
... SPEND AT LEAST ONE HOUR PER



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




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
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TIME-SAVING DRYWALL


hen it comes to a taping and mudding project, the corners that meet existing walls are my worst nightmare. Not only do you have to tape and mud the corner, but now you're stuck painting the entire wall, and there's never a good way to tape up to a wood or brick accent wall. Well, Trim-Tex makes a special tear-away bead so you don't have to lose sleep over a corner again.

Adhere the bead to the surface, staple it down, then run your mudding knife along the raised edge. Before your final sanding, tear away the leg that's sticking out. Tear-away bead is perfect for repairing or covering a ceiling or butting drywall to a surface you don't want to mud, like a paneled wall, exposed brick or existing trim. A 10-ft. stick costs less than \$3 at home centers.

The endless headache over your tangled ratchet straps may have finally come to an end with Quickloader straps. With standard straps, there's no easy way to store excess strapping-you could spend five minutes apiece rolling them up to store in your vehicle, only to have them unwind.

Instead, the Quickloader straps use a spring-loaded mechanism to keep the straps coiled. Like the blade in a tape measure, the straps are under tension and able to retract into the case. A 12-ft. strap rated for 1,500 lbs. costs about \$22 at The Home Depot and online.

ABETTER PRUNING BLADE

The next time your list of chores includes branch trimming, put a pruning blade in your reciprocating saw and get to work. A standard wood-cutting or demo blade will get the job done, but a pruning blade will work much faster. The teeth are big and sharp and allow for fast cuts through big sticks and logs.

Pruning blades aren't limited to cutting branches and logs; if you're not worried about splintering or a very rough-cut edge, they'll work fast on any wood material, making them great for demolition as well. This Diablo blade features carbide-tipped teeth, which will stay sharp much longer than those on standard pruning blades. Pruning blades are made by many manufacturers and cost \$2 to \$9 each

at home centers.



Peel-away protection

eel-Tek 150 is a liquid masking; you brush or roll it on like paint and it forms a rubbery coating. It's used for painting and staining and other home improvement projects, as well as for crafting.

It's ideal for protecting surfaces that might get stained, chipped or scuffed during demolition. Cover your sink or tub ahead of renovating a bathroom, or roll it on a countertop before replacing your backsplash. It's easy to apply with just a brush or roller, and you can lay it on extra thick for more protection. When you're done with the job, peel up the masking and the surface will be just how you left it. Most garage door openers are loud and frankly, not too bright. They're difficult to install, can set off your dogs, and it's easy to forget to close them when you drive away. The Genie SilentMax Connect is one of many smart garage door systems that solve these problems. We found it easy to install and program and were pleased by its ultra-quiet operation. With Wi-Fi and Bluetooth technology, it connects to your smartphone, allowing you to open and close the door while you're away. It also integrates with Alexa and Google Home for hands-free control, and doesn't charge a fee for linking with these smart devices. The opener is available for \$200 at homedepot.com.



Finishing Stands

When you're finishing table legs or other furniture parts, cut square 1/4-in. plywood "stands" and screw them onto each end. The table legs stay put as you apply your finish, making the job much easier than it would be if the parts were hung on a hook. And you can stand them vertically to dry.



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Upgrade Your Garage Door for a Faster Sale

he garage door is often your home's largest architectural element. According to a 2019 study done by Remodeling magazine, a garage door replacement returns on average nearly 100 percent of the project cost at resale. In 2018 a major garage door manufacturer partnered with an independent research firm to conduct a study to "gauge Realtor perceptions" to determine if the garage

door's appearance was a key factor in a home's listing price. According to the study, if home shoppers don't like what they see from the street, they won't even go inside. Seventy percent of the real estate agents surveyed agree that a new garage door sells a home faster, and more than 80 percent believe a new one boosts a home's value. Here are options for maximizing the curb appeal of your garage door.

Paint it

This is the fastest and cheapest option if your door is attractive and in good condition. As with

any other painting job, a clean, wellprepped surface is a must. You can easily finish this job in a weekend or less. Be sure to choose the proper paint and primer for your door, whether it's wood, vinyl or metal.

