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Spring is around the corner and it's time to evaluate whether the harsh winter weather and constant foot traffic may have damaged your concrete steps. ight from the start, the Schlage Encode Smart Wi-Fi dead bolt is as simple to use as an ordinary dead bolt. Even the installation is easy! But its tech smarts make it far more convenient.

My wife and I love the backlit touch keypad—we no longer need a key to unlock the door. It's very easy to change and monitor codes when you have visitors, check the status of the lock and lock/unlock your door remotely from your smartphone.

We also like the auto-lock setting that will lock the door after a predetermined amount of time, and the simple lock button so you don't have to enter your code each time you lock your door. This has become a life-saver for getting the kids to preschool and day care when we're crunched for time and have our hands full.

My wife is wary of relying on Wi-Fi and batteries for the lock to operate, but there is a keyhole in case you ignore the low battery warning. These dead bolts are available for \$250 online and at home centers.

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

I recently tried Boral Building
Products' TruExterior trim, a composite trim made from fly ash, a
byproduct of coal burning. It won't
swell and rot from water exposure,
and it's approved for ground contact and contact with masonry and
brick. It cuts with a standard saw
blade and shapes easily with a
router. (I suggest dedicating a blade
to this stuff; mine went through lots
of TruExterior trim, but it wouldn't
cut anything else cleanly afterward.)

MY FAVORITE TRIM

The trim comes preprimed and ready for paint. I even stained a piece out of curiosity, and it took gel stain great! It expands and contracts much less than wood or vinyl, has the best simulated wood grain texture I've seen, and resists splitting even when you drive a screw without a pilot hole close to the edge. This is my new favorite engineered trim product. The 5/4 x 4 x 16-ft. sticks cost \$39 each at my local lumberyard.

Crevice-cleaning broom

If you have a paver patio or any grooved surface (like a sidewalk or a truck bed), you know how debris stays stuck in the crevices. The 18-in. Renegade broom is made for this job. Its arched bristles reach into crevices and scoop out the debris, and it can move heavy piles of wet leaves and dirt. This broom may seem a bit pricey (\$37 online), but it's a great tool for outdoor cleanup.


CORNER-KEY DOWELING JIG

ockler is making it easy to break away from using traditional miter keys and splines to reinforce miter joints. Its corner-key doweling jig is a breeze to set up and allows you to drill three different-size holes (1/8 in., 1/4 in. and 3/8 in.) through the joint, adding strength and a unique design feature. The jig adjusts to let you drill closer or farther from the mitered corner, which helps match material thickness and gives you more freedom with your dowel placement. 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

DEFUZZ YOUR ROLLER

New roller covers have lint on them that will end up on your wall when you start to paint. To avoid this, roll the cover over a strip of tape before painting.

SAFER SAW FENCE

Cutting small parts on a miter saw is dangerous. There's typically a wide gap between the fence halves and another in the throat plate. Without full support for the workpiece, small offcuts can (and will) go airborne. To solve this problem, attach a sacrificial fence.

Make the fence by gluing and nailing a length of 1x4 to a piece of 1/4-in. plywood. Attach the 1x4 to your saw's fence. Miter saw fences usually have holes predrilled, but if yours doesn't, just drill a few. Two holes on each fence section is sufficient. The fence greatly increases safety and makes it super easy to get accurate cuts. After you've made one cut, the kerf tells you exactly where your saw will cut. Just mark a cutting line on your workpiece and line it up with the kerf.

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A TESTING ZONE FOR /NNOVATIONS

SECURITY FEATURES, TESTED

Irom monitoring the weather to I controlling your smart home, Amazon Echo has hundreds of different skills. One that piqued my interest is Alexa Guard, a home security feature built right into the speaker. Say "Alexa, I'm leaving" to your Amazon Echo and it will activate guard mode, listening for breaking glass and smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. Upon detection, it will activate lights and integrate with select security systems, like ADT. You can even have your Amazon Echo make guard dog sounds to deter intruders. These seemed like handy security features, but I really wanted to test them in homeLAB and see if they held up to scrutiny. Here's what I found.





Breaking Glass Detection Amazon Echo claims to be able to hear breaking glass. Presumably, if someone broke glass to enter your house, your Amazon Echo would hear it and send a noti-

fication to your phone. That sounds like a great feature,

but does it really work?

In the homeLAB, I activated Amazon Echo's guard mode and smashed small pieces of glass before shattering much larger pieces. I was roughly 3 ft. away from the Echo, and yet, no matter how much glass I broke, it didn't detect anything. I tried to make the glass breaking sounds louder, but that didn't work, either. Eventually, I put shards of glass in a bag and shook it rapidly. Still nothing. In fact, the only way I could get the Echo to recognize breaking glass was to play glass-breaking sound effects on my smartphone.



Amazon Echo can send a notification to your phone if it hears smoke or carbon monoxide alarms. I first tested a smoke alarm about a foot away from the Echo. Within roughly five seconds, it detected the sound and sent a notification and included a sound clip in the Alexa app. I did several tests, each time moving roughly 10 ft. away from Echo to see how far it could hear the alarm. The Echo passed every test, hearing the slightest chirp from 65 ft. away and immediately sending a notification to my tablet. This is an awesome feature!



Amazon Echo works with ADT Pulse, ADT Control and the Ring Alarm security systems. With ADT, Alexa guard mode will arm the security system and also send audio clips of a disturbance, like a triggered smoke alarm, to ADT's monitoring agents to review and verify whether emergency services should be called.

