







Backyard chooks

Chickens provide fresh and delicious free-range eggs as well as use up kitchen scraps and fertilise the soil.

Our chickens wander free in the orchard at my home, so we put them away at night to protect them from foxes. As a result, we've developed fine chicken-wrangling skills.

The chicken house project in this month's issue is ideal for creating a space for them to enjoy the day in the open and move about, plus an area for them to sleep at night, protected from predators.

Winter maintenance

With winter hanging in the air, growth in the garden slows down but there's still plenty to do outdoors.

Now's an opportune time to take care of your gardening tools.

I soak hand tools and secateurs in diluted household cleaner with a splash of bleach, then scrub them with steel wool or a stiff wire brush.

With larger tools, I like to take the time to scrape the soil from any metal surfaces, wipe them over with a cloth dipped in cleaner and sharpen cutting edges using a broad file.

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Raising foundations


The old house was totally demolished and, as Alex anticipated, there were issues with the surrounding warehouse wall, which stood 5.5m high.

Many older buildings are built on a layer of bricks, so if you do any work near it, you undermine the existing structures, in this case, the walls.


Alex raised the level of the foundations of his house and used a thick waffle slab to provide the same strength and reduce the concrete used.

'Raising the level meant less structural impact on the surrounding walls, saving time and money without compromising the integrity,' he says.



Exaggerating elements

While the block is only 10 x 21m, with about 320sqm of internal living space, nothing about this house feels small.

Utilising oversized elements exaggerates the perception of space, and a huge front door sets the scene.

A wide and roomy entrance creates a landing area and avoids that feeling

'The entrance is also important. of having to jostle past people. >









Choosing colour

It may appear that the use of strong colours on walls is a matter of taste and personality, but there's more to it than that, according to Alex.

'It wasn't necessarily my goal to use feature colours, but they serve a real practical purpose. To detract from the wall being the dominating feature, I actually drew attention to it,' he says.

'Choosing the strong colour for the entire expanse means the eye registers

the red, but then diverts to the blue sky. It invites the sky in, adding to the feeling of openness and space.'

The paint was waxed using a high-grade buffing machine, resulting in an amazing depth, similar to looking into something translucent.

'It was done painstakingly by hand, but the effort elevates it from a simple red wall to something different and purposeful. It's also incredibly tactile and has a life of its own,' says Alex.



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Maximising spaces

The kitchen floorspace is relatively small, but many tricks have been used to make it feel expansive. The island bench is in excess of 1.2 x 3m and the back bench 8.5m long.

'I'm a big fan of a kitchen party, so I want room for everyone,' says Alex.

A large sliding window above the sink brings in a green aspect and takes advantage of the neighbouring trees. It was cantilevered for support and so the eye travels across and out.

The floor plate is smaller than the ceiling plate so, again, you perceive the space to be larger than it is.

Massive sliding glass doors off the kitchen recede into the walls, so the courtyard is integrated and accessible.

Kitchen



Casual living

The living room is casual and understated, with relaxation and comfort being the primary objectives.

In an additional pavilion situated at the other side of the courtyard from the kitchen and living area, there is a small and intimate dining room, as well as a separate study.

'These look into the central space and back at the house, so everything works to focus and contain, like your own private world,' says Alex. >



Choose larger and fewer pieces of furniture for a small room to avoid cramping the space





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Gaining height

On the first floor, there are three bedrooms and the family bathroom.

The master bedroom follows the extended roof line inside, and the internal timber ceiling adds warmth.

It is spacious, featuring an ensuite with bath and a full-length balcony that provides a private viewing point.


'Design is making decisions about all the variables and ordering them into a solution,' says Alex.

'What my training and experience offer is an aptitude for thinking outside of the box and the scientific rigour for knowing how things go together, then testing how that can vary.

'This house was an experiment in many ways and it works,' he says. ◊

BATHROOM UPGRADES

Two run-down spaces get two different luxury looks without breaking the bank

he bathroom is one of the busiest rooms in the house, and renovating it to remove a clunky layout will add value and simplify the morning rush.

Practical storage options and a combination of natural and fitted lighting should be included in any new design, while the needs of your family have to be considered as well.

The average cost of a bathroom renovation is \$16,000, but you can create a new look for much less. >

Use light-coloured tiles and a white vanity unit to achieve a bright, airy feel.



Ensuite overhaul

As an extension of the master bedroom, an ensuite may be viewed as a luxury, as it doesn't play a large a role in the daily routine of a busy family.

It can be neglected until the main bathroom has been done, by which time there is often little budget left over. Transforming an old ensuite into a private haven for parents to escape and unwind at the end of a day doesn't require a large infusion of cash.

This dingy 1970s ensuite was redesigned twice to show that, even on two modest budgets, it can be transformed into a relaxing retreat.



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

READER'S PROJECT

Bathroom revival

Accessing the shower in this tiny bathroom was a challenge, and the original layout and fittings weren't working. This inspired *Handyman* reader Nathan Congram to transform it for his parents.

'The room was old, decrepit and impractical. The renovation gave me the opportunity to implement my ideas and create a warm and inviting place for them,' he says.

By using two mirrors, installing a corner-opening shower and laying new white wall tiles, he was able to make the 1900 x 2600mm bathroom appear spacious and well lit.

