



After all, Stickley was about 43 vears old when this century started, and was just hitting his stride - much like Norm is today.

Thanks to everyone who nominated their favorite Woodworker of the 20th Century (readers and professionals alike) and thanks especially to our friends at Ridgid® for sponsoring a fun contest. 
Gustav Stickley: Woodworker of the 20th Century

t the end of the 1900s,
Woodworker's Journal
— and our readers — name
the woodworker with the
most influence in the past
100 years.

At the beginning of the 20th century and now, at its end, woodworkers have looked to one man in particular for inspiration. The first decade of the 1900s saw his furniture style become enormously popular (both in terms of sales and imitation); in the last decade of the 1900s, furniture stores, woodworking schools and project designers are quick to cite his work as one of their main inspirations. His enduring legacy demands recognition for Gustav Stickley.

Born on a Wisconsin farm in 1858, Stickley supported the family after his father abandoned them and learned early that he loved working with wood. "I began to

study [wood's] beauty more carefully, to note its varied grains and textures, the way it lent itself to sturdy forms and soft finishes, and these things filled me with enthusiasm," he said.

From that early work in a chair factory near his Pennsylvania uncle, furniture became and remained an important part of Stickley's career. His exploits as

a young man included making more chairs with his brothers and, one rumor says, designing New York's electric chair while director of manufacturing operations at a state prison.

Perhaps the defining moment of his life, however, came as Stickley entered his middle years. In 1898, at age 40, he sailed to England on a pilgrimage to meet the still-living founders of the Arts and Crafts Movement. Returning home with examples of Charles Voysey's furniture and textiles, Stickley also brought with him a conviction to Arts and Crafts ideals: honesty, morality and simplicity.

As the 1900s began, Stickley unveiled a line of furniture patterned after these ideals at the 1900 Grand Rapids Furniture Exposition. The exposed joinery recalled medieval times, an idyllic period for Arts and Crafts afficionados. Over the next few years, he saw many imitators of what came to be called Mission furniture. In contrast to their nails and screws and decorative mortises and tenons, Stickley employed dowels and functional mortises and tenons. He also paid attention to details other manufacturers overlooked, like running his desk drawers on hardwood guides.

Stickley's furniture reflected his philosophy. "The constructive features must be plainly visible and declare the purpose and use of the work," he said. Components, from structure to wood, were important

Throughout his career, Stickley said, "I tried to make pieces that would be practical and comfortable ... the kind of things one could take pride in handing down to one's grandchildren.

The colors associated with those pieces were also important to Stickley. Autumn hues were his



sold for up to \$66,000 at David Rago Auctions — and Barbra Streisand once paid \$363,000 for a Stickley sideboard.

favorites. His chairs might have brown, green or red leather seats, and he offered some of his early furniture with gunmetal gray or

Tyrolean green finishes. He was particularly fond of "a rich nut brown" produced by fuming oak with ammonia.

Operating under the motto "Als Ik Kan" or "All I Can" — which he had adapted from medieval Flemish painter Jan van Eyck-Stickley spread the Arts and Crafts ideals through social activities as well as furniture. As early as the late 1890s, he tried to establish a national union of chair manufacturers. That effort failed, but when he set up his own company in 1901 as United Crafts, it was an early profit-sharing enterprise: both the workers and

the managers benefited. In 1904, the business reorganized to a more traditional configuration, and Stickley changed the name to Craftsman Workshops. At heart, however, he had a generous nature: on New Year's Day 1902, Stickley distributed \$2,000 in gold coins to his employees.

He also wanted to share his philosophy with as wide an audience as possible, so in 1901, Stickley started publishing The Craftsman magazine. He wrote over 200 articles for the periodical, addressing subjects that ranged from cabinetmaking and homebuilding to dance, dress, family and national issues.

Craftsman readers learned woodworking techniques and, beginning

in 1903, they could order house plans from the magazine. For a short while, Stickley even owned a construction company which built Craftsman homes in New York and New Jersey. His empire had expanded to include a factory in Eastwood, New York, a family

The Craftsman magazine was another outlet for Stickley's philosophy. It covered woodworking lessons and national affairs.



home in Morris Plains, New Jersey and, in 1913, a 12-story building in New York City which housed the Craftsman showrooms, offices and restaurant.

By 1915, however, a changing market and some bad decisions had led Stickley to declare bankruptcy. He was briefly hospitalized for a nervous breakdown, and then lived out his days in an apartment at his daughter's Syracuse home. As a younger man, Stickley had probably designed the home and its furniture. In his retirement, he experimented with furniture finishes in the apartment sink. Stickley died April 21, 1942.

In his own time, famed architects Charles and Henry Greene recommended Stickley's furniture for the houses they designed. Readers of The Craftsman magazine and numerous imitators built furniture in his style. Today, as Dan Morgan of Lewiston, Idaho, wrote in his nomination, "the revival of his designs is influencing a whole new group of woodworkers."

