

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
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AAW TURNERS & FURNITURE SOCIETY JOINTLY HOST ANNUAL CONFERENCES

Wood turners and studio furnituremakers are coming together to jointly hold their annual conferences, June 22-25, at the Convention Center in Kansas City, MO. Both the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) and the Furniture Society FS) are composed of members, specializing in handcrafted workmanship, but the flat and round worlds have rarely overlapped. Acting in parallel, their commonality is work moving from strictly functional applications to artistic explorations. The hopes of the joint meeting is to build bridges between the two organizations, expand members' horizons, explore new design paradigms, and share expertise and enthusiasm with each other.

CONFERENCE PROGRAMS

The American Association of Woodturners' 31st annual AAW Woodturning Symposium celebrates contemporary applications of one of the world's oldest crafts. The program consists of approximately 140 sessions of demonstrations and panel discussions, involving 58 presenters. It combines instruction and exhibitions to provide educational and inspirational opportunities for turners of all skill levels, from novice to master.

The Furniture Society sessions, June 23-24, are themed as *Fresh Eyes on Furniture: Tradition and Innovation*. Sessions include both demos and panel discussions on furniture-related topics—from inlay and embellishment to cold metal casting and computer controlled routing, as well as how the disciplines of furniture making and woodturning intersect. Featured presenters include **Scott Grove, Bart Niswonger, Mark Sfirri,** and **Kimberly Winkle.**

Action begins on Thursday evening, June 22, with special interest group sessions, including Ornamental Turners, Principally Pens, Segmented Woodturners, Women in Turning, Woodturning Teachers, and Young Turners.

SPOTLIGHT ON RICHARD RAFFIN

Also on Thursday night, internationally-esteemed woodturner, author, and instructor, **Richard Raffan** will reflect on his path in life and in turning. Besides being known for his high quality functional work, the Australian Master Turner's greatest impact

on the woodturning field was through his pioneering instructional use of books and videos, beginning in the mid-1980s.

EXHIBITIONS & COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Exhibitions on display include *Waves of Grain*, a juried exhibit of 30 AAW members' work inspired by the conference's location; *The Sphere: Second Round*, an invitational exhibit of 47 *AAW Professional Outreach Program (POP)* members with the work being auctioned to support POP initiatives and programs; a retrospective of *2017 POP Merit* honoree **Ron Fleming** (see pages 54-55); *Artist Showcase*, featuring the work of **Keith Holt** and **Jim Sannerud**; the always popular *Instant Gallery*, featuring work of symposium attendees; and the *AAW Chapter Collaborative Challenge*.

This year's Return to the Community effort includes bowls available for sale to support Variety the Children's Charity of Greater Kansas City, which provides children with developmental disabilities adaptive equipment and opportunities for activity and inclusion; turned boxes will be collected for donation to Beads of Courage, supporting children coping with serious illness; and the collection of new and slightly used tools for such AAW programs as Woodturning Beyond Barriers, Turning to the Future, and Turners Without Borders.

There will be socializing opportunities, with *Social Hours* on Friday and Saturday night, as well as a Saturday night *Banquet* and *Awards Celebration*. Other activities include the *Trade Show*, with a variety of machinery, supply, and wood vendors; the *Youth Turning Workshops*; companion activities; and auctions.

One registration covers both AAW and FS conferences. *Early Bird* discounts are available thru May 7; advanced registration closes on June 11, with on-site, single day, student, youth, and educator rates available. 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Woodworking Observations

Suppose there was an international celebration of woodworking, and no one came. Could it still achieve world harmony? For the nearly 600 participants of March's World Wood Day (WWD) festival in Long Beach, CA, the answer is a resounding Yes; for the general public, not so much.

WWD was an exhilarating experience. Craftspeople from all over the world even from some countries requiring a Goggle search to see where they were—came together for a week to live together, work together, and socialize together, in the spirit of sharing their mutual interest of wood art and protecting our natural resources. From the moment of set-up, there was a flurry of shared creative energy, even when there was no common language.

