

## WOODWORKING IN A PANDEMIC

Memes on social media—similar to the one below—imply work by artists, woodworkers, writers, etc. remain unchanged from before to during the pandemic. Essentially, self-isolation is the norm for such "creatives," and with construction designated as "essential" in many locales, work has continued through the coronavirus "shutdown" pretty much uninterrupted.

In fact, many craftsmen were quite productive during this "quiet" period. Some used this time to concentrate on specific works (see **David Marks'** article on pages 26-27), while others undertook projects that they had no time for previously. For example, **Wendy Ellsworth** documented her husband—master turned wood artist **David Ellsworth**—constructing display

cases and raised vegetable gardens on *Facebook*.

Suppliers, including woodworking stores, home centers, and lumber yards, also were considered "essential," so most remained open during the "stay-athome." Many added "curbside pickup" services to provide a greater sense of safety for customers and employees; several Rockler stores, Gilmer Wood

**Company** in Portland, OR, and **Tropical Exotic Hardwoods** in Carlsbad, CA have been operating solely on this basis.

On the other hand, the COVID-19 pandemic essentially shut-down the rest of the woodworking world. Here is an overview, though resumption of activities is dependent on local changing conditions and restrictions. Information in this issue, is based on what is known at press time, and confirmation is suggested.

#### **HAPPENINGS**

Most woodworking events scheduled for the Spring and Summer have been cancelled outright, or with the hope of being rescheduled for later in the year. The **Texas Woodworking Festival** in Austin, TX has been rescheduled to Sept. 26, while **Weekend with Wood** in Des Moines, IA has been moved to Oct. 29-Nov. 1. Woodworker West has posted the status of events on its website (www.woodwest.com).

The only major "live" woodworking event that was still on the books was the *International Woodworking Fair,* Aug. 25-28 in Atlanta, GA, but just as we were going to press, cancellation was finally announced.

The American Association of Woodturners canceled its 34th annual symposium in Louisville, KY, but announced in June that they decided to offer a "virtual" conference on July 10-12, including demonstrations, panel discussions, auctions, drawings, a virtual tool show, and more (see page 20 for details).

#### **EXHIBITIONS**

All museums and galleries were shuttered in March, with most stating closure thru June. A survey of art organizations in Southern California found that most are looking at possible mid-to-late summer reopenings, with restrictions.

Houston's **Museum of Fine Arts** did reopen on May 23, requiring temperature

checks, masks worn at all times, restroom use restricted to one person at a time, closure of interactive displays, and only self-guided tours. In Los Angeles, museums will have to comply with a 60-item protocol checklist, issued by the health department. In the meantime, many instutions are offering virtual guided tours on their websites.

Of course, closure has disrupted exhibition schedules. Some pre-pandemic exhibitions—such as Contemporary Crafts at the Mesa Contemporary Arts in Mesa, AZ—have been extended into the summer, after reopening. The Ogden Nature Center in Ogden, UT has moved its springtime outdoor Birdhouse exhibition to the summer, though too late for the nesting birds to take advantage.

Most craft fairs have been outright cancelled, though late summer state fairs are still on the calendar (see page 19). Southern California's *Orange County Fair* is trying to salvage its popular *Fine Woodworking* exhibition by hosting submissions on its website and allowing visitors to vote for their favorite pieces in a *People's Choice* competition (entry deadline is July 6, see page 17).

#### **ORGANIZATIONS**

Woodworking clubs cancelled all "live" activities, including meetings and shop operations. However, several continued to conduct Zoom meetings, complete with remote demonstrations.

For example, the Bay Area Woodturners are having on-line demonstrations by Art Liestman (July 18) and Rudy Lopez (Aug. 8), the San Diego Woodturners are having demonstrations by Cindy Drozda (July 18) and Alex Snodgrass (Aug. 15), and the Rocky Mountain Woodturners are having a demonstration by Laurent Niclot (July 9).

Most of the upcoming club symposia have been cancelled, including the August's **Southwest Association of** 

Woodturners Symposium (SWAT) in Texas and September's Rocky Mountain Woodturning Symposium in Colorado.

Clubs members also undertook efforts to assist first responders during this crisis. The **Guild of Oregon Woodworkers** undertook a campaign to collect masks and other personal protection equipment (PPE) for donation to

health care workers. Other clubs organized manufacturing efforts to produce PPE products (such as face shields) for donation to first responders.

