

TABLESAW REGULATIONS ANYONE?

The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is revisiting the issue of tablesaw safety, by currently soliciting comments on proposed regulations limiting blade depth when contacted by a human body part. The proposed rule would address an estimated 54,800 medically treated blade-contact injuries annually—with estimated benefits of \$625 million to \$2.3 billion in injuries prevented—at an expected cost to industry of between \$170 million to \$345 million per year. SawStop has marketed saws that meet this standard for some time, but Bosch's recently introduced alternative—the Reaxx jobsite saw—is being excluded from the U.S. market, as a result of a patent infringement decision by the International Trade Commission last March. This issue produced a lengthy discussion among our website visitors, resulting in some excellent insights—and some mixed feelings—about the proposed regulations...

"There is no question that SawStop was a marvelous advancement

in wood shop safety when it was introduced, but should everyone have to buy this insurance for a problem that can be avoided through propered ucation and operating procedures? The underlying

question is should SawStop be rewarded for preventing a better technology (the Bosch Reaxx) from entering the marketplace?"

"The CPSC firmly believes that tablesaw injuries are a real problem that needs attention. Though impressed with the SawStop technology, the Commission, in the previous review, was not about to mandate a monopoly to benefit SawStop. Rather, the Commission wanted to wait until a viable alternative technology was available and on the market before proposing regulations to require these kinds of safety features. The proposed regulation purports to set a standard that new tablesaws must meet with regard to limiting injury; it does not seek to mandate how that is accomplished."

"There is only one saw on the market that would meet this regulation. That saw is protected by not one, but dozens of patents. The inventor of that saw and principals of the company are also patent attorneys. If the patent office and the courts continue to operate as they have, these patents will never expire."

"Government analysis points out that the benefits exceed the costs of this technology. But, the regulation can't affect existing tablesaws, and 45% of all estimated tablesaw-related, emergency department-treated injuries that were related to the victim making contact with the blade involved consumers older than 60 years of age. When economically assessing a proposed regulation, the

focus should be on how benefits and costs will change due to the regulation."


"None of this type of regulation should be legal until the proposed solutions are actually outside of current patents and are safe and economical"

"As a patent attorney and a happy SawStop owner, I think you may want to wait until all relevant patents expire for a safety regulation to come into being or such patents are required to be licensed on reasonable terms. 'Reasonable' means different things to different people, but it is an amount that is greater than zero. Another thing to consider is that this rule making may be a way for companies, like Bosch, to get their products into the American market before the expiration of the SawStop patents."

"I agree about rejecting the proposed regulation, if it gives a patent holder an industry monopoly. SawStop patents should be expiring soon, right?"

"What I took from this report: There's a compelling need for improved tablesaw safety; riving knives and splitters are ineffective in eliminating serious tablesaw injuries; more AIM (active injury mitigation) saws are inevitable; tablesaw prices will rise substantially because of AIM regulations and increased liability insurance; patent fights will only delay manufacturer launches; new rules should wait until manufacturers can retool their products; in the future, and non-AIM saws will have poor resale value."

"The SawStop is a pretty remarkable invention. It makes sense for it to be in schools and shops of hobbyists, who can afford it. A group of other manufacturers worked together to develop a similar system that stops the blade without slamming a block of aluminum into the blade. They worked pretty hard to avoid violating existing



patents, but there is an ongoing court battle, keeping this system out of the market. I feel that competition is better for everybody than a monopoly, yet adoption of this regulation would essentially give a monopoly to a company that has already earned a huge market share, based on their implementation of their good idea."

"The issue here is how much more will the saw that I want cost, not how much will the only one that has this technology cost? How much will other company's products cost to be modified to this new standard? And, the main qualifier for any regulation like this: Will this piece of unnecessary regulation make certain companies withdraw from the marketplace?"

"Proper training on the operation of tablesaws would reduce, if not eliminate, the kind of problem. If I don't trust a machine like that, why should I be forced to buy one? How long will it take before the nanny government shuts a business down because they don't use SawStop technology? Will hobbyists have to buy them also? Will it force all makers of saws without this technology out of business?"

"I am troubled by the destruction of saw blades when the device falsely triggers."

"Regulations or laws should never be enacted, passed, approved, or even considered seriously, if they result in a sole-source situation with regard to patents."

"SawStop has a great idea, but the technology that makes it work is pretty simple. The flesh-sensing part is the same type of circuit used in a touch lamp, so what is left to patent? Or do we patent the larger idea and say that any device that stops any machine when a finger touches the dangerous part belongs to one company?"

