Texture mix

Consider the materials you'd like around you, and mix up textures.

A rough-hewn wall contrasts with sleek timber and a shag-pile rug, while a matt-finish bath looks glamorous against glossy paintwork and shiny chrome tapware.

Whether it's timber, metal, ceramic or glass, the material you choose must be able to withstand moisture, as no matter how effective your ventilation, there are going to be splashes and spills, and damp towels draped about.

A cold room is a definite no-no, so if the budget can extend to under-floor heating, so much the better. If not, consider a combination heat, light and exhaust fan system.

And including a heated towel rail is a worthwhile splurge. After all, creating a bathroom that's a soothing comfort zone should be every renovator's prime objective.

QUICK FIXES

Make an old bathroom look like new with these simple and easy solutions

bathroom, but once you add up the cost of new fixtures and tradies to handle the plumbing, the bill can easily run into the thousands.

If the budget won't stretch that far, you can refresh the bathroom by

installing new towel rails, shelves and hooks DIY, and resealing fixtures to prevent further problems.

A new showerhead and basin set will make a big impact for minimal outlay, and a plumber will charge about \$200 to install both.



Get the feel of a new bathroom by replacing small items and handling maintenance DIY

VANITY MAKEOVER

After a couple of decades of constant use, this vanity was showing its age.

The tapware was chipped and scratched and the silicone sealing the gap between the vanity and the wall was flaking off, allowing moisture to get behind and cause mould.

To update the vanity, a plumber removed the old basin set and installed a new chrome model. The old silicone was replaced DIY with SikaSeal Kitchen and Bathroom Silicone Sealant, \$10 (sikaretail.com.au).














Remove old silicone

Use a plastic silicone remover to peel off silicone by pulling the angled blade towards you and scraping residue with the flat blade. Carefully cut away deeper silicone using a utility knife, then wipe the surface clean.



Apply new sealant

Tape either side of the joint, 5mm from the edge. Cut the nozzle at a 45° angle, then apply using a caulking gun, pushing the nozzle forward as you squeeze the trigger to push the silicone into the gap.



3 Smooth the bead

Dip a rounded silicone spatula in soapy water, then smooth the bead by drawing the spatula towards you, wiping off excess silicone frequently. Remove the tape immediately to create a neat edge.







Remove the old shelf

Undo the grub screws underneath the mounts to remove the old shelf, then extract the old screws and remove the old mounting plates. Replace damaged wall plugs by tapping new ones into the holes and trimming to size.



Attach the mounting plates

Position the plate over the wall plugs, attaching with the screws. Check for level and reposition by loosening the screws. If the existing holes aren't suitable, apply masking tape and drill new holes using a tile bit.




The old screws were cut using a rotary tool and then extracted with pliers, and new wall plugs and

a soap dish installed. >

③ Install the new shelf

Position the mounts over the mounting plate and tighten the grub screws. Slide the shelf into the mounts and use a tape measure to check it is centred, then tighten the grub screws using the supplied Allen key.














Remove old paint

Scrape away flaking paint with a paint scraper and fill any holes or cracks with timber filler. Sand the surface using a power sander and medium grit paper for flat surfaces, using a flexible sanding pad for details.



Prepare the surface

Clear away any dust and debris with a handheld vacuum cleaner and sugar soap wipes. Mask off the edges and hang a drop sheet to protect the wall and fixtures. Apply primer to the windowsill and allow to dry.



🚱 Apply new paint

Apply two coats of gloss paint to the windowsill, using an angled brush for details and to cut in at the edges, and a roller for flat surfaces. TIP Remove the window pane to make the frame easier to paint.



Add hanging storage

To continue the chrome look throughout, the towel rail and robe hook were replaced with matching items using the existing mounts. Extra storage was added on the door using the Naleon Ultimate Double Hook, \$15 (naleon.com.au). Suction hooks easily attach to tiles and other

smooth surfaces, but for porous surfaces such as timber or plasterboard, a self-adhesive plastic mounting disc is required.








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Renovate on a budget

Give a bathroom a style injection with modern fixtures and a few clever fixes

hen DIY blogger Melissa
Darr moved into her
house five years ago, the
bathroom wasn't unbearable, but it
wasn't entirely what she wanted either.

'The wall and floor tiles were pretty new, the vanity wasn't too daggy and it had newish feature tiles around the shower and bathtub,' says Melissa.

'But the gold edging on the shower screen and mirror was not to my taste and neither were the feature tiles.

'The finish of the entire bathroom was kind of wanting.'

Melissa and her husband Bevan chose to give the walls a fresh coat of paint, leaving it at that until they had the time and money for a full reno.

Replace the vanity

For the vanity, Melissa wanted something a bit different than the standard white floor cabinet.

Before

She initially chose a wall-mounted vanity but had to compromise, as the drainage from the original vanity went through the floor and they didn't want to spend too much on plumbing.

They settled on an oak-look one with a white ceramic top.

'Choosing a coloured vanity was way out of my comfort zone, but I can honestly say I really am happy with our selection,' says Melissa.

Once the vanity was installed and a mirror attached to the wall, new tapware and towel rails were added.

Adding feature tiles

Knowing the existing neutral white and grey marble look would work well with just about any new colour scheme, Melissa and Bevan kept the original wall and floor tiles in place, removing only the blue and green feature tiles.

'Not stripping everything back to the bare bones saved us lots of money,' says Melissa.

To remove the feature tiles without damaging the surrounding wall, Bevan removed the grout along

the top and base of the feature tiles using the blade of a multi-tool.

He then gently hammered out the old feature tiles with a chisel and hammer, slowly working his way around the shower and other areas of the bathroom, before replacing them with a mosaic-design tile.

'I love these tiles in the shower. They really add a nice modern edge to the bathroom,' says Melissa.

'Although they weren't the cheapest tiles, they were definitely worth the investment.'



Mosaic tiles were installed in the shower recess.

Overhaul the shower

After replacing the feature tiles in the shower, Bevan also removed a number of cracked wall tiles in the recess, replacing them with new tiles.

'Sourcing the correct shade of white tiles for the shower was actually the most difficult part of the whole renovation,' says Melissa.

'We ended up buying three versions of the same tile to get the right shade. It still wasn't perfect, but we matched it the best we could.'


Once the tiling in the recess was done, a shower screen was installed by a window and door company.

'To give the feel of a frameless screen without the price tag, we chose a semi-frameless one,' says Melissa.

'We decided on a matt-silver edging around the screen, which flowed seamlessly with the rest of the bathroom. No more ugly gold.'

Adding a new showerhead and tapware completed the shower. >







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
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Repaint and re-grout

Having originally painted the bathroom the same colour as the rest of the house, Melissa now wanted to try something a little bit different on the walls.

'I was after a bit of a cooler colour in the bathroom to suit the grey and white marble floor tiles and the new marble mosaic feature tiles,' she says.

'After three or four test pots, we settled on a white with a really lovely soft grey tone to it.'

The paint job helped brighten up the areas of the bathroom, such as the toilet recess, that didn't get a lot of natural light.

Bevan decided to re-grout the floor and wall tiles, as they weren't being replaced, to bring them back to a near-new condition.

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


FROM RETRO TO

REFRESHING

Updating the colour scheme and replacing the hardware modernises this dated bathroom

The dark colour scheme makes the room feel cramped, and despite being a relatively large space,

storage is lacking.

On the plus side, the layout works fine, which means reno costs will be low, as there won't be any major plumbing work.

The reno challenge

With a budget of \$2000, a cosmetic refresh will neutralise the flamboyant colours and modernise the fixtures and fittings.

Hexagonal floor tiles still work well in a modern bathroom, so I'll retain them to keep costs down.

