GAINING ACCESS

Think outside the square and set the tone with statement gates

gate may not be the first thing that springs to mind when renovating or building, but it is functionally necessary and can set the tone for the whole house or give you an opportunity to get creative.

Ergonomic function should be high on the agenda for a front gate that will be used multiple times a day.

It needs to be secure, easy to operate and look good, as well as be suitable for the kind of use it will get.

For a side passage, where rubbish bins most likely need to come in and out once a week, the gate must be wide enough to accommodate this function, with an easy method of securing open.

Be inspired by this selection of gate designs for your home.

How does it open?

A gate can open inwards, outwards, or slide on tracks behind a wall.

The method you choose must first take into account the site. A gate can't swing up a slope and a level area is required for best function.

Proximity to the house, parked cars, pedestrians and other potential obstacles need to be carefully weighed up so the gate doesn't become a hazard and difficult to use.

Artistic touch


Instead of installing a solid gate, which can block the architectural and landscaping flow, opt for a creative approach.

This gate offers both security and screening, but also functions as a modern work of art.

It was designed by Anne Miles and made by sculptor Robert Miles for Watershed Design (watersheddesign.com.au).









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

MAKE A GATE

Use off-the-shelf pickets to build this Federation-style landscape solution in just a few hours

f you have an opening that's too big or small for a standard-sized gate, build your own. A picket gate is a simple DIY project and the dimensions can be easily adapted.


Here, 13 cypress pine pickets were used to create a side gate. To build it, all you need is a drill and a mitresaw.

The gothic profile was cut off five of the pickets and they were used for the rails, brace and gate stops.

Treated pine posts were secured to the house and a brick fence and the gate was hung using hinges.




Stain or paint a timber gate to protect it from the elements






Secure the posts

Counterbore 10mm-deep holes at the top, middle and base of the posts. Drill clearance holes, securing to the house with coach screws. Drill the second post using a masonry bit, securing to the brickwork with Dynabolts.



2 Install the stops


Drill four clearance holes through the gate stops 25mm in from one edge, then position with the holes closest to the wall, flush with the post tops. Secure the stops to the posts with galvanised timber screws.



3 Assemble the gate

Position the pickets face down and align with a spacer block and straightedge. Lay the rails 100 and 690mm from the base. Secure the pickets 10mm in from the rail edges with screws, using three on the outer pickets and two on the rest.






Attach the brace

Check the gate assembly for square, then position the brace diagonally 20mm from the ends of the rails.

Mark the angles, remove and cut with a mitresaw. Secure the brace to each picket using two screws.



5 Hang the gate

Secure the hinges to the rails with two screws, then position the gate against the stop with a 5mm gap between the rails and post. Attach the hinge plates to the post with screws, securing a pad bolt or latch on the opposite side.

Brace the gate
Gravity can cause the
sides of a gate to sag, but
a diagonal compression brace,
like the one we've used here,
prevents this by moving some
of the load to the hinged side.


A compression brace is usually positioned from the base hinge corner of the frame to the top latch corner.

The brace prevents sagging by transferring the downward pressure to the hinge. >



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
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LESS IS MORE

A well-planned renovation and modest extension made the most of this suburban home without blowing the budget

hen a new job meant a change of city, it gave the Harris family the chance to rethink what they wanted in a home.


Having rented an old terrace in the inner city for many years, Tina Harris wanted to create something new, and a move to the suburbs of a smaller city meant the possibility of buying.

Without a large budget, Tina knew she would be in the market for a bit of a fixer-upper, but had her mind set on a more modern house than she'd lived in previously.

When the couple first inspected their new home, price and location drove the sale. It was a fairly standard detached house and the interior layout consisted of a number of small closed-off rooms and narrow hallways.

But the big backyard and pool had them immediately interested.

'For the first time, I understood what people mean when they say they saw the potential. As it stood, there was just a back door leading to the outside space and no real view from anywhere in the house, but I knew we could make a big improvement,' says Tina.




The price was right and left enough in the budget to plan for a 37sqm extension to be built off the back.

The original kitchen and living

'I just couldn't wait to get walls knocked down and let in the light.'

The single-level extension would leave enough room in the garden for a large entertaining deck, a good-sized pool and a grassed area.





Seeking simplicity

The new layout in the extension is simple and effective, and while the zones are large and open, there isn't any wasted space.


A staggered design positioned the kitchen at one end of the space, which in turn allowed for a private dining nook to be created on the other side of a dividing column.

Large without being cavernous, the kitchen features sleek, narrow cabinets that mirror the shape of the room, and so are in perfect balance.

'Storage is everything in the kitchen, of course, but instead of running cabinets up the whole wall, we used the length of the room instead,' says Tina.

'We have lots of cabinets, but the space looks and feels very pared back. This approach has really set the tone for the whole house.'

Playing with space

The rooms in the main house are small, but maximum function and space has been retained in each. All the bedrooms have built-in storage, and the lack of space is embraced.

Instead of using mirrored built-ins, which would be a traditional way to create the illusion of space, Tina opted for timber for warmth and earthiness.

The playful strip of mirror on the doors serves a practical purpose and also reflects the feature pendant lights.

'I like a bedroom to be cosy and relaxing, and I don't think you need lots of space for that. Colours and textures used are the main considerations,' says Tina.

The smaller rooms also helped with budget constraints. Using recesses not only provides a focal feature and adds depth to a space, but it also creates extra practical surfaces with built-in headboards.

Built-in desks and wardrobes streamline the kids' bedrooms. >



Choose timber doors with mirrored panels for built-ins to inject texture and warmth

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Living in colour

White works well for an overall scheme, particularly in an open-plan area, but knowing where to introduce colour is key to adding visual depth.

Built-in recesses serve a practical purpose of adding storage space, but also create shadows, so expanses of white wall are broken up.

While the living area is zoned to watch TV, floor-to-ceiling sliding doors give the home what it was missing, a connection to the outdoors.

Paying homage to 1950s style and featuring carefully curated items, the living spaces are visually interesting without feeling overdone.

'I've been a bit of a collector and you keep hold of things because letting them go feels wasteful. But in preparing for the move, I realised I had lots of stuff that I didn't even like,' says Tina.

'I understand now that having less but loving it makes me happier and my home look more put together.'

Panels of feature colour create a theme and give a definite nod to the owners' personalities.