Stickley, said nominator Jeff Greef of Davenport, California, "helped bring the craft back to a real quality of workmanship and away from the overly ornate leanings of the Victorian period. [He] brought real craftsmanship back home ... which, it seems to me, is the tradition all woodworkers are continuing today." With Dan, Jeff and others, Woodworker's Journal is proud to announce Gustav Sticklev as the Woodworker of the 20th Century.

Norm Abram: Next Century

Another 20th century woodworker who deserves recognition is Norm Abram. Known to many as the master craftsman on "New Yankee Workshop" and "This Old House," Norm has gained his fame from TV — another 20th century phenomenon.


Norm got his big break when producer Russell Morash of public station WGBH "discovered" the talented carpenter he'd hired to build his barn. The "smallest scrap pile [Russ] had ever seen" inspired him to film Norm renovating a rundown Victorian house in Boston, and a star was born.

Prior to his TV career, Norm worked construction in New England. Born in Rhode Island, he learned woodworking from his carpenter father, helping to build custom homes during high school and college vacations.

According to nominators like Kevin Byrd of Lexington, North Carolina, Norm "has been an inspiration to woodworkers everywhere." Barney Howard of Sisters, Oregon, adds, "His tastes vary from project to project; he uses power whenever he can; his way follows the practical approach in project design and execution ... Here's to Norm!"






Mighty Miters

Mitered plywood corners are very fragile and susceptible to damage. I have a technique for reinforcing the corners that also eliminates any flaws in the miter cuts. This method is most effective when the miters run parallel with the grain of the plywood, unless you want to highlight the corners with contrasting grain patterns or colors.

Cut your plywood pieces 1/2" shorter than the lengths you need for your project, then rout the miters using a large 45° chamfering bit. The key here is to adjust the cutting depth of the bit to leave 1/4" of the edge unrouted, which is just what you need for the bit's pilot bearing to ride against. Now glue the perfectly cut miters together, and glue a 5/16" square strip into each corner rabbet. After the strip is secure you can plane it flush with the plywood. Pick your stock for the strip carefully and no one will ever know it's there.





Ever Ready V-Block

My V-block is conveniently mounted on the underside of my drill press table. For a base, I laminated two pine blocks and machined them to fit perfectly into the two outside cavities in the ribbing of the table. I then laminated three pine boards and made them into a V-blocks long enough to span the width of the table. I curved both ends of the V-block so it's less conspicuous when the table is turned upright. Once the V-block was aligned perfectly under the drill press chuck, I glued it to the two pine blocks in the cavities. Removal is easy. I embedded four ring magnets in the base to hold the V-block securely in place. They work perfectly.








Drawing a True Ellipse

The most elegant oval shape is an ellipse, and I have a method to make this shape easy to draw. Simply lay out the major (AOA) and minor (BOB) diameters of the oval you

want to create. Once the axes are drawn, mark the length OA on a straight edge and label the endpoints "o" and "a". Next, mark the length OB and label the new point "b". Now align point "a" on the straight edge with the minor diameter and point "b" with the major diameter. Mark a dot on your wood at point "o" and repeat this procedure until you have dots surrounding the axes. Connect the dots with a pencil and you'll have a true ellipse.





devised a system for using swivel casters on a hinged arm. When the arm is in the lower position the workbench legs contact the floor and the casters rise out of the way. When the arm is raised into its upper position the casters swing to the floor and lift the legs off the ground. Once I worked out the glitches I used this system on all my large tools.


I used 100 lb. capacity casters, and 2 x 4 lumber for the arms and caster supports. Then I secured the supports to the bench legs with heavy weight strap hinges. To hold the arms in the raised position, I drilled a hole through each arm and each of the lower bench rails to accept pole barn nails. There's no mystery about the bench except that one side of each leg is tapered at the bottom to provide a nice tight fit for the caster.


Knee Activated Safety Switch Keeps Your Hands Securely on Work Piece

chose a Montblanc style twist pen as my production gift this year. The pen parts retail for about \$6.00 and the wood, depending on your approach, will cost from nothing (scrap bin) to a couple of dollars. Not bad, considering you can easily spend over \$100.00 for one of the real things at an office supply store. The kit includes two brass tubes (a longer one for the body and a shorter one for the cap) and the other various pen parts.

If you're not set up to turn pens, the supplies box at right offers everything you need to get started. And of course, this is the ultimate scrap wood project. With such small blanks, you can really be selective in the material you choose. One last thing: the pen tubes must fit very tightly into the blank. I recommend using an "O" diameter bit for the Montblanc style set.

Blanks and Brass Tubes

To start, select your materials and, if you don't own them already, equip yourself with a universal mandrel and the appropriate bushing set. I use a variety of hardwoods and acrylics for my pen blanks, which, for this particular pen, I machined into 5/8" square strips. Crosscut a group of body blanks to 2 3/8" (the exact length of the longer brass tube) and a second group of cap blanks to 125/32", (about 1/4" short of the shorter brass tube). Keep the

sets together (use a matching number on each set) and be sure your blanks are crosscut perfectly square. This results in a pen with tight joints between the turned material and the fittings.





