





LET THE LIGHT IN

A beach-side shack is given new life with a generous renovation that transforms it into a sophisticated family home

aking inspiration from the Canary Island date palm in the front garden, TV super renovators Kyal and Kara Demmerich have brought a piece of Palm Springs, USA to the stretch of coastline past Palm Beach, NSW.

With 28 project-managed, designed or complete renovations done in just three years, it's fair to say the new


parents are on a roll, and their latest addition is a testament to all they've learned along the way.

Choosing to see the inevitable pitfalls and frustrations of renovating as setbacks rather than problems, Kyal and Kara completed this full transformation in just nine months.

To make best use of the large, flat block, the renovation goals were to

build a grand family home with four bedrooms, large open-plan entertaining areas and an outdoor space to provide a family with all they'd need.

Resisting the temptation to add another storey, and also to save time and money, the couple decided to stick with a traditional gable roofline at the front, and transition to the flat skillion roofline toward the rear of the home.













Understated kitchen

'For us, we love nothing more than enjoying the company of friends and family over a good meal. We're relaxed entertainers, so preparing food together is always time well spent. Island benches are so great for this,' says Kara.

'The vault of Velux skylights above this island bench is such an architectural statement and the timber detailing around the bench adds another level of character.' Fully integrated appliances give a streamlined look, and one of the couple's favourite features are the stacking doors that open up this space to the deck and pool area.

The ceiling height gives a sense of grandeur, but the sheer curtains help to soften the look and create an intimate feel. No dining room is complete without a place to eat and the American Oak timber table works perfectly with the pale leather chairs.

To break up the solid nature of timber furniture, Kara selected some pieces with inlaid rattan for a lighter take on a retro idea. The buffet complements a couple of cupboards in the kitchen to tie the look together.

On a large expanse of wall, one large artwork is often better than multiple pieces, unless it's a properly curated collection.

'A good artwork will really lift the space,' says Kara. ►


Spa treatment

One of the most impressive design elements of the home is the day spa inspired bathroom. It features a shower separated by a walk-around wall with his-and-hers showerheads, Velux skylights positioned over the shower area and a custom-made American oak double vanity.


More importantly, it features a 180kg freestanding limestone bathtub that was so heavy Kyal had to install it from underneath the house.

'We've done a lot of bathrooms, but I think this one is our favourite. I'm certainly envious of it! We wanted the ultimate calming and relaxing space, and to do this we did give it a lot of room,' says Kara.

'Kitchens and bathrooms sell houses, so we always invest in these areas, and in this bathroom the giant stone bath takes centre stage. When people come in, they immediately want to come and touch it and that luxurious, tactile finish is exactly what you want in a bathroom.' ▶













Soft and comfortable

Of the four bedrooms in the house, two are in the original front half of the home. As a nod to the traditional period, the front bedrooms and media room all feature Easycraft Easyascot panels, which are an excellent DIY project and a great opportunity to add personality to any space.

The kids' bedroom is a fun and relaxing space with scope to evolve.

'Our focus is always on crafting a space with great bones that can be adapted as the kids grow,' says Kara.

'This was particularly important, as we'll be selling this home. This room can easily be styled for a teenager, home office or a more formal guest bedroom.'

Though the original part of the house featured timber floorboards, the executive decision was made to keep everything consistent and carpet the bedrooms in a textured loop-pile carpet in an oatmeal colour. ▶

All the doors are higher and wider than standard in the home, adding to the feeling of scale.

In the new part of the house, with no existing floor plan, Kyal and Kara designed a huge master suite with the ultimate parents' retreat in mind.

This flexible space can be opened up to the backyard or concealed to create a place to escape the hustle and bustle of the rest of the home.

To take the room from light and open to dark and contained for sleeping, the ceiling height was dropped to conceal block-out blinds and the track for the full-length curtains.

'Small details like this make a world of difference, and it's amazing being able to control the window dressing with the touch of a button,' says Kara.


'This is the kind of thing you will always be glad you did.'

The colour palette is muted throughout. Soft olives, sage and barely there pinks complement soft furniture fabrics and shapes.

There's nothing fussy or overdone. Each room has a feeling of invitation and relaxation. ▶


















Opulent outdoors

The way this renovation was designed, the pool needed to be poured first, before the house was built.

'A pool adds a whole other expense to the mix, but where would a Palm Springs-inspired renovation be without one?' says Kara.

When building a concrete and tile pool, you need to lock in your design before formwork is complete, to ensure all measurements can be planned to tile size. Such was the case with this build, which featured 200 x 200mm patterned tiles around the waterline.

The pool is surrounded by an Australian blackbutt timber deck, which has been treated to remove dirt and tannins, leaving it with a soft, sandy look. The white and breezeblock walls offset the turquoise of the pool perfectly, and landscaping is typically Palm Springs with a selection of cacti and succulents.

'We approach a renovation from the position of what we love and how we want to live in the most comfortable and achievable ways. We've created a retreat we would be more than happy to spend our days in,' says Kara. *

'Why stick with white when you can go for it and add some colour?
The bathroom used to be seen as an extension of the overall house design, but these days it's regarded as a space in which you can go bold, or experiment with texture and perspective,' says Alan.

'It's a private room that should reflect exactly how you want to feel and the smaller area means you can afford to add a little luxury, either in a material or a fitting.' ►



Wow-factor wallpaper

While the choice of tiles grows year on year, for a really personalised statement, nothing says it quite like wallpaper. For instant and dramatic visual appeal, a bold wallpaper choice will immediately distinguish the space.

Though common in bathrooms in Europe and the USA, Australians are only just beginning to embrace the trend. The availability of European papers and number of local suppliers is increasing.

Prices vary widely, but a good quality paper is needed for a wet area and the paper should be kept away from direct contact with the bath or shower.

Try wallpaper on a feature wall, or above tiles. A powder room or guest bathroom is a great option.

Unlike tiles, wallpaper is easily removed and quick to replace, so when the mood strikes, you can change the look and feel within a day. ►







Pastels are continuing to be on-trend this year and the small tiles used in this bathroom prevent the room from looking too overbearing.

A smaller bathroom is no impediment to design flair, says Alan. A classic black and white colour scheme works well to keep lines simple and creates the illusion of more space. But don't necessarily buy into all the old 'rules'.

'Traditionally, you might say very small tiles such as penny rounds or mosaics would be too much for a small bathroom because it looks more fussy. But in this pink bathroom, for instance, tiling floor to ceiling in pastel pink penny rounds looks absolutely amazing,' says Alan.

Keep the fittings simple and float the vanity to create more visual space, which then translates into a more expansive feeling. If space is really tight, floating shelves and built-in recesses and niches are good ways to add utility without creating bulk. ▶

Renovating wisdom has it that if you can fit in a bath, you should. Even a very small floor plan can be cleverly adapted to accommodate a bath, and if you are thinking ahead to sell, a bath is most often on the must-have list for families.

athrooms. They've changed a lot in just a generation or two, evolving from the minimalist and functional to spaces of spa-like indulgence and sanctuary.

When well-executed, a bathroom reno can provide a major boost to your lifestyle and the value of your home.

It's not a task that should be undertaken lightly, as it's a complex space to work with and can be the most expensive per square metre of any renovation project you undertake.

Here are some ideas to help you plan a painless and perfect project. ►

The simple fact is that for any renovation or construction project there can be no set cost per square metre as so many variables are involved.


These include the age of the home, the materials it's constructed from and a whole host of constraints from access to heritage considerations.

For a ballpark comparison, and this assumes that you will be undertaking some of the work yourself, a regular room such as a lounge or bedroom may cost about \$750 to \$1000 per square metre to renovate.

But a bathroom is likely to cost at least three times that amount. So, we arrive back at why it is so expensive.

A bathroom is a multi-layered construction that needs access to all of the home services such as power and grey and black water.

