igh-end bathrooms are one of the most sought after features in a modern home, and it's easy to see why. A relaxing, comfortable haven makes a house more liveable and increases value.

When creating a new bathroom from scratch, devote as much space to it as possible. Large layouts allow for inclusions like a bathtub, dual basins and extra storage.

If space is at a premium, focus on high-quality additions. >



A bathroom haven needs to be tidy, spacious and streamlined



The definition of opulence has to be a designer bathtub. Position it in the centre of the room to show off its shapely curves or in front of a window to take in the view.





A concealed cistern toilet is a must-have for a minimalist bathroom. Have the cistern installed in the ceiling or wall and tuck the loo away in a nook to keep the room tidy.

Install a frameless glass shower screen and a large mirror to increase the sense of space in a bathroom.

Matt black bathroom fixtures are a hot design trend at the moment, and this look works especially well when paired with timber or white surfaces. 0

A luxury bathroom needs to be warm and inviting, and a combination light, heater and fan achieves this while providing ventilation in the the one compact appliance.

Use designer surfaces

High-quality tiles and benchtops make a big impact in a bathroom. Select premium surfaces like marble for feature walls and contrast this with modern flooring for a designer look.

Black is back when it comes to bathrooms, with classic monochrome getting a contemporary update.

Matt black fixtures catch the eye while hexagonal tiles add interest by creating a striking geometric pattern.

Timber softens a modern monochrome colour scheme and the organic texture adds warmth to the room. Choose a duckboard mat for hygiene and style.

Boost the light Skylights increase the light levels in a room, but it's not always possible to install a standard type, especially on the ground floor of a two-storey home.

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1 Protect the surfaces

Apply strips of masking tape to either side of the gap, about 4mm apart. Cut the nozzle from the silicone at 45°, keeping the hole smaller than the gap for greater control.

TIP Cut the nozzle neatly, as jagged edges create furrows in the bead.



2 Lay an even bead


Start at one end and continue to the other. Pull the trigger slowly and steadily, pushing the caulking gun away from you and adjusting the rate to match variations in flow speed.

TIP Lift the gun and release the trigger once you reach the end of the gap.



3 Smooth the bead

Using a finger dipped in soapy water, run along the bead continuously from one end to the other, applying enough pressure to create a smooth, even surface. Remove the masking tape and excess silicone immediately, then allow to dry for 24 hours.





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BATHROOM MAKEOVER

A sharp eye for style and a bit of imagination are key to a quick and successful renovation

his old semi in Sydney's inner west had seen a mix of updates and DIY projects over the years. The toilet, as was often the way until the '50s, was out in the backyard.

With a baby on the way, the owners had a three-month window to bring the toilet inside and create a functional, stylish space on a tiny footprint of $2 \times 2m$.

They called on the expertise of builder Dylan Falecki from Network Ten's *The Living Room*. After a trip to Bunnings, everything for the reno was on the back of Dylan's ute.

With the addition of a few items the couple already owned, and one standout feature of an unusual black toilet, the renovation totalled \$25,000, including the cost of the tradesmen, and was completed in a week.

a nod to the era of the house, but the other elements are about personality and doing things a bit differently.

While the black and white colour scheme is striking, the brief was mostly about traditional texture.

'They didn't want any polished, refined finishes. The sanded and

'The old waterproofing had failed and had to be redone. That led to water issues causing rot, and a number of the floor joists had to be replaced.

'Compressed fibro flooring was laid, then we built the bath hub, put in the bath, started tiling, and it went from go to whoa in about a week.' >

cement bed and fill it with water overnight.



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REVAMP

Painting the tiles and installing new fittings rejuvenated this bathroom

B athroom makeovers can be costly, particularly if you start ripping out floor and wall tiles. Doing it this way will most likely mean hiring tilers and specialised tradies to complete the work, which will have a big effect on the cost.

This bathroom renovation had a tight DIY budget, so the floor and wall tiles were left intact and surface treatments were applied instead.

The overall look of this bathroom was tired and dated, but the surfaces were all in excellent condition, so it was inexpensive and easy to totally transform it in a weekend.

Before starting work, a plumber replaced the old sink with a modern square-edged basin and shiny taps.

White laminate paint was applied to the vanity doors, which were given sleek chrome handles to tie in with the modern new look of the room.

The tiles were then thoroughly cleaned, sanded and painted using a tile cleaner, primer and paint. >

DIY TIP

To get a smooth, professional finish and avoid brush marks, use a mini roller to apply paint to tiles.

After

Resurfacing and adding a modern basin have refreshed this room.





RAINT THE TILES



Clean the tiles

Scrub the tiles and grout with a mix of one part bleach to 10 parts water to remove mould, then leave to dry. Spray with tile cleaner, then leave for 30 seconds to give the cleaner time to work on the surface of the tiles. Wipe off the cleaner with a wet sponge to remove soap scum and oil.



Apply the primer

Stir the primer well, then pour into a roller tray. Paint small areas of the tiles at a time, using a microfibre mini roller and a brush to cut in the edges and around tricky areas such as taps. Roll on the primer in a zigzag pattern, then smooth out, working from the top to the base. Allow to dry.



Sand the tiles

Give the tiles a light sand all over using 240 grit wet/dry abrasive paper and a sanding block to create a rough matt surface. This will help the paint adhere better to the tiles. Wash and rinse off the tiles using a wet sponge and clean water, then leave to dry completely.



Paint the first coat

Lightly sand the tiles with 240 grit paper and wipe down. Apply the first coat with the roller, cutting in with a brush. Paint a small area at a time in a zigzag pattern, then roll smooth. When the paint is spread and only a little is left on the roller, go over the area in one direction from top to base.



Mask the edges

Use painter's tape to mask off the walls at the floor and ceiling and any other edges. Press firmly on the edge of the tape along the area that is to be painted to give a clean finish. Fill any cracks with grout or gap filler and leave to dry. Position drop sheets on the floor to avoid paint splashes.



6 Finish the painting

Store the brush and roller in water until the first coat of paint is dry, then squeeze out the water. Lightly sand the tiles with 600 grit paper, then wipe off the dust. Apply the top coat using the same technique as for the first coat. Allow to dry for a day, then wait a week until fully cured.



