

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

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FINE WOODWORKING BRINGS 'HANDS-ON' TO SAN DIEGO, OCT 4-6

Fine Woodworking magazine brings its HANDS ON event to San Diego, Oct. 4-6. Taking place in the woodworking facility at Palomar College, HANDS ON San Diego features a series of intensive 2-day hands-on workshops, focused on building woodworking skills through personalized instruction by top experts in the field. Outside of classes are social activities, during which masters and attendees can informally interact.

 skillfully with hand tools. You'll discover the secrets to cutting
 dovetails successfully, learn to cut and fit mortise and tenons,
 and get a primer on setting up your hand planes to get perfect
 shavings every time. Students will use coping and back saws,
 bench planes and smoothing planes, marking gauges and
 knives, and chisels and mallets to gain hand tool proficiency.
- · The Finer Points of Bowl Making with Mike Mahoney. This

- class will explore how to turn beautiful bowls, from the basics and beyond. You'll learn the fundamentals of sharpening, the basics of push cuts and pull cuts, and how to use a jamb chuck. You'll also learn how to sand and finish on the lathe.
- Build a Mitered Box with a Kumiko Top with Michael Pe-kovich. Crafting a little tea box, you'll learn the basics of box making and discover the wonders of kumiko, a traditional Japanese joinery technique that's a fun way to spice up any project. Mike will cover smart tablesaw techniques that make quick work of mitered joinery for the box and the fundamentals of kumiko by making the decorative panel for the lid of the box using hand tools.
- Make a Japanese Toolbox with Vic Tesolin. As in most cultures, the Japanese have a specific-looking toolbox that they use for their woodworking tools; simple chests lacking ornamentation or flair, but highly functional to store all matter of things. Vic will take you through the layout and joinery for putting together a solid toolbox. You will also learn how to use your toolbox as a work-holding solution for using hand tools. If you come prepared with a list of tools and sizes of those tools, you can even customize the box for your specific needs.

HANDS ON San Diego will utilize the woodworking workshops of the Cabinet and Furniture Technology program at **Palomar College.** This 23,000 sq. ft. facility consists of classrooms and state-of-the art woodworking labs. Palomar College is located in North San Diego County (30 miles north of San Diego) at 1140 W. Mission Rd. in San Marcos, CA.



Small bookcases serve different needs. They can hold books and magazines, plates and goblets, keys or remote controls. Or they can provide a builder with a lovely opportunity for carving and inlay. Join us for this exploration of form and joinery but with great details.

Case construction can be accomplished in many ways. Learn several methods for carcase construc-

tion that are solid and can be decorative. Learn to cut different through and stopped mortise and tenon joints. Discover the absolute joy of a tapered sliding dovetail joint for case construction. Then see how to carve and shape through tenon joints. Whether a tenon is wedged or not, careful chisel work spruces up any bit of exposed joinery. From Gothic peaking to a Greene and Greene pillowed and puffed tenon extending below a cabinet face, there are many ways of shaping joints to make them a vivid part of a design. See how a

simple chisel can be your best carving tool.

Gary will also discuss inlay and carving details that make simple forms stand out. Learn how to carve a simple basket weave design that you create to liven up a case side. Any number of forms or shapes can be used as inlay but there are opportunities as well for curved inlay, sand shading your inlay, and carving it in place. Come to see these techniques in action.

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Woodworking Observations

As a digest for the woodworking community, we frequently post obituaries for individuals that significantly impacted the field of woodworking. In this column, we do not mourn the passing of an individual, but of an institution.

The **Utah Woodturning Symposium** was not the first, but was the longest-running woodturning conference. Industrial arts professor Dale Nish at Brigham Young University started the annual event in 1979, drawing upon his experience at turning conferences back East. Over the years, the list of demonstrators was impressive—including local, national, and international established and emerging artists—and demand to attend was capped at several hundred to maintain the intimate atmosphere. It's format has served as the basis for the many national and regional symposia that have since emerged.

This year was to be the 40th anniversary, but facility logistics caused the symposium to be postponed. Instead, a new location was being sought for a larger—and probably a final—celebration in 2020. Social media was abuzz with commitments to attend from around the world. Sadly in July, the Board announced termination:

Although this was not an easy decision, a variety of factors have combined which make us question the continued financial viability of the symposium, while still maintaining the level of quality that we strive for and have enjoyed in past years. We express sincere appreciation to the hundreds of volunteers who have helped make the Utah Woodturning Symposium a success over the past four decades. We also thank the many world-class presenters who openly shared their hard-earned expertise. Most of all, we thank the thousands of participants who supported the symposium by their attendance, many who returned year after year creating a family-reunion type atmosphere.

Though I never attended, it certainly was on my bucket list. It will be missed.

HAND PLANING: FEELING THE HEAT

Sometimes, the conversations on our messageboards can get pretty esoteric, as they did recently when one of our hand-tool aficionados speculated about the heat generated at the cutting edge of a plane iron when hand planing wood. This prompted a far-ranging discussion of all the variables involved and some academic insights into the physics of hand planing...