#### **EDUCATION**

Similarly, all in-person woodworking classes went on hiatus in March, though some private schools have begun to resumes classes, with limited attendance.

The **Southwest School of Wood-working** in Phoenix, AZ returned to a full slate of classes, including two workshops with **Michael Fortune** (*Oval Table & Band-sawn Dovetails*) in July.

The Northwest Woodworking Studio in Portland, OR is offering both in-person and on-line lectures, with Gary Rogowski.

Although **Rockler** has cancelled all summer events, individual **Woodcraft** stores are conducting classes.

Formal programs, such as **Cerritos College** in Southern California, are planning reduced Fall schedules with limited students, beginning in August.

#### **CONFIRM THE EVENTS!**

Since the status of all activities is fluid, it is best to confirm the latest details with the particular organizations.

## COMMENTARY

#### A STATEMENT OF SOLIDARITY

The world is changing: Six decades ago, when **Sam Maloof** was told to access a client's home through the servant's entrance, it was not unusual for the son of immigrants from the Middle East to be regarded as someone not quite worthy of respect in the eyes of the privileged. Issues of diversity, equality, inclusion, and accessibility had not yet entered mainstream awareness, and polite society didn't yet talk about the many ways lines are drawn to stigmatize and exclude people based on the color of their skin.

Alfreda Maloof, who had worked as a teacher at the Indian Boarding School in Santa Fe, NM, saw her own life transformed by cross-cultural experience. Working alongside the potter Maria Martinez and other Native American artists, Alfreda learned how the art of a master craftsperson speaks universally in every language, across cultures, without regard to race or ethnicity. It was a lesson she would bring into her marriage to Sam.

Within a few years, furniture created in the workshop founded by Sam and Alfreda Maloof, would be displayed proudly in homes both humble and elite, commissioned for corporate boardrooms, and selected to inspire the faithful in houses of worship of several religions. Sam and Alfreda would be welcomed to the White House by **President Ronald Reagan**, and would come to count **President Jimmy Carter** among their friends.

But the Maloofs never forgot where they came from. Born of California, Sam and Alfreda understood opportunity as a force for good in the world. They knew a society that limits the possibilities

of its people based on skin color, religion, national origin, gender or other attributes of identity, diminishes its collective capacity to dream, discover, and build the future.


Given this history—and the fervently held values of our founders—the **Sam and Alfreda Maloof Foundation for Arts and Crafts** now stands in solidarity with those who protest against systemic racism and hate that affect black people disproportionately. 
#### **VOICES OF EXPERIENCE**

The **WoodCentral** forum is a good place to get knowledgeable feedback fast, from woodworkers with a wealth of varied experiences. While discussions usually revolve around someone's specific question or problem, occasionally they focus on more universal topics of interest to woodworkers at all levels. Recently, one of our members posted some advice for beginners, who he described as anyone attempting something new in their woodworking, suggesting that "If you have never done something before, first prove to yourself that you can, by conducting a practice trial." His post was regarding the importance of practice in finishing, an echo of **Michael Dresdner's** old axiom, "finish firewood first." This prompted a flood of valuable insights on a variety of basic woodworking insights...

"Don't assume that something you have never done will be easy, or that it will even work. This is especially true when it comes to finishing, with some wood or material you've never used before. Practice is the fastest route to success. It's easier to avoid a problem than to fix one."

"There is always something new to learn. Everyone teaching you —whether in person, or in a workshop, or in a magazine article, book or video—has a different set of experiences. They often don't explain the nuances of technique or tools or materials that

they've learned at the School of Hard Knocks, because they will have forgotten that they do most of them. While learning from an expert is valuable, you can also learn many important details from someone who has just learned the process themselves."

"Practice is key, so don't throw away your failed attempts. If your practice piece is even marginally successful, you should be able to make use of it in the future, to remind you of what you did right and what you did wrong. If you burn it, the lessons that it holds are lost forever."

"My mentor taught me a valuable lesson. Whenever he was preparing to build something, he built it first in his head. He didn't start building it for real until he was sure he understood everything that he would need—materials, tools and techniques—to complete it."

"No matter how long you've been woodworking, every new piece presents opportunities to learn and to implement small fixes that you haven't tried before. There is no shame in repairing mistakes."