'I love colour, but I didn't want anything to look too busy. In previous homes, I've gone to town with colour, as I didn't know where to stop. I was determined not to do this here and I'm pleased with the results.'




Using the basics of feng shui, a Chinese philosophy of directing energy, the colours were chosen to reflect the mood that was wanted in each space.



Break up expanses of white walls and add character with pops of colour





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Creating consistency

The bathrooms and ensuite in the house all feature the same tiles but in different tones and ways.

A downstairs powder room uses the large-format grey tiles on a false wall to hide the toilet cistern and streamline the space.

An angled section of the wall creates shadows and the illusion of depth, making the room feel bigger.

The bathroom features the tiles in two different greys on the walls and floor. The recess theme is continued, this time backed with a mirror, which takes the emphasis off the corner of the room and creates an infinity view.

In the ensuite, a large shower and lots of glass give an upscale hotel feel, with not a white tile in sight. Storage is provided by a large vanity and a heated towel rail ups the luxury.

BUDGET TIP Use the same tiles in bathrooms throughout the house to reduce material buying costs and create a uniform, streamlined look.

Planning wisely

This is a house that has taken budget and building restrictions and made the most of what was there.

Money was saved by using the same paint and tiles throughout, and small pops of colour.

Paint has been used to define and brighten but also to disguise less-than-perfect walls in the main house, and also make a feature of unsightly radiators.

Furnishing is kept to a minimum, but interest is brought into each space with the use of simple recesses.



Knowing where to spend and where to save meant that Tina was able to incorporate inexpensive items but still keep the overall look sleek and sophisticated.

In the bathrooms, vanities are run-of-the-mill, but tapware is high end. Likewise in the kitchen, the cabinets are standard flatpack, but Tina splurged on the island bench chairs and the extractor.

'These elements lift the room and claim your attention. A lot can be done with clever planning and a good builder,' says Tina. ◊



A well-equipped alfresco entertaining area is one of the most sought-after features in the modern Australian home.

Creating an outdoor room extends the existing living area, providing a space where you can take advantage of the long, hot summers.

Protected from the elements, it can be used all year, whatever the weather.

Here, a garage was converted into an outdoor room. Large windows and floor-to-ceiling sliding glass doors close off or open up the room, providing a natural flow between zones and bringing the outdoors in.

A neglected outdoor area is reclaimed with decking to become a cosy entertaining space

The biggest problem with the side entrance of this house is all the dead space that could be put to better use.

The bare, decades-old concrete appears cold and uninviting, and the ramp means there's no room to put any outdoor furniture.

And the backdrop of grey steel fence panels doesn't make for much of a relaxing outdoor sanctuary.

While the plants add greenery, the bulky planters are getting in the way of the entry.

The reno challenge

The owners are keen to turn the area into an outdoor space they can use for relaxation.

A simple solution is to install a deck that still allows traffic flow but can double as an inviting entertaining area.

Modern furniture creates a comfortable seating area, while decorative panels and a vertical garden create a pleasant haven.

SIX STEPS TO SUCCESS

1 LEVEL THE AREA

A level surface is needed for the new deck, so the concrete ramp is the first thing to go, which I'll replace with two steps.

At the same time, I'll get rid of the plastic planter tubs to free up more floorspace.



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PAINT-JOB PERFECTION

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t requires plenty of time and elbow grease to paint the outside of your house, so it pays to get it right the first time around.

Paint won't adhere to dirty or flaky surfaces, so ensure the walls are clean and smooth before picking up a brush. Factor in preparation time when planning and work from the top down to avoid dirtying cleaned surfaces.


Always allow enough time for repairs to dry or cure, leaving finishes such as new sand and cement-based render for 30 days before painting.

FIVE-STEP PLAN

SAFETY TIP

Pressure washers should be used safely. Don't operate one when on a ladder, as the force could cause you to lose your footing. Follow these easy steps to cleaning, preparing and painting the house to get the job done well.

- **1** CLEAN the surfaces thoroughly by hand or use a pressure washer.
- PREPARE the surfaces by removing rough sections and flaking paint with a scraper or sandpaper.
- 3 PATCH any damaged areas such as gaps, holes or cracks.
- 4 PROTECT the surrounds using drop sheets and mask off trim.
- S APPLY two coats of paint, allowing it to dry completely in between.





Cleaning the surfaces
A pressure washer is effective for removing loose paint and built-up grime on surfaces.

It's worth investing in one for general home maintenance, but make sure you use it carefully near windows, as it may break the glass.


Avoid directing water up under the eaves and keep the nozzle 500mm

away from the surface being cleaned. Always start with a low pressure and test a small section prior to full-scale cleaning.

If you don't have a pressure washer, you can scrub surfaces using a stiff brush on a pole and a bucket. Mix the water with liquid sugar soap or mild detergent, then hose thoroughly with clean water.







Preparing weatherboards

Weatherboards are used as external wall cladding on a house.

They are long, thin boards that run vertically or horizontally and either overlap or fit together with a tongue-and-groove joint.

Traditionally, weatherboards are made from timber such as cedar, cypress or baltic pine, but they are now also available in H3 LOSP finger-jointed clear grade pine and composite materials.

It's worth keeping these boards in good condition, as preparation for painting can be a time-consuming and difficult task, particularly if the old paint has been left for too long and has started flaking.

For boards with flat profiles, it's possible to use a power sander, but those with curved profiles need to be sanded by hand using flexible sanding sponges, making it a tough and laborious job if there's a lot to do.

Sanding weatherboards
If the paint is pre-1980s, the
chances are it is lead-based.
To check, buy a test kit and read
the Lead Alert booklet produced
by the Australian Government. Go
to environment.gov.au to download.

If it's lead-free, remove any flaking paint with a scraper, then feather the edges by sanding with 80 grit, then 180 grit paper.











Prepare the boards

Scrape and sand away any flaking paint using a scraper. Remove any rusty or protruding nails and replace them with galvanised nails, positioned 10mm from the original holes.



Patch damaged areas

Remove paint from around the damaged area. Overfill slightly using an epoxy two-part filler and allow to dry. Sand with 80 and 180 grit paper, then prime the filled area and any bare timber.



Fill nail holes

Use a caulking gun with a paintable, flexible gap sealant to fill holes, gaps or cracks around window and door jambs. TIP Old caulk loses elasticity, so dig it out and refill to weatherproof.