"I've noticed that my hand planes feel warm after extended planing sessions. I've heard that the heat increases with the speed of planing. I don't know how this might affect the blade temper or sharpness, but I was able to measure a 6° temperature rise about 1/8" back from the edge, after about five minutes of continuous planing."

"I've turned an edge blue from planing. I was using a highly rounded plane on a chair seat in hard wood. The small area contacting the wood just couldn't handle the pace of the work. Of course, after drawing the temper, I had to hone past that and decided to be more careful in the future."

"We all recall the heat that occurs when using a card scraper—the 'burned thumb' experience? I suspect that high cutting angles are more likely to produce heat in plane blades."

"I have noticed that a brown resinous coating tends to accumulate on some blades, but I've never understood why or how. Does it have to do with the type of blade? The bed angle? The species of wood you are planing. This resin has to be scrubbed off before lapping the back of the blade, or else it will gum up the sharpening media."

"This result says the shaving is getting hot enough to volatilize stuff from the wood, which then condenses on the cooler blade."

"For those that remember their physics history, work and heat are equivalent. The more work you put into planing—force times distance—the more heat will be generated. The heat generated by the friction of the shaving rubbing on the cap iron and blade will equal force times distance. This heat, divided by the time to generate it, will be the heat flux into the blade and cap iron, if there is one. That's the easy part. Heat flux out of the blade tip will be a


complicated function of wood heat capacity, temperature rise of the shaving, and mass of the shaving, plus a complicated function of the mass of the blade and cap iron and steel conductivity and heat capacity and a few other variables. The temperature of the blade tip will be the temperature where the heat out equals heat in. Heat is generated by friction, so this heat input is being generated all along the front and back of the blade that is rubbing on wood—plus the shaving rubbing on the cap iron. This heat input is not concentrated at the tip. In fact, the frictional forces at the tip may be substantially less than along the blade surfaces, because of the splitting action at the tip. The bottom line is that scrapers get hot because the amount of shavings carrying heat away is very small, the work input is high, and the mass of the metal is low compared to a plane blade. That said, in normal planing, I don't see the opportunity for a cutting edge to reach a temperature where it will lose hardness, since the heat absorbing capacity of the plane iron conducts the heat away from the edge. Of greater interest is whether the blade will reach a temperature where corrosive wear becomes important, as it is in milling wood with a high-speed router bit. If it does, the chromium content of A2 and PMV11 could improve their edge life."


"A dull iron can overheat in use and lose its temper. This happens more easily with Hard Maple than other woods. But, it does not happen 1/8", or even 1/100" from the edge; we are talking about a very small region. One does not need to be able to see blue or any other discoloration to know this is happening. We learn this by noticing how the iron acts, not by being able to see actual damage. If an iron suddenly acts as if it has been overheated and it then requires a number of sharpening cycles to regain its former quality, then this evidence suggests overheating. This is the kind of thing that one would not otherwise notice, without a great deal of experience."


"I would be pretty surprised to see an iron get hot enough to worry about temper in planing. I wouldn't be surprised at all if the very edge of it got hot enough to affect the overall mechanisms of wear. If you really want to know the temperature at the edge, you might be able to set up some kind of holder for a laser thermometer. They actually work quite well and usually have a peak hold feature. I think some of the better multi-meters have temperature probes and a setting on the meter to display calibrated temperature."

"I think the part that would heat is like some fraction of a thousandth, and because of the conductivity of the iron, after the instant when the heat occurred, it would quickly be absorbed by the surrounding metal. I'm not sure it can be accurately measured with anything a mere mortal can afford."

Using thermal imagery, it demonstrates the heat generated as a plane cuts wood. This is a York pitch moving fillister, taking a 12" shaving of Beech at actual speed. This sequence shows three points in the process—from the beginning of the shaving through the shaving curling off the iron. The temperature of the iron is read right at the target in the center of the image. The temperature begins at 68.9° and increases to 74.1° with repeated passings. So, there is just over 5° of heat generated in this example."

"It's worth noting that the clip is at actual speed. It seems so slow, because they couldn't have gotten the images at regular speed. So, I'm sure the temperature increase would have been much more at a brisk planing speed."

"This discussion goes back to the factors that determine edge life: Shaving thickness, iron thickness, type of steel, wood type, planing speed, ability of the wood to carry heat away...I don't think at most hand planing speeds that it causes much of an issue, or we'd be able to smell something burning."

"To find when heat actually makes a difference at the edge, the easiest thing to do would be just to have a planing machine and use an HSS iron and a carbon steel iron and run tests

incrementally increasing the speed. I'd assume that in most test scenarios, the speed would be beyond what we do, but perhaps in some, it may occur at lower speeds."

"I'd not be surprised if the super surfacer (a planing machine with a wide, fixed blade) could easily create heat problems the way it smashes the wood through huge, heavy cuts at high speed."

"If heat were important in edge life, 3V and M2 would stand out in wear resistance compared to the others. Both are tempered way above any temperature that could be generated—1000° F for 3V. If heat was destroying the hardness of LV11 (tempered similar to O-1 and A2), these blades would have fallen short of 3V and M2. O-1 and A2 did, but for other reasons. What has not been investigated is the effect of hardness. Problem is this variable would be difficult to separate from toughness for the two are highly correlated."