Figure 1: Tapering the outside faces of the legs adds an element of style to their blocky, rectangular shapes.

Make yourself a stop jig for your drill press (see **Figure 1**) and, using an "O" drill bit, drill a hole through all your precut stock. Keep


lifting the bit out of the stock to remove waste and be careful, the blank gets warm while drilling.

Before gluing the brass tubes from the pen kit into your freshly drilled blanks, rough up their surface with a little steel wool. A great little tip I learned years ago is to jam one end of each brass tube into a raw potato. The resulting plug keeps glue out of the tube. Apply cvanoacrylic glue to the inside of one end of the blank and quickly push the brass tube into this end, until it is flush with the opposite end. The shorter blank will leave about 1/4" of the brass exposed. This glue dries very quickly, so only apply glue to one blank at a time during the process. Once all the body and cap blanks have brass tubes inserted, remove any excess glue and use a skinny dowel to pop out your potato plugs.

Turning, Sanding and Finishing

Now you're just about ready to move onto the lathe. You'll need a lathe chuck with a Morse taper and a universal mandrel. Mount your bushing parts and first set of blanks on the mandrel (see the **Elevation Drawing** above), finger tighten the nut and snug up the tail stock.

Get those safety glasses on, lose the long sleeve shirt and choose your weapons. I have a set of Sorby micro tools that work great for small turnings like this. I start with

my 8 mm roughing gouge and wrap up with my 6 mm spindle gouge. The Montblanc style features an elliptical taper on both the cap and the body. Keep this taper in mind as you turn the blanks down almost even with the diameter of the bushings (see Figure 2), and then sand through the grits until you're flush with the bushings (see Figure 3). I use padding lacquer to finish my pens. It's easy to use and produces great results. Generally, once I get going, I can mount, turn, sand, finish and assemble a pen in about half an hour.

Final Assembly — Parting Thoughts

Before you start fitting the two halves of your pens together, take time to align the grain. I like mine aligned when the pen is in the closed position.

Moderate force is required to press fit the pen parts and blanks together, and once you do, it's just Figure 3: I sand and finish from the

about impossible to separate them. Be sure to develop a system to keep your parts in order. Start with the pen body and press fit the tip into position, as shown below. Loosen up the clamp and do the same with the unthreaded stem of the twist holder at the other end. Slide the spring onto the ink refill and insert both through the twist holder. Complete the body assembly by screwing the twist mechanism onto

the twist holder, as shown at the bottom of the facing page.


Now switch to the cap assembly and insert the stem of the finial cap through the finial ring and then

through the clip's ring. Follow the same clamping procedure to press these pieces onto the cap. Slide the center ring over the exposed brass tube, flush to the shoulder of the pen cap. If the center ring is a little loose, you can carefully glue it

into place with a drop or two of cyanoacrylic glue.

Finally, slide the cap over the twist mechanism and sign some lucky relative's card — you're done, at least for the moment. How many more pens you've got to go depends on how many happy relatives you're aiming for this year.







orking as a cabinetmaker for a living might cause some people to


forget their initial fondness for their craft. After all, work is ... well, just work. But I have to admit, building this beautiful yet practical piece of furniture reminded me of all the reasons I started woodworking in the first place and helped me to remember how much I really like what I do.

This desk is a series of simple frame and panel subassemblies, joined with modern biscuits, hidden screws and glue. I designed the desk with basic joinery ... anyone with a little experience, a good router and a table saw will have no problem building this modern Mission piece.

Start with the Back

The back of the desk is made up of two rails, two stiles and three panels (pieces 1 through 4). Cut these and all the other parts to the dimensions shown in the Material List on page 26. With any project, measuring and test fitting each part as you make it is wise. The cabinet shop proverb measure twice, cut once - holds true for all woodworking. Chuck a 1/4" bit in your table-mounted router, set the fence, and mill 1/2" deep grooves in both edges of both stiles, plus the appropriate edges of the top and bottom rails. (All dimensions are on the Elevation Drawings beginning on page 26.) Each cut should be made in several passes, raising the bit about 1/8" each time to avoid tearout and excessive wear on the router.

These stiles and rails have 1/4" wide tenons centered on their ends. Form them using a fine crosscut blade in the table saw coupled with



the saw's miter gauge and nibble away the waste in successive cuts.

The tenons at each end of the bottom rail are notched 1/4" from the bottom. These cuts can be made on a band saw, but I prefer a sharp backsaw. With that done, you're ready to dry fit the frame together and check your joinery. When you're pleased with the fit, apply glue to the stile and rail joints (but not the plywood panels, as they need to float freely). Make sure the subassembly is flat and square as you clamp it up. After the glue has cured, use a router and straightedge to plow a vertical 1/4" deep groove on the inside face of each stile. These grooves are a full 11/4" wide and will be used to join the interior frames to the back.

The Interior Frames

The interior frame subassemblies house the drawers and surround the desk owner's legs. Begin machining them at the router table by plowing a 1/2" deep groove in each stile (pieces 5) and

rail (pieces 6) at the locations shown on the Elevation Drawings. Then move to the table saw to mill tenons on the ends of each rail. These are relatively simple cuts as there's no shoulder required. Glue and clamp the two subassemblies together, again letting the panels (pieces 7) float freely.

