


From your garage or basement or dedicated shop, keep flying your own DIY flag.

#### What should I tell my doctor before taking IMBRUVICA®?

#### Before taking IMBRUVICA®, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have had recent surgery or plan to have surgery. Your healthcare provider may stop IMBRUVICA® for any planned medical, surgical, or dental procedure.
- have bleeding problems
- have or had heart rhythm problems, smoke, or have a medical condition that increases your risk of heart disease, such as high blood pressure, high cholesterol, or diabetes
- · have an infection
- have liver problems
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. IMBRUVICA® can harm your unborn baby. If you are able to become pregnant, your healthcare provider will do a pregnancy test before starting treatment with IMBRUVICA®. Tell your healthcare provider if you are pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with IMBRUVICA®.
  - Females who are able to become pregnant should use effective birth control (contraception) during treatment with IMBRUVICA® and for 1 month after the last dose.
  - Males with female partners who are able to become pregnant should use
    effective birth control, such as condoms, during treatment with IMBRUVICA® and
    for 1 month after the last dose.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed during treatment with IMBRUVICA® and for 1 week after the last dose.

**Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take**, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Taking IMBRUVICA® with certain other medicines may affect how IMBRUVICA® works and can cause side effects.

#### What should I avoid while taking IMBRUVICA®?

Do not drink grapefruit juice, eat grapefruit, or eat Seville oranges (often used in marmalades) during treatment with IMBRUVICA®. These products may increase the amount of IMBRUVICA® in your blood.

#### What are the possible side effects of IMBRUVICA®?

#### IMBRUVICA® may cause serious side effects, including:

- Bleeding problems (hemorrhage) are common during treatment with IMBRUVICA®, and can also be serious and may lead to death. Your risk of bleeding may increase if you are also taking a blood thinner medicine. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any signs of bleeding, including:
  - blood in your stools or black stools (looks like tar)
  - o pink or brown urine
  - unexpected bleeding, or bleeding that is severe or that you cannot control
  - vomit blood or vomit looks like coffee grounds
  - o cough up blood or blood clots

during treatment with IMBRUVICA®.

- o increased bruising
- o dizziness
- o weakness
- o confusion
- o change in your speech
- headache that lasts a long time or severe headache
- **Infections** can happen during treatment with IMBRUVICA®. These infections can be serious and may lead to death. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you have fever, chills, weakness, confusion, or other signs or symptoms of an infection

- Decrease in blood cell counts. Decreased blood counts (white blood cells, platelets, and red blood cells) are common with IMBRUVICA®, but can also be severe. Your healthcare provider should do monthly blood tests to check your blood counts.
- Heart problems. Serious heart rhythm problems (ventricular arrhythmias, atrial fibrillation and atrial flutter), heart failure and death have happened in people treated with IMBRUVICA®, especially in people who have an increased risk for heart disease, have an infection, or who have had heart rhythm problems in the past. Tell your healthcare provider if you get any symptoms of heart problems, such as feeling as if your heart is beating fast and irregular, lightheadedness, dizziness, shortness of breath, swelling of the feet, ankles or legs, chest discomfort, or you faint. If you develop any of these symptoms, your healthcare provider may do a test to check your heart (ECG) and may change your IMBRUVICA® dose.
- High blood pressure (hypertension). New or worsening high blood pressure has
  happened in people treated with IMBRUVICA<sup>®</sup>. Your healthcare provider may start you
  on blood pressure medicine or change current medicines to treat your blood pressure.
- **Second primary cancers.** New cancers have happened during treatment with IMBRUVICA®, including cancers of the skin or other organs.
- Tumor lysis syndrome (TLS). TLS is caused by the fast breakdown of cancer cells.
  TLS can cause kidney failure and the need for dialysis treatment, abnormal heart
  rhythm, seizure, and sometimes death. Your healthcare provider may do blood tests to
  check you for TLS.

I used to keep several hole saws in my toolbox to cut drywall for plumbing, electrical, and recessed lighting, but I no longer need them. This Milwaukee hole cutter cuts 2- to 7-in. holes in 1/4-in. increments, and a quick lock adjustment makes setting a breeze. The debris shield keeps the dust out of your face and minimizes cleanup. It takes up far less space in my toolbox than my hole saws and is sturdy enough for day-in, day-out use. The cutter costs \$35 at home stores and online.

If you need more "oomph" than your garden hose nozzle can supply, but you don't want to go all out and rent or buy a pressure washer, try a highpressure wand for your garden hose. The Hydro Jet Power Washer Nozzle has easy-tochange spray tips-jet, fan or conical-and can handle most light-duty pressure washing chores. I found it perfect for flushing out my gutters and washing off splashes on my lower siding. It doesn't have the power of a pressure washer, but it's a significant step up from a hose nozzle. I've always loved duck-cloth work pants and shorts for their durability. But when it's hot, they do get uncomfortable. These Dickies Tough Max shorts, however, are duck cloth with Lycra, making them breathable and flexible without sacrificing durability. They have the classic triple-stitched and riveted construction with a hammer loop and two utility pockets, one large enough for an average-size cell phone. How many times have you encountered a nut or a bolt

in a tight spot with zero room to swing a ratchet handle? An ordinary ratchet handle might give a few clicks for several short swings, but a rotary-action ratchet wrench like this Blackhawk Rotator Ratchet will get the job done quicker. Set the drive direction as you would normally and then rotate the handle to spin your socket. It works like a conventional ratchet wrench, so you can still get leverage when you need it. This 3/8-in. Blackhawk model costs about \$45 online. Quarter-inch and 1/2-in. drive versions are also available.

The original "hippie soap," Dr. Bronner's 18-in-1 Pure-Castile Soap has persevered into the 21st century, making it more than a counterculture fad. It's often used as a body wash for a tingly clean feeling, but don't overlook its 17 other recommended uses. Despite its safe, nontoxic formula, I've yet to get up the nerve to brush my teeth with it, but it's an excellent multipurpose household cleaner and laundry and dish soap.

It now comes in eight scents, each with unique attributes. Tea tree and lavender are said to be effective for controlling kitchen ants. The liquid version (bar soap is also available) comes in a variety of sizes up to a gallon jug. A 16-oz. bottle costs about \$12. This size is just big enough to make the crazy 3,000 or so words on the label readable, always good for cosmic insights and a little brain cleansing too!



