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

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CERF+ OFFERS ASSISTANCE TO CALIFORNIA WILDFIRE VICTIMS

This past Fall, California experienced the most destructive wildfire season in its history. Nearly 2 million acres burned, destroying more than 15,000 homes and killing more than 90 people. Among the victims were many woodworkers, toolmakers, and other craftspersons.

CERF+, the Craft Emergency Relief Fund, can help in the recovery of studio artists whose home or studio were damaged or destroyed. It has created a special web page—www.cerfplus.org/news/cerf-response-to-2018-california-wildfires/with information and resources for wildfire victims, including financial relief, disaster recovery resources, personal support, networking links, and recovery warnings.

Since 1985, this nonprofit organization has served as a safety net for artists working in clay, fiber, metal, wood, glass, or non-traditional materials, suffering an emergency/loss threatening their careers. In previous issues, we have posted stories of woodworkers that have rebuilt their careers, with assistance from CERF+.

Its core services are emergency relief, educational programs, advocacy, and network building. It offers career resources, from business practices to legal issues; educational and network opportunities; and relief thru grants, loans, and discounts.

Emergency Grants provide immediate assistance after serious emergencies (e.g., accidents, fires, and natural disasters), while **Emergency Recovery Loans** can be used to re-establish, improve, or possibly

expand his/her work capacity after an emergency. **Brokered Assistance** aids in securing discounts on tools and supplies, as well as exhibit space at craft shows. In addition, it provides referrals to other assistance organizations.

Over time, CERF+ has distributed over \$1.2 million in grants to 640 artists, over \$1 million in loans to 537 artists, and nearly \$.5 million in in-kind support for 375 artists.

CERF+ is supported by public donations, organizational fundraisers, and foundation and government grants. In 2017, the website **Etsy** raised close to \$60,000 and

matched these funds to create their own seller community emergency relief fund at CERF+; the **Chihuly Garden and Glass House** in Seattle hosted a dinner to raise over \$14,500, and the **Museum of Craft and Design** in San Francisco raised \$10,000 in Northern California wildfire relief efforts. These funds were generously matched by the **Windgate Charitable Foundation**.

Woodworking Observations

In our last issue (November-December, 2018), we did a full page article on the White House Collection of American Crafts: 25th Anniversary Exhibit, currently on display at the Clinton Presidential Library in Little Rock, AR, thru Mar. 31. However, I did not provide any personal perspective to it.

The original exhibition was a major event for the craft world. Under a Congressional resolution, First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton worked with Michael Monroe, Curator-in-Charge of the Smithsonian Institute's Renwick Gallery, to assemble a collection of the best American contemporary craft to celebrate 1993 as The Year of American Craft. The selected 73 works—in wood, ceramic, fiber, glass, and metal by 78 craftspersons—was not meant to provide a comprehensive overview of the field, but rather included work that complemented "the pre-existing style and ambiance of the historical spaces" in the White House. As a result, wood vessels were the predominate forms, "because they related directly to the classical and traditional shapes of the past and responded eloquently to the aesthetic of their period settings."




Ron Fleming's Redwood burl turned and carved New Beginnings bowl, as it was displayed in the White House in 1993.

After debuting at the White House during the 1993 holiday season—where it was viewed by over 1.5 million visitors—the pieces traveled to museums across the United States for seven years. During the 3-month display in Los Angeles (July 4 - September 29, 1996), it created a great deal of excitement, even receiving rare coverage in the L.A. Times—though the reviewer did display his ignorance of the concept of craft.

There is also historical significance for the turned wood art. The exhibit provides a snap shot of contemporary wood during its adolescent growth spurt. Many of the pieces represent artists who inspire work being crafted today.

For example, the basket illusion form, popularized by the late David Nittmann, can be traced directly to the pieces by **Lincoln Seitzman.** His wood piece in the White House Collection was so convincing that it was exhibited along side the fiber baskets.

I'm unaware of the future plans for the collection, after the Clinton show. It really needs a home to be on permanent display. If you can't make it to Little Rock, you can get a sampling of the exhibition and its

QUESTION EVERYTHING

Recently, one of our regulars admitted that he had been mistaken in an earlier post, when he said that applying a preliminary coat of boiled linseed oil (BLO) to Cherry "pops" the grain prior to top-coating with varnish. Another member had questioned this technique, so the original poster ran an experiment to try to settle the argument. To his surprise, he couldn't detect any appreciable difference between Cherry finished with and without the prior coat of linseed oil, though he suspected the oil would hasten darkening of the finish.



