MOUNTAIN RETREAT

A new build on a family plot of land strikes the ideal balance between modernity and simplicity





A contemporary home replaced the rustic shack that used to sit on this bush property.

s a child, Mark Parer spent his school holidays with his father and siblings in a shack in the bush. But it wasn't always welcomed.

'I would moan like mad,' says Mark, who is now 58 years old.

'We had no TV, no neighbours and no privacy. The place my dad bought was as basic as it comes, with only two rooms. How he put up with us, I'll never know.'

But those holidays formed some of his best childhood memories and a lasting connection to the landscape.

When Mark inherited the 2.5ha of land, he left everything untouched for a number of years, unwilling to change what had been there.

And when he and his wife decided to leave city life behind, there was really only one place to go. >

The swimming pool is positioned to take advantage of the bush setting and amazing mountain views.

Pool priority

There was one element that was non-negotiable when Mark decided to build a new home on the property.


'The nearest beach is miles away, so a swimming pool was essential. I looked at plans with the architect and she suggested it was also a way to bring water to the dry environment, so the design got larger,' says Mark.

Most people include a pool for the kids, but here it was a defining feature that drove the rest of the build.

To keep the reference strong, the 20m pool runs long and narrow into the distance, forming the visual punctuation in the bush landscape from each room of the house.

Central views

The home follows a simple floorplan of living and dining at the front, with bedrooms and bathrooms to the back.

A central courtyard links all the spaces and also provides ventilation, visual balance and views.

It also features a limestone step arrangement, which reflects the lines of the house and acts as a defining sculptural element, combining nature and the built environment.


A mature olive tree references the European-influenced design and the wider bush landscape.

'You don't realise how important these exacting details are until you are living with them,' says Mark.

'It's such a relaxing and calm house, and I know it's at least in part down to the attention to every aspect working together in harmony.'







Understated luxury

In this house, the palette is soft and earthy, with all the strong colour being reflected from outside.

The generosity of the floorplan means that lots of space is given to everything, enhancing the feeling of luxury and unhurried leisure.

No elements compete and excess is avoided. The quality of the light and the open but considered spaces make this home a private oasis.

'Even the kitchen takes second place to the view. This was something different for us, to take the focus away from the interior,' says Mark. 'Of course, we have all of the inclusions we need, such as storage and bench space and a double-sized stove, but the simplicity of the design makes it enjoyable and unfussy to use.'

All the technology in the home works cleverly behind the scenes to provide modern conveniences such as heated floors, automatic blinds and curtains, and music.

'Without really realising it until it was finished, this modern and comfortable home has managed to retain something of the feeling of my dad's old shack, something that makes me incredibly happy,' says Mark.



GRER LIVING

These homes of the future blend seamlessly with nature





ave you ever wanted to live among nature in a treehouse but baulked at the prospect of managing the everyday necessities such as electricity and plumbing while living off the grid?

A new building concept is set to change all that by fusing nature and architecture in a fully equipped, multipurpose dwelling.

Oas1s, an idea conceived by Dutch architect Raimond de Hullu, is intended to revitalise urban spaces by replacing concrete with greenery and creating the world's first 100% eco city.

'For those people who demand a high-quality and green standard of living, Oas1s brings competitive middle-class housing,' says Raimond.

A typical Oas1s home is clad with vertical gardens and features three bedrooms and two bathrooms, plus lounge, dining and storage areas in a 160sqm, four-storey layout.

The eco-homes are designed to be constructed within a forest-like urban community that doubles as a public park. The compact sites will be car-free, with electric car-share stations located at the fringes.



The spacious interiors feature recycled timber and triple-glazed windows that allow natural light to flood into the home.

Back to nature
Living off the grid means
all electricity and water
must be provided by nature.

In a self-sufficient Oas1s home, power comes from solar panels, water is collected and recycled and green walls can provide edible produce.

The homes can also be set up as an eco-resort, allowing guests to experience natural locations while making minimal impact on the environment.

The layout is the same, but the kitchen is now flooded with light and bang up to date. he kitchen in this investment property was well past its prime. Dated peach cabinets dominated the small space, and were teamed with a brown splashback and grey benchtops, making it an eyesore.

Maria Coutinho and her husband Pedro spent just \$6300 to update it. They knocked out a wall and designed the kitchen using Kaboodle cabinets and benchtops. A rangehood, new sink and lighting were also added.

The reno took a week and doing the work DIY, except for plumbing in the new sink, and not changing the wiring kept the costs right down.

INSTALL THE CABINETS



Assemble the cabinets

Secure the back to the base using the supplied screws and predrilled holes, ensuring the leg holes are on the outside. Add the sides, keeping the front edges flush, then attach the rails in between with two screws each end.



Position the cabinets

Use a spirit level to mark a level line on the wall, 865mm up from the lowest point on the floor. Position the cabinets and adjust the legs so the tops meet the wall line, then check for level in both directions.




Hang the doors

Secure the plates to the cabinet sides and the hinges to the doors, then hang the doors with even gaps. The two plate screws adjust the height, while the centre screw on the hinge arm moves the door left or right.


Attach the legs

Position the leg base plates with the tapered edges on the sides and the front legs set back 60mm. Push in the legs, then use a combination square to set the height to 145mm to match the maximum height of the kickboard.




6 Cut the pipe holes

Mark any pipe holes down from the level line and cut with a holesaw from the outside, finishing from the inside. Drill 5.5mm holes into the wall through every second cabinet, insert plastic plugs and secure with screws.



Add the drawer faces


Drill clearance holes in the drawer front corners. Position the lowest face flush with the cabinet base with even gaps on the sides. Secure from inside with screws, using clamps and coins as spacers to attach the remaining faces.



Add the drawers

Attach the runners to the inside face of the cabinet sides and the guides to the drawer sides, aligning the guide marks. Insert the drawers.

TIP Screw heads can impede runners if they are not driven accurately.



6 Secure the end panels

Clamp the end panels with the front edge overhanging the cabinets by 20mm, and plane to finish flush at the top. Secure through the inside of the cabinets with screws. Add heat deflectors for the oven cabinet.



Install the kickboards

Cut the kickboards to length and position hard against the legs. Mark 50mm back from the cabinet base front edge using a combination square. Secure with screws. Seal around panels and kickboards with silicone.

DIY design

To ensure the final layout of the kitchen was going to make the most of the space, and the finishes would complement each other, Maria designed it with the help of a Bunnings consultant.

In addition to a floorplan, a 3D rendering of the renovation was provided, to give a realistic preview of the finished design, ensuring any errors were caught before purchase and installation.

The Kaboodle website has tools for you to try this at home (kaboodle.com.au).

The mykaboodle management tool enables you to create mood boards, collect images and track the progress of your DIY project.

PAINT SHORTCUTS

THAT DO MORE HARM THAN GOOD

Avoid these common pitfalls when decorating rooms DIY

inishing a paint job as quickly as possible may be desirable, but taking shortcuts will often create problems instead of solving them.

