

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

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Given that schedules are in flux, confirmation of activities listed in this issue is highly recommended.

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


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

Woodworking Observations

Labor shortages are greatly impacting our economic recovery. The reasons why people are not returning to their pre-COVID employment are numerous, from health concerns to job reassessment. For woodworking, this is a more appropriate discussion for the industrial publications that cater to a corporate readership. However, there are incidences of woodworkers giving up their shops for occupations offering more job security—in terms of salaries and benefits—and less self-reliance.

One factor rarely mentioned is retirement. Even before COVID, there have been grumblings among my peer group about cutting back and/or finding some other pursuits. They have reached, or are approaching, the magic age of 70, when collecting social security kicks in, withdrawal for retirement accounts is required, health issues begin to consume significant time, and we begin to admit to physical limitations. It is only coincidental that this movement is taking place in the age of COVID.

In our field, this is the second wave of studio woodworkers. They matured in the 1970s and choose to live a creative lifestyle. They were inspired by the work of Sam Maloof and George Nakashima. They found their voice by reading the books of James Krenov and articles of lan Kirby in Fine Woodworking. They rejected corporate career paths to apprentice with Art Espenet Carpenter, or, at least, chose woodworking as an outlet for relaxation.

In this issue, there are several examples, including Christian Brispere from Woodworkers Emporium in Las Vegas (page 10) and Peter Korn from the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship (page 11). Even Gary Rogowski in Portland is taking his school in a less strenuous direction (pages 32-33).

Another case is our long-time columnist **David Marks**, who has been slow to recover from knee surgery. I value his 16 years of contributions to this publication, and look forward to see his future artistic work, as he steps back from teaching.

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
ARTFUL ORNAMENTS





WHAT'S NEW

BEWARE OF ONLINE TOOL SCAMS

There have been lots of reports of phony woodworking tool websites, many pretending to be manufacturer-direct sellers. **Milwaukee Tool** warns customers that they do not sell direct. Other websites may pretend to be retailers, offering major discounts with some sort of pricing deadline. Milwaukee says if the deal is too good to be true, it probably is. At best, you might receive a knockoff product or just a stolen credit card number.


It is recommended to only deal with authorized distributors. Many manufacturers will have lists of authorized dealers on their websites. Milwaukee also has set up a webpage to report fraudulent websites—www.milwaukeetool.com/support/fraudulent-site/. They request the website address and a screenshot.

If you are a victim of a tool scam, notify your bank or credit card company, as quickly as possible. If the transaction is already processed, you can, at least, block any future charges. And if you get contacted by the scammers for an incomplete transaction or other requests, do not engage. Don't give them any personal or bank information, and definitely do not give them your social security number. Just hang up.

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WOODWORKERS EMPORIUM CLOSES

For 41 years, **Woodworkers Emporium** in Las Vegas has been serving woodworkers in Southern Nevada and beyond with the finest woodworking tools and accessories. A student of **John Nyquist, Christian Brisepierre** opened a custom furniture shop in 1980 and sold a sampling of woodworking hand tools and some Imported European Hardware. As the Las Vegas market expanded, so did the store, becoming the largest woodworking machinery dealer in the region in its 12,000 sq. ft. retail store. Christian also was influential in the growth of woodturning, both in the local area and nationally.

Wanting to retire, Christian and Jeri closed the physical space on Sept. 30, but will continue to operate on-line, selling woodturning products and other remaining inventory. The virtual storefront is: www.woodworkersemporium.com/.

THE LUMBER PRICE SEESAW

The decline in lumber prices over the summer has come to a screeching halt. After a drop of more than 75% from the high in May to August, prices again have risen to nearly double from that low point. Some are blaming the DIY and residential market returning from vacation; others blame low supplies from sawmills, which cut production during last summer's price drop. Though the cost of lumber is expected to rise further, an equilibrium of supply and demand maybe reached by the end of the year, preventing the astronomical prices of last Spring.




