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glam revamp

A budget-conscious facelift for a 1960s hutch yields sophisticated style and smart storage in a busy family bath.

1 nouveau niche

Updated with soothing cream and coral paint and brushedbrass hardware, this hutch looks custom-built. Its tall, slim profile maximizes wall space without eating up floor space. Open shelves provide grab-and-go perches for folded towels and water-resistant woven totes filled with each family member's toiletries. As you shop for a similar piece at garage sales and flea markets, look for one with a depth of 21 inches or less, enabling the piece to line up with your vanity.

2 drawer dynamics

Carve out a home for frequently used grooming aids in a shallow upper drawer. Plastic bins divide tools by function, making it easier to put items back where they belong after each use to reduce clutter in a squeezed space. Adhesive shelf paper lines the drawer with a durable, cleanable surface.

3 spin doctor

A turntable organizes glass jars filled with disposable items such as cotton swabs and rounds. The labels are cut from a vinyl decal sheet and accented with adhesive letters. A band of paint decorates the jars' bottoms.

4 tray chic

Keep wandering items in line by clustering them within a tabletop tray. Metal votive holders in punchy patterns sort cosmetic brushes.

5 double identity

A drawer pull installed on a vanity side stands in for a hand-towel bar. For a cohesive look, choose metal fixtures in coordinating finishes. When the vanity's knobs and the tub-side table didn't jibe, we simply used gold spray paint to unite them.

Minimizing kid clothing chaos isn't about spending a fortune on new furniture or a custom closet. It's about getting your youngster to buy in. "Ask your kids how they want to set up things," professional organizer Kathy Jenkins says. Even very young kids can decide where they like to get dressed and whether they prefer their school clothes to hang on the right or left side of their closets. "The answers don't really matter, but your kid now has ownership in setting up the system," Jenkins says. "And if they help make the system, they can be accountable."

Before shopping for new organizers, Jenkins recommends doing a thorough evaluation of your child's current clothing and setting specific expectations. "Stop throwing your shirts on the floor" isn't a very effective rule, whereas "I expect to not see clothing on the floor when I come into your room to say goodnight each night" is achievable and gives kids freedom to figure out their own methods for meeting the goal. Most critically, parents need to practice what they preach. "If you have stuff all over your bedroom floor, don't expect your kids to understand why you are insisting that their floor be clean," Jenkins says.

Evaluate clothing at the change of season or after a child has gone through a growth spurt. Involve kids in the process by having them pull out their favorites, which can then be placed on the shelf or rod that's easiest to access.

1. Large picture labels or iconic rub-on decals, used here, allow children to put away and find their clothes even before they can read. 2. Plastic expandable drawer dividers keep stacks of folded clothing from toppling. Labels in the bottom remind kids where each item belongs. 3. A fun hamper—perhaps with a backboard—turns picking up clothes into a game. 4. A peg rail hung outside the closet shows off the clothes for the day. A small tote corrals shoes, socks, and accessories.





5. Curtains pulled back by a ribbon make it easy for kids to grab what they need. **6.** A clear plastic tag (search "retail shelf tags" online) hangs easily from a wire closet component and can be changed quickly. **7.** A bin for each activity gathers all uniform necessities in one place. **8.** Underbed boxes hold seasonal items out of the way. Each label serves as an inventory, noting sizes, quantity, and next season's needs. **9.** Rod dividers (these are homemade from cardstock) delineate what goes where. Other labeling strategies include listing days of the week or each child's name in a shared closet. 10. Adjustable closet systems allow for kids' closets to change along with their sizes. 11. Shelves and bars are easy to remove and rework.

Kids can also be helpful "damage detectives," searching for stains and holes to be repaired. If your kids can't make it through the entire process, have them try on at least one of every type of clothing so you have a sample size of what fits to then use as reference while you evaluate the rest of their wardrobe.

Supply kids with the right tools—shelves, rods, hangers, hooks, and a hamper—to keep edited wardrobes in good order. Reserve traditional dresser drawers for small staple items, such as underwear, socks, undershirts, tights, and PJs. Shift all other garments to a cubby-style bookcase or closet shelves. Reserve one or two hanging rods for your child's nicest clothing; fold and stack the rest.

Invest in right-size, good-quality hangers. Child-size hangers are great for toddlers and preschoolers, but as kids grow you must upgrade to wider versions to keep garments from falling off. Slim, velvet-lined hangers are worth the investment because they minimize slipping and save space.

Hooks are easier than hangers for kids to manage their everyday clothes. Mount several inside or near a closet and dangle jeans and shirts. Be prepared to raise hooks as kids grow taller and their clothes get longer. "Life changes, so choose a system you can easily adjust," Jenkins says.

- Keep surface clutter at bay when you choose a dressing table with deep, wide drawers to house brushes, cosmetics, and toiletries.
- **Stow** cosmetic brushes and other tools in a roll-up case to keep them clean and ready for use.
- **Show off** pretty perfumes, polishes, and statement jewelry on shallow trays and cake stands.
- Hide an electrical strip inside a drawer and plug in curling irons and blow-dryers with ease.
- **Double up** on function when you use a storage ottoman as seating. A patterned skirt adds a layer of style.





