

CABINETS & CLOSETS CONFERENCE MARCH 22-24 — PASADENA, CA

Conference & Expo

The Cabinets & Closets 2016 Conference and Expo is taking place, Mar. 22-24, at the Convention Center in Pasadena, CA. Organized by the Woodworking Network, this annual event is dedicated to home remodeling professionals, specializing in building kitchen cabinets, closets, and other home storage designs.

The conference program on Mar. 22 begins with a keynote address by **John McDonald** of Semihandmade (profiled on

pages 54-55) on Going Toe-to-Toe with IKEA. Following are break-out tracks on Cabinets (sponsored by the Cabinet Makers Association), Closets (sponsored by the Association of Closets & Storage Professionals), and Finishing (lead by Phil Stevenson, founder of industrial coatings application educational organization

AWFI). The former sets of sessions focus on business-related topics, while the latter classes are finishing technique-oriented.

Presentations include **Lisa Adams** of HGTV's *Million Dollar Closets Reality Show* on *Closet Design*, **Brendan Matthews** of Foothill Cabinetworks and Palomar College on *Building Your Cabinet Business*, **David Buchsbaum** of Atlanta Closet & Storage Solutions on the *Art of Pricing*, and **Joe Knobbe** of Exclusive Woodworking on working with *Architects & Designers*. In addition, the day will conclude with a plant tour of K&Z Cabinets, one of Southern California's largest casework manufacturers, and reception.

The Conference Expo takes place on Mar. 23-24. With over 80 exhibitors, the Expo features a dynamic mix of cabinet and woodworking machinery, CAD/CAM software, cabinet and closets hardware, wood components, and much more.

There will also be free educational opportunities, including a What's Your Problem? roundtable discussion with Cabinet Makers Association and Social Media Marketing, as well as an industry

reception, Best in Wood and Top Shelf Closet Design Awards Gala.

FDMC magazine will also host a Woodworking Collectives Meet Up to bring together members of collective shops and maker spaces—from across the country—to address issues of operation, finance, and marketing.

"The rise of woodworking collectives offers great opportunities to overcome the significant business obstacles and to help new entrepreneurs get a head start on business," says FDMC editor **Will Sampson.** "We want to do whatever we can to promote those opportunities."

Sunday, January 24 marked the 100th birthday of **Sam Maloof**, kicking off the *Maloof Centennial* celebration, as outlined in our last issue. Sam's widow Beverly hosted a relatively small (in Maloof party terms) gathering at her home, where friends could catch up, stories of Sam were told with toasts of champagne, and

Beverly announced that she is giving the *Beverly* chair—that Sam designed and made for her near the end of his life—to the Maloof Foundation for it's permanent collection. Without Sam around to bring us all together, it was a great opportunity to reconnect with many old friends.

The event also marked the debut of Sam Maloof: 36 Views of a Master Woodworker. Compiled by Fred Setterberg, this new book explores the life of Sam, through the eyes of 36 friends, employees, colleagues, and family members, including President Jimmy Cart-



er. A special discussion of the book is taking place at the *Los Angeles Times Book Festival* at the University of Southern California on Apr. 9-10.

CLEANING THE AIR

Dust is a major health and safety concern for woodworkers. It clogs lungs and sinuses and can lead to serious health issues. Recently, one of our regular visitors—tired of wearing dust masks and face shields—posted a question about the efficiency of overhead air filtration units for removing airborne dust. He speculated that dust is still floating around the room until the filter captures it, so you're still breathing it after you take the mask off, just not as much. Here's what some other visitors had to say...

"Don't expect miracles from your air cleaner, because, as you suggest, it takes time to circulate all the air in the shop. Finer filters help, but, the better the filter, the less throughput and the longer it takes to clean the air. The other critical issue is that one filter can end-up with dead spots, where the air doesn't get drawn into the filter. The usual recommendation, unless the shop is quite small, is to use two air cleaners in a 'race-track' configuration on opposite walls, so the air is blown around in a circle."

"I have a homemade air cleaner in my shop with a squirrel cage fan and furnace filters. It works fairly well, by keeping the particles suspended so that they can be trapped by the filters; but, keeping it airborne gives you longer to inhale it. It would be better to trap the dust before it flies out into the air. Theoretically, with perfect dust collection, you would not need an air cleaner or personal protective gear."

