WELCOM

PREP STEP

Transfer the outline patterns from the pattern packet to the appropriate wood. Sarah and the sign are cut from 3/4" pine. The flowerpots, flowers, the bunny in the watering can, and the wing piece are cut from 1/4" birch plywood. Cut out all pieces using a scroll saw. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern packet.

Sand each piece with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Stain all pieces with Delta Antique Oak Wood Stain or a stain of your choice. While still wet, wipe the stain with a lint-free rag. Allow stain to dry for one hour. Sand lightly to remove burrs. Transfer the main pattern outlines. Transfer the details as needed.

BASECOAT

Use the #10 flat to base Sarah's face and hands

Medium Flesh and her dress Periwinkle Blue, Base her stockings. wings, and the sign Oyster White.

Use the #6 flat to base Sarah's shoes Black, Base all leaves Chrome Lt. Green and the flowerpots Terra Cotta. Base the flowers in the flowerpots Custard, Periwinkle Blue, and Pink Quartz. Base the flowers in Sarah's hands Custard. Base the watering can Quaker Grey and inside the handle Black. Base the bunny and Sarah's collar Oyster White.

Blush Sarah and the bunny's cheeks with an old scruffy brush and Garnet Red Stencil Creme. Use the #0 liner to base Sarah's eyes, mouth, and the bunny's eyes, nose, whiskers, and eyebrows Black. Paint the lines on her collar with thinned Pink Quartz. Paint the lines on her stockings and the lettering on the sign with thinned Periwinkle Blue.

SHADING

Use the 1/2" angular shader to shade Sarah's face and hands with Cavenne. Shade her dress, stockings, collar, wings, and the sign with Blue Lagoon. Highlight her shoes with Oyster White.

Use the 1/4" angular shader to float a highlight of Oyster White along the left sides of Sarah's eyes and the top of the bunny's nose. Shade the bunny and watering can with Black that has a touch

of Ovster White added to it. Shade the inside of the bunny's ears with Pink Quartz. Shade all the leaves with Deep River Green and highlight with Custard. Shade the pots with Burnt Sienna, Shade the Pink Quartz flowers with Raspberry, the Periwinkle Blue flowers with Blue Lagoon, and the Custard Flowers with Crocus Yellow

DETAILS

Use the #0 liner to paint squiggly lines on the sign and wings with thinned Black. Paint the highlight marks on Sarah's shoes and eyes with Oyster White. Use a double-ended stylus to dot the letters Periwinkle Blue with the the large end and her dress with Oyster White and the small end. Add tiny highlight dots of Oyster White to

the top and bottom of Sarah's eyes, her cheeks, and the bunny's nose and cheeks. Dot Black holes in the watering can.

EASY FINISH Use an old toothbrush or a spatter brush to spatter all pieces, avoiding Sarah's face, lightly with thinned Oyster White, then Black.

Wood-glue the wing to Sarah's back. Cut four pieces of 99gauge wire, 41/2" long, curling one end of each piece. Twist and curl the ends to attach the flowers to either side of the bunny in the watering can, and then to Sarah's hands.

Cut one piece of 19-gauge wire 17" long. Thread through the

holes in the top of the sign, pulling around back and twist the ends in place to secure. Cut two pieces of 19-gauge wire 71/2" long. Thread through the holes in the bottom of the sign and top of Sarah's wings. Pull wire around the back and twist ends in place to secure

Make rings of curly yarn for hair and hot-glue to Sarah's head. Tie bows from scrap fabric and hot-glue to her head and the flower pots. Hot-glue the buttons to the flowers, and on Sarah's collar and shoes. Cut a piece of scrap fabric 6" x 31/2" wide, gathering at the top, hot-glue in place for her apron. Spray with several coats of Delta Satin Finish.

PREP STEP

All pieces of the basket are cut from %" plywood. Transfer the outline pattern for the front and back from the pattern packet to %" plywood. Cut two side pieces 8" x 9½". Cut the bottom piece of the basket 8" x 8¾". Drill holes for the handle as indicated on the pattern.

Sand with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Transfer the main pattern outline. Transfer the details as needed.

You may choose to paint the pattern design on both sides of the front and back pieces. If you build the basket yourself, you may prefer to paint the inside bunnies before assembly.

BASKET BACKGROUND

Base the bottom piece, the side pieces, and the background around the bunnies on the front and back pieces Antique White. (Be sure to base the inside of all pieces.)
Base the basket trim and the dowel

handle Raspberry. Highlight the top portion of the trim with Rose Petal Pink. Use the stylus or the end of a small

Use the stylus or the end of a sma brush to add Raspberry dots.

BUNNIES

Base the bunny and his arm Maple Sugar. While the Maple Sugar is still wet, blend Adobe to the cheek area for blush. Shade the bunny and his arm with Burnt Sienna.

Use a liner brush to base the pupil

Black and to add Blue Jay to the lower left comer. Let dry, add a highlight dot of Antique White to the upper right comer. Base the nose with a mix of Antique White and Adobe. Add the whiskers with thinned Burnt Sienna and a 00 liner.

The small stitching around the bunny's ears is added with a fine-line Brown permanent pen.

FLOWERS, STEMS, & LEAVES

Base the leaves and flower stems Pine Green, and highlight with Olive Green. Add the veins to the leaves with thinned Olive Green.

Add delicate grass strokes with Pine Green that has been thinned with water. Add the strokes from the bottom of the basket upwards.

Base the large tulips Raspberry. Shade at the base with Mulberry and highlight the tops with Rose Petal Pink.

Base the small tulips Butter Yellow. Shade at the base with Burnt Sienna. Highlight at the tops with Moon Yellow.

ASSEMBLY

Refer to the exploded perspective illustration in the pattern packet for assembly. Butt joint the side pieces to the bottom piece and the front and back pieces to the sides and bottom pieces with small finishing nails. Touch up nail areas with the appropriate colors.

Apply a small dab of wood glue to the holes drilled in the tall tulips, and insert the $\frac{7}{16}$ " dowel for the handle.

Wood-glue the arms to the bunnies, and hot-glue the ribbon bows to the bunnies' necks. Fill with paper grass or raffia. Add brightly colored eggs or your own special Easter treat for that somebunny special in your life!