- Fill photo frames with paper for a quick burst of pattern and color.
- **Sort** grooming products by task (for example, hair or eye care) and store in one drawer. Position daily-use items at the front.
- Affix a small fabric-wrapped magnet to the inside of a drawer to keep stray bobby pins together.
- Collect hair ties, clips, and other tiny accessories in clear-top spice containers.





- **Drop** cosmetics into shallow trays designed for office supplies.
- **Corral** disposable items in clear containers so they're easy to find and refill.
- **Mount** a mirrored medicine cabinet above your dressing table, even if it's not located in a bath. Keep hair spray, lotions, and creams within the compartment.
- **Top** the table with a sheet of glass to provide a safe place for hot tools.
- Slide blow-dryers and other tools into salon-inspired holsters mounted to the vanity's side.

sanity savers

ONE WEEK, ONE SUITCASE

Save headaches—and annoying baggage fees—by toting a single suitcase on your next trip. Here's how to wedge a week's worth of gear inside.

- Plan Check the weather in your destination: Will you need an umbrella? A jacket? A swimsuit? Mentally put together each day's outfit, including changes of clothes for evening or exercise, and then write a list of everything you'll need.
- Minimize You need far fewer clothes than you think, so get ruthless. Go for interchangeable layers: two or three bottoms (pants, jeans, skirts, or dresses), four or five tops (a mix of shirts and sweaters), plus jewelry and scarves. Every top should coordinate with every bottom. Choose a few top layers you can wear twice with a change of shirt or camisole. Include one pair of underwear and one pair of socks for each day. No need to pack extras; you can always wash or shop for extras. Limit yourself to two pairs of versatile shoes (one for walking and a dressier pair).
- Assemble Plan to wear your bulkiest shoes and clothes on the plane. Lay out everything else on a bed or big table, including accessories and jewelry. Pack only items on your list so you're less tempted to add "just in case" items. Shoes go in first, as they're usually heaviest and don't compress. Tuck scarves. belts, underwear, or socks inside, and position them as in a shoebox (soles out).
- ROII Rolling clothes takes up less space than folding and minimizes wrinkles. Pack rolled pants and sweaters first, then fill in with rolled tees, tanks, socks, and undergarments. To squeeze in several sweaters, use compression sacks or vacuum bags to squish them to a manageable size.
- Drop Need an extra bit of space for that final shirt? Zip up your nearly packed bag and drop it two or three times from a height of about 18 inches. The contents will shift and compact, yielding extra packing space.

QUICK TRICKS

Iravel smarter by repurposing items you already have on hand.

12 jewelry saver Ditch the vitamins and instead

Ditch the vitamins and instead fill a weeklong medication case with jewelry organized by day or look. Corral safety pins and other mending supplies in an empty chamber.

13 in the bag

Speed up packing and dressing later by loading gallon-size zipper bags with outfits. Use adhesive labels to note the wearer and day of the week. Press out air for tight packing.


14 making contact

Deposit earrings or tiny batteries inside contact lens cases. Screw-top lids prevent leaking, making the containers ideal for a dab of hair gel, eye cream, or first aid ointment.









As an efficiency expert and professional organizer, Audrey Thomas thought she understood everything about closet organization. Yet even she learned some new tricks while transforming the windowless space she once used as her home office into a new master closet to share with her husband, Tony.

What surprised you most about planning your closet? How hard it was to finalize its design! I was overwhelmed by the decision-making process.

Did working with a closet company make it easier? Absolutely! I interviewed three potential closet organizers. The one I ultimately chose asked a lot of questions about our habits, like where we unpack from our travels, where we put our shoes on, and where our dirty laundry goes. They made me think of things I never would have considered on my own, and then incorporated those things into the final design.

What topped your wish list? I wanted the island to be dead center in the closet, I wanted a custom laundry bin, and I wanted separate his-and-her zones.

Did you change your mind about any of those things? The closet pro convinced me an off-center island, rather than one right in the middle of the closet, made more sense so we wouldn't have to walk around it all the time. He said making the closet symmetrical wouldn't make it functional, and that really got my attention because I'm all about function. He was so right!

I also realized I didn't want a custom laundry bin after all because the sorters I already had worked so well. We sort our clothes by lights, darks, and cold-water brights as we go, so doing laundry takes less time. I'm constantly telling people to choose functionality over beauty, so I took my own advice and stuck with what already worked. As for separate his-and-hers zones, yes, I did keep that idea!

new item that comes into the closet, two have to go out. It's not difficult for me to release things, but my husband likes to keep things "just in case." He must have had 10 pairs of shoe trees and never used any of them. They were in a pile collecting dust. So we compromised. He kept two pairs in case he ever needs them and got rid of the rest—but not without a little discussion!

