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

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

Jason Quis and consultant Patrick Heidrich tackle communication as core to culture, and the millennial conversation. Lisa Ryan of Grategy shares the importance of engaging employees for better retention.
- Cabinet, Millwork, and Furniture: Paul Downs brings back his popular session on introducing CNC to the furniture shop. Owain Harris and John Conrad of ISFD discuss life as a furniture maker. Creative furniture designer/maker Judson Beaumont shares his fun and innovative design process.
- Techniques & Applications: Woodworking pro Scott
 Grove returns to offer two sessions on veneer technique,
 and one on using resin with wood. Diane Shattuck addresses problem solving in finishes and color consistency,
 Jim Larin of Fuji Spray speaks on choosing the correct HVLP
 spray system, and Louis Jasso of Elite Fine Finish discusses
 the importance of training in finishes.
- **Teacher Track:** The *Teacher Track* is expanded to seven ses-

sions on WCA for the classroom, tool safety, CAD training, accessing curriculum and resources, teaching design/build, marketing your program, and program funding.

In addition, the *Woodworking Network* presents full-day symposia on Tuesday, July 16 on topics of CNC Technology, Finishing, Closets, and the Under 40 Leadership Conference. All symposia attendees receive complimentary show registration and access to the *40 under 40 Reception* on Tuesday evening. *Industry 4.0* returns as a showcase of future technology, including: Artificial Intelligence; Augmented and Virtual Reality; Robotics; 3D Printing; Cloud Computing; Internet of Things (IOT) and Internet of Services (IOS). Or

get your hands dirty in the *Make & Take* area.

Other free educational programs are be-

ing provided by the Architectural Woodwork Institute (AWI) on estimating, project management and an overview of the new AWI Standards Suite; the Cabinet Makers Association (CMA) will host a session featuring Guy Bucey from Inova on leadership and sessions on investing in a bigger machine, diversifying your business,

maximizing your nested based router, and their flagship "What's Your Problem?" event; and the **Woodwork Career Alliance (WCA)** will offer sessions on how to find, train, and retain workers, creating an in-house training program, and teaching WCA standards for students.

STUDENT EXHIBITIONS

Always popular is the student exhibition/competition. Top high school and college students from across North America will compete in the *Fresh Wood* furniture design competition and *Turning to the Future*, a turned wood showcase organized by the AAW. Fair attendees can vote for their favorite pieces, and awards will be announced at a ceremony on Friday, July 19.

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Woodworking Observations

I recently came across an essay in which a man reminiscences about the lessons that he learned from his father, a carpenter. Being more cerebral than hands-on, he had not inherited his father's craftsmanship skills. Though he tried to follow his father's mantra of "measure twice, cut once," his attempts always failed. Only later did he realize that this guide transcended woodworking to apply to life itself. When his father retired, he tried to reconnect by attempting to undertake a collaborative construction project—a chessboard. Again, the finished product was less than desired, but that did not matter to his father, who instead merely relished the process.

Many woodworkers were introduced to the craft by their fathers or grandfathers. My father was far from a fine craftsman, but he did have a workbench, hand tools, and portable power tools, to undertake household maintenance. He taught me basic skills, as we undertook various tasks, as well as the satisfaction of a project completed. The upcoming Father's Day is a chance for us all to remember the lessons learned from our fathers, as they apply to woodworking and beyond.

In preparing for this issue, Pam suggested that we revisit the topic of respiratory safety by reprinting Dr. Ken Roth's article from 2000, since we all have been suffering seasonal respiratory illnesses. Dr. Roth explains breathing mechanics, especially the negative effects of smoking and woodworking (pages 40-42).

It was only after she began to repackage the article that we discovered that Ken had passed away just weeks before, after a long illness. Besides his medical practice and teaching at Loma Linda Medical School, he had been President of the San Diego Woodturners and traveled around to regional woodworking clubs giving presentations on the importance of respiratory protection. It should also be noted that Ken served as a Councilman and Mayor of Redlands, CA. So, I'd like to use this opportunity to remember Dr. Ken Roth, thank him for his service to the woodworking and greater community, and extend condolences to his family and friends.

