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

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
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

Simple and streamlined

The view from the entry is directly into the dining room, a low key and simply arranged space housed in the original single-storey building.

An eight-seater dining table and high-gloss white chairs and storage unit are offset by a wallpapered shelving nook. It ties into the colour scheme and is an unexpected addition in the mostly neutral palette.

The eye is drawn outdoors through the doors and windows to the green landscape and the turquoise pool.

Continuing the minimalist look, the adjacent kitchen has a long island bench with storage clad in walnut and topped with Carrara marble. The island extends into a breakfast bar, positioned to take advantage of the views.

A high-gloss cabinet with an integrated fridge provides more storage, so every surface is kept clear, with the oven economically and ergonomically tucked into the end.

Drama and glamour

The living area is a long space that opens off the entrance. The new extension provides a double-height ceiling, accentuated by the pivoting panels that can either close off the room or create a little more privacy.

Munro was concerned that the high ceiling may make the space feel ungrounded or cold.

'I understood we would have the recess under the mezzanine but didn't

anticipate the success of the stone cupboards, which look more like a sculpture than storage,' he says.


At the other end of the living space, the cantilevered cube forms a low and cosy zone. This area picks up the walnut element from the kitchen as cladding on the ceiling.

Lighting and sound are recessed into the cladding and, in keeping with the intimate feel, the back wall is painted a deep Prussian blue, which

serves to absorb some of the light and add depth to the room.

'I'm so happy with the contrasting materials in the living space. The room really does have many personalities, depending on where you decide to sit and what time of day it is,' says Munro.

Furnishings are few but very well chosen. Comfortable and unfussy in form, they allow for a variety of arrangements and activities without overwhelming the space.

Calming and luxurious

The master bedroom, which is more like a parents' retreat, is in the cube. The 70sqm area features stunning views front and back, benefiting from the floor-to-ceiling windows that open onto a Juliette balcony.

'There is little need to go over the top decorating this house, as the view often takes centrestage and the light moves through the day,' says Munro.

A large part of the success of this calming and undemanding home is plenty of storage, and most of it hidden. Clever planning allows for the integration of storage in every room.

Built-in robes look like a partition wall in the bedroom, opening on the

other side to create a dressing room. And further down the hallway, the bathroom is more than just an ensuite.

With a view back up the hill, the green bush creates a scenic backdrop and imbues the bathroom with a sense of privacy and retreat.

A sage green wall is calming and plays into the Scandinavian theme suggested by the gloss vanity and a tribute to a Eero Saarinen tulip table.

The freestanding bath takes in the spectacular view, while an oversized shower makes room for two.

'It's these small details that impact how we feel and function. This is the home we always wanted and the house that fits this site,' says Munro.

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Private and practical


Three bedrooms and a bathroom extend off the cube in a loft space that was part of the original home.

Designed for teenagers, the bedrooms are practical and gender neutral. Earthy colours reflect the outdoor scene and built-ins provide extensive mixed storage.

'Having the kids in a separate part of the house is great for them and us, even more so because they have their own bathroom,' says Munro.

The design approach in the loft is simple, with success dependent on attention to detail, such as the grout lines of the wide-format bathroom tiles aligning perfectly with the vanities.

'It's quite extraordinary to have teenage children and not be living in a certain level of chaos, but this place never feels overwhelmed.' 6

Flooring

If your kitchen floor has burn marks, holes or tears, patch the damaged section with a new piece of vinyl.

You can buy a sample piece of vinyl, but make sure it shows any repeat patterns. If you can't match the flooring, find a hidden spot inside the pantry or under appliances and cut out a piece to use.










Cut the vinyl

Use a utility knife to cut around the damaged area, then loosen the adhesive in one corner using a hairdryer and lift with a putty knife. Cut a patch to match the damaged area, extending it 15mm around the pattern or grout line.



Position the patch

Tape the replacement patch over the damaged area with painter's tape and cut through the new patch with a sharp utility knife, following the pattern line.

TIP Use a ruler to guide the knife to ensure smooth, straight cut lines.



8 Apply the adhesive

Remove the replacement patch and the damaged section and any backing material. Apply a vinyl-flooring adhesive with a small-notched trowel and secure the replacement patch, going over the seam with a vinyl floor sealer.



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Timber doors show knocks more than high-gloss cabinetry but are easy to touch up, then stain or varnish for a natural finish.

Polyurethane is similar to clear varnish but is easier to apply, making timber doors durable and giving them a medium-level shine.

Before resurfacing timber cabinet doors, remove any handles, then repair cracks, scratches and dents with a filler in a matching colour.

Sand the surface smooth, wipe off the dust, then use sugar soap to clean oil build-up, particularly on cabinets near the rangehood and fridge.

Stain the timber, then use a brush or short-nap roller to apply 2-3 coats of a clear polyurethane, letting it dry and sanding lightly between coats.

DIY TIP

Repair minor scratches in timber with a walnut. Just rub it diagnonally over the damage, then repeat with your finger to set the natural oils.

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
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Budget revamp

This kitchen had a good layout and new appliances, so homeowner Kate Griffith couldn't justify spending on a reno, but she felt the all-white scheme made it stark and cold. The solution was a DIY makeover.

- REPLACE THE FACE Paint doesn't adhere well to high-gloss cabinetry, so replace the existing doors. If the cabinetry is in standard sizes, this can be done with flatpacked options.
- © CREATE A CONTRAST Add colour to a neutral backdrop for big impact. Here, the red doors make the stainless steel splashback pop, while the white bench and blinds look fresh. New handles with a modern profile update the look. ⊘

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EASY KITCHEN STORAGE SOLUTIONS





Create a divider
Tidy up cabinets and
create easy access to
flat pans, boards and trays by
storing them upright instead
of stacking them up.

Measure and cut a piece of melamine to fit inside the cabinet and serve as a divider.