### More projects for your recip saw

eciprocating saws replace the back-and-forth motion of a human arm, only at an accelerated rate. Previously only cutting blades were available for reciprocating saws. Now Spyder, Milwaukee and others make additional attachments that let you use it for other tasks.

I recently made quick work of extracting a few broken floor tiles with Spyder's grout removal tool and 4-in. scraper blade. I wouldn't attempt to take out an entire tile floor-a task better suited for a small demo hammer-but for light jobs like this, the tool was perfect. I could see it being effective at removing carpet adhesive or other gummy residue as well. Spyder's wire brush attachment would also speed up small-scale paint prep work. For about \$25, you can find a Spyder combo pack with 2-, 4- and 6-in. scrapers. Its 1/16- or 3/16-in. grout removal tools cost about \$10, and the wire brush is about \$15. All the attachments are available online and at home centers.







# EASY TILE REMOVAL

To remove a damaged vinyl tile that needs replacement, put a cloth down on the tile. Then hold a medium hot iron on it for about 10 seconds. The heat will soften the adhesive backing; the cloth will keep the tile from melting. Tease a corner free with the tip of a utility knife and the tile will peel right up. This works with both peel-and-stick and glue-down tiles.

Tidy paint mixing

Mixing paint is messy, but here's a neat solution. Drill a hole through the paint can or bucket lid, insert a mixer through the hole and then put the lid back on the container. Now you can mix the paint without splashing it everywhere. This works great for driveway sealant and anything else you have to mix in large quantities.

#### **CURLING IRON HOLSTERS**

I hated the messy look of my curling irons lying on the vanity or the toilet tank. They were always in the way, and the cords kept falling into the sink or onto the floor. I solved the problem with PVC pipe. I used hook-and-loop tape to attach 5-in. lengths of 2-in.-diameter pipe to the vanity door to hold my curling irons. Three-inch pieces of 1-1/2-in.-diameter pipe hold the cords. Measure your curling irons to see how long your holsters need to be. Let your curling irons cool before you store them.

# SMARIA COCK SMARIA DOCK CANIDO

y home's main entry lock needs to deliver on two equally important fronts: security and convenience. And since smart locks claim to be all about both, I decided to give one a try.

I wanted a retrofit model that didn't look like a smart lock from outside. I also knew I needed one that wasn't overly complicated to install and that my kids could regularly use with ease. That's why the August Wi-Fi Smart Lock Gen 4 was the perfect smart lock choice for my family.

#### **KEY BENEFITS**

1. RETROFIT DESIGN. It fastens on the interior of our door, so we could keep our existing dead bolt. Also, you can't tell from outside that it's a smart lock, which I like because I find many smart lock styles to be too industrial looking.

#### 2. NO MORE NEED FOR A KEY.

No more leaving keys under the front mat for friends or neighbors when they check on our house

while we're away. No more wondering if our son is going to lose his house key somewhere. No more keeping track of duplicate keys or having copies made at the hardware store. We can, however, still use a key with this lock.

#### 3. NO MORE LOCKOUTS.

We cannot physically lock ourselves out of our house anymore. With three kids coming and going, you'd be surprised how many times this has happened or almost happened.

#### 4. AUTO LOCK AND UNLOCK.

This lock can tell when you're nearby or on your way out and can be set to automatically lock or unlock the door. The lock works with not only Wi-Fi but also Bluetooth and GPS, enabling it to sense when you're in physical proximity to automatically lock and unlock your door. I can't tell you how many times I've had to set crying toddlers or armloads of groceries on the steps while I dug for my house key. No more.

**5. REMOTE ACCESS.** I can temporarily grant access to others and track who is opening and closing the door and when. The guest access option on the app grants unlimited digital keys with set time frames.

**6. EASY TO INSTALL.** It took me about 10 minutes to install it over our existing dead bolt by myself.

7. EXTRA SECURITY. You can also use your smartphone's fingerprint or facial recognition as added security verification and integration with Apple home kit, Google Assistant and Alexa. Our family doesn't use this extra security feature, but it's nice to know it's there if we ever wanted to.





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When you're decorating, matching the colors of paint and furnishings can be challenging. An app can ease the process, suggesting sample colors and giving color codes for matches from major paint manufacturers. We tried the Nix Mini

2 Color Sensor (\$100) in our homeLAB and we were impressed.

Using the small sensor and app, we sampled colors from pillows, furniture, plants and rugs, and each time the Nix app brought up several accurate color matches from

different paint brands. We then tested its accuracy by painting six color swatches on the wall. Each time, the actual manufacturer's color came up along with a few other reasonable matches. If you're beginning a major renovation

or a new home build, the Nix Mini 2 can remove a lot of color quesswork. If you're just repainting a room or two, consider Color Muse or Datacolor ColorReader EZ, which cost less, about \$60 each.

#### IF GLUE WON'T DO, TRY WELDING WITH PLÁSTIC

Light-cured bonding resins originated in dentistry in 1969 and are starting to gain a foothold in DIY. The Bondic pen came out in 2013 but is still heralded as new technology. I picked one up to see what it could do.

One end of the Bondic pen dispenses the plastic resin; the other provides the UV light required to cure it. The light won't bond resin that's hidden between two parts. You create the bond by building up the resin on the surface. For this reason, Bondic is good for connecting parts with very small contact area. It adheres to just about any material, but smooth surfaces require scuff-sanding. You can use it on larger parts if they're transparent, allowing the UV to cure the resin. I did repair some broken glassware, but with opaque materials, I found epoxy to be a better choice.

My most successful fix was a phone charger cord with frayed casing at the charger end. I was able to reattach the wire casing to the charger cord tip and conceal the exposed wire. A few repairs like that and the Bondic pen (\$25) will pay for itself.






#### Sliding doors can make the TV room a family room again

'm willing to bet that a TV is the focal point l in at least one room in your home. That's great for movie nights and sporting events, but when you're focusing on friends or family, you'd like the TV to disappear. Unlike a phone or a tablet, a TV can't just be put away, so I developed this system that lets you hide it with artwork instead!