Add Festool owner Tooltechnic Systems, which has acquired Tanos, Narex, Sawstop, and Shaper Tools. Only Hilti and Makita remain stand alone companies, with their single brands. INADEQUACY IN THE SHOP

A recent messageboard thread started with this tongue-in-cheek lament by one of our visitors:

'I am feeling inadequate when I go into the shop. I don't have a SawStop; I don't have a Domino; I don't have a Festool track saw; nor an over-under planer-jointer. Do I need to seek professional counseling? I can't believe that all the tools I have used for years are obsolete and not cutting-edge. Woe is me.'

This sparked a wide-ranging, often amusing, sometimes sobering, conversation that went to the core of many of our woodworking motivations...


"When I get that feeling, I grab my sharpest drawknife, head to the shave horse, and take it out on a piece of unsuspecting wood. Works every time."

"I'll bet the guy that recently mangled four fingers in his tablesaw wished he had a SawStop. A major safety improvement like that makes just plain sense to buy, in my opinion."

"Some people have limited time in the shop; tools that speed up the process can either provide more time with the family or make quicker money."

"I'm surprised you have a computer. Some of us are getting old, and our eyes and hands and backs and knees don't work as well as they used to, and we can't find an apprentice who will work for room and board, or who even wants to learn the skills that our machines do automatically."

"It's not about the tools, it's about the journey. Do you enjoy working with wood? If you do, that's all that really matters. For



what it's worth, I know a couple of professional woodworkers who do very fine work with remarkably few—and old—tools. One of them works in a drafty old barn. His tablesaw is an old Craftsman contractor's saw that he built a table around with old scrap plywood. His shop has a dirt floor and terrible lighting. Yet, his work is regionally sought after. If you can find joy in working with wood without all the pricey tools, then good on you."

"My woodworking (like my skiing) takes me away from everything else going on in the world. Whether I'm running a tablesaw or a crosscut handsaw, I'm in wood world hobby land. No worries, no stressing, just enjoyment."

"You are such a stirrer. Just think, you get to use your tools and will never be tempted to just sit and polish them! And, you get to be reminded that a good workman does not blame his tools.:)"

"I don't have a SawStop, but if I buy another tablesaw, that'll be it. Anyone making a political argument against owning one has never mangled a finger in the shop. I have. SawStops are cheap insurance and excellent saws. I like my fingers too much to consider buying any other saw. That said, I am sticking with the contractor's saw that I bought in 1971."

"Your lament reminds me of a list I have posted in my shop:

Why I Like Wood Working in a High Tech World

- My tools aren't upgraded on a regular basis, rendering the old ones useless.
- Getting a new species of wood doesn't require me to purchase new tools and learn new skills (usually).
- I don't have spiffy new terms constantly introduced. In the corporate/tech world, using a tablesaw would probably be known as 'controlled kerf introduction.'
- 4. When I learn to use a new tool, I don't need to relearn to use it next year.
- My only deadlines are set either by myself or my wife, and neither are really all that important.
- Idon't have to be politically correct in my own shop. The tools don't really care how much I swear.
- 7. I may still have meetings about woodworking, but they are fun, and sometimes involve alcohol (as long as tools aren't nearby!).
- 8. Idon't have to hang charts and graphs to tell me if I am doing a good job or not.
- 9. I can pay for my supplies and not have to deal with PO's.
- 10. If I get a splinter, I don't have to fill out an accident report or do a root cause investigation to see how it happened.
- 11. If you want to buy something, you don't need to sit through a PowerPoint demo.
- 12. More than likely, there isn't a 15-year old kid who knows more than you do.
- 13. Ethernet and Wi-Fi are simplified to 110/220.
- 14. In woodworking, you can burn your mistakes. In the corporate world, your mistakes burn you.
- 15. I've never seen someone caress an RFP.
- 16. When you're not in the boardroom, there are really 'boards.'"

"For over 20 years I earned my living in meat shops, and for about 30 years I've been a woodworker, mostly a hobbyist because there is very little to no money in it. Out of all those years of working around sharp objects, I needed five stitches once, and that was because the guy next to me slipped with his knife and ran it across one of my knuckles. You can have your SissySaw."

"I'm glad that I didn't spend any more money on tools and machinery than I have."