What's your advice for anyone contemplating a closet redo? Take time to think about your habits. I prefer to fold my T-shirts; my husband likes to hang his. I like to stand when I put on my shoes; my husband prefers to sit. All those things factored into the design of our closet so it works perfectly for both of us.

Any other tips? Take inventory of what you own. Count your shoes. Count your dresses. Know how many purses you have, because if you're like me, you're going to be surprised by how much space they fill. And don't tackle this job while planning your daughter's wedding. I did, and I don't recommend it to anyone!



Returning to California after years in New York City was the ideal move for Brooke and Frank Puleo. But the Menlo Park ranch house where they settled their young family was decidedly less than ideal. With the help of architect Jim Maliski, designer Nancy Evars, and interior designer Mary Jo Fiorella, the Puleos found ways to transform the dated and confined floor plan. The team raised the ceilings in several rooms, tore down walls to encourage flow, and incorporated lots of custom built-ins, open shelving, and other clever storage options.

The revamped kitchen is a masterpiece of inconspicuous storage. Two cabinets boast doors with hydraulic lifts that raise to provide easy access. Electrical outlets inside each make them ideal for housing small appliances. "Back in the day they were called bread boxes," Fiorella says. "But today they're ideal for appliances you don't need to see all the time." The cabinet-style pantry features color-coded and labeled baskets on pullout shelves for snacks and other frequently used items.

Off the kitchen, a multiuse mudroom with a wall of hooks and labeled cubbies designates a space for each family member's shoes, bag, and jacket. A desk with a built-in filing cabinet helps Brooke stay organized with adjustable shelves for binders of information she refers to regularly and closed storage for less-used items.

Fiorella extended the crisp white cabinets into the family room and incorporated numerous display areas. Two special areas open to create side-by-side workstations for daughters Mia and Gracie. The girls can close cabinet doors to hide away their projects and supplies when not in use.

Master bedroom cabinetry combines deep drawers and fullextension glides to hold the couple's clothing and accessories. Fiorella designed the unit around a centrally located TV and included spots for photos, books, and accessories. Electrical components are tucked away behind doors below. A shared walk-in closet keeps Brooke and Frank fashionably organized with shelves for shoes, dresser drawers for delicates, and double hanging rods for clothing.

An island with maple butcher block,

above, gives the kitchen a centrally located work space, offers extra storage, and creates a place for family and friends to gather around.





the ultimate

A narrow galley kitchen is radically revised into a multifunctional family space.

Sometimes adding on is the only way to achieve a kitchen that meets your needs. This was the case when a family of six needed more space and functionality than their galley-style kitchen could provide. The result is a combined kitchen, butler's pantry, home office, and mudroom with zones for cookware, electronics, paperwork, and sports equipment.

Storage space in the kitchen more than doubled thanks to careful placement of cabinets and appliances. For example, extending the kitchen cabinets to the ceiling means less-used items can be stored out of sight on the upper shelves. A doubleoven range and additional wall oven let the homeowners easily prepare meals for family or larger groups. Garbage disposals in each of the kitchen sinks allow for prep work and cleanup in both areas. The refrigerator is sited near the range, while the trimmer freezer is placed outside the work triangle. Pullout garbage drawers in multiple locations facilitate recycling and help keep the space tidy.

The design of the butler's pantry was born of necessity because it contains a load-bearing wall that could not be removed. The result is a partially open corridor that connects the kitchen to the office and mudroom areas. Day to day, the butler's pantry serves as an attractive passage to the home's work and utility areas; when the homeowners entertain, it becomes party central, housing the stereo system and transforming into a full-service bar.

The office hosts the family's main computer and has ample storage for essentials such as school papers and household records. Its proximity to the kitchen hub makes it a great place for family members to check e-mail or do homework while feeling connected to the action.

A refrigerator with a cabinet-style front, *left*, is a step from the range, creating a convenient work triangle.

A spacious island, below, with seating for three anchors the kitchen, offering space for kids or guests to sit comfortably while leaving plenty of room for food preparation on the other side.

Deep drawers like this one beneath the wall oven, *opposite, top left,* hold nested cookware and assorted culinary gear.

A tiled ledge behind the range, opposite, top right, holds favorite oils and adds architectural interest.

A pantry with pullout shelves, opposite, bottom left, allows views of all the dry and canned goods in the cabinet box, not just the items in front. A shallow rack attached to the inside of the pantry door keeps frequently used items and condiments close at hand.

The food pantry wall, opposite, bottom right, has three identical-size doors; two hide the pantry and the third covers a stand-alone freezer. The cabinetry's dark stain signals the transition to the butler's pantry, office, and mudroom, which are accessed to the left.











This kitchen addition seamlessly transitions into well-defined areas for cooking, eating, and studying.

cook

A range with double ovens, a wall oven, abundant counter space, and a built-in pantry make this area ideal for a homeowner who likes to cook.

