



Woodworking Observations

I hate to be the bearer of bad news... the consumer *Woodworking Show* circuit will be bypassing the West Coast for the 2015-2016 season. With management and major exhibitors based in the East, they no longer think traveling across country for a few shows before the holiday break is profitable enough. The upcoming schedule is planned to begin in January for a 14-show circuit, coming no farther West than Denver.

To be honest, the show's exhibit floor is no longer a marketplace to kick the tires of woodworking machinery before purchasing. Rather, it has become a swap meet of accessories and supplies. The demise of the independent local tool stores have prevented most manufacturers from being represented at the show, and for the retailers that have survived, the profit margins are too small to incur the expenses of exhibiting, only to find customers buying on the Internet. At some shows, there wasn't a machine on the floor. Their prime asset is three days of free seminars for only \$10.

There is definitely a woodworking market, here on the Left Coast, but the show concept needs to be reimagined. Several publications are finding success in more of an educational symposium approach, such as *Popular Woodworking's Woodworking in America*. These are singular annual events, targeted to a specific audience, such as hand tool enthusiasts. They have well-known master craftsmen as seminar presenters, but come with a substantially higher admission price tag. I am afraid that this will only serve the converted and fail to attract the new blood. And can this model be repeated across multiple venues?

I am sure an entrepreneur will arise that will devise a model to tap the spending dollars in the West. But then, who would have thought it would take 20 years for profootball to return to the Los Angeles/Orange County region.



News and Views from WoodCentral.com by Ellis Walentine

JOINTER UPGRADES

One of our WoodCentral regulars recently started a lively conversation on jointer repairs and upgrades. His 1972-vintage Delta/Rockwell 6" jointer had started to "grumble" when running and winding down, and he first wondered about replacing the cutterhead bearings. Then, he questioned the wisdom of installing a new spiral cutterhead, while he was at it. The suggestions from our visitors were enlightening...

"If the machine makes noise on shutdown, it might be the bearings as you surmise, or it might just need the belts tightened. Check the simple stuff first. While you are at it, remove the belt(s) and spin the cutterhead by hand and listen. If you need bearings, I can tell you that you are better off sourcing the bearings from a local bearing store, rather than via the manufacturer, because factory bearings are generally not on par with your average Timken or other industrial-supplier product. Take your bearings with you to your bearing supplier, so they can get you the right replacement parts. They may also offer a pressing service to remove and replace them. If not, a local automotive machine shop can do the bearing swap quickly and correctly."

"Don't neglect the belt, motor, and motor mount. The sheet metal bases can amplify sounds. Take off the belt and run the motor before going after the bearings. When my jointer sounded like that, it was just the pulley set screw and key had come loose. The pulley was working its way off the motor shaft."



"Obviously, a moving part but which one? I'd take out the belt and 'feel' the rotation of the head manually, and then do the same for the motor. Quite often, a bad bearing will reveal itself with a simple manual spin. Of course, it might be a 'lump' or set spot in the belt, but that isn't easy to detect without powering on. I've looked at the cost of spiral cutterheads and quickly decided that anything like that was out of the question, unless my shop became a money-making proposition, which it never will."

"Check the motor, too. A couple of years ago, I took my TS motor into the repair shop 'cause it wouldn't start. They cleaned out a ton of sawdust (I now have a compressor to do this) and along the way noticed a bearing starting to go. They replaced both bearings for seemingly pennies extra since the motor was already apart. I don't know that this is a DIY job though."

"In my opinion, any sealed bearing over 20 years old is bad and should be replaced, noisy or not. The grease in the bearings turns into waxy rocks, and that's part of what you hear and feel with bad bearings. I say replace both cutterhead bearings and both motor bearings and be done with it."

"If the bearings are going bad and you continue to use the machine, at some point the bearing will seize and the shaft will be spinning inside the bearing race. Since the bearing is harder than the shaft, the shaft eventually will be ground away. Then if you try to replace the bearing, it will not stay on the smaller shaft, which could lead to a difficult and expensive shaft repair. A pair of bearings generally costs only a few dollars, but a replacement cutterhead will cost a few hundred. I think of them as cheap insurance."

"I don't recall ever seeing the need for a spiral cutterhead on a jointer, but I work mostly with run-of-the-mill Oak, Maple, Walnut, Cherry, Ash, Poplar, and other typical domestic woods, and my straight cutterhead works fine. By feeding in the optimum direction—and slowly when necessary—I don't get tear-out on board edges."

