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





# GREEK CHIC

A Santorini-style renovation of a family house creates a luxurious feel for a modern lifestyle

hen best friends Lana Taylor, Bonnie Hindmarsh and Erin Cayless quit their corporate jobs in 2014 and decided to set up a renovating business together, for at least one of them it came like a bolt out of the blue.

'I'd been doing the same gig for almost 15 years and wanted to do something for myself. So when Bonnie suggested we renovate houses together, I was all ears,' says Lana.

With their complementary skills and a steep learning curve, the women completed five glamorous renovations and documented it all on social media.

Lana's own home would be number six, and Three Birds Renovations created a stunning modern home, with a style made for comfort, glamour and Greek Island holidays.





### Alfresco living

Apart from the primary outdoor space leading from the kitchen and lounge area, Lana's home has multiple alfresco spaces. These are treated thoughtfully and form an arc over the home to follow the trajectory of the sun.

Transforming dead space is a principle of the business, and making areas that may have been overlooked functional and beautiful.

'I had quite a large access down the side of my house, so I transformed it into a courtyard,' says Lana.

'When we have guests over, rather than everyone having to traipse through the house through the front door, I've got a side entrance with proper steps instead of the dirt and gravel that used to be there.'

### Light-filled void

The dramatic impact of the light and the stand-out statement of the staircase all come down to one thing – the void. After designing the third Three Birds Renovations house with a void, Lana immediately knew she wanted the feature in her home.

It forms the centrepiece, and Lana is so passionate about how this one design tenet can transform a home that she sacrificed the original master bedroom to fit in the void, taking the house from four to three bedrooms.

'People can struggle with losing floor space. If we'd kept four bedrooms, the house would have been darker, not open, and the stairs would have had less impact,' she says.

'It's just a different ball game and so, wherever possible, think about a void, even if you can only make it work at the entrance. It creates drama and floods the space with light.'


### **Style statement**

The entire second floor is space for Lana and her husband, Jason, and two children.

The aesthetic remains very much the same, as Lana preferred not to create kids' rooms that would only be appropriate for certain ages, or use very bright colours or certain surfaces, just because they are kids.

'I didn't want to design a house for my kids in terms of getting dark floors and dark sofas just because they won't show the dirt, as I'm not going to be happy every day. I want to wake up feeling like I'm in Santorini,' says Lana.

'We have a shoes-off rule, but I'd rather get the couches steam cleaned a few times a year than sacrifice the overall look and feel I want at home as mother of the household.'









### Adding detail

One of Lana's favourite details of the original house was a wall of pink bougainvillea, and her search for her signature style started there.

'I looked at houses with pink bougainvillea on Instagram and Pinterest and came across lots of Greek houses. My house was already a Tuscan villa style, so I thought, yes, my house can definitely take this,' she says.

'From there, it all became easy and I incorporated so much of the style, in the colour palette and the details, such as rendered bench seating.'

The children's bathroom also works within the Greek Island colour spectrum, and has a signature feature wall of glazed subway tiles. >

### Parents' domain

The top level is a private area for Lana and Jason, comprising the master bedroom, walk-in robe, bathroom, office and an outdoor terrace.

Each area is optimised to create the calm and luxurious feel Lana wanted. It's a home to feel good in, and she ensures each room achieves this end.

'The most beautiful spot in the home is my office, which is really a huge room with a beautiful table and chandelier,' she says.

'Many would have used it as a lounge room, but I work from home nearly every day and I didn't want to be spending all that time in a dingy study.

'You have to ask yourself where you want to sit when everyone else has left for work or school. I wanted to sit in the best place in the house, so it became my office.'





### **Sleeping space**

The master bedroom has the simple task of providing a comfortable place to sleep, with all other elements removed from the room and located elsewhere.

'It made sense to make the bedroom just for sleeping and walk around the corner on the carpeted landing to a walk-in robe and ensuite,' says Lana.

In the bathroom, the signature feature wall of tiles is a fish-scale mosaic that ties into the overall colour scheme and brings in an element of water.

'It's like being on holiday every day living in this house,' says Lana.

# TRANSFORM OUTDOOR SPACES

Celebrity renovator Cherie Barber reveals how to add value by improving entertaining areas and backyards

andscaping needs to be part of your plan from the get-go. The main reason to get started with the gardening is that it needs time to settle, which can happen while you get on with your interiors.

A lush lawn is the gold standard in real estate land, but don't let big-booted tradespeople trample on your hard-laid work. Get some do-not-cross tape and mark the areas not to be walked on.

Your plant selection should be tied to the style of your home. There are cottage plants and modern plants.


Cottages and weatherboard homes look great with soft heritage-style plants such as murrayas, rosemary bushes, lavenders and camellias. For modern places, think cordylines, succulents, yakkas and a whole lot more.

Timber sleepers are my number one landscaping go-to for garden

beds on a budget. Install them on their edge, not flat, to add bulk and scale to your property.

They come in treated pine, so you can spray-paint them the same colour as your house trims to make external colours work together beautifully.

If your budget allows, hardwood sleepers look a treat, especially if you've used hardwood timber elsewhere on your facade.



# Deck the front yard

This home was pretty cute already, but its awkward angles required some real strategic thought on my part. Best part of all, I had a big budget of A\$80,000 to play with. Jackpot! This meant I could move from budget to beautiful and take this facade to the next level.

This reno took me a month to complete, but what a transformation! It looks like a completely different house.

Raised, multi-tiered, rendered-brick garden beds featuring exotic tropical plants and hardwood decking edged with hardwood and wire balustrade make the space inviting and visually appealing. I added a stone feature wall at the entry for wow factor, and a set of bifold doors encourages people to wander outside. This is one of my favourites.

Sometimes I amaze myself. Other days, not so much.





# Make a connection

A double deck on this house, what a bonus! While it's all structurally fine, everything screams dowdy and drab.

There is almost no connection between the inside and the outside, and all that green shade cloth isn't making me green with envy.