2 gather

The island brings folks together. Guests enjoy comfortable seating, while the cook has plenty of room to use the sink, drawers, and prep area opposite.

3 entertain

The butler's pantry houses serving pieces, glassware, and other supplies. An icemaker, wine cooler, and sound system make hosting a cinch.

4 work

The office features a shared computer station and plenty of drawers for sorting parents' paperwork and kids' supplies for homework projects.



A butler's pantry, opposite, with refrigerator drawers, an icemaker, and a wine cooler facilitates easy entertaining. Because of its small size, finishes, like the diamond mesh on the upper cabinet fronts, can be more extravagant.

Drawers in the butler's pantry, *above, far left*, are dedicated to candles, linens, silver, and serving platters.

The sound system, above left, for the entire home is controlled from the cabinet in the butler's pantry. The other cabinets hold wineglasses and barware.

Office space, *above*, at the far end of the kitchen is a convenient place for working online or completing homework while staying connected to the main gathering space at the kitchen island.

Tiny or expansive, simple or detailed, there's a hardworking island for every kitchen.





1 all-purpose station

Combine plentiful shelving and compact features, such as a small refrigerator, for a function-packed island. Display cookbooks and dishes, use the sink for prep, and stock the fridge with produce or wine.

2 tucked away

Gain counter space for serving or meal prep with a pullout island. This one blends in with cabinetry but can be rolled out when additional work surface is needed.

3 petite perfection

An island with a work surface no larger than a cutting board is perfect for displaying or chopping produce. Tuck a small appliance in an open compartment.

the ultimate IVING SD

One flowing space wears multiple hats as a kitchen, dining room, and family room.

Though light and bright, this once-ordinary builder-grade spec house encouraged clutter—not calm—because of a woeful lack of storage. That is, until a few smart changes transformed the main-level space into a multifunctional one-room wonder that easily accommodates dining, entertaining, relaxing, and cooking.

Key to the room's success is sophisticated storage, which not only subtly divides the space into clearly defined zones, but also stows items from a microwave to Monopoly with ease. White inset-panel cabinets unify the various areas for a clean, unified look. Within the built-ins, smart solutions, including pullout shelves and abundant baskets and bins, organize the stuff of daily life. Open shelves sprinkled throughout welcome artful display and provide opportunities to energize the room with juicy bits of color.

Custom carpentry yields several storage surprises. The toekick area below the kitchen cabinets conceals cookie sheets and baking pans, while a lift-up countertop near the door to the

garage stashes cell phones and keys. An ingenious banquette serves as a transition between the kitchen and dining area. Similarly, the wet bar doubles as a home for entertaining necessities and as a divider between cooking-related activities and relaxing.

While big-screen televisions sometimes pose decorating dilemmas, this one blends in between wall panels that neither highlight nor hide its presence. Even the upholstered furniture can be smartly stored, as in the case of two colorful ottomans parked beneath a clear coffee table; they add versatility, ready to be pulled out at a moment's notice by family members wanting to prop their feet up while enjoying a good book or to seat an unexpected extra guest.

Rolling ottomans, above, stow beneath the coffee table to keep floor space clear for playing games. A tray tidies reading materials.









A hinged portion of the mudroom counter, *left*, lifts to reveal a shallow compartment for tucking keys, coupons, and cell phones beside the garage entry.

A new mudroom, *right*, carved from extra space in the garage, smooths the family's comings and goings. Library books to be returned and letters to be mailed gather on the counter; shoes slip into the cubbies below.

An extra-low drawer, below right, optimizes the toe-kick space beneath the oven.

Strategic furniture placement and clever built-ins distinguish specific areas within one large space.

cook

The kitchen is open to the dining and living areas, inviting the cook to interact with guests and take part in festivities—or answer homework questions.

2 dine

Custom banquette seating bordered by the kitchen island defines the casual dining area and links it to both the kitchen and the family room.

3 entertain

A built-in wet bar with a wine cooler and abundant glassware encourages guests to help themselves. The bar functions as an extra serving surface.

4 relax


Cozy seating is arranged around the family room fireplace, beckoning friends and family to read, watch television, and converse.

1 perfect partners

Pair a freestanding piece with wall shelves to inexpensively cover an entire wall with storage. Use trays for glassware rather than standard board shelves to facilitate serving.

A plywood box secures a stack of PVC pipes, resulting in a wall-hugging wine rack that's accessible from either side.

3 write idea

Add casters to a small desk to fabricate a roll-anywhere serving cart. Fill the kneehole with shelves for bottles and large serving pieces, then stock the drawers with paper goods and utensils.

4 good-time cubbies

Dedicate each section of a bookcase to a single type of dishware, making it easy for guests to help themselves. Baskets keep barware, linens, and decorations from spilling out and onto the floor.

1 bordered in books

Frame a window on all sides with slim cases. Put a cushion on the bottom section to create a window seat.

3 block by block

For a wall's worth of organization, begin with a dining buffet, flank it with matching china hutches, and unite the pieces with a bracketed shelf, horizontal wine rack, and row of display cubbies.

