The passing of **Leo Doyle** also has come to my attention. He ran the Studio Art Woodworking Program at California State University at San Bernardino and was a painter, furnituremaker, and turned wood artist. His Sugar Bowl was the cover photo on our first issue of this publication in 1988 (above). It is fitting to remember him on the start of our 35th year.



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RECENT WORK

Every now and then, we like to showcase some outstanding work by our WoodCentral members and visitors. Here are four examples of some inspiring pieces posted on our message boards in recent days.



Jack Guzman (ME) Windsor Chair

This chair is one of **Curtis Buchanan's** designs. He calls it Patra's Chair. The seat is made from White Pine, the spindles are Red Oak, and all the other parts are Hard Maple. It has two features that differentiate it from other chairs that I build: the posts are mortised into the bottom of the crest and the wide cove in the post and leg turnings. The false miter is created after assembly with a saw, chisel, and rasp.

Alan Young (MI) Music Stands

About six years ago, I was commissioned to design and build a pair of music stands for the Salmagundi Club, a prestigious art society in New York City. The stands are made of Sapele and brass, and the finish is black lacquer. My goal was to create a look that might be reflective of the American composer Henry Mancini. Elegance, flair, and stability were my motivations for the aesthetics and form. All the brass details were machined in my shop, including the G-and-F clef features on the pull pins. The rack can be articulated and locked in any of four angle settings.

Andrew Ziny (CO) Altar Chairs The two altar chairs are made of Maple and stained. The larger *Priest's* Chair has four decorative onyx panels, representing the four gospels, glued to 3/4" plywood panels inset in the back frame. The seat is

stone, with a very sturdy understructure to eliminate any possibility of torsion breaking the stone. There are 3" x 3" onyx squares in aid in the tops of the back legs and in the arms, where the priest rests his hands. The smaller Deacon's Chair has a simple floating-panel back.



This Windsor-style settee has a Cherry seat and turnings, with an arm hoop and spindles of White Oak. The continuous arm was split from an 8-ft. log section, then riven and sawn to a 2" x 3" blank. It was shaped with a drawknife and spokeshaves, prior to steaming. The seat was carved with a Kutzall disk on an angle grinder. The hoop and spindles were hand-shaped with spokeshaves after drying. Hide glue was used for its longer open time.

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
TURNER MEMORIUM

In the waning weeks of 2021, the woodturning community lost two of its pioneers:

Lincoln Seitzman spent 35 years in the garment industry. winning many fashion design awards. After retirement in 1981,

he developed an interest in woodworking, making furniture and eventually segmented turnings. He was the pioneer of the "basket illusion" technique. Initially, he used "polychromatic assembly" to emulate the





wood pieces. Later, a similar look was created using ink and paint, which was popularized by David Nittmann and is a frequently used technique today. His

work resides in many prominent collections, including the Smithsonian American Art Museum and the Center for Art in Wood. Lincoln was 98.

Jack Straka worked in the electronics industry for 18 years, until taking a 2-day woodturning workshop in England in 1972. He guit his job, moved to Hawaii, and became a full-time woodturner, producing utilitarian items from native Hawaiian woods. He inspired and mentored many local turners and helped organize the Big Island Woodturners Club, serving as it's first president. He also developed Eldon Redhorn's concept of a chucking system into an inexpensive reversing chuck—known as the "Straka Chuck"—for wider usage. Jack's work has been widely exhibited, including a piece in the collection of the Smithsonian American Art Museum. Jack was 87.

2022 DESIGN IN WOOD

After a 2-year COVID hiatus, the *Design In Wood* exhibition is poised to return as part of the San Diego County Fair, June 8-July 4. This 39th showcase is among the largest woodworking competitions in the U.S., drawing entries from across the country and viewed by over 1.5 million fair visitors.

More than 350 entries are expected in 26 competition categories: Contemporary (furniture, accessories), Traditional (furniture, accessories), Art Furniture, Woodturning (face work, spindle, segmented, embellished/mixed media), Chairs, Veneer & Marquetry (furniture, art, laser/CNC), Made for Children, Model Building (scale, not-to-scale), Musical Instruments, Clocks, Scrollsaw (intarsia, fret work), and Woodcarving (animals, birds, marine animals, human form, open).

Some 90 prizes, totaling over \$20,000, will be at stake in category and overall awards, including *Best of Show* and the *Theme Award* of *Heroes Re-Unite*. Entry deadline is April 29. Entry forms and information will be available mid-January at the website: www. sdfair.com.

