# WHAT'S NEW

### **UPTICK IN STOLEN LUMBER**

Skyrocketing prices have spurred a surge in stolen lumber, from poaching timbers on Federal lands to stealing picnic benches and benches from parks in San Mateo, CA. No longer are tools and equipment the primary target at construction sites. With lumber prices more than tripling, wood thefts have similarly risen.

Reports are numerous. A man is accused of stealing \$1,600 in lumber from a Fresno, CA lumber yard, and in Aledo, TX, two men were arrested after being observed loading 29 sheets of plywood into a truck from a construction site at 2:30am. In Eagle Mountain, UT, \$1,300 in plywood was stolen from a home under construction, while \$5,000 in plywood was removed from a construction site in Denver. Even \$1,850 of 2x4s was taken from a Habitat for Humanity project site in New Jersey, and a man was caught cutting down Century-old Oak trees from a Civil War battle field in Georgia.

But these are small potatoes compared to what is happening in Canada. Besides similar cases at construction sites, trucks of building materials are being stolen. In Alberta, two trailers with \$80,000 of lumber were taken from a truck stop, but they were recovered with full loads.

Then, there is the case of the missing pile of fence posts in Saskatchewan. That crime was quickly solved when officers found beavers were using the posts to build a dam. No charges were filed.

Workers at job sites are being encouraged to limit materials to immediate needs and to store materials in locations difficult to access (such as on upper floors or under heavy objects). Consumers are advised to purchase wood from reliable sources, not from Craigslist where contraband has surfaced.

# Revisiting Bandsawn Veneers



With lumber prices soaring, this is an opportune time to revisit veneering. Over my series of articles (along with other examples in this publication), many applications utilizing veneers to enhance a project have been illustrated. Besides being able to maximize utilization of a highly figured board, veneering can open up a world of opportunities that are not easily accomplished with using solid wood. Such an example is curvilinear designs created through bent lamination.

The advantages of veneering are numerous. Primary is providing stability. Woodworkers are constantly challenged by wood's hygroscopic nature, which means its propensity to react to humidity levels. When it is dry, wood loses moisture and shrinks. When it is wet, wood takes on moisture and expands. Veneering wood onto a stable substrate, such as plywood or MDF (medium density fiberboard), eliminates wood movement problems

I qualify that because the ability of wood to move should not be underestimated. I have seen even veneers exert enough force to open glue lines, when glues that have not cured rigid have been used. Also, there are cost savings. The cost of an expensive board, when sliced into multiples, can be spread over several covered furniture parts.

You can purchase veneers from a variety of commercial

sources, and given the ease of shipping, you are not restricted to only local sources. However, I prefer to cut my own. The primary benefit is control over thickness. Most commercial veneers are only available in thicknesses of 1/32" to 1/40". These pieces require more care in handling, especially when it comes to sanding. They are just so easy to sand through. Cutting your own veneers provides the luxury of giving you extra material (say to 1/8") to prevent potential headaches down the line.

The key to bandsawing veneers is the set-up of your bandsaw. This has been the topic of many of my most popular classes. I even produced a video, *Bandsawn Veneers*, that provides insights into (1) ways to reduce vibration in your bandsaw, (2) tips for improving bandsaw fences, (3) the 10-steps to set-up your bandsaw to enable you to resaw

your own thick veneers, and (4) a demonstration of resawing exotic wood into sequential matches of veneers.

Things to consider are blade selection and preparation, bearing guide selection and set-up, blade tensioning and tracking, fencing, and drifting. The blades that I use are 1/2" wide with six teeth per inch and moderate set. I find these blades leave a smooth cut and a narrow kerf, about 1/32", which allows me to get six veneers per inch.

Many woodworkers can never understand why they can carefully set-up their bandsaws, but still can not cut straight. The problem is likely to be in the bandsaw blade itself. The manufacturing process for bandsaw blades is not as precise as tablesaw blades. Tablesaw blades have carbide teeth with a multitude of tooth designs and very accurate grinds. Bandsaw blades (that aren't carbide) can have slight differences in the "set" angle, as well as sharpness from left side of the teeth to the right. These nominal differences can result in a "drift" angle that is as much as +/- 5° to the left or right. Thus, the stock that you feed in may not, necessarily, cut straight to the blade.