"I recall **Peter Follansbee** mentioning that he started to work with Walnut, after many years of working with White Oak. You'd figure someone who has been working within and demonstrating a very similar style for a long time could just adjust to new materials quickly, but he commented that he needed to learn some things about working with the new material."

"Several things happen as you work for a while: you get better; you learn faster; and you accept that things don't always go perfectly. If you're motivated to get better a little at a time, you'll stay interested, and you'll enjoy putting new skills to use."

"In a way, we are all beginners when it comes to finishing. We can never be certain what a finish will do to a particular piece of wood, until we try it out."

"For staining, you need to create sample boards, to get it right."



For staining, Michael Dresdner suggests creating a "step sample" board for the wood being utilized to determine the right stain for achieving the desired color (from *Wood Finishing Fixes*).

"I once had a teacher, a German immigrant, who insisted that before a student starts any process, he should write down all the details, noting the tools and supplies that will be needed and how to evaluate his progress before moving on to the next step. I hated to have to do it, but I found that I made far fewer mistakes that way."


"I always make a full-size drawing and a cut list, organized by material and thickness, with both rough dimensions and finished dimensions. It also had two columns of check boxes: one to use at the chop saw or saw bench and the second to use at the table saw or workbench. It is also useful to write part numbers in chalk on the rough-cut parts, because you know Murphy will be out there shuffling parts around, as soon as you turn your back or go for a cup of coffee."

"When you do a test piece, it's good to write down the problems you encounter and exactly what you'll do to address them. Then, the next time that you are confronted with this situation, you can just look over your notes, instead of having to learn the process all over again."

"I enjoy watching folks who finish guitars and do the buffing work. They make it look very easy, but it takes a couple of years for them to get to that level of workmanship. Facility with any process is an acquired skill. There are no shortcuts."

"Learn to mark parts and pieces, so you can easily identify where they go. Legs on case pieces are generally mirror images of each other, left- and right-handed like chicken wings. I have tape with notes and arrows in several places designed to keep orientations correct before the next mortise gets punched into it, ideally in the correct place. Chalk is good, but rubs off. I have come to using tape for labeling."

"Regarding labeling parts, here is an overview of the so-called 'triangle method' that I use to keep track of furniture part. Note that the 'drawer parts' in the drawing are shown looking down on them."

"Regarding chalk as a marking tool, it is only useful for the first stage of breaking down lumber into component pieces, when the lumber is still rough and would destroy a sharp pencil point. A much more complicated system of parts and orientations descriptions is needed almost immediately."

"I have been turning for almost 60 years, but I'm still learning. I am about to make a baby rattle for a new great-granddaughter; but, before I turn valuable wood, I will make a practice piece from scrap."

"Every piece that I build has some aspect that is new to me, whether it's something simple or a major element of the process. So, I am wary of trying to get it right on the first try; when I do—more often than not—I make a mess of it. The drawback is that when I spend a lot of time mulling over my next steps, it prolongs my build times dramatically. But, I don't mind, because I'm not on a production schedule. I have lots of time. I can do it over. Either way, I've learned something new."

"Do any research that you think necessary and dive in. Mistakes are part of the learning process. Sooner or later you'll get it right."

"The test of a true craftsman is not whether he makes mistakes —everyone does—but rather how well he hides them."

"Some of the most innovative breakthroughs were the results of mistakes."

"As Jim Tolpin would say: 'Measure twice, cut once.'"

## WHAT'S NEW

#### **URBAN WOOD ORGANIZATIONS UNITE**


**Urban Salvaged and Reclaimed Woods (USRW)** and the **Urban Wood Network (UWN)** are banding together to form an international urban wood effort to inform, collaborate, and connect to build community, business, and consumer confidence in the urban wood industry. They both are endorsing new chain of custody standards.

As part of this effort, USRW will be changing its name to the **Ur-ban Wood Network Western Chapter**, to help expand the network's impact on the urban wood industry through enhanced research, marketing, and technical assistance for members. Members in the Western chapter will continue to receive the benefits of the regional society, as well as access to those of the national UWN. #### SKETCHUP CHANGING LICENSE PLANS

**SketchUp** is changing its business model to a yearly subscription. The computer-assisted design (CAD) program began as a free service, before developing advanced paid versions. As of Nov. 4, the *Classic Perpetual License* plans will no longer be offered, though current owners will be grandfathered. After Nov. 4, new users, or those wishing to upgrade, will need to purchase a yearly subscription.