"The legal battle started before the Bosch saw was released, and some were sold before there was a ruling and an injunction. Bosch is a huge company with pretty deep pockets, so they didn't come into this unprepared. SawStop has its own patent attorneys. Some people cast this as David vs. Goliath, but that's not the case. David doesn't need to hire an outside firm to fight the case in court. Like most things in our legal system, patents and patent law are used in all kinds of ways to stifle competition. Protecting intellectual property is important, but the laws are often bent and twisted to favor one company over another. My understanding is that the Patent Office no longer checks as thoroughly as they once did and lets the courts figure it out later. The real problem to me is that we are no longer trying to make the world a safer place or protect an inventor from being ripped off, we're waiting to see who can out-lawyer the other."

"I agree that the patent laws are broken in a number of respects and need serious updating and revision. But they were not originally intended to be used as they are today. The original idea was to encourage research and development by giving an inventor a protected interest in his invention for a period of time. The purpose is still valid. Without real incentives, few would be willing to risk the kind of serious investment in R&D and marketing that is required to perfect a truly new product and bring it to market. Unfortunately, the cost of litigating patent issues has put the legal system out of reach for the ordinary small businessman, and this is the root of the problem. Until the legal protections afforded by the law are reasonably available to everybody, the patent laws will continue to favor those with deep pockets."

"All this is true about a broken patent system. And my opinion is that the period of the patent is too long. As has been already stated, the patent office does not do the checking it should do. In this case, the patent is being driven as a vehicle into a government regulation, an abuse of the system. That should be plainly stopped.

This regulation should not happen unless and until the patent is either nullified or forced to be totally minimized. Regulation should never be aimed at producing a monopoly for a given vendor."

"The industry is sitting back, waiting for the SawStop patents to expire. Then, they will copy or clone the technology to save R&D costs."

"If 92% of tablesaw injuries are related to the victim making contact with the saw blade, that is operator error. There is never any excuse for that, which presumably makes technology the only solution for those whose stupidity can't be cured."

"I think a rule that enshrines SawStop would help return the tool business to the U.S., to some degree, since regulation is a means of installing non-tariff import barriers. That might appeal to the Trump administration."

"Part of the problem with the U.S. stationary power tool market is that it has not embraced proven technologies and advances in machinery; designs dating back nearly 100 years remain on the market. Asian discount manufacturers copied the tired designs and kept them alive for the last 40 years, when they surely should have cratered. SawStop is just another kludge to keep bad designs in the market."

"If this regulation gets through, then what is next? There are all

kinds of tools that mangle people."

"Personally I have never felt the need for government edict protection from any machine. I have been designing, building, and using machinery for over 60 years. I have a jointer that can rip your hand off, a planer that can do the same, a lathe and routers that can mangle all your

appendages. Not to mention my 1 hp drill press can wrap your hand around a spindle or make many serious cuts, if a piece of metal is caught on the bit and starts swinging. When the government sets safety standards, our freedoms are little-by-little restricted. We, as a human race, will always figure out how to bypass safeties and do stupid things with a tool that it was never designed or intended to do. Due to the fact that lawyers are trying to force the SawStop on the public, I personally would never purchase one, even if they were the cheapest, best saw on the market. This is me. I don't fault those who made the decision to purchase one, but I sure feel it should be each individual's decision. You can force people to wear seat belts, but you can't stop the people from driving recklessly."

"I can understand the government requiring safety features on machinery that is used by businesses, as they employ people who have no choice in determining what safety features they want or need. But, hobbyists are free to determine what tools they feel safe in using; we do have choices. Some people use a bandsaw, as they are afraid of tablesaws. Others choose to use hand tools only, although I have had more injuries from chisels than from power tools."

"There was an old axiom my father used to say: Freedom means you can swing your fist as far as you want as long as you don't hit anyone else. In my mind, that is still true. You should be able to do anything you want, or use any machine or tool, as long as it doesn't harm or endanger others."

"Freedom does involve risk. When edicts are made to prevent all danger, some freedoms are lost. I don't want any of my freedoms to be determined by any government."

"I wonder if the insurance industry might be one of the primary drivers of this regulation, since, in the Massachusetts lawsuit, it was the insurance company, not the injured man, that pushed the suit."