Other members soon added their own experiences to the discussion, and then what began as a finishing question became more of a philosophical one: about the need for woodworkers to make fewer assumptions and to question everything—a wise approach in an activity where there are so many differing opinions and methods of work.

The discussion reminded me of several notable woodworking friends of mine, all master craftsmen in their own right yet trained in different traditions and cultures, each internally consistent and complete. These craftsmen didn't need to question things, because the answers—tools, techniques, methods of work—were dictated by their training. There was always one correct way to do everything. As **Frank Klausz** used to say, "I once thought I was wrong, but I was mistaken."

Nowadays, as we rely on magazines, social media, and YouTube channels for information—often contradictory if not questionable—it is wise to take woodworking advice with a grain of salt. The great strength of forums, such as ours, is that we can share our personal experiences and inform each other, adding dimensions to our understanding.

"In the old days, the recommendation for a linseed oil finish was to rub it in once a day for a week, once a week for a month, once a month for a year, and once a year for life. That's a lot of applications, each of which is going to increase the overall film thickness, however slightly. And each application may trap some dirt/grime if the surface was not thoroughly cleaned. I would not expect a single rubbed in thin coat of boiled linseed oil to turn excessively dark over the years, especially if then top-coated with

a more durable finish."

"I always felt that BLO brought out the figure on my Cherry projects. Maybe it accelerated the eventual darkening."

"I often use multiple coats of Danish oil on wood turnings, as the sole finish and have wondered about using it in combination with other finishes. Decades ago, I read that someone asked **Albert Einstein** if it upset him when he found out he was wrong about something. He replied, 'No. Before, I was wrong in my thinking, but now I will be right.' I don't even know if it's true, but I always think of that when encountering differing opinions, suggestions, and criticism."

"The more that I am corrected, the more correct I will be!"

"I often remember that statement because I think we all struggle with wanting to be correct, without being corrected. But, being corrected is part of learning."

"I try to be wrong about something at least several times a week, otherwise I'm not trying enough new things."

"'Question everything' seems especially useful in woodworking. Over time, means and materials change, rendering what was once done potentially invalid, obsolete, or at least not the only way. The Internet has given voice to self-proclaimed experts that advocate for their way. Novices are in no position to know if their way is the only way, the best way, or even a reasonable way. Notions become facts.

"WoodCentral has been a valuable means for asking questions about conventional wisdom. Years ago, I asked about using tool steel for woodworking tools. 'Can't be sharpened,' was the reply. True if you are wedded to Arkansas stones. Not true with some modern abrasives, as **Steve Elliot** demonstrated with elegant experiments. The questions asked here have become inspiration for many such discoveries."

"This forum seems to be the best for information supported by experimentation and data, because people ask questions and do experiments to answer them with data. Unfortunately, some feel threatened by questioning. It shuts down discovery. The person that was awarded the Nobel Prize for discovery of plate tectonics was asked what he was going to do next. 'Try to disprove it,' he replied."

"I once saw 'QUESTION EVERYTHING' spray painted on a wall. Underneath it, someone had painted 'WHY?'

DESIGN IN WOOD 2019



Rubbing Out Arm R Seal & Questions


RUBBING OUT ARM R SEAL

While I do lots of rubbing out techniques on lacquer, my approach to rubbing out General Finishes' Arm R Seal is different. Lacquer is a much harder (or should I say brittle) finish and behaves differently. You can wet sand, and polish or buff lacquer with excellent results, because each layer melts into the previous one.

Arm-R-Seal is a family of urethane resin topcoats, which produce a

durable and long-lasting finish. Oil-based, they are essentially a thinned down varnish, designed to be wiped on and wiped off. I always build all of my coats of finish with gloss, no matter if it is lacquer, varnish, oil, or polyurethane. In some cases when I want a satin finish, I will apply a coat of satin as the final coat. In other cases, I will use rubbing out techniques to dull down the finish.