I wasn't able to test this with ADT, but I connected the homeLAB's Ring doorbell to the Echo for some tests. The first time I walked in front of the Ring doorbell, its sensor told Alexa someone had come by, which then sent a notification to my tablet. Subsequent tests, however, weren't as successful; the Ring sensor only notified Alexa about half the time that motion was detected.




Amazon Echo can learn "skills," which are small programs you can download from your Alexa app. Several promise to deter burglars by making the sounds of dogs barking. I used a few of these skills. While none were very realistic, one called "Burglar Deterrent" had the most convincing bark, playing a variety of barking sounds rather than a rhythmic loop. But the noise level will be affected by both the Echo's distance from the intruder's possible entry point and the Echo's volume setting. Even if it's loud enough, I wasn't convinced this would scare off an intruder. Of course, it doesn't hurt to use it, and if anything, you might scare off those pesky relatives who like to stop by.



With smart lightbulbs, the Echo will turn your lights off and on while in guard mode. It uses machine learning and your zip code to know when to turn on your lights while you're away, making it look like you're home.

I tested this in the homeLAB using Philips Hue smart lights. When I told the Echo I was leaving, it turned on the lights. When I came back later, the smart lights had turned off. This feature works more conveniently than any automatic lighting timer.



One-Coat Paint Test

ew people want to mess around applying more than one coat of paint, but more often than not, you need to put on that second coat. Several paint brands, however, have high-end products that claim one-coat coverage. It seemed to us a little too good to be true, so we bought a gallon of Behr Marquee (\$38), Sherwin-Williams Infinity (\$44) and Benjamin Moore Aura (\$72) to see how well they covered in one coat.

How we tested them

We painted the entire wall gray, but to see how the one-coat performs on darker and lighter paints, we also painted three white and black squares. We used a roller with a 3/8-in. nap for each paint.

Coat thickness makes a difference

How much paint you apply with your first roll makes a big difference. At first, we used a light amount of paint to test the one-coat claim and realized that for one-coat coverage, the coat needs to be a thick one. And it's also important to consider other factors, like color, shade, quality and the roller you use.

One-coat paint is pretty great

We were impressed by how well the one-coat paint in the color we chose covered the black and white squares. The paints differed subtly, but all three brands covered the white and black squares well. We liked Benjamin Moore Aura for its ease of application, but they all completely covered the underlying color in one coat.

Marvin Windows Lock Status Sensor

With most windows, security systems require you to install sensors to detect motion, letting you know if they're open or closed. Marvin Windows bypasses this problem with its "Lock Status Sensor" built into their windows, giving it a cleaner look. They work with an existing or new security system through a wired or wireless connection.

We installed these windows in the homeLAB and connected them to our security system panel. We loved how seamlessly our security panel told us when the windows were opened. Prices start at about \$2,500. To find a local dealer, go to marvin.com/find-a-dealer.

Smart Bridges

Products in the homeLAB and one thing quickly has become clear:

Smart home bridges—small electronic boxes that connect your smart device to your Wi-Fi and smart assistant—are a nuisance and will quickly clutter your home. From the Philips Hue lightbulbs bridge to the Wemo bridge to the bridge that connects to our smart ceiling fan, these small plastic boxes stack up fast. Several don't install or program easily, or work nicely with a smart assistant. So what's the deal? Do you need these things?

How they work


Some smart devices, like a smart ceiling fan, aren't designed to work directly with your home network. The bridges act as an intermediary, providing a path between your smart device, your Wi-Fi and your smart home assistant, like the Amazon Echo.

Bridge or hub?


Not all smart products call them bridges; some might call them "hubs," muddying the waters. Whether a smart home device includes a bridge or a hub, know that they're the same thing.

Avoid bridges if you can

Since many alternative smart home devices don't require bridges, it's best to avoid bridges so you won't clutter your house or get stuck with one brand. If you're concerned about Wi-Fi dead spots and too many devices slowing down your Wi-Fi, consider installing a mesh network (see p. 72).

A BRIDGE is simply a go-between for your smart device and your home network.




LED Lightbulb Brightness Test


We had two theories about LED lightbulbs: that some bulbs with the same lumen rating are brighter than others, and that some fade very quickly. So, we bought six 800-lumen bulbs online and put them to the test by measuring their brightness over one month of constant use.

Not all bulbs shine equally

As expected, some of the lightbulbs burned brighter than the others right out of the box, with the Philips (\$12 for a fourpack) being brightest. But our second theory didn't pan out. None of the bulbs dimmed significantly—at least not in their first 750 hours of use. We'll continue to monitor them over the coming months.

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

It can be intimidating, but replacing a window is just a series of simple steps BY MIKE BERNER he kitchen in our new house featured a garden window that was stealing useful cabinet and countertop space. We didn't like its exterior look either, and ultimately my wife, Steph, decided to take the lead on replacing it. Doing it herself saved our family about \$1,200, and with my help she got it done in just a day. At first she thought she was biting off more than she could chew, but she quickly realized that-like most carpentry jobs-window replacement is just a matter of following simple steps. Here's how to do it:









REMOVE THE TRIM

Cut the caulk around the trim

and the window. Pry the trim away
from the window and the siding.

Remove the trim from the inside of
the house as well.

2 PULL OUT THE OLD WINDOW

Remove the screws or nails that hold the window in the opening. If the window still doesn't budge, there may be foam, more caulk or hidden screws keeping it in place. Work a reciprocating saw blade between the window and the framing and cut around the window, then wiggle the window out of the opening.

3 FRAME THE NEW ROUGH OPENING

The new rough opening needs to be 1 in. wider and 1 in. taller than the new window. That allows space for leveling the window and insulating around it. We first raised and leveled the sill and added cripple studs. Then we added trimmer studs to make the rough opening the size we needed. Make sure the trimmers are plumb and there's enough blocking for sheathing.

