yard sale sign in dry soil that's as hard as concrete? Well, why not treat it as if it really were concrete and drill holes into it with a masonry bit? This 3/8in. x 12-in. bit costs less than \$15 at home centers.



### 7. MAKE A BLADE FOR **CUTTING FOAM**

A jigsaw will cut through rigid foam like butter-except butter doesn't crumble into thousands of bits that mess up your shop, basement or garage. If you remove the teeth from a jigsaw blade, it will cut the foam just as well but without the mess. Remove the teeth with a grinder, and be sure to wear eye protection. Hold on to the blade with locking pliers, not your fingers!





### 8. LIFT HEAVY STUFF WITH A FLAT PRY BAR

If you've ever had to remove a solid-core door, you know how heavy they can be. Lifting them up to reinstall hinge pins can be a challenge if you're working alone, but a flat pry bar (aka "flat bar") can give you just the leverage you need.

If your flat bar won't raise the door high enough, install a small block of wood at the fulcrum point of the pry bar to increase the lifting distance. Hold the block in place with a small screw and washer. Make sure the screw doesn't poke through. If it does, grind off the end so it won't damage the floor. This same setup can be used to raise bottom drywall sheets off the floor for fastening.

Make them any length, any color, for any wall. by Travis Larson

icture ledges are the perfect marriage of beauty and function. They elegantly display your picture collections, large or small, and they're ultra easy to use. You don't have to mess with positioning hooks. Your photos and artwork will never go crooked, and best of all, you can "redecorate"

These shelves are super-simple to build too. It's mostly a matter of gluing and nailing together two boards and a length of moldingno fancy cuts, tools or skills required. This is a great woodworking project for beginners.

### Planning your shelves

Even though you'll likely be swapping out and rearranging pictures down the road, it's a good idea to lay out the initial arrangement of pictures on the floor. That way, you can sketch a plan for the length of your ledges and the spacing between them. The other advantage is that you'll be able to assemble a materials list to take to the home center.

You can build your ledges any length you wish. It takes two 1x3s for every ledge, one for the apron (back) and one for the shelf (Photo 1). A 1-1/4 x 1/4-in. molding nailed to the front (Photo 2) acts as a lip to hold picture frames in place.

We made our ledges from clear pine because we planned to paint

them. If you prefer a natural wood look, oak is available at the home center along with the 1/4-in. matching molding. You can choose any wood you want if you're capable of making your own molding.

Remember to get wood glue along with the nails. Finish washers are a simple, elegant way to dress up screw heads. They'll largely be

hidden behind the pictures, but you can paint them to help them blend in better if you wish. You'll need 2-1/2-in. screws, about one for every 8 in. of shelf plus a package of screw-in. anchors that accept conventional threaded wood screws. (E-Z Ancor is one brand.) You can use other drywall anchors if you wish.

### Assembly takes minutes

You'll glue the pieces together and then nail them with an 18-gauge brad nailer (Photo 1). Fasten the apron to the shelf with 2-in. brads, and secure the 1/4-in. molding to the front with 1-in. brads. If you don't have an air nailer, you can certainly do it the old-fashioned way with finish nails and a hammer.



**Draw a guideline**• Scribe a line on the back of the apron 3/4 in. down from the top.



**5.** Mark for screw holes 2 to 3 in. from both ends. Then space holes evenly every 8 to 12 in. between them. Drill 1/8-in. holes.




**Sand and paint**• Fill the brad holes with filler, sand them flush, and prime and paint the ledges. (Or use a combination primer/paint product.)

# **7.** Mark ledge locations on masking tape Stick a vertical strip of masking tape to the wall to position one end of the

ledges. Mark the top of each ledge on the tape, and use those marks to draw level lines on the wall for each ledge.








**9.** Twist and drive a Phillips screwdriver through the marks. Draw a circle around any holes that have studs behind them.

It's smart to assemble all three parts first and then cut the ends so they're perfectly flush. If you don't have a miter saw, make the cuts with a handsaw.

### Finish after assembly

Whether you paint or stain and varnish for a natural wood finish, do it after the shelves are built but before they get mounted on the



wall. If you choose to paint, start with a coat of primer. The best top-coat to use is acrylic latex enamel. It's easy to apply and is much tougher than ordinary latex paint, so it resists scratches and wear—and it's easier to dust.