Completing the makeover himself kept the budget down to just \$1800, including all new fixtures and fittings.



Install two mirrors to add depth to a tiny room, as they create the illusion of more space and reflect light





To make a cool bath mat in just a couple of hours all you need are a few pieces of timber, a handsaw and a power drill.

Cut 70 x 19mm kwila into slats and join them with cleats using 30mm galvanised screws. Finish the mat with a timber stain, varnish or oil to give it a waterproof barrier.

Materials

Measuring tape Combination square Handsaw Sandpaper Clamps Drill and countersink bit Small paintbrush Pencil





Cut the timber

Cut six 800mm long timber slats and three 440mm long cleats using a handsaw. Line up the slats on a flat surface spaced with 5mm even gaps. Position the cleats across the slats at least 50mm from each end and clamp.



Secure the cleats

Mark two screw holes for each slat on the cleats. Use a countersink bit to predrill the holes, then secure the slats through the cleats with galvanised screws but don't drive them in too hard, as this could split the timber.



Apply the stain

Round off any sharp edges and sand the surface using 180 grit paper, then apply 2-3 coats of decking oil. It will cause the timber fibres to swell, making the surface feel rough, so sand lightly in between coats for a smooth finish. 9

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BACK IN BLACKIN

Transform tired timber into a dramatic floorspace using a striking dark stain

here are few people who don't love the look and feel of timber floorboards underfoot.

Cool and clean in summer, warm and comforting in winter, they'll always have a huge influence on how the rest of the interior looks.

After a recent reno, the new colour scheme in this beach cottage left the white painted floor looking scratched and dull, so it was time for an update.

We hired a drum sander and edge sander for the floor, using two each of the 40, 80 and 120 grit sanding belts and one sanding disc of each grit.

Once this was done, we applied the Black Japan finish.



REVAMP THE FLOORBOARDS



Prepare the space

Measure the width and length of the space to calculate the amount of stain needed. Clear everything from the area you're going to work in, tape up sockets and switches and cover doors and windows with drop sheets.



Sand the edges

Use an edge sander and a 40 grit disc to sand areas near the skirting boards, easing the machine onto the floor to avoid gouging. Use a multi-tool or scraper and sanding sponge to get into corners. Vacuum away any dust.



Apply the first coat

Tape up skirting boards and doorways. Stir the Black Japan well, then apply using an applicator or short nap roller, working the full length of 3-4 boards at a time and maintaining a wet edge. Use a small brush for awkward areas.



Smooth the surface

Check the floorboards for protruding nails and punch them 2-3mm below the surface. Remove any staples and dispose of anything else that could clog or rip the sandpaper. Fill any cracks or holes with appropriate filler.



5 Do a second sand

Punch any nail heads that may have been turned up in the initial sanding, and fill any cracks. Give the floor a sand with both the drum sander and edge sander using 80 grit belts and a disc to give a smooth finish.



∇acuum the floor

Allow the first coat to dry for up to 12 hours. When dry, give the floor a light sand, then vacuum thoroughly to remove the remaining dust.

TIP Wrap up applicators, rollers and brushes in plastic wrap between coats.



Do a rough sand

Use a drum sander and 40 grit belts to do a rough sand to remove any old paint and level any variations in the boards. Ease the machine down while it's in motion and lift it before stopping to avoid gouging the boards.



6 Finish the sanding

For a silky-smooth finish, use 120 grit sanding belts and a disc, blending the work of the edge and drum sanders to ensure an even result. Thoroughly clean up any remaining dust and remove the drop sheets and tape.



Apply the final coats

If satisfied with the strength of the stain, apply two coats of a clear floor finish, using a clean applicator sock.

TIP For a darker look, apply two coats of Black Japan and one of clear, or three coats of the stain only.

DIY TIP

Grab extra sanding belts and discs so you won't run out, and just return the unused ones with the hire equipment.

Timber floors need to be covered with a masonite or plywood underlay. A water-based primer must be applied to both concrete subfloors and timber floors before laying tiles or planks.

To lay the Senso tiles, you simply peel off the backing and apply, using a roller for maximum bond.

DIY flooring

Modernise your interior by choosing the right surface for each room

here are many different flooring options when laying a new surface, and the right one will depend on the look, feel and size of the space in question.

Laminate boards feature designs that resemble popular timbers or other textures such as stone. They are made from MDF and have a melamine resin layer on either side of the board.

Engineered flooring, made from a thin layer of natural timber glued to a plywood base, is also popular.

Carpet is another option if you would prefer a surface that is quieter and more comfortable to walk on.




1 Level the subfloor

When laying over concrete, run a spirit level across the subfloor to find peaks and valleys of more than 3mm. Use an angle grinder to remove high spots and spread self-levelling compound over low areas with a steel float.



Prepare the doorjambs

To trim the base of the doorjambs to allow the new floor to fit underneath, position an offcut of the flooring and underlay next to the jamb to determine the height. Carefully trim the base of the doorjamb using a handsaw.



③ Scribe the first row

Trim the first row of boards to align with the wall. To scribe the boards, tape a permanent marker to a narrow timber block, sliding it along the wall above the flooring so the pen marks a corresponding line on the boards.



Fitting new floorboards

Boards are designed to respond to moisture, so leave the packs in the room for a few days before laying them so they can acclimatise.

