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



# Light and open

Three small rooms housed the kitchen, dining and living areas, with the main bathroom off the living space. The old kitchen was tucked into a corner with insufficient bench space and storage.

'For what people want today, it was all wrong,' says Christy.

'Not only was it dark and cramped, but it didn't work logistically and there was no sense that the outside area was connected to the house at all.'

The partition walls came down and the area was opened up into a spacious and light-filled living and eating hub.


An island between the kitchen and dining area was installed to act as a casual seating area, while a red-tiled splashback was added, bringing a large slice of warmth and personality.

'Renovating a kitchen is one of the most satisfying parts,' she says.

'It's amazing how much better you can make the area function just with better use of the space, more cabinets, benchtops and built-in appliances.'

# **Entrance impact**

Grand proportions, like high ceilings, wide hallways and large rooms, are a main feature of homes from this era.

Through the front door, the long hallway was painted in a soft grey, so the decorative trim and architraves really stand out. An archway has been added to reflect back to the decorative preferences of the Federation period.

'Before we renovated, this hall just looked long and cold,' says Christy.

'All the features were gone or boarded over and it just didn't invite you in at all. But that impact you can make on people entering is really easy to achieve once you take it back to how it would have originally been.'

The flooring adds to the dramatic effect, with old telegraph poles used instead of the more usual boards.

# Sleeping beauties

The original three-bedroom layout has remained the same, but the treatment of the space is dramatically different.

All extra large, the bedrooms had no storage at all. Each bedroom now has floor-to-ceiling built-in wardrobes.

'There was so much empty space, but just a small timber wardrobe in each room,' says Christy.

'The possibilities for brilliant storage were endless, and we did plan the built-ins carefully so they have well-considered solutions inside.'

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# Spa appeal

When redesigning the space, the couple had to work out ways to incorporate existing features into the new layout.

One of these was a light well, which was in the centre of the home.

'This was empty space, and while it served a purpose, I looked at it and immediately knew we had to do something with it,' says Christy.

'When I saw that the bathroom in the old house was accessed through the living space, it was clear that we had to move it and the light well area was the obvious choice.'


Taking some floorspace from the second bedroom, Christy and Scott decided to create a large family bathroom with luxury finishes.

'Scott saw this stone bath and said we had to have it. I wasn't convinced at first, but I have to say it's definitely a feature that people love,' she says.

'I'm really happy we didn't skimp on space, as it's now a luxury retreat, not just a functional bathroom.'

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# Garden redesign

Christy and Scott built a new deck off the back of the house, to replace the concrete suntrap they found there.

An old Hill's Hoist dominated the outlook and there was nowhere with any shade. Retro purple paint and masses of plantings made the backyard feel small and undefined.

To make the most of the area, they created a covered deck with a built-in barbecue and plenty of room to sit out and eat in the warmer months.

Below this, a patio area has been defined with a low border wall, which also doubles as seating. A pizza oven has been installed for entertaining.

# Finishing touches

A large purple-painted shed ran down the side of the garden, and Christy and Scott first thought to tear it down. But it had storage space and a laundry, so they changed their minds.

'I like a proper laundry, not one in the bathroom or just a cupboard, so we kept the shed and reconfigured the layout to include a toilet and study.


'Scott and I are really happy with how this all turned out. It took four years and cost \$200,000, but we made \$600,000 on the sale,' says Christy.

'We're already onto our next reno, another period fixer-upper that we hope to do in two years this time around.'

With the broad range of materials, colours and designs on offer, choosing the right blinds to suit your lifestyle can seem like a big job.

To skip the stress and make sure you buy the best blinds for your place, use these handy tips to select a type for each room in your house. >

Suit the space In areas exposed to high heat, consider aluminium venetians, white timber venetians or blockout roller blinds. All have a white or reflective backing to help eliminate heat.

Wet zones, like bathrooms, are environments where fabrics that resist moisture, such as PVC and aluminium, are the best picks.

Pick a style Currently in fashion, venetian blinds are an affordable alternative to white plantation shutters. They also help control privacy and light.

Roller blinds are a practical option for areas that require frequent use or access, such as sliding doors, and provide a sleek, contemporary finish.

Evaluate how you use the window or door when deciding on a style of blind.

If you regularly need to open or close them, a roller blind may be best. Venetians are ideal for spots like behind a couch.

Access is also an important consideration, as you need to be able to reach the cord or wand.

Check light levels
Venetian blinds are the ideal solution for general living areas, as the angle of the slats can be adjusted to suit your light and privacy needs.

In bedrooms where less light and more privacy are needed, fabric blockout blinds can provide a dark room for a deep sleep.

Keep it safe

If you have children and

pets, make sure you select window coverings that include child safety devices.

They are crucial for protecting kids and pets from hazardous dangling cords and chains.

Read the instructions carefully to install the blind correctly with the supplied safety devices.

Clean it easy

All blinds will attract dust, so consider the allergen tolerance of household members before buying.

Fabric blinds can hoard dust, unlike aluminium blinds, which are also easy to wipe clean with a wet cloth.

When entertaining, the back patio comes into its own. Positioned under a timber pergola, the dining setting is protected from the sun and rain.

Inside, a small study has been created in a corner of the houseboat.

Positioned at the back end of the boat, with no corner windows, is the bedroom. It is restrained in colour to

promote restful sleep, and minimally furnished. The headboard has been covered in timber-look wallpaper to tie in with the rest of the decor.

'Not a day passes that we are not surprised by nature. The sunlight, birds, and everything else that lives on the water make you feel at one with nature and the seasons,' says Tineke. •

Cheer up an alfresco entertaining area with DIY hanging decorations

prucing up an outdoor area can be as easy as hanging a centrepiece above a table or from a tree or pergola.

You can make a colourful and vibrant chandelier using a hanging basket, wire and bead necklaces, and with a couple of coats of spray paint, you can match it to your space.