### Hang the ledges

Use screws with finish washers along with drywall anchors to hang



the ledges—no glue. That way if you want to remove them later for repainting, you won't have to patch the walls. The screws will be mostly hidden by pictures, but if you want, you can paint them after installation. Some screws will fall over studs. You'll find them when you drill pilot holes with a Phillips screwdriver. You can skip the anchors and drive those screws directly into the wood.







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

As you might imagine, home inspectors encounter all kinds of improvised, dangerous and bizarre fixes. And lucky for us, they often photograph the odder "repairs" they come across. Here are some photos from a home inspection company, along with some advice on the proper fix.

### OLD SPARKY

There are at least two things wrong with this picture (three if you count the dead mouse). Nonmetallic (NM) cable should never enter a metal electrical box or service panel without the protection of a proper clamp. Eventually the sharp edge on the entry hole will cause the cable sheathing to wear through, creating a short and a fire hazard. In addition, an open hole will let in moisture, bugs and critters and wreak havoc like gnawed wire insulation, nests and electrocuted mice.

THE RIGHT WAY: Use cable clamps or snap-in grommets to protect the cable and hold it in place as it enters any type of electrical box. Unused holes should be plugged with box plugs.







### **DON'T SIT** ON THIS TOILET!

This is all too common. The carpenters carelessly placed a floor joist directly under a toilet that's clearly marked on the house plans. And then a plumber goes nuts with a reciprocating saw. If you have manufactured I-joists, never, ever cut the top or bottom flanges!

THE RIGHT WAY: You can drill holes up to 1-1/2 in. almost anywhere in the web area (the area between the flanges). Just stay 6 in. away from any end or load-bearing wall. Holes up to 4 in. can be drilled in the middle of the I-joist away from the ends or load-bearing wall.

### DR. SEUSS WATER HEATER VENTING

Wow! This looks silly, but it's also downright dangerous. Flexible aluminum dryer duct isn't designed for venting exhaust gases, and this duct doesn't have a continuous upward slope. With this setup, carbon monoxide is likely entering the house.

THE RIGHT WAY: Water heaters must be vented with the solid single-wall or double-wall pipe available in the HVAC aisle at home centers. The vents must always slope upward at least 1/4 in. per linear foot, and include a draft hood to allow room air to help draw out the exhaust gases.





### **NOW THAT'S FREEZE PROTECTION!**

What you see is a freeze-proof sillcock mounted on the outside of the house. Not a good idea.

THE RIGHT WAY: In the photo at right, you'll see that the water valve is supposed to extend inside the house where it's warm. The 12-in.-long pipe "after" the valve should be slightly sloped toward the outside so residual water will drain after the valve is closed. Obviously, this amateur plumber didn't quite grasp the concept.





### DRYER VENT AS CONDUIT-BRILLIANT!

The first mistake was running cable through the dryer vent, but wait, there are more. At least the installer used underground feeder (UF) cable.

**THE RIGHT WAY:** The cable should run through a dedicated hole in the wall and be protected inside PVC or metal conduit to at least (ground-fault circuit interrupter) protection.



### **WELL, THAT'S ONE** SOLUTION

Before you go to the home center to choose a new toilet, know that toilet tanks and bowls vary in height, depth and distance to the wall. Take some careful measurements of the existing toilet while it's still in place. Check the clearance in front of the bowl and clearances from each side of the tank.



THE RIGHT WAY: Check the distance from the wall to the toilet flange bolts. That's almost always 12 in., but in rare cases you'll find that it's 10 or 14 in. When people run into trouble, it's usually from replacing a standard toilet bowl with an elongated one. They're 2 in. longer than a round bowl and might stop a door or drawer from opening. (See "Toilet Shopping Tips" on p. 72.)

# WHAT'S THE WORST THING THAT COULD

Vinyl dryer vent line is a fire hazard, and this house will be at risk until this line is replaced with metal. Fires caused by dryers occur about 7,000 times in the United States every year, killing 10 people on average.

Once a dryer fire starts, the lint inside the duct can ignite, and the flammable, flimsy vinyl will burn right through and ignite nearby materials. But replacing vinyl vent lines with rigid metal ducts isn't enough. You should clean the lint from ducts, the exhaust hood and the underside of the dryer cabinet at least once a year.





THE RIGHT WAY: It's best to use rigid metal vent line because it's less likely than corrugated metal to accumulate lint. Use foil tape rather than screws to join sections because the exposed screw shanks will also gather lint.