The pedestal basin will be upgraded to a wall-hung vanity to add extra storage space.

Finally, a timber bench, a coat of paint and a modern art print complete the transformation. >

SIX STEPS TO SUCCESS.



1 REPLACE THE VANITY

Lack of storage is a real problem, so I'll kill two birds with one stone by removing the pedestal basin and installing a wall-hung vanity.

The fresh white cabinets and a timber benchtop give the bathroom an instant modern lift.

4 ADD NEW LIGHTING

Our white-washed bathroom now needs a colour lift and there's no better way to do that than with artwork and feature lighting.



As Scott began work, he discovered the original floor was poorly built, with the joists positioned too far apart.

To fix the problem, he had to reinforce it and put down compressed fibro before he could start installing the waterproofing and tiles.

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TILE THE BATHROOM FLOOR

Keep tradie costs down when renovating by tiling DIY

aying floor tiles can be time consuming, but doing it yourself can significantly reduce the cost of a bathroom renovation. Luckily, it is a straightforward process for anyone with basic DIY skills.


When laying bathroom tiles, ensure the subfloor is professionally waterproofed before starting to avoid water damage down the track.

To lay tiles neatly, a reference point called a datum line is marked across the floor, creating a guide to keep the tiles aligned.

Once all the tiles are laid and the adhesive has cured, apply grout to fill the gaps and seal it using grout sealer to prevent discolouration. TIP Choose large-format tiles to make a small bathroom feel bigger.

Ensure the tiles are symmetrical and spaced evenly by aligning them to a datum line



Mark your datum line

Use a spirit level, tape measure and pencil to mark the datum line. This reference point allows for the tiles of the same width to be laid around the edge of the bathroom so the tiling job looks symmetrical and to account for any uneven walls.



2 Test-fit the tiles

Before applying adhesive, lay out the tiles dry, using the datum line as a reference, to see what the finished floor will look like. Check the tiles are evenly spaced on every side of the wall, and if any are uneven, adjust the datum line as required.

DIY TIP

Multiply the width of the room by the length to determine the amount of tiles required, adding 10% extra for wastage.



6 Mix the adhesive


Pour water into a bucket and add powdered adhesive according to the instructions. Mix it using a drill and mixing paddle until it's the consistency of toothpaste. If the adhesive is too thick or too runny, add more water or powder and mix again.






4 Lay the tiles

Use a trowel to apply adhesive between the datum line and the wall, then run a notch trowel across the adhesive. Apply adhesive to the edge of the tile that runs along the datum line, then position it on the adhesive and gently press down so it is flush with the line.



f Insert the spacers

Lay a row of tiles across the floor, then wipe off excess adhesive with a damp sponge. Insert spacers between them to keep the grout lines straight, using two spacers for each side of a large tile. TIP Once the adhesive is dry, remove the spacers with needle nose pliers.



6 Cut tiles to size

Measure the distance between the wall and each laid tile at both ends of the tile. Mark this distance on a new tile and connect the marks with a line, then cut using a tile cutter. Mark the position of the floor waste, then plunge cut with an angle grinder.

Concentrate on essentials

Getting the basics right is key before selling, and Grant says there is huge value in clever, targeted improvements, with painting and flooring the most effective jobs you can do.

'A fresh paint job is going to bring attention to the flooring, which is likely to be as tired as the paintwork, so don't do one without the other,' he says.

'Together, these two elements make a big difference, and if you can only stretch to the minimum, just do these.'

If you can spend more, kitchens and bathrooms are the big-ticket items.

'Buyers love a renovated kitchen and bathroom, but it doesn't need to be high end. Try to improve what's already there,' says Grant.

'Painting cabinets, adding new handles and resurfacing benchtops can make a huge difference.'

Avoid an average job

It can be tempting to do a surface job for as little money as possible, and do as much as you can yourself.

While this is understandable, says Grant, it comes with a warning.

'Something is not always better than nothing. A mega-budget job is easy to spot and can backfire if buyers think it won't last,' he says.

'If you can't afford renovations, it may be best not to do them at all. Just clean and tidy up, including outdoors.'

Also don't attempt work you're not confident or proficient enough to do, such as installing a deck.

'Decks can be a common pitfall. If a builder's report highlights a badly put-together effort, it creates a poor impression and gives buyers an in to start bargaining down,' he says.



Limit the ways a buyer can negotiate you down so the ball is in your court Be wary of bad advice You may well receive advice from agents that you don't have to do anything before you sell, as properties like yours are selling like hotcakes.

It's important to be informed before making any decision.

'You have more to gain from a makeover than an agent does, because they always have a vested interest in a quick sale. Their commission isn't going to budge too much after a renovation,' says Grant.

'Also, if a house is going on the market, but the sale is delayed by doing improvement work, there's always the potential for another agent to make a better pitch, then the first agent misses the sale.'

It is important to remember, though, that your time is money, so the length of time spent on a reno should be factored into the cost.

Find a happy medium

Get to know what's on offer in your area. Median house prices are a good guide, but try to compare like with like.

There are theories on how much you should spend on renovations, with one suggesting that every dollar you spend should be returning three.

'We find on average at the moment that it may cost between \$20,000 and \$30,000 for a really effective makeover, for places that haven't been updated in 15 years or more,' says Grant.

'If bathrooms or kitchens need a lot of work, it could be up to \$40,000. What you spend should always be in balance with a realistic return.

'We go through and quote for every job, and itemise it. We know not everyone has the cash to do it all, so we say 80% is the sweet spot.

'That way, you can go to market knowing that you did as much as you could for a profitable result.'

Plan ahead when changing location to guarantee a smooth, stress-free move

t's inevitable that at one time or another you have to move home. Maybe you're **L** downsizing or upsizing, or just want a sea change or tree change.

And whether you're going interstate, overseas or only across town, the process of packing up all your belongings and repeating the process in reverse at the other end is pretty much the same.

According to research, many people say they'd like to move to a new home but are afraid of the upheaval. Yet it doesn't have to be a traumatic experience.

Here, Handyman project editor Adam Woodhams, who has just relocated from NSW to Queensland, shares his personal

BUDGET TIP

If you're purchasing boxes, ask the supplier if they have a buy-back scheme so you can you've unpacked.





Boxing clever

The main aim is to get everything from point A to point B undamaged, leaving nothing to chance.

Items such as books and crockery need heavy-duty, medium-sized boxes, while large, thin-walled boxes are great for light, bulky things such as pillows, Doonas and stuffed toys.

There are also portable wardrobes with hanging racks available, as well as specialised boxes for wide-screen TVs.

Butcher's paper is the best choice for wrapping plates and glassware. Bubblewrap, which comes in a range of sizes, is ideal for unusual-shaped, large fragile items.

Use a good-quality packing tape to seal the boxes and seal the base of each box with a double run of tape.

Consider buying padded moving blankets, lounge and chair covers, and mattress-protection bags if you are planning to move DIY.

• GIVE yourself plenty of time to pack, as rushing things is likely to increase the risk of breakages.

• USE good-quality boxes for packing your belongings.

- PACK fragile kitchenware just as you would in the dishwasher, with plates standing on edge and glasses facing rim-down.
- PUT bedding and toiletries in suitcases so they're easily accessible when you come to unpack.
- LABEL every box clearly with the room the contents live in so it's easy to identify where it needs to go.



Doing it DIY

If you decide to do the moving yourself, don't underestimate the time it can take and the difficulty you may face, especially when it comes to shifting large items such as whitegoods.

For this task, a multi-wheeled stair-climbing trolley, which can be rented or bought, is a necessity.

A small, rented light removalist's truck that can be driven on a standard driver's licence may be all you need.

They generally have a hydraulic tailgate lift, so heavy items can be easily lifted on board.