The alfresco sitting area is a comedy show in itself, and the lacklustre shade sail looks like it could fall down at any moment.

There was so much junk in this yard, it was incredible. It required

a lot of hard work to clear this mess, but the result was well worth it.

I removed one of the porch balustrades and got my carpenter to build some timber steps that now create an easy flow between the inside and the yard outside. Lush green grass and plants make this an inviting and usable space.

The biggest expense in this rear transformation was the addition of structural bifold doors. That zapped A\$15,000 out of my budget.

But there was very little expense for everything else. I simply dragged out my trusty spray gun and painted the pergola roof, balustrade and house exterior, then I painted the old brown pavers with a paint roller.

My carpenter added stairs to lead people down into the yard. My tenants now love this part of the house.

Never underestimate the power of good landscaping. This house shows just how an unkempt garden is a waste of prime real estate.



# Waging war on weeds

Before your renovation starts, stockpile your newspapers. It's the poor man's, or as I like to call it, the soon-to-be-rich renovator's best gardening weapon for weed matting on a budget.

Once you've popped your plants into the garden beds, completely cover the soil with newspaper. Then put your woodchips, mulch or pebbles on top of your newspaper.

This stops weeds growing in your garden bed. There, you just got your weekends back.





A mangled lawn, a path to nowhere and a creepy old, rapidly dilapidating shed – who would want to spend time in this backyard?

Everything looks very neglected and in need of repair. It's certainly not somewhere I'd want to have a barbecue or let kids play.

This was a low-budget reno, so I added a simple timber deck to help people transition from the inside to the outside. It also creates a neat area for entertaining and relaxing outdoors.

We also demolished the shed out the back, which wasn't going to last too much longer anyway.

The backyard now looks so much bigger. New turf and the freshly spray-painted fences help make this home's outdoor area great again.







It's a space that people can see themselves in and it also heightens the sanctuary element of your home, which helps people make that all-important emotional connection to your place.

Even something like a gorgeous potted urn by your front door can make a world of difference.

# RETRO REVAMP

Add designer style to your interior by transforming vintage furniture

urniture from days gone by often ends up on the roadside as homeowners replace retro relics with modern pieces.

But with just a few DIY tricks, it's easy to turn a dated table or old chair into a stunning contemporary conversation starter in just a weekend.

Items that are in good condition can benefit from the transformative power of paint, which can also be used to conceal damaged or faded timber and give them a fresh new look.

### Hall table transformation

Blogger Melissa Darr had this piece of furniture under her house for years and thought it time to give it a makeover.

'If you feel like a piece of furniture won't work in your home because of its design or colouring, revamping it to suit your current decor is a great way to recycle and relove it,' says Melissa.

Melissa restained the top in walnut and painted the base in blue using Dulux Harpoon. To finish, she installed new polished brass knobs.



# EXPERT SECRETS

Use a colour reducer with stain to give a lighter, more subtle shade when applying to bare wood.









### Prepare the surface

Remove the knobs from the drawers. Using an orbital sander and 80 grit paper, sand the top back to bare wood. Smooth with 120 and 240 grit paper. Wipe off dust. Apply the stain and wipe with a lint-free rag after a few minutes.



### Paint the base

Tape newspaper to the top to protect it. Lightly sand the base, then paint with a stain blocker undercoat. Apply two coats of the blue top coat, allowing to dry in between coats. Apply varnish. To finish, add new drawer knobs.

# GO WITH THE FLOW

A dark and disconnected kitchen becomes a modern alfresco space



A functional and flowing alfresco area is top of the renovating hit list, and while there are standard inclusions, often the possibilities exceed your best hopes.

The owners of this older-style home found that their backyard was hugely underused, as it had little connection to the kitchen and dining area, and the laundry had pride of place.

Architect Justin Loe designed a space that worked right up to the boundary. While the addition is only 1.5 x 1.5m, the whole function, look and feel was transformed.









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Appliances are integrated or concealed to free up space and create a streamlined look

#### **Material mixture**

There is one school of thought that says materials should run on over junctions to create a seamless flow.

But there is another approach that uses whatever material is completely relevant for the particular place it inhabits and the function it serves.

This technique is one that Justin used to great effect in this space,

mixing hardwood, polished concrete, steel and glass, with polyurethane and Corian. One wall is raw fibre cement sheet and gets lots of compliments.

Another element that worked surprisingly well was the black ceiling over the dining area.

'We added a black ceiling fan and strip lighting, and it's become a standout feature,' says Justin.

Hidden storage
A pantry and an appliances cabinet with an inbuilt benchtop are concealed behind a wall of storage cupboards.

The laundry was relocated, as it was taking up prime space. On one side of the integrated fridge, a concealed door leads down a passageway to provide easy access to the new laundry.





#### **Refashioned deck**

The old raised deck was never used and felt out of place.

'It had become a maintenance issue and was causing a lot more work than its use value. It had no connection to anything,' says Justin.

A new deck was laid, continuing the grey and black colour palette. Extending the steel framing further connects the two spaces, with the shift in zone determined by the flooring and the open space overhead.


'A modern addition should address how we live. This achieves that in terms of sustainability, open-plan living and alfresco entertaining,' he says. •

#### **Pool position**

The elegant pool deck on page 40 embraces a new trend of separating the entertaining space from the house.

'The owners really wanted to focus everything around the pool, and the pool isn't directly off the house,' says landscaper Matt Seymour.

'It's a large block of land, so making a dedicated entertaining space, rather than having some people around the house and some at the pool, made sense to them.'

A floating deck at a water-side site requires extra engineering and the

timber will need more maintenance, but a multi-level deck like the one above is a more work-intensive project.

A pool right next to the house turns practical step elements into a visual aesthetic and adds dimension to the flat structure of the pool.

'You need to work out all the level changes very precisely in the planning for a well-resolved finish,' says Matt.

#### **Small wonder**

The backyard space in this inner-west home in Sydney was an almost unusable collection of broken rocks, scrubby soil and overgrown weeds.