Give it a face-lift

If you have a metal door with a dull, aged finish, you can restore it with a Garage Door Renewal Kit from Everbrite (not shown). The kit for a one-car garage costs \$50.


The cost of a new garage door ranges from a few hundred dollars up to thousands, depending on the style, size and material. Adding windows will increase the natural light as well as the price. If you're not comfortable installing the door yourself, you'll pay \$400 to \$500 to have it done for you.

If you're a hard-core DIYer, you may want to build your own door. 
GARAGE DOOR FIXES!

If your garage door looks good but isn't operating quite as it should, go to familyhandyman.com and search for "garage door tune-up."

SEAL ATTIC AIR LEAKS

If you're about to add insulation to your attic and you've never heard the term "attic bypasses," you're missing the crucial part of insulating your attic. Attic bypasses are air leaks from your living space into your attic. These leaks occur where wires, air ducts or pipes go through the ceiling and into the attic. Bypasses must be sealed before adding insulation. In fact, in many states it's the law. However, in homes built before 1991, there was probably no attempt to seal bypasses. After that, there's a good chance some of the larger bypasses were sealed, but likely not all of them.

If the leaks aren't sealed, warm air is getting into your cold attic no matter how much insulation you add. But you're not just losing heat and increasing energy bills. You're also potentially causing frost and condensation in your attic, as well as ice dams, all of which lead to water/moisture damage, mold and rot. If you eliminate all attic bypasses, you'll probably eliminate most of those problems. But if you



add insulation before sealing attic bypasses, you could make the frost problem worse. So, before you add insulation, seal all leaks with caulk or expanding foam. If you're hiring an insulation contractor, make sure this step is included in the work. For more information, go to **familyhandyman.com** and search "how to seal attic air leaks."

Photoelectric smoke alarms Don't buy anything else

ith the variety of smoke detectors available, it's easy to feel the urge to pull your hair out when you're standing in front of shelves of them at your local home center. Thankfully, you can keep your hair and sanity intact. You only need a smoke/CO detector with a photoelectric sensor, preferably hardwired. Don't buy ionization or dual sensors. Ionization sensors are

prone to false alarms, so you're tempted to disable them. That puts you and your family in greater danger. Photoelectric sensors, on the other hand, detect smoldering fires faster and are less likely to have nuisance alarms.

If you're into tech, you can install a smart photo-electric CO detector, but any photoelectric smoke detector will do the job. For more information, go to familyhandyman.com and search for "smoke detector."

Troubleshoot **Your Toilet: Do** the Bucket Test

If your toilet's flush is weak, the first thing you need to determine is whether the problem is in the drain or the toilet. Before you snake out the drain or replace your fill valve, try this. Dump a bucket of water into the bowl. If it flushes slowly, the problem is in the drain. If it flushes quickly, the problem is in the toilet. This doesn't fix the problem, but at least it tells you where to start looking. For solutions to all kinds of toilet trouble, search for "toilet" at familyhandyman.com.

Seal openings in electrical boxes

hen you're doing electrical work, take a look at the junction boxes. According to the NEC (National Electrical Code), if there are missing knockouts that don't have any wires running through them, they need to be sealed. Otherwise, each opening exposes flammable materials to possible sparks. Knockout seals cost less than a buck apiece at home centers.





PERMANENT CHALK

When I built my house at the ripe old age of 27, I thought all chalk for snapping lines was the same. Not so. Some is temporary and some is permanent. Permanent is great for stuff that won't be visible, but I had chalk lines showing on my house and garage roofs for years. If you do accidentally snap a permanent line where you don't want one, an oxidizing cleaner such as OxiClean followed up with water removes permanent chalk pretty well. I've tested it on unfinished plywood, paint and unsealed concrete, all with very good results.

DIY & Your Hearing 3 Things You Must Know

1. Most power tools do damage

OSHA requires hearing protection for extended exposure to noise at 85 decibels or above, and most power tools, lawn mowers and chain saws are louder than that.

Vickie Tuten, a member of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and an audiologist with the U.S. Army, offers a rule of thumb-if someone walked up to you and started talking while you were working, would you have to turn the tool off to hear them? If so, there's a good chance it's hazardous and you should be wearing hearing protection.