Bead necklaces are available from party or discount stores. Ensure you have enough necklaces so the wire basket underneath doesn't show.

## EXPERT SECRETS

Hanging centrepieces add charm to an outdoor area without taking up extra table space, and can even be used to display candles or plants.

Just be sure to take them down during high winds.




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
#### 1 Prepare the beads

Spray-paint the bead strands in two shades of a bright colour. Remove the lining from a wire hanging basket, then unclip the hanger and reattach to a large curtain rod ring. Secure three equal lengths of chain to the curtain ring and add chain clips to the ends.



#### 2 Attach the beads

Use tie-wire to attach a strand of beads to the basket rim, then take the beads under the basket and attach to the opposite side, cutting to length if needed. Repeat to cover the basket. Clip the chains to the rim. Wire bead strands to the rim and the curtain ring.





Candles and plants are an easy way to add ambience outdoors. Group different-sized candles and pot plants on a hanging tray to create a display of light and greenery.


This tray is made from 19mm pine board and is suspended by two loops of chain. Each chain runs through a shackle attached to a length of 8mm rope secured overhead.

The timber board is edged with punched-metal strapping to create a lip for the tray and give it a touch of industrial chic.










#### Secure the strapping

Cut a 19mm pine board to size, wrap 30mm metal strapping around the edges and cut to length. Position the strapping flush with the board base to create a lip for the top, securing with 25mm flathead nails every 100mm.

TIP Seal the timber with clear varnish.



#### 2 Attach the chain

Measure 15mm in from the ends, mark the strapping and drill 25mm deep pilot holes into the edge of the board. Position the third link from the end of the chain over each hole, securing with M8 x 50mm coach screws and washers. Tighten with pliers.



#### **3** Hang the tray

Attach a shackle to each chain, then thread a piece of rope through the shackles. Secure the rope to a branch, awning or pergola using S-hooks. Add pot plants and a variety of candles.

TIP Use a spirit level when hanging the tray to get a flat, level surface.









Melissa cleaned the table and removed the top from the base before she began painting.

She decided to spray the top in a gloss white and the legs in hammered silver. Using spray paint meant she could easily get to the hard-to-reach parts.

'The paint is fast drying, so it was finished in an afternoon, which is just what an impatient DIYer likes,' says Melissa.

#### KITCHEN

With constant use, the kitchen can quickly become the dirtiest room in the house, but given it's where we prepare food, it has to be the cleanest.

To minimise grime, bacteria and stains, get in the habit of wiping the benchtop and sink after every meal, and giving them a good scrub weekly.

For a big clean, focus on the hotspots like cabinet doors, the rangehood and splashback, using a grease-cutting cleaner, then it's time for the oven and microwave.

#### Remove oven grime

Make an oven cleaner by combining half a cup of baking soda and one teaspoon of salt with enough water to form a paste. Apply to the oven walls with a sponge, then scrub to remove the grime.



#### Clean the microwave

Microwave a cup of water and a slice of lemon on high for five minutes to steam-clean the inside.

Once the cup has cooled a bit, remove it and wipe away the grime with a damp cloth to leave the microwave lemony fresh.

BUSTERS

Microfibre cloths are more efficient at cleaning surfaces than cotton cloths or paper towel. They're also great for picking up dust when dry, plus they're machine-washable

#### PETS

Our furry friends aren't the tidiest of housemates, shedding their hair on furniture, tracking dirt through the house and leaving nasty surprises on the carpet for us to clean up.

Keeping certain parts of the house pet-free will minimise their impact, as will regular grooming to remove any loose fur. Invest in a powerful vacuum cleaner and sprinkle baking soda on carpets to kill odours.

**AVOID CARPET DAMAGE** Act fast after toilet accidents to prevent stains. The longer you wait before cleaning, the greater the risk of long-term damage.



#### 1 Blot the mess

Soak up the urine with white paper towel, avoiding printed patterns that can bleed colour. Press hard to soak up as much as possible, then add about a quarter of a teaspoon of dishwashing liquid to a cup of lukewarm water.



#### 2 Apply soapy water

Soak the area thoroughly using the detergent solution and paper towel, then blot with dry paper towel. Repeat this process at least once. Rinse out the detergent using clear water and blot the carpet dry again.



#### 3 Dry the carpet

Top stain-stopping tips

Avoid permanent damage by following these essential rules.

• TAKE IMMEDIATE ACTION as the less time the stain has to penetrate, the better your chances

are of removing it before it sets.

- BLOT UP as much of a spill as possible using a cloth or paper towel. Lift off solids with a knife.
- KEEP IT MOIST if you can't clean it immediately, as it's easier to remove a stain when it's still damp. Sponge it with cold water, spray it with soda water and then cover it with a damp towel.

Don't scrub at a stain. Place an absorbent pad underneath and dab it with the remover, working from the outside in to avoid leaving a ring



**REMOVE MILDEW AND MOULD** Thriving in cold, damp and dark places, like inside wardrobes or behind furniture, mould and mildew leave an ugly stain behind even after removal, so repaint to cover the stain.




1 SCRUB THE WALL using a sponge and a solution of one part bleach and three parts water. Don't worry if the stain doesn't totally disappear.



2 PRIME THE STAIN and surrounding area using a stain-blocking primer. Allow to dry, then apply the top coat to match the original wall colour.

#### EXPERT SECRETS


Fertilise your lawn about a week before you apply a topdressing to prime your grass for quality growth.

#### **AERATING**

For soil to support quality plant growth, it needs to have spaces that air, water and nutrients can be transferred through.

This can be hard to achieve in lawns, as the soil is constantly being compacted, so the simple way to fix this is through aeration. **OSPIKED LAWN ROLLERS** are an easy and efficient way to aerate large lawns. Pick up a roller from your local hire shop, fill it with water, then pull it around the lawn. • GARDEN FORKS are ideal for small areas. Drive the fork about 50mm into the soil and gently rock it back and forth. Repeat every 50mm across the compacted area.

