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
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
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

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WOODWORKING FOR A CAUSE: BUILDING DESKS FOR STUDENTS

In this age of COVID-19, education has gone virtual. Computer availability and Internet access were the obvious needs to be addressed in the transition, but overlooked—at least by nonparents—was students not having dedicated places to study.

Among the pandemic shortages are desks. Many retail outlets quickly sold out, and Amazon reported "desks" being the second-most searched term after face masks. However, many families do not have the discretionary funds for such purchases.

Among the first to recognize this problem were Jess & Al Berrellez of Gaithersburg, MD. They established Desks by Dads, to provide free desks to low-income students. Initially, desks were collected for redistribution, but the greater need prompted the couple to build new ones. As demand grew, some 60 others were recruited to help, ranging from retirees to parents whose own

kids got desks. Al even posted his simple design on the Internet for wider use.

Media coverage and Facebook posts did spur similar efforts, including Study Stations in Virginia, D is for Desk in North Carolina, and Keep the Kids Focused in Massachusetts. Seventeenyear-old Colby Samde in Loudoun, VA, frustrated himself with virtual classes at his own dining room table, formed Desks for Distance, which has grown beyond his own construction efforts to involve the community—from local businesses to scouts.

Similarly, Eric Janota of Arvada, CO was inspired by the Desks by Dads, and the National Geographic cartographer created Desks for Kids. "I can't imagine second graders trying to learn remotely while sitting at the dining room table or on the floor or in their bed. We're trying to by Mitchell Couch of Lemoore, CA

make it a little bit easier, just one less hurdle to learning." He and his wife constructed an initial batch, and notices on Next Door and Facebook recruited friends, neighbors, and businesses to the cause, which has produced a couple hundred desks.

Chicago-area teacher Marty Coyle noticed the need, when he found some of his students having no other options for remote attendance than laying in bed or even a bathtub. Using the school's woodshop, he built desks out of 2x4s for his students, and after posts on social media, he was overwhelmed with reguests for similar furniture from all over the U.S.

Other woodworkers across the country took up the cause, from Air Force veteran and hobbyist **Bob Hunt** of Claremont, NH to self-taught carpenter Jerson Ramirez of Chula Vista, CA. Students from the Milwaukee School of Engineering volunteered to build desks, while the Minnesota Tool Library in the Twin Cities organized membership for its own undertaking.

Les Ruefencht, a grandfather in the San Francisco Bay Area, got the idea of making desks from an ABC's World News Tonight segment. "My wife said to me, 'You can build anything, you should do this." He has made 80, with materials to make another 100.

For Marcus Holley of Omaha, NE, its more personal. After failing to find desks to buy for his three children, he decided to build them himself, using YouTube videos as a guide. Upon ful-

> filling his children's needs, he thought "maybe someone else could use these," so he continued construction, completing 150 desks with more

Similarly, building inspector Mitchell **Couch** of Lemoore, CA, tired of seeing his two children at "school" on the kitchen table, designed a simple and inexpensive plywood hutch, which he shared in the YouTube video, Desk-Making 101. A local grocery store, seeing this online, stepped forward to sponsor production of dozens of these desks for more students.


Hobbyist woodworker Chai Hansanuwat of Chino, CA began making desks to fill his time, after his software company shut down due to the pandemic. "I didn't think it would become that big of a deal. I thought I'd make 4-5 desks, using the tons of scrap wood laying around."

Instead, he was inundated with nearly 1,000 requests and has recruited "builders" from throughout Southern California to join

These projects have produced thousands of desks, each costing around \$20 in materials. More than two dozen how-to videos are available on YouTube, including one by Wood Whisperer Marc Spagnuolo. Many of these efforts have been supported by generous contributions through GoFundMe and Facebook, but more funding is sought, as the need remains strong.

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Woodworking Observations

Good-Bye 2020 — Hello 2021?