"All spiral cutterheads are not created equal. Some have the segmented cutters arranged in a helix, while the face of those cutters still are perpendicular to the work piece. This arrangement is less desirable, than having the cutter faces arranged in a helix with their cutter edges also in a helix. The latter makes more of a slicing cut, and generally works better."

"I looked into a spiral cutterhead for my Delta 190, but the cutterhead costs almost as much as the machine. For a 6" jointer, I'd live without it. My Performax sander remedies all torn grain:)"

"The idea of paying more for a part than the whole machine bothers me. My Biesemeyer fence would have cost more than I paid for my

Delta Rockwell Contractor saw in 1972, but I bought it for \$80 from Lowe's when they got out of the business. My kinda deal."

"Spiral cutterheads have some advantages on planers. On a large industrial machine, for example, the planed surface can be so smooth that one can not see planer marks and initial sanding could be as fine as 150 or 180 grit. And, for those without an on-board sharpening attachment, insert bits are easy to reposition for a new edge. If depth of cut and feed direction don't prevent tear-out, a spiral cutter head will likely yield a tear-out free surface. Though, planing lower-grade lumber could present more problems with the greater incidence of knots."

"I have a Grizzly G0490X which is an 8" jointer with a spiral head. I think the spiral head with carbide cutters is a great innovation. There is much less tear out, they are quieter, they mean no more having to sharpen blades or install blades, and they leave a better finish meaning less sanding. (Yay!) A new head might cost more than the jointer did originally, but in early 1972, gold was \$35/ounce versus today's price of \$1100.1 wouldn't buy a jointer without a spiral head, if I ever had to replace mine."

"I replaced the original cutterhead on my 8" Delta Professional Jointer with a Byrd head years ago. It was THE best investment that I could have made. I no longer worry about feed direction, knots, or figured lumber. No more sharpening jointer blades, even though I'm equipped to do so. Just turn the carbide inserts to the next edge and get back to work. I've had nothing tear out since. The results are smooth and clean. That said, I don't think that spending this much money makes sense for anything under an 8" machine."

"I bought the cheapest Grizzly cutterhead for my 6" Jet jointer. It's quieter, requires less feeding force, and I'll never spill another drop of blood re-setting blades, in a seemingly endless round of adjustments."

"If someone is having trouble jointing typical hardwoods, an improvement in their technique could solve their problem at no expense. If changing knives is difficult on the machine they own, the expense of the insert head may be worth it to them."

"Once I moved into dressing mostly rough lumber and started using more figured stock, I decided the Byrd head would make a big difference, and it did. I could dress rough stock much faster and didn't worry about tear out with the figured stuff."

"I'd sell the old jointer and buy a new 8" (or 10" or 12") machine with a spiral head. There's somebody around who'd like a good deal on a well-kept 6" jointer. After 40 years, what you get for it is found money as it doesn't owe you a dime. Then have that new iron delivered and enjoy."


"When my straight blades got nicked, they required replacement to get rid of the ridges the nicks left on the board (though many people just offset one of the knives). The carbide inserts eliminate all of these problems for me. If an insert is damaged, all I have to do is rotate it 90°. I can feed from either direction with no problems. By the way, I have a Grizzly spiral cutterhead on my jointer and a Byrd cutterhead on my 20" stationary planer—I cannot tell any difference in quality of cut between the two."

"I wouldn't waste my money on a new cutterhead for a small jointer and then still only have 6" of surfacing capacity. If your shop can't handle a bigger jointer, I would recommend getting a big powerplane. It's a shame to have to rip down wide boards, so you can run them over your narrow jointer."

"I don't know why I would bother with carbide insert technology when I can sharpen and set my own blades. They certainly do improve productivity in certain situations, and one doesn't have to hire people with as much skill."

WHAT'S NEW

PONY ACQUIRES EASY WOOD TOOLS

Though they were missed at the AWFS Fair, clamp manufacturer **Pony Tools** did not stay home to rest on their laurels. Soon after the national woodworking show, the 112-year old company, formerly known as Adjustable Clamp Co., announced the acquisition of woodturning tool and accessory manufacturer **Easy Wood Tools**, as the first acquisition in its new strategic growth initiative.

WHAT'S NEW

BOSCH SAW DEBUT; LAWSUITS ENSUE

Robert Bosch Tool Corp. unveiled its new *Reaxx Jobsite Table Saw*, with flesh-sensing technology, to the greater woodworking community at the *AWFS Fair*. When skin is detected, an activation cartridge fires, lowering the blade below the table. This differs from **SawStop**, in that (1) there is no damage to the blade; (2) the activation cartridge can be utilized for two incidents, taking only minutes to reset; and (3) the same activation cartridge works with all types of blades.