To attach it, screw a bracket to the face frame of the cabinet floor and one to the back wall. Or you can drive screws through the divider from the shelf above.








Store cutting boards Create a dedicated storage space for your cutting boards by adding a rack to the inside of a cabinet door.

Cut to size 12mm thick acrylic or plywood, then smooth the edges using sandpaper and round the lower corners with a belt sander.

Use ferrules or timber blocks as spacers and secure the rack with screws and washers.



Organise spice jars Save time hunting through your spice collection to find the right one by reorganising them in simple wire drawers.

Install two of the drawers in a cabinet, then add the spices in matching clear-glass jam jars.

Write the name of the spices on the jar lids and arrange them alphabetically for easy access.


Join and install a laminate bench to give the kitchen a modern update

aminate benchtops are durable and come in a wide range of designs and colours, making them ideal for any kitchen. They're also easy to install DIY.

Benchtops are available in lengths of up to 2400mm and will need to be

measured and cut to size before they are attached to the cabinets.

Most kitchens require multiple benchtop sections, which are joined underneath for a smooth finish. TIP You can order laminate benchtops cut to size at your local Bunnings.



Mark the joins

Lay the benchtop sections in position on the cabinets and from underneath mark where they join. Turn the sections over and line up the marks. Measure and mark out the drill points on the underside of the benchtops, according to the manufacturer's instructions.



Orill the holes

Drill holes in the underside of the benchtop with a Forstner bit, using masking tape to mark the depth. Use a handsaw to cut two grooves 10mm apart between the hole and the edge of the benchtop. Make a channel by tapping out the waste with a chisel.




6 Mount the brackets

Drill pilot holes in the centre of the back panel of each cabinet at the top, then attach the brackets using screws. Drill guide holes in the horizontal braces at the front of each cabinet. Position each benchtop section the right way up on the cabinets.



Join the benchtop

Apply PVA adhesive to each side of the joint, install the joiner bolts and tighten using a spanner. Secure the benchtop to the rear brackets with screws. Use the guide holes at the front to drill pilot holes in the benchtop, then secure with screws.

Start from scratch

If you have to gut a kitchen, it doesn't mean you need to pay top dollar for a new one. Hunting for bargains can shave thousands of dollars off your budget.

This kitchen was beyond saving, so the whole lot had to go, including the lino floor. Underneath, there were pine floorboards in near-perfect condition, so it was a great base to work with.

A new flatpack kitchen was found online for \$1500 and a pantry was added to boost storage. The breakfast bar was permanently removed to provide a more open-plan space.

New stainless steel appliances and a tiled splashback were installed to modernise the kitchen, while the walls were patched up and given a fresh coat of paint throughout.

CUSTOMISE CIOSET

Install drawers and shelving DIY to maximise wardrobe storage

or five years, crafty blogger
Melissa Darr put up with a less
than user-friendly walk-in robe
in the master bedroom. It had ample
hanging space, but that was about it.

'There wasn't much in it, so we lived with stuffing our clothes into a little tower of drawers,' says Melissa. After doing more important reno jobs, such as the kitchen and bathroom, Melissa had the time to take on the wardrobe.

'I was tired of living with a dysfunctional closet, so the first step was to decide what we wanted from the space.'



Building storage is a big carpentry job, so tailor off-the-shelf options instead



EXPERT SECRETS

Assess what needs to be stored, then design a closet to suit your actual needs.



Melissa's goal was to increase drawer and shelving space in the wardrobe without it turning into too big a job.

'I wanted something pre-made that we could customise to fit our space and that was easy to install,' says Melissa.

After researching different options, they decided to go with Clever Closet by Handy Storage (handy-storage.com.au).

Custom vs standard
There are two ways you can
go with Clever Closet. You

can buy a pre-packaged system to fit into an area or you can tailor the parts to suit your needs, which is what we did,' says Melissa.

'What I loved was that we could install open wire shelving next to the window and not block out the light.

'While the Clever Closet system is a little more expensive than buying melamine wardrobe inserts, it's worth spending the extra money.

'It can be completely customised, there are no bulky cabinets, and it is super simple to install.


'With all our clothes now so easy to access, there is no more need to rummage around or make a mess.'





1 Install the hang track

Mark the top of the closet system and secure the horizontal hang track, checking for level with a spirit level. Hang the wall strips vertically from the hang track, checking for plumb. Secure the strips with screws.



2 Make the frames

Build the sliding basket frames for the drawers, following the manufacturer's instructions. Install the shelf brackets in the wall strips, then add the wire shelves and engage the locking clips, working from the top down.



3 Add the drawers

Secure the sliding basket frames to the wall strips with screws, leaving enough room in between so they run smoothly on the tracks and keeping them clear of the ground. Slide the drawers into the frames.



MAKE A MINISCAPE

Create landscapes under glass with this step-by-step guide to terrarium gardening

A glass vessel filled with plants, rocks and soil, a terrarium is a tiny garden that mimics a real landscape, bringing nature inside.

Easy and low-maintenance, you don't need a green thumb to become a terrarium gardener. And there's no right way or wrong way to make one.

Experiment with containers, plants and decorations and see what happens. Use these projects as a guide and add your own creative twists, or improvise with plants readily available to you.

Either way, the range of terrariums on these pages will inspire you to give miniscape gardening a try. >

Building your landscape

The process for planting a desert or forest terrarium is generally the same. It is important to have all of your elements ready to go before starting and to give yourself enough time.

Assembling a terrarium can take between 20 minutes and two hours, depending on the complexity of your project. Make sure you thoroughly wash, clean and dry the glass vessel.

Lay out the equipment and inspect your plants, checking that they look healthy and are free from any dead leaves or pests and diseases.

Arrange your plants in the order you'd like to plant them. Once you're happy with the layout, you can begin.




