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





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CREATING WAVES FOR POOL SAFETY

he kitchen forms the centre of everyday activity in a home, so it is often at the top of a homeowner's renovating wishlist.

From cooking and entertaining, to socialising and even working, the kitchen of today is a very different space to the old closed-off room at the back of the house. It really is now the heart of every home.

Avoid budget blow-outs and stress when renovating by getting the planning stages right, so you know what to do, and when.

the most economical option.

Custom-built kitchens made by joiners and carpenters provide a highly specialised result, but come with a higher price tag.

Custom building can utilise many different materials and create something of great quality and design that will last.



If you have a huge cookbook collection, make room for it. If you are a serious baker, consider what kind of drawers and cabinets will make it easiest for you. Taking the time now minimises regrets later.

The layout should be safe and ergonomic. The golden standard of the 'working triangle' is the imaginary line that connects the three main activity areas, the cooktop, the sink and the fridge.

This triangle makes working efficient while also keeping a safe and comfortable distance between stations. Make sure nothing blocks the triangle for best results.

Book the tradies
Call the plumber first to
see what can be achieved
and what is needed.

Always check the credentials of tradies with your local building authority. If you need gas work, only use a qualified gas installer, as it is very dangerous.

Once the layout is agreed, book an electrician. A licensed electrical contractor is the only person qualified to disconnect fixed appliances and power, and to reconnect newly installed fixed appliances.

The tradies will have to come three times, first to disconnect everything before demolition, then to rough in for the new kitchen, and lastly to install when everything is in place.



Lay the benchtop If you have chosen a flatpack kitchen, the benchtop will be included and can be laid after the cabinets are assembled.

Granite, engineered stone, stainless steel and solid surface materials, such as Corian, should all be installed by a specialist. They will need to be measured up

and templates created first, so they can be made exactly to size.

Manufacturing time is generally around 10 working days, but this will vary depending on the supplier.

Concrete benchtops require a mould and have to be poured on-site. Depending on the thickness, you may require extra support in the cabinet to hold the weight. >





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Finish the trades
Now is the final call for the trades, who will 'fit off'.

The electrician will install all power outlets, light switches and light fittings, connect and test all appliances, then fit out the switchboard with safety switches and circuit breakers.

The plumber will finish off any pipework, connect pipes to taps or valves and test the mounting of the sink, taps and hot water system.

Add the splashback
The main function of
a splashback is to protect
the walls, but they also have a high
aesthetic value and are used to
complete the look of a kitchen.

The choice of materials is varied, including acrylic, glass, stainless steel, timber and copper sheeting.

Tiles remain the most popular choice, with large-format tiles being the easiest to lay. This is because they are fewer in number per square metre, and the wider-spaced grout lines work well in smaller spaces.

Choose a tile that suits the style of the cabinetry, and tile as high as you can for a designer look.



Lay the flooring
Arguably the most
cost-effective option
is to lay new flooring last to avoid
damage during the renovation.

Laying the floor first is an easier process and avoids having to cut around objects, but it also means the cabinets will have to be removed if the floor is replaced.

Timber boards and floating floors can't be installed under cabinets, as the cabinets will be too heavy and restrict the floor from expanding and contracting.

If laying the floor last, don't install the kickboards until the job is finished. •

◆ Baby blues

Powder colours are having their moment in the sun and stepping out with an unusual colour choice in the kitchen can pay style dividends.

Anything in a blue hue can work well in the social and practical space that a kitchen forms, and teamed with steel accessories and hardware, it's an out-of-the-box choice that isn't over the top.

The key with colour is to give it room, so keep the palette elsewhere simple and benchtops clutter-free.

Right white -

No matter what the trend advice, a white kitchen never goes out of style. The go-to choice for many renovators, it's a fail-safe option that is anything but boring with the right treatment.

Rather than the colour, it's the surfaces and cabinetry style that can make a white kitchen look ho-hum, so take a modern approach and stick to sleek lines and shiny surfaces to create a luxurious look.

Splurge on the benchtop and use pops of colour to elevate the finish. > Painting brick
Exposed brick is back in vogue, and painting it gives a clean, fresh look, but thorough prep is the key to a good finish.

Fill any holes or gaps in the mortar with a caulking gun. Allow to set, then clean with soap and water and a hard-bristled brush.

Select a masonry primer and press the paint into the brick using a roller with a long nap.

Finish with at least two coats of acrylic paint, using a paint sprayer for even coverage.

Retro mix -

Interior trends inevitably follow fashion trends, and everything retro is cool again.

Exposed brick walls are to be celebrated rather than concealed. And painting them provides an industrial edge that pairs well with stainless steel cabinets and benchtops, and a vintage-style fridge.

The key to achieving this look is not to try to match elements too precisely, but go with a general theme and work with what you have.

Black beat >

The strong black kitchen trend is one that doesn't appear to be fading. The best way to incorporate black, whether it's on a large scale or in just a few accessories, is to go for a matt or low-sheen finish.

As a neutral, black can always be incorporated. A really striking black kitchen can work particularly well in large, open-plan spaces.

Texture matters, so if you're going for this look, be sure to incorporate different finishes and materials. >



RENOVATE **DESIGN TIP** Use the window as the guide for the maximum height of wall cabinets to create overall balance and symmetry in the room. When going with a matt finish overall, use shiny metallics as features and to add balance. Handyman.net.au FEBRUARY 2017



Surfaces and cabinetry are always white or light coloured, and set in contrast to a dark timber floor. So go for a modern timber finish and allow the floor be a highlight.

Stick to traditional sconce lighting but add a modern touch with a few well-chosen colourful accessories. If storage can be found elsewhere, resist the urge to build up on the walls, and further increase the sense of space by matching a bulky rangehood to the wall colour so it blends in.

A waterfall edge on benchtops in a contrasting colour to the cabinets is a great way to inject style, and gives inexpensive cabinetry a big boost. 4

Embrace the space you have and find ways to maximise the potential of the layout **Material** world

You may think cork went by the wayside in the '70s, but this versatile and sustainable material is making a comeback.

Cork is waterproof, so it's suitable for wet areas such as kitchens and bathrooms, and it makes a great, lightweight sound insulator. Another material that's making a comeback is terracotta, but not just in the familiar earthy orange.

Look out for blues and greens that have become very popular in Europe.

Marble and natural stone continue to be favourites, with metallic accessories and accents still going strong.

FROM DREARY TO DELIGHTFUL

Fresh surfaces and new cabinets turn this dated kitchen into a tidy modern space

Small kitchens invariably pose big problems, as limited bench space has to be balanced with enough storage to make this important room functional.

As with many older homes, this one has an eat-in kitchen, so space was originally left to accommodate a dining table and chairs.

An option would be to add a breakfast bar or island bench in the void, but to keep costs down, I'll work with the existing layout and simply supplement what's there.

The reno plan

As they are all well past their prime, I'll need to remove and replace the cabinets, benchtop and appliances, creating extra work surfaces and increasing storage space.