"You may think your dust collector (DC) is doing a good job if you don't see a lot of dust lying around, but the real problem is with airborne stuff that you can't see—especially particles in the 0.3-micron range, which is the size that tends to lodge in your lungs. So, the quality of your DC filter is a major first line of defense. The air cleaner will clean the air, but to get rid of the nasty stuff, it needs good filtering—such as a HEPA filter—though anything rated at one micron or less will get some smaller stuff, too. But just how much is anybody's guess."

"I have made shop air filters with furnace blowers. I use a sand-wich of a cheapo fiber-glass filter on the outside, a pleated one in the middle, and a good FiltreteTM filter on the inside. I have four of these sandwiches—on three sides and the bottom. The large filter area means that the fan doesn't have to suck like crazy and pull small particles through the box. I don't use a filter on the output side, because the force of the air movement would push too much dust through. A little cooking oil on the fiberglass outer one makes it much more effective as a filter."

"I use an air filtration unit, because dust collection alone is not going to get it all, and I like to keep things as clean as I can in my garage shop, because we still park our vehicles in there. While the DC and the air filter help a lot, I still use a dust mask, until I'm sure that the air has cleared. I don't think there is any getting around it, unless you live in a warm climate and can open every door and window on a really windy day."

"My Jet air filtration unit is relatively quiet and does a pretty

good job. One of my main reasons for getting it was to limit the amount of dust getting into my furnace."

"I have dust collection on all my stationary equipment, and most of my portable power tools are Festools that are always hooked to a HEPA vacuum. My air filtration unit still collects stuff that the others miss. If I forget to run it while milling, I can turn it on and in a couple of minutes the air is noticeably better."

"You can make your own unit, but getting a good seal around the filter is mandatory. Otherwise you are just wasting electricity."

"I made my own air filter box with a cheap spun-glass filter on the outside and a more expensive allergen filter inside of that. I lightly spray the glass filter with PAM™, whenever I change it. It catches and holds an amazing amount of fine dust. I change the glass filter about four times, before having to replace the secondary filter."

"A ceiling-hung air cleaner certainly doesn't do anything about the dust in your face when turning, but it excels at clearing the air while you step out for a few minutes, and it reduces the amount of floating dust you breathe. I use a Dylos air quality monitor to check how well my filter unit works. This thing is amazing. It sucks air through it with a fan and uses a laser to size and count particles. Turn it on and look at the particle count. Then do anything in the shop that makes dust and watch the numbers skyrocket. You can easily see the difference that using the filter makes. Without the filter, the fine dust hangs in the air for a long time. You might want to test your unit in various locations before mounting it permanently. The experts recommend using smoke sticks to watch how the air circulates in the shop."

"I think that ambient air cleaners are useful, probably even necessary, but the benefit for your lungs is minimal or nonexistent. Once the air cleaner can catch the dust, it's also already in your lungs."

"I built my double-filter ambient dust collector from plans in a woodworking magazine. The intake is between-the-rafters, above the bench where I do most of my sanding, but the location is not ideal, due to interference by overhead lights. Still, it picks up a lot of dust. If I had the room, combining the overhead with a downdraft sanding table would be ideal."



WHAT'S NEW

MOCC CLOSURE: A BLOW TO NW CRAFT

Craft in the Pacific Northwest has suffered a major setback with the announced closure of the Museum of Contemporary Craft (MOCC) in Portland, OR. The oldest continuously-running craft institution in the U.S began as the Oregon Ceramic Studio in 1937 and embraced the broader spectrum of craft in the 1960s, taking on the name Contemporary Crafts Gallery in 1965. Gambling to expand and gain greater visibility, it rebranded itself to its current moniker and relocated to a 4,500 sq. ft. exhibit space in the downtown Pearl Art District in 2007.

However, the organization never recovered from the financial strain of the move and the economic downturn of 2008. In 2009, the museum was given a lifeline by merging with the Pacific Northwest College of Art (PNCA), who has overseen the operation for the past seven years. According to the recent announcement, the MOCC collection will be integrated into PNCA's Center for Contemporary Art & Culture, and the Davis Street space will be sold. It remains to be seen what prominence craft will receive under this new umbrella.