"I can't assume that all irons generate the same amount of heat. I would expect stainless steels like PM-V11—give off less heat, because the steel resists sharpening by abrasion. All that chromium



makes the iron more slippery so they generate less friction."

"If you are concerned about heat, rub some wax onto the sole of the plane. That will reduce friction significantly, making it easier to push, and will reduce the heat generated."

CROWD-FUNDING SAVES PRIZED WOOD

Last Fall, a freak storm hit the Val di Fiemme region of Italy, devastating the Spruce forests—from which came the wood used by **Stradivari** for his violins. In order to save the trees from rot, a crowd-funding effort was undertaken to salvage the wood. Within eight months, the campaign raised 230,000 euros from 870 donors, enough to save the resonant wood from 3,000 trees—supplying soundboards for 35,000 instruments.

WHAT'S NEW

OPPOSITION TO TRADE TARIFFS RISES

More than 660 U.S. companies and trade associations—including wood industry groups—have sent a letter to **President Trump** requesting he end his tariffs on Chinese parts and products, warning that his trade war is hurting the economy, jobs and U.S. consumers. The letter states that, despite his frequent insistence otherwise, the "tariffs are taxes paid directly by U.S. companies," not China, and increased costs are being passed along to American consumers. And this was before additional tariffs were announced in August.

The letter cites a Trade Partnership Worldwide study that the 25% tariffs on an additional \$300 billion worth of Chinese goods will cost 2 million American jobs and add more than \$2,000 in additional costs for the average American family of four. Another study estimated that the trade war with China is costing American companies and consumers an estimated \$3 billion a month, and this does not include the loss of business suffered by American exporters of products to China.

Among the wood-related associations signing onto the letter are The American Home Furnishings Alliance, The Home Furnishings Association, the Hardwood Federation, the International Wood Products Association, and the American Society of Interior Designers.

WOODWORKING JURISPRUDENCE


Home Depot is being sued for injuries from falling wood. A shopper in it's Collinsville, IL store claims that he was struck by poorly-stacked wood, as he walked down an aisle. The plaintiff is seeking more than \$50,000 for medical treatment costs, future costs, lost wages, and the potential loss of future earnings.

The former store owner of **Hermantown Lumber Company** in Hermantown, MN is being investigated for allegedly stealing more than \$300,000 from customers. After operating for over 50 years, the store closed it doors this summer, and 50 customers accuse the owner of never fulfilling orders. The location is now occupied by a new woodworking company, **Minardi Millwork and Lumber.**

The American Home Furnishings Alliance (AHFA) and ASTM International are being sued for their alleged failure to alter or recommend changes to a voluntary furniture safety standard that the lawsuit claims was inadequate in protecting children against tip-over incidents. This case stems from the death of a 2-year-old, when an IKEA 8-drawer dresser tipped over. This lawsuit claims that the IKEA dresser had met the ASTM standard, providing consumers with a false sense of security. Not likely a coincidence, ASTM published new voluntary tip-over standards in August, for storage units over 27". The case against IKEA was settled for an undisclosed amount.

WMIA SUPPORTS STUDENTS

The Woodworking Machinery Industry Association Educational Foundation awards scholarships to those who want to study and, eventually, pursue a career in wood technology, machinery, and related fields. For the 2019-2020 school year, 19 students were awarded WMIA support, totaling \$30,000. Most of the students are attending four schools: Pittsburg State University, the New England School of Architectural Woodworking, Seattle Central College, and the École Nationale du Meuble et de L'Ébénisterie in Canada. 





Veneering a Curved Surface & Questions

Ocean is David

Marks latest workin-progress. This 3-foot diameter dome-shaped wall sculpture was veneered with Mahogany from "The Tree" (July, 2015).

In this article,

The Mahogany will served as the background for later aquatic marquetry.

David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for over 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004.

My latest work-in-progress is a commissioned wall sculpture entitled *Ocean*. It is a 3-foot diameter and 8" deep domeshaped piece, in which Mahogany veneer is laid over an Appleply plywood base turned to this shape. This will serve as the canvas for artwork to be inlaid into the surface.

Working on flat surfaces requires experience and skill to ensure that the veneer is pressed flat and remains stable. The stakes get higher when gluing veneer onto a compound curved surface. Now platens have to be cut and shaped to match the curves, in order to press the veneer down to that curve.

Well, you know the old expression. . . "Kicks just keep getting harder to find" and that's true in my case. At age 67, I'm trying to leave the best wood art that I can on the planet earth.

Veneer work requires a level of planning and craftsmanship that is very different from working with solid wood. Everything has to be very carefully planned in advance, and there is little room for mistakes. I had just enough precious Mahogany veneer that I cut from one board of "The Tree" that contained a total of four board feet of lumber, to cover the entire front face, as well as the edges, the back bevel, and the back flat.



I figured that it would be worth the effort to saw up a board of Poplar into $^1/_{16}$ " thick veneer, and use that to cut into numbered pieces to make sure my plan would work. By using the Poplar veneer, I could cut it up and place it on the sculpture and map out the entire surface.