PETER KORN'S RETIREMENT EXHIBIT

Peter Korn, the *Founder* and *Executive Director* of the **Center for Furniture Craftsmanship (CFC)** in Rockport, ME is retiring at the end of 2021. A furnituremaker since 1974, he was *Program Director* at the **Anderson Ranch Art Center** in Snowmass, CO for six years and an Adjunct Associate Professor at **Drexel University** in Philadelphia, PA for four years.


CFC was originally begun, in 1993, as a summer program, in the barn behind Peter's house. It moved to its present location in 1996 and became a non-profit in 1999. Under Peter's leadership, the program expanded into a full-year program, with a four-building campus of fully-equipped woodworking and woodturning studios, gallery, and library. In 2019, the school had 399 course enrollments from 40 states and 9 foreign countries.

Peter is the author of Woodworking Basics: Mastering the Essentials of Craftsmanship (Taunton Press, 2003), The Woodworker's Guide to Hand Tools (Taunton Press, 1998), and Why We Make Things and Why It Matters (David R. Godine, 2015). His award-winning furniture has been exhibited nationally in galleries and museums. 

2021 FROGWOOD COLLABORATIVE

The *Frogwood Collaborative* in Oregon returned as an inperson event in August, though downsized to only 30 participants for public health concerns. Initiated by the **Pacific Northwest Woodturning Guild** in 2007 as a local weekend activity, it has evolved into its own organization, attracting multimedia artisans from around the world for 5-days of collaboration and creativity. It is a venue to explore the fusion of woodworking with metals, fibers, glass, and other media to create one-of-a-kind art works


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Tools & Techniques

The Boutique Toolmakers

by David Heim



Looking for gift ideas for your favorite woodworker or yourself? Check out **David Heim's** new book *Saws*, *Planes*, *and Scorps* (216 pages, 318 color images, \$27.50 hardcover).

He provides a glimpse into the world of hand tool makers, by profiling some 70 boutique makers of woodworking hand tools and accessories. He discusses their motivation for their careers, their products, and their processes of manufacturing.

This essay provides an overview of the book, highlighting a sample of the featured makers. The book is available direct from the publisher Princeton Architectural Press at www.papress.com and other retail and on-line distributors.

David Helm is a trained journalist, who worked for Consumer Reports and Fine Woodworking magazines. He has previously published SketchUp Success for Woodworkers, and teaches on-line Introduction to SketchUp classes through the Austin School of Furniture (www.austinschoolof furniture.com). When I was a very young boy in the early 1950s, my father owned a small machine shop. As I recall, it had a vertical milling machine, a drill press, a couple of metal lathes, and a powered hacksaw, plus acetylene torches and an arc welder. The place smelled of old grease, hot steel, and oily dust.

To a six-year-old kid, it was a wondrous place. I remember once being allowed to use one of the lathes, advancing the cutter to make ribbons of shiny, curly shavings. Like many other wondrous places, though, it wasn't meant to last. My father lost the shop in a fire.

Fast-forward 60 years. I tried my hand at being a toolmaker. I hit on a device for people who wanted to turn wood-bodied pens on a lathe. Most pen-turning equipment holds the wood on a metal shaft called a mandrel, which fits in the lathe's headstock; the tailstock is advanced to squeeze the free end of the mandrel, keeping it centered. Squeeze too much and the mandrel will flex slightly, forcing the wood out of alignment. I figured out a way to keep the mandrel in tension, so it wouldn't flex. Thus was born *The Better Pen Mandrel*.

Despite my early upbringing, I'm no machinist. I found a couple of local shops to make the parts. All I had to do was package the orders, cash the checks, and watch my fortune grow. Or so I thought.

The product itself was the least of it. Marketing my mandrel meant setting up a business with a website, a PayPal account, a bank account, a business license, a sales-tax license, and a fat liability-insurance policy. It meant hiring Legal Zoom to file a patent application. It meant contacting the editor of every woodturning magazine and website that I could find, imploring them to give my mandrel a review. But most of all, it meant answering a constant stream of questions from potential customers and trying to troubleshoot problems (real or imagined) that they had. After a couple of years of very modest sales, I called it quits.