Machining the Legs


Use either solid or glued-up stock to make blanks for the legs (pieces 8). Either way, have the quartersawn grain showing on the front and back faces of each. After cutting the legs to size, taper their two outside faces, as shown below in **Figure 1**. I used

a commercial jig and great care to slice the angles off of the legs (see the **Elevation Drawings**).

Move back to the router table to mill the 1/2" deep stopped grooves in each leg to accommodate the sides and back.







Stopping the grooves in the right spot is simply a matter of matching up pencil marks on the leg and the router table fence. Wrap up the legs by using a router equipped with a 1/4" straight bit to create the small mortises for the legs' decorative faux tenons (see the sidebar on page 29).

Building the Exterior Frames

Cut and mill the four rails for the exterior frames (pieces 9), using the same techniques as you did for the interior frame rails; just notice that the lengths are different. Notch the tenons on the two bottom rails (see

the Elevation Drawings) to create 1/4" shoulders.

Test the tenons' fit in the legs, then cut the panels (pieces 10) to size. Glue and clamp the rails to the legs (slipping the panels in place without glue as you do).

Building the Top

Begin making the top by creating a simple, butt-jointed frame with the front, back and sides (pieces 11 and 12). Start by cutting the parts to size, then chop the small, shallow mortises for the faux tenons and screws on the long frame pieces. Predrill each piece to properly accept the screws (pieces 13), then assemble the frame without glue. Turn the frame upside down and, using a bearing guided rabbeting bit, mill a rabbet around the inside edge (see Figure 2). Square the corners with a sharp chisel after you're done routing.

Select solid hardwood stock with beautiful grain and figure for the two outer desktop panels (pieces 14). Form rabbets on the edges of each panel: note that on three sides,

this rabbet is milled on the top while on the fourth side it is milled on the bottom face. Cut the center panel (piece 15) from 3/4" plywood and, after predrilling screw holes, attach it to the frame with screws only. Test fit the two outer panels to the center



FAUX TENONS

There are two different size faux tenons on this desk. The top frame set have larger tails and cover a set of screws. The leg set are machined with tiny tenoned tails to glue into 1/4" mortises. They're easy to make and ensure a clean attractive look.

Machine the faux tenons in three steps: Chamfer the edges of your stock on a sander, relieve the tenon tails on your table saw, and slice them free with a band saw and miter gauge.



Be sure to make each size faux tenon in sets. Use a registration block clamped to your miter gauge to ensure uniformity.

With the drawer boxes complete, install the drawer slides according to the manufacturer's instructions, then slide the drawers into their openings. Use two-sided tape to temporarily position and mark the locations of the faces, then remove the drawers and screw the faces in place. Install the remaining faux tenons (pieces 36, see above).

Apply a light walnut oil stain, topped by at least three coats of clear matte lacquer. Sand between these coats with 400 grit paper, and install the drawer pulls after the finish dries.

Then you can sit down at your new desk and bask in the glow of woodworking well done!

panel and frame. When all of the parts fit together well, remove the screws and reassemble the top with glue and screws. Apply a couple of drops of glue to the joint between the center panel and the inverted rabbet on the outer panels. This will ensure both panels will expand and contract from the center of the desk. Finally, glue the top faux tenons (pieces 16) in place.

Assembling the Desk

Sand the subassemblies down through the grits to 220, and test fit all your joints (see Figure 3). Then lay out and mill the eight biscuit slots for the drawer dividers (pieces 17). Glue and clamp the two interior frames in their dadoes in the back, then glue the subassembly into the stopped grooves in the legs (don't glue the panels in place during this process). Before this glue begins to set, install the drawer dividers with glue and biscuits. Make sure everything is square as you tighten the clamps. Once the glue dries, use a Forstner bit to create round mortises in the tops of the legs (see the Elevation Drawing), then secure the tabletop fasteners (pieces 18) in place with screws (pieces 19).

To join the top and bottom subassemblies, start by placing the desktop on the lower desk assembly. From the underside, mark where the interior frames touch the desktop's center panel. Remove the top and drill pilot holes for screwing through the top into the interior fames, countersinking the holes from the upper face. Center the top on the desk body, then drive your screws (pieces 20) down through the center panel into your predrilled

pilot holes in the interior frame's top rails (pieces 6). Finish securing the frame in place by driving screws (pieces 19) up through the tabletop fasteners into predrilled pilot holes in its bottom face, then attach the leg space shelf (piece 21) with screws (pieces 13). Take a moment to glue the drawer cleats (pieces 22) to the plywood panels inside the drawer cavity (refer to the Elevation Drawings).

Drill a finger hole in the top's center panel to help lift the removable leather covered panel, then cut the leather (piece 23) and its backer (piece 24) to shape and dry fit them to the top of the desk. When the fit is right, glue the leather to the backer with 3M's 77 spray adhesive.