Fortunately, the floor is in great condition and the large-format dark tiles suit a modern colour scheme, so being able to leave them in place is a fantastic saving.

Now it's up to the transformative power of paint to brighten up the space, turning it into a room that any homeowner would be proud of.

Extend the benchtop

Running a new benchtop all the way into the corner increases the work surface area, which is a bonus for any small kitchen.

I'll install a 50mm bamboo benchtop, which has sufficient bulk and scale to anchor it in the space.

Move the sink

Extending the benchtop provides the opportunity to reposition the sink under the window.

This creates a long length of work surface and also makes room to fit in a dishwasher.

Installing a new double sink improves functionality.

Replace the cabinets

The retro kitchen cabinets are too old to work with, so these will be scrapped in favour of new ones. I'm going for two different shades for the upper and lower cabinets.

Matching chrome handles help modernise the kitchen.

Install new blinds

A micro venetian blind for the window completes the new look.

These blinds are a versatile choice because you can have them open for filtered light, fully up for maximum light or closed to provide privacy.



Tile the splashback

I'm using subway tiles, which are right on-trend, cheap and available in a wide range of colours.

I'll keep things neutral, but depending on the palette of the rest of the room, you could easily experiment with a pop of colour.

Add task lighting

In a kitchen, the lighting is very important, and with downlights, a feature light or under-cabinet lighting, you're spoilt for choice.

It's not hard to improve on the bare bulb that's there now, so I'll simply substitute it for practical track lighting.

Monique's revamp

Before

Although she'd never tackled anything like it, mum of five Monique Jensen decided she'd do her kitchen reno herself.

'I planned everything very carefully. It's a small space so I wanted to maximise the potential. After finding a second-hand kitchen, I drove a ute to collect it and ripped it out myself,' she says.

Monique re-sheeted the walls and painted, factoring in plumbing points and electrics so everything was in the right spot, then retiled.

'I splashed out on the black sink and drainer, and a good tap. You have to have some feeling of luxury, even on a very small budget,' says Monique.

'It looks better than I imagined. I love spending time in there and having the family over, which is what it's all about really, isn't it?'

REPLACE REFRESH

Revamp the laundry without the expense of a full reno by boosting storage and updating fittings

his laundry was a couple of decades overdue for a reno. It had an awkward layout, little storage, old fittings and an unappealing colour scheme.

But as it was part of a dated extension that would need to be knocked down and rebuilt, it wasn't worth a complete overhaul. Instead it was given a makeover to make it more user-friendly and easier on the eye. The work was done DIY and the plumbing not changed in order to keep costs down.

Paint transformed the space, then new fittings, storage solutions and design tricks were used to streamline and modernise the laundry.



Use existing plumbing and make cosmetic changes to cut down on reno costs










Corner cabinet

A big problem with the original layout was that the corner in between the sink and the washing machine was wasted space.

The sink had to stay in the same spot because of the plumbing, but the dryer was wall-mounted and the washing machine moved to the right.


We installed a Kaboodle 1000mm Blind Corner Base Cabinet, \$150, with a door, panels and kickboard in Gloss White (kaboodle.com.au).

This easy-to-build flatpack is the ideal storage solution for tricky spaces, as the pull-out baskets mean you can utilise the whole cabinet.



Secure the sliding track frame

Position the sliding track frame inside the cabinet according to the instructions, then drill pilot holes. Secure into the cabinet base using the supplied screws, then attach the front support rail.



Attach the basket frame

Position the basket frame on the sliding track frame and secure using the supplied hex screws and Allen key. Attach the front roller wheels at the front of the basket frame.



Install the baskets

Hang the baskets from the hooks on the basket frame, then attach the handles. Attach the blind corner base panel and hang the cabinet door. TIP The door must be at least 450mm wide for the pullouts to work properly.



Bespoke bench

The rotting piece of melamine that served as a benchtop was ripped out to make room for the corner cabinet.

To create a large work surface and add warmth to the room, a Kaboodle Euro Oak timber benchtop was chosen.

The 38mm thick benchtop was cut into two pieces and installed on top of the cabinet and against the side panel to create a waterfall effect.

The timber was sealed with a clear hardwax oil to give it a natural finish and make it water repellent.

A quick and easy splashback was installed behind the benchtop using Stick-A-Tiles. These self-adhesive mosaic tile sheets are applied in minutes, don't need grouting and are simple to remove.



Add affordable storage with a flatpack cabinet then customise it with a benchtop and splashback










Cut the timber

Support the benchtop on four offcuts, with the good side facing down. Mark the cutting line using a pencil. Clamp a cutting guide or straightedge to the timber, allowing for the offset, then cut the timber using a circular saw.



Install the benchtop

Position the benchtop on the cabinet, then attach two brackets to the back panel flush with the underside of the benchtop. Secure the benchtop with screws through the brackets and through the front brace.



3 Apply the finish

Sand the benchtop with 120-grit paper, then remove all dust from the surface with a vacuum cleaner. Apply hardwax oil using the applicator and allow to dry. Sand the surface with 240-grit paper, then apply a second coat.





Paint the room

Mask off the room with painter's tape using plastic drop sheets to protect floors and doors. Cut in with a brush and use a roller to paint the walls. TIP We used Dulux Super Hide, as it covers any colour in two coats.



Install the sink cabinet

Fit the cabinet panels together using the metal tabs, then insert the sink. Have a plumber connect the pipes to the existing plumbing, then apply a bead of silicone along the gap between the wall and the sink.



Mount the dryer

Locate the wall studs, then drill pilot holes and attach the bracket using coach screws. Attach the spacers to the back of the dryer, then lift it into position and insert the tabs on the bracket into the slots in the dryer.



Sink cabinet

After decades of use, the old sink cabinet was rusted and scratched. And the brown tub and plastic taps really dated the space.

Replacing the cabinet with a new flatpack with stainless steel sink was simple. A plumber then connected the waste and the outflow from the washing machine, and installed new tapware.

The Dorf Maxum Chrome Bath Set, \$178, and Washing Machine Set, \$158, really help bring the laundry bang up to date (dorf.com.au). >

More storage

The only storage the laundry had was three old rickety kitchen cabinets with mismatched handles stacked on top of each other.

A basic white flatpack cabinet was chosen to replace them. At 1800mm high and with adjustable shelves, it offers flexible storage for a broom, mop and other gear.

To coordinate with the blind corner cabinet, the supplied handle was swapped for the same Kaboodle T-pull.





INSTALL A SINK

Cut a benchtop hole DIY and add a tub to streamline the laundry

A sink in the laundry is essential for doing handwashing and housework, and also for the disposal of waste water.

In a new build or if renovating the laundry, swap the traditional all-in-one cabinet with a trough for a more modern kitchen-style sink.

Install a benchtop and cut out a hole for the laundry tub using a template and a jigsaw.

Add a base cabinet underneath the sink to double as storage and to conceal the pipework and plumbing.









A stainless steel sink is easy to clean and will handle harsh household chemicals



Mark the sink position

Measure across the top of the benchtop where the sink is to be located, marking the midpoint of the front edge. Draw a straight line from this mark to the back of the benchtop as a centre line.