The good news is that the drift is consistent, so you can compensate for it by adjusting the fence. I find the drift of each new bandsaw blade by taking a piece of scrap wood that is 2" thick and approximately 2 to 3-feet long and jointing one edge. Then after scribing a pencil line about 1/8" in parallel to that edge, I begin cutting it on the bandsaw, trying to follow the line. After cutting about one third of the board, I turn off the saw and hold the board firmly in position. Then, I take a bevel gauge and check the angle. Now, the angle of the fence can be set to match the angle of the bevel gauge. By using this technique, you can set your fence to the desired thickness of the veneer, say 1/8" or 1/32", and with care, successfully cut slice after slice of your own veneer.

I use a long straight fence to resaw veneer on the bandsaw, as opposed to a single point fence. Screwed to the fence is a tall auxiliary fence, made of two laminated 1"-thick sheets of Baltic Birch plywood, sanded to 320 grit and waxed. Offering additional support, I use a shop-made featherboard, made of stacked 2x4s, which apply consistent firm pressure to hold the board flat to the auxiliary fence.

A final reminder is to prepare your board by flattening both sides on a jointer. This all may seem a little overwhelming, but with practice (and with the help of my DVD), you could be cutting your own veneers in no time.

Furnituremaker **James Stadig** was quite ecstatic with the resawn <sup>3</sup>/<sub>32</sub>" thick Quilted Mahogany veneer that David sliced for him.



A board of rare Quilted Mahogany is positioned on David's 20" bandsaw. The board is 7' 8" long by  $11^{1/2}$ " wide by  $^{15}/_{16}$ " thick and will be resawn into thick veneers of  $^{3}/_{32}$ ". Roller stands support the board on the infeed and outfeed.



The board was supported by a tall and thick laminated auxiliary fence on the right, and a feather-board on the left, to provid consistent firm pressure to hold the board flat against the fence.



# Thoughts On Design

# by Christian Becksvoort



**Christian Becksvoort** is known as *That Shaker Guy*. Son of a cabinetmaker, he has been a professional woodworker for five decades, operating his own full-time studio, designing and crafting Shaker-style furnishings since 1986.

He gained a national recognition as a Master Craftsman through his nearly 130 articles published in *Fine Woodworking* magazine, and his five books, including *Shaker Legacy*, *With the Grain*, and *In Harmony with Wood*, as well as numerous published plans and project videos.

In his latest book *Shaker Inspiration*, he shares his woodworking knowledge and techniques, as well as insight into operating a successful one-man shop. In addition, he includes measured drawings for 13 of his own well-known furniture designs and seven Shaker pieces that he's reproduced. With permission of the publisher Lost Art Press, this essay is adapted from his chapter *On Design*.

Design is a more slippery topic than craftsmanship. A lifetime of merely following plans will make you a pretty decent woodworker, but not much of a designer. You've got to give some thought to what you are building, and why it's built this way. Engage mentally with your work. Why is this drawer at the bottom of the cabinet instead of at the top? Question, evaluate, compare.

One can certainly do worse than to follow or imitate historic pieces when designing furniture. I think that's how many of us got our start. With an open mind and a willingness to learn, we can gain tremendously from copying existing work. Subtle techniques, profiles, proportion, and a different way of observing can all leave impressions on us when copying good or great works from the past. Call it osmosis.

Eventually you, too, will be able to discern what makes a great design as opposed to something just ordinary. For example, in one of my previous jobs, I was called upon to make *Queen Anne* tables and chairs (Figure 1). It took a while to master the technique of creating a cabriole leg. It took even longer to distinguish the subtleties of a really good leg from a ho-hum, or disproportionate leg.

To this day, I have deep respect for the effort, craftsmanship, and design that goes into that style of furniture. However, I could never figure out why a chair or table leg would need an eagle claw grasping a cue ball. To put it another way, that style never spoke to me.

Shaker designs, on the other hand, got my immediate attention. I grew up with Scandinavian furniture in our home. It turns out that in 1927, a Shaker armed rocker found its way to Denmark, where it came to the attention of architect and designer **Kaare Klint**. While teaching at the Danish Royal Academy of Fine Arts, he had a drawing made of the chair and had students reproduce it. It was 10 years later that **Edward Deming Andrews'** book *Shaker Furniture: The Crafts-manship of an American Communal Sect* was published, and the Danes discovered the Shakers. The unembellished functionalism clearly struck a chord with them.

Designers such as **Børge Mogensen** and **Hans Wegner** were equally influenced by these designs. A Danish delegation actually visited the Hancock Shaker community and returned home impressed by the clean walls of drawers, peg boards, and trestle tables. Most historians consider Shaker furniture to be the first modern style furniture. As Hans Wegner noted, "There is much confusion today about what is modern, what is functional, and my hope always is that people will not be drawn to novelty, but will learn to value what is simple and pure in good design. And things should do the job they were designed for. I don't think that's asking

too much." Sound familiar? The Danes took the Shaker design and functionalism to heart, and began producing their version. In the 1960s, they sold it back to us as "Danish Modern."