CREATE A TERRARIUM



Cut a piece of butcher's paper a bit smaller than the container and position on the gravel or pebbles.



Press moistened sphagnum moss tightly around the inside edge to prevent any soil dropping through.





Sprinkle in 4 tablespoons of horticultural charcoal, then add a 50-70mm layer of soil.



Add more soil in some areas to make a mound and create variations in height.



Remove the plants from the pots.

Scrape excess soil from the rootballs and trim any roots longer than 50mm.



Dig holes, position the plants and fill in with soil, firming it down to remove any air pockets.



Put tall plants at the back and small at the front. Wash down the sides and water the plants with a spray bottle.



Finish the miniscape with feature rocks, decorative stones, pebbles, crystals or figurines.

MINISPHERE

Air plants don't need soil so are lightweight for hanging.

Air plants don't require soil, as they use their roots to anchor themselves to rocks and branches.

Soak air plants in a bowl of water for 30 minutes. Drain the plants and shake off any excess water, as they may rot if they hold extra moisture for too long.

Pour grey stones into the orb. Add glass pebbles around the front, then arrange the air plants. Add coral, shells, a sea urchin and starfish.

Attach fishing wire or string to the glass loop at the top of the orb, then hang it.

Guidelines

 Give it a position in bright, indirect sunlight.

Remove the plants and soak in water once a week for 30 minutes. Spritz with water using a spray bottle in the warmer months.
Curled leaves indicate that the plants are not getting enough water.

PITCHER PERFECT



Carnivorous plants like moist, boggy conditions and get their nutrients from capturing and digesting insects.

Pour gravel into the fishbowl and gently shake to create an even layer. Sprinkle charcoal over the top. Mix the peat moss and sand and add half.

Remove the plants from their pots, gently scrape away any excess soil

from the rootballs, then arrange in the centre of the bowl. Cover the roots with the extra soil and firm it down.

Put large rocks and pebbles in between the plants. Add the live moss around the inside edge, then water the plants thoroughly using a spray bottle.

Keep it in a cool spot with lots of bright, indirect sunlight.

35cm glass fishbowl

3 cups gravel

1/2 cup horticultural charcoal

1 cup peat moss

1 cup horticultural sand

3 Sarracenia x umlauftiana

'Pitcher Plant'

2 large rocks

Handful of black river pebbles

1 cup live moss

What you need

35cm concrete-based hurricane lamp vase

2 cups gravel

1/2 cup horticultural charcoal

- 2 cups African violet potting mix
- 1 Syngonium 'Neon'
- 1 Hypoestes phyllostachya 'Pink Polka Dot'
- 1 Hypoestes phyllostachya 'White Polka Dot'
- 1 Saintpaulia ionantha 'African Violet'

- 1 cup grey decorative pebbles
- 1 cup coral rubble

Handful of seashells

1 dried sea urchin

1 dried starfish

Shells and coral give a wonderful beach effect to a terrarium.

Pour gravel into the vase, but don't go above the concrete base, so the drainage layer isn't visible. Gently shake to create an even layer. Sprinkle the charcoal evenly over the top.


Add three-quarters of the potting mix and create a mound in the centre. Plant the sea fan at the back. Remove

the plants from their pots and scrape away the soil to show the rootballs.

Put taller plants at the back and smaller towards the front. Firm down the remaining soil over the roots.

Add decorative pebbles and coral around the inside edge, then the shells, sea urchin and starfish. Water the plants well using a spray bottle.





PRICKLY PEAR

Cacti and succulents come in different shapes, colours and sizes. A tall vessel protects fingers from spiky leaves.

Pour the black stones into the vase and gently shake to create an even layer. Sprinkle the charcoal evenly over the top. Add three-quarters of the potting mix to the container.

Remove the plants from their pots and gently scrape away the soil, so you are left with the rootballs.

Put small plants around the inside edge and tall in the centre. Firm down



the remaining soil to cover the roots. Place large rocks and river pebbles in between the plants.

Add a section of cream gravel, then an area of grey pebbles and dark grey stones. Water the plants thoroughly using a spray bottle.

 Give it a spot with bright, indirect sunlight.

• Slowly pour ½ cup water onto the soil once a month in winter and every two weeks in summer.

Wear garden gloves when handling cacti.

• Let the soil dry out between waterings.



o make this rustic hanging planter, all you need is an old bicycle rim, with the spokes removed, and an assortment of old containers.

For a hanger, four lengths of 3mm wire were wound around the bicycle rim at equal intervals, then twisted together at the top to form a loop.

As a decorative effect, the wire was twisted at the rim to create a spiral.



metal surfaces will weather to make the rustic planter look aged



Paint the cans

Remove the labels, then wash and dry the cans thoroughly. Position them on stakes and apply spray paint, using three or four similar colours. When dry, lightly sand the cans to expose the metal on the ridges.



Make drainage holes

Use a 4mm metal drill bit to make a drainage hole in the base of each can. Drill hanging holes in the side of the cans by sliding them onto a 90 x 45mm timber offcut and drilling two holes 20mm apart, 40mm below the lip.



3 Attach the cans

Thread a length of wire through the two holes in the can, then wrap each end of the wire around the bicycle rim and twist the ends together to secure. Position the cans on both the inside and outside of the rim.





<u>GARAGE</u>

Overhaul the workshop by adding storage and resurfacing the floor

ften a dumping ground for everything from sports gear and broken appliances to car parts, most garages have little room for tools.

This poorly organised workshop was taken over by clutter and had become unusable, with no space to work.

We cleared it out and revamped the space with a fresh paint job on the walls and a new-look floor, using a coating system that took just a weekend.

The junk was thrown out and purpose-built cabinets and lockers were introduced, as well as a workbench and wall-mounted tool storage.

Adding storage

One of the main considerations when redesigning a garage is where to put everything. This is when storage systems become essential.