So as you can see, I'm neither a machinist nor a good businessman. Consequently, I have nothing but unconditional admiration for independent toolmakers. They are highly skilled craftsmen and women who take no shortcuts and put the highest premium on quality and precision. They know how to marry high-performance metals with exotic hardwoods to create beautiful tools that also work beautifully.

They are visionaries who are determined to take a venerable tool and make it better or to create unique tools that sidestep tradition. Most of these makers are also social-media maestros, with beautiful websites, robust Instagram accounts, Facebook pages, and YouTube channels that attract large numbers of followers.

Saws, Planes, and Scorps is not meant to be a hand-tool encyclopedia. Rather, this book represents one woodworker's celebration of splendid, high-quality tools—the output from what I consider the best woodworking hand-tool makers active in North America, Great Britain, Australia, and New Zealand. There are fine toolmakers in other parts of the world, of course, particularly in Japan—but that is a seperate book, in itself.

When I began working on this book, I quickly realized that not all toolmakers are created equal. Some—namely Lie-Nielsen Toolworks, Lee Valley and Veritas Tools, Bridge City Tool Works, and Woodpeckers—began as independent makers and, with their successes, have grown and expanded to become essentially factories with outstanding quality control, producing catalogs of fine tools.

Thomas Lie-Nielsen says his motivation to become a toolmaker was encounters with customers, when he worked for tool seller Garrett Wade. "Guys would come in and complain that they don't make tools like they used to. We also got a lot of people who were looking for a Stanley tool that was no longer made. . . So I thought, why not make these tools, but with better materials, thicker blades, flatter soles, and tight tolerances on moving parts."

Bridge City Tool Works was started by furnituremaker and woodshop teacher John Economaki, who turned to toolmaking after discovering that he was allergic to wood dust. Beginning with a try square, his objective was to make better tools than what was available. "The woodworking squares were crap. They cost \$2. We did a Rosewood and brass square and charged \$45. The response was literally unbelievable."

However, most of the 70 or so makers are simply 1- or 2-person shops with singular focus. I tell the story of each, organized by tool types. The text and images introduce the makers who produce the tools that I consider the most distinctive, showing how they fabricate their tools, explaining how they decided to start their businesses, and noting what keeps them motivated.

Here are brief introductions to a small sampling of the makers profiled in my book:

Work Benches

Benchcrafted in Cedar Rapids, IA is a family-run business, making fully assembled Roubo-style work benches and innovative bench vises. "We're motivated by one thing: making the best, most satisfying things we can." Their hardware is utilized by many other work bench makers.

Period furnituremaker **Frank Strazza** of Austin, TX approaches bench-making as a work of art. Not only does he mix light and dark woods, but adorns the work station with attractive joinery, inlays, and marquetry. He admits his Roubo benches "are a little over the top, but maybe they will inspire a woodworker to do good work."

Measuring & Marking

Dave Jeske of Blue Spruce Toolworks in Portland, OR was an engineer working on such projects as submarine missile systems. Frustrated with the quality of woodworking marking knives, he started a side business making them, marketed solely by posting images on an early Internet woodworking forum, *Neanderthal Haven*. He later expanded his product line to try squares, bevel gauges, and miter squares, before selling his business to Woodpeckers in 2019.

Kevin Glen Drake of Glen-Drake Toolworks in Fort Bragg, CA began his toolmaking career out of dissatisfaction. He became infuriated with the marking gauge that he was using, finding it "too hard to adjust." After throwing it into the street, he designed his own version with a micro-adjustable gauge and sold them to College of the Redwoods students. He got a major push when the tool was picked up by Lie-Nielsen for their catalog.