PREP STEP

To order an unfinished whirligig kit for this project send \$20.00 which includes S+H to: Jim Byrne, 409 Pine Ave., Aiken, SC 29803.

Transfer the outline patterns from the pattern packet to the appropriate wood. Cut the body from ¾* pine and the wings from ½* pine. Sand each piece with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Transfer the main pattern outline. Transfer the details as needed. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern.

Cut two propellers and two washers (%" dia. with 16" center holes) from the green plastic sheet. An ordinary green plastic, 3-ring binder can be used.

The propeller block is a 16" × 16" block of bass wood. Cut a 16" deep slot across the comers on one end, and across the opposite corners on the other end. Insert the plastic propellers and secure with glue. Drill a 16" hole into the center and insert the prass tube.

The nose cone is made from a 3/6" dowel, 5/6" long. Drill a 1/6" hole 3/6" deep in one end. Round the other end to form a cone. Straighten a 1/6" brass L hook. Screw into front of carrot, leaving 1" out.

BASECOAT

Use the #4 and #8 shaders for basecoating. Base the bunny's face, arms, and ears Putty. Base the inside of his ears Hydrangea, his hat Liberty Blue, and his scarf Village Green.

Base the carrot Pumpkin. Base the leaves, the cone of the plane, and the wood on the propeller Jubilee Green.

Base the center section of the bottle cap White. Base the side and outer edges Metallic Silver. Base the top and bottom circle sections Crimson.

Base the shovel blades Metallic Silver and the shovel handles and the steering wheel Spice Brown.

STIPPLING

Use the #8 fabric die brush to stipple the carrot Yellow. Blot the brush on a paper towel to remove some of the paint. This should be done with an almost dry brush. Use the same technique to stipple the carrot leaves first with Forest Green, next leaf Green, and finally Jubilee Green.

SHADING

Use the #8 shader to shade the carrot with Tangerine. Deepen the shading with a float of Tomato Spice.

Shade the shovel blades with a float of Hammered Iron and Black and the shovel handles and the steering wheel with Burnt Umber. Highlight the shovel blades down the center with a drybush of White.

To create the bunny's fur, stipple first with Bambi Brown, next Putty, and then Light Ivory. Use more Light Nory above the eyes and the muzzle area. Lightly stipple the shading on the bunny's ears, the bottom of his arms, under his eyes, and under his nose and mouth with Bambi Brown.

Shade under his eyes (over the stippling) with a float of Bambi Brown to deepen the shading.

Shade the bunny's hat and around the goggles with Nightfall Blue using a #4 shader.

Shade the White area of the bottle cap with Dolphin and the red area with Mendocino Red.

DETAILS

Base the nose Fiesta Pink, the eyes White, and the iris and lens of the goggles Black. Add a highlight to the eye with a float of Dolphin. Dry-brush a Dolphin reflection on the goggle lens. Add a White highlight with the stylus or the end of the liner brush.

Use the #0 liner to add the mouth and the line over the eye Spice Brown. Line the stripe on the bottle cap and the lettering Pthalo Blue.

Add all the detail lines with a Rotring .35 rapidioliner pen.

EASY FINISH & ASSEMBLY

Spray all wood pieces with Ky/on Crystal Clear. Insert the wing section into the slot on the bottom of the carrot. Glue with Aleene's Tacky Glue and screw in place with a #4 woodscrew. Slide the plastic washer on the propeller shaft, slide on the propeller, then another washer. Finish by gluing the nose cone on the front. Insert a screw and a swivel in the top of the bunny's head.

PREP STEP

Transfer the outline patterns of the angel and the base from the pattern packet to 3/4" pine. Transfer the birdhouses to 1/2" pine. Cut out all pieces using a scroll saw. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern packet. Sand each piece with 120-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. No wood sealer is used on this piece. Transfer the main pattern outline: transfer the details as needed.

BASECOAT

Use the #12 shader to base the top of the base Hauser Dark Green, the edges of the base Sand, and the angel's boots Sable Brown.

Use the #8 shader to base the angel's face, hands, and legs Medium Flesh. Base her blouse Hauser Dark Green, and her apron and the birdhouses Sand.

Use the #4 shader to base the bird Williamsburg Blue. Base the birdhouse roof in the angel's hand Deep Midnight Blue and the birdhouse roof on the pole Dark Chocolate.

SHADING

Use the 1/2" angular shader to shade the angel's face, arms, legs, apron, the edge of the base, and the birdhouses with Sable Brown. All squiggles for these areas are done with Sable Brown and the 10% lines

HIGHLIGHTING

Use the 1/2" angular shader to highlight the angel's blouse and boots, the top of the birdhouses, and the bird with Buttermilk. All sauiggles for these areas are done with Buttermilk and the 10% liner

Use the small old scruffy brush to dry brush the angel's cheeks with French Mocha and the bird's cheeks with Mauve

Use the small old scruffy brush to dry-brush additional Buttermilk highlights to the angel's sleeves and boots.

DETAILS

Use the 1% liner to add the fine linework. The small hearts on the birdhouses and the angel's apron are Cranberry Wine. The bird's beak is Marigold, and the plaid on the blouse is Buttermilk. The holes in the birdhouses and the angel's eves are Lamp (Ebony) Black. All additional fine lining and stitching is Lamp (Ebony) Black.

Use the end of a small liner brush to add Titanium (Snow) White highlight dots to the angel's cheeks and Lamp (Ebony) Black dots to the lettering. Use the end of a smaller brush to highlight the eyes with Titanium (Snow) White dots.

EASY FINISH

Use a spatter brush or an old toothbrush to spatter all pieces first with Buttermilk, then with Lamp (Ebony) Black, then with Sable Brown. Let dry completely

Sand the edges of all pieces to give a soft, worn look. Sand off any paint that might be on the sides. Use a foam brush to apply a thin coat of your favorite stain to all sides. Yes, even the front! Wipe off all excess stain with a old soft cloth. This will give your angel that finished look, and the stain will also seal the wood

ASSEMBLY

Attach the angel to the base using a 5/8" drywall screw. Lace shoes with carpet thread. Hammer nails into birdhouses for perches. Attach the birdhouse with the Midnight Blue roof to the angel's left hand with 20-gauge black wire.