In an area of the home that's often short on space, it pays off to think vertically by installing tall cabinets and multi-tiered shelving units.

We added a range of storage systems from Ultimate Storage and Ryobi that keep the workshop organised and uncluttered, and provide security.

A number of heavy-duty Zenith SureHooks, designed to hold anything from rakes and brooms to bikes and ladders, were also installed to turn the walls into extra storage zones. >











1 Clean the area

Wash the floor with a hose or pressure washer. Using a degreaser, scrub the floor surface and walls with a stiff bristle brush. Rinse thoroughly once the whole area has been scrubbed and wait for it to dry before etching.



Etch the concrete

Mix the etch in a watering can. Wet the floor lightly and sprinkle the surface with the etch. Scrub the floor thoroughly with a stiff bristle brush, repeating until finished, then rinse the floor and allow it to dry fully.



3 Paint the floor

Mix one pouch of the floor coating, adding tint and anti-slip if desired. Pour it in 100mm x 1.5m ribbons and work it in 1.5sqm areas, rolling out the paint in an M/W pattern. Repeat until the floor is fully covered.

Paint the walls

In a windowless workshop, white walls help reflect light into dark corners, improving visibility for working on DIY projects and other jobs.

This gloomy garage had both painted and raw brick walls, so before coating the concrete floor, we gave them a new finish. We primed and painted the walls white, using a semi gloss as it is easy to wipe clean.

The new paint brightened up the workshop and also helped prevent any potential brick dust or flaking paint from the walls falling onto the new floor coating as it cured. >



or an organised garage, you need ample space to store power tools, garden equipment and bulky items such as sporting gear.

If your garage is short on storage, a sturdy shelving system is the best place to start. DIY shelving kits are available in a range of sizes and configurations for any garage.

Assembling no-bolt, snap-lock shelves is simple, and they can be built in less than half an hour. The only tool required is a rubber mallet.

The position of each shelf can easily be changed to accommodate items of different sizes.

Use large transparent storage tubs to keep things such as cleaning supplies organised and easy to access.

Store heavy items on lower shelves to avoid accidents and keep bulky but lightweight items up high.





Prepare the area

Measure the height and width of the area where the shelves will go to ensure there is enough space for the size of shelf you are building. Working on a stable, level surface, lay out all the parts in position to make assembly easier.

Assemble the shelves

Starting at the base, gently tap the horizontal bars into holes in the legs to create the frame. Insert the support bar in the centre, then position the timber shelf on top. Repeat for the rest of the shelves, ensuring they are level.

Build the deck

The major challenge with this build was how to lay a new deck with low clearance that was insufficient for a normal bearer and joist design, and could handle the 170mm site fall.

The solution was to use Builders Edge Pedestal Feet, from Bunnings. They fit directly under the joists, eliminating the need for bearers, and come in three sizes of 25-40mm, 35-60mm and 70-170mm.

Each stirrup has an easy-to-use helical screw you unwind or tighten to get the joist level, making it simple to build a level deck on a sloping site.

Made from bulletproof plastic, the pedestal feet have an extremely high load-bearing capacity, won't rot and won't obstruct subfloor drainage or ventilation, which is essential on a deck with low clearance.



If you don't want to demolish an old patio, just lay a deck over it







1 Secure the joists

Engage the joists over the house bearer, then level with the pedestal feet spaced at the recommended intervals. Attach the pedestals to the joists with screws. Use a spirit level and stringlines to level and align the joists. Secure each deck joist to house joists with a batten screw.



2 Add the blocks

Measure the space between deck joists, cutting four blocks of 90 x 45mm pine for each. Offset and secure each block between the joists, 5mm below the top of the joists, using two batten screws at each end. Check for level, adjusting the pedestal feet as needed.



3 Lay the boards

Working from the house outwards, lay the deck boards. Use a 5mm packer to space the boards, leaving a 10mm gap at each end. Secure the boards with two screws at each joist. Check for any errors as you go, adjusting the spacings to make sure you get a good fit.



1 Clean the boards

Sweep the deck with a stiff-bristled broom, then hose down the boards. Apply deck cleaner to a square metre at a time, choosing a product that suits the timber and the finish.

TIP The cleaner is activated by water.

Scrub the surface

Use a stiff scrubbing brush to work the cleaner into the timber, then leave it to soak for 15 minutes without letting it dry completely. Hose down the area to rinse, then clean the rest of the deck and allow to dry.



3 Finish the deck

Apply two coats of decking oil using a lambswool applicator with a long handle for an even finish. Leave the oil to dry between coats and use less for the second coat, as the timber won't absorb it as easily.

xterior timber can start to look weathered after a few seasons of being exposed to our harsh Aussie conditions.
This built-in bench seat, clad in treated-pine decking boards, was looking worn out and unwelcoming.

To spruce it up and extend the life of the timber, we gave it a clean, sand and stain in just 30 minutes.

Bringing timber back to life is a simple three-step DIY job, requiring only basic equipment. Depending on the size of the surface, the only power tool needed is a sander.

DIY TIP

Use water-based oils to restore weathered timber, as they're easy to apply, give a good finish and clean up is simple.









Clean the area

Thoroughly clean the area, brushing away any dust or dirt from the surface of the timber. If the timber is soiled or mould is present, treat it with an exterior surface cleaner and allow it to dry thoroughly before sanding.



Sand the timber

Use a belt sander to sand the timber. If the surface is very badly weathered or the old stain is difficult to remove, start with coarse-grit sandpaper, progress to medium-grit paper, then finish with fine-grit paper.



3 Apply the stain

Wipe down the timber to remove the sanding dust before applying two coats of a suitable exterior finish. TIP We used a water-based oil in a natural finish, but you can use tinted stains to get a different look.