If the base of a door sits close to the existing floor, shorten the door using a plane, removing enough material so it doesn't scrape.

- NOISE-PROOF the floor by laying foam underlay beneath the boards, which also provides cushioning. To buy underlay, multiply the length of the room by the width and add 10% to allow for miscalculations.
- REMOVE SKIRTING and replace it when all the boards have been laid, leaving a gap underneath the skirting to allow the floorboards to expand and contract due to variations in temperature and moisture.

⊕ LAY IT DIY for about \$670 for a 20sqm room, at about \$30 per sqm. ◆ CALL A TRADIE to lay it for you for about \$400 a day, plus materials. ◆ HAVE IT DONE by a floor company for about \$1400 for a 20sqm room, including materials and labour.

installation kit, \$30, underlay, from \$45, duct tape, \$5, and the boards themselves, from about

\$15 per sqm for laminate boards.



Position the boards

Use spacers to keep the boards away from the wall for an expansion gap of up to 15mm. Lay the floorboards in sequence, keeping the tongue against the wall, joining long sides first and leaving a small gap at the end.

Tighten the joints

Tap the long sides of the boards together using a tapping block and hammer. Reposition the block at the open end of the board, tapping until the end join butts tightly and working across to complete one row at a time.



6 Position the end boards To install the last board, hook a pulling bar over the end of the board, then tap the upturned edge with a hammer to pull the board into position. When all the boards are laid in position, replace the skirting boards. >



CHOOSING A WEAVE

Carpet comes in various weaves, each designed to suit different amounts of wear and tear.

For high-traffic areas such as hallways or living rooms, denser weave such as loop pile is ideal as it's more durable. For low-traffic areas such as bedrooms, twist pile is a better choice.

There are also products that mix loop and twist pile, so ask your carpet retailer for advice on your specific application. ◆ LOOP PILE is created by looping the yarn into a dense, durable, level surface that doesn't show traffic marks created by walking or vacuuming. It's a favourite in many homes for living areas. OTWIST PILE is soft to touch and is created by twisting the fibres, creating a plumper texture. The pile lies in varying directions, which creates a great overall textured appearance in a room.

Twist

Laying a carpet

Well suited to low-traffic spaces such as bedrooms, carpet provides sound insulation and warmth underfoot while adding a touch of luxury.

Carpet can be laid over most surfaces using underlay to extend the life of the product, giving it better resilience and comfort underfoot.

To choose the best carpet for the room, consider its intended use and your budget as it comes in a variety of materials and weaves, with costs ranging from premium prices for pure wool to the less expensive synthetics.

TIP Colour choice depends on the decorating scheme but, generally, light colours make a room look larger while darker shades hide the dirt.

Cost a new carpet
To lay carpet DIY, you'll
need to buy a carpet-laying
kit, about \$91, seam tape, about
\$17 for 5m, underlay, from \$10 per
sqm, a carpet gripper, \$1 a metre,

and the carpet itself.

Carpet is priced by the square metre, but as it comes in a roll of 3.66 or 4m wide, the cost is calculated by the linear metre or converted into square metres.

To work out how much you need, multiply the width and length of a square or rectangular room to find the number of square metres.

A professional carpet layer will charge from \$20-\$40 per sqm for installation and materials, based on the quality of the carpet. •

re you just about to throw out furniture that looks well past its prime? Before you do, take another look

with an eye to upgrading DIY.

That vinyl suitcase you've been using to store paperwork can be given a new purpose as a novel planter.

Those plastic-topped stools and that outdated footstool are easy to spruce up, while the timber stepladder that's been gathering dust in the garage can become a bedside table.

You'll keep them out of landfill, save money on replacements, and give your home designer chic.






Before

Bargaining isn't just for markets, it's worth asking for a discount at garage sales and secondhand stores.















Spray the suitcase

Drill drainage holes in the base of the suitcase. Spray inside and out with two coats of special-effect paint using even strokes, then leave to dry. Paint the hardware in a contrasting colour. Apply an exterior clear spray paint to the outside of the case to protect the finish.



2 Line the inside

Use black builder's film to line the inside of the base half of the case, then trim to fit, leaving a 30mm overhang. Make holes in the liner to align with the drainage holes in the case. Add a layer of fine aggregate to cover the lined base.



3 Add the plants

Position the plants and when happy with the arrangement, remove and add a layer of potting mix. Return the plants, fill the planter to 50mm below the rim and firm down the mix. Fold and secure the liner using waterproof duct tape. Water in the plants.

arved in intricate detail, with brush hairs serving as long gowns, these quirky copies of old works of art are actually made from recycled paintbrushes.

They've been produced by artist Rebecca Szeto, who was motivated to copy female figures from paintings by Old Masters Johannes Vermeer and Diego Velázquez, among others.

Rebecca carves and paints her own used brushes to produce these one-offs.

'I use mass-produced, end-of-life materials, inspired by my experience as a faux finisher,' she says. •


Assemble the base

Tap the cams into the kickboard holes, then insert the locking pins into the holes in the base shelf. Insert the locking pins into the cams on the kickboard, then turn the cam to lock in place. Repeat for the back support, then position the brace perpendicular to it, securing with screws.