Work backwards to avoid walking on the aerated parts.



Use the back of a landscape rake to evenly spread the topdressing mix over small areas. For larger areas, use a soil levelling tool.

#### **TOPDRESSING**

It wasn't that long ago that the must-do spring chore for the lawn lover was topdressing.

To aerate smaller lawns, use a garden fork.

Today, topdressing is really just done to fix lumps and bumps. But that's not to say that giving your lawn a full topdress isn't an option, as the results are well worth the effort.

If you do decide to topdress, feed the lawn about a week beforehand

and only use a specialist mix, which is available in bags from your local landscape supplier.

This mix is generally made up of 70-80% very fine organic matter with river sand.

Apply only a light covering and don't water in the mix until the new growth punches through, as a hard crust may form. >





It's easy to overlook weeds, but they can cause the biggest problems with your lawn by creating dead patches when they suck out nutrients and overshadow your grass.

Many weeds can be adequately controlled through feeding your lawn and regular mowing, but sometimes you need a more direct approach.

#### MANUAL REMOVAL

This is still the most reliable way to weed the lawn. A variety of modern tools are available to help you weed, or you can use an old-fashioned daisy grubber.

• WEAR gloves while weeding, as some have prickles and others have mildly caustic sap.
• PULL up the weeds, roots and all, to prevent them growing back.
• AVOID shaking the weeds to prevent the spread of seeds.
• KEEP a bucket on hand to toss the weeds into, then dispose of them in your green waste.



You can use selective weedkillers to spot-spray lawn weeds or use diluted all-purpose herbicide.

The important thing to remember is that non-selective herbicides will kill or damage all plants, so any overspray onto the lawn will cause harm.

If not using a ready-to-use pack, then there are two easy ways

of applying herbicide to the lawn when spot-weeding.

- BRUSH on using an old paintbrush or a special-purpose device such as the Yates Zero Weeding Brush.
- SPRAY on to spot-treat the weeds. There are hooded spray heads available for many spray units, but remember that you're still likely to get a certain amount of overspray.

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# FOOD FOR HEALTH

Want to take the easiest option for caring for your lawn? Simply fertilise with a quality lawn food.

A healthy lawn can often out-compete weeds, killing them naturally, and is more able to repair its own scrappy patches.

If you use a fertiliser with an organic component, you'll also be feeding the soil, not just the grass.

This gradually improves the quality of the soil, which will aid aeration and drainage.

#### KILLER GRUBS

If you're finding dead areas in your lawn for no reason, then curl grubs could be the culprits.

These are the larvae of a small black beetle that lives and grows in the soil, feeding on the roots and leaves of the grass.

The giveaway that you have curl grubs is when you can grab the dead-looking grass and it comes away from the soil easily.

Use environmentally friendly Eco-Neem to solve the problem.





There are three main points to consider when replacing a lawn.

**1** ASPECT If the lawn is in a sunny position, the soft-leafed buffalo Sir Walter is ideal.

If the area is shady, you will need grass that has a higher shade tolerance. This is sold under codes, such as ST91, which means it has 91% tolerance.

- ENVIRONMENT Take into account the local climate. Fescue grasses are very tolerant of hot, dry conditions, while Velvetene is ideal in warm, coastal situations.
- 3 FUNCTION Select a variety to suit your level of wear and tear. Running grasses such as buffalo or kikuyu self-repair to cover bare patches much faster than clumping grasses like fescues.

Did you know?

Here are a few facts and figures that might just make you love your lawn even more.

- Well-managed turf works effectively as a carbon sink, capturing carbon emissions.
- O A healthy 450sqm lawn can absorb more than 11,000L or 25mm of rain without significant runoff. This reduces erosion and the burden on stormwater systems.
- The root mass of a lawn acts like a filtration system, trapping excess nutrients and other substances, and stops them reaching waterways.
- Lawns absorb CO<sub>2</sub> and generate oxygen. A standard 15 x 15m lawn will produce enough oxygen to sustain a family of four.
- In summer, a healthy lawn will maintain a surface temperature at least 10°C lower than bare soil and other hard surfaces.



Bulk buying

For large jobs, you'll need bulk materials. Talk to your local landscape supplier and explain that you need a turf underlay soil mix.

To calculate the volume you need, measure length by breadth and then the desired depth.

Assuming your area is level, about 20-40mm of new soil is adequate. So an area of 5 x 5m

to a depth of 20mm would need half a cubic metre of soil. Your supplier can convert this into tonnage for you.

You'll need turf delivered in bulk, so check with your supplier about what access they need for delivery, as they often use an all-terrain mini forklift to move the turf to your site.

Also, ensure you have a spot cleared for the delivery. >

Make sure you have access for soil to be delivered.





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Replace the lawn

Sometimes a lawn reaches a tipping point where it has become too badly worn and you need to do some serious work to get it looking good again.

You can try to refresh a seriously degraded lawn, but you'll likely end up investing more time and money without ever getting a quality result.

The simple fact is that if your lawn has more weeds and bare patches than grass, then it's time to lay new turf to restore it to health.


#### Prepare the ground

Remove the existing lawn and weeds, then turn over the soil. Use a landscape rake to collect the waste material and roughly level the entire area.

TIP We hired the Husqvarna TR 430 Dual Cultivator for \$157 for one day.



Spread underlay mix over the area with a soil spreader. Starting from one end and working along a straight edge, lay the turf in a brick-like pattern to help the turf knit together faster. On a slope, lay the rolls across the slope.



#### 3 Apply a fertiliser

Straight after laying the turf, apply a hose-on seaweed tonic, such as Seasol, then use a sprinkler to evenly water the lawn thoroughly.

TIP We used an oscillating sprinkler so the water covered the whole lawn.

## GET READY FOR SPRING

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ack when Dad did the lawn, the edges were laboriously finished off with a spade, and trimming around tricky spots was done with hand shears. Today, we just reach for our trusty line trimmer.