Use Aleene's Tacky Glue to attach the other birdhouse to the dowel, and wire to the other hand. Hot-glue Spanish moss to the roof and glue bird to moss. Hot-glue a feather to the back of the bird's head

To make angels hair, loop hair yarn loosely around three fingers three times, and tie in the center with matching embroidery floss. Repeat twelve times, and hot-glue in place. Make a bow from scrap fabric, and hot-glue to the top of her head.

Tie a gold heart around the angel's neck with white embroidery floss, and glue down with Aleene's Tacky Glue.

Tie eight to ten twigs (8"-9" long) in the center with fabric, and hot-glue to the angel's back for wings.



PREP STEP

Transfer the outline patterns to the appropriate wood. Cut the angel and her arms and legs from ¾* pine. Cut the flower pot from ½* pine and the wings from ¾* exterior grade plywood. Cut five flowers from ¼* birch plywood and ten leaves from ½* birch plywood.

Drill 1/16" holes in the flowers and flower pot. Use a #56 drill bit to drill the remaining holes in the leaves and the angel. Refer to the pattern packet for placement.

Round the edges of all pieces, using a belt or hand sander. Sand smooth with 100 then 220-grit sandpaper and dust off. Transfer main pattern outlines. Transfer details later as needed.

BASECOAT

Base the angel's face and hands Medium Flesh, her hair Honey Brown, and her wings and stockings Toffee. Base her dress and sleewes Uniform Blue, her apron Mink Tan, and her shoes Lamp (Eborny) Black: Base the flowerpot Terra Cotta, the leaves Evergreen, and the flowers Roolwood Red. Let all pieces dry compitetly and sand the edges lightly.

SHADING

Shade the angel's face and hands with a float of Burth Sienna. Use the Wistencii brush and pick up a small amount of Country Red. Wipe nearly dry on a paper towel. Gently with a circular motion, blush her cheeks. Dot her eyes with the stylus or the end of a liner brush and Lamp (Ebony) Black. Let dry, and add a try, Light Buttermilk dot to highlight each eye.

Line and shade the angel's hair with

Light Cinnamon. Use a Na" rake brush to wash Toffee stripes on her dress and sleeves. Use a liner brush to paint double Rookwood Red lines between the stripes. Shade the dress and sleeves with Deep Midnight Blue.

Use the stylus or the end of a small brush to add the Rookwood Red tridots on the apron. When the dots are dry, shade the apron with Burnt Umber. Stencil 1/2* Rookwood Red checks on

the wings with a 1/2" checkerboard stencil. Shade the wings and stockings with Milk Chocolate.

Shade the flowerpot with Burnt Umber. Paint the signs on the pot Light Buttermilk. Paint the lettering Deep Midnight Blue, and add the dots with the stylus. When dry, shade with MIlk Chocolate.

Use the liner to line the leaves with Black Green.

ANTIQUING INSTRUCTIONS

You can use your own favorite antiquing medium, or ty Myra's Paste Wax method: Mix ½ cup wax with ½ teaspoon each Burnt Unher and Burnt Sienna oil paint. Apply mixture with a sponge brush to all pieces. Wipe dry with a clean cloth. Let dry for 15 minutes and buff with a clean, dry cloth. Deepen antiquing around edges with a cloth dipped in Burnt Umber oil paint. Wipe nearly dry on paper towe! Rub gently around edges to darken. Use a clean cloth to blend into lighter areas.

Use a spatter brush or an old toothbrush to spatter first with Light Buttermilk, then with Lamp (Ebony) Black.

ASSEMBLY

Cut four pieces of £2-gauge wire, 6° long. Attach arms and legs to angel. Glue and nail wings to angel with 1° nails. Attach a sawtooth hanger to the back of angel. Nail 36° buttons to dress with 16° bras nails. Cut five pieces of £2-gauge wire, 8° long. Thread a leaf on each end of wire, leaving a 1° tail, twist in place. Curlicue the tails. Set aside.

Cut five pieces of 16-gauge wire, 6* long for the flower stems. Wrap the leaf wires around each stem. Insert stems into holes in the flowerpot. Trim the stems so the flowers will be at different heights. Nail the buttons to the flowers with 1/4* Escutcheon Pins and attach the flowers to the writer stems. Cut two pieces of 92-gauge wire, 10° long, and attach the flowerpot to the angel's hands, securing behind the flowerpot. Plant your angel in a sunny spot and watch the love growl

Paint Box

6" x 4" x ½" pine 12" x 6" x 3/8" exterior grade plywood

THE MYRA MAHY STORY

Myra Mahy's wonderful career as a decorative painter of renown will inspire all those who "think" they have no artistic talent. Myra grew up believing she had no skill in drawing or painting whatsoever, yet now her designs grace the pages of magazines and books, finding a wide audience who

appreciates her charming details and innovative designs.

Myra's favorite childhood activities were always outdoor "tomboy" activities, such as hiking and camping, and her real passion was riding horses. She endured piano lessons for a while and was, in her own words, "a total flop." Her one concession to hand-work of any kind was sewing, which she learned from her mother. She never took so much as one art class as a child and never gave the subject a secand thought.

Later, when Myra was married and a mother of two, she "wanted something new to do," and enrolled in college with the idea of pursuing a career as a medical transcriptionist. At this time her sisterin-law. Theresa, was dabbing with decorative painting, and Myra was intrigued. "You can do it too!" Theresa insisted, so

Myra gave it a try. To her surprise, not only did she enjoy it, but she discovered she had a real talent for painting. She had been looking for something that could provide her with extra income at home, and "this was it!"

By 1986. Myra was actively participating in five to ten craft shows a year, offering her painted items for sale, basing her work on other artists' published designs. The "painting bug" became serious enough that she took a semester off from school to paint full time and

build up her inventory. She knew this was what she was "meant to do." She abandoned her medical goal and "has not looked back since!" By 1993 she began to develop her own designs and signature style. She entered a Christmas ornament contest, and her design was purchased by the spon-

soring magazine. This was the first national recognition that would eventually lead to Myra's publishing business.