Trace the template


Centre the sink template on the pencil mark, a little away from the front edge. Check the template is straight and leaves enough room for taps to be installed against the wall, if needed, then trace around the template.



3 Cut the benchtop

Drill a large pilot hole on the template outline as a starting point, then cut the benchtop using a jigsaw. In the rear corner near the wall, drill a hole with a holesaw, to help the jigsaw cut around this corner.





Attach the brackets

Attach the brackets into the locations under the lip of the sink. Different sinks have different brackets, so follow the instructions to make sure they are attached correctly and will keep the sink in place.



6 Insert the sink

Insert the laundry sink into the hole in the benchtop, making sure it is sitting straight. Tighten the brackets with a screwdriver so that the sink is secured underneath the benchtop. Repeat this until the sink is secure.

Laundry layout

A laundry should be designed for utility, but that doesn't mean you have to sacrifice form for function.

Easy ways to create a stylish space include integrating the appliances into the layout, and maximising storage to minimise clutter and conceal equipment.

Use full-length cabinets for tall items such as brooms. Wall-mount the clothes dryer to free up floorspace, and tuck a front loader under a benchtop.

Modern design

Update the layout and use storage solutions to turn the laundry into a multi-function room

he laundry is often the last room on the reno list, but with just a little design know-how, it can be made into so much more than just a place to wash clothes.

Layout is key when it comes to having a functional laundry, and both small and large rooms can offer storage opportunities and an extra workspace for ironing and other jobs.

Choose cabinetry and storage options to suit the needs of the household. The use of sorting hampers, wall hooks and hanging rods in the laundry can help to eliminate clutter around the room.

Mix and match

Use a combination of cabinetry in the laundry just as you would in the kitchen.

Use base and wall cabinets plus drawers to hold cleaning products and linen. Then add a pantry or broom closet for an ironing board and other tall items.

DESIGN TIP

To create a cohesive backdrop in a small space such as a laundry, run the benchtop material up the wall as a splashback.


Having an understanding of exactly how the house took shape and where everything is helps you form a connection with the space that makes every aspect feel complete.

Maximising views and making the most of the hilltop breezes were top priorities

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Provide a place to display books and ornaments with box shelves that attach to the wall using hidden cleats

nstalling floating shelves in a living space creates storage and display opportunities for books and ornaments without the need for bulky furniture.

You can buy ready-made shelves for about \$50 each and they are easy to install DIY, but they are often not the right size for the space.

For about the same cost, you can build shelves to suit the dimensions of the wall and the style of the room.

These shelves are built as boxes, with top and base panels supported by side rails and internal braces. The back edge is left open so the shelf can be attached to a cleat on the wall.

The box structure also means these custom-made shelves are more likely to be sturdier than many store-bought options, holding about 22kg each.

The top and base panels, braces and side and front rails for all four shelves were cut from two 1220 x 2440mm

sheets of 12mm hardwood plywood. Lengths of 90 x 45mm timber were used to create the cleats.

For an authentic timber-look finish, self-adhesive veneer was applied to the rails, then the top and base panels were sanded and the shelves were finished all over with a timber stain.

It took a couple of hours to build each shelf, including sanding and staining the surfaces and mounting the shelves on the cleats.


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BUILD THE SHELVES




Make the frame

Attach the front rail and two side rails to the base panel of the shelf using adhesive and nails with a brad nailer. Secure the three braces to the panel, leaving space at the back edge for the cleat. Apply adhesive to the edges of the rails and braces, then flip it over and secure the top panel using nails.



4 Secure the cleat

Drill countersunk pilot holes in the top of the shelf 20mm from the wall edge, spacing them about 300mm apart. Use a stud finder to locate the wall studs, then drill pilot holes in the cleat and wall, using a laser level for accurate marking. Secure the cleat to the wall with washer head screws.




Sand the rails

Clamp the shelf to the work surface, then use a random orbital sander with 100-grit paper to lightly sand the side and front rails, making sure the rails and panels are flush with one another at the edges. This will give you a completely flat, smooth surface on which to apply the veneer.



5 Stain the shelf

Sand the panels and sides of the shelf using 100- and 150-grit paper. Remove all the dust after sanding with the 100-grit paper to prevent loose granules from scratching the plywood surface. Apply a stain evenly to the entire shelf, then allow to dry completely.



3 Add the veneer

Cut three pieces of adhesive-backed veneer to cover the front and sides of the shelf. Make the veneer 81mm wide to allow for a 6mm overhang on each side. Peel off the back and stick on the veneer. Press the veneer on firmly using a block of timber, then trim it flush with the edges of the shelf.




6 Attach the shelf

Hold the shelf firmly against the wall, then drive timber screws through the pilot holes of the shelf and into the wall cleat. Hide the screw heads with timber filler that matches the colour of your stain.

TIP Use non-hardening filler to make the screws easier to remove later.

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POWDER FILLER

Designed for use on cracks and holes in plasterboard, powder filler needs to be mixed with water before it can be applied.

It can also be used on MDF, timber, brick and concrete, and sanded, nailed or painted, but it isn't weather resistant or flexible. TIP Always use a fresh container when mixing a new batch of filler.

POWDER PUTTY

TIP Water it down to use as a grain filler.

Ideal for interior and exterior repairs to timber, plaster and cement sheeting, powder putty is weather resistant and can be sawn, sanded, cut or carved.

TIP Powder putty can be used as a moulding medium.

TWO-PART FILLER

Best for holes bigger than a nail head, two-part fillers set hard without shrinkage, are tougher than other options and, while messy, can be shaped when dry.

The two main two-part fillers are epoxy resin, used mainly in wet or damp areas for large holes, and polyester resin, which is good for filling cracks and gaps.

Both resins need to be mixed with a hardener before use.

WATER-BASED ACRYLIC FILLER

A versatile all-rounder, water-based acrylic fillers often come pre-mixed and are suitable for use indoors and outdoors.

Suitable for a range of surfaces, these fillers are easy to clean up and can be blended with stain to match timber repairs.

EXPANDING FOAM

Perfect for gaps around pipes or windows, this is a polyurethane filler that expands into solid foam.

Expanding foam can also be used to block out dust, draughts, noise and wildlife by filling large, irregular-shaped gaps, hollows and cavities around the home.

Once cured, it can be trimmed, sanded, plastered and painted.

TIMBER HARDENER

A water-based chemical cure for rotten wood, hardener revitalises timber by penetrating weak fibres to restore their structure.

TIP Use a wire brush to remove soft timber and flaking paint before applying hardener.

CEMENT-BASED FILLER

Commonly available in powder or caulk form, cement-based filler is usually used to repair cracks or seal joints in stone, concrete, masonry and stucco.

TIP Try a self-levelling crack filler for a perfectly smooth joint.

Make your own timber filler

Take a palm-sized portion of sawdust from the timber you are working with and add drops of PVA adhesive while mixing it into a workable consistency. Push the putty into the holes to be filled, then remove the excess.