To remain sane, we must approach each new year with some sense of optimism. A year ago, 2020 held so much promise. I planned to relinquish some obligations to pursue new adventures. But, that all lasted as long as a resolution of a new gym

In Los Angeles, the world began to unravel with the shock of the helicopter crash killing **Kobe** and **Gianna Bryant** and friends, and it spiraled downwards towards near shutdown. We all have our own stories from the past nine months. We lost many people; we lost many things.

So now, we cautiously approach the start of another new year. With the promise of virus containment, we can begin to reset, with the hope of returning to "normal." However, the reboot will take continued patience, as the vaccine rollout will surely take six months to approach "herd immunity." And masks, as standard attire, likely will continue beyond that.

Many woodworking activities—usually scheduled for the first few months of the year—have already been cancelled or converted to virtual on-line mode. Other events may have been so impacted that their return is uncertain. Such is the case with the San Diego County Fair, which hosts our favorite Design in Wood exhibition. In financial crisis, staffing has been reduced to a skeleton crew, and the interim CEO has publicly stated "we need to be creative and reimagine our approach to the 2021 fair." Already, the Board has cancelled contracts, rolled over from 2020. We can only wait and see how this plays out.

Thus, life will remain in flux for some time. Will we, or can we, return to old norms? Technology has demonstrated that alternative forms of interactions are acceptable, and even preferred. We, again, live in interesting times.

THE PANDEMIC EFFECT

As the COVID pandemic continues to devastate our nation and the world, I couldn't help but wonder how people's woodworking habits or output has changed in the face of this global nightmare. It seemed like folks were making the best of a bad situation...

"I have chosen projects accordingly, like the desk I made for my wife who was suddenly working from home. I named it the COVID Desk."

"I've done almost zero woodworking. My daughter requested a bookcase, but I don't want to go out and buy lumber. We rarely go out unless it's necessary. I'm scared to death of this virus (not afraid to admit it) and trying really hard not to get it. I'd be the first in line to get vaccinated, if I could."

"I've had more time in the shop, but the downside is that I'm noticing how tedious some of my production work is. If I figure in the time spent stalling the boring steps, I'm probably not even making minimum wage."

"I do notice that I'm more likely to start big projects and lay in supplies for the future, especially with wood retailers who may need the business."

"I'm working from home, so theoretically, I'd have more time in the shop, but things haven't really changed. I'm still doing the same amount of making and experimenting. I used to use my commuting time to locate supplies that aren't easily found locally, but that doesn't happen now; and all of the nest building that I planned hasn't materialized. I also thought I'd spend more time with the kids, but it seems I'm encroaching on their ability to do the things that they want to do."

"I have a long-term project, a slant-top desk, that I've been working on since well before the pandemic began. When all this insanity started, I spent a lot of time on it and made good progress, but now I get bored with it, much more than when I spent a lot of time on it without a break. I've done several interim projects for neighbors that broke the boredom, but none recently. I'm thinking about other projects that should go faster and be a little less challenging. I'll get back to the desk before long."

"I think that the designer in us is always trying to come up with

solutions to problems at hand. In my case, I've noticed a sort of nesting or cocooning behavior—concentrating on refining my surroundings and my routines, working on home-improvement projects, spending more time contemplating positive outcomes, and thoroughly appreciating my additional opportunities to work

"I heard that you don't realize how antisocial you are until there is a pandemic and your life doesn't change. I think that applies to me. My wife and I have been homebodies for years, so this hasn't changed our basic routines much. We don't see friends as often, and we don't go out to eat or to athletic events, like we did before the pandemic; but otherwise, our life remains about the same."

"My woodworking has dropped off over the last few years, but I've hardly turned on a machine this year. Since my wife and I have several risk factors, we are pretty much locked down. So, going down into the basement shop has little appeal when I can go for an eBike ride in the sunshine or drive around in our Miata convertible. I was so desperate to be outside, I even painted the house!"

"The pandemic has not impacted my woodworking, as I haven't done much for the past two years, and we have run out of space for new projects. We didn't go anywhere before the pandemic, and we sure don't now. We avoid restaurants, crowds, and friends, and we wear masks and use hand sanitizer a lot. So in that sense, life is different."