Renting or buying a trailer is another good option, as large items can be easily moved on an open trailer.

When you are filling any truck or trailer, make sure the weight is evenly distributed, that everything is securely strapped down and covered, and that you don't overfill it.



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


- STICK to regular routines with meals, walks and playtime.
- O AVOID washing bedding, as cats and dogs are reassured by their own smell.
- KEEP your pet in a safe room with their bedding, toys and water when the removalists arrive and empty this room last. Or you could put them in a boarding kennel 2-3 days before the move.
- TAKE them to the vet if they need any medication, such as for travel-sickness. Sedation is not advised for air travel.
- GET them used to a carrier by putting their bedding, toys and treats inside.
- CHECK their ID tag is up to date, legible and securely attached.
- CONSIDER joining the nationwide ID tag Freecall service Boomerang-ID (boomerangid.com.au), which reunites pet owners with their lost pets 24/7.

- O UNPACK and position their luggage first and watch they don't try to urinate while exploring their new home.
- FEED them in a safe room while you unpack everything else.
- USE a plug-in diffuser, which releases a calming scent, for very anxious pets. Try Adaptil for dogs and Feliway for cats.
- RE-ESTABLISH regular routines for feeding and other indoor activities, but keep them safely indoors.
- O ALLOW at least a week before you let a cat venture outside and do so just before mealtimes so you can lure them back indoors for dinner.
- TAKE a dog out on a lead to explore the new neighbourhood, allowing them to urinate on trees and groundcover so they can find their way back home should they accidently get out.



- **DECLUTTER** as early as possible.
- SET a date for a garage sale or sell items online as you go.
- SEEK a removal quote as early as practicable or rent a truck or trailer if you are moving DIY.
- ▼ TALK with your vet about moving your pet and obtain any records you may need in your new location.
- **BUY** cardboard boxes in a range of appropriate sizes.
- CONTACT the Post Office about redirecting your mail.
- MAKE a list of people you need to advise on your change of address, including the Electoral Commission and the Australian Taxation Office.
- ARRANGE disconnection for the utilities, phone, internet and cable TV for the day you move out.
- ✓ ORGANISE all the same utilities and services to be active at your new home on the day you arrive.
- **▼** BOOK a cleaner and a gardener for the lawn, garden and pool so that everything is neat when you leave. Using contractors lets you focus on the move and will save you stress. •





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DITCH THE DIRT

When giving the home a thorough final clean, there are several key areas that are still often overlooked.

In the kitchen, check for grease on cabinets and crusted-on oven grime. Clean away any food scraps and dust caught behind appliances.

In the bathroom, get rid of grout mould and ensure there is no hair left

in the drawers and the drains. The shower screen also needs to be left free of soap scum.

Living areas require fans and light features to be wiped down for dust.

Outside, the roof and pergolas should be checked and cobwebs swept away. Outdoor areas should also be free of moss and lichen build-up.

Spotless pets

How to keep your home stain and smell free the easy and green way

The smell in cars
The smell comes from
the oil in their coat and
means your dog needs a bath.
Keep an old blanket for them
to sit on in the car.

To remove the oily stain, place 1 cup of unprocessed wheat bran in a large bowl.

Add drops of white vinegar one at a time, stirring as you go, until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. It shouldn't be wet. Add 2 drops of dishwashing liquid.

Place the mixture into the toe of pantyhose and tie up tightly. It will be the size of a tennis ball. Rub over the area. Don't forget to wipe over doors and windows.





Dog kennels are made of timber or plastic. To clean, remove the contents of the kennel and wipe the interior with white vinegar on a cloth. Then wipe with a cake of bathroom soap and water.

To remove the smell, mix 1 litre of hot water, 1/4 teaspoon of oil of cloves and 2 tablespoons of dried mint in a spray pack. Allow to cool.

Spray over every surface and wipe with pantyhose. The oil of cloves kills mould and the mint kills fleas. Reapply once a month.

Portable kennels are made of powdercoated steel and polyester fabric. Wash the fabric with a cake of bathroom soap and cold water.

Dog kennels should be elevated so air can circulate. One option is to place bricks underneath the kennel.

If you live in an apartment, you may have a pet loo or potty patch. This is a porous synthetic grass mat on top of a plastic urine collection tray.


The best way to clean it is to spray with white vinegar and water and rinse with fresh water.

Get the book

This is an edited extract from Spotless Pets by Shannon Lush and Jennifer Fleming (ABC Books, \$20).

Packed full of easy-to-follow tricks and techniques for lifting stains and banishing smells, it's a must for every pet owner and will become your go-to guide for keeping your home and car clean.

Scratch marks on leather WHAT TO USE Bead of water, walnut-coloured shoe cream, cloth, stainless steel spoon, boiling water, tea towel and leather conditioner.

HOW TO APPLY Before tackling any stains, work out if the leather is waxed, plasticised or oiled.

Place a single bead of water on an inconspicuous part of the leather. If it soaks in slowly, it's waxed. If it rolls off, the leather coating is plasticised. If the water soaks into the leather, it's oiled.

For brown leather, cut a walnut (the nut, not the shell) in half and rub the cut surface over the area. Leave for 1 hour for the colour to cure.

For other leather, use shoe cream, not shoe polish or wax, that matches the colour of the leather. Apply with a cloth over the marked area only.

To set the shoe cream, rub over it with the back of a warm stainless steel spoon. To warm, dip the spoon in a glass of boiling water and dry with a tea towel.

Wipe with leather conditioner. To make, place 1 teaspoon of beeswax, 1 teaspoon of lavender oil and 1 teaspoon of lemon oil on a 100% cotton cloth or old T-shirt.

Put in a microwave-safe dish. Microwave on high in 10-second bursts until the beeswax melts.

After use, place the cloth in a zip-lock bag and store in the freezer, ready to use again. >



and place the entire cage in the sink. Run water over the cage, gently giving your bird a bath at the same time. Help distribute the water in a spray by aiming it at the cage wire.

Alternatively, place the cage in the shower with enough space for the bird to step out of the flow of water. Leave

the seed heads to feed to your bird.

Commercial bird poo removers are available but you can clean cages with a cake of bathroom soap and cold water on a cloth, before wiping with white vinegar on a cloth.

To protect the wire from further corrosion, wipe with sweet almond oil. algae with rolled-up pantyhose. To stop the problem recurring,

add a pinch of non-iodised salt to each litre of clean water.

The birds won't be deterred by the tiny amount of salt in the water, but the algae will.





Keeping fish

Fish are the forgotten family pet, says University of Western Australia science researcher Miriam Sullivan.

'Just like cats and dogs, fish are intelligent, long-lived and can feel pain, but you'd never flush a dead cat down a toilet or win a puppy at a carnival.

'With 1.5 billion pet fish sold globally every year, it's time to take better care of them and regularly cleaning an aquarium is one of the most effective ways to keep your fish healthy,' says Miriam.



In Australia, more than 20.5 million fish are kept as pets



Cleaning fish tanks
An average fish tanks holds
40 litres of water or more.
Clean it weekly, but there's no need to remove the fish or tank contents.

Small tanks, under 40 litres,

need to be cleaned twice a week with 50% water change. If the tank doesn't have a filter, change between 50-100% of the water every day.

• ALGAE If algae is present, wipe the inside of the glass with pantyhose pulled over your hand like a mitt. Do this before removing any water.

- WATER Remove 15% of the water.
- → GRAVEL Clean 25% of the gravel with a siphon. Or remove 25% of the gravel, place it in a sieve and flush with boiling water. Allow to dry.
- FILTER If you need to clean the filter, don't change all the water at

the same time. Rinse a new filter under cold running water.