#### **Function**

The biggest takeaway I've learned from studying, admiring, and restoring Shaker furniture is that it is first and foremost functional. "All beauty rests on utility" and "That which in itself has the highest use, possesses the greatest beauty." These Shaker proverbs perfectly state their design ethic, nearly a century before Louis Sullivan declared that "Form ever follows function."

These are words that I design by, that have served me well, that I still keep in mind each time a client wants a new piece. From a furniture maker or designer's point of view, that, I think, should be the first and foremost principle of design.

If you're predisposed to add your own ideas, a curve, a flair, a new texture or color, whatever, that's fine—as long as your take doesn't supersede or replace the primary function of the design: to be useful and functional.

### Design Elements

Design elements are merely a set of guidelines, principles, or standards that designers incorporate when coming up with a new idea. Each style of furniture has its own design elements, or distinctive characteristics, that immediately identify it as "that" style. For example, Arts & Crafts has its exposed and protruding tenons, corner braces, and, of course, dark quartersawn Oak.

Shaker has its mushroom knobs, unadorned drawers, straight lines, and light ladderback chairs. French Provincial is dripping with gingerbread, paint, and gilding. And Chippendale has the cabriole leg, shell carvings, and broken pediments. In working in any of these or other styles long enough, the elements become almost second nature, and part of your vocabulary. The more you study, practice and build, the more it all becomes part of your inherent sense of design.

Many woodworkers and designers start by copying other styles, a great way to learn. Eventually some develop their own vocabulary or voice. Sam Maloof, for example, was influenced early by Danish Modern, and soon developed his own take, his own style. George Nakashima had deep roots in the Japanese design tradition and was also influenced by the Shakers, but developed his own distinct design principles.

### Brainstorm Designing

I use what I call "brainstorm designing."
When a client wants a new piece, be it a music stand, bench, or room divider, I first make a list of requirements outlined by the client. Next, I take time to sketch out whatever comes into my mind. Pages of doodles. Any variation—no matter how wild, far out or impractical—is fair game. After a half-hour, or three or four pages of multitudes of diverse alternatives, I call it quits. Figure 2 shows the last page of a music stand brainstorm.



Figure 2 Brainstorm sketches of a potential music stand.





Then I start examining, eliminating, and combining ideas. Some are so far out in left field, as to be worthless. They get tossed. Others have a hint of possibility—a curve or other element that makes them worth a second look. A few may be really close.

I sketch out five or six possible options to send to the client. Figure 3 shows a few refined options for a standing mirror that I sent to customers. They'll either zero in on one design or want a combination of a few elements that they like from one or two others. Then, it's back to my drawing board to refine the design. This goes on until both the customer and I are satisfied and in agreement.

On occasion, it may become clear that the client and I are not on the same page. In other words, I won't go beyond my design elements, and they are clearly searching for something different. It may turn out that they want a ball-and-claw foot. I send them to a maker who is well-versed in that style. No need for me to re-invent the wheel. More often than not, however, we come to an agreement on one of my designs, and we get started.

Many of my designs have been a direct result of a singular design for a client. My signature 15-drawer chest (Figure 4), was such a design. The client, a collector, wanted "something about the size of a file cabinet, with lots of different size drawers." That design has been modified over the years, because I try to never build the same piece twice. The dimensions, proportions, layout, or method of construction get tweaked each time. It makes my daily routine more interesting, keeps me on my toes and my sense of design fresher.

#### **DESIGN OUTLINES**

Design outlines (or briefs, as they're sometimes called) are merely a list of requirements that a design must meet to be workable and acceptable. The client above, who wanted "something about the size of a file cabinet, with lots of different size drawers," knew exactly what he needed, but had no idea what it would look like. That's frequently the case with clients. The more information the client gives me, the easier it is for me to pinpoint what they are after, design-wise. A vague "something for the living room" doesn't give me a good starting point, but it can be a blessing.

The fewer the restrictions, the more opportunities for design expressions. Some requirements are critical, such as the dimensions of a piece that has to fit under a window, or how many people need to be able to sit at a table. That's helpful input and is welcome, while being non-restrictive from a designer's point of view.