SkecthUp has become a preferred CAD program for creating 2D plans and 3D modeling for designing everything from building furniture to animation. A comparison of the benefits of the Classic License vs. the new SketchUp Pro Subscription is explained at: help.sketchup.com/en/end-of-classic-license-faq/.



#### **ARTIST COVID-19 RELIEF PROGRAMS**

Custom woodworkers, small cabinet shops, and studio artists are not likely to have benefitted from government programs, aiding businesses to survive during the economic shutdown. However, two non-profits offer assistance to artist/craftsperson.

As mentioned frequently in this publication, **CERF+** supports craft artists through periods of loss, both in financial aid and business support. For COVID-19, a special response fund has been established to provide one-time \$1,000 grants to meet urgent food, housing, and/or health insecurities. These grants will be awarded with deadlines of July 29 and Sept. 9. Priority will be given to eligible artists who have traditionally been underserved by the grantmaking community, including people of color and folk and traditional artists. Another national source specifically providing COVID-19 relief is **Artist Relief.** This is a coalition of national arts grantmakers coming together to create an emergency initiative to offer financial and informational resources to artists across the United States. #### **WOODWORKERS AID IN PANDEMIC**

There are many stories of woodworkers using their skills to help out their community during this recent crisis. Students at **Jordan High School** in Minnesota built portable hand sanitizer dispensing stations for all the schools in the district, saving about \$145 apiece. Custom woodworking company **Woodchuck USA** in Minneapolis shifted production of custom wood gifts to face shields, producing upwards of 65,000 a week. **Kaas Tailored**, a Seattle upholstered furniture maker, converted operations to produce face masks, face shields, and gowns.

Jerry Powell of Castle Rock Woodworks in Colorado helped stressed parents by manufacturing do-it-yourself wood construction kits for kids to assemble and paint, including bird houses and feeders, keepsake boxes, and planters. Over 10,000 kits were distributed free locally, and plans posted on his website were utilized by woodworkers in 24 countries.

#### **COVID-19 STIMULATES INDUSTRY**

Sheltering-in-Place has proved a boom for woodworking and interior on-line retailers. Although their stores remained opened as 'essential businesses,' both **Home Depot** and **Lowe's** experienced an 80% increase in digital sales in the last quarter. Home Depot says by the end of the quarter, sales were actually into 3-digit percentage increases.

Most benefiting from the shutdown may be **Wayfair.** The on-line interiors store faced dire prospects at the start of 2020. In February, the company announced layoffs of 550 employees, or 3 percent of its total workforce, and rumors of bankruptcy circulated. Then came COVID-19. With brick and mortar competitors closed down, the e-commerce website saw sales double within the early weeks of the crisis, and the stock price has risen over 700%, since hitting its low on Mar. 19th.

## WHAT'S NEW

#### TAYLOR GUITARS GOES URBAN

Looking to improve use of sustainable materials in the instruments, Taylor Guitars in El Cajon, CA launched an Urban Wood initiative and began working with West Coast Arborists (WCA) of Anaheim, CA, which provides tree maintenance services for more than 300 municipalities and public agencies throughout California and Arizona.


From WCA's sort lot, they sampled a variety of woods that were cut, dried, and utilized to create prototype guitars. In this experiment, they found Shamel Ash, a fast growing shade tree quite common throughout Southern California, was a possible high-grade guitar wood.

"This particular species happens to be a great mix of the right weight, density, dimensional stability, and drying attributes, while responding well to sawing, sanding, and finishing," says Taylor's resident master builder Andy Powers.

He was equally excited about the tonal properties of the

prototype guitars that he built, using the wood for the back and sides. "In almost every physical way that I can measure, it's reminiscent of good Honduras Mahogany. It tends to be relatively consistent throughout the board. Compared to other Ash species, it's heavier, denser, and more resonant than the 'swamp' Ash loved by electric guitar makers, yet not nearly as heavy or tough as the Northern Ash used for baseball bats."


Known as Mexican Evergreen Ash or Tropical Ash in some places, it was propagated throughout Southern California 60-70 years ago, considered well-suited for the local climate. To emphasize the urban nature of this wood, Taylor has named it Urban Ash, and it is being utilized



in Taylor's new premium-class guitar, the Builder's Edition 324ce.