"I get more time in the shop, because I save two hours of commuting every day. But, while I'm no longer exhausted by my day job, I'm reading less and many of my plans for home projects are still on the drawing board. I find myself just messing around the shop, not really advancing a project (e.g. resharpening oncea-year tools, re-arranging tools, cleaning, etc.). I have plenty of materials, mostly bought before the pandemic and waiting for ideal projects. But, after attending a few estate sales, I realized this day might never happen and that I don't want my treasures to end up in an estate sale unused. So, I'm going through my modest stack of domestic hardwoods to its bottom, where 200 bf of guartersawn American Beech await the day I'll finally get to my dream of making my own planes."

"When the lockdown hit, my office basically shut down. That gave me lots of time to hide out in my new shop and be productive. I finished a half-size model of a dining table that I had designed, spent a bunch of time on the lathe with some Red Maple that I harvested, completed a turning commission, made a log-sculpture side table for my son and a storage bench for my daughter's kitchen. I also did some nesting, restoring our basement after moving my woodworking gear to the new shop, and building

in the shop."

"I spent April making three chairs for the church and, since then, have mostly been carving caricatures, trolls, Santas, etc., for giveaways and presents. I took one to a fisherman neighbor who has been holed up, and he was very grateful for the present and the visit. The biggest change in our life is that we have cancelled our annual month-long vacation."

"I'm doing less lumber shopping, using more of my stashed wood instead of buying new stuff. Shop time is spent doing shop projects, like racks and jigs. Oh, and since my wife is now home all the time, my 'honey-do' list has gotten a lot longer."

"The pandemic has changed our lives in several ways. When it struck, we decided to stay here in Arizona for the summer rather than travel back to Connecticut, so I got to spend a lot of time in our community woodshop. Then, both my wife and I got COVID-19. We each spent six days in the hospital and were on oxygen for nearly a month afterwards. The good news is that we were fortunate to have only a mild case. We are both fully recovered and back to normal. I am back to spending my weekday mornings in the woodshop, working on several Intarsia projects."

"The pandemic hasn't had a serious effect on my life. I've recently retired, so I can stay at home and with my grandkids and family. My only major curtailment is on traveling and vacations. My tune would be different if I lost someone close to me."

"Not much change in my woodworking. I have been procrastinating on a project for a couple of years now, and even with some extra time off from work this year, I still have not worked on the project. The lack of shop time had more to do with changes in the family structure than the virus. But on the other hand, I have finally started to attempt to sharpen my chisels and a few plane irons. Sharpening is a skill that I've been meaning to improve upon and have finally started. Maybe this was the kick that I needed."

"The pandemic has had a big impact on my life by restricting our travel, friendships, and visits with our kids and grandkids. In my shop, however, I seem to be getting more things done, completing projects that I've ignored for far too long. That's a good thing. One aspect of my woodworking life that has suffered greatly is my participation in our woodworking club. I'm a mentor/instructor on a regular basis and haven't been able to be there since last winter. It's a big part of my social life, too, so the virus has played another

"Working from home, the pandemic has not had a major impact on our daily life, though business has taken a significant hit with projects cancelled or put on indefinite hold. We do miss our planned vacations, eating at restaurants, and going to movies. Instead, we have been doing a lot of takeout to support our favorite restaurants and fully taking advantage of our various video streaming services. As for woodworking, I guess motivation to complete projects took a hit, when the competitions that I usually enter were cancelled. Instead, I have been clearing out space to setup an exercise room, not knowing when and if the local gyms will reopen. Time just seems to pass by too quickly, or is that just a factor of growing older."

"I've stopped buying tools. With my age and underlying conditions, I am pretty vulnerable to COVID. Whenever I see something I want, there's always the thought, 'Will I be alive this summer to use that tool?' Hopefully the vaccine will change all that."

