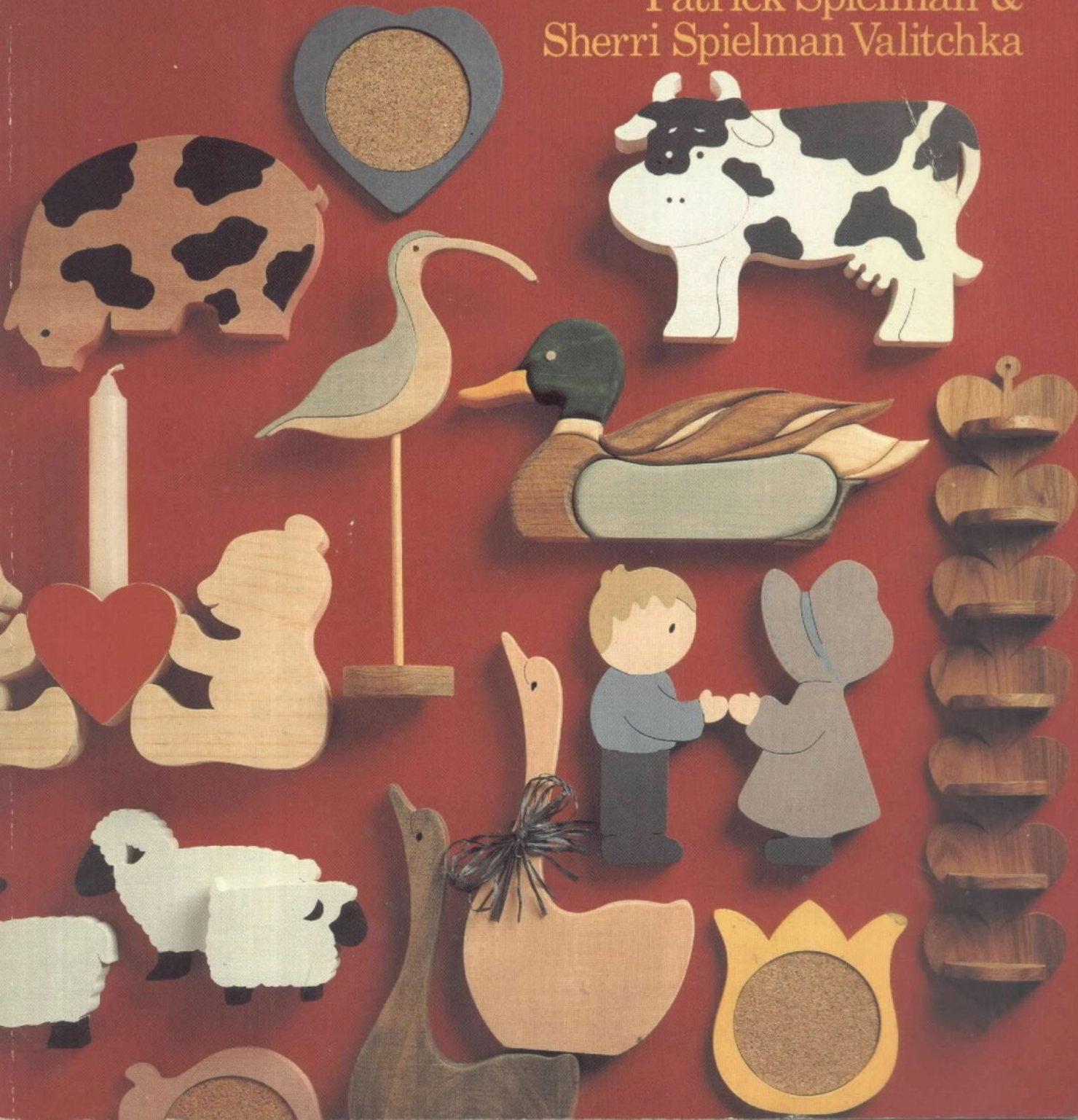

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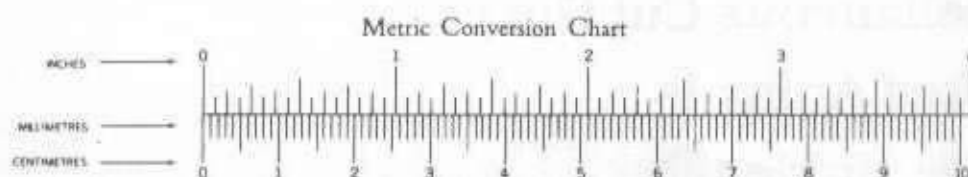

Introduction and Helpful Tips

The country look in home decorating has evolved over the last 10 to 15 years to become a standard. Country has proven to be more than a passing trend as some experts earlier predicted. Today, country designs cut out of wood are favorites among decorators, collectors, and woodworkers across North America and Europe.

Country style gives a feeling of warmth and coziness to a home. The country look contributes to the homeowner's sense of peace and serenity away from his daily struggles with the masses, the cold plastics, and high tech environments of the work place. People want to see and touch real wood. They like one-of-a-kind objects, hand-made works that are special and uniquely different from mass produced products.