Contact adhesive

Stud adhesive

This specialist adhesive secures sheets of plasterboard or fibre cement to timber or metal wall frames. It is most commonly sold in tubs or tubes.

The adhesive is applied along the length of the wall studs in patches, then the sheets are secured to the studs with screws. TIP Don't drive screws through the adhesive, as this will force the screws out of the holes.

Floor adhesives

A range of contact adhesives is available for bonding carpet, vinyl and cork tiles to timber, concrete or particleboard subfloors.

These strong adhesives are usually sold in tubs and applied using a trowel.

TIP Select a water-based adhesive for securing carpet and cork tiles to a substrate.

Tile adhesive

A strong, waterproof option designed for use in wet areas such as kitchens, bathrooms and laundries, tile adhesive is available in powder or pre-mixed forms for easy application.

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Hot glue gun

A crafty tool


The humble hot glue gun is a versatile favourite for craft projects, as it's simple to use and can bond a variety of materials together.

An electric element in the glue gun heats the cylindrical polymer-based adhesive cartridges. The hot adhesive is pushed through the gun using a trigger or thumb pressure.

The adhesive emerges from the nozzle in liquid form and is tacky while hot, but quickly solidifies in less than a minute, allowing it to form a quick bond between two surfaces.

Hot-melt adhesive is ideal for bonds that don't require a high degree of strength such as for small decorating projects. It also has several handy uses in the workshop, and is ideal for tricky repairs.





OLESS IS MORE

To avoid getting messy, long strings of adhesive on your workpiece, squeeze the trigger gently to produce small dabs. As you pull the glue gun away from the surface, turn your wrist to roll the nozzle, cutting the string.

TIP Lay a sheet of baking paper to protect the work surface.



QUICK TEMPLATE CUTTING

To save time when cutting multiple identical shapes, temporarily secure the pieces of timber together with a small dab of hot glue. Cut the shape with a jigsaw, then gently twist the pieces apart to break the bond. If the bond is hard to break, use a putty knife or heat gun to loosen the adhesive.



O HARD-TO-CLAMP REPAIRS

Superglue is ideal for fixing damaged toys or ornaments, but the downside is that the pieces must be clamped as the adhesive cures. Hot-melt adhesive sets in seconds, so it's ideal for tricky repairs where clamping isn't possible. Just hold the pieces in position until the adhesive solidifies.



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Adhesive

Adhesive is one of the most common means of joining two surfaces, and there is a wide range of types for a variety of DIY uses.

Adhesives have been used for thousands of years, with early humans making stone tools using glues derived from tree sap and tar.

Ancient Egyptians, Greeks, Romans and Chinese created wood furnishings and artwork with glue made from animal hides and bones.

In recent centuries, the use of synthetic adhesives has become widespread, although animal glues are still in use for furniture, musical instruments and bookbinding.

The most common synthetic adhesive used for woodwork is PVA, also known as wood glue.

DIY TIP

When using PVA adhesive, wear gloves to make cleaning up easy and keep a damp cloth handy to wipe away any excess.

ABOVE Use adhesive with dowels for strong butt joints. BELOW PVA adhesive is ideal for assembling indoor furniture.

Form a strong bond

Good contact between surfaces is essential for any adhesive to work.

Until the adhesive cures, it's important to clamp the joint or secure pieces with fasteners.

Most joints can be secured with screws or brads. Dowels or biscuits are ideal for hidden joints.



Creative corner

Set up a special zone where kids can draw and read by building a desk and matching bench seat with built-in storage for toys.

We used formaldehyde-free coloured MDF by Porta in blue to skip the hassle of painting. The bench seat slots perfectly inside the desk for a low-profile design that won't dominate a small room.

The storage cubbies were created by inserting two dividers into the hollow rectangular bench seat, which also strengthens the frame. Lightweight wicker baskets fit into the cubbies to keep toys tidy.



Design the cubbies around off-the-shelf cube storage baskets for a perfect fit





Cut the panels

Mark the cutting line, then position the MDF on four offcuts parallel to the line to support the panel. Secure a cutting guide to the panel, taking into account the offset of the saw, then cut using a circular saw.



Build the desk frame

Apply PVA adhesive along the back edge of one side panel. Hold the side panel upright and clamp it to the back. Drill pilot holes, then secure the panels using 6g x 30mm screws. Repeat on the other side to form the frame.



3 Attach the desktop

Apply adhesive to the top edge of the frame. Position the desktop on the frame and align the edges, then use clamps to hold it in position. Drill pilot holes through the desktop into the frame and secure with screws.



6 Add the dividers

Apply adhesive between the marks on the bench back and base, then position the dividers and hold using clamps. Predrill holes and secure the dividers using screws through the back and base.

4 Make the bench frame

Use adhesive and screws to secure the bench back to the base, then attach the sides. Position two dividers between the sides and mark the base and back along either side of the dividers using a pencil.



6 Secure the seat

Apply adhesive along the top edge of the bench sides and dividers, and the back edge of the seat. Clamp the seat to the bench frame, then secure with screws through the seat into the sides and dividers.






1 Cut the panels

Lay the MDF flat and cut the pieces using a cutting guide for accuracy. For the angled cuts on the back panel, mark the line, then clamp a straightedge to the panel, taking into account the offset of the saw.



Assemble the frame

Use adhesive and 6g x 30mm screws to secure the back, middle and side panels to the base panel, then secure the top panel. Use clamps to hold the panels in position while applying adhesive, and predrill holes to minimise splitting.



3 Attach the shelves

Temporarily position the room dividers underneath the shelves to support them at the correct height. Clamp the shelves in position, then secure with adhesive and screws through the back and middle panels.

Paint-free panels

Skip tedious hours of applying paint to these builds by using Porta Forescolour Coloured MDF Sheets, from \$20 (porta.com.au).

Install the floors

Position the floors in the front section, level with the shelves at the back and temporarily supported by the dividers. Clamp in position and secure with adhesive and screws through the middle and side panels.



5 Insert the dividers


Mark the divider position on the base panel, then apply adhesive. Use a clamp to gently lift the first floor by about 10mm. Slide the divider into position and secure with screws. Repeat for the remaining floor.



6 Add the roof

Apply adhesive along the sloped edges of the back panel. Attach the roof panels one at a time, securing them with adhesive and screws and butt-joining them along the ridge to create the roof.

Shaun's play centre

To pool

Keeping Lego pieces all in one place and out of the way of bare feet is the eternal challenge. But Shaun Primmer found a way.

'I built this stand for my two girls. I found an old bookshelf and a table on the street in council clean-up week,' says Shaun.

'I cut the table legs to child height, then cut the bookshelf in half. I used the leftovers to make the box frame, which is attached at the base, to hold all the pieces.

'The girls picked out their favourite Lego colours and I had them matched at Bunnings, then I painted the whole stand.

'I painted the logo freehand, then applied a clear varnish all over to prevent scratches.'

David added a downlight in the top to display the girls' creations.

