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


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FURNITUREMAKER & TEACHER **JOHN NYQUIST PASSES AT 82**

John Nyquist of Long Beach, CA passed away in August from complications of Parkinson's disease. John was among the early studio furnituremakers that emerged in the late 1950s and 1960s

to help define the modern California furniture style. He was also a teacher that influenced generations of future furnituremakers.

John's interest in woodworking emerged as an industrial design student at Long Beach State University. With the support of instructor Tom Ferrara, he was exposed to the Southern California Designer Craftsmen organization and discovered that handcrafted furniture could become a possible career path.

Beginning out of his garage in 1959, he secured orders from schools and corporations for desks, tables, display cabinets, arts equipment, and whatever came his way. On the side, he constructed residential furniture and exhibited at shows throughout the state. The prestigious California Design showcase, held every three years, provided great exposure, resulting in clients that lasted

throughout his career. "It was Southern California's golden age of craft. After

World War II, everyone seemed to be moving to California, and a spirit of design and discovery was occurring in all of the arts. Arts and Architecture magazine sponsored the experimental design of the Case Study houses, the Los Angeles Times provided significant coverage of craftsmanship in its Home magazine, the museums hosted exhibitions of work by local makers, and architectural firms were as interested in how homes were furnished as the structural design. It was a lucrative market in the '50s, '60s, and '70s."



His work drew upon the Shakers and Greene & Greene, but he was heavily influenced by Scandinavian design, which was popular in Southern California. "It was clean and unembellished which

complemented the Modernist architecture of the time. It certainly provided the basis of the California Roundover-style pursued by myself. Sam Maloof, Art Carpenter, and others."

Though his repertoire ranged from music and candle stands to drawered case goods and large conference and dining tables, he was particularly known for his chairs. "I've made lots of chairs: dining chairs, occasional chairs, side chairs, office chairs, and rocking chairs. When you make a lot of dining tables, you need 6-10 chairs to go with each."

Besides running a full-time studio. John made time to teach. "I taught at Long Beach State for 20 years, then 20 years at Cerritos College. To further the educational experience, I offered internships in my shop, exposing

students to all aspects of the business—from meeting with clients to material shopping and hands-on construction—and I probably had over 30 students apprentice with me." John also was one

of the founding woodworking instructors at Anderson Ranch Art Center, "That first summer, we had the barn, some worn out equipment, a family of skunks, and not much else."

Auction house Bonhams & Butterfields celebrated his 50th anniversary as a furnituremaker in 2009 by hosting a special event in his honor and including six of his pieces in its 20th Century Decorative Arts auction.

John was remembered at a beautiful reception in his home, attended by appreciative friends, clients, and former students.

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DARKENING OAK

Oak, in its many varieties, is one of the most ubiquitous and desirable woods for furniture and cabinerity. Hard and strong with pronounced grain and strikking medullary rays, it lends itself well to all sorts of for woodworking projects, from barns to boats to helmoons. Naturally light in color, most Ook species benefit from staining and darkening treatments, many of which were introduced and/or perfected by Gustav Stickley and other makers of the Arts & Crafts period at the turn of the 19th Century.

One of our messageboard regulars, recently commissioned to build an Oak dining table, brought up the question of how best to darken Oak, to produce the rich and authentic brown color of antique furniture. The replies covered the gamut of options, from furning with ammonia to chemical treatments to staining methods:

"A solution of vinegar and steel wool will turn it very dark, almost black, but it can be sanded lighter with little effort."

"Furning with ammonia is dangerous, and then you've got this highly toxic stuff left to deal with, while homemade concortions like steel wool and vinegar or Walnut hulls and ammonia don't produce controllable results. Instead, I use an NGR [non-grain-raising] dye stain to get the even ground color more characteristic of an aged patina, then work over that with a pigmented oil stain. Rubbing in the oil stain will let you create the appearance of wear on edges."

"I have had good success furning with plain, unscented household ammonia. I tent the furniture or whatever in a large plastic bag, laying saucers of ammonia inside to fume the piece, preferably outside when the weather is warm. The ammonia produces a somewhat cool, grayish color, so I follow with TransTint® Mission Brown dye and finish with varnish or shellae. You might even like the Mission Brown without fuming." to ammonia fumes will be less than cleaning car windows with Windex", and much less than shoveling out the hen house. Also, ammonia triggers a response that initiates retreat from any harmful concentration. I don't regard it as any more hazardous than anything I use for finishing. Do wear safety glasses, as high concentration will damage ever.

