never noticed the time I wasted changing out drill bits until I discovered hex shank bits. Whether I'm drilling 1/8-in. pilot holes or hogging out a 1/2-in. peg hole, the bit shank is the same size. So I just have to open the chuck slightly to swap out the bit. If I'm using an impact driver, the swap is even quicker! Several companies offer hex shank sets; my 18-piece Milwaukee set costs about \$20.








or other profile to match your needs, then go to town.

The sheets are great for wet sanding. If your sheet gets clogged, just rinse it off or crinkle it up to release the dust. Available at hardware stores in a 10-1/2-ft. roll for \$11 or in a four-pack of half sheets for less than \$5.

TIME-SAVING BRUSH AND ROLLER COVERS

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

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

is peeled from the logs like paper towels from a roll, leaving only the very center of the log. The center "pith" is the least stable part of the log and is very prone to twisting, splitting and bowing. This is particularly true of treated 4x4s because the treatment exaggerates the warping. Examine the stack of posts at the home center and reject the posts with end grain that looks like a bull's-eye. Choose the straightest posts you can find, with the least amount of center pith.

Reduce Home Allergens

hen pollen and mold levels are high, allergy symptoms might force you indoors. But indoor allergens are troublesome too. They can cause sneezing, a stuffy or runny nose, and itchy, watery eyes. Your best bet for beating indoor allergies is to banish the things that trigger them. For starters, vacuum regularly, preferably with a HEPA-rated vacuum cleaner so you're not blasting allergens back into the air. When you dust, use a damp cloth to help trap the allergens. Below are a few specific allergy triggers and ways to combat them.





PETALLERGENS

skin flakes and saliva in dogs and cats, and urine in rabbits, guinea pigs, hamsters and mice. Although some animals trigger more allergic reactions than others, there is no such thing as a hypoallergenic pet.

THE FIX:

- Keep pets out of your bedroom.
- Regularly wash or replace your pet's bedding and toys.
- In extreme cases, consider replacing carpets with hardsurface floors.



MOLD & MILDEW

THE CAUSE: Dampness. THE FIX:

- Repair roof and plumbing leaks.
- Keep damp spaces—such as kitchens, bathrooms and basements—clean and well-ventilated.
- Replace vent switches with timers to fully vent moisture during and after showers.
- Don't install carpeting on concrete or damp floors.
- Don't store items like towels, bedding or clothes in damp areas.



COCKROACHES

THE CAUSE: Saliva, feces and body parts of cock-roaches, which are often found in urban areas and in the southern United States.

THE FIX:

- Block any cracks or gaps in walls and windows where cockroaches can enter.
- Repair roof and plumbing leaks to eliminate the water sources needed by cockroaches.
- Apply bug barrier products around your home's exterior perimeter.



POLLEN

THE CAUSE: Spores that make their way inside your home.

THE FIX:

- Keep doors and windows closed to prevent pollen from drifting in.
- Weatherproof around your doors and windows to seal any gaps.
- Change your air conditioner filter regularly.




DUST MITTES

THE CAUSE: Warm, humid areas such as bedding and carpeting.

THE FIX:

- Allergen-proof covers on bedding.
- Wash bedding weekly in hot water and dry with high heat.
- Consider replacing carpeting with hard-surface flooring like tile, hardwood or vinyl. If you don't want bare floors, use washable area rugs.

REMOVE A BATHTUB DRAIN

eed to replace your tub drain? Removing the old one can be a real chore. Typically, you'd remove the drain with a drain wrench (\$10 online; Photo 1), but if the drain's crossbars are gone, you'll have to use a drain extractor (\$20 online; Photo 2). If the drain is really old, sometimes even a drain extractor isn't enough; you'll first have to knock it loose using an old chisel to bite into the metal (Photo 3). Once the drain is loosened a bit, turn it the rest of the way with the drain extractor.

Correction

Shear pins for snow blowers come in a variety of designs, but the pins we showed on p. 75 in our Winter '19 issue were not true shear pins. Shear pins are designed to break when an object gets jammed in the auger. If you install bolts or pins that aren't designed to break, or shear pins that aren't designed for your blower, you risk damage to the machine and injury to yourself.





Will Your Homeowners Insurance Pay for Bed Bug Extermination?

he cost for professional bed bug extermination typically ranges from \$500 to \$1,500, depending on the extent of the invasion. An infestation is a minor home disaster, so extermination must be covered, right?