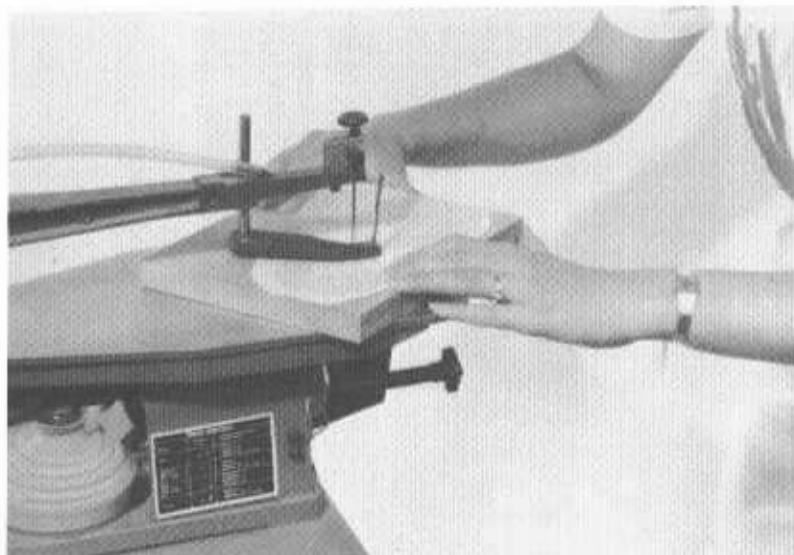
All this is good news for the scroll saw woodworker. Country cut-outs are fun, fast and easy to do. Making these objects requires no great artistic or special mechanical aptitudes. The necessary sawing skills are learned quickly. (See Illus. 1.) Anyone above the age of nine can soon learn to make objects for their own use and pleasure, or for giving and/or to sell for fair profits.

Also on the list of good news for the scroll saw owner are some new machine developments and a number of tips and shortcuts that greatly simplify the work. The new "constant tension" scroll saws manufactured in the last dozen or so years make accurate, detailed cutting of thicker materials faster and easier than ever before possible. (See Illus. 1.)

All of the patterns in this book can be cut with any scroll or jig saw. Many patterns

can also be cut with a band saw. However, generally speaking, scroll saws cut almost as fast as band saws and they are much safer. They can also cut sharper turns and saw out inside openings, making them well-suited for smaller work such as these patterns. To use these patterns, you'll need to transfer them from the page to your work, and for this you first need a copy of the pattern. It's easy to find a paper that is sufficiently transparent so you can trace over the dark black outlines of the patterns. An office copy machine, however, makes quick work of this step. Pattern copies can also be enlarged or reduced to practically any predetermined size on many machines. Copiers are becoming more and more sophisticated and also accessible to almost everyone. Most public libraries have them as do most quick printing establishments for individuals to use. Many businesses and schools, even in remote, rural towns and villages, often make them available for public use on a cost per copy basis. Pattern copies of any size can now be made in just seconds for pennies a copy. Gone are those labor intensive and crude copying and enlarging techniques using graph grids, difficult to adjust pantographs, or methods of tracing off of various illuminated projection devices.

Now all that is needed is an easy, speedy, and accurate method of transferring the copied pattern to the work piece. To satisfy this important requirement, we highly recommend a spray adhesive to bond the pattern directly onto the wood, such as 3-M's Scotch Brand Spray Mount Artist's Adhesive (catalog #6065.) Most photography stores and studios carry this as do art,



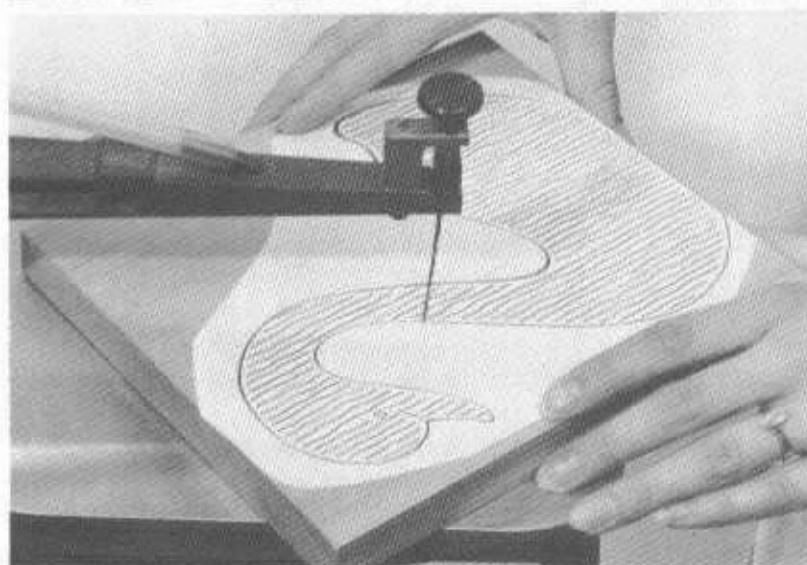

graphics, and craft supply stores. One can, costing under \$10.00, will last the average scroll sawyer about 1 year, and is a superb material.