Mike Hou and his Taiwanese crew must be congratulated in pulling together the complex logistics and financing of such a massive undertaking. Only lacking was marketing...a common bane for most woodworkers. Woodworker West was the only publication to promote this event, and I can honestly say that a good percentage of visitors were our readership. The four previous WWD festivals took place in third world countries, with government support. The Los Angeles market is quite different, with zillions of competing activities grabbing the local media's attention. On top of that, getting to the venue was difficult, amidst construction of infrastructure for the Long Beach Grand Prix.

Even devoting an 8-page pictorial (pages 24-29), I can barely convey the full intensity of the experience. Fortunately, the entire event was well documented by a team of cameramen, and at some point, videos will be posted at the website: www. worldwoodday.org/. There is a desire to make World Wood Day an annual event in the U.S. Hopefully, lessons learned can be applied to the future.

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EXIT STRATEGIES

Life is all about change, for woodworkers and everyone else. Our interests and abilities, our tools and shops—in fact, our very lives—are in constant flux. Sooner or later, we all will have to transition to the next, and possibly final, phase of our woodworking careers. Often these changes are incremental; sometimes they are dramatic, perhaps because of sudden changes in health or circumstances. Facing some downsizing myself, I decided to ask our visitors how they planned to deal with the endgame of their woodworking lives:

- Do you have an exit strategy from your current mode of work?
- Will you always have a shop?
- What will your last shop look like compared to what you have now?
- What sorts of things can you imagine doing in your shop as you get on in years?
- Are there unfinished projects on your bucket list that you are determined to accomplish before you're through?

The responses ranged from predictable to surprising...

"Since we're preparing to move to a smaller place, and since I'm not getting any younger, I'm having to rethink the whole concept of 'shop." I don't want to go through the huge process of setting up a large, fully-equipped shop—been there, done that—but I need to have a sanctuary where I can still make things and escape to the pleasures of hand work, design, and contemplation. I don't need to do big projects anymore, so I plan to pare down to a bench, my collection of hand tools, probably a bandsaw and a drill press, and most certainly a lathe. For anything more ambitious than this, I'll just have to cultivate arrangements with other local woodworkers who have the necessary equipment."

"My only exit strategy is death or disability. I have devoted many years learning to make furniture. Why would I waste this effort by stopping learning and making? I have an endless list of furniture to be made for family and friends. I will make furniture until I can't. I will keep at hand whatever is needed to make furniture."

"My shop is a haven, and I will have it until I pass on. It is my last shop, and I've arranged for my youngest son to inherit it. I myself will build smaller projects as time goes on."

"My kids have already put dibs on the tools they will take. I don't plan on moving or downsizing my shop in the meantime."

"If flatwork gets to be too much of a pain, I'll probably retreat to turning, small sculpture, and jewelry to play with, as I dodder on into senility."

"I'm almost 83, but I plan to make six Maloof rocking chairs for family members to remember me by, after I am gone."



"Woodworking has been my leisure activity, not my main work, so my shop is pretty small to begin with. My wife suggested I'd better stock up on or replace tools, because there wouldn't be any time in the future where we would have more money. So I did. What I have is still pretty modest, but it is sufficient for my needs and will last me until I can't do it anymore. My wife has a complete inventory of everything and an estimate of their value today. I have given a few tools to some young friends who do have an interest."

"Over time, my esthetics and interests have expanded, so I've been acquiring more equipment for metalworking and other pursuits. My shop will dissolve when I die. What happens after that is of minimal concern. I'm single. I'll try to get what remains to people who will actually use what I've accumulated. My exit strategy is to do what I can, while I can."

"I'm 77 now, and I will work in my shop until they carry me out. I have one more blanket chest to finish, and then all my children and grand daughters will have a chest built by me. I will then mostly build smaller items and intarsia projects."