Not so fast. Insurance companies classify bed bugs as a home maintenance issue and thus the owner's responsibility, says Michael Barry, spokesman for the nonprofit Insurance Information Institute.

A BAD RISK

Although bed bug infestations occur across the United States, they are too random (and costly) to fit insurance risk models, Barry says."No insurer wants to take this on." Nor does renters insurance cover bed bugs, although in some locales-such as New York Citylandlords are required to remove them.

CAN YOU GET RID OF THEM YOURSELF?

If you do face an invasion, it's possible to exterminate bed bugs yourself. It's a huge investment of time, but you'll save quite a bit of money. 

ust the sight of a security camera can help prevent a break-in. And if someone is snooping around outside your house, motion and sound notifications can alert you immediately. An indoor camera lets you check on your kids or pets while you're at work. You can even use a speaker on the camera to tell your kids to start their homework.

STORAGE AND POWER

There are several types of security cameras, and getting started can be overwhelming. Cameras usually include streaming on your smartphone while you're away. Some systems offer free cloud storage for a set number of days, referred to as "rolling cloud storage." For example, if you have seven days of storage, you can see only the previous seven days. But, you can download any footage you need to keep. Other systems require a subscription for storage or are equipped with a memory card. Without storage, a camera provides only a live stream. Following are several options for powering and connecting your camera.

WIRED/IP

These are more traditional, heavyduty security camera systems. Each camera connects to a recorder with an Ethernet cable. This provides





you with a stable 24/7 connection, independent from the internet. The downside of wired cameras is their complicated installation.

WI-FI

Wi-Fi cameras connect to the internet without complex wiring. Plug your camera into a power outlet, connect it to your Wi-Fi in the app, and it's done. These are easy to set up and move, but since they depend on the internet, crashes and even hacks are concerns.

BATTERY WI-FI

Completely wire-free, these cameras work on rechargeable batteries. Install them in a tree or anywhere your internet service can reach. When it's time to recharge, the app will notify you to plug the camera in for recharging or to replace the batteries.


Adjustable Hardware Bins



Build these bin racks with removable partitions to suit the size of the hardware you're storing.

n a table saw, cut 3/16-in.deep slots every 4 in.
across the 24-in. x 7-1/8-in.
piece of plywood. Make the slots
just wide enough for the 1/8-in.thick partition to slide in smoothly.
Now saw the slotted piece into
strips 4-1/2 in. and 2-1/2 in. wide.
Use 1-in. brads and glue to assemble the sides and angled ends,
then nail and glue the floor on.
Drop the angled partitions into the
slots, mount the rack to a wall, and
go nuts sorting and organizing
your scattered hardware.

prefer traditional groundlevel gardening, but not the ones we've been hearing from in recent years. Those who've made the switch love raised garden planters and won't go back.

The list of reasons is long, but these are the main advantages:

- Tending raised plants is a lot easier on the back and knees.
- You can fill planters with topquality soil for more productivity in a smaller space.
- Raised beds curtail creeping weeds and drifting seeds.
- The height discourages pests, especially rabbits.

To build on these advantages, we designed our own raised planter. On the outside, it looks a lot like others. But we engineered ours for longevity and simple construction. And we added some optional improvements to make an even better home for your vegetables.

Gathering materials

Everything you need is available at home centers for about \$200 per planter. We chose pressure-treated lumber that's cedar tone rather than green. Take the time to select straight, good-looking lumber. When you get it home, cover it with plastic to slow its drying. Pressure-treated lumber tends to warp badly as it dries; much better to let it dry after assembly when the parts are fastened together.

BUILD THE END FRAMES

Clamp the parts to a flat surface with the best-looking sides face up. Join the parts with screws as detailed in Figure A. The bottom rails (C) require a 2-in.-deep countersink hole drilled with a 5/8-in. spade bit.




BUILD THE SIDE FRAMES

Fasten the side frame parts with "toe screws" (screws driven at an angle). If any of the screw heads don't sink into the wood, drill a shallow countersink hole sized to match the screw head. See Figure A for details.





4 First, slip on gloves—those metal edges are sharp! Then cut the panels to length with metal shears (\$25). Standard 26-in.-wide metal panels don't require cutting to width.



5 INSTALL THE METAL

Screw the panels to the frames, placing screws every 8 in. along the top and bottom edges. Along the side edges, drive a screw at every second rib.



ADD PLY WOOD BACKING


Reinforce light-gauge corrugated metal by screwing plywood over the metal. Set the plywood on 2x4 blocks to help position it.