The glue that one chooses to use is also a major decision. I prefer slow setting Urea Resin glue, which is gap filling and hardens to a rigid glue line. It's also highly water resistant, and it is an excellent glue for areas with high humidity rates—like *Ocean's* eventual home of Houston, TX. My preference is Unibond 800, and I have had great success with it over decades of use, so I know that it will stand up to the test of time.

My first challenge in pressing the $^{1}/_{16}$ " thick veneer onto a compound curve was to do test runs in my vacuum press. I experienced major problems immediately; I was reminded of the powerful forces generated by vacuum presses, 1,500 lbs. of pressure per square foot. When I placed my plywood dome onto a $^{3}/_{4}$ " thick MDF platen, I used a square frame to hold it up off the platen, so that the veneer would have room to hang over the edges. It wasn't long after I turned on my pump that I heard a loud "Bang" that jangled my nerves!! Who knew how powerful these things were! My platen imploded completely within the perimeters of my 2 x 4 frame!

My next move was to laminate a new ³/₄" MDF platen/grid onto a sheet of 1" thick heavy-duty void free Baltic Birch plywood. When the glue hardened, I had a new rock solid platen/grid that stands up to the force.

I also learned that there is a new type of vacuum bag on the market. **Darryl Keil**, a woodworker and the President of Vacuum Pressing Systems Inc., has produced a whole new way of using the vacuum press. He sells a zipper bag, which is made from heavy duty 30 mil polyurethane, and it works great! The zipper bag makes working with large heavy pieces much more manageable, especially for a 1-man shop. You can check out Darryl's new zipper bag in the link here: www.vacupress.com/product/zipper-pannel-bags/.



The good news is that by persevering, I eventually experienced success, which I tested by placing a straight edge on top of the bag with test pieces under pressure.

As you can see in this photo of my test bend, the Poplar $^1/_{16}$ " thick veneer and the $^1/_{8}$ " MDF caul have been successfully bent from side to side as well as from front to back, resulting in a compound bend.

Now, time for some questions. . .

1. **Bandsaw Blade for Veneer Cutting:** I have just watched your Bandsawn Veneers DVD. There are many companies that produce the bi-metal 6 teeth per inch (tpi) blade that you suggest. Which brand have you had good success with? I know that Lenox makes them, but all I see on the Lenox web site are blades 1" and larger for use on metal. What blades do you use? Jeff

David's Answer: I have found that the Lenox works the best for me. If you aren't concerned about kerf loss and want to be able to cut faster, then I recommend the Lenox carbide tipped Trimaster blade. It cuts much faster and stays sharp for a very long time. The kerf is $^1/_{16}$ " as opposed to $^1/_{32}$ " on the Diemaster 2 blade. I have been using the Lenox DieMaster 2. The blade width is $^1/_2$ ". If you are resawing, then I would suggest getting the 3 tpi blade with a hook configuration.

For really fine veneer cuts in expensive woods, I use the Lenox DieMaster 2, $^1/_2$ " wide blade with 6 TPI, which cuts slower but gives you a smoother cut with slightly less kerf loss (approximately $^1/_3$ 2"). This blade will get dull sooner then the 3 TPI, but again, for really expensive woods, I find it worthwhile. This is the blade that I used on my *Bandsawn Veneers DVD*, which gave me that great yield on the Quilted Sapele.

I have been purchasing my bandsaw blades from Hastings Saws in San Rafael, CA. If you call them (888-223-7016), they can tell you which blades that I have ordered in the past and make sure that they match that blade to your specific measurements (since all bandsaws require different lengths). FYI: Hastings offers a discount if you do your ordering online.

2. Colored Epoxy for Worm Holes: *I am making a Tea Box and am turning a lidded box from Box Elder. I was worried about toxicity of the wood and taste and smell getting into the tea, so I ingeniously inset a ¹/₂ pint mason jar the inside of it.*

My question is: The Box Elder has worm holes in it. I intend to fill them with a colored epoxy. Yellow and Green. What is a good dye for that? and where would I get it? Gary

David's Answer: I have been using Mixol, a high quality and very concentrated pigment made in Germany. It can be mixed into finishes that are solvent-based, water-based, oil-based, or even epoxy.

Mixol is a universal tint, and they are extremely concentrated, so it only takes a few drops to change the color of epoxy. It's a good idea to do some experiments first, because I have experienced the epoxy getting too soft if I added too much Mixol.

You can purchase these through Woodcraft, as well as many other online vendors. Some of them want you to buy a whole kit, but just stick to the individual colors you want.

Tools & Techniques

Preparing for the Inevitable: The Wood Shop Estate Sale

A well-advertised shop sale will draw a wide pool of buyers, waiting for the gates to open.

Fred Sotcher is a long time woodworker, living in the San Francisco Bay Area. He has written articles that have been published in *Fine Woodworking, Woodcraft Magazine, Sunset Guide* books, and *Ortho Books*.

After retiring from the electronic company Sotcher Measurement Inc. that he founded, Fred started teaching woodworking at schools in the area and has had many students working in his home shop creating all sorts of projects.

Fred has been active in all the various woodworking clubs in the Bay Area. In recent years, he has found himself organizing woodworking estate sales for families of club members that have passed. He felt the need to write this article, both to implore woodworkers to prepare for the inevitable, as well as a guide for the family members tasked with the disposition of the woodshop left behind.

