

AWFS®FAIR LAS VEGAS

The biennial **AWFS®Fair** in Las Vegas, scheduled for July 20-23, is proceeding towards an in-person event. Taking place in the convention center's brand new hi-tech state-of-art addition, the massive exhibit hall will feature the full range of woodworking machinery, tools, supplies, and services, as well as a variety of educational opportunities.

And Las Vegas is eager to show that it is once again open for business. Over the pandemic, new casino resorts, innovative restaurants, and exciting attractions have opened across the destination. Even **Elon Musk's** new Tesla-driven underground transportation system may be operational.

AWFS has been working closely with the public health department, monitoring local health conditions and establishing safety and health protocols. The hall, itself, has been awarded the Global Biorisk Advisory Council (GBAC) STAR facility accreditation, considered the gold standard for safe facilities for risks associated with infectious agents (including COVID-19).

Organizers also have been surveying its potential audience to measure intent, and results indicate a significant majority are planning to attend.

All eyes will be watching the **World of Concrete**—June 7-10— which will be the first city-wide trade show since the pandemic shutdown was initiated. It will help determine what adjustments might be needed to conduct a safe and healthy convention.

Featured demonstrators include: Stuart Batty, Dixie Biggs, Bruce Campbell, Nick Cook, Mark Dreyer, Art Liestman, and Al Miotke.

Held later in the summer, the 26th annual **SWAT Woodturn**ing **Symposium** will try to be in-person, Aug. 27-29, in Waco, TX. Organized by the regional woodturning clubs, this is the second largest woodturning event, offering demonstrations, vendors, an instant gallery, and banquet. The schedule of events picks up speed in September, with the *Texas Woodworking Festival* in Austin, TX (Sept. 4), the *Woodworking Show of Texas* in Houston, TX (Sept. 10-12), and the *Wood & Craft Expo* in Vallejo, CA (Sept. 18-19). Museums and galleries are reopening now, and *Call for Abstracts* for future exhibitions are plentiful (pages 14-16).

Details and informational links to all these events are provided within the pages of this issue. Just remain safe, and remember that masks are only a minor inconvenience, but offer big benefits.

Woodworking Observations

Occasionally—but more often than would be expected—there is a theme that arises between independent stories in an issue. This is unintentional, as I only may realize the connection when editing submitted materials, and it even may not be perceived by most readers. I only remember making note of this case once before, but I am doing so for this issue, since I think the message is important—woodworking as a source of therapy.

In the first case, there is the winner of the Forest Heritage Center's Master Woodworking Artist of the Year competition/exhibition (page 17). Jim Anderson of Steilacoom, WA is a 24-year career veteran in the U.S. Army's elite 75th Ranger Regiment. His service left him ravaged with physical injuries and PTSD. Through severalwounded Veteran outreach programs, he learned the therapeutic value of glassblowing, woodworking, and other artistic mediums, which have helped him to overcome some of the mental and physical challenges that he faces as a disabled veteran.

Secondly, we have Chris Baldonado of Algodones, NM (pages 26-27). In his letter shared by David Marks, he describes being a crime victim, left paralyzed from a gun shot at only 21 years old. Devastated both physically and mentally, he had little hope for his life, until finding inspiration from David's WoodWorks television series to renew his life through woodworking.

There has been a lot written on the benefits of woodworking, from keeping kids in school to rehabilitation. I have seen this first-hand in the San Diego Woodturners' Turn Around for Vet project—in which wounded soldiers are taught to turn pens to my visit to California's Folsom State Prison, where the woodworking program is helping turn lives around. As funding becomes available for educational programs and apprenticeships, I hope more support can be allocated for such therapy efforts that pay big dividends.



Don't Ask Me How I Know This

This month, I wanted to try something a little different: a sort of reverse tip collection, of some of the myriad comeuppances that we've all had—admit it—in our woodworking journeys, as a warning and a reflection for other woodworkers. You might call this the DAMHIKT (Don't Ask Me How I Know This) collection—admissions of dumb mistakes that we've made for what may have seemed a brilliant reason at the time. Here are a few of the notable responses...


"When you're working with a liquid and bump it with an arm or elbow, don't go for the 'save.' That nearly always creates a much bigger mess than if you'd done nothing at all. There's a chance that it'll just wobble and won't spill at all. Or it'll splash just a little over the edge, or it'll tip and create a puddle. But, if you go for the save, suddenly fumbling and grabbing in the attempt to prevent a spill, you're not only guaranteed to cause a spill that likely wouldn't have happened, but you will knock the container flying, slinging liquid everywhere."

"I needed to joint some short boards, but my 6" jointer was too big for the job. So, I decided to use a Makita power planer. After all, I had mounted Skil saws to plywood as a makeshift tablesaw, so why not the power planer? Well, I managed to clamp the planer to the plywood, but I used only one clamp. As soon as the first piece of wood hit the blades, the planer slipped out of the clamp—still

running, of course—and hit the concrete floor with parts flying everywhere. I repaired the planer and now use it to plane down doors, etc., as intended. I bought a bench top jointer to joint the short boards."

"I kinked a good bandsaw blade, cutting a poorly supported log."