So steer clear of these 20 dodgy

time savers to guarantee great results.

Trying to cover in one coat

It's a bad idea to slather on a thick layer of paint in an attempt to save a little bit of time.

For starters, one coat rarely covers well. A thick coat will also run and take forever to dry.

Applying two thin, even coats is easier and will give you a much better end result.



For a lump-free finish, sand your walls before you roll on paint.

Sanding gets rid of bumps, roller lint and flaking paint left over from previous paint jobs.

Use a pole sander and 80 or 100 grit sandpaper. You can use a handheld sanding block instead, it'll just take longer.



Most patching compound leaves a foggy spot on the wall when you paint over it. This is what painters call flashing. And it's ugly.

Prevent flashing by applying primer over the patch with a sealing-type primer.

In a hurry to get the job done? Painting over paint that's not completely dry isn't the answer.


The worst-case scenario is that you'll loosen the partially dry paint and it will start to come off onto your brush or roller, creating a real mess.

It can also cause adhesion problems or even slow the drying time, so follow the drying time instructions on the paint tin.



Washing, patching, filling and sanding are undoubtedly tedious. time-consuming tasks. But there's no substitute for good prep work if you want a great end result.






You won't save any time by trying to use thick paint to fill the gaps in the skirting boards.

When the paint dries, the gaps will reappear, meaning you'll have to apply filler anyway. So, always fill first, then paint. >





Even if you're a tidy painter and can brush a perfectly straight line, you should still use painter's tape on the skirting boards.

If not, you're sure to end up with spatters on the boards, or worse, get paint all over them.

You don't have to completely cover the skirting board. A strip of 25mm tape is all you need to catch any spatters.

Bumping the ceiling

A slight distraction is all it takes to bump the ceiling with a roller, leaving you with a touch-up job.

You can avoid this problem by cutting in with a brush, painting a 50mm strip of paint parallel to the ceiling first, then rolling up to this buffer zone.

Painting over wallpaper without sealing it

A one-day project can become a week-long job if you don't remove the wallpaper first, or at least apply a stain-blocking sealer.

The paper is likely to soak up the paint and start to peel off the walls in spots if it isn't sealed.

Not thoroughly mixing the paint

Using paint that is not well mixed can be problematic when you go to touch up areas afterwards.

If you use the remaining paint in the base of the tin to touch up, you'll discover it's a slightly different colour because the paint hadn't been mixed well.



There are many reasons you should put the lid back on the tin as soon as you're done painting.

Perhaps the most obvious one is it will stop someone stepping on the lid and treading in paint.

But it'll also keep your paint clean and stop it from drying out.



If you base your colour choice on paint swatches, you may be in for a nasty surprise.

We've all done it. You pick out a nice colour from the swatch at the hardware store and order your paint, but when you put the paint on the walls at home, it doesn't look like the colour you chose.

You can avoid this problem by buying a small sample tin of paint that you can try out on the walls.

Remember to look at it in both natural and artificial light.

Doing a paint job on an extremely hot day is a bad idea, as the paint will start to dry before you can spread it evenly, leaving streaks.

Plan your painting to avoid doing it in direct sun, if possible. Try to paint south-facing walls in the morning or the evening when the sun is less intense.

Equally, avoid painting on cold days when paint will dry slowly.



If you're painting walls without skirting boards, leave an unpainted strip along the base that will be covered once the skirting boards have been installed.

Painting too close to the floor can result in your roller picking up dirt, lint and hair that can then be spread across the wall. >

Using the wrong paint

If you've chosen the wrong paint for the job, no matter how good your application technique is, the project isn't going to turn out well. Here are three situations to watch out for.

1 ENSURE the surfaces are perfectly smooth if you want to paint with a semi gloss or gloss sheen, or else light will show up every defect.

2 START with a tinted primer when covering a light-coloured wall with dark paint. Grey is a great choice under most dark colours.

3 LABEL the tins if you're painting with two sheens of the same colour, as it's very easy to mix them up. You won't realise your mistake until the walls are dry and it is too late.



Avoid painting interior surfaces in low light, as you won't get a fair impression of how it will look when the light is brighter.

The most likely problem areas that you'll miss are thin patches and other surface imperfections, so always make sure you have bright light when painting.



When you paint over any surface that already has a coat of varnish or glossy paint, apply a surface preparation product first.

Thorough sanding will work, but wiping the surface with a liquid bonding agent is easier and more effective.

Buying cheap brushes and roller covers to save money

Good-quality brushes and roller covers give a better finish.

This not only saves time, but they will also help the paint go further, saving you money as well. They'll last far longer if you take good care of them. Painting timber without a stain blocker

Timber contains tannins that bleed through most acrylic paint.

Prime trims and doors with a stain blocker before painting to prevent the tannins bleeding through the paint as it dries.



Stripping old wallpaper can be a big job, especially if it has been hanging for decades.

Unlike modern wallpapers, the pastes and materials used in the past can be a challenge to get off but not impossible, if you have the right tools.

Here are two effective methods for removing old wallpaper DIY.

What you need

Chemical method


Lay a drop sheet and score the wallpaper using a wire brush. Mix up chemical remover, pour into a paint tray and apply using a roller, wetting the paper well. Scrape off the wallpaper, then reapply the remover, soaking any stubborn spots. Scrape the wall clean and rinse with water.



Steamer method

Cover any powerpoints with tape, lay a drop sheet on the floor and make sure the area is well ventilated. Press the paddle of a wallpaper steamer against the wall, a section at a time, for about 30 seconds or until the paper starts to peel off, removing it with a scraper as you go.

CREATE A BACKYARD PLAYGROUND



Turn a bare patch of the garden into a paradise for the kids by installing a multifunctional play set

PROJECT AND PICTURES STUART SCOTT



his family home had been recently renovated and the yard was not yet landscaped, making it an ideal spot to create a children's playground.

Carrie and Steve Gregg wanted somewhere their kids, two-year-old Lily and baby Harper, will use for years.

They chose a multifunctional play set that includes a slippery dip, ball pit, climbing wall and more, so the kids will never run out of options when it comes to playtime.

Several pairs of hands were needed to assemble the play set, before the footings were excavated and the structure was secured with concrete.

A crushed-rock substrate was created to level the ground, then rubber crumb was laid over the top to provide a soft-fall surface.

Setting the surface
For the surface, we used
Pour In Place rubber crumb
compound, which is available in
a range of colours from red to black
(pourinplace.com.au).

It comes in boxes, with each one covering an area up to 1.5sqm, and it is easily laid DIY.

Pour in Place can be applied over concrete or just about any other stable surface. The only tools you'll need are a float and a utility knife, as everything else is in the box.

This backyard was very sandy, so we added a 50mm layer of fine roadbase in a loose free-form shape to create a stable substrate.