2. Plugs and muffs don't work as labeled

How much hearing protection you need depends on two factors—how loud your equipment is and how long you're exposed to the noise. Tuten says both earmuffs and earplugs work as long as you wear them properly. With earmuffs, make sure the temple of your protective goggles (or anything else) doesn't break their seal. And with earplugs, be sure to insert them according to the instructions on the package.

When you purchase earmuffs or earplugs, they'll have a noise reduction rating (NRR) on the package. But you can't simply subtract that number from the decibels you're exposed to. "That's a number derived under lab specifications with an expert fitter," Tuten says. NIOSH (the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health) recommends that the labeled NRRs (Noise Reduction Ratings) be adjusted for real-world use as follows:



EARMUFFS: Subtract 25 percent from the manufacturer's labeled NRR.



FORMABLE
EARPLUGS:
Subtract 50 percent from the manufacturer's

labeled NRR.



EARPLUGS: Subtract 70 percent from the manufacturer's labeled NRR.

ALL OTHER

To increase your protection, you can wear earplugs and earmuffs together. Results vary depending on the products you choose, but expect four to eight dB of additional protection.

3. Every exposure does some damage

Tuten says a lot of people believe that a one-time exposure to loud noise doesn't matter. "That's a false sense of security," she says. "Damage actually does often occur. It's a cumulative kind of damage." Even if you've already lost some hearing, with protection you can preserve the hearing you have left. "If you can keep the loss at a mild level, that's a win," Tuten says.



Fast Fact

The decibel scale is logarithmic, so, for example, 85 dB is 15 times louder than 70 dB. Many power tools are loud enough to damage your hearing. Here are a few examples from the University of Florida's Hearing Conservation Program:

Want a fridge in your garage? Cold facts you need to know


o one needs to be convinced of the convenience of a garage refrigerator. Whether you have one already or are thinking about getting one, here's how to help it perform its best.

Understand the basics

In a non-climate-controlled garage, refrigerators struggle. Excessive heat forces them to work extra hard, resulting in high electric bills and early failure. Freezing temperatures make your refrigerator think it doesn't need to work, letting frozen things thaw and refrigerated items freeze. Humidity is also an issue, as it can cause rust on the coils. The ideal way to keep your garage refrigerator running at peak performance is to condition the garage air. However, this gets expensive and involves insulating the garage. You could frame up, insulate and condition a small space within the garage, but that's not very practical and there are easier options.

Keep things cool

If your garage gets too hot (over 100 degrees F), set up a fan to increase airflow over your fridge's cooling coils. Just make sure the air





is moving across and around the back of the fridge. If humidity is an issue, set up a dehumidifier. If your garage is also your workshop, clean up sawdust daily and make sure it doesn't build up on your refrigerator's coils.

Know Your Hardware Store

When my late wife and I bought our house, we thought we were going to be here two years and gone. Thirty-eight years later, I'm still in the same house. The best advice comes from an issue of *Reader's Digest* published more than 40 years ago: "When you buy a house, you think you have a place to live. You don't; you only sleep there. You actually live in the hardware store."

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FAMILY HANDYMAN has been improving garages for decades. This year, we found a family overdue for a garage makeover. Their simple desire to clean up the garage led to a unique conversion that extended their living space while still leaving space for cars. It was a big transformation, but the projects were easy:

- **TO CUT CLUTTER, we** installed an electric attic lift. That made moving out-ofseason gear into the attic safe and effortless-and opened up lots of floor space. Aside from careful positioning and adjustments, the installation was
- **FOR YEAR-ROUND** COMFORT, we added ductless mini-split heating/cooling. If you're intimidated by this HVAC project, don't be. Supplying the power took creative planning, but the rest was amazingly easy.
- **TURNING A GARAGE INTO** A HOME THEATER could be as simple as hanging a TV on the wall. But we wanted to protect all the electronics from sawdust and stray basketballs, so we built a giant cabinet. Don't be fooled by the size; it's big, but construction was basic.
- **CONCRETE FLOORS** are bland and hard to keep clean. Our solution was an epoxy floor coating. More than any other project, this stunning floor transformed the garage into an inviting living space.