"Once, while following some plans in a woodworking magazine, I narrowly avoided an unpleasant experience by not following their procedure of lowering a piece onto a spinning router bit to make a mortise. I had tried that once, and it didn't go well. I have since found much better methods to cut a mortise."

"When chopping mortises, I found that the deeper the mortise, the harder it becomes to extract the chisel. Wiggling and gentle pulling does the trick at first. Eventually, you need to lean over the chisel, so you can get your shoulder muscles into it. As you lean over, your chin becomes right in line with the chisel handle. One more good yank and the chisel comes free, and you might almost knock yourself out. DAMHIKT."

"One of the biggest mistakes that I have ever made was while building five tables. I drew the table plans in AutoCAD® at work, but forgot to bring the drawing home that evening. I recalled that the legs were 1 1/2" square and 15" long. You guessed it—I cut the 20 legs to length only to find they were all 3" too short. The takeaway here is to always double-check critical dimensions."

"Failing to account for wood's response to humidity has come back to bite me, way too often. I don't know how many times something failed or didn't work properly, because of a moisture change in the wood that I hadn't anticipated correctly. The one seared into my memory was a Walnut top that I was finishing on a warm spring day. I sprayed the finish and left the piece in the sun for a short while to bake off the solvent. The Walnut got astonishingly hot from the sun and split on one end. Many of my moisture problems resulted from differential moisture gain or loss from one side of a panel or piece of lumber."

"I used to work from plans in magazines. Once, there was an error in one of the dimensions that caused me to make a drawer opening wider than the carcase would accommodate. The cabinet came out really wonky looking. I don't work from plans anymore, unless I screen all the dimensions carefully in advance. And when making a big piece of furniture, I always do a cardboard mock-up. How many of us have built something that looked good at eighth-scale, but was a dumpster fire at full size?"

"I was instructing a student how to turn her first lidded box. Due to my failure to teach the careful methods of measuring depth, she cut through the bottom of a box. This is unhappy enough when working solo, but downright Just Plain Embarrassing with an unforgivable lapse in instruction! Fortunately, it was a learning experience on how to enlarge and cut a clean, slightly tapered hole in the bottom and fit a piece of Ebony that nicely complimented the Ebony cabochon in the lid. The result was beautiful and looked like it was a planned motif. Whew!"

"I made a very nice entry hall table for a friend. We'd checked the measurements and figured out what would fit, so I built the table. However, it looked way too large when installed. I inherited that one and made a new smaller one for my friend."

"I decided to hook a router up to my lathe to speed up the roughing process. I just held it up against the tool rest as a proof of concept. The tool rest still has a notch in it, and the router base was destroyed when it hit the floor. Then, I mounted a piece of wood on the lathe at the end of the day and failed to check it closely before turning the lathe on. Got a third eye, a trip to the emergency room, and 27 stitches to show for my brilliance."

"I learned not to make small adjustments, while the bandsaw is running. A board that I was starting to resaw got hung up on the back edge of the table insert, so I reached under the table to push the back edge up a bit. You can guess it: I removed a chunk of my middle finger. The finger still has a dent in it."

"A neighbor lady asked me to cut a small piece of plywood for her. Anxious to show her my woodworking chops, tablesaw prowess, and how fast I could do it, I set to work. Next thing I know, the piece of plywood was lodged in the wall behind the tablesaw, thanks to twisting slightly in the cut and kicking back. I told her there had been a slight problem that I could fix with some glue and a patch. She said no problem, but I learned a lesson to never rush any project using cutting tools and power machinery, no matter how small the task appears. That has—knock-on-wood—been my only experience with kickback, and it sure sticks in my memory."

"Boat-in-the-basement syndrome. I once built two assembly benches in my kitchen, and they were just an inch too wide to fit through the sliding patio doors to the outside. I had to remove the entire door unit to get the benches out."

"When marking a piece to cut to length, remember to mark which side of line to cut. If you're not paying attention, a piece will be a little short due to this oversight."

"A friend of mine—who wants to remain nameless—made a dovetail tail board for a drawer. He made one pin board and left the project. When he came back, he cut the wrong end of the other pin board, ending up with a Z rather than a U. Oops."

"The opportunities to screw up a dovetail are endless: Saw on the wrong side of a line, saw off a pin or tail, mark the tails upside down, make two left drawer sides, mix up which tail board goes with which pin board, chamfer the wrong side of the tail, make a drawer longer than the case, forget to dado the side for the drawer bottom, locate the dado so it shows on the drawer side, do not register marking knife securely during transfer, break something upon assembly or disassembly of dry fit, over-saw everything, fail to own a chisel narrow enough to chisel out tail board waste. It hurts to recall all the problems others have told me happened to them."

"I was making an octagonal piece out of a cube of Ebony. Each offcut slid nicely next to the angled blade, until I got to the fourth corner. While pushing the block through, the offcut at the back of the blade caught in the saw insert, which twisted the block being cut, catching it on the blade, and kicking it back right into my chest. I can only imagine that this is what getting shot feels like. The moral: figure out a way to manage smaller pieces, so you are out of the line of fire from kickback, and remove your offcuts no matter how innocuous they appear!"

"If you throw a circular saw around enough, it is possible to force the base out of alignment. DAMHIKT."