To use the adhesive, simply apply a very light mist to the back of the pattern copy. (See Illus. 2.) Wait 15 to 30 seconds and press the pattern copy onto your wood with hand pressure and, presto!—you're ready to begin sawing. (See Illus. 3.) Gone are the frustrations of doing tracings, working with carbon papers and similar techniques that never really produced clear, crisp, or accurate layout lines which are obviously so essential to good sawing. When sawing is completed, the pattern is easily peeled off. (See Illus. 4.) The adhesive leaves virtually no residue on the wood that might inhibit subsequent finishing. We feel obligated, by tradition I suppose, to sand the wood surface with just a few strokes of 220 abrasive before finishing, but it's really doubtful if this is even necessary.

We have made a serious effort to provide a fresh, new selection of scroll saw patterns in this book to complement those of our other pattern books, including the new *Spielman's Original Scroll Saw Patterns*. The fine, crisp lines with extra shading should help let you know where and where not to drill or saw. This we feel also helps to relieve eye strain and contributes to easier and more accurate cutting. We have included almost 400 patterns in 28 different categories. Our intent is to provide a wide range of new projects, from fairly simple ones to those of intermediate challenge level. Overall, in terms of difficulty the patterns in this book fall somewhere in between those in our *Scroll Saw Pattern Book* and *Scroll Saw Fretwork Techniques And Patterns*, prepared with professional scroll sawyer, James Reidle.

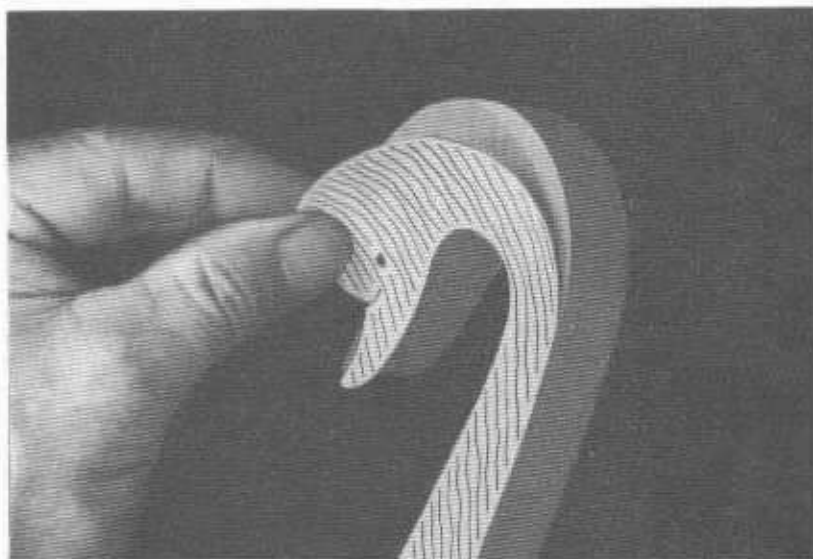
Try to visualize the many ways a single pattern, of your liking, can be used. This will multiply the value of this book and the number of projects you can make with one pattern. Although not fully illustrated here, think about using various pattern designs

as wall hangings, shelf or mantle decorations, as door stops, tree or window ornaments, paper weights, key chains, miniatures and jewelry, refrigerator magnets, or just add pegs (Illus. 5) or hooks to hang things on. Think of the designs used as overlay or pierced decorations glued on to plaques, cabinet doors and panels, on jewelry boxes and ornamentation on wood signs to name just a few more application possibilities. Flip-flop the design or cut them in pairs and make a row of the same pattern. Or, for even more variety, cut the same pattern from different materials.

Most of the patterns can be sawn from materials of your choice of species, type, and thickness. For your information, we have indicated the materials we used to make the projects illustrated in the color section. These are only suggestions. Where specific dimensions or finishes are important to a project pattern, they are included. Many of the projects can be sawn either from any solid wood or from a plywood you might choose in any thickness from $\frac{1}{32}$ inch to $2\frac{3}{4}$ inch or more—whatever is your preference or is dictated by the capacity of your scroll saw.

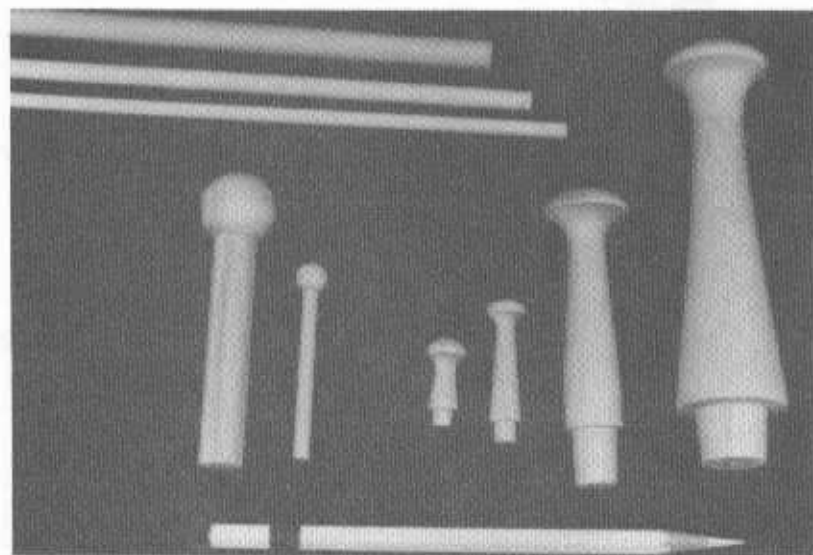
Piercing and inside cutting is a necessary technique for cutting out openings and to do line work detailing. Piercing requires drilling a very small hole(s) to permit the blade (No. 4 or 5) to be threaded through the work. (See Illus. 6 and 7.) Once the blade is again clamped on each end in the machine and tensioned, sawing can proceed as usual until the inside opening work is completed. The piercing technique is also an effective way of using the scroll saw to cut away a single inside line. Sawing a line through the thickness of the work will dramatically accentuate the design detail intended on many patterns.