MEET THE HOMEOWNERS

he Dempseys-JD, Heather, sons Donavan and Jack, and their puppy, Joe Louishave lived in their home for 14 years but had never given their garage any TLĆ. "It was kind of a mess, just a place to keep things," says Heather. "When we first started the project, all I wanted was to declutter and clean up. Now it's a great space to hang out with friends and family and entertain more often."

ATTIC LIFT

Send heavy loads to the attic—with the press of a button BY MIKE BERNER

aving attic space above your garage just about doubles your storage options. But carrying stuff up the ladder is a hassle and can be dangerous. An attic lift makes the chore safe and effortless. You can even store things like a lawn mower or snow blower that you wouldn't think of hauling up a ladder.

A lift is easy to install if your garage has the right bones, and it uses power you likely already have. We'll tell you what you need to know before you buy and walk you through the installation.



Powering the lift

Check to see whether there's already an outlet close enough for the power cord to reach. If there isn't one, the best way to add one is by connecting the new outlet to an existing attic light. This way the VersaLift has power only when the garage light is on, and it can be turned off without a special trip to the attic. INSTALLATION

CUT THE OPENING FROM ABOVE

Start in the attic by snapping lines on the floor along the inside of the joist space you're using for the lift. Snap two more lines to make a rectangle 46-1/2 in. long and 22-1/2 in. wide. Make sure you have at least 4 ft. of vertical clearance above the marks, then cut the opening into the floor with a reciprocating saw.

INSTALL HEADERS **BETWEEN TRUSSES**


Install blocks 1-1/2 in. beyond the opening at each corner. Then cut headers and screw them to the blocks. Double-check the opening to be sure it's sized correctly and square.

CUT THE DRYWALL Slice around the rough opening to open the hole to the garage. Hang a plumb bob from each corner of the opening and mark the garage floor. This will help later on when you attach the

platform to the lift.

COVER THE CORNERS For the platform to move through the opening smoothly, nothing can protrude into the opening, including nail heads, splinters and screws. If there are any protruding edges, trim them off with a flush-cut bit in your router. Cover the corners from the top of the floor to the bottom of the ceiling with the L-flashing provided with the lift.





Position the lift over the opening and start the lag screws that fasten it to the floor. But leave the lag screws loose so you can adjust the mounting rails later (see **Photo 9**). Level the lift housing by sliding shims under the legs (see **Photo 6**).

At this point, the bolts that hold the legs to the mounting rails are loose. The bolt holes are slotted, so with the legs shimmed and the unit level, push the mounting rails to the decking and tighten the bolts that hold the legs to the mounting rails.

ASSEMBLE THE PLATFORM
Build the lift platform and
door, then set the platform assembly on the door. Screw the spring
brackets to the door braces. Then
set the unit inside the corner marks
on the floor.







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SIDE TO A HOME THEATER

A TV turns a garage into a gathering spot, the perfect informal place to watch a game with friends or binge on a miniseries. But garages aren't always TV-friendly—sawdust, spray paint and flying balls are threats. Protect your electronics by building this handsome cabinet.



his cabinet began as basic, utilitarian protection for a garage TV but became much more. It has space for other electronics like speakers and gaming equipment, and the finished product is attractive enough for any home theater. "Looks too good for a garage!" is the reaction I hear again and again.

This is a huge cabinet but an easy project. If you can accurately slice up plywood parts and screw them together, you can do it. All the parts dimensions are in the Cutting List, and Figure A shows how they fit together. Sized for a 75-in. TV, the design can be altered to suit other sizes. Plywood makes up most of the cabinet and most of the cost. Depending on the plywood you choose, your materials bill might be \$100 less than mine, which was \$600.

ASSEMBLETHE CABINET

I tacked the parts together with brad nails just to hold them in place, then added trim screws for strength.


Don't forget to position the parts so that the best-looking veneer faces outside or up where it's most visible.

2 BUILD THE VALANCE

Assemble the plywood parts of the valance, then wrap the front and sides with 1x4. I couldn't get long enough stock at a home center, but I found nice pine 1x4s at a traditional lumberyard.