"Regarding bandsaw technique, **Sam Maloof** had plenty of gifts and abilities that I do not seem to possess! I have seen videos or pictures of Sam at the bandsaw and recall thinking 'Hmmm that doesn't look like it should work,' but results do speak for themselves. As it turns out, he did seem to know what he was doing. That's an understatement! Though, I'm not sure I should attempt to emulate his techniques."

"The adage is 'measure twice, cut once.' Well, Murphy's Law kicked in. I measured three times, looking at the wrong dimension on my plan, and made a raised panel 3/4" too short. So, I decided to change the lower rail dimension 3/4" wider, and the front of the desk ended up looking much better. A happy ending to a bonehead move."

"I am told that you can mount a bandsaw blade backward, but it doesn't work as well;)"

"I once managed to get a bandsaw blade turned inside out, so it couldn't be installed to cut. After cursing the maker for welding it backwards, I realized I just had to turn it inside out."

"Once, I installed a dado set on my table saw and got all the chippers backward. When I turned the saw on, there was an unusual buzzing sound, but no unusual vibration. So, I tried cutting a dado and couldn't hardly push the board forward. I wondered how the whole thing could suddenly get so dull. Then, I turned the saw off and took a closer look. Whoops!"


"Making a display cabinet with an inset back panel, I put the top, bottom, and sides together, and measured the height for the back panel. It was gonna fit exactly. Right—exactly ³/₃₂" too short. I guess, it's better to make it slightly larger than the opening and plane to fit."

"I wanted to resaw a burl to make 3 table tops. I built a great jig to hold the burl, sliced it into 3 thicknesses on the bandsaw, and stickered the beautiful tops to work on the bases. When I went back to the tops, the uppermost one had turned into a potato chip, with exposure to the air. I tried wetting it and weighing it down in the sun on the driveway, but nothing worked to get that baby flat. I think it might make a nice abstract wall hanging."

"I was tired after a long day finishing and left the oily rags on my workbench in the garage. Around 4am, my next door neighbor was ringing the door bell and pounding on the door, yelling 'you're house is on fire.' So, I learned about spontaneous combustion the hard way."

In March, 35 industry organizations, collectively, sent a letter to the **Biden Administration**, urging it to address the rising costs of lumber. The cost of construction-graded wood has risen up to 400%, quality hardwood is up about 50%, plywood has tripled, and even the low-grade wood used for pallets has doubled.

Causes of the increases are numerous, including trade policies, high demand for residential building and remodels, the pandemic stimulation of DIY projects, reduced production by sawmills due to the COVID pandemic, shortage of loggers and drivers, weather, and wildfires and infestations in the Western states and Canada. Also, demand will continue to rise, as the world economies recover from the COVID pandemic and the probable federal infrastructure program.

A similar request was made to the **Trump Administration** in 2020, to no avail. Hopefully, these issues will be taken into consideration as economic, trade, and forest management policies are formulated.

PUSH TO EXPAND APPRENTICESHIPS

The Association of Woodworking and Furnishings Suppliers (AWFS) has joined the lobbying effort in support of the proposed National Apprenticeship Act of 2021 (HR447). This legislation invests more than \$3.5 billion over 5 years in expanding opportunities and access to various types of apprenticeships, while codifying standards and regulations to facilitate such programs and strengthens intergovernmental relationships.

"Our industry, comprised primarily of small businesses, is experiencing a skills gap," says AWFS executive vice president **Angelo Gangone.** "We need all tools and resources available to attract and train new talent, including apprenticeships."

According to **Congressman Robert Scott** (D-Virginia), this Act "will begin to bring America's investments in apprenticeship more in line with countries around the world" as "our peer industrialized nations spend roughly six times as much as a share of GDP on apprenticeships as the U.S." The bill has passed the House and awaits action by the Senate.

AWFS also advocates for the Relaunching America's Workforce Act (HR602/S200) "which authorizes \$15 billion in funding over the next three years to help employers keep workers on the job and help displaced or underemployed workers quickly re-enter the workforce, as the economy emerges from the pandemic. This includes an investment of \$1 billion in high-quality, workbased learning opportunities and career and technical education to prepare students for careers in high-skill, high-wage, or in-demand industry sectors and occupations. It further provides \$2 billion to restart the community college career training grant program and provide individuals with career pathways to high-skill, high-wage, and in-demand employment opportunities.

EAMES CHAIR NOT 'FAMOUS' ENOUGH

There is constant conversation in the furniture and art worlds about protection of design. Well, the U.S. Supreme Court has failed to help clarify this issue in a recent case regarding the *Eames Office Chair*.

Herman Miller, which owned the rights to the Eames chair since the 1940s, sued **Office Star Products** for marketing a knock-off. Though a jury ruled in Herman Miller's favor regarding trade

dress dilution damages (i.e., likelihood of confusion in the mind of the purchasing public), an appeals court overturned the \$3 million award, finding that the Eames design was not "truly prominent and renowned" to establish a "household name" level of fame.

Herman Miller had introduced evidence that it sold hundreds of thousands of its Eames chairs since 1958, it spent an average of \$550,000 per year on advertising the chairs, the chairs were heavily featured in



the TV show *Mad Men* and in other TV shows and movies, and the chairs have been exhibited in the Museum of Modern Art and the Henry Ford Museum. Anyone who would be in the market for such a \$1,200 chair would surely be aware of the Eames design.