Tasked with creating a usable and multifunctional backyard for the new owners, former interior designer Judith Treanor applied simple logic.

'It's quite a small space, and often this means ease of planning because of the natural limitations,' she says.

The property flanks a busy main road, so the feeling had to be

peaceful and tranquil to counteract it. Guided by one redeemable feature, a frangipani tree, a paved area leading from the back door was preferred.

A small deck replaced the former site of an old shed.

'The slab was there so we laid decking over the top of it and made another functional space.'

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Spa solution

Landscape designer Ben Kingsnorth faced a big challenge on a very steep site backing onto bushland. He had to create as much usable area as possible, where possible.

'This is absolutely the place to use decking because you can cantilever it out as far as the site will allow, and ultimately maximise the flat space,' says Ben.

The previous owners had bought the spa and set it on a concrete slab.

'It looked very out of place, but the new owners wanted to keep it, because if you are ever going to have a spa, the place to do it is on a hill overlooking bushland,' says Ben.

'I used the surrounding decking design to integrate it into the space and provide a flat surface from which to walk from the house and step down into the spa.'

A balustrade provides a safety element without blocking views. >

#### Ocean view

High up on a hill with spectacular ocean views on one side and over open country on the other, these outdoor areas have one important purpose – to provide spaces that meld into the surroundings.

'In this design, both client and architect sought to acknowledge the special qualities of the land and its relationship to the new home,' says architect Charissa Snijders.

'It was important to the client that they create a home that sat quietly and sympathetically with the land. They also wanted it to respond to its wildness, particularly the wind.'

Framing the view and protection from the elements drove the design of this stunning deck.

It can be open to the sea and sun during summer, but still act as a seamless extension of the house during the cooler months.

#### **Pool planning**

In this project, designer Sue Coles used decking to start the transition to a pool that was in the planning stage.

'This was a renovation extension and the deck connects the indoors to the outdoors by running flush with the floor level,' says Sue.

It is one of two decks. It gets full sun while the deck on the western side captures afternoon sun.

#### Sunny villa

Architect Darren Jessop was tasked with doubling the internal space of this New Zealand villa and maximising the utility of the large outdoor areas.

'We installed a deck to make an outdoor room that links the bedrooms and the living spaces. It forms a kind of centre that is open to the north sun in summer and is shielded from the elements in winter,' he says.


Go for products that suit your site and budget when building a deck

t wasn't too long ago that when you had to decide what to use to lay decking, the choice was between treated pine or hardwood.

There are now composite decking materials in a variety of colours that will give you further design options.

The choice isn't just limited to boards, with a thermoplastic product





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ELW148SI









Timber boards are the conventional decking choice. They range in size typically from narrow 88mm boards to wide 140mm boards.

Manufactured boards are a more modern choice, with technological advances making them very durable and resistant to rot.



Hardwood

Hardwood has a naturally long life when it is well maintained.

DIY TIP

Predrill nail or screw holes that are located within 30mm of the end of the decking board to avoid splitting the timber.

Kwila, with its warm orange-red hues, is usually oiled or sealed with clear products to accentuate its natural colour.

Hardwood is heavier and more difficult to work with than pine and usually requires predrilling before nailing or screwing. >

**Treated pine** 

Pine decking has long been the go-to choice for decking among builders and homeowners. It's lightweight and easy to work with and the timber treatment extends the timber's life. It is also about half the price of hardwoods.

It can be stained or painted any colour of your choice.

Composite boards come in a variety of colours. ekologix.co.nz

These high-tech decking products are made from recycled plastic, reclaimed wood-fibre products, bamboo or even rice husks.

Durable with a wood-like texture, they don't need painting or sealing and come in a range of colours similar to traditional timbers or popular finishes.

Composite products are very easy to work with using conventional power tools, and are often secured with a hidden fastener system.

They are one of the more expensive options, but are cost-effective in the long-term due to their long life span and fewer maintenance needs. >

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

#### LAY TIMBER DECKING BOARDS




#### **1** Position and cut boards

Lay five rows at a time with 50mm overhang at each end, overlapping the joints at the nearest joist. Use a combination square to mark a line on the boards showing the joist positions, then cut to length with a mitresaw.



#### **4** Secure the screws

Use a drill and 2mm combination countersink bit to make pilot holes at the marks, drilling only through the board if the joists are treated pine.
Use a square drive bit to secure screws, adjusting the torque clutch as needed.



#### Mark joist centrelines

Check the board joints are square and centred over the joists, then position a straightedge or spirit level across the boards at the centre of each joist. Mark centrelines across the decking boards using a pencil.



#### **6** Check the alignment

Position a stringline along the complete length of a row every five rows to check the boards are straight, adjusting if needed and using a chisel to prise the gaps slightly further open or closed as needed for even spacing.



#### **8** Mark screw positions

Use a 40mm square offcut as a spacer to mark across the line to show drilling points. Make narrow wedges 100mm long using a mitresaw, then tap them between the boards at every second joist to keep the gaps even.



#### **6** Trim the board ends


Mark a cut line on the end of the boards, leaving a 20mm overhang. Cut using a circular saw and round over with 120 grit sandpaper.

**TIP** Use a handsaw to cut the last board where the circular saw won't reach.



# Quality that outshines other woodstains

# FASTER DECKS

There are options that can make building a deck fast and easy for even the DIY-challenged.

The most complex part of a deck is building the subframe – the bearers, joists and footings or posts. There are now systems available that remove that hassle, delivering a project that just screws together.

#### **Footings**

An alternative to concrete footings is a thermoplastic product called TuffBlock. Designed to take a post or bearer, each TuffBlock can support up to 770kg.

They eliminate the need to dig holes for concrete footings, as they distribute weight over a wide surface area. This minimises the time and effort involved in excavation and waiting for concrete to set. •

#### Season new timber

A natural weathering process, timber seasoning takes 3-6 months, during which time tannins are released.

If timber is coated before it is fully seasoned, the coating will break down prematurely and the boards will become discoloured and stained.