"Time to move on to the dark world of spinning wood."

"Take care with the tools you have, be safe, and enjoy. I am convinced time spent in the shop is not subtracted from your time on earth. When I go into the shop, I say I am going to the gym."

"How have you been able to get anything done all these years? By the way, my favorite tool is 150 years old."

"I do most of my work with machines, but most of my pleasure comes from hand tools."

"I am enjoying my retirement. You've got to die somewhere; the shop would suit me fine."

"A Festool track saw might be useful if you broke down a lot of plywood. The other stuff is unnecessary. A Domino is a better biscuit joiner in narrow circumstances, and if you have money to burn, but is not a better tenon. Jointer/planers are kludges, except some of the better ones like the German 24-inchers that allow full width jointing and planing. And, the SawStop is clearly an important innovation for people, both amateur and 'professional,' who don't know how to use saws. But if you have made it 50 years without cutting yourself, you may be in that niche market of people who know what they are doing. Of course, it isn't wrong to take chances with machines, if that is your objective. Then a ballistic brake might be a good thing to have. I just impose safe limits on my use. At the end of the day, one might wonder what inadequacies one is discussing."

"A couple years ago, I upgraded to a SawStop. It is a great saw, well made, and I have enjoyed using it. One of the reasons I got it is that, in the not too distant future, one of my three kids will be inheriting it. I was concerned about their safety as well as my own."

"I just don't get how people put their hands in the way of the blade in the first place. To me, it is like licking a metal pole in winter. I can see the attraction, but you can just not do it. There is no circumstance where you have to put your hands anywhere near the blade. If you do, you are doing it wrong."

"You only have to be wrong once. A friend of mine cut off all four fingers on his right hand. He and his wife panicked and raced to the hospital, without the fingers. They couldn't put them back on. Guess what his job used to be...Dentist. His life style took a hit too."

"People give far too much credit to their brain as being their number-one safety device. Granted it's good, except it has the problem of being easily distracted at times, and other times just going into an idle/sleep mode. That's why devices like guards and, yes, SawStop, are useful. They prevent many of the accidents that are caused by silly, non-thinking actions, like reaching over a spinning blade to move a cut-off."

"I'm a professional, and I don't want or need a Domino. I don't own a SawStop. In fact, I just bought a tablesaw. I do own a tracksaw, and yet, I don't use it much."

"I look at things in terms of design: What is it that I want to accomplish, and what is the most aesthetically-pleasing, cost effective, safe, and gratifying way to do it? Fancy gee-gaws can be enticing; but, lacking them, it's usually possible to solve the problem anyway. Solve the problems. Enjoy the journey."

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

WHAT'S NEW

CORDLESS POWER TOOL MARKET

Cordless tools have surpassed plug-in electric tools in the U.S., according to a new report by Cleveland-based industry research firm **The Freedonia Group.** The global demand for cordless electric tools is forecast to rise 7.9% per year to \$10.1 billion in 2022. Technological improvements will be the main driver of increased market share for cordless electric tools. These products will achieve higher maximum power capabilities and longer run times, while the declining price of lithium-ion batteries will make cordless electric products more affordable to operate. TAEHO KWON OPENS OWN SCHOOL

NEW NATIONAL FORMALDEHYDE RULES

New formaldehyde rules went into effect on March 22. Nearly identical to those set forward by the California Air Resources Board, they require any seller, supplier, offeror, manufacturer, or importer of composite wood products to undergo third-party certification before sale in the U.S. Composite wood product manufacturers also are required to establish and maintain a quality-control program to ensure compliance with the standards. Companies must also provide third-party certifiers with the program's quality control manager's contact information. All composite wood products made in the U.S. or imported are required to be labeled with the producer's name, lot number, an EPA-recognized third-party certification number, and a compliance statement.