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
The **Wharton Esherick Museum** in Malvern, PA has received a \$10 million gift from the Windgate Foundation. The museum preserves the home and work of **Wharton Esherick** (1887–1970), regarded as the grandfather of the American Studio Furniture movement and one of the foundational figures of contemporary craft and design.

In the woodworking realm, Wharton is best known for his ground breaking sculptural furniture. His fiercely individual approach to art-making, as well as his highly original fusion of form with function, has inspired important artists and designers including **Wendell Castle** and **Sam Maloof.** His influence is kept alive by an annual woodworking themed competition (see page 16).

The museum is comprised of several buildings, including: *Sunekrest*, the Esherick family home; the *1956 Workshop* designed by Esherick and renowned American modernist architect **Louis Kahn**; and the *Studio*, a work and living space hand-built by Esherick. Open to the public, the *Studio* gives an intimate glimpse into both the artist's working and private life. It also houses a wide range of his works: from toys carved for his children, to flowing and functional pieces of furniture specifically-built for the space, to an organic swirl of a staircase that seems to grow from the ground. On the National Register of Historic Places since 1973, the 12-acre wooded site was also designated a *National Historic Landmark for Architecture* in 1993.

Plans are being developed to "reimagine" the property. Among the improvements are a new *Visitor's Center* that blends into the landscape at the base of Valley Forge Mountain. It will include a space to exhibit work by contemporary artists in dialogue with the Esherick legacy; restorations that will allow new public access to *Sunekrest* and a new gallery; new access to the *1956 Workshop*, which will return it to its original appearance after being used as a residence since 1970; and a terraced *Ramble* that will lead visitors on a gentle meander through the woods connecting the lower and upper portions of the site.

The gift will be used as an endowment, in which returns from the investment can provide income to support the Museum's annual operating budget, at a time when cultural organizations of every size are grappling with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. 
TOOLMAKER MANNY SHABHU

Veteran attendees of the old *The Woodworking Shows*—which no longer visit the West Coast—remember **Manvendra**

(Manny) Shambhu. The owner of Manny's Woodworker's Place in Lexington, KY was a fixture on the show circuit, selling his line of Gladstone hand tools.


The immigrant from India had a Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry, but entered the woodworking hand tool business when, as a hobbyist, he had trouble finding the tools that he wanted. He ran the physical store

until 2011, but continued on-line sales of his tools serving woodworkers worldwide. Manny passed away in October at age 81.



Australian woodturner **Vic Wood** passed away in October. Considered the grandfather of Australian creative woodturning,

he also was instrumental in stimulating interest in the craft in the U.S. and around the world. He initially was a high school and college woodworking instructor, before choosing to turn full-time, in 1983. His signature works were square-edged lidded and off-centered boxes—sold in galleries worldwide—as well as large turned wall



plaques for public and private installations. He, along with **Richard Raffan**, brought the Australian approach to the U.S., teaching at such events as the *Utah Woodturning Symposium* for 11 years.

SHOP TEACHER AWARDED NEW CAR

Middle school shop teacher **Jason Erdreich** of Madison, NJ was honored by **Mazda USA** for aiding health care workers in the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic. When personal protective equipment was running short, he collected 15 3D printers from his school, hooked them up in his living room, and printed masks day and night, as well as instructing other teachers and students in the procedures. Together, more than 12,000 pieces of PPE were produced for hospitals, nursing homes, and local frontline workers. His reward was a new Mazda MX-5 Miata 100th Anniversary Special Edition for his "selfless act, creative thinking, and contributions to community."

NEW KRENOV BIOGRAPHY

James Krenov (1920-2009) was one of the most influential woodworkers of the 20th century. His best-selling books inspired tens of thousands of people to pick up tools and build things to


the highest standard. Yet, little is known about his life, except for a few details mentioned in his books.