Whether battery, electric or petrol driven, line trimmers have in many respects revolutionised lawn care.

Simple to use and available for a variety of prices, from budget to top shelf, there's a trimmer to suit your needs whether you have a tiny lawn or an acreage.

Here we look at a selection of the range on offer and provide a few tips on using a trimmer. >

Head rotation
Know the direction of rotation of the head. If yours spins anticlockwise, it will cut best on the right-hand side, and vice versa.



Best technique
A trimmer cuts with the last few millimetres of the line, so don't push the head into the area you're trimming, just let the ends do all the work

Spindle check
Check the trimmer before
every use to make sure
everything is tight and clean, and
that there is no material trapped
around the head spindle.



Line thickness

Refill the head with quality line of the recommended diameter. If it's too thin, it will snap easily. If it's too thick, it may not feed correctly in auto-feed or tap-and-feed heads.



## PICK THE POWER SOURCE

With electric trimmers, you just plug them into the mains and off you go. Efficient, quiet, lightweight and easy to handle, they're ideal for small lawns.

Battery-powered trimmers are quiet, convenient and lightweight, and have many of the benefits of electric models with the added bonus of being cordless.

Modern battery technology means these models are more than up to trimming small- and medium-sized lawns. But when it comes to cutting power and run time, petrol wins out.

Nowadays, petrol-driven line trimmers are much quieter and more efficient than those of the past, and they also have much lower emissions.

Petrol trimmers are available in two-stroke and the more powerful four-stroke models.

#### Preparing the site

Concrete can be expensive if bought by the bag, so it's best to buy a ready-to-pour mix that can be delivered to the site in a mixer truck.

Order more than you

think you'll need before you start the job so you don't end up running out before finishing. Use the remaining concrete to fix up any other DIY jobs that need doing.

Before digging the trench for the footings, be sure to prepare properly.

Consider where plumbing and electrical pipes or other obstructions may be buried, and Contact Dial Before You Dig to find the locations of underground utilities (1100.com.au).

Check with your local council to guarantee compliance for the pool fence, and take the necessary steps to ensure the site remains safe and secure throughout the build.

#### Laying the tiles

The concrete was left to cure for a week then Travertine tiles were laid on a waterproof mortar screed to prevent them cracking.

Apply a 10:1 Bondcrete and water mix to the concrete to create a waterproof membrane.

While still wet, apply a mortar slurry made using a 10:1 water and Bondcrete mix. Let it cure for a day, then lay the tiles.

## The DIY pool fence that's ready for summer.

Whether you're updating your old pool or finishing off a new one, you can't go past Everton's range of DIY glass pool fences. Stylish, safe and budget friendly, Everton glass pool fences are ready for you to install in a weekend.

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### INSTALL THE FENCE



#### Prepare the trench

Set a level stringline using stakes or pegs to mark the fence line and excavate a 400 x 400mm trench. Position reinforcing mesh on bar chairs in the trench. Overlap lengths of mesh and tie together with wire.



#### Set out the posts

Mark the ends of the fence line, flick a chalkline in between, then set out the panel positions with equal gaps. Mark the post positions 150mm in from the panel edges and use a mini post at each position to mark the hole centres.



#### Install the panels

After an hour, secure the posts using washers and nuts. Set the panels in the posts, align with the marked positions and check the spacing. Ensure the rubber insert is seated correctly. Use the Allen key to clamp the panels securely.




#### Make the footings

Pour the concrete, agitating the mix so it settles well. Trowel the surface to an even finish, use the stringline to check for level, then let it cure for a week. To determine the best tile layout, mark the fence and gate panels on the concrete.



#### **5** Drill the post holes

Use a masonry bit to drill 6mm holes to 80mm deep for the post holes, then a 10mm masonry bit to widen the holes to 10mm by 100mm. Drill into the tiles with the hammer action off, turning it back on to drill into the concrete.



#### 8 Level the panels

Set a stringline to check the alignment of each panel using a 5mm spacer. To adjust, loosen the bolts in the post and insert packers underneath to align the panel with the stringline. Check each panel for plumb and level.



#### 3 Lay the tiles

Flick a chalkline to mark the edge of the tiles. Mix the tile adhesive and spread over the concrete with a 10mm notched trowel. Lay the tiles, using a spirit level and straightedge to get them straight and level.



#### **6** Set the anchor studs

Clean the holes using a bottle brush and compressed air. Position a post, inject UltraFix Plus and wind in each Chemset anchor stud, leaving 10mm protruding. Remove the post and clean if needed. Repeat for each post.



#### 9 Fit the latch

Attach the hinges to the hinge panel and release the spring tension. Position the gate, pack underneath to align the hinges, then secure. Re-tension the springs so the gate shuts firmly. Attach the latch on the pool side of the gate. •



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


## INSTALL THE FENCE



#### **1** Excavate the post holes

Clear the area and run a stringline low to the ground, using a fence panel as a spacer to mark the post holes at 2500mm centres. Excavate the holes with a power auger, 600mm deep and 200mm in diameter.




#### **3** Secure the panels

Slide the panel brackets over the top and base rails, raising them into position on temporary blocks. Use a spirit level to check the panels are level, then secure the brackets to the posts with self-drilling Tek screws.




#### **5** Hang the gate

Attach the self-closing hinges to the outside of the gate using Tek screws, 80mm from the top rails and level with the base rail. Space the gate evenly, using a torpedo level to check the gate is level.




#### Position the posts

Set a stringline for the post tops. Allow a gap of up to 100mm below and 50mm above each panel, with the latch post 300mm above the gate. Position the posts in the holes and fill with concrete, sloping for runoff.



#### **4** Cut the panels

If the fence needs to negotiate an angle other than 90°, change the direction of the fencing by cutting the ends of the panel rails using an angle grinder with a cutoff wheel. Touch up the ends with spray paint.