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FROM DAGGY TO DAZZLING

New surfaces and modern fittings refresh this dated bathroom on a modest budget

If there was ever a magic wand of the renovating world, it'd have to be resurfacing products.

Tile, laminate and bathtub paints

allow you transform a room without having to replace any surfaces.

Without them, your only option for a dingy old bathroom like this would be to gut it and start from scratch. And that, without question, would be an expensive task.

The reno plan

I'd put the era of this bathroom around the 1960s, which probably means asbestos and dubious old plumbing.

We'll leave that can of worms unopened and break out the paint cans instead!

The main thing this bathroom needs is a coat of paint for the tiles, vanity and bathtub, plus new flooring.

Add a frameless glass shower screen, plus new handles and taps, and you have a budget reno that will modernise this small space without costing a small fortune.

I reckon you could do this revamp for about \$500, and the best part is, you won't need a plumber.

1 CLEAN THE SURFACES

The crucial thing with any resurfacing product is to start with a completely smooth, clean and

Otherwise, all your hard work will be wasted when the new surface peels away because it hasn't adhered.

2 APPLY THE PRIMER

With a clean, dry surface and all the vanity handles removed, it's time to lay on the primer, also known as undercoat.

It needs to go on all the tiles that are to be painted. as well as on the retro vanity and the storage cupboard.

4 RESURFACE THE TUB

That green bathtub is in good condition for its age, which makes it a perfect candidate for resurfacing in fresh white.

It's labour intensive but, for under \$100. it's worth the effort and will make the tub look like new.



3 PAINT THE SURFACES

We'll paint the benchtop in a dark colour and contrast it with off-white for the vanity.

A clear top coat will help protect the surface for

years of use. Crisp white paint will also transform the tiles and walls.

5 ADD A SCREEN

Glass panels have come down a lot in price, so our lean budget will stretch to replacing the shower curtain and rod.

You can pick one up off the shelf for under \$200, but it may cost more if it needs to be custom made.

6 LAY VINYL FLOORING

My favourite timber-look vinyl flooring, Gerflor, can go straight over that lino. It's waterproof and looks fantastic. Just peel off the backing and stick it down.

The final touch is to cover the grim security venetian blind to let in the light but block out the eyesore. 🤣






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SAVE ON YOUR RENO

Plan ahead when replacing your bathroom so you can stick to an affordable budget

s one of the busiest rooms in the home, the bathroom can also be the most expensive when it comes to renovating.

Replacing a bathroom will cost on average \$16,000, so knowing what you can DIY and when you need to call a tradie is important.

It means you can build your dream bathroom without overspending. >

DESIGN TIP

Think about future lifestyle changes, such as having children, to avoid remodelling again in a few years.

HEY, BIG SPENDER

To keep within budget, create a complete plan for the makeover, including quotes from the pros, before beginning construction.

Decide which big-ticket items you can afford to splash out on and areas where you can compromise.

Major expenses can include professional tiling, relocating the plumbing and choosing luxury fixtures like a freestanding tub.

Select the best products you can afford so your new bathroom will stand the test of time.

Hire a professional

No matter how handy you are, it's inevitable that you'll need to call in a tradie for certain elements of bathroom renovation because of regulations set by the Building Code of Australia and Australian Standards.

Waterproofing is vital to prevent structural damage and damp, with government standards requiring a pro to complete the job in your home.

Electrical jobs must be done by a licensed electrician, who will do the wiring, as well as installing exhaust fans, heaters and power outlets.

For plumbing work, you'll need a plumber to disconnect and reconnect the pipes, as well as waste outlets.

Check out free services like Hipages (hipages.com.au) to find the most suitable tradie in your area for the job.



If you live in a strata property, make sure you have approval before starting work on your renovation



Let an electrician handle any wiring work.



Can't afford a full reno but sick of staring at your old bathroom?

Just changing a few elements can give it a fast facelift without cleaning out your bank account.

Installing a new shower screen and skylight, painting tiles, and resurfacing the bath or basin will have a huge impact on the look of the room.

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
Design a resort-style bathroom sanctuary using large-format tiles and a smart, modern layout

n opulent bathroom sanctuary is easy to create by designing the entire space as a wet room.

The transition to the shower and bath area is seamless in a wet room. This approach to bathroom design utilises the floorplan well, allowing for high-end inclusions like dual showers and a tub.

A symmetrical double shower with a bathtub centrepiece oozes luxury.



DESIGN TIP

When laying large-forma tiles, use a grout of the same colour to maximise the visual impact of the tile design.

Add instant elegance

Large-format stone-look tiles give the feel of a luxury hotel, and using them on the floor then taking them up the walls makes a room seem bigger.

A simple ledge creates a defined zone for the bath without affecting the flow of the room. Frameless glass shower screens are almost invisible and let in plenty of natural light. A bathroom haven needs plenty of unobtrusive storage to keep it streamlined and a wall-mounted vanity creates the illusion of space.

For the ultimate in bathroom indulgence, install a combination rain shower and handheld mixer, and add an elegant freestanding tub to create a bathroom that you'll never want to leave.



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Easy DIY revamps costing just \$12,500 made this 1980s house ready to rent

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Why use an agent?

You may consider agent's fees costly and think you should DIY to save money. But while you could find a tenant easily enough, you might not be prepared if problems arise.

Agents have the knowledge of tenancy and property legislation and the experience to sort out any issues. They deal with repairs, chase overdue rent and arrange inspections to ensure the property is being cared for.

They are also good negotiators and put your best interests first, plus their fees are also tax deductible.

But even if you use an agent, take out landlord insurance for protection from any unforeseen circumstances that may arise and incur costs.





Expert advice

Lee took part in Cherie Barber's Renovating for Profit workshop, where she showed the best ways to make the maximum impact on a tight budget.

She advises attendees to look at the renovation as a business, watch the budget and keep personal taste out of it.

Cherie also demonstrates how to make a property appealing to as many people as possible by keeping surface colours neutral, fittings modern and creating as much light as possible.

Lee used many of her strategies when renovating this property. >



Dining room revamp All four window treatments

in this room, including lace curtains, a pelmet, vertical blinds and drapes, had to go.

Removing these opened up the house to the view out the back and let in more light.