**AUTOMATE IT!**This double sliding door belt system is slick: When you slide one door, the other slides too. To make it happen, all you need are a belt and pulleys (about \$20). Even better, I added a motor and remote control (\$50). It took a lot of experimenting, but now that I've figured out a system, you can replicate it in an hour or two. The automation is optional: You can keep it simple and slide the doors by hand.



track support arms are 1 in. narrower than the cleat to hide the track inside the finished shelf.


MOUNT THE TRACK
Drill holes in the track to line
up with the track support arms. Hold
the track in place, flush to the front
of the arms, and drill pilot holes into
the arms. Fasten the track to the
arms with wood screws. Then fasten
a nailer (H) behind the tracks and
cap the outside ends with full-height
shelf arms (F) to contain the wheels.

HANG THE DOORS

Predrill and screw two door
brackets to the top of each door,
about 4 in. from the door's edges.
Slide the door hangers into the
tracks and connect the door brackets
to the door hanger.






At this point, you could finish the shelves, add picture frames to the doors and call it a day. But for about \$70, you can add a pulley system and a DC motor so you can open the doors from your favorite seat!









ing block, then bolt the motor to the bracket. Secure the mounting block to a support arm near the end of the track, then slide the drive wheel over the shaft. Make sure the wheel is level and just below the track, then tighten the drive-wheel setscrews.

PLACE THE PULLEYS At each end of the track, screw a pulley to the shelf arm, centered on the track. I attached two more pulleys to add tension to the belt, screwing them to the nailer on each side of the drive wheel, 3 in. from the motor.






This transmitter uses two channels: one to make the motor spin clockwise, one for counterclockwise. I used the included wiring diagram to make the connections but added limit switches between the (+) lead and each "NO" terminal.

#### **POSITION THE LIMIT SWITCHES**

You'll need limit switches at each end of one track. When the wheels contact them, they tell the motor to stop. Connect lengths of wire to the "common" and "normally closed" terminals on the limit switches, then feed the wires through a hole in the top of the track. I secured the switches with strong hook-and-loop tape so I could adjust their positions.







# 10 SKIN THE SHELVES

Nail the shelf top to the arms. Then trace and cut a large notch out of the underside to fit the pulleys and the track. Nail the shelf bottom to the nailer, the cleat and the arms at the ends of the shelf. Finish it off with a hardwood fascia to cover the plywood edges. I tacked scraps to the top of the fascia to hold it while I nailed it on.

## 11 ASSEMBLE THE PICTURE FRAMES

Put the picture frames together using glue and pocket hole joinery. To keep the frame pieces flush, clamp the joints to your work surface while you drive the screws.

## 12 RABBET THE FRAMES

Rout a 1/2-in. x 3/8-in. rabbet around the inside of each frame's back. The frame screws are close to the action here. It's a good idea to remove them and reinstall them after routing. Don't make my mistake and nick the router bit!



## 13 SQUARE THE CORNERS

The router leaves a rounded corner in the rabbet. Mark the corner square and chisel it out to fit the matting and glass. Your chisel work won't be seen, so don't worry if it's a tad sloppy.

## INSTALL THE HARDWARE

Drill a recess for the turn buttons. Use a 5/8-in. Forstner bit to ensure the screw heads are flush with the frame's back surface. You'll need to do the same with the keyhole hangers. Trace the hangers, then line up the Forstner bit and drill out just enough material for the hanger to sit flush with the surface. Drill a little deeper in the center to allow room for the screw head, then clean up the recess with a chisel.

## ADD YOUR ARTWORK

I had custom matting and glass cut at the local frame shop to fit the frame and the artwork perfectly. I carefully placed a screw in the door to accept the keyhole hanger and then hung my artwork.

# NEXT-GENERATION GRILLING The outdoor grill, reinvented



e've been grilling food since the domestication of fire. By the 12th century, this outdoor ritual went indoors when we devised ovens for our "modern" kitchens. In the 1950s, cooking went outdoors again with the postwar boom that brought us the Weberstyle charcoal grill. Today, we're enjoying a outdoor cooking renaissance, with the grill becoming an essential extension of our indoor kitchens and dining rooms.

Knowing how your grill works is the secret recipe for great food. In this article, you'll learn about the operation and cooking characteristics of three popular grill types–from a few modern grilling masters.





#### PELLET GRILL


Traeger pellet grills are highly regarded and are the choice of many celebrated outdoor chefs. Diva Q is one of those chefs, and I caught up with her to find out what makes her such a devotee.

"When I first started in competitive BBQ, lots of guys were put off by a woman with a pellet grill. But once I proved myself, those same guys are now asking advice on how to use the pellet grill, wishing they'd listened when I said, 'You know I'm working smarter, not harder, right?" For Diva Q, her pellet grill yields the "most consistent results with the easiest learning curve," opening the door for grilling newbies and enabling veterans to experiment. While the new app-controlled pellet grills are easy to use, there are some essentials to learn.

"One of the key things is, not all pellets are created equal." Diva Q says the compression rate, moisture content and sourcing of the wood all play key parts in a quality pellet. Softwood is not great and is usually what's in cheap pellets. All-natural hardwood gives the best fire and flavor. The flavor profiles of apple, cherry, hickory and oak are all different. Diva Q feels it's best to establish a base flavor that's softer and then mix in a harder one like mesquite. Also, the hotter a pellet grill gets, the less smoke it produces. This is good for baking and high-temperature dishes that don't need smoke. But at temps less than 250 degrees F, "they produce all kinds of beautiful mild smoke that brings that great flavor to the food."

Most pellet grills don't sear a steak as well as a gas or charcoal grill. But Diva Q says she's learned a lot about the science of grilling, and she now knows that caramelization for the desired char from searing still happens with low, indirect heat. With a pellet grill, you can still get what's called the "Maillard reaction," which gives browned food its singular flavor, but not with the same high-heat char like on a direct heat charcoal or gas grill.

Diva Q says she can smell when the sugars are changing with low heat, and that she doesn't really need an app to cook. She will use the Traeger app if she leaves the grill unattended. She says the real benefit of the app is its library of recipes. They designate timing, temperature and serving size, all enabling anyone to execute exceptional grilled food.