The Completed Ocean Sculpture

David Marks has been a studio furniture maker in Santa Rosa, CA for over 40 years and was the host of the popular woodworking television series *WoodWorks* on the DIY network. He also has been a contributor to *Woodworker West*, since 2004

Over many past issues, I have chronicled the progress on my latest commission, *Ocean*. Begun in 2017, this is a 36" diameter by 8" deep domed wall sculpture of Quilted Mahogany veneer, with an underwater scene of inlaid fish and kelp. Now that it is finished, I want to share the completed piece.

It was a very difficult journey, with countless obstacles in the way. I had turned a "shell" from void free high quality plywood (appleply) and used urea resin glue to ensure stability. When it came time to veneer it, the obstacles presented themselves rapidly. I had to make paper templates of my veneer stock, as I had bandsawn a 4-foot board of Quilted Mahogany into ¹/₁₆" thicknesses and had just enough to cover the front and back edge with very little left over.

I also quickly realized that my vacuum press wasn't up to the task. After much trial and error, I discovered that Vacuum Pressing Systems, in Maine, sells a new bag design, which has a zipper. This was a life saver, because now I could assemble the pieces of veneer over the dome with the glue applied and taped in place, and simply pull the other half of the bag over it and zipper it closed!

The veneers had to bend over a compound curve, and I quickly determined that the 6" wide board that I had sawn up had to be split into 3" widths or less, in order to handle the pressure and not crack over the curves.

I also learned that in order to achieve enough pressure, I had to make individual plattens the exact size of each veneer. For that I used $^1/s$ " thick bending Poplar plywood that I covered in clear packing tape, in order to prevent the glue from sticking to it. To ensure that the air pressure was able to uniformly press each platten down onto the entire surface of each veneer, I cut and double-stick taped breather mesh to cover each one.

Now, you might be asking yourself "how did he cut the joints?" The answer is "very carefully," haha. I glued the first veneer down and allowed the Unibond 800 to cure overnight, using a heated blanket. The next day, I used a router freehand to remove the bulk of the glue, then removed the rest with a chisel.

Next, I hand fitted the matching veneer as close as I could, using a bandsaw and hand sanding. I temporarily attached it with double stick tape, as close as possible to the first veneer. I usually got them within a $^{1}/_{32}$ " gap or so, sometimes there was as much as a $^{1}/_{16}$ " gap and that's ok.

My thought was to develop a system to cut through both veneers simultaneously, while they were attached to the domed compound curving surface. I needed to do this because they will only fit when cut in place over the curves. When laid out flat and cut straight, they become different shapes when pressed down to a domed surface. I used a small router with a 1/8" downcut carbide spiral bit, while using a fence to guide it.

This was the spooky part, because everything had to be held in place accurately, but temporarily. My fences were made from 1/8" bending Poplar plywood and attached with very strong cloth backed double stick tape. I also discovered that each fence had to be made to match each changing radius, as I moved away from the center towards the ends.

Eventually, I managed to cover the entire face and back edge with the veneer. Now, it was time for the inlay. I looked through books that had images of fish, and I searched the Internet until I had a stack of photocopies to inspire me.

One of my biggest concerns was in trying to create a final picture, where the pieces came together, and they looked like they were in the correct proportions and were somehow balanced. I did this by taking photocopies, reducing and enlarging them until they looked good to my eye, cutting them out, and taping them to the background. I stood back 10-feet away to see if they looked good, then I came up to 12" away, to compare the view. James Krenov used to say that an object should look good from a distance, but it also needs to look good when you are close enough to scrutinize the fine details.

I wanted to work on the least challenging fish first to gain some experience and see how it turned out, but as time went on, I decided to make a small 6" test sam-

ple using shell on a domed surface, because that's what intimidated me the most. After completing my test sample, I was suddenly filled with confidence and decided to reverse my strategy and inlay my most difficult piece first, the shell Jellyfish. Mother of pearl and abalone shell are made up of calcium carbonate, which is very hard and also tends to be somewhat brittle.

Many inlay artists and jewelers use a jeweler's saw with a fine 1/0 to 3/0 blade to cut it by hand. I improvised my own methods. Due to the challenges of holding onto tiny pieces (as well as my preference to use an electric scrollsaw), I came up with the following method: I used 1/8" thick plywood and apply paper backed (thinner and

not as aggressive as cloth backed) double stick tape. I cut out my photocopied designs and glued them to the selected shells. Then, I took the shell and press it down onto the double

stick taped piece of plywood and cut them out on my scrollsaw. I used 1/0 Jeweler's saw blades, which handled the 1/16" thick shell quite well.