13,000 PENS TURNED FOR SOLDIERS

Woodcraft reports that customers turned 13,000 pens, during its 12th Turn for Troops National Turn-a-Thon in November. For the fifth consecutive year, Woodcraft of Tucson, AZ, led participating stores with a total of 3,149 turned pens. Woodcraft of Grand Rapids, MI finished second (2,165), and Woodcraft of Nashville, TN was third (1,647).

MORE HITS FOR LUMBER LIQUIDATORS

Lumber Liquidators (LL), the nation's largest specialty retailer of hardwood flooring, was fined \$13 million and sentenced to five years probation for violations to the Lacey Act, a landmark environmental law banning the import of illegally-sourced tim-

The company had previously plead guilty to smuggling illegal wood products into the U.S., including timber cut from a Siberian tiger habitat in Russia where fewer than 600 of the endangered big cats remain in the wild. The sentence caps off a multi-year investigation, and the fine was the largest ever issued under the law.

The hardwood dealer also received an additional blow when the Center for Disease Control (CDC) issued a report confirming that their Chinese-produced laminate flooring emitted formaldehyde gas, enough to irritate the eyes, nose, and throat of people, and cause breathing problems for those with respiratory conditions. However, the silver lining was that the report stated that levels created only a low risk for cancer. Investors took the last finding as positive news, causing a jump in LL's stock price.

The CDC did recommend that customers with this flooring installed should open windows for a few minutes every few days, use exhaust fans, and avoid smoking tobacco in the home.





From David Marks Studio

Answering Reader's Questions

by David Marks



David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for nearly 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004.

Over seven seasons, David produced 91 episodes of *WoodWorks*, featuring step-by-step instructions for building contemporary studio furniture. 1. Veneering Sides: In the WoodWorks Episode 210 Pyramid Art Pedestal, you put sheets of Lacewood veneers on Apple plywood without veneering the opposite face. Would this not cause warping in the plywood due to the unbalancing situation between the veneered side and the non-veneered side? How did you solve this in that particular episode? Mauro

David's Answer: Your question regarding *Episode 210 Pyramid Art Pedestal* is a very good one. When I teach classes on veneering, students are always asking if you have to veneer both sides of the plywood or MDF substrate, and I always say yes, except for a few types of construction.

When you make a torsion box, typically the two or more outer plywood skins will have some type of surface treatment, unless they are strictly for functional use, like a workbench. I have made lots of furniture where I have veneered the top and bottom and sides of torsion boxes, which is a perfect exception to the rule. The reason is that we are applying the veneer to essentially a "thicker" piece of plywood. The gridwork inside does such an excellent job of locking the torsion box together, after the glue has cured, that one only needs to veneer the two outside faces of the (plywood) skins. It would be a lot of extra work to have to veneer

both sides of the plywood substrates (skins), before making them into a torsion box.

In learning to think "out side the box," I have pushed the limits and made the *Pyramid Art Pedestal*, essentially, a pyramid shaped torsion box, and as a torsion box with ribs holding it together solidly on the inside, I am free to only need to veneer the outside. In this case, I used a thick bandsawn veneer that was a little over ¹/₁₆" thick, and I veneered all four sides (two at a time) and the bottom.

2. Inlay vs. Marquetry: I am considering purchasing your Marquetry DVD. I want to inlay or marquetry ½" material. Will that be covered in the DVD? Monte

David's Answer: In my *Double Bevel Marquetry DVD*, I use $^3/_{32}$ " thick veneer that I cut on the bandsaw. I don't recommend using $^1/_4$ " thick veneer in general, because it behaves more like solid

wood, at that thickness. You can use $^{1}/_{4}$ " thick wood for inlay, but inlay is a different technique than marquetry.


Marquetry is essentially a veneering technique. In marquetry, pieces of thin wood are cut and glued together to form pictures in wood. Once the entire picture is made, then the entire sheet is glued down to a stable substrate (good quality plywood or medium density fiberboard).

Inlay is a completely different process, where you cut the pieces of wood or other materials, temporarily attach them to your background material with double stick tape or glue, scribe a knife line around the borders, remove the inlay piece, and rout to the desired depth without going outside the borders. After that, you glue the individual pieces, in one at a time, and sand them level with the surface.

If you want to try double bevel marquetry, then I highly recommend purchasing my marquetry DVD.

3. Bending Form: I took one of your bent wood lamination classes in Austin, TX, many moons ago. I'm finally getting around to building a project where I can put it to use!