Making the Drawers

Refer to the sidebar (upper left) to mill the joinery on the sides, fronts

and backs of the four deep drawers and the shallow pencil drawer (pieces 25 through 35). Assemble each box and sand smooth. Cut the drawer faces from attractive hardwood stock. Mount the drawer pulls with their bolt heads counter bored into the back of the piece for flush mounting.

utdoor hobbies are important to me; in fact, fishing and hunting are

a way of life for many of us here in the north country, and in most other areas of the country as well. That would explain why one of the most common project requests we get is for a gun cabinet: a way to safely store firearms, yet display them for the craftsmanship they embody. So I took on the challenge to create a display case for my guns with a circular twist, after all ... I like talking about hunting and fishing almost as much as doing them. And this gun cabinet gives me an easy way to start the conversation!

Stiles, Rails and Sides

When you first look at the gun cabinet, your eye is drawn to its molding and decorative shapes, but the nuts and bolts of this cabinet are its stile and rail construction. I used both cherry lumber and veneered plywood with good results.

Start by cutting all the corner stiles (pieces 1 and 2) to the dimensions listed in the Material List on the next page. Move to your router table and, with a 3/4" straight bit chucked into your router, machine rabbets down the length of the wide stiles. Change the router bit over to a 1/4" straight bit to plow 1/2" deep grooves into the edges of the corner stiles. These grooves are full length on six stiles and stopped on the front two, as shown on the Exploded View. (If possible, leave this set-up in place, as you will be using it again soon.)

Next, cut the top and bottom rails (pieces 3) from 3/4" hardwood plywood and the middle and lower rails (pieces 4 and 5) from solid stock. All of these rails are identical in length, but vary in width. A real time-saving step is to cut all the rails to length and width, and then machine the 1/4" wide by 1/2" long full width tenons onto their ends.



Figure 1: Plow grooves into the appropriate edges of the rails and glued-up rails. Take a few passes to achieve the proper depth.

Test the tenons' fit in the grooves you created earlier. The cabinet has three built-up carcass sides (pieces 6) created with 1/4" hardwood plywood and applied hardwood slats (pieces 7). Cut your plywood sides with a sharp, thin kerf saw blade designed for this operation. Stay at your table saw to make the horizontal dividers (pieces 8)

from 3/4" hardwood plywood. Slice the two drawer walls (pieces 9) from your remaining plywood and the four



drawer glides (pieces 10) from solid hardwood, and you're ready to move on to your first subassembly.

Carcass Subassembly


Edge glue and clamp four pairs of top and middle rails (pieces 3 and 4) together. Do the same with four pairs of bottom and lower rails (pieces 3 and 5), and allow the glue to cure. Move back to your router

table (the one you left set up with a 1/4" straight bit), and plow 1/2" deep grooves in the appropriate edges of the middle rails (pieces 4) and glued-up rail subassemblies (see Figure 1). Check the **Elevation Drawings** for all of the machining details. When that task is complete, move to a large, flat work surface and test fit the right and left sides and the front and back subassemblies.





Note: this view shows the drawer glide grooves and strike plate mortises.

Notice the orientation of the wide and narrow stiles is critical to properly assembling the cabinet, as shown in the **Elevation Drawing** on page 65. Once all of your subassemblies' various parts fit together well, take them apart and re-clamp them together using a good quality yellow glue, making sure each panel is flat and square as you go.

There are a few more machining steps to take care of while the glue is curing. Find the drawer walls you cut earlier and lay out the matching drawer glide grooves and the locks' strike plate mortises. Use a straightedge guide and your portable router equipped with a 1/2" straight bit. Rout the 5/16" deep grooves for the drawer glides and then use the same bit to create the mortises for the strike plates.

Face the front edge of the middle divider with hardwood tape (piece 11), and trim the back of the divider by the thickness of the tape. Drill a 1" diameter hole dead center on the top divider — sorry, most drill presses lack the throat depth to reach the middle of this 21¼" square panel, so you'll have to drill straight with a Forstner bit chucked into your hand-held drill.

Remove the clamps from the carcass subassemblies and scrape

off any excess glue squeezeout. Using your tri-square and straightedge, lay out all of the grooves for the horizontal dividers on the inside faces of each of the four subassemblies.

Chuck a 3/4" straight bit into your portable router and, with the aid of a clamped-on straightedge, plow the grooves you just laid out. This is the time to make the rabbets for the back (piece 12) and the glass (pieces 13). Now, chuck a 1/2" bearing-guided rabbeting bit into your router and rout the rebates as shown in the **Elevation Drawings**. (Hint: **never** order glass until you measure (twice!) the opening you machined for it.)


Body Building

Now you're ready to put some parts together. It will be a smoother operation if you get a friend to help you handle these larger carcass sections ... but it can be done solo.

Dry fit your components by laying the front face down on your work surface and then fitting the horizontal dividers in place. Note: the divider with the hole is placed at the top and the divider with the hardwood tape is in the center (tape facing down). Snuggle the sides up to the front and dividers, fitting the dividers into their respective grooves, and clamp them up through the glass openings.