4 enter organization

Sacrifice a little square footage on both sides of a door to introduce storage towers with adjustable shelves. Stabilize the towers with a bridging shelf on top.

Books, art supplies, and small toys are easy to see inside clear acrylic magazine files. Label for each family member and institute a rule that everyone's personal items need to be put away at bedtime.

Stash favorite toys in containers that accentuate visibility and easy transport. Skip shapeless bags and boxes with lids, and instead focus on buckets, clear bins, and durable baskets. Reserve drawers for infrequently used playthings.

the ultimate Master Suite

Planning yields savvy storage throughout this new bedroom and bath.

A spacious master suite in a brand-new condominium might seem like an organizing dream, but considerable nuts-and-bolts planning was required to incorporate storage that functions well and lives up to this location's high-end style. For the cluster of personal rooms, the key to high-performance pampering was a combination of clever furniture, custom closet details, and well-planned cabinetry.

The serene bedroom takes a subtle approach to storage. A flip-top ottoman at the foot of the bed is an ideal spot for storing extra linens and slipping on shoes. Multidrawer bedside tables offer room to stash books, eyeglasses, and more, while a large dresser provides ample storage for clothes and divided top drawers for accessories. As a final flourish, the full-length wall mirror swings open to reveal a velvet-lined jewelry closet with custom spaces for bracelets, necklaces, rings, and earrings.

A pair of walk-in closets boast closet systems customized to match the homeowners' belongings. Open shelves hold bulky sweaters as well as a bevy of labeled baskets and boxes for infrequently used items. Dividers and inserts stand purses upright on shelves and sort smaller items within drawers. Ample hanging space and a floor-to-ceiling shoe rack keep everything neat and make morning routines flow smoothly.

The elegant bathroom is designed for two with plenty of space to move around. A wall-to-wall vanity features double sinks and lots of counter space, with drawers and closed cabinets below. Adjacent to the vanity, a mirrored armoire-style cabinet holds towels and bathroom supplies. A ledge above the sinks is surprisingly hardworking, displaying perfume bottles and shaving supplies, while a small storage drawer tucked into a corner near one sink stashes makeup just where it's needed.



the ultimate SMal

Clever bins, wall solutions, and color help this alcove live larger than its tiny footprint.

Who hasn't overstuffed a traditional reach-in closet? With its folding doors, single hanging rod, and underused top shelf, this basic storage space often becomes a dumping ground for clothing, shoes, and never-to-be-found accessories. Time for a fashion-forward makeover!

First to go in this closet were the folding doors, which hampered reaching into the closet's corners. In their place, stylish curtains were mounted high and wide on the outside wall so the entire closet can be visible. The panels look great open or closed and frame the alcove with a swish of soft pattern.

Rather than overloading the lone wooden rod with clothes, garments such as T-shirts, tanks, jeans, and sweaters are now folded and stacked in various containers. A trio of bins corrals off-season stuff on the overhead shelf. A small readyto-assemble bookcase offers six cubbies for bins and baskets stocked with items such as sweaters and socks. The piece also introduces a surface for a mini dressing station. Whimsical cabinet knobs hold handbags aloft, while earrings and bracelets dangle from a jewelry tree. Wan white paint gives way to a bold color-blocking scheme that looks cool and reinforces a zone approach to garment storage.

Beneath hanging garments, floating shelves cradle several pairs of shoes and boots. Below, a salvaged wooden bin with casters keeps workout gear in one portable spot. The short inside wall is lined with 1-inch-thick molding to hook more shoes by their heels.

Colorful washi tape, *below*, rounds the necks of white hangers, denoting which ones are for sleeveless, short-sleeve, and long-sleeve shirts. Alternatively, you could coordinate the closet by color or season, using tape to classify.

Cup hooks, right, suspend belts by their buckles in a sliver of space on the closet's inside wall. A rubber-coated double hook catches scarves and totes.

Floating shelves, opposite left, just deep enough for shoes, utilize the wall underneath hanging clothes. Quilted inserts keep boots standing tall. Snugged beneath the shelves, a wood bin contains

exercise clothes, shoes, and ball caps. A wide-mouth wire bin, opposite, top right, stows surplus linens in a neat stack, out of the way on the top shelf. This zone is also handy for luggage and handbags.

A wire basket with cardboard dividers, opposite, middle right, organizes rolled socks, tights, and leggings. The bin slips into the bookcase with other clothing clusters.

Pieces of angled molding, opposite, bottom right, line the closet's side wall, creating shallow ledges where this shoelover can hang her high heels.





















Laid out for maximum visual impact, this petite closet encourages a quick morning routine.



hang
Cull through clothes so only dressy or bulky pieces are left hanging. Invest in matching high-quality hangers to standardize hanging height.

fold

Knits, such as T-shirts and tanks, and casual gear, such as jeans, are just fine folded. Separate by season, slip into a bin, or place on a shelf with dividers.