#### A SMOKING OVEN

Pellet grills/smokers resulted from the 1973 oil crisis, as we searched for alternative fuel sources for furnaces. Joe Traeger figured out how to use compressed sawdust pellets to fuel a grill. His original design shines through in today's pellet grills. The pellets go in a hopper from which a motorized auger delivers them to a fire pot, which has an electric heating element. A fan then aids combustion and circulates the hot air. Traeger held the patent on this grill until 2006. Then mass production brought a wave of innovation, tranforming them into sophisticated appliances.

Most modern pellet grills employ digital automation for appbased control. A thermostat in the cooking chamber automates the fan and auger operation. You can program your grill to cook at a specific temperature for a determined length of time. Some grills integrate leave-in meat probes to hold a temperature once the food reaches a set point.

#### KAMADO GRILL

These grills have been around for thousands of years, but only since WWII has the Japanese kamado been grilling deliciousness in the United States. The kamado grill's ceramic outer shell and inner parts retain heat far better than a steel grill. This results in a slower, more efficient and controlled burn. Their popularity coincided with the rise of "foodie" culture, and they're now available at most home centers and hardware stores. I spoke with kamado guru "Chef Eric" Gephart to glean some knowledge about this archaeologic treasure of a grill.

Many say a kamado heats up slower than other charcoal or gas grills. Chef Eric says that if you have quality lump charcoal and the right approach, you'll have a usable fire in 10 to 15 minutes. Once you have flame, close the lid and adjust the draft door and control cap

to find your desired temp. This is a crucial point of control with a kamado. If you leave that cap and draft door open too long, the draft will stoke the coals and the temp can quickly climb as high as 750 degrees F. A kamado is so efficient at holding heat that it's difficult to drop temperature quickly. If you want a slow, low-temp cook, increase the temperature gradually. The upside of the kamado's quick flash heat is that you can slow-smoke food and then finish it with a quick sear by opening up both vents and even the lid for immediate, high heat.

The most popular kamado grills are 18 to 22 in. in diameter, but they come as large as 42. Chef Eric said all grill sizes perform the same way. The only difference is what he calls "grill estate." The more grill space you have, the greater the options for different cook zones, or "heat signatures," as he referred to them. Banking the charcoal to one side creates separate areas of direct and indirect heat, allowing you to cook different foods simultaneously. Larger grills often have secondary grates or racks for even more "grill estate." Combine this with a rotisserie or other accessories and "you can have a culinary jungle gym," says Chef Eric.

Chef Eric sees more and more culinary aspirants drawn to kamado grills. Chef Eric has used a kamado grill to execute everything from Bretagne-style apple cake to triple cream beer bratwurst and, yes, of course, some serious BBQ brisket.




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



#### THE CLAY POT COOKER

Other than the lid, a kamado grill has two moving parts: the lower draft door, and the top control or chimney cap. Chef Eric sees the draft door as a heat pump, sucking in ambient air to create convection. Closing that draft door is like putting on the brakes; this is where you execute big temperature changes. The chimney cap regulates smaller changes in temperature. The cooking grate sits on the fire ring above the firebox, also ceramic. An optional heat deflector aids indirect cooking. All these ceramic components retain temperature for an even distribution of heat.







#### **GRAVITY-FED CHARCOAL**

Gravity-fed charcoal smokers came on the competitive barbecue scene in the 1990s. Their self-feeding mechanism put an end to staying up all night stoking smokers. Initially these were custom DIY builds, made by a handful of boutique manufacturers. But their popularity quickly put them into the home consumer market.

Until recently, most gravity-fed units were for serious barbecue enthusiasts with big budgets. But design innovations have made these units more user-friendly Masterbuilt have taken gravity-fed charcoal to a new level of "set it and forget it" with automation technology, bringing capabilities not previously seen on this grill type. A fan stoking the firebox automatically adjusts to maintain temperature. It's linked to your phone, so you can monitor your grill remotely. This adds convenience and pinpoint temperature control but also means fast temperature change—up to 700 degrees F within 15 minutes—no fussing with fuel or airflow dampers. With this temperature control, you can sear a steak just as easily as slow-cook a rack of ribs.



Does all this convenience remove the art and craft from grilling? Daniel says, "The creativity with this grill comes in how you layer wood chips in with your fuel or use the fast temperature control to cook several different things for a meal." The ability to use technology to dial in that delicious charcoal flavor without tending a fire removes the barrier to having a great grilling experience every time.



#### MORE THAN JUST GRAVITY

The basic design of gravity-fed charcoal cookers is simple: A tall charcoal hopper sits to one side of the cooker, gravity-feeding fuel into the firebox. An air inlet in the firebox regulates oxygen. Heat and smoke from the firebox flow through a transfer chute and hit the heat baffle that's centered below the cooking zone.

Above the heat baffle sits a grease shield or drip pan with a cleanout tray. The cook chamber has a cooking grate directly over the heat baffle and two or more cooking racks above it. At the top of the chamber, a chimney vents heat and smoke from the firebox up around the cooking zone. There's typically an ash cleanout below the fire grate.



# PULL VIRES ANYWHERE YOU WANT THEM

"Fishing" wire is easier with these tips and tools



#### **DON'T FISH POWER CORDS**

Cords that power appliances, TVs and power strips cannot be placed inside a wall. The **National Electrical Code says** these cords cannot replace permanent wiring. To avoid seeing these power cords, you can fish cable to add a new outlet nearby.



#### MAKE A BEVEL CUT

If you have to cut an access hole, make the cut at an angle. Then, when it's time to patch it, spread joint compound around the hole and press the cutout back in. The mud will hold the plug in placethere's no need for screws or backing and the plug won't fall through the hole.




#### MAKE A CHASE **WITH TRIM**

Run conduit or BX cable (armored cable) along the top corner of a wall and cover the cable with crown molding. You can cut small holes in the wall or ceiling where the wiring needs to exit the room.



#### A ROUTE CABLE BEHIND BASEBOARD

If you're like me and would rather install miles of trim than patch drywall, this is the way to go. Remove the baseboard and cut a long, narrow hole in its place. Then drill holes in the studs for your wire to pass through. This works best with wide base trim but can be done with narrow base trim as well. Be sure to keep the holes in the studs at least 1-1/4 in. away from the stud edges to avoid the need for protective metal plates.




#### GIVE COMMUNICATION CABLE ENOUGH SPACE

Communication cable like coax or Cat 6 should be kept away from cables that carry high voltage to outlets and lights. Pros recommend keeping them 12 to 16 in. away. If you must cross these cables, do so at a 90-degree angle.