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DESIGN TIP

Colours date fast, so go for bright white in bathrooms to create a space that looks clean, fresh and modern.

While the benchtops and floor tiles would have looked better if replaced, the extra cost would not have been justified.

Replacing the sinks and taps with modern designs has improved and rejuvenated the room.



roperty investment is arguably the number one way Australians build their wealth. Nearly two million Australians earn a rental income from property, while others are planning to make a fortune from the housing boom.

But owning property can be risky, and without proper planning, it's easy to run into trouble. Many investors lose thousands when they are forced to sell their properties after bad decisions.

Property guru Zaki Ameer has built a portfolio of 10 properties and is the founder of Dream Design Property (ddpproperty.com.au).

From reno disasters to legal battles. Zaki has seen it all and explains how you can avoid an investment nightmare.

Off-the-plan dramas It's easy to get excited about a brand-new property but, sometimes, buying a dwelling that hasn't been built yet can cause problems.

'This type of investment may seem enticing at first, but there is no quarantee of the quality or the final value,' says Zaki.

Additionally, many properties can be overvalued by the developer, meaning the home could be worth a lot less than the purchase price once it has been built.

SOLUTION Buy an existing dwelling that you can inspect in person before committing.





Nasty exit fees

With historically low interest rates, fixed rate bank loans are

appealing to more investors than ever. The catch is the fees that are charged if you need to make an early exit.

'A friend of mine went through a traumatic divorce and was forced to sell his investment property during the fixed rate period and paid thousands of dollars in exit fees,' says Zaki. **SOLUTION** Keep careful records of the properties purchased so you are aware of any penalties that may apply for breaking fixed rate agreements. >



Smart investment decisions can result in fantastic profits, but bad ones can be costly





Dodgy builders

Renovating is a great way to add value, but it can cause financial pain if corners are cut or disreputable builders are used.

Poor workmanship, accidents and the resulting legal fees can completely erode any potential profits.

'I've seen appalling renovations by builders where roofs have leaked and caved in soon after completion, costing the owners \$250,000 in legal fees and repairs,' say Zaki.

SOLUTION Check builders' credentials and inspect their recent work before commissioning them for your reno.

Terrible tenants

Good tenants that pay rent on time and keep the property in good order are a godsend, but bad tenants are unfortunately too common.

Reliable renters can suddenly turn into property-wrecking nightmares, as one of Zaki's clients found out.

'They deserted the house in the middle of the night, leaving it in a terrible condition and, not having landlord insurance, she had to fork out \$20,000 to pay for repairs.'

SOLUTION Always invest in landlord insurance.

No safety net

Losing your job or being unable to work due to injury or illness can cause major problems when it comes to repayments, and applying for loan extensions may cost thousands of dollars in fees.

To avoid running into trouble, put aside money to use as a safety net in case the unthinkable happens.

'It's better to have this cash for emergencies than to use it to pay extra loan repayments,' says Zaki. **SOLUTION** Set aside three months of

repayments per property.





EXPERT ADVICE

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

set into a wooded hillside, it was a case of pushing the limits when it came to designing this seaside villa. The luxury holiday home cleverly combines elements of modernism with residential warmth.

In high season, when the crowds arrive, it is the ideal private escape for

a large family, with each of the nine bedrooms offering a private ensuite and terrace overlooking the ocean.

The whitewashed concrete and natural limestone exterior of the house takes on cubic forms, with a parapet roof lending to the clean lines and angular symmetry.











The oversized windows bring in a wall of vibrant green, framing the natural views to provide pleasure and tranquillity in the home.

While the windows are a strong feature, the walls above head height are also used to maximum effect.

'Dramatic wall panels painted flat white serve as a canvas for the owners' art collection,' says Cameron.

'But it would work just as well if used to display children's artwork or just left blank to allow the play of light as the sun moves across the sky.' 'This staircase is a classic exercise in form and function combining to create a striking design feature in the living area,' says Cameron.

'It's a complex and self-supporting design that acts like a beam, and the stringer is incorporated into the stair. While it is reinforced with steel, it still looks light and simple.'

The use of reinforced concrete brings another material into the room, adding to the formality and making it an architectural element to be viewed beyond function.



There has been a move away from all-white bathrooms, and black is having its moment.

If the room has lots of natural light, black can be warm and luxurious, actually opening up small spaces rather than closing them in.

'The use of dark stone and dark tones in the bathrooms serves to create a sense of intimacy and enclosure, and also sets these spaces apart from the stark minimalism of the otherwise all-white interiors,' says Cameron.

Ensuites get the same treatment, with points of difference such as the gold mosaic tiles on the walls. •

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BACK IN BLACKIN

Transform tired timber into a dramatic floorspace using a striking dark stain

here are few people who don't love the look and feel of timber floorboards underfoot.

Cool and clean in summer, warm and comforting in winter, they'll always have a huge influence on how the rest of the interior looks.

After a recent reno, the new colour scheme in this beach cottage left the white painted floor looking scratched and dull, so it was time for an update.

We hired a drum sander and edge sander for the floor, using two each of the 40, 80 and 120 grit sanding belts and one sanding disc of each grit.

Once this was done, we applied the Black Japan finish. >





A gleaming black finish adds a luxurious feel and enhances the flow through to the deck.







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
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REVAMP THE FLOORBOARDS



Prepare the space

Measure the width and length of the space to calculate the amount of stain needed. Clear everything from the area you're going to work in, tape up sockets and switches and cover doors and windows with drop sheets.



Sand the edges

Use an edge sander and a 40 grit disc to sand areas near the skirting boards, easing the machine onto the floor to avoid gouging. Use a multi-tool or scraper and sanding sponge to get into corners. Vacuum away any dust.



Apply the first coat

Tape up skirting boards and doorways. Stir the Black Japan well, then apply using an applicator or short nap roller, working the full length of 3-4 boards at a time and maintaining a wet edge. Use a small brush for awkward areas.



Smooth the surface

Check the floorboards for protruding nails and punch them 2-3mm below the surface. Remove any staples and dispose of anything else that could clog or rip the sandpaper. Fill any cracks or holes with appropriate filler.