However, SawStop is attempting to stop the Bosch saw, by filing lawsuits in U.S. District Court and with the U.S. International Trade Commission. Alleging violation of six patents related to the safety system, SawStop seeks a permanent cease and desist order to exclude infringing table saws from entry into the United States and to stop any advertising and selling the saw in the United States. Bosch representatives could not speak about the litigation at *AWFS*, but did say that they are proceeding with plans for mid-Fall delivery. See you in court.

WOOD DUST CITED IN FATALITY

The **Occupational Safety and Health Administration** (OSHA) has concluded that the January death of cabinetmaker **Tom Hegg** was due to acute, long-term exposure to wood dust. The 55-year old finish sander was a 15-year employee of Oak Creations Inc. in Columbus, MT. Upon inspection, OSHA identified 21 serious safety violations that exposed workers to respiratory hazards, fire, explosion, and amputation. The company was fined \$50,000.





'FINE ART WOODWORKING' AT O.C. FAIR

The 16th annual *Fine Art Woodworking* again was a popular exhibition at the *Orange County Fair* in Costa Mesa, CA. My Day with Tommy Mac

by David Marks



David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for nearly 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004.

Season 6 of *Wood Works* is now available as a DVD or individual episodes can be downloaded. Among the techniques covered are laying out dovetail patterns, turning a Walnut bowl, hand planing, flattening veneers, turning a hollow vessel, and gilding. The complete DVD is available for \$69.99 at David's website: *www.djmarks.com*, along with DVDs and downloads of *WoodWorks* Seasons 1-5. Each DVD includes the full 13 episodes from each season, featuring step-by-step instructions for building contemporary studio furniture.

He also will be teaching *Creative Bowl Turning* in his Santa Rosa, CA shop (Oct. 15-19) and will be hosting a *Marquetry* class with **Paul Schürch** on Nov. 12-15.

My old friend **Tommy MacDonald** is beginning the 6th season of his PBS television show, *Rough Cut-Woodworking with Tommy Mac*. Tommy is a graduate of the North Bennet Street School in Boston, and his show includes project construction in his shop, road trips, and special guest demonstrators. To kick off his new season in October, he came West to tape episodes in my Santa Rosa, CA shop and at **Paul Schürch's** shop in Santa Barbara, CA (who will be teaching a marquetry class at my shop in November).

The shoot was very spontaneous. Even though I had been preparing for a month and a half by turning multiple hollow vessels in various stages, things were decided the day of the shoot, which kept me on my toes. For example, we talked about shooting some of the raw Maple burls on the back of our acre of land as part of the intro, which I thought would be interesting.

When Tommy saw my drum set, he said "Man, you play the drums? We gotta do this for the intro!" So, we began the episode with a bang—sort of *Whiplash* for woodworkers.

After tapping out some rhythms, Tommy proceeded to ask how I got started in woodworking, and I told him that back in 1972, I started making tables out of Redwood burl and other burls including Walnut, Buckeye, and Olivewood. These were my "roots" so to speak.

Soon after, we made it to my lathe to begin my demonstration of creating a 2-part hollow vessel, with a patina bottom. I roughed out the lower portion of my vessel in Poplar. Then, we mounted a piece of Big Leaf Maple burl in my Vicmarc chuck, which I joined to the Poplar with a box joint (round mortise and tenon).

Once the joinery was complete, the fun began, as I hollowed the workpiece.

We finished up the episode with my trademark silver leaf and patina finish, all of which I demonstrated on camera. I showed the process of carefully brushing on the oil size, allowing it to dry to a sticky surface, then carefully laying on sheets of silver that are 3 ³/₈" square, while tearing the silver to create fine cracks. After this dried, I cleaned the surface with a brush and applied chemicals to oxidize the silver.

The finished piece (11" h, 5 1/2" dia.) has an Ebony rim, Maple burl top, and Poplar bottom, covered with metal leaf and a chemical patina.