Also, a lot of the cost is in the parts you never see, such as waterproofing, but which need to be flawlessly installed.



Tiles should not be laid until all waterproofing is undertaken.

WHAT LIES BENEATH

A bathroom requires special treatment to prevent water penetrating into the house frame. Effectively, the space needs to be isolated so that water only travels out through the drains installed.

Multiple layers are required to achieve a seal. It needs to be very robust in construction and materials used.


All of the floor and much of the walls need to be constructed from a suitable water-resistant substrate – the panels beneath your floor and wall tiles. You'll often find this sheeting described as wet area board.

After this is installed, the surfaces are waterproofed with a brushable sealant or membrane. It's only once the waterproofing is in place that the tiles can be applied.

You only get one chance to get the waterproofing right. If in doubt call in a specialist installer. ▶







SERVICES

Like waterproofing, the relocation of services – hot and cold water, waste outlets and electricity – is a major cost for a finish you'll never see.

One of the best ways to rein in a bathroom renovation budget is to keep all of the services in roughly the same locations. Updating some sections will still be cheaper than a complete relocation.

The best option for quality light in a bathroom is natural light let in through windows or skylights. Even then, you'll want suitable lighting installed.

Light in a bathroom should be balanced and evenly distributed. You may want to add suitable lighting above or around the vanity mirror if it is used for things such as applying make-up.

Privacy can often be an issue with bathroom windows. The best way to achieve this and avoid reducing the level of natural light is to use windows with heavily frosted glass.

If you're retaining existing windows, you don't need to have them reglazed. Simply install frosted privacy window film for a fraction of the cost.

AIR

Quality airflow is a must. Even if natural air is available through windows, you'll want to add an exhaust fan to create cross flow and extract steam. Consider having the fan hard-wired into the light switch circuit so it runs when the light is on.

Alternatively, in bathrooms with an abundance of natural light a separate switch may be a better option.

It is important that fans are correctly vented, whether into a suitable ceiling cavity or ducted to outdoors. If ducting into the ceiling cavity, either install a fan that has inbuilt backflow prevention or add a one-way self-opening cover on the outlet side to stop hot or cold air entering your home. ▶



TILES

Tiles serve a multitude of purposes in your bathroom. They provide the final layer of waterproofing, the main area of colour and decor, and the design element that sets the mood of the space.

There are a number of critical considerations when selecting tiles and these go well beyond the aesthetic ones of colour, pattern and size.

You'll need to discuss your needs with a tile professional, but areas to consider include suitability for use in wet areas, slip resistance of floor tiles, durability and ease of cleaning.

FIXTURES

One tip from the design experts is to buy taps, heads and outlets, and even towel rails and other accessories, that are all within the same style collection. This avoids that often mismatched look of older bathrooms.

Also take a look at the most appropriate water-saving fittings

available. Today's choices are extensive and a far cry from the earlier generations of flow-restricting tap heads where a shower output would be reduced to a miserly trickle.

Modern heads will provide a luxurious flow and fall pattern while still saving water.

STYLES TO SUIT

From dual showerheads in over-sized stalls to frameless glass screens, there are many design elements to consider.

The best place to start is by thinking about the bathroom's main purpose. Is it used as a rough-and-tumble family bathroom, the guest's space, or your ensuite sanctuary?

The main use of this space will determine a lot about its design. Here are some points to consider.

- ◆ DOUBLE SINK While very popular in ensuites, a double sink installation will double the cost of the vanity thanks to the extra hardware, fittings, cabinetry and plumbing.



BATHROOM RENO ON A BUDGET

Cherie Barber shows how to transform this hardworking space on the cheap

Renovating old bathrooms can be extraordinarily challenging and expensive, as you're inevitably peeling back decades of old plumbing and wiring, possibly dealing with asbestos, and addressing waterproofing issues.

it justifies the additional cost if you get a much smarter layout or can add a toilet into the family bathroom.

The cheapest way to spruce up any bathroom is to neatly sidestep all intrusive work and just skim over the surface with creative paint and maybe a few hardware updates. Let's look at three different approaches to bathroom repoyating, all on tight budgets.

COMPLETE BATHROOM RECONFIGURATION

This renovation was for the main bathroom of a large family home with eight occupants. All of them were forced to share the one toilet, thus one of the aims of this renovation was to build a much-needed second loo.

It was a generous-sized space, so my main challenge was to reconfigure the bathroom on a tight budget. I had to move the bath to accommodate the toilet, so I capitalised on the opportunity to install a modern freestanding bath, which I picked up for \$700.

I removed the mouldy shower stall and replaced it with a modern open shower, and modified the vanity by changing the profile of the vanity doors to a Shaker style by adding MDF architrave, then painting it in White Knight Laminate paint, tinted to Iron Age.

A new laminate benchtop with his-and-hers basins was added, as well as new lighting, and the old yellow and blue tiles were removed.

New floor sheeting was installed and waterproofed, while a feature wall in hexagonal Nova Hex Carrara Blend Bianco tiles from Beaumont Tiles created the wow factor. For the remaining walls, we chose neutral, large-format tiles, which complemented our choice of floor tiles. ▶



BUDGET REJIG

This budget makeover is somewhere between a full-blown bathroom renovation and a simple paint job.

An old basin dated it, but the floor tiles were a real feature and saved us the added expense of a rip and replace and the inevitable cost of waterproofing.

The bath was resurfaced using White Knight Tub & Basin and tiles primed and painted with White Knight

Tile & Laminate Primer. I then installed a new vanity and shower screen and updated the taps and towel rail.

The worn-looking shelves under the window were removed and replaced with a large mirror.

Sleek slimline venetian blinds replaced the drab curtain, while the bathroom was painted and the light fitting replaced. *

MODERN MARBLE

A burnished finish is achieved when the slab is trowelled to the point where it becomes very smooth and glossy, and requires at least three passes with a trowel after the concrete has been screed flat and level.



TILES

Texture and subtle patterns are the design themes for tile trends. Highly durable and hypoallergenic, tiles are still the favourites for bathrooms, laundries and kitchen splashbacks.

The most commonly used tile type is ceramic. These tiles can be either glazed or unglazed. This essentially means the pattern or glaze sits on top of the base, or the biscuit as it is called.

The other common choice is a porcelain tile. Porcelain is a more refined material and fired at a higher temperature than ceramic tiles. This process makes porcelain more durable and harder than ceramic, so it's often more expensive.

Unlike a ceramic tile, the pattern in a porcelain tile goes the whole way through. Porcelain is usually preferred for bathrooms, as it is a dense material, which makes it almost waterproof. >

An alternative to nailing or adhering materials to a subfloor, floating boards are joined with a tongue-and-groove system that clicks into position.

The boards come in different sizes and are usually supplied with a finished surface, so there's no need to sand or seal. They can be installed over tiles, concrete, vinyl or timber.

You'll need a floor-laying insulation kit and use a quality moisture-resistant underlay for impact cushioning and sound insulation. Butt-join the underlay, then apply duct tape to the joints.

Let the boards acclimatise to the room's moisture content, then decide on the laying direction and pattern.

123



OLEAR the room, remove skirting boards and vacuum. Prepare the doorjambs by trimming the bases so the new boards will fit underneath. Position an offcut of flooring and underlay next to the door jamb to get the height of the cut, then saw off the base of the jamb.



② LAY the boards in sequence, keeping the tongue against the wall. Join or click long sides together first, leaving a small gap at the end. Use a tapping block to close the long sides and tighten the joints, leaving a 10mm gap around the outside for expansion.



3 FINISH each row by positioning the end board and hooking a pulling bar over the edge against the wall. Tap the upturned edge of the pulling bar with a hammer to close the gap between the boards. Finish laying the floor and replace the skirting boards.