Attach the top cabinets

Assemble the top cabinets in the same way as the base cabinets. Insert the dowels into the holes at the top of the base cabinet, tapping them in gently with a hammer. Lift the top cabinet onto the base cabinet and align the holes with the dowels to lock it into position.



Add the sides and back

Assemble the corner cabinet by securing the side and back panels to the base with screws, ensuring the finished edge is at the front. Stack the shelves on top of the base to make it easier to position them later, then secure the top shelf to the cabinet sides and back with screws.



Make the drawers

Slide the drawer base into the grooves in the drawer sides. Fold over the drawer front, align the holes with the dowels and tap into position, then secure the handles. Attach runners to the base of the drawer and the inside of the side cabinets by aligning the pins and securing with screws.



Install the shelves

Finish the corner cabinet by lifting each shelf to the desired height, then insert the shelf pins into the holes in the side panels to support each shelf. Assemble the side cabinets by joining the sides to the base, kickboard and top using screws to create the frame, securing the back with nails.



Secure the rods

Cut the hanger rod 10mm shorter than the distance between the cabinets. Secure a flange to a wall or side panel with screws, slide another flange over the rod and insert into the mounted flange. Level the rod and secure the other flange on the opposite wall or panel. Screw in the top shelf.

WORKSHOP

Design and create a classic workbench for DIY projects

very DIYer needs a dedicated space to work and keep tools, whether it's a shed or a bench tucked into the garage.

Featuring a large work surface and a shelf for storage, this sturdy, classic 1800 x 800mm bench was made using pine and plywood, easily adjusts to fit any space and cost about \$340.

The design is simple, with a top and a base frame for the bench and shelf. Both butt and mitre joints are used, with notches cut into the legs and shelf for easy assembly.

Dressed pine is used to trim the frames for a neat finish and tung oil applied to the raw timber to nourish it and give it a natural matt finish.

What you need

Structural pine
Premium grade
dressed pine
O plywood
Tung oil
Wood glue
Galvanised screws
Galvanised nails

MAKE THE BENCH




Make the legs

Cut four 790 and four 880mm lengths of 90 x 45mm pine. Mark 90 x 45mm notches on the tops of the 880mm lengths and cut out with a compound mitresaw. Apply adhesive and clamp the 790 and 880mm lengths in pairs, aligning the ends. Drill 4.5mm pilot holes, securing with six batten screws.




4 Attach the benchtop

Mark the benchtop and shelf on plywood, then clamp a straightedge, cutting them with a power saw using a fine tooth blade. Cut the notches out of the shelf with a jigsaw. Drill 3mm pilot holes in the bench and shelf, securing with adhesive and 40mm screws into the frame and rails.



Build the top frame

Make 45° mitre cuts at each end of the top rails with a mitresaw. Build the top frame, securing the mitre joints with adhesive and batten screws. Attach the legs using coach bolts and batten screws. Position the three top cross rails between the front and back rails, securing with batten screws.



5 Secure the trim

Attach the front and side trims to the bench and shelf flush with the tops, using adhesive and nails. Attach the top back edge to the bench and the shelf back support flush with the shelf. Attach the side back supports to the inside of the back legs. Clamp and screw the back to the supports.



3 Assemble the shelf frame


Position the front and back shelf rails between the side rails, drill 4.5mm pilot holes at each joint, securing with batten screws. Position the shelf cross rails between the front and back rails and secure with screws. Mark 230mm up each leg and attach the shelf frame from the inside using batten screws.



6 Apply the finish

Punch all nail heads 1-2mm below the surface and fill all nail holes and other imperfections in the timber as needed. Let the filler dry, then sand the whole bench to a smooth finish using 80 grit, then 120 grit paper and an orbital sander. Dust the entire bench and apply two coats of tung oil.

'I decided the floorboards would make a great benchtop, as they are pre-finished and simply click together,' says Gun. Gun

The only expense was for a pack of 100mm bugle screws for the butt joints, which set him back just \$6.

SIX-DOLLAR WORKBENCH

DESIGN TIP

Give a workbench built from recycled timber a thorough sand to smooth rough edges and splinters, but otherwise leave it unfinished.

The benchtop trim was made from what had been a shelving system, while the legs were cut from 90 x 45mm salvaged pine.



'The bugle screws were only \$6 anyway, so I still got a good deal for such a great-looking and functional workbench,' he says.







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eating and cooling a home makes an obvious impact on energy bills, but just how much it affects them may come as a shock.

On average, 40% of home energy use is for heating and cooling and that doesn't even account for hot water.

To save money this winter, get energy smart. The key is to have good insulation and ventilation, and there are lots of changes you can make DIY.



You can waste up to 30% in energy use through having inadequate insulation **Solar solution**

How much sun your home gets, or solar access as it is known, is an important part of understanding the heating and cooling needs of your property.

The easiest way to discover your solar access and plan how to heat and cool your home is to use the Sun Seeker app (available on iOS, \$22, and Android, \$16).

It tells you which direction the sun comes from at different times of the year and uses augmented reality to view the path of the sun across the sky. It's an invaluable landscape-planning tool as well.

When it comes to heating and cooling, passive measures will incur little or no ongoing costs after installation, but they do have a positive effect on your home and wallet.