Myra still doesn't consider herself much of a sketch artist, and she develops new ideas not by sitting down with a pad of paper, but by allowing new ideas to hatch in her imagination as she pursues everyday tasks. "As silly as this sounds. I find the shower is the best place for inspiration," she laughs. She may execute a very rough sketch, then heads straight for her wood saw.

As she works with the wood itself, the design takes its real character. "Wood is my true medium." she acknowledges.

Myra designs have their origin in folk art, and while she strives for a primitive look, she stops short of "rustic" because she prefers a nice finish. Her favorite theme is Christmas, but she enjoys cre-

other holidays ating designs, too. Now each vear Myra produces approximately 12 new pattern packets, 12 pin kits (painted pins are one of her favorites), and one or two books. Her friend, Sandy Strecker, assists her in the nuts and bolts of crafts publishing while another friend, Margaret Wilburn, distributes her books under the company name Whimsy Unlimited.

Now that she publishes, Myra no longer has time to paint in quantity, and limits her craft show participation to the Christmas Cottage Bazaar held every November near her home in La Mesa, California. She also finds time to attend several trade shows, including the Creative Painting Show in Las Vegas, Nevada, in February; the Society of Decorative Painters National Convention

every May or June; and the Heart of Ohio Tole Show in Columbus, Ohio, in August.

Myra has some advice to offer painters who are ready to move beyond painting other artists' designs: Begin with changing the colors of an existing design. Experiment and find what colors you like to work with best. Once you feel comfortable with color, you might then want to experiment with new wood shapes, which will truly make the design "yours."







Transfer a Pattern: Trace the paint pattern onto a piece of tracing paper and lay the tracing atop the wood blank with a piece of transfer paper underneath. Draw over the traced pattern with a pencil, using enough pressure to transfer the image.





Loading or Creating a Wash: Dip a damp brush into the paint, loading it no more than 3/4 of the way up. To create a wash, drag the loaded brush through a drop of water to dilute the paint. Mix in more water as needed to lighten the color.





Double Loading: Dip each side of the brush into a different color of paint. Stroke the brush back and forth on the palette before painting so the colors blend together on the tip.





Sideloading or Floating: To sideload your brush for shading or highlighting, dip one corner of the wet brush into the paint. Brush back and forth on your pelette to blend the color so it faces across the brush. Apply a darker color for shading, and a lighter color for highlighting.

Brush Types

Listed below are the most common types of craft brushes and some of their uses. All types are sold in a variety of sizes and fibers. We recommend synthetic fiber brushes for Wood Strokes acrylic paint projects. Synthetic brushes are inexpensive, durable and easy to clean. Keep the brushes moist during a work session; acrylic paint dries quickly and may damage the fibers. Use a mild soap and warm water to clean after use.





Wash or Glaze: Basecoating, shading, highlighting and double loading large areas; dry or dirty brushing.





Round: Comma strokes, thin/thick lines and "S" strokes.





Shader: Wider comma strokes, thin/thick lines and "S" strokes, calligraphy lettering, color book painting, double loading, shading and highlighting, "C" strokes and roses.





Liner: Outlining, thin comma strokes, thin/thick lines, thin lettering, cross-hatching.





Deerfoot Stippler: Bushes, foliage, fur and fuzzy effects.





Stencil: Stencil painting, dry brushing.





Stylus: Decorative, multi-sized dots and pattern transplant

Transfer the outline pattern to the appropriate wood pieces. Cut the mama bunny from 3/4" pine. Cut the four flowers, the banner, and baby bunny piece from 1/4" plywood. Cut the baby bunny's hands from 1/8" plywood. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern packet

Sand each piece with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Transfer the main pattern outline. Transfer the details as needed

BRUSHES

Use the flats for basecoating, the 1/4" angular for shading and highlighting, and the liner and rounds for details

BASECOATING

Base both bunnies, including the egg halves, their hands, and feet Desert Sand. Base the mama bunny's dress Colonial Green and her shoes Lamp (Ebony) Black. Base the banner Camel, two flowers Tangerine, one flower Teal Green, and the remaining flower Napa Red.

SHADING & HIGHLIGHTING

Shade both bunnies and the banner with Burnt Sienna, and the dress with Teal Green. Dry-brush highlights on both bunnies, the mama bunny's shoes, and the tips of the flowers with Buttermilk. Dry-brush the bunnies' cheeks with Napa Red.

DETAILS

Base the eyes and noses on both bunnies Lamp (Ebony) Black. Let dry, and add Buttermilk highlight dots to the eves with the stylus or the end of a small brush.

Add the inner double line work on the mama bunny's dress Teal Green and the outer double line work Napa Red. The lettering on the banner is Lamp (Ebony) Black.

Use the stylus or the end of a large brush to add Golden Straw dots to the mama bunny's shoes

All remaining linework is done with a #.005 Sakura Micron Pigma black permanent pen. Use a spatter brush or an old toothbrush to spatter all pieces with Lamp (Ebony) Black.

EASY FINISH

Sand edges of flowers lightly with 150-grit sandpaper. Finish with several coats of Americana Matte Sealer/Finish. Wood-glue the egg halves to the bunnies' faces, the banner to the mama bunny, and the baby bunny's hands to the banner

Tear a 11/4" x 9" piece of scrap fabric. Wrap around the mama bunny's head. bringing together in the front, and tie in a knot at the top. Hot-glue edges to secure. Make two small scrap fabric bows; glue one to the mama bunny's neck and the other to the top of the baby bunny's head.

Thread four 5/8" buttons with thin linen jute, and hot-glue buttons to the flowers. Take 24" of 19-gauge wire and cut into four 6" lengths. Curl each piece of wire, leaving 1/4" on each end. Hotglue one end into the flower and the other into the drilled holes

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


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
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






















































paint a rustic cheese box









Butter Cream

To order the cheese box (item #WS-1) for this project, send \$11.99 postage paid to: Homespun Touch, 231 Seventh Street, Sturgeon Bay, WI 54235, or call 1(800) 445-5753 (orders only please).

PREP STEP

This box is made by a cheese box manufacture in Wisconsin and is very rough and rustic. This is part of its charm, so when sanding don't sand away all of the roughness. Seal the wood with a good sealer like Designs From The Heart Wood Sealer, following instructions on the bottle. Do a final sanding after the sealer direct when the sealer shall be sealer in the sealer of the sea

BASECOAT

Base the box Silver Pine and the lid Butter Cream. When dry, transfer the main pattern outlines, transfer the details as needed.