Home centers typically carry light-gauge corrugated metal, which is fine for this project as long as you reinforce it with plywood (see Photo 6). Our metal is 30 gauge. When looking at gauges of metal, remember that a higher number means thinner material. Also, make sure all the screws you choose are rated for use with treated lumber.

Building tips

- Start by cutting the parts according to the Cutting List. Cut shorter parts from your imperfect boards and save your straightest material for the long parts (E, G, M).
- To avoid assembly mix-ups, note that the rails fit between the stiles on the side frames. On the end frames, the stiles fit between the rails.
- We didn't use a finish on our planters. If you do, note that it will be much easier to apply before you install the metal panels.
- If you're tempted to miter the corners of the rim, reconsider. Outdoor miters look better than square-cut butt joints at first, but they inevitably develop ugly gaps as the wood absorbs and releases moisture.
- Here's how to install the planter: Set it into position, then slice into the soil around it, marking its footprint. Move the planter aside and dig a shallow perimeter trench, just a couple inches deep. Set the planter in place again and check it for level in both directions. Add soil or deepen the trench to level the planter.
- When the planter is in place, cut a couple large slits in the bottom of the plastic liner so excess water can drain into the soil below unless you plan to install a selfwatering system. That requires a watertight liner.
- Filling this planter requires a lot of soil, almost a cubic yard. But there are ways to fill the lower half of the planter with less effort and expense. One common filler is plastic milk jugs (with caps screwed on tight). Another trick is to set plastic buckets in place upside down.





TINE THE BOX Staple plastic sheeting to the inside of the box, then trim off the excess with a utility knife. A plastic liner helps to keep the wood dry and the soil moist.



RIM THE BOX

Top off the planter with a 2x6 rim. If necessary, add toe screws to the joints to hold parts flush.



EASY ARCHES FOR PEST OR FROST PROTECTION

Arches can support screen or mesh to stop pests, or poly sheeting to keep plants frost-free overnight. The three arches are simply 5-ft. sections of 1/2-in. CPVC pipe that you can bend and slip into 12-in. sleeves made from 1-in. PVC pipe. A 4-ft. x 25-ft. roll of fiberglass window screen costs about \$20.





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
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

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6 factors that matter

■ Cost

One thing I learned from the experts was that quality paint starts with expensive raw materials. That means cost is a pretty good predictor of the results you'll get. Using inexpensive paint could save a few bucks on the front end but cost you down the road. The paints I tested ranged in price from \$35 to \$90 per gallon.

\blacksquare Odor

I steered clear of any oilbased paints because of their smell, but some of the new acrylic-alkyd formulas still use solvent. These are a lot less stinky than pure oilbased paints, but some may bother sensitive noses.

■ Cleanup

With two kids under 2 running and crawling around, I don't want to mess with any solvent cleanup, and with so many great water-cleanup options, I don't think you should either.

■ Toughness -

My trim takes some abuse from my kids. It's no fun sanding and repainting when it gets dinged up. I tested the toughness of the finish by dragging a piece of 80-grit sandpaper weighted with 1-lb. boxes of screws across it. The toughest paints took the punishment with only light scuffing.

■ Workability -

A good trim paint can be applied in tight areas like corners and curved profiles and smoothed out before it starts to dry. I painted an intricate profile at a mitered corner to figure out which paints were more workable.



Smoothness is king when it comes to a trim paint job. I've worked hard to make my trim look great, and I don't want to ruin it with brush marks, drips or roller ridges. A good trim paint should flatten out and become smooth as it cures. Not all the paints I tested did this well.





THE TWO MOST COMMON OPTIONS FOR TRIM PAINT

ACRYLIC LATEX (\$15 TO \$70).

Most of the cans you see as you walk through the paint aisle will be labeled "a crylic." These vary drastically in both price and performance. Some gallons cost as little as \$15, but I steered dear of them. Paints made of 100 percent acrylic are more expensive but will cure harder and are less porous, making them durable and easy to clean. Acrylic latex paint can be a great choice for interior trim, but it won't match the toughness of an oil-based paint.

ACRYLIC-ALKYD HYBRID (\$35 TO \$90).

Acrylic-alkyd hybrid paints have been available to contractors for a while but are still fairly unknown to most homeowners. These paints have all the good qualities of an oil-based paint (leveling, hardness, flow and open time) while still providing easy soap-and-water deanup and resistance to yellowing over time. Most brands have a version of these paints now, and they're definitely worth checking out.