The plan is to bend 1" worth of Maple around a ~27" radius (90 arc). I'll probably cut $^{1}/_{16}$ " strips. The widest board will be ~6". I am trying to get all the form pieces out of 3 sheets of $^{3}/_{4}$ " material:



We used MDF in your class, but it's heavy, and MDF dust is pretty nasty. There's a cabinet wholesaler just around the corner from my house, and I have easy (and relatively cheap) access to $^3/^4$ " particle board—but I'm afraid it can't withstand the stresses (though a stack of 10 plys has got to be pretty strong!). The last option, of course, is B-C or some sort of sanded ply from a Home Depot or Lowes. I know it'll have the strength, but is probably not the most

cost effective option.

So the question is: what material would you use for the bending form? Miles

David's Answer: Yes that bentwood lamination class in Austin was a long time ago.

Bending a stack of $^{1}/_{16}$ " thick Maple laminates, 6" wide by a total of 1" thick around a 27" radius will require a lot of force. I would not use MDF or Particle board for the form. I have had forms made of MDF break, when trying to apply clamping pressure to a 1" thick stacked lamination, with each laminate $^{1}/_{16}$ " thick.

Plywood would be the best choice. I would get some plywood that is sanded on both sides, but inexpensive. These sheets can be glued and screwed together to make your form. I hope this information is helpful.

4. Clamping: I am building serving trays that I am trying to produce as a product. The handles for the trays are a 3-piece bent lamination. I cannot get the handles consistent—about 1 in 5 that have voids between the laminations. I believe the problem is my curves are made as half circles and the male-female form binds up and will not pull tight. I want to try using a steel strap on the outside of a male form to pull the laminations tight. I wanted your take on this idea and any advice on drawing this steel strap tight. Daniel

David's Answer: I would not use a steel strap for this project, because even though the metal is flexible, it can crimp when you apply clamps to it and that would cause a dent in your Walnut laminations.

The situation of having voids in your laminations is a common problem when the two halves of the forms don't conform perfectly. This is generally eliminated using a vacuum press, because the bag is flexible and forces all of the laminates up against the convex form uniformly.

I recommend that your form be convex on one side and use about 8-10 pieces of flexible $^1/8$ " thick bending plywood for the concave half of the form. This way, you are using a flexible form for the concave side, and it will bend smoothly. Start applying clamps in the middle and work your way out towards the ends.

5. Glue: On your WoodWorks show, what was the glue that you used? You had it mixed in a small paper cup, it was dark in color, and I think it was a crystal type you mixed with water. Paul

David's Answer: I used an Urea Resin glue named Urac 185, but it is no longer being manufactured.

The Urea resin glue that I use now is mostly Unibond 800. It sets up faster then Urac 185, so go for the slow setting (6 parts resin to 1 part powder) method of mixing and still work quickly. I also use Dap Weldwood plastic resin glue. This one mixes with water and works fine for bentwood laminations, but be careful using this with veneers, because the water will cause the veneer to expand.



The collectors market is increasingly recognizing studio woodworking in the same light as high-end art. This is most reflected in the growing demand of decorative arts auctions, as well as competitive bidding. Heritage Auctions has responded by enlarging its 20th & 21st Century Design department, with a special emphasis on studio furniture craftsmen.

Of course, such names as **Sam Maloof, George Nakashima**, and **Wendell Castle** have been staples at contemporary auctions across the country for many years. At our auction last Fall, a *Walnut Rocking Chair* (2002) by Maloof sold for \$37,500 and a *Free-Edge Conoid Coffee Table* (circa 1975) by Nakashima sold for \$35,000.

However, markets are developing for other makers, who have not been as appreciated. Auctions give these historical artists—who may still be living—the opportunity for exposure to a larger audience and placement in context with other makers who may be better known.

One good example is **John Nyquist** of Long Beach, CA. He is a respected woodworker, and his work was included in museum shows in the 1960s and 1970s. He had a long teaching career, but his work flew largely under the



Beyond being of high quality in design and construction, what makes a piece collectable is having a story to tell. Collectors want to be connected with the artist, through a personal relationship or knowing where the piece/artist resides in the larger artistic movement. It is the job of the auction specialist to make sure that the artist's story is fully told. I use historical photographs. I feel that many collectors are hungry to be educated about other artists to build a broader picture of that artist and their work.