Base the two side borders on the lid Cape Cod Blue. Base the rectangle check Butter Cream. (If you prefer, you can cut your own stencil. Place a sheet of stencil plastic over a copy of the check design and cut out the checks with an X-ACTO knife. Then, stencil with Butter Cream and a stencil forush.)

Base the bee skep Antique Gold and the border around it Silver Pine.

The design at the top and bottom of the bee skep is quick and easy. Use the liner brush to paint the vine Black and the #4 filbert to paint the leaves Black. Use a stylus or the end of a small brush to add Adobe dots at the base of each leaf.

THE BEE SKEP

Shade under each layer of the bee skep and along both sides of each divider with Burnt Sienna. Using the 1/2" rake brush, pull some "straw" lines in from the sides of each section. Add a few thin lines in the dividers, too. Using an old yuck-muck brush (that's an old beat up brush better known as an old scruffy brush), dry-brush some Butter Cream highlights on each section.

BEES

Base the bees Antique Gold with Butter Cream wings. Let dry, and add Black stripes on the bodies. Use a stylus or the end of a medium size brush and dot their heads Black. Use the liner brush and outline the bodies and wings with thin Black lines.

FLOWERS

The flower design is repeated on the sides all around the box. Use the liner brush to add the Black flower stems and the #4 filbert to add the Black leaves. The flowers are simple touch-down strokes, using the #4 filbert and Adobe.

Use the small end of a double-ended stylus to add Antique Gold dots at the base of each leaf and Butter Cream dots for the flower centers. Make the flower stems a little longer to fill the space on the box sides. (This is such an easy way to paint flowers. Try to paint without transfering the design from the pattern packet.)

EASY FINISH

Use the stylus to add large Cape Cod Blue dots along the edges of the box. Outline everything on the lid with a very thin squiggly Black line.

Allow the paint to dry, remove any pattern lines, then give the piece a coat of watered-down vamish (2-1-vamish to water) before antiquing with *Delta* Waterbased Antiquing Medium. Let dry thoroughly before finishing with *Delta* Waterbased Matte Finish.

Refer to the exploded perspective illustration in the pattern packet for cutting wood pieces for basket. Transfer the outline patterns of the front and back basket pieces to 3/4" pine

Sand with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Seal with DecoArt Wood Sealer, and let dry. Sand again, using 400-grit sandpaper. Wipe off with a tack cloth.

BRUSHES

Use the washes for basecoating, the 1/4" angular for shading and highlighting, and the #1 round for details.

CRACKLE & ANTIQUE

Basecoat all the basket pieces Deep Burgundy. When dry, apply DecoArt Weathered Wood Crackling Medium according to the manufacturers directions. When ready, base Buttermilk. Let dry completely

To antique, thin an ample amount of Sable Brown with water. Paint on surface. and then wipe off with a clean cloth

Antique sides and bottom of basket, inside and out, with Sable Brown

SHADING & HIGHLIGHTING

Transfer the basket pattern to the front and back pieces. Refer to the photograph, and shade the woven pattern with Sable Brown. Darken deep shadows with Burnt Umber. If needed, highlight with Buttermillk. Spray with several coats of DecoArt Matte Spray Finish.

BASKET ASSEMBLY

Refer to the exploded perspective illustration in the patten packet. Woodglue the side pieces to the bottom piece, and then the front and back pieces to the sides. Clamp together, and allow adequate drying time

BASKET HANDLE

Cut three pieces of grapevine about 3 feet long. Form the basket handle, and use a staple gun to staple to the bottom of the basket to secure. It will be necessary to use quite a few staples

SEASONAL CUT-OUTS

Transfer the patterns from the pattern packet to 1/2" pine, and cut out using a scroll saw.

Use an electric carving tool or hand carving tools to carve the edges and pattern lines. Sand with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. PAINTING CUT-OUTS

The seasonal wood pieces are painted with washes of color. Simply thin paint with water. Apply like a stain by brushing on paint and wiping off excess with a clean cloth. Let dry completely, then spray with DecoArt Matte Spray Finish.

SPRING

Wash bunny White Wash. To paint wooden eggs, stick push pins in the bottom to hold. Have fun decorating the eggs with Lilac, Peaches 'n Cream, Baby Blue, Green Mist, and Taffy Cream.

SUMMER

Wash the beehive Anique Gold Base the opening in the beehive Burnt Umber. The bees are a wash of Antique Gold, White Wash and Black. Paint the bee's detail lines with Black.

AUTUMN

Wash the pumpkin Pumpkin; the stem Burnt Umber; the leaf Avocado; and the fall leaves Plantation Pine, Deep Burgundy, and Antique Gold.

WINTER

Wash the tree Hauser Dark Green, it's bottom Burnt Umber, and the stars Antique Gold.

FINISH

Drill 1/16" holes in bees, leaves, and stars. Use approximately 12" of 24gauge wire each. Thread wire through each piece and crimp the ends Spiral the other end of wire around a dowel to curlicue

Make bows out of raffia or ribbon. Secure wired wood pieces to bows by threading wire into knots on bows. Thread a separate 19-gauge wire through the back of the bows to attach to the basket handle. Decorate as shown in the photos or be creative and come up with your own variations.

To order the 15" oval basket (item #10-899H) for this project, send \$37.00 (S&H included) to: The Box Company, 3877 Christytown Road, Story City, Iowa 50248-7531, or call (515) 733-5086.

PREP STEP

Lightly sand the box, if necessary, with 220-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean with a tack cloth.

BASKET SIDES & HANDLES

Base the sides and the handles of the box Wild Rose. Use a sea sponge to lightly sponge with Antique Rose. Space the lines for the guilt pieces about 21/4" apart around the side of the box. Shade with a mix of Cinnamon and Wild Rose. Highlight with Hydrangea. Dry-brush Hydrangea highlights in the center of every other section.

The tulip pattern is repeated seven times around the side of the box and six times on each handle. Since it is repeated so many times, you may prefer to cut a stencil. Transfer the leaf and tulip pattern from the pattern packet to a sheet of stencil plastic or thin cardboard. Cut out using an X-ACTO knife with a sharp blade.