WCA will be supplying this wood to Taylor from its tree service business. It also sells wood to the public through its retail outlet Street Tree Revival, located at 2220 E Vía Burton, Anaheim, CA. For info, visit the website: www.streettreerevival.com/ or call: (657) 220-6685.

## From David Marks Studio

## Inlay Project & Questions Answered

A quick clarification from David's column in the January issue. On the day of delivery, a final coat of wax was applied to *Metamorphosis* in the morning.

**David Marks** has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for over 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television program *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004.

Sheltering in place is very, very difficult for a large portion of our society, and I feel for people that have struggled with it. It's a different story for artists, writers, woodworkers, woodturners, and those amongst us whom thrive in isolation.

As someone who has spent the majority of his life working alone in a remodeled horse barn, I have to admit that the shelter in place order is working well for me at this time. Victoria and I decided to suspend all of our group classes in late February, and I had been planning to use the Spring to get back to work on my 3-foot diameter dome-shaped wall sculpture commission, Ocean.

I had completed all of the turning and veneer work last year (as described in *Woodworker West*, Sept.-Oct., 2019). I sawed the Quilted Mahogany lumber on my bandsaw into veneer that netted <sup>1</sup>/<sub>16</sub>" thick after drum sanding at 100 grit.

My next step is to embellish the surface with inlay of oceanic life. When working on inlay, I find that I work best in isolation. I need time to think, visualize, sketch, and refine my ideas into something where I can commit to taking action.

I'll be the first to admit that I have spent a lot of time in "paralysis through analysis." Quilted Mahogany is an extremely rare and expensive wood (currently \$1,500 per board foot

and higher). . . and rule Number
One is "Thou Shalt Not F..k Up the
Quilted Mahogany." My mind went
back and forth over this project for
well over a year while teaching, but
now with the *Shelter in Place* order,
I had the gift of the quiet time that I
so desperately needed to be able to
concentrate at a much deeper level
without distractions.

I began by finding an image of a Jellyfish that I liked. I enlarged it so that the proportions looked good in relation to the 3-foot diameter of the disk. Then, I redrew it on acetate and made numerous photocopies, which indicated my actual cut lines.



For the inlay, I chose Pau shell from New Zealand for its rich blue colors to make the Jellyfish "bell." Pau shell is small, so I had to grain match several pieces and cut and join them together with clear packing tape to create a piece large enough to make the bell. Since I am inlaying on a domed surface, I "hinged" all of the pieces together with the packing tape, rather than gluing them. This allows the pieces to flex and conform to the shape of the dome.

After cutting out and assembling all of the various pieces of shell, I was ready to begin cutting into the Quilted Mahogany background. I started by temporarily gluing the bell in place, scribing around it with a knife, then removing the bell and routing the background.

jellyfish. It came out pretty nice.

Now that I have completed the jelly fish, I will move on to a lion fish inlay.

And now, a few questions. . .

1. Wood for Torsion Box Assembly Table: I have been a huge fan of yours since I first discovered WoodWorks when I was in the 4th grade (I am 26 now). I hope, one day, to be able to attend one of your turning classes and learn from whom I consider to be the best.

I am about to build a torsion box assembly table, and I am wondering what material I should use for the internal "honeycomb" structure.

I was looking at 2 x 4 Spruce, but most of the pieces that I came across have knots along the edges as well as the faces. I am sure the knots pose an issue in terms of strength, and the table could be subject to movement later, as the wood dries and the knots come loose. I was also considering White Fir, Poplar, or Pine. Which of these choices do you think would be better? And, how long should I let the stock acclimate to the shop before I start working with it? Kurt

**David's Answer:** I am very glad to hear that you have been a huge fan of my show WoodWorks. Regarding torsion boxes, I have used lots of different materials over the years. When I use solid wood for the honeycomb structure, I use knot-free Poplar. I have also used plywood and MDF. I found that it took too much time to mill solid wood to make a honeycomb structure, when you take into consideration resawing, jointing, and planing to get everything to its final dimension.

Also, there is the factor of letting the wood sit after it has been sawn to acclimate to the shop for two weeks. Taking all of this into consideration, I started using plywood for the honeycomb structure. For the episode you saw on WoodWorks, I used MDF.

**2.** Curling Veneer: When I do marquetry, I am finding that the Black Walnut veneer field curls up the length of the grain. To flatten out the field after doing the Marquetry, I glued it to a substrate. However I still have a cupping of the field. What is the best method for gluing down the field and maintaining a flat surface. Bill

David's Answer: The first issue is thickness. I usually band saw mine to around 3/32" thick and then drum sand them to 1/16" thick.