You can accelerate the weathering process in just a single day using Cabot's New Timber Prep, \$59 for 4L (cabots.co.nz).

It works by drawing tannins to the surface of the timber in 15-20 minutes to prepare for cleaning and coating.







Before applying a new coating or reapplying an old finish to a deck, the timber boards need to be clean and free from dirt. This allows the new coating to penetrate the timber.

As well as removing grime, deck cleaners also brighten and rejuvenate weathered timber in preparation for being recoated.

Always hose down the deck thoroughly to remove surface dirt before applying a cleaner.

# Choose the right coating

Stains and finishes can be water- or oil-based. What you select is largely a matter of personal preference.

Water-based finishes have good colour retention, are odour free, nonflammable and easy to clean. Try Cabot's Water Based Deck & Exterior Timber Stain, \$76 for 5L (cabots.co.nz).

Oil-based finishes highlight the grain of the timber and penetrate deeper into the timber, providing greater durability. Try Cabot's Deck & Exterior Stain Oil Based, \$74.50 for 5L.







# Avoid mixing coatings

When recoating a deck, it's best to use the same type of coating that was most recently applied.

An oil-based coating applied to a deck with a water-based coating won't properly adhere to the timber, and vice versa.

If you want to change coating systems, you will need to strip the existing coating back to bare timber before recoating, which can be a time-consuming process.

# Recoat every 12 months

A year of rain, beating sun and foot traffic can lead to wear and tear on your deck's protective coating.

Without this essential defence against the elements, boards can start to deteriorate.

To avoid having to replace damaged timber, it's best to clean and recoat your deck every year.

Choose a day when the weather is cool and overcast rather than hot, sunny or windy. >



#### Applying a stain

After years of withstanding heavy foot traffic and harsh elements, this timber deck had lost its sheen.

The boards were in need of a deep clean and a few coats of timber stain to give the deck a rich and glossy look.

First, the boards were sprayed with a pressure washer to remove any dirt, debris and leaves. While still wet, they were scrubbed using a mild detergent and a long-handled brush for a deep clean.

To finish, two coats of a teak timber decking stain were applied, revitalising the deck and protecting it from future wear and tear.


To ensure your stained deck stays in the best condition, refinish it every year.



Use a quality stain, which will withstand the elements and won't fade when exposed to sunlight







Rinse the boards using a pressure washer to remove any surface dust and grime. Use a fan spray to clean the deck rather than blasting it, making sure not to be too aggressive with the pressure washer.



#### Scrub the boards

While the deck is still wet, scrub it thoroughly using a deck cleaner and a long-handled scrubbing brush, cleaning the boards of any stubborn patches of mud or dirt. Rinse off the cleaner, then allow to dry.



#### Apply the stain

Finish the boards with two coats of a timber stain, using a decking brush to spread the stain evenly all over the deck. Allow at least two hours between coats. Avoid staining the boards in hot and windy conditions.

# **COPPER BATHROOM** LADDER

Add hanging space in the bathroom with this stylish metal rack for towels

veryone could do with more hanging space in the bathroom, particularly for towels.

This easy-to-follow guide shows you all the steps and some handy hints to make your own stylish copper ladder for hanging your bath towels.

Once you've decided on the size of the copper ladder, mark out the lengths on the copper pipe.

For this project, we cut 34in straight copper pipe to make five 500mm ladder rungs, eight 300mm ladder verticals, four 150mm top and base ends, and four 80mm wall offsets.

The joins include four 19mm round flanges used for the wall fittings, 10 20mm copper tees to join the straight pieces, and four 20mm 90° copper elbows to attach the wall offsets.




#### Brighten up unused wall space in the bathroom with a copper towel rail



#### Cut the pipe

Measure and mark the pipe lengths, then cut with a pipe cutter, which gives a cleaner cut, or use a hacksaw. Clamp the pipe cutter onto the pipe. Rotate it around the pipe. Tighten the cutter and repeat until the pipe is cut.



#### Attach the tees

Sand the pipe ends smooth, then clean them using metal polish and a rag to ensure the fittings will attach securely. Secure the copper tees with epoxy adhesive to the ends of the eight ladder verticals. Wipe off excess glue.



Make the pipes sit securely in the 19mm flange wall fittings by flaring the four ends of the 80mm wall offsets using a flaring tool and hammer. Paint the wall fittings with etch primer and black enamel paint for an industrial look.








#### 4 Attach wall fittings

Support the wall offset in an inverted disposable cup with a hole in its base. Apply adhesive to the flared pipe end and slide a wall fitting on the end. Let it rest on the cup. Allow adhesive to dry. Repeat for other fittings.



#### Join the rungs

Using epoxy adhesive, attach the four 150mm top and base ends to the verticals, then attach the elbow fittings. Insert rungs into the tees on both vertical sides, wiping off excess adhesive. Push together for a parallel fit.



#### **6** Secure the ladder

Attach the four wall assemblies to the elbow pieces with adhesive, ensuring they are at a 90° angle to the verticals. Clean the pipes with metal polish and a soft rag. Secure the ladder using wall anchors and screws in the wall fittings.





olidays away should be a time for relaxing, but it can be hard if you're worrying about thieves breaking into your home.

More than 80,000 burglaries occur each year in New Zealand, many of them when home owners are absent for long periods.

Thieves are mostly after cash, laptops, jewellery, cameras, mobile phones, wallets, handbags, TVs,

computer games, watches, power tools, DVD players, stereo gear, credit cards and other ID documents.

There are many ways to protect your home against thieves, to make it less of a target for them and limit the damage if they do get inside.

These include installing grilles, screens, locks and alarms, as well as cameras that allow you to monitor your property on your smartphone.

#### Locks

The first line of defence against robberies is installing strong locks on your doors and windows.

Deadlocks fitted to doors not only prevent thieves from getting in, but also stop them carrying off large items, such as flat screen TVs, if they enter through a window.