PREPARING THE SURFACE

Floating floorboards can be laid over a variety of subfloors after a little levelling and preparation.
• CONCRETE Grind off any high spots and fill low areas with a self-levelling compound mixed to a slurry, spreading it lightly with a steel float

TIP If laying over a new slab, leave for one month per 25mm thickness so the concrete cures.

- VINYL Most sheet vinyl floors provide a relatively level surface and they are likely to have a hardboard underlay, making them a good laying surface.
- ◆ TIMBER Particleboard and tongue-and-groove strip flooring needs little to no preparation. Use a power planer to level any raised edges flush and punch in all nail heads. ❖



Laminate boards usually come prefinished and are easy to lay DIY, as they have a tongue-and-groove system, or get help to install.



Vinyl flooring such as Senso Natural Lord 914 x 184 x 2mm Vinyl Planks, \$68.60 for 2.69sqm, is made from polyvinyl chloride, or PVC, which gives the material a firm but elastic feel.

A wooden peg rail shelf is a great place to hang your coats, hats and scarves. For this DIY project, you can have the timber pre-cut at your local Bunnings store.

You'll need two 900 x 90 x 19mm Tasmanian oak pieces for the shelf and mounting board, and five 100mm pegs cut from 35mm oak dowel. Each dowel needs an end cut with a mitre saw set at 10 degrees so it angles up when attached.

WHAT YOU NEED

- Tape measure and pencil
- PVA timber adhesive
- Bar clamp
- Orbital sander
- 120 and 240 grit sanding pads
- 180 grit sandpaper
- 8g x 40mm countersunk screws
- 8g x 50mm countersunk screws
- Cordless drill
- · Phillips head drill bit
- 3mm and 2mm drill bits
- 3mm countersink bit
- Stud finder
- Spirit level
- Nail gun and brad nails
- Paint and paintbrush











Join the pieces

Mark peg positions on the back of the mounting board 150mm from each end, 20mm from the base and 150mm apart. Predrill pilot holes with the countersink bit. Secure the mounting board to the shelf, keeping it square, with adhesive and a nail gun. Wipe off excess adhesive.



Prepare the pegs

Clamp a peg to the workbench, with the angled end facing out. Use a 2mm bit to drill 20mm into the centre of the peg. Repeat for all pegs. Sand the shelf with an orbital sander using a 120-grit pad, then 240-grit. Sand the pegs with 180-grit sandpaper for a smooth finish.



Attach the shelf

Drill 40mm screws until they poke through the backing board. Apply adhesive to pegs and align them with the screws, secure them so they face upwards. Putty holes, sand and paint. Find wall studs. Position the shelf and attach it to the wall with 50mm screws.

MADE TO LAST

Learn from master artisans how to make heirloom quality objects

Inspired by a growing interest in the provenance of things and a deep dissatisfaction with the disposable nature of the world we live in, Melbourne-based culture writer Vanessa Murray has compiled *Made to Last: A compendium of artisans, trades & projects*, featuring 50 artisans from around the world.

This beautiful book details the products they create, the tools they use and the secrets of their crafts, exploring everything from leathersmithing, woodworking and welding to craft sewing, vinyl pressing, distilling, baking and fermenting.

Here are just three of the projects that can be found inside.

MAKE A SHIGEKI YAMAMOTO FLOWER VASE

Create this simple yet stunning vase devised by Japanese born, Berlin-dwelling designer and maker Shigeki Yamamoto.

METHOD

- ① Align the test tube lengthways along the piece of wood, then use the pencil to mark the length of the test tube on the wood.
- 2 Saw through the piece of wood at the marked position using a hand saw or circular saw.
- 3 Take the pencil and mark the centre of each end.
- ① Using the measuring tape or ruler, measure the diameter of the test tube and add 2mm to the figure.
- **5** Next, use the drilling machine or hand drill to drill a hole within and to the edges of the marked area. The hole should be the same diameter as the measurement you took in step 4.
- 6 Carefully trim the edges at the top using the router.
- 7 Sand the surface with sandpaper.
- **8** Apply decor wax with a brush or a cloth.

- Insert the test tube into the drill hole.
- ① Insert a flower and present the vase to the one you love. Or just put it somewhere nice. ▶



WHAT YOU NEED

- Test tube
- A piece of beechwood or other wood of your choice measuring approximately
 7 x 7cm - the length must be slightly longer than the test tube
- Decor wax
- Pencil
- Hand saw or circular saw
- Measuring tape or ruler
- Drilling machine or hand drill
- Router
- 240 grit sandpaper
- Brush
- Cloth

MAKE A COPPER SNAIL COIL

Plants and soil love copper, but slugs and snails? They hate it. These easy-to-make copper snail coils devised by Melbourne coppersmither Travis Blandford will protect your seedlings from slimy garden pests.

METHOD

- 1 You'll need a decent bench space to work on for this project; 1sqm is ideal.
- 2 Use the pliers to cut the wire to lengths approximately 30-40cm long.
- 3 Start bending the wire 10cm along and wrap it around a cylindrical object a couple of times to create a coil 5cm in diameter. Leave enough excess wire so there is a 4cm overhang at the end. This will take a bit of trial and error to get right in the beginning.
- 1 Bend the original 10cm length sharply, so that it intersects the

diameter of the copper circle that you have created.

- **5** Use a hammer to flatten the two ends (this step is optional, but it makes handling safer).
- **6** Use the metal file to clean up the ends so there are no burrs.
- 7 To use the coil in the garden, bend the 10cm section out at right angles so it's perpendicular to the circle and will pierce the soil. This fixes it in the soil and means the coil can sit around a seedling to protect it from snails.

WHAT YOU NEED

- 2-2.5mm solid core copper wire (available from metal recyclers and electrical wholesalers)
- Pliers
- Hammer (optional)
- Metal file
- Bench vice
- Rigid cylindrical object
 50mm in diameter a tool handle will suit



MAKE A BICYCLE PANNIER

Industrial sewer Cathy Parry, from Castlemaine, Australia, explains how to easily repurpose a simple canvas bag as a handy bicycle pannier. You'll need a pannier rack attached to your bike.



METHOD

- ① Measure the length for your belts. They will be attached to your pannier, and be used to attach the pannier to your bike. You can work out how long to make them by threading them through the hanging system and holding them roughly where they will attach to the pannier. This will show you how long they need to be.
- 2 Use the snap-off blade to cut your belts to length.
- 3 Cut the plywood (or other material) to fit inside the back of your bag. This will keep the back of the bag stiff, which stops it from fouling your wheel.
- Working with the bag inside out, use the awl to push through the fabric at each of the four corners.

- **5** Now use rivets to attach the plywood to the bag through the holes you have already made.
- 6 Next, attach the belts to the top of the back of the bag. Place them as wide apart as is practical (this will help balance the pannier when it's on the bike), then drill a hole through the belts, the back of the bag and the board.
- Working from the outside in, push the bolt through the hole you just drilled and add a washer and nut on the inside of the bag. Add the hook and loop tape or extra belt at the bottom of the bag in the same way so the bag doesn't swing out at the bottom when you go around a corner.
- Attach to the rack at the three points, and away you go. *

WHAT YOU NEED

- A simple canvas bag
- 2 old leather belts
- Thin piece of plywood, MDF or plastic sheet (no more than 3mm)
- 2 old belt rivets
- Bolts and nuts
- Hook and loop tape or extra belt
- Knife for cutting leather (such as a snap-off blade)
- Awl
- Drill

VINTAGE MAKEOVERS

Bring outdated cabinets back to life with these simple restoration tricks and a little TLC

PROJECTS AND PICTURES MELISSA DARR

Beauty was certainly in the eye of the beholder when blogger Melissa Darr bought this rickety sideboard. It had been pulled out of an old house being prepared for sale.

'I saw potential in it, as it had good bones but needed a little TLC to bring it back to its former glory,' says Melissa.