GET PASSIVE

These measures, which include ventilation and insulation, are a great example of the simple and effective sustainable steps you can take.

When most people think about sustainability, they generally only

think of the environment, but balanced sustainability also takes into account other factors such as economic and human impacts.

Taking a passive approach to cutting back your heating costs ticks all these sustainability boxes.

Most passive measures are easy to install and will save you money, while making your home more comfortable and reducing your carbon output.

Ceilings and attics

Whether you have a large attic or just a thin layer between a flat roof and the ceiling, the roof cavity is a critical area for keeping your house warm in winter and cool in summer.

Heat can be very easily and quickly lost through a plasterboard ceiling as it rises. One of the best ways to retain heat is with good insulation.

R-value requirement
The R-value of insulation
relates to its ability to resist
the movement of heat in or out of
a structure. As a general rule of
thumb, the cooler the climate, the
higher the R-value required.

In those parts of New Zealand where retaining heat is a priority, ceiling insulation rated at R-5.2 would be the minimum needed.

In regions of the country where keeping heat out is key, a minimum value would be R-4.1.

Talk with a local insulation supplier for advice for your region.










INSTALL ROOF INSULATION To prepare for laying insulation, evenly distribute the packs around the ceiling space, cutting them open with a utility knife around the sides from top to base, then fluff up the segments to their full thickness.



1 Prepare the area

Gently sweep the area, removing any debris. Measure the surface area in square metres to calculate how many insulation packs are needed, buying segments with the correct R-value and width for the area.



2 Install the segments

Position the segments between ceiling joists. Slide them under any pipes as necessary. Electrical cables can lie over the insulation. Trim the segments to size with a utility knife, using a piece of timber as a cutting board.



3 Fill the gaps

Butt the segments as closely together as possible to avoid heat leakage. Cover all areas, saving offcuts to fill smaller gaps and odd spots. Remove any waste from the roof space, such as the insulation packaging, before finishing up.



Building and renovating

If you're designing a new home or renovating, talk with your architect or builder about passive design features.

These can be as simple as maximising any insulation and extending the eaves to offer more sun protection during summer.

You can also avoid using dark materials and create closed-off living areas that can be heated and cooled independently. >

Windows and doors

Take a close look at all of your doors and windows when they're shut and you'll find that many of them don't actually close with a snug fit.

These gaps, small as they may be, create draughts and leak heat. Glass in windows and doors is also a major area of heat loss, so consider double glazing as a passive measure.

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Remove the weeds

Weeds compete with plants for soil nutrition and leave them open to attack by insects and diseases. So start the backyard tidy-up by removing weeds in beds and pots.

They grow in every season and it's best to attack them as soon as they appear. Dig them up if necessary, making sure you get the roots as well.

Put any hard-to-kill bulbous, perennial and seeded weeds into a plastic bag. Tie the top and leave the bag in the sun until the weeds rot, then add them to the compost bin.



Prep the soil

For plants to stay healthy, soil needs to be reconditioned at the end or start of each season.

Add cow or chicken manure, compost or mushroom compost to the surface of the soil.

Organic matter breaks down and supplies nutrients to plants and builds soil structure.

You can also use a seaweed product to promote beneficial micro-organisms in the soil and help plants thrive.

Top up mulch

After weeding and conditioning the soil, mulch will need topping up. • WATER the soil well before applying

mulch, or apply after it has rained. • USE an organic mulch such as lucerne hay or pea straw because they add organic matter to the soil

as they break down.

• SPREAD a light layer of mulch to only about 25mm thick for winter, so the warmth of the winter sun can penetrate through to the soil. Water it in well after laying. • ENSURE the mulch is clear of tree trunks and plant stems to prevent fungus or rot developing.











HOW TO PLANT Don't simply dig a hole and plonk in the tree or shrub, as a little preparation of the soil and simple measures will help your transplant thrive. **TIP** Water the tree or shrub several hours before you plant it out.



① DIG A HOLE twice the width of the pot containing the new shrub, making sure it is also a little deeper. Use a hand trowel or spade if needed. Gently remove the plant from the pot.



② MIX COMPOST into the excavated soil and add a layer in the base of the planting hole. Position the shrub so it is at the same level in the soil as it was in the pot.



3 BACKFILL THE HOLE with the soil and compost mix, then gently firm it down by hand. Water in well, using a seaweed solution to help prevent transplant shock, then mulch.

At this time of year divide perennials for replanting, and this can be done every three to four years.

If a particular plant looks good in one area, consider using it more widely, as repeat plantings can visually unify the garden.


Perennials that have multiple stems arising from the base of the plant can be divided. Plants that are flowering less freely, have become

with the removed soil. Water in well, then water the plants frequently until established.

congested or are dying back in the centre benefit from division.

Perennials ideal for dividing include ajuga, achillea, agapanthus, astilbe, bergenia, canna, catnip, flax, helianthus, hosta, red hot pokers, liriope, penstemon, phlox and phlomis.

TIP To give you more variety, swap divided perennials with your gardening friends.







Sow seeds

Clear beds or troughs of summer greens that have bolted to seed for a winter crop such as silverbeet.