Stack cutting or plural sawing involves layering two or more pieces on top of each other and sawing them simultaneously. This results in perfectly identical sawn parts. (See Illus. 8.) Stack cutting is a good technique to employ to increase produc-



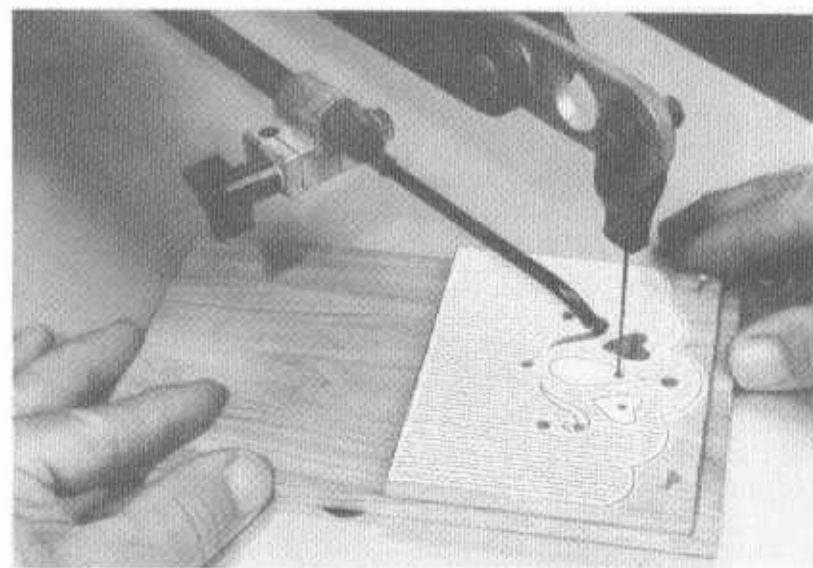

After sawing is completed, the pattern lifts off the wood easily, leaving no residue to interfere with finishing.



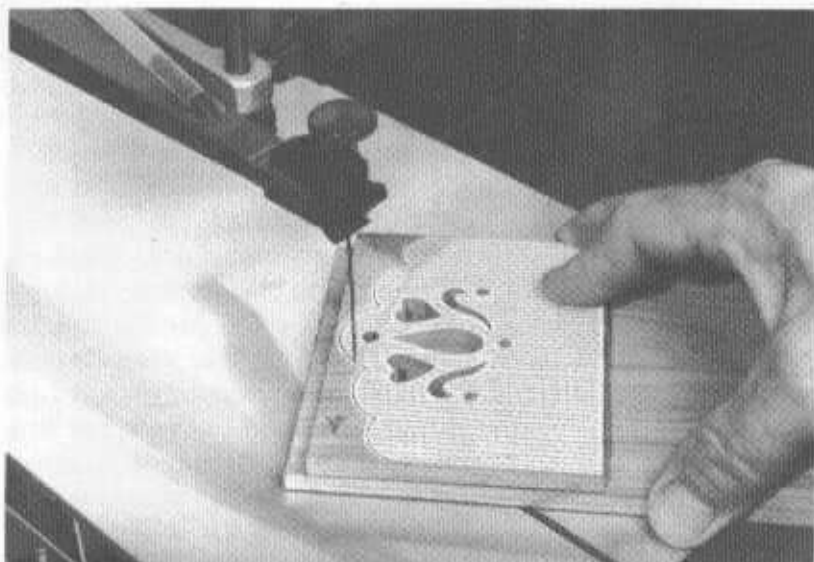

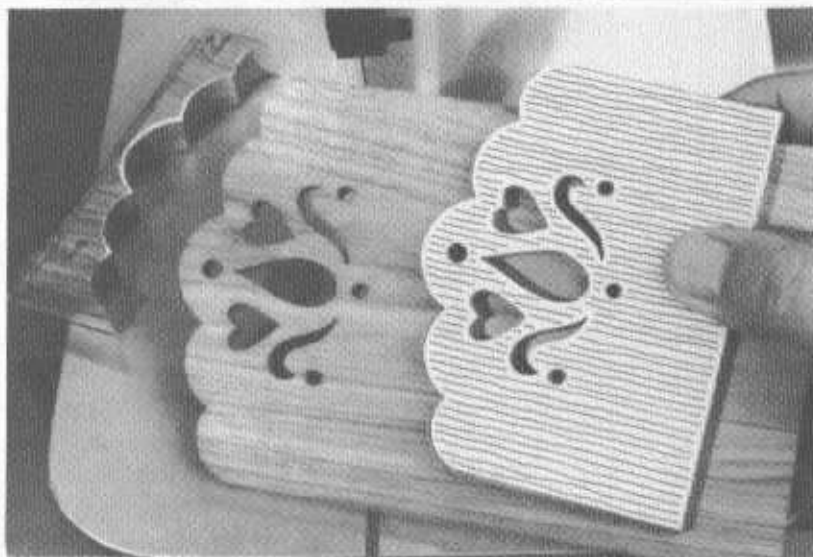

tion. The essential requirement is that the work pieces be temporarily secured to each other so they don't slip around during sawing. Various methods are used. Nailing or spot gluing in the waste area (if you have a waste area) works well when sawing thicker size stock. (See Illus. 8.) Spot gluing with just a little hot melt permits later separation.