"When fuming Oak, I replace the ammonia occasionally to keep it fresh. Ambient temperature affects the process as well. The result is a cool blue-gray Oak that I then apply Tried & True[™] varnish oil. The result is a medium brown that I am pleased with for Arts & Crafts-style furniture, I suquest experimenting on a piece of scraw bood."

"I'm fearful of concentrated ammonia. From what I've read, even Stickley used dyes or stains, due to the color variation caused by sapwood to heartwood."

"Blueprint ammonia (28%) is quicker than household (5%) ammonia, and the longer you expose the wood to the fumes, the deeper the color penetration. One thing about furning; it turns the medullary rays dark, as well as the spring and summer wood. So if the look you want is with dramatic, lighter-colored rays against a brown background, I would suggest staining with some combination of dyes and pigment stains, even varying the order of anolication to see the effect.

"The best reason to use dye as opposed to traditional methods that react with chemicals in the wood is better control over color variation."

"Household ammonia is not dangerous compared to solvents that most of us use on a regular basis. Those of us without sensitive skin do not notice any adverse reaction to the low concentration found in consumer grades of ammonia. Splash protection is wise, as it will irritate eyes and sinuses. Industrial ammonia is a whole other question. I used to use a dilute version of it in blue line copy machines—it was only a few times stronger than household. Catching a strong wiff of that while changing bottles was like getting socked in the nose. Can't even imagine working with the real anhydrous stuff!"

"Ammonium hydroxide in concentrations of 30% or more causes a strong reaction when inhaled, burning lung tissue, which in turn causes swelling. People with compromised lung function may be less able to withstand inhalation, and children are more at risk.



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because of their relative proportion of lung surface to body size."

"Besides inhalation, there are risks not only from improper handling, but also from accident: One could trip in the tent when walking away from the just-filled dish; a drop could splash into one's eye while pouring the ammonia; one could even fall over the dish and not see well enough to exit the tent rapidly; the bottle could suffer accidental damage and leakage; a curious child could open the bottle; and so on. Not likely, but neither is being struck by lightning or an oncoming driver suffering a heart attack."

"If you want to turn Oak black, ferric acetate, made from vinegar and steel wool, is your solution. Even at relatively dilute strengths, the Oak looked like I sprayed it with a rattle can of flat black."

"Oak is so pretty and dramatic, why make it dark?"

"Years ago, I recall articles about a 'secret' Walnut stain, made from a dollop of roofing tar mixed in mineral spirits."

"Yup. Roofing tar is also called asphaltum. It is the colorant in Watco Dark Walnut, and probably also in smaller amounts in their other Walnut Danish oil varieties."

"If you have several different pieces (chairs, table, sideboard, etc...) I'd go for a method that makes your life less complicated. Mohawk's medium dark Walnut stain works well. It has a reddish hue as the predominant color, though it is definitely brown. Also, Bona (for hardwood floors) makes very good oil based stains. Again dark Walnut color is good and there are other shades from which to choose. Both brands of right'ry dast and both are oil based."

ADDITIONAL INSIGHTS ON DARKING OAK FROM ROBERT W. LANG

WoodCentral contributor Robert W. Lang, former editor of Popular Woodworking magazine, and author of many books and articles about Craftsman-style and A&C furniture, offered some extended comments on the topic of coloring

There are plenty of methods for coloring Oak and other woods. If you want to experiment with coloring by

chemical reaction, don't do it if you're trying to match (or come close to) to the color of something else. You just won't have the degree of control that you have with other methods.

In my experience, vinegar and iron can be a crap shoot. Washing with strong tea before application can help to get you to a strong black, but you might end up with purple.

Blueprint ammonia can be handled safely, but caution is advised. I wear goggles, good gloves, and a respirator, and I have the tent and dish ready before opening the jug.

Beyond the safety precautions, there are a couple of issues to keep in mind when fuming wood. The amount of tannic acid in each piece of wood determines how much of a reaction results. This will vary, and sapwood won't turn color at all. This kind of thing can be corrected with careful application of aniline dve at the end.