Deadlocks, or deadbolts, are operated either mechanically with a key or electronically with a code, or both. Bluetooth deadlocks can be operated by your mobile phone.

Most locks are easy to install on existing doors and windows.

You should also fit strong latches on side gates and install a lock on your meter box to stop thieves turning off the power to alarm systems.

- ✓ Lock away cash, keys, valuables, tools and ladders.
- Cancel newspapers and mail delivery.
- Lock up the garage and shed.
- Mow the lawn before leaving.
- Make sure window and door locks and alarms are working.



## **Cameras**

Alarm systems often come with security cameras that let you monitor their video surveillance 24 hours a day.

These include a digital video recorder and an app so you can view your footage remotely from your smartphone or computer.

You can also install cheap fake cameras, but these won't fool seasoned burglars. Avoid fake cameras with a flashing red light as well, as real cameras don't have flashing lights.

Cameras should be positioned near vulnerable doors and windows.

Some systems include multiple cameras to cover your entire property, and can operate with 4K resolution, even in night vision. Different camera views can be monitored at the same time on your computer.

### **Alarms**

Once your home has been robbed, statistics show that it is more likely to get burgled a second time.

This is because the thieves know the layout of your home and that you have to restock with new items to replace the ones they stole.

Installing alarms is a good back-up against this. Thieves hate noise. Alarms may not stop a smash-and-grab theft, but they'll deter a planned operation.

Alarms work by sensor and include wireless sirens as well as window and door alarms that work off any movement or breakage.

Battery-operated gate alarms also protect your yard from intruders. >

# Lights

An effective deterrent against intruders at night is motion-sensing lighting, which is cheap and easy to install.

You can buy individual LED spotlights with their own sensor or motion sensors that link up to your existing external lights and become inactive during daylight.

Sensor lights attached near entry points around your home will usually scare off intruders or, at least, alert neighbours to suspicious visitors.

A device that makes it appear you're home when you're not is a timer. Plug it into a power point and it will turn on a lamp at the times you set. >



# SUMMER SIZZLERS

Fire up the barbie and cook up a feast with these barbecue recipes

or many New Zealanders, 'low and slow' is a new style of cooking, but it's a great opportunity to combine the things we already love, such as meat, seafood, vegies, socialising and barbecues, in a novel and rewarding way.

Ideally, it is carried out on a charcoal-burning barbie or smoker. The charcoal, smoke and leisurely pace of cooking combine to impart a flavour you can't quite get in any other way.

Equipment can be costly and complicated, but fear not. It's entirely

possible to cook this way using a kettle barbecue or even a gas burner.

These recipes have been designed to work in a variety of barbecues because most people already have one or the other at home.

Once you're hooked, you may want to explore and invest more.

You'll never find yourself short of options. A quick browse on the internet will uncover dozens of alternative cooking methods, tricks, and tips, as well as a vast array of specialised equipment.



# With any type of meat, resting off the heat after cooking is desirable to ensure a tender meal



This is an edited extract from The BBQ Cookbook (ABC Books, A\$35). Inspired by the movie, The BBQ, it features more than 80 recipes and tips, including what gear you need and cooking to temperature, not time.

It also offers the latest in grilling trends and techniques, such as mastering the US-style 'low and slow' barbecuing method.

## Moroccan butterflied lamb leg

PREP TIME 10 minutes, plus 1 hour marinating and 30 minutes standing COOKING TIME 30 minutes

#### **Ingredients**

- 2 tablespoons olive oil, plus extra for brushing
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 2 teaspoons finely grated fresh ginger
- 3 teaspoons ground cumin
- 3 teaspoons ground coriander
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1.8kg butterflied leg of lamb Barbecued flatbread, to serve
- **COMBINE** the oil, garlic, ginger and spices in a shallow dish. Add the lamb and turn to coat in the marinade, rubbing it into the meat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour, or overnight. Remove from the fridge about 30 minutes before cooking and stand at room temperature.
- **2 PREPARE** the barbecue for two-zone cooking and preheat to 190°C. Place a drip tray on the side without coals and add water. Put the cooking grate in position and wipe with oil.
- **3 SEAR** the lamb directly over the coals with the lid down for 5 minutes on each side, then move to the indirect cooking side. Cover the barbecue and reduce the heat to 160°C. Cook for 20 minutes or until the meat temperature reaches 55°C at the thickest part.
- 4 TRANSFER the meat to a board and cover with foil. Rest for 15 minutes. Slice and serve with the flatbread.

  TIP Butterflying lamb makes it cook
- TIP Butterflying lamb makes it cook faster. As the thickness varies, some parts will be medium-rare, others well done, with plenty in between.



## Char siu pork

PREP TIME 10 minutes, plus 1 hour marinating and 20 minutes standing **COOKING TIME** 6 minutes

#### **Ingredients**

1/2 cup hoisin sauce 1/3 cup soy sauce 2 tablespoons oyster sauce 2 tablespoons rice wine vinegar 2 tablespoons brown sugar 2 teaspoons sesame oil 11/2 teaspoons Chinese five-spice powder 8 boneless pork spare ribs, about 1.3kg in total 2 tablespoons vegetable oil

- **① COMBINE** the hoisin sauce, soy sauce, oyster sauce, vinegar, sugar, sesame oil and five-spice in a shallow non-reactive dish. Add the pork and turn to coat. Cover and marinate in the fridge for 1 hour, or overnight.
- **2 TAKE** the pork from the fridge about 20 minutes before cooking. Meanwhile, prepare the barbecue for direct cooking and preheat to medium.
- **3 REMOVE** the pork from the marinade and pour the marinade into a small saucepan. Pat the pork dry with paper towel, then brush with the oil.
- **4 COOK** the pork on the grill for 3 minutes on each side, then transfer to a plate to rest.
- **S BRING** the marinade to the boil. Reduce the heat slightly and cook for 5 minutes or until thick and glossy.
- 6 BRUSH the glaze over the pork and sprinkle with the spring onion. Serve with steamed jasmine rice.
- TIP After raw meat has been sitting in it, a marinade is only safe to serve with cooked meat once it's been thoroughly boiled, to kill off any bacteria. >