The Supreme Court declined to review the case, letting the appellate court decision stand. A separate judgment of \$3.3 million for infringement was affirmed.

MALOOF HOME REOPENS TO VISITORS

Looking for somewhere to go to get out of the house? The Maloof Historic Home, Workshop, and Discovery Garden in Rancho Cucamonga, CA is reopening to the public on May 1.

"We've got refreshing, artful experiences in beautiful surroundings, within an hour's drive of much of Southern California," says **Jim Rawitsch**, executive director of the not-for-profit **Sam and Alfreda Maloof Foundation for Arts and Crafts.** "The Maloof is what we all need to start recovering and reconnecting after a year of COVID."

Docent-led tours will resume of the mid-20th century home of Sam and Alfreda Maloof, housing the world's largest collection of furniture designed and crafted by woodworker Sam Maloof. Listed in the *National Register of Historic Places*, the home also contains paintings, drawings, ceramics, and textiles by artists of the Pomona Valley, Southwest, Mexico, and America's studio craft movement. Additional pieces from the Maloof art collection will

be on display in the Joe and Vi Jacobs Education Center gallery, as well as a sculpture, Rescued Timbers, made by Larry White from wood beams recovered during relocation of the Maloof workshop from its original site and a 3-legged stool inspired by a workshop that Sam Maloof taught in El Salvador in the 1960s by Lauren Verdugo (beginning June 12).

During the pandemic shut down, the Upper Barn teaching space has been improved, with new LED lighting, a new workbench, and new cabinetry and storage for tools and materials. A new class offering

is a woodworking workshop for women—a 2-day course in building the Maloof-inspired *El Salvador Stool*—led by **Lauren Verdugo.** Summer and Fall classes in furniture and woodturning will be announced soon.

Initially, public access will be reduced to Saturdays only, and tours will be limited. Face masks and social distancing will be required for the foreseeable future, and air circulation for enclosed spaces has been enhanced with the introduction of HEPA and ultraviolet filters.

ROCKLER DESK CHALLENGE



There are 120 sections with 12 pie-shaped pieces in each, plus a solid center with a hole drilled through to run a cable that helped in keeping the assemblies in place when it was built. Each of these sections are cut at one angle for the front side and a different one for the back side. If they were all cut with the same angle, the results would be similar to a donut. The entire creation has a twist to it, so it could be assembled in the shape you see. That was the challenge—to see if it could be done. The first 3 months were devoted to the initial design, before the first piece of birch was actually cut.





The Healing & Restorative Power of Woodworking

As some of you may know, I have been slowed down these past months not only from the COVID-19 shutdown, but recovering from a Total Knee Replacement surgery and its complications. I would like to share a recent email that I received, which has provided comfort and inspiration:

Hello Mr. David Marks,

My name is Chris Baldonado, and I'm a long time fan. In fact, I owe a lot of my well being to you. . .let me explain. 22 years ago, I was a young man of 21 years and a victim of a violent crime. I was shot in the spine and was left paralyzed from the waist down. I was shattered. I was very depressed and felt I had no purpose in life anymore. My condition left me in bad health physically, as well as mentally. I couldn't lead any kind of normal life. I was in lots of pain and having a hard time healing from countless surgeries. At this point, my life was reduced to being cared for completely.

All I was able to do was watch television. At that time, reality TV was new, and it's all that was on. I was watching random people living all these lives that I knew that I could never live. It was frustrating. I was having a real hard time sleeping at the time, so I was awake early every morning. One morning surfing thru the television channels, I ran across this show about a young artist making a door. I was intrigued almost immediately. So, I watched the show and thought how cool would that be. Looks like fun! Then, I watched another of his shows, then another, thinking I could have done this before my injury. But in my mind, it was only another life that I would have to live vicariously thru television. I watched show after show, amazed how these beautiful functional pieces came to life from raw materials.

I was hooked. I got up every morning at 6am to tune into Wood-Works. I recorded every episode on my VCR (remember those?). All the time I'm saying to myself, "if I'm ever well enough to make even a simple project, I absolutely will." At this point, I realize that I can't wait around and hope I get better—I have to get up and get better. I need to be at least strong enough to lift a couple boards, swing a hammer, and use a saw right? So, I started getting up and quit making excuses about my condition.

A year or so after seeing the first show, I was doing much better, and I bought a \$100 table saw. With this little cheap shitty one (Lol), I was able to make a simple corner cabinet. It actually came out pretty dang good for a paraplegic!!! I continued making little projects, but more than anything, I was building my shop, little at a time, including torsion box tabletops for my work surfaces—inspired by your show of course. Now, my wife can't stand to hear the name David Marks anymore (Lol). I'm completely inspired by your work ethic and attention to every detail.

Absolute precision or nothing!!

So.... Mr. David Marks, I must thank you for all the great habits that I learned from you. Not only in woodworking, I applied the same ethics and attention to detail in all my life. Now, 22 years later, I'm still in my shop every day building and learning more about OUR craft. I say OUR with pride. Who knows where I'd be if I hadn't been inspired to build something. Not only was I building projects, but I was actually building a new life. I was inspired by you to build things bigger than myself. I learned to not be afraid and to try regardless of my physical limitations. That carries on to everything in life.