"When I can't get to the shop anymore, I'm going to switch from segmented woodturning to quilting. In both cases, you take a piece of material, cut it up, and then sew it back together. I don't know how my wife is going to handle sharing her sewing room with me. Probably about as well as I would handle her coming out and working in my shop."

"I have all the tools I need, have always had a small shop, and other activities interest me more than woodworking. I have a few projects in the works, but after that, I would really like to get into building model ships from scratch. I plan on keeping a few hand tools, band saw, drill press, and a spindle sander. The rest will be disposed of at a local flea market."

"I have spent a lifetime accumulating tools, skills, and materials. At 67, after losing a year to prostate cancer treatment, it occurred to me that my heirs don't want my shop; so my exit strategy is to just keep working. I have started to build the furniture that I have been putting aside for years. I am considering building a coffin for myself or perhaps turning an urn. The best anyone can hope for is to die well."

"At 46, I don't have any plans to retire the shop, while I can still walk around."

"This is a very relevant topic for me, as I recently moved into a condo, with no shop facilities, and my old carcass isn't getting any better. So, I sold my stationary machines and donated my lathe to a local senior workshop, where I, and others, can use it."

"My current shop is my last shop, as we don't plan to move unless we really have to. When the time comes, I will donate a lot of tools to the educational fund of our local woodworking club, as I have no one to leave them to. Meanwhile, I have a bunch of UFO's (unfinished objects) that need work, mostly smaller projects. Pipe dreams include a cedar strip canoe or kayak."

"My wife and I are not where we want to be 10 years from now, because it is too remote from medical care and a better support infrastructure. I'll probably end up with half a garage, so I'll have to determine how many tools that I will be able to have. For sure, I'll have to keep my work place a lot neater."

"This was a topic of conversation last weekend with someone on the verge of moving, and her children are trying to discourage her from moving her shop to the new location. Even though she does not work in the shop as much as in the past, she still likes to know that she has a shop and it still provides a sanctuary where she is happy. She certainly will be paring down, but her basic tools will remain the source of her happiness."

"At one point, I had a large pole barn for my shop. When we built a new house in an 'over 50's development and I was confronted with the overwhelming task of moving my shop, I pretty much decided to sell everything and find a new hobby. But friends dissuaded me, and we moved all but the heavier equipment to the new place. I now make smaller projects, and I am glad to have my shop. My plan is to just keep on keeping on 'til I can't anymore."

"Change is on my mind these days, because my dad is 92, and I am living those changes through him. And, there are things I would like to do other than have a workshop. I still do a lot of fly tying, which shows how a huge world can be contained within a very small footprint. One doesn't have to do big things. Having said that, while the noose in my mind is tightening, I am still adding to the shop."

"My shop is my escape, so I guess I'll always have one, but my wife and I are thinking about downsizing in a few years. I think I can get by with just a lathe, a bandsaw, hand tools, carving tools, and a workbench. If possible, I'd like to keep my jointer and planer, and maybe a tiny tablesaw, all on rollers so they can be stored in a smaller space. Sell the big lathe and keep the midi. Downsize the dust collector and sell the big air compressor. Start using wipe-on finishes, instead of keeping spray equipment. I plan to have an auction company liquidate my shop and give the proceeds to my son, so having a big shop will pay off for someone."

"I've been getting into smaller-scale work, like 3-D mechanical puzzles, which lend themselves to a small scale, precision tool set. I'm also thinking of getting into carving and intarsia, which lend themselves to smaller spaces and quieter work."

"These thoughts float through our minds, the farther down that path we travel. A friend who lives in a retirement community keeps a few hand tools in the garage and uses the well-equipped community shop for larger work. I've also considered setting up a shop inside a 20-ft. shipping container, so when I move, I could take it with me. It wouldn't need dust collection; just put the lathe at the front, open the doors and turn on a big fan behind it."

"If I had to give this place up and start over, I'm not sure I wouldn't just give all my tools to my son and daughter and quit completely. I don't think that I would be able to work happily making do and not having the machines or tools that are meant for the job."