My approach to Arm R Seal is to build all of the coats with gloss, wiping it on, wiping it off, then letting it dry overnight. The next day, I rub the surface with 0000 steel wool, blow the dust off, and apply another coat. My goal is to have the last coat looking perfect, after I finish carefully wiping it off and then buffing it with a clean, soft, cloth. Sometimes, Murphy's Law gets in the way, and things do not come out looking so

great. If I have something in the finish that looks like it needs to be flattened, for example some specs of dust or maybe a hair from a brush or some dried resin, then I can usually level it with some very light sanding with 600 grit sanding paper.

From there, I can rub the entire surface with 0000 steel wool to blend the sheen and make it uniform. After that, I would apply another coat of gloss oil to fill in any small scratches from the 600 grit sandpaper and let that dry overnight. If this looks good, then the finish is complete.

In some cases, I find I need to lightly 0000 steel wool the finish after the last coat. I like to raise the sheen back up to a semi gloss, so I will apply a coat of Renaissance Wax and buff that in. Renaissance Wax is a hard, micro crystalline wax, which resists fingerprints. The wax gives a nice soft, silky feel and improves the look of the surface. You can buff the wax with a soft cloth or clean T-shirt to blend everything to an uniform sheen.

Now for some questions. . .

1. Resawing Amboyna Burl Blanks: Quick question about Amboyna Burl that I saw on your video. I want to veneer some on small jewelry box sized panels. Have seen Amboyna Burl blanks whose dimensions would work for me. Do you think that I would be OK resawing veneer from a blank with my Laguna LT16 SE with ReSaw King blade? Or, better to just buy the Amboyna veneer?

Thanks for any insights that you might provide and keep up the awesome work. Fred

David's Answer: The first priority is to know the moisture content of the burl. The burl needs to be dry in order to re saw it for veneer. I would say somewhere between 6% up to 10% should be fine. For that, you will need a moisture meter to check it. If the moisture content is say 12% to 18% then you most likely could still resaw it to a thickness of ¹/₈" and then store it, by clamping it between pieces of plywood with sheets of porous paper in between each slice of veneer.

The question is: how much the veneer might potentially warp during the drying process. Burl, in general, is prone to warping as it dries. Your 16" Laguna Bandsaw will work just fine for re sawing thick veneers. My personal preference for resawing thick veneer is the Lenox 1/2" wide Die-Master II 6 tooth per inch hook configuration bandsaw blade. If you have not seen my *Bandsawn Veneers* DVD. I would highly recommend that you purchase a copy to hone your resawing skills.

Another option would be to go with the commercial veneer. In this case, you would be safe in terms of dryness, the question: 'is the veneer flat?' If you get some Amboyna burl veneer that is dry, but not flat, then I strongly suggest that you treat it first with a flattening solution. You could also mix up your own solution.

Here are two options that I recommend:

FLATTENING SOLUTION FOR BRITTLE VENEERS

4 Units Water

2 Units Glue (Weldwood Plastic Resin Glue, Dap Brand)

2 Units Glycerin

1 Unit Denatured Alcohol

Glycerin: Available at any drugstore, makes the veneer more pliable.

Alcohol: Aids in penetration and evaporates the water.

Glue: Sizes the veneer, and helps to keep it flat until it is ready to be used.

ALTERNATIVE FORMULA

4 Units Water

2 Units Glue (White or Yellow Aliphatic Resin Glue)

1 Unit Glycerin

1 Unit Denatured Alcohol

In both cases, stir until thoroughly mixed and brush solution onto veneers, soaking them completely on both sides. Next, stand them up, and let them drip dry.

Then sandwich them with a layer of fiber glass screen on both sides and several pieces of newspaper on both sides, stacking one to ten veneers at a time. Then, clamp up the stack between 2 sheets of ³/₄" thick plywood and allow to dry for a day. On day two, remove the wet newspaper and replace with dry newspaper. After three days check again, replacing the newspaper.