# HomeCare+Repair

Fix it, maintain it, improve it. By Jason White



henever you're remodeling, it's important to protect any uncarpeted floors from demolition debris and dropped tools. When canvas drop cloths aren't enough, I use 4 x 8-ft. sheets of 1/8-in. tempered hardboard, commonly called Masonite.

Start by thoroughly vacuuming the floors so grit doesn't scratch the flooring under the hardboard. Then cut

and lay down the hardboard and ducttape the pieces together at the seams.

If you'll be running the HVAC system during the remodel, be sure you don't cover grilles or registers. Finally, seal around the perimeter with masking tape so grit can't get underneath the hardboard at the edges. A sheet of 1/8-in. hardboard costs about \$5 at home centers.



### Fix a broken phone charger

harger cables for cell phones usually last only a few years before the insulation starts fraying on the ends. Replacement cables cost \$8 to \$30, but there's a cheaper solution. If the insulation is cracked but the copper wire inside is still intact, try covering the crack with a couple of layers of liquid electrical tape (\$5 to \$10 per bottle). Performix and Gardner Bender are two brands that get lots of positive reviews online. Just be sure not to let the cable touch anything until the liquid tape dries completely.

### EXPERT ADVICE

### **All-in-one paint** and primer

Ever wonder if it's OK to skip the primer and use a "paint and primer in one"? The answer is yes for about 90 percent of DIY painting projects, according to John Gilbert at Behr. All-in-one products are not simply primer and paint mixed in a can. Special polymers were developed to make them sticky enough to use without a separate primer.

Traditional primer is still best for metal, plastics and substrates like drywall and plaster with water stains or smoke damage. It's also recommended for woods like redwood or oak that contain tannins that might bleed through, says Gilbert.

Are factory-reconditioned toolsany good?

f you're looking to save money on power tools, consider going the "factory-reconditioned" route. Most of the time they're goodquality tools that somebody just changed their mind about after they opened the box, or they returned it because of a defect. These tools are sent back to the manufacturers, who fix whatever's wrong with them and then sell them again at a discount.

"The product is good and often comes with a warranty," says Jason Swanson of Techtronic Industries, makers of Ryobi and Ridgid power tools. "All of our refurbished tools are inspected and rebuilt as needed by trained technicians."

You'll find factory-reconditioned tools online at sites like cpooutlets. com, directtoolsoutlet.com and acmetools.com.

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

### Misfiring gas nailer

f you own a cordless gas nailer, you know how convenient it is. But that convenience quickly gives way to aggravation when it starts acting up. If you can hear the fan running on your nailer, but it only fires intermittently when you pull the trigger, don't take it to the repair shop-new gas may be all you need! Fuel cells have a "best used before" date printed right on the can. Old fuel cells lose internal pressure over time, so manufacturers recommend buying only as much fuel as you need to finish the job. You can buy new ones for about \$12 to \$15 at home centers.











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
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# **Toilet Shopping**

Sick of your old, leaky, water hog of a toilet and want to buy a new one? You'll find water-efficient toilets with an array of options. Our friends at Maximum Performance (MaP) Testing make a living putting toilets through their paces and offered these tips for the next time you go toilet shopping.



**Bowl height** 

This is the distance from the floor to the top of the toilet bowl's rim. The standard height for toilets used to be 14 to 15 in. But today, you'll find toilets that are 16 to 18 in. high. These are often called "comfort height" or "ADA height" or something similar. The additional height makes getting on and off the toilet easier and is more comfortable for lots of people, especially the elderly. Child heights of 10 to 14 in. are also available.



### Insulated tank

If summers are humid where you live and you don't have air conditioning, you've probably noticed your toilet "sweating" quite a bit. Condensation forms on the outside of the toilet, which can drip down and make a mess or even rot out your floor. Some toilets are available with insulated tanks to prevent condensation problems.

### **One-piece** VS. two-piece

A two-piece toilet-a separate tank and bowl-is the most common design found in homes. But onepiece models are available. While two-piece toilets are less expensive, one-piece toilets often have shorter tanks and are easier to clean. Some people also like one-piece toilets for their smooth, sleek appearance.



### Cost

When it comes to toilets, expensive doesn't automatically mean better performance. In fact, some of the best models tested by MaP are relatively inexpensive, while costlier ones offer only marginal performance.

### Color

Fashion is fickle. Stick with a white or an off-white toilet so you're not stuck with a color you'll hate a few years down the road. (Don't miss the blue one on the opposite page!)