Highlight shoes and accessories by adding shelves and pretty hooks. Stagger to accommodate tall footwear and long accessories.

Pulling tomorrow's outfit today and putting it on display takes the guesswork out of dressing. Just a sturdy hook or two can serve as a valet station.

Hooks that resemble vintage doorknobs, opposite left, partner with wallpaper and decorative trim on the wall to the right of the closet opening. The resulting valet station organizes outfits and elevates clothing to art.

Cardboard price tags, opposite, top *right*, indicate the purpose of each hook at the valet station.

A canvas-covered box with cutout handles, opposite, middle right, rounds up supplies to care for shoes and clothes. Needle and thread, polish, and brushes in one spot mean it's easy to stitch on a button or buff some boots.

Handmade tags, opposite, bottom right, dangle from wire bins to reinforce organization. These simple labels were made by attaching strips of washi tape to cardstock and using a die-cut punch to produce shapely medallions.

A magnetic bar with hooks, above left, hung above the blue velvet chair displays photos and favorite finishing touches.

1 side by side

Mix and match similarly sized furniture pieces, such as a table and mini dresser. Display color-coordinating books and vases on open shelves, and tuck away nighttime essentials, including lotion and lip balm.

2 one, two, three

Stow bedroom basics and decorations on a three-shelf bookcase. Keep extra blankets on the lowest shelf, personal items at bed height, and collections above.

3 on a roll

3 in plain view

4 out of sight

Hang a canvas shoe organizer on the back of a closet door for often-worn flats, pumps, and sneakers. Attach adhesive hooks as needed for belts, necklaces, scarves, and wristlets.



Work Spaces

Even with little opportunity for decor, a smooth-running garage, laundry, basement, or mudroom is a thing of beauty. Deploy minor organizing upgrades in these areas and prepare to reap major rewards



the ultimate \(\)

Clever organization fuels room for bikes, tools, sports equipment, and cars.

If your garage is driving you crazy, follow these road-tested ideas to transform it into a model of organization and efficiency. This refreshed garage shows how to fit it all—bikes and brooms, lawn care and ladders, skateboards and screwdrivers, plus a car or two-into one hardworking, good-looking space.

The owners of this garage first divided it into activity-specific zones dedicated to their interests. The active family decided to prioritize areas for biking, sports, fix-it projects, automotive care, gardening, and camping. Next, they took a thorough inventory of gear and got rid of duplicate, damaged, and unused items. They then shopped for organizing tools to accommodate the remaining items and available space.

The key solution for this garage is a versatile system of hooks, racks, and shelves. Most are affixed to do-it-yourself, wall-mount panels or easy-to-adjust channel strips. Selecting components from one manufacturer enables the owners to switch elements among various orders as storage needs evolve.

To maximize storage capabilities, the owners looked low, high, and very high for space. They devoted prime, eye-level real estate to regularly used tools and cleaning supplies. Infrequently used items such as off-season sports equipment and tents are now stowed on high shelves; toxic chemicals shifted to a lockable, parent-height cabinet. Otherwise-wasted ceiling space above the garage door was called into service for ladders and lumber.

Affordable storage accessories throughout the space help manage the details. Plastic caddies corral supplies by task, while specialty hooks and labels add a layer of function to blue-painted pegboard. Bins designated for each child feature clear panels, so it's simple to preview the contents.




An armoire-style cabinet, above left, sequesters cleaning and automotive supplies behind metal doors.

Mesh bins, opposite above, gather balls and other small items at kid level. A sturdy brace elevates a plastic tote filled with off-season boots; it's accessible with the aid of a collapsible step stool.

Angled wire shelves, opposite, below left, keep bike shoes (and dirt) outside the home and off the garage floor.

Heavy-duty clamps, opposite, below right, store bikes off the floor. A quick-release mechanism lets riders get on the road in one fluid motion.

Specialized hooks, *above*, cradle pogo sticks, tennis rackets, scooters, skateboards, and other good-time gear.

Vinyl floor tiles, above right, affixed to the wall minimize marring from muddy bicycle tires.

Bins with clear drop-down panels, *right,* give each child a spot to stash favorite toys and treasures.













A tool strip mounted near the garage's side exit, above, places a leaf blower, weed trimmer, and various digging tools in tidy configuration. A freestanding metal rack helps kids keep their bikes off the ground and doesn't require any heavy lifting.


A locked plastic cabinet, top right, rests on a higher shelf out of kids' reach and houses gasoline, garden fertilizer, and other adult-only supplies.

Stacking plastic totes, above, provide mess-free storage for bulk yard supplies, such as potting soil, birdseed, and mulch.

Ceiling-mount brackets, left, are an ingenious method of storing ladders or lumber in the usually wasted space above the garage door.

A canvas trunk organizer in the car, opposite, features three color-coded bags that can be filled with soccer supplies, swimming gear, or goodies for a picnic.