David's display case

When a collection shows no sign of slowing down, a specific storage solution can save everyone's sanity, and look great, too.

David Rust tackled his son's heap of Hot Wheels and created a feature fix that makes the best use of the space available.

'Like many kids, my son has more cars than he knows what to do with. And, tired of finding them everywhere, I needed a place to store them,' says David.

'I saved myself a cutting job by using a 900 x 1200mm MDF sheet, then gluing and nailing pine rails to it at even intervals. I sprayed it red and bought a logo decal online for the finishing touch.'

The profile is thin enough to sit behind most bedroom doors, which is generally a dead space.



Rob's baby sleeper

When Rob Middenway learned he was to become a grandad, he solved a space and sleep issue in one.

'Our son and his wife are expecting their first baby and have limited space in their flat,' he says.

'They asked if I could make a bed for the baby that butts up against the parents' bed to eliminate the need to get up in the night for a feed. These beds come in lots of different designs and can cost upwards of \$400.'

No screws, glue or hinges were used to build the plywood bed. Instead, small holes were drilled in the sides and back and they were then joined using red rope.

The ply was sanded smooth and painted with a clear varnish.

'To finish, I'll attach padding to the top, back and sides with Velcro. And I'll use straps to secure the baby sleeper to the bed so it doesn't move about,' says Rob.

Our generation is rediscovering many actions and activities that used to be standard household practice.


Taking sustainable steps is like creating a mosaic. Each one makes its own small impact, but it's when you start joining them all together that the effectiveness becomes much greater.

How big you make your sustainable picture is up to you, but remember, like a mosaic, every little part counts.


Here are a few ways to get you started in the home and garden.



Living sustainably is easier than you may think, and every single change makes a difference



- CH00KS roamed free, picking grubs off plants, taking care of weeds with their pecking and scratching, and laying eggs.
- SHARING was the norm. Families who had different fruit and vegies would swap what they produced.



Waste not, want not Up until the 1950s, waste, which is in many ways the opposite of sustainability, was virtually non-existent.

Glass was collected, while tin and other materials were re-used.

Rainwater was harvested and used for doing the laundry, then poured on the garden.

This was all done for purely pragmatic reasons such as to save money and put food on the table.

Light saver

Rising energy costs have left many homes feeling the pinch, and they seem set to continue the same way.

A simple but effective way to help reduce your power bill is to change how you light your home.

Using LED lights and keeping power-hungry fittings such as lights and heaters on a timer will all help.

With easy-to-use switch panels, the Envirotouch Energy Timer range, from \$69, will help you conserve power use (envirotouch.com.au).

These energy-saving timer systems, which can be easily retrofitted, are suitable for use with lights, heated towel rails, fans, heaters and other small appliances.



Going solar

With recent advances, a domestic solar electricity generation system can now reduce external electricity consumption to near zero when a battery storage array is added to the system.

Green clean

Many household cleaners can be harsh on you and the environment, so consider switching to more environmentally friendly options. Here are a few ideas.

- SCRUB mouldy bathroom surfaces and kitchen benchtops with bicarb soda made into a thick paste.
- CLEAN toilets by pouring in a cup of vinegar and leaving it to stand

overnight. The next morning, add half a cup of bicarb soda and scrub.

- OUNBLOCK sinks by pouring down a quarter of a cup of bicarb soda, followed by four tablespoons of vinegar, then flush with boiling water once the fizzing stops.
- OUSE a cloth well dampened with vinegar to clean stainless steel. Rinse thoroughly, then dry.



Panel pack

IN THE GARDEN

A fully sustainable garden will in many ways look after itself without time or energy being wasted improving or correcting it. Here's how you can achieve this through mulching, fertilising and watering.



Fine fertiliser

Traditional fertilisers tended to dump a huge load of nutrients into the soil in the hope that plants would grab what they needed as it flushed through.

This can lead to all kinds of problems as excess nutrients run onto land and into waterways.
The garden soil can become acidified and heavy metals can even build up in the soil.

So when you fertilise, use only a quality controlled-release or slow-release product and apply it at the recommended rates.

Mulch better

A great money saver, mulch helps reduce spending on water bills, as it cuts down water wastage.

It also improves the look of your home and garden, gives you more time to enjoy the garden, reduces risks of exposure to chemicals that may otherwise be needed, and keeps away allergy-causing weeds.

Added to this, mulch goes some way to improving the soil, reducing fertiliser, chemical and weedkiller use, and decreasing the amount of maintenance needed in the garden.








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CLIMATE CONTROL

On average, 40% of electricity used in any household goes towards keeping the temperature level, making it a costly and unsustainable pursuit.

Much of this problem is down to poor design, with open-plan spaces proving particularly inefficient for heating and cooling, as so much energy is wasted adjusting the temperature.

Passive cooling

Good for the environment and kind on the budget, passive cooling is undoubtedly the most sustainable way of keeping the temperature steady and comfortable in a household.

Methods for passive cooling include installing insulation, fitting a whirlybird on the roof and using outdoor blinds to block out UV rays from sunlight.

The only costs involved are purchasing and installing the items and materials. After that, passive cooling will happen by itself, saving energy and money.

Active cooling
Sometimes a more immediate solution is called for to beat the heat.
That's when it's time to invest in an active cooling solution.

This could mean anything from setting up a ceiling or pedestal fan to installing an air-conditioning system.

When you take this path, shop sustainably and consider the energy star rating of the product, selecting the best you can afford. Multiple speed settings, a timer option and a remote control make the Moretti 40cm Pedestal Fan, \$60, a great option for warm living areas (bunnings.com.au).

Check your roof materials before rainwater, as certain tiles can leach harmful chemicals and minerals.

Tank types

There are a number of options when it comes to storing the water you save, as tanks are made in a range of materials and come in different shapes and sizes.

Here is a rundown of the most common tanks available.

METAL TANKS come in a variety of sizes and, while traditionally seen in rural settings, are often now used in urban areas. They are usually installed on a metal frame or concrete slab.

- O POLYETHYLENE TANKS are lighter and more slimline than metal options. They are also immune to rust and modern tanks are often UV resistant.
- **OCONCRETE TANKS** are usually built on location, meaning they can be installed beneath the ground when building a new house.
- BLADDERS are puncture-resistant, flexible PVC containers, often installed in the subfloor of a house. >



HARVEST CALCULATOR

All you need to know to get an idea of how much water you can capture is the approximate measurement of your roof in square metres and the average rainfall that occurs in your area.

Once you know this, the formula is as simple as 1 x 1 x 1. That is, 1mm of rainwater falling on a 1sqm roof results in 1L of water.

So 1000mm of annual rainfall x 150sqm of roof area equals 150,000L of water saved. But as no roof plumbing works perfectly, reduce this estimate by 10% to allow for the rainwater that doesn't make it into your downpipes.







System options

The way a tank is connected to your downpipes can vary with your block, the set-up of your downpipes and also whether it is an installation on a new dwelling rather than a retrofit.