### Flush-handle location

If you have lots of room above or beside your toilet, this probably isn't all that important. But if your toilet will be right up against a wall or cabinet, choose one with the handle on the opposite side or on top of the tank.



### Rough-in

The distance of the flange bolts-the two bolts that anchor your toilet bowl to the floor-to the wall behind the toilet is known as the "rough-in" dimension (make sure to account for the thickness of your baseboard, paneling or tile). Twelve-inch rough-ins are the most common, but in some older houses you may find 10-in. or 14-in. rough-ins. Be sure to measure your rough-in before you go toilet shopping so you'll know what to ask for.





### **Bowl shape**

Most toilets sold today have either round-front bowls or elongated-front bowls. Round-front bowls are great if space is tight. Elongated bowls have a longer rim-as much as 2 in. longer-and require more space (there have been cases where doors and drawers couldn't be opened after installation). On the plus side, elongated bowls are generally more comfortable for adult use and help improve hygiene. Check manufacturer websites for dimensions of bowls and measure your space before deciding on the bowl shape.

### "Wall print"

If you install a new toilet with a smaller tank, you might have to paint the part of the wall that was covered by the old toilet tank.

### **Footprint**


If you're replacing an old toilet that has a large footprint (the base covers a large floor area), you might have to patch and repair the part of the floor that was covered by the old toilet. You may even have to replace the entire floor before installing a new toilet with a smaller footprint.

Mechanics

It's not only about having the right tools. It's about knowing when, where and how to use them. Sometimes that means using them for tasks they weren't designed for. Check out this collection of mechanics' tool tips-you're bound to find a couple to help you.

### Proper way to torque lug nuts

id you know there's a right way and a wrong way to tighten lug nuts? Most people think tighter is better. Not true. Overtightening lug nuts is the No. 1 cause of warped brake rotors (called "brake rotor lateral run-out"). Warped rotors cause pedal pulsation and can increase your stopping distance. Overtightening can also break wheel studs. The stud itself doesn't cost much (\$3), but the labor to press out the old stud and insert the new one can run \$50 to \$75.

Spin the lug nuts on by hand. Never coat the stud with grease, oil or anti-seize. Lower the jack only enough to bring the tire into contact with the road. Tighten each nut to half the specified torque. Then lower the vehicle completely and tighten each nut to full torque.

Consult your owner's manual or a shop manual and set your torque wrench to one-half the recommended torque specification.

Reset the wrench and • tighten each nut to full torque. Move the socket from one nut to the next in a star-shaped sequence.



### Diagnose chirps and squeals with a stethoscope

If you want to be a real car doctor, you've got to use the right tools. An automotive stethoscope can be the most effective diagnostic tool in your toolbox. It works just like the medical version, allowing you to "hear inside" a mechanical component. The stethoscope we chose, the Lisle No. 52750, comes with two attachments—a sound amplifier and a metal probe.

You connect the amplifier to the hose and move it around the engine compartment as you listen. That will narrow your search to a smaller area. Then you switch to the metal probe to pinpoint the exact source of the problem. The Lisle No. 52750 Automotive Stethoscope is available for \$15 at tooldiscounter.com.



Touch the scope's metal probe to the nonrotating part of the suspect component. If it's worn, you'll hear an unmistakable metallic sound.




# Save your back with a 20-in. extension bar

When you're leaning over the fender and elbow deep into a tune-up, the tool you want is a 20-in. extension bar. It'll save your back every time. Just snap your socket onto the end and ratchet away—while standing. The Kobalt 20-in. Extension (No. 337368) is \$14 at Lowe's.

# Great way to store used oil

Storing used motor oil is a hassle. Here's a tip: Restaurants order liquids such as cooking oil and soy sauce in 5-gallon jugs. Next time you're out to eat, ask if you can have a few empty jugs. Rinse them and use them to store several changes' worth of used oil between trips to the recycling center.

#### Six-point vs. 12-point sockets

My gearhead neighbor keeps telling me I should quit using my 12-point sockets and buy a set of six-points. Is this really necessary?

A 12-point socket is fine for most lightweight repairs, but heavy wrenching calls for a six-point socket. A six-point socket is much less likely to slip off a stubborn fastener or round over the corners.