"If I didn't have access to a shop, I'd seriously consider joining a maker space to gain access to equipment." "I don't have an exit strategy, but I sometimes get an itch to do a wall-to-wall inventory, so that my wife won't be stuck. Then I go out there and realize that the mess is too intimidating for me to even start."

"I'm planning to do more hand work, while keeping one powered lathe and a compact spring pole lathe. I hope to work green wood with hand tools, so I'll want a carving bench, shave horse, and a few chopping blocks to make spoons, bowls, and relief carving on riven panels in the **Peter Follansbee** tradition."

"As I get older, I'm losing more and more friends and relatives, so I suspect I'll be turning cremation urns for the rest of my days. I'd better plan ahead and prepare one for my own remains, cuz I won't be there to make one when the time comes. Maybe there is no getting out of this turning stuff—literally, if my own ashes are destined to go into a turned object. Deep thought for the day."

"As long as I can walk up and down the basement steps, I will keep my small basement shop."

"I always thought that I would build a fully-equipped workshop when I retired. But when the time came, I couldn't see spending the \$40K, so I just continue to share my turning space with my bass boat in my 3-car garage. I make a lot of items for charity, which gives me a lot of satisfaction. So, I'm really content in my small space, and I plan to keep it that way for a long time."

"My shop is only 9 ft. x 17 ft. and, at 71, I plan for it to be my last. It is dedicated to hand tools, except for a small planer and bandsaw. I have really enjoyed the challenge of learning the necessary hand tool skills to do the quality of work that I did with power tools. I will work wood as long as I can get to my shop."

"My only woodworking now is whatever I need to keep my old home from falling apart. I have a lot of other hobbies, but I don't plan to sell my woodworking tools any time soon, unless health and mobility issues force us to move to a more octogenarian-friendly location. A friend of mine sold his woodworking and metalworking tools when he was in his early 80's, rather than leaving that task to his wife."

"I'm only 76, so I plan to keep on with woodworking for quite awhile. I am currently taking a class on making chairs; darn, they are so hard with all those compound angles! I can say, though, that I probably have all the tools I could ever want, but don't hold me to that!"

"Somewhat tongue in cheek, I say they'll take me out of here in a box, although it'll be a hollow form since I intend to be cremated."

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WHAT'S NEW

BOSCH TO COMPLY WITH REAXX BAN

Bosch has agreed to comply with the U.S. International Trade Commission ban on sales of its *Reaxx Jobsite Table Saw*. However the company will continue to seek appeal options and vows to support distributors and customers with parts and service.

The ban, which went into effect on March 27, is the result of a ruling that the Reaxx Saw violates two patents held by **SawStop** for flesh sensing technology designed to protect users from accidentally being injured by a saw. Bosch maintains that the saw does not infringe on SawStop patents, which expire in 2020 and 2022, and represents anew technology.

FORMER MAKEPEACE SCHOOL GUTTED

An early morning fire on April 15 gutted a stately mansion in Dorset, England, once the home of renowned furniture maker **John Makepeace's** *School for Craftsmen in Wood* (1977-2000). Parnham House dates back to the 16th century and was considered to be one of Dorset's oldest Elizabethan stately homes, registered as a historic landmark. Cause of the blaze is under investigation.

RECALL NOTICES

Black+Decker and **Craftsmen** are recalling their 10" portable Table Saw (#JT2504BD and #137.415030 respectively). Sold exclusively at Walmart and Sears, the black foldable stand is subject to collapsing unexpectedly, posing laceration and impact injury hazards to the operator. Users should immediately stop using the recalled table saws and contact manufacturer Rexon for a free replacement stand, by calling: (866) 934-6360.

STIHL is recalling its gas-powered chain saws (#MS 461 & #MS 461R). The fuel line can leak, posing fire and burn hazards. Consumers should contact Stihl for a free inspection and free repair, at the website: www.stihlusa.com or by calling: (800) 233-4729.