Organizing tools segment this hardworking space and ensure easy access to oft-used items.

ride

Wall-hung bicycle storage and a freestanding rack prevent bikes from toppling into parked cars. Extra bike gear is stashed in nearby bins.

maintain

Household cleaning supplies line up on shelves behind cabinet doors, minimizing fumes in the garage. Yard tools are steps away from the garden.

A rolling toolbox stands alongside a project-ready workbench. Oftenused tools are secured on pegboard for graband-go convenience.

4 play
Balls and other playthings pile into wall-hung storage bins so kids can easily reach and return items. Rackets and riding toys hang from hooks.



Online tools helped these homeowners choose from 25 colors of tile in six sizes to create an interlocking mat perfectly sized for their garage.

Specialty tiles and edges were added to allow for drainage and to gently transition between bare concrete and tiled areas.

A rubber mallet and knee pads are the main tools required to install the flooring yourself.

Reshaping space for closets, benches, and a pantry speeds up coming and going.

The charm of an older home, with lavish woodwork and character-laden nooks, woos and wins the heart of many a home buyer. But dismal storage can put a damper on the love affair. Fortunately, smart built-in storage, artfully added decades later, can rekindle the romance.

Revamping the interiors of this 1920s home yielded a customized, highly organized mudroom so beautiful it rises above its humble name. Conceived as a sort of dressing room and outdoor prep space for the whole family, which includes two young boys and a dog, the space packs outerwear, sports equipment, off-season clothing, backpacks, pet-care supplies, and the entire household's shoes within a minimal footprint.

Stepping through the back door brings you to a hall-style room with storage at every turn. Two niches on the right beckon kids and visitors to have a seat while taking off shoes or boots and to leave behind their jackets and bags on pegs. Labeled wood bins above each bench hold clusters of grab-and-go supplies that the whole family uses. On the opposite wall, two closets replicate the scale of the niches. Frosted-glass doors shield less-attractive contents, such as bulky coats, strollers, and sporting gear, from view. A few steps farther stands an open shoe closet loaded with the family's footwear, as well as a trio of additional closets for off-season clothing, travel supplies, and even picnic and camping gear.

A butler's pantry unfurls as you head toward the garage. Here, an extra freezer, wine refrigerator, and walk-in pantry hold items bought in bulk. A coffee station and sink near the garage door send off the homeowners fully caffeinated and hydrated. With a place for everything, both home and family can live happily ever after.

Centralizing storage for seasonal clothes, sports gear, and shoes means clutter doesn't intrude into the rest of the house.



A door-free closet, opposite, organizes shoes for the family of four. (Taking off shoes upon entering the house is a longtime tradition for this crew.) Tilted shelves stretch floor to ceiling, so every pair is easy to see. Parents use the upper shelves, and kids the lower ones. Muddy or dirty shoes go on the bottom shelf, where a metal liner catches debris and can be removed and rinsed.


A floor-level drawer in this niche, above, holds purses and accessories that can be called into service at a moment's notice. Wood dividers refine the vast drawer space, designating zones for specific family members or seasons. A hardy imitation suede cushion is designed to withstand use and abuse while adding a touch of blue to match the palette of the house.

The bottom of all five wood-lined closets feature double-decker shoe storage, *above right*. The top shelf lifts to reveal a second layer of space for shoes and shoe-care accessories, *right*.









in the zone

Logically laid out, this family-friendly entry maintains order with solutions that target specific gear.

1 hang

Lining the matching niches with peg-style hooks signals family and friends to keep things tidy by hanging their coats, umbrellas, and bags.

2 hide

Five closets bring out-of-sight order to less lovely gear. Frosted-glass inserts and acrylic hardware lighten the look of the many doors.

2 cholyo

Shoes and sandals stay organized when standing on shallow shelves in an open closet dedicated favorite footwear.

4 stock

A walk-in pantry, a freezer, and a run of cabinets ensure that a busy family has a wellorganized reserve of food, beverages, and other supplies.



A kitchenette in the butler's pantry,

opposite, stashes overflow from the main kitchen in an additional freezer and a wine fridge. Slate-look tiles—they're actually low-maintenance porcelain—stand up to wear and tear and stretch throughout the mudroom.

The bulk goods pantry, above left, is wrapped in shelves to hold cleaning supplies, paper goods, lightbulbs, and planting tools. It's not meant to stash cooking ingredients—there's another pantry closer to the kitchen for that—but rather nonfood items purchased at warehouse clubs.

The sink area with a pullout sprayer,

above, can be called into service as a potting/cleanup station for the herb garden just steps beyond the back door. A sliver of countertop to the left lets the homeowners brew coffee in the morning to grab on their way to the garage.

Combine two mini storage towers with pullout bins and a painted board to form a counter-height desk. Organize small accessories in shoe dividers set on top.

installing closet systems

Follow these steps to plan, purchase, and hang all the elements of a closet makeover.