Let's face the fact that at some point, the woodworking items that we have collected and loved for years will need to find a new home—we're not getting any younger!

I have conducted a number of estate sales and have seen how hard it is for the families to deal with it. They don't know what the tools are, what value to place on them, or how to conduct the sale. You can help a lot if you take time to create a list of the items in your shop with their replacement value. This becomes a valuable guide when the time comes for the items to be sold.

Using this outline of the information will help guide you and your family in preparing for a sale. It will need to be adjusted, based on the size of your shop and how much of it will be put up for sale. You might wish to place a copy of this article with your estate papers, so that it can be found when needed. The objective is to clean out the space and put money in the bank.

Assemble a kit of tools that might be useful in home repairs to be set aside for the family. Before a sale, family members should take any items that they feel they could use. But ask them to avoid taking items that they are unlikely to really use. It's best to have a big sale and clean out stuff, not just let it sit unused for years.

I believe that you can get the highest dollar amount by listing the items on eBay. For smaller items that are easy to package and ship, you can open the auction to all buyers, for larger items, choose "Local Pickup Only" for the shipping option. The winning bidder will pick up that item from you. Know that there is time involved in creating the ad, shooting and uploading images, and boxing and shipping items to the winning bidder, but you do have a bigger pool of buyers. There are also fees associated with any eBay sale.



An inventory list will help you set prices for the sale, determine which items should be auctioned, and which are to be sold on eBay.

An on-site sale also requires preparation, which can be done within a month or so, and you don't need to worry about shipping.

SEVERAL WEEKS BEFORE THE SALE

MAKE A LIST of the major items to be sold. This is a big job, but important. The list is best created in a spreadsheet program like Excel or Numbers. Include the name of the item, manufacturer, model number, description and price. For example: Spray Gun, HVLP, 1 Qt, Gravity Feed, Makita 4568, \$32. Identify if it is a single item (Ea) or a group of items (Lot).

DETERMINE PRICES. Keep in mind that you want to sell everything in one day, so price things low. If new, price it at half the replacement cost; if used, price it at one-third the replacement cost or less. Plan to set a price on most items, and then hold an auction for the larger items. The sale should take one day. Anything left over is donated to a local charity or school, goes on Craigslist as FREE, or goes to the dump. When the list is completed sort A-Z by names.

SET THE DATE. Plan sale for a Saturday, 10am to 3pm, with the auction scheduled for 11am. No auction items are to be removed until the end of the live auction. All purchased items are to be removed by 6pm on the day of the sale. Nothing is sold prior to the date and time listed (no Early Birds).

PHOTOS. Take pictures of some of the items to be used later in the ads.

PAYMENT OPTIONS.

Accept cash and/or credit cards. Find out how to set up a small credit card reader—Square, Spotify, Pay-Pal) that can be used for the day. (Best Buy sells a low cost card reader). Be aware that there are fees paid by the seller associated with credit card transactions.



You should set up the account well in advance of the sale. Another option for accepting payment is a Mobile Payment System App on your smart phone, such as *Venmo*. Get a cash box and smaller bills for making change and perhaps a counterfeit detection pen.

RUN ADS on Craigslist two or three weeks before the sale. Run two or more for Woodworking Tool Sale, one for Woodworking Estate Sale. Try and provide lots of pictures. The ad should state the address of the sale, the date, the hours of the sale, and contact information. Include what forms of payment that you are accepting. If you are going to auction off some items, plan it to start one hour after the gates open. State in the ad that there will be no sales prior to the sales date. In the ad, list the most important items with

prices. Remember that Craigslist ads run out after one week, so they must be renewed.

Send a copy of the item list to a few people in each club in your area, with a note asking them to post it to the group. This should be 4-5 weeks in advance of the sale

PURCHASE ITEMS to aid in the sale. Items to consider include:


- Small tags. Order #4 tags—each tag has a hole in the top and preformation midway, and a sequential number printed on both halves. (Xpresstags)
- Masking or Painters Tape (to attach tags)
- Plastic Ties (to string a buyers sold tags together)
- Hand Stapler
- Hole Punch
- Red Sharpies to write on tags
- Plastic Shopping Bags (WebstaurantStore)
- Large Signs to mark location of sale
- Long Tables to display item on driveway and garage (rent or borrow)
- Adding Machine with paper tapes or receipt book
- Credit Card Reader
- Metal Cash Box. (Amazon or Staples)
- Red Ball Caps to give to each person working the day of the sale. (DiscountMugs)

THE WEEK BEFORE THE SALE

ARRANGE FOR HELPERS both for setting up and for the day of the sale. If you need outside help, ask members of local woodworking clubs, they are often very willing to help.

Job Descriptions for your selling team:

 Manager—Reviews the inventory and plan and makes any changes required. Recruits people to assist as necessary. Adjusts the pricing as he or she sees fit.



You will need some items to help you, before the sale and on the day of the sale. It is a good idea to arrange for a credit card reader and test it our in advance of the sale day.