2. Renaissance Wax: I'm getting closer on finishing the jigs I think I will need to make my segmented vessel. I made all my segments out of plywood first and think I have them dialed in so I can begin cutting my expensive wood. I did have a question about the Renaissance Wax. You sent me a link to its website, but it says and the wax is for Jewelry. Am I looking at it right? I just want to make sure I buy the right stuff. And also I have never used this stuff and not sure what is the best way to apply, buff out, and number of coats. Keith

David's Answer: Renaissance Wax can be used on jewelry, but it can also be used on wood, leather, metal, marble etc. Here is another link for information: www.artchemicals.com/RenaissanceWax_p/808081000.htm

As described above, I find one of its greatest assets is to rub it on to the final coat of Arm-R-Seal (the thin wiping varnish from General Finishes), after it has cured.

Typically, the last couple of coats Arm-R-Seal become more difficult to apply as it sets quickly at 75°, which I recommend applying it at to maintain the clarity of the finish.

Streaking can be a problem (getting a rub pattern of uneven sheen), and I have found that rubbing the last coat after it has cured with 0000 steel wool and Renaissance Wax will help to make the finish a uniform sheen (that means how the light reflects off of the surface, and whether it is a gloss, semi-gloss or satin sheen).

Another challenge that happens with hand rubbed oil finishes, is even once you have a 'perfect' finish, the oils in people's hands have different types of acids and they can leave finger prints on your beautiful finish.

To remedy this, I like to use Renaissance Wax rubbed onto a piece of Micro mesh 6000 grit flexible abrasive and hand rub the surface until the fingerprints are gone.

It works really well and you don't need to apply a lot of wax. A small amount goes a long way. You can use some clean dry soft rags from tee shirts and rub it in by hand until it has a nice soft sheen. If it looks like it needs more, then simply apply another coat. Multiple light coats always works the best.

Glues for Veneering

by Craig Thibodeau

When I first started using veneer, it didn't seem as though there were as many glues available as there are today. I used primarily polyvinyl acetate (PVA), urea formaldehyde (UF), and hide glue for nearly all my veneering. It turns out there are a number of other glues that can be used to glue veneer, and many of them have benefits over my old favorites in certain situations. Let's start with the basic glues and work our way to more specialized glues later in the discussion.

I've found that having a variety of glues in the shop allows me to be prepared for just about any glue-up that needs to be done. However, the majority of my veneering is done with only three glues: PVA for simple flat panels, UF for marquetry and parquetry veneering, and polyurethane for complex panels and curved work. As a beginning veneer artist, however, you can get by with just a single glue for a long time before needing to invest in more varieties. Whether you choose something like hot hide glue or PVA will depend on your workshop setup and the type of work you like to do.

POLYVINYL ACETATE (PVA)

The easiest and most readily available glue to use in your veneer work is PVA glue. My personal preference for PVA glue is Titebond® 1, which is easy to apply, dries fast, and forms a fairly rigid glueline. I tend not to use the more water-resistant type 2 and 3 varieties of PVA glues, because not much of my work needs to be waterproof—and if it does, I'll switch to epoxy or polyurethane glue because they are both truly waterproof. I've also found that type 2 and 3 PVA glues tend to have softer gluelines, and therefore, more cold creep, neither of which

is beneficial in veneering. I use Titebond 1 for a variety

of veneer jobs, but primarily for flat panels with simple veneer work like book-matches; more complex veneer jobs get a different glue.

When using PVA to glue veneer, roll a thin, even coat of glue onto the substrate (never on the veneer or you'll end up with a buckled sheet of veneer that's impossible to press flat). I find that adhesive rollers from the local home center work well as glue rollers for most of the glues I use. Double-check that the glue is evenly spread over the entire surface, especially around the edges, where it can sometimes be thinner. When you place the veneer into the glue, try to get the alignment correct as you put it down; PVA glues have good initial tack, and you'll risk tearing the veneer if you try to pull it up and move it around. PVA glue dries quickly enough that panels can be taken out of the press in 1-2 hours. This makes it an ideal glue for pressing multiple panels in a short time.



Titebond 1 is a great all-around glue for veneering and woodworking in general. It dries fast, has a hard glueline, is easy to clean up, and doesn't require any particular safety precautions during use.



Applying the correct amount of PVA glue doesn't take much practice. You'll want the substrate surface to be completely wet with glue, but not so wet that you can pour it off. Make sure there are no puddles or dry spots.