Also, the color from fuming won't look right until you apply a finish. It should look like you ruined it, but a wash coat of amber or garnet shellac makes the magic happen. You'll have a nice warm brown.

Here's an easy, fool-resistant recipe that doesn't require fuming. Get a good oil-based dye stain with an appropriate color.

(TIP: Find an old timer at the paint store who remembers what Minwax 'Special Walnut' looked like.)

Apply a coat of stain, let it dry for a day or two, and follow with a coat of one of the 'Walnut' flavors of Danish oil. This combo will give an even color on both the flakes (rays) and the surrounding wood. If you're after an authentic look, you do not want the figure to 'pope'; you want it subdued. Give the oil a day or two to dry, and coat with shellac, using amber or garnet if you want to warm up the color. After the shellac, apply your go-to finish.

Another option is to color with aniline dye. Lockwood has a furmed Oak, 'in light, medium, and dark, but you can control the intensity with the amount of solvent you use to dissolve the dye. To my eye, this comes closest to a fumed finish, and it gives you good control of the outcome.

WHAT'S NEW

TURNER RAY KEY PASSES

Master turner **Ray Key** passed away in September, after a lifetime as a craftsman and teacher. Though a Brit, he greatly influenced the craft in the U.S. through his books, videos, and frequent demonstrations and workshops at American symposia and clubs.

Attracted to woodturning at age 10 in Birmingham, England, his career began in 1958 as a patternmaker, creating objects with fine tolerances. In 1965, he bought his first lathe and developed his skills as a production turner, going solo full-time in 1973. By 1984, he

began focusing his work on bowls, platters, vessels, and boxes, as he became known to the collector community

"My work embraces minimalism; my quest is to produce objects of beauty and elegant simplicity. I am a great believer of the object as a whole; not a disjointed assemblage of different ones. My design bywords are 'keep it simple stupid,' 'let the wood speak for itself,' and 'if in doubt leave it out.'

Invited to American symposia in the early 1980's, he discovered the growing hobbyist and collector market for woodturning. Being charming and witty, he became a much sought-out demonstrator for events and clubs across the U.S. Back home, he helped found the Association of Woodturners of Great Britisin.

He also was among the earliest teachers to use media for woodturning instruction. Beginning in 1987, he published Woodruming and Design: Woodruming with Ray Key: Techniques, Tools and Projects: Woodruming-Nobook and The Woodrumer's Workshook. An Inspirational and Practical Guide to Designing and Making, Later, he produced a ceries of videos, many accessible on the Internet.

His awards include an AAW Honorary Lifetime Membership (2001), Master in Turning award from the Worshipful Company of Turners (2012), and the British Empire Medal, among the highest honors for British citizens (2015).

"The world wide growth of turning organizations, seminars, workshops, hobby turning, equipment development etc. is unbelievable. Perhaps the most significant and important development of the ancient craft is that it is now accepted as an 'art form'."

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Woodworking Observations

In this last issue of our 31st year, I will use this space to cover a variety of miscellaneous topics:

First, I apologize if mailed subscribers received this issue a little later than normal. I've been slow in recovering from my most recent hospitalization, which hopefully will resolve my health problems of the past two years. I want to take this time to thank all the well wishers who communicated their concerns through emails, voice mails, and cards. Wil ack of recomps was only a factor of perevo allocation.

I particularly want to thank my wife **Pam**, who not only took care of me, but assumed a major burden of the operation of this publication, while dealing with some of her own health problems. A good indication of our progress has been her ability to return to the shop this week to resume work on a much delayed furniture project.

Since we last met, there have been a number of significant passings. I lead this issue with the death of John Nyquist. He did not have the name recognition of Sam Maloof and Art Espenet Carpenter, but he was among the early furnituremakers of the late '50s and '60s that exemplified what became known as the California Roundverstyle. He established his client base through regional shows and selling through local stores, but he did have a national audience, as reflected by the number of his pieces showing ou at auctions across the country.

However, his long-lasting legacy is as a teacher and role model for how to become a successful studio furniture maker. His 40 years as an instructor spawned several generations that have impacted the woodworking field as makers and business persons. It was only fitting that his memorial reception took place among his furnishings in his home.

In this issue, I also note the passing of **Ray Key**. He was a British turner who made a livelihood doing production work, until he surprisingly found a market of American hobbyists who actually turned for pleasure. With a charming personality, he was among the earliest educators of woodturning, through live demonstrations, books, and videos. Support by the American collector community also allowed him to move from quantity production to artistic work.