- DRY SYSTEM Most often used in retrofitted set-ups, the pipes in a dry system run into the top of the tank directly from the downpipes, draining water until they run dry.
- WET SYSTEM The pipes in a wet system will run low, generally below ground, before rising up to the tank input. The lowest parts of the system

will remain full. When the downpipes fill, this pushes the water along.

• TRANSFER SYSTEM Popular for commercial situations, a transfer system collects water in a pit or sump underground before a transfer pump is used to move the water to the tank.

The big advantage of this system is that the tank can be uphill and a fair distance from the collection point.

On the downside, it can require a significant amount of engineering and may need expensive high-volume transfer pumps to be installed.


STEP 1: PREPARE

- Dig a trench that is 50mm deeper and wider than the Channel being installed (use a string line to ensure your trench is straight)
- Place compacted bedding sand or concrete slurry in the base of the trench
- Ensure the grate is securely attached to each Channel length

STEP 2: INSTALL

- Lay the Channel in the trench, connecting each length as necessary, ensuring the joints 'click' together
- If required, use a saw to cut the Channel to the desired length
- Connect an End Cap to each Channel end and seal with silicone

To connect to PVC pipe, cut an outlet in the base of the Channel as required



STEP 3: FINISH

- Place a suitable expansion material along the top edge of the Channel
- Pour concrete around each side of the Channel, ensuring the base is completely immersed
- Lightly compact and finish the concrete slightly above the surface level of the grate (approx. 2-3mm) to promote run off from the surrounding area into the drain











From the smallest 50-100L to large 15,000L storage systems, the range of available water tanks is huge.

When selecting the tank, plan for your possible future demands in water use, and consider the fact that a tank should have the surplus capacity to catch a big downpour.

Also bear in mind that for every 1000L of water you store, you'll need one cubic metre of space, and a surface that can support one tonne without collapsing, subsiding or cracking.

SCREENS

Screens are vitally important to prevent debris, from leaves to wildlife, entering your storage system.

Often described as pre-treatment devices, they should all be constructed of drinking water standard materials.

These tank screen systems should also include a fine gutter guard, downpipe head leaf catchers, tank inlet screens and an overflow pipe flap valve or fixed screen. Using a super-fine filter, the Icon 300mm Leaf and Debris Control Rain Head, \$38, keeps out everything, from leaves to insects (iconplastics.com.au).

Good for all roof types, the Blue Mountain Mesh 2mm Corro Steel Gutter Guard, \$25 per lineal metre, will block out most debris (bluemountainmesh.com.au).



Even if the environment seems pristine, there is still the risk of contamination of tank water, so filtration is not just recommended, but in fact insisted upon by many councils or health departments.

You can set up a filtration system that requires an individual filter to be installed for each drinking water point, although these are only really suitable for smaller applications.


The alternative is a whole-house system that will ensure every tap provides safe, clean drinking water.

It is also necessary to install a drinking-water-safe pump to ensure a constant flow to taps in your home.



Preventing leaves, debris,

Designed to be installed just after the pump to improve water clarity, the Rain Harvesting Filter, \$99, will make water suitable for use in toilets and the laundry.

While not a filter, the Ozito Drinking Water Constant Pressure Pump, \$269, is safe to use with drinking water and will provide an even flow to taps (ozito.com.au).



A great way to light the garden while avoiding electricity costs is to use solar-powered lighting.

These energy-saving lights can be easily assembled DIY and placed in the garden to illuminate the side of a path or walkway, making it safer in the dark.

You can install butterfly lights as well, which are also solar powered, to add a decorative look. Try to pick areas that are sheltered from strong winds.



The garden may need to be watered before you drive light stakes into the ground

Pathway lights

Remove the top of the light and pull out the safety tag that stops the battery from recharging.

Insert the support pole in the head of the light, then attach the stake to the base of the pole. Install the assembled light where you want it to go, making sure it is fully inserted in place.

Finally, peel off the sticker that covers the solar panel.

Butterfly lights

Insert the support pole in the base of the butterfly, then assemble the stake and attach it.

Flick the switch on the base of the solar panel so the battery will start charging.

Remove the sticker covering the solar panel, then firmly insert the stake in the ground. Make sure the light is secure and won't fall or be blown over.


Ragged screens also make a house appear neglected, but it's an easy, inexpensive DIY job to replace the

mesh and the spline, which secures the mesh in the frame channel. And you only need simple hand tools.

Mesh is available in fibreglass and aluminium. While the aluminium variety is sturdier, it is less flexible and more difficult to work with. Here, we used fibreglass for ease of installation.



Fix any torn and tatty flyscreens to give your place an instant facelift









Remove the old mesh

Working on a flat and level surface, use a small screwdriver or letter opener to prise the spline out of the channel at one corner of the frame, then gently pull to remove the spline and mesh. Cut new mesh to size with a 50mm overhang.



Install new mesh

Lay the mesh evenly over the frame. Use the parrot-beak end of a spline roller to push in new spline at a corner, then push the remainder into the channel using the roller end. Complete one side, then pull the mesh tight as you complete the other three sides.



3 Cut the excess

Use a utility knife to trim the excess mesh. Cut the mesh at an angle at each corner of the frame, then carefully slide the knife along the sides of the frame close to the edge of the spline. Replace the flyscreen in the door or window frame.



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





WHAT'S IN COLOUR

O DWARF ESCALLONIA 'HEDGE WITH

AN EDGE' is an easy to grow shrub with glossy leaves that look good year-round. It spreads to 80cm and reaches 80cm high, and produces masses of gorgeous deep-pink blooms in summer.

Once established, it needs only occasional deep watering during long, hot periods. Give it a sunny position and feed with a slow-release fertiliser in early spring.

It grows well in large containers and is ideal for creating low borders and hedges, or trimming into ornamential shapes. If using as a small hedge, space about 50cm apart for the best effect.

Give Escallonia 'Hedge with an Edge' a light pruning after it has finished flowering to keep it tidy.



THREE TYPES

There are three main pelargonium groups, zonal, ivy-leafed and regal, each of which has many different hybrids and cultivars.

- **OZONAL** These pelargoniums are loved for their heads of brightly coloured flowers that stand on upright stems above fabulous kidney-shaped green foliage. The leaves feature zones or circular bands of colour.
- IVY-LEAFED Sun-loving ivy-leafed pelargoniums have a semi-scrambling habit with eye-catching, fleshy leaves.

The flowers are often patterned with colours including white, pink, red and magenta. They're perfect for growing on trellises, cascading out of hanging baskets and window boxes or using as a groundcover on slopes.

• **REGAL** There are many different hybrids of regal pelargoniums in a variety of shades, from white to near black. The leaves have a serrated edge and are virtually hidden by masses of spectacular frilled flowers.




SCENTED SPECIES

Scented-leafed pelargoniums are grown mainly for their fragrant leaves, which vary in shape and size, but their small flowers can also be showy.

Depending on the species, the leaves release a strong scent when touched, including aromas of apple, coconut, ginger, lemon, lime, nutmeg, peppermint and rose.

The majority of these hybrids form small shrubs, making them perfect for garden beds.