Dismantle the barbecue

Lay newspaper, then remove the hotplate, grills and flame diffusers, keeping any volcanic rocks that are in good condition. If possible, remove the burners by pushing them back to dislodge them from the valves. Burners may also be secured with a split pin.



Clean the burners

Spray heavy-duty barbecue cleaner on the grill and hotplate, allowing it to penetrate before wiping clean and washing off. For stubborn spots on the grill and baked-on grease on the flame diffusers, scrub vigorously using a wire brush.



3 Wipe the inside

Use heavy-duty barbecue wipes to clean all internal surfaces, paying particular attention to any build-up on the sides and in the corners, as this can ignite at high temperatures. Wipe any fat and cooking residue from the underside of the hood.



Barbecues can be enjoyed in all seasons, so a maintenance check midyear is essential to ensure yours is always ready to be fired up.

To get it into shape, clean off any greasy build-up on the grills, hotplates

and the inside of the hood, wiping the residue onto newspaper to discard.

Remove and clean all the internal parts, including the flame diffusers and the grease tray, and clean out the body using wipes or soapy water.

4 Lubricate gas spindles

If a brass spindle is stuck, spray it with a penetrating oil such as WD-40, then tap lightly to deactivate the safety mechanism if needed. To prevent water getting into the gas system during maintenance, cover the gas valves with duct tape.



Reline the grease tray

Fat-sorb 100% Natural Mineral, \$10

If using volcanic rocks as the flame diffuser, spread a single layer over the tray. Line the grease tray with aluminium foil and spread a thin layer of fat absorber or washed sand over the tray to catch drips. Replace it at regular intervals to prevent flare-ups.





6 Clean the exterior

Wipe down the outside of the hood and all other external surfaces using heavy-duty barbecue wipes, then spray with barbecue surface cleaner and wipe clean. This adds a protective coating to the non-cooking surfaces to help keep them cleaner for longer.





Spicy steak on garlic toast



Ingredients

- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 1½ teaspoons chilli powder
- ¼ teaspoon dried or fresh chopped oregano
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- ²/₃ cup (150ml) spicy tomato-vegetable juice
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
- 2 cups canned corn kernels
- 2 spring onions, thinly sliced
- 1 small red capsicum, seeded and diced
- 370g well-trimmed flank steak
- 1 loaf Italian bread, 250g, halved horizontally, then halved crossways
- 1 garlic clove, peeled and halved

Method

1 COMBINE the cumin, chilli powder, oregano and black pepper in a small bowl. Put the vegetable juice and lime juice in a measuring cup. Stir 2½ teaspoons of the spice mixture into the juice mixture.

2 PUT the corn, spring onion, capsicum and ½ cup (125ml) of the juice mixture in a medium bowl. Stir well to combine. Refrigerate until serving time.

3 OIL a hotplate or grill rack lightly and, with the hood closed if using, preheat to high. Rub the remaining spice mixture onto each side of the steak. Cook over direct heat for about 4 minutes on each side for medium-rare, or until cooked to your liking. Remove the steak from the barbecue and allow to stand for 10 minutes, then thinly slice across the grain, on the diagonal.

◆ GRILL the bread, cut side up, over direct heat for about 30 seconds or until lightly toasted. Rub the toasted side of the bread with the cut garlic and brush with the remaining juice mixture. Grill, cut side up, covered with the hood if using, over indirect heat for about 1 minute or until lightly browned. Serve the steak on the toast with the corn relish on the side.

Thai chilli chicken skewers





- Small bunch of fresh coriander
- 1 garlic clove
- ½ cup (125ml) light olive oil
- 1 tablespoon Thai-style sweet chilli sauce
- 1 tablespoon sesame oil
- 4 tablespoons medium-dry sherry
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Garnish

- Lime wedges
- Fresh red chillies

- 1 CUT the chicken into 2-3cm cubes and put in a medium-sized mixing bowl. Set aside.
- **2 CHOP** enough coriander finely to give about ¼ cup. Peel and finely chop or crush the garlic.
- 3 COMBINE the chopped coriander, garlic, olive oil, chilli sauce, sesame oil, sherry and sugar with the chicken and toss well. Leave to marinate for 5-10 minutes.
- 4 PREHEAT a hotplate or grill rack to medium-high heat. Thread

the chicken onto 4-6 skewers. then cook over direct heat for 5-6 minutes or until the chicken is cooked through.

- 5 PUT the marinade in a small saucepan over medium heat, then reduce the heat and simmer until it has reduced and thickened.
- **6 ARRANGE** the skewers on serving plates and spoon over the sauce. Garnish with the lime wedges, remaining coriander sprigs and fresh chilli, then serve. >





- 650g lean boneless pork
- 12 dried apricots
- 2 small zucchini (about 125g), thickly sliced
- 2 small red or white onions (about 125g), cut into quarters

Marinade

- 4 tablespoons finely shredded orange marmalade
- 2 tablespoons orange juice or sherry

- **3 OIL** a hotplate or grill rack lightly and preheat to medium-high heat. Thread the pork, apricots, zucchini and onion alternately onto 4 metal skewers. Cook the kebabs over direct heat, turning and brushing with the reserved marinade, for about 12-15 minutes or until the pork is cooked through. Serve immediately.


- 1 COMBINE the oil and 2 tablespoons of the vinegar in a clean plastic bag. Add the onion slices, turn to coat, then seal the bag. Set aside to marinate for 30 minutes.
- **2 PUT** the garlic, basil and the extra 3 tablespoons oil in a small bowl. Stir to combine. Brush over each side of the mushroom caps and set aside.
- **3 BRING** the honey and remaining vinegar to the boil in a small saucepan. Cook for 5 minutes or until thickened, then set aside.
- **a** COVER a hotplate or grill rack with foil and preheat to medium heat. Drain the onion and discard the marinade. Cook the onion and mushroom over direct heat for 10-12 minutes, turning frequently. Layer the lettuce, tomato, cheese, mushroom and onion on the roll bases. Drizzle with the honey and balsamic sauce and add the roll tops.