There were several stages needed to restore it, including sanding it back, attaching a backing board, painting with a stain blocker undercoat and two top coats, before creating a vintage look with more sanding and waxing.

Sanding

The first step was to remove the hinges and doors on the front of the sideboard in preparation for sanding.

Using an orbital sander with 120 grit sandpaper, Melissa sanded the entire sideboard to remove the stain on the shelves, sides and doors. Any hard-to-reach areas she sanded by hand with 120 grit sandpaper. A damp cloth was then used to remove the dust.

Melissa applied two coats of a stain blocker undercoat, allowing to dry for at least an hour between coats. ►

WHAT YOU NEED

- Orbital sander
- 120 grit sandpaper
- PVA adhesive
- MDF and nails
- Timber putty
- Clamps
- Stain blocker undercoat
- Foam roller and paint
- Furniture wax
- Soft cloth



EXPERT SECRETS

You can use any paint you like, but for this sideboard I chose a chalk paint for its appealing matt finish.



DIY TIP

Always stick to the three Ps when restoring furniture - prep, prime and paint. Following these steps will give you a successful restoration.

Painting

Melissa cut pieces of timber the same thickness as the shelf to patch the small cut-outs that had been made previously. They were secured with adhesive and held in place with clamps. When dry, putty was applied in the gaps and allowed to dry for an hour.

The patched areas were then sanded back with 120 grit sandpaper and a stain blocker undercoat applied.

A piece of MDF was cut to fit behind the sideboard for a backing and to help stabilise the piece. A stain blocker undercoat was applied and 20mm nails used to secure the backing.

Two top coats were applied, allowing an hour to dry between coats and the doors were then reattached.



ABOVE MDF was attached to the sideboard to create a backing. BELOW Patched cut-outs were clamped while the adhesive dried.





To give a vintage effect to the sideboard, an orbital sander with 120 grit sandpaper was used.

Melissa concentrated on areas that would normally and edges, and along parts she wanted to highlight, such as the bevelled edge of the doors.

Excess sanding dust was then removed using a damp cloth.

A coat of clear furniture wax was applied using a soft cloth before buffing to a nice sheen

Position the sideboard against a wall and secure with brackets and screws if needed. Style with pot plants and your favourite knick-knacks.



CABINET FACELIFT

This little cabinet jumped out at Melissa when she was doing her op-shop rounds.

'I loved the shuttered front of the door, and I thought the legs had a cute mid-century feel to them,' says Melissa.

The downside was that it had an awful red knob and needed a bit of a facelift to give it a new lease of life.

'After my daughter saw me doing up this cabinet in this gorgeous colour, using British Paints Forever Pink, she claimed it instantly for her room.'

WHAT YOU NEED

- 120 grit sandpaper
- ESP Easy Surface Prep
- Undercoat
- Foam roller and paint
- Ceramic bird doorknob

Prep, prime and paint

The door, hinges and doorknob were removed and the bedside cabinet was given a light sand with 120 grit sandpaper.

As the top of the cabinet was made out of laminate, Melissa prepared this by applying two coats of Easy Surface Prep with a paintbrush, allowing it to dry for an hour between coats. The cabinet was then painted with an undercoat, followed by two top coats, allowing to dry for an hour between coats.

The hinges and door were reattached and a fun, ceramic bird knob used to replace the ugly old doorknob. *

BUNNY SIGN

Add charm to your backyard for the annual Easter egg hunt by creating a bunny crossing sign. It doubles as a basket hanger where participants can pick up their baskets ready for the hunt.

Look online to find a template for a bunny face. You can even have the kids customise it with their favourite colours and accessories.

WHAT YOU NEED

- Pink acrylic paint
- White acrylic paint
- White primer and paint spray
- Gold spray paint
- Bunny face template
- White ribbon

Cut the pieces

Cut the lengths of timber required for the sign using a drop saw. Make sure to cut the bottom end of the pole into a point to help insertion into the ground. Paint the pole using the white spray paint and let it dry. Two coats may be required for even coverage.




3 Create the signs

Print off the word 'bunny' on paper in a size and font that fits the sign. Shade the back with pencil. Turn over, centre on the bunny sign and outline the letters with biro. Remove the paper and fill in the outline with permanent marker. Repeat for the crossing sign.




6 Assemble the pieces

Attach the bunny face board to the pole by drilling two pilot holes through the pole and board. Secure with the drill using two countersunk self-embedding screws. Attach the bunny sign, leave a 50mm gap between the sign and the board. Repeat for crossing sign.



Paint the face board

Paint the bunny face board using the pink acrylic paint and foam roller. Apply two coats of the paint, letting it dry for at least two hours between each coat. Spray the bunny crossing signs with the gold spray paint, applying two coats for even coverage.



Paint the face

Trace the bunny face onto the board in the same way. Paint the face with 2-3 coats of white acrylic paint, letting it dry completely between coats. Draw face details with the permanent marker. Tie a bow with the ribbon and attach between the ears using the craft glue.



6 Add final touches

Attach two cup hooks to each end on the underside of the crossing sign, then use a hammer to drive your finished sign into soft ground. Use ribbon to attach pots or baskets to the hooks on the crossing sign ready for the kids to go Easter egg hunting. ▶



Decorate your home with this cute Easter-themed hessian bunny hanging. It will look great on the front door. You can get the kids involved and let them put their own special touches to the design.

While Melissa used a lovely rustic hessian fabric, you can keep this project simple and low budget by using whatever spare fabric you may have lying around at home.

WHAT YOU NEED

- Bunny template sketched onto newspaper (ears 120mm long, head 120mm diameter,
- 1m long x 110cm wide
- 1m blue gingham ribbon
- Hobby fill stuffing
- White wool
- 200mm 18-gauge craft wire
- Needle-nose pliers
- Hot glue gun



Glue and stuff

Fold the fabric in half and pin the bunny template on top, then cut out. Run a bead of glue around the head of one template, then glue the second on top. Stuff the ears and head. Repeat with the body, leaving a gap at the base to insert the stuffing. Secure shut with the glue gun.



Make the tail

Form a thick loop of wool around your fingers, then remove and press the middle of the loop together to create a bow look. Tie in the centre with a piece of the wool. Cut each end and tease apart to create a round ball. Secure the tail to the bunny using hot glue.



Attach the wire hanger

Tie the blue ribbon in a neat bow around the neck. Fold the craft wire into a V-shape. Bend the wire ends outwards to create coils using the needle-nose pliers. Attach the coils to the back of each ear using the hot glue gun. Let it dry before hanging.



RUSTIC LOG BUNNY

Delight the kids at Easter by constructing this rustic bunny from a hardwood log, to nestle among the shrubs in the front garden.

There's no need for costly materials, as most of it can be found in your woodpile or backyard, while the simple construction method means the kids can be involved in the assembly.

Let them have a go at personalising each bunny, or keep them minimalistic - it's up to you.

Melissa cut the hardwood logs to make the body (300mm diameter), face (200mm), feet (100mm), and ears (160mm long, cut at a 55° angle).


WHAT YOU NEED

- Hardwood logs
- PVA adhesive
- Black pipe cleaners
- Hot glue gun




Cut the pieces

Use a drop saw or chainsaw to cut the pieces for the body, face, feet and ears of the bunny, plus the support stand, from the logs. When cutting the ears for the bunny, make sure you cut them at a 55° diagonal angle to allow for long ears.



2 Assemble the pieces

Secure the feet and the head to the body with adhesive and press together. Apply adhesive to the base of the ears and press into the back of the head. Turn over the bunny and secure the stand to the base of the body with adhesive. Allow to dry overnight.