Another loss from the woodturning field is **Stephen Mark Paulsen**, among the early crop of contemporary turned wood artists. He was largely known for his wood-crafted perfume bottles and his wall assemblies—tableaux featuring positioned turned objects. His work will be showcased in an upcoming exhibition of work from the *Lipton Collection* at the Beatrice Wood Center for the Arts in Oaja. CA.

And as we go to press, I am informed of the death of **Bob Oswald**. Bob was one of my go-to guys on what was happening in the woodworking scene in Portland, OR. In retirement, he became a dedicated furnituremaker, as well as an active member in the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers. He served as the Guild's President, long-time Newsletter editor, and Webmaster. He was working on Guild business, up to days before he peacefully passed away.

Lastly, plagiarism of design is an issue that regularly comes up in woodworking conversations. Though he did not want to discuss it in our interview, our profiled artist. Greg Klassen, has been susceptible to this for his River* table series. He may not have been the first to cut a slab length-wise and leave negative space in a tabletop, but he certainly is the one to popularize the technique, receiving international media coverage as well as praise by Martha Stewart. The design found a market, definitely quiving a boast to his strugding infine furniture business.

And recently, others have taken it upon themselves to sell similar tables. I attended a national conference where one presenter boasted about such a design, claiming he was filing for a patent, yet afterwards admitting the idea was based on a picture of a Greg Klassen table. There is little that Greg can do to protect his design idea, other than offer a Certificace of Authenticity, but he has trademarked the River® Table name (registration number is 5,549,965) for some protection. Copiers will have to show some originality in coming up with a different name.

DESIGN IN WOOD 2019

WHITE HOUSE CRAFT COLLECTION

of American Crafts: 25th Anniversary Exhibit, thru Mar. 31. As part of the 1993 Year of American Craft Celebration, former First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton requested Michael Monroe, then Curator-in-Charge of the Smithsonian Institute's Renwick Gallery, to assemble a collection of the best American contemporary craft.

The collection consists of 73 works in wood, ceramic, fiber, glass, and metal by 78 American craftspersons. The exhibition debuted at the White House during the 1993 holiday season and was viewed by over 1.5 million visitors. It then traveled to museums across the United States for seven years, including the National Museum of American Art in Washington, D.C., the American Craft Museum in New York, and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art in Los Angeles. The current exhibition is the first public display of the work in 18 years.

"When we moved into the White House more than 25 years ago, we realized that we were temporary residents of a 200-year-old museum that belonged, and still belongs, to the American people," explained Secretary Clinton."We thought it was fitting that the 'people's house' become a showcase for one of the nation's oldest cultural forms. And we wanted to make sure the White House continued to reflect

Wood is the most prominent medium in the collection, accounting for more than a quarter of the work. Among the 20 pieces are a rocking chair by Sam Maloof, a sculptural clock by Wendell Castle, a multi-layered architectural box by Po Shun Leong, and a laminated bandsaw vessel by Peter Petrochko. The remainder of the pieces are turned wood, with work by Fletcher Cox, Frank E. Cummings

III, Virginia Dotson, David Ellsworth, Ronald F. Fleming, Bob Hawks, Robyn Horn, John Jordan, Ronald E. 

"Wendell Castle constantly pursued new ways of approaching art, making major conceptual leaps in the worlds of sculpture, design

and craft," said Julián Zugazagoitia. Director of the Nelson-Atkins, "He was a master at articulating a presence in a void."

Born in Emporia, Kansas in 1932, Wendell is considered the father of the art furniture movement and he continually pushed boundaries during his prolific career of more than 60 years. Trained as an industrial designer and sculptor at the University of Kansas, he moved to New York in the early 1960s to teach at the School of American Craftsmen at the Rochester Institute of Technology in New York. He set up a nearby studio and began his professional career making sculptural furniture with a chainsaw. He developed a stack lamination process, allowing him to create virtually any shape out of wood.

Wendell, whose first work in an exhibition was shown at the Nelson-Atkins in 1960, considered form and function equally, defying categorization by generating creations that skirted the boundaries of both art and furniture. His work, intentionally enigmatic, could be a chair from one perspective and a sculpture from another.