Test fit the drawer walls; they must slide in place, touching the middle and bottom dividers, running squarely back from the front drawer opening. Then, drop the back subassembly in place and see if all of your joints are tight. Once you're happy with the fit, disassemble and repeat the steps with glue in the appropriate joints, until you slide the drawer walls in place (with glue). Pause here and drive finish nails through the middle and bottom into the edges of the drawer wall. Continue the task, clamp and allow the glue to cure.

Finger Jointed, Locking Drawers

When it comes to gun cabinets, drawers are definitely not an after-thought. They are the key to safely separating the guns from the ammunition. That's why you'll want to use separately keyed locks from the door.

Cut the blanks for your drawer backs and sides (pieces 20 and 21) from 1/2" stock but make the fronts (pieces 22) from 3/4" stock to accommodate the locks (pieces 23). Form the drawer fronts' profile on the band saw. Create 1/2" finger joints on your table saw with an auxiliary fence on your miter gauge and a registration key mounted to it (see Figure 2). Next, groove the fronts and backs with 1/2" wide by 1/4" deep grooves running their whole length to capture the drawer bottoms (pieces 24). The sides need their grooves stopped to accommodate the finger joints. Also, groove the sides on their outside faces to

accept the drawer glides which you made earlier. Bore 7/8" holes through the drawer fronts for the locks and chop through mortises in the sides so the locks' throws can pass through the drawer sides. With the machining completed, dry fit the parts and move on to gluing and clamping once everything fits.

Carriage for Eight

The circular carriage allows you to display eight guns in a surprisingly small space. I used a heavy-duty lazy Susan because ... guns are heavy!

Cut a 20" diameter circle from 3/4" plywood to make the base (piece 25) and cover the edges with more hot melt hardwood tape. Next, glue up hardwood blanks to make the gun caddy (piece 26) and barrel guide (pieces 27). Lay out the various notches and the circular shapes found in the **Elevation Drawing**, and move to your band saw to shape the blanks. Use a 1/4"

a miter gauge with a keyed fence register each finger joint accurately. Always test your set-up on scrap lumber to avoid problems.

roundover bit to soften the edges of the cut-out areas. Attach the gun caddy to the base with clamps and glue. Drill 3/4" diameter stopped holes where indicated to accept the hardwood dowels which make up the struts (pieces 28). A 1" dowel runs from the top of the barrel guide up through the hole in the center of the top horizontal divider. This stabilizer (piece 29) has a rectangular key (piece 30) notched into one end of the dowel to fit into a matching mortise on the barrel guide. Form the key, notch out the



end of the stabilizer on a band saw and glue the two pieces together. Start the mortise on the top of the barrel guide with a one inch Forstner bit and chop the remaining squared-out ends for the key with a sharp chisel. Now assemble the carriage with yellow glue and set it aside. (Don't glue the stabilizer in place — it will be attached with a screw later.)

Details, Details


The basic rectangular shape of this gun cabinet is accentuated by shop made dentil molding, shaped stacked moldings and flat, built-up slats.

It's time to glue the slats (pieces 7) in place on the carcass panels and door. To keep the glue from escaping the edges and making a real mess, relieve two glue wells down each edge of each slat. Rip and plane up long pieces of the slats and cut them to exact length as you need them.


The stacked molding will give your router a real workout. The dentil molding (piece 31) has two different thicknesses, but they're machined the same way, as shown in the sidebar at right. Next, make the bead molding (piece 32) in two steps, using a 1/4" radius roundover bit on the edge of your 3/4" stock. This molding is used in two locations on the stacked molding, as shown in the

detail on the next page.

Make the long cove (piece 33), with a vertical panel raising bit in your router table. The little cove (piece 34) is made with a 1/2" radius bearing guided cove bit. Cut the cove base molding's (piece 35) shape on the same set-up. Before you attach the



molding, wrap the top of the case with a 1/2" plywood backer (piece 36) to add dimension to the crown molding effect. Now miter the moldings around the gun cabinet, starting from the top down and attaching it with glue and clamps. For the two bottom molding elements, start from the bottom and work up.

The last machining step is to make the back and form a rabbet along the inside edge of the back. Test the fit and then glue and nail it in place with brads. Remove the door if you haven't already done so and attend to a few details like mounting the locks and strike plates and gluing the drawer glides in place. Also, machine up lengths of retainer strip (piece 37) to hold the glass pieces in place. Sand the entire cabinet up through all the grits to 320 grit. While some folks will disagree with me, I think nothing looks as good on cherry lumber as a high quality oil finish. I recommend four coats of Watco oil with an ultra light steel wool (0000 grade) rub down between coats.

Mount your door and the glass panels, set the lazy Susan (piece 38) in the cabinet, place the carriage on top of it, and slide in your drawers.


Create dentil molding as you need it with this simple jig. Mount a new plywood base on your router. Make a guide rail of the same thickness and depth as you desire for the dentil's "teeth". Start with wide boards and then, on your table saw, rip the dentil molding off, piece by piece, with a sharp thin-kerfed blade.