3 Attach the whiskers

Twist the three pipe cleaners together at the centre of the face so that each side splays out to create your bunny's whiskers. Secure the whiskers firmly to the middle of the bunny's face using the glue gun. Press firmly and hold until the glue dries completely. ❖

BUILD A LAUNDRY CUPBOARD

Make this clever cupboard to conceal your washing machine and supplies and allow for easy removal of clothes. It has 25mm holes that serve as both handles and ventilation, and a plinth on which the machine sits inside the cupboard.

Putting it together

- OONSTRUCT the plinth for the machine by securing the plinth top to one of the plinth sides using adhesive and screws. Repeat for the other side to create a square U-shape.
- 2 BUILD the shelf section by laying down the cupboard top and shelf so you can mark measurements on both of them.

On a 680mm side, mark 210mm in from the end, then 16mm along from that, then 198mm on from this, followed by another 16mm further on. Use the try square to mark lines across each piece.

3 PLACE the two shelf dividers on the 16mm marks running across the shelf. Drill 3mm pilot holes, then secure using adhesive and screws.

Position the cupboard top and place it on top of the shelf dividers and secure with adhesive and screws.

① LAY the shelf assembly on a flat surface with the shelf openings facing upwards, then secure the two sides with adhesive and screws.

Leave the cupboard on its back and insert the plinth's assembly at the base between the two sides. Secure with adhesive and screws.

Secure the strut between the two sides, level with the base. Turn the cupboard over facing downwards and

Project notes

- ◆ Have the MDF cut to size at your local store.
- Sink screw heads, cover with wood filler and allow to dry.
- Predrill 3mm pilot holes for the screws to prevent damaging the MDF.
- Make sure all corners are precisely 90 degrees, or your cupboard will be uneven.
- If you prefer, build the cupboard without doors or replace them with a curtain.

spread adhesive along the back of the frame. Position the backing sheet on top and secure with panel pin nails.

5 DRILL two 50mm holes with a jigsaw in the masonite just above the plinth for the hoses and power cable of the machine.

Measure and mark 11 holes 50mm from the side and 100mm apart, lengthwise down the opposite side of the door, with the last hole mark just above the plinth shelf.

Clamp the door to the workbench, then drill a hole through each mark using a sharp 25mm bit to avoid damaging the MDF. Repeat for the second door.

6 SECURE the hinges with the 16mm screws and adjust until the doors mirror each other and close smoothly.

Lightly sand the cupboard to smooth any sharp edges. Remove all dust and paint the cupboard. •



DOOR TYPES

Doors are gateways that affect the look, style and function of your home. For this reason it's important to choose the right door when upgrading.

The entrance door is the first thing your visitors see, so it should be well maintained and look inviting. They are stronger than interior doors and usually made from solid timber, which improves security and insulation.

Hinged timber doors are the most common type within the home. Interior doors come in standard sizes and many have a honeycomb core. Variations of interior doors include French doors, which have two doors with glass panels, and sliding doors, also called pocket doors, which save space and can be hidden in a wall.

Sliding and folding doors are popular exterior doors leading to outdoor entertainment areas. Their glass panels let in light and views.

Security doors and screen doors, which include mesh to keep out insects, act as a barrier in front of an exterior door. Security doors are tougher yet still allow air flow. ►

INSTALL A DOOR

If you're replacing an internal door or hanging a new one, mounting it to the jamb is an easy DIY job.

First, test that the door fits in the frame and check that there is at least 2mm clearance at the top and sides.

If the door is too wide or too tall, trim it on the hinge side or from the base, using a power planer.

WHAT YOU NEED

- Internal door
- Drill and drill bits
- Tape measure and pencil
- Wedges and hammer
- · Utility knife and chisel
- Hinges and screws











Attach the hinges

Mark the position of the hinges on the edge of the door 200mm from the top and 300mm from the base. Drill pilot holes and attach the hinge with screws. TIP If the hinges need to be recessed, score the outline with a utility knife, then use a chisel to remove the waste.



2 Fit the door

Position the door perpendicular to the frame. Level the door using wedges, ensuring there is 2mm clearance at the top and the hinges are sitting square on the jamb. Drive the top screw into the top hinge, check the door is level and adjust the wedges as required.



3 Hang the door

Once the door is level, drive the top screw into the lower hinge. Remove the wedges and check the door shuts properly. If it doesn't, remove the screw, adjust the wedges, then reattach. Secure the hinges with the remaining screws when the door hangs flush.

REPAIR A LEANING DOOR

Doors need to be cleaned and maintained to keep them working well. Check hinges, hinge pins and handle assemblies every 12 months or so, and clean and lubricate them with WD-40 or a similar product.

If a door sticks when closing or opening it may be slightly off its hinges. You can tell by checking the gap at

the top of the door. If it's wider at the doorknob side, the top hinge screws are probably loose.

Door hinges aren't really adjustable, but by driving a 75mm screw through the centre hole of the top hinge into the jamb and wall framing, you can draw the hinge and jamb towards the framing and slightly reposition the door. ▶

HOW TO MAKE A TRESTLE DESK

Create this stylish trestle desk and add a bespoke touch to your home or office space

on't have a lot of space at home?
This stylish trestle desk could be the ideal solution. It looks great in any compact workspace such as a study nook, a hallway, child's bedroom or corner of the room.

Just follow the steps below for this great DIY project. The tabletop can be cut from a piece of hardwood such

as an 1800 x 600 x 26mm merbau FJ laminated panel.

And to make this project easier, have your timber pre-cut to size at your local Bunnings store (see cutting list).


The ends of the legs should be cut using a compound mitresaw set to 5°, so that the legs join the supports and leg bases at an angle.

WHAT YOU NEED

- Tape measure and pencil
- Drill and Phillips head bit
- 3mm and 6.5mm drill bits
- Orbital sander
- 240 grit sanding pads
- PVA timber adhesive
- 8g x 40mm timber screws
- Two 1200 x 6mm galvanised threaded rods, two 6mm nuts
- Bolt cutters or hacksaw
- Wax and spray paint
- · Safety gear



Waxing the tabletop will protect the surface and bring out the natural timber grain



Prepare the legs

Lay out two leg pieces, a leg base and a support to create a triangle on your workbench. Predrill pilot holes with a 3mm bit for the 40mm screws that will secure the legs to the base and the support. Apply adhesive and join the pieces. Repeat for the other legs.



Attach the supports

Using the drill, attach the bases to the legs with 40mm screws. Then assemble one trestle by attaching a support to the four legs. Predrill four pilot holes in the ends of each support, then secure to the legs with adhesive and 40mm screws. Repeat for other trestle.



Paint the legs

Paint or spray the trestles in the colour of your choice. Apply several coats, allowing to dry between coats. Lightly sand the painted surfaces with 240 grit sandpaper between coats. Sand the tabletop using an orbital sander with 240 grit sandpaper for a smooth finish.





Attach the trestles

Position the trestles under the tabletop by marking the side of each support 110mm from the end of the tabletop, with a 30mm overhang at each end of the supports. Predrill 3mm pilot holes through each support. Attach the trestles to the top with 40mm screws.



Cut the rods

Use two galvanised rods to brace the table. Position the rods diagonally between the inside back legs on both sides 80mm from the base of the legs and 50mm from the top of the legs. Cut the rods to length with bolt cutters or a hacksaw.



6 Secure the rods

Paint the rods to match the trestles. When the paint is dry, predrill pilot holes for the rods on an angle using a 6.5mm drill bit. Thread each rod through the holes and secure with 6mm nuts. Apply several coats of wax to the tabletop for a final finish.

HOME OFFICE HEAVEN

Make working from home productive and rewarding by creating the right space for your needs

LIGHTING

A well-lit workspace will have both the level and type of light evenly diffused, with no – or very limited – shadows.

It will have an abundance of natural light, but not an excess of light falling directly onto any work areas or screens from one direction. Think filtered or diffused light all round.