4 PATCH IN THE SHEATHING

Cover the framing with exterior-rated plywood or OSB. Our job required only a 2 x 4-ft. sheet of 3/4-in. CDX plywood. Steph cut it to size and screwed it into the framing with 2-in. coated screws. Then she capped the sill by nailing on a piece of cedar siding (**Photo** 5), giving it an outward slope. If any water gets in, the slope will send it back out.





We used tar paper as a water-resistant barrier (WRB). Newer houses might have house wrap material, which will work the same way. Start at the bottom and overlap the existing WRB. Then cover the sides, followed by the top, always overlapping the previous layer and

tucking the WRB underneath the siding as best you can.

6 FORM THE WINDOW PAN


The window pan protects wood from any water that might enter around the window. Cut flexible flashing tape 12 in. wider than the window opening, peel off the backing and lay the tape on the sill without stretching it. Starting from the middle, press the tape into the corners then up the sides. Fold it over the sill and stretch the tape around the corner. Many window installers don't cover the side or top corners with flashing tape, but I always add the extra layer of protection. I wrap 4-in.-wide flashing tape over the side corners, then the top. When all the tape is on, roll over it with a J-roller.

7 APPLY SEALANT TO THE WINDOW

To make the connection watertight, apply a continuous bead of sealant along the side and top flanges. Be sure the bead goes right over the nail holes; penetrations through the tape must be sealed well. Don't seal the bottom flange; if water gets in, it must have a way out.

8 PLACE THE WINDOW

Rest the bottom of the window on the sill, then tilt the window up and into place. You'll need a helper waiting inside to center the window. Next, the helper will raise the window with a few shims and adjust them to make sure the bottom of the window is level. When it's level and centered, drive a nail in the very bottom hole on each side flange.

PLUMB AND SQUARE THE WINDOW

Hold the window in place with a few sets of shims on both sides of the window, a pair that holds the top and one toward the bottom. Adjust the shims so the sides of the window are plumb. Once the bottom is level and the sides are plumb, drive a nail into the top hole of each side flange. The real test is how the window operates; don't nail it off until it operates smoothly.

1 ONAIL THE FLANGE

When you've centered the window and it's level and plumb and operates smoothly, drive nails in all the holes on the top and sides. Don't nail the bottom flange. Then install the drip cap that came with the window.



1 COVER NAIL PENETRATIONS

As an added measure against water intrusion, cover nails in the flange with flashing tape. Start with the sides and extend the tape a few inches past the bottom and top nail flanges. Then cover the top flange, making sure it overlaps the tape covering the sides.

12INSTALL Z-FLASHING AND TRIM

Install Z-flashing above the top piece of trim. It should be cut to the same length and tucked under the water-resistant barrier (tar paper or house wrap) and will shed water over the trim. Then install the trim using coated trim screws.


3 REPLACE SIDING

Our siding is double-course cedar shakes, which we were able to match easily. Caulk around the window and trim using a high-









he usual way to replace a door is to tear out the old jamb and install a new "prehung" door. Often that's a good way to go. But in my older house, that would have meant ordering a custom jamb width, fussing with tricky interior trim for hours and cutting back the hardwood flooring. So I chose to put a new door in the old jamb. This did require some extra work; I had to move hinges and strike plates for the latch and dead bolt. But I still think it was faster and easier.

You can skip those steps If you're lucky when you hang your new door and the new hardware locations match the old. I'll show you how to change out a door slab and trim and how to solve problems along the way.



To complete the new look, we replaced the dated light fixture, house numbers and mailbox with modern matte black options.





1 REMOVE THE OLD DOOR

Unscrew the hinges from both the new door and the existing door, then set the new door in place to find out if the strike plates and hinges line up with the old ones. If they do, screw the hinges into the jamb and consider yourself luckyand skip to Photo 6. If the new hinges don't line up, draw a line from the bottom hinge to the top that connects the back edges of the hinges. It will help you place the new hinges later.

PLUG THE HOLES Glue pine blocks into the latch and dead bolt holes. When the glue sets, cut the blocks flush with a chisel. Glue thin strips of pine into the hinge mortises.



WHAT IT TAKES

COST \$350 and up

SKILLLEVEL Intermediate

Drill, pry bar, oscillating tool, router plus a bit/ sharp chisel, circular saw or miter saw

MATERIALS

All-purpose wood filler, two 8-ft. 1x2s (plugs plus jamb extensions), Z-flashing

TILL THE GAPS Smooth over the plugs with auto body filler. The filler hardens fast; you can apply two coats if needed and sand it flat, all in about 30 minutes.

4 MARK THE HINGE LOCATIONS

Cut two blocks of scrap wood to the height of the threshold plus 1/8 in. Set the door onto the blocks and move the door into position. Make sure the new hinges are on the line you drew along the old hinges. Then temporarily attach the door with one screw in each hinge. Trace the hinges with a sharp pencil and remove the door.

CUT MORTISES

Follow the traced line with a utility blade, making this cut as deep as the hinge is thick. Then, with a chisel at the edge of the jamb, establish the depth of the mortise and work your way from the top down. Cut with the bevel of the chisel down to keep the blade from digging in. When you reach the knife line, the chips should fall away. Hinge-mortising router jigs make this job easy and fast, but if I have only one door to do, I cut the mortises by hand.













6 INSTALL THE DOOR AND ADJUST THE THRESHOLD

Place the door back on the blocks, predrill and screw the hinges in the new mortises. To make the fit airtight, turn the adjustment screws to move the threshold up or down. You want the door sweep to be pinched slightly when the door is closed.