- DECORATIONS To clean algae from decorations, put inside a plastic bag with sand, close tightly and shake.
- ☼ WATER Replace the water, matching the temperature. Fill a plastic bag with fresh water, sit the bag in the tank until the water inside the bag is the same temperature as the tank water. Slowly add the new water.

If it's a large amount, transfer it from a bucket uncontaminated with detergents using a siphon. Leave a gap between the water level and the top of the tank for oxygen exchange.

• WIPE Use white vinegar on a cloth for the outside of the tank. Never use strong detergents, as they can seep into the water and harm the fish.

CONVERSION BY DESIGN

Lots of space and bold colours inspired an architect to turn an old church into a modern, comfortable home

Respecting space

The vast, open space is one of the main charms of a church conversion, but it is also a tricky template to turn into a multi-roomed residence.

The original Glanville Mission Church, dating back to 1863, was first converted into a private residence over 20 years ago, and the two previous owners had both undertaken various parts of the renovation.


'I wish I'd seen the first round of work, and I don't know how far they took it before the second owners came along and added their ideas. When I bought the property, much of the basic work had been done,' says Stewart.

Church conversions can easily be over-divided. There are many examples of trading the valuable asset of space for multiple pokey areas, in a building designed to have one internal space.

But the best renovations respect height and light, and work with natural dividing lines, such as running the kitchen from the pulpit step.

'When you have space at your disposal, less is more. This house is quite a study in paring back, with the basics forming the backbone of the design for best form and function.

'It's really one bedroom, with an office, a kitchen, open-plan living and dining, and two bathrooms.' >

Making improvements

The property didn't need renovating from the ground up, but it did require a lot of maintenance work.

With old buildings, typical problem spots include the windows, roof, a lack of plumbing, insufficient heating and cooling, and draughts.

As he was working with a limited budget, Stewart completed only the most essential and effective repairs.

'The gutters were overflowing, the trim was dropping off and hadn't

been painted for ages. I re-roofed the back section over the verandah, as it had completely disintegrated,' he says.

Keeping the feel of the church and respecting the original features was important to Stewart.

'I enjoy the fact you can look down the length of the building, without feeling it's cut off and segmented.

'It is stereotypical, quaint church architecture, including the leadlight and stained-glass windows, and that's the way it should be.'

Embracing colour

The interior colours were already in place when Stewart moved in and rather than rebel against the scheme, he decided to take it to a new level.

A bit of repainting in the same colours deepened the saturation on the walls and refreshed the overall look.

'The height of the ceilings is what saves these very bright colours from being overwhelming and, instead, it just makes the whole place feel happy and welcoming.'



Reclaiming storage

The kitchen is orientated in an elevated position where the pulpit was once located. It overlooks the rest of the house, as the priest would have overlooked the congregation.

The existing cabinetry had worn well, but the layout was unworkable.

'There was no room to install a dishwasher and an old enamel

oven that was barely functioning dominated the space. Its awkward positioning also prevented easy access to the cabinets near it,' say Stewart.

'As storage is at a premium in a large open space, I had to reclaim as much as I could. Reorientating solved these problems and made it more functional. A half-wall shields open shelving from view and keeps the kitchen neat.'

'I rarely have anyone over who doesn't comment on how uplifting it is, whether they like the colours or not,' says Stewart.

No restraint has been shown in the furnishings either, with jewel tones complementing the classic mid-century lines, adding to a feeling of extravagance and comfort.

'I think each new owner will just come along and add something to what exists. Nothing needs to be changed, as it's such a lovely place.'

Creating zones

In the central nave of the church, where the congregation would have sat, Stewart positioned the living area.

Using his collection of mid-century furniture, he created functional zoned areas around colourful rugs.

An oversized dining table reflects the scale of the building and doesn't get lost in the room.

A seating area, library nook and dining area are defined spaces, but are unified by style and design.

The original church had two outhouses. One was turned into a full bathroom and laundry and the other used for valuable storage.

Opening up

Upstairs, the mezzanine level houses the bedroom and studio-cum-office, as well as a bathroom.

Stewart replaced the carpets and removed all the heavy curtains. He felt the design worked better with no window treatments, and maximised the natural light available.

A rusty and unattractive exhaust fan was removed from the round window at the front of the church. Melamine wardrobes were replaced with a simple open hanging system, which doesn't block the flow.

'I wanted the timber rafters to be unfettered so the architecture could be fully appreciated,' says Stewart.

'The curved shape makes the bedroom space feel private, although it is open to the other side.'

The upstairs bathroom mirrors the shape of the ceiling, again making a feature of the architectural style. >

Adding insulation

The height of the interior and the poor condition of the roof meant the potentially cold Adelaide winters and hot summers could be problematic.


Stewart filled in the gaps in the fabric of the building, then installed a 5kW PV solar system on the northside roof, which made a dramatic difference.


'The 16 or so panels helped shade the roof and acted as eaves for the skylights. The energy collection in summer made a massive difference.

'Where I could gain access to roof space, I put in Air-Cell foil insulation sheeting. Even removing the heavy curtains from the northside windows introduced much more sun in winter.

'Anywhere I could improve the thermal efficiency, including replacing a couple of windows, I did,' he says.

Once all the gaps were filled and trim replaced, two existing split system air-conditioners worked well to heat and cool the whole house.

A large part of the work Stewart did was in the grounds of the residence.

'The garden was a mass of weeds, so I stripped it back to create a blank canvas for my garden designer,' he says.


Mark Ellis, the designer, had to turn the southern garden into a shady summer haven that would attract birds.

He took the bold colour scheme outside after seeing various creative approaches to home decor in the area, which quashed his reservations about upsetting the neighbours.

Banksia and crepe myrtles were planted, which would provide great contrast with the orange fence until they reached full height.

'The front door and the masonry wall in the garden were an off-beige and the carport was a real eyesore.

ADDING DRAWERS

Increase storage options in a built-in cupboard with DIY sliding drawers

PROJECT AND PICTURES SUE FERRIS

oncealed storage is not only a sure-fire clutter buster, but it's easy to create DIY.

The shelves of this built-in wall unit were packed with books, CDs and DVDs, but the base cupboards were underutilised. To provide more storage with easy access, drawers were custom-built for the cupboards.

Seven timber drawers were made from 425 x 90 x 12mm lengths of DAR pine, using simple butt joints secured with dowels and wood glue.


The cupboards were separated by dividers but built right to the brick walls either end, so plywood panels were installed using brackets to create a frame for the sliding drawers.




Drill the dowel holes

Measure and mark the positions for three holes for the dowels on the ends of the drawer sides using a pencil. Use the drill bit included with the dowel-jointing kit to make the holes for the dowels.



Add dowel markers


Insert the dowel markers in the holes on the ends of a side. Line it up at a right angle with the drawer front, pressing together to mark the hole positions. Repeat with the drawer back, then the other drawer side.



3 Make the drawer box


Drill dowel holes in the drawer front and back. Apply wood glue to the holes in the drawer sides, front and back, then insert the dowels. Join the pieces, pressing firmly, using a set square to ensure your angle is exactly 90°.






Mark the base

Position the drawer box on top of a 900 x 600 x 7mm plywood panel. Use a pencil to mark around the edges of the drawer box for the drawer base. Cut out the plywood using a circular saw.



5 Attach the base

Apply wood glue around the base edge of the drawer box, then position the plywood base on top, pressing down firmly to join. Secure the plywood drawer base to the drawer box using screws.



6 Add the runners

Measure and mark the location of the drawer runners. Secure the runners to the drawer sides and the interior cupboard panels, using the supplied screws. Check the runners for spacing, then install the drawer.