Paint the leaves with Wedgewood Green, Shade with Seminole, and highlight with Apple Green. Use the liner to add the stems Seminole. Paint the tulips Hydrangea. Shade with a mix of Cinnamon and Wild Rose

BASKET TOP

Base the box lid Sachet. Use the sea sponge to lightly sponge only the sides of the lid with Antique Rose. Float an Oyster White scallop 1" apart and about 1/2" deep around the outside edge of the lid to create the lace. If you are uncomfortable doing this freehand, you can transfer the design from the pattern packet, very lightly, with pencil to help guide your spacing.

Use a stylus or the end of a small brush to add the Oyster White dots along the scallop. Now you are ready to transfer the angel's main pattern outlines. Transfer the details as needed.

THE ANGEL

Base the angel's hands and face Fleshtone, her hair Pigskin, and her shoes Charcoal. Base her dress and collar Wild Rose. Base the bow, apron, cuff, and lace collar Hydrangea. Base the wings and quilt Oyster White.

Stencil the tulip pattern on the wings and quilt, and paint as on the sides.

The dress plaid is done with a liner brush and a wash of Hydrangea. Add the thin lines with Seminole. Add tiny squares where the thicker stripes cross with a mix of Cinnamon and Wild Rose.

Shade the angel's face and hands with Persimmon. Highlight her hands and boots with Oyster White.

Shade the dress, bow, apron, cuff, lace collar, the quilt, its folds, and the wings with a mix of Cinnamon and Wild Rose. Shade again to darken where needed with Dark Night. Highlight the dress first with Hydrangea, then with Oyster White, where needed. Highlight all else with Ovster White

Use the stylus to add Oyster White dots for trim around collars and cuff. Add 14K Gold buttons to dress and boots.

FACIAL FEATURES & HAIR

Use the liner brush to paint the angel's eves Oyster White, then Wedgewood Blue for the iris, and Charcoal for the pupil. Let dry between colors. Highlight

with small dots of Oyster White. Use the liner to paint the angel's eyebrows Mocha, her lashes Charcoal, and her mouth Persimmon.

The angel's nose is a float of Persimmon and her cheeks are stippled on with Delta Paprika Stencil Creme.

Use a liner brush to add Mocha, Maple Sugar, Custard, and Oyster White squiggly lines for the angel's hair. Shade with Mocha. Use a script liner to add the Ovster White lettering. All stitch lines are done with a fine-line permanent black pen. Finish with several coats of Krylon Matte Spray Varnish.



THE CAFFIENDS













Transfer the outline pattern from the pattern packet to 34° pine. Sand with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean with a damp cloth or a tack cloth. Make a misture of equal parts Decoart Multi-Purpose Sealer and Titanium (Snow) White. Basecoat entire piece, front, back, and sides. Let dry, and sand with a brown paper bag. Basecoat again with Titanium (Snow) White. Transfer the details as neecled.

BRUSHES

Use the $\frac{1}{2}$ " wash for basecoating, the $\frac{1}{2}$ " comb brush for hair, the $\frac{1}{2}$ " angular shader for shading, the #2 filbert for small areas, and the #0 or #1 liner for outlining and details.

BASECOAT

Base the Caffiends' faces and arms Medium Flesh. Base Mr. Caffiend's shirt and peg Golden Straw and Mrs. Caffiend's dress and peg Victorian Blue.

HAIR

Base Mr. Caffiend's hair Lamp (Ebory) Black. Use the comb bush to pull strokes from his forehead to the sides of his head. Acid texture with strokes of Titanium (Snow) White thinned with extender. (Tip: The comb brush should be damp, not wet, and the paint the consistency defink. Dip the tip of bristles in paint, stroke across palette before applying to wood.)

Base Mrs. Caffiend's hair Light. Cinnamon. Using the comb brush, add very few lines of Black, then overstroke with Golden Straw, and finally Titanium (Snow) White for the strongest curl highlights. Be sure to follow the direction of the hair lines from the pattern.

FACIAL FEATURES

Base the eyes Titanium (Snow) White and the pupils and Mr. Caffiend's mouth Lamp (Ebony) Black. Make a light mix of Raspberry and Titanium (Snow) White to base Mrs. Caffiend's lips.

Mix a tiny bit of Raspberry into Medium Flesh to create a pale blush color. Dip the long haired side of the angle brush into DecoArt Brush & Blend Extender and then into the pale blush mixture. Blend on your palette and float across the cheeks. (The extender will assist in making smooth floats.)

Make a mix of Light Cinnamon and Medium Flesh for a darker flesh color and float around the eyes, the bottom of the faces and the areas shown as hash marks on the pattern.

Use a dry-brush of Titanium (Snow) White on the tip and bridge of the noses, Mrs. Caffiend's bottom lip, and the middle of the chins.

Use the liner brushes to add eyebrows, Mrs. Caffiend's eye lashes, the separation between the lips, and the outline around the eyes with Lamp (Ebony) Black, Detail the facial features and outline the flesh areas with liner and Light Cinnamon. Add Titanium (Snow) White hishiplath dots to the eyes.

SHIRT & DRESS

Refer to the pattern and shade Mr. Caffiend's shirt with Light Cinnamon. Add Victorian Blue lettering.

Shade the area inside Mrs. Caffiend's right sleeve with Wedgewood Blue. Base the buttons and daisies White and the leaves Yellow Green. Dot the center of the flowers Golden Straw. Use the liner and Wedgewood Blue to shade under each button and to make the button holes on the left of each button.

EASY FINISH

Use the liner brush to outline the Caffiend's with Light Cinnamon. Finish with three coats of *DecoArt* Waterbased Vamish, allowing sufficient drying time between coats. Lightly sand with a brown paper bag after first two coats.

Drill holes to secure pegs and woodglue in place. For better stability, attach two sawtooth hangers on the back.

Birdhouse, Adobe Tree



"Birdhouse Adobe Tree" is the fourth project in our new six-part series of kitchen accessories designed exclusively for us by Kathy Morrissey. It is the fourth piece in the series and the third piece in the Candy Canister Set. The Canister Holder and the Letter Holder will follow in the next two issues.