#### **A** FIND THE EASIEST ROUTE

The easiest route is not always the most direct. Take advantage of unfinished spaces like basements and attics to run wire from one end of the house to the other. You might use an extra 50 ft. of wire, but it will save you lots of time.




#### ▲ USE A LOT OF CABLE

Pushing far more cable than you need into the walls or ceilings is helpful for a few reasons. First, it makes the job of hooking the cable you're fishing much easier. It also eliminates lots of tugging, which can damage fragile Cat 6 cables.



#### HIDE WIRES WITH RACEWAY

Running wire on the wall surface with raceway is a great way to get power right where you want it without fishing wires through walls. You can hide the raceway behind furniture and paint it to match the wall. Build the raceway from an existing electrical box with snap-together components and hide the wire inside the channel.




#### A RUN CONDUIT IN CLOSETS OR CABINETS

Conduit or armored cable is another great option for surface wiring, and it's about half the cost of raceway. You wouldn't want to run it over your walls like you would raceway, but it won't be visible in a dark closet or along the backs of cabinets.



#### **▲** SPLICE **LIKE A PRO**

Sometimes you have to pull hard to get a cable through a wall, so make sure the cable is securely tied to your pulling tool, whether it's a fish tape or a coat hanger. This is my favorite method: Put the wire through the eyelet or around the hook, then wrap it around your fishing tool. Tape them together with electrical tape, making sure to taper the wrapped section so it will slide through holes.




#### ▲ WIRE ALONG THE **PLUMBING STACK**

Adding power in an upper level can mean running wires from the basement to the attic. In a twostory home, you'd have three ceilings to go through. But in older homes, sometimes this is as easy as lowering a plumb bob along the plumbing vent stack and pulling up the cable. Newer homes might not have enough space around the stack, but it's worth checking first.

#### **DON'T RUN CABLE IN DUCTWORK**


Running cable inside ductwork, as convenient as it may be, is not allowed by code. You can run cable in plenum spaces like stud and joist bays for return air, but you'll need a plenum-rated cable. These cables have special jackets that are nontoxic and rated for fire. You can find plenum-rated Cat 6 and security cable at electrical supply stores. It will cost about twice as much as standard versions.





#### **A FIND OBSTRUCTIONS**


Before cutting any holes in walls, map out the route you want your wire to take. Scan the wall with a stud finder to locate any blocking that might obstruct that route. If there's blocking in one stud bay, the next one over might make a better path. You don't want to find out the hard way.





#### ▲ DOUBLE-DUTY ACCESS HOLES

Instead of cutting new holes in your walls or ceilings, you can use holes that are already there. Remove light fixtures, switches or outlets to use existing holes, or plan ahead to use the access hole for a new fixture.



#### ▲ TUCK LOW-VOLTAGE WIRES

Low-voltage cable doesn't have the same installation requirements as household power cables. Speaker wire, cables that provide power to doorbells and thermostats, and communication lines like Cat 6 don't need to be run inside your walls. You can just tuck them under your baseboard, but not under carpet or rugs. Wire-fishing gear

#### **GLOW RODS**

Glow rods are a staple for wire fishing. Just like steel tape, they can be pushed up walls and along ceilings, can usually be purchased in several lengths and can be screwed together for longer spans. Most come with a swivel eyelet tip and a hook tip. The luminescent rods glow in the dark, illuminating dark joist and stud bays. You can find them for \$40 at home centers.

#### **FLEX BIT**

If you need to run wire across a few joists or studs, reach for a flex bit. They come in long lengths, and extensions are available so you can drill holes through several joists. They have an eyelet at the tip, so once you've made your holes, you can pull the wire back through with the same bit. One thing to note: Don't drill through insulation with these bits. Expect to pay about \$50 for a 54-in. flex bit at a home center.

#### **HOMEMADE HOOKS**

Some of my favorite fishing tools are ones you can make yourself. Small hooks made from cable or coat hangers let you grab cable just out of reach. Best of all, they're economical.

#### **90-DEGREE DRILL ATTACHMENT**

This is the perfect tool for drilling holes between stud bays. About \$18 at most home centers, it's a lot cheaper than a dedicated angle drill and serves the same purpose. It can be a little tricky to use with larger bits, so hold on tight.

#### WIRE-PULLING MAGNETS

With a few options at different prices, magnets are cool tools for pulling wire along an insulated stud bay. This Magnepull (\$125) consists of a steel leader and a roller magnet. You can even use it to retrieve lost bits and other tools from inside walls. Wire-pulling magnets, which range from \$40 to \$125, can be found at electrical supply stores.

#### **LOW-VOLTAGE MUD RING**

I use mud rings to prevent marring drywall as I pull cable. They also have markers in the corner to outline the perfect hole size and shape for single-gang boxes. When you're done fishing, leave it in the wall and cover it with a blank faceplate to avoid patching (especially useful for hard-to-patch textured walls).

These mud rings are available for less than \$2 each at home centers.

#### STEEL FISH TAPE

This long roll of stiff steel is great for pushing wire through insulated walls, up wall cavities and down long lengths of joists. A roll starts at \$15 at home centers.

# QUICK&EASY STORM DOORS

Install a storm door kit in just 30 minutes

storm door with a rollaway screen makes it easy to let in the breeze on a beautiful day and keep out the weather when it's not so nice. Most door companies make an easy-to-install version that has a precut frame and adjustable parts. If your door opening is mostly square, the install is a cinch. In about a half hour and without altering the opening, I had a perfect new door.

# 1 SET THE PLACEHOLDER SCREW

Hold the hinge rail tight to the door trim and drive a screw into the top hole. Leave a 1/8-in. gap between the screw head and the trim. Remove the hinge rail by sliding it over the screw.

#### 2 ASSEMBLE THE DOOR

Set the door on a pair of sawhorses and screw the hinge rail to the door. Cover the unused mortise hole with the provided plug, then slide on the adjustable door sweep and slip on the rail extender cap.

#### 3 HANG THE STORM DOOR

Hang the door by the hinge rail onto the placeholder screw and tighten it to hold the door in place.

#### 4 FASTEN THE HINGE RAIL

Drive screws along the inside of the hinge rail. Slide the rail cap down to the door's sill, then fasten the outside of the hinge rail to the trim.