- Auctioneer—Conducts the auction trying to get the best price on items.
- Auctioneer Assistant—Writes down the selling price on the bottom half of the tag and hands it to the buyer.
- Cashier —Totals the amounts on each of the tag stubs, punches a hole in each stub, connects the stubs together with a plastic tie, and hands them back to the buyer with a printed receipt. Accepts payments. The cashier will need an assistant with this process.

Most people will be ready to leave within one hour, so there can be big rush at that time.

- Wood Seller—Someone that has an understanding of the types of wood and their value. As buyers express an interest, the person should point out the type of wood and the price. The boards are measured, and the board feet estimated. The seller writes the price on the lower section of the tag and gives to the buyer. When the buyer returns with the tag punched and secured with a plastic tie, he is given the lumber.
- Sellers—People working the day of the sale, keeping an eye on the buyers. They should come two-three hours prior to the starting time to get things ready.
 Some will staff the long tables, one person for every two tables. If helpers are just working on the day of the sale, offer to let them come early and purchase



the buyers arrive. If they come and help getting items ready, they should get items of their choice at no charge to compensate them for their time and effort. If you are short of helpers hire some students or day laborers to help.

Red ball caps make it easy for buyers to spot a person to help them with their purchases.

FIND OWNERS MANUALS for each item and attach them to the item. Also try and collect any accessories that go with the item and place them with the item.

ARRANGE ITEMS FOR SELLING. Most items should remain in their normal location as they are best dis-

played that way. Items that cannot be displayed in the shop or are not on the inventory list should be displayed on folding tables. Borrow or rent lots of long folding tables, so items can be displayed.

TAG ITEMS. Every item or group of items gets a tag

(Xpresstags or Staples). The tags come numbered sequentially on both sections. The top section remains blank the bottom section will be marked with the price. If the item is to be auctioned, write **AUCTION** on the top half and leave the bottom half blank. The tag is secured to the item. Writing the price with a red marker makes it difficult for anyone to change.



Items to be auctioned get the word "Auction" written on the top of the tag. Once the winning bid is placed, the price is written on the bottom of the tag with a red Sharpie, torn off, and handed to the buyer to make a payment.

BUYER RULES. Print a list of rules (see side bar) to hand to each buyer.

THE DAY OF THE SALE

FINAL SET UP happens two to three hours before the sale starts. Set up the folding tables on the driveway and set out those items. A pop-up awning or umbrella should provide shade for the cashiers table.

If items still need pricing, give numbered tags to each person selling at a table and to the lumber seller. Give all helpers a red Shapie, so they can price odd items or lumber.

For items displayed in drawers and cabinets, the sale price listed is for the item or items in the drawer, not the drawer or cabinet itself. This should be make clear to the buyers.

Lumber can be difficult to price. Boards shorter than 4-5 ft. (shorts) should be secured together and a tag attached to the bundle. Consider pricing at $^{1}/_{4}$ of the replacement value. Longer boards can be priced by the board foot at about $^{1}/_{3}$ - $^{1}/_{2}$ replacement value. For plywood, attach a tag to full sheets or sheets that are good size. Have someone with knowledge in the lumber area that can work with buyers on price and selection.

Paint and Finishing Material is worth very little: maybe, Spray cans \$0.50, Quart cans \$1.00, Gallons \$5.00. You might consider having someone place the items a buyer has selected in a bag or cardboard box and attach a tag on which they have listed a price.





Some items are arranged on tables and tagged with sale price.

Other items, such as the router bits, are easier to sell if left in the drawer. The risk of chipping is minimized. The buyer can choose the bits, and a salesperson can wrap them in a paper towel, put them in a bag, and attach a tag, giving the part with the price to the buyer.

Once paid for, the buyer returns to pick up his items. The punched hole and plastic tie on the tag indicates payment has been made.

Selling router bits from the tables or drawers. Once a buyer makes their selection, wrap each one in a paper towel as they are easy to chip. Items priced as Ea.—price is for one only. Items priced as Lot—price is for all items in set.

START THE SALE. When a buyer spots an item that he would like to purchase, he removes the lower part of the tag. When he is finished looking, he takes the

To be given to each person attending the sale.

Welcome to Our Woodworking Tool and Lumber Sale.

Sales hours are Saturday, 10am to 3pm, with the auction at 11am. No auction items are to be removed until the end of the live auction.

Items are on display on the driveway tables and in the shop. Most items are priced and marked. If you have any questions ask one of the people with a red ball cap.

Prices are marked as Price Each or Lot. If marked as Lot, it includes everything in the drawer or box, but not the drawer itself.

Lumber—Lengths of 5-feet or more is sold by the board foot; shorts are sold in lots.

Everything is priced at $^{1}/_{3}$ to $^{1}/_{2}$ the replacement value, so bargains are everywhere.

Larger items will be sold at the live auction. Price will be added to tag, after the winning bid is reached.

When you find something you would like to purchase, find the tag and remove the lower section, leaving the top section with the item. Once you have gotten all the tags you like, take them to the cashier. Once paid for, just show your punched tag and receipt and collect your items.