UREA FORMALDEHYDE (UF)

UF-based glue is another glue that frequently gets used for veneering, especially in marquetry and parquetry work and often in bent laminations as well. There are a few brands on the market today, but the one I use most is made by Pro-Glue®, called Pro-Glue Veneer Bond Dry Resin. It comes in white and brown colors that can be mixed together in different quantities to create custom glue colors if you need to match a particular wood tone on something like a bent lami-

❖ TIP — Make sure to stand glued panels in a location that gives them airflow on both sides, and let them sit for 24 hours so the glue can fully cure before you sand the veneer or untape any joints. If you remove the tape from the joints before the glue has fully cured, the joints tend to open up a bit as the glue dries.

nation where the glue color should blend in with the wood grain. Unlike other UF glues, Pro-Glue is a dry powder that you mix with water when you're ready to use it. The formaldehyde content is low, but it's still a good idea to wear gloves and a chemical respirator when mixing and sanding this glue.

UF glue is applied similarly to PVA glue. Roll on a thin, even coat, and make sure you've coated the entire substrate, especially the edges. When you lay the veneer onto the glue, you'll notice that it doesn't have the initial tack of PVA glue. Instead, it is slightly slippery, and the veneer can be moved around a bit in the glue. This might make it easier to position the veneer on the substrate, but also easier for the veneer to move around while in the press (all the more reason to have a few pieces of tape around the perimeter to hold the veneer in place).



Urea formaldehyde glues come in multiple colors that can be mixed together to create new colors, in case you need to match a particular wood tone. This brand, Pro-Glue Veneer Bond Dry Resin, is a powder that gets mixed with water to create the active glue. It's formaldehyde-based, so you'll want to wear gloves and a chemical respirator while using it.

Pro-Glue, like most UF glues, takes between 6-8 hours in the press to cure, depending on the temperature of your shop. Higher temperatures speed curing, and lower temps slow it. Either way, you'll want to wait 24 hours before removing any tape or sanding your panel to allow the glue to finish curing completely. When you're ready to clean up the panel after the glue has cured, be aware that UF glues dry very hard and the squeeze-out around the edges of panels can be very sharp. Wear safety glasses while trimming the panel edges, because those sharp bits of glue seem to fly everywhere, and they aren't fun to get in your eyes.

HOT HIDE GLUE

Traditional hot hide glue is a time-honored adhesive for veneering. Typically applied with a veneer hammer, it



Hot hide glue comes in pearls and granules that get dissolved in cold water then heated in a double-boiler system over a hot plate. Water goes in the bottom pot, and the glue gets heated in the upper pot. Temperature control is a must with hide glue to prevent burning the glue; the ideal temperature range is between 140°F and 160°F. If you don't have a glue pot with temperature control, you can use a meat thermometer to monitor the temperature of the glue.

can be used to veneer small or large surfaces, as well as curved parts. If you're not familiar with using hot hide glue, you'll definitely want to practice a few glue-ups with some scrap material before working on an important project. Hot hide glue comes in pearl or granulated form and gets heated and kept hot in a two-layer glue pot, much like a double boiler. Just place some granules in a plastic container and cover them with cold water; in about an hour the granules will have absorbed the water and will be ready to go into the glue pot for heating. Temperature control is very important with hide glue. If the glue is too cold, it will not liquefy properly; too hot and the glue can be ruined. The ideal temperature range is between 140°F and 160°F. Try to keep the glue below 160°F; if you go much higher than that, you'll risk ruining the glue.

Most hide glue made in the U.S. comes from just one company, Milligan & Higgins, and luckily, they are extremely helpful if you have technical questions regarding hide glue (www.milligan1868.com). Hide glue is available in a variety of gram strengths. The strength part of that description can be misleading because it doesn't actually refer to the strength of the glue but rather to the set time and stiffness of the glue. Higher numbers set faster and dry stiffer. For veneering, 192-gram strength hide glue is the best option, providing an ideal combination of set time and stiffness.

It takes an hour or so for a glue pot to warm up and get the hide glue fully liquefied, so you'll want to plan your glue-ups well in advance. As with all the other glues, hide-glued panels need to rest for at least 24 hours to continue curing before any cleanup is done.