The hottest segment of the market, these days, are period pieces from the 1950s and 1960s, but we're also not afraid of presenting material from the entire artistic spectrum. My personal criteria for inclusion in an auction—particularly if it's not a noted historical example—is if I personally respond. I've learned to trust my gut.

However, the most important role of the auction is providing a secondary market to add the potential for future financial appreciation to the current utility and aesthetic appeal of a piece.



Michael Cullen (Petaluma, CA) Planet 9 Mahogany, milk paint (4 ⁷/₈" h, 5 ⁷/₈" w, 2 ⁷/₈" d) The *Professional Outreach Program (POP)* of the **American Association of Woodturners (AAW)** annually sponsors an exhibition of small scale, lathe turned pieces, bringing together works by professional studio turners from across many countries.

For 2016, the theme is *Patterns*, and more than three dozen artists from ten countries were invited to create work, specifically for this exhibition. They were free to interpret the theme any way that they liked, limited only in size (no larger than 8" square).

"Some artists used the grain of the wood as their inspiration, either in its natural state or altered to bring out its properties, while others used multiple woods or materials, pigments, or carving to create patterns," explains AAW curator **Tib Shaw**. "Surface design is not the easiest thing to do well. Added elements need to fit the intent of the piece—not only avoid battle with the material and form, but enhance it. Good surface design almost always reads as an integral part of the work, not as an overlaid component."

This exhibit is being presented at the AAW Gallery of Wood Art in St. Paul, MN, Mar. 6-May 22, before moving for display during the *AAW Symposium*, June 9-11, at the Atlanta Convention Center





Woodworking with Kids

Jack McKee of Bellingham, WA is a builder, designer, teacher, and writer. He has worked as a mechanic; remodeled houses; built small boats; designed (and built) equipment used by children's museums, schools and preschools; and built an electric car. His design for *Builder Boards* and for a marble roll are used in children's museums around the country.

He has written articles for Home Education, Tech Directions, Early Childhood Today, Wooden Boat, and on various internet sites. He has authored two books, Woodshop for Kids and Builder Boards.

Using his experience from teaching his own children, he proceeded to expose other kids, of all ages, to the joy of woodworking. He developed simple instructions on how to use tools and how to make a variety of projects. These lesson plans are documented in the book *Woodshop for Kids*, which includes instructions on tool techniques appropriate for children ages 4-12 and 52 woodworking projects.

Woodshop for Kids (201 pages, \$21.95), publised by Hands On Books, is available at www. woodshop4kids.com and other on-line books distributors.

The excitement and interest of my own kids about using tools, about building, and about woodworking taught me how competent children could be and inspired me to volunteer to do woodworking at my sons' school. My plan was for the students to arrive with an idea of something to build, and I would help them build it. From woodworking with my own kids, I knew enough to collect a workbench, kid-sized tools, and some scrap wood.

It turned out to be a bit more complicated than I anticipated. Two had an idea about what to build, and I was able to get them started by demonstrating a tool or helping with a design problem. Some didn't know where to begin, and I didn't know how to get them started. I tried to create, with words, an image of a project to capture their interest. I asked "Would you like to build a boat, candle holder, key ring?" The answer came back something like "maybe" or "let me think about it."

Other kids had an idea about what to build, but no clue how to begin. I had to figure out construction details off the top of my head, communicate those details to the child in a way they could understand, and show them how to use the tools. It wasn't very successful; not much was built. It was confusing for the kids, and hectic for me. At least no one got hurt.

I had expected too much. Perhaps, I made unconscious and unfair comparisons with my own children, who had been around tools since birth. I had assumed kids could use a vice. They couldn't. I assumed they knew enough to keep their fingers away from the saw teeth. They didn't. I later learned that none of the kids had ever used any tools before. How could they be expected to know what to do?

I needed to review the way that I used tools to see if I could break down actions that I did automatically, without thinking, into steps kids could understand. I started with a safety demonstration: how to carry a saw, how to put a piece of wood in the vice, and then how to use a saw. This was a step in the right direction and gave kids enough background to begin using basic hand tools, without getting hurt. I became intrigued by the details of how to use tools at a beginning level. Over time, I refined this introductory approach and developed short lessons for each tool.