Next, I glue my veneers to my substrates—face and back—at the same time to prevent any curling or warping. It is important to use the same thickness for both veneers, to maintain the balance.


I read that you use contact cement and did not have any warping or curling. This is due to the fact that there is no water in the contact cement, which would cause the veneer to expand. A word of caution though, contact cement is a rubbery cement and will never harden to a rigid glue line.

I have had the best success with Unibond 800. It is a slow setting glue, so you easily have 30 minutes to mix it, spread it, and get it into the vacuum press. You can also use slow setting epoxy.

## Deconstructing a Byrdcliffe Desk

**Robert W. Lang** has produced a new edition to his series of Craftsmen-style *Shop Drawing* books. Ranging from furniture to interiors, the books include accurate shop drawings of work by **Gustav Stickley, Charles & Henry Greene**, and others—taken from actual antique pieces—with complete material lists.

In his new book, he explores the lesser-known—but highly-significant—work done by New York's Byrdcliffe Colony. Shop Drawings for Byrdcliffe Furniture (228 pages, \$45) provides the historical background on the craftsmen, as well as drawings, detailed plans, and material lists for 28 pieces of desks, case goods, tables, blanket chests, wall cabinets, chairs, and stools.

In this essay, Bob explains his discovery of the *Iris Desk* and his thoughts, before undertaking the project. Plans and drawings of this piece are included. This book is currently available in a soft cover print edition or as a downloadable PDF at *https://readwatchdo.com/*. In addition, full-size carving patterns are available.

Bob has been a cabinet and furnituremaker for over 40 years, with a particular interest in the American Arts & Crafts movement. He wrote articles for WoodShop News and Fine Woodworking, before joining the staff of Popular Woodworking. His books include Shop Drawings for Craftsman Furniture, More Shop Drawings for Craftsman Furniture, Shop Drawings for Craftsman Interiors, Shop Drawings for Craftsman Inlays and Hardware, The Complete Kitchen Cabinetmaker, Shop Drawings for Greene & Greene Furniture, Drafting & Design for Woodworker's, Furniture in the Southern Style, Woodworker's Guide to SketchUp, and Building Blocks of SketchUp.


Many people are aware of the furniture by **Gustav Stickley**, the **Greene & Greene** brothers, and others who made furniture in the Arts & Crafts period of the early 20th century. But, few are aware of the contributions made by the **Byrd-cliffe** colony, near Woodstock, NY.

Byrdcliffe was a productive small shop, not a factory, and it only operated for a few years, producing around 100 pieces. However, the designs, almost entirely the work of **Zulma Steele** and **Edna Walker**, are among some of the nicest furniture ever produced—they are simply breathtaking—and are a significant part of what was produced in that period.

The signature feature of these works is the colored carvings. Adding artistic decoration to furniture is difficult to do well, but the Byrdcliffe designs do it in grand style, a wonderful blend of good proportions and subdued decoration. For example, the *Iris Desk*, made of Cherry, is stained

green and the carved panels, made of Poplar, adorn the drop front (right).


When I researched the Byrd-cliffe furniture, I happily discovered that the Winterthur Museum in Delaware had original drawings and pieces,



and the *Iris Desk* was located at the Woodstock Guild in New York's Catskills.

Previously when I viewed significant pieces in person, there would be serious restrictions—no photography, touching, or measuring. On the contrary, the Woodstock Guild staff welcomed me with open arms. They moved the *Iris Desk* from their executive director's office and placed it in their gallery, they helped move it closer to the windows for better light, and they let me pull out the drawers, crawl underneath, take photos, and measure all the bits and pieces.

The advantage of the in-person viewing was that I could clarify details. The front panel wasn't completely clear in the photos that I had seen, and the original sketches and renderings from Winterthur showed only the front panel in different ways, with and without a mitered frame around the panels. I had assumed that the panel itself was stile and rail construction with the carved panels as separate pieces let into the framework. I was amazed to find that the panel was entirely solid wood; three pieces of Poplar glued edge-to-edge with the grain running vertically.



The front panel is made from three pieces of wood glued edge to edge and surrounded by a mitered frame.