When you use hot hide glue, the veneer gets covered in hide glue on both the show and glue faces. Cleaning the show face before the glue has cured is pretty easy: Simply wipe the surface with a cloth dampened with water and scrub off the excess glue. Try not to soak the veneer with water because too much could release the glue that holds the veneer to the substrate. Just wipe the surface and then use a scraper or stiff brush to remove the excess. If you leave any glue on the surface to fully cure, you'll need to sand or scrape it off later.

Since the entire surface of the veneer gets covered with hide glue in hammer veneering, it's not possible to tape joints together ahead of time for more complex veneer matches. Instead, each piece of veneer is glued down individually and the joints between them are cut and forced tight while they are hammered flat. I find this to be a time-consuming method of veneering complex panels, so I use hot hide glue only for veneering small projects with single sheets of veneer and use other glue for more intricate veneering where I am able to tape joints together ahead of time and glue the veneer down in a single operation.

LIQUID HIDE GLUE

Liquid hide glue has become a staple glue in many woodshops for a variety of processes over the past few years. I like to use it for veneer glue-ups where my standard glues won't work quite the way I need them to. For example, when veneering columns, the veneer needs to completely wrap around the surface of the column, leaving the final seam in the veneer to be cut after the glue is partially cured. To do this necessitates using a glue that can be reversed temporarily by applying heat and then reactivated after the final joint is cut



and the veneer is re-pressed. (See the article by **Patrick Edwards** in *Fine Woodworking* magazine issue 173 on veneering columns for a complete set of instructions.)

Liquid hide glue is relatively easy to use. Just place

the bottle of glue in a hot-water bath for about 20 minutes and start gluing much as you would with any other woodworking glue. You can use liquid hide glue in a vacuum press or with clamps, but either way it does take quite a while to dry fully, as the drying is primarily accomplished through evaporation of the water in the glue. Cleanup of veneer work glued with liquid hide glue is done in the same manner as with hot hide glue. Wipe the surface with water and scrape or scrub any excess glue off the surface.

There are two main brands of liquid hide glue on the market right now, one made by Titebond and another made by Patrick Edwards called Old Brown Glue (my personal favorite for liquid hide glue). Knowing the process Patrick uses to manufacture Old Brown Glue, I'm always confident that the glue I buy from him is fresh, and I can buy it in a variety of sizes, so it doesn't expire before I get through a bottle.

POLYURETHANE GLUE

Polyurethane glue is the most misunderstood glue for veneering. Because of the glue's lack of moisture, your veneer sheets won't start to curl as soon as they touch the glue, which is a big benefit when gluing large pieces of veneer. It is also inherently slippery, so it's possible to move the veneer sheet around a bit to fine-tune alignment of the veneer on the substrate. And any glue that penetrates the veneer and appears on the show face is easy to sand off and doesn't affect how the wood takes stain or finishes. Poly glues are also great for bent laminations, because they have a rigid glueline that keeps bent-laminated panels the exact shape of the form they were made on. Sounds pretty good so far, doesn't it?

The only real drawback to working with polyurethane glue is the cleanup. As the glue cures, it creates foam, and any excess glue you've got on your parts will turn into messy, sticky foam until it's cured hard. I found out the hard way that it is best to leave the foam alone

Gorilla Glue® is the most readily available brand of polyurethane glue on the market and the one I use the most. You'll be able to find it in most home centers and a variety of other stores. It does take some practice to get the hang of using it properly though, and you'll want to wear gloves to keep it off your hands. Keep a spray bottle of water handy when using polyurethane glues, because they need moisture to cure.

until it cures and chisel it off once it's fully dried. The foam is soft and doesn't have any structural strength, so don't use it where you might need gap-filling strength. That's a job for epoxy.

Because polyurethane glues are isocyanate based, you'll want to keep them off your hands by wearing gloves while working. If you get some on your bench or tools, you can clean it off with acetone or denatured alcohol while it's still wet. It takes a bit of moisture to start the curing process in polyurethane glue, so keep a spray bottle handy while veneering. After you have the glue spread on your substrate, lightly mist the glue face of the veneer panel with water. It barely needs any water to start curing, so don't overdo it or the veneer will start to buckle.