#### **6** Attach the gate latch

Secure the latch at least 1500mm above ground level, closing the gate with it in position. Tap in the post caps, then adjust the springs on the hinges so the gate will automatically close from any open position.

There's definitely something quintessentially Australian about a backyard pool.

#### The reno challenge

With uninspiring surfaces and minimal furniture, this pool is not somewhere you would want to spend your summer afternoons.

The paving surrounding the pool is faded, the garden looks scraggly and there's no outdoor furniture except for a couple of deckchairs.

The main ways this pool will be improved is with decking, paint and low-maintenance plants, with a barbecue and table added in to boost entertainment credentials.

#### 1 PAINT THE FENCE

There isn't anything glamorous about a timber paling fence, and even less so when the construction posts are on your side.

The first step is to remove the garden bed around the perimeter and spray-paint the fence for colour consistency and a smarter look.

#### **4** COLOUR THE PAVERS

With the poolside lounge area now sorted, it's time to revamp the fringes.

The pool surround and pavers can be painted using a non-slip paving paint that is designed for wet areas.

Using a dark grey will ensure a cohesive and colour-coordinated design.

#### 2 BUILD A DECK

Uniformity is important in any design and especially here, where the aim is to create a clearly defined outdoor area with a barbie and furniture.

The warm tones of merbau will be used for the new deck and for timber screens that will frame the area.

#### **5** REVAMP THE GARDEN

To avoid overhanging branches dropping leaves into the pool, I'm going for minimalist landscaping.

Tropical-looking cordylines and natural river pebbles in the beds give a restful outlook.

A vertical garden creates a lush focal point on the bare white wall of the house.

#### 3 ADD A SHADE SAIL

Shade is necessary in any outdoor area but is very important poolside, where it's easy to lose track of time.

A dark grey shade sail will tie in nicely with the charcoal-sprayed fence.

If the budget allows, a timber pergola is an alternative, but it will need to comply with council regulations.

#### **6** FENCE THE POOL

There are very strict rules around pool fencing, but they differ depending on where you live and the age of the pool, so check what regulations apply for your situation.

## CALLY VAILERS

Add a bubbling fountain to the garden using a large decorative pot


water feature can turn any garden or courtyard into a soothing and tranquil place, as the sight and sound of running water creates a relaxing atmosphere.

This fountain is made from a large pot, which adds wow factor without taking up too much space.

To make it, you'll need a pot of your choice, a water feature conversion kit, waterproofing membrane, a pond pump and submersible silicone, plus a shovel to excavate the area.



### INSTALL THE WATER FEATURE



#### Prepare the area

Decide on a position for the water feature, then remove any pavers or turf. Bury heavy-duty conduit beneath the area to allow the pump cord to run to a nearby outlet, selecting conduit that is wide enough for the pump plug.



#### 4 Install the pump

Remove the top of the sump and position the pump inside the support chamber. Feed the pump cord through the chamber side hole, then position the pump and support in the base of the sump, clicking it into place.



#### Attach the riser

Secure the riser tube to the flange inside the pot. The top of the riser should sit about 75mm below the rim of the pot to keep it constantly below the water level, preventing splashes and the pump from drying out.



#### Seal the pot

Apply two coats of waterproofing membrane, such as bitumen paint, to the inside of the pot. Start from the top of the rim and work towards the base, allowing each coat to dry for several hours before applying the next coat.



#### 3 Dig the sump hole

Use a shovel to excavate the area where the sump will sit to a depth equal to the height of the sump. Compact the soil beneath the sump to provide a stable base and use a spirit level to ensure that the sump sits level.



#### 6 Attach the sump top

Connect the pump attachment to the pump and feed the other end through the sump top. Attach the flange to the top of the pump attachment, then apply silicone around the flange and position the pot on top.



#### 8 Drill the sump holes

If the base of the pot covers the original sump drainage holes, drill new holes in the sump top to allow water to re-enter the sump. Ensure that all plastic waste is removed from the holes to avoid clogging the pump.

#### **6** Prepare the cord

Secure the end of the power cord to a cable puller using electrical tape and pull it through the conduit. You may need a qualified electrician to install an outdoor powerpoint nearby if you don't have one already.



#### 9 Fill the water feature

Add water to the pot and sump, ensuring the water level in the sump is higher than the pump. With the pump on, the water will flow over the lip into the sump. Replace pavers and cover the sump with pebbles. 2



TEST the paint on a small area of the floor to check it's compatible with the old coating. Allow to dry for 24 hours and if it does not adhere, remove the old paint.
APPLY the first coat of paint using a paintbrush or roller.
LEAVE to dry for 16 hours, then apply a second coat.
ALLOW a week to fully dry.





O TULBAGHIA 'MILKY WAY' looks great in rockeries and along paths, and is part of the Border Stars range. Bred to be tough, 'Milky Way' is hardy and tolerates both dry and wet conditions.

Featuring evergreen grass-like foliage and pale pink flowers from spring to late winter, it's ornamental year round, growing to 40cm high and spreading to 60cm.

This clump-forming perennial has low water needs and is easy to grow, requiring minimal maintenance. OTELOPEA 'ESSIE'S GIFT' is a unique, compact form of waratah. It's a winner in small gardens as a low-growing hedge and also does well in containers.

It puts on a display of beautiful deep-pink blooms on short stems during spring, which look fantastic in cut flower arrangements.

This Aussie native likes fertile, well-drained soil and has low water needs once established. Give it deep soaks in long dry periods, and a feed in autumn and spring.



# To-do list

Get to work planting and maintaining the spring yard.

- SOW marigolds, petunias and other summer-flowering annual favourites.
- **PLANT** container-grown roses and keep well watered until established.
- ✓ TAKE leaf or stem cuttings from cacti and succulents and pot them up.
- ✓ WEED vegie beds regularly and mulch to prepare for warmer weather.