Tommy was great fun to work with. He is high energy and likes to laugh and enjoy the process of making television. Keep a look out for this episode, which is scheduled for October. Now, it's time from a reader's question:

Card Scraper & Curly Cherry: I bought your "Scrapers" DVD on card scrapers some time ago and used it to improve my sharpening skills. It was helpful. I am working on a large 50" x 10' Cherry dining table. The grain in the top is polarized and quite nice. The table must be stained a deep reddish brown. Wanting to keep some texture on the top for stain to grab, I chose to scrape prior to stain. The top looked perfect, prior to color, but the stain showed shallow, but noticeable, lines from the scraper. I am re-scraping now and rubbing with steel wool prior to stain. Thankfully, I did the underside as a test. What did I do wrong with the scraper to leave the marks? Faust

David's Answer: Let me just make this perfectly clear that I do sand after scraping. I receive a lot of emails from woodworkers stating that they have read that the ultimate surface that you can produce would be a clean cut right from a hand plane or a beautifully scraped surface. As a professional furniture maker who has earned his living at woodworking for over 40 years, I can tell you what has worked for me and most other craftsmen that I know.

Typically when you plane or scrape a surface, the challenge is trying to blend those tool marks over the entire surface width of a table top or drawer front or whatever piece it is that you are making. I find that I always come back and hand sand the wood with the grain to get the best possible finish. I might begin sanding at 320 grit or I will drop down to whatever grit is necessary to get the job accomplished (220, 120). Even **James Krenov** told me that he would sometimes sand the surface at 320 grit to blend tool marks.

In your email you state that you must stain the 50" x 10' Cherry *Dining Table* a deep reddish brown. Any time you put a stain on wood, you are almost asking for trouble, if you do not sand it. The color from the stain will dramatically highlight any tool marks, facets from a hand plane, torn grain, and any fuzzy grain, which is quite common when you are using the scraper on rowed grain (which I believe you are referring to as polarized grain). Your best bet is an uniform scratch pattern produced by hand sanding in a long, parallel pattern, sanding with the grain.

Rule #1: Always make test samples to see the results of your finish before you apply it to your piece of furniture.

You did not specify whether you are using an oil-based stain, a water-based stain, gel stain, etc. A gel stain will probably be your best bet to minimize blotching on Cherry.

Promoting Traditional Japanese Methods

Kezurou-Kai USA To Be Revived

Kezurou-Kai is a Japanese organization dedicated to preserving traditional Japanese woodworking techniques and passing the knowledge on to future generations. Founded in 1996, this group sponsors an annual festival, which attracts Japanese woodworking tool enthusiasts from across Japan and around the world.

Craftsmen, toolmakers, and hobbyists gather for demonstrations, hands-on experiences, sharing of knowledge, tool selling, and competitions, with the purpose of keeping traditional techniques alive. The meeting hall is filled with hundreds of people planing away, with the culmination of finding the Kezurist who can plane the thinnest, widest, and longest shaving. The current record is 3 microns.

In the summer of 2000, Hida Tools hosted the first *Kezurou-Kai USA* weekend event, in which 13 Kezuru-Kai members were brought to Berkeley, CA to conduct two days of Japanese woodworking demonstrations and instruction, including sharpening, sawing, planing, and joinery. Though none spoke English, they "let the techniques speak for themselves." Shown here are pictures from the initial event in 2000.

Each day concluded with a planing competition, pitting the Japanese masters against their American counterparts. Each using their own tuned instruments, the teams took turns planing a plank of Port Orford Cedar, attempting to make the thinnest, widest, and longest shaving. The Americans prove competitive, with Hirioshi Skaguchi of Occidental, CA winning the Saturday competition and Jay Van Arsdale of Oakland, CA taking the honors on Sunday.

There was constant activity at the sharpening station. Yoshio Hata explained his sharpening process, using a progression of 4 waterstones: 1,000 grit until you see a burr, 2,000 grit—first a man-made stone, then a natural stone to get out the roundness, then a 12,000 grit natural finishing stone to remove the scratches. The whole process—10 minutes. When asked how long one needs to practice sharpening, Yoshio responded, "Until you are dead."

Kezurou-Kai USA continued until 2007, taking place in the Bay Area and at Palomar College in San Marcos, CA. Now, a group of Northern California woodworkers—who practice traditional Japanese techniques—have secured the American rights to Kezurou-Kai in the U.S. and intend to organize a major Japanese woodworking event for the Fall of 2016.

To stir anticipation, an initial program will be held this Fall, Oct. 31, at the Kohan-en Japanese Garden along Lake Merritt in Oakland, CA. This activity will serve as an introduction to Japanese hand tool techniques, including sharpening/maintenance, demonstration of techniques and applications (such as joinery), hands-on experience, and an exposition of woodworking talent. Beyond merely showcasing traditional Japanese techniques, they hope to demonstrate the relevance of these methods to Western applications. Attendance will be limited, with a registration fee of \$40. 