Grow them along paths, near walkways and in entertaining areas, where their perfumed leaves can be touched so you can enjoy the smell.



Pelargoniums love pot culture and look great tumbling from window boxes and hanging baskets.

Or put containers filled with flowering pelargoniums on steps, around a courtyard or on a balcony.

- **POSITION** pots in a sunny spot that has shade from the hot afternoon sun. In cold climates, give the plants shelter from frost.
- PLANT in a premium potting mix that carries the Australian Standards ticks, which will contain sufficient food for a few months.
- WATER when the potting mix feels dry to the touch. Always water deeply, continuing until the water runs out of the drainage holes.
- FEED with a controlled-release fertiliser that will nourish the plants for three or six months. Or you can apply a complete soluble plant food every three weeks.



GROW IN BEDS


In frost-free climates, pelargoniums are easy to grow in garden beds.

- **POSITION** in a spot that receives at least six hours of sun a day. While ivy-leafed pelargoniums can take full sun, most perform best if shaded from the hot afternoon sun.
- PLANT in free-draining soil, as pelargoniums don't like to have wet roots. Dig cow manure or compost into the soil before planting.
- WATER regularly in hot weather but wait until the soil is dry to the touch before watering again. During winter, water less frequently.
- TIP These plants are more likely to die from overwatering than underwatering.
- FEED in spring with a six-month controlled-release fertiliser, or apply a soluble plant food for flowers monthly.

Many people confuse pelargoniums with geraniums. They used to be called geraniums and are still commonly known as such. But the name was changed over a century ago, when it was recognised that the seed heads were different shapes.

the seed neads were different genera, both They are two different genera, both belonging to the Geranicaceae family.





Pruning is essential for healthy growth in all but ivy-leafed pelargoniums, which simply need the occasional tidying up.

In hot, humid climates, you can prune every three months, but in

other climates, prune in spring. Cut back by a third to generate lots of new growth and tip-prune the new growth to keep the plants bushy.

Remove any finished flower stems to encourage more blooms. TIP Use the prunings as cuttings.












Take the cutting

Use secateurs to take a cutting from healthy new growth just below a node, leaving at least three nodes on the stem. Remove any flower buds and all the leaves except the upper ones.



Plant the cutting

Fill a small pot with propagating mix, then add the cutting. Put in a warm, shady spot and keep the mix moist. When roots form in about 5-6 weeks, re-pot in a larger pot, or plant in a bed.

Holes in leaves

- CAUSE Looper caterpillars feed on the underside of the leaves and cause a windowpane-like effect.
- FIX IT Remove them by hand or use Derris Dust.

Help them thrive

Follow these care tips to keep your potted plants in the best health.

• USE a premium potting mix that carries the Australian Standards ticks. These mixes meet strict standards for drainage, water retention, pH levels, and content of trace elements and minerals essential for growth.

This gives several months of growth before you need to add fertiliser. OCHOOSE glazed pots, as unglazed

If you do use an unglazed pot, spray it with a sealer before planting, or use the unglazed container as a sleeve for a plastic pot.

- O MULCH with sphagnum moss, sugar cane, pebbles or tumbled glass.
- WATER pots deeply. Don't just give them a quick sprinkle with the hose or a watering can. Keep up the water until it flows from the drainage holes.

On very hot days, it's best to water in the morning when it is cooler. >







Bird's nest fern The large green fronds of native bird's nest fern (Asplenium nidus) look dramatic all year. It's ideal for a large pot. O POSITION Morning sun only. GROW This fern is an epiphyte, so use half orchid mix and half potting mix. Minimal water is needed during winter. Feed with a soluble plant food in spring. OCLIMATE Bird's nest fern grows well in all areas but needs frost protection in cold regions.

Yucca Also called spineless or giant yucca, Yucca elephantipes is ideal for pots. It is a great accent plant for gardens with a Mediterranean look. OPOSITION Sun or shade.

GROW Use a large pot. It can be grown indoors in a well-lit room. Water when the top of the mix feels dry and feed with a three-month controlled-release fertiliser in spring.

OCLIMATE Yucca elephantipes thrives in hot climates. In cool climates, provide frost protection.

Ponytail palm When is a palm not a palm? When it is the ponytail palm (Beucarnea recurvata). Closely related to the yucca plant, its strap-like leaves sit on the top of a bulbous trunk. POSITION Sun or semi-shade. GROW Water when the top of the mix is dry to the touch. Don't overwater, especially in winter. Feed in spring with a three-month controlled-release fertiliser. CLIMATE It can be grown throughout Australia but protect it from frost in cool climates.

Sansevieria Commonly called mother-in-law's tongue, Sansevieria trifasciata features greenish white flowers that are mildly scented. POSITION Shade from the hot afternoon sun. GROW It can be grown indoors in a well-lit room. Allow the mix to nearly dry out before watering. Feed with a three-month controlled-release fertiliser in spring.

CLIMATE Sansevieria likes

a warm frost-free climate.

Rosemary A spring-flowering hardy Mediterranean native, Rosmarinus officinalis grows well in coastal gardens. The cultivar 'Prostratus' is ideal for large hanging baskets. O POSITION Sun. OGROW Free-draining potting mix is essential. Don't overwater and feed with a three-month controlled-release fertiliser in

spring. Tip-prune regularly to retain a compact shape.

CLIMATE Rosemary will grow in all areas, except the hot tropics.

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Stop garden ornamentals jumping the fence and behaving like thugs in the bush

he Macquarie Dictionary describes a weed as a 'plant growing wild, especially in cultivated ground to the exclusion or injury of the desired crop'.

But this isn't always the case, as many weeds are actually attractive ornamental garden plants.

Commonly called garden escapes, these plants have broken out from the confines of the garden and taken over bushland and roadside verges. And many are still available in nurseries in the areas where they've become environmental weeds.

Garden escapes compete with indigenous species for moisture, sunlight and space, and they can also choke the waterways.

Here, we take a look at a few of the common suspects and show how you can stop them in their tracks.

Why it happens

Garden escapes have a tendency to be adept at growth and reproduction.

They are very hard to remove and threaten the existence of other plants, or even whole plant communities.

Garden escapes, such as lantana, overgrow and stop the regeneration of natural vegetation, destroying the habitat of native animals and reducing the biodiversity of species.

And with the varied climate zones within Australia, it is difficult even for the experts to know whether or not an ornamental grown in one area will be invasive in another.

The capacity of certain ornamentals to get out of control often depends on the climate and soil type. One growing normally in a garden in one state may take over in a different state, or indeed in a different climate within that state.

The seeds of many plants, such as capeweed (Arctotheca calendula), which is causing problems in most

from a piece of stem or root.

How they spread

Seeds are eaten by birds, bats and possums, then spread through their droppings. You don't even have to live near bushland, as they can be carried over long distances.

Vehicles can transport seeds and people often carry them on clothing. parts of the country, can be blown by the wind or washed down gutters into streams and waterways.

Lantana is considered one of the worst weeds in Australia.