"He was an innovator who turned furniture into an art form and

an experience," said Stefanie Kae Dlugosz-Acton, Assistant Curator. Architecture, Design & Decorative Arts, "The strength of his work lies in subtlety, and there's a coyness about it that's so interesting. The organic nature of his art is a clear response to both materials and form "

Wendell published 10 Adopted Rules of Thumb in 1996, which served as creative advice both for him and other artists. The list included "If you are in love with an idea, you are no judge of its beauty or value,""The dog that stays on the porch will find no bones," and "If you hit the bullseve every time, the target is too near." Though, he

> rarely let his imagination, or technology, stop him.

For a 2016 exhibition of his work at the Rochester Institute he wrote: "Linvent.distort.deform.exaggerate. compound, and confuse as I see it. I obey only my own instincts, which often I do not understand myself. I often draw things I do not understand, but am secure in the knowledge that they may at some point become clear and meaningful."

Wendell's awards are numerous, including a 1994 Visionaries of the American Craft Movement award from the American Craft Museum

Answering Reader's Questions

by David Marks



David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for nearly 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program WoodWorks on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to Woodworker West, since 2004.

Lathe Advice: I'm worting you because I'm about to make the purchase of my lifetime, and your expertise is what I would appreciate. Straight to the point, I'm deciding between the Robust American Beauty and the Oneway lathe. I'm planning on turning large bowls, large vessels and various other pieces. Could you give any input on what your preference would be and why? Davis

David's Answer: Lathe choice can be very personal. I purchased my Oneway lathe back in 1999. It has served me very well, and I have turned everything from small spindles, to boxes, bowls, and hollow vessels. I also have turned wall sculptures that were 4 feet in diameter on the outboard and one hollow vessel that was 16° x 32°. I have been very impressed with the precision and strength of this machine, and it has served me very well for almost 20 years now.



Here is a 36" diameter plywood form, turned on the outboard side of my Oneway lathe.

Gold Fusion is a similar 36" diameter form, turned and gold leafed with 4 different types of genuine gold leaf.



Though I have never had the opportunity to use a Robust Lathe, I have heard great things about them. My friend and mentor Steve Sinner of Advanced Lathe Tools turns on them and endorses them. His work has been frequently featured in this publication, and you can see him turn on his Robust Lathe in videos on YouTube. I encourage you to contact Steve via his website (advancedlathetools.com) for his thoughts.

The challenge here is that my friend Mike Mahoney will tell you that he loves his Vicmarc Lathe. Mike is both an artistic and production turner, and you also can see videos of him turning on his Vicmarc on YouTube. You can contact him through his website: bowlmakerinc.com. I own 4 mini Vicmarc lathes that I use for teaching, and they are excellent too.

You really can't lose with any of these 3 brands. What I would insist upon is having electronic variable speed control and a long bed to accommodate large vessels, which you are interested in making. I use a center steady bolted to the long bed to stabilize hollow vessels when I turn them.

2. Acrylic Paint for Patination Project: Can I use a high grade acrylic paint for a project I am getting ready for patination. My Japan paints are all dried out, and I was going to try to thin them with naphtha.

However, I have so many colors of acrylics and would like to use them on this project. Is this possible? If I do this do they have to be covered with a coat of clear shellac before applying the metal leaf adhesive? Or can the adhesive be applied directly over the acrulics?

Any assistance you can give me regarding this would be appreciated. I have my projects on hold until I hear from you. Sharon

David's Answer: Yes, you can use acrylic paints as a foundation to gild on. I have gilded over Golden acrylic paints with no problem. Generally speaking, it is always safer to apply a coat or two of shellac, after you have lightly sanded the acrylic paints, just to be on the safe side. The rule I live by is that 100% wax free shellac will bond to almost any finish and almost any finish will bond to 100% wax free shellac.

If you want to skip the sanding, you can just make sure the acrylic paints are nice and dry before you apply the shellac to seal the surface.

I recommend using Zinsser Bullseye Seal Coat which is a 100% Wax Free shellac. Simply brush on one or two light coats to seal the surface and create an excellent bond for the Gold Size, aka Leaf Adhesiye.

Since you said the Japan paints have dried out, I would advise just throwing them out (disposing of them appropriately). Once their dryers have cured, adding Naphtha won't really help, because their dryers have already solidified and can't be revived.