INSTALL THE TRACK

cabinet top.

The doors glide on standard hardware, the kind typically used for closet doors. Screw the rollers to the doors and mount the tracks inside the valance. The two sections of track meet at the center of the valance, leaving a gap at the outer ends.

8 HANG THE DOORS

Slip the rollers into the track and check the fit of the doors. Adjusting the doors is a trial-and-error process. Unlike with a typical closet, the valance doesn't allow access to the adjustment nuts. So you'll have to remove the door, make adjustments—and repeat. Don't forget to add the stop blocks or the doors will roll off the tracks (see **Figure A**).










Plywood Cutting Diagrams

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
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Ductless Air Ductlessaing Cooling Installing cooling

Installing cooling is surprisingly easy with a mini-split system

dding an A/C system sounds like a job for pros only. And usually it is. But two non-pros installed this ductless "mini-split" system in a garage in one day.

The installation was fast and easy because of the special line set (top right). It comes prefilled, or "precharged," with refrigerant and includes connectors that don't require special skills or tools. Just mount the two main units and connect the line set to the condenser. Some mini-splits include an easy-install line set, but most don't.

A mini-split system can be installed in a home, a garage, a cabin or a shed. Some offer heating as well as cooling, and some include multiple evaporators to serve multiple rooms. Depending on features and size, most DIY mini-splits cost from \$700 to \$2,000.

Choosing the system

Very few brick-and-mortar stores carry DIY systems, so online shopping may be your only option. Luckily there are many online suppliers. The size of the system is listed in BTUs (British thermal units). The higher the number, the greater the cooling capacity. To select the right size mini-split, calculate the

heat loss of the room. Several websites simplify these calculations. Don't just guess; an undersized system won't keep up, and an oversized system will cycle on and off too frequently, shortening the condenser's service life. We installed a 12,000-BTU heating and cooling system that costs about \$1,100 at climateright.com. The other necessary materials totaled about \$275.

Providing power

Scan the photos on the following pages and you'll see that installation is mostly basic DIY stuff: measuring, drilling holes, driving screws... Usually the biggest challenge is running power to the system. With a small system, you may be able to draw power from a nearby underloaded 20-amp circuit. More likely, you'll want to install a new circuit dedicated to the mini-split. That can be a small job or a major project depending on how easy it is to run cable from the main panel to the unit.

By cutting-and later patching-three small holes in drywall, we were able to run cable from the basement up through the garage wall, through the attic, then down and out the exterior wall and into a disconnect box. (The disconnect provides an easy, certain


way to turn off power when servicing the unit.) Power then runs from the disconnect to the condenser. Cable running alongside the line set powers the evaporator. Our bill for electrical supplies was about \$160. A local electrician estimated that work at about \$500.


If you have some electrical knowhow but need extra guidance, don't forget your local electrical inspector. It's not an inspector's job to act as a consultant, but most will give you some advice and outline code requirements. Expert help and certainty that the job is done right-not bad for the cost of an electrical permit.

Other materials

The condenser needs a level surface to rest on. You could pour a concrete pad, but a plastic condenser pad (\$50 and up online) is instant and easy. We mounted ours on condenser wall brackets (\$60 online).

The fabric sleeve covering the line set isn't attractive or easy to keep clean. The solution is a plastic line set cover kit, which costs about \$50 online.







INSTALL THE MOUNTING BRACKET

Mount the evaporator inside the room on an exterior wall away from direct sunlight, doorways and sources of dust. Make sure this area of the wall is free of wires, pipes and ducts that would interfere with making a hole for the line set. Mark the stud locations and fasten the bracket to them with screws.

2 DRILL A PILOT HOLE

The line set hole must slope slightly downward to the outside so condensate from the evaporator can drain outside. Begin by drilling a pilot hole from inside to outside. Then go outside and make sure no trim or other obstructions will complicate drilling the full-size hole.

3 BORE THE FULL-SIZE HOLE

Cut with a hole saw from inside, move aside any insulation and inspect the wall cavity for obstructions. Finish the hole by drilling from the outside.