I suspect that part of the reason the workshop did not last long was conflict between the designers and craftsmen. I can not believe that a competent cabinet-maker would construct a single slab, surrounded by a mitered frame. He would know that a single panel that wide will move enough to break apart the surrounding frame, which it did. In addition, the choice of knife hinges mounted between the end of the panel frame and the leg made a bad situation even worse. As the panel shrunk, the hinges resisted the movement and pulled loose, creating splits in the front legs near the hinge locations.



These hinges lock the front panel into position between the front legs. When the panel shrank, damage was done to the legs and the rail below the panel.

To add insult to injury, the desk was discovered, in the 1970s, in a basement, painted white. In restoration, the white paint was removed and thin strips of wood were inserted to the outer edges of the front panel, filling in the gaps and allowing the panel to be reattached. New brackets have been added inside to support the panel when it is lowered. Other than that, the desk is nicely made, but there are places where it looks as if the builder was in a bit of a hurry. Perhaps his heart wasn't in it, knowing what would likely happen in the future, due to the front panel construction.

On my way to Woodstock, I had planned on making a faithful reproduction, but on my way home (and in the following months), I decided that it needed some refinements.

#### **CABINET CONSTRUCTION**

As with most Arts & Crafts period pieces, the construction is simple and obvious. The four square legs are connected with rails side-to-side and front-to back. This basic skeleton is connected with mortise and tenon joints, and panels are let into grooves in the sides and back. In the upper section of the cabinet, the space above the writing surface is divided into a series of pigeonholes. This unit acts as a stop and dust seal for the drop front.




The pigeonholes are constructed as a distinct unit, slid into place and nailed to the sides. The back of the panel, the surrounding frame, and shelf behind are all in the same plane. The supports are modern replacements, and the two holes in the back are probably not originals.

No joinery is apparent in the ¹/4" thick gallery as all the front corners butt together. The reasonable approach to making this is to cut shallow dados that stop behind the front edges, and notch the ends of the parts that fit within. A few nails into the sides hold this assembly to the inside of the case. A cove and fillet cornice molding wraps the top on the front and returns down both sides. From the back, saw marks are visible indicating that the molding was attached, then trimmed flush to the case. The molding was likely made by hand with a hollow plane to form the cove and a rabbet plane to make the fillet. The best evidence for this is seen from behind the case. The fillet is a few degrees out of square, but that isn't evident from the front or the sides.



The cornice molding was created by hand and the ends were trimmed after the molding was attached to the case. The Byrdcliffe logo and date are to the right.

Below the writing surface are three drawers, two split the distance above a single wide drawer. All the drawers ride on simple runners and guides, with the runners nailed at the front and back. The outer runners also attach to the legs, with the guides attached on top of the runners. In the middle of the two smaller drawers, the back of the runner is attached to the back panel. There is a single intermediate rail on the paneled back, at the level of the writing surface.




The drawers slide on simple runners attached to the legs and to the back panel. Guides on top of the runners position the drawers side to side.

Below the drawers, small blocks reinforce the corners where the runners meet the legs and the rails. These appear to be newer wood than the rest of the drawer support structure and may be either replacements or late additions. There are also kickers above the two small drawers on the outside. These pieces could also be later additions or replacements. In addition to preventing the drawers from dropping forward, these small pieces also act as cleats to reinforce the connection between the shelf above and the legs.

The drawers themselves have half-blind dovetails at the front and a thick solid bottom. Beveled edges on the front and sides of the bottom slip into grooves in the drawer front and sides. The drawer back sits in dados at the back, set in from the back of the drawer sides about 1/2". The bottom extends slightly past the sides and a thin strip of wood has been added to the

back of the drawer bottom to act as a stop. The drawers are inset at the front, with the faces set in slightly from the surrounding frame.

The drawers are made with traditional construction, hand-cut half-blind dovetails at the front with the beveled bottom slid into place above the dadoed and nailed back. The angle on the dovetails approaches 45° and there is a significant amount of tear-out on some of the drawer sides.



As I was crawling out from under the desk after taking pictures, a neatly made repair in the left rear leg caught my eye. Its location is in line with the groove for the panels and the mortise above. It isn't visible when standing beside the desk, and is barely visible when crouching down. Rather than scrap a leg with several mortises and grooves already made, the original builder cut a patch from matching wood, an understandable decision given the location and colored finish of the desk. The leg has shrunken over time, leaving the patch barely proud of the surface.



This patch, covering a misplaced mortise or a groove cut farther than planned, would have been flush when the desk was originally built.