5 Do a second sand

Punch any nail heads that may have been turned up in the initial sanding, and fill any cracks. Give the floor a sand with both the drum sander and edge sander using 80 grit belts and a disc to give a smooth finish.



8 Vacuum the floor

Allow the first coat to dry for up to 12 hours. When dry, give the floor a light sand, then vacuum thoroughly to remove the remaining dust.

TIP Wrap up applicators, rollers and brushes in plastic wrap between coats.



O a rough sand

Use a drum sander and 40 grit belts to do a rough sand to remove any old paint and level any variations in the boards. Ease the machine down while it's in motion and lift it before stopping to avoid gouging the boards.



6 Finish the sanding

For a silky-smooth finish, use 120 grit sanding belts and a disc, blending the work of the edge and drum sanders to ensure an even result. Thoroughly clean up any remaining dust and remove the drop sheets and tape.



Apply the final coats

If satisfied with the strength of the stain, apply two coats of a clear floor finish, using a clean applicator sock.

TIP For a darker look, apply two coats of Black Japan and one of clear, or three coats of the stain only.

DIY TIP

Grab extra sanding belts and discs so you won't run out, and just return the unused ones with the hire equipment.

But while there are homes that have a hallway, others open directly onto a living space, so there is no one-size-fits-all solution when it comes to entry furniture.

Finding a piece to fit your space isn't hard if you look for something in the right size and customise it to suit your interior decorating style.

Flatpack furniture is ideal for this purpose, and kitchen cabinets or storage pieces are very adaptable.

This white melamine bedside table was painted and given new legs for three different designer treatments.

For the first look, the door was covered in easy-to-use vinyl wallpaper in a geometric pattern and a square metal handle added for a retro effect. TIP Always use a primer for laminated surfaces before painting melamine. >



RXPERT SECRETS

Giving new flatpack furniture a makeover is much faster than revamping a vintage piece, as there's no stripping, sanding or repair work involved.



3 Attach the legs

Mark and pre-drill the cabinet door for the new handle. Turn the cabinet upside down and mark the furniture leg locations, pre-drilling holes. Install the legs on the base, turn the cabinet right side up and attach the door handle using the supplied screws.





Paint the cabinet

Remove the door handle, then apply primer to the cabinet using a brush and small roller. Apply two coats of low sheen acrylic paint, letting it dry and sanding lightly in between coats. Paint four timber furniture legs in the same colour as the cabinet.



2 Cover the door


Measure the cabinet door and transfer the measurements to the back of a piece of wallpaper. Cut out the wallpaper using scissors or a utility knife, then apply spray adhesive on the back and attach it to the door. Smooth any air bubbles by hand.




RETRO LOOK



1 Paint the cabinet

Apply primer and then two coats of low sheen acrylic using a brush and small roller, sanding lightly in between coats. Cut 19mm copper piping to length for the base using a pipe cutter. Cut four 300mm uprights, four 200mm rails and two 250mm braces.



Z Join the pipes

Slide a tee fitting onto each upright to the midpoint, attach elbows to the ends and insert the rails to make two leg frames. Insert the braces in the tee fittings to join the leg frames. Apply liquid sealant to each pipe end as you go, taping the assembly until dry.



3 Attach the base

Attach end caps to the basin tee for the door handle. Cut dowel to fit in the basin tee and drill a pilot hole, securing the handle from inside the door with a screw. Turn the cabinet upside down and secure the base frame using saddle clips and screws.











1 Paint the cabinet

Apply primer and then two coats of low sheen acrylic paint to the cabinet using a brush and small roller, letting it dry and sanding lightly in between coats. Paint four timber furniture legs in the same colour as the cabinet and use a small brush to add gold detail.



2 Prepare the beading

Measure the cabinet door to calculate the lengths of timber beading needed for a panel box. Cut the beading to length with mitred ends using a mitre box and saw. Apply primer and two coats of gold acrylic paint to the beading using a brush, leave to dry.



3 Finish the cabinet

Turn the cabinet upside down and mark the furniture leg locations, pre-drilling holes. Install the legs on the base, then lay the cabinet face up. Position the beading to mark the door, then apply PVA adhesive to the back of each length and attach to the door.




When it comes to vintage furniture most of us think of shapely silhouettes, soft tones and ornate embellishments.

To create a pared-back version of this classic style, timber beading in a decorative profile was used to give the illusion of a panel on the cabinet door. Paint the beading gold and use the same colour on the coves of tapered colonial-style timber legs to mimic the look of gilt-edged furniture.

For the cabinet, keep to a soft colour in a low sheen not a gloss finish. Instead of a door handle, a push-to-open latch was installed.

SHOWCASE SHELVING

Turn a blank wall into a visual feast with built-in floor-to-ceiling shelves

here aren't many DIY projects that will give you as much bang for your buck as this plasterboard shelving.

It's just a frame made from 140 x 35mm timber covered with 10mm plasterboard. You can build shelving like ours, or design it to fit the space you have available.

For this project, the shelving is 3600mm wide and 2700mm high, and the 450mm deep shelves are designed to accommodate home entertainment equipment, including a central recess for a 150cm (60") TV.

This arrangement also looks great even if your ceilings are only 2400mm high. And you don't have to build your shelves wall to wall. You can leave one or both ends exposed and finish them with plasterboard.

We used graph paper to sketch out the design, but you can just map it directly onto the wall.

First add about 125mm to the width and height of the TV, then centre this rectangle on the wall.

When happy with the dimensions of the TV recess, mark the vertical and horizontal frame locations and flick chalklines to see how it will look.

We left a 10mm gap between the frame and the floor, walls and ceiling to allow the frames to be pre-built and positioned without having to fit the shelving exactly to the room.



You can build the shelves from standard pine, but termite-proof blue T2 pine is a safer and more cost-effective option

DIY TIP

Avoid mess and damage by building the parts in your garage or backyard, then assembling them indoors when ready.

FRAME IT

These shelves are assembled using simple box frames. Made from rails and crosspieces, the butt joints are secured with nails.

Set up a stop on a mitresaw to cut the crosspieces, then cut the rails to make the frames using a mitresaw or circular saw.

Build a full-length base and top, four stud frames, and the centre and side shelves.

The crosspieces are used in the frames as braces and noggins.