A Snap Shot of the 2015 AAW Symposium

The American Association of Woodturners (AAW) held their 29th annual *International Symposium*, June 25-28, in Pittsburgh, PA. For the over 1,400 attending, it was rewarding, educational, inspirational, and collegial. It provided substance and networking for both the novice and the master.

The core of the conference was the more than 215 sessions of talks, demonstrations, and panel discussions, involving more than 74 presenters. It gave exposure to emerging artists, while sharing wisdom from turned wood's numerous elder statesmen. It provided nuts and bolts techniques, business & marketing strategies, and philosophical reflections, as it nurtured the future generation with hands-on instruction for the kids.

The state of the craft was presented in several organized exhibitions. The juried showcase *Merging* (on exhibit this Fall at AAW's *Gallery of Wood Art* in St. Paul, MN) featured work by 30 association members, reflecting on various themes of confluence, the merging of past and present, the relationship of inner and outer forms, marriage and family, among others. The exhibit's *Master's Award* went to **Michael Gibson**, while the *People's Choice Award* winner was **Hal Metlitzky**. Also on display was the invitational exhibit of the *Professional Outreach Program*, entitled *Creativity in Construction* (featured in our May, 2015 issue). The work, by 31 studio artists, combined various materials, surface treatments, and techniques.

The Saturday night banquet provided a venue for attendees to socialize, eat, and acknowledge society award winners. The 2015 Honorary Lifetime Membership Award was presented to collectors Ruth and David Waterbury of Minneapolis, MN, for their long-time support and promotion of the field of turned wood.

The 2015 Merit Award of the Professional Outreach (POP) Program went to Jacques Vesery, of Damariscotta, ME. The Merit Award recognizes artists whose work demonstrates exceptional development during their career and influences or has a significant impact on others in the field of woodturning.

The 2016 AAW Symposium is being planned for June 9-12 in Atlanta, GA. Session proposals are being solicited, with a submission deadline of Oct. 15. The theme of the juried exhibition is *Turning 30*. 

The student competitions at the 2015 AWFS Fair, held in July in Las Vegas, were expanded to include both furniture and turned wood, at both the high school and post-secondary levels. For the 9th fair, the Association of Woodworking & Furnishings Suppliers sponsored Fresh Wood, while the American Association of Woodturners joined the biennial

event with *Turning to the Future*. The goal of both competitions is to encourage students and promote opportunities working with wood.



Profile: Robert Galusha

Robert Galusha of Austin, TX, who has been woodworking for nearly 40 years, won "Best of Show" at the 2014 Texas Furniture Makers Show. Here is Robert's story, in his own words:

I began woodworking in the mid-1970s, after I inherited a tablesaw and tools from my father. At the time, I was managing an apartment building for **Francis Ford Coppola** in San Francisco and was able to set up shop in the parking garage. I first made a platform bed for myself, then a friend wanted a stand for his television and records, and other clients followed.

Drawing upon my background as a mechanic, my initial pieces were all put together like an engine: everything was screwed together. I then started reading *Fine Woodworking* and learned tons of stuff. As business expanded, my wife and I moved to a house on California St., which could accommodate a shop, as well as an art gallery. We began soliciting work from interior designers and connected with **Michael Taylor**, known for creating the *California Look*. He would send us drawings and ask for quotes. I would bid, but never heard back. We figured that we were not working with a sharp enough pencil, so we trimmed down the prices as low as we possibly could and gave quotes as best as we could. Suddenly, we received an order for everything: 40 pieces on an impossible time frame.

So, I got on the horn and called every woodworker that we could find in the Bay Area to a meeting at our Art Gallery. We had 30 people show up, we discussed the order and the quoted prices, and essentially said: "if you want the work, you can have it." We kept some for ourselves, but we gave a good part of the work away. This became the genesis of the **Bay Area Woodworking Association.**

By 1986, I had employees and took space in a converted slaughterhouse, near Candlestick Park. We connected with a hospitality company and were making furniture for hotels. As we were nearing completion on an order for 61 rooms of furniture, a clandestine fireworks factory in our building blew up, killing 10 and leveling two city blocks. Losing everything, we scrambled to get back into production within 6 weeks, bumped up my staff from 8 to 50, and delivered the job on time.

However, the financial strain from the recovery caused me to

close the business and move to Napa/Sonoma, where I operated on a smaller scale, building furniture to order and doing restoration work. What continued was my production of *Klismos* chairs (upper left) for Michael Taylor's company (which continues to the present). I have produced hundreds of this 3,500 year old design—depicted on pottery chards found off the coast of the Greek island of Klismos—featuring a bookmatched back and legs.