We screeded the new substrate level, then spread a 15mm layer of Pour in Place over the top. >

BUILD THE PLAYGROUND



Prepare the site

Consult the plans for the precise area needed for the layout, ensuring there is plenty of clearance around the shop, slippery dip, swings and fireman's pole, where the rubber crumb surface will be laid. Chip out any grass with a mattock, then use a rake to groom the site, removing any large stones.



Create the substrate

Mark a free-form shape around the assembled and concreted play set, allowing plenty of room at the various activity centres of the play set for the kids to play. Spread a 50mm layer of roadbase, then screed and compact it with a straight piece of timber or screed board until the surface is level.



Assemble the play set

Keep everything organised by using containers with lids to house individual items. Lay out all the components logically and follow the instructions carefully and precisely. Ensure you have a number of helpers on hand as, once fully assembled, the play set will be heavy to move.




5 Spread the rubber crumb

Remove the parts of the play set that may impede laying the rubber crumb, such as the slippery dip. Mix the supplied binder adhesive from the kit with the rubber crumb in the bag. Cut the bag and spread the mixture with a lubricated float. Repeat this until the entire area is covered.



3 Create concrete footings


Prop up the play set with offcuts of decking or similar to support it, then excavate the footings. Consult the instructions for the exact positions of the footings. Fill the footings with concrete, embedding the supplied fittings into the mix. Allow to fully cure before loading.



6 Finish the edges

Smooth and roll the rubber crumb surface with the float as you go, to achieve a seamless transition to the surrounding surfaces. Leave the newly laid rubber crumb surface for 12 hours to fully cure, then return the elements of the play set that were removed before the surface was laid. >




as shade cloth or canvas for birds, even in fully enclosed structures.

- ADD mosquito netting for rabbit and guinea pig runs to guard against heartworm.

- **SELECT** metal to enclose rabbits, as they will chew through wood.
- **USE** only galvanised iron, avoiding cheap imported cages, wire or mesh.




LAY THE PAVERS



Excavate the area

Set out the area using marking paint, then remove any soil, vegetation and grass with a shovel. Make deep, parallel cuts spaced one shovel width apart, then slide the shovel underneath to lift the turf in strips. Dig deep enough to allow for 100mm of roadbase, 30mm of sand and the thickness of the pavers.



4 Haunch the edges

Prepare a sand and cement mix by adding water until it is the consistency of toothpaste. Use a steel float to spread the mix alongside the pavers to reach halfway up the edge, sloping it away at a 45° angle. This locks them in position. TIP Use 20kg premixed bags of sand and cement for small jobs.



Prepare the base

Spread 100mm of roadbase evenly over the area to be paved, then compact it twice with a plate compactor. Spread 30mm of washed sand evenly over the roadbase and screed using a timber float, checking for level.

TIP You can hire a plate compactor for about \$60 a day.



Fill the gaps

Sweep dry jointing sand across the area to fill the gaps between the pavers. Use a plate compactor to compress and settle the pavers into the sand, placing a piece of carpet underneath to protect the pavers. Lightly spray the area with water using a hose, to activate the jointing sand. Apply a sealer, if desired.



Position the pavers

Set up a stringline along the edge of the area to ensure the pavers are straight. Starting at one edge, lay the pavers across the area with 3mm gaps in between to allow for jointing sand. Check the pavers are straight and level, then wriggle them into place and tap with a rubber mallet to adjust.

Cutting pavers

Pavers laid around awkward corners usually need to be cut to fit. They can be cut dry using a large angle grinder with a segmented diamond blade.

For larger areas with a lot of cuts, you can hire a wet-bladed brick saw for about \$110 a day.



HOW TO HANG PLASTERBOARD

Renovate a tired hallway by replacing the surfaces DIY

PROJECT AND PICTURES STUART SCOTT

his 1950s coastal cottage had undergone a number of updates over the previous few months, and the hallway was the next area on the list to be given a reno.

The plasterboard was stripped off the stud walls, then new insulation was added into the wall cavities.

New plasterboard linings and cornices were cut out and installed. The original skirting board was kept, but the old picture rail wasn't replaced.

Hanging plasterboard isn't hard as long as cutting is done accurately, but getting the joints smooth requires skill, as a rough finish will show.

DIY TIP

Check for pest damage or old or unsafe wiring that can be replaced when you remove the linings from the walls.

If you want to call in a plasterer for the joints, it will take a day and cost about \$400 for an average-sized room

Good practice

When jointing, it's common for inexperienced DIYers to overfill. Thinner applications of compound are always best.

Try to use just enough compound to fill the joints and no more. It's easy to top up with a second application if necessary.

Wear appropriate safety gear and strip wall linings carefully after switching off services.

Have an electrician terminate any wiring that will be affected before commencing work.

And if it's necessary to handle wiring, turn off the power at the fuse box before you begin the work.

EXPERT SECRETS

Imperfections are more noticeable on large surfaces, so build up your skills before tackling those areas.



INSTALL THE NEW WALL



Measure the walls

Remove the existing trim, window frames and plasterboard, saving the skirting to reinstall later. Measure up and draw a plan of the walls to be lined, including window and door openings. Use this to work out the size of the plasterboard sheets you will need to use to complete the job.



4 Add the cornice

Measure the wall at the ceiling line, transferring the measurements to the new cornice, then mitre cut the ends. Dry fit the cornice, marking the wall along the base, then tack in a few nails on this line. Add cement to the edges of the cornice and lift it onto the nails, securing with temporary screws.



2 Cut the sheets

Cut a sheet of plasterboard for the top half of the wall and one for the base. Mark the overall wall length on the sheet. Score the sheet using a trimmer knife and a straightedge, then snap the sheet, cutting the backing paper. TIP Use a holesaw to cut openings for powerpoints and light switches.



Spread a 1mm layer of compound at the corners and horizontal joints using a broad knife. Bridge the joints with paper tape, working it into the compound. Allow to dry, then lightly sand. Apply a second coat of compound over the joint to a 2mm depth and smooth. Allow to dry, then sand.



3 Install the plasterboard

Add a daub of adhesive to each stud, avoiding the first and last studs and the rebated edges, as these will be screwed. Put 10mm packers on the floor and position the base sheet. Screw the edges on every stud, the centres on every second stud and the ends about every 250mm. Repeat for the top sheet.



6 Paint the walls

Apply wallboard sealer to the entire area. A second coat may be required over joints and screws to seal those areas adequately. Apply an undercoat and paint the plasterboard using a roller. Reattach the architraves and skirtings, filling and sanding as required. Finally, touch up the trim.

a picture on the wall and got into a debate about the right height and position, followed by the inevitable, 'Is it straight?'

You can make picture-hanging disputes a thing of the past with a laser level kit from Bosch.

The PLL 360 Line Laser comes with its own tripod, and it's self-levelling, so you'll be set up in seconds.

It projects a forward-pointing vertical line and a line on a 360° horizontal plane, which can be run at the same time or switched on and off independently.

CHOOSE AN ANCHOR



Light

expanding anchor.

• For a nylon anchor, drill a hole the same diameter in the wall and insert the anchor, tapping in the nail with a hammer. Leave the head protruding for pictures that weigh up to 10kg.