Class Notes:

I really enjoyed working with the students in my 3-day Double Bevel Marquetry class, last August. I like it when the students think outside the box and push the envelope—and that's exactly what these guys did. Their desire to see their visions come to life in wood pushed me to discover methods to make those visions a reality. Here is a sample of the completed projects.



Tools & Techniques



No longer restricted to use by large woodworking production shops, recent advancements in CNC technology have made these tools easy-to-operate and affordable for small and hobbyist shops.

CNC Router Essentials (144 pages, \$25.95), by Randy Johnson and George Vondriska provides an introductory guide to this new technology, covering design essentials, toolpath essentials, and machine set-up, as well as various practice projects.

Intro to CNC Routers

by Randy Johnson & George Vondriska

The value of CNC (computer numerical controlled) technology is a given among most production shops—even if they don't have one. But small shops and hobby woodworkers, CNC is often quickly dismissed as not needed or wanted. The reasons include cost, the potential learning curve, an unclear need, and a concern that "it's not real woodworking." As CNC routers continue to decrease in price and increasing in availability at woodworking retailers, there is more and more access to information, classes, and community feedback on how to utilize this valuable tool. And, while it's true that a CNC router can automate the operations of many other machines (i.e. table saw, bandsaw, drill, router), that's not necessarily a bad thing bandsaw, drill, router), that's not necessarily a bad thing.

The versatility of the CNC is perhaps the best justification for adding it to a small shop. What other tool has the ability to cut complex and odd shaped pieces with such ease? Curved furniture parts, templates, jigs, and rough carvings are all handled easily with CNC. It's also a great companion tool for prototyping, because it allows a woodworker to quickly create multiple versions of a design or a sample for a client. It takes the tedium out of many operations and allows the woodworker to focus on other, more creative aspects, such as design and craftsmanship.

The more one eliminates his or her preconceived notions and works with a CNC router, the more one discovers the many interesting and useful ways that it can be used in the shop and on projects. So rather than seeing a CNC router as an unnecessary and expensive gadget or a threat to the essence of woodworking, it can be more helpful to view it as a useful tool that can augment your hard-earned skills, while offering versatility like no other.

MACHINE MECHANICS

Basic CNC routers operate on three axes: X, Y, and Z (Figure 1). Think back to your days of graphing in math class. The X and Y axes move left to right, front to back, while the Z axis is vertical. The machine can move in all three directions at one time, which allows it to cut complex shapes as easily as simple shapes. Most CNC routers use an industrial high-speed spindle (Figure 2), although some CNCs use woodworkingstyle router motors to hold the bit or cutting tool. The main differences are spindles run quieter and are more accurate than woodworking routers, plus a spindle's bearings last several times longer than those in a woodworking router. But a spindle oss several times the price of a similarly sized router. Some CNC tools allow you to start with a router motor and later upgrade to a spindle

The bed or deck of a CNC machine may be metal, plastic, or plywood, and is often covered with a spoilboard. The spoil-

board is usually a sheet of MDF or plywood. It is a consumable item, since many projects require you to cut completely through the project material and slightly into the spoilboard. Over time, the spoilboard will become grooved, but you can renew it by routing the surface flat. When the spoilboard becomes too thin, it can be replaced, or a new one can be glued on top of the old one.

The brain of a CNC consists of onboard electronics connected to an external computer or control pendant (Figures 3 & 4). Together, these are referred to as the control system. The control system automatically moves the machine during operation, but it-can also be used by the operator, to manually move the spindle along the machine axes during tool set-up.

CNC WORKFLOW

The workflow for CNC projects consists of three primary steps: designing, toolpathing, and machining. Each of these has several sub-steps, but the important thing to know, at this point, is that they are each associated with a particular kind of software. CAD (computer-aided design) for drawing and design: CAM (computer-aided machining) converts the CAD drawing to toolpaths and machine code; and Controller software that communicates the code to the CNC machine and tells it where to move during the machining process. Don't let that alphabet soup of letters intimidate you. Using today's CNC machines has been simplified by advances in CNC software that automate much of the complex processes of the past. With a little practice, it will start to make sense, but first, let's take a quick look at each type of software.