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Rendered

Masonry includes brick, block or stone that is bound with mortar. It's commonly used for the exterior walls of houses and retaining walls.

BAGGED MASONRY has a skim coat of wet mortar applied over the surface to partially hide the joints and create a textured finish. Coloured oxide can be added to the mix or the finish painted.

RENDERED MASONRY has a smooth appearance that completely hides all joints. Colour can be painted on or









added to specialty textured coatings.



Prepare the area

Brush off any loose debris, then apply a sealing and bonding agent for render. Remove any drummy render using an angle grinder, bevelling the edges for smooth joining of old and new render.



Patch the hole

Lay mortar in the damaged area with a trowel, overfilling slightly. Screed by pushing and pulling a straightedge across the patched surface. Fill any depressions and repeat the process.



3 Smooth the surface

As the render firms and dries, use a float to smooth the area in a circular motion. Finish by rubbing the area in a circular motion using a flat sponge, blending the patch with the existing edges.



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




Cut around damage


Mark around the damaged area using a steel rule and pencil, then cut out the section using a jigsaw.

TIP Use a tungsten carbide-coated jigsaw blade to cut the FC.



Add the backing

Cut a backing piece 40mm longer and 2mm narrower than the cut-out section. Add holes for string, apply construction adhesive to the ends, then position in the cut-out section and pull against the wall.



Fill the section

Allow the adhesive to dry, then cut an FC patch to fit the cut-out section. Apply adhesive to the back and position on the backing. Smooth over the joints with an epoxy filler, then sand, seal and paint.



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Applying paint

There are a few simple rules to painting to get a professional finish.

Work from the top down to avoid drips on freshly painted areas. Start with gutters, fascia boards and eaves, then paint walls, downpipes and trim.

With windows and doors, paint them early in the day so they can be closed at night.

For windows, use a 50mm angled sash brush, overlapping paint slightly onto the glass. When dry, remove it with a razor-bladed paint scraper.

For doors, paint the panels, then work into the corners. Use long strokes in the direction of the grain, brushing back over wet paint to avoid marks. Paint walls, downpipes and trim.

When painting weatherboards, work horizontally, doing three boards at a time. If there are vertical boards or panels, complete each from top to base before moving to the next.




Protect trees, shrubs, driveways and paths from overspray with drop sheets

Using a roller 1 ROLL on the paint using moderate pressure and reload the roller when the paint stops flowing easily. 2 START near the top of the

wall, rolling upwards in a big M shape and covering 1sqm at a time. Roll stripes across with even strokes, finishing in one direction, then continue lapping into the wet edge.

Use a brush to work the paint into cracks and splits and onto the base edge of the board, going with the grain to smooth the paint. 3 MASK trim or use a paint shield or straightedge and cut in as close as possible with an angled sash brush.

Extend the paint at least 50mm out from the trim, then overlap close to the trim using the roller.



1 USE a bucket with 100mm of paint rather than a full can to prevent it from drying out.

Dip 50mm of bristles into the paint and drag the brush against the inside of the bucket to remove the excess.

- 2 LAY the paint on thickly using two or three back-and-forth strokes. Reload and repeat until about 1sqm is covered.
- 3 SMOOTH the paint without reloading using long strokes, working from the unpainted area towards the painted.





Using a spray gun

A spray gun is the quickest way to apply paint to a large, smooth surface but you need to factor in the time taken to protect fixtures and the surrounding area from overspray.

- COVER any surfaces that are not being sprayed. Use drop sheets on flooring and newspaper over doors and windows.
- WEAR a lightweight spray suit, a quality mask and safety glasses.
- 3 START at the top and move across and down in overlapping layers until the area is covered. Use a steady back-and-forth motion and keep the gun perpendicular to the wall.

Turn a dated piece into a shabby-chic sideboard to display collectables

his old-fashioned display cabinet had been picked up from an op-shop by blogger Melissa Darr, but was then left under the house to gather dust.

'It was in pretty good condition with just a few chips on the veneer. I knew it would do up nicely with paint and new knobs,' she says.

Melissa removed the doors, knobs and hinges and sanded it down, then

gave it a new finish with an off-white spray paint and replaced the hardware, using crystal knobs she found on eBay.

'I had fun filling it with my trinkets, but I am sadly having to let it go, as it's too tempting for my little boy to play with all the items on the shelves.

'I've decided to give it to my sister-in-law who has just moved into a Federation-style Queenslander and I know it will suit the space.'

DESIGNER UPDATES

Use simple techniques to turn basic homewares into one-of-a-kind pieces

he secret to redecorating without spending a fortune is to update existing fittings and furniture instead of replacing them.

Give accessories a different look DIY with easy makeover techniques, changing the style of your home and bringing it bang up to date.

Here, a leather hanger was created for a mirror and a pendant light was given a new finish with spray paint. Most mirrors have a chain for the vintage look and a rope to give a beach-house feel. For contemporary chic, use leather to make a hanger.

Leather straps are sold in 120cm lengths from suppliers such as Birdsall Leathercraft (birdsall-leather.com.au).

They come in natural, red, brown or black in several widths, and are easy to join using rivets. We added brass buckles to reinforce the belt effect.








Make the mirror strap

Wrap a leather strap around the base of the mirror frame, then thread it evenly through the hanging hooks. Cut two 100mm leather pieces for loops, making two holes 10mm from either end using a leather hole punch and hammer.




Attach the buckles


Fold over each 100mm leather piece and insert rivets, using a rivet setting tool to secure. Thread the loops onto the ends of the mirror strap. Wrap each end of the mirror strap around a belt buckle and secure with rivets.






Join two straps with rivets to make the hanger. Attach a 600mm strap to each end, mark and punch belt holes 40mm apart, then thread onto the buckles. Taper the ends of the hanger using a steel rule and utility knife.







Prepare the pendant

Remove any dust or dirt from the pendant shade, then use painter's tape to mask around the top of the shade to get a clean edge.

TIP You can also use the tape to mask off a patterned design on the shade.



2 Cover the fitting

Fold a piece of paper around the light fitting to protect it from overspray, securing with painter's tape. Make sure you work in a well-ventilated area. TIP Set up a spray booth using cardboard and position the shade inside.



Spray the shade

Hold the can 300mm from the surface and spray in a side-to-side motion to evenly coat the entire surface. Allow the paint to dry, then apply a second coat, removing the painter's tape while the paint is still tacky. 6



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BUILD & CLASSIC PERGOLA

Attach polycarbonate roof sheets to a timber frame to create a cover for a deck without losing natural light

b

o make the most of a revamped deck space at this 60-year-old cottage, the awning, which was badly designed and had rotted, was removed and a new pergola installed.