Wing Enterprises is recalling its *Little Giant Ladders* (models Velocity, LT, and Liberty). The ladders' locking pins/rung fasteners can fail, posing a fall hazard to consumers on the ladder. LAWSUIT FOR NOT BEING SAWSTOP

A 35-year-old Oregon man, **Noly Chouinard**, is applying the **SawStop** argument in a lawsuit, seeking damages from a wood chipper accident. On only his 13th day working for a tree-care company, the suit states that a utility rope used to lower large branches from a tree down to the wood chipper got caught in the chipper, pulling Chouinard headfirst into the machine. With his head only inches from the chopping blades, his knee, luckily hit the emergency shut-off button, breaking the knee but preventing further damage to his head.

The plaintiff was in a coma for four days and suffered a crushed skull, bleeding near his brain, brain damage, a broken leg, a torn meniscus, and torn ligaments and tendons. He has a metal plate in his head and has undergone three knee surgeries, totaling more than \$700,000 in medical bills, but he still can not walk properly.

In a \$16.7 million lawsuit, he alleges that the machine, manufactured by **Vermeer Manufacturing**, lacked readily available technology to prevent catastrophic injuries, such as automatically shutting off when a person comes into contact with the framework (i.e., flesh detection). His employer has already been subject to a proposed fine of \$2,150 by the state for safety violations.

Festool has launched its new *Airstream* battery technology, which it says will reduce charging times by up to 60%. The new charging system pulls cooled air through the air intakes of the battery pack and channels airflow through the cells and into the charger, while heat from both the battery and charger are exhausted to the side. KRENOV'S WIFE BRITTA PASSES

Britta Krenov, long-time wife of master woodworker and educator **James Krenov,** passed away in February, at age 94. They met in Paris in 1947, and she certainly became the woman behind the man. Starting out together, she asked him what he truly wanted to do with his life. When he replied, 'perhaps woodworking?,' she became a teacher and supported the family of four, while Jim built his career.

When Jim established the woodworking program at College of the Redwoods, Britta became the 'Bonus Mom' of the woodworking school, attending to students who missed their homes and worried about their future. As James became a famous figure, Britta was wellknown and very much loved in her own right.

After James passing,

she founded **The Krenov Foundation**, which is creating an archive of Krenov's work and writings, awarding scholarships, and supporting exhibitions of fine furniture. A \$500 *Krenov Foundation Award* is presented annually at the Sonoma County *Artistry in Wood* exhibition, and the \$2,500 *Professional Development Award* assists an emerging fine woodworking professional as an artistin-residence or visiting scholar at a nationally-recognized woodworking school or craft center.



Marquetry Demo & Question

by David Marks

I recently was invited to teach a demo on double bevel marquetry for a tech company at their private woodshop in the San Francisco Bay Area. Victoria accompanied me to help, and we were both amazed by the enormous facility and its amenities. The security was very impressive, as we are accustomed to our home Woodshop environment on our acre of land in Santa Rosa, CA.

Jennifer, the friendly Woodshop manager, met us at the main entrance of the company and guided us thru security to the shop. The shop was very well-equipped with everything from a SawStop table saw to a Powermatic lathe, as well as all of the necessary tools expected for a working wood shop.

I really enjoyed meeting the dozen or so company employees that came in to see my demonstration. There was even a young woman that has been studying at the Krenov school in Fort Bragg for several years which I was glad to hear.

My demonstration was inlaying a fish into a piece of Wenge.




Tracing the outline of fish for the demo project.

Now, for a question. . .