TWO-PART EPOXY

Two-part epoxy may not seem like an ideal glue for veneering, but it can be used where no other glue can get the job done successfully. I learned a variety of techniques for using two-part epoxy with veneer, while working on a large yacht renovation. On this project, we were faced with the prospect of re-veneering curved panels already installed on the boat.




It would have been extremely challenging to create a vacuum bag system that would properly press the veneer onto the cabinetry, so instead we used paper-backed veneer in large sheets that were cut to exactly fit each panel on the boat. We then used thickened epoxy spread with a notched trowel as the adhesive and pressed the veneer into the epoxy, pressing it flat with hard rubber blocks.

This technique is definitely a specialized one with limited use in everyday veneering, but thickened two-part epoxy does work extremely well at adhering paper-backed and two-ply veneer to flat and curved surfaces where a vacuum press or clamps wouldn't be possible. I wouldn't consider this a technique for beginners, because it is technically complex to complete all the steps properly, but it can be a handy tool to have in your toolbox for some future project.







Education: Maloof Foundation Classes

When he set up his foundation, **Sam Maloof** envisioned an enduring arts center, with a museum and educational workshops to teach woodworking. Now, the **Sam and Alfreda Maloof Foundation for Arts & Crafts** has begun fulfilling this dream by offering woodworking courses at the historic Maloof compound in Rancho Cucamonga, CA.

With support of several generous individuals and corporations, including equipment manufacturers, hardwood vendors, and various local woodworking stores, two former wood barns on the North side of the property have been converted into woodworking classrooms. One barn is a fully-equipped machine shop, while the second barn contains workbenches for hand tool work, sanding, and assembly.

"The legacy of Sam Maloof supplies the inspiration, and the Maloof Foundation provides the experiences," explains Executive Director **Jim Rawitsch.** "So now, there's a Smithsonian-affiliated institution where you can come to learn and grow your skills as a woodworker."

The educational program began last summer with monthly woodworking demonstrations: Long-time Maloof master craftsman Larry White leads a 4-hour *Maloof-Inspired Woodworking* course, in which he explores the aesthetics and basic techniques for making beautiful works in wood. Craftsman Dennis Hays explains the process of making artful, one-of-a-kind guitars, utilizing such found and rescued woods as Walnut, Redwood, Persimmon, Eucalyptus, and Orange. And in *Turn, Turn, Turn, Jeremy Sullivan* presents the basic concepts, tools, materials, and techniques for turning wood.

With success of the demonstration courses, the program has recently expanded to include hands-on classes. Larry White is now conducting a 3-day class on *Making a Maloof-Inspired Bench*, while Dennis Hays teaches a 2-day class in *Making a Walnut Side Table*. A hands-on turning workshop is in development for 2019. The small-group sessions, limited to four or six students, allow focused, personal instruction, with tuition that includes the costs of wood, materials, and use of templates and tools. On completion, students go home with one-of-kind heirlooms they make for themselves.

The Foundation also offers a *Maloof Veterans Workshop* program. Since 2013, U.S. military vets—both men and women—have been invited to explore basic woodworking in the healing of PTSD. In addition to the woodworking courses, the Maloof Foundation conducts docent-led tours of Sam Maloof's mid-20th century home and workshop, available on Thursday and Saturday afternoons.

Profile: Allaire Inc.

Dan & Jennifer Allaire of Scottsdale, AZ have grown his Allaire, Inc. from a garage shop to a furniture company, serving the interior design community of Arizona and beyond. Here is their story, in Dan's own words:

I began woodworking in the 1989, when I took an apprentice position in a cabinet shop in Florida. Desperate for a job at the time, I began at the bottom—sweeping floors and taking out trash, with little experience working with wood. My interest was piqued, watching the awesome craftsmen working in the shop. They would stay after hours to craft their own beautiful furniture, and I would pester them with a million questions, which they happily answered. Once I got the bug for woodworking, my enthusiasm escalated.

After Hurricane Hugo swept across the Caribbean, leaving widespread devastation. I headed down to the islands as part of the reconstruction effort, working on everything from rebuilding houses to repairing boats. By the time I left four years later, I had a full running cabinet and furniture shop. After working for a few years with furniture companies in North Carolina, I moved to Arizona in 1995. I spent a few years working for other woodworkers, before deciding to open my own furniture shop—operating out of a garage.