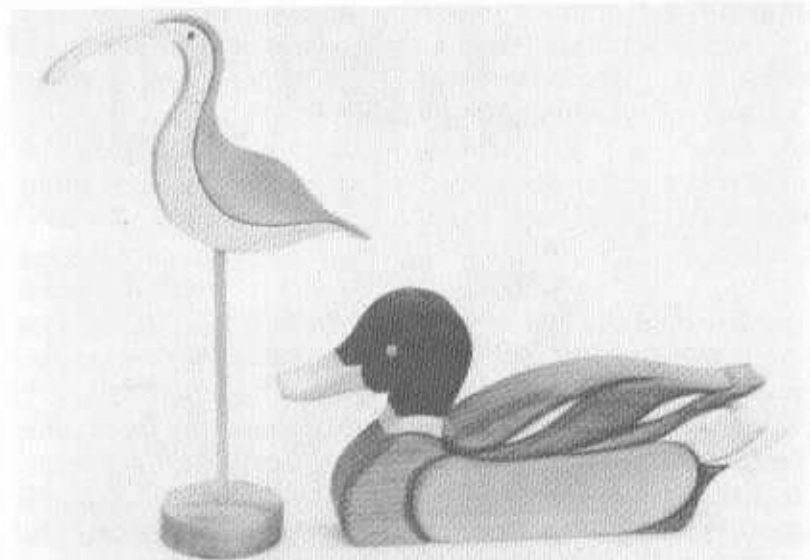
Double-faced tape (Illus. 9) is also handy for stack cutting. You can make your own double-faced tape by using scraps of paper coated on both sides with the spray adhesive (Illus. 2) that you use to apply patterns to your work piece. This technique works great for holding layers together of all materials including those too thin to nail effectively. Spray-coated paper has more than sufficient sheer strength so the layers won't slip. On the other hand, it has a very low peel resistance which allows the layers to be separated very easily when sawing is finished. Commercially produced double-faced tape has a very aggressive tack and occasionally leaves some sticky stuff on the surface and sometimes it will pull fibers and splinters up with it. In some situations masking tape, filament tape or other types can be wrapped around stacked pieces.

Finishing. The country look often combines natural light colored or bleached woods with blue, white, and yellow painted accents. Light reddish pastels and even pinks along with natural woods are now popular. Natural woods combined with pat-

terned papers or fabrics are also popular. Small floral prints or thin stripes of sharply contrasting colors make good accents when glued onto or displayed with wood.

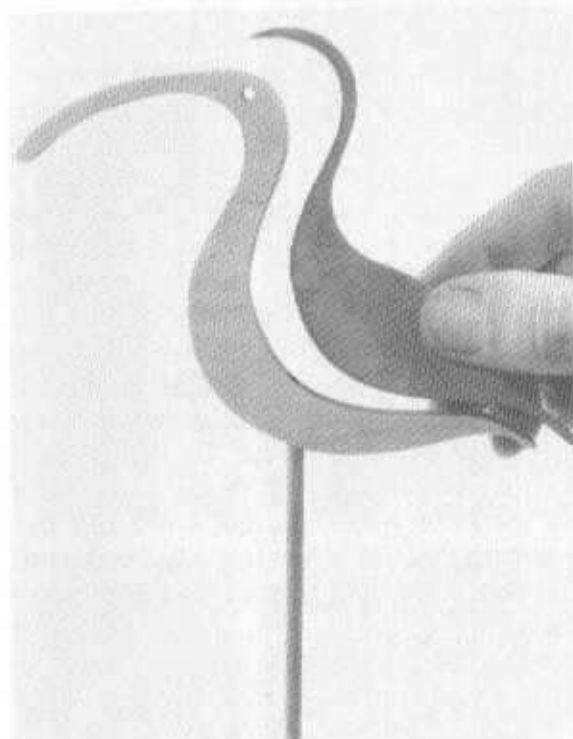
Penetrating natural oil finishes such as the popular Deft and Watco brands (Illus. 10) are ideal for natural woods. If you've never used this type of finish, give it a try. Pigmented acrylic finishes are great for coloring and adding details. (See Illus. 11, 12, and 13.) Imaginative ideas can be worked up to make fairly uninteresting cut outs come alive with attractive personalities. Repetitive, contrasting dot patterns painted over a solid colored surface is one useful technique. (See Illus. 13, 14, and 15.)