OPlastic star plugs are colour coded for size and length. For a blue plug, drill an 8mm hole, drive in a 14g screw and leave the head protruding to hang pictures up to 15kg in weight.



With a sleeve anchor such as a DynaBolt hook, bore a hole with a masonry drill and tap in the bolt. Tighten and secure, using locking pliers for extra leverage if needed. This holds up to 20kg.

PLASTERBOARD It's best to secure a hook directly into the wall stud, but if there isn't one, then you can use a hollow wall anchor.



When using a self-drilling anchor such as a Wall-Mate. there's no need to drill a hole first. Simply drive the anchor into plasterboard, then wind in a screw hook to hang pictures up to 10kg.



To use a molly bolt, drill a 10mm diameter hole, then install the bolt with a setting tool. Remove the screw, add a picture hook and replace the screw to hold up to 15kg.



Mark the wall and position a four-pin hook. Use the built-in spirit level to check for level and tap the pins into the holes with a hammer. Heavy-duty four-pin hangers hold up to 20kg.

The trick to transforming the bathroom DIY is good tiling skills

Buying his first home was the impetus for James Illes to pick up tools and begin renovating.

After getting quotes of over \$7000 to update the bathroom, he chose to revamp it DIY instead.

'I thought about it for a while and eventually decided to give it a go myself,' says James.

'I'd done smaller projects before and my dad is very handy so he taught me a lot.'

James redesigned the layout of the bathroom, stripping out all fixtures and tiles. He replaced the blue board walls and the old screed, then installed a bath.

A wall was built for the tub and timber frames for shelving, then James tiled and grouted the floor and walls, before painting.

In the end, he completed the stunning reno for just \$2100.



After renovating their weekender at Coronet Bay in Victoria, David and Christine Mitchell built an eye-catching privacy screen.

'We decided that, being close to the beach, we would go for a bathing box theme,' says David.

A support frame was built and attached to the fence, then three sheets of 15mm exterior ply, cut to bathing box shape, were attached to the frame.

Doors were added, then each box was given different cladding, including corrugated iron, timber weatherboards and a fibre-cement version called HardiePlank.

David created the eaves and fascias using 230mm HardiePlank with 70mm grooved treated pine decking, then each box was painted in a bright colour scheme.

'We now have a privacy screen that brings the beach to us when we look at it,' he says.

When it comes to creating something eye-catching, colour is the key



When friends of Suzy Hindley bought their dream home, she thought she would give them a unique housewarming gift.

'They needed a new mailbox, and my friend loves pelicans so I happily offered to make one for her,' says Suzy.

She came up with 2D images on paper, then transferred them onto 12mm marine-grade plywood. She cut out the pieces with a jigsaw and painted them.

The pieces for the box were scribed out, then the screw holes predrilled and countersunk. A vice was used to hold it together while it was glued and screwed.

Suzy pre-painted the inside of the box to seal it, then attached it to the pelican, nicknamed Mr Percival, before painting it.

She spent \$66, with the paint accounting for most of the cost.

'Mr Percival is now happily living in Currimundi,' she says.





While looking around to buy a new mailbox, keen DIYer Andrew Ho had the idea to create one from scratch.

'I noticed many customised designs and quickly decided to do one myself,' he says.

'I was inspired by the bold and sharp colours of a kingfisher that I saw in a book.'

Andrew built the mailbox using exterior plywood and spray paint, spending about \$70 in total.

'The tools and design are very simple and it was straightforward to build, with the only problem being the extra care needed when screwing into plywood,' he says.

'The finished box is very noticeable from the road and my two little girls love it. They have promised they will now help to check the mailbox every day.'

Toms coffee cart

Coffee lover Tom Neivandt took inspiration from daily coffee runs to build his own barista station.

By attaching redgum sleepers that he had in his garden to two kitchen cabinets, Tom created his unique feature piece for his home for just under \$800.

'I had a final design in my head, that of a modern-looking cabinet with a rustic-looking benchtop and timber wheels,' he says.

Tom bought two cabinets and assembled them, then sanded and

varnished the sleepers, which was the lengthiest part of the project.

He then used a biscuit joiner to join the sleepers together, forming the benchtop. The benchtop was then screwed onto the cabinets using a bracket kit.

'The whole unit is very heavy, but I built it like this so that if I ever need to move it, it will come apart in two pieces,' says Tom.

Finally, he added the wheels to complete the look, finishing off the whole project in a single weekend.





When Grant Watson bought his Federation home in 2011, he had never even owned a drill, much less attempted any DIY.

But necessity became the mother of invention when Grant wanted to restore some of the original features in the old house.

'There was an obvious space where the fireplace should have been. While there are regulations about open fires in bedrooms, I wanted it as a feature,' he says.

He bought the tools and knocked out the old bricked-up fireplace, bracing it with a steel strap before packing, rendering and trying his hand at tiling.

A steel insert and a mantel, both found on eBay, were added.

Finally, Grant painted the fireplace, completing the project in just a few days for \$300.





earn the secret to creative upcycling from an expert homemaker

ne thing everyone needs when dressing for the day is a decent mirror to see themselves in. And what better for an honest appraisal of your outfit than a full-length mirror?

Sometimes it pays to ponder for a little while before embarking on an upcycling project, but my initial idea after acquiring this freestanding, second-hand mirror was that staining it black would be the best way to add more elegance and modernise it.

I've found that black pieces of furniture combine well with crisp white bedding and natural-toned walls for a dramatic yet harmonious bedroom.



A freestanding, full-length mirror can work in a corner of the bedroom or as a feature piece of furniture













🕖 Tape the mirror

Remove the mirror from its stand. Run a line of masking tape around the edge of the mirror to protect it from paint splashes and sandpaper scratches. TIP Spread a canvas drop cloth on the floor in your work area.




Sand the timber

Lightly sand all the timber surfaces on the mirror and stand that are to be stained using medium to fine grit sandpaper. Wipe off all the dust with a clean lint-free cloth, making sure it is just damp and not wet.




3 Apply the stain

Using a medium-sized paintbrush, apply 1-2 coats of a water-based stain to all timber surfaces to achieve the depth of tone you want, leaving the stain to fully dry between coats. Remove the tape, polish the mirror and rehang.



BUDGET TIP

Check local garage sales or online trading sites for a reasonably priced second-hand metal wheelbarrow.



Growing food in a wheelbarrow is an easy way to start a kitchen garden. Just park it on your patio or deck and wheel it out of the way as needed.

Look for a sturdy barrow with a decent weight-bearing wheel. Check the tyre and rim are in good condition and the handles aren't rusty or loose.

Give it a bright paint job, using up leftover pots from other projects.

🚺 Paint the barrow

Scrub the barrow with soapy water and allow to dry. Sand the surfaces to be painted using medium-grit paper, wipe off the dust and apply a metal primer. Paint the tray, handles, legs and tyre rim in the colours of your choice.