The new roof structure is raised higher than the original, with rafters extending out from a beam secured to the house fascia. The roof spans to a front beam, supported by three posts set into an existing slab.

Battens run across the top of the rafters, with polycarbonate sheets attached to the top of them, providing shade for the decking area while still allowing in plenty of natural light.

Create the structure

To gain the new, higher aspect, the roof was pitched from the fascia of the house instead of the wall, where the awning had originally been fixed.

For this, several house rafters were reinforced with 70 x 35mm H2 pine stiffeners, then heavy-duty galvanised brackets were secured under the gutter, adjacent to the reinforced rafters.

These brackets were attached with bolts through both the rafters and stiffeners, providing a sturdy structure to hold the rear beam of the pergola.

Woodhouse Weatherproof F7
185 x 42mm timber was used for the

rear beam. This pre-primed H3-level treated timber is highly resistant to termite and fungal attack.

For the front beam, a 185 x 65mm length of GL8 engineered pine was used, set 4.2m away from the house. Three supporting 88 x 88mm GL8 pine posts were anchored with adhesive and the beam was secured to these.

Nine 185 x 42mm rafters were cut to size, spanning the deck area from the rear beam to the front beam.

Finally, five 66 x 30mm F7 pine battens were fixed across the top of the rafters to hold the roof sheets in place.









Install rafter stiffeners

Mark the end points for the rear beam on the fascia, fixing a 1.8m stiffener to the first, last and every second house rafter. Predrill 4.5mm holes at 300mm centres in the rafters, clamp the stiffeners in position and secure.



Add the fascia brackets

Cut 60 x 8mm slots through the fascia, adjacent to each rafter stiffener. Install the first and last brackets plumb with the outside of the gutter. Run a stringline between these brackets, then install the remaining brackets.



Secure the rear beam

Clamp the rear beam in position. Mark on it the flange hole positions, then lower the beam and drill 6mm pilot holes. Replace the beam, then open the holes to 10.5mm and secure the beam with cuphead bolts.

Add the roof

The pergola was roofed with Suntuf corrugated polycarbonate sheets. These roofing sheets are easy to install DIY and they go perfectly with corrugated iron for a classic Aussie look.

To cover the 6 x 4.5m roof, eight roofing sheets were laid on the

battens with overlaps, then secured with Suntuf One Shot screws.

These fasteners have excellent corrosion resistance and the hex head is easy to drive.

Barge capping was secured to the rafter on the open side, then apron flashing was added and the junctions were sealed with silicone.



BUILD THE PERGOLA



Mark the post positions

Drop a plumb at both ends of the rear beam and measure 4.2m out from this to find the front beam position, using the 3:4:5 method. Measure 300, 3000 and 5700mm along the front chalkline, marking out the post positions.




4 Make the rafter template

Position a rafter over the beams with a 400mm overhang at the front. Cut a 50mm notch at the front and back of the rafter so it sits snugly on the beams. Cut a level line from the front beam to the rafter end to taper the overhang.



Gut the sheets

Measure the length required for the roof, allowing a 50mm overhang. Mark the crests of the top roofing sheet and tape the bundle together. Use a power saw with a fine tooth blade to cut the sheets to size. File off the cut edges.



Secure the front posts

Use stirrups as templates to mark the hole positions on the existing slab for the three front posts. Drill 12mm holes to 100mm deep at the marked points, then secure the stirrups to the slab with anchor bolts and adhesive.



5 Install the rafters

Lift the template rafter back onto the beams, checking for fit in all positions. Use this template to cut the rest of the rafters. Secure the end and centre rafters in place at either end, then secure the remaining rafters at 745mm centres.



Secure the roof

Align the first sheet, marking the screw positions on the crests as you go using a felt tip. Secure at these positions, but leave the first and last unsecured. Install the subsequent sheets, screwing through both on their overlaps.

🚱 Add the front beam

Use a level to find a 180mm drop from the back to the front beam, then cut the posts to this level. Cut a 40mm beam housing on each post, securing with coach head bolts. Attach the front beam using two cuphead bolts on each post.



6 Add the battens


Secure the front and back battens to the rafters, then add the centre batten, ensuring the rafters remain parallel. Add the intermediate battens. Brace the front beam with decorative lace braces secured to the outside posts.




Install the flashing

Attach the barge capping to the final rafter, flush with the crests. Secure this and the apron flashing through the roof into the battens. Seal the junctions with silicone, securing aluminium flashing as needed for extra protection. •

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NURTURE YOUR WINTER LAWN

Give your grass plenty of TLC in the cooler months to keep it lush, strong and healthy

a sits growth slows over the cooler months, the lawn is often forgotten about while we spend more of our time indoors.

Come spring, the grass can be in a sorry state thanks to cold days and nights and short daylight hours.

A bit of care over winter will help keep your lawn healthy and will see it bouncing back quickly in spring.

Here are our simple steps for looking after your lawn in winter. >




EXPERT SECRETS

Having a healthy lawn can add significant value to your home when it comes to selling.

A well-cared-for winter lawn will bounce back quickly when spring arrives.





Let in light

A critical part of keeping your lawn looking the best it can during winter is to maximise the amount of sunlight that reaches the grass.

In order to produce energy, and for photosynthesis, grass needs sunlight. Sunlight also makes the soil warmer, which helps keep roots healthy and soil micro-organisms active.

Keep the lawn raked clean of leaves and twigs. It's a fast and easy way to increase light-fall, helping your lawn warm up on a winter's morning.

Another option is to set the mower slightly higher than usual and, with the catcher fitted, run it over the lawn. It will work like a vacuum cleaner, sucking up any loose detritus and foliage.

Look at overshadowing plants or branches from surrounding garden beds and prune them back as well.

Use a computerised timer attached to a tap to ensure your lawn gets exactly the right amount of water Winter watering
The cold months can be
a deceptive time for watering,
as soil may become dry, especially
if it's windy, but you're less likely to
notice due to the cool temperatures.

On the other hand, a period of rain can cause your lawn to stay damp for weeks on end.

You can't do much about an overly wet lawn in winter, but you

If the soil beneath your lawn appears to be dry, run a sprinkler for 15-20 minutes. Use a tap timer, as timing is important.