1. Table Top Joinery: I'm a novice woodworker and am about to build a large kitchen table. I found your explanation of a loose Mortice & Tenon joint to be the most straightforward that I've seen. I plan to use this method to join the aprons to the legs. I did want to ask your personal opinion on the table top. What joinery do you use to join the top pieces to each other? I know the top needs to be able to move on the base for expansion/contraction, and I plan on using brackets for that. But as far as "paneling up" the top, I've seen lots of different methods (joint-glue-clamp, biscuits, dowels, pocket holes on the bottom, etc). Mark

David's Answer: In terms of joining the planks for the kitchen table top, generally I just glue those up long grain to long grain. If you are familiar with the technique of bentwood lamination where wood is

sawn into thin strips, coated with glue, and then assembled into a form and clamped up, then you will understand that once the glue dries, all the pieces remain in a solid curved, form. Gluing up table tops is similar, except now you are using wider pieces of wood, as opposed to thinner pieces of wood, and all the pieces are glued up parallel to each other in a straight line. Generally, the only time you need joinery (such as splines, dowels, biscuits, dovetails, finger joints, screws, mortise & tenons, etc.) is when you are joining end grain, which is far more porous, to long grain.

One of the concerns that you will encounter is keeping the boards or planks flat while you glue them and clamp them together. This is why some people like to use biscuits, splines, or dowels, and I myself will use them on occasion, as a method to register the boards flush with each other at the top.


Since I have several torsion boxes in my shop, my preferred method is as follows:

- Face joint the boards first (get the width of the board flat)
- Then run the opposite face through the planer to get it parallel
- Then edge joint one side
- Next rip the opposite edge parallel on the table saw.
- Then do a very light pass on the jointer to clean up the edge from the table saw


At this point, the boards are ready to glue up. I lay newspaper down on top of the torsion box and have my clamps placed next to it. I always do a dry fit to determine any challenges before the glue goes on. I like to use cauls to create downward pressure, which insures that everything is pressed flat down against my torsion box (which is flat). I place the boards on the torsion box, place my clamps perpendicular to the edges, and lightly apply pressure. After that, I would select cauls long enough to be placed across the width of the boards and begin clamping those down to either side of the torsion box. The cauls will press the boards flat to the torsion box, insuring that the table top will be nice and flat. After glue up, all that should be required is perhaps scraping off the glue squeeze out and leveling the faces, which certainly should be close (within $\frac{1}{64}$ of an inch or so).

Hopefully, if all the milling went well, all you will need to do is scrape off the glue and then sand the table top to remove any mill marks left by the planer. For those that prefer hand tools, you could use a sharp, finely tuned hand plane to remove any mill marks left by the planer. Scrapers also do a fine job, which I find myself using more often than not, due to the fact that I have a preference for highly figured hardwoods that do not always lend themselves easily to hand planing.


This event included woodworking demonstrations, an academic symposium, and a cultural program culminating in a Saturday evening musical concert. Activities actually began weeks beforehand. Artist **David Best**, known for his extraordinary large-scaled temples at *Burning Man*, and his team of volunteers created a spiritual work most fitting for Southern California—a *Temple Bus* (left). The 20-passenger vehicle was adorned with Birch plywood fretwork and a removable spire. Conference participants were encouraged to carve plaques—illustrating a personal story, dream, or message—for later attachment to the bus.

Another group with an early start was the **Collaborative Project.** Consisting of 20 artists from 16 countries, the team, headed by **Cillian O'Suilleabhain** of Ireland and **Michael Cullen** of Petaluma, CA, began working a week earlier at Cerritos College, where they designed and machined their sculptures addressing the theme of *Rooted*.

The pieces were moved to the convention center, for completion of handwork and finishing. The resulting works (lower left) consisted of a 5-foot tall seed, chainsawed out of a block of White Oak, and a collection of five Cherry monoliths (up to 12-feet tall), abstractly symbolizing a forest grove. The seed was placed at the entrance to the hall, while the trees were erected in the center of the hall's activities.

The Wood Design section was comprised of 15 studio wood artists, each conducting their own design explorations, ranging from furniture pieces by Jennifer Anderson, Chance Coalter, Matt Hutton, Brian Newell, Mark Sfirri, Ryan Taber, and Kimberly Winkle to fantasy coffins by Eric Adjetey Anang of Ghana and a paddleboat by David Trubridge of New Zealand.