Let's examine a Shaker ladderback chair with a design outline in mind. In my humble opinion, they are light, graceful, and quite

uncomfortable. Yet, they meet their design requirements perfectly: A chair you sit in for 20 minutes while eating, without talking, and when you're done, it gets hung on the wall (as seen on the book cover on Page 28). Perfect. Maybe not your criteria, but it best serves the purpose for which it was designed.

Many designers follow the golden ratio to proportion in their work. That's the ratio of 1:1.62. It's sometime called the "divine proportion," although it's not divine at all—it was actually theorized by the ancient Greeks. It is, however, a very pleasing rectangle. Many buildings, windows, frames, and furniture designs are proportioned by means of the golden ratio, also know by the Greek letter phi, or  $\Phi$ . If you're building a special piece, this is a great place to start your design process.

In my opinion, though, a whole room full of phi-proportioned cases is wicked boring. Apparently the Shakers thought so, too. Some of their case pieces are proportioned that way, but not many. Remember that function and utility were first and foremost in their design criteria, not beauty. Look at the *Shaker Tall Cupboard* (Figure 5); it's only 18 ½ (47 cm) wide, but more than 6 ½-foot (1.98 m) tall. It doesn't come close to that ratio, but it is a thing of beauty. It is tall, austere, and extremely functional for the space and purpose it was designed for. So, take the golden ratio with a grain of salt. You can't go wrong using it, but don't be limited by it.

A few words on proportion, and material thickness as it relates to the size of the piece being built. It takes a while to develop an eye for determining the correct thickness to incorporate into a given overall size. The tendency for most beginning woodworkers is to purchase 4/4 (2.54cm) stock,

mill it down to <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" (1.9 cm) and use that through out the entire project, no matter what its size. I've seen small boxes and minute cabinets that look clunky, because of the material being too heavy.

Likewise, large tabletops. An 8-foot (2.4m) or 10-foot (3m) table really wants to have a 1" (2.54cm) or even a 1 1/4" (3.2cm) top. As a general rule of thumb, the smaller the item, the more delicate the components, and the larger the pieces, the heavier the individual parts. When in doubt, look at items of similar size to see what thickness the parts are, in order to achieve overall harmony and the most pleasing proportions.

### Design Help

There are a few old resources that have served me well for decades. The first is the book *Architectural Graphic Standards*, from the American Institute of Architects. There are sections on standard furniture sizes, and a vast assortment of other dimensioned implements and devices. Another is *Humanscale 1/2/3*, by **Niels Diffrient** and **Alvin R Tilley.** Though out of print, it contains a *Seating Guide*, with such dimensions as seat height, seat length, seat width, seat angle, lumbar support, and thoracic support for people of various sizes.

My first encounter with actual Shaker pieces was at the 1973 Shaker Exhibit at the Smithsonian American Art Museum's Renwick Gallery in Washington, D.C.

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# Profile: Robert Seliger

"I am both a master wood craftsman and a fine art artist—an unusual combination."

War Vest Sofa Table Cherry (33" h, 65" w, 20" d) Robert Seliger of Bend, OR has been creating custom furniture for nearly 40 years. He views himself as an artist who works in wood, and he has attracted an international following. Here is Robert's story, in his own words:

Art has always been part of my life. Being raised in Aspen, CO, there was a pretty extensive arts program in the schools, and my drawings won national scholastic awards. I also had the pleasure of working with **Christo**, when he installed his *Orange Curtain* across a Colorado valley in 1972.

I became exposed to woodworking as an architecture student in college. I spent a summer as an apprentice to an architect in California, who wanted his draftsmen to experience handson construction. I spent the mornings designing and drawing and the afternoons cutting wood and pounding nails on one of his spec home projects. I loved that.

Seeing the direction that my life was going, a friend encouraged me to take a workshop with **Sam Maloof** at the Anderson Ranch Art Center. We hit it off, and I was fortunate to take five one-week workshops with him, which provided a lot of one-on-one attention. Though it would have been so easy to simply copy his work, his message was "develop your own techniques and style." It proved to be sound advice.

After college, I started my own company, designing and building homes. Besides managing a team of workers, I built the cabinet doors, which evolved into doing furniture pieces for those homes. When I moved to Oregon in 1990, I wanted total control of my work. I converted a two-story barn into my studio to just focus on furniture.

My designs are contemporary interpretations of traditional Western furniture, with French-country and Asian influences. I am very observant, and I capture mental images of details of interest that I see in nature, in media, or in other pieces of furniture. I let them percolate in my mind, and later explore them through a series of sketches. I draw well, and architecture school, particularly, taught me proportion, which is critical in furniture.