- flowers and deadheading.
- CHECK for fruit tree pests but don't spray if in flower, use methods like fruit fly traps and hand-picking.
- STAKE tall perennials for support and tie in climbers.
- ✓ LAY rolls of turf or sow new lawns and reseed damaged patches.
- CLEAN existing ponds of weeds and algae and plant up new ones.

# GROW CLIVIAS FROM SEED

Once their skin has turned bright red or yellow

clivia seeds are easy to collect and grow, but they'll take at least three years to flower.





#### Skin the berries

Trim the seed head using secateurs. Wearing gloves, remove the berries and rub off the skin and flesh to reveal the pearl-like seeds. Remove the near transparent seed skin and discard any seeds that are wrinkly or spongy.



#### Sow the seeds

Fill small pots almost to the top with seed-raising mix and gently push a few clivia seeds into the surface, leaving about half exposed. Water in gently and position the pots in a warm spot. Don't overwater.

## Feed now

Lightly feed new plants and those in spring growth.

the Little Veggie Patch Co has been helping people grow food at home since 2008. They started by installing raised beds, then released a range of seeds (littleveggiepatchco.com.au).

In this project from their latest book, DIY Garden Projects, Mat and Dillon show off their talent for repurposing unassuming materials.

'Salvaging and upcycling is all about unlocking the potential in a discarded item,' says Mat.

'Take the apple crate, for example. It started as a storage bin, yet we have used them as raised garden beds, chook coops, sand boxes and cubbyhouses.

'Trench mesh bars, typically used in concrete work, have become our staple trellising material.' >

### Materials

Newspaper or tarp 3 x 4m lengths of 20mm electrical conduit Spray paint Crate 12 x 25mm U-brackets Drill set

40 x 25mm timber screws Bird netting 1.83 x 2.5m sheet of heavy-duty

clear plastic Household stapler and staples 2 x 1.2m medium wooden dowels

Staple gun and staples Twine or string 1.83 x 2.5m piece of shade cloth Lay out a tarp or some newspaper on the ground. This will be the foundation of your paint workshop.

Electrical conduit comes in a generic PVC grey that speaks more to a building site than a peaceful garden, so lay the conduit out on the newspaper or

> tarp and spray paint it with two coats of your favourite colour.

While the paint is drying, prepare the crate by attaching three sets of U-brackets on the opposite sides of the crate. Fix these at each end and through the centre. Fix a corresponding row below.

Full of ideas for spaces big and small, projects range from quick and easy, such as a self-watering milk carton planter, to large jobs like a cubbyhouse made from recycled apple crates.



The shade cloth is built exactly the same as our plastic cover. Cut to the appropriate dimensions and attach a 1.2m dowel or timber length to one end.

Use a staple gun to fix the non-dowel end of the cloth to the opposite side of the crate to the plastic. It can now be extended or stored away according to your needs. 🗸

# CARING FOR YOUR VINE

Given the right growing conditions, a passionfruit vine is easy to grow.


- POSITION the vine in full sun with protection from the wind.
- SOIL must have good drainage to prevent root rot, as passionfruit is very susceptible to this. It is a heavy feeder, so add well-rotted manure or compost to the soil before planting.
- FEED in early spring and autumn with a controlled-release plant food for flowers, or a citrus food. Water the soil thoroughly before and after.
- MULCH around the plant, as this helps retain moisture in the soil, avoiding the area near the stem.
- WATER regularly and deeply, especially in dry weather. The passionfruit vine has an extensive and shallow root system, so soak a wide area surrounding the vine.
- PRUNE in early spring by about one-third. Remove any dead wood and cut back wayward shoots to promote new growth. Prune so air can circulate through the foliage.

# TIME TO HARVEST

About 12 months after planting passionfruit, the fruit starts appearing. Let it ripen on the vine to fully develop its sweet flavour.

When ready, the fruit will drop off, or it can be picked when it's fully coloured and easily pulls free from the vine.

You can freeze the pulp in ice trays or place the fruit in a bag and refrigerate it for a month.



# In the kitchen

There are lots of ways you can include passionfruit in your everyday eating. • SQUEEZE the pulp onto cereal or yoghurt. • MIX it into smoothies. • ADD the pulp to an olive oil and balsamic dressing to enhance green salads. • FREEZE in popsicle moulds to make a healthy treat. • TEAM passionfruit with pork and seafood. • ADD it to an apple or mango crumble. • USE it to make jams.

# PROBLEM SOLVER

#### **EXCESSIVE SUCKERS**

CAUSE If the graft is damaged or there has been root disturbance, suckering can come from the blue passionfruit rootstock.
The leaf looks different, and is a blue-green colour.
FIX IT Remove the suckers at once. If a grafted vine dies, carefully remove all the root system to prevent growth from the roots.

#### **PASSIONFRUIT VINE HOPPER**

CAUSE This insect sucks sap from the plant, causing the leaves to wilt and the flowers or fruit to drop. FIX IT Hose them off, or you can use a pyrethrum-based spray.

# SMALL BUMPS ON THE STEMS CAUSE Scale.

FIX IT Scrape off with your nail or spray with horticultural oil.

#### **FLOWERS BUT NO FRUIT**

CAUSE This can be the result of a lack of pollinating bees or the weather being very hot, very cold or raining at flowering time.

FIX IT Pollinate flowers by hand using a dry paintbrush to transfer pollen to the female parts. Prune excessive growth to expose the flowers and plant bee-attracting plants such as borage nearby.



#### **WILTING SHOOTS**

CAUSE Fusarium wilt.
FIX IT Remove the vine and do not add it to the compost. Plant a variety that has been grafted onto golden passionfruit.

FLOWERS AND FRUIT DROP AND LEAVES FALL AT THE VINE BASE

**CAUSE** Lack of water.

FIX IT Water regularly and deeply.

#### **TINY HOLES IN THE FRUIT**

CAUSE Fruit flies lay their eggs underneath the skin of the fruit and the hatching larvae then feed their way to the centre, causing the fruit to rot.