#### 5 INSTALL DRIP CAP AND LATCH RAIL

Line up the drip cap with the edge of the hinge rail, hold it tight to the trim and fasten it with screws. Install the latch rail tight to the drip cap and lined up with the edge of it.











#### **6** DRILL HOLES FOR THE LATCH

Snap the drilling guide onto the door and drill the holes from both sides with the provided spade bit.


#### 7 INSERT THE LOCK BODY

Slide the lock body into the mortise and fasten it with a screw. If the latch isn't facing the right direction, you'll have to unscrew the front of the lock body and spin the latch.

#### 8 MOUNT THE HARDWARE

Place the faceplates on each side of the door. Push the handle rod through the faceplate and lock body and secure the other handle with a setscrew.






#### MAKE ROOM FOR THE LATCH AND DEAD BOLT

The latch and dead bolt should be able to extend all the way into the latch opening. If not, you'll have to drill and chisel out a mortise in the trim.

#### INSTALL THE CLOSER

Screw the side-jamb bracket to the hingeside jamb, then insert the closer with the short connecting pin. Pull out the closer rod slightly, then attach the door bracket to the door. Connect the closer to the bracket with the long pin. If your door has two closers, repeat this step at the top of the door.





#### Businesses and Consumers Who Bought an Interior Molded Door Between March 1, 2014 and September 4, 2020, Could Receive \$25 or More From a Class Action Settlement Totaling \$19.5 Million

The lawsuit, *In re: Interior Molded Doors Indirect Purchaser Antitrust Litigation* Case No. 3:18-cv-00850-JAG, pending in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia, claims that JELD-WEN, Inc. and Masonite Corporation ("Settling Defendants") agreed to fix the prices of Interior Molded Doors ("IMDs") and, as a result, consumers and businesses who indirectly purchased Standalone IMDs not for resale may have paid more than they should have. Although the Settling Defendants have agreed to settle, they do not agree that they engaged in any wrongdoing or are liable or owe any money or benefits to Plaintiffs. The Court has not decided who is right.

Who is Included? You are a Settlement Class Member if you indirectly purchased not for resale a Standalone IMD between March 1, 2014 and September 4, 2020. Purchases must have been made in, or while you were residing in an Indirect Purchaser State at the time of purchase. "Indirectly" means you bought the Standalone IMD from someone other than one of the Settling Defendants (e.g., you purchased a Standalone IMD at Home Depot, Lowe's, or a lumber yard).

IMDs are a type of interior door made through a process of sandwiching a wood frame and hollow or solid core between two molded doorskins, rather than making the entire door from solid wood. A "Standalone Interior Molded Door" is an IMD that is not incorporated as part of a larger product (such as the purchase of a home) or service (such as the installation of the door in a home). For example, you are included if you are (a) a consumer who purchased an IMD for home installation OR (b) a business or commercial contractor that purchased an IMD to be included as a service provided to a customer or for its own use. Standalone IMDs contain patterns and do not include flush doors which have no patterns or relief.

The definitions of IMDs, Standalone IMDs, and the list of Indirect Purchaser States, among others, are available by visiting the Settlement Website www.InteriorMoldedDoorSettlement.com.

What Does the Settlement Provide? The Settlement provides for a total Settlement Fund of \$19,500,000 ("Settlement Fund"). After deduction of notice and administration expenses, attorneys' fees, service awards to the Class Representatives, and litigation expenses, as approved by the Court ("Net Settlement Fund"), the Net Settlement Fund will be available for distribution to Settlement Class Members who timely file valid claims. It is estimated that each member of the Settlement Class who submits a valid claim will receive at least \$25. Payments will be based on a number of factors, including at least the number of valid claims filed by all Settlement Class Members and the number of Standalone IMDs purchased by each Settlement Class Member.

#### What are My Rights and Options?

**Submit a Claim**: To receive a Settlement payment, you must submit a claim by going to <a href="www.lnteriorMoldedDoorSettlement.com">www.lnteriorMoldedDoorSettlement.com</a> and submitting (or printing and mailing) a Claim Form. A valid Claim Form must be **submitted online or postmarked by June 25, 2021**.

**Do Nothing**: You will be included in the Settlement Class and bound by the Court's decision, but you will not receive a payment. You will give up your rights to sue the Settling Defendants about the claims in this case.

**Exclude Yourself**: You can exclude yourself ("opt out") of the Settlement by submitting an exclusion request to the Settlement Administrator that is **received no later than June 2, 2021**. If you do so, you will not be eligible to receive a settlement payment, but you will retain the right to sue on your own regarding any claims that are part of the Settlement.

**Object**: You may also object to any part of this Settlement. Objections must be mailed to the Clerk of the Court and the Settlement Administrator and received no later than June 2, 2021.

Details about how to opt-out, object, and mail your Claim Form are available on the Settlement Website.

Has the Court Approved the Settlement? No, the Court has set a hearing for July 13, 2021 at 9:00 a.m. to determine whether to approve the Settlement, Class Representative service awards not to exceed \$56,000 total, attorney's expenses not to exceed \$5 million, and attorneys' fees not to exceed 33% of the Settlement Fund. If there are objections or comments, the Court will consider them at that time. You or your lawyer may appear at the hearing at your expense. The hearing may be moved to a different date or time without additional notice. Check the Settlement Website or call 1-844-964-2884 for current information.

Advice for leak-free plumbing

BY JAY CORK

EX plumbing is inexpensive and reliable, fast and almost goof-proof to install. Almost. Some mistakes can lead to leaks right after installation ... or years down the road. To learn how to avoid these mistakes, I talked with a 21-year veteran plumber who has seen them all.



MEET THE EXPERT Master plumber Bret Hepola owns and operates All City Plumbing.

#### Bret uses PEX-A

Home centers commonly carry two types of PEX piping:
PEX-A and PEX-B. PEX-A has several advantages over
PEX-B: It installs faster, it's more flexible and it's less likely to burst when frozen.
For these reasons, PEX-A makes sense for Bret. But for most DIYers doing a small job, PEX-B might be a less expensive option, taking into account both the price per foot and the required tools.

# Bret's favorite tools

#### - PEX CUTTER

The bottom jaw of this cutter is flat and cradles the pipe, making quick work of cutting PEX perfectly straight. Find one at your home center for about \$20.