"I just did a Google patent search on **Stephen Gass,** the inventor of SawStop, and I got more than 280 hits. There is an obvious pattern to all these patents. Many of these are 'improvements' to the original SawStop patent, with relatively recent dates. I don't see a clever guy trying to protect his ideas from would be competitors; I see somebody trying to sew up a significant market segment by patenting every possible part multiple times. If you were trying to compete with that you would spend a fortune on legal fees just in researching the existing patents. Unless our current system is changed, the SawStop patents will never expire."

"I have never had an accident in which a technology like that being pushed by SawStop would have prevented it. People get injured because they are doing something wrong. So, is this regulation even necessary? Does it cause more harm than good, like causing other tool companies to go out of business or increasing saw prices dramatically? Regardless, I think that under no circumstances should the government enact a regulation, legislation, or court ruling that requires a technology, if a single company has a patent on that technology. The main problem is that the patent itself is an advantage for an inventor. For the government to enact a technology-driven requirement gives the inventor an entirely doubled-down advantage. That is clearly an abuse of the system. I would have fewer objections if the SawStop patents are released."

"I understand the issues with cost. I looked a few things up yesterday, and my back of the envelope assessment is that costs might rise between \$50-\$200. This is based on some guesses as to margin and what licensing fees might cost. In my opinion, costs are going to be capped by the current differential in prices, with and without the flesh sensing technology. Since saw customers are price sensitive, I don't see any current manufacturers cutting their throats by passing on the costs in such a way that would make their saws noncompetitive with SawStop."

"I also think that prices might actually drop a bit, as multiple companies hit the market with competitive technologies—even with a SawStop license payment. This is speculation on my part, but the saw manufacturers that oppose SawStop are a pretty ruthless bunch, and I can see resulting price war. Lower prices will mean lower royalties and fewer sales by SawStop."

"I see the numbers of tablesaws sales dropping off so much in the future that projections are incredibly speculative. If the number of estate sales and poor used machinery market are any indicators, woodworking will be a rare hobby in 10-15 years."

"The Bosch Reaxx job site saw, with Bosch's 'active response' technology, is 17 lbs. heavier and 2" taller than their standard model, presumably because the technology requires a larger, more rigid frame. I would expect that the added weight would be roughly constant across most higher-priced job site saws, and substantially greater for lower cost saws, which typically use a lot of plastic components."

"I don't see the licensing fee, or even the R&D costs, as being significant factors influencing decisions taken by the major power tool manufacturers in opposing the adoption of the technology. Rather, I suspect that the cost impact of upgrading lower cost saws to withstand the forces exerted when an "active response"

technology is activated would result in there being no sub-\$600 saws available through places as Lowes and Home Depot."

"Building a portable saw to withstand the forces imposed when the blade retraction is activated adds around 50 lbs. to the weight of the saw and something like \$500 to the wholesale cost, which will effectively remove all sub-\$1000 (retail) saws from the market."

"I believe that over 80% of the tablesaws sold in the U.S. each year cost less than \$300. So the real cost to incorporate active response technology in every tablesaw is not the licensing costs, it's the likely reduction in tablesaw sales. This may not be a bad thing, depending on how you view tablesaw use by untrained hands."


"Once the new safety technologies are mandated, we are likely to see far fewer of the sub-\$200 price point saws. But those cheap saws are probably better correlated with injury than more expensive saws, so the proposed regulation would probably be effective in reducing the raw numbers of injuries."

"Pricing tablesaws out of the reach of many would be expected to lead to a reduction in tablesaw injuries, but it might also lead to a substantial increase in circular saw injuries, as people try to use a circular saw or saber saw to make cuts that really should be made on a tablesaw."

"I have two saws, and rather than buy one with the new technology, I will just keep the old ones, buy a new motor for each, and resharpen my blades until they are not regrindable anymore."

"In the present political climate of reducing or eliminating regulations, I have trouble seeing this as a successful effort."


BRIAN BOGGS WINS FEDEX GRANT

For the last five years, FedEx has conducted a Small Business Grant Contest, in which small business owners compete for over \$120,000 in cash and prizes. Hundreds of small businesses presented business plans on the FedEx website, and ten awards were determine by a vote of the public.

Among the winners was furnituremaker Brian Boggs of Asheville, NC, who received \$8,000 in cash and Fedex services. He proposed to use the funding to install a spray booth (for water-base finishes) to dramatically improve his ability to finish in a timely, safe, and sustainable fashion. The Grand Prize of \$32,500 in cash and Fedex services went to **Sword & Plough** of New York, which hires military veterans to repurpose military surplus into clothes and accessories.