② Drill drainage holes

Apply a second topcoat, then drill drainage holes in the base of the wheelbarrow tray. Take care not to drill too many holes, or too near the corners, as it will weaken the tray.

TIP Use waterborne enamel paint.



Prepare the tray

Add a biodegradable, non-toxic lining such as hemp to the tray. Pour in gravel for drainage, fill with potting mix, then plant out and water in well.

TIP Ask a local cafe to give or sell you empty fair-trade coffee sacks. ⋄

Easy table revamp

Use veneer and paint to transform a budget item into a designer piece

hopping for furniture can leave a serious dent in your wallet, with quality pieces often demanding high prices. But you can get the designer look for less by making over budget furniture.

This pine table was affordable but plain, so it was refinished. Veneer hides the knots on the top, while the green legs add a retro feel. To keep costs low, we used leftover varnish on the top and bought only a sample pot of paint.

A 1220 x 1220mm sheet of 0.4mm mahogany craft ply, about \$130 from timber suppliers, was cut to size and attached using contact adhesive. Clear varnish enhances the appearance of the grain and creates a durable surface.

New, raw timber will only need a light sand with medium grit paper to prepare it for priming and painting. For a second-hand table, use a palm sander and coarse grit pads to remove the old finish first.










TRANSFORM THE TABLE



Cut the veneer

Measure the table and mark the measurements on the veneer, adding 10mm to the length and width. Cut the veneer to size with a new blade in a utility knife, using a steel rule as a guide. The knife tends to follow the grain, so score the surface, then make multiple passes to cut through cleanly.



Trim and sand

Trim excess veneer from each side with the utility knife. Smooth the edges of the veneer using a sanding block and 240 grit paper, taking care not to remove too much material. Sand the top of the veneer using 240 grit paper, working only in the direction of the grain.



Attach the veneer

Spray both the tabletop and the veneer with contact adhesive and leave until touch-dry. Position the veneer above the table, allowing 5mm overhang on each side, then carefully lower one end onto the surface and lay it down slowly. The adhesive grips immediately on contact and can't be repositioned.




6 Apply the varnish

Wipe the surface with a tack cloth, then apply clear varnish to the veneer and the edges of the table using a paintbrush. Work only in the direction of the grain using long, even strokes. Once dry, sand lightly with 240 grit paper, wipe clean with a tack cloth and apply two more coats.



Smooth and prime

Use a plastic broadknife to smooth out any bubbles and ensure the entire surface of the veneer is in contact with the table. Position a sheet of plywood on the veneer, weigh down or clamp and leave overnight. Sand the frame using 120 grit paper, wipe with a tack cloth and apply primer.



Paint the frame

Sand the frame with 180 grit paper, then apply two coats of water-based acrylic paint, using an angled trim brush for cutting in and a small roller for large sections. Sand lightly between coats using 240 grit paper.

TIP Apply masking tape to protect the tabletop from paint.





How to turn an old window frame into a chalkboard

IY blogger Melissa Darr has a talent for turning old objects into decorative pieces.

Wanting the kind of French-style blackboard she'd seen in shops for up to \$90, Melissa decided to make her own using an old sash window frame.

First, she removed the glass from the frame and replaced it with a piece of MDF. Melissa then sprayed this with chalkboard paint and transferred a printed design onto the board.

'The menu board fits perfectly above my wine cabinet and brings me great joy. I love the old rusty handle and hook that were reattached. I think they really add charm,' says Melissa.

When making something look worn and rustic, concentrate on the edges of the piece and highlight any rough patches.



EXPERT SECRETS

Keep pieces of removed hardware in a jar so they're easy to find when you want to replace them later.

Add the board

A piece of 4mm MDF board was cut to fit the frame, then sprayed with two coats of black chalkboard paint and allowed to dry.

Wood glue was applied to the edges of the board, which was pressed into the frame and clamped until dry. Nails were hammered in for extra strength and the old hardware was added.

Melissa researched online for fonts and designs she liked, then wrote her own message and printed it out.

The back of the printouts were coloured with lead pencil, roughly cut out, then positioned on the board.

She traced over the designs and words to transfer them onto the board. Using a fine-tipped paintbrush, she painted the outlines in a soft grey.

Check out your local recycling centre for old sash windows

Prepare the frame

Melissa found a second-hand sash window and removed the pane of glass from the frame.

She applied strips of masking tape over the glass to help contain the shards, placing the frame on sheets of newspaper to catch the pieces. Melissa then broke the glass and removed and disposed of all of the pieces.

The frame was thoroughly cleaned and all the hardware removed and reserved, then the frame sanded.

Two coats of white acrylic paint were applied and the new finish was given an aged look using sandpaper.


Assemble the base

Tap the cams into the kickboard holes, then insert the locking pins into the holes in the base shelf. Insert the locking pins into the cams on the kickboard, then turn the cam to lock in place. Repeat for the back support, then position the brace perpendicular to it, securing with screws.



Attach the top cabinets

Assemble the top cabinets in the same way as the base cabinets. Insert the dowels into the holes at the top of the base cabinet, tapping them in gently with a hammer. Lift the top cabinet onto the base cabinet and align the holes with the dowels to lock it into position.



Add the sides and back

Assemble the corner cabinet by securing the side and back panels to the base with screws, ensuring the finished edge is at the front. Stack the shelves on top of the base to make it easier to position them later, then secure the top shelf to the cabinet sides and back with screws.



Make the drawers

Slide the drawer base into the grooves in the drawer sides. Fold over the drawer front, align the holes with the dowels and tap into position, then secure the handles. Attach runners to the base of the drawer and the inside of the side cabinets by aligning the pins and securing with screws.



Install the shelves

Finish the corner cabinet by lifting each shelf to the desired height, then insert the shelf pins into the holes in the side panels to support each shelf. Assemble the side cabinets by joining the sides to the base, kickboard and top using screws to create the frame, securing the back with nails.



6 Secure the rods

Cut the hanger rod 10mm shorter than the distance between the cabinets. Secure a flange to a wall or side panel with screws, slide another flange over the rod and insert into the mounted flange. Level the rod and secure the other flange on the opposite wall or panel. Attach the top shelf with screws.

THE MODA COLLECTION

A door is a statement of what to expect as you enter a room. That's why Sally Klopper of Sally Caroline Interior Design starts with Corinthian's Moda Collection. 



If you bought a potted lavender over the summer when it was fragrant and in bloom but have yet to plant it out, you don't have to wait until next spring.

Lavender is usually propagated or sown from seed in spring, but it can be planted any time in most climate zones, as long as there is no frost and the soil can still be easily cultivated. A Mediterranean shrub, lavender likes well-drained soil and full sun.

Give it a sheltered spot out of wind, growing it near a solid wall if you can, so the heat retained from the sun will protect the plant on winter nights.

TIP Remove spent blooms and trim every spring. It doesn't regenerate from old wood, so don't prune too hard.