4 RUN THE LINE SET

Carefully uncoil the line set from the back of the evaporator. With an assistant outside, feed the line set through the hole. As it emerges, the assistant should gently bend the line set downward and to the side as needed to reach the condenser. Keep the rigid plastic collar surrounding the line set at the end that connects to the condenser. The drain line is shorter and goes through last, below the other lines. Add the drain extension and wrap the joint with electrical tape to keep it secure.

5 INSTALL THE EVAPORATOR

Wrap the foam sleeve around the section of line set within the hole and replace any insulation in the wall cavity that was disturbed. Then hang the evaporator on the mounting bracket. Your helper may need to feed a few more inches of the line set outside as you do this. On the outside, insert the two-piece plastic trim into the hole to prevent any rough edges from damaging the line set.

6 INSTALL THE CONDENSER

Set the condenser on a pad on the ground or mount it on a wall bracket so that the refrigerant lines can reach it easily. Route the line set so it stays tight to the building exterior and doesn't leapfrog any obstructions. This makes it easier to install a cover. Ensure the condenser has the recommended clearance from walls and bushes. Avoid placement where ice or packed snow could fall on it or where other appliances vent. A location on the east or north side of the structure maximizes cooling efficiency.


CONNECT THE REFRIGERANT LINES

This step varies by manufacturer. With this system, a locking lever presses the line connections together. Before powering up, inspect the refrigerant lines for kinks and verify the electrical connections. Then go inside and set the temperature using the handheld controller.

8 COVER THE LINE SET

Insulate and seal the hole in the outside wall, then cover the line set using sections of plastic or metal channel cut to length. Place the back half of the channel behind the line set, plumb it and anchor it to the wall with self-tapping screws. Our line set travels horizontally to the compresser, so when we added the channel corner (see p. 46), we drilled a hole in it to allow the drain line to exit straight down.










built a folding workbench for American Woodworker magazine about 20 years ago–l think it was one of the first ever built. It has served as a lumber cart, finishing stand, cutting station, job-site workbench and as an assembly table. Because it's been so useful, I designed a deluxe anniversary model with extra features. If you want to build the original, simpler version instead, search for "folding workbench" at **familyhandyman.com**.

5 Fresh Features:

- A TOUGH WORK SURFACE For a durable, smooth work surface, I glued a layer of tempered hardboard over plywood.
- **TWO TOPS** The large top allows ample room for work and tools. When the bench is folded up, the small top is just right for a benchtop tool like a drill press or miter saw.
- A LARGE LOWER SHELF This big space is the perfect spot to park tools during projects. The shelf's ends clip into the cabinets, making the bench extremely rigid.
- **ADJUSTABLE SHELVES** I replaced the end frames on the original with cabinets. This one holds adjustable shelves.
- **DEEP DRAWERS** The drawer cabinet is the same size as the shelf cabinet, so you could opt for two shelf cabinets or two drawer cabinets.







BUILD THE CABINETS

Cut all the cabinet parts to size. Plywood thicknesses vary slightly, so double-check dimensions as you build. Sand all the parts, and then screw the drawer glides to the drawer cabinet sides (don't use glue, in case you need to make adjustments). Assemble both cabinets.

2 INSTALL SHELF STANDARDS


Cut the shelf standards to length. Install the standards using No. 6 x 3/4-in. screws, with the factory ends of the standards set on the cabinet's bottom. Attach the hinge panel cover strips to both cabinets. Apply finish.


3 ATTACH SHELF HANGERS

Cut to length the hangers and spacers that support the lower shelf. Attach the hangers to the cabinets using pan-head screws.

4 ATTACH SHELF BRACKETS

Cut the large shelf and shelf brackets to size. Attach brackets flush with the ends of the shelf using pan-head screws.








Fasten the casters near the outer ends of the cabinet bottoms using washer-head screws. I used swiveling casters that lock to prevent rolling as well as pivoting, so the bench stays put while in use.

Cut the small shelves to size, allowing about 1/8 in. of play between the shelf standards. Sand the shelves and then attach the shelf lip. The lip overhangs the tops of the shelves to keep contents from sliding out. Sand the shelves and apply finish.