They are also used to make the stud boxes at each shelf location, to provide backing for the plasterboard on both sides.




BUILD THE SHELVES



Set out the framing

Transfer the frame layout to the wall, snapping chalklines for the vertical and horizontal frames. Check the lines are level and plumb with a 10mm gap all around the frame to make it possible to fit it in the space.



Set the stud frames

Position the outer stud frames, securing to the base frame with screws. Check for plumb, then drill two clearance holes through the back studs, securing to the wall with toggle bolts or screws. Repeat with the remaining stud frames.



Attach the plasterboard

Cut the plasterboard to fit and attach with screws, fitting it tightly at the wall if caulking the back edges. Shave any overhanging edges, securing metal or plastic corner bead with nails or staples. Cover the bead with mesh tape.



Build the frames

Make the top, base, stud and shelf frames, securing with nails. On the top and base frames, mark the stud frame locations on the rails, then attach the top and base crosspieces. Mark the shelf locations on the stud sides.



5 Secure the top frame

Position the top frame on the stud frames, checking the centre and side shelves fit. Make any adjustments, then secure the stud end plates to the top frame with screws. Secure the back rail of the top frame to the wall.



8 Prepare the corners

Spread a layer of joint compound on both sides of all internal corners. Fold the tape in half and press in using your fingers, embedding in the compound with a taping knife. Spread a thin layer of compound over the tape and bead.




Level the base frame

Position the base frame on 10mm scraps of plywood at each corner and under each crosspiece. Use a spirit level to level the base frame from side to side and from front to back, then secure to the wall using screws.



6 Add the shelves

Cut plywood to use as spacers for installing the shelves. Starting with the centre shelves, rest each one on the spacers and secure the shelf ends to the stud boxes with screws, lining them up precisely. Secure the side shelves.



Plaster the joints

Spread a thick layer of joint compound on the studs and front rails, smoothing with a 200mm taping knife, then cover all interior bead and taped joints. Apply a second coat, then a finishing coat, sanding lightly in between.



Replace handles

Hide the bins

Exposed rubbish is both a health risk and an eyesore, and bins can crowd much-needed bench or floorspace. Adding bins in base cabinets is a compact solution.

Make life easy by organising and categorising your rubbish into two bins concealed in a cupboard, with one for general waste and the other for recyclables.

DIY WALL TILL

Lay tiles to create a splashback in between benchtops and cabinets

new kitchen will find its way onto the reno wishlist of every homeowner at some point, as it is the heart of the home.

Installing a new kitchen is a big project, but there are affordable, small jobs that can easily be completed in a day or weekend, to personalise it.


The splashback in this new kitchen was tiled DIY before the stove was installed. To allow for the gap between benchtops, a piece of timber was temporarily secured to the wall to support the first row of tiles.

TIP Before tiling a wall, make sure the surface is clean and dry, then lay drop sheets over the benchtops and floor.



Lay the first row

Use an 8mm notch trowel to apply tile mastic to the wall. Lay the first tile about 1mm above the benchtop but flush with the end. Keep laying tiles using yellow spacers for uniform gaps. Every half a dozen tiles, check for level.



2 Cut tiles to fit

To cut a tile to fit into the corner, lay it face down to mark the width needed, including gaps either side. Put in a tile cutter, check it's square and run the blade along the tile, applying pressure. Lay with the cut edge in the corner.



The bare wall above the benchtops was tiled then the stove installed.

Before

3 Lay the tiles

Apply more mastic and lay tiles in rows, using spacers and checking they are straight and level. When the mastic has set, after about 12 hours, remove the spacers. Clean between the tiles with a paint scraper to remove excess mastic.





4 Apply the grout

Mix water and grout powder in a bucket to the consistency of toothpaste. Use a rubber trowel to apply the grout to the tiles at a 45° angle so it fills the gaps, removing excess grout as you go. Tape the benchtop at the base of the tiles.



5 Clean the tiles

Let the grout dry for 30 minutes, then dip a sponge into a bucket of clean water and wring it out thoroughly. Wipe the tiles at a 45° angle, regularly rinsing the sponge. Run a finger over the grout, checking it's evenly applied.




6 Seal the gaps

Remove the tape and timber, scraping any mastic off the tiles. Apply silicone at a 45° angle in the gaps between the tiles, walls and benchtop, and where the timber was. Spray water and run a stick along the silicone to remove excess.







Soften the boundaries


Boundary walls and fences, as well as the sides of neighbouring houses, can make a small space feel cramped and hemmed in, especially when they are stark and bare.

Choose plants with small leaves to act as screens and, if the budget allows, buy mature plants and trees.

'You can buy advanced trees, as they are called, like ash trees, from many growers across Australia, and buying bigger really works to establish the garden very quickly,' says Jarret.

Sculptural stone features are a nod to grand formal gardens, and also work to break up boundary lines.

'Stacked stone cladding is a great and inexpensive way to introduce this material into the garden, and it is also light and easy for DIYers to work with,' he says.



A garden pond provides a safe haven for wildlife, and the bigger it is, the easier it is to maintain the ecological balance.

Check with the council before installing a pond as, in many areas, a maximum depth of just 300mm is allowed before fencing is required.

Include a gentle slope to the water using sand, gravel or pebbles, plus an underwater shelf around the edge for plants and to help wildlife get out.



Dense poolside plantings offer shelter for wildlife to safely approach the water



There are several factors to consider when choosing a location for a pond.

- AVOID shady areas, choosing a site that receives sun for most of the day.
- PICK a spot that is sheltered from cold winds so the water temperature is less likely to fluctuate.
- POSITION the pond in the open, away from overhanging trees or big shrubs. Fallen foliage can pollute the water, and the leaves of certain evergreens such as yew and laurel are toxic.
- MEASURE the area, as the pond should be a minimum of 2 x 2.5m.
- © CHECK for pipes and underground utilities before excavating by using Dial Before You Dig. Call 1100, or go online to make an enquiry or to download the free iPhone app (1100.com.au).



Flexible liner

Available in varying widths, these are easy to install and come in a range of materials from PVC to rubber.