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SEALING TIPS

Get a professional finish when using sealant to fill gaps DIY

ealant is one of the most versatile products around. It's relatively inexpensive, and the amount of money it saves you in energy costs and leak repairs more than makes up for what you pay for it.

You can buy a speciality sealant to fix everything from a leaky gutter to gaps around a window.

It can be used for easy DIY fixes on everything from plasterboard, plastic, glass and timber to metal, concrete, stone and brick. >




repaint it first, if necessary.

a spare nozzle is another option.

Keep it flexible Depending on the type, a sealant can become stiff and hard to work with when it's cold. Heat makes it more flexible and easier to apply smoothly.

In cold weather, dunk the cartridge of sealant in a bucket of warm water for half an hour before you use it.



For best results, the hole should be about half as wide as the space you're filling.

Cut the tube at a 45° angle and to make applying sealant easier around corners, you can make a V-notch cut in the tip.

Tool the bead Sealant needs to be tooled, or compressed, into the seam. It should be thick where it adheres to both sides of the joint but thinner in the middle.

Use the cut end of the nozzle or a wet finger, but wear latex gloves to avoid irritation. An ice cube will also do the job.

> Guide with tape To get a straight, neat line of sealant, stick a strip of masking tape on

either side of the seam.


Apply about 1m of sealant at

a time, smooth the finish, then slowly remove the tape.

Fill big gaps Using just sealant on gaps wider than 5mm or deeper

than 10mm can be wasteful. For deep cracks, press backer rods into the gaps before applying.

Fill wide gaps, such as where a pipe comes out through a wall, using expanding foam filler. Once dry, cut off any excess with a sharp knife or hacksaw. >



Squeeze the trigger of the caulking gun to start the sealant flowing. Begin at one end of the gap and move slowly, keeping a firm, steady squeeze on the trigger as sealant is dispensed.

To stop the flow at the end, release the locking bar on the piston, located where your thumb is when you're holding the gun.

INSTALL HANDLES

Cabinet and drawer handles can have a surprisingly big impact on the overall look of a kitchen.

Fitting handles is the final stage of a kitchen reno, and is easy to do using a template. Simply mark and drill the holes, then attach them with the supplied screws.

Position the template on the lower corner of the door opposite the hinges. Locate the holes in the template that match your handle, then mark the screw holes on the door using a pencil.



Drill the holes

Position the handle next to the pencil marks to check that the holes are marked accurately. Make the holes using a cordless drill, selecting a drill bit that is slightly wider than the supplied screws.



Attach the handles

If the supplied screws are too long, trim them using nippers so they protrude 5mm. Attach the top screw first using a screwdriver, keeping it slightly loose. Attach the lower screw and tighten, then tighten the top.

fence defines the boundary of a property and keeps children and pets safe and secure.

The backyard of this property had never had a boundary fence and, while the hedge provided a natural screen, a permanent and low-maintenance solution was needed.

To fence the yard, a classic 1.8m high post-and-rail fence was built using a lap-and-cap design with 100mm palings. Treated pine was used, as it's durable and inexpensive.

Once completed, the timber was allowed to season for four weeks, then painted with Walpamur Fence Finish. 5 DAYS

Plan the fence

Before beginning construction, you will need to discuss options with your neighbour as they have a say on the type of dividing fence.

Both owners are usually required to equally share the cost of a fence that is considered sufficient and appropriate for the site.

If only one party wants extra features or a premium fence, they may have to pay the additional costs.

Your council will also have regulations regarding the height or style of the fence to be installed, and these can be found on their website or at their local office.

BUILD THE FENCE



Set out the fence

Run a stringline between the start and end points for the fence. Mark post holes at 2400mm intervals along the stringline with line-marking paint. Transfer the marks to the ground using a spirit level or plumb bob. Dig 250mm wide by 600mm deep holes at each position using a post hole digger.



4 Secure the palings

Run a stringline 10mm above the post tops. Using a nail gun and starting at the first post, secure a paling with two nails on each rail, so the tops are above the stringline and the bases touch the ground. Secure the remaining palings using a rail offcut to space 50mm apart. Attach palings to cover the gaps.



Install the posts

Insert a post in each hole and brace in position, plumb against the stringline. Trim the posts at the base to create a smooth top to the fence if the ground undulates. Fill each post hole to ground level with concrete, using a float to slope it away from the posts to drain water. Let the concrete set overnight.



5 Trim the palings

As the palings follow ground level, there will likely be a ragged top line once they have been secured to the rails. At each post position, mark the front face of the paling 10mm above the post and spring chalklines between these marks. Cut the palings along this line using a power saw.



Add the rails

Insert the rails through the post mortices, joining the rails with scarf joints at the posts and securing with nails through the post and both rails. Stagger the joints from one post to the next to increase the strength of the finished fence.

TIP One rail will span three posts.




6 Attach the capping

Make a 45° cut at the back edge of each post to allow the capping to overhang by 10mm and for water to drain off. Cut the capping to length and secure with nails, joining the capping with scarf joints.

TIP For sloping sections, use capping offcuts to test the angled cuts. **⊘**



Compost is made when micro-organisms feed on organic matter - any plant, animal tissue or residues - and break it down into smaller and smaller pieces. When the waste is fully decomposed it forms humus - or compost - a dark, soil-like material with a pleasant earthy smell.

While natural decomposition takes a long time, you can produce mulch in four weeks or rich compost in 6-8 weeks by creating the perfect environment and providing the air, water and food that micro-organisms need to rapidly multiply and quickly break down organic waste.

Once you've made your mulch or compost, place it around your plants, keeping it away from the stems, to feed important nutrients into the soil and to hold moisture in.

SIMPLE SCREENING

Boost privacy and create shade in an entryway with a slatted screen

PROJECT AND PICTURES ADAM WOODHAMS

A dding an outdoor screen is one of the easiest and most practical ways to solve a variety of landscape challenges.

A screen can be used to improve both privacy and security, block out an undesirable view or create filtered shade in an exposed spot.

The main entrance to this home was open on all sides and was hit by afternoon sun, so a screen was installed on one side using decking boards and aluminium channel.

A slatted timber screen is easy to install DIY, very budget-friendly and can be customised to fit any space.

For a low-maintenance screen that will last, we used a composite board called Ekodeck instead of timber. >

DIY TIP

Always secure a screen to at least three fixed points, such as two posts and a centre support, to prevent the slats from bowing.



EXPERT SECRETS

Composite timber is not only resistant to fading, rot, decay, termites and mould, but it will never need oiling or painting.





BUILD THE SCREEN



Attach the half-slats


Measure the height of the posts on both sides of the opening. Cut a slat to length, then rip saw it in half vertically. Clamp one of the half-slats flush with the exterior side of one of the posts. Predrill, countersink and secure to the post with 40mm screws. Secure the remaining half-slat to the other post.



Install the slats

Using a slat as a spacer, position the second slat above the base slat. Predrill and countersink the slat at each end, securing it to each post with two screws. Install the remaining slats, checking for level as you go.

TIP The centre support is located on the outside or rear of the screen.



Cut the screen slats

Measure the opening and calculate the number of slats needed, with 15mm gaps in between. Cut the slats to length using a circular saw. Lay a slat flat on the surface as a spacer. Position the base slat, predrill and countersink, then secure the base slat using screws, checking for level with a spirit level.



5 Secure the centre support

Mark screw holes along the centre support, with the marks centred on each slat and running in a straight line up the support. Predrill, taking care not to drill through the slats. Pull each slat firmly against the centre support from the front while securing buttonhead screws using a drill.



(3) Add a centre support

Cut aluminium tube to length to use as a centre support, then cut pieces of aluminium channel as saddles. Secure the saddles at the top and base of the opening. Predrill the saddles and tube, then join using a pop rivet gun.