Here's why: (1) Six-point sockets have thicker walls, so they're less likely to flex. (2) A six-point socket is designed to contact the head of a fastener well away from the corners so contact is made on the thickest part of the socket and the flattest part of the fastener. This dramatically reduces the likelihood of slippage and rounding over the corners. And (3), the edges of a socket are angled back a few degrees to allow the socket to slide easily over a fastener. The angle on a sixpoint socket is less than on its 12-point counterpart, again providing more contact area inside the socket.

One last point. Most high-quality sockets are chrome plated to prevent rusting and make cleanup easy. However, after years of use, the chrome finish can flake off. Don't use a socket if the chrome is peeling. The chrome will be as sharp as a razor blade. Any reputable tool company will replace a tool that has peeling chrome.



# Free up a stuck trailer hitch


When the ball mount on your trailer hitch is rusted in place, don't whack at it with a sledgehammer. Here's what to do instead. Buy a can of penetrating oil (\$6) and an air chisel fitted with a "hammer" bit. The air chisel will run about \$15 and the extra bit will be about \$8.

Spray the opening to the hitch receiver. This newest style of penetrating fluid chills the metal, causing it to contract to help break the rust seal. Then use an air chisel fitted with a hammer bit to knock everything loose. The air hammer

Rap the sides, top and bottom of the hitch receiver for 15 seconds with blows from the air hammer. Spray again. Repeat the rapping until the ball mount loosens.



will break up the rust, spread the penetrant and free up the ball mount. Once it's free, just tap out the rusted ball mount with a regular hammer. If you plan to reuse the rusty mount, coat it with a rust converter or waterproof marine grease.



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LED flashlights aren't new, but this isn't an ordinary LED flashlight. The TFCFL 1800LM XM-LT6 LED Zoomable Torch Flashlight (\$17 online) is powered by a standard 18650 lithium rechargeable battery that provides up to five hours of continuous use. The zoom feature allows you to concentrate light to get better illumination or pull back to light up large areas. Use the serrated front bezel for selfdefense or to break glass in emergency situations. The flashlight kit comes with plug-in car and AC wall chargers, lithium battery, "AAA" battery adapter, a lanyard and a plastic case.



# Smartphone with thermal imaging

The CAT \$60 Android smartphone (\$630 at catphones.com) is far more rugged than a consumer-grade phone. It's shatterproof up to a 6-ft. drop onto concrete, dustproof, shockproof and waterproof down to 5 meters for up to an hour.

This phone works in temps from minus 13 to 131 degrees F, and the touch screen has glove-on and wet-finger tracking ability, so it operates in any weather.

The CAT S60 has a 13-megapixel camera as well as an infrared (FLIR) camera. Use the FLIR camera throughout your house to measure surface temperatures and find air leaks and temperature differences behind walls, electrical problems and even beehives.

The S60 works with AT&T and T-Mobile and affiliated GSM networks using a nano sim card. It comes with 32GB internal memory and accepts a microSD card for extended storage up to 128GB.

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# Electrical tools with onboard voltage tester Noncontact voltage testers are green

Noncontact voltage testers are great for making sure the power is off before you start an electrical project. But the testers are easy to lose track of and misplace which pocket is it in?

Tool manufacturer Gardner Bender solves the problem of lost testers by incorporating a tester right into the handles of its wire stripper and screwdriver—tools you're bound to have on hand whenever you're doing electrical work. Simply press the button and move the tool handle near the wires to test before touching. Or, slide the tester off the tool handle to use it as a freestanding unit.

## Smartphone inspection camera

This **Distianert Endoscope Inspection Camera** has a 13-ft. cable that lets you snake behind walls and peek inside appliances—even grab wires or retrieve nuts and bolts from tight quarters. Just download the app and plug the 2.0-megapixel inspection camera into any on-the-go (OTG) compatible Android smartphone or tablet or into a USB port on a Mac laptop. Move the camera into position and adjust the light intensity switch to get the proper illumination. Watch your screen to get the camera into the right spot. Then snap a still shot or shoot video.

For long runs, tape the cable to a stick to feed and aim the camera head. The unit comes with a cloth storage bag and three attachments: a 90-degree mirror, a hook and a magnetic tip. The video quality is good enough to get the job done; just don't expect 1080 resolution for this price. You can find the camera for about \$23 at amazon.com.