Hand Saws

Shane Skelton of **Skelton Saws** in England makes a range of handsaws, based on Georgian designs. "I found that I couldn't buy a saw that would cut straight the way I wanted. So, I decided to have a go at making saws." Working alone in his garage, he makes eight saws a month. "I am the only person in the world making saws of this quality," he declares.

Mark Harrell of Bad Axe Tool Works in Superior, WI began by restoring and sharpening old saws to sell on Ebay, before deciding to make handsaws from scratch. "If someone who uses one of our saws isn't smiling by the end of the cut, we haven't done our job."

Hand Planes

A master of wood-bodied planes is **Larry Williams** of **Old Street Tool** in Eureka Springs, AR. He is widely acknowledged as the force behind the renewed interest in 18th Century planes. "They are like sports cars. They have better proportions. They fit your hand better. You're not struggling with the plane and can focus on your work." As a testament of his tools, more than 300 Old Street planes are used in the woodshops at Colonial Williamsburg.

In contrast, modern hand planes have taken a more contemporary design. Hobbyist woodworker Konrad Sauer of Sauer & Steiner Toolworks in Canada was a graphic artist. When he found that vintage infill planes were expensive and hard to find, he decided to make his own. Teaming up with friend Joel Steiner, they began designing planes of steel and Rosewood. His goal has been to improve ergonomics, while being aesthetically pleasing. "I gave the body curves because curves are sexy as hell."

Hammers & Axes

Old Soldier Toolworks in Canada was founded by a trio of Canadian Army veterans, with a shared love of blacksmithing. The company's first tools were marking knives and workbench holdfasts, before expanding

their line to hammers and chisels. Most of their hammers are customized orders, with options for shape, weight, handle length, and materials.

Brent Bailey of Brent Bailey Forge in Orland, CA was working nights at a bar, when he got an interest in blacksmithing. His desire to learn lead to training in Zimbabwe and Mozambique and teaching assignments in Peru, Australia, and South Africa. Returning back to California, he undertook ornamental work, but with the birth of his son, he needed to become more of a business. Today, he specializes in hammers and hatchets.

Chris Kuehn of Sterling Tool Works in Mobile, AL makes unique plane hammers. "I was watching a plane maker make these beautiful planes, but he was using a butt-ugly plane hammer. I said 'Your hammer needs to be as functional and as beautiful as your planes." So, he went off to design an attractive plane hammer of brass and wood.

Spokeshaves

Chairmaker **Caleb James** of Greenville, SC branched off into the spokeshave tool business after seeing a demo by Windsor chairmaker **Peter Galbert**. "I've always had an issue with a spokeshave making a small radius. On a Windsor chair, there's a part of the seat with a tight radius curve. Nothing gets in there properly. So I kept tweaking the design, and one day I got it." His spokeshave works on curves as little as 1 ½" radius. "The feel is a natural carving action, much like using a carving gouge."

Russ Filbeck of San Diego, CA got the chairmaking bug, after taking classes from **Brian Boggs** and **Mike Dunbar**. To facilitate his work, he started making his own spokeshaves out of exotic hardwoods. To eliminate wrist stress and torque, he moved the handles in line with the cutter, so the tool doesn't roll.

<u>Knives</u>

Similar to many others, **Gil Drake** of **Drake Knives** in Arlington, WA entered the knife business out of frustration. "I had trouble finding tools that would hold an edge and that weren't super expensive. So I decided to try making my own. I took them to several knife shows and sold them out of a little tackle box for a while." His product line has since grown to 41 tools.

And a Last Word. . .

This book also includes profiles of those who have influenced today's toolmakers. One such figure is **Ron Hock** of Hock Tools in Fort Bragg, CA. For more than 30 years, he has been making some of the finest plane irons, supplying individuals and other toolmakers. If you ever purchase a vintage Stanley plane, you will certainly want to replace the old iron with one from Hock Tools.

As I said earlier, this book is not meant to be a comprehensive directory. I apologize to anyone whose work I omitted. That was more of an oversight, than a snub.