TIP Paint the saddles and centre support before securing, then touch up.



6 Cover the slat ends

Measure and cut two slats to cover the slat ends. Make a 45° cut on the base of the cover slats, if required. Predrill and countersink the slat covers, securing at the top, base and centre with two screws.

TIP We offset the slat covers about 10mm in from the screen edges.

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
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

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

HOW TO RECLAIM A POND

REMOVE any fish or plants from the pond, then drain the water and remove the shell or liner. Clear out any debris from the base of the pond hole.



POND HOLE NEW SOIL

② FILL the hole with an all-purpose garden soil with added soil wetter using a shovel and wheelbarrow. Plant up, water in and mulch with pebbles.

Clean the mower



And after thinning out seedlings that you've grown from seeds sown directly into the ground, you can use them to plant up pots and save money.

Direct sowing

Annuals such as cosmos and poppies are so easy to cultivate that you can sow the seeds directly where you want them to grow in beds or pots instead of using seed-raising trays.

- **① PREPARE** the bed before planting by pulling out any weeds, then rake the soil to remove any clumps.
- **2 SOW** the seeds according to the packet directions and keep the bed moist while the seedlings germinate.
- **3 THIN** out the seedlings when they reach a height of 50-75mm.





Non-direct sowing

Annuals that do not like to be sown directly, such as stocks, bedding begonias and English daisies, can be sown in seed trays.


- **1 FILL** the tray with a seed-raising mix, then sow the seeds according to the packet directions.
- **2 WATER** lightly with a mist spray and cover the tray in plastic wrap. Place in a warm, shady spot.
- **3 REMOVE** the plastic wrap when the seedlings emerge. Water regularly with a mist spray, then transplant into a pot or garden bed when 50-75mm high.

Design ideas

There are many ways to plant annuals to the best effect in the garden.

- **o GROW** plants with different leaf and flower shapes together, such as snapdragons and gypsophila, to emphasise their diversity.
- **GROUP** the same type of annual, such as ageratum, or blend this with a different group, such as cosmos, to create a strong visual look.
- PLANT annuals of different heights in a pot, positioning tall ones, such as stock, in the centre and low-growing ones, such as bedding begonias and trailing lobelia, around the sides.

COLOUR COORDINATE



The colours in your home reflect your taste and can work well outdoors, too. The easiest way to plan a scheme is to use a colour wheel.

TIP As a shortcut or to get you started designing with colour, seed suppliers offer carefully selected flower mixes.



• COMPLEMENTARY Using colours from opposite sides of a colour wheel creates a complementary scheme.

The most intense contrasts are formed by using colours that lie directly opposite each other, such as red and green, yellow and violet and blue and orange.



• HARMONIOUS Colours that are adjacent or close neighbours on a colour wheel, such as red, orange and yellow, will give a harmonious scheme when used together.



• TINTS AND SHADES You can also use tints and shades of the same colour for a themed look. This adds interest and depth when using mainly one colour in landscaping, and when done in small gardens, it isn't overpowering.





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WHAT TO PLANT

Impatiens

Also called busy Lizzie, this plant produces a nonstop display of flowers in white, pink and purple. **POSITION** Full sun in cold climates, part shade or shade.

Cosmos

Tall-growing cosmos comes in shades of white, pink or crimson and is easily grown from seed. It features fine feathery foliage. **POSITION** Full sun.

Nasturtium

Great for beds, rockeries, hanging baskets and pots, colours include yellow, orange and red. Some varieties have semi-double blooms. **POSITION** Full sun or part shade.

Lobelia

Ideal for pots and edging garden beds, this low-growing plant has tiny, dainty flowers in shades of blue, pink, mauve and white. POSITION Full sun or part shade.

English daisy

Also called bellis, this short-lived perennial is usually treated as an annual. It carries its daisy-like flowers on 15cm high stems.

POSITION Full sun or part shade.

Poppy

Shirley poppies come in shades of red and pink. Pick the flowers regularly to encourage more. **POSITION** Full sun, with shelter from the wind.

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Stock

Alyssum

Commonly called sweet Alice, this low-growing annual is covered in white or deep-violet flowers that will attract bees to the garden.

POSITION Full sun.

Snapdragon

This short-lived perennial is usually grown as an annual and comes in a wide range of colours. It makes an excellent cut flower. **POSITION** Full sun.

Pansy and viola

These plants flower from winter into spring and are ideal for pots, hanging baskets and beds.

POSITION Full sun, with afternoon shade in hot climates.

Sweet pea

This climber has delicate fragrant flowers. There are dwarf varieties available that grow well in pots.

POSITION Full sun, with shelter from the wind.

s inner-city apartment living becomes increasingly popular, boutique balcony gardening is rapidly growing.

Modern 'balcony-scaping' means that lush outdoor spaces are turning bland blocks into green buildings.

While it may not be big, a balcony is the closest thing many of us have to the great outdoors. And spring is the perfect time to give it a boost.

Here's how to practice high-rise horticulture and turn your lacklustre balcony into a gorgeous green space.



Ways to landscape

There are lots of great timber, stone, plastic, terracotta and steel pots available in a wide range of colours.

- SELECT pots that will reflect and enhance the mood of your balcony.
- GROUP pots to create a feature and use leaves of different shapes to create interest. Bold pots and planting styles look striking if you have the space, but simplicity can also be effective.
- FILL tall troughs with clipped plants for a sculptural presence and to provide privacy. Try box, native lilly pilly, westringia or murraya.
- PLANT large pots with shrubs and underplant with flowering

- annuals. Change colour with the seasons and have twice the value in the pot.
- O DISPLAY seasonal colour or special plants on your outdoor table.
- **OUTILISE** wall space with vertical gardens and hanging baskets.

Or train climbers on trellis or wire stretched diagonally or in patterns.

Perfumed Chinese star jasmine (Trachelospermum jasminoides), poet's jasmine (*Jasminum sambac*) and Hardenbergia violacea are great choices. Mandevilla blooms from spring through autumn in shades of white, pink or red. >



Pick the pot

Large pots work well on balconies, as they hold moisture better than small ones. Self-watering pots are also ideal.

If you have to carry them upstairs, plastic pots are a good choice, as they're light. They also retain water well and some look like terracotta.

Select plastic pots that are large and heavy enough to withstand wind when filled with potting mix. For vegetables, choose large troughs so the plants have enough space.

Spray unglazed terracotta and concrete pots with Yates Pot A Seal to prevent moisture loss, or line the sides of the pot with black plastic.

Use pot feet to avoid staining the balcony floor. If run-off is a problem, put the pot on a tray to catch water and empty the tray regularly.

Re-potting rules

If your existing plants are looking scraggly and not growing well, they may simply need to be re-potted.

It's a good idea to re-pot plants every 2-3 years, even if they haven't outgrown their pots, as the potting mix degenerates over time.

Check the mixes in your pots have not become water-repellent and hard to re-wet. This will be obvious if the level of the mix has dropped and the water doesn't drain away quickly.

Old potting mixes can also become compacted, reducing the access of the roots to their supply of oxygen.

Re-pot in the same container if the plant isn't root-bound. If it is, or it has grown considerably, use a pot about 5cm bigger to give it room to grow.

New plants brought home from a nursery usually need to be re-potted into a larger pot, or one of your choice.









HOW TO RE-POT To help keep your plants performing at their best, they will need re-potting every couple of years into larger pots.



Add potting mix

Water the plant about an hour before re-potting, then partially fill the new pot with a premium potting mix. Remove the plant from the old pot, taking care not to damage the roots.



2 Trim the roots

Check the root system carefully and if the plant is root-bound, lightly loosen the roots with your fingers, then trim off any twisted or broken pieces using secateurs.