I am very greatful to you for the inspiration. Thank you very much for hearing my story. I look forward to seeing your new works of art. I would love to take a class someday, so keep an eye out for me in the future.

Take care. Keep inspiring. You never know who you may save next. Chris B.

David's Response: Chris, WOW!! Your story is simply amazing!

I can't imagine the horror of being shot and left paralyzed from the waist down. What an absolutely horrible experience that you have been through! Depression would undoubtedly be the result of an experience like that, and depression, itself, can leave us without the will to go on.

Your email arrived as I find myself in a state of being somewhat depressed, as I struggle to recover from a Total Knee Replacement (TKR) surgery. I had my TKR in mid-September 2020 and thought that I would be back to work in a few months. As it turns out, I had to have a manipulation under anesthesia 6 weeks ago and even that didn't go well. I have become discouraged with my recovery, because I'm still in pain $4^{1}/_{2}$ months post surgery, spending most of my days doing rigorous physical therapy. My doctor has said that I am in the unfortunate group of 4% of TKR patients that will require another surgery to remove scar tissue.

After reading your email, I can now put my situation in perspective, realizing that I am still much better off than people like you who have suffered through much greater ordeals. Now, it is you that has inspired me! I thought, "geez, if Chris could get inspired by my Woodworks show, then I need to do the same thing," using your motivation to get myself back to work.

Your story is truly amazing, and you stand as a role model for others who have been disabled. Take care, and I wish you continued success in your woodworking. David

Chris's Reply to David: Man I'm sorry to hear you're on the mend at the moment. I'm honored that I was able to give you some motivation and perspective. I've said it many times—while going thru my struggles—that "some people have real problems." No matter how bad you think you have it, some have it worse.

I hope you get thru it, as quickly and painlessly as possible. I'm sending healing vibes your way!!! I would be equally honored if you would share my story. It would be awesome if someone could use my story for inspiration. I would absolutely love the magazine and DVDs!!! As I told you, I recorded the shows on VHS a long time ago, and those were lent to an inlaw and never returned (Lol).

Now, time for a question. . .

Gluing Up Miters: How do you glue up the sides of a miter box?

David's Response: One of the biggest challenges with miters is getting a perfect glue up. Even if the joints fit perfectly without glue, they can get out of alignment during the glue up.

One of my favorite expressions is 'glue changes everything.' Once you put glue on the miters, there is the viscosity of the glue holding the joints apart and making them slippery. So when force is applied, they can slide a $^{1}/_{16}$ " this way or a $^{1}/_{32}$ " that way, making for a frustrating experience.


I always start with a 'dry clamp' to rehearse, make sure it looks good, and all of my clamps are available. After glue is applied, I use a 'band clamp' (clamp with a canvas strap) to pull everything together.

Once they are in place, then I use a bar clamp or pipe clamp for each side (four total). This way, I can 'dial in' the pressure slowly. I start lightly, check the alignment, make adjustments if necessary, and add a little more pressure at a time. Wearing magnifying lenses, I scrape away excess glue with a putty knife, check to see that it looks tight under magnification, and finish up with just a little more clamping pressure.

Tools & Techniques

Brief Notes on Sharpening

Ron started the business when—as a struggling knife-maker—**James Krenov's** students came to him for plane irons for the wooden planes that they were making at the College of the Redwoods' *Fine Woodworking* program in Fort Bragg, CA.


He tooled up for plane irons, learned about planemaking, and found a niche-market of discerning woodworkers who appreciate a superior tool. His inventory of blades, knives, and tools can be seen at the website: www.hocktools.com/.

This essay provides a basic overview on tool blade sharpening. The process is explained in further detail in Ron's book, *The Perfect Edge: The Ultimate Guide to Sharpening for Woodworkers*. The book (224 pages, paperback, \$27.00) is available from www. hocktools.com or from your local bookseller.

Ron, previously, wrote an article for us on *Understanding Rust* (*Woodworker West*, July-August, 2011).

Though many woodworkers find the sharpening process a pleasant pre-work meditation, most of us would just as soon get it out of the way and get busy woodworking. There is much more to sharpening than I can cover here, and I refer you to my book on the subject: *The Perfect Edge: the Ultimate Guide to Sharpening for Woodworkers.* What I offer here, in extremely condensed form, are some ideas and methods to help make the task less forbidding.

First, **The Goal:** A sharp edge only exists where two planes (i.e., the back and the bevel of a plane iron or chisel, or the two bevels of a knife) meet with **zero radius**. Of course, "zero radius" is a theoretical ideal that eludes us, as we move to the next, more powerful microscope.




There always will be some radius to an edge, but The Goal is to minimize it. (Our fine-grained steel helps you here; the hardened particles in our steel are very small, allowing a smaller radius to be sharpened.)

Next, Getting There: Any of the popular abrasive devices can and will sharpen your blade. The choice is yours. The venerable "Arkansas" oilstones are legendary and keep their shape and flatness with little maintenance. These are a natural, quarried product that will last a lifetime. Manmade waterstones were more recently introduced from Japan, having a long history there as a natural stone. These stones sharpen more quickly because they are softer and, thus, wear faster, exposing fresh, sharp particles as they wear. However, their softness requires they be flattened often to avoid their tendency to "dish," which makes accurate blade flattening and honing impossible.