Education:

NW Woodworking Studio

Sorting out the inventory for the Moving Sale.



The Northwest Woodworking Studio (NWS) in Portland, OR has transitioned to a fully virtual curriculum. Given the impact of COVID on in-person classes, Gary Rogowski draws upon years of conducting his *Distance Mastery Study* and on-line lectures and discussion sessions to offer instruction over the internet.

Last year, the new *Online Mastery Program* was introduced, attracting 35 students. "The Oompa, as we call it, was successful beyond belief," explains Gary. "This is where I want to put my focus: on students excited about learning, exchanging ideas, and working on design. I will do this now online, as students won't have the stress of travel in these times, and my reach is greater."

With a new session scheduled for November, the *Online Mastery Program* is a 2-year, part-time, on-line course, focusing on the traditions, skills, and techniques for designing and building special furniture pieces. Applicable to self-directed and motivated students, real time lectures, special topic videos, and Q&A sessions supplement hands-on experience at the bench—designing and constructing a total of 11 quality pieces. With limited enrollment, personal attention is provided by one-on-one talks with the instructor and past Mastery students.

Open to all skill levels (except raw beginners), applicants must be able to work to a schedule and project deadlines, while building out of their own shop. They also must have the ability and flexibility to receive their instruction and critiques online. Students will need a camera in their shop at the bench and a DSL hookup or good Wi-Fi signal in order to participate.

The goal is to produce great pieces that could sit in any gallery or room in your home. Projects have been chosen to teach certain methods, techniques, and approaches, while at the same time allowing each student to explore his or her own signature style.

Downsizing the Studio

This new model of instruction does not require the 10,000 sq. ft. shop that served as the NWS home for the past 15 years. So, Gary held a moving sale and relocated to a smaller space of 600 sq. ft.

"During the final days of my move out of the Studio, it felt a bit more like a siege than a relocation. In the process, I found things that I never knew I had or had forgotten that I still did—from partially completed projects to molding planes and more molding planes. And, there were jars and jars of screws and bolts and chains, found next to vise parts and lamps and discarded router bits. I didn't need a third of this stuff. I had become a hoarder of wood and screws and fans and motors. 'I might need that,' I would say to myself, and so I kept it because I had the space. Now, I had to get rid of things."

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In the move, he discovered the impact that NWS has had. "Many folks came by to find a treasure, a tool, a memento, perhaps of days passed. Other students came by simply to talk and share a reminiscence, or they bought something just to help me move one less thing out the door. Then, there were strangers who came to thank me for being open for the past 20 years, or they wished out loud that they had taken a class. JJ had to point out to me that I had touched a lot of folks' lives." Gary would like to point out that they touched his life more.

Looking Back at the High Points

"I have great memories of teaching at the Studio," says Gary. "To share what I know has always been the gift for me. To see folks grow and go off on their own is a joy. The pay wasn't great, but the time sure was."

Among the warm memories was the *Design Open Houses*. "These chats offered a necessary balance to the grind of hours at the bench on a project. They stimulated new ideas, both in terms of design concepts and methods of execution. Woodworkers are not all block heads."

Teaching high school students in the *WIN* program provided satisfaction, frustration, and fun. "This venture was wrapped up in my vision to create a school in the Pacific Northwest that was a cultural phenomenon. It didn't come to the acme of fruition that I desired. I envisioned a Studio with a *Mastery Program*, an ongoing high school program, working with veterans in construction education, building *Tiny Houses*, a sawmill and forestry program, as well as ongoing classes. This was all so people could see the value of education from source to different end points. Having a vision isn't enough. I needed support and someone more adept than I at raising money. So the non-profit will close."

"Being able to transform my business of design and building one-of-a-kind pieces of furniture into teaching and talking has been a gift. It remains a gift. I am lucky to have chosen a path that has allowed this kind of freedom. It is seldom found in other walks of life. But then, I'm a hard head, a peripatetic, and full of energy. So what else could I have done?"