- **1** MARK the pond outline with rope or a garden hose, then dig out the shelves, which should be about 200mm wide and 250mm deep, sloping inwards.
- **2 DIG** out the rest of the pond, making sure the top is even and level. Position an underlay, such as old carpet or a 50mm layer of sand, in the base to protect the liner from sharp objects.
- 3 DRAPE the pond liner over the top and anchor it with bricks or rocks. Fill with water and leave overnight. Trim off the excess liner and finish by edging with stones or rocks.



Aquapro 0.5mm x 4m PVC Pond Liner, \$40. aquatecequipment.com These are available in different shapes, sizes and depths, and some include a shelf for water plants. They're easy to install and very durable.

- **1 POSITION** the shell where you want to locate the pond, then mark the outline with a garden hose or rope. Excavate the hole 50mm wider and deeper than the pond dimensions.
- **2 LINE** the hole with about 50mm of damp sand. Using a spirit level, check the layer of sand covering the base is level, then place the shell in the hole.
- **3 FILL** the pond with water and, at the same time, fill in the gaps between the pond and the hole with sand and topsoil, ensuring the pond stays level. Allow to settle for a week before placing rocks around the edge.

A pond is a wonderful feature in any landscape, but it's not always possible to have one in small outdoor spaces.

The solution is to turn a pot into a pond. With just waterproofing paint and epoxy putty, you can convert almost any container into a water feature. All you need is a pot that matches the style of your landscape.

Clean the inside thoroughly, following the surface preparation instructions for the waterproofing paint, then fill any drainage holes with the putty and seal the interior.

Fill the pot with clean water, leave for two days to remove all surface impurities, then empty and refill.

To add waterlilies, check the depth required for the variety and position potted plants in the base of the pot or elevated on bricks.



Fill the holes

Seal the drainage holes with epoxy putty by kneading a small piece until blended to a consistent colour. Push the putty firmly into the drainage holes, leaving an overlap on the inside of the pot. Allow it to cure.



3 Seal the interior

Create a water feature in just three easy steps

Apply waterproofing paint to the interior with a roller, allowing it to cure in between coats. Position the pot in its final location, then use a spirit level to check for level from side to side and back to front.









Clean the pot

Scrub the pot using a suitable outdoor cleaner and a stiff-bristled brush or broom. Rinse thoroughly, then leave to dry completely.

TIP We used 30 Seconds Outdoor Cleaner to wash the pot interior.



• BLADES To replace dull or nicked blades, remove them and take to the hardware store to match up correctly.

• AIR FILTER Many can be cleaned but replacement is a better option, especially if you mow in dusty conditions.

• OIL AND FUEL Catch the waste oil in a container, remove the filler plug and roll over the mower with it pointing down.




With their scented flowers and long vase life, it's easy to see why carnations are a florist's favourite. But this hardy perennial is also easy to grow at home.

To brighten outdoor areas or for cut flowers during the warm months, add Carnation Oscar to beds or pots. It comes in eight colours and blooms from early spring to late summer.

This compact variety features short stems covered in large double flowers and has a mounded habit, growing to 25cm high and 30cm wide.

Give it a position in full sun or part shade in fertile, well-drained, slightly alkaline soil with a pH of 6.75. Deadhead for more blooms and don't overwater or mulch close to the base.

GROW SPROUTS

before they develop green leaves. Rinse well to remove any hard unsprouted seeds and coatings, drain, air-dry, then refrigerate in an airtight container for up to a week.





CHEESECLOTH RINSE WATER

1 Soak the seeds

Pour a thin layer of seeds into a clean glass jar and cover with warm water. Secure a piece of cheesecloth over the mouth of the jar with an elastic band, then leave the seeds to soak for 6-12 hours, depending on the variety.

Rinse the seeds

Drain the jar through the cloth, then half-fill with warm water. Replace the cloth, swill seeds gently and drain. Put the jar on its side in a warm, light spot out of direct sun. When shoots appear, rinse, then drain morning and night.

TOP 10 PLANTS BEES LOVE

Catmint

Nepeta x faasenii Don't let the common name, catmint, sway you from planting this favourite. You and the bees will be rewarded with blue flowers on silvery foliage all season.

Look out for the low-growing 'Walker's Low' or the tall 'Six Hills Giant'. One haircut midseason will keep this plant looking its best.

Calendula

This edible flower is also known as pot marigold and the yellowish-orange petals can be used in salads or as a garnish.

officinalis

Calendula

It likes moist, well-drained soil, full sun and cooler temperatures, and will reseed to provide years of beauty and nectar in the garden.

Rosmarinus officinalis Covered with masses of blue flowers, this herb thrives in a hot, dry, sunny position in well-drained soil. It likes alkaline soil, so add dolomite before planting.

It can be trimmed as a hedge and prostrate cultivars can be grown as groundcovers or used in hanging baskets.

💶 Callistemon spp. The magnificent spring or summer flowers of these native shrubs or small trees are irresistible to bees.

Most are hardy and will tolerate dry conditions. Prune bottlebrush lightly after flowering and feed with a fertiliser low in phosphorus.

Eucalyptus spp. Much of Australia's honey is produced from eucalyptus flowers. Choose one that suits your climate and bees will flock to the flowers.

'Summer Beauty' has soft pink flowers while 'Summer Red' has dark-pink to red flowers, and both grow to about 5m tall.



While it is a biennial, foxglove reseeds and tends to remain in the garden for years.



Borago officinalis The blue star-shaped flowers of borage are standout and you can eat the cucumber-flavoured leaves raw, steamed or sautéed.

This annual self-seeds, so it will be a long-lasting member of the garden. Once established, it is drought tolerant.









here's no denying that shade is a fact of gardening life, and growing plants successfully in areas with little or no sunlight is not always an easy task.

But there are plenty of beautiful and interesting specimens in the plant world waiting to transform these darker spaces, whether they're located under trees, along narrow passageways or in parts of your courtyard.



SHADE SAVVY Look closely at the kind of shade

being cast through the seasons. Certain areas may get morning sun in summer but none in winter, others may be in full shade all year. There are three main types of shade. FULL SHADE is permanent and not relieved by direct light. Dense and solid, it occurs in south-facing yards and passageways with tall walls. OFILTERED SHADE is found under trees that don't have branches close to the ground and allow rays of sunlight to pass through. OPART SHADE is defined as full sun for part of the day and shade at other times. There may be only morning or afternoon sun, and this is usually

Part shade can also be cast by tall plants, shrubs and hedges. This type of shade needs to be considered when planting out garden beds and as plants develop. >

the case on the western and eastern sides of walls, buildings and trees.