Gourmet vegies

The cooler weather of autumn is designed for vegie gardening, as it's not too hot to do the prep work to start a patch from scratch.

Or if you're sowing an existing patch for the new season, there are

lots of fast growers to get into the ground for a bumper winter crop.

When you buy new bulbs, they are primed and ready to flower, but here's how to get the most from them.

- STORE bulbs in the crisper section of the fridge for about six weeks before planting in warmer regions. This can help them perform better.
- GIVE bulbs free-draining soil, as they won't tolerate wet feet.
- PLANT the bulbs with the roots pointing downwards.
- **FOLLOW** the instructions on the packet on the planting depth and the level of sun or shade required.

The general rule of thumb is to plant a bulb twice as deep as it is tall. So a 50mm bulb is placed at a depth of 100mm.

• **RESIST** overtidying the bulbs after flowering. Just remove spent blooms and only trim off leaves as they die, as they use this post-flowering period to store energy for next year's flowering.



If space is limited, plant bulbs in multiple pots and you can have a display anywhere





Some bulbs perform best the next year if removed from the ground, especially if your region is very warm across summer, or you have heavy rain during their dormant periods.

After they've flowered and the foliage has completely browned off, gently lift them. Remove any soil and leaves, then trim the roots. Allow to dry for a few days and place in a paper or net bag.

Store in a cool, dry spot until planting time, occasionally checking for rot or fungus and throwing out damaged bulbs. >



Jonquil

Excellent for naturalising under deciduous trees, jonquils are hardy and reliable like their close cousins, daffodils.

The flowers come in whites and creams and are richly fragrant. TIP Old-fashioned paperwhites are one of the earliest flowering bulbs, coming out as early as May.

Probably the best known of the bulbs is the daffodil. The cheerful blooms held above long stems nod gently in a spring breeze.

Daffodils are very hardy and suitable for naturalising in most regions, and the flowers can be yellow, near white or bicoloured.



Ranunculus

This plant flowers in red, orange and white.

It must have good-quality and free-draining soil in full sun, with protection from the wind.

Plant the tubers with the claws facing downwards, then mulch the surface of the soil with a quality composted manure.

Anemone

One of the most riotously colourful and abundantly flowering of the spring bulbs, anemones make excellent cut flowers, as they will last for well over a week in a vase.

As the stems develop, they need regular watering and feeding with an organic liquid plant food.








Hyacinth

Stems packed with perfumed, bright blooms are the hallmarks of the hyacinth. In colours ranging from pure white to pinks, blue-purples and gold, it is a serious show-off.

It performs best in cooler regions but can be planted for a one-off display in other areas.

One of the most
understated and
delicate of the bulbs, this lovely
plant is also extremely hardy
and ideal for naturalising in
situations from sun to shade.

Needing very little care, it will flower year after year in most regions except the tropics.

For an extended flowering display, underplant your bulbs with annuals

Iris
Perhaps the most romantic of the spring bulbs is the iris. Tall flower stems stand proudly above the fine silver-grey foliage. Irises can be naturalised in cooler regions.
The blues and purples are highly prized, but don't overlook the whites and yellows.

Tulip
With their elegant blooms, tulips are like the royalty of the bulb world. The colours range from pastel hues to bold solid colours and patterns.
They like a cold winter or time

They like a cold winter or time in the fridge, good drainage, and sun and wind protection. In warmer areas, lift and store or replant.



POTTING BULBS

Planting up a pot or window box with bulbs is easy and rewarding. Here are a few tips to help them thrive.

- CHOOSE a container that has very good drainage and avoid placing a saucer underneath it.
- USE a quality bulb potting mix.
- OPOSITION the bulbs no closer than 30-50mm to the container sides or they will get too hot.
- **© KEEP** the taller-growing plants to the rear or centre of a display.
- ALLOW the mix to nearly dry out between waterings.
- FEED bulbs at planting time using a quality controlled-release fertiliser, then again during flowering.
- PUT the container in a partially sunny spot, avoiding afternoon sun, until the weather cools down.







Choose a large container for your bulbs and mass-plant to create the maximum visual impact.



Add the potting mix

Fill the pot to about 100mm below the top lip with potting mix, checking the instructions on the pack, as this will vary depending on the planting depth requirement of the bulbs. Pat down to remove air pockets but don't compress.



Position the bulbs

Plant from the centre of the pot out, placing the tallest bulbs in the centre or at one side. Don't position any bulbs too close to the pot sides. Gently push the bulbs into the mix, then top up to about 30mm below the lip with mix.



🚱 Cover with mulch

Add a thick layer of lucerne mulch. Position the pot in a semi-sunny spot, avoiding afternoon sun. Water in well with a seaweed solution. When foliage appears, position the pot according to the needs of the bulb variety.

CARING FOR YOUR CITRUS

Citrus trees like a frost-free climate, sunny location and shelter from wind. OPLANT in free-draining soil, digging in copious amounts of compost.

Dig a hole twice the size of the rootball and plant so the soil level is the same as in the pot. Ensure the bud union is well above ground level.

Water twice a week for six weeks until they are established, then water thoroughly every week, especially while the fruit is ripening.

• MULCH with sugar cane, lucerne hay or pea straw to help keep the

soil moist, leaving at least a hand's span clear around the trunk when applying to prevent collar rot.

• FEED with a complete citrus food, cow manure or blood and bone. Apply under the mulch in early spring, early summer and early autumn. Apply fertiliser to damp soil and water it in.

• PRUNE half the developing fruit on young trees in their first and second years so the trees don't exhaust themselves. They don't need annual pruning for fruit production, but they can be pruned into any desired shape.


GROW TIP

The roots of mandarin trees spread to the outer perimeter of the branches, like all citrus, so water and feed there.

Don't feed newly planted trees for at least six weeks or until new growth shows the roots are established

- WATER thoroughly an hour or two before removing the tree from its pot.

PROBLEM SOLVER

Citrus leaf miner

- **CAUSE** Tiny silvery moths that are difficult to see. They lay their eggs on new growth and the larvae tunnel into the leaves.
- SPOT IT Silver trails on new foliage are the first sign, then curling and distortion of leaves.
- FIX IT Spray with Hortico White Oil.



Citrus gall wasp

- **CAUSE** Small black wasps lay groups of eggs in young soft twigs in early spring.
- SPOT IT As the larvae develop. the plant is stimulated to produce extra cells, causing lumps on branches, known as galls.
- FIX IT Remove and dispose of the infected branch before the end of winter while the pupating wasps are inside to avoid reinfection.

Collar rot

- CAUSE A fungal root disease that attacks the trunk of the tree just above soil level.
- SPOT IT It causes yellowing foliage and a damaged area on the lower trunk. If left untreated, the rot will spread around the trunk, ringbarking the tree.
- FIX IT Scrape the bark back to healthy growth. Keep the area around the trunk free from weeds and other plants. Don't overwater.