CNC SOFTWARE

There are dozens of CAD programs that can be used to create CNC project designs. So if you currently use a CAD program that you like, you can probably use it as a starting point. The basic requirement is that it needs to output a CAM compatible file, such as a .dxf, dwg, .skp, .eps, ai, or similar vector-based file. A software package that is compatible with many types of CNC machines is called VCarve Pro by Vectric. It's popular because it combines both CAD (designing) and CAM (toolpathing) software in one package. It also was developed specifically as a CNC application and is one of the easiest to learn. We used VCarve Pro v8.5 for illustrating our book, and a free demo copy can be downloaded at Vectric.com. If you use a different CAD or CAM software, the steps will be similar.


VCarve Pro has three main windows (Figure 5). The CAD side is used to create lines, shapes, and text. It also contains tools for aligning and refining the elements in your design. The center workspace is used to create, edit, and view your designs and toolpaths in both 2-D and 3-D. The CAM side is used to create the toolpaths for your project. Creating toolpaths involves setting parameters, including the kind of bit.

the type of cut, the depth of cut, the number of passes, and the feeds and speeds for the bit.

One of the best parts of VCarre Pro is that after the toolpath is created, you can preview the virtual results. It's a great way to proof your work, catch errors, and verify that your project looks correct before cutting. If everything looks good, you can save your toolpath through a process called post-processing (also part of VCarre Pro), which converts your toolpaths to machine code. Post processors are machine specific, so be sure you choose the correct one for your CNC. This cutting file is then saved and loaded directly into the control software from your computer or via flash drive to the computer or pendant that is attached to the CNC machine.

Control software usually comes with the CNC machine, because it needs to be configured to match the machine's mechanical and electrical setup. Some machines use a pendant to control the machine, while others are hooked directly to a computer. Both contain similar functions for controlling the machine, because their primary function is to aid the operator in preparing the machines for cutting, and then reading the cutting file and directing the CNC's movements.

PROJECT MATERIALS

CNC routers can be used to cut nearly any material. including wood, plastics, composite materials, aluminum, foam, brass, and more. If equipped with special cutting tools, you can also use it to engrave glass and granite, or to cut cardboard or vinyl. The possibilities are nearly endless. Whatever material you choose, it's important to know its working characteristics. Some woods chip more than others, and some plastics melt easier than others. Knowing the differences has a big effect on the success of your CNC cutting.

APPLICATIONS

A CNC router can become the most versatile tool in your shop. It can be used for sign making, 3-D carving, texturing surfaces, and cutting out furniture parts. It can be used to create an entire project, production of multiples, or complement more traditional woodworking techniques. Here are some examples of applications, illustrated in our book.

Profile: Greg Klassen

Greg Klassen of Everson, WA is studio furmituremaker, who's River® Table Collection has parnered international attention and orders. Here is Greg's story, in his own words:

I began woodworking while a theology student in college. Getting married at 21, I took a job as a "garbage man" at a door manufacturer to help make ends meet. Among my duties was to recycle wood waste, and I brought home wood scraps to play with. Though I had no woodworking experience (beyond a woodshop class in high school). I was able to construct needed furnishings for our very empty apartment.

In the process, I discovered that I really enjoyed working with wood, and this developed into a passion. I discovered Fine Woodworking, the work of Sam Maloof and George Nakashima, and the writings of James Krenov. This lead me to want to develop my skills, and I enrolled in the College of the Redwoods Furniture Program, after earning my college degree. I also had the opportunity to spend a semester at Capellagården School of Craft & Design in Vickleby, Sweden, founded by Krenov's mentor Carl Malmsten.

Upon completing this woodworking study, we returned to the Pacific Northwest in 2008 and went into business. Among my first jobs was kitchen cabinetry, and thereafter decided that I did not want the temptation of chasing money and becoming a cabinet shop. Rather, I chose to focus upon one-off furniture projects of my own design. Those first six years were a struggle-as I created rocking chairs, fine cabinetry, entry doors, and the like-but I remained true to only taking on projects that excited me.

Up to this point, I had been only working with dimensional lumber. My process was to make a sketch and then find the appropriate wood to fit my idea. Then, I was introduced to a dairy farmer, who had been collecting local trees that people didn't want, milling them with an Alaskan Mill, and properly stacking and stickering them. In his barn was a 40 year

collection of live-edge slabs, far more than he could use for his own woodworking hobby.