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WHAT'S NEW

FRACTAL BURNING BAN

Fractal Burning has received a growing amount of attention, especially on social media Internet sites. It is a technique of wood burning, in which high voltage electricity creates Lichtenberg figures in wood soaked in salt water. The result is a burnt branching design on the surface of the wood.

However, at least two recent deaths have resulted in electrocution while using this method of embellishment. The latest is a hobbyist woodworker in Walla Walla, WA. In most cases, this technique is undertaken with home-made apparatus.

As a result of the potential danger, the American Association of Woodturners (AAW) has issued a policy opposing the use of Fractal Burning. AAW is prohibiting its use in any AAW-sponsored events (including regional and

national symposia) and strongly urges clubs to refrain from demonstrating or featuring the process in chapter events. Further, the process of Fractal Burning shall not be featured in any written or online AAW publication, except within articles that warn against its use. AAW publications will not accept advertisements for any products or supplies directly related to the process. Additionally, the Safety Committee recommended that an article be published in the August 2017 issue of *American Woodturner* to highlight the dangers of the practice and publicize the new AAW policy.


BIG ISLAND WOODTURNERS INVITATIONAL





From David Marks Studio

Using Templates & Question

by David Marks

Many woodworkers have commented on the number of templates I make. I will often hear humorous remarks like; "You must own stock in MDF" (medium density fiberboard) or "I'll bet you have a warehouse somewhere to store all of your MDF patterns." I have even heard one gentleman ask "Wouldn't it be faster to just build the piece of furniture rather than spend all of that time making full scale drawings, mock ups, and templates?" My response was "Yes, but I'm not always happy with the outcome."

My methods are a system that I have developed from over 40 years of working with wood. I am meticulous by nature, and I do not like wasting expensive hardwood. As a result, I have developed an approach to furniture making that makes sense to me.

I always begin with sketches because it is the least expensive and quickest way to sort through ideas. If I see something I like, I develop it further. Once I decide to commit to a project, I will draw it full scale on a piece of ¹/s" MDF in three views: Plan (Top), End, and Side. As I go through this exercise, I'll learn more about the piece, thus preventing possible mistakes from occurring down the line. Another reason that I make so many templates is the fact that I like to design pieces with

curved lines, and it is much more difficult to build woodwork with curves than woodwork that is composed of straight lines.

A decent quality tablesaw with a sharp, good quality carbide blade will yield lots of smooth straight cuts requiring little effort to scrape and sand smooth the various facets of a linear design. By contrast, a bookcase, made from a dense wood (i.e., Jatoba) that has solid wood sides with elongated S curves, is somewhat of a chore to shape when it comes time to make two sides that are a mirror image of each other and finesse those curves.

Pattern routing, also known as silhouette cutting and template routing, is a very efficient solution. For one thing, it is much easier to shape a piece of MDF than a piece of wood.

If you have ever tried to smooth a curve in a piece of hard-wood after it has been cut out on a band saw, then you know what I am talking about. Wood has a grain structure to it, and you will find the long grain fibers are easier to work with than the end grain.

MDF is made from glue and compressed sawdust, with no grain structure, making it very easy to shape. After band sawing I'll follow up with a pattern makers rasp and then fare the final curve with sandpaper. I find that the best way to blend the transitions is to double stick tape a piece of 80 grit sandpaper to a thin piece of wood $^{1}/_{16}$ " to $^{1}/_{8}$ " and work it back and forth, leveling the high spots down to the low spots. Once the pattern or template is smooth, double stick tape it to the hardwood stock and band saw the profile staying at least $^{1}/_{16}$ " away from the template.

After band sawing, you can use a router with a flush trim bit to finish it off. The bearing will rub against your template, while the cutter removes all of the excess wood flush to the edge of your template. Carbide bits work really well, and for difficult woods, I use a spiral or helical-shaped carbide bit.

Now, for a question. . .

1. Gilding Ungessoed Wood: I once saw a picture frame that was completely gilded, yet the gold was tissue thin and one could see the figured wood grain right through the gold — obviously no gesso or bole was used. How is this done? What is the technique called? Was the gold an especially fine thinness, and if so, what does one ask for when buying the gold leaf? The frame was at a museum show, and no one at the museum could help me. The effect was very handsome, and I want to replicate it on old Paulowina wood bases for a pair of Japanese bronze cachepots. Walter

David's Answer: Your question about the picture frame with Gold leaf so thin that you could see the figured wood right through it is very intriguing.