Select daylight globes for any artificial lighting, which have a natural colour range that reduces eyestrain and ensures a natural colour balance.

The easiest way to get balanced light is to have multiple light sources, as this tends to create a more balanced light fall. If you are likely to have lights running all day, switch to LED as they are massively more energy efficient.

A more permanent comfort option is to have a ceiling fan installed. Look for remote-controlled options for ease of use. This Arlec 4-blade Sweep Ceiling Fan, \$269, has an onboard light offering a broad spread of diffused light as well.



A good flow of fresh air and quality ventilation are critical for a comfortable workspace. Ideally, you want at least one opening window and the ability to have cross-ventilation, where air flows in from one point and out through another creating gentle movement of fresh air.

This may not always be achievable, especially if you live in a high-rise, so that's where fans and reverse cycle air-conditioning come in.

Running the air-con can become rather expensive, so either run it on fan-only mode or use a traditional fan. Ceiling fans are a very efficient way of cooling an office.



SCREEN SET-UP

For the vast majority of us, working from home will mean screen-based work. It's a very important part of office ergonomics to have your screen set up in the right location to help reduce eyestrain.

- MAKE SURE no light falls directly onto the computer screen.
- AVOID light sources from behind you that may reflect off the screen.
- ENSURE there aren't any strong light sources behind the screen by placing your computer away from any windows.
- CHECK there are no distracting or busy views behind your screen.

With a laptop, it may be more comfortable to create a docking station so you can plug your laptop into a larger monitor and use an external keyboard and mouse.

GET CONNECTED

E-mail, internet and device-to-device communication are all an essential part of getting your job done.

Wi-fi and other wireless connection methods have been the greatest areas of growth, allowing access from anywhere to virtually anything. But every IT geek will tell you one thing – if the option is there, plug it in.

Wireless connections can be variable in speed and signal strength, which leads to delays or failures.

The simplest way to get all your home office gear networked is by using ethernet cables and creating what is called a LAN, local area network.

Many devices have ethernet ports built-in, so you just simply connect a lead and devices are talking.

Some devices such as printers or scanners may not have ethernet ports or may run faster if connected via other cables, so check out the installation manuals for best performance.



Cables can be messy and dangerous. Keep them tidy and safe with a cable cover. They're available in a range of sizes, shapes and colours to suit all situations. Try a D-Line 1m Cable Cover, \$30.

If you need more ethernet connections, they are easy to add by connecting an ethernet switch or hub, such as this D-Link 5-port Gigabit Switch, \$24. When selecting, remember that a five-port hub only has four outlets, as one port will be taken up by the input lead.



The neatest way to get cables where you need them through desks is by installing a cable duct. Use a hole saw to drill through, then pop in a duct, such as this Kia Ora 60mm Cable Duct, \$3. Look for ducts with spring-loaded shutters.

If your wi-fi signal isn't ranging far enough around your home office or home, you'll need a wi-fi repeater or range extender.

The best way to have ethernet added to your home office is to run cables through the walls. The outlets are then available through neat wall plates like this Deta Cat 6 Ethernet Outlet, about \$22.

POWER ON!

When you're setting up your new home office, you'll likely realise just how many things will need to be plugged into a power outlet.

Don't panic, as the issue you'll find is purely the number of items needing outlets, not the actual power use, as many devices, such as printers, will only be running occasionally.

You may find it useful to have an electrician come in and switch some single wall plates over to double outlets or to have them add an extra one or two. If you still need extra outlets, look at quality multiple outlet power boards with inbuilt surge-guard protection. ▶

YOUR WORKSTATION

It may sound obvious, but your workspace's two main components - the desk and chair - need to be carefully considered and selected together, with ergonomics being a key factor.



DESK

- Do you need a fixed height desk to match your typical work or is an adjustable one to suit varying work demands more appropriate?
- Make sure there will be adequate workspace left for whatever tasks you may have after space is taken up by fixed items such as a computer, keyboard and mouse, a monitor, printer, an in-tray, speakers and any other extras.
- Rolled-edge desks will be more comfortable on your arms than those sharp angles.
- Look for an easily washable desk with a matt surface that won't create reflections or glare.
- Consider a corner desk as they make excellent use of wasted space - things such as power boards and external hard drives can be positioned behind your screen, hidden but easily accessible.

CHAIR

- ◆ Don't scrimp on a chair. It needs to be comfortable, multi-adjustable (height, angle of tilt, even backrest) and suitably ergonomic.
- What type of surface will the chair be on? Carpet, tiles, timber? Make sure the castors are suitable for the surface.
- Consider the material. In warm weather, a chair can get uncomfortable. Look at mesh backs for breathability. If the actual seat section is leather it will be more expensive, but it will be more comfortable than vinyl in hot weather.
- Do you opt for an armrest or no armrest? This will depend entirely on your desk, the nature of your work and, of course, personal preference.



GARAGE STORAGE

Follow these tips to get rid of clutter and organise a space for your tools

s your garage a mess, with used paint tins stacked next to a pile of tools, tangled extension cords and timber offcuts?

You're not alone. It's the nature of a workshop garage to end up this way without proper organisation.

Not everyone can afford the luxury of a custom-made workshop in the garage, but there are ways to pack away tools and create an orderly environment in which to work on home projects.

The key is finding space for storage. Most storage comes as shelves, but you can also add cabinets, lockers and pegboards for hanging tools and mobile cabinets that double as a workbench.

Here, we list options for garage and tool storage and show you how to make a handy garage shelf.





LOCKERS AND CABINETS

Stainless steel cabinets and lockers are a great storage solution for organising equipment and household items.

Because they are strong and sturdy, they need little maintenance and do not get damaged easily.

Another benefit is that they suit items that you may need to store safely or lock away securely.

Under-bench mobile storage cabinets are a great way to store equipment in a small garage.

Made from stainless steel, they usually have multiple drawers and move around on castors.

Some also come with hardwood benchtops and cabinets, so you have a mobile workshop on wheels.

SHELVING

Sturdy shelving that can handle the weight of power tools is another useful storage solution in your garage.

If you have timber shelves already installed, you only need to buy wire baskets or plastic bins and tubs of varying sizes to organise your tools and garden equipment.


Many bins and tubs are designed to be stackable, which also saves you valuable space in small garages.

Wire baskets and shelves that come with an expanding system of brackets and frames can be installed quickly on your garage wall.

You can also purchase heavy-duty multi-tier garage storage units that are easy to assemble.

They usually have adjustable shelves with a high load capacity that can be put together in many configurations.

These shelves suit a mix of large and small items that you want to keep organised and out of the way. ▶



TOOL STORAGE

Knowing the location of every tool should be a priority of any serious DIY enthusiast. It is annoying to learn half way through a project that your Phillips head screwdriver is missing.

Organising your tools so you can see where they all are at any given time is not that difficult.

You can organise them in categories by placing them in small tubs on shelves or you can keep them in mobile tool cabinets with multiple drawers to suit different-sized tools.

Metal tool chests and tool trolleys do a similar job, keeping the tools you need for a project within easy reach.

Another way of doing this is to attach a pegboard with hooks to the wall over your workbench.

Pegboards are often made from masonite, which you can cut easily to suit the size you want, or powder-coated stainless steel, which offers a stronger surface for supporting tools. ►

SOIL HEALTH

Get to the heart of growing with this easy guide to determining and treating the health of your soil

WORDS DONYALE HARRISON



t the heart of growing healthy plants is soil. A few simple diagnostics you can do at home can tell you a lot about the condition of your soil and what will most successfully grow there.

THE SAUSAGE TEST

1. Take a large handful of soil, minus stones or mulch. Add enough water to hold it together, like pizza dough. 2. Roll it into a sausage shape and try to bend it into a circle. 3. If it bends easily without breaking, your soil is mostly clay. If it won't bend without breaking, it's mostly sand. If it bends partway, then breaks, it's loam.