I was immediately taken by the beauty of this wood, and when he agreed to sell some materials, my initial projects were not unlike most of the generic natural-edge tables made by others. Then, I started to experiment by cutting and jointing the wood in different ways, such as waterfall desks where the slab is mitered to become the leg. One day, I cut a slab and turned the live-edges inwards, leaving a space between the edges. Having also been exploring the use of glass at this point, I then cut blue glass to follow the live edges and inserted it between the wood. This was the birth of my River® Table series, applying the technique for tables, cabinetry, and wall sculptures.

I select my woods from independent sawyers



of beautiful salvaged domestic woods. Originally, I would cut a single slab to form the River® Table, largely because I could not afford to buy a second slab until the first one sold. Now, I match multi-slabs, allowing the wood itself to inspire and dictate the design.

My latest work, the Archipelago Series, goes beyond the singular river motif to reflect groupings of islands. As seen on the cover, holes are cut in the glass top to not only be flush, but to allow the wood, mitered to the frame, to emerge through the glass. For these pieces, I use the outermost cuts of a burly tree, which are typically discarded as waste by sawmills.

Last summer. I took off a month for a special project: building a fabulous tree house for my three children. Hung on two large Douglas Firs 12-feet apart, the house (10' x 11' x 8' tall) is surrounded by a deck (14' x 24'). The structure is fully insulated with electricity. windows from my glass company, spiral staircase, sleeping loft with a queen sized bed, skylight, Dutch door, and exposed rafters.

My River® Collection has been well-received, garnering much coverage in regional, national, and international publications. It is not surprising that others have undertaken similar designs, so I offer my clients a Certificate of Authenticity. I invite you to view more of my work at my website: www.gregklassen.com/.

SCIII PTURF PLACES AT ARTPRIZE

Wood sculptor James O'Neal of Bridgeton, NJ was a winner in the prestigious ArtPrize competition. Taking place annually in Grand Rapids, MI, artwork is displayed in public locations throughout the downtown area, and the public and judges vote for their favorites, with \$500,000 in awards at stake. In its 10th year, the competition attracted over 1,260 works. created by 1,400+ artists from 41 states and 40 countries. Work was available for viewing in 165+ venues by over 500,000 visi-

James' entry, Champions, consisted of five life-sized sculptures of iconic sports figures, each meticulously hand carved from single tree trunks. Boxing champions Muhammad Ali and Floyd Mayweather, were carved in Black Walnut: UFC fighting champion Conor McGregor, in Maple, UFC female fighting champion Cris Cyborg, in White Oak; and bodybuilding champion Arnold Schwarzenegger, from Black Oak. Each sculpture stands over 8-feet in height. Each piece took 700-



his full-time job at an oil refinery.

for the public vote in the 3-Dimensional category, and when the votes were finally tabulated, the collection of sculptures captured a 4th Place finish—an honor but no cash award.

MASSIVE HAMMER DISAPPEARS IN SONOMA

The public in Sonoma County, CA is being asked for information related to the disappearance of a Hammer sculpture outside a community center, on Oct. 5, in Healdsburg, CA. Made of wood and steel, the sculpture is 20-feet long and 6-feet high, weighing approximately 1 000 lbs

The piece was created by artist **Doug Unkrey** and was on loan to the city by the Voigt Family Sculpture Foundation, valued at \$15,000. FOREST TROLL FACES EVICTION

Isak Heartstone may become a victim of his own popularity. The 15-foot tall troll-like creature was created by Danish artist Thomas Dambo on a \$40,000 commission for last August's Breckenridge International Festival of Arts in Breckenridge, CO. Constructed from recycled and reclaimed wood, the purpose of the figure sitting stacking stones was to encourage hiking up the Wellington Trail and experiencing the wilderness. The plan has been to leave the sculpture up, as long as it can withstand the weather and isn't vandalized

However, nearby residents are not so thrilled. The artwork has become a media and social media sensation, attracting "literally hundreds" of troll hunters on a daily basis, resulting in traffic congestion, illegal parking, littering, and loss of privacy. One resident complains that he peeks over the berm and straight into her home, which is a little disconcerting and creepy. The local city council is being asked to remove the work.

Thomas has created similar projects around the world, including The Forgotten Giants project outside Copenhagen (Woodworker West, July-August 2017).

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
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