His story is now told in a new book, James Krenov: Leave Fingerprints. After years of research and more than 150 interviews, **Brendan Bernhardt Gaffney** has produced the first and definitive biography of Krenov, featuring press clippings, historical documents, and hundreds of historical photographs. Gaff-



ney traces Krenov's life from his birth in a small village in far-flung Russia, to China, Seattle, Alaska, Sweden and finally to Northern California, where he founded the College of the Redwoods Fine Woodworking Program (now **The Krenov School**).

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


ESHERICK COMPETITION





Making Wooden Knuckle Hinges

Making your own hinges out of wood can be the perfect complement to any project with moving components. Though only a minor element, it can have a major impact on the overall feel, greatly enhancing the handcrafted nature of the piece of furniture—rather than using metal hardware, associated most with manufactured products.

The wooden hinges described in this article are designed specifically for use with folding screens (such as the *3-Panel Folding Screen* shown below), but the idea can be modified and adapted to be used in a wide variety of furniture applications.

For a folding screen to function properly, it needs to be able to stand up by itself anywhere in a room and fold up flat for storage. Thus, the hinges need to be "bi-fold," allowing the panels to be folded against themselves. In order to accomplish this, the hinges need full 180° movement, and the edges of the stiles and knuckles of the hinges have to be rounded so that there is clearance for them to pivot.

I begin by cutting the hinge recess (or mortise) into the stiles, which are the vertical members of the frames. These have to be laid out and cut accurately to ensure that the hinges are aligned and move smoothly. I used a piece of ³/₄" thick plywood as a template, notched it on the table saw, then after rough cutting the mortises with a jigsaw, clamped it to each stile measuring off the bottom, and routed them using a flush trim bit. Afterwards I used a sharp chisel to square up the corners (Figure 2).



The next step is to mill the stock for the hinge knuckles. You want to orient the grain so that it is perpendicular to the stiles. This means that the grain is running the length of the knuckle. If the grain was running parallel to the stiles, it would be weaker and could possibly break.

At this point, I have a piece of hardwood stock that is ³/₄" thick by 2" long but about 4 or 5 times as wide as I need. The extra width is helpful during the next step, which is to radius the ends with a ³/₈" radius bit at the router table. The extra width helps to support the stock against the router fence; afterwards they can be cut to width.

Holes that will accept 1/8" brass pins are then drilled through the hinge, centered 3/8" from the rounded edge at each end of the stock. For precise drilling of the two holes, a precision machinist's vise is used at the drill press with a 1/8" bit (Figure 3). The machinist's vise uses threaded rods for exact adjustments and settings. The precise adjustability of the vise—coupled with a wooden stop block taped in place on the face of the vise—ensures uniformity in drilling the holes—so that the hinges will line up accurately and allow proper operation once installed in the framework.

The pins are created by cutting $^{1}/s^{"}$ brass dowels on a bandsaw—with a bimetal blade—into 3" lengths. Use a disc sander to smooth the edges on the ends of the pins to ensure that they'll turn smoothly in the holes. The pins then can be inserted into both holes of the hinge.

To prepare to install the hinges with pins in place into the notches in the frame, a router with a slot cutting bit is used to cut a 1/8" slot (3" long and 1/2" deep) on either side of the mortise in the stiles (Figure 4). Then, the hinge with pins can be inserted into the slots (Figure 5) and concealed by gluing splines into the slots, which also serves the purpose of holding the pins in place. This process is done for each notch/mortise in the frames—in this case there are three sets of hinged mortises in each of adjacent panels.

Here's some good advice: apply some wax to the brass pins before gluing in the splines. The wax will prevent any excess glue from sticking to the splines and help ensure that the hinges will move freely.

For this screen example, the Maple frame and hinges are ebonized—i.e., dyed jet black—to create a nice contrast to the Lacewood panels. Wax is applied into the frame's notches to help ensure trouble-free movement of the hinge (Figure 6).





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Tools & Techniques

The Intelligent Handby David Binnington Savage



British furniture designer-maker-writer-educator **David Binnington Savage** passed away two years ago (January, 2019), after a hard-fought battle with cancer. Known for utterly flawless craftsmanship with a flair, he attracted a clientele of the wealthy and eccentric, while teaching new generations of makers at his Rowden Atelier furniture design school in North Devon, England.