## BBQ buffalo chicken wings

PREP TIME 20 minutes, plus 4 hours marinating and 20 minutes standing COOKING TIME About 40 minutes

#### **Ingredients**

1.5kg chicken wings 125g butter, chopped 2 tablespoons chilli sauce Vegetable oil, for brushing

#### **DIPPING SAUCE**

120g soft blue cheese
1/4 cup sour cream
1/4 cup buttermilk
1/4 cup good-quality whole-egg
mayonnaise
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon chopped chives
Salt and pepper

- **1 CUT** the wing tip sections from the wings, if present, and discard. Cut the wings into two portions through the joint and place in a shallow non-reactive dish.
- combine the butter and chilli sauce in a small saucepan and stir over a medium heat until melted and combined. Cool slightly, then drizzle half the mixture over the wings and toss to coat thoroughly. Cover and marinate in the fridge for 4 hours, or overnight. Refrigerate the remaining butter mixture until needed.
- **3 TAKE** the chicken from the fridge about 20 minutes before cooking.
- 4 PREPARE the barbecue for indirect cooking and preheat to 180°C. Add a few soaked woodchips to the coals and add water to the drip tray. Put the cooking grate in place and wipe with oil. Place the wings on the grill, over

the drip tray. Cover the barbecue and cook for 20 minutes.

- **S RE-MELT** the remaining butter mixture and brush over the wings. Cover and cook for another 15 minutes.
- **OUNCOVER** the barbecue and slide the wings over the coals for a few minutes to char slightly. Move and turn as needed so they colour evenly. Transfer the wings to a tray and cover loosely with foil. Rest for 10 minutes.
- MAKE the dipping sauce by either combining all the ingredients, except the chives, in a small food processor, or mashing the cheese and adding the remaining ingredients a little at a time, mixing with a fork until almost smooth and evenly combined. Stir in the chives and season to taste.
- TIP Use regular chilli sauce, not sweet chilli sauce, which will make the wings burn on the barbecue.





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

# BUILD A TIMBER CHAIR



#### Assemble the seat base

Measure and cut the timber. For the seat base, secure the front piece to the sides, then attach the seat supports to the sides with adhesive and screws. If needed, raise or lower the seat supports slightly so that the space above them matches the 18mm thickness of the slats.



#### **4** Attach the legs

Turn the chair assembly on its side and clamp the legs to the seat and back. Repeat for the other two legs. Turn the chair right side up and check the legs for plumb and the seat for level. Drill clearance holes and secure the legs to the chair with bolts, avoiding the position of the slats.



#### Prepare back supports

Secure the back supports to the back sides with adhesive and screws, keeping the square ends flush. The angles at the ends should be parallel. Position the back supports to match the thickness of the back slats. Position the sides and secure them with one screw each at the base into the seat sides.



#### **5** Nail on the slats

Measure the inside width of the chair and cut a test slat for a good fit. Secure the end slats to the base edge of the seat supports using screws. Space the other slats 10mm apart and nail in position. Turn the chair over to secure the back slats, starting with the end slat.



#### Bolt on the back


Secure the back top to the top of the back sides using screws. Secure the back to the seat sides, then drill two bolt holes each through the seat sides and the back supports. Insert galvanised bolts and fit washers before tightening the nuts using a socket wrench.




#### **6** Attach the arms

Position one arm, mark the angle of the back on its edge and cut the rebate into the arm. Repeat for second arm, then secure both arms. Sand the corners and sharp edges to prevent splinters. Cover screw heads with timber filler. Sand the entire chair with 120 grit paper. Apply exterior finish.


#### Cut the pieces

Cut the seat slats, short leg slats and long leg slats. On a long leg slat, clamp a 90 x 42mm template. Drill guide holes in it using a 35mm spade bit. Use the guide holes to drill two holes in the long leg slat, using a 22mm spade bit for a rod and a 35mm bit for a cap.



#### Make the legs

Use the template to make holes in all the long leg slats, then align leg slats for each leg, alternating long and short slats. Apply adhesive to the sides of the pieces and clamp them together. Insert rods in holes and leave to dry. Remove excess adhesive. Repeat for the seat top.



#### **(3)** Assemble the bench


Lay the seat flat and insert the leg slats into the gaps in the seats. Use a rubber mallet to tap them into place. Cut the rods to length and insert them into the holes. Place caps on the rod ends. Sand the timber smooth and finish with paint, stain or fibreglass resin.

Rejuvenate the soil

Not only is a healthy soil the key to good gardening, but it will also hold water for longer periods to help plants battle the heat while you're away.

To keep your soil in good shape, add conditioners such as organic matter at least once a year. Add a layer of compost or chicken or cow manure before adding mulch.

If mulching for the first time or your mulch has finished, lightly rake the soil, then sprinkle with a soil wetting agent. This helps improve the penetration of water into the soil.

You can choose from inorganic or organic mulch. Organic mulches can include lucerne hay, bark and pea straw.

Inorganic mulches such as gravel, scoria and pebbles suit succulent beds.

- OWATER the soil before adding mulch.
- LAY the mulch about 75mm thick. If too thick, it will prevent water getting to the plant's roots if watering or rainfall has been inadequate. Ensure that the mulch is clear of tree trunks to prevent fungus or rot developing.
- WATER again after mulch is laid.

# Install a watering system

Watering systems apply water directly into the soil and they can be installed easily DIY.

You can choose from the typical irrigation system that uses black poly pipe in which various sprinkler heads or nozzles are plugged, or a drip system that has a series of holes in the pipe that release a set volume of water every hour.



# Fit digital timers

These timers are the ideal way to ensure your garden is watered regularly while you are on holiday.

Whether you're running a sprinkler or have an irrigation system, you simply attach them to your tap and program them to turn on and off on set days of the week for a determined length of time.