Leek and mustard mash

- 900g floury potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks
- 2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil
- 200g young leeks, finely shredded
- ½ cup (125ml) hot milk
- 1 tablespoon wholegrain mustard
- 1½-2 tablespoons butter
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

by putting them in a saucepan and pouring over boiling water to cover by 5cm. Bring back to the boil over high heat, then reduce the heat to medium. Cook for 15-20 minutes or until the potatoes are very tender.

- **2 SPREAD** out the peppercorns on a plate, then press the steaks into them until they are coated with peppercorns on all sides. Set aside.
- 3 **HEAT** the oil for the mash in a non-stick frying pan over medium

stirring constantly, for 3-5 minutes or until tender. Transfer to a plate lined with a double thickness of paper towel to drain.

4 DRAIN the potatoes when tender, shaking the colander or sieve to remove any excess water, then return to the pan. Pour over the hot milk, then mash the potatoes until completely smooth. Add the leek, mustard and butter, and season with salt and pepper

to taste. Beat well to mix, then cover to keep warm.

- **5 OIL** a hotplate or grill rack lightly, then preheat to high heat. Cook the steaks over direct heat for 3 minutes on each side for rare, 3½ minutes for medium-rare, 4 minutes for medium, and 5 minutes for well-done.
- 6 SPOON a mound of leek mash onto each warmed serving plate. Add the steaks and sprinkle with parsley. Serve immediately with the steamed green beans.

DESIGNER HOUSE NUMBER

Create a piece of landscape art to give your home kerb appeal

hey serve an important function, yet house numbers are often overlooked as a design feature.

So make yours stand out to make sure visitors and delivery people can find your place every time.

We created a house number that can't be missed, and doubles as a piece of modern landscape art, by using a simple concrete casting technique.

Cut a plywood mould, mix up a batch of coloured concrete and pour it over letters or numerals. We used 200mm high characters, so if smaller characters are used, bear in mind some raised sections may be too fragile.

You can easily adapt this technique to create other pieces of garden art. Just make sure you work on a surface that can support the load of the concrete. Or lay a tarp and work on the ground.



Take this concept to the next level and include a house number block in a new boundary or retaining wall



Mixing concrete

Dry-mix sand and cement in a wheelbarrow in a 3:1 ratio, using a bucket to measure it out. We used a 9L bucket.

Add the oxide and continue to dry-mix, ensuring the colour is consistent. Add water, blending as you go, until it is a consistency just short of pourable.

Off- and real-white cement allow you to create bolder colours without grey undertones. >

MAKE THE BLOCK



Mark the plywood


On a flat surface, mark a 690 x 315mm base, two 690 x 140mm sides and two 340 x 140mm ends on plywood. Mark one edge of the ply as the top and, with the base edge as the starting point, draw a line for the characters using a spirit level. The base of the mould will create the face of the finished block.



4 Secure the characters

Apply a generous amount of adhesive to the back of the characters and position carefully, remembering they must read backwards. Carefully wipe off any excess adhesive and position the mould in the sun to dry.

TIP Use a quick-drying adhesive suitable for smooth and porous surfaces.



Position the characters

Position the characters, remembering they must read backwards, then mark their locations on the plywood. They should be 50mm in from the edges to avoid cracking and about 30mm apart. TIP We used 200mm tall papier-mâché characters, but to create letters DIY, cut them from plywood with a jigsaw.



5 Add the concrete

Mix the concrete, then tint using oxide powder, ensuring the consistency is just short of pourable. Add it to the mould, pushing it around the characters and into all four corners. Add the remaining concrete, firming it down, then trowel off the surface. Cover with plastic and leave overnight to cure.



Make the box mould

Use a circular saw to cut along the marked lines on the plywood for the mould base, sides and ends, using a guide to maintain a consistent cut. Position the side panels flush with the base, clamp and secure with screws. Position the ends and secure to the base and sides with screws.



6 Remove the mould

Once the concrete is cured, remove the screws and side panels. Carefully roll over so the mould base faces up. Starting from one end, pull off the base slowly and gently. Don't attempt to lever the base off, even if it offers a lot of resistance. Remove the characters from the face of the concrete block.



arge or small, permanent or just seasonal, a greenhouse can be the ideal solution for cool-season gardening.

The way a greenhouse works is simple, with the structure providing protection from the cold and trapping available natural sunlight and warmth that's often in short supply in winter.

Using a greenhouse also makes it easier to control other aspects of plant care, such as watering.

This means you can keep plants that prefer warmer conditions alive and healthy during the cooler months. You can also make use of the protected environment to get a head start by growing from seed ahead of time.

In temperate regions, we generally talk about greenhouses or glasshouses, but different types of structures can be used, depending on the climate. **◆ GREENHOUSE** This structure is covered with high-strength polycarbonate or glass and protects and insulates plants from temperature extremes, while still allowing light through. • HOTHOUSE In cooler regions or some commercial situations, greenhouses are often heated and are referred to as hothouses. • COLD FRAME This is a mini

Protect plants

Traditionally, in cold climates, the frame is attached to the rear of a hothouse and left unheated.

greenhouse that is usually low to the ground with a hinged top.

Seedlings or cuttings can then be raised in the hothouse and, as the warm season approaches, moved to the cold frame for hardening off before being planted in the garden.

Use hardwood cuttings

We generally think of growing from cuttings only during the warm months when growth is vigorous but, using a greenhouse, you can grow a range of plants from cuttings in winter.

The type of material you need to propagate from is all-important.

In the warmer months, you'll strike cuttings that are either soft-tip, which are the new vigorous, non-flowering growth tips, or semi-hardwood shoots, which have started to become rigid but still retain a bit of flexibility.