Segmentation is simply sawing the pattern into various parts and then gluing them all back together. (See Illus. 16.) This is an especially useful technique that can be employed to simplify finishing while creating an unusually attractive effect. To create segmented projects the design is sawn into individual parts or pieces. (See Illus. 17.) The edges of each part should be softened or rounded over to accent the joint when the parts are reassembled. This can be accomplished by using sandpaper on small projects, (Illus. 18) or a carving knife and sandpaper and/or a router on projects having much larger pieces. The individual parts are best colored different shades before they are reassembled. Coloring can be accomplished by using pigmented oil finishes, oil stains, dyes or pigmented finishes.



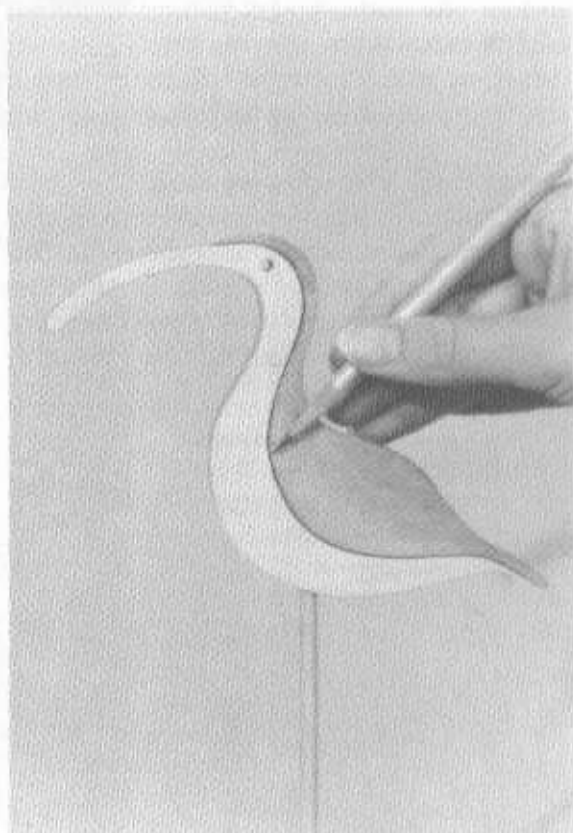

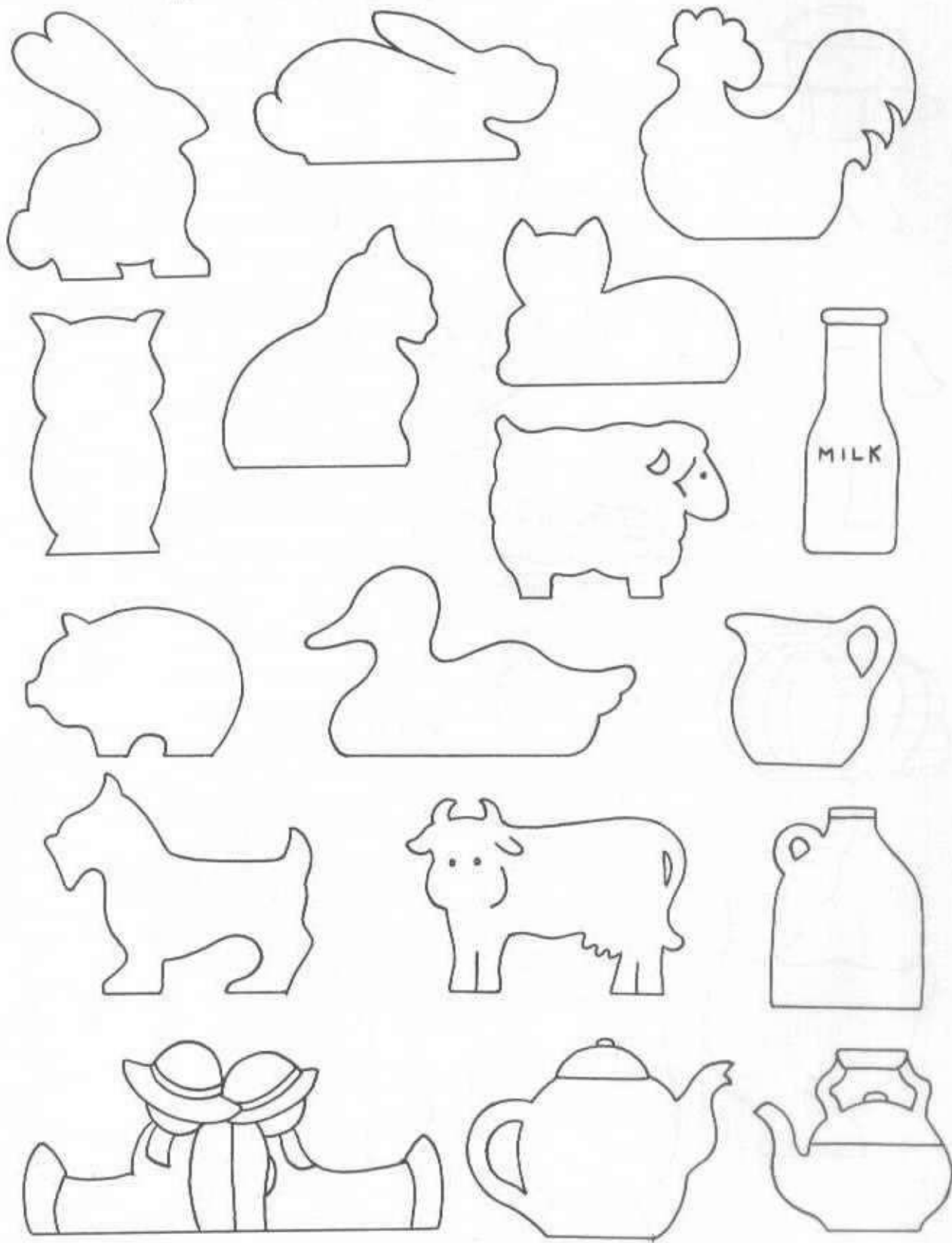
A simple two-piece segmentation project. The upper part is stained and then glued back to the other unstained piece to create an attractive two-tone effect.