I was also expecting children, who had never picked up a tool, to be able to figure out what they wanted to make, when the idea of making anything was foreign. I took a boat and a pencil holder that my son had built to the second class to see if this would help the children visualize. When I showed the boat and pencil holder, the kids reacted with excitement and enthusiasm. Everyone wanted

to build both. The class was still hectic, but it was amazing to me that a few tool lessons and a couple of projects could change the class tone from confusion and lost to interested and excited. Everyone went home with a project. The kids' enthusiasm was contagious, and I went home to think up more projects.

I had so much fun that I approached the local Park Department with the idea of a summer shop class for children. Even though I didn't have much teaching experience (none actually), they were enthusiastic. I, however, was more than a little unsure about how things would go. Could I duplicate the playful atmosphere that prevailed at home with my own boys? Would other kids respond? Could I keep them from hurting themselves? Would they be interested in the projects that I had created?


I need not have worried. That first year, half the projects that I developed were too complicated, but the other half worked surprisingly well. We did a little bit of everything: woodworking, making folk toys, taking things apart, and doing experiments with electricity. The children responded, much like my own. They appreciated real tools and engaging projects. They worked hard to be safe. The kids got a taste of the magic of building, and I got a taste of the magic of kids. It was the most meaningful, fun, and interesting woodworking that I'd ever done.

After that first summer class, I was asked to teach "shop" to 3-6 year olds at a Montessori school, where I ended up working for six years. Since then, I have instructed a variety of children in such projects as cardboard domes, take-apart playhouses, log buildings, and boats. It still amazes me how much youngsters love to build.

I have found many adults interested in woodworking with kids, but don't know where to start or what to expect. Once word got around that I did woodworking with kids, the local Washington Association for the Education of Young Children asked if I would present a workshop for teachers. I agreed and have been doing them ever since.

However, I found that even a 3-hour workshop is too short to cover everything. I have to leave things out, and sometimes, I forget to mention details. Participants always ask for more written information, especially project ideas, to share and obtain parental help.

So in an effort to help anyone who has considered woodworking with children, I've put everything, including answers to questions I've been asked in the workshops, into *Woodshop for Kids*. I hope this will help more children have the opportunity to work with wood.

Profile: John McDonald

John McDonald will be a keynote speaker at the 2016 Cabinets & Closets Show, Mar. 22-24, in Pasadena, CA. John began as a maker of solid wood furniture and cabinetry. His company evolved into Semihandmade, specializing in cabinet doors and drawer fronts for IKEA-style cabinets.

John McDonald and his company Semihandmade of Duarte, CA have created a successful woodworking business by identifing and exploiting a special niche. Here is John's story, in his own words.

I worked in the film business for 14 years doing free-lance production and scriptwriting, which meant that I was a waiter. To make extra money, I started buying old furniture to refinish and resell. One day, a friend said "you should try to make your own furniture." Though I had no previous woodworking experience, I started buying 2x4s at Home Depot and making clunky, junky tables, which sold at swap meets for \$75-\$100.

Wanting to improve, I bought woodworking books to read and found a class at Cerritos College. Just before the class began, I bought a Grizzly bandsaw, unpacked it, put the instructions aside without bothering to read them, and proceeded to cut off my finger immediately. When I showed up at class—ironically *Shop Safety*—that first day, we were asked why we wanted to learn to woodwork. I simply raised my bandaged hand.

I didn't let this injury deter me. I took classes and continued to make furniture in my garage to

sell at swap meets. Then, I started to get custom furniture and cabinet commissions, which lead to kitchen remodels. I further grew the business by doing consumer design shows. At *Dwell-on-Design*, I was the only custom cabinetmaker, and it generated clients. It also resulted in the formation of a number of professional relationships, which have proven

invaluable as the business has expanded.

At Dwell in 2009, a guy comes by and says, "you should make doors for IKEA cabinets." At first, I did not understand what he meant, but over the next 4-5 months of thinking about it, I started to incorporate some IKEA cabinets into my kitchen remodels—mixing standard IKEA boxes with my custom cabinets—to save people money.

It was obvious that there was a void in the market for quality, affordable cabinetry. The customer most often did not care if I made the boxes and drawers or if someone else did, especially if there was a significant savings (up to 40% off a typical custom kitchen). All they ultimately wanted was a beautiful and unique exterior that defines the room. And though it would cut into my margin, revenue would potentially be made up in volume.