In winter, hardwood is the best material to propagate. These are stems that are thoroughly rigid.

The success rate with hardwood cuttings is usually much higher than with other cutting types, although they take longer to establish.






Take the cuttings

Take cuttings that are rigid, about as thick as a pencil and at least 100mm long, but no longer than 200mm. Make clean cuts at a right-angle on top and sloped on the base, so you don't get the top and base mixed up.



Trim the cuttings

De-thorn the cuttings and trim them as required, making a fresh-angled cut at each base. Add propagating mix to a pot, making 50mm holes in the mix. Dip the cuttings in root hormone gel, then insert in the holes.



Label the cuttings

Firm the propagating mix down around the cuttings, top up if needed, then water in. Add a label with the name of the plant and the potting date. Keep the pot in the greenhouse out of direct sunlight.

CUT CLEANLY When taking cuttings, you need to make very clean cuts. If your secateurs are blunt, they'll crush the stem, making it hard for the plant to grow roots. It's also more likely that rot or fungus will penetrate your cuttings and cause them to fail.



$oldsymbol{0}$ Dismantle the secateurs

Use a wrench to remove the spindle nut and washers. Put them in a dish in the order they came off so they aren't muddled when reassembling. Remove any screws or nuts that are securing the blade to the handle or body.




Sharpen the blade

Wash and dry all the parts. Work the blade over a sharpening stone, then flip it, laying it flat on the stone and rubbing it in a circular motion to remove any burrs. Sharpen again if the blade won't cut a piece of paper.



Clean the secateurs

Use steel wool to clean any surfaces with excess dirt or rust. Wipe all parts clean and reassemble the secateurs, ensuring that you do not over-tighten the spindle nut. Lightly spray with lubricant, then wipe off any excess.



Raising seeds in winter

It's no secret why nurseries always manage to have beautiful annual seedling vegetable and flower plants to sell at just the right time of year. It's because they use greenhouses.

If you're a regular vegie or flower gardener, a greenhouse can allow you to have your own seedlings ready to go when the weather is right.

This means you can grow your tomato seedlings in late winter ready for the last cold night or frost to pass.

Growing from seeds much earlier in the season like this will save you money, as you won't have to worry about buying punnets.

You can also grow seeds on a smaller scale in windowsill trays.



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O VIBURNUM 'ANVI' This frost-hardy evergreen has a dense growth habit, making it a great hedge, screen or feature shrub in beds. Featuring large flowers up to 12cm across, it reaches 4m high and spreads to 3.5m.

Flowers completely cover the bush in winter and through to late spring, followed by deep purple-blue berries. Use both the flowers and berries in vase arrangements.

'Anvi' has low-to-medium water needs, but for optimum results grow it in moisture-retentive soil. Prune it to the required shape or size after the berries are finished.

PLANT PANSIES

When you buy winter annuals from the garden centre, they are often quite tender because they've been grown in greenhouse conditions.

Planted outside, they're vulnerable to snails and slugs, as their leaves and stems haven't toughened up. So help protect them at planting time.



1 DIG planting holes, position the plants and fill around with soil using a hand trowel, firming down by hand. Lay mulch to help keep the soil warm.





② SPRINKLE snail and slug pellets loosely around the plants, keeping clear of the leaves. Rain can dissolve the pellets, so reapply as required.

Prune now

Cut back dormant deciduous fruit trees in temperate and cool zones.

Make leaf mould

Fallen leaves block sunlight from getting to the lawn, so use a blower vac to collect them. But don't just add them to the compost, make nutrient-rich leaf mould instead.

Pile up the leaves and wet with the hose. In 6-12 months you'll have a rich mulch and in 1-2 years a nutritious soil conditioner.

TIP Shred big or thick leaves so they rot faster. ◆

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Give them the right care and you'll find these indoor favourites are easy to grow

mong the world's most popular flowering indoor plants, African violets (*Saintpaulia ionantha*) will flower for months if given the right conditions, adding brilliant colour indoors.

They belong to the Gesneriaceae family and there are about 20 species in the *Saintpaulia* genus.

While the original flowers were purple-blue, there are now many cultivars in a range of colours and bicolours. They can bear double flowers and the petals have either smooth, fringed, ruffled or frilled edges.



EXPERT SECRETS

An excess of leaves often causes a failure to flower, so remove every third leaf and a few small ones in the crown of the plant.



Help them thrive

Native to a tropical climate, African violets grow best in temperatures ranging from 15-24°C. Cold conditions can stop growth, but it will increase when the weather warms up.

- **O POSITION** Give them a well-lit spot that doesn't get direct sun, or just a little early morning sun. Turn the pots regularly to ensure even growth.
- **O SOIL** Use a potting mix specially formulated for African violets and plant in small pots, as they prefer to be slightly root-bound.

• WATER When the top of the soil feels dry, water with lukewarm water. The best way is to add water to the saucer and let the plant soak up the moisture.

Remove the saucer after about 30 minutes, when enough water has been absorbed. Don't stand the plant in water for too long. In cool weather, allow the potting mix to just about dry out before watering.

• **FEED** Give them specially formulated African violet food every four weeks, except during the winter. >



Make sure African violets get lots of light or they won't produce flowers and the foliage will turn yellow



TAKE CUTTINGS

African violets grow easily from leaf cuttings and it is an inexpensive way to increase your collection.

There are two methods of propagating these plants, either in potting mix or water.

Take cuttings from a plant you already have or share leaves from different cultivars with your friends.



Transplant new plantlets into their own pots when 25mm high

Propagate in potting mix



1 Cut the leaves

Select 1-3 healthy mature leaves from the centre of the plant and cut off with a 25mm long stem using secateurs. Trim the bases with an angled cut. Fill a small pot with seed raising and cutting mix.