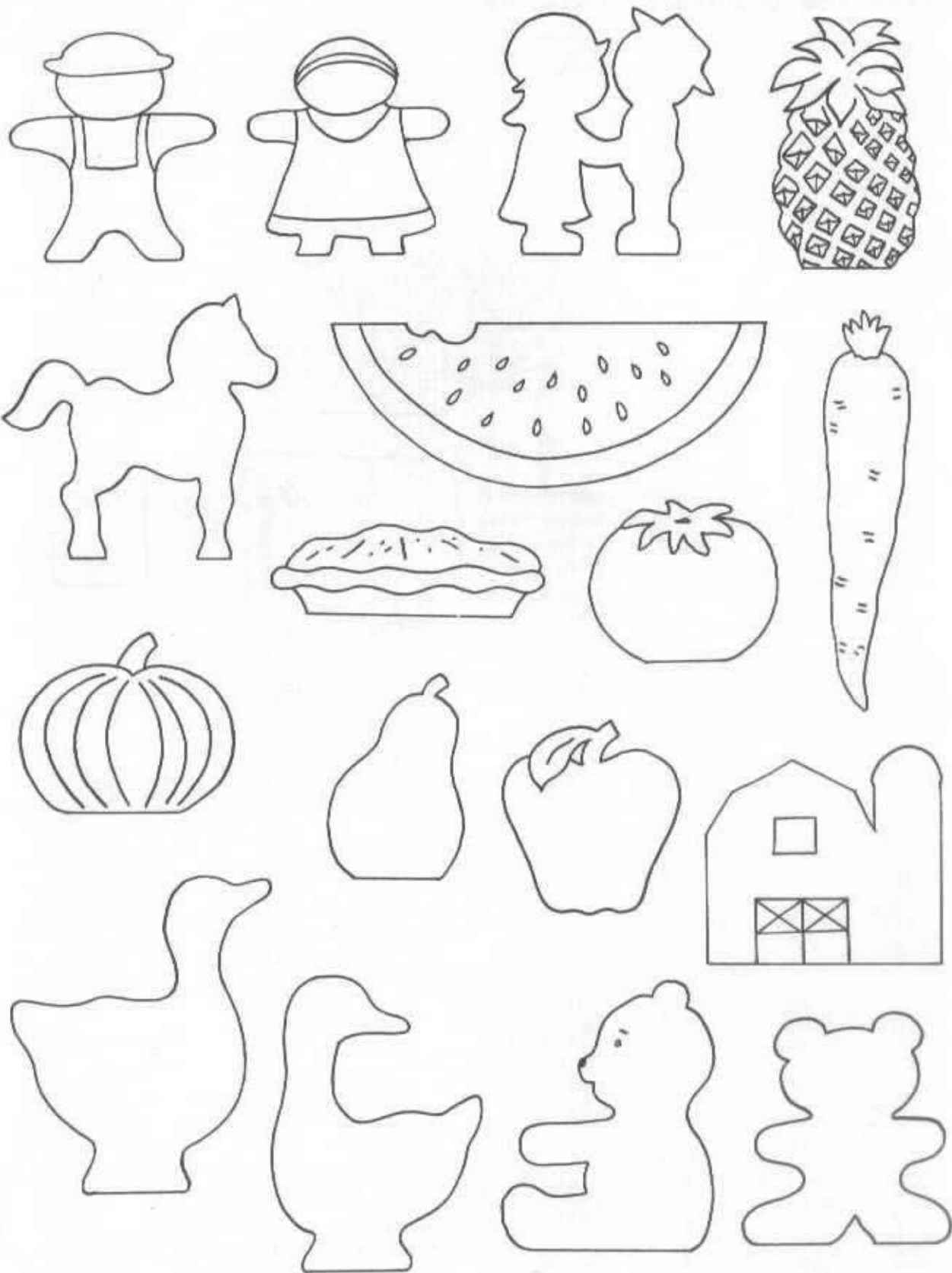

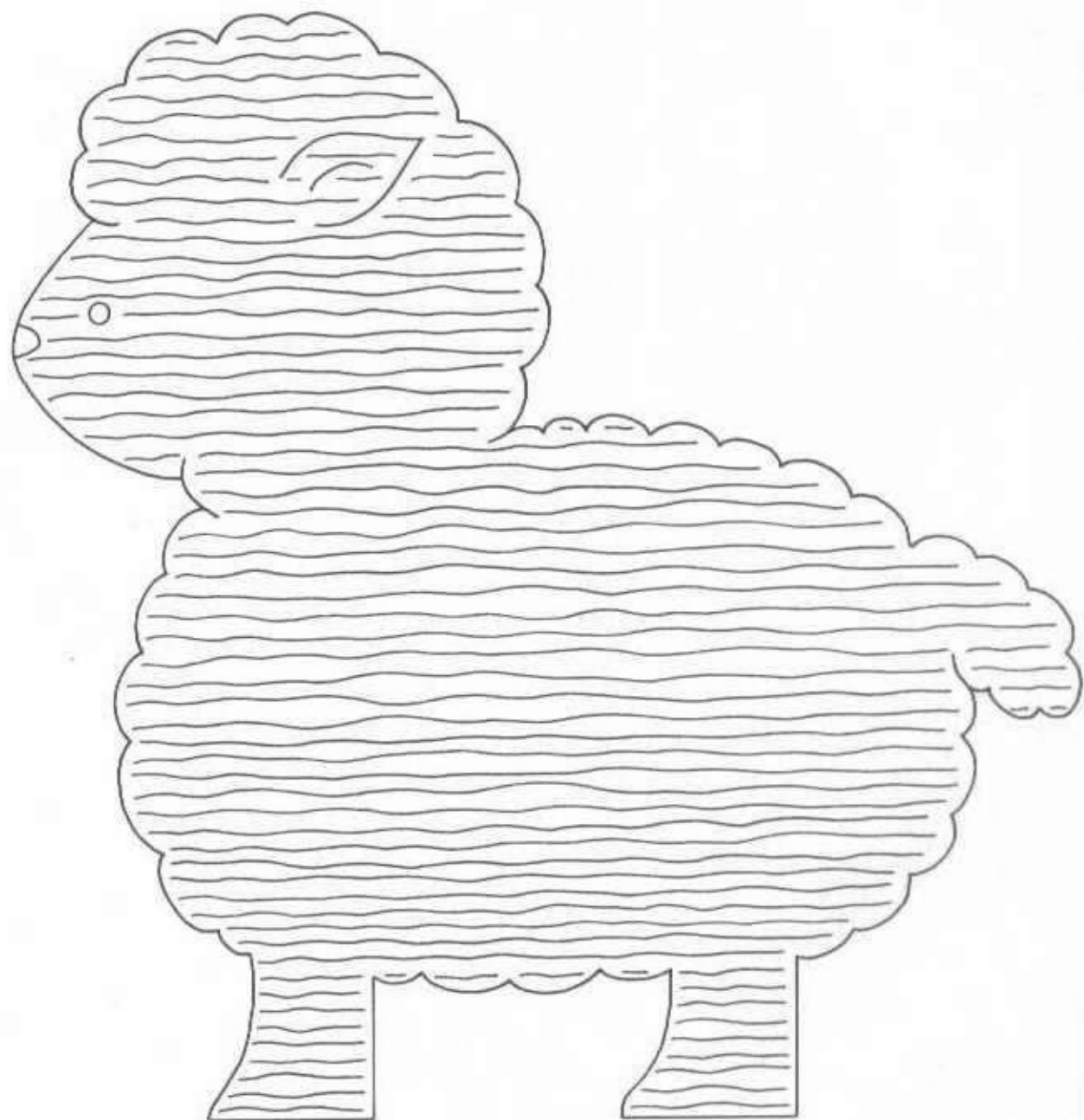
Slightly rounding the sawn edges at the joint with sandpaper