IKEA is unique. It's a great system. The kitchens

are excellent, with European standard $^{3}/_{4}$ " TFL boxes. It is the same construction as Poggenpohl or Bulthaup. They use Blum hinges, slides, and lifts, which is what every other custom cabinetmaker uses. And most important, everything is *a la carte*. Ikea gives you the flexibility of buying all the components, without having to buy the doors.

Moreover, IKEA has 50 stores in North America, and each sells 10 kitchens a day. That's about 180,000 kitchens a year. My thinking was that if I could capture only a tiny segment of that market—who might wish for a kitchen decor beyond the standard IKEA offerings—I had a business. So, I formed Semihandmade in 2011 to provide one-of-a-kind pre-drilled doors, drawer faces, side panels, and trim for IKEA cabinet systems. We simply customize each order to the kitchen design and drop ship it directly to the client's home for installation. An example is the kitchen installation on the cover.

We offer eight categories of styles, each with a variety of material choices: *Shaker* (solid lumber frames/panels), *Classic* (real wood sequenced veneers), *Supermatte* (flat, supermatte color thermofoil in Shaker and Slab styles), *Impressions* (textured melamines), *Eco* (reconstituted real wood), *Color* (high gloss), *Reclaimed* (real lumber fronts/neutral backs), and *DIY* (unfinished parts, meant to be stained or painted). I am most excited about recent collaborations with other partners offering everything from doors made from recycled skateboards, to tiles, to licensed artwork on veneer. All standard wood and veneered products are finished with a clear solvent-

based satin conversion varnish, providing maximum protection and exposure of the material's natural beauty.

In recent years, we have expanded to include IKEA's closets, media cabinets, and bathroom cabinets (see right), and we will be announcing our own private label line of cabinets.

For the most part, IKEA has been supportive of our efforts, once they understood what we were doing. We had an incident last year at a design show in Toronto, where IKEA Canada overreacted, but they have since apologized and opened doors for our expansion in Canada. The bottom line is that we help them sell cabinets.

This business has simply taken off. I went from being a sole proprietor, living in my shop, to a company of 44 employees, operating in 18,000 sq. ft. of workspace and three showrooms. SHAVINGS & SAWDUST

MAY THE FORCE BE WITH YOU

With the release of *The Force Awakens*, **Star War** fans are again showing their dedication to the long-running film franchise. None is more fanatical than **Martin Creaney.** The Australian carpenter spent more than a year creating a wooden replica of the *Millenium Falcon*, with over 3,000 handcrafted pieces. Using MDF for the frame, he considered using Radiata Pine for the body, but wanting more depth of color, he crafted the exterior with a mix of 30 different species. The finished project measures 6 feet long and 5 feet wide, and the immaculate detail can be seen in a video at: *www.youtube.com/watch?v=CP1Fk5aUFvM*. Hopefully, it will find a home, where it can be viewed by an appreciative audience.



TALK ABOUT A PERIOD FURNITURE PIECE

In 1925, the **Harvard University–Museum of Fine Arts Expedition** discovered a small, unfinished chamber almost 100 feet underground at the famous site of Giza, Egypt. It contained the deteriorated burial equipment, sarcophagus, and other objects belonging to **Queen Hetepheres** (circa 2550 BC), who was the mother of **King Khufu** (the pharaoh who built the Great Pyramid). Conservators restored and reconstructed some of the furniture, but until today, the queen's elaborate throne existed only on paper.

Having only decaying fragments from the original, Harvard researchers used computer modeling, a 5-axis milling machine, and hand detailing to recreate a replica of the most luxurious known piece of royal furniture from that period. The

throne just went on display at the Harvard Semitic Museum in Cambridge, MA.

FINDING THE TREE WITHIN A TREE

Italian artist **Giuseppe Penone** belongs to the *Arte Povera* movement, which is concerned with establishing a contact between man and nature. The tree is a central element in much of his work. In 1980, he displayed *Tree of 12 Metres* at the Tate Gallery in London, where by he scraped away the growth rings from a felled tree to reveal its internal structure of a narrow core and developing branches. In his *Cedro di Versailles* (2004), he repeated this technique


to present the original sapling, within the context of its older self. The nearly 20-foot sculpture was a segment of the truck of an ancient Cedar tree, uprooted during a 1999 storm that wrought havoc in the Forest of Versailles in France.

"My artwork shows, with the language of sculpture, the essence of matter and tries to reveal the hidden life within," explains the artist.