- REMOVE the old crop, getting all the roots and any weeds.
- ADD compost to the soil and fork it in well, then make rows for sowing using a fork or trowel.
- SPRINKLE the seeds to the depth and spacing indicated on the packet. Cover seeds with soil and water in well.

eeping chooks in the backyard has become popular again in recent years as more and more of us have rediscovered the benefits of owning these feathered friends.

Chickens are great fun to have at home and they are fantastically sustainable. Not only do they lay eggs and produce manure, which can be used for composting, they also gobble up pests and snails in the garden.

Every chook needs a place they can call home, so we called up sustainability expert Charlie Bacon from Ecolicious to help us build a chicken house (ecolicious.com.au).



EXPERT SECRETS

Placid Faverolles are a French breed of chicken that make ideal pets and don't make much noise.









CARING FOR CHOOKS

Keeping chickens is a fully rewarding experience, but they do need plenty of TLC. Here's what Fionna Appleton from chooks.co.nz advises.

- **GET** three or more birds to create a new flock, never just one.
- **BUY** good-quality chook food and provide clean drinking water.
- **GIVE** new chickens a week or so to learn they have a new home before allowing them to roam free.
- TALK to your chickens when giving them a treat feed so they associate humans with good things.
- POSITION branches in the run and perches in the hen house to allow the chooks to exercise their feet and keep agile and busy. Hang a bunch of silverbeet just above their head height so they have to jump up for it.

- REPLACE dirty floor litter from under their roosts regularly and ensure laying boxes are always clean.
- TREAT the chooks for worms two or three times a year and ensure they have an area to dust-bathe to help smother mites. If needed, also treat the hen house with products such as Smite or Poultry Shield.
- **ENSURE** a constant supply of shell grit to provide the calcium they need to make good strong eggshells.
- TRIM the flight feathers of one wing of flighty birds so they can't escape to neighbours over low fences.
- **SOW** Appletons Chook Edibles in seed trays and offer them weekly as a treat. Chooks love nutritious greens.
- **PROVIDE** a shade cover. Chooks will feel protected from aerial predators.

• LIGHT SUSSEX are a heritage breed. Striking to look at in their black and white plumage, they are easy to handle and have a friendly temperament.




• PEKIN BANTAMS are small, round and cute with feathered feet. They make great pets and are great brooders, but don't expect vast quantities of eggs.



● BROWN SHAVERS are laying machines. These mostly reddish brown birds, like other hybrid commercial chooks, provide about 300 large brown eggs a year. They also rarely go broody, which can sometimes halt egg production.

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
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



Choose the material

The type of material a pot is made of will affect both the look and the portability of your herb garden.

- TERRACOTTA containers are popular, as they're practical, affordable and attractive, but they do dry out much faster than plastic pots.
- **LIMESTONE** and concrete pots make a big impact visually but are heavy and hard to move when planted up.
- PLASTIC pots are lightweight and come in a huge range of colours. As they're not porous, they hold moisture longer than concrete or terracotta.

Pots made from polyethylene and fibreglass are long lasting and waterproof, and they can also be frost-, UV- and scratch-resistant.



Using the right growing medium is vital when it comes to herbs.

Potting mix is better than garden soil, as it's designed for containers and provides just the right balance between holding water and giving good drainage.


At the nursery, you'll find various organic mixes that are

tailored to different situations, such as hanging baskets, and to different varieties, such as herbs and vegetables.

Pick a high-quality mix and look on the bag to identify various ingredients.

These can include a wetting agent to stop the mix drying out too fast, vermiculite to keep it lightweight, and a slow-release fertiliser.





Most herbs like to be kept moist, but they also need to be allowed to dry out between waterings so they're not left standing with damp roots.

A quality potting mix provides

A quality potting mix provides good drainage, while drainage holes in the base of a pot allow excess water to escape.

To make watering easy, buy a colourful watering can that's easy to find, fill and carry. Keep it out of direct sun so it lasts longer.

DESIGN TIP

GARDEN

Experiment with unusual containers such as old colanders, buckets and wicker baskets, adding drainage holes if needed.

Herbs will grow more quickly if fertilised.

Give them food

Herbs in pots should be planted in a mix containing a soluble, slow-release fertiliser and also fed regularly.

The fertiliser will contain all the necessary nutrients to promote healthy roots, flowers and leaves, while helping herbs grow into vigorous, sturdy plants.

It's also a good idea to use a liquid seaweed product at planting to lessen transplant shock, and then add it to your watering regimen. >

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MIXED HERB PLANTER

A strawberry pot makes a great mixed herb planter. Experiment with the combination of herbs and their positioning to get a look you like.

Use trailing varieties such as thyme and variegated and common oregano in the side holes, and a flowering plant with an upright habit in the top.

What you need

Large terracotta strawberry pot Potting mix Hand trowel Trailing herbs Flowering plant





Add the mix

Use a hand trowel or scoop to fill the strawberry pot with potting mix until it comes to just beneath the level of the first hole. Remove the first herb from its container and tease out the roots to loosen the mix. Gently ease the roots into the lowest hole in the pot.



Mix upright and trailing herbs in a strawberry pot.

Position the plants

Add more potting mix to the pot, firming it with your hand to cover the roots of the first herb. Fill to the level of the next hole with potting mix and add another herb. Repeat to plant the rest of the holes, leaving enough space for a plant at the top.




TIDY TIP

Stop potting mix from falling out the sides of a strawberry pot by tucking coconut fibre around each hole in the pot.