ROCKLER LOCK-ALIGN ORGANIZERS

Rockler Woodworking and Hardware has added several new products to its modular Lock-Align Drawer Organizer System. The Lock-Align Wall Brackets provide the ability to mount drawers/bins to a wall or bench for better access, without adding clutter to a work surface; 4-Way Divider Bins for organizing small items; Wide Bins for storage of larger items or greater quantities; 2-pack Standard Trays; and textured synthetic rubber Liner for drawer protection. "These new components provide users with even more flexibility, so they can design storage solutions tailored to fit their needs," explains Steve Krohmer, Rockler's vice president of product development. WHAT'S NEW

STANLEY BLACK & DECKER SUES SEARS

Stanley Black & Decker (SBD) has filed a federal lawsuit against **Sears** over trademark infringement. SBD purchased the *Craftsman* brand and all related trademarks from Sears for \$900 million in 2017, but Sears has begun introducing a new line of tools, the *Craftsman Ultimate Collection*, claiming that it is the "real home" of the 92-year old *Craftsman* brand in a February press announcement.

SBD argues that "by touting itself as 'the real home of the broadest assortment of Craftsman, Sears is implying that only its *Craftsman* merchandise is 'genuine' and that all other *Craftsman* products are 'illegitimate.'" In addition, SBD alleges that Sears is causing customer confusion, as evidenced by social media postings, and poses an imminent threat of irreparable harm. SBD is seeking a temporary restraining order to stop Sears from marketing, advertising, and selling the new product line.

Sears has other legal troubles. It emerged from bankruptcy in February, after being purchased by hedge fund ESL for \$5.2 billion. However, ESL has been accused of improperly taking \$57.5 million from Sears and has been ordered to return the funds.

WOODWORKING CRIME BLOTTER

Two Colorado men have been found guilty for stealing wood from fences along Wyoming highways, designed to protect roadways from blowing snow. The wood was then sold to a furniture manufacturer. The men were sentenced to 5-years supervised probation and ordered to pay the Wyoming Department of Transportation \$16,000 in restitution.

Five members of a Native American tribe in Wisconsin have been charged with conspiring to steal more than \$400,000 worth of timber from their Menominee tribal land. The men have been accused of cutting more trees than contracted and selling the excess lumber to private sawmills over a six-year period.

Security cameras in a Fresno, CA hardware store captured a customer stuffing a chainsaw into his pants, then hobbling away. The Fresno Bee newspaper headlined the story: Wanted: California Shoplifter with a Chainsaw in His Pants. The man has yet to be apprehended.

ARTHUR MASON PASSES AT 93

Arthur K. Mason was among the leading collectors of contemporary wood art. The Washington, D.C. attorney, with his wife **Jane**, began collecting in 1986, supporting many of today's leading turned wood artists during their formative years,. Over a 20-year period, they accumulated more than 900 pieces from approximately 400 makers.

Pieces from the Mason Collection have been exhibited in shows that traveled across the country and cataloged in *Turning*

Wood into Art and Turned and Sculpted. Hundreds of works have been gifted to museums, with many going to the Mint Museum of Craft + Design, Charlotte, NC. He served as legal advisor in the establishment of the American Association of Woodturners (AAW), Board of Director for the Center for Wood Art in Philadelphia, and among the organizers of the Collectors of Wood Art (CWA).

He and Jane were awarded AAW Honorary Lifetime Memberships in 2005 and CWA Lifettime Achievement

Awards in 2009. A memorial service was held at the Smithsonian Museum of American Art on April 7.

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From David Marks Studio

A Couple's Collaboration & Questions

by David Marks



David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for nearly 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004.

Over the years, I have had the opportunity to teach some husband and wife private classes. Recently, **Mike and Susan Logan** of Houston, TX came to my shop to undertake one of my turned and patina forms, whereby Mike did the turning and Susan did the silver leaf and patina finish on the base. This was a very challenging piece that required me to guide them very carefully through all of the steps.

Mike turned the center part of the vessel from Koa. The bottom of the base, which will be covered in patina, was turned from Poplar.





The top was Curly Koa, Ebony, and a betel nut. The upper rim was a segmented spiral of Ebony and Holly. Enjoying a challenge, he decided to go for hand chased threads, so the lid could be screwed on and off.

Once the parts were completed, they were assembled and returned to the lathe for finish turning, supported by my shop built center steady.







Susan paints the the Poplar base with an oilbased leaf adhesive, before applying the silver leaf. The finished piece is simply stunning.

With the turning completed, Susan took over. She has a great eye for color and design and after showing her numerous samples, she decided to go with a new technique using Lichen Moss as a resist material.