Note: The price is for the item only, not the drawer or cabinet holding it.

tags that he has collected to the cashier, who adds up the total amount, collects the money, punches a hole in each tag, and connects them together with a plastic tie. The buyer then returns to collect his items. He can show that they are paid for, as they are punched and connected together. During the auction when the bidding is done on an item, the lower part of the tag is marked with the price and given to the buyer to take to the cashier for payment. Buyers are asked to not remove any items until the auction is completed.

After the sale ends, leftover items should be given to charity (Habitat for Humanity can often use construction materials and tools), school, or offered for free on Craigslist. Leftover hazardous materials should be taken to an appropriate recycling center.





Education: Fresh Wood Competition

Fresh Wood is the national student furniture design competition, sponsored by the **Association of Woodworking & Furnishings Suppliers (AWFS).** Held in conjunction with the biennial AWFS Fair in Las Vegas, this competition promotes and encourages woodworking by students in formal instructional programs.

For last summer's 11th competition,188 entries were received from 46 high schools and post-secondary schools across the United States and Canada. 42 pieces were chosen as *Finalists*, for display and judging on the exhibit floor at the *AWFS Fair*.

Best of Show went to Nicholas Maraldo from the Furniture Institute of Massachusetts for his Nautical Marquetry Table, made of Mahogany, Eastern Pine, Walnut, Holly, and Gabon Ebony. He was awarded \$1,000, a KCD Software Package, and an iconic sculpture made by renowned woodworker and artist Judson Beaumont. The People's Choice Award (and its \$750 prize) went to Cole Daniels of Rolla Technical Institute (MO) for his Hard Ninety shuffleboard table, with intricate paneling and accenting.

Category winners at the *Post-Secondary* level were: *Case Goods*—Christopher Merchant (Center for Furniture Craftsmanship, Rockport, ME), *Cabinet End Table; Tables*—Nicholas Maraldo (Furniture Institute of Massachusetts, Beverly, MA), *Nautical Marquetry Table; Seating*—Osamu Sassa (Center for Furniture Craftsmanship, Rockport, ME), *Coopered Daybed; Open*—Zala Ouyang (North Bennet Street School, Boston, MA), *Mahogany Music Stand; Design for Production*—Nathan Miklo (Iowa State, Ames, IA), 72.5 *Chair;* and *Sports and Games*—Valerie Alt (California College of the Arts, San Francisco, CA), *Detach*.

High School category winners were Case Goods—Kailan Weidner (Mustang H.S., Mustang, OK), Oops! I Broke It.; Tables—Spencer Johnson (Corner Canyon High School, Draper, UT), Visions of Rhythm; Seating—Logan Miller (Lincoln East H.S., Lincoln, NE), L. & J.G. Stickley Prairie Chair; Design for Production—Jack Reznich (Frankfort H.S, Frankfort, MI) The Daddy Chair; Open—Keaton Carter (Corner Canyon High School, Draper, UT), Serenity; and Sports and Games—Kyle Hassett (Dale Jackson Career Center, Flower Mound, TX) The Big Slick.

First Place winners in each category and at each school level received a \$1,000 prize, Second Place winners received \$500, and Honorable Mention winners received \$250. AWFS covers project shipping, and the majority of travel and hotel costs to bring the students and their teachers to Las Vegas.

Profile: Richard J. McCormick



That first lowboy, now nearly a bona fide antique, still stands in Richard's home entry way, a daily reminder that (even blind) passion toward an endeavor can lead you through something you might otherwise have thought impossible to accomplish. It also reminds him that the most basic tools do help you create fine wooden objects of beauty.

In honor of the 10th anniversary of the passing of James Krenov, Richard McCormick of Durango, CO reminisces on the impact that the woodworking icon had on his own wood craftsmanship. Here is Richard's story, in his words:

Like many who embark upon their path of working wood, I can say that James Krenov's early books were profoundly influential in igniting the passion that I developed to continue this pursuit. Krenov seemed to have a near spiritual connection to his craft, and perhaps, as much as any aspect of his passion was his connection to planes. In his book, *The Fine Art of Cabinetmaking*, Krenov dedicated 20 pages to explaining how he made wooden planes, stating right up front: "It is not an anybody-can-do-it kind of thing."

In so many words, he cautioned the reader to be deliberate, careful, and cautious when making these planes. He advised those of us who studied every word in his book to listen and feel and be sensitive. "We need to pass a certain point, cross a threshold of discovery where we say, 'Oh that's what it is about. Now I'm beginning to see." I read quickly through these many pages, as my interest then was not in making wooden planes. I saw the process as slowing me down, in the way of getting to the point, getting something made.

The news of James Krevov's death made me sad. In some strange way, I felt that I owed him something for giving me insights and for inspiring me, when I first started out with wood and tools. I remembered how I had started woodworking, the mistakes I made, and the thrills that filled me when long labor produced something of beauty. I remembered how naïve I had been, getting in over my head so early in the game—believing I could make something that any experienced woodworker would have advised me against. Krenov's words seemed to whisper to me, "go for it with passion in quiet methodical manner."