BUILD THEDRAWERS

After cutting the drawer parts, draw an arc on one of the drawer fronts using a roll of tape or a paint can as a guide. Cut out the arc and sand it smooth (sandpaper stapled to the cutout works well for this). Repeat for the other drawer fronts. Dado the fronts and sides to accept the bottoms. Assemble the drawers using glue and brad nails, and then apply finish.


Secure the piano hinge in a vise and cut the lengths needed for the hinge panels using a hacksaw. File the cut edges smooth.





ASSEMBLE THE HINGE PANELS

Join each pair of hinge panels using a section of piano hinge and No. 8 x 1-1/4-in. wood screws, predrilling for the screws. Leave a gap equal to the hinge barrel's diameter. Install the T-hinges on the free ends of each panel.


1 O POSITION AND ATTACH **HINGE PANELS**

Attach the top and bottom hinge panels flush with the top and bottom of the cabinets, directly behind the hinge panel cover strips. Mount the center hinge panel on the opposite side of the cabinets, on a line 1/2 in. below the top hinge panel.

INSTALL PANEL LOCKS

Panel locks stiffen the hinged panels, making the whole bench more rigid. Cut them to length using a hacksaw. Cut a notch in one side of each panel lock for clearance around the hinge barrels.







Figure F 1/2-in. Plywood







BUILD THE TOPS
Hardboard "skins" provide a smooth, tough surface for the large and small tops. Cut the top bases and skins slightly oversize, and then glue the skins to the bases. When the glue is dry, cut the tops to finished size. Attach the edging using glue and clamps.


3 ATTACH STAYS TO TOPS

Glue and screw the top stays to the underside of both tops. The stays on the large top lock the two cabinets in their open position. The small top stays lock the cabinets in their closed position and prevent the top from sliding.

1 4 INSTALL SASH LOCKS

To hold the cabinets together, install sash locks on the hinge panel cover strips 6 in. from the bottom of both sides of the cabinets.

ADD THE SHELFDrop the shelf into place, slipping the shelf brackets behind the shelf hangers. This addition makes the bench very rigid.







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


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

The easiest way to add garage outlets

INSTALLING SURFACE-MOUNTED

RACEWAY is the slickest way to add lighting or outlets in a finished garage—even if you're already a master at running conduit or fishing wire. Like conduit, it eliminates the need to tear into walls or ceilings. Unlike conduit, it doesn't require special tools or materials. And raceway looks neater. A raceway system typically begins at an existing outlet. From there, it can run anywhere: up, down, around corners or in multiple directions at once.

The raceway system shown cost about \$60. Raceway itself (sold in 5- and 10-ft. lengths) costs about \$1 per foot. The surface-mounted junction boxes cost \$5 to \$10; the elbows and tees about \$5 each. You'll also need mounting clips and other accessories. Home centers carry a variety of parts, and you'll find even more online. The cost of wire, switches and outlets will add at least \$50 to the total. Raceway is often called "Wiremold," the name of a common brand.

BEST PRO TIPS

Planning tips

- Building a raceway system is kind of like plumbing; it requires the right parts and fittings, which can mean repeated trips to the store. To avoid that, sketch out a plan and make a list of the items you'll need. When in doubt, buy extra parts and return the leftovers.
- When possible, locate the new boxes directly above, below or level with the original box to minimize ells and bends. It's less work for you and makes for a neater installation.
- Try to locate the new boxes at studs so you can screw directly into wood and minimize the need for drywall anchors.

CAUTION:

Turn off the power at the main panel and check with a noncontact voltage detector before you begin work.

START AT AN EXISTING OUTLET


Remove the outlet from an existing junction box and screw on a baseplate. Don't forget to add a No. 10 grounding screw to the baseplate. The entire raceway assembly must be grounded.

2 MARK THE PATH AND MEASURE


Draw a line marking the path of the raceway to the next baseplate or fitting. I like to temporarily screw that box or fitting into place. You'll have to anchor it later anyway, and having it locked in place makes measuring easier. Measure between the plate and the fitting. Add 3/8 in. for each end (3/4 in. total) to get the total length of the raceway.