Plant the centrepiece

Add an upright flowering annual or perennial at the top of the planter as a centrepiece. Position the pot in a sunny spot, then water in well. TIP We used fanflower (Scaevola aemula), but any plant with an upright habit will work. >





HANGING HERB BALL

This mini hanging kitchen garden looks impressive but is easy to create DIY. You just join two baskets to make a ball and plant through the sides.

When choosing the herbs for the ball, think about their leaf shapes, colours and growing habits.

For this ball, a mixture of trailing and upright varieties were used, with broad-leafed herbs contrasting with plants featuring feathery foliage.

Add plants for their scent as well as form and colour, and consider using flowers for a pop of colour. Include easy-grow herbs like basil, parsley and chives for their versatile culinary value.



Combine form and function in a culinary masterpiece and hang it on a deck, patio or verandah

KEEP IT HEALTHY

SELECT a secure position to hang the ball, as it will become heavy once it has been watered.

HANG the ball in a position that receives only morning sun for 1-2 weeks until the roots are established, then move it to a sunny spot away from drying winds, as herbs love the sun.

FEED the ball fortnightly with a soluble all-purpose fertiliser to help it grow quickly.

WATER daily at the top and use a spray bottle to mist the foliage so the herb ball gets a good drink every day.










Prepare the baskets

Support a wire basket on a stand with the basket liner in position. Wet the liner so it expands, then make a series of holes with a piercing tool, forcing the fibre outwards. Protect each herb with plastic wrap, pushing them into the holes. Repeat for the second basket.



Qut the cardboard

Blend potting mix with perlite and vermiculite, then part-fill each basket. Press the mix around the roots, then position a plant through the base of the top basket. Cut out a cardboard cover for the top basket, pierce several holes in it and secure with wire.





Assemble the ball

Position the top basket on the base basket on the stand, aligning the rims to create the ball. Use wire fencing clips and pliers or twisted wire to join the baskets. For maximum strength, attach the hanging chains to the rims of both baskets.

Never attach the hooks or brackets for hanging planters or baskets to crumbling brickwork or rotting timber posts or beams.

What you need

2 metal hanging baskets
2 coconut fibre
basket liners
Perlite
Vermiculite
Potting mix
Plastic wrap
Wire
Corrugated cardboard
Hanging chain set
Selection of herbs



- APPLY a seal to porous pots to reduce moisture loss, or buy glazed ceramic pots, which are not as porous as untreated concrete, terracotta or limestone.
- BUY lightweight fibreglass or polyethylene containers so you can move the pots around a deck or patio.
- USE static or movable stands on castors to raise pots and make moving them or sweeping the floor easier.

 Ensure the pots are secure and won't move around on windy days.
- CHOOSE heavy or large pots in areas regularly exposed to strong winds, such as rooftop gardens and balconies.
- CONSIDER the scale of the container, as a huge pot will look totally out of place squeezed onto a tiny balcony.



• STAND pots on saucers to hold any excess water and stop surface staining on tiles or decking, but make sure you give the roots a chance to dry out. ◊



Camellia

The flowering queen of autumn and winter, you can find a camellia cultivar to fit almost every niche in the garden.

They are tough, undemanding plants, but give them a little TLC and you'll be rewarded with lots of blooms.

• PLANT The soil should be slightly acidic, friable and well-drained. Fork in cow manure and compost to improve it. Dig a planting hole twice as wide and as deep as the rootball.

• GROW Water regularly, especially

when hot and dry. Feed in early spring to boost growth and again in summer to encourage more flowers.

Water the ground thoroughly around a camellia before and after applying fertiliser.

• MULCH Use pea straw, lucerne hay or composted autumn leaves. Spread a 75-100mm thick layer of mulch, keeping it clear of the trunk.

There are some pretty shrubs that brighten up the winter garden.

Shrubs are essential plants, as they form the skeletal structure of a garden design and provide a permanent framework of leaf and flower forms.

They can also be used to fill the spaces between trees and low-growing annuals and perennials.

Choose shrubs that flower in different seasons so you have colour throughout the year.

Winter daphne

Daphne odora bears clusters of sweet-smelling, pink-tinged flowers.

- GROW Plant in an east-facing spot in well-drained, slightly acidic soil. Give it a monthly tonic of seaweed extract and regularly apply Yates anti-rot. It can be grown in a pot.
- HEIGHT 1.5m

Marguerite daisy

Small, shrubby *Argyranthemum* hybrids are a welcome sight in July with their colourful flowers.

- GROW Good drainage and a sunny spot is essential. Ideal for coastal gardens and can be grown in a pot. Prune lightly after flowering.
- **HEIGHT** 600-900mm

Diosma

The tiny pink flowers of diosma (Coleonema pulchellum) are borne from late winter to early spring amid narrow aromatic foliage.

Luculia

Luculia gratissima is valued for its large and perfumed pink midwinter flowerheads.

GROW Plant in a frost-free, east-facing position. In cool climates, grow luculia under the eaves of the house.

Winter honeysuckle

The small, strongly scented cream flowers of winter honeysuckle (Lonicera fragrantissima) appear from winter to spring.