My first shop, in the early 1970s, consisted of an old Sears radial arm saw, a couple of dull Stanley chisels, along with the usual pliers, screwdrivers, and a hand saw or two. At center stage was my prized possession—an old Rockwell 4" jointer that I bought for \$50. It was loud and vibrated across the cement floor of my single car garage shop. At one of my early and frequent library visits, I came across a black and white photo of a Philadelphia-style Chippendale lowboy, which was originally produced around 1765. I could not fathom that human hands could possibly have made something so elaborate and beautiful, using only simple tools. The small photo depicted the customary ball and claw feet and carved shell with acanthus leaf details.

I was too ignorant to know I couldn't make something that ambitious, so I began making a Chippendale lowboy from Walnut that I had harvested locally and dried. It took three years, working mostly nights and weekends. Three years of studying and trying to figure out how they were originally made. How do you shape and carve a cabriole leg? How

do you cut fine dovetails? Where do I begin? A valuable lesson was learned in that sometimes, when you don't know you can't, then sometimes you just do it and can. Back then, there was no *Fine Woodworking* magazine to tell me the how-and-why of making furniture. I studied, dreamed, read every library book I could get my hands on, and visited museums. Once, I got busted lying on the floor at the Yale University Library attempting to get a glimpse of the underside of a chest! Throughout the '70s, '80s, and '90s, I chased after every jig and every latest, greatest, must-have tool, in pursuit of efficiency and productivity. No time for much hand work. No time for slowing down to make and use hand planes.

Then suddenly, only a few years ago, something inside me began to stir, or perhaps something began to settle in my soul. I began to grow tired of the noise and dust of machine work, tired of deadlines and commitments in my work. I was not weary from woodworking, but just found myself detached from what had, so many years ago, brought me to this show in the first place.

Upon Mr. Krenov's passing and many years since first reading his books, I re-read them cover-to-cover, especially the pages that I had skimmed over on making wooden planes. Mr. Krenov had passed on, but he was suddenly alive again for me. That's when my woodworking path changed direction. I made a Krenov-style plane, a "smoother" with a Hock blade. I wish I'd taken photos of my progress. Now, I finally accomplished what James Krenov advised readers to do in his book so many years ago: I had passed that certain point and crossed a threshold of discovery where I said, "that's what it is about," and I began to see what he said I would.

The experience of making my first plane was near life changing. It led to making another plane, and another. I began studying the history of American and English planes and their makers. I made more planes. Then, I became afflicted with the bug that I had been warned about—I began collecting vintage antique wooden planes. The bug bit me badly. To date, I've made over two dozen planes that I use in my daily work. And I have acquired well over a hundred older planes.

Many of the planes I have made are Krenov-style, and some are the traditional style of 18th and 19th century planes. I have fitted many of my vintage pre-WWII Stanley and Record bench planes with Hock irons. They sing. Also, I have, with all humility, become an expert at sharpening. I am now confident and comfortable. Since embarking on my new "unplugged" path, I avoid as much machine work as possible and delight in the quiet and peace the sensitive use of hand tools provides.

James Krenov might surely be proud to know he played a vital role in starting many woodworkers, such as myself, on the path of quiet and meaningful woodwork. My testimony is to the fact that it is never too late to find that point, that place of discovery thathe mentioned in his early book.

COMMEMORATING THE MOON LANDING

In celebration of the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing, NASA commissioned wood artist **Judy Gale Roberts** of Seymour, TN to create an intarsia artwork commemorating the event.

What makes the 50th Anniversary Moon Landing Intarsia particularly special is the fact that "moon wood" was incorporated into her creation. On the Apollo 11 mission, seeds were taken up to space to see the effect of space travel on tree germination back on earth. Judy utilized Sycamore wood that was grown from those seeds

The work contains over 1,300 individual pieces, taking approximately 150 hours to design and select the shades of wood and 1000 shop hours to cut each piece and sculpt/contour the surface. CRAFTING A TREASURE FROM 5,000-YEAR OLD WOOD

It began in 2012, when a British farmer was planting potatoes and hit something hard. It turned out to be a 5,000-year old Black Oak log, over 43 feet long. It is assumed that the enormous tree fell when rising sea levels flooded the ancient forest and was preserved, when buried in an airless grave of wet silt. And the log is belived to be only a quarter of the original tree!

Coined the *The Jubilee Oak*, the **Fenland Black Oak Project** was established to preserve the wood in the form of an iconic table, as a gift to the nation. With the help of an international team of experts, the log was lifted out of the ground and cut into quarter sawn planks, using a sawmill shipped in from Canada. The planks were then moved to a custom-made drying kiln, where 400 gallons of water were extracted. After seven years of drying, the slabs were taken to London, where a team of craftsmen are working at Building Crafts College to construct the very long table.

The table will consist of four full-length book-matched planks, resulting in a width of approximately 5-feet. In order to retain the individual character of the planks, a "river joint" technique is being utilized, as opposed to a straight butt joint. According to Project Manager **Hamish Low,** "When the first two planks came off the saw mill and were laid side by side on pallets, we knew exactly how this top should be put together. The river joint allows us the opportunity to beautifully demonstrate the lack of a growing taper, thereby giving a unique insight into the astonishing scale of this ancient tree."

The goal is to complete the table by next Spring for debut in the Ely Cathedral, located where the once-ancient forest existed. Besides its use for special occasion events, it will create awareness of the need to preserve the nation's once plentiful Black Oaks.