#### **GREASE PENCIL**

Regular pencils and markers don't work well for marking PEX. Use a grease pencil to make highly visible marks that won't rub off.




The full kit is pricey (\$450), but you'll actually enjoy installing PEX-A piping with this tool. (PEX-B tubing requires a different tool.) If the job you're doing is small, consider renting one for about \$40 a day.


#### Go with the branch method

PEX lines can be run in two ways: With the manifold method, individual lines run from a manifold directly to every fixture, and with the branch method, lines branch off to the kitchen and bathrooms, then branch off again to each fixture. While manifolds allow greater control over individual fixtures, they use up to three times the material and waste a lot of hot water. That's why Bret believes the branch method is the way to go.



#### **Keep PEX away from hot spots**

PEX is plastic and can melt. If you're running PEX to your water heater, there must be an 18-in. extension up from the tank. Also, keep PEX at least 6 in. away from any exhaust flue.



#### **Heat a leaky fitting**

If your PEX-A fitting has a small leak, try warming it with a heat gun. This momentarily softens the plastic, which then contracts around the fitting again. This is a big time saver for Bret; instead of removing and replacing a fitting, he'll first try heating it.

#### Repair kinks in PEX-A with heat


PEX-A tubing is stronger and more flexible than PEX-B, and kinks in PEX-A can be repaired by applying a little heat. If PEX-B gets kinked, the damaged section must be cut out and repaired with a coupling.

#### NOT ALL CITIES ALLOW PEX

In some areas, it's still against code to use PEX tubing for a plumbing job. Check your local plumbing code to make sure you're on the right side of the law.


#### WARM UP COLD FITTINGS ND TUBING

Installing PEX-A at temperatures of 60 degrees F or lower can result in poor connections. This may cause leaks when things warm up. Bret gives the PEX time to warm up before installing it, and on cold days he warms poly fittings by keeping them in his pockets.



#### **Protect your PEX**

If PEX needs to be run through a joist space where it can't be fastened, Bret suggests that you first wrap it in pipe insulation. This protects it from nails or other protrusions during installation and guards against abrasion from water hammering. He'll also use an abrasion clip to protect the PEX when it passes through the joist adjacent to a bend.



#### DON'T REUSE POLY FITTINGS

Fittings for PEX-A are made from either brass or polyethylene. Poly fittings are less expensive and more readily available than brass, but Bret did give one warning about them: Don't use a poly fitting more than once. If a joint or fitting has to be modified or repaired, always use a new fitting.

#### **VE SPACE BETWEEN FITTINGS**

PEX fittings are allowed to be spaced as close as 3 in. apart, but Bret prefers wider intervals. With ample space between PEX fittings, you can more easily repair leaks or alter individual fittings. Give yourself enough room to insert new fittings; you'll thank yourself later.





#### **Use copper stub-outs**


You can connect shutoff valves directly to PEX, but Bret prefers to use copper stub-outs for sink and toilet connections because they provide a more solid connection to the shutoff valves.



#### **Cut it straight**

Angled cuts can lead to leaks. To ensure a proper marriage between PEX and the fittings, you need a cutter specifically designed for plastic tubing. A cutter costs only \$20 or so and is designed to make this job easy. With a little care, you can easily cut PEX perfectly square.







#### Sliding door hardware

Works like a cabinet door closer. Easy to install. Prevents door slamming and pinched fingers. Ideal for use with new or existing Johnson pocket, sliding and wall mount hardware.

### KEEP YOUR HOUSE RUNNING SMOOTHLY

Home maintenance advice from the trenches



urtis Petersen solves more maintenance problems in a week than most of us see in a year. A building superintendent with a crew of six, Curtis loves his job. He also loves to share his knowledge. Recently, he told me the problems he runs into the most—and the solutions he's found that can save all of us time and money.

#### **DRAIN YOUR WATER HEATER**

Periodically draining your water heater will extend its life and lower your energy bills. Over time, sediment collects at the tank. On gas-powered heaters, this

bottom of the tank. On gas-powered heaters, this creates hot spots that can damage the tank and cause leaks. On an electric water heater, sediment buildup can cause the lower heating element to fail prematurely. Curtis recommends clearing sediment from your water heater at least once a year.



#### **KEEP FAUCET HEADS FLOWING**

Faucet spouts and showerheads can gradually clog with calcium and lime. Curtis soaks them in vinegar to loosen the buildup. He advises against using CLR (Calcium, Lime & Rust Remover), saying it might damage the finish on brass or nickel-plated fixtures.




#### **PATCH DAMAGED WALLS FAST**

Curtis sees a new ding or dent in the walls nearly every day, and he needs to be able to patch them fast and reliably. He uses Durham's Rock Hard Water Putty (\$11 for a 1-lb. can) because he can mix it quickly, it's durable and it doesn't shrink. Once he's applied the compound to the repair, he uses a heat gun to speed up the drying. The patch is usually ready for paint in less than an hour.



#### **CLEAN GLASS STOVETOPS WITH A RAZOR**

Curtis shared a great tip for cleaning glass stovetops-he uses a razor! First he applies Cerama Bryte Cleaner (\$12 online) to the glass cooktop and lets it sit. Then he scrapes the cooktop clean with a razor blade. Those tough baked-on spots don't stand a chance!



#### **KEEP STAINLESS STEEL STAINLESS**

Stainless steel appliances look great-until they get fingerprints all over them. And while no cleaner can prevent fingerprints and smudges, the way the cleaner is applied can help avoid streaks and spotting. Instead of spraying the cleaner directly onto the surface, first spray it on a microfiber cloth and then wipe it on.



#### AVOID REFRIGERATOR REPAIRS

When the condenser coils of a refrigerator get clogged with dust and dirt, they can't release heat efficiently. As a result, the compressor works harder and longer, using more energy and shortening the life of your fridge. Clean the coils with a coil cleaning brush and a vacuum once a year.

#### **LUBRICATE LIGHTBULBS**

If you've ever had to remove a stuck lightbulb with a needle-nose pliers, you know it's not fun. Curtis is responsible for thousands of lights, so he doesn't have time to deal with stuck bulbs. He'll drop a dab of dielectric grease on a new bulb's threads to make sure it comes back out easily, every time. Dielectric grease is available for about \$5 at any auto parts store.