TIP: Always ask specialty paint stores about possible discounts. My experience tells me they're often running some sort of unadvertised sale or may have the freedom to give discounts.

– 5 that stood out for me











TRIM ENAMEL (\$98). This represents a new category of paint, and it reminds me of a pigmented, water-based polyurethane—even the way it smells. This stuff produced the toughest coating of all the paints I tested. I dragged five 1-lb. boxes of screws on a piece of 80-grit sandpaper over the painted surface, and the paper just glided right along.

Emerald enamel brushes on well, has a long enough open time to work into the corners, and levels out nicely. It had less sheen than other paints; the semigloss I tested was more like a satin. If you want a super-hard finish and have \$90 to spend on a gallon, this is right up your alley. It would be my choice if cost didn't matter.

BEHR ALKYD (\$35). This acrylic-alkyd hybrid may not be as tough as other hybrid trim paints, but it's still pretty tough and because it's a great value, I included it in my list of standouts. It's thicker than other hybrids and brushes on really well. It also has great leveling characteristics and could get into the tough-to-reach areas in the mitered corners of my trim-painting test.

PPG BREAK-THROUGH! (\$70). This is one of the non-hybrid paints I tested. It's a low-VOC (volatile organic compound) formula with a strong ammonia odor, but it leveled out better than anything else on the list. According to the manufacturer, it's used to coat warehouse floors. If it can stand up to forklifts, it ought to be able to take on my son's Matchbox cars. It dries in 15 to 20 minutes, so you need to lay and smooth the paint quickly. It won't fill in dings or scratches, even small ones, so sand well before painting.

BENJAMIN MOORE ADVANCE (\$57). With a longer drying time, this acrylic-alkyd hybrid was the most workable of all the paints I tested, and it was also the runner-up in my toughness test. The downside is that you have to wait at least 16 hours between coats, compared with four to six hours for the other options. It also takes about 30 days to cure, so be careful reassembling parts or using the things you paint.

SHERWIN-WILLIAMS SNAPDRY (\$77). This acrylic latex ultra-fast-drying paint has great resistance to "blocking." That's the tendency of two painted surfaces to stick together, such as a door and its jamb. SnapDry's fast drying time worried me, but with some urgency, I was able to apply the paint and spread it before it became tacky. It leveled out fairly well and was one of the tougher paints I tested. It's harder to work with than others, but the super-fast drying time enables you to close your freshly painted door.

MY CHOICE


Ultimately, I decided to go with Benjamin Moore's Advance. I've worked so hard to make my trim look nice, and I want the paint to look like it's been sprayed on. The base trim also has to stand up to vacuum cleaners, play sets and toy trucks. Advance was a good balance of price and performance, and it hung with the top performers in my tests. I am making a sacrifice in recoat and cure times-I need to figure out how to add an extra day to the weekend.

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This sidewalk is a typical example. The materials and mixer rental cost about \$200; a pro would have charged me at least \$600. So I saved 400 bucks—not bad! You can do the same. Experience with concrete isn't necessary, but you will need tool know-how and a strong back. WHAT HAPPENED?

This sidewalk is more than 80 years old and still in good shape—mostly. So what went wrong with this section? Most likely, it was excess water: The builders added too much water to the mix or misted the surface to make troweling easier. Or maybe rain came before the concrete cured. Any of these circumstances makes concrete weak, porous and destined to disintegrate.



EXPECT A MISMATCH

New concrete looks very different from older concrete. The match improves with time, but that can mean years. One solution is to replace the entire sidewalk. Another approach—much easier—is to coat the whole sidewalk with a resurfacer. For an overview of that job, search for "resurface sidewalk" at familyhandyman.com.

Trench along both sides of the walk at least 6 in. wide and 6 in. deep. These trenches will allow you to set up forms later.

2 CUT A CRACK STOP

When you break up the bad section, a cut that's at least 1-1/4 in. deep will prevent cracks from spreading to the good section. An existing groove in the concrete is usually the best place to cut. Cut with a diamond blade in a circular saw or an angle grinder.

3 BUST UP THE BAD SECTION


A small section of sidewalk usually doesn't require a jackhammer rental; try a sledgehammer first. A mattock is perfect for prying up broken concrete. Remove the chunks. For more concretebusting tips, search for "concrete demolition" at familyhandyman.com.

4 PLACE THE FORMS

Select straight 2x4s for the forms and drive stakes every 24 in. Position the forms even with the adjoining sections of sidewalk, then drive screws through the stakes into the forms. The forms should feel rocksolid. If not, add stakes.