Many woodworkers use a series of sheets of sandpaper or honing film as their abrasive medium. A piece of glass serves as a flat base-plate, and the sheets are simply switched as the blade is honed through successively finer grits. The low start-up expense, ease of use, and variety of grits (as fine as 0.3 micron) make this a great way to get started. Then, there are diamond stones, lapping plates, ceramic stones, leather strops, and an overwhelming selection of powered machines, all designed to make this task easier. Whew!

If you have a method that you like—that works for you—stick with it, use it. The following steps are mostly generic, and you can follow along regardless of your abrasive proclivity. If you're new here and "grit-less," head to the store that sells automotive paints and related supplies and buy a sheet or two each of 180-grit (180X), 320X, 400X, 600X, 1200X, and 2000X. Some people use 3M's "#77" spray adhesive to stick down the sandpaper sheets; they sell it where you buy the sandpaper. Or locate some pressure-sensitive-adhesive-backed honing film, in a similar variety of grits. Next, to the glass shop for a piece of 1/4" glass to fit your abrasive sheets. A marble floor tile or scrap piece of monument or countertop granite work well, too. Now, go clear a spot on a workbench for the glass or tile. With a new blade, start with the 600X or 15 micron paper. If the back needs a lot of flattening, don't be afraid to use a coarser grit to save time. When re-sharpening a blade (if the edge is chipped or horribly dull), you may need to start coarser: 80 micron or 180X may be necessary.

Honing guides are useful things. If you have one, now is a good time to use it. Most block and bench plane blades are ground to 25°, but some smart folks argue that there need only be clearance under the heel of the bevel. In other words, since the average bench plane blade is bedded at 45°, any bevel angle 10° or so less than that will provide the needed clearance. And a thicker bevel is stronger, so the edge should last longer. Bench plane and block plane blades have traditionally been beveled to 25°. Our blades for the handmade wooden planes were specified by **James Krenov** to have a 30° bevel. Chisels get different bevel angles for different tasks: 25° or lower for paring, 30° or more for chopping. Experiment a bit with different angles to see which one works best for the wood and your style of work. A honing guide helps with all this by establishing an angle and sticking to it. It can also shorten the whole process by letting you raise the blade a degree or two, so that you're only honing the very edge. The angle of the bevel is determined by how far the blade sticks out of the honing guide.



At least one brand tells you right on it how far to extend the blade for a 25° or 30° angle. If your honing guide doesn't tell you how far to extend the blade, you'll have to experiment and measure to get what you want.

No honing guide? That's okay, but you'll have to exercise a bit more diligence and control while honing the bevel. It is important that the bevel angle be maintained throughout the sharpening process. If you rock the blade, the bevel will end up convex—"roundish"—and the actual angle at the sharp edge will be greater than you intended. Not the end of the world, but it makes apples-to-apples comparisons between woods, steels, tools, and bevel angles impossible. You can cut an angle template from a piece of cardboard or whatever, and use that to check the angle as you go.

Honing Guides

The need for accurate bevel angels, combined with the trepidation of newbie sharpeners, has created a boom market for accessories that assist in the sharpening process. A honing guide locks the blade into a device at the proper angle, so that it can be run over the abrasive and the bevel will be ground to the selected angle.

For chisels and plane irons, the simplest of the honing guides are the side-clamping models. I have owned the *Eclipse Honing Guide*, made in the United Kingdom, for over 30 years.





Eclipse Honing Guide

The Ruler Trick for Flattening the Back

I need to stress the importance of flattening and polishing the flat back of the blade, the side opposite the bevel. Many beginners worry like crazy about honing the bevel and give short shrift to the back of the blade. Think about this for a moment: the back of the blade is the cutting edge. The steel that you see when you look at the back of the blade is made of molecules that comprise the cutting edge, as the bevel is worn and sharpened away. If the back is not flat, the cutting edge can never be straight.

There is a simple trick for expediting the flattening process. The "ruler trick," made popular by **David Charlesworth**, is as simple as laying a stainless steel ruler under the back of the blade.




By lifting the blade a little bit, you're now flattening only the front portion of the back of the blade. You'll polish a narrow strip—maybe only 1/8" wide along the cutting edge—instead of flattening the entire back surface. You'll be surprised how much faster this is.




In just a few seconds, I've managed to flatten enough of the back to last for dozens of bevel honings `

But, you say, aren't you are putting a back bevel on the blade? Well, yes, but it's a straight angle—less than a degree—and won't effect the performance of the blade at all. However, do not do this with chisels. They need to be truly flat to the edge. Start by "grinding" the bevel until a burr forms on the back. It may not be very visible and will get smaller as you move to finer abrasives, but the burr will catch your fingernail. If the edge radius is large (which is a fancy way of saying "if the edge is really dull"), it may take a while before the burr will appear, but it must be there or you haven't done enough work. It's the burr that tells us when the two planes have met (that zero radius thing again.)