You are correct that no gesso or bole would have been used underneath the gold, because they are both opaque. This means that the base had to be transparent. I have used shellac as a good base to seal the wood. Shellac will dry to a transparent finish, so that you can see the beauty of the grain through the clear finish.

I also like to use oil-based quick dry size (gold leaf adhesive) as a base, because it will fill faster and dry to a harder surface. Genuine Gold leaf is beaten to a thinness of anywhere from 3 to 5 millionths of an inch. I once had a physicist in one of my classes that told me that Gold Leaf was 400 atoms thick. The Rutherford Experiment validates this statement.

So, we know that Genuine Gold leaf in the 22 to 24 Karat range is already extremely thin, but I have applied single layers of 23.75 Karat Gold, and it is still opaque on the wood.

I have seen some antique Gold leafed frames where the Gold had been rubbed over the years to a point where you could see the bole (red clay) through the Gold. In speaking with Museum guides, it has been suggested that cleaners will dust the frames by rubbing them with a soft cloth, and eventually they rub through the gold. Walter, my suggestion is that you create a series of sample boards and do some experiments.

Since you stated that you would like to use Paulowina wood, then I recommend building a clear base finish using oil-based quick dry size. The quick dry size will dry enough to be sanded in approximately 4 to 5 hours, if it's in a warm environment (75° to 80°). Sand it with 320 grit in between coats (you might need to start with 220) to smooth it and keep applying coats (drying, then sanding) until the wood is smooth to your liking. Since Paulowina is an open grained wood, this might take a while. Another option would be to use a closed grain wood, such as Maple.

Once the surface is filled and smooth, then I would wet sand the finish with 1000 grit wet/dry sandpaper to get a glass smooth surface. Now, you are ready to gild. Use a very fine sable/synthetic hair brush with a square end. The brush should be nice and soft.

Brush on one coat of quick dry oil based size.

Once it has dried to a dry tack (you can lightly drag your knuckle across the surface and hear a slight squeaking sound), then you can apply the genuine Gold Leaf.

After the surface has dried overnight, you can smooth it with a cotton ball (don't use synthetic cotton balls, they will scratch the surface). I would allow the surface to harden for several days, maybe longer, and then begin rubbing it with a soft cotton tee shirt.

I don't know how long it might take to rub enough atoms of gold off before you begin to see the wood underneath, but I'm sure that eventually you will rub some of the gold away.

The faster technique for "aging" gold would be to rub it lightly with 0000 steel wool. I have seen this technique used to get an antique look, but it does have a scratchy appearance.

Another technique would be to rub some of the gold off using rottenstone powder on a soft cotton cloth.



But more importantly, I look forward to this show as a way of checking where I am now and where I'd like to be in another two years. Between the machinery, supplies, and the *College of Knowledge*, this event falls far down the scale toward technical rather than aesthetic. I enjoy both kinds of events, but this one provides me with a chance to feed my inner techno-twit. I like to gawk at the big stuff, which I will never need or afford, but I go for the smaller things that I hope will help me elevate my game without financially knocking me into a bigger league where I cannot compete. The seminars offered through the *College of Knowledge* can fill in significant gaps in understanding, especially if you are making a bigger leap.

In the months leading up to AWFS, I take a close look at what I have been doing and what I would like to be doing a year or two down the road. Where are the possible upgrades that will help me to be more accurate and more productive? How can I work smarter and faster? It usually boils down to an older machine that I have been itching to replace with something bigger and better. And yet, my personal review also helps me to take a closer look at my methods of work and how I might change them for a broader upgrade: Is this the year that I decide to "go digital" in both design and fabrication? Is this the year that I step up my finishing process? Is this the year for a big overhaul of dust collection? Rather than apply a patch and replace only one machine, should I really look at how I can upgrade a whole system? Can I be better positioned to work smarter, not harder?

In making these decisions, it is imperative that I do some close calculations, before I even step onto the show floor. If I don't, I risk making a big and expensive mistake that will take years to amortize—and that will make me more gun-shy about significant changes for the future. Big shop or small shop, the same rules apply to the decision-making process.

FIVE KEY QUESTIONS

1. What is my budget? Like going to Las Vegas to gamble, I'd better put a limit on the bleeding. What can I afford and how will I pay the bill? I try to look at how new tooling will "earn its keep" on an on-going basis and save me time. If I run this out, when will my purchase pay for itself? Is this a tool that I only need for one job—should I simply sub it out instead? Often, I have had a job waiting in the wings, and I can see the payoff in one job. That's a big win, but I don't want something gathering dust that I only used once.