## **Grow waterwise plants**

If you spend summer trying to keep plants alive, maybe now is the time to rethink your garden by choosing plants with a good drought tolerance.

Check plant labels, as nurseries often mark plants as waterwise, but shrubs with small, hairy and silver or grey green leaves such as dusty miller (*Senecio cineraria*) and the curry plant (*Helichrysum italicum*) are water efficient, as are plants with waxy leaves such as bergenia. Others include:

• ANNUALS Portulaca, strawflower, cockscomb, alyssum, bedding begonia, dianthus, verbena, salvia and hollyhock.

• PERENNIALS Agapanthus, dietes, gazania, bird of paradise, catmint, red hot poker, kangaroo paw, liriope, snow in summer, clivia, acanthus, erigeron, convolvulus, euphorbia, sedum, lamb's ear, lomandra, salvia and bergenia.

• SHRUBS Nandina, plumbago, grevillea, abelia, Japanese quince, Indian hawthorn cultivars, westringia, yucca, hebe, echium and callistemon.

**○ POT PLANTS** Succulents, aspidistra, baby bougainvillea, bromeliad, lavender, rosemary, sansevieria, flax, ponytail palm, bird's nest fern, geranium and yucca. **◊**

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# PROPAGATE YOUR PLANTS


Boost your plant supply by taking cuttings and collecting seeds

Plants aren't cheap and starting or improving a garden can be economically daunting. But unless you want an instant garden, there are certain tasks that you can undertake to help the budget.

Taking cuttings and collecting and saving seeds is an effective money-saving strategy and one that is carried out during summer.

Watching the cuttings you've lovingly nurtured and the seeds you've collected grow into mature plants will increase your gardening knowledge. Here, we show you how.





# TAKING CUTTINGS

Summer and autumn are the seasons to take herbaceous and semi-ripe cuttings. Propagate immediately or store the cuttings in large polythene bags in the fridge or a cool, shady spot.





Semi-ripe, or semi-hardwood, cuttings are taken from hardened spring growth. Take cuttings in the morning when the stems are swollen with moisture.

These plants are all ideal, but you can give anything a go.

O WHAT TO PROPAGATE Abelia, azalea, bay, bottlebrush, begonia, box, fuchsia, camellia, gardenia, Geraldton wax, grevillea, hibiscus, lavender, lillypilly, mint bush, murraya, pelargonium, New Guinea impatiens, plumbago, photinia rosemary, roses and westringia.

# HERBACEOUS CUTTINGS

The soft new growth of herbaceous plants such as pelargonium, coleus and cane begonia grow roots in water. Roots usually appear in about 10-14 days.



1 TAKE 75-100mm long cuttings from new growth, with the base cut just below a node and with at least three nodes on the stem. A node is where the leaves join the stem.



2 REMOVE the leaves, leaving 2-3 at the top. Put in a glass of water, then pot up or plant in a bed when roots form. Water with a seaweed solution. Keep moist until new growth appears.



TAKE THE CUTTINGS Choose stems from wood that has been growing for a couple of months and that snaps easily when bent.



10 FILL a 100mm pot with a premium propagating mix. Using secateurs, cut 4-5 healthy stems 100-150mm long with at least three nodes, cutting just below a pair of nodes.



2 REMOVE the leaves, leaving 2-3 at the top. Dip into a cutting powder. Make holes, then insert the cuttings by at least half their length. Firm the mix around the stems.

# **GROW TIP**

Always take cutting material in the early part of the day, when the stems have become swollen with moisture.

## **Humidity help**

Semi-ripe cuttings need humidity to root. You can make a mini greenhouse by inserting small bamboo stakes around the edge of the pot and covering it with clear plastic, ensuring the plastic doesn't touch the plants.

Or cut large, clear soft drink bottles in half and upend these over the cuttings.

You can buy mini greenhouses that provide perfect humidity for cuttings or make one by placing the pot of cuttings in a wooden or polystyrene foam box and covering the box with a piece of glass.

It's easy to increase your supply of succulents by taking leaf or stem cuttings, and planting offsets that are produced by the mother plant.

# Leaf cuttings

Many succulents, such as gasteria, sedum, pachyphytum, graptopetalum and echeveria, can be grown easily from leaf cuttings.

- o **REMOVE** the leaves from the stem so they come away cleanly with an almost-sealed end. Stand upright in a shallow tray filled with a coarse mix of one part potting mix to one part river sand. Place the tray in a warm, semi-shaded position.
- WAIT until young plants form at the base of each leaf in a few weeks. When they've used up the nutrients provided by the leaf, transplant into a potting mix formulated for succulents.



# Stem cuttings

Aeoniums, cotyledons and kalanchoes propagate easily from stem cuttings.

- REMOVE the stem from the parent plant with secateurs and place in a shady spot for about a week so the stem can form a callus, which helps prevent rot.
- PLANT in a pot using a potting mix formulated for succulents or directly into the ground.



## Plant offsets

Offsets are small plants that develop from the parent plant of echeverias, aloes, agaves and sempervivums. These can be detached and replanted.

- REMOVE the parent plant and offsets from the pot or ground. Pull the offsets from the parent plant or cut off with secateurs.
- PLANT the offsets in a pot using a new potting mix formulated for succulents. Or plant into the ground.



# ROSE CUTTINGS

If you have a favourite rose or have been admiring a neighbour's, then you can easily replicate it with cuttings. Take the cuttings from April to July from the current season's growth.



1 TAKE 2-3 cuttings 250mm long with at least three leaf sets on the stem, cutting above a bud at the top and below a bud at the base.

Remove the leaves, leaving 1-2 at the top. Dip into cutting powder.



2 PLANT in a 150mm pot filled with propagating mix. Keep moist in a shady spot. In late spring, pull the cuttings. If there is resistance, roots have formed. Transplant to a larger pot and plant next winter.







# GROW SUMMER HIERS

Plant these edibles in garden beds and pots to enhance your cooking

erbs are a cook's best friend and they're easy to grow during summer, so make sure you plant a few favourite varieties.