Pot the plant

Position the plant in the centre of the pot so it is at the same level as it was in its original pot. Top up with potting mix to about 25mm from the rim, firming it down, then water in lightly.

CHOOSE THE RIGHT PLANTS

Every balcony situation is different, so your plant choices will be affected by conditions such as the amount of light the balcony receives.



- SOUTH-FACING balconies receive little or no sun, so choose shade-loving or indoor plants.
- WHAT TO GROW Cast-iron plant, mother-in-law's tongue, clivia, liriope, elephant's ears, justica, cane begonia, ctenanthe, nandina and bird's nest fern.

For height, try Fatsia japonica and the parlour palm.



EAST-FACING balconies get some sun in the morning but are shady for the rest of the day.
WHAT TO GROW Begonia, small camellia cultivars such as 'Fairy Wand', bromeliad, hydrangea, impatiens, dianella, liriope, orchid,

maranta, ctenanthe, nandina,

lobelia and Lomandra 'Tanika'.

ferns, fuchsia, daphne, cyclamen,

- WEST-FACING balconies can be scorchingly hot at the end of the day, especially in summer, so tough, heat-loving plants are the best choice.
- WHAT TO GROW Agave attenuata, geranium, petunia, flax, yucca, bougainvillea, verbena, petunia, lavender, herbs and bay.

Mix and match different succulents in large pots for an interesting look.



- NORTH-FACING balconies are drenched in sun during the day. You can grow a range of plants, including vegetables and herbs.
- WHAT TO GROW Yucca, cordyline, flax, roses, gardenia, geranium, hebe, bougainvillea, citrus and dwarf fruit trees.

For a colourful display, fill large pots with a mix of seasonal annuals such as cosmos, bedding begonias and stocks. >





Help them thrive

- **USE** a top-quality premium potting mix that carries the Australian Standards tick and add Seasol Planting Gel to promote moisture retention.
- MULCH the pots with sphagnum moss, sugar cane or pebbles.
- FEED potted plants in the growing and flowering season, but cut down when plant growth slows. Use a three-month controlled-release fertiliser or regularly liquid-feed. Water before and after applications.
- MAKE watering a relaxing part of your morning or evening routine, as potted plants need frequent watering, especially after windy weather.
- **CONSIDER** installing an automatic drip-irrigation system if you are away for long periods of time. ➤

The frame was mounted on the concrete wall using wall plugs and

screws, and pots were hung using the supplied brackets.

Parsley, mint and lettuce create an edible garden, while chrysanthemum and polyanthus provide colour and also attract beneficial insects.







Drill mounting holes

Hold the frame against the wall and check for level, then mark mounting holes with a pencil. Use a hammer drill and a 6mm masonry bit to drill 35mm deep holes.



Attach the frame

Tap green wall plugs into the wall using a hammer, then align the mounting holes with the wall plugs and drive in 32mm buttonhead screws to secure the frame.



3 Install the pots

Position the plants in the pots, then backfill with a premium potting mix and water in well. Attach the brackets to the pots, then hang on the frame, spacing them evenly.

SIADVIERUES Green up those dark places in your garden with shade-tolerant shrubs, vines and annuals WORDS AND PICTURES ADAM WOODHAMS ne of the most common problem spots that gardeners face is a shady area in the backyard. It could be around the side of the house, under a large tree or just a situation created by aspect. These spots often end up neglected due to the difficulty they pose, but they can be turned into amazing landscape assets by selecting plants that happily tolerate various levels of shade. Here's how to make your shady place your favourite corner. SEPTEMBER 2016 Australian Handyman



Types of shade

The level of shade can vary, so get to know how much light you get in your shady spot to make choosing plants and solving associated problems easier. **ODAPPLED LIGHT** Occurs under trees with open canopies, such as gum trees. This type of shade offers the most planting opportunities, as many plants can adapt to, or tolerate, the conditions. These areas may also be quite dry. • PART SHADE This is often found at the side of a house, where there is sun for only part of the day. You will have more planting opportunities if there is morning sun instead of afternoon sun. ODAMP SHADE An ideal location for many ferns and other moisture-loving plants, as the soil remains damp. ODRY SHADE This is common under large vigorous trees. To make the most of these areas, the regular addition of compost and mulch is needed. Creating raised beds or using pots and planters can expand planting options further. • DEEP SHADE With this type of shade, the area receives no direct light. The plant range may be limited, but the results can be very rewarding.

You may want to consider lifting the levels of light by thinning the canopies of the trees creating the shade.



Native violet

If you want a beautiful groundcover in damp shade, add the delightful native violet to the garden.

It will grow in all cool, damp regions in most levels of shade but won't survive in dry conditions.

The native violet flowers abundantly in spring and summer and spot flowers year-round.

Coleus

Grown primarily for its superbly patterned foliage, coleus can also feature pretty flower spikes.

A warm-season annual that is grown across spring and summer, coleus, or flame-leaved nettle as it is also known, will add colour in dappled light and part shade.

It likes good soil and reliable moisture during hot weather.

Clivia

This plant will thrive in all levels of shade, and can be grown indoors. It will tolerate virtually any soil type, except constantly wet conditions.

In late winter, it bears blooms ranging in colour from delicate whites, yellows and salmons to near-luminous orange-reds.

Clivia forms large clumps that can be easily divided.

Wonga wonga vine This lush native climber is great for covering a fence

or trellis in a shady spot. It flowers in spring in colours ranging from white to burnt-orange.

A hardy plant, it will grow in part shade in damp or dry conditions, but prefers reliable moisture. Trim to encourage density and keep it under control.

Lilly pilly

A large shrub, lilly pilly makes an ideal hedge and features sprays of flowers from discreet to showy. Many have colourful new foliage and fruit, which is often edible.

Grow lilly pilly in dappled light, part shade, damp shade and dry shade if well mulched.





Simply roll out, cover with soil and water



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Setting up a kit

Composting with worms couldn't be simpler, with a range of worm farms available to suit the size of your garden and household.

Most tiered worm farms consist of one or more working trays, where the worms live. This is also where worms are fed and process their food.

Holes in the base of the trays allow worms to migrate to the upper levels, as they fill the lower trays with castings.

Once the worms have migrated, the castings can be collected and mixed into the soil of a new garden bed, or diluted with water to create nutrient-rich liquid plant food.

The lowest level is called the collector tray, and this is where worm juice accumulates. This prized liquid can be extracted using the tap and diluted with nine parts water before being used on the garden or pot plants.



Having worms in the garden is one of the signs of a healthy soil ecosystem







1 Assemble the worm farm

Attach the legs to the collector tray, then screw on the tap and insert one working tray into the collector tray, saving the others for later. Hydrate the bedding block in a bucket of water and spread it over the working tray.



Add the worms

Pour the contents of a worm farm starter kit on top of the bedding and spread it out gently. Position a worm farm blanket on the top and allow the worms to settle in for a week before their first feed.



Harvest the castings

Extract the juice frequently using the tap. To harvest the castings, remove the lid and the blanket to expose the worms to the light, causing them to burrow. The top level of castings can then be scooped out with a trowel.


Caring for your worms

Worms like to be kept moist, but not wet, so give them a light spray of water every few feedings and drain the lower tray frequently to avoid excessive water build-up. Pour in 5L of water weekly to keep them moist.

A healthy worm farm should have an earthy smell, but if it smells like rotting food, you might be feeding them too much. Reduce the amount of scraps and mix in hay or shredded newspaper to absorb excess moisture. TIP Position your worm farm out of direct sunlight and heavy rain.



Add a compost conditioner to help neutralise acidity and minimise pests

Grow this citrus to enjoy its fragrant flowers and flavoursome fruit

lassified as citrus, limes are mostly warm-climate trees. The fruit is generally smaller than other commonly grown citrus such as oranges, lemons and mandarins.