In 2002, I met the love of my life, Jennifer, who also had a strong interest in design. She earned her Bachelors in Interior Design from NAU, and in 2013 we purchased our own 12,000 sq. ft. facility here in Scottsdale.

Our business is targeted towards the trade. Over the years, we have established a quality reputation with designers, architects, and builders, as a onestop furniture company. Not wanting to be a onetrick pony (i.e., specializing in one style or product), we purposely sought out work of all kinds, from handcarved pieces to real ultra-modern stuff.

We brought various expertises under one roof—woodwork, metalwork, upholstery, and glass. This is real attractive to designers, knowing that we can produce any concept. We strive to make any design idea happen no matter how complicated.

An example of this synergy of talent is the pair of chairs (right). A client had purchased an antique chair by a Mexican designer and wanted a second. A typical upholstery studio would

have to outsource the woodworking portion of the chair and the same for a typical woodworking studio. By having all these talented craftsmen in one studio, we can control the quality, comfort, and structural integrity of both trades.

If expertise is needed beyond what we have in-house, we have developed a network of artisans from across the country to draw upon for whatever project that we are working on. For example, the drawer front of the *Custom Vanity* (above) was painted by an artist from Arkansas, who is super talented at back painted glass.

Some designers come to us with specific projects, including full CAD drawings and finish samples, and we just fabricate it. Others might have a sketch or a general idea of function, and Jennifer and I will work with them on design, drawings, and production.

Sadly, my role in running the company prevents me from getting into the shop as much as I would like to pursue my own designed pieces. Invited to

Furniture+ exhibition, I did carve out time to make the spec Custom Bone Side Table (left). Having just been working on a number of pieces for a client in West Palm Beach, FL, I wanted to do something in the spirit of that project's beach-theme. I created a side table, featuring a hurricane swirl top made from camel bone.

To succeed as a woodworking business, it takes endurance and persistence. There is no substitute for blood, sweat, and tears. You develop loyalty of clients by being dependable and maintaining a high level of quality.

KOREAN PUBLIC ART 'ROOT BENCH'

Korean architect **Yong Ju Lee** has created a giant seating public art installation for Seoul's Hangang Park in South Korea. Entitled *Root Bench*, the circular work, nearly 100-feet in diameter, spreads across the grassy area, as if roots from an enormous tree. Supported by a steel frame, the wood decking raises to three different heights—a child-size chair, an adult chair, and a table—for individuals or groups of various sizes to lean, sit, or lie on its sprawling 'branches.' Lighting under the seating illuminates the project for evening use. Submitted as part of an art competition, a computer algorithm was used to generate the bench's 3-dimensional geometry.

RON KENT SCULPTURES AT UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII

Four of wood artist **Ron Kent's** *Guardian* turned forms have been gifted to the University of Hawaii's Law School. Two of the 6-8-foot plywood laminated sculptures have been placed in the Law Library Student Lounge, and two reside in the Administration Building, along with a collection of his massive bowls. Retired from the financial industry in 1997 to become a full-time turner, Ron is best known for his translucent Norfolk Island Pine bowls, which reside


in private and museum collections around the world, including the Vatican. His daughter Elizabeth is a graduate and faculty member of the Law School.

BRECKENRIDGE TROLL UPDATE

Here is a follow-up to our previous story on *Isak Heartstone*, the 15-foot tall troll-like sculpture that resided in the forest of Breckenridge, CO. The Breckenridge City Council voted to remove the art piece, which became a nuisance by attracting too many sightseers through the nearby residential area.

Created by Danish artist **Thomas Dambo** on a \$40,000 commission for last August's *Breckenridge International Festival of Arts*, the piece, constructed from recycled and reclaimed wood, was to encourage hiking and wilderness experiences, which it succeeded in doing. The plan was to leave the sculpture up, as long as possible, but the overwhelming traffic caused by "troll hunters" resulted in its earlier than expected demise.

However, Thomas has reported positive news: "After massive protests, thousands of e-mails, and messages, the city council finally heard us! The city took Isak gently apart, and once the snow melts, I will be back to rebuild him in a new location." The city has convened a task force to determine a new, more accessible location where the popular sculpture can be reconstructed.

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
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