Choose a sunny day and water early to allow surface water to evaporate. If you leave it until late in the day, this water can sit on the grass and cause fungal problems.

Applying a hose-on seaweed fertiliser once every month should provide adequate water. >







Mow monthly

In most areas and with most types of lawn, you'll probably only need to mow once every 4-6 weeks across the cooler months.

When you do mow, keep the blades set at a normal height or even raise them one click.

Only mow after the lawn has dried off from any overnight dew and definitely don't mow a wet lawn.

In winter, clippings can take too long to break down and this may lead to fungal problems damaging your lawn, so if you normally mulch-mow, switch to catching mode instead.

Even if the lawn doesn't look like it needs a mow, it's still worth running the mower over it, as this will remove fallen leaves and other material that can reduce the amount of sunlight your grass receives.

Did you know?

The majority of the more popular lawn grasses are actually warm-season varieties. This is why it's important to nurture them across the cooler months to reduce damage from the cold.

TYPES OF GRASS



Zoysia

- SOIL Likes sandy and clay soils.
 GROWS Features soft, dark green leaves and is drought-tolerant.
- MAINTENANCE Requires less mowing than other grasses.



Kikuyu

SOIL Likes medium-textured soils.
 GROWS A quick grower in warm, sunny areas and withstands heavy traffic. Sends runners under the edges.
 MAINTENANCE Mow weekly throughout the summer.



Sir Walter Buffalo

SOIL Suitable for all soil types.
 GROWS Has soft, green leaves, likes hot weather and tolerates shade and drought. This grass runs across the top and is not an edge invader.
 MAINTENANCE Mow fortnightly throughout the summer.



Windsor Green

- SOIL Can be grown in all soils.
 GROWS A fine-leaf grass with a low seed head that likes full sun and is not sand tolerant. Sends runners under the edges.
- MAINTENANCE Requires relatively high maintenance.

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












ECO TIP

By improving water flow, gutter guards help maximise rainwater collection and reduce silt build-up in the base of the tank.




There are gutter guards to suit both corrugated and tiled roofs

To install the guard, we bent the tabs down 30°, then positioned each length, overlapping them by 30mm. The scalloped design of the gutter guard matched the corrugated roof.

The mesh guards were secured every 300mm along the gutter lip on every second corrugation and each join using galvanised hexagon screws.

Roof and gutter silicone was used to seal the gaps along the corrugations to stop loose leaves getting caught.







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PIZZA OVEN DENTITATATA

Get rid of rust and repaint the doors to bring an outdoor stove back to life

onstant exposure to the harsh elements had caused the iron doors on this pizza oven to deteriorate, making them look shabby.

If the doors had been left for much longer, they would have needed replacing, so we repainted them to save them from rusting beyond repair.

After removing the rust, we applied two coats of a specialised, heat-resistant paint DIY to restore the doors.



Resurfacing the oven doors makes them look like new











Remove the rust

Use a scraper to remove flaking rust on the front, inside and around the edges, then go over the surface with a wire brush until it is smooth. Repeat with the scraper and wire brush to ensure all loose rust is removed.



Paint the first coat

Apply a single coat of heat-resistant paint in broad strokes to the doors, ensuring the front, sides and inside are all covered. If the brush strokes are visible, smooth them out for a clean finish, then allow to dry overnight.



DIY TIP

Use acidic household liquids, such as lemon juice or vinegar, to get rid of any particularly

hard-to-remove patches of rust.

3 Sand between coats

Gently rub over all the painted surfaces using a 120 grit sanding block. Remove any excess dust with a lint-free cloth and apply a second coat of paint. Allow this to dry overnight before using the oven.



Wheelbarrow

Prepare the area

Lay a 50mm bed of crushed rock and compact it to create a level base. Position timber edging along the path sides, securing with stakes. The edging should rise above the gravel by the height of the pavers plus 20mm.



Add the sand

Pour three bags of paving sand onto the crushed rock base and thoroughly mix in a handful of cement with your hands, wearing work gloves and a dust mask. Smooth the sand across the path base to about 20mm deep.



Make a straightedge

Cut a piece of timber to the width of the path and use the height of one paver to mark a level line along one side. Drive in a nail at the marked line on each end and use the nails to position the straightedge on the timber edging.






Screed the base

Working from the start of the path, pull the straightedge towards you to screed the base and create a level section, then start laying pavers. This path uses a stretcher bond pattern, where the joints are offset by half the length of a paver.



5 Lay the pavers

Lay two rows of pavers, gently tapping into position with a rubber mallet, then set a stringline across the path. Check for level, adding or removing sand as needed. Mix more sand and cement on the base and screed it level.



6 Finish the paving

Lay the path using the stringline to check for level, cutting end pavers with an angle grinder. Mix sand and cement in a 4:1 ratio, sweep into the joints and spray with water to harden the mix. Repeat until all the gaps are filled.



A hedge needs regular trimming to keep it in good shape and promote healthy, dense growth. Trim hedges 3-4 times a year at the turn of the season for the best results.

Trim new, non-established hedges along the top, leaving the sides untrimmed to encourage growth.



Create a dense hedge by spacing plants one quarter of their maximum growing width apart

Garden shears

Prune the topmost foliage of each plant to the same height using garden shears. Start at the end of the hedge and work along the top for a consistent cut, keeping the shears level to create a tidy top. Assess cuts at eye level to make sure the hedge is trimmed evenly.

Cordless trimmer

To cut larger and established hedges, using a cordless trimmer is quicker than using garden shears. For a neat edge, keep the trimmer horizontal and maintain an even flow while cutting.

TIP Set up a stringline to keep the top of the hedging even.



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

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


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WHAT'S IN COLOUR

• ACACIA 'SCARLET BLAZE' has made horticultural history since its 1995 discovery by two bushwalkers and is Victoria's official Federation flower.


Bearing striking blood-red blooms from August to October, this wattle reverts to the more traditional yellow flower when grown from seed.

An ornamental, evergreen tree with a weeping habit, it is hardy, low maintenance and frost tolerant.

Give 'Scarlet Blaze' a position in full sun to dappled shade in moist, well-drained soil. Growing to 4.5m high by 3m wide, it can be used for screening or as a feature plant.

This native tolerates dry periods and, in warm weather, the crushed leaves release a cinnamon-like scent.