FIX IT Use a fruit fly bait early in the season to detect fruit flies. Destroy the infested fruit immediately, but don't put it in the compost. ➤





# Raspberry and passionfruit sponge roll

#### **Ingredients**

340g fresh raspberries 30g icing sugar, sifted 4 passionfruit 3 large eggs 115g raw caster sugar 110g plain flour 1 tablespoon tepid water Extra 24 (about 100g) fresh raspberries Sprigs of fresh mint

#### Method

**1 SET** aside half the raspberries. Put the remaining raspberries and icing sugar in a bowl and crush lightly with a fork. Cut the passionfruit in half, scoop out the pulp and stir into the crushed raspberry mixture.

**PREHEAT** the oven to 200°C. Grease a 23 x 33cm Swiss roll tin and line with baking paper. Put the eggs and caster sugar in a large bowl. Beat with an electric mixer until very thick and pale, and the mixture leaves a trail on the surface when the beaters are lifted out.

TIP If using a hand whisk or rotary beater, set the bowl over a pan of almost boiling water, ensuring the water doesn't touch the bowl.

**3 SIFT** half the flour over the egg mixture and gently fold in with a large metal spoon. Sift over the remaining flour and fold in with the tepid water.

**4 POUR** the mixture into the prepared tin and shake it gently so it spreads evenly into the corners.

Bake for 10-12 minutes or until the sponge is risen and golden, and springs back when pressed gently.

**5 TURN** out onto a sheet of baking paper that is slightly larger than the sponge. Peel off the lining paper. Trim the crusty edges of the sponge with a sharp knife and make a score mark 25mm from one of the shorter edges to make the sponge easier to roll up.

**6 SPREAD** the crushed raspberry mixture over the hot sponge, leaving a 10mm border all round. Scatter over the reserved raspberries. Roll up the sponge from one short edge and place, seam side down, on a serving plate.

**SERVE** warm or cold, cut into slices. Decorate each serving with extra raspberries and a sprig of mint.



# Passionfruit jam

#### **Ingredients**

24 passionfruit 1 cup water Juice of 1 lemon 1.1kg sugar

#### Method

**1) WASH** the passionfruit, cut in half, scoop out the pulp and set aside. Put half the shells in a bowl, cover with water and leave overnight.

2 TRANSFER the soaked shells and water to a pan and boil for about 30 minutes or until the insides of the shells are tender. Drain the water, scoop out the soft pulp inside and discard the shells. Chop up the pulp.
3 PUT the soft pulp, reserved pulp and cup of water in a pan and bring to the boil. Add the lemon juice and sugar, stir until the sugar dissolves and boil rapidly to setting point.

# Passionfruit and honey zabaglione

#### **Ingredients**

- 4 ripe passionfruit
- 1 tablespoon boiling water 90g honey
- 4 large egg yolks
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice

#### Method

- **1 CUT** each passionfruit in half and scoop the pulp and seeds into a sieve over a large heatproof bowl. Sieve the fruit thoroughly, then trickle the boiling water over the seed mixture in the sieve and scrape again with a spoon. Scrape any pulp from underneath the sieve into the bowl. Discard the seeds.
- **2 HALF-FILL** a saucepan with boiling water and bring to a simmer. Add the

honey, egg yolks and lemon juice to the bowl with the passionfruit juice, then whisk well with electric beaters. Set the bowl over the pan of simmering water and continue to whisk until the mixture is pale and thick, and leaves a trail when the beaters are lifted out. This will take about 10 minutes and the mixture will look like a slightly soft, whisked sponge mixture when ready. Keep the water barely simmering, don't allow it to bubble too fiercely or the eggs will cook and separate.

**3 REMOVE** the bowl from the pan and continue to whisk for 1 minute. Spoon, ladle or pour the zabaglione into four small glasses and serve immediately.

## Passionfruit fool

#### **Ingredients**

200ml pouring cream 2 tablespoons icing sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 160ml passionfruit pulp 8 almond bread or biscotti, to serve

#### Method

**1** WHIP the cream, icing sugar and vanilla extract in a bowl using electric beaters until soft peaks form.

**② FOLD** most of the passionfruit pulp gently into the cream mixture using a large metal spoon or rubber spatula, reserving a little for decorating, taking care not to stir too vigorously or you will spoil the texture of the cream.

3 SPOON the mixture into four 160ml glasses. Drizzle over the remaining passionfruit pulp. Serve immediately with the almond bread or biscotti.

TIP This dessert can be made up to two hours ahead and chilled.

# FRAGRANT FOLIAGE

The leaves of various plants can be just as fragrant as the flowers.

Position plants with scented foliage by entrances or pathways so you can touch them as you pass.

The foliage of scented-leafed geraniums (*Pelargonium* cultivars) release a strong fragrance when touched, which makes them popular in gardens for the visually impaired.

Combine them with lavender and rosemary in sunny garden beds.

Lemon verbena (*Aloysia triphylla*) has lemon-scented foliage, as the name suggests, and can be grown in pots.





Corsican mint



Scented groundcovers planted between stone steps, courtyard pavers or bricks in paths provide perfumes underfoot.

When walked on, thyme exudes a wonderful fragrance. Try woolly thyme (*Thymus pseudolanuginosus*) or lawn thyme (*Thymus serpyllum*).

The heat of pavers appears to accentuate the perfume of sweet Alice or alyssum (*Lobularia maritima*).

Lawn chamomile, especially the cultivar 'Treneague', is ideal for paths, while Corsican mint (*Mentha requienii*) likes damp, shady areas. It has a lovely peppermint-like smell, particularly when its leaves are crushed. >

# CONTAINERS

Boost colour in the garden by transforming everyday items into novelty plant holders

ardening in containers is a very rewarding way to get growing. It also has many advantages over planting in garden beds.

You have a lot more control over the growing conditions and you can place them in handier locations, such as close to the kitchen door, which is especially useful for herbs and vegies.