- 2. This is perhaps the most important question to ask, but the hardest to answer: Where is the need? What capacity do I wish to increase? Which areas need to be streamlined for smoother work flow or greater profit? Identifying the weakest area or the one with the greatest potential is the biggest single step. I leave myself enough time before heading to the show to examine different areas and processes and evaluate how changes might help me to grow. I talk with others who have made changes about their purchases and the fall-out. Then, I decide which one is THE one for this round of upgades. What might the gains be? I do a few quick time studies, based on educated guesses, on how the cash outlay will reap gains over the next two years. When will this upgrade pay for itself? Is it worth it? And does it fit with the budget I have set?
- 3. How much floor space am I willing to allocate for the new tooling or machinery? I have a small shop, and space is at a premium. Do I have the infeed and outfeed space that I will need to be able to use the machine, without a significant struggle each time I want to run a longer or wider piece through it? If I need a bigger space for a bigger machine, what is going to change to allow me to move in a much larger chunk of iron? Is there a way to sell off something that this machine will eliminate? Can I recoup some of the price by selling my older machine? Am I being realistic about all of this? I'd better be.
- 4. What are the increased electrical requirements that the new machine might generate? Do I have the capacity in my box already or will I need to upgrade this as well? Back to question one, for more deliberation. And then where will the electrical line come from? Is there an outlet near? And incidentally, what about dust collection? Can I use the same port as the old machine, or will the increased capacity mean a bigger diameter duct and blast gate?
- 5. Can I easily remove the old machinery and install the new machinery without removing doors, taking

out walls, or having to move other pieces of heavy equipment? My father once purchased a big, new printing press off the floor of a show, a great bargain on a wonderful new machine, but never realized that it would not fit through the big double doors at the back of the print shop. With the riggers waiting in a snowstorm, we madly "renovated" the double doors, adding several inches to the width and height, and hundreds of dollars to the cost. The new opening was vaguely sealed with plywood and plastic until the spring, and it rankled him every time he looked at it.

There is one other factor that I have left out, but really need to discuss: the unknown. The reason to attend these shows in the first place is that we come across new and unexpected options. We need to allow ourselves to rethink on the fly. Last time I went to AWFS, I was looking for a new fence for my table saw, which seemed to be a simple and straightforward problem. I thought it would be easy and the solution relatively inexpensive. But the well-known names in fences were not at the show, and I didn't see anything that was really a step up. A friend suggested that we look at what Tiger Stop had to offer. I was dubious, not because I don't like their stuff, but because it is way more than I thought I needed. After discussions with the rep, sleeping on it, and talking with my wife, I decided to pull the trigger. I admit that I was a bit worried about it, but once installed, it has proven to be all I wanted and so much more. It is a game changer for me, and I am glad that I allowed myself to step out a bit and rethink the purchase. But overnight, I still went back to my five questions and made sure that I was sufficiently satisfied with the answers, before I handed over my credit card.

In the long run, you may decide not to make changes for the time being. I have been looking to upgrade my band saw for years, but have not found anything that truly does what I want and would make the upgrade pay for itself. Maybe this year, I will. I'll see you on the floor of the show!







The Northwest Woodworking Studio (NWS) in Portland, OR begins its 18th year, offering its innovative *Mastery Study* programs. Under the tutelage of Master Craftsman, educator, and author Gary Rogowski, these unique, hands-on educational experiences offer the advantages of an apprenticeship in formats to fit the student's personal needs. They also go beyond the focus on techniques to provide a broad background in design for anyone wanting to become a studio furnituremaker.

NWS offers three *Mastery Study programs: Local Mastery, Distance Mastery,* and *Resident Mastery.* The first two programs are 2 years, with students working at their own pace. The *Resident Mastery* is a 9-month intensive program, where students work at the Studio on a daily basis. The end goal for each program is the completion of a signature gallery-quality work of their own design.

The Local Mastery Study program is designed for self-directed students with their own workshops in the Portland area. Students design and construct a total of 10 pieces, as well as visit the Studio for lectures, demonstrations, and critiques. Year One emphasizes hand tool skills, router use, carving, and basic construction and joinery skills, while Year Two focuses on furniture

design, effective machine use & maintenance, carving, inlay, bentwood construction, and fine cabinetry including drawer work.