2 Plant the leaves

Make a hole in the mix with a pencil and insert the stems so the leaves are above the mix, ensuring they don't touch. Water lightly using a mist spray and position the pot in a well-lit but shaded spot.

Propagate in water



1 Take a cutting

Choose a healthy mature leaf from the centre of the plant with a 50mm long stem. Make an angled cut at the base of the stem. Select a container that will support the leaf above the rim.



2 Add the leaf

Fill the container with water to cover the base of the stem and add the leaf. Wrap the container in foil to help root development and prevent algae growth. Transfer to a small pot when roots form.

In 1892, the District Commissioner of Tanganyika, now Tanzania, Baron Walter von Saint Paul-Illaire, who had an interest in botany, sent seeds of a plant he'd discovered to his father in Germany for study.

He handed them to the Royal Gardens of Herrenhausen, Hanover.

The flowers from these seeds acquired the genus name Saintpaulia after the Saint Paul-Illaire family, and received the species name, ionantha, because of their similarity to the garden violet.

Plants with benefits

Flowering fruit trees are an excellent landscape choice and, as a bonus, have many sustainable advantages as well.

Being deciduous, they provide leafy summer shade while letting the sun and warmth stream through in winter.

Many are the perfect size for today's smaller gardens, most are tolerant of a wide range of conditions and they're also very hardy once established.

As they lose their leaves in one big autumn drop, they're quite tidy for the rest of the year. The fallen leaves make a great addition to your compost heap.

Their beautiful spring-flowering display is followed by delectable fruit in summer and throughout autumn.



Lots of fruit trees benefit from an annual prune, so check the label for details

BREEDING MATTERS

Most fruit trees used to be literally as tall as a house but, today, grafting and hybridising has given us designer trees to suit any situation. The size description only relates to the tree, not the fruit, so a dwarf or miniature tree will still bear full-sized fruit. Here's a selection from Fleming's Nurseries (flemings.com.au).



Miniature

The Trixzie 'Pixzee' Peach bears masses of full-sized fruit but only grows to 1.5 x 1.5m. It fruits well in cool to warm temperate regions and is even suitable for large pots.



Columnar

Fruit trees with a columnar form, such as Ballerina Apples, are ideal for narrow beds or where space is at a premium. They only reach a little over 3m tall and 60cm wide.



Low maintenance

The Pixie Crunch Apple reaches a tidy size of 4 x 4m and has been bred to resist apple scab, making it easy to care for and an ideal choice for the home gardener. >

Pollination

Many fruit trees do best growing in the company of other suitable fruiting trees, as it increases their pollination and, in turn, the fruiting rate.


Check the labels before buying, as some are self-fertile but others perform best with specific varieties nearby.

This doesn't mean you need a huge garden, as you can buy double-grafted plants with two or more varieties combined to maximise pollination.

You can also use duo or trio planting techniques and put multiple trees in one planting hole.

Grow a duo or trio

Is your garden small, but you fancy a couple of different trees? Does your preferred tree need a partner to assist with pollination, but you don't want to lose too much yard?

There is an amazingly simple solution, called multi-planting.

Following the regular steps for planting, dig a slightly larger

hole and place 2-3 compatible varieties back-to-back, leaning a little outwards, then prune any inward-pointing branches.

This technique is suitable for apples, cherries, almonds, apricots, nectarines, peaches, pears and plums. The smart idea is to combine varieties that will cross-pollinate to improve your harvest.









10 Dig a planting hole

Carefully remove the tree from the bag and shake the mix from the tree roots, pruning damaged roots with secateurs. Put in a cool, shady spot. Dig a planting hole twice as wide as the root spread. TIP Use a post hole auger for digging.



Add the tree

Make a small mound of soil in the centre of the hole and position the tree, so the graft, or bud union, is 20-30mm above what will be the finished soil level. Backfill the hole, ensuring the gaps between the roots are filled.



Water in well

Create a water well by mounding up a low wall of soil, then apply a quality controlled-release fertiliser for fruit. Water well. Add mulch, keeping it clear of the trunk, then water. Prune lightly to compensate for the lost roots.









WHAT TO GROW

Oriental lilies

Popular cut flowers, these lilies can have wavy petals or double flowers. All sweetly perfumed, they come in a wide range of colours and grow up to 1.1m high.

LA Hybrids

Breeding has crossed Asiatic hybrids with *L. longiflorum*. Called LA Hybrids, they feature vigorous, fragrant flowers in various colours and reach a height of 500-800mm.

Tiger lily

This lily bears spotted orange blooms, and cultivars come in shades of pink or yellow. Tiger lilies (*Lilium lancifolium*) grow to 1m or more and like cool climates.

Christmas lily

Also known as a November lily, Lilium longiflorum produces up to 10 waxy, sweetly scented white flowers on each stem. It tolerates some lime and grows up to 800mm.

Asiatic lilies

Available in a range of colours, Asiatic lilies are very hardy plants and will multiply quickly in the garden. They grow to a height of 500-800mm.

The Madonna lily

The flowers of the Madonna lily (Lilium candidum) are pure white with golden anthers. Unlike other lilies, it likes slightly alkaline soil. It grows to about 1.5m high. ◆







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

Chill the bulbs

Put the bulbs in a paper bag, marking their name on the outside. Put them in the vegetable crisper in the fridge and leave for 3-10 weeks.

TIP The later in the season you bought the bulbs, the less chill time they'll need.



Add growing medium

Fill the base of the container with the growing medium, such as glass beads, gravel or pebbles, to about a quarter or a third of the depth of the container. Fill the container with water to just below the top of the beads.



Position the bulbs

Remove the bulbs from the fridge and stand them root-down on the growing medium, pushing them in until the base of each bulb contacts the water. Position the container in a cool indoor spot, ensuring the water is kept topped up.