As you can see the results (right) are stunning! Congratulations to Mike and Susan for their persistence, hard work, and dedication to completing this project together!

Now, time for some questions. . .

1. **Ammonia for Fuming:** I've become a big fan of this process. Do you re-use ammonia, or start with fresh each time? Chuck

David's Answer: Fuming with 27% aqua ammonia is a time-honored method to darken the color of woods containing Tannic acid, as well as accentuate the medullary ray fleck grain patterns.

I covered this topic in my recent hands-on finishing class, and the students asked the very same question: whether it was a one time use or can it be used again. Just be aware of the dangers using ammonia.

My response is yes, it can be used again. I use 4 mil clear plastic (the kind that the hardware stores sell to contractors in big rolls for approximately \$25.00 or so) and use one or two small step ladders to make a tent. I drape the plastic over the ladders and duct tape it down to my outdoor concrete slab.

Once the object or objects have been placed inside on sheets of cardboard, I finish sealing up the tent with duct tape. Next, I cut an opening big enough to slide in a glass or plastic dish with approximately one cup of aqua ammonia. The clear plastic allows me to monitor the color change without opening the tent.

Once I'm satisfied, I'll open the tent, remove the dish, and pour the leftover liquid into a bottle labeled "used 27% ammonia." This container is separate from the original ammonia.

Next time that I use the used ammonia, I might expect to leave it in longer, because it most likely isn't as strong as the original product.

2. Shelf Life of Patina Chemicals: Your Gilding & Chemical Patinations DVD has great info. I have worked with metallic paint patinas, but not directly with leaf.

In ordering chemicals from Art Chemicals, I was trying to deduce the value of ordering based on amount ordered. I had settled on about 250 grams each. It occurred to me that there might be some deterioration in storage, so I don't want to order a supply that will not be usable. Is deterioration an issue with any that are stored in an airtight container?

As someone sensitive to fumes/odors, do you have a recommended respirator? I have one made by 3M. If I am going to use one frequently, I want to protect my lungs as much as possible, and a respirator isn't one of the things I want to "experiment" with. Jackie

David's Answer: The chemicals in the dried form will keep for years. The exception would be sodium sulfide and potash sulfurated; these two chemicals can "go bad" over extended time in storage or if the containers have been opened and closed enough times to allow air and humidity to damage the chemicals. Generally, it is advisable to buy smaller quantities of these two chemicals.

For all of the chemicals, once you add water to the chemicals, the solution will stay active for a day or two, so the recommendation is to mix up a small portion to work with each time.


Always work in well-ventilated areas, preferably outdoors whenever possible—though you can work indoors with the fan on and windows open. Being sensitive, do use a respirator with a charcoal cartridge or filter.





Wood Dust & Your Health

by Kenneth Roth, M.D.

This essay concisely discusses the dangers of wood dust and the alternatives for minimizing exposure

Working with wood—whether woodturning or woodworking—produces and exposes you to dust, toxins, and allergens, thereby threatening your health. Those of us who work with wood have blindly accepted these risks, but current medical knowledge tells us that the risks are too great to continue to ignore the impact on our health. As we live longer, the effects of health hazards are showing their ugly faces in those of us who have insulted our bodies with poor diet, too much alcohol and tobacco, and inhalation of harmful substances. This essay discusses the effects of working with wood and how to minimize the risks.

ANATOMY

Understanding the anatomy of the lung is crucial to your understanding of this subject and what it means to your well-being.




Figure 1. The Human Bronchial Tree

The nose and the area behind it (the nasopharynx), with its hair

and mucus covered surface, "strains" out the large particles that are inhaled through the nose. The bronchial "tree," beginning at the "Adam's apple" (larynx), consists of the trachea (trunk of the tree) and the bronchi (the limbs) and is responsible for screening and removing smaller inhaled particles (Fig. 1). Alveoli (the leaves) are balloon-like formations that constitute the actual lung tissue. Covering the lining of the trachea and the bronchi are millions of tiny projections called cilia. The cilia are 5 microns in length (1 micron = 1/25,650 of an inch; the finest human hair is 100 microns) and beat in a wave action 1,000 to 1,500 times per minute, functionally sweeping material from the alveoli up and out of the bronchial tree.