SOIL LIFE

There are three general types of soil: sandy, loam and clay, with most soils somewhere on a spectrum between these points. But more important than the structure of your soil is the amount of life in it.

Dig up a spadeful of soil and drop it on a sheet of plastic or cardboard. If you include weeds or unwanted plants, so much the better. Take a look at what's in the soil. Can you see worms, tiny bugs, traces of fungus on the roots and a good amount of moisture and

is a sign of healthy soil. BELOW Make compost from organic matter to improve structure.



have, it can be made healthier by improving its structure with carbon-rich organic matter, including compost, manures, green manures and mulches.

You don't even need to dia. just pile them on and worms and insects will do the work for you, especially in clay soils.

Organic matter attracts worms and beneficial microbes, fungi and insects, all of which add even more carbon.

Every gram of carbon you add to the soil can retain up to eight grams of water. which further increases the life in your soil. ▶

WATER HOLDING

To grow well, plants need a good mix of air and moisture in the soil. Too little water and most plants won't survive. Too much water with too little air, and they will rot.

Dig a hole about 500mm deep in your soil and pour in a bucket of water. If it drains straight through, your soil doesn't hold enough water for most plants. If it pools and drains very slowly, it holds too much.

If it forms a pool and then drains smoothly, it indicates a good balance. If water starts to fill the hole before you pour any in, the soil may be waterlogged.

What to do

You can expand the range of what will grow in your garden by creating a better balance of water and air.

Adding organic matter is a good start, as it helps dry soil retain moisture and wet soil gain better airflow.

You can even make raised beds to plant into and leave the soil below to improve over time. If your soil is waterlogged and you can't improve your drainage, this is your best option.

Clay is often the reason for wet soil. Its super-fine particles stick together and hold moisture so plant roots can't easily push through to access the nutrients.

A range of claybreakers, mostly gypsum-based products, is readily available. These work with some types of clay soil.

Drop a small amount of soil into a glass of water and leave for a day. If the water goes cloudy, then gypsum-based claybreaker will help. Liquid or hose-on types

are easiest to apply. If it doesn't go cloudy, add organic matter, mulching with thick layers.

Dry soils can also be hydrophobic, where water sits on the surface without soaking into the soil and then runs off quickly. You can counter this with a soil-wetting agent.

Look for organic varieties based on polysaccharides and seaweed. Seasol's version comes in a concentrate or a hose-on pack for large gardens.

Acid (low pH) soils are the most common. You can raise the pH of the soil by adding garden lime. Most come as powders that can be scattered over the soil and hosed in.

Wear a mask and protective clothing, as it can irritate skin. If your garden bed is bare, you can dig the lime in to the depth of a spade. Leave for a fortnight before sowing or planting.

If your too-acid soil is also low in magnesium (see Soil nutrients, page 120), dolomite is a type of lime that contains magnesium.

Use it the same way as lime. or in a soluble form that can he watered in

If your soil is alkaline, you're probably on limestone and are best off growing alkali-loving plants, with acid-lovers in pots.

You can lower the pH slowly by adding organic matter such as compost and manures, especially leaf mould and pine needles.

You can also use elemental sulphur, which will provide a more dramatic effect, but it is slow-acting as well.

For all types, cover your soil with mulch or with groundcover plants to hold in water. Organic mulch will add carbon to the soil, but for dry gardens or if you don't want to have to re-mulch regularly, gravel will do the job. ▶


SOIL pH

This measures the acidity or alkalinity of soil. Most plants grow in a range of 5.5-7 (slightly acid to neutral) on the pH scale, and outside this range some nutrients can be 'locked up' in the soil.

Soil pH kits are readily available and cheap. Take several samples from around your garden and mix with the liquid and powder testing materials in the kit, then match the colour your sample turns to a chart in the package.

Outside the 5.5-7 range, you can choose to either adjust the pH or plant acid- or alkali-loving plants.

SOIL NUTRIENTS

Many Australian soils are naturally low in nutrients, especially phosphorus. Native plants have adapted to this, but food crops and exotics need fertile soil to thrive.

The main nutrients are nitrogen, potassium and phosphorus. A lack of nitrogen shows in pale leaves and poor plant growth. Low potassium shows as older leaves wilting or looking scorched, and all leaves yellowing between the veins from the base. Low phosphorus is harder to spot but can show in poor plant growth or leaf tips that look burnt.

Calcium, magnesium and sulphur are also key. A lack of calcium can show in distorted new leaves, while low magnesium sees older leaves turn yellow at the edges, and low sulphur has younger leaves turn yellow first.

A number of trace elements, including iron and boron, make up the remaining diet for most plants and their lack can be seen in discoloured and distorted foliage. Talk with your local garden centre about specific worries.

What to do

A good organic fertiliser such as Yates Dynamic Lifter, or a slow-release option, contains a wide cross-section of nutrients.

For hungry plants such as roses and fruit, or lawns, a fortified option such as the Neutrog specialist range will do the trick, while leafy greens love an additional foliar feed with Charlie Carp, or similar.

If you have specific problems, blood and bone is high in nitrogen, phosphorus and calcium. A scatter of sulphate of potash will raise potassium levels, or you can spray with a liquid potash.

Dolomite, lime and gypsum will all add calcium, while lime and Epsom salts will both raise magnesium levels.

Sulphur is available as dust or powder. Add powdered sulphur directly to the soil. If you need to control mites and fungus in your garden, grab the dusting variety, as it's a great general remedy over leaves.

Look for a trace element supplement if you suspect one is needed. Yates and Manutec make them, as do several organic manufacturers.

If you're planning to grow food and are worried your soil may be contaminated, check with Vegesafe (research.science. mq.edu.au/vegesafe). This initiative from Macquarie University costs \$20 and tests five samples from any Australian garden for metal contamination including lead and arsenic. *







Keep the soil damp during flowering for the best colour displays and prune lightly after flowering has finished.



TRANSPLANT A TREE

Autumn is a good time to move trees, as they suffer less from heat stress, but the soil is still warm enough for the roots to recover and establish.

- DIG a new planting hole and enrich the soil with organic matter that is low in nitrogen, such as sheep manure.
- PRUNE the tree to a manageable size, then dig a moat around the tree trunk. Give the roots a good soaking.
- MARK the north side of the tree so that it can be planted in the new hole in the same orientation. This will help to

avoid the bark on a shade-facing side getting sunburnt.

- CUT the surface roots, then use a shovel to lift the root ball, severing any deeper roots. Ease the root ball onto plastic or hessian to retain as much soil as possible.
- LOWER the tree into the new hole and backfill with soil. Water in well to remove any air pockets around the roots.
- APPLY a slow-release fertiliser and water every day in dry weather for two months or until established.







MAXIMISE RESULTS

When you're growing plants in hanging baskets, you'll need to consider a few extra things that you may not normally think about with regular potted plants. One of the major points to keep in

mind is that a basket is a very unnatural environment for most plants. As a result, allowances need to be made to maximise their growth and performance.



The sunny side

If baskets are kept on a balcony, it's not unusual for them to be in a spot where they receive sun all morning and shade all afternoon, or vice versa.

Be familiar with the amount of sun in your location and select plants accordingly.



It's not unusual for hanging baskets to have higher fertiliser requirements, as nutrients are flushed through by the regular watering.

When you put your basket together, add a little extra controlled-release fertiliser, then supplement this with regular liquid feeds.

ADD a little less than one level teaspoon to about 500ml of water to pre-soak the water crystals. Around the liner, mark four evenly spaced points halfway down using a marker pen. Remove the liner, fold at marks and cut out four holes 40-50mm in diameter.



2 REPLACE the liner and position on top of one bucket. Nearly fill the second bucket with potting mix, a handful of expanded water crystals and two teaspoons of controlled-release fertiliser. Blend well. Add to the basket up to the line of holes, pressing down gently.