Bronze orange bug

- CAUSE Flat, green nymphs, and dark-brown or black adults that are about 25mm long.
- SPOT IT Both nymphs and adult bugs cause flower and fruit fall by sucking on the stalks.
- FIX IT Spray young nymphs during winter with Yates Success.
- Remove the adults by hand and put in a bucket of boiling water and detergent. Wear gloves and eye protection, as they squirt a nasty-smelling chemical. 🗸

Native and non-native ornamental grasses are suited to many landscape situations. Once established, most thrive on rainwater, making them excellent choices for dry garden beds.

Water newly planted grasses regularly for the first couple of months until they are established. Feed with a controlled-release fertiliser in late winter and mulch regularly.

NATIVES

Poa labillardieri

Also known as common tussock grass, Poa labillardieri has green leaves. The cultivar 'Eskdale' is a very drought-tolerant grass with fine blue leaves that grow up to 600mm in height.

GROW Plant in full sun or part shade and trim back every year to 150mm above the ground. USE Plant in rockeries, use as a feature, grow on banks to help stabilise the earth, or mass-plant.

Pennisetum

Poa labillardieri

These lovely native grass cultivars have elegant feathery flowers that stand above arching foliage.

- 'PURPLE LEA' bears purple blooms above 800mm high green leaves.
- 'PENNSTRIPE' features variegated foliage and whitish flowers. It grows to 450mm high and wide.

'NAFRAY' has cream flowers and reaches a height and width of 600mm.

'RUBRUM' has purple-pink flower spikes and grows up to 600mm high. GROW Plant in full sun to part shade in sandy or clay soils. Trim back by two-thirds if they become straggly. JSE Mass-plant or grow in large pots, beds or rockeries.



Themeda

A prostrate kangaroo grass, Themeda 'Mingo' forms a mound of bluish foliage that grows up to 200mm high and 600mm wide.

Rust-coloured seed heads appear during summer. **GROW** Plant in full sun to part shade. Trim back by two-thirds if the leaves become untidy. Suited to all soil types, it is frost tolerant. USE Plant in rockeries, grow as

a groundcover, or mass-plant.



EXPERT SECRETS

Most ornamental grasses like a trim once a year in late autumn or winter.

NON-NATIVE

Miscanthus sinensis

With pretty feathery flowers, the foliage of these tall grasses colours beautifully in autumn.

The cultivars don't self-seed and some have variegated foliage.

- 'SARABANDE' has narrow arching green leaves.
- 'GOLD BAR' bears dark-green leaves that are banded with gold.
- 'GRACILLIMUS' features
 purple-pink autumn flowers.
 GROW Plant in full sun to part
 shade in well-drained loamy garden
 soil. Cut back hard in late winter.
 USE Plant for vertical interest
 in beds, or mass-plant.





Calamagrotis acutiflora

The cultivar 'Overdam' grows up to 1.2m high and has variegated cream and green foliage and flower plumes, which appear from summer to winter.

'Karl Foerster' grows to 1.8m and has feathery seed heads.
GROW Plant in full sun to part shade. Cut back hard late winter.
USE Grow as a specimen plant, or mass-plant.

GRASS LOOKALIKES

With their strappy foliage, some plants have a grass-like appearance. They can be used in the garden the same way as ornamental grasses.

Lomandra, dianella and liriope are all extremely hardy plants and the cultivars are available in a variety of heights and leaf colours.

Dianella

These tough evergreen native grass-like plants all have blue and yellow flowers followed by purple-blue berries.

Cultivars include 'Destiny', which has variegated foliage, and 'Cassa Blue'.

GROW Most dianellas will grow in sun or pa<u>rt shade.</u>

USE Plant in rockeries or pots, grow as border plants or as a groundcover, or mass-plant.



Liriope

Evergreen liriopes with their strap-like leaves have pretty flowers in purple, blue, pink or white. There are many cultivars and some varieties have variegated leaves.

GROW These tough waterwise plants will grow in sun or shade. Cut back ragged leaves in winter, to allow for new growth.

USE Plant as a lawn substitute, use as a groundcover or for borders and edging, or grow in containers.



Lomandra

Native lomandras, known as mat rushes, are attractive and tough.

There are some fabulous lomandra cultivars suited to a variety of garden situations.

'TANIKA' has fine green 600mm high leaves. It's ideal for mass plantings, containers, along driveways or on banks, and will flourish when drainage is good. There is also a variegated cultivar.

- 'KATRINUS' grows up to 800mm high. It tolerates humidity and frost, and can thrive in harsh roadside conditions. It has honey-perfumed yellow flowers.
- 'NYALLA' has fine blue-green leaves and forms a stunning mound that grows up to 750mm high and wide. It tolerates windy and salt-laden positions and looks striking in a large pot.

 GROW Depending on the cultivar, they will grow in sun or shade.

 USE Plant on embankments or under tall trees or shrubs.

eep in the English countryside, Gavin Munro of Full Grown (fullgrown.co.uk) is growing a field full of furniture.

This is achieved using an innovative technique known as botanical manufacturing.

On his farm in Derbyshire, Gavin raises willow, oak, ash and sycamore trees in special moulds, with the trunks and branches manipulated to grow in the shape of tables, chairs and even lamps. Joints are formed by shaving patches off the bark and aligning the branches, which eventually fuse.

Ex-gardener Gavin says it makes more sense to train trees to shape in four years, rather than chop down a tree and cut it up, just to stick it back together again.

In his one-hectare field, Gavin has about 400 pieces of furniture growing. They'll be harvested later this year, then dried and treated.

The first of the items are being sold for between \$2000 and \$5000.

Once you've removed all the weeds, it is time to get the soil ready by adding compost or manure. This will keep it in excellent shape and help your vegetables thrive.

Adding chicken or cow manure, or compost, builds soil structure, as the compost or manure eventually disintegrates, supplying the soil with beneficial organic matter.

Compost is full of nutrients and regenerates the soil while increasing its water-holding capacity by at least 30%.

Dig the compost or manure lightly into the soil, then give it a good rake to make it crumbly, level and smooth. >



Recycling organic waste means less ends up in landfill Salads are eaten throughout the year, and autumn is a great time to plant lettuces, rocket, mizuna, spinach, celery leaves and beetroot leaves.

Grow them in pots or beds in a sunny spot and feed fortnightly with a complete soluble plant food.

Lettuces

As a staple, lettuce is very handy to have on hand. There are lots of varieties with a diversity of leaf shapes and colours. Each has its own individual but subtle taste.

These varieties can essentially be divided into four types.

COS Popular in Caesar salad, this type, also known as Romaine, doesn't have a definite centre, and the leaves grow from a long central

stem. Try 'Red Cos' or 'Cos'.

• HEARTING This type, also called crisphead, has a cabbage-like heart. Try 'Great Lakes' or 'Iceberg'.

BUTTERHEAD As this type has a loose centre of leaves, it can be picked whole or by leaf. Try 'Buttercrunch', 'Green Mignonette' and 'Brown Mignonette'.