Figure 2. Healthy Alveoli, when oxygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged from the blood stream.

Alveoli are one cell thick—each immediately adjacent to its neighboring alveoli—with one cell thick blood vessels between them (Fig. 2). The blood vessels are just big enough to allow a single blood cell to squeeze through, one at a time (a red blood cell is 8 microns in diameter). These "balloons" have a total surface area in a human of 70 square meters or the area of a tennis court.

The lung allows inhaled oxygen to be transferred to the blood, and the carbon dioxide in your body to be transferred to the air being exhaled. Without this happening, YOU DON'T LIVE!!! The ability of the lung tissue to transport these gases depends on the thinness of the alveoli, the blood vessels, and their interface. If that interface is thickened by scarring or edema fluid (swelling from the inflammation of heart failure, etc.) oxygen and carbon dioxide can not be exchanged, and you are in respiratory distress or dead. There are large, roving white cells (macrophages) that ingest dust particles and other foreign bodies and transport them out of the bronchial tree and lungs.

Dr. Roth was a retired physician and an active member of the San Diego Woodturners Association. He spoken at a number of Southern California woodworking organizations on the respiratory dangers of working with wood.

PHYSICAL PROPERTIES OF DUST

As stated above, one micron is $^{1}/_{25,650}$ of an inch or $^{1}/_{1,000}$ of a millimeter. Visual dust is greater than 20 microns, but dangerous dust is less than 10 microns. Most of the dust greater than 5 microns are deposited on the walls of the nasopharynx and trachea and are removed by the cilia and macrophages unless overwhelmed by chronic exposure or by high concentration. (Dust particles less than 5 microns readily reach the alveoli, though 90% can be expelled with the exhaled air. Incidentally, cigarette smoke particles are 5 microns.

To further confuse you, we need to talk about concentration of dust in the air. If the concentration is small or the exposure is not prolonged the macrophages and cilia can eventually handle the deposited dust. OSHA states that "the maximum permissible exposure per 8 hours is ½ teaspoon in a 24' x 24' x 9' shop."

Wood also can contain toxins (Western Red Cedar has plicatic acid, and Silky Oak has a phenolin), allergens (Sequoia Redwood), and molds and fungus (spalting woods and bark).

PATHOPHYSIOLOGY

Pathophysiology is a big word that describes what all these things do to us. We can become acutely ill with pneumonia, respiratory distress, bronchial asthma, or a chronic respiratory condition, such as pneumoconiosis that requires constant oxygen therapy and can lead to an early, miserable death.

The bottom line is that dust particles are foreign bodies, and the body reacts to them by an inflammation reaction. Chemical / toxins / allergens are similarly handled by inflammation. Inflammation produces tissue fluid (edema) and THICKENS the tissue between the alveoli to the point that it is difficult or impossible for the oxygen / carbon dioxide to exchange (Figures 3 and 3A). This can occur as an acute pneumonia-like process or as a chronic condition. In the chronic condition, scarring results, making the changes permanent and the ability to breathe difficult or impossible.

At this point, I need to tell you one reason that smoking is bad. Nicotine paralyses the cilia, thus making it impossible for the trachea and bronchia to clean out the entrapped foreign particles. One cigarette paralyses cilia for approximately one hour. This is why smokers constitute the vast majority of people who die from pneumoconiosis, silicosis, emphysema, bronchiectasis, and COPD to name a few. Smoker's lungs simply can not handle the crap that we breathe into our lungs on a daily basis—particularly if your work or play environment includes dusts or other breathable irritants.

PROTECTION

As woodturners and woodworkers, we can not eliminate dust and other inhalants, but we must minimize them. This is important for all of us, but especially for those who smoke. How do we minimize exposure?

■ Minimize Dust

- a. Use cutting techniques, minimize scraping.
- b. Plane and scrape flat work, with minimal sanding.
- c. Use sharp saw blades, router bits, planer blades, turning tools, etc.
- d. Wet sand when possible.