before staining makes for a better looking finished product.

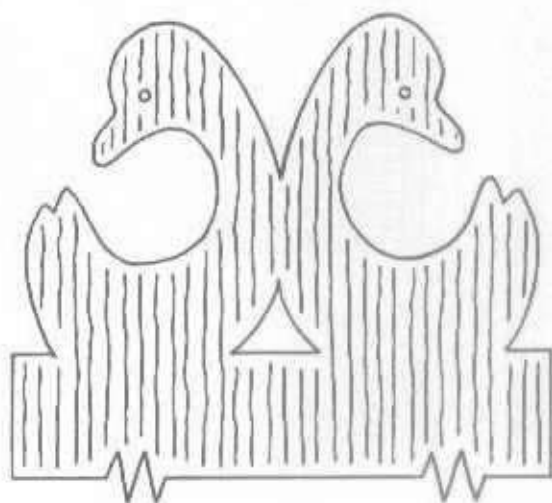
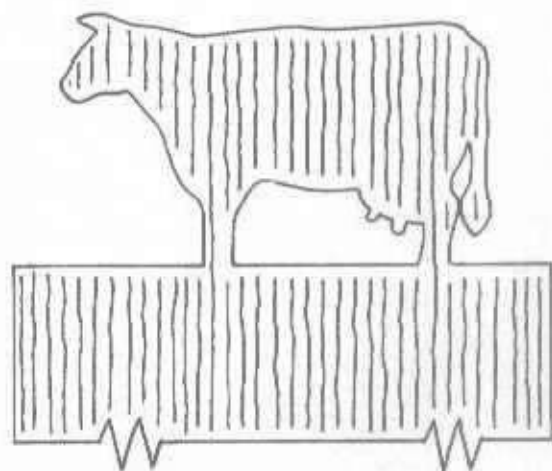