1 CLEAR any weeds or debris, break up the soil with a hoe, then level out. Pour in soil mix, blending to create 300mm deep of improved soil, then water well.





2 SOW seeds in rows to the depth and spacing on the packet. When seedlings emerge in about 10 days, water well until established, thinning when 100mm high.

Look out for the flower packets that feature a Wildlife Attracting symbol, as they are a great way to add colour to beds, including the vegie patch, while encouraging bees and butterflies into the garden.

The big advantage of potted plants indoors is that you can change their look and feel by using different-style planters, from plain to patterned. Whatever works in your space.

Just about every plant you see in the nursery has been nurtured to the peak of perfection, and indoor plants are perhaps the best examples of this.

They have been raised under optimum conditions and the grower has taken every care to make them as healthy as they can be.

This means it can be a challenge to keep indoor plants looking as fresh as the day you bought them. But there are simple tricks to getting the most from them so they stay lush and lovely.

Watering

O AVOID overwatering, as more house plants actually die from too much water than too little. So before you whip out the watering can, stick your finger into the potting mix.

If it's moist a few centimetres down, there's no need to water. O PUT saucers under pots to avoid leakage and staining of flooring and carpets. Don't let the plants sit in

a saucer of water for an extended period of time, as this may cause rot and bring on fungal problems. • STOP saucers overflowing by filling up the saucers rather than watering the plants from above. Allow the plant to suck up the water, then repeat until it stops taking it up. • USE self-watering pots to make the task much easier. >

Check the plants need water before you begin pouring.



Helping hand

Plants breathe and create energy through their leaves.

Unlike plants in the garden, indoor plants don't have natural air circulation or rainwater that removes dust from their all-important leaf surfaces, so they need a helping hand.

You can use a damp cloth to gently wipe dust from the leaves, then apply a glossing aerosol product.

When the weather is warm, take the plants outside to a sheltered and shady spot, then gently wash them down.

Remove the saucer and give them a good liquid feed over the foliage and potting mix with a seaweed plant food. Let them drain before taking indoors.

Feeding

Give your indoor plants an annual feed with a quality controlled-release fertiliser. Every month or so, liquid feed them with a low-odour, organic-based product.

Positioning

- MAKE sure the position you choose for your plant has the right levels of light. If a plant prefers the shade, then ensure that the spot doesn't receive too much direct or reflected sunlight.
- AVOID having the foliage touching window glass, as the leaves will scorch, even on sun-loving varieties.
- KEEP plants away from direct draughts from air conditioners and heaters, as these can dry out plants or damage the foliage.





GROWING BENEFITS

Research carried out by the University of Technology Sydney into the health and environmental benefits of indoor plants returned some very interesting results, proving that house plants should be on everyone's must-have list.

The study revealed that potted plants effectively clean the air inside the home, removing harmful VOCs (volatile organic compounds) and reducing CO₂ levels.

It was found that air cleaning is not brought about by plants alone. The micro-organisms living in the potting mix, which exist symbiotically with the plants, play an important role.

In a survey, people studied in a plant-filled office environment had reductions of up to 60% in stress, anxiety and fatigue, while about 80% of people felt that plants made a space feel more welcoming.



Potted indoor plants make a room more inviting and also help purify the air





Indoor plants can suffer from a few common maladies, but if you know the symptoms and how to treat them, you'll be able to keep your house plants in tiptop shape.



Deformed leaves and white fluffy lumps

• LIKELY CAUSE Mealybug.
• SOLUTION For small outbreaks, gently wipe the leaves with a soft cloth soaked in a 1:1 mix of water and methylated spirits, then dab each infestation with a cotton bud

Or, take a natural approach and introduce a beneficial native ladybird, available from suppliers such as Eco-Organic Garden.

If the infestation is severe, consider disposing of the plant.

HOW TO GROW

Hellebores aren't complicated plants to cultivate. They grow well in cool and temperate climates, but they are not suited to the tropics, sub-tropics or dry inland areas.

They can be grown easily from seed and various-sized potted plants are available in nurseries in winter. • POSITION in a shady or semi-shaded spot. While hellebores are ideal for woodland gardens, don't plant them under trees that have competitive fibrous root systems near the surface. • SOIL must be moist and rich, but free draining. Dig in lots of compost or cow manure before planting. • WATER regularly, especially during winter, as this is their growth period and new flowers are forming. • FEED them yearly with well-rotted manure and compost. Apply a fertiliser for flowers in late autumn. • MAINTAIN hellebores by cutting off old leaves at the base in late autumn

to encourage new leaves to grow.





SELF-SOWN SEEDLINGS

Any gardeners who have established hellebores will have experienced forests of seedlings germinating beneath plants in autumn and winter.

These seedlings have come from self-sown seeds during the previous late spring or early summer.

All hellebore seeds need a period of warmth followed by a period of cold for germination to occur, and summer and winter naturally provide this cycle.

Remove the flowers when they have finished if you don't want your hellebores to self-seed.

SOWING SEEDS

If you want to grow hellebores from seed, it's best to collect the ripe seeds in November for immediate sowing, as fresh is best.

• FILL a pot with a good-quality potting mix to about 20mm from the top, add about 20 seeds, then cover with 15mm of mix.

• WATER the seeds and position the pot in dappled shade. Keep the mix just moist but not wet and protect the young seedlings from snails and slugs.

• TRANSPLANT the seedlings into the garden, including self-sown ones, after they have produced their first set of true leaves.

While mature plants will survive being transplanted, it may inhibit their growth for some time.

Take advantage of these pretty winter flowers by planting a few in the colder months, and you'll be rewarded with a spectacular display for years to come. Here, we showcase four of the best.

Black hellebore Also called the Christmas rose, as it flowers in winter in the northern hemisphere, black hellebore (Helleborus niger) produces

It grows best in cold climates and the flowers remain until spring,

Lenten rose Often incorrectly called by its previous name, Helleborus orientalis, the lenten rose (Helleborus x hybridus) is the most commonly grown hellebore.

It starts flowering late winter, continuing into spring. Colours include shades of cream, white, pink and purple, and nearly black. Some feature speckled flowers.

Double-flowering hybrids are also available in various shades.

cup-shaped white flowers set against leathery deep-green leaves.

Stinking hellebore While the common name of Helleborus foetidus is unappealing, don't let this put you off growing this striking plant.