■ Dust Collection

- a. A dust collector system is best. Shop vacs do not have adequate filtering capabilities, and the motors are not designed for continuous use. Filters are available for shop vacs to .3 micron particles.
- b. Use filter bags on your collection system that will filter small particles. There are bags that filters .3 microns. Cotton bags (standard) only capture 50 micron-sized particles. Knit polyester bags only capture 5 micron particles.
- c. Seal leaks in your saws, etc., so that the exhaust system can work correctly.

■ Room Air Filter System

- a. The smallest particles remain suspended in room air for hours, and long after you quit making dust, these particles are in your inhaled air. These must be filtered out.
- b. Air filter systems capable of filtering 1 micron, or less, sized particles, while filtering at least 6 room changes per hour are available. Some will filter 35% of .4 micron particles. (Note: There are plans available to make your own, but none emphasize the filter capabilities. Use filters capable of filtering 1 micron or smaller).
- c. If you can open your shop to the outdoors, blow dust outside. This is a reasonable alternative to a room air filter.

■ Personal Protection

- a. Throwaway, one strap masks are the least expensive but are NOT effective. They are for nuisance dust only, which is the least dangerous.
- b. NIOSH-approved disposable masks with 2 rubber straps are effective, though they can not be used with a beard.
- c. Cartridge respirators usually will filter .5 micron dust. They must fit well and to not be used with a beard. They can be difficult to wear with a face shield.
- d. The old 3M Power Visor (formerly Racal) is only a nuisance dust filter. It is NOT a HEPA filter.
- e. A dust helmet with a HEPA filter is the best personal protection, as it will filter .5 micron particles. It also has an impact resistant face shield.

SUMMARY

Working with wood has definite health hazards of dust, toxins, molds, and allergens. Inhaling these substances can lead to devastating lung disease, even death, in the long run. Minimizing exposure is an absolute must. The process can be expensive, but it can be made affordable by minimizing the production of dust, evacuating the suspended dust out of the shop by fan, stopping smoking, and using a HEPA filter, either in the form of a NIOSH-approved dust mask or cartridge filter (if you are not bearded), or better by obtaining a HEPA filter Dust Helmet. If you have the potential to develop pulmonary disease—such as smokers and career woodworkers—you MUST protect your lungs or suffer the consequences. A respiratory cripple is one thing that you don't want to be.

Remember that the invisible dust is the bad stuff, and high concentrations and prolonged exposure can overwhelm the system, producing severe problems, especially in smokers.



Profile: Ken Cowell

Ken Cowell of Yorba Linda, CA is an award-winning craftsman. His most exquisite pieces are when he incorporates his various talents into a single piece. Here is his story, in Ken's own words:

Just as with many future woodworkers, I was always making things with my hands as a kid. I whittled and carved, and I made willow whistles, trout fishing flies, and a box kite from salvaged wooden orange crates and Christmas wrapping paper.

When I went to college and grad school, I studied education administration, but upon earning a Masters, I realized that I didn't want to sit behind a desk. I tried teaching, only to conclude that surviving one year in a junior high proved I could accomplish anything in the universe. That summer, I did odd repair jobs and rediscovered the joy of working with my hands. When September rolled around, I decided, in consultation with my wife, to continue handyman work, rather than return to a classroom.

I had no formal woodworking education, but read whatever I could get my hands on or figured out solutions. After three years, I secured my contractor's license to specialize in residential remodeling. Over the next 11 years, the progression of my work became more and more cabinetry and finish work, leading to opening my own custom cabinet shop in 1988. I operated the business for 25 years, until my son took over when I retired five years ago.

As a cabinetmaker, I realized that I was not just making cabinets, I was fulfilling dreams. I would interact with clients to find out what they wanted, and then do the design work to create what they imagined. However, I found that I had become only a salesman and manager, as my employees were making everything. Therefore, I built a second shop at the house, where I could make things, primarily for the house and family—which could be a full-time endeavor with a large family. There were dining and bedroom sets for each of the four kids and presents for the 10 grandchildren.

Along the way, I became interested in turning bowls. I made my own lathe with just a headstock, and gathered wood by chasing down tree trimmers, whenever I heard a chainsaw. As more ambitious projects were undertaken, I decided to take a class at Craft Supplies with **Mike Mahoney** and purchase a "big boy" lathe, when I discovered the advantages of a tailstock.