A graduate of the *Local Mastery Study* is **Jeff O'Brien**, who has operated a successful furnituremaking business for over 10 years (*www. dogwood-design.com*). Looking for a mid-career change, he came with little woodworking experience. "Besides learning the many ways to join two pieces of wood together, the biggest benefit was design—the ability to create, evaluate, and build it. This was my most creative time; I had complete control over what I designed and built. Now, most of my projects are client driven, and I'm constrained by that."

Kent Saunders, a 2011 *Local Mastery* graduate, concurs: "What I didn't expect to learn was design, problem-solving, and coming up with your own creations. Gary knows a lot about what he is doing. It was a great experience."

The **Distance Mastery Study** is similar, but for motivated students who reside outside the Portland area (with participants from Alaska to Florida). Students will meet at NWS for a 4-day orientation seminar at the start, and then return to their home shops to undertake a series of exercises and projects, communicating with Gary and classmates via telephone and on-line. Every three months or so, the class reconvenes at the Portland studio for a 3-4 day seminar and critique.

David Corey's Signature Project *Three Drawer Chest* Walnut, Mahogany, Yellowheart, White Oak, marble (31" h, 39" w, 18" d)

David Corey of Utah was a 2005 graduate of the *Distance Mastery Study*. "Before coming to NWS, I made Missionstyle pieces from plans. I did not have the design skills to create original pieces, nor the training in methods of work for crafting details. After two years in the program, I can say that I understand the interaction between the wood and the tools, which is required to be safe and make great pieces. But besides mechanics, the real takeaway for me was my evolution as a designer. Gary opened my eyes to historical design periods. Bringing your piece to class and going through the critique process, certainly accelerates your growth and development as a furnituremaker."

Matthew Kanomata of Northern California just graduated last year and has started his full time furniture business. "It taught me to notice the small details, and that it is part of being human to make mistakes then figure out how to fix them. I am learning what Gary meant in saying 'Woodworking is a great way to live, but a hard way to make a living.'"

The **Resident Mastery Program** is a more intense, 9-month course, working on-site at NWS. Limited to four, students undertake both Design Projects and Bench Projects, chosen to teach certain methods, techniques, and approaches in learning effective hand tool techniques, machine use and maintenance, production methods, and shop setup. . . all the while developing a signature style of their own.

Kate Fox completed the *Resident Mastery* program in 2015, after a 6-year Army career. With the assistance of the Department of Veterans Affairs Vocational Rehabilitation Program, Kate has used the NWS experience as the basis of creating her contemporary furniture business, Shrewd Woodworks (*www.woodshrew.com*), and a local timber reclamation and milling operation. She is also developing new classes to teach at the school.

According to Gary, "We have changed many lives. The Studio is a place to become who you are. We teach more than woodworking. We are a school of thought; a brand of philosophy that says no to the quickly done, the badly made, and the throw away mentality of our world today."

Fall classes begin in October, with an application deadline of Sept.

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Profile: Brian Newell

Walnut Cabinet Bastogne Walnut (40" h, 72" w, 12" d) With a carving background, Brian Newell of Fort Bragg, CA brings a unique perspective to crafting furniture. Here is Brian's story, in his own words:

I am not sure why I got started woodworking. No one in my family did it. The best that I can recollect is that I was fascinated by the woodcarvers in a tourist town of German immigrants not far from where I grew up. By age 8, I was whittling, and at 12, I saved enough to buy a 12-piece carving set from the *Woodcraft* catalog and the book, *Manual of Traditional Woodcarving*. In my parent's basement, I taught myself how to do relief carving, with all sorts of details and ornamentation. Learning the nuances of woodworking (grain patterns, what direction to cut, how sharp the chisel needs to be, etc.) was a good grounding; I made a real intimate connection with wood.

In Junior High, I was introduced to power tools, and by Senior year in high school, I was the de facto teacher's assistant. I just loved it so much. It was good to help people out. I also had a side business of carving signs for local stores.

It was at this time that I encountered **James Krenov's** book *A Cabinetmaker's Notebook.* Advertised as the woodworking "whyto," I remembered how disappointed I was when I opened it. Compared to complicated shapes and curves of the carving world, Krenov's work was so simple and visually austere. Then, I read the book, and it spoke to me, even at my young age. I was a Krenov fan, from that point on.