Sometimes, inspiration comes through visions. The design of my *War Vest* table (left) came to me in a dream of a Native American chief going into battle with a war vest on his chest.

I love flowing lines and curves. It might be the centerpiece, such as in the *Midgard Table* (upper right) or just a slight flair at the end of a straight line, as in the *Singapore Altar* (far right).

Sometimes, the design is client-driven. They may have a specific request or may ask for something similar to a piece that I've already made. An example is a client in Singapore wanted a furniture piece to display an 800-year-old gong, given to him at his retirement. The result was my *Sho Gong Credenza* design (left), which featured hand-carved dragons and exotic Mappa burl drawers. It is the most spiritual piece that I have ever made.

I don't do production. Every piece is unique; even pieces in a series are tweaked. I like to say that I create furniture to fit the client "like a custom-made Italian shoe." And each client receives a signed drawing.

Many of my pieces are embellished with carved elements, using relief carving. I lay a full-size drawing on a board and start removing material around the drawing. It takes time, but it is well worth the effort. If you can draw, you can carve.

My altar pieces typically depict mountain ranges carved across the drawers, with an additional carved element on the sides, as I did with the *Cascade Altar* (cover).

I also take great pride in my finishes. Most of my finishes are 8-12 step processes. Everything is stained, sealed, and glazed, with a very clear top coat. Most are oil-based. My crackle finishes—which **Ralph Lauren** considers the finest in the world—layer oil-based glazes on top of latex-based stains.

A major turning point was exhibiting at the 2015 Western Design Conference (WDC) in Jackson Hole, WY. Awarded First Place for my War Vest table provided broad visibility. WDC has proven to be a great market for me, both in terms of selling everything I show and generating a ton of future commissions. It even lead to developing a clientele in Russia.


They love Western art; they can't get enough of it.

I produce 75-130 pieces a year with the help of my wife, Kathy (a finishing artist), and one studio apprentice. I love everything I do. It's exciting to come into my shop every day and get to work. It's what I dreamt of doing when I started my career as a furniture maker. I simply follow Sam Maloof's advice: "Build the pieces you want to build for yourself. If they're good, they will sell."

#### **WOOD FRAMING AT VENICE BIENNALE**

The U.S. pavilion—at this year's *Venice Architecture Biennale* (thru Nov. 21) in Venice, Italy—celebrates the building tradition of wood framing in American architecture. This unique construction method evolved in early America, when settlers, moving West, took advantage of the cheap abundance of Southern Pine and Douglas Fir, without needing extensive carpentry joinery skills.

Entitled American Framing, this exhibition begins with a 4-story wooden skeleton facade entrance to the pavillion grounds, featuring traditional American residential elements of dormers, gables, and a porch. Inside, the history of wood framed construction is explored through models, furniture, and photographs.

Often overlooked, architects **Paul Preissner** and **Paul Andersen** wanted to showcase what underlies 90% of American residental construction.



#### SALVAGED PLYWOOD FOR ARTWORK

During last summer's protests, many businesses protected their storefront windows with plywood. Now with life returning to normal, much of that plywood has been removed, as stores reopen.


Not to waste, **Neil Hamamoto** of the New York City's nonprofit Worthless Studios has been collecting this used wood and distributing it to artists, to create public art projects to exhibit in city parks across NYC's five boroughs.

All of the five works installed this Spring address themes from 2020. Set designer **Tony DiBernardo's** *Open Stage* installation at the Alice Austen House on Staten Island (right) is dedicated to the loss experienced by performers with the closure of theaters. "Taking away our stage is taking away our art," explains Tony.

#### \$8.5 MILLION FOR FOLDING CHAIR

A rare 17th century Chinese Folding Horseshoe-Back Jiaoy (left) has set a world record, selling for over \$8.5 million in an auction at Christie's Hong Kong in June. It nearly doubled the auction price for a similar chair in 2018.

These Jiaoys evolved from the "huchang" folding stools carried on horseback for millennia by the Mongols. The Chinese name "huchang" (meaning "barbarian bed") illustrates that the hostility between these two cultures goes back many, many centuries.

When introduced to China during the Han dynasty (206 BCE to 220 CE), these seats became an important identifier of rank, as they could be easily transported by servants to provide comfort for their masters at public meetings and on hunting trips. Thus, they were known as "Hunter's chairs."


Their symbolism was incorporated into the Chinese language, as the most honored seat in a public meeting is called "the first folding chair."



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