The name is a reference to the stem, which emits a smell when crushed, and the earthy-smelling roots, but neither is especially offensive.

The green flowers start unfurling in late autumn and last until spring. They look magnificent nestled among the deep-green foliage of stinking hellebore.

Helleborus x sternii The large flowers of

Helleboros x sternii are pale green and often tinged pink.

It has a shrubby growth habit and reaches a height of about 600mm. In early winter, each stem produces many cup-shaped blooms that last until spring. 🤣



hillies have a well-earned reputation for being hot and spicy, as they can bring tears to the eyes and make mouths burn. A popular ingredient in many cuisines, they're eaten both raw and cooked.

Belonging to the Solanaceae or nightshade family along with potatoes, tomatoes and eggplants, chillies are grown the same way as another close relative, the capsicum.

Also called bell peppers, there are over 200 varieties of these short-lived perennials. Highly ornamental, they feature bright-green foliage and white flowers followed by colourful fruit.

A warm-season fruit from the tropics, chillies are easy to cultivate and come in lots of shapes and sizes. They ripen from green to shades of red, yellow, orange, brown or purple, depending on the variety.

Avoid fertilisers high in nitrogen, especially when the plants are young, so there is not too much leaf growth at the expense of fruit.

• HARVEST at any time from green to fully coloured. The heat of chillies increases as they mature and they won't ripen after being picked.





Beat the heat

Capsaicin is the chemical in chillies that gives them their heat. They are rated on the Scoville Scale, which is divided into heat units. It is based on the dilution of ground chillies in sugar water to measure pungency.

Most of the capsaicin is contained in the seeds and white ribs in the fruit, so removing both reduces the heat.

Capsaicin levels in chillies are affected by the environment and climate, as well as by the variety. Cool weather and too much nitrogen in the soil can slow its production.

As capsaicin is not water-soluble, drinking water, a soft drink or beer won't provide relief if you eat a very hot chilli. The most effective means of relieve is casein, a protein found in milk and yoghurt-based drinks.



If you have a bumper crop, freeze fresh chillies in bags for about six months





Red lentil and vegetable dal

Dal is a dish of simmered lentils, flavoured with aromatic spices and usually served as a sauce.

Add extra vegies to turn it into a light, low-fat vegetarian meal.

Serve with Indian-style bread and natural yoghurt or raita.

PREPARATION TIME 15 minutes
COOKING TIME 30 minutes

Ingredients

1 onion, chopped

2 large garlic cloves, crushed

1 green chilli, seeded and chopped

1 carrot, grated

1 eggplant, chopped

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon mild curry powder

2 teaspoons black mustard seeds 150g split red lentils

800ml salt-reduced vegetable stock

1 zucchini, halved and sliced

1 large tomato, chopped

Salt and freshly ground black pepper 2 tablespoons chopped fresh coriander

- 1 PUT the onion, garlic, chilli, carrot and eggplant in a flameproof casserole dish or large saucepan. Stir in the oil and 2 tablespoons water. Heat until the mixture starts to sizzle, then cover and cook gently for 5 minutes, or until the eggplant has softened.
- 2 STIR in the spices and cook for 1 minute, then stir in the lentils and stock. Bring to the boil, then add the zucchini and tomato.
- 3 COVER and simmer gently for 15 minutes. Remove the lid and cook for a further 5 minutes, or until the lentils burst open and thicken the dal. Season to taste and sprinkle with the coriander to serve.

Seafood kebabs with tomato salsa

PREPARATION TIME 40 minutes, plus 1 hour marinating COOKING TIME 6-8 minutes

Ingredients

700g white firm-fleshed fish fillets 4 raw prawns

- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 teaspoon crushed ginger
- 1 green chilli, deseeded and finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon sunflower oil

TOMATO SALSA

500g Roma tomatoes

- 2 teaspoons coriander seeds
- 1 green chilli, deseeded and finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 lemongrass stem, outer leaves removed, very thinly sliced

Juice of 1 lime

Lime wedges, to serve Salt and freshly ground black pepper ① CUT the fish fillets into 2-3cm chunks. Peel the prawns, removing the legs and heads, leaving the tails on. Run a small sharp knife along the back of each prawn and pull away the dark vein. Rinse and pat dry with paper towel.

② MIX the garlic, ginger and chilli with the oil in a large bowl. Add the fish and the prawns and mix well. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for 1 hour. If using wooden skewers, soak them in cold water for at least 30 minutes before using.

3 MAKE the salsa. Cut a cross in the base of the tomatoes, cover with boiling water and leave for 1 minute. Peel and deseed the tomatoes and chop the flesh into a chunky puree. ⚠ DRY-FRY the coriander seeds in a heavy-based frying pan over high heat for a few seconds until they release their aroma. Crush the seeds in a spice mill or with a mortar and pestle and add to the tomato. Mix in the chilli, garlic, lemongrass and lime juice and season well. Cover and chill for at least 30 minutes.

6 HEAT the grill to medium-high.

Thread the fish and prawns onto four skewers and grill for 3-4 minutes on each side, or until the prawns are firm and pink. Season and garnish with the lime wedges. Serve with the tomato salsa on the side.

Mexican chicken soup

Fresh coriander, green chillies and lime juice bring an authentic Mexican flavour to this warming soup.

Topped with sautéed tortilla strips, it's a great dish to share with friends on a chilly winter evening.

PREPARATION TIME 20 minutes
COOKING TIME 25 minutes

Ingredients

¼ cup (60ml) olive oil 6 corn tortillas (15cm), halved and cut crossways into 1cm strips 1 small onion, finely chopped 2 garlic cloves, crushed 1 cup (250g) canned chopped tomatoes 3 mild green chillies, chopped
1 pickled jalapeño chilli, finely chopped
1½ cups (375ml) chicken stock,
preferably homemade
½ teaspoon chilli powder
½ teaspoon salt
1½ cups (375ml) water
625g boneless, skinless
chicken thighs, diced
4 tablespoons chopped fresh
coriander leaves
¼ cup (60ml) lime juice

• HEAT 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large heavy-based saucepan over medium heat. Add half of the tortilla strips and sauté for 3 minutes, or until crisp. Remove the strips with a slotted spoon and drain on paper towel. Repeat with another tablespoon of the oil and remaining tortilla strips.

2 ADD the remaining oil, onion and garlic to the pan and cook for 5 minutes, or until the onion has softened. Add the tomatoes, chilli, pickled jalapeño, stock, chilli powder, salt and water, then bring to the boil. Reduce to a simmer, cover and cook for a further 5 minutes.