3 PUSH the root balls of the seedlings through the holes and cover the roots with potting mix. Fill the basket to 30mm below the liner lip, then plant the centre plant, firming down and topping up the mix if needed. Hang from a hook, then water with a diluted seaweed solution. *

Good to know

- Many natural fibre pots with plastic liners don't have drainage holes. Punch at least one good-sized hole through the liner before planting.
- When potting plants with long foliage, use budding tape to gently tie the leaves in a ponytail. This stops them getting damaged or buried in the potting mix.
- To avoid your basket becoming awkwardly heavy during planting, water it only after you have moved it to its new location and hung it securely from a hook.
- Plastic pots are a great choice for hanging baskets as they are more resistant to drying out.



SWEET SCENTS

Prepare now for a springtime garden filled with the delicate perfume and gorgeous colour of the sweet pea

EXPERTSECRETS

Plant dwarf varieties in garden beds to provide a perfumed groundcover. in the United Kingdom from Sicily in 1699 and quickly became all the rage. From that time, the sweet pea was bred continuously and hundreds of cultivars have since poured onto the market.

While sweet peas are loved for their perfume, keep in mind that not all modern cultivars are fragrant, so check the seed packet for the magic word when purchasing.

Sweet peas are easy to grow in pots and garden beds. We show you how. ▶

Sweet peas provide a veritable anvas of colour in the garden. Did you know? Sweet peas were such popular blooms with the Victorians that, in 1901,

the National Sweet Pea Society was formed and the flower became established as the symbol of Victorian England.

BLOOMING IDEAS

- ◆ CASCADE dwarf cultivars out of hanging baskets and pots.
- GROW climbing varieties on teepees in garden beds and pots.
- CREATE a fragrant covering on a wire fence.
- PLANT them in pots on the balcony and tie to rails.
- COVER a trellis with sweet peas.



cold districts. A support for climbing varieties should be erected before seeds are planted to avoid disturbing them.

- POSITION is vital, as sweet peas need full sun with shelter from the wind.
- SOIL should be free-draining, dug to a depth of 100-150mm, and enriched with compost or manure and fertiliser formulated for flowers and fruit. Add


are to grow into damp soil. Make drills 20-30mm deep and press the seeds into the soil 50-70mm apart. Don't water too much during the germination period, as overwatering can cause seed failure.

When the seedlings are about 150-200mm high, place twigs along the length of the row to help the tendrils reach the support.

- soil damp but not overwet.
- MULCH lightly with sugar cane or lucerne hay.
- FEED with a fertiliser for flowers and fruit when the buds appear.

Watch for snails, slugs and birds that love the young growth. And pick the flowers frequently - the more you pick, the more you get.





SWEET SUCCESS

Did you know that sweet peas, like all members of the legume family, have the ability to fix atmospheric nitrogen in a plant-usable form? This is thanks to bacteria that live in their root nodules. Some goes directly into the plant to help growth and some is transferred into the soil for use by following crops.



Going potty

Dwarf sweet pea cultivars are available for pots and window boxes, or you can grow climbing sweet peas on a teepee in a large pot. Here's how.



OFILL a 300mm pot with a premium potting mix. Position several 2m high bamboo stakes in the potting mix about 50mm apart and about 50mm from the edge of the pot.


② PULL together the tops of the stakes and tie them securely using string or wire. Place the pot in a sheltered, sunny position and lightly water the potting mix.



MAKE a 50mm deep hole at the base of the stakes and plant a seed in each. Keep the mix moist but not overwet to prevent the seeds from rotting. Once germinated, water the seeds regularly. ❖

he humble onion is one of the cook's most reliable friends.
Delicious raw, baked, sautéed or steamed, onions are a versatile vegetable and form the basis of many Australian and international dishes.

But their benefits are not only culinary. Onions are a good source of potassium, iron, fibre and vitamins A, B6, C and E, and have been highly regarded throughout the centuries for their antiseptic properties.

And if that wasn't enough, the onion family, including shallots, leeks and chives, are said to be outstanding performers in the realm of disease prevention. If eaten regularly, they may help to prevent stomach cancer, prostate cancer and heart disease.

PEELING BACK THE LAYERS

Onions are a vegetable of antiquity. They were cultivated for food by the Ancient Egyptians but also used in spiritual traditions. Onions were placed in the thorax, pelvis or near the eyes during mummification as a symbol of eternity.

Onions

You can choose from bulbous red-, white- or brown-skinned onions, used in many cooking styles.

- PLANT Sow the seeds directly where they are to grow. Thin the seedlings to 70-100mm apart when 100mm high. Don't plant seedlings too deeply, just cover the roots and the base of the stem.
- GROW Don't mound the soil around the plants, as the bulbs sit on the surface of the soil, not below it. When bulbs start to form, feed with a complete fertiliser. Keep the area around the plants weed free.
- HARVEST Onions will be ready for eating about 6-8 months after planting, when the leaves dry and fall over. Pull from the ground and leave in the sun for a few days to cure. Store in a cool, dry place with lots of ventilation.

Spring onions

While spring onions are often confusingly called eschalots, green onions, scallions or shallots, a spring onion is simply an immature onion that hasn't yet made a bulb. It is harvested for its green shoots.

Any onion can be picked immaturely as a spring onion, but it is best to buy seeds labelled as spring onions. They are ideal for growing in containers.

 PLANT Seeds can be sown directly where they are to grow at almost any time of the year.
 Make successive sowings every 4-6 weeks for a continuous supply.

- GROW Water regularly and feed fortnightly with a soluble liquid fertiliser.
- HARVEST Plants are ready to be pulled from the ground about 8-12 weeks after sowing the seeds.

Green onions

Not to be confused with spring onions, green onions are onions that have been picked at an immature stage when the bulb is small.

- Both the bulb and long green stems are used raw in the kitchen and impart a rich onion taste.
- PLANT Sow the seeds directly where they are to grow.
- GROW Water regularly and feed monthly with a soluble liquid fertiliser.

 HARVEST Pull from the ground in spring when the small white round bull has formed



Shallots

Also called eschallots, shallots have a milder, sweeter flavour than onions.

Their brown- or red-skinned bulbs develop underground.

 PLANT Shallots are grown from bulblets or cloves like garlic, and are available from nurseries in autumn and winter.

Space the bulbs 150-200mm apart with just the tops showing above the soil. More bulbs will multiply around the mother plant.

- GROW Fertilise monthly with a complete soluble fertiliser.
- HARVEST Shallots are ready when the tops start to fall over and before flowering. Save and replant



With a subtle onion taste, leeks are an asset to many dishes, especially soups and casseroles.

- PLANT Sow the seeds in punnets, then transplant to the garden bed when 120mm high, or you can buy seedlings.
- GROW Make a 200mm deep trench and add the seedlings. Cover them with a little soil to hold them upright and slowly fill in the trench as the seedlings grow. This will blanch the stems.

Water regularly and feed monthly with a fertiliser that is high in nitrogen.

 HARVEST Start the harvest when the stems are about 20mm thick. You can harvest each week for several weeks.



Chives

Chives are very easy to grow in containers and garden beds. They have round hollow leaves, while garlic chives have flat, solid leaves. Their flowers make a pretty garnish. • PLANT Seeds can be sown in spring, summer and early autumn or you can plant seedlings. New

plants can also be started by dividing overcrowded clumps.

- GROW Sow the seeds or plant seedlings in clumps. Fertilise monthly with a soluble plant food.
- HARVEST Cut the leaves at the base when needed. Chives may also be frozen in ice cubes.

HOW TO DIVIDE CHIVES



Dig up the clump of chives using a trowel or fork.



Separate the plants carefully, so as not to damage the roots.



Replant the chives in small clumps, then water in well. *