7 LINE UP THE DEAD BOLT AND LATCH

Use chalk or lipstick to coat the ends of the dead bolt and door latch. Retract the dead bolt and latch as you close the door all the way, then turn the handles to let them contact the jamb. Use a 7/8-in. Forstner bit to drill holes where the latch and dead bolt touched the jamb. Place the strike plate over the hole and trace and cut mortises as you did for the hinges.

REMOVE THE OLD TRIM

Cut any caulking between the trim and the siding with a utility knife. Otherwise, you might lift the siding as you pull off the trim. Take care to not dent the doorjamb as you pry the trim away.

UPGRADE YOUR TRIM

One advantage of putting a new door in an existing jamb is that you don't have to fuss with the trim. But, I didn't think the old brickmold trim fit the sleek style of the new door. So I replaced the old trim with Boral TruExterior trim (see p. 14). Here's how I did it.



CUT THE SIDING If your new trim is wider than the old, you'll need to cut back the siding. I used 3-1/2-in.-wide trim and wanted a 1/4-in. reveal on the doorjamb as well as some wiggle room for caulking, so I traced a line 3-7/8 in. in from the door-

jamb. An oscillating tool worked

well to cut my cedar shake siding.

INSTALL NEW TRIM

Cut a length of Z-flashing 1/4 in. wider than the top piece of trim. Tuck the flashing under the existing tar paper or house wrap. The sheathing on my house was about 1/4 in. proud of the jamb, so I cut a 1/4-in. jamb extension to let the trim sit flat. I tacked the extension 1/8 in. from the edge of the jamb.

11 FASTEN THE TRIM

Screw the trim to the sheathing and doorjamb with trim-head screws every 24 in. Since my trim is wider than the sill, I cut a notch around the sill. To finish up, caulk along the siding, fill the screw holes and paint.





SIDEWALK TRANSFORMATION

■his sidewalk was just your basic concrete—in pretty good shape but with zero curb appeal. To change that, I considered tile, stone and even complete replacement. Then I discovered "overlay," a cementbased topping for existing concrete. It's used mostly by pros, but I found a supplier who provided materials and rental tools and encouraged me to do it myself. I'm glad I did! With a helper, it's a manageable process, and the total cost was about \$800, less than one-fifth of the pro bid I got.

Prep your sidewalk

Old sidewalks are seldom perfect, but this one was in decent shape, without any cracks. If yours has cracks, you'll need to properly repair them before applying an overlay. If you don't, those cracks will promptly transfer to your new overlay. If your sidewalk has some heaves or uneven sections, you'll need to grind them reasonably level before applying an overlay. In this case, I just needed to thoroughly clean the sidewalk. This included edging it to remove any overgrowth, sweeping off debris and pressurewashing with a degreasing detergent.

STAMPABLE OVERLAY is a highstrength polymer-modified cement.

BOND COAT is an acrylic primer that helps the overlay stick to the old concrete.

LIQUID RELEASE is typically a petroleum-based liquid that helps prevent stamps from sticking to the overlay.

SLED-STYLE GAUGE RAKE

This rake lets you skip filling control joints but leaves larger tracks to smooth out.

CAM-STYLE GAUGE RAKE

Small cams on the ends of this rake leave a relatively track-free surface, but the cams will dip into the control joints if they're not filled.



WHAT IT TAKES

TIME COST 3 days \$3 to \$4 per square foot

SKILLLEVEL Intermediate

TOOLS Pressure washer, heavy-duty drill, squeegee, gauge rake, concrete stamps, brick jointer, grout line roller

stamping mats with an ashlar pattern, and a thinner, more flexible texture mat. The texture mat has no grout lines, so it works well for vertical surfaces and applying texture in areas where the standard stamps don't go quite deep enough. Some home centers stock them, or you can rent them from a local rental center.







FILL THE JOINTS Fill the control joints to create a flat surface for the gauge rake to follow (Photo 1). Otherwise you'll end up with dips in the overlay. The concrete mix I had on hand filled the joints, but mortar mix would have been easier to work with. I marked the joint locations with garden tags so I could recut them later (see

Photo 2 inset).

PRIME THE CONCRETE

For a strong bond, the overlay requires a special primer that must be covered with overlay within two hours. At first, my helper and I primed only a few feet of sidewalk. But after mixing and pouring our first bag of overlay, we realized we'd be able to move pretty quickly, so we primed the whole sidewalk.

3 ADD COLOR
We wanted to darken our overlay a little, so we added powdered pigment to the water and thoroughly mixed it before adding the overlay mix.

Thorough mixing is a must. Use a heavy-duty corded drill with a 1/2-in. chuck and a mixing paddle. If you don't have a heavy-duty drill, get one. (I burned up a standard drill while mixing this stuff!) With the Brickform product, after initial mixing, allow it to set, or "slake," for three to five minutes, and then mix again.









Pour the overlay onto the primed surface. This product required a thickness of 3/8 in., so I used a gauge rake in order to get a consistent depth. A gauge rake has an adjustable cam or foot on each end, allowing you to set the depth you need. Rake carefully, pulling and pushing the product for even coverage. Don't let the cams slip off the edge of the sidewalk.

After raking, smooth the overlay with a standard floor squeegee. At first I found the squeegee a little difficult to control because the edge wanted to dig into the overlay. But I got better with practice!

COAT THE STAMPS

Spray each stamp with a liquid release to keep the overlay from sticking to the stamp. We used a garden pump sprayer, which proved easier than a trigger-type spray bottle.