This method worked really well for me, so I continued on with it as I worked on the other fish. The main thing that I strived for was to use unfamiliar materials to create familiar images. For example, when I decided to inlay a Lionfish (below), I looked through dozens of pieces of wood in an attempt to find something that had the amount of fine details that I needed.

Scale of detail is very important. Some woods like Zebrawood have striped lines running through them, but by the time you scale a design down to 2"-3", the stripe patterns are too large to fit. Betel nuts worked out perfectly, because they have very tiny striped lines that were the perfect size for a 3" long fish.

My approach was to make each fish, then temporarily glue it to the surface with model glue, scribe around it with a #11 exacto knife, and then rout out the recess. It's important to slightly bevel the underside of each inlay piece, so as not to crush the edges of the recess when you glue them in. Of course, this only worked for 3 of the 5 fish. The shell had a lot of tentacles with negative spaces—where the Quilted Mahogany showed through—so I had to go the labor-intensive route which was to inlay one piece at a time. The Lionfish—made of betel nut, tagua nut, and Ebony—also had to be inlaid in various pieces, mainly because the betel nut would easily break.

Inlay work is very slow, but the rewards are tremendous. I think the finished piece reflects that.



Preserving Japanese Tool Traditions

by Toshio Odate



Toshio Odate is a recognized master craftsman, who has served as an ambassador to America for Japanese woodworking tools and techniques. He apprenticed in woodworking as a teenager in post-war Japan, before immigrating to the United States to become a sculptor and educator with academic positions at various institutions.

His classic book, *Japanese Woodworking Tools: Their Tradition, Spirit, and Use,* is being reissued as a *Special Limited Edition* (200 pages, \$125). Each individually-numbered copy features a hardbound cover with slipcase, acid-free paper, and personal signature by the author.

Toshio not only discusses the use and maintenance of Japanese hand tools, but provides the spiritual context from the point of view of a traditionally-trained craftsman. In the process, we get a glimpse into the life of a Japanese apprentice in Post-War Japan.

Edited from the book, this essay provides Toshio's thoughts on the need to preserve the Japanese tool traditions, from the perspective of the craftsman, as well as the purpose of this special edition.

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About 60 years ago, I came to the United States on a trip arranged by my professor **Shinji Koike** and an American industrial designer. My purpose was to demonstrate Japanese craftsmanship and introduce Japanese woodworking tools to Americans. After one year, I was supposed to go to Denmark. Except for my arrival here, none of this came to pass. Instead, I became a sculptor.

There were many reasons for this turn of events. First of all, I was unfamiliar with the society and culture of America, so my initial contact was disastrous. I could not adequately convey information, and many Americans did not understand my sensibilities. Secondly, at the time I truly wanted to be an artist, rather than a craftsman. And the most compelling reasons were freedom and opportunity—the allure of America for all immigrants.

Of course, I felt guilty about betraying Professor Koike's

dream. He had endured and overcome many complicated problems to effect my arrival in this country. Yet even though his intentions were not fulfilled, he wrote me often, patiently tutoring me on life in American society. In short, he stood by me and frequently provided good advice.



It is ironic that 25 years after my arrival in this country, my original mission came to be realized when I was approached to write about Japanese woodworking tools. Having lived in America and adopted many of its customs, I was better able to explain what I know of *shokunin* and their tools, and Westerners seemed more interested in learning about them.

Shokunin is the Japanese word for "craftsmen" or "artisan." The Japanese apprentice is taught that *shokunin* means not only having technical skill, but also implies an attitude and social consciousness. These qualities are encompassed in the word *shokunin*, but are seldom written down.

The *shokunin* demonstrates knowledge of the tools and skill with them, the ability to create beauty, and the capacity to work with incredible speed. The value of an object is dependent on a subtle combination of skill and speed; that is what the apprentice's master and his colleagues teach, and that is what the *shokunin* believes. Such teaching is basic and continues to be significant from the earliest stages of apprentice-ship through mastery of the craft. In short, the pride of the *shokunin* is the simultaneous achievement of skill and speed. One without the other is not *shokunin*.

I was once a *shokunin*. I worked with both skill and speed, as my standards of creation. With the passing of time and after changing my profession, however, my understanding of craftsmen and their tools became more important than anything else.

The Japanese consider *shokunin's* tools to be special, and not for the use by the ordinary person, who is nevertheless permitted to purchase and use them. Among the most well known of these tools are the woodworking tools of the *daiku* (carpenter) and the *tategu-shi* (sliding door maker).