#### Consider storm windows

If you want windows that look great and open smoothly, complete replacement is definitely the way to go. But if your main concern is air leakage and energy costs, consider storm windows. Quality storm windows can stop air leaks almost as well as full replacements but cost half as much—or even less. Plus, the labor savings are huge; a DIYer can install 10 storm windows in the time it takes to replace one window. You might find storm windows for less than \$50 each, but shop around. Chances are, you'll discover that spending \$75 to \$150 is smarter.



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#### **HOME SMARTS**



Set your dryer on a box and save your back. This box is a simple one made from 2x8 boards and topped off with 3/4-in. plywood. It's a good project for a first-time carpenter. Before you begin, make sure your dryer's exhaust duct, power cord and gas line will accommodate the move up. If you have a rigid duct rather than a flexible one, you'll have to alter it.



#### DON'T CHOOSE CHEAP COAXIAL CABLE

Shielding is what counts when it comes to cable quality. It blocks interference and keeps the signal clean. So skip the "dual-shield" or "double-shield" cable and go for a "quad-shield" product; it has twice as much braided wire and foil shielding. After spending big bucks on a TV or computer, it doesn't make sense to skimp on cable.





You can buy furniture slides in many shapes and sizes at home centers and online. It's also easy to make your own sliders from plastic container covers, Frisbee discs, bedspreads, moving blankets, towels and carpet remnants. Use hard plastic sliders for carpeting and soft, padded sliders for hard flooring.



#### Caulking concrete

The best caulks for concrete are usually labeled "urethane" or "polyurethane," and most can fill cracks 1/2 in. wide or more (check the label). For any crack wider than 1/4 in., stuff in foam backer rod first. Using backer rod saves expensive caulk and results in a stronger joint. And since it seals off the crack, it allows you to use runny "self-leveling" caulk, which provides a much neater look on flat surfaces.



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

#### LOCK THE OVERHEAD GARAGE DOOR

When some people go on vacation, they "lock" their overhead garage door by unplugging the opener. That's a good idea, but physically locking the door is even better. An unplugged opener won't stop a burglar who has entered through the house from opening the garage door from the inside, backing in a van and using your garage as a loading dock. Make a burglar's job more difficult by locking the door itself. If your door doesn't have a lockable latch, drill a hole in the track just above one of the rollers and slip in a padlock.







#### Springtime safety warning

Every spring and summer, readers tell us about their window air conditioner accidents: A/C units dropped on toes, tumbling down stairways or falling out of windows. We haven't heard about any serious injuries or deaths, but lots of close calls. In almost every case, the trouble began when someone decided to install an A/C unit solo. The lesson is this: Those things are heavy and clumsy to handle. Get help!





#### CHECK THE OUTLET

If any electronic item suddenly won't turn on, don't immediately assume it's broken. Plug in a radio or a lamp to make sure the outlet is working.



# Buying light fixtures? Beware!



sometimes don't recognize the problem until I've installed the fixture. Ouch. So before you go shopping, measure first.







True. Few know about WRP, but it's very smart to apply it to wood in moisture-prone locations like windowsills and garage door trim to keep paint from peeling. It prevents water from getting into the wood through tiny cracks in the paint. Once water gets in, the wood swells and begins creating more and bigger cracks, eventually leading to peeling paint. Nearly every paint manufacturer makes a version of WRP; just make sure you pick one that's paintable and then scrupulously follow the instructions.



(B) Read the cleanup instructions. If the product cleans up with soap and water, it's water-based; if it requires mineral spirits, it's oilbased. The label doesn't always state which is which. And with all the new finish formulations, the smell isn't a reliable indicator either.



**True.** You might think that the setback would always be measured to the foundation or edge of the building. But that could mean you'd end up sawing off your roof eaves to comply with a prickly building inspector or neighbor!



**7** (**B**) Ceramic tile and glass. Some will even drill through porcelain tile.

True. "Synthetic" soaps make cleaning your shower or bath easier because they don't contain the ingredients that create tough soap scum. Any liquid or gel soap is synthetic. Most bar soaps are standard soaps, but a few, including Zest and Ivory, are synthetic.

**True**. Most modern refrigerators have an onboard computer. Unplugging the refrigerator for a half hour or so and then plugging it back in will often get your fridge back online without an expensive service call.

(A) Disposable foam plugs are the best, although both earmuffs and reusable plugs offer plenty of protection for just about any loud work. According to the Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA), the goal is to reduce noise levels to 85dB, the point where hearing damage begins. For super-loud noise, like a screaming chain saw, use both disposable plugs and earmuffs.

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
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
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
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