Run the guide rail against the end of the board to form the first dado. Then drop the guide into that dado to form the second one, continuing until you reach the end of your stock.



With the dentil dadoes cut, simply rip off lengths of molding on your table saw. Be sure to use a very sharp blade for best results.



Movers and Shakers

Shakers: Not So Simple

Religion Shapes Furniture

"Plain and simple" sums up the popular image of Shaker furniture, Smithsonian curator Jeremy

Adamson said during

a show of Shaker pieces — but woodworkers need to remember other influencing factors.

"We look at the period 1820 to 1840 as the heyday of Shaker design. Shakers didn't see it that way." Adamson explained. Instead, they believed in striving for perfection. An 1824 tool chest might be "perfect" for its time, but the design was open to later improvements.

Shaker simplicity reflected their attempts to achieve perfection: the contrast of their designs with the elaborate art of "the World" demonstrated the holiness of Shaker communities' separate lives. Their work clearly showed the value Shakers put on cleanliness and longevity. They expected their furniture to last 1,000 years, Adamson said, so it had to be easy to clean the drawer pulls.

For today's woodworkers interested in building like the original Shakers, Adamson said,

> "If they want to go beyond the simple replication of a plan and reflect

some of the perfectionism, a lot has to do with trying to make the piece as light as

possible, and as elegant, as though it might just lift off." The wood color, grain direction, and overall balance of the piece, all play a role.

The upward motion, Adamson said, "has a prayerful effect," — echoing a Shaker sister who said, "It was religion that produced the good tables and chairs."

A Smithsonian show of Shaker objects included "typical" items like baskets, constructed between 1830 and 1880 — and an 1806 tall clock that dates to a first generation Shaker craftsman, still influenced by experience in the outside world.

Ted, who's been making bowls, vases and coasters, says the strawboard has "a golden hue with lots of character" after varnishing. He's been having fun as one of the first woodworkers to try out an exciting new product. "I'm like a kid in a candy shop," he said.





Carvings Rediscovered

Pocket Knife Artistry



In 1926, photographer William Neher made a portrait of himself surrounded with some of the results of his prolific carving hobby.

From 1899 to 1961, Illinois photographer William Neher produced dozens of elaborate carvings. For more than 30 years after his death,

most of his work lay undiscovered.

Then, in the 1990s, someone finally decided to clean out the photography studio's basement. Folk art collector Merle Glick saw the pieces, and the result was a traveling show of Neher's carvings.

According to Glick's research, Neher learned to carve while living in Arkansas between 1899 and 1902, and continued his hobby after moving to Chenoa, Illinois to open a photography shop in the early part of the 20th century. His



tools were limited to a pocket knife, screwdriver and sandpaper, but his ideas spanned a wide range. For instance, Neher carved a three-dimensional tableau of his own minister father performing a baptism along a riverbank. He also carved a version of DaVinci's "Last Supper." Most of Neher's works, however, were original. Several, like an oversized walnut chair with

realistic fish and water plants, celebrate his passion for fishing.

Most of Neher's pieces remain with his descendants, but the Lakeview Museum in Peoria, Illinois owns one and expects to acquire

more. The Neher show is at the State of

Illinois Art Gallery in Chicago until October 22 and at the Illinois State Museum in Springfield from November 7, 1999 to January 2, 2000. If you're planning to be in the area, call the Springfield museum at 217-782-7387.



A Tender Spot for Old Tools



I really like old tools, so I pick up quite a few at different sales. I thought this one was interesting, but I don't know what it is.

Thanks for asking, Phil, and thanks for letting the Woodworker's Journal staff play with your tool. We were fascinated when we pushed the lever on top and watched the 12 small blades rotate out of slots in the bottom. When we turned a round knob next to the lever. we succeeded in adjusting the height of the blades. The purpose of the wheel-shaped serrated knob on the side wasn't obvious. We're pretty sure that your little tool (it's about 13/4" diameter, 15/16" high) is for cutting something, but we're hoping

the rest of our readers can tell us what. Anyone out there with your thinking muscles ratcheted up? Send in your response!

My Stanley tape measure has a little diamond at 19¹³/₆₄", at 38¹³/₃₂", and so on to the end of the tape. Can anyone tell me what the purpose of this is?

When we got your letter, everyone at Woodworker's Journal pulled out our tape measures, looked at the diamonds, and said, as a group, "Huh." Then we called Stanley Tools.

Here's the ruling from Stanley: Tape rules have diamonds every 19.2 inches to assist carpenters in laving out I-joists for floor trusses. Using engineered lumber and a spacing of 19.2" between joists, carpenters can cover eight feet of space with only five joists — as opposed to six joists for the same space if they were using dimensional lumber at 16" spacings. The diamonds seemed like such a good idea for carpenters that they've become a standard part of every tape measure printed.






The 'tool' is a meat tenderizer," wrote Philip Rudell of Shakopee, Minnesota. "You pound flour into round steak with this to make the meat tender." Theo Ninneman of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, agreed with the function: "My mother-in-law, a farm lady, used it on some of their home-killed beef," he wrote.