Some of the tools—especially planes, chisels, saws, and sharpening stones—have enjoyed popularity among Western woodworkers, but problems exist in knowing how to acquire the best performance from them. Though Japanese tools look simple when compared to Western tools, they are really complicated to use, performing best through *shokunin's* preparation, ability, and experience. Though the *shokunin's* knowledge is usually acquired through long years of apprenticeship, knowledge of new things in America is often gained through experimentation.

In this book, I have written not only about the tools, but a little bit about the spiritual relationship a *shokunin* has with them. What the Westerner should understand about Japanese tools is that an appreciation of them involves much more than simple utility. For the *shokunin*, utility and appearance must be enhanced by a tool's "presence," that is, its refinement and dignity. This quality is not written in books, not contained in words or numbers or scientific data. Presence is what the toolmaker—the blacksmith—imbues his creation with as a result of his commitment to his craft. It is the spirit of the tool that records the blacksmith's ability through the years to face the uncertainties of life, to overcome them, and to master the art of living.

Compared to traditional methods of toolmaking, today's manufacturers can produce high-quality steel, scientifically tempered, and with a high percentage of evenness. Blades made from this steel are excellent. However, a really great blade is a personal achievement. To me, a blade lives and sustains its own life. Manufacturers use machinery to produce tools only because the process is faster and much cheaper; the result is a product that does not demonstrate quality.

For blacksmiths of the future, there is a great responsibility to adhere to the sense of quality aspired to by their predecessors, but also to learn and use whatever new technologies—electronic or otherwise—are made available to them. Of course, others involved with woodworking tools have certain responsibilities, too. Both the vendor and the craftsman must be aware of their participation in this process. I gave a lecture at a state college in New York, where two young men asked me why the blades of Japanese saws buck-

led when cutting small pieces of hardwood. I was stunned by this question and replied that they did not buckle. I later learned that some tool companies in the West were buying tools made for Japanese school children, made to cut softwood with blades only a little harder than sheet metal. There is bound to be disappointment and discouragement among craftsmen who purchase them, and a distorted view of all Japanese tools will be the result.

In addition, many of the middle-level tools that are being produced are made to look like high-level tools—dramatic signs are put on plane blades, saw handles are wrapped with cane in a samurai-sword pattern, and fake temper marks are put on sawblades. Chisels are often given Ebony handles. Because the Ebony is brittle, the top ring will not stay in place. I have seen some chisels with the rings glued on to keep them in place and the tool looking good, which defeats the purpose of the ring. The true purpose of a tool is to be productive, not pretty. Of course, I really appreciate the many stores that bring beautiful tools of the highest quality from Japan to this country. I am very proud to talk about these tools as part of Japanese culture.

In 2020, I turned 90 years old. I thought back on my life, and what I have done. One thing that stays with me is this book, *Japanese Woodworking Tools*, and the wonderful responses that I have received for it over 40 years. I wrote this book by following the philosophy of the *shokunin*—when society asks the craftsman to create, the craftsman's responsibility is to fulfill social needs to the best of his or her ability. Thus, I wrote what I knew.

At age 90, I started to think one more time about the role of the *shokunin* and his life with his tools. Scholars, scientists, and historians can catalog, document, and analyze traditional Japanese tools, but who will preserve the elements the tools played in protecting and supporting the craftsman's life? Only the craftsman who uses the tools knows that. That experiential knowledge, which I knew intimately and intuitively, I preserve in this book. Today, nobody makes a living with hand tools alone, and therefore nobody can write a book like this ever again.

After Taunton Press stopped printing the original edition of *Japanese Woodworking Tools*, a new paperback edition was published by Linden Publishing. The paperback edition is very convenient and affordable for general craftsmen and young dreamers, but it is not ideal for preserving the content of the book, long into the future. To preserve this book in a lasting format, we decided to publish a limited hardback edition. I hope the reader will enjoy this book and will come to understand the speed, accuracy, and elegance of Japanese tools. I wish Professor Koike was alive to see that I fulfilled the responsibilities with which he charged me.




Mark Wedekind of Blackstone Design has been designing and building wood furniture in Anchorage, AK for nearly 30 years. Here is Mark's story, in his own words:

I have taken a circuitous route to become a professional woodworker. Growing up in Missouri, I was exposed to woodworking, but it was not until I became disillusioned with my career—having a degree in agricultural economics—that it became a serious interest. I started to seek out learning new skills and to develope design ideas.