3 ADD the chicken, cover and simmer for 5 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked. Stir in the chopped coriander and the lime juice. Divide the soup among bowls and garnish with the tortilla strips to serve.

Spicy sauces

Fresh or dried chillies are an essential ingredient for sauces with zing. Mix them with ground herbs and spices.

Chilli and lime sauce

From the Caribbean, this sauce recipe is delicious with barbecued or baked fish or vegetables. Baste the food with it or serve it separately.

- 2 fresh red chillies
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 cup (250ml) fresh lime juice
- 1 REMOVE the seeds and white pith from the chillies if you don't want too much heat. Finely slice the chillies and pack into a sterilised jar.
- 2 **DISSOLVE** the salt in the lime juice and pour over the chillies. Seal and store in a cool place to let the flavours develop. It is ready for use after four days and keeps for up to four weeks.

Harissa

This fiery sauce is a feature of North African cooking. Use it as a condiment with eggs and couscous-based dishes.


THE If using fresh chillies, there is no need to soak them.

8 dried chillies 2 garlic cloves, peeled

½ teaspoon<u>salt</u>

2 tablespoons olive oil

- 1 teaspoon ground caraway seeds
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander ½ teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 SOAK the dried chillies in hot water for 30 minutes, then drain. Remove the stems and seeds, then put the chillies, garlic, salt and oil in a food processor, blending them to a paste.
- 2 ADD the caraway seeds, coriander and cumin, then blend. Pack into an airtight container and top with a thin layer of olive oil. It keeps for one month in the fridge. Thin with a little oil and lemon juice or hot stock before using.



Nuoc cham


An indispensable seasoning in Vietnamese cooking, this spicy mixture can be served with mixed salad greens and herbs, or used as a dipping sauce or marinade.

- 2 small red chillies, or to taste, finely chopped 2 garlic cloves
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 2 limes, peeled and chopped
- 1 tablespoon hot water
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 5 tablespoons fish sauce



1 POUND the chilli and garlic to a fine paste. Add the sugar and lime, then pound to a pulp.
2 STIR in the water, vinegar and fish sauce, then serve.
TIP Remove the seeds from the

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Work with what you have

Take a good look at the hardscaping elements in your garden, such as paths, retaining walls, pergolas and decks.

If the garden is already landscaped, then try living with it for a while and see if it works for you.

It's expensive to replace paving, so if it's a bit dilapidated, you could consider fixing instead of removing it.

Timber decks and pergolas can often be given a new lease of life with a coat of oil or paint.

Give outdoor furniture and sheds a facelift with paint.



Removing unwanted items from your garden such as bricks, broken concrete or timber can be expensive, so re-use them in small projects.

Bricks and timber make good garden bed borders and foundations for compost heaps. Broken concrete can be used as slabs for crazy paving or as stepping stones.



Salvage any timber you find lying about the yard and re-use it in DIY projects



Right plant, right place

It may sound too simple, but correct plant placement is one of the key steps to having a successful garden, and one that will save you lots of money.

Growing each plant in the right position allows them to reach their full potential and purpose.

Every plant must have a suitable climate and soil, as well as enough light or shade and dryness or moisture.

So do your research beforehand instead of simply buying a plant and then trying to place it.

Use anything that can hold soil as a planter.

Look for items on council clean-up days, at tip shops or in skip bins and give them a new purpose in the garden. It's amazing what you can create.

• USE wicker baskets, boots and shoes, wheelbarrows, galvanised buckets, tins and trunks as containers, adding drainage holes.

• REMOVE the stuffing from the seat of an old dining chair, then staple mosquito wire to the underside. Fill up with potting mix and plant with succulents or flowering annuals.

• MAKE quirky outdoor plant stands from bookcases. You can add shells and other outdoor memorabilia.

• USE an old dresser as a potting stand and for storage.

• REPURPOSE a bathtub as a garden pond or use as a planter.

• SAVE broken crockery and mirrors and use for mosaics on paths and walls.

• TURN glass jars into lanterns by placing tealights inside, wrapping thin wire around the mouth of the jars, then hanging them in trees.





Take a close look at what plants already exist in the garden, then divide any perennials and plant the divisions in the bare areas.

If a perennial is growing well and is undemanding in its water needs, use it around the garden. It may be possible to divide a large clumping perennial into three or four clumps.

Perennials such as agapanthus, lomandra, catmint, penstemon, iris, canna, strelitzia and ornamental grasses are all easily divided to provide you with more plants.

How to divide

- 1 REMOVE the plant from the ground using a fork.
 Divide the rootball by pulling it apart with your hands or cutting it with secateurs.
- 2 MAKE new planting holes for the divisions, then add a layer of compost. Replant the divided sections at the same depth as the mother plant.
- **3 WATER** thoroughly and apply Seasol to prevent transplant shock. Water regularly until the divisions are established. ➤



DIY TIP

Create a mini greenhouse by sealing a punnet in a freezer bag or covering it in plastic wrap until the seeds germinate.

Start small

Growing from seed saves money, especially in a new garden. A packet of 50-100 seeds costs roughly the same as a punnet of 6-12 seedlings.

Large seeds and those that germinate easily, which is usually indicated on the packet, can be sown where they are to grow.

This saves you the trouble of transplanting and avoids any setbacks that may occur when young plants are moved.


Take cuttings

A good money-saving approach is to take hardwood cuttings during winter. For more variety, you could swap cuttings with neighbours and friends.

Hydrangea, deutzia, buddleia, mock orange (Philadelphus), forsythia, kolkwitzia, hibiscus and weigela all grow easily from cuttings.

Cuttings form roots in 8-10 weeks and show new growth in spring.









Prepare the cuttings

Take each cutting and dip the base of the stem into hormone powder or honey. This will encourage the production of roots and ensure their even distribution. Fill a pot to just below the top with propagating mix.



Pot the cuttings

Make holes with a pencil and plant the cuttings to a depth of a third to half of their length. Keep the potting mix moist. Transfer to larger pots in late spring using a good-quality potting mix, then plant in the garden in autumn.



Select 2-3 healthy, ripened stems about 150-300mm long and as thick as your little finger. Make straight base cuts below a pair of nodes and angled top cuts above a pair of nodes. This prevents you from planting them upside down.