He began his second book, *The Intelligent Hand*, on the day that he received a cancer diagnosis with a grim prognosis. Unsure if he would finish, he wanted to leave something for future craftsmen, similar to the inspiration that he received from the books of **James Krenov** when he was starting out.

This is to help, encourage and support a decision to leave the world where thought and work are separated. Where they no longer exist together. This is for the brave souls who need to plough a contrarian furrow, where intelligence and making exist together, and you are in control of your life. Don't be scared, but don't expect it to be dull or easy. A life well lived never is dull or easy.

I want to share the story of a pair of cabinets that have just been finished. They will help tell a little about who I am. They are made in American Cherry, highly figured and among my more successful pieces. However, both the selection of the species and the wonderful figuring are complete mistakes, for which I can claim no credit. I wanted these pieces to be made in English Cherry. It has a greenish golden heather honey colour that has an elegance very suitable for bedroom furniture. I am pretty sure I said "English" to Daren, who ordered the wood, and I was sullen and grumpy for a while when the American Cherry arrived.

"I can't get English in these thicknesses," he said. "This is all I can find, and we are lucky to have that." So, we carried on—no point doing anything else—and didn't things turn out well! I could easily say how hard we looked for this highly figured stuff and how important it was to the concept, but that would be hogwash.

For most of my life I have made furniture for other people. Like the cobbler with poorly shod children, we have furniture in our home that has gone to exhibition but did not sell. What we don't have is a handmade dining table and chairs or a pair of bedside cabinets. Storage in our bedroom is a moronic piece of furniture design from Habitat that closes two large drawers together and catches them in the centre. Push, just there, and maybe the catch will hold. Push anywhere else, and this aircraft carrier of a drawer springs out toward you, whacking you in the shins. But now, we have these made-to-measure Cherry lovelies.

They were largely made by **Daren Millman**, who is the senior cabinetmaker at Rowden, where we have been for nearly 20 years. Rowden is also a teaching school where we cover hand-tool techniques, machine techniques, drawing, design and business skills. Rowden is a farm owned by **Ted Lott**, who has retired and let out the farm buildings to us. During those 20 years, we have built up a workshop with an international reputation for making fine modern furniture to order. Before Rowden, I was in a workshop in Bideford for about eight years, where I did much the same, but not quite as well.

Not made fast, these cabinets. When asked how long these took, Daren would give his standard answer for any serious piece: "Oh, about 400 hours." Whether it is a dining table set, or a cabinet with secret drawers, 400 hours seems to do it. Estimating times for making jobs is at the very guts of making a living in this biz, and Daren is spookily accurate. We do price estimates in two ways. I have an arm-waving, general feeling gathered after 40-odd years of making mistakes. "Oh, it's about three months," as I visualise the piece being made from timber arrival to polishing. And I do the estimating in days or parts of days. Cutting those rails will be about half a day. I

know this, for I have cut similar rails and seen others doing similar rails, and that's how long it took!

But Daren is much more meticulous. He will settle down with paper and pen to plot the progress of components and processes through the workshop. Like me, he will begin at the beginning with timber ordering, visiting timber yards, making a cutting list right through to polishing, packing, and delivery. Each will have a time allocation. That time allocation, again, will be based on nearly 30 years' experience. He will be better than me, but I will have got there faster. So, if I need a quick price, I will use the arm-waving method, and I may even ask Daren to wave his arms about. A serious job enquiry needs pen and paper, a nice comfy stool, and a tidy bench. And about half of an expensive day.

But this wasn't being made for a customer so none of that mattered; we won't be getting paid for the time spent. I was once accused of being very concerned about money by one of those gutless anonymous Internet trolls. This stunned me because all of our work has been for pay, but that was always secondary to making something that was special. If we could survive doing it, I would always want to make it as best we can—but to do that you need to know your numbers.