TRIM OFF THE STAKES

Cut the stakes flush with the forms with a handsaw or recip saw. Then span the forms with a 2x4 and slide it along the length of the forms. It should slide smoothly without hitting obstructions.









Set a 2x4 across the forms and measure to the soil or gravel below in several spots. Your goal is a 4-in.-deep space for concrete. You may need to add or remove material. Then compact the base with a hand tamper (\$30 at home centers).

7 ADD EXPANSION JOINTS

Tack expansion joint material to the existing concrete with 1-in. masonry nails. A 50-ft. roll of expansion joint costs about \$20 at home centers.

OIL THE FORMS

A "release agent" allows
for easy form removal after
the concrete has cured. Spray
lubricant is fast, but you can
use a rag to wipe on any oil.

Paper isn't essential for sidewalks, but it adds strength and longevity. The 3/8-in. rebar and support "chairs" shown cost less than \$20. "Pin" the new concrete to the old: Drill 3-in.-deep holes into the old concrete, insert 16-in. sections of rebar and tie the rebar frame to the pins (Photo 10).

10 Dry soil or gravel can absorb water and cause concrete to dry out quickly, before it has time to fully cure. Give the base a good dousing, but not enough to create puddles.


11 MAKE A MEASURING BUCKET

A strong, workable concrete mix contains just the right amount of water; follow the instructions on the bag. Measure the water into a bucket and mark that level on the bucket.


12 MIX AND DUMP
Consider renting a
small concrete mixer (\$50
per day). Aside from saving
you some hard labor, it lets
you mix faster, so all your
concrete will be at the same
stage in the curing process.
And that allows for a more
consistent finish.

Drag a 2x4 screed board over the forms as you add concrete and fill in any low spots. When the form is evenly filled, round up a helper for the final screed. With each of you holding one side of the screed board and making a sawing motion, screed off the entire length of the fresh concrete.









1 4 FLOAT THE CONCRETE

Immediately after the final screed, smooth the concrete with a wood or magnesium float. Don't worry about small ridges left by the float; brooming the surface will erase them.

15 BROOM THE SURFACE

Drag a broom lightly across the concrete to create a nonslip surface. The time to do this is typically 30 minutes after floating, but that will vary a little depending on the temperature and humidity.

1 6 EDGETHE PERIMETER

An edger (\$10) forms a rounded edge, which looks good and is less likely to chip off. This can be done before or after you broom the surface.

7 GROOVE THE SURFACE


A groover (\$10) cuts a "control joint," which encourages any cracking to occur in the joint, rather than randomly. Typically, control joints are spaced 5 to 8 ft. apart.



Tips for a smooth, successful project

- Once you add water to concrete mix, the clock starts ticking. So the most important step in any concrete work is preparation. Mentally run through the entire job, make a list, and be absolutely certain you have all your tools and materials ready to go.
- To determine how many bags of concrete mix you need, search online for "bagged concrete calculator." Buy a couple extra bags. Running out can lead to disaster.
- Consider renting a mixer or calling in a ready-mix truck. Here's my personal rule: If you need more than 15 bags, rent a mixer. If you need more than 30 bags, order ready-mix.
- Whether you're mixing by hand or using a mixer, it's best to have a helper so you can get the final batch mixed before the first batch becomes too stiff to work with.
- A couple hours after finishing the concrete, cover it with painter's plastic for a few days. Concrete that stays wet longer grows stronger.
- Wait overnight (or longer) before you remove the forms.





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


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

Asimple, one-job tool, right? Some might even call it "boring." But as is often the case with tools, many tinkering minds have come up with clever ways to use this humble shop staple. Here's how to use your drill press to its full potential.




SET THE TABLE FOR PERFECT "PERPENDICULARITY"

A drill press can only drill perfectly straight holes if the table is perfectly perpendicular to the spindle. Here's an old machinist's trick to make your table spot-on. Make about a 30-degree bend in a 1/4-in. steel rod about 2 in. from the end. Cut it to a length that will reach the outer edges of your table when the short end is in the chuck. Chuck in the rod and then turn the chuck so that the rod's end is oriented toward either edge of the table. Raise the table until the rod just touches the surface and then lock the table. Turn the chuck to position the rod on the opposite edge of the table. Adjust the tilt of the table until the rod touches both edges equally. Lock the tilt adjustment nut and never adjust it again. (Find out how to drill angled holes on p. 50.)