For a client in London, I am currently finishing a set of 10 in Walnut, whose grain and bookmatching is amazing.

As the California housing bubble was set to burst in 2004, we were able to sell our house for a significant profit and move to Kingman, AZ. Being halfway between Phoenix and Las Vegas, I hoped to draw business from both directions. I built a beautiful 1,350 sq. ft. workshop, with big windows, insulation, and a swamp cooler, however, I was never able to draw enough business to sustain me. In 2011, I moved to Austin, TX.

Much of my work today involves bent lamination. My first application was for a really good client in Kingman, who would give me vague notions of what he wanted and I would design pieces for him. One was a Walnut *Sofa Table* with a Red Rock stone top and stepped bent laminated arches that hold the legs (left). In 2008, *Fine Woodworking* sponsored a contest to build a piece of furniture from a single board of Maple (10' x 10' x 2"). My entry was the Maple *Occasional Chair* (above). The dimensions of the lumber dictated the design to be a low chair, since the main piece of the chassis was a strip that goes from one toe up and around to form the back and down to the other toe, and that length was limited to 10-feet.

This chair took *Second Place* in on-line voting. Future versions of this chair were accepted into

The Maple was ebonized using iron oxide, which interacted differently across the grain. The result was an amazing two-tone effect across the top of blacks and browns. The edge was banded with sequential vertical grain veneer, in a repeating pattern.

the *CraftTexas* 2012 exhibition at the Houston Center for Contemporary Craft and **Collectors of Wood Art** exhibit at *SOFA* 2012 in Chicago—where it sold to a collector. The *Moblius Rocker* (upper right) was an award winner at the 2011 Texas Furnituremakers Exhibition, while my latest chair in this series, the *Katelin Arm Chair* (on the cover), won *Best of Show* at the 2014 Texas Furniture Makers Show.

Besides the order of *Klismos* chairs mentioned above, I am currently completing a commission of 52 chairs, 4 dining tables, 5 pedestals, and various coffee tables for a client in Kuwait. Once complete, I will resume my artistic explorations, as well as teaching students in my shop—which has been suspended due to my current workload.

SHAVINGS & SAWDUST

BINH PHO: SHADOW OF THE TURNING

The **Craft & Folk Art Museum** (CAFAM) in Los Angeles, CA hosts a very special exhibition, *Binh Pho: Shadow of the Turning*, Sept. 26-Jan. 3. Vietnamese-American sculptor **Binh Pho** of Maple Park, IL uses his turned wood pieces—some done in collaboration with an international roster of artists—to illustrate a fantasy novel, cowritten by **Kevin Wallace**, Director of the Beatrice Wood Center for the Arts in Ojai, CA.

As they previously did with Binh's autobiography and exhibition *River of Destiny* at the **Long Beach Museum of Art** in 2006, this fictional story is told on the printed page, as well as in 3-dimensional art work combining woodturning, paint, and glass. It's a tale connecting past to the present, expressing the belief in destiny—that things happen for a reason.

To transverse the world of dreams, spirits, and reality, Binh uses an intricate, mixed media approach to woodturning. He explores the interaction of negative and positive space by etching and piercing through thinly turned wooden surfaces before using an airbrush to create imagery and symbols in the style of Chinese landscape painting. Sometimes incorporating glass, gold leaf, and bronze in his objects, Pho's fascination

with media and techniques, and his ability to master them, has allowed him to push his artistic vision.

Incorporating his personal iconography, the book's narrative concepts are expressed symbolically: peacock feathers signify a dream, dragonflies represent good luck, and butterflies symbolize the link between the physical and spirit world. Knowing the story, you will recognize the various elements, though there is no need to have read the book to appreciate the work.

To complete this undertaking, Binh drew upon other craftsmen with various expertise: multimedia artist Ron Gerton; turned wood artists Graeme Priddle, Harvey Fein, Joey Richardson, Curt Theobald, Michael Mahoney, Don Derry, Giles Gilson, Alain Mailland, and Hans Weissflog; fiber artists Kay Kahn and Patti Quin Hill; assemblage artist Ron Robertson; metalworker Meghan Rowland; ceramic artist Richard Flores; and Australian painter Annette Barlow. He often builds structures around the work of the collaborator; in one case, he sliced open Patti Quinn Hill's basket to paint the interior.