Now flip the blade over to do the back. Flattening the back is as important as honing the bevel. I repeat: Flattening the back is as important as honing the bevel. Think about it: the back of the blade is the cutting edge. So you have to make the back flat to insure that the edge is straight, smooth, and sharp—without waves, valleys, or "teeth." Many woodworkers believe that the whole back, from the edge to the slot, should be flattened and honed. Others figure that a stripe about an eighth of an inch back from the edge is sufficient, since the cap iron rarely exposes even that much. Your choice.

If you can leave the honing guide on the blade, just hang it over the edge of the stone or plate. If it's in the way, you'll have to measure and reset the blade extension from the guide each time you change grits. Or just sharpen and polish the back, then start over to do the bevel. Start with the coarse abrasive you've been using and rub the back using even, firm, down-pressure and take even, steady strokes, keeping the blade flat on the surface. Do this until the new scratches uniformly cover the area you want to hone. It's quite common for a plane blade to have a slight "hollow" in the back, and the early honing will reveal an arc of fresh metal along the edge and sides. You can expand this area as far as you want until the whole back is covered with the coarse scratches. When you're down far enough, and the planar surface of the back meets the planar surface of the bevel (zero-radius!), you will raise a burr on the bevel side. You're there.




Change to a finer grit and repeat the above process. Once the back has been ground flat with the first grit, it gets much easier and goes much faster. It's a good idea to angle the blade slightly while working on the back and to change the angle with each successive grit. That way, you can readily see when you've honed off all the scratches left by the previous grit; another clue that it's time to change to a finer grit.

Check the blade to be sure that it is staying **square**. If it's not, push a little harder on the high corner, while honing the bevel to bring it back square. Proceed through the grits until you run out

of them. After a few, the honed surfaces will begin to act as mirrors; a sure sign of imminent sharpness.

For most efforts, the 2000X paper or 5 micron film is as fine as you need to go. But if you're doing the final planing on a surface that you don't want to degrade by sanding, you may want to go beyond the 2000X paper to an 8000X waterstone or a **strop** charged with chromium oxide compound ("green oxide" or "knifemaker's green"). The 8000X waterstone cuts fast, but it can be tricky to use, because the blade wants to stick to the fine surface. Slow strokes, plenty of water, and patience are required. The strop can be leather, cardboard, or wood; a flat, fine textured surface that will take the crayon-like super-fine abrasive is what you want. It's best to gently pull the blade across the strop, or you risk cutting into it. Be careful to keep the back flat against the stone or strop and the bevel at the correct angle; you don't want to round off the edge.

To **test for sharpness**, you can always shave the hairs on your arm (or wherever). A sharp edge will cut hairs with very little pressure. But if you're running low on hair (or just hate that patchy look), there are other ways. A sharp edge will catch on the flat of a fingernail or plastic pen barrel, while a dull edge will skid a bit. It's really that simple; try it a few times to feel it, but it takes only the lightest touch and if it skids, it's dull.



Also, you can see if a blade is sharp. Closely examine the edge with good light, and if the edge reflects at all, it's dull. (Remember that zero-radius stuff? It's the blade's edge radius that reflects light and if there is no radius—The Goal—there will be no reflection.)

If you've just done a chisel, block-plane blade, or other cap iron-less blade, you're done! But if you're working on a bench-plane iron, you're not done until you've polished the cap iron. Make sure the cap iron, when tightened in position on the blade, makes complete contact along its edge with no daylight showing; no gaps at all where a shaving could catch. Now, polish the cap iron ramp-surface. How much work is needed depends greatly on its condition, of course, and how smooth is enough is a matter of experience and performance. Use the same abrasives starting no coarser than you must. Cap irons usually aren't hardened, so the work should progress quickly. Rock and slide the cap iron along the different grits until all coarse scratches are gone, and the ramp area looks and feels smooth. Now you're done.

Resharpen often and lightly, no coarser than necessary, to insure good cutting performance and save time in the long run. Good luck, have fun, and... "Ommmm"

Machines

Though much of what has been addressed directly applies to muscle-power stone sharpening, the concepts also are applicable to machine sharpening.

Bench Grinders can be your best friend or your worst enemy. The friendly part happens when the machine is adjusted properly and used appropriately. The enemy shows up when you're in a hurry or not paying attention, most likely when you're using the grinder for a task better performed by other tools in your arsenal, or when you're simply trying to take off too much material too quickly. The danger is overheating the blade.

Belt Sanders run cooler than bench grinders and can switch among many grits in seconds. They do not require the maintenance of grinder wheels, and belts are available in a variety of abrasives and grits.

Vertical Grinders offer more control. There are several manufacturers, though Tormek is the leader of this category. They operate at low-speed, and the stone is water-cooled, preventing burning, sparks, and dust. And, there are a variety of jigs available to properly and repeatably hold everything from chisels and scissors to axes and fingernail gouges.



Horizontal Grinders use a horizontal "sandpaper platter" to sharpen the jig-held tool. They have the advantage of a wide range of abrasives that can be as easy to change as a record on a turntable (if you remember what that is). Manufacturers include Work Sharp, Lap Sharp, and Veritas, offering similar tools with some differing enhancements.







Mats Fogelvik immigrated from Sweden to Hawaii for sun, love, and wood. Over the past 30 years, he has emerged as among Hawaii's woodworking elders. Here is Mat's story, in his words:

Though neither of my parents were artists, they had an eye for beautiful things and valued finely-made furniture and art. They instilled within me an appreciation for quality, handcrafted work, and that art is important.