Japan, China

Circling the center of the Exhibition Hall was the **Woodcarving Show.** 120 relief woodcarvers from 70 different countries were assigned to international teams of 3-4 to work together to create sculptural designs on wood slabs, as long as 13-feet, over five days. From the moment the teams selected their slabs of wood, they immediately went to work, combining styles and techniques. Through collaboration, different approaches sparked creativity and artistic development, with the ultimate goal of rediscovery—how passion is shared beyond boundaries. On the concluding day, there was a showcase of the final products. Here is a sampling from the 30 or so completed pieces, with identification of the participants' nationalities.







A variety of techniques and styles were on display in the **Woodturning Demonstration Area**. Besides our more common electrical lathes, there were the more unusual human powered lathes—including a hand lathe whose design is 5,000 years old, a foot-powered lathe that could have been the predecessor to today's elliptical exercise machines, a foot-peddle lathe, a Bamboo spring-pole lathe, and a bicycle powered lathe. Demonstrating turners were **Sally Ault** (CA), **Steve Abshear** (CA), **Andy Chen** (TX), **Sandy Huse** (CA), **Dale E Larson** (OR), **Janice Levi** (Tx), **Murray Lincoln** (Canada), **Xuemin Li** (China), **Bill Loitz** (CA), **David Marks** (CA), **Merryll Saylan** (CA), and **Derek Weidman** (PA). Examples of demonstrators works were exhibited in display cases.

As a true example of collaboration, Andy Chen (TX) always needs a partner to turn on his home-made bicycle powered lathe.

The broad range of Folk Art from across the world was on display, with an international array of craftsmen. Attendees were also entertained throughout the day—and at a Saturday Evening Concert—by more than 40 ensembles—composed of 100 musicians from 6 continents playing wooden instruments. Following the festival, boats on display were launched to sail across Long Beach Harbor to the Queen Mary and back.





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Profile: Ron Fleming

The American Association of Woodturners (AAW) will honor Ron Fleming of Tulsa, OK at its 2017 annual symposium in June. Ron will receive the 2017 POP Merit Award for his 35-year career that significantly contributed to the growth of woodturning as an art form. Here is Ron's story, in his own words:

My interest in art began as a young child. Growing up in rural Oklahoma, we didn't have television nor any of the luxuries of today. Instead, I drew pictures and painted, often copying the lids of puzzle boxes. By age 13, I was working as an artist for a print shop in Oklahoma City.

When it came time for college, I followed my parent's wishes to study engineering, and I became a civil engineer designing bridges. It was math, math, math. . . and I wanted to be an

illustrator. So, I took a job with Douglas Aircraft as an airbrush artist, illustrating technical manuals. After three years, I left to start my own commercial illustration business.

Gaining representation in New York City, I grew **Graphic Associates** into a company of 20, producing corporate reports, advertisements, and product packaging for a

Fortune 500 client list. However, the demands of the commercial illustration world are unreal, both in terms of deadlines and workloads. I was working 16 hours a day. As an outlet, I took up woodcarving and woodturning around 1980, as a means to

relieve the stress. It was so mesmerizing.

I had gained an appreciation for wood and basic woodworking skills from my grandfather. I admit my early work was pretty crude, and what I was trying to accomplish was unlike anything else being done at the time. I was greatly encouraged by the **Edward Jacobson** collection catalog, which showcased turned wood as an art form. This provided an incentive to improve my technical skills.

Just as I was becoming disillusioned with the world of commercial illustration—especially with the introduction of computer graphics in the late 1980's—I was approached by Connecticut gallery owner **Michael Mendelson** to sell my wood art. The timing was right. . .

I had no desire to punch buttons on a keyboard all day, and my interest in carving and turning was growing. So my wife **Patty**—an artist in her own right—and I transitioned to form **Hearthstone Studios**, converting an old municipal incinerator building into our home and studio. And Michael kept us busy. We were working as hard as we did as illustrators. . . only, we were doing this for ourselves and not to satisfy a client.

Patty and I worked in collaboration. We would discuss design ideas, sometimes sitting in the hot tub. She was very good at telling a story with a piece. We both would carve, though she had little interest in turning. . . but she did do a lot of sanding. Our pieces were very labor-intensive, taking several months to complete.