Willows have also become weeds along watercourses throughout Australia and they can be spread simply by a branch breaking off and floating downstream, where it will most likely catch on the bank and take root. >

Weed alert!

How do you know if a plant bought in good faith from a nursery will escape from the garden and spread into the surrounding bush? Check with your local council or contact the Department of Environment in your state or territory.

Control the damage

There are precautions you can take to help keep your garden under control.

- **GET** involved in bush care, as this will alert you to the types of plants causing problems in your area.
- **OBE** wary if a local gardener gives you plants that grow easily and have multiplied quickly in their garden.
- SUSPECT any plant that self-seeds prolifically throughout your garden. Nip its weedy potential on the head by pruning before the seeds set, or remove it completely from your garden.

• **COMPOST** garden waste that may contain seeds. A compost heap must be working efficiently to kill seeds.

If unsure, put the seed heads from plants with a weedy tendency in a thick plastic bag and leave in the sun for a couple of weeks to destroy them. This will also work with tubers and bulbs.

- REPLACE invasive plants with native plants indigenous to your area. This will attract birds and provide food.
- REPORT any weed-infested vacant blocks to your local council.

ECO TIP

Inform your local nursery if you know of any ornamental garden plants that have become environmental weeds in your area.

Invasive natives

Not all invasive plants are imports, and even natives can turn weedy when taken to a different environment, as there is a lack of natural influences to control them.

And the new conditions can be so good that the plants become rampant and reproduce too freely.

Australia's floral emblem, the golden wattle (Acacia pycnantha),

is regarded as weedy in several areas, as is the Cootamundra wattle (*Acacia baileyana*).

Pittosporum and the umbrella tree (Schefflera actinophylla) have also established themselves in many areas outside their natural habitats.

Certain eucalyptus, melaleucas and hakeas are now also listed as environmental weeds.

COMMON CULPRITS

Here are just a few of the commonly grown garden ornamentals that are causing problems in the environment.

Butterfly bush

(Buddleia davidii)

The mauve flowers of this pretty shrub attract butterflies and it is easily spread by seed.

In Victoria and Tasmania, it is considered weedy.

Montbretia

(Crocosmia x crocosmiiflora)
This bulbous South African
plant bears orange flowers in
summer and many bulblets
that spread quickly.

It is an environmental weed in NSW, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania and WA.

Arum lily

(Zantedeschia aethiopica)
Popular for its glossy leaves and white flowers, the arum lily is an environmental weed in Victoria, SA, WA and Tasmania.

Busy lizzie

(Impatiens walleriana)
The common name of this plant describes it perfectly, as it spreads easily by seed.

It is causing problems in NSW and Queensland.


Cosmos

(Cosmos bipinnatus)
This dainty annual with fine ferny foliage seeds freely and has become a problem in Victoria and Queensland.

Glory lily

(*Gloriosa superba*) A spectacular climbing plant

featuring large red and yellow flowers, this lily has turned into a pest in Queensland and NSW.



Add this root vegie to your patch and harvest crops throughout the year

he versatility of the humble carrot (*Daucus carota* subsp. sativus) makes it a must-have in your vegie patch.

In mild areas, you can sow seeds all year round, but in cooler regions, avoid growing them in winter.

Carrots sown in late summer will mature in winter and taste sweeter due to the sugars stored in the roots.

Usually thought of as the classic orange root vegetable, the surge of interest in heirloom vegetables has seen a rise in the popularity of other colours, including purple, yellow and white.

Seeds are available for short- and round-rooted orange carrots as well.

Chilled carrot soup

PREPARATION TIME 15 minutes COOKING TIME 45 minutes

Ingredients

1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1 medium onion, coarsely chopped
1 garlic clove, crushed
3⅓ cups (830ml) chicken stock,
preferably homemade
600g carrots, coarsely chopped
½ teaspoon dried thyme
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon white pepper
¼ cup low-fat natural yoghurt, to serve
1 tablespoon finely chopped dill,
to serve

- **1 HEAT** the oil in a saucepan over a medium heat. Add the onion and garlic and sauté for 5 minutes or until softened. Add the chicken stock, carrot and thyme. Reduce the heat to low and simmer, uncovered, for 40 minutes or until the vegetables are very tender.
- **2 PUREE** the soup in batches in a blender or food processor. Season with salt and pepper.
- **3 COOL** to room temperature, then cover and refrigerate until cold.
- **4 LADLE** the soup into bowls. Add the yoghurt and sprinkle with the dill. Serve with the toasted sesame flatbread. **TIP** This soup can also be served hot.

Roast carrot dip



PREPARATION TIME 15 minutes COOKING TIME 1-1¼ hours

Ingredients

1kg carrots, coarsely chopped
1 garlic head, cloves separated
½ cup (80ml) olive oil, for drizzling
Salt

Freshly ground black pepper ½ cup (125g) natural yoghurt Finely grated zest and juice of 1½ lemons ¾ cup (180ml) olive oil

- 1 PREHEAT the oven to 200°C. Line a roasting pan with baking paper. Scatter the carrot and the garlic cloves in a single layer in the prepared pan.
- 2 DRIZZLE over the ⅓ cup oil and season with salt and pepper. Roast for 1-1¼ hours until golden and very tender. Allow to cool to room temperature.
- 3 SQUEEZE the garlic flesh from the skins. Put the carrot and garlic in a food processor or blender. Add the yoghurt and lemon zest and juice. Season with salt and pepper, then process until smooth. Add the ¾ cup oil in a steady stream while processing. Store, covered, in the fridge until ready to serve.

Brazilian carrot cake with chocolate glaze

PREPARATION TIME 25 minutes, plus cooling
COOKING TIME 1 hour

Ingredients

Butter, for greasing
2 cups (300g) plain flour
1 tablespoon baking powder
1½ cups (345g) caster sugar
2 cups (250g) grated carrot
(about 3 carrots)
¾ cup (180ml) vegetable oil
3 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
GLAZE

1 tablespoon (20g) butter

 $\frac{1}{3}$ cup (80g) caster sugar $\frac{1}{3}$ cup (40g) unsweetened cocoa powder $\frac{1}{4}$ cup (60ml) milk

1) PREHEAT the oven to 180°C. Lightly grease a 22cm round cake tin and line the base with baking paper.
2) SIFT the flour and baking powder into a large mixing bowl. Stir in the sugar and make a well in the centre.
3) PROCESS the carrot, oil, eggs and vanilla extract in a food processor or blender until smooth. Pour into the dry ingredients in the bowl and fold together lightly until just combined. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin.

♠ BAKE for 40 minutes. Cover with foil and bake for a further 20 minutes or until springy to a gentle touch in the centre. Stand in the tin for 5 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack to cool completely.
♠ MAKE the glaze by combining the butter, sugar, cocoa powder and milk in a small saucepan. Stir over a low heat until melted and smooth. Increase the heat to medium, bring to the boil and cook for 2 minutes or until slightly thickened. Cool for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally to release the heat, then spread the glaze

over the cooled cake to serve.

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












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