ADJUST BELT TENSION TO LIMIT VIBRATION

After you've changed speeds, or if your drill press has excessive vibration, check the belt tension. You should be able to deflect the belt with your finger no more than 1/2 in. midway between pulleys. To adjust the tension, loosen the motor lock, move the motor forward or backward, and then tighten the lock again. Some drill presses have a tension adjuster lever to move the motor.



CHECK YOUR SPEED FOR EFFECTIVE DRILLING

Detailed charts are available online with information about speed, bit types, diameters and the material being drilled. But here are two general rules: Decrease speed as the bit diameter increases, and slow way down for steel.


Some high-end drill presses have a variable-speed dial on the front. Otherwise, you'll change speeds by changing the belt position on the pulleys located under the top cover. On most drill presses, a graphic under the lid shows the speeds associated with different belt positions. To change the belt positions, first release the motor lock to take the tension off the belts.

PLUNGE AND RELEASE TO CLEAR THE FLUTES

Don't bore a hole in a single plunge. The bit's flutes will fill up with sawdust, create heat, slow down drilling and dull the bit prematurely. Instead, drill in small increments, raising the bit often to release the sawdust. If the sawdust doesn't come out on its own, blow it out.



NO-FUSS DEPTH SETTING

Mark the desired depth on the edge of your workpiece. Lower the spindle until the bit reaches the mark, and then set your depth stop.

V-notch



MAKE A CLAMP BAR FOR SMALL PARTS

To safely drill small parts, you need a way to hold them. A clamp bar is a fast solution. Predrill a screw hole in the end of a 1x2, and then screw it directly to the table where needed, according to the size of the workpiece. This pivoting bar lets you squeeze the workpiece against the fence while keeping your hands out of the way. For dowels, cut a V-notch in the bar to keep them from sliding. A hand screw clamp (right) also works well for small parts, again with a V-notch for dowels.






CLEAR DEBRIS QUICKLY WITH AN AIR NOZZLE

I've tried shop vacuums and dust collection setups on my drill press, but they're not very effective. The best thing for dearing dust off the table and out of the bit's flutes is compressed air. I hang an air nozzle from an eye screw on the underside of the table.



SECURE WORKPIECES WITH TOGGLE CLAMPS

Sometimes-such as when you're drilling steel-you need to firmly clamp your workpiece to the table. I use a pair of toggle clamps (\$6 each at harborfreight.com). I just screw them directly to the table where needed.



DRILL ANGLED **HOLES WITH** A HINGED TABLE

To drill shallow angles, don't tilt the table. Instead, make a hinged platform. Join two pieces of MDF together at one end with a piano hinge. The platform is 3 in. narrower, centered on the base. The fulcrum is 1-1/2 in. tall, and its length is the same as the platform's width. Fasten a 1-1/2-in. angle bracket to each end of the fulcrum. To use, slide the fulcrum to create the desired angle, and then clamp or screw the angle brackets to the base.

STABILIZE ROUND STOCK WITH A V-BLOCK

To drill a hole or a straight line of holes in a cylindrical object, use a shop-made V-block. To make one, set your table saw or circular saw blade to 45 degrees, and then make two passes to create the "V." Leave a little extra length on the dowel, screw the end of the dowel to the V-block and cut that end off later when you're finished.




BUILD A SANDING TABLE IN 5 MINUTES

A set of sanding drums is a handy addition to your drill press. One advantage this setup has over a spindle sander is that you can set the height of the drum to utilize the entire sanding surface. All you need is a piece of plywood with a cutout sized for the sanding drum you're using. Swing the table off to one side and clamp the sanding platform into place.

DRILL EVENLY SPACED HOLES

One of many ways to drill evenly spaced holes is to use a shelf standard attached to a fence. Tap a finish nail into the edge of your workpiece and clip off the head so that no more than 1/8 in. is left protruding. Mark your starting hole on the workpiece and drill it with the nail engaged in the shelf standard. Move the workpiece however many spaces are needed on the shelf standard for each consecutive hole.



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
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Adjustable drawer dividers

You can restore order to messy shop drawers with 1/4-in. plywood partitions and self-stick weather stripping (\$3 a roll at home centers). For the strongest grip, use spongy "closed cell" weather stripping.

Apply weather stripping to two sides of the drawers as shown, then cut the partitions long enough so they squish firmly into the rubber on both ends. A good rule of thumb is to make the partitions 1/4 in. longer than the inside measurement between the pieces of weather stripping.