Transfer the outline patterns from the pattern packet to 3/4" pine. The outline pattern piece for all three canisters must be cut at one time to ensure that all three canisters will fit together when assembled in the canister holder

The two dotted lines on the pattern indicate the cuts necessary to make three separate canisters. It is imperative that you make each of these cuts with only one pass on your scroll saw.

(The first three projects in the series are in issues #24, #25, and #26 and can be ordered on page 14. The painting detail patterns for the first two canisters are in issues #25 and #26. The canister holder and a letter holder will be featured in the next two issues.)

Sand both pieces with 400-grit sandpaper. Wipe clean. Varnish with Delta Waterbased Varnish, sand again, and wipe clean.

BASECOAT

Basecoat entire surface and the apple knob with an equal mixture of Sandstone and Light Ivory. Keep lots of moisture in the brush. Let dry well, and transfer main pattern outlines. Transfer details as needed.

Base the edge of the piece at the tree and shrubs Blue Spruce. Base the back of the piece and the circle Dolphin

Base the shrubs and tree Silver Pine; shade with Blue Spruce. Base the tree trunk with an equal mix of Sandstone and Trail; shade with Autumn Brown.

Shade the fence and background with an equal mixture of Sandstone and Trail.

BIRDHOUSE #1

Base the roof and heart Williamsburg Blue: shade with Blueberry. Base the bottom of the birdhouse Rose Cloud: shade with Rose Mist

BIRDHOUSE #2

Base the roof Western Sunset; shade with Spice Tan. Base the bottom of the birdhouse Drizzle Grey; shade with Dolphin.

BIRDHOUSE #3

Base the roof of the top birdhouse Drizzle Grey and the bottom of the top birdhouse Rose Cloud; shade with Rose Mist. Base the roof and base of the bottom birdhouse Williamsburg Blue; shade with Blueberry. Base the bottom of the bottom birdhouse Dolphin.

DETAILS

All holes and perches are made using the stylus and Blueberry. All detail lines, including tree trunk, the arrow, and the lettering on the tree, are done with the liner and Charcoal. The extra-fine shading dots are done with a fine-line black permanent marker.

EASY FINISH

Let dry at least one day to allow the marker time to set. Varnish with three coats of Delta Waterbased Varnish, letting dry well between coats. Use Aleene's Thick Designer Tacky Glue to glue rubber weather stripping around the circle. Glue on the circle and the knob as indicated on the pattern.

The Canister Holder will be in our next issue. For now, fill the canisters with your favorite candy, place on the countertop, and enjoy!

Transfer the outline patterns from the pattern packet to 3/4" pine, and cut out using a scroll saw. Cut a piece of 1/4" dowel 81/2" long for the birdhouse pole and one 1" long to secure the bunny to the base. Cut a piece of 3/16" dowel for the birdhouse perch. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern

Sand each piece with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean with a tack cloth. Seal with Delta Waterbased Wood Sealer, let dry, sand lightly, and wipe clean using a tack cloth. Transfer the main pattern outline. Transfer the details as needed

THE BUNNY & BASE

Basecoat the bunny and the base Ivory, let dry. Base the checks around the base Ocean Blue. (A 3/4" check stencil can be used to add the checks.) Shade the bunny with Territorial Beige and the base with Burnt Umber.

Base the bunny's shirt Prussian Blue. Shade with Paynes Grey, and highlight with Salem Blue. Paint the trim on the bunny's shirt at the neck, arms, and bottom Ocean Blue. Use the 1% liner to add the stripes on the trim White

Base the bunny's inner ear Sachet Pink. Shade with Rose Mist, and highlight with White. Use the #1 liner to paint the bunny's mouth and the hearts on his nose and mouth Sachet Pink. Paint his eyes White and Black. When dry, add White highlight dots with a stylus or the end of a small brush.

THE BIRDHOUSE

Base the birdhouse Ivory and the roof, perch, and checks Prussian Blue. Base the hearts Sachet Pink and the

hole Black. Highlight the roof shingles with Salem Blue. Paint the birdhouse pole with a wash of Burnt Umber

THE BIRD & EGG

Base the egg White and the bird Ocean Blue. Base the stripe on the egg Tropic Bay, and shade with Emerald Green. Use a stylus to add Emerald Green dots along the edges of the stripe. Add tri-dots of Rose Mist on the stripe with Crocus Yellow dots at the bottom of the tri-dots. Paint the bird's eyes Black and his beak Crocus Yellow. When dry, highlight eyes with White

THE PAINTBRUSH

Base the metal band Drizzle Grey, the brush handle Dark Brown, and the bristles Palomino Tan. Base the paint and drips on the brush Tropic Bay. Shade with Emerald Green, and highlight with White. Shade the bristles Territorial Beige, and highlight the brush handle with White

EASY FINISH

All remaining linework and stitches are done with a #.03 Sakura Micron Pigma black permanent pen Place a small dab of wood glue in

the hole drilled in the bottom of the bunny and insert the 1" dowel. Apply a small dab of glue in the hole in the base and attach the bunny. Wood-glue the birdhouse pole to the birdhouse and the base in the same manner

Break off a long strip of Spanish moss, and spiral it around the birdhouse pole. Secure moss in place using hot glue. Spray with several coats of Delta Matte Spray Varnish



A quick & easy project to complete with your favorite little crafter. The color book style painting will be a snap for any aspiring young talent.









Paint Box

PREP STEP

Transfer the outline patterns from the pattern packet to the appropriate wood. Cut the puppy's body from ¾* pine and the sign and bone from ¼* plywood. Cut his head, feet, and tail from ½* plywood.

Sand each piece with 150-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Transfer the main pattern outline. Transfer the details as needed.

BASECOAT

Use the 3/4" flat to basecoat all the puppy pieces Cashmere Beige. Base the bone Titanium (Snow) White and the sign Buttermilk.

Use the #10 shader to base the puppy's spots Sable Brown.

DRY-BRUSH

Load the #10 shader with Buttermilk and wipe off most of the paint on a paper towel. With an almost dry brush, brush the front of the bone. This will help give the bone an "old look."

Load a stencil brush with Antique Mauve. Blott off most of the paint as above, and, in a circular motion, drybrush the puppy's cheeks.