Cliff Egger of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, still has his mom's meat tenderizer. "I have it in my collection of collectibles," he notes.

For **Ron Smith** of Fort Walton Beach, Florida, the tool brought back memories of his dad. He admits the tool probably wasn't designed for the purpose, but said his dad used a tool like this for wrapping chalk line. "He often had lines that ran 50 to 100 feet, and this gadget held the string quite nicely," Ron said.

William Lacy of Marion, Iowa, had his own theory about what the tool was for. He called it a densimeter, used to determine the density — or specific gravity

of syrup or sorghum.

"When the sorghum would span the discs, it was time to remove it from the heat," he wrote.



The Very Fein MultiMaster

By John English

Woodworkers unanimously hate it. It's the job most likely to be dumped on the lowliest apprentice in a cabinet shop. We're talking here about detail sanding, the nittygritty, slow process that bedevils almost every project we build. Well, the task just got a little easier, thanks to Fein Tools, Inc. of Stuttgart, Germany, Their new, variable speed MultiMaster is the tool most of us have dreamed about as we meticulously sanded between spindles, into corners or around an inside curve. Sure, there are lots of detail sanders on the market. But this one is special: it's built to meet the rigors of a pro environment, at a street price that makes it available to pretty much anyone's budget. I shop-tested the MultiMaster and liked what I found.

The Standard Kit

The kit I received included the variable speed, oscillating tool plus a sanding head and paper, a power scraper and a cut-off saw. I also checked out the optional accessory kit that included a slicing scraper, a carbide-coated rasp, and a grout removal tool.

The first thing I discovered about the MultiMaster is it sands into corners and up against edges with virtually no kickback, a welcome change from some of its less expensive competitors. This is in large part due to the oscillating pattern and length of stroke, both of which are quite controlled. It may also be attributed to the





While most folks think of the MultiMaster as a detail sander, it's at home in the shop doing lots of different tasks. This German import is a sound addition for hobbyist and professional alike.

MultiMaster's considerable heft (just under 2.5 lbs), a factor that gives it a solid feel but may weigh heavily on the operator after several hours' use.

Detail Sanding

The MultiMaster runs very quietly, which is a real asset in close quarters where most detail sanding seems to occur. The action is aggressive and quickly removed clear finishes and paints right up to the edges of spindles and dowels. Finer paper left a clean, swirl-free surface, ready for refinishing.

Changing sandpaper was quite simple, as the sanding pad and supplied papers were both equipped with hook and loop surfaces. The three-point design of the pad cuts down on waste: when the paper on the leading point became clogged, I simply peeled it off, rotated it 120° and went right back to work. The pad and papers are generously sized, but are not so large that they won't fit into tight spots. All in all, with a small reservation about weight, I found the MultiMaster to be a superb detail sander.



A well thought-out collection of accessories and the power to drive them all. The triangular sanding pad (secured with hook and loop) makes efficient use of sandpaper. All of the accessories are easy to attach with a simple hex wrench system.

Sawing Though more suited to finish carpentry than furniture building, the flushcut saw found several uses in my woodshop. It's an ideal tool for installing trim and moldings, and it came in useful for trimming veneers and flush trimming plugs. I tested the blade in plastic, oak and pine. In the wood, it tended to overheat and

burn quickly if it wasn't kept moving. So I checked the instruction manual (when all else fails ... read the directions) and discovered that high speeds are recommended for wood, and a cutting grease or paste extends the service life of blades used in plastic or even soft metal (optional high-speed steel saw blade is required). The blade is only 0.5 mm thick, so the saw kerf is negligible.

Other Accessories
The MultiMaster comes

One of the most useful options available from Fein is the carbide-coated rasp. This accessory works on plaster, cement, adhesive, wood, tile, filler and brick. It's ideal for rough sanding any of these surfaces during patching or finish work. The rasp can also be used in



An accessory on the way, but not available at the time of the test, is a dust collection adapter.

It's coupled with specially perforated sandpaper, and should be useful in close quarters. (Although I did not find the dust produced to be troublesome.)

The MultiMaster operates on 120V/60Hz standard household current at a rated input of 160W. The oscillation rate varies between 12,000 and 21,000 orbits/minute, and the tool operates at a sound level that is typically less than 75 dB(A). Ear protection is recommended when the tool is in contact with any material. The MultiMaster carries standard industry warranties: for more information, retail pricing or to locate a dealer near you, call Fein Power Tools, Inc. at their U.S. headquarters in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. the early stages of wood carving, to remove large amounts of material. I found a follow-up treatment with several grits of sandpaper reduced this coarse forming to a smooth, finishable surface. Attaching the rasp is just a matter of unplugging the tool, removing the set screw and replacing it once the rasp is in place. This is another accessory that must be moved constantly, as the abrasive grit is very aggressive.

Another Fein offering is an optional convex segment knife that can be used to cut carpet, linoleum, window screen and other rigid materials. This kind of cutter has already found a home in boat building where it is used to remove old polyurethane, silicone and marine glue fillers.