My interest in segmented turning was a result of reading Woodturning with Ray Allen, in 2005. Following Ray's lead, my initial work was in the Southwest-style, but as soon as I got the feeling of the whole process, I tried to develop my own look, incorporating curved lines and shapes. But there is only so much that you can do with the geometric nature of segmented turning. I have also become interested in basket illusions. I decided to give it a whirl after American Woodturner published instructions at the time I was teaching the grandkids to weave baskets.

Ken loves to demonstrate marquetry, using his home-made, long-throat scrollsaw, powered by foot peddles. Here he is demonstrating at the 2017 World Wood Day event. He annually demonstrates at the Orange County Fair.

My interest in marquetry also developed from reading a book, where the guy made his own thick veneers and used a scroll saw. I said 'I could do that' and started making my own veneer and doing marquetry. My first projects were making keepsake boxes with a bird or a flower on the top for all the female family members. It got a lot more complex after that.

I was looking at art on the Internet, when I came across **Alphonse Mucha's** painting entitled *Printemps*. I knew I had to do that in marquetry. When the panel was completed, there was the question of how to display it: framed to hang on the wall or incorporated it into a piece of furniture. Fearing people would confuse a wall piece for a painting, I decided to make it the centerpiece for an armoire. *The Lady* (right) won *First Place* category awards at the *Design in Wood* in San Diego, the *Orange County Fair*, and the national Veneertech competitions. However, my biggest compliment was finding one of my daughter's friends sitting on the floor and staring at it, with a tear going down her cheek. "I just love it. It moves me so much." That's what artists talk about in delivering an emotional punch.

Even though it was not my original artwork, going from a painting or photograph to little wood pieces is art in itself. You have to choose the right color of wood, and shades and grain patterns have to match. You are trying to take advantage of as much of the characteristics of the wood as possible to accomplish the picture that you want to complete. In *The Lady*, I used 25 different species—13 reclaimed from urban trees—almost all in their natural color.

The Lady spurred me on to create an entire bedroom suite for our home, including the *Tree of Lie* dresser (on the cover) and the matching bed side tables—all which were winners at *Design in Wood* and *Orange County Fair*.

Being retired means that I can continue enjoying life doing what I like. If I see something that I'm interested in, I pursue it. Or, I will design a tool to accomplish a particular task or figure out how to make something work. That's what gets me up in the morning.

SHAVINGS & SAWDUST

FUNCTIONAL WOOD AT R & CO.

Celebrating 20 years in business, **R & Company** in New York presents the most innovative and finely crafted contemporary work.

It opened the year with the functional sculpture of Chilean-born **Sebastian ErraZuriz.** Breaking the Box consisted of new work from his Mechanical Cabinet series, in which each piece transforms from a box shape into something unexpected. For example, Grand Complication (below) opens like a Russian nesting doll.

Thru May 11, the gallery hosts the first solo exhibition of South Korean designer **Bae Se Hwa.** Working alone in his studio, each intricate piece is meticulously crafted, resulting is only 3-5 works produced per year. This exhibit features pieces from his *Steam Bent* series, in which hundreds of Walnut slices are shaped to create subtle curves and elegant lines that wrap around the human body.

THREE CHAIRS FROM THE MILAN SHOW

Chair design was a major topic at the 58th edition of *Salone del Mobile*, the annual furniture fair held in Milan, Italy in April. Here are three examples that stimulated a lot of discussion.

The NO1 chair by Japanese studio **Nendo** merges Danish and Japanese aesthetics. The chair is constructed as a puzzle consisting of 23 wood pieces, solid wood for the frame and nine layers of laminated veneer shaped to form the seat.

The Kohlo dining chair by Matthew Day Jackson is inspired by

the Apollo moon landing. "Apollo was rectilinear and the Dionysus crater was chaotic and curvy," says Jackson. "Those two things, those two polarities begged for a material that curved." The designer worked with Formica to develop a textured material for the seat that subtly replicates the surface of the moon.

The Leva chair by Foster+Partners was inspired by the efficiency and form of a rowing paddle. With the idea of sustainability, the piece was created from a single timber, with the arms and supportive backrest steam-bent from solid wood.