Way back in the early 1980's, I read books by James Krenov that inspired me to take up working with wood, making furniture. He inspired a generation to hug trees and to love wood, and to make as beautifully as one could, but from the position of a skilled amateur. Jim never sought, I believe, to make a living from this. That was my madness. What Jim did do, however, was touch upon the reason that is at the core of this book. Why do we go that extra mile? Why do we break ourselves on that last 10 percent? This is the 10 percent that most people would not even recognise, or care about, even if it bit them on the leg. This is the bit that really hurts to get right, both physically and mentally.

But get it right and deliver the piece and she says, "Wow, David, I knew it would be good, but not this

good." Get this right, over deliver and soon you don't need too many more new clients, for she will want this experience again and again. We have been making for the same clients now for most of my working life. They get it, they like it, and they have the means to pay for it. Your job is to do it well enough to get the "Wow, David," have the satisfaction of doing it right, get the figures right, and feed your children. Not easy I grant you, but for some of you it will become a life well lived.

This is the quality thing at the centre of our lives. This is the issue that brings people to Rowden from all over the world to learn, each with what **Perry Marshall** would call "a bleeding neck" (something is wrong, or they wouldn't be here). Each knowing they can do more with their lives. They come with damage that they feel can be fixed with a combination of physical work and intelligent solutions. Both are essential.

Physical labour is unfashionably sweaty. We generally now sit at terminals in cool offices. We are bound by contracts of employment that would make some 18th-century slave owners seem benign. The only exercise we get is the twitching of our fingers and the occasional trip to the coffee machine. Our bodies, these wonderful pieces of equipment, are allowed to become indolent and obese. We feed up with cornstarched fast food and wait for retirement. Exercise, if we take it, has no meaning; we don't exercise to do anything. We run or jog, but we go nowhere. We work out in the gym and get the buzz, the satisfaction of the body's response to exercise, but we don't do anything. We don't use the energy constructively to engage our minds and our hands to make stuff.

White collar work has become what we do, almost all of us in the Western world. It pays the bills and keeps us fed, we get a holiday and our children are kind of OK. And that is fine for most of us. But there are some of you who know that something is missing. Something creative, some way to spend your day working physically while exercising your body and your mind. Thinking and revising what you are making, as consequence of the quality of your thoughts. This is Intelligent making, this is *The Intelligent Hand*.





Profile: Pat & Karen Miller

The work of **Pat and Karen Miller** is frequently featured within the pages of this publication, as part of pictorials of regional and national exhibitions. The couple from Yakima, WA is proficient in producing innovative collaborations, with Pat turning the canvasses upon which Karen can embellish by carving, burning, and coloring.

"Sometimes, Pat will work on something and bring it in to get my ideas," explains Karen. "While other times, I bring him an idea, and we go back and forth until we develop a consensus. Just last night, I could not sleep because I had a new design for a Christmas ornament. I drew it up, and this morning, he turned five of them for me."

With a degree in geology, Pat is a retired equipment parts salesman. Good with his hands, he always had some sort of shop to make functional "stuff." He had turned a bowl in high school shop class (which his parents still have), but it was not until 41 years later that he tried again, after buying a Shopsmith. "I started playing with the lathe and liked the idea of quickly making round things. It was a gratification tool. However, I became frustrated early on, having one disaster after another. I was ready to just sell everything, when Karen suggested that maybe I could find some help. Discovering the American Association of Woodturners on the Internet, I located a local chapter (90 miles away), who connected me with nearby artist John **Barany**. After a cold call, he agreed to show me around, and I ended up spending three hours every Thursday for $2^{1/2}$ years in his shop. We continue to critique each others work and share ideas. His mentorship is a big reason for the success that we have today."

Karen actually had artistic training, having graduated college with a major in small sculpture and jewelry design. While working as a nurse, she did crafts on the side, and when Pat started turning, she began experimenting with his rejects—and everything went from there.