When my wife and I moved to Alaska in 1994, I decided to go for it. Once I had a shop set up, I began making "show pieces," to introduce my work. I entered several exhibitions to get my pieces in front of a number of eyes, which generated interest and

commissions. Much of my work in the Anchorage area is a result of those shows.

My work is a celebration of the life of a tree. I showcase the beauty of grain, and my designs are inspired by the curvilinear lines seen in nature. Using age-old joinery techniques, I sculpturally mimic how a branch comes off a tree trunk and extends over



One of my design features is incorporating a rock or stone. While on a rock climbing trip in Squamish, British Columbia, I was intrigued at how tree roots grew around rocks, reaching for sustenance. I introduced that idea in a stairway, where the newel post resembled a tree and the root-like appendages of the base wrapped around rocks (left). I, then, started incorporating it into furniture pieces, where a tree-shaped leg would capture a rock in its foot. It became my version of the traditional ball and claw foot, though that was not my original intent.

My first "rock" piece was entered into one of the Earth, Fire, Fibre exhibitions at the Anchorage Museum, and it won an award, got bought by the museum, and has been exhibited repeatedly. People seemed to like the concept, resulting in a continual stream of commissions, requesting that feature.

As most of my work is commissions, the rock is a vehicle for client participation. I encourage clients to go out and select their own rock from a spot that has meaning. It really is kind of cool. I get to connect personally with the clients, and they get to connect personally with the piece.

In other cases, clients may bring materials of significance for utilization in a work. One client had an antique Walnut dining table, which was destroyed beyond repair in shipment to Alaska. We designed a bench that utilized the drop leaf, a table leg, and antique hardware (upper right). That antique Walnut was a joy to work with, not like anything I can get nowadays. And they

asked me to include a rock in it, which I was happy to oblige.

Several of my commissions have resulted from the policy requiring Alaskan public buildings to allocate a percentage of construction costs (.5%-1%) for public art. One such project was a large dining table for the reconstruction of a fire station in Anchorage. Wanting something elegant yet sturdy—for utilization by "big, rugged guys," my Mad Dawg Table (below), is a large dining table (14-foot long and 4-foot wide), with a timberframe-style base and a glass panel inserted into the tabletop to view a rock nested in the center of the base. This was a big commission for me, as


my workspace is pretty small. The firemen were enthusiastic. They came to my shop to pick it up in their truck and help me assemble it, on site. This was rather fun; I rarely get that kind of help. There is even a video of this project—from design to utilization—at: www.youtube.com/watch?v=80HNbAQ6VnQ/.

I have constructed a variety of seating, from 3-legged stools that have been exhibited at the Bellevue Arts Museum (WA) and Wharton Esherick Museum (PA) to dining chairs (left) to accompany a massive Walnut slab table. And benches. I have made lots of benches, for public spaces to private homes. I did 14 benches for the hallways of a new building at the University of Alaska at Fairbanks, as well as sculptural benches for the hospital at Fort Wainwright Army Base.

I take great pride in my sculptural joinery (upper left). Instead of square corners, I like to sculpt the joint, so that there is an organic flow between pieces. These joints, themselves, are works of art. I was commissioned to create the trophies, based on these joint designs, for presentation to winners of the Alaska Governor's Arts and Humanities Awards. I will be teaching a Zoom Workshop on sculptural joints for the Pocosin Arts School of Fine Craft, April 2 & 9. For info on this class, visit the website: www.pocosinarts.org/.

I am grateful for how well my work has been received by my clients—from individuals to public agencies—as well as the support that I have received from the Anchorage Museum, the Alaska State Council on the Arts, and The Rasmunson Foundation. I have found Alaska to be extremely nurturing of


Ironically, it is a return to its origins. The initial Legos were made of wood, transitioning to plastic in 1960. The Home Collection can be

MING TABLE SELLS FOR \$18 MILLION

A massive Chinese Rosewood (Huanghuali) plank-top Pedestal Table sold for approximately \$18 million at auction in December. Created in late Ming to early Qing dynasty (circa 16th-18th century), the top (measuring nearly 15-feet long, 3-feet wide, and 3" thick) is among the longest and thickest single Huanghuali plank-top tables ever recorded.

This massive size suggests that the table would have been

immensely costly, even at the time of manufacture, and a highly prized possession of a wealthy scholar or official. It can be disassembled for easy transport, making surviving examples of this table rare, due to parts being lost over time. Due to a shortage of Huanghuali, later tables were much smaller in size.





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