Growing up in Flint, MI, almost everyone worked on the General Motors assembly line. Wanting something better, college was seen as my way out. The University of Michigan was very exhilarating, like being in a foreign country. Eventually, I discovered the recreational wood shop, and I got a job as a monitor and teacher. It was fantastic, a great community. The problem was that it usurped all my energy for academics, and working with my hands won out.

In my Senior year, I quit college and immediately applied to James Krenov's school at College of the Redwoods in Fort Bragg, CA. It was a validation for me. Suddenly, I was in a room with people who took woodworking seriously, and I was exposed to people who were making a living doing it. It was intense. Lots to learn. This was the launching pad for my professional career.

In the school's tradition, my early work was very much like Krenov's pieces, but with carving embellishments. Then, I was exposed to veneers, and I wanted curves, I wanted parquetry. I realize how to make more interesting furniture. With Krenov's recommendation, I got a piece accepted by the Pritam & Eames gallery in New York, and it sold. . . They wanted more.

After College of the Redwoods, I ended up in Chicago, working as a patternmaker in the scale model industry. Our job was carving forms out of Basswood from drawings to make the plastic molds.

Essentially, I spent all day carving compound curves for car bumpers, engine parts, hubcaps, etc., with tolerances of $\pm .005$ ". I am grateful for the

experience, as it made me fearless when it came to curves. These skills became ingrained, and later made my furniture more interesting. I am not restricted by machine limitations, anything is possible.

This job also supplied the financial support for assembling my own woodshop. As I continued to work, I spent my "free time" (before and after work and weekends) making furniture. I began to build a client base, I produced one piece a year for Pritam & Eames, and I slowly weaned myself away from patternmaking, over a 4-year period.

I admit that I didn't have much of a social life, except for twice-a-year trips to Italy. On one trip, I met a Japanese textile artist, who I followed back to Japan and married. For the next 10 years, we lived in Japan. This was my dream period. I built a shop, and without economic pressure, I had time to focus on my work, explore my ideas, and develop a style. Most of my pieces were shipped to Pritam & Eames for sale.

My cabinetry pieces are characterized by compound curves. My *Ebony Desk*, on the cover, is an extreme example with curves on all sides, even the tops. In this case, the cores are carved from Basswood, and skinned with veneer. It was constructed as component panels assembled together. I prefer pieces for display in the center of a room, so they can be visually seen in the round, but this is rarely practical.

Another series of recent work is my horizontal wall cabinets. Carved from solid wood, I can play with shadow imagery against the wall. And I enjoy making them, sitting at the bench, listening to music, and carving the wood. It's a very nice way to spend time.

The piece that received the greatest visibility is the *Cicada Cabinet*, created for the *Inspired by China* exhibition at the Peabody Essex Museum in Salem, MA. Made of rare Zitan and Oxwood, the piece was inspired by a carved jade pendant of a cicada, given to me by Chinese friends. The carved lattice work is a traditional Chinese pattern, over 3,000 years old. This work became the cover piece for the exhibit and was purchased for the museum's permanent collection.

In 2007, we returned to the U.S., settling in Fort Bragg, CA. This is also the time that the studio furniture market began to wane, with a number of gallery closings (including Pritam & Eames). Luckily, I have had some very good clients supporting my work.

Currently, I am excited about renovating an old dairy barn in Fort Bragg into a Community Workshop, with a gallery and courtyard for events. People are genuinely excited, and we have a waiting list for bench space. Our goal is to open by year's end.

HUNTING FOR GIANTS IN THE FOREST

There are giants in the forest outside Copenhagen, Denmark, as if Shrek and his friends have come alive. *The Forgotten Giants* are a sculptural project by Danish wood artist **Thomas Dambo**, consisting of six large figures made from locally-acquired scrapwood and recycled materials. With the purpose of encouraging people to visit the wooded area, the sculptures are scattered throughout the forest—hidden behind trees, under bridges. THE ORIENTAL LION

A giant wooden sculpture of a roaring lion now stands proudly in the city square of Wuhan, China. Nearly 50-feet long and 17-feet tall, the work was carved from a single Redwood tree trunk over the span of 3 years. Under supervision of Chinese architect **Dengding Rui Yao**, the sculpture was completed by a team of 20 carvers in Myanmar and then transported 3,000 miles to reach Fortune Plaza Times Square. It has been designated as the world's largest Redwood sculpture by the *Guinness Book of World Records*. Most of the statue retains the rough texture inherent in the log. Only head, nails and tail are polished.





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