Stamp the Overlay
Set each stamp down carefully,
the whole stamp at once. Don't slide
them, drag them or set one corner
down first. Walk on each stamp to
ensure a full, deep texture. If necessary, use a tamping tool to force the
stamp down. Don't use a cast iron
tamper, though. The hard edges
can dent the texture. Instead, use a
soft-faced tamper.

3 RECUT CONTROL

Once the overlay has hardened, mark and recut the control joints. Caution: As we were stamping, a couple of our stamps didn't come out perfectly square with the control joints. So, when we recut those, we cheated them a little bit to keep the cuts square with the pattern. One of those cracked at the original control joint within a week. So, as you're applying the stamps, take care to keep the pattern square with the control joints.

APPLY STAIN Mix the concentrated stain with water in a gallon jug, and then apply it using a hand sprayer. Apply generously, allowing the stain to pool in the low spots. Those pooled areas end up darker, giving a more natural stone look.

5 SEAL IT AND YOU'RE DONE!

When the stain is completely dry, use a paint roller to seal the overlay. Unlike applying the stain, don't allow the sealer to puddle, because it won't cure properly. We used a brush to fully coat the grout lines and also on the stoop to get up close to the house.





HOW TO REMOVE ROOF STAINS
To see an immediate improvement, you'll need to climb onto your roof, spray it with a cleaning solution and rinse with water. A cleaning solution and water will remove most algae stains right away, but some can be especially difficult. If you have a steep roof, it's best to call a pro. Here's

1. MIX A HOMEMADE SOLUTION

how I cleaned my roof.

To save money, I opted to make my own solution. Commercial roof cleaners are available at most home centers, but they're expensive and won't work any better than a homemade solution. Plus, it's easy to make your own. Mix 15 oz. of an oxygen bleach powder (I used OxiClean Stain Remover, available at home centers for about \$12) with 2 gallons of warm tap water in a garden sprayer. Don't use chlorinated bleach; it'll kill the lawn and plants on the ground below.

2. SPRAY THE SHINGLES

Once you're on the roof, start at the edge and spray the shingles with your homemade solution, working your way up to the ridge. A wet roof is a slippery roof, so leave a dry path back to your ladder. Allow the solution to sit for 20 minutes before rinsing. Tough stains may require an additional application and a mild scrubbing with a stiff-bristle brush.

3. RINSE WITH A GARDEN HOSE

After you've waited for the solution to do its work, douse the roof with a garden hose, clearing suds and algae off the shingles. You'll see a big improvement unless your stains are especially stubborn. Never use a pressure washer to clean the algae; the roof will be clean, but its life will be shortened by the loss of granules.




WHERE TO INSTALL ZINC STRIP

Zinc strips work only on areas directly downhill. So if you have dormers, ungalvanized roof vents, valleys, roofs under gables or any other sections that could obstruct the flow of zinc, install zinc strip in those locations too.

Zinc strip locations

HOW TO INSTALL IT



1. SLIDE IT UNDER THE SHINGLES

Start at the beginning of the ridge and gently pry up the cap shingles with a crowbar. Roll out 2 ft. of zinc strip and slide it no more than 1 in. under the cap shingles.



2. FASTEN UNDER THE SHINGLE

Fasten with galvanized rubber washer nails under the shingles. You can also use an exterior construction adhesive. Continue to fasten the zinc strip every 12 in. until you've reached the end of the ridge and then clip it to length with scissors. I found cutting the zinc strip at the end saved time and kept it from flapping around in the wind.

Zinc strip test

Zinc strip is often marketed as a moss, fungus and algae preventer, but not as a remover. However, expert home inspector Reuben Saltzman installed zinc strip on a moss-covered roof to see if it would remove the moss over time. As you can see in the before and after photos, it significantly reduced the moss and algae. So, if you don't mind waiting, you can skip the cleaning and let zinc strip do the job.





Replace your roof with algae-resistant shingles

If you're in the market to reshingle your roof, consider installing algae-resistant shingles. They'll keep your roof looking great and cost about the same as standard shingles.


LANDSCAPE DESIGN

12 easy ways to improve curb appeal

recently purchased a new home, and improving the landscape is high on my to-do list. Landscape design, however, isn't always straightforward, and achieving a great look requires a little nuance. The stakes are also high: If you get it wrong, you might end up with dead plants and an ugly yard for all your hard work. Still, DIYers can save roughly 40 to 60 percent of the cost of a professional landscaper and dramatically boost their house's curb appeal. So, to get it right, I spoke with a landscaping expert, who shared these quick tips.




DEVISE A MASTER PLAN

Most people tackle landscaping headfirst without thinking about the grand picture. Eventually, they end up with a jumble of plants that don't look right with the house or one another. Start with the end goal in mind for the best look. If you don't feel up to the design task, get help. A landscape architect will typically charge \$600 to \$3,500 to visit your home and create a plan; costs vary by the size of your property and the work to be done. Many garden centers offer free design services if you purchase the materials from them.

LEAVE A PATH TO THE

If there's an addition or new patio in your future, leave a path for machinery. You don't want to tear out shrubs or a retaining wall later so a skid steer can reach the backyard.



PLAN FOR ALL-SEASON COLOR

You want your plants to bloom throughout the growing season. When you're developing a plan, know the bloom time for each plant, and choose coordinating colors for plants blossoming at the same time. Design your landscape to highlight different plants during each season. It's fun to see individual plants have their day in the sunlight.





TO THE HOUSE

It's common for homeowners to plant large shrubs and other plants too close to their house's foundation and siding. Then the owner prunes them back and they eventually become half a plant. For a better look, plant shrubs farther away from the house and give them room to grow. A general rule is to take the plant's mature width and put it at least half that distance away from the house.