There is nothing better than having fresh herbs at hand to flavour summer barbecues and salads.

You can grow herbs in a garden of any size. Scatter them among other

plants, grow them in a vegie patch or give them their own bed near the kitchen door to make harvesting easy. Herbs also lend themselves particularly well to growing in pots.

Picking them regularly encourages branching and new autumn growth.

Here's a selection of annual and perennial herbs to plant. >

# PERENNIALS

Most perennial herbs are evergreen, so you can harvest the leaves all year. It's worth preserving some to use in winter when growth is slow.

• HOW TO GROW Plant perennial herbs in full sun in well-drained soil that's enriched with compost or cow manure. Water regularly and feed with a three-month controlled-release fertiliser in spring and summer.



## Chives

Plant seedlings or sow seeds in summer and early autumn. Chives grow in clumps, which can be divided every third year in early spring to avoid overcrowding.

Use the leaves fresh or chop and freeze them. The flowers make a great garnish and have a mild onion flavour.

- ADD the leaves to scrambled eggs, omelettes and quiches.
- SPRINKLE over barbecued fish.
- USE to flavour tomato sauces.



This herb likes more moisture than most other perennial herbs, and has small oval leaves and white flowers.

Prune off the flower heads as soon as they appear to maintain a good supply of leaves.

Pick the leaves as needed and use fresh, or freeze or dry them.
Use the flowers as a garnish.

ADD to meat and pasta dishes.SPRINKLE the leaves on pizzas.





The leaves of this spreading herb taste similar to marjoram.

Trim back spent flower heads to encourage more leaves. Pick the leaves in summer for drying and to promote growth in autumn.

Use the leaves fresh, or freeze or dry them and flavour food with the flowers or use as a garnish.

- SPRINKLE the leaves on pizzas.
- O ADD to tomato and pasta dishes.
- OUSE in soups and stews.



### Mint

There are many types of mint with a variety of flavours. Mint is a thirsty perennial herb, so plant it in a damp spot or grow in a pot standing in a saucer of water. It can be grown in semi-shade.

Use the leaves fresh, or freeze or dry them.

- OADD the leaves to potato salad.
- USE in Asian dishes.
- SPRINKLE on fruit salads and summer drinks.





## Rosemary

This shrub grows to about 1.5m, but it can be pruned lower, and there are groundcover varieties. It likes a slightly alkaline soil and is very drought tolerant.

Use the leaves fresh, or freeze or dry them. The flowers can be used as a garnish.

- SPRINKLE over oven-roasted vegetables or tomatoes.
- TEAM with lamb and other meat.
- O ADD to tomato soup.
- USE rosemary for stuffings.

Plant annual herbs such as basil, dill and parsley to enhance salads.

O HOW TO GROW Treat annual herbs as you would salad vegetables and give them lots of food and water.

Before planting, dig in compost or cow manure to enrich the soil, then water regularly and feed fortnightly with a soluble complete plant food to encourage new leaves.

## Basil

There are many types of basil available. Plant seedlings now in a sunny position for leaves until the cool weather arrives. Remove the flower heads to encourage more leaves.

Use the leaves fresh, or chop and freeze them.

- ADD to a goat's cheese frittata.
- USE Thai or lemon basil in Asian cooking.
- COMBINE with bocconcini and cherry tomatoes for a salad.

With its feathery leaves and yellow flower heads, dill attracts beneficial insects into the garden.

Sow from seed or plant seedlings in a sunny or lightly shaded position.

Use the bittersweet-tasting leaves fresh from the garden.

- PARTNER dill with seafood.
- ADD the leaves to quiches.
- USE to flavour egg sandwiches.
- ADD to potato salads.

# DIY TIP

To get the best flavour from your herbs, harvest them in the morning when aromatic oil concentrations are at their highest.

## **Parsley**

Biennial curly or flat-leafed parsley is easy to grow during summer. Once established, you'll be picking the leaves for months.

Plant seedlings or grow from seed, which takes up to four weeks to germinate. To hasten the process, soak the seeds in warm water for 24 hours, then sow.

Use the leaves fresh or freeze.

- OUSE in egg dishes.
- O ADD to tomato sauces.
- OPARTNER with mushrooms.



Herbs can be simply air-dried in bunches, which will ensure they maintain their essential oils, or slowly dried in an oven. Dried herbs keep their taste for about a year.

• AIR-DRYING Pick the stems as long as possible, then strip the lower leaves. Gather 6-8 stems into a bundle and secure with a rubber band or twist ties.

Hang the bundles in a dry and well-ventilated position until the leaves are dry and crumbly. Remove the leaves from the stems and store in an airtight tin or dark bottle.

**○ DRYING IN AN OVEN** Strip the leaves from their stems and spread them out on an oven tray. Preheat the oven to the lowest temperature, add the tray and heat the leaves, leaving the door ajar so moisture can escape.

Turn over the leaves after about 30 minutes so they dry evenly. Once dry, remove from the oven to cool. Store in an airtight container.



# Easy freezing

You can freeze herbs in water or oil for ease of use. Or freeze the leaves whole and place directly into freezer bags.

- **O IN WATER** Pack chopped herbs, such as basil, parsley, chives and mint into ice cube trays, add water and freeze. To add to dishes, drop a cube into the pot. TIP You can also use homemade stock.
- IN OIL Freezing herbs in oil is a great way to store herbs such as sage, thyme, rosemary, oregano and marjoram.

Chop the herbs and fill ice cube trays two-thirds full. Pour over extra virgin olive oil or melted butter.

When cooking a casserole or stew, cook the onions and garlic in the herb-infused oil.

- **TIP** To free up the trays, transfer the ice cubes to freezer bags.
- **WHOLE LEAVES** Frozen leaves are handy to have. You can freeze your favourite combinations of herbs in the one bag or individually.

Pick stems of herbs and wash under cold water. Use a salad spinner to dry the herbs or pat dry with paper towel. Remove the leaves from the stems and place in freezer bags.