Future Plans

In addition to the *Mastery Program*, on-line individual classes, lectures, and workshops will be offered in the future. "Last Spring, our first on-line *Build Along Session* of constructing a *Floating-Top Table* was great fun. Early next year, we will offer another, making a *Jasmine Jewelry Box*—after I get settled and get the *Online Mastery Program* back on track."




Michael Palace of Sonoma, CA is an artist, whose medium is wood. Using recycled and salvaged wood, his work pays tribute to the trees that once lived. Here is Michael's story, in his own words:

With my childhood in the Seattle area, I was raised among the trees. My family would routinely go out hiking, and we would identify all the birds, the trees, and the plants. My parents, in fact, built our house around a tree.

My education was in painting and drawing. I did that professionly for a number of years, with gallery representation in Scottsdale,

Seattle, and Denver. But I was not making enough money, so I started working as a carpenter and proceeded to get my contractors license.

On these jobs, I found wood being discarded that I didn't think was garbage. I took pieces home and made things, which found a market. Looking around, I realized that additional materials were readily available from trees destined for landfills or firewood. At this point, I dedicated my life to making beautiful

things from recycled and urban logs. In rare instances that I use exotic woods, they were either given to me or recycled, such as Mahogany from a salvaged church pew.

Much of my work is commissions for specific needs. It could be a simple chair for a client's wife with severe dementia to match the house's decor to a Nakashima dining set to replace one lost in the recent Sonoma County wildfires. The latter project consisted of an 11-foot live-edge table with 10 Conoid chairs, made from a Redwood tree that we were able to salvage from the fire.

But my greatest fulfillment comes from creating speculative art pieces. At first, this was largely showing reverence for a life once lived, where the features of the tree are apparent. Using wood like a paint palette, I would contrast colors and emphasize grain and defects. *Temple of Earth* (left) is an example, even incorporating the tree's exterior for a coral-like effect.

Later, I began asserting my own personality, through manipulation by working the wood. Initially, it would be incorporating painting onto the work, such as butterflies on *Fragile as a Forest* (above), but more recently, it has been hand carving, from the flowing waves on Gates of Earth (below) to the piercing forms on *Erosion of Earth* (on the cover).

When I build something, the structure is secondary. Certainly, it needs to be functional and strong, but I am more concerned about the aesthetic statement: how it looks, the fact that it has personality, and that it looks like a piece of artwork, rather than just a piece of furniture.

Besides tables and cabinets, I have given a lot of thought to chairs. What bothered me about wood chairs is that when you sit back, the wood hits your spine. Bicycle seats leave a gap in the center to reduce pressure, so I thought why not do the same thing with a chair. The result was the Split Back Chair (upper left), which has no material down the center. Its like two hands holding your back, without touching your spine. During the pandemic slowdown, I made another alternative comfortable chair design, which I am calling Chair Personified (lower left).

I know that I'll never get rich woodworking. As long as I have enough money to pay my bills, I get to do what I enjoy. That is what fulfills me; that is what makes my life rich. OUT OF BOUNDS: THE ART OF CROQUET

As daylight hours wane and temperatures become frigid, we can hold onto memories of summer with a visit to *Out of Bounds: The Art of Croquet.* This "striking" exhibition of artist-made mallets and balls had opened the year at the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship's (CFC) Messler Gallery in Rockport, ME and was recently on display at the Center for Wood Art in Philadelphia, PA.

Curated by **Jennifer-Navva Milliken**, Artistic Director at the Center for Art in Wood, and furniture maker **Silas Kopf**—both amateur devotees of the sport—the exhibition features works by 21 artists, invited to take part based on their demonstrated commitment to sculpture and design in the material of wood. Responding to the game, its history and impact on pop culture, and formal aspects of the croqueterie, these works explore a wide range of topics—from personal artistic concerns to contemporary



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


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
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