Thin out trees

Dense shade caused by foliage is easy to change by thinning the heads of trees.

Remove the lower limbs so light from the sides can reach the plants. Select the bough, then stand back before cutting and imagine what the tree will look like with it gone.

Once trees are thinned, full shade can become filtered or part shade.



Take into account that the sun is much lower in the sky in winter, so you may find that a south-facing spot with sun in January is in full shade in July

Prep before planting

When soil is in full shade and gets no sun, it will often be damp. When it is under eaves or shaded by buildings and receives little or no water, it can become lifeless and dry.

A little preparation before planting, followed by regular maintenance, will provide better conditions for growing plants in any type of shade.

Dig in compost or well-rotted manure, then mulch with lucerne hay.

Regularly apply organic materials while the previous application is rotting to keep plants healthy.

Don't allow soil or mulch to impinge on tree trunks.

- ASPIDISTRA ELATIOR has leathery strap-like foliage that looks good all year, but watch out for slugs and snails.
- AUCUBA JAPONICA cultivars such as 'Gold Dust' and 'Variegata' like morning sun.
- OBUXUS grows well in dry shade.
- CHAMAEDOREA ELEGANS
 thrives in frost-free climates.
- O CLIVIA MINIATA likes dry shade.
- CTENANTHE has striking leaves and is suited to frost-free climates.

TOP TRICKS

Try these smart ways to make a shady spot appear brighter.

- O PAINT walls in passageways or dark courtyards a pale colour to reflect the available light.
- FILL a large lime-washed terracotta pot with a shade-loving plant to brighten up an area.

Add extra charm by growing moss on the pot. Painting it with yoghurt or a mix of cornflour and water will encourage moss.

- OPLACE a mirror at the end of a shaded passageway or in a courtyard to reflect light.
- CREATE a cool summer relaxing area with a white table and seats.
- MIX coloured, variegated and green foliage to lighten a shady spot. In warm, frost-free climates, try ctenanthe, caladium, maranta, aglaonema, coleus or calathea.

The white flowers of the Japanese anemone bring light to semi-shaded areas.

Watch the way shade changes in the garden. As plants grow, they can cast shadows on plants that were initially in a sunny spot

Use mondo grass instead of a lawn to liven up a shady landscape.

Go to ground

Plant a shade-loving groundcover, such as Dichondra repens, star jasmine, baby's tears, mondo grass or native violet, instead of trying to grow lawn in a shady area. Large pavers or flat stones interplanted

with miniature mondo grass look very effective while decorative gravel can be used as a groundcover. 🦠



Most succulents can be very easily grown from cuttings or even leaves that you've accidentally broken off.

CUTTINGS

When you grow from cuttings, you're effectively cloning, creating a new plant with the same characteristics as the parent. This is ideal when you need an exact replica for a hedge or want to share a favourite plant.

Growing from cuttings also gives you the ability to preserve an ailing plant. If it's past its prime, you can start the life cycle again by growing a new specimen from a cutting. Think of it as new plants from old.

It's worth understanding, too, that certain plants, such as roses and citrus, may be grafted onto more vigorous and disease-resistant rootstock, so a cutting from them may not grow very well.



The key to growing from cuttings is taking them at the right time of year for the type of plant



RAISE NEW SUCCULENTS If you have succulents, keep a tray of propagating mix handy. When you accidently break leaves off a succulent, just pop them in the tray and in no time you'll have a collection of new plants.



Prepare the cuttings

Use clean and sharp secateurs to trim any ragged or torn ends from the broken-off succulent leaf or stem base of a cutting, leaving as much of the leaf or stem intact as possible for planting.



Make the planting holes

Fill a pot with seed-raising mix and use a stick to make small holes in the mix. Gently position cuttings in the holes, pressing the mix down around them. TIP Terracotta pots are ideal for succulents, as they breathe more.



Position the pot

Water in well, position the pot in a warm, sunny spot and don't let the mix become or stay too wet. For larger leaves, lean the cuttings against the lip of the pot for support if needed.

PREPARE THE SEEDS The native plant Kennedia has rock-hard seeds that won't germinate without treatment, called scarification, to break the hard skin.



1 PUT THE SEEDS in a bowl and pour over boiling water, then leave the seeds to stand overnight. **TIP** The seeds can also be lightly abraded using sandpaper.





2 CHECK THE SEEDS and select only those that have swollen, then spread them evenly in shallow rows in a tray full of seed-raising mix. Cover lightly with mix and water gently.



3 POSITION THE TRAY in a warm spot and keep moist but not wet. Add labels with the plant name and sowing date. In as little as a few weeks, your native seeds will be well on their way.



Been growing a delicious tomato? Save the seeds for next year.

Scoop out some flesh and put it in a fine sieve, then gently rub under running water until only the seeds remain. Spread them over a square of paper towel and allow the seeds to dry so they stick.

Cover with another square and roll up. Put in an airtight container with a teaspoon of rice to absorb moisture. To sow, cut off squares and lay on moist seed-raising mix seed-side up. Cover with mix. >



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DIVISION

In many ways, division gets the same results as growing from cuttings, as the new plants are clones of the parent.


A big difference is that divided plants are garden-ready and a good size in a short time or even right away.

But division is limited to plants that grow in clumps and spread by their root mass expanding, so it's generally only perennials, not shrubs or trees, that are propagated this way.

Re-potting cymbidium orchids after flowering gives you the chance to divide one plant into many, as a large specimen can quickly become half a dozen or more plants.

To divide them, you need a suitable orchid potting mix and a sharp spade. They love terracotta, as it breathes well.







Turn one beautiful orchid into a collection.

2 BREAK UP THE CLUMP further using your hands, wearing gloves. Aim to maintain sections that have at least one or two strongly growing lead bulbs and a few firm back bulbs.



3 REMOVE DEAD ROOTS and leaves. and any spongy or dead back bulbs. Make sure any accidental cuts to surviving bulbs are clean and, if not, tidy up with a sharp knife or secateurs.