- GROW A tough plant, it thrives in a sunny spot if given regular applications of water and fertiliser.
- HEIGHT 2m

Viburnum

Viburnum farreri bears clusters of pale-pink fragrant flowers on leafless branches during winter.

- GROW This deciduous shrub likes well-drained soil and a sunny position. Plant near a window or door to appreciate its scent.
- HEIGHT 3m >

Pot up colour

Growing flowering annuals in pots is a quick colour fix for winter and will certainly brighten up cold days.

Plant in window boxes and hanging baskets or fill your garden with pots of colour. And positioned by the front door, they'll be a welcoming sight.

You can mix and match annuals for bright colour combinations, and change colours with the seasons.

If you plant seedlings in autumn or winter, they flower in a few weeks.

1) REMOVE the seedling carefully from its punnet so you don't disturb the roots. Use a high-quality premium mix.

2 WATER the punnet of annuals before transplanting, then water regularly. Feed monthly with a soluble plant food.

TIP Use a plastic pot for good water retention, then use a larger, more attractive terracotta or glazed container as a sleeve.

Iceland poppy

This pretty annual bears winter and spring flowers in shades of salmon, apricot, yellow and cream.

Protect from wind and pick for indoors just before bud burst.

Calendula

These orange or yellow daisies brighten up winter days. Remove spent blooms to prolong flowering.

The flowers are edible so add them to salads or use as a garnish.

Polyanthus

A perennial that is usually grown as an annual, polyanthus comes in a variety of colours.

Pot up in shallow bowls for an enchanting look.

POSITION Sun or semi-shade

Pansy

These reliable winter flowers provide a great choice of colours. Picking the flowers encourages more blooms to grow.



Primula

Ideal for mixed plantings, choose from a variety of shades, including pink, lavender, purple or white.

Pick the finished blooms of primula to extend the show.

Scoop out

You can eat a pomegranate simply by cutting the fruit in half and scooping out the seeds with a spoon.

Roll them around in your mouth, sucking the surrounding juice sac, or aril, while you chew the seeds to release the juice.



Rich in fibre, folate, potassium and vitamins C and K, pomegranate juice is very high in antioxidants, especially polyphenols, which help protect against free radicals.

Research shows it may also reduce plaque build-up on artery walls, working in a similar way to aspirin. And studies suggest that it may help lower blood pressure.




Release the seeds

It may be a bit tricky to open and enjoy this fruit, but it's well worth the effort. A medium-sized fruit yields about one cup of seeds. They can be kept in the fridge for about a week or frozen.





1 HOLD the pomegranate in your hand, then use a sharp knife to make 4-6 cuts all around the fruit from the stem to the other end, making sure you only cut through the skin.



2 SLICE off the top to reveal the bright red seeds. Hold the fruit in both hands over a small bowl to catch any juice, then pull apart the sections using your hands.



3 TAKE a section in both hands, then push out the seeds into the bowl. Peel off any pieces of membrane that are still covering the seeds. Discard the peel and membrane.



Chilled lime cheesecake

PREPARATION TIME 30 minutes, plus 3 hours setting
COOKING TIME 5 minutes

Ingredients

2 tablespoons canola oil
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1/3 cup wholemeal plain flour
1/3 cup almond meal
600g silken tofu, drained
2/3 cup low-fat natural yoghurt
1/3 cup icing sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 tablespoon finely grated
lime zest
2 tablespoons lime juice
1 tablespoon powdered
clear gelatin
1 pomegranate

1 COMBINE the oil, brown sugar, flour and almond meal in a non-stick frying pan. Stir over medium heat for 5 minutes until golden brown.

Transfer the mixture to a plate and put in the fridge to cool.

2 PUT the tofu, yoghurt, icing sugar, vanilla extract, lime zest and lime juice in a food processor, and process until smooth.

3 POUR 2½ tablespoons cold water into a small heatproof bowl. Sprinkle with the gelatin. Leave for 1 minute until softened. Sit the bowl in a larger bowl of boiling water, then whisk until the gelatin dissolves. Stir a spoonful of the tofu mixture into the gelatin, then add to the tofu mixture. Process briefly to combine.

⚠ LAY a large sheet of baking paper over the base of an 18cm springform cake tin, then clip the side into place, leaving the excess paper sticking out of the side of the tin. Lightly oil the side. Pour in the tofu mixture, then sprinkle over the almond mixture. Refrigerate for 3 hours until set.

⑤ REMOVE the seeds from half the pomegranate. Extract the juice from the other half with a citrus squeezer.

RUN a non-serrated knife around the tin to loosen the cheesecake. Invert onto a serving plate, remove the side of the tin and peel off the paper. Spoon the pomegranate seeds over the cheesecake and drizzle with the pomegranate juice. Cut into wedges and serve immediately.







Name these trees

With their colourful autumn foliage, can you identify these trees? The answers are at the bottom of the page



The three pigments that colour foliage are chlorophyll, carotenoid and anthocyanin.

In summer, trees use sunlight to convert water and carbon dioxide into sugar, known as photosynthesis. Chlorophyll is what makes the leaves green and, as the days shorten, the trees respond to the decreasing sunlight by stopping production of it.

The carotenoid pigment then shows through, giving the leaves their yellow and orange shades.

Protective anthocyanins are also produced so the tree can recover nutrients before the leaves fall off.



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