PVC pipe clamp rack

Are your pipe clamps missing in action right when you need them? Build this snap-in, snap-out storage rack from PVC pipe. For 1/2-in.-diameter iron pipe, use 3/4-in. PVC, and for

3/4-in.-diameter pipe, use 1-in. PVC.


To make the rack, cut 2-in. lengths of PVC, and with a hacksaw or band saw, slice them length-wise about 3/16 in. past the diameter's center-line. This creates the gripping action to firmly hold the heavy iron pipe. Drill and countersink two holes in each PVC piece, then screwthem to a pair of boards. Attach the upper board to your shop wall and snap a pipe clamp in each end to position the lower board for screwing to the wall.

Store sheet goods on a ladder

An old extension ladder is just right for holding leftover plywood, drywall, plastic laminate and spare boards. Take the ladder sections apart, lay one on the floor near a wall and then load it up. This handy rack will hold your sheet goods high and dry and make it easier to find what you need.



File by grit

Organize sandpaper by grit in a handy plastic file box (\$10) available at office supply stores. Just list the grits on the tabs and you can instantly find the right one. The box is also a good place to store partially used pieces that often get thrown away.







Up, up and away

Put joist spaces to use with this simple storage idea. Fasten eye screws to the joists and cut lengths of chain to keep odd lengths of trim and pipe out of the way but easy to find. Open one side of the eye screw with a pliers to slip the chain into place. Make the chain a bit longer for future expansion.



Hang-it-all hooks

The plastic hooks that plumbers use to support pipes make convenient hangers for just about anything. They're strong and cheap and come in a range of sizes. Find them in the plumbing aisle.

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
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
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
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


Different sizes for different jobs

If you have a large floor that needs to be ground down, plan to rent a walk-behind floor grinder. You'll spend \$90 to \$150 per day, but a big machine can grind a large space within the rental period. Depending on the store and the machines it carries, a diamond grinding wheel may be included in the rental or you may have to buy diamond grinding inserts for about \$150 a set.

For a small job, rent an angle grinder equipped with a diamond grinding wheel (\$50 a day or less). It's the perfect tool for taking down just a few high spots or tough-to-reach areas near walls. Be sure the one you rent comes with a means of attaching a vacuum to suck up the dust. If you plan to grind right up to a wall, make sure you rent a grinder with a convertible dust shroud that will flip up to expose the wheel enough to get into the comer.





Diamond grains do the cutting

The cutting surfaces of these grinders are diamond grains held by "segments," the raised metal parts of the wheel. An aggressive wheel, which can take down 1/4 in. of concrete or more, grinds away material faster but leaves a rougher surface. A less aggressive wheel removes smaller amounts of concrete and leaves a smoother surface.

Here's the rule of thumb for choosing a wheel: The more surface area it has, the less aggressive the wheel. Choose an aggressive one to remove high, long ridges or large, rough areas of concrete, and a less aggressive one for tasks like cleaning up tile thin-set residue from a wall or prepping for an epoxy coating.

How long will the job take?

If you have a 3/4-in. difference in height between sidewalk slabs, you should be able to knock that down in a few hours, but it depends on how hard the concrete is and the grinding wheel you use.

Wear safety gear!

Plan to deck yourself out in safety gear: hearing protection, safety glasses and a respirator. The high-speed machines are loud and can send concrete rubble flying from the grinding wheel.

Grinding concrete also releases fine silica dust, which can cause health problems. Always wear a NIOSH-certified N95-rated respirator.

Disposable masks cost as little as \$2 each, but for \$25 you can get a half-mask respirator that will have a better seal. Check the seal with this easy test: If you can exhale and inhale sharply without air escaping, you're good to grind. If you have facial hair, even a bit of stubble will ruin the seal. Go ahead and shave it will grow back!

Avoid tripped circuit breakers

Both the grinder and the vacuum draw a lot of power, so if possible, plug them into separate circuits and wrap the cord so the connection stays away from moisture. Otherwise you may find yourself flipping tripped circuit switches all day long. And if the grinder is struggling to start up when the cutter head is resting on the ground, lift up the head before starting the grinder. That will reduce resistance during startup.

Keep the machine in motion

While you're grinding, keep the cutter head moving, especially with a large floor grinder. Pivot the machine on its wheels, moving the cutter head in an arcing motion. If the cutting surface is riding on only one edge, work the machine in small circles to flatten out the surface.