LETTING THEM GROW UNCHECKED

Because shrubs are relatively low maintenance, they're easy to neglect. Overlooked for years, they grow out of control and hide the house, crowd doorways and look ugly. Drastic trimming or removing them might be the best and easiest thing you could do for your front yard.



FOR DRAMA, CHOOSE WHITE AND YELLOW

Red and purple are vivid colors, but in a landscape, yellow and white flowers are the real attention grabbers. They stand out more against green foliage while others tend to disappear. So, if you want an eye-catching landscape, use yellow and white flowers.



TEST YOUR SOIL

Good soil is the key to healthy plants. A simple test will tell you whether you need to add lime, nitrogen, phosphorus or potassium to the soil. Dig 6 in. and scoop samples from 5 to 10 areas in your yard and mix them in a bucket. You can purchase an at-home soil testing kit at most home centers, but for best results, send your soil sample to a state-certified soiltesting lab or university extension service. To find yours, enter "university extension service" and your state in a search engine. Testing fees are usually \$15 to \$20, and results take one to two weeks.



sections of your landscape. For example, if you use red at your walkway, use red at the side of your house as well. This technique gives your design continuity and balance. Remember, foliage is color too!

IF YOU PLAN TO SELL, START PLANTING NOW

Improving your landscaping is a great way to boost the curb appeal-and selling price-of a home. But remember that most plants take time to get established and look their best. If you hope to sell in midsummer, get started in early spring, or better yet, the year before you plan to sell.

DON'T PUT POLY UNDER WOOD MULCH

Putting poly under wood mulch prevents the decomposing mulch from enriching the soil. Instead, place a 4-in. layer of wood mulch on the soil to block sunlight from reaching it. Like poly, this prevents weeds. But unlike poly, it will naturally decompose, providing nutrients to your plants. You'll have to add mulch as needed.



PREVENT WEEDS WITH MASS PLANTING

Weeds will pop up wherever light reaches the soil. To make your landscaping low maintenance, place plants tightly together so weeds can't get started.

BEST PRO TIPS





PLAN FOR GROWTH

Before buying a plant, check the tag for its mature size. Keep in mind that many plants grow larger than the tag indicates. Knowing the maximum size—and allowing a little extra—helps you avoid a crowded, overgrown look later.



PLANT IN RANDOM PATTERNS

In a formal garden, you may see plants all lined up, but most residential landscapes look best with a more casual design like the one shown here. Planting in random or zigzag patterns provides good ground coverage with fewer plants, and these arrangements are visually interesting too.

CUSTOM SHUTTERS

The size, style and color you want—for less than the cost of plastic shutters

y hunt for manufactured decorative shutters got me nowhere—I found only very limited selections of sizes, styles and colors. Then it occurred to me that it would be simpler and quicker to build my own. Cheaper, too. My DIY shutters cost less than most of the plastic versions I saw.




Materials

In addition to 1x4 boards, you'll need 1-in. nails, 2-in. exterior screws, waterproof wood glue and painting or finishing supplies.

My design is simple, just four 1x4 boards joined by a cleat. The details are what make the shutters special. I'll show you how to cut notches in the boards to create attractive shadow lines and how to reduce the thickness of the cleats for a refined appearance.

Measure, then buy materials


Before going to the home center, measure your windows to determine the height of the shutters so you can figure out the length of boards you need. For the most authentic look, measure from the top of the window frame (not including the window trim) to the top of the windowsill and build your shutters this height. Use these measurements to make your lumber list. Each pair of shutters requires eight 1x4 boards and an additional 5 ft. of 1x4 for the cleats.

I chose Boral TruExterior trim boards for my shutters (see p. 14 for more information). Inexpensive pine boards would also be fine, but you'd have to be vigilant about repainting them in the future. Any moisture entering the wood would quickly lead to rot. If you prefer a rustic look, cedar with a transparent or semitransparent stain would be a good choice. Whatever you choose, be careful to pick out straight boards with undamaged edges.

Mounting the shutters

I used 2-in. exterior trim-head screws to mount my shutters (one screw in each corner). This approach will work with most wood, vinyl, aluminum and steel siding. If you have a stucco or masonry exterior, you'll have to mark the screw hole locations on the exterior and drill holes to accept plastic masonry anchors. Light-duty anchors are fine for this job. For more information, search for "masonry anchors" at familyhandyman.com.





RESAW SAFELY

You'll have to remove the blade guard to resaw boards, so it's essential that you use a push block to keep your fingers well away from the blade. Also mount a feather-board to the saw just in front of the blade. You can make a featherboard or buy one. This Kreg model (Photo 3) costs about \$25 online.

CUT BOARDS TO LENGTH

Every pair of shutters requires eight boards of the same length. For fast, accurate cuts, use a stop block. Screw the block to a board that's about 6 in. longer than your shutter height. Clamp the board to your miter saw fence so that the distance from the blade to the block equals the shutter height. Then simply slide the end of the board against the block and make your cut.

NOTCH THE BOARDS

Six of the eight boards are notched along one edge, creating an attractive shadow line between the boards. To cut the notches, clamp a sacrificial board to your table saw fence. Position the board against the blade and set the blade height at 1/4 in. Run the boards across the blade, move the fence slightly away from the blade and then run them across a second time to get a notch 1/8 in. wide.

3 You could use 3/4-in.-thick stock for the cleats, but I think thinner cleats look better. To "resaw" the cleats to 1/2 in. thick, set the blade height at 1-7/8 in. and the fence 1/2 in. from the blade. With the board on edge, make the first cut. Then turn the board over and make the second cut.