There are several species that can be grown at home, including native finger lime and Kaffir lime. And the bonus with growing limes, as with all citrus, are the fragrant flowers.

Limes are an excellent source of vitamin C and a great alternative to lemons. And if you like acidic tastes, this fruit is for you, as it contains one and a half times more acid, weight for weight, than a lemon.

They can be used in seafood dishes, with chicken and other meats, in cakes, drinks, desserts, biscuits, marmalade and, of course, as a substitute for the lemon in gin and tonic.





lime trees are the same.

- POSITION in a sunny spot with protection from the wind.
- SOIL must be free-draining. Limes dislike badly drained clay soils or those with heavy subsoil. Dig in copious amounts of compost before planting. Water in with a solution of Seasol to help prevent transplant shock.
- WATER newly planted trees twice a week for six weeks until established, then water well once or twice a week, especially while the fruit is ripening. • FEED with a complete citrus fertiliser in spring and late summer.

Or alternate a complete citrus fertiliser with Yates Dynamic Lifter, cow manure or blood and bone. Apply

to damp soil under the mulch in early spring, early summer and late summer.

The roots spread to the outer perimeter of the branches, so water and feed there. Wait at least six weeks or until the roots have established before feeding newly planted trees. • MULCH with sugarcane, lucerne hay or pea straw to keep the soil moist and prevent weeds growing and competing for the nutrients. Leave at least a hand's

span clear around the trunk.





WHAT TO GROW

Kaffir lime


Kaffir lime

The Kaffir lime (Citrus hystrix) grows to about 1.5m. As the leaves are constantly picked for cooking, the plant usually remains small, and will grow well in a pot.

The strong lime-tasting leaf is 'waisted', resembling two leaves joined together. It is an essential ingredient in many Thai recipes, including green curries, fish dishes and soups.

Before use, the leaves are generally shredded or cut, and they can also be frozen in a plastic freezer bag.

While the flesh of the knobbly fruit is not eaten, the zest is delicious in cooking.



The most popular homegrown lime, Tahitian lime (Citrus x latifolia) is thought to be a hybrid of the West Indian lime and the citron.

It reaches about 3m high and does well in the garden or in a pot.

Also called the Persian lime, this small tree will grow well as far south as Sydney and Perth in

frost-free zones. Given frost protection, it can be grown as far south as Victoria.

This citrus tree produces green thin-skinned fruit that are about 50mm in diameter and ripen over a five-week period in autumn and early winter.

They are at their juiciest when the skin is just turning light yellow.



Finger lime

Many top Australian chefs and gourmet cooks love our native finger lime (Citrus australasica) because of its superior lime taste.

Finger lime is an under-storey rainforest tree that reaches a height of 2-5m when planted in the garden, but lower when grown in a large pot.

The fruit contains a mass of juicy, strongly lime-flavoured citrus pearls or juice vesicles that resemble caviar. Cultivars are available with green or pinkish-red pearls.

They can be used to garnish chicken, seafood and oysters, and also make interesting jams, chutneys and savoury sauces.



Lime and Kaffir lime trees grow well in containers, and there are dwarf varieties available.

Choose a pot that is 40-50cm in diameter with good drainage, using pot feet so drainage is unhindered.

Use a specialised potting mix for citrus and add about 10% soil or, even better, homemade compost. The tree will be in the pot for a long time, so these additions will help prevent the mix from slumping.

Frequent feeding is essential, especially from late winter to the middle of autumn. Apply a complete citrus food every six weeks.

Or you can use a six-month controlled-release fertiliser such as Scotts Osmocote Fruit, Citrus, Trees & Shrubs. Always water the pot well before and after applying fertiliser.

Water regularly, especially during summer when you may need to water daily, and mulch with lucerne hay.



If space is limited, choose a dwarf variety or grow a lime tree in a pot

- **3 HEAT** a non-stick frying pan over medium-high heat. Add half the chicken and cook on each side for 3 minutes, or until cooked and golden brown. Transfer to a plate and loosely cover with foil to keep warm while cooking the remaining chicken. Serve hot, drizzled with the pan juices.


Fine sea salt, to coat

1 tablespoon lime juice

White fish ceviche with avocado, capsicum, onion and tomato

PREPARATION TIME 20 minutes, plus 3-6 hours marinating COOKING TIME Nil

Ingredients

500g firm white fish, such as blue-eye trevalla, snapper, hake or cod

- 3 large limes
- 1 red capsicum, finely diced
- 1 small red onion, finely diced
- 1 small garlic clove, crushed (optional)
- 2 ripe tomatoes, skins removed and diced
- 1 small cucumber, peeled, seeded and diced
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh coriander leaves, plus extra leaves, to garnish
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 small pinch white pepper
- 1 firm ripe avocado, diced
- 1 lime, quartered, to serve


- **1) PAT** the fish dry with paper towel. Cut into 2cm cubes and remove any bones. Put in a glass dish with a lid.
- **Q GRATE** the zest of 1 lime finely and juice all three limes. Add the lime zest and juice to the fish and stir to coat. Cover the dish with the lid or use plastic wrap, then refrigerate for 3-6 hours. The fish is 'cooked' by the juice and is ready to eat when it is firm and opaque.
- **3 DRAIN** off any liquid from the fish, then transfer to a large bowl. Add the capsicum, onion, garlic, tomato, cucumber, chopped coriander, cumin, oregano and white pepper, then stir to combine. Gently fold in the avocado.
- **④ SPOON** the fish mixture onto serving plates. Garnish with the extra coriander leaves and serve with the lime quarters. ➤



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Mango and papaya with lime mousse

PREPARATION TIME 15 minutes COOKING TIME 10 minutes

Ingredients

- 2 limes
- 1 tablespoon gin
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 mango, diced
- 1 papaya, diced

Lime mousse

- 1 eggwhite
- Pinch of salt
- 150g thick cream
 Grated zest and juice of 1 lime
- 2 tablespoons acacia honey
- **1 USE** a citrus zester to finely grate the zest from 1 lime, then set aside. Juice the limes and pour the juice into a small measuring cup. Add the gin and enough water to make $\frac{1}{2}$ cup (125ml).

- **2 POUR** the lime and gin mixture into a small saucepan and add the sugar. Bring to the boil over medium heat, then reduce the heat to low and simmer, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes, or until the mixture thickens to a syrup.
- **3 PUT** the mango and papaya in a bowl. Pour over the hot syrup, then cover and refrigerate to allow the fruit to marinate.
- **MAKE** the mousse by whisking the eggwhite with the salt until stiff. Whisk the cream with the lime zest, lime juice and honey, then gently fold in the eggwhite.
- **S DIVIDE** the fruit and syrup among serving dishes, then top each with a spoonful of the lime mousse. Sprinkle with the reserved grated lime zest.

Lemon and lime sorbet

To serve six people, you need 1 cup caster sugar, the rind and juice of 2 lemons and 4 limes, and 2 eggwhites.

MAKE THE SYRUP Put the sugar and ½ cup water in a pan and heat gently, stirring continuously, until the sugar dissolves. Bring the liquid to a boil and immediately remove the pan from the heat.



1 ADD the lemon and lime rind to the hot syrup, then let the syrup cool to room temperature.



2 STRAIN the cooled syrup into a bowl and stir in the fruit juice. Pour into a container and freeze until it resembles slush.



3 WHISK the eggwhites until soft peaks form, then add the slushy sorbet in large spoonfuls and gently whisk. Return the mixture to the freezer until it is icy and half-frozen. Remove and stir gently with a fork, then return to the freezer until solid. ◆