And your garden is portable, so if you move house, it can go with you.

There is a huge range of off-the-shelf choices for pots and container garden systems but, sometimes, you just can't find that special something.


Here are a few ideas to get your creative juices flowing and help you assemble your own designer planters.











#### **1** Drill drainage holes

Clean the boots thoroughly in slightly soapy water using a scrubbing brush, then rinse and allow to dry. Carefully drill two drainage holes in the sole of each boot using a drill fitted with at least a 10mm bit.



#### Spray the boots

Apply painter's tape to the tags, side panels and sole edges. Wearing gloves, apply stain blocker to each boot. Allow to dry, then spray one boot in orange. Apply another coat, if needed. Spray the other boot in lime.



#### **3** Add the plants

Carefully remove the painter's tape and half-fill each boot with potting mix, pushing the mix right down into the toe areas. Add the plants and backfill with potting mix. Water in and add more mix, if needed.



#### MUG PLANTER

Ideal for beautiful bloomers by the front door to greet guests, this project uses mugs mounted on a timber board to form a series of small planters.

The top third of each mug needs to have a straight surface so they can be mounted on the back board.

Our board measures 140 x 20mm and we left a half-cup width between each mug, with the handles to the side, and a mug width at each end.

To make it stand out, we used Dulux Weatherboard Gloss tinted in Charcoal Essence to paint the board.

#### SAFETY TIP

It's important when using diamond core bits that you wear gloves and suitable eye and ear protection.



#### **1** Cut the back board

Measure and cut the back board to length using a circular saw, then mark the mug positions, drilling screw holes. At each end, drill and countersink screw holes for mounting. Sand, undercoat and paint the board.



#### Attach the mugs

Mark the position for a mounting hole a third of the way down the back of the mugs. On a stable, shock-absorbing surface, such as a firm foam mat, drill a 6mm mounting hole, then an 8mm drainage hole in the base of each mug.



#### Secure the board

Attach the mugs to the board using buttonhead screws and washers, then tighten with a socket wrench and driver bit or right-angled screwdriver. Add potting mix and the plants. Mount the board, securing with screws.

Drilling into porcelain

The only way to safely drill into porcelain is with a diamond core bit, which comes in various sizes.

The drill must be run at a low speed and should never be set to hammer mode. Apply only moderate pressure, letting the bit do the work. Keep it wet by dipping it in cool water at least every 20 seconds.

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# FLOWER TOWER

To make a three-tier planter, like ours, you'll need five different-sized pots. The top two visible pots are glued to support pots positioned upside down.

Each visible pot should be a size or two smaller than the one it sits on and the decrease in sizes should be even.

The pots that sit inside are hidden by potting mix and allow the bases of the visible pots to be positioned 20-30mm into the potting mix.





#### 1 Attach the pots

Apply adhesive to the base of the first support pot. Position the second-tier visible pot upside down and secure the first support pot to it, with the drainage holes aligned. Repeat for the next tier of pots. Allow the adhesive to dry.



#### Add the plants

Position the second-tier glued pot arrangement in the base pot and add potting mix. Repeat for the top tier of glued pots. Add the plants to each tier. TIP For larger towers, assemble them where they are to be positioned. •

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ABOVE Salad vegetables, like climbing tomatoes, will thrive against a vertical backdrop.

BELOW Surrounding a doorway with greenery softens the look and gives it an air of mystery.





#### Climbing plants

In a small space, train productive climbers over frames, trellises or poles, or create a wall garden, to increase the growing area and maximise your harvest.

Tomatoes, beans, cucumbers, peas and small pumpkins can all climb and are ideal for tiny yards.

Frames and trellises for growing can be easily made from wire mesh,

timber, lattice or even wire stretched between two upright posts.

The climbing frame can also have multiple purposes. You can curve two frames together to form an arch that doubles as a shaded seating area and provides protection to nearby plants.

Supports range from hardwood or bamboo stakes to a purpose-built metal climbing frame. >





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

# PLANT WALL

A wall garden is the ideal way to bring greenery into a small space, such as a courtyard, and to get the job done fast, use a kit that comes with a frame that attaches to the wall and hooks to hold the planter troughs.

A vertical garden is a great way to grow seasonal herbs and annuals, but make sure to water it regularly, as pots can dry out quickly.

#### Materials


Vertical garden kit
Wall plugs
Hammer drill
Screws
Pencil
Tape measure
Spirit level











#### **1** Measure the wall

Choose a location on the wall for the vertical garden, ensuring it gets enough sunlight and a tap is nearby to make watering with a hose easy. Use a tape measure and spirit level to measure up and mark the wall.



#### Secure the frame

Position the frame to mark the screw holes on the wall. Use a hammer drill to make the holes, cut wall plugs to size, then insert in the holes. Insert the screws in the wall plugs, then hang the frame securely on the screw ends.



#### **3** Hang the planters

Once the frame is secure, hang the supplied planter hooks on it. Fill the planters with potting mix and plants, then water in well. Position planters on the hooks so they're held securely and make sure they're evenly spaced.

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#### FREEZER REFRESHER

Get rid of the smell of food after a freezer failure. Fill bowls with used or fresh coffee grounds and put them in the freezer overnight. For a flavoured-coffee scent, add a couple of drops of vanilla.

#### PLANT FERTILISER


Put old coffee grounds to good use as plant food. They're packed with nutrients that acid-loving plants love. Save them to fertilise rosebushes, azaleas, camellias, rhododendrons and evergreens.

#### WORM FEEDER

Keep bait worms wriggling all day long with used coffee grounds. Mix a cup into the soil in your bait box before adding the worms. They love coffee, and the nutrients in the grounds helps them live longer.

#### CARROT BOOSTER

Mix carrot seeds with freshly ground coffee before sowing. The extra bulk makes the tiny seeds easier to sow and the aroma may repel cutworms and other pests. They also add nutrients as they decompose.



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