4 ASSEMBLE THE SHUTTERS

Arrange the boards on your workbench and clamp them together. Measure the width across the four boards and cut cleats to that length. Then, using one of the cleats as a guide, draw lines 3-1/2 in. from each end. Apply waterproof wood glue to the cleats and fasten them with 1-in. nails. Let the shutters rest for at least an hour before painting or finishing.


Quick and simple ways to get organized





Handy hardware bucket

Finding the right fastener will be a whole lot easier with this sectioned storage bucket. To make one, round up a plastic 5-gallon bucket (\$3 at a home center) and some scrap plywood.

Use a jigsaw to cut the bucket holes as shown, then saw the lower pair of partitions, slightly angling the ends to fit snugly against the bucket sides. Saw notches halfway down the center of the partitions so they can interlock. Set the pair in the bucket. Next, cut the lower circle and drop it into the bucket over the first pair of partitions. Cut the upper pair of partitions, put them in, and cut and add the upper circle. Create the "egg carton" partition to fit on top and screw or nail it to the upper circle.









Lattice rack

Plastic lattice works well in the garage for storing long lengths of miscellaneous pipe, trim, flashing and conduit. Just cut matching pieces, then screw 2x4 cleats to the ceiling. Next, screw the lattice to the wall studs and cleats. Now you can quickly find those oddball leftovers instead of going to the hardware store and buying yet another piece.



New angle on small tool storage

Find a bare spot on a wall or workbench and screw on a 2-ft. piece of 2-in.-wide slotted angle iron, available at home centers. It's the perfect hangout for screwdrivers, bits, safety glasses and sanding drums.

clamping TIPS

Spring clamps


Clever solutions, better results

First things first. Here are three basic types of clamps that belong in any workshop:

Pipe clamps are the everyday highpressure workhorses of woodworking. They cost just \$15 per set, plus a few bucks more for pipes. Because you can quickly screw the clamps onto different lengths of pipe, one set of pipe clamps does the same work as several lengths of bar clamps. Buy pipes in 2-, 3- and 4-ft. lengths and you'll be ready for most situations.

Bar clamps are quicker and easier to use than pipe clamps. Light-duty bar clamps are perfect when you need a long reach and moderate pressure. They cost \$10 and up.

Spring clamps are the fastest helpers for holding your work in place or doing light-pressure clamping. They're cheap, too:
Most cost less than \$5.

The moisture in glue triggers a reaction between iron and chemicals in wood (called "tannins"). The result is black stains on the wood, especially with tannin-rich woods like oak or walnut. A strip of wax paper creates a barrier between the clamp and the wood. I also use wax paper to keep glue off my cauls.





Long-jaw hand screw

Extend the reach of your hand screw clamps with a couple of lengths of scrap wood. Screw the jaw extensions to the side of your hand screw clamp and away you go. Works great and couldn't be easier.



No-clamp veneer trick

Gluing down veneer is tough. You have to apply even pressure over every square inch. There are fancy tools for this, but for small veneer jobs, try this trick: Apply a thin coat of wood glue to both the substrate and the back of your veneer. Let the glue dry. Then position the veneer and use a hot iron (no steam) to reactivate the glue. Then press the veneer into place. The bond is almost instant and very strong.





Cauls keep glue-ups flat and flush

As you squeeze boards together with pipe clamps, they sometimes arch or slip out of alignment. Pairs of upper and lower cauls are the solution. Lightly squeeze the cauls with bar clamps, then tighten the pipe clamps, then tighten the cauls a bit more. Repeat these adjustments until the boards are joined flush and flat.

Two-by-fours make great cauls. I carefully select ones that have a slight bend, or "crown," along the 1-1/2-in. edge—but no twist or warp. A crown is an advantage because it creates extra pressure in the middle of the caul. Label all your cauls with an arrow marking the direction of the crown and the length of the caul.



Shift clamps to square

To check the squareness of a cabinet frame or box, take diagonal measurements. If the measurements aren't equal, shift the position of the clamps. In this photo, I exaggerated the shift for clarity. In most cases, a slight shift will do the trick. Sometimes, shifting just one clamp will pull the assembly into square.



Water pressure

Some woodworkers keep a stack of bricks in the shop for those times when weight is better than clamps. But I think plastic buckets make the best weights. Filled with water, they provide a lot of weight. When empty, they're light, easy to store and handy for other jobs.

What are antimicrobials?

Antimicrobials are chemicals that kill certain organisms—bacteria, viruses, fungi or protozoa—collectively known as microbes. These microbes are often called germs because some can cause illnesses such as influenza. But not all of them cause illness, and some are actually beneficial to our health. In short, antimicrobials are designed to kill living organisms.

What's the purpose of antimicrobials?

Antimicrobials came into use in building materials—paint, carpet, flooring, countertops, hardware—starting about 1994, initially in the health care market in an attempt to decrease hospital-acquired infections. Currently, we're seeing building materials for residential use as well as thousands of common household and personal care products infused with antimicrobials. Historically, antimicrobials were simply used as preservatives for the product itself, but now they're often added and advertised as also being beneficial to our health.

Do they work?

Antimicrobials do kill microbes, both harmful and beneficial ones. However, studies by the CDC (Centers for Disease Control) have shown no evidence that they have any positive effect on our overall health. In fact, it's becoming clear that antimicrobials contribute to the development of "superbugs," which cause illnesses that are resistant to antibiotics.

Further, evidence is mounting that they may have unintended negative consequences for the environment because they leach into soil and water. In addition, there is no objective science showing that antimicrobials added to building products are having any beneficial impact at all. Coming full circle, hospitals are now moving away from products that contain antimicrobials.