In Sweden, I operated my own business as a contractor, specializing in finish woodworking. I always liked to do furniture, but it was never more than a hobby. Ultimately, I went to an art and furniture school for a year to improve my skills, and I taught wood shop for a year, never

expecting that I could earn money making furniture. In Sweden, there is a deep heritage in woodworking. Contemporary furniture is straight, functional, and doesn't cost that much. Think IKEA. The concept of art furniture is not well known.

In 1991, I came to Hawaii as a tourist, and it was a time in my life that I was ready for a change. After months of gloomy Spring weather in Sweden, the Maui sun and warmth were greatly appreciated, and I ended up staying and meeting the woman that I would marry. And then, there are the woods. Amazed, I had never seen such a variety. In Sweden, the woods are very blond and subtle, while the Hawaiian woods are beautiful and loud. I have learned to keep the lines very clean and simple, since the Hawaiian woods are so powerful.

Professionally, I found more potential to express myself as a woodworker. There was a market to be artistic, with a clientele that can afford it. I never could sell such pieces in Sweden and receive the appropriate compensation. I also learned to work with veneers, which provided more freedom in design, without the worry of wood movement. Swedish woodworking is largely solid wood.

On Maui, I first worked in a large co-op shop of six members, which provided a very stimulating environment. Much of my early work was for architects, designers, and contractors. For example, a designer across the street from the shop would have me build these incredible and technically challenging pieces for his wealthy clients. Through these referrals, I was able to create a bread-and-butter business of custom-made doors for high-end condo remodels, besides commissioned furniture.

One job involved Koa paneling for a Maui condo remodel. When completed, I joked with the owner that his Oak kitchen looked terrible, compared to the beauty of the wall. Sure enough, I got the job to remodel the kitchen in Koa (right), which earned me 15-minutes of fame in an episode of the television series *Modern Masters*. That was 25 years ago. Since then, I have created furniture for every room of his residence—and my upcoming project is a 20-foot conference table for his office in California.

In 2010, we moved over to the Big Island, where we were able to buy 3-acres for a reasonable price and build a home and shop. With the lower overhead, I have had the luxury to become less dependent on commissioned orders and able to us

dependent on commissioned orders and able to undertake more speculative pieces.

I do a lot of work in Koa. It is a hard wood to work with, because the grain goes in all directions. If you plane it like a piece of Maple, you can get terrible tear-outs. I am fortunate enough to have had the foresight to break the bank and purchase Koa, whenever I came across it. My wife thinks that I'm crazy, but I have seen too many of my woodworking friends scramble to find the wood, every time they get a commission for a Koa piece.

Having an engineering background, I get a lot of my inspiration from architecture. For example, the *Roots of Inspiration* (cover) was designed based on a bridge on the Hana Highway in Maui. Quite often, I get inspiration from the wood itself. A grain pattern or a curve can start a design concept that I can elaborate through sketches. The *Nihoniho* demi-lune scalloped hall table (upper left) began with one piece of Curly Koa that was wedge-shaped with a sapwood edge. After I resawed the wood into veneers, I laid out the pieces in a fan pattern and knew that I had to make a tabletop out of it. I use MDO plywood as my substrate, which works well with veneers.

When I work with clients, my design process includes sketches, and often a model, as a basis of discussion. Email has become so helpful in communicating. Some clients on the mainland, I


have never met. My website is a good source for business, though my most recent client found me in a local directory. And many of my pieces are for repeat customers.

One of my most recent commissions was the *Elliptical Dining Set*. When COVID began, I started to worry that I wouldn't get any work, and then this local guy calls me saying he wanted a 6-foot oval dining table with triangles. So, I designed and made this table and a follow-up order of six matching chairs (right).


NAVY SEEBEES CRAFT NEW V.P. DESK

Though the U.S. Navy Seabees may be better known for building bridges, constructing runways, and erecting barracks, they showed off their woodworking talents, by crafting a new executive desk for **Vice President Kamala Harris.**

This "heritage desk" was constructed, utilizing wood, cooper, and nails, reclaimed from the USS Constitution during two previous restorations. The USS Constitution is the Navy's oldest commissioned warship, having sailed since 1797. The desk features carvings of an eagle and stars, reminiscent of the Constitution's stern decorations.

A second desk, also, was built for the Navy secretary that not only includes materials from the *Constitution*, but from the frigate *Chesapeake*; battleships *Texas*, *New Jersey*, and *Arizona*; and sloop of war *Constellation*.





Movie theaters reopened from the Covid shutdown with a bang, as the premiere of the film *Godzilla vs. Kong* brought in \$285 million in worldwide box office receipts. Vietnamese artist **Duy Tran** celebrated the release of the new sci-fi film by creating a magnificent wooden sculpture, depicting the epic fight scene between Godzilla and Kong on the aircraft carrier.

GODZILLA VS. KONG CARVING

The sculpture (8" h, 14" w, 6" d) took ten days to complete, using chainsaw, power drill, and hand tool techniques. He also added fine details, from Godzilla's scales and the hair creases across Kong's body to background items scattered across the ship.