Cut the raceway track to length with the "show" side facing up. A reciprocating saw or jigsaw will do the job, but I use a hacksaw to avoid marring the finish. Deburr the cut ends with a metal file, then insert metal bushings (provided with the accessories pack) in both ends.

You have two choices for fastening the raceway: clips that go on first and snap around the raceway base, and straps that go over the raceway and attach to the wall. I use clips because they're less visible. Either way, you need support every 32 in. For fastening clips or baseplates, I like screw-in drywall anchors rather than the anchors that come with the raceway. (E-Z Ancor is one brand.)










BEST PRO TIPS







5 CONNECT TO THE STARTER BOX

Remove the fitting temporarily installed earlier and slip it into one end of the raceway. Slide the other end of the raceway under a tab on the baseplate. Don't forget: Both ends of the raceway require bushings to protect the wires from sharp edges.


SNAP THE RACEWAY INTO THE CLIPS

Hand pressure is usually enough, but I sometimes persuade stubborn clips with a rubber mallet.

FASTEN THE SECOND FITTING

Screw the fitting or baseplate to the wall-permanently this time. Drive screws until they're snug, but don't overtighten them and strip out the drywall anchor.

O ADD AND REPEAT From here on, you'll just repeat the steps, building the raceway system one section at a time. When in doubt, add more outlets. Nobody ever complains about having too many.



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
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
BEST PRO TIPS



Tape the ends of the wires together and push them through the raceway. Depending on the raceway size and wire gauge, you can run 5 to 10 wires (check the instructions). Use "THHN" wire. Don't use sheathed cable (often called "Romex").


INSTALL BOXES AND COVERS

Snap fitting covers into place. Before screwing the boxes to the baseplates, you'll have to grab pliers and remove knockouts to create openings for the raceway. It's easy to make mistakes here by removing the wrong knockouts. To get it right, hold the box in place and mark the correct locations. With the raceway system complete, you're ready to add outlets, switches and lighting.



Metal or Plastic?

Raceway comes in plastic and in metal. The stores in my area carry a better selection of metal parts, so I always go with metal, which is shown above. But plastic is a bit easier to work with and a good choice for smaller jobs. If you choose plastic, make sure it's rated for 120-volt wiring. Some plastic is intended only for low-voltage wiring like speaker or phone cables. To see how to install plastic raceway, search for "raceway" at familyhandyman.com.

f weekend projects are your thing, think about getting your hands on this Haul-Master 1/2-Ton Truck Bed Cargo Unloader. It's ingenious even though it's nothing more than a sheet of polypropylene mesh that wraps around a shaft turned by a hand crank. Just hook it on the end of your lowered tailgate, pull the mesh sheet across

the length of the bed and load your cargo right on top.


When you're ready to unload, just spin the crank and watch your precious cargo spill right out the back; no more tiresome trips up into the bed with a shovel. If you need to spread gravel or topsoil, you could drive slowly and have a buddy dump the load as you go.

The Haul-Master Truck Bed Cargo Unloader can handle a load up to 2,000 lbs. and takes less than 10 minutes to install—no tools required. It won't work well on an antislip bed surface, and it may not fit on the thicker tailgates on some new trucks. TWO-DOLLAR, TWO-MINUTE THEFT PREVENTION

Truck tailgates are easy to remove and can cost thousands, making them a target for thieves. Prevent theft, or at least slow it down, with a stainless-steel hose clamp. Simply wrap the hose clamp around the open-sided tailgate hanger bracket, the one usually found on the passenger side. Get the clamp snug with a screwdriver, slide the fastening nut as far forward as you can, and then finish tightening with a small wrench.





Make trailer wiring last

Get more miles from your trailer wiring harness by occasionally dabbing dielectric grease onto the male parts of the connectors. The grease will help prevent corrosion and oxidation. Make sure to use a nonconductive, silicone-based formula sometimes called tune-up grease. The one shown here costs less than \$10 online.

Replace seat filters

Most air-conditioned seats are just seats covered in a perforated fabric with a fan strapped underneath to circulate cool cabin air up onto your backside.

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
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
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
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
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