#### LET YOUR FREEZER BREATHE

These vents on frost-free fridges allow air to circulate in the freezer. Curtis suggests keeping your freezer only about three-quarters full. This allows the fan to freely circulate the cold air. It's good for the freezer and helps the refrigerator run more efficiently, saving you money on energy bills.



Despite the name, flushable wipes are not flushable. Curtis has seen this many times and warns against flushing them down the toilet. It's just a matter of time—they will cause a clog. Throw used wipes into the trash!



It's often difficult to match paint when touching up, but Curtis shared a tip to make touch-ups invisible. Besides feathering side to side, he'll feather the paint high enough so it's above most people's line of sight.



#### LUBRICATE YOUR GARBAGE DISPOSAL

In-sink disposals get fed a lot of things, including some things they shouldn't. Curtis suggests a monthly cleaning with ice cubes to help keep the blades free of rust. He also finds that pouring in a squirt of dish soap helps keep the disposal lubricated and running smoothly.



#### **RENEW YOUR VINYL FLOORS**

Vinyl plank flooring is durable, easy to install and beautiful. However, it's not immune to scratches, and a little dirt underfoot can mar that beauty. Curtis taught me how to make these scratches disappear with sandpaper. Using a little water to lubricate the sandpaper, he starts at 120 grit, then 180, and stops at 220. He also recommends testing in an inconspicuous spot to make sure the vinyl reacts well to sanding.



#### ····· ELECTRIC STAPLER

Curtis has done miles of small carpet repairs with this electric stapler (\$200).



#### LASER LEVEL·····

Hang pictures faster and with more accuracy using a laser line (\$40 online) instead of a tape measure and spirit level.



#### 3-IN-ONE OIL ·····

To keep things running smoothly, 3-in-One oil is hard to beat. Curtis always has a bottle with him and will use it on door hinges, drawer slides and tools. It's available at hardware stores for about \$8.



#### SLIP JOINT PLIERS .....

This one tool can take the place of small or large pliers and a whole set of wrenches. It can handle plumbing fixtures, pipes and sometimes old rusty bolts.

#### 1 LOOSEN THE BLADES

Remove the nuts that secure the blades to the bar. I don't remove the blades on this trimmer because it involves disassembling the entire machine. Removing the nuts lets me separate the blades enough for sharpening.

CLEAN THE TEETH
Wipe off as much pitch and sap as you can using a blade cleaning liquid such as Red Armor from Echo (\$10 for a 12-oz. bottle). Your grinding stone cuts faster if the teeth are clean.

#### 3 GRIND THE BEVELS

With the blades clamped to a work surface, carefully grind each beveled edge using a small grinding stone in a rotary tool. Use a light touch and stop when the bevel is shiny all the way down to the edge, and you can feel a slight burr under the edge. A small wood spacer block clamped between the blades maintains clearance for grinding.

#### 4 HONE THE UNDERSIDES

Hone the underside of each tooth to remove the burr created by grinding. My favorite tool for this is an EZE-LAP diamond paddle (\$20 for a set of three). Wipe off the teeth with blade cleaner again, to remove any metal dust. Then reinstall the nuts that secure the blades to the bar.

odern vehicles don't seem to rust out nearly as badly as those from 30 or more years ago, but they will definitely rust, especially if you live in an area with harsh winters and salted roads. An annual spray of rustproofing oil goes a long way to prevent body and frame rust. Although I live in the Rust Belt, my 1990 Ford F-150 remains rust-free because I spray it every year. You can have a pro do it for about \$200, or you can do it yourself using any rust-proofing spray from an auto parts dealer, such as Fluid Film from Krown (\$10 for a 12-oz. can). With six vehicles to spray each year, I now own all the proper wands and spray equipment that a pro might use. And because I live close to a supplier of the Krown brand rust prevention treatment, I'm able to purchase the product in 5-gallon pails.

# Replace a cracked storm window

If your storm window frame is machine pressed at the corners, take it to a hardware store for repair. It's too much hassle to do it yourself. But storm windows with screws or friction-fit fasteners at the corners allow for easy disassembly and reassembly. You may need to order parts online; two sources are reflect-window.com and dkhardware.com. Here's how to replace a broken pane.

#### 1 REMOVE BROKEN GLASS

If the glass is just cracked, carefully remove the storm window, frame and all. Tape the cracks so the glass stays put. If the glass is in pieces, carefully remove them, wearing leather gloves and eye protection, then vacuum the frame and window area thoroughly before removing the frame.

#### 2 MEASURE FOR NEW GLASS

Before you disassemble the frame, measure the inside width and height. Measure the depth of the channel using a flat ruler and add that to the height and width of the frame's interior dimensions.

#### 3 DISASSEMBLE THE FRAME


For friction-fit frames like this one, clamp one frame side to a work surface. Separate the frame parts using a hammer and a wood block. Remove any remaining glass and the rubber gasket, being careful not to tear it. If the gasket is in good shape, reuse it. Vacuum the work area.


Apply the gasket over the edge of the new glass. If it's a new gasket, make small cuts at the corners to help make the turns. Tap the side frames on first, using a rubber mallet. Align the corner keys on the frame top and bottom with the corners of the sides, and gently tap the frame pieces home.

# SHOULD YOU CALL A PRO TO REPLACE THIS OUTLET?

A scorched outlet can be caused by metal arcing across plug blades, overheating from a high-wattage appliance or a malfunction from a hard impact. The wiring in the wall is likely fine, but you should carefully inspect everything. Wear gloves; the charred residue can be caustic.

Before turning off the power, test the outlet in question with a threeprong tester (also test an outlet you know is good) to see if it's working. Then turn off the power and test again, to be sure there's no power at the outlet. Remove the faceplate, then the outlet, inspecting both to determine the extent of the damage. Next, inspect the connecting wires for melted insulation. Check all wiring in the box for melting or other damage as well. If the damage is limited to the outlet, just replace the outlet and the faceplate.


If you discover a melted tangle of wires in the box, call a pro. A good electrical contractor will ask questions about what led to the damage, to make a thorough assessment.


# Silver Sees 8-Year High

- 2) Which silver coins are right for me?

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


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
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
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# Great Goofs