DETAILS

Use an extra-fine brown permanent marker to outline the puppy's nose and the dark spot under his ear. Add his eyebrows, all the wavy outline work, and the double stitches on the puppy and his bone.

Use a stylus or a liner brush to fill in the dark spot under the puppy's ear and his nose Dark Chocolate. Paint his eyes Lamp (Ebony) Black Add the lettering, the outline, and the stitches on the sign with an extla-fine black perment marker. You can use the marker by dot the letters or use the stylus and Lamp (Ebony) Black. Use the stylus to highlight the puppy's eyes, nose and cheels Butterman.

EASY FINISH

Very lightly sand the edges of all pieces. Wood-glue puppy pieces and the bone in place. Finish with several coats of DecoArt Matte Spray. Thread 92-gauge black wire through the hole in one side of the sign, thread through the puppy's tail, spiral the wire, and secure through the other hole in the sign. Be sure to trim wire to avoid sharp edges. Tie a bow from scrap febric, and hot-glue it in place.



Garden Fairy













Transfer the outline pattern of the fairy from the pattern packet to 3/4" pine. Transfer the wings and sign to 1/4" plywood. The base is 53/8" x 21/2" x 1/2" birch plywood. Cut out all pieces using a scroll saw. Drill holes as indicated on the pattern packet.

Sand each piece with 220-grit sandpaper, and wipe clean. Base each piece with your favorite wood sealer. Transfer the main pattern outlines. Transfer the details as needed.

BASECOAT

Use the #1.0 flat shader to base the fairy's dress Taffy Cream, her wings and sign Buttermilk, and the base Jade Green.

Use the #6 flat shader to base the fairy's face and hand Toffee and her hair Milk Chocolate.

Use the #6 flat shader to base the flower centers Milk Chocolate. Use the #4 flat shader to base the leaves Jade Green.

Let basecoats dry completely, then sand lightly. Repeat basecoats for a complete coverage of color.

Use the #4 flat shader to apply comma strokes of Antique Gold for the flower petals. Begin from the tip of the petal and pull the stroke upwards to the center of the flower with a slight curve to the stroke. You may want to practice on wax paper until you're confident with your stroke.

SHADING

Use the #6 flat shader to shade the fairy's dress and wings with a float of Golden Straw.

Use the #4 flat shader to shade the fairy's face, hand, and the edges of the sign with a float of Milk Chocolate. Shade the flower petals next to the centers, also with a float of Milk Chocolate

Use the #4 flat shader to shade the leaves with a float of Hauser Dark Green. Shade the flower centers and the fairy's hair with a float of Lamp (Ebony) Black

DRY-BRUSH

To dry-brush, apply a small amount of paint to an old scruffy flat brush and wipe off excess paint on to a paper towel until the brush is almost dry.

Blush the fairy's cheeks with a drybrush of Brandy Wine. Apply in a circular motion.

Use a small old scruffy flat brush to apply Buttermilk highlights on the flower centers, petals, and leaves.

DETAILS

Use the #0 liner brush and Lamp (Ebony) Black that has been thinned with water to add the lettering on the sign and to do all the linework.

Use the stylus or the end of the liner brush to add Lamp (Ebony) Black dots for the fairy's eyes and to dot the lettering on the sign.

EASY FINISH

Use a spatter brush or an old toothbrush to spatter all pieces with Lamp (Ebony) Black. Let dry completely and antique with a brown waterbased antique medium.

Use Quick Grab Glue and a nail to secure the fairy to the base, slightly off center. Attach her wings to the center of her back with glue and a tiny tack nail.

Cut a piece of 22-gauge black wire 8" long. Center and insert the wire through the fairy's hand. Twist three or four times underneath her hand and insert each end through the holes in the sign. Curlicue the ends to secure.

Fold a small tea-stained Battenburg doily in half and cut an appropriate section to fit the fairy's neck. (Sue Ann used two corners from the doily to give the collar a layered look.)

Thread a piece of cotton/linen string through the button holes of a 1' brown button. Tie a knot in the front and glue to the center of the collar

Sand the complete surface of the box, inside and out, using 150-grit sandpaper. Remove dust with a tack cloth. Using a clean, cotton rag, apply Minwax Puritan Pine Stain and Sedler. Let dry.

BASECOAT

Base the lid and the outside of the box with Antique White. Two coats may be needed.

Base the leaves Dark Jungle Green. The roses are based in Wild Rose (not the buds), and the daisies are based in Heritage Green.

SHADING AND HIGHLIGHTING

Shade the mouth of each rose and their base in Barn Red. On the lower sides of the roses, make long arching strokes in Barn Red from the outside to the middle of the rose. On the upper sides, make equally long arching strokes in White, slightly passing the darker ones. At the very top, pull one long White stroke around the mouth of the rose, forming a circle with a slight tail inside.

Shade the underside of the leaves with Black Green. Highlight the upper side with Leaf Green.

The daisy pedals are shaded with Barn Red at the center of the flower and along the sides of each petal. Use the shading to separate one petal from another where they overlap.

The rosebuds are shaded and highlighted in one step. Load the #8 flat with Wild Rose, then dip one comer in Barn Red and the other in White. Place the brush on the wood surface at a right angle, then pull to the left in a slight arch up to form the top of the bud. Reload the brush, placing the brush at the same right angle, only slightly lower then the first stoke. Arch down while pulling to the left.

DETAILS

With the end of a large brush, dip into the Antique Gold, and dot the center of the daises. With the end of the same brush, make a series of dots in the mouth of the roses and the buds.

With the #6 round double dipped into both Heritage Green and Leaf Green, form the small leaves and the leaves that come up the side of the buds.

With the #2 liner loaded with Black Green, paint the stems. Use the same liner to paint the veins in the larger leaves.

The baseboard that we used in the construction has natural borders at the top and the bottom of the box sides. Freehand a checker pattern along this border in Barn Red, using the #8 flat as a width suide.

To create the oval surrounding the flowers, take the #2 liner loaded with Dark Jungle Green and make a series of long "S" strokes.

EASY FINISH

Antique the box using *Delta* Dark Brown Antiquing Gel, following the manufacturers instructions, or use your own favorite antique method. When completely dry, apply two or three coats of *Delta* Waterbased Varnish.