The works that we are most known for are our natural forms, i.e., leaves, flowers, and grasses carved into the sides of a vessel. The initial inspiration came when finding a Rosebud in our yard. I brought it in and said to Patty, "Wouldn't this make an interesting vessel." Rather than copy, I would sketch out stylized Art Deco interpretations. I would follow the grain, beginning at a central point on the bottom and spiraling all the way to the top.

Our garden was a major source of ideas, as well as images from trips. I once did a large bowl with diamonds on the sides, similar to the back of an alligator that I saw during a canoe trip on a South African river. I entered that piece in a statewide art show and won *First Place*. But within five minutes of the show's opening, it was knocked off its pedestal and broke. The insurance company initially said "couldn't you just glue it together and sell it," but ultimately, they paid.

To my galleries' chagrin, I was never an artist that did the same thing over and over. I will do 5-6 pieces in the same style or technique, then I'll see something that will lead my mind to venture down a different course.


My favorite piece is *Dragon Dance* (on the cover). I spent so much time designing it. Unlike Chinese dragons that are fierce and mean, I wanted mine to be happy-go-lucky. I designed eight of them, all different, dancing around. This was one of my pieces that was then cast in crystal (above) and bronze, and I must admit that they are even more stunning than in wood.

Patty passed away in 2003, and I sort of dropped out of the wood scene for 10 years. I continued to work, but I didn't go to any shows. It hasn't been the same without her.

My current work is Science Fiction-oriented, relating to visitor's from outer space and crop circles, including *Planets in Space* (right). You have to be a science fiction nut to understand. Approaching 80, I am trying to do things that don't involve carving forever. These pieces are pretty much done freehand on the lathe.

Woodworking has been an amazing journey. I have documented my career in a new book *Insights & Inspirations*, and a sampling of my work will be exhibited at the *AAW Symposium* in Kansas City.

THE SCIECE OF DETECTING FAKES

The Winterthur Museum in Wilmington, DE is hosting an interesting exhibit, Treasures on Trial: The Art and Science of Detecting Fakes, thru Jan. 7. This exhibit explains how conservation sciences have been use to uncover 40 of the most notorious cases of fakes and forgeries, including paintings, couture, sports memorabilia, furniture, silver, and more. Some of the fakes and forgeries are exhibited, alongside authentic objects and are accompanied by new and rarely seen scientific insights from the Witherthur's own Scientific Research and Analysis Lab.

One of the pieces is a Chest of Drawers, purported to have been

made in Newport, RI (circa 1750), "probably the work of one of the Townsends." The piece ended up in the collection of Henry Francis du Pont and exhibited as an antique. However scientific analysis has dated it as being made between 1890-1920 in Connecticut.



Another example is a violin with a label claiming that it was made by Antonio Stradivari (1644-1738). However, the label was printed on wove paper, not generally use in Europe until the late 18th century. Visitors can also listen to recordings to compare the sound of the instrument to the a genuine Stradivari instrument. This violin does appear to date from 19th century, though the maker is unidentified.

This exhibition also discusses some of the difficulties associated with proving whether something is fake or genuine. An example is a Windsor Chair that has examined by three "experts," who provided differing opinions in a court case.

Cerritos College in Norwalk, CA offers an ART+TECH Artist-in-Residence Program, in which a professional visual artist is paired to work with a technology department on campus. The 2016 Artist-in-Residence Stephanie

Deumer collaborated with Reuben Foat of the Woodworking Department to create a large-scale installation, inspired by a dollhouse that was meticulously handmade by the artist's mother.

The task was to enlarge the original dollhouse miniature furnishings to life-size. Each piece was 3D scanned and then constructed to human scale using CNC machinery. Through various digital processes and translations, the pieces paradoxically become nostalgic, harkening back to childhood toys, recollections, and a time, when handmade wood crafting was valued to a greater





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