The bottom line

There's no evidence that household products containing antimicrobials are good for our health. So, if you're thinking that antimicrobial-infused products will help fend off illness, think again. The most effective way to prevent the spread of germs is still to thoroughly wash your hands with plain old soap and water.

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
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QUICK FIX FOR A LEAKY PIPE

If you have a slight leak in a copper pipe joint, you might be able to fix it without disassembling and resoldering. First, shut off the water and drain the pipe. Start heating the joint, brush on some flux and continue applying heat until the solder melts and fills the gap. Let the joint cool, and then turn on the water to test the joint. If it still leaks, you'll have to disassemble and resolder, but you won't have lost much time trying this first. And if it does work, you'll have saved some time!

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MESH NETWORK FOR STRONG WI-FI

What is a mesh network?

A traditional router sends one signal that radiates out like ripples from a stone dropped in water. A mesh network has a main hub and several nodes placed around the house. The nodes receive the signal from the main hub, spreading coverage throughout your home. The nodes connect wirelessly, or you can hardwire them using CAT 5 or 6. A mesh system costs about \$300 to \$400.

What are the benefits?

TOTAL COVERAGE

The main benefit is reliable signal strength throughout your house. With a hardwired mesh network, there is no drop-off in signal strength. Wireless has very minimal drop-off. Some nodes have a CAT 5 or 6 port, so you can connect your device directly. The signal improvements from a mesh network are most noticeable in homes larger than 2,000 sq. ft.

RELIABILITY

Unlike with a standard router, if one of the nodes breaks down, your network still functions. There may be a dip in efficiency, but you'll still have coverage.

THE ABILITY TO BYPASS OBSTACLES

A traditional router has to blast a signal through obstacles or rely on signals bouncing off walls to reach all corners of a home. A mesh router avoids obstacles by using multiple distribution points. Using several nodes, improving coverage is as simple as adjusting one node's position or adding another node. If you have masonry walls or many other electronics, a mesh network lets you boost the signal in key spots.

SOLID SECURITY

Mesh routers have excellent security support. They're easy to manage, so you're more likely to keep your network devices updated and secure. Many mesh routers update firmware automatically. Also, you can monitor which devices are using the signal, turn zones off completely or set hours when the network is active.

EASE OF SETUP


After the setup, any adjustments are typically done through a smartphone app.

WHY NOT USE A WI-FI EXTENDER?

Extenders do help with coverage, but the signal strength is typically cut in half. Also, when using laptops or tablets in an area covered by the extender, you'll need to sign in to the extender.

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

MESH NETWORK


The router sends out the signal, which is picked up by nodes throughout the house, with little to no drop in signal strength.


THE TROUBLE WITH WHOLE-HOUSE **HUMIDIFIERS**

Whole-house humidifiers make dry, brutal winters far more comfortable indoors. Unfortunately, if you have a manual humidifier, the problems might outweigh the benefits. With manual humidifiers, you need to know the outdoor temperature hours in advance and adjust the humidity accordingly, every day. Few people actually do this. Most people just select a middle setting and never touch it again. As a result, home inspectors regularly find frost- and mold-covered attics, damaged windows and ruined ceilings.

Automatic whole-house humidifiers, on the other hand, have an outdoor temperature sensor so they can adjust the humidity level for you. If you do have a manual humidifier, either leave it off or do the daily work of keeping it properly adjusted.






What's the plastic cap on my hose bib?

Many building codes require house bibs, also called sillcocks, to include an anti-siphon feature. This feature prevents the formation of a vacuum that could pull water from the outside into the clean water supply. While you can retrofit backflow preventers to standard spigots, frost-proof hose bibs have one built in, and that's what you'll find beneath that plastic cap.

The two main components are a bonnet, or port, and a spring-loaded disc called a poppet. These are sealed with rubber gaskets. Over time, water can leak from under the cap, but the repair for that is simple. Just remove the cap, either by prying it off or unscrewing it, then remove the components inside. Flush the opening to eliminate any debris that could prevent the poppet from sealing tightly. If any parts are broken or missing, replace them using one of the repair kits offered by most manufacturers.



Washing machine lid switch

If your washing machine fills but won't spin, check the lid switch. If the switch is bad, your machine won't spin. A new switch is less than \$20 and takes minutes to install.

If your switch has a wiring harness, unplug it and test the side of the harness that connects to the switch. If there's no wiring harness, test directly on the switch's terminals.

To test, move your multimeter dial to the lowest ohms
setting. Zero the meter, and
then touch the probes to the
"line" and "machine" terminals.
The meter should read zero.
Touch the probes to the "line"
and "motor" terminals. The
meter should again read zero.
If it doesn't pass both tests,
replace the switch.

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




Don't crowd YOUR ELECTRICAL PANEL

When you're remodeling, it's tempting to gain some living space by building walls close to the electrical panel. But that might come back to haunt you during an inspection or when you sell your home. Here are the space requirements as outlined by the NEC (National Electrical Code):

- **1.** There must be 3 ft. of working clearance in front of the panel.
- 2. The width of the working space needs to be at least 30 in. (the panel isn't required to be centered on the 30-in. width).
- 3. The panel door must open at least 90 degrees.
- **4.** For new construction, the height of the working space needs to be at least 6.5 ft. (there is an exception for existing homes).
- 5. The area above and below the panel is reserved for other electrical equipment, which can't extend more than 6 in. beyond the front of the panel.
- 6. Illumination is required for all working spaces at electrical panels.
- **7.** The required working space cannot be used for storage. Think of it this way: You should have a clear area about the size of a refrigerator in front of the electrical panel.



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
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
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
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
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
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


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