Inspiration comes from everywhere. "You just have to walk out the door and open your eyes and be willing to think outside the box," says Pat. "There's a lot of freedom without constraints." And each piece has a story. *Malden, et al.* (left) is about the wildfires of 2020, which incinerated such small towns as Malden, WA. It consists of two pieces of Mango wood—turned, carved, burned, textured, dyed, and airbrushed—on a basalt base. I used pretty much everything in my creative arsenal on that piece."

Though sculptural, Pat does approach each piece from a functional angle. "I have the mentality of wanting to make things that do things. At its core, most of my pieces are lidded boxes of some kind. That is how I see things; the eye of a container maker."

Karen's designs are custom for every piece. "The shape determines what the embellishment is going to be. I make up shapes in my head, then tweak them and add things.

Our piece *Decorum* (on the cover) started as something else, and I was going to throw it out. But Pat turned it back down for me, and I took a whole different approach. The shape struck me as something that would have come from the times of old Elizabethan England. I created a floral garnish, using pyrography and artist pens, while carving birds on the bottom and burning it black. It was topped with a complementary finial of turned and polished aluminum." This piece was selected as the first recipient of the *Deena and Jerry Kaplan Award of Excellence* at 2019 AAW Symposium.

Their work is quite diverse, in terms of style, materials, and finishes. Karen remembers being critiqued at a symposium as "you need to focus on one thing." That does not work for them. They don't have a "signature" piece that they repeat. That's too much like production. "People know us because we are diverse. They recognize our work, because it doesn't look like anyone else's. In fact, one of his best patrons really appreciates the fact that it is always something different, and he has accumulated a real variety of different pieces from us."

The closest they come to serial work are tea pots. "I like tea pots," exclaims Pat. "They are fun. There is a little bit of everything in tea pots: turning, carving, and assembly. And it's a great canvas for Karen's embellishment."

Pat sums up by saying: "For as long as we've been together, Karen and I have shared a bit of a twist in how we see things. It's part of what drew us to each other, I suspect. We seem to feed off each other's perspectives in a way where one and one adds up to more than two. Both of us have an innate need to make things that lead us to dabble a bit in wood art since 2010, and the dabbling quickly engulfed us as a passion. We've earned our living, raised our kid, formed some opinions, paid our taxes, and added candles to our cakes—but haven't really grown old. We are rather easily inspired and try not to look past the obvious. Our work may include the labor of one of us or both, but the heart, soul, and result of all our work is a true collaborative effort. Our intention is to enjoy the journey."

REMEMBERING KOBE BRYANT IN WOOD ART

It has been a year since the helicopter crash that killed basketball star **Kobe Bryant** and eight others. Shock extended beyond Los Angeles Lakers' fandom, and international artists channeled their grief by producing memorable artworks.

Hobbyist **Steve Thomson** of Ontario, NY created an intarsia tribute (36" h, 24" w), using 100 pieces of Walnut, Cherry, Mahogany, Maple, Oak, and Butternut. After an image of the piece was posted on social media, it caught the attention of Bryant's former teammate **Pau Gasol**, whose "shoutout" went viral, amassing more than 120,000 likes and 600 comments from around the world. Pau also agreed to purchase piece, as a gift to Kobe's widow, Vanessa.

WHAT FUN! STAIRS TO SLIDE DOWN

Clyde Martin, owner of **Top Tread Stairways** in Sierra Vista, AZ has completed an unique project, a spiral staircase with a slide for a client in Sacramento, CA. This 2 ¹/₂-year project—from planning to installation—included a 33-foot long curved slide and adjacent stairs.

The slide was constructed at a 22° pitch out of 445 layers of stack-laminated, CNC-cut American Black Walnut, glued and milled. The slide was built in the shop in three sections, and the stairs in 30 pieces. The project was assembled on-site, with the stair treads inserted into cut rabbets in the side of the slide. In planning, the design concept was tested with an initial mock-up, as well as a 7-foot long MDF prototype, tried out by both the client and grandchildren.