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Nibble at a heave

For a heaved sidewalk or cracked slab, tilt the grinder slightly and remove the meat of the concrete and then feather back the high spot. You may never get toestubbing heaves completely flat, but you can lessen the hazard. When tilted, the dust shroud can't catch all the dust, so you'll need a second hose and a helper.



Grinding to the edge

Never remove a dust shroud to get dose to a wall. You'll increase your exposure to nasty silica and remove a safety barrier. To grind near walls with a convertible dust shroud attached, push the open end of the dust shroud against the wall and make steady, shallow passes. Be sure you don't dig the edge of the wheel into the concrete as you move it back and forth.

Mark where to grind

1. Trace the high spots Outline the space that needs to be ground. Using a level or other straightedge, find where the high spot meets the flat surface. Balance the straightedge on the high spot and mark where the ends of the level are equidistant from the ground and trace around the high spot. This can be done by eye; it won't be perfect, but it will be a good start.

Check your progress Start grinding on the crown of the high spot and work your way toward your marks. When you feel you've made progress, use the straighted ge again to check for flatness. Retrace the high spots and grind them down. Repeat this grind-and-check process until the high spot is gone.

Keep grinder flat against concrete

When possible, make sure the entire grinding surface is touching the concrete. Grinding with only one edge of the wheel will wear down the segments unevenly.

- Put it on the ground to keep yourself clean and prevent losing nuts and bolts.

- Shield your seat covers when you're filthy or your dog is with you on the job. (It works under children and ice cream cones too.)
- Protect delicate furniture and appliances that are tied down in the bed.
- Keep it on hand for an emergency blanket.

My flat-tire kit includes: plugger, reamer, needle-nose pliers, plugs, valve stem tool, extra valve stem caps, air chuck and tire pressure gauge. A kit like this will likely pay for itself the first time you use it. And yes, we know the tire experts say you're not supposed to plug a tire from the outside, and you definitely shouldn't plug sidewalls. But I've personally plugged at least 20 tires (lots of nails and screws on construction sites) without any failures, safety issues or reduction in the overall life of the tires.

I keep this container under my front seat at all times to hold my ratchet straps and a red flag for when I haul long material in the back of my truck. Leaf blowers to the rescue!

They can do many tedious tasks—fast BY TRAVIS LARSON

the middle of a mature hardwood forest, which puts us knee deep in leaves much of the year. In October and April, I spend hours with a commercial-grade backpack blower strapped to my back. But the other 10 months, I depend on my battery-powered blowers—and I'm not kidding. Let me show you what I use them for.

Cleaning shop vacuum filters

I used to hold shop vacuum filters at arm's length and blow them out with my air hose nozzle—ideally when there was a breeze so the dust would blow downwind of me. But I still ended up covered in dust every time I did it. Now I just hold the filter down with my foot and blow it out with the leaf blower. I stay a lot cleaner with this method.



Wood Shop

A few times a year, I give my dust-covered shop a blowingout. First I open the doors and put a couple of box fans in the doorways, blowing air outside. Then I open all the blast gates on the power tools and switch on the dust collector.

I put on my dust mask, safety glasses and hearing protection, and then I go nuts with the leaf blower, starting at the back of the shop and working my way toward the doors. Under and over benches, shelving, air collection ducts and overhead lights-everything gets blasted. The dust that isn't blown outside gets sucked into the dust collector, which I leave running for about 20 minutes after blowing.



Grass-free mower decks

Grass that collects on top of the mower deck gets under the pulleys and wrapped around the drive shafts. Blow it off before it becomes a problem.



Spot-free car washing

Whether you go to a self-service car wash or swab your car down at home, blow-dry it after rinsing and your car will be spot-free. Start at the roof and work your way down. By the way, if you use car-wash detergent from an auto parts store, you'll get far better results than you would using dishwashing soap or other household deaners.



Soffit blasting

When you're blasting your soffits to get rid of all the cobwebs, do one more thing. Diligently blow out all the dust from the perforations in your aluminum soffits (or rectangular screens if you have plywood soffits). Dust can block some of the airflow into your attic, and that airflow is important for keeping the attic cooler in summer and for preventing ice dams in winter.

Light snow

If my car is covered with light snow, I just blow it off with the leaf blower. I do the same with my deck.



Blowing out the cars



Electric fire bellows

Need to get that fire started in a hurry? Give it a massive shot of oxygen. Just don't get so close that you melt the plastic nozzle and be sure to wear safety glasses.

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
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
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


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
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














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




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
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
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ASHES, ASHES—THEY ALL DRIFT AROUND