The hardware is solid copper and, except for the pull and lock escutcheon at the top of the panel, looks like typical commercial hardware of the day. Reproductions of the pulls are still available, although not in copper. I'm still on the fence about the hardware. I'll likely give making the top pull a try in copper and buy the other pulls in brass. Copper used in the early 1900s was usually patinated, and it can be difficult to distinguish between the two metals.




The hardware is copper, and this pull/escutcheon was likely made at Byrdcliffe. The other pulls and escutcheons may have been commercially made.

I'm also not sure if I want to duplicate the green stain, which was also a bit of a personal struggle when I built my reproduction of the Byrdcliffe linen press. It just seems wrong, but the linen press has aged nicely, and I'm now fond of the color. I'm tempted to build two of these, one duplicating the original green and one with a clear finish on the Cherry. In any case, the drop front will definitely be stile and rail construction with floating Basswood panels. I believe that if the front panel is made with rift sawn Cherry, the overall movement would be minimal and that would allow the mitered frame. I definitely won't be using knife hinges, instead I'll use fall front hinges between the fixed shelf of the desk and the bottom of the front panel.

#### SHOP DRAWINGS

In my book *Shop Drawings for Byrdcliffe Furniture*, there are drawings for building this desk, as well as 27 other pieces, including cabinets, tables, chests, chairs, and stools.




Shop drawings for the front panels of the Iris Desk

Though furniture drawings that are scaled to fit on a standard page are fine, there is no substitute for a full size pattern when recreating a carving. In my work, I print the pattern full size, stick it to the wood with spray adhesive, and do the initial carving through the paper print.

When I created the book, I included the carving patterns scaled to fit the page with a grid over the pattern. That's a time-tested method, but it's time consuming to recreate the grid and draw the pattern. Modern technology now allows a reader to photocopy a page from a book and scale the page until it is full size. Better than doing it by hand, but it can still be slow and tedious.

To make things as easy as possible for my readers, I've put all 28 of the patterns from the book into a single PDF file. Each image is formatted to print at actual size on standard paper sizes. About a third of the patterns fit on "letter" or "legal" size paper, so you can print them from home on virtually any printer. The rest require larger sheets, (ranging from 11" x 17" to 24" x various lengths), and those can be handled by almost any local "copy & print" center.

You can find patterns quickly in the PDF by browsing in the Page Thumbnails on the left side of the screen. Each design is in two forms; with and without the grid. The grid is handy for lining the image up with the edge of something, and you can measure the spacing on the grid to make sure the scaling is correct. The grid-less version contains only the image and the image border, so you can use that to create just about anything from an image to hang on the wall, or lines to send to your laser or CNC machine.



If you are a maker of Arts & Crafts-style furniture, you might want to expand your collection, by trying your hand at a Byrdcliffe piece.



## **Burs for Carving**

#### REMEMBRANCES

Earlier this year, the woodworking community lost two influencial members:

Judson Beaumont of Vancouver, Canada suddenly died in February at age 59, after sudden cardiac arrest on a return flight home from South Korea.

Operating under the name of Straight Line Designs, Justin was particularly known for his well-crafted, curvilinear, whimiscal, functional, and anthropomorphic furniture. His general rule was "If you can draw and design it, you can build it." His philosophy was: "A person must dare to drift away from the tried and true in order to give a piece energy and interest. Be influenced and inspired by the norm, and then challenge it, change it, melt it, stretch it, alter it for the better."

Besides being active in the local arts community and international furniture organizations (including judging Fresh Wood at AWFS), he donated work to charitable causes, and authored a children's book, entitled Timberland Tales: Chester Gets a Pet, which features characters modeled after his furniture.




Untitled Bowl, Satinwood & Paduak (3" h x 8" dia.)

Yosh Sugiyama of Redding, CA was an internationallyrenowned turned wood craftsman. Raised in the San Francisco Bay area, he spent three years of his youth in an internment camp for Japanese-Americans during World War II.

With a degree in bacteriology, he became Lab Director of the Shasta County Health Department. His hobby was woodworking, and he published articles and tips from his projects in various woodworking publications.

He was the originator of Open Segmented Turning, ring construction vessels with small gaps left between the segments. His work resides in many major collections. Locally, he headed the Shasta Woodworker's Club and inspired and encouraged many woodturners worldwide. He was 88.