Making over your closet can seem daunting, but with good planning and the proper tools, you can install a wire closet system yourself in as little as an afternoon. Online design tools, user-friendly hardware systems, and simple step-by-step instructions and videos help you quickly choose and build your dream closet. Many closet systems featured on pages 110-111 also offer free expert assistance in troubleshooting online or via phone

To prepare your space for installing wire shelving, first remove all clothing, shoes, and other stored items. Take inventory of the clothing you need to store, noting what you'd like to fold, hang, and store in drawers. "Planning Makes Perfect" on page 113 offers more tips. Next, remove existing closet components, patch walls, and paint.

When your closet is clear and clean, consider upgrading lighting with LED bulbs or a new ceiling fixture. You might also want to replace sliding doors with bifold doors, pocket doors, or curtains, which increase access to the closet.

Essential tools to install most wire closet components include a carpenter's level, cordless drill, screwdriver, tape measure, rubber mallet, and ladder or step stool. Depending on your system, you might also need a stud finder, bolt cutter, or hacksaw.

PLANNING MAKES PERFECT

To purchase the right types and quantity of closet components, do your homework first.

- Take inventory. To know what you need, you need to know what you have. After identifying items to discard or donate, make an itemized list of everything that needs to reside in a closet. Then you can determine how much space you need for short and long hanging items, and whether you need drawers or shelves or both.
- **Do the math.** Plan your hanging storage around the lengths of your clothes. Use these vertical measurements as a guide.

Women's shirts: 36-40 inches long

Men's blazers and shirts; women's skirts: 38-42 inches long Women's long dresses and coats: 60-70 inches long

Women's cocktail dresses and pants hung by cuffs: 48-50 inches long Pants folded over hanger: 20-25 inches long

- Plan for various-height shoes. There's no one-size-fits-all solution for shoes with tall heels or boots. Measure shoe heights when assessing your needs.
- Allow for new acquisitions. "One in, one out" is the ideal when it comes to adding clothes to your closet, but cut vourself some slack and purchase components that will accommodate 10-20 percent growth over time.
- **Consider relocation.** Stash awkward, infrequently worn garments in alternative spots. Move a robe to a back-of-door hook, a formal gown to a coat closet, or hats to underbed storage rather than sacrificing space for everyday items like shirts and pants.













Start by measuring your closet (A). Write down all relevant dimensions, including door swing and light placement. Use online design tools or grid paper to plan the design of your new closet. and purchase the necessary components. Before you begin installing, hang the layout nearby your closet for reference (B). Unwrap all materials and organize them nearby.

Using a level, place the top track or rack (C). Use wall anchors for any screws that don't line up with studs. Hang the track or rack using a drill and screwdriver. Next, hang vertical standards from the top bracket (D). Standards in some systems require additional mounting hardware; this one does not. Group standards together to easily insert shelf brackets at the same level.

After brackets are inserted, slide standards to their approximate position on the track, using a provided spacer or a tape measure (E). Begin installing shelves from lowest to highest. Install shallower and shorter shelves first, then longer and deeper ones next. You should hear and feel shelves lock into place (F).













Double-check for adequate clearance between shelves. To adjust shelves, start from the bottom, repositioning them for adequate clearance as you go higher (G). Add liners to shelves that will hold folded clothing.

Add specialty features like drawers, baskets, and bins. For drawers, affix the lowest glide mechanism first (H). Then follow manufacturer instructions for bins and racks. Insert the basket frame and drop in baskets (I).

Follow manufacturer instructions for capping shelves with protective end pieces (J). Install clothing rods, adding support for rods that span longer than 36 inches (K). Add finishing touches such as belt, tie, and shoe racks according to instructions (L).

GOOD TO KNOW

A variety of retailers and manufacturers sell wire shelving and have system-specific recommendations. However, the following tips are useful regardless of where you purchase your system:

- **Keep it safe.** Before installing shelves, check with an electrician and plumber to be sure you won't be drilling into electrical wires, ductwork, or plumbing components.
- Cover up. If your closet has tile or wood floors, layer with a nonskid drop cloth to prevent damage and slipping.
- Find a friend. For safety and convenience, work with a partner to install long shelves and to hold your step stool when in use.
- Buy extra pieces. If your plans change, you have parts on hand. If not, you can easily return them.
- Assess your needs. Most closet systems use closet-gauge wire shelving, but heavier-duty garage systems are also available. Unless

- you're storing sports equipment or other particularly heavy items, a closet-gauge system will generally fill the bill.
- Make the cut. If your local hardware store won't cut your shelving to size for a nominal fee, you can use a hacksaw outfitted with a metal-cutting blade. Consider investing in a bolt cutter for safer, cleaner
- Cut it short. When trimming shelves, cut a half-inch shorter than the space they'll occupy. This prevents scratched walls and makes it easier to fit shelves into wall brackets.
- Make it secure. Don't skimp on the wall clips and angled support brackets. Position about 50 percent of support brackets to hit studs, but realize that wall clips don't need to go into studs.

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
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