1 REMOVE THE ORCHID from the pot and position on a firm surface. Find a clear section between leaves and bulbs, then divide the clump using a sharp spade or large garden knife.

4 FILL EACH POT with enough orchid mix so the plant sits at the right height. Tie the leaves up to keep them clear, fill around the roots so the bulbs are above the mix and firm down gently.



5 UNTIE THE LEAVES and water in well with a diluted seaweed solution. Position the divided and potted orchids in a shady spot that is also protected from winds.

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Coriander

Also known as cilantro, this annual herb grows to about 50cm high.

To ensure a plentiful supply, sow the seeds every few weeks in a sunny position in well-drained fertile soil. Remove the flowers to encourage the plant to produce more leaves.

In hot areas, choose slow-bolt varieties that are suited to leaf production and delay flowering.

In the kitchen

All parts of this plant, including the leaves, seeds and roots, can be used to flavour cooked dishes, salads or salsas.

Coriander leaves have a sharp taste and are added to Asian, Indian and Middle Eastern dishes, while the seeds and roots are dried and ground for curries and spice pastes.

Lemongrass

This grass-like herb is a frost-tender perennial and forms a striking clump, adding an architectural element to the garden. The edges of its arching leaves are razor sharp, so position it where it will not cut passersby.

Lemongrass is widely used in South-East Asian cuisines, especially that of Thailand and Vietnam.

In the kitchen

This is used to add a lemon flavour to cooking. Whole stems are bruised and tied together, then added to a dish to infuse while cooking and removed to serve.

The whitish bulb and tender white base of the stem can also be sliced very finely and added directly to cooking.

Parsley

There are two varieties of this herb. Curly parsley, which grows to 30cm high, and the stronger-flavoured flat-leaf, or Italian, parsley which reaches 50cm in height.

It likes a fertile, well-drained soil in sun or partial shade and makes a good border plant. It flowers in its second year and will self-seed.

In the kitchen

The most widely grown culinary herb, parsley is added to cooking or used fresh as an ingredient or a garnish.

A wonderful addition to salads and the main ingredient in tabouli, it can also be teamed with vegetables, fish, eggs, meats, stews and soups.

For the best flavour, add parsley to hot dishes just before serving.



New exciting seed varieties

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Mint

Popular in Thai and Vietnamese cooking, a use can be found for this versatile herb in any kitchen.

It must be planted wisely in the garden due to its invasive nature. You can grow it in a pot with a saucer or pavers underneath so it can't make direct contact with garden soil and escape.

Mint likes to be kept moist and will thrive in either shaded or semi-shaded positions.

You can choose from many different types, all with different qualities of scent and flavour. Most are low-growing, spreading perennials that reach about 45cm in height.

In the kitchen

Fresh mint leaves can be used with spring vegetables and as a garnish, or added to salads and fruit drinks.

It is used in mint sauce and mint jelly, which is traditionally served with roast lamb.

Fresh or dried leaves also make a refreshing herbal tea.



This herb has a distinctive flavour that is at its best when harvested after the small purple flowers start to appear.

It is a hardy perennial that grows to 45cm high and prefers a sunny spot in well-drained soil. It is drought tolerant once established.

There are golden-leaved ornamental forms of oregano and its cousin, sweet marjoram. They do best with a hard prune at the end of autumn.

In the kitchen

The fresh or dried leaves of oregano have a sweet, mild spicy flavour and are used on herb bread, in seasonings, and in Greek, Italian, Spanish and Mexican dishes, especially those including meat, pasta and tomato.

Sweet marjoram has a milder, sweeter flavour than its cousin and is used in Italian cooking. >

Tarragon

A sun-loving herbaceous perennial herb, French tarragon grows to 60cm high and requires excellent drainage.

It performs best when the old foliage is cut down to ground level at the end of autumn.

In the kitchen

This herb is an essential part of French cooking, and the leaves have a delicate aniseed-like flavour.

Tarragon can be used fresh or dried with fish, poultry, veal, eggs, cheese and salads.

Only a small amount is needed to add a distinct flavour to a dish without overpowering it.

Rosemary

This Mediterranean perennial shrub can reach 2m high, and there are also a number of dwarf and groundcover forms available.

Rosemary needs to be planted in full sun and is very drought tolerant once established.

It can be clipped to form an attractive fragrant hedge around the vegetable patch. Or one of the groundcover varieties can be grown down an embankment or a wall, or used as part of a vertical planting.

In the kitchen

Rosemary's pale-blue flowers and aromatic needle-like leaves can be added fresh or dried to dishes.

It is traditionally used to accompany lamb, but it also works well with chicken and other meats.

Sprigs can be sprinkled over vegetables when you roast them to add a lovely flavour.

Dill

Featuring fine, feathery foliage, this annual herb grows up to 1-2m high. The seeds can be saved for future planting.

It prefers a sunny position in moist soil with good drainage.

In the kitchen

The foliage has a parsley-caraway smell and is used fresh as a classic partner with eggs, soft cheeses, white sauces, vegetables, seafood and chicken dishes.

If adding fresh dill to cooking, do so just before serving as the flavour diminishes with heat.



SILVER CLEANER

Line a dish with foil, fill it with cold water, then add two teaspoons of salt. This creates a reaction in which the aluminium acts as a catalyst.

Soak your tarnished silver for 2-3 minutes, then rinse and dry.

PET GUARD

Can't keep your pet off the new couch? Place a piece of foil on the seat cushions and, after one go at settling down on the noisy surface, your pet won't consider it a comfy place to snooze anymore.

VEGIE SAVER

Keep hungry insects and slugs away from your cucumbers and other vegies by mixing strips of foil with your garden mulch. As a bonus benefit, the foil will reflect light back up onto your plants.

FLEXIBLE FUNNEL

For those times when you can't find a funnel, try doubling up a length of heavy-duty foil and rolling it into the shape of a cone. And, unlike a regular funnel, it can be bent to fit holes in awkward spots.

DRIP TRAY

To stop meat dripping on your barbecue coals, make a disposable drip tray out of a couple of layers of foil. Mould it so the tray is slightly larger than the piece of meat you're cooking.





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