• LOOSE-LEAF This type can be constantly picked without pulling up the whole plant. Try 'Green Oakleaf', 'Red Oakleaf', 'Australian' Yellow' and 'Red Coral'.

Mizuna

With its attractive, deeply serrated leaves, mustard-tasting mizuna looks good in pots or garden beds.

Sow the seeds directly where the plants are to grow and transplant

the seedlings to 250mm apart. The young leaves can be harvested as needed to encourage more growth.

Add mizuna to salads and team with fish. Use the leaves as a garnish for soups to impart a mustard flavour.



Cress

This salad green can be easily grown in a tray on a sunny windowsill. You can sow the seeds on moist cotton wool or paper towel, or on a thin layer of seed-propagating mix.

They can also be sprinkled onto soil in beds or pots.

Pick the young leaves, as required, and add to salads and sandwiches for a peppery taste.

Spinach

Sow the seeds directly where the plants are to grow. Pick the leaves frequently to promote growth.

The leaves of baby spinach, one of nature's superfoods, add flavour to salads.

Beetroot leaves

If you're growing beetroot just for its young leaves, the seeds can be sown closer together, about 20mm apart.

A beetroot seed is actually a cluster of a few true seeds and, upon germination, 2-3 seedlings appear. You can keep one for the leaves, then transplant the others to reach maturity for their roots.

Harvest the young leaves when they reach about 50mm in length and add to salads.

Celery leaves

Plant seedlings or sow the seeds directly where they are to grow.

Also called Chinese or cutting celery, the leaves add a refreshing celery taste to salads.

Pick the young leaves for salads and use the older leaves in stir-fries, soups and stews.

Rocket

This salad green grows well in autumn and winter and won't bolt to seed. It is easily grown from seeds sown directly where the plants are to grow.

Pick the young leaves as required, as frequent picking means more leaves. Wild rocket has deeply serrated leaves.

Rocket is commonly used with lettuce in salads. >



If you like to whip up a stir-fry, plant a few Asian greens. All are easily grown from seed, and you can also buy seedlings.

They are fast growing and like a sunny position and, if space is limited, they can be grown in pots.

The flowers of Asian greens are edible and make a pretty garnish.

Chinese cabbage

Also called wong bok and nappa cabbage, Chinese cabbage forms a densely packed head of fine-textured, crinkly leaves that are blanched in the centre.

Mr. Fothergill's Chinese cabbage 'Nagaoka' is ready for harvesting in about 10 weeks.

Use the leaves as a wrap or base for steaming fish, or add to coleslaw or Asian salads.

Kimchi

Chop 1 Chinese cabbage and put in a colander over a plate. Sprinkle with 5 tablespoons salt, then toss. Stand for 30 minutes, rinse and drain well, then transfer to a big glass container.

Add 1 peeled and sliced cucumber, 12 thinly sliced radishes, 4 chopped spring onions, 3 thinly sliced garlic cloves and a peeled and sliced 3cm piece of fresh ginger.

Combine 1 tablespoon salt, ¼ cup rice vinegar, 1 tablespoon chilli paste and 12 cups water in a large bowl.

Stir until the salt dissolves, then pour over the vegetable mixture.

Cover and refrigerate the kimchi, stirring occasionally, for at least two days, before serving.

TIP Serves 20 or makes 10 cups.

Chinese broccoli

This green produces much smaller flower rosettes than common broccoli. It is harvested about nine weeks after sowing, just before the flowers open.

Also known as Chinese kale, kai lan and gai lan, the whole plant can be eaten, including the stems, leaves and flowers.

Steam and serve with soy sauce and fried garlic as a side.





Soil can slowly become acidic through fertilising. If it is too acidic, you can rectify it with dolomite, garden lime or a liquid lime. Make sure you follow the directions on the test packet.

Tatsoi

The deep-green leaves of fast-growing tatsoi, or Chinese flat green cabbage, have a slightly nutty flavour.

For continuous picking, remove the outside leaves from the rosette individually.

Add the young leaves to Asian salads, or steam the leaves and stalks and serve seasoned with soy sauce and garlic.



Bok choy

This fast-growing Asian green has tender and crunchy pale green or white stalks.

You can pick bok choy, or pak choi and Chinese white cabbage as it is also called, while young or allow it to mature. It reaches maturity in about six weeks.

Add the young leaves to salads or steam whole and serve with oyster sauce and sesame oil. >

Choy sum

This popular Asian green, also called Chinese soup green and choi san, has large leaves and delicate-tasting stems.

Choy sum can be harvested young or allowed to mature. You can eat the whole plant including the small yellow flowers.

Add the stems and seeds to soups or steam the stems and serve as a side dish.

GROW TIP

Seaweed products, such as Seasol, promote beneficial micro-organisms in the soil, which in turn keeps the plants healthy.

MORE WINTER STAPLES

Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and kale are essential autumn and winter vegetables. You can sow the seeds or buy seedlings.

Give them a sunny spot, keep well mulched and water regularly. Apply a complete soluble plant food fortnightly to ensure steady growth.

Add to stews, soups or simply steam or boil and serve with butter and salt and pepper.



Dig in dolomite or lime before planting, as brassicas are sensitive to acidity



PEST BUSTERS

Caterpillars

- SPOT IT Larvae, especially of the cabbage white butterfly, love all brassicas and will chew the leaves on young and old growth.
- FIX IT Yates Nature's Way Caterpillar Killer controls most caterpillars. It contains natural bacteria that kill the larvae once the insecticide is ingested.



Snails and slugs

SPOT IT These pests will munch on most vegies, especially salad greens. Look for shiny streaks and slime trails.

FIX IT Used coffee grounds or broken eggshells sprinkled around plants help deter snails.

Pour beer into a container and sink it in the ground for a trap. Or use environmentally friendly snail and slug pellets.



Mala sian-st le Asian greens with noodles

PREPARATION TIME 10 minutes **COOKING TIME** 10 minutes

Ingredients

- 450g hokkien egg noodles
- 1 tablespoon Malaysian shrimp paste (belacan)
- 1 tablespoon canola or peanut oil
- 1 long red chilli, seeded, finely chopped
- 1 large garlic clove, crushed
- 2 tablespoons small dried shrimp
- 1 tablespoon palm sugar, shaved, or dark brown sugar
- 2 bunches Asian greens, such as bok choy, choy sum or Chinese broccoli, leaves separated, ends trimmed
- **1 PUT** the noodles into a heatproof bowl and pour over boiling water to cover. Soak according to the packet directions, then drain and set aside.
- **2 PRESS** the shrimp paste into a flat disc and put into a wok or large frying pan. Heat over low heat until fragrant, then add the oil, chilli, garlic and dried shrimp. Stir to distribute the shrimp paste evenly and combine the ingredients, then cook for 1 minute.
- 3 STIR in the palm sugar, Asian greens and noodles, and cook for 5 minutes or until the greens wilt and the stems are tender. If the noodles stick to the wok, add 3-4 tablespoons water. Serve immediately.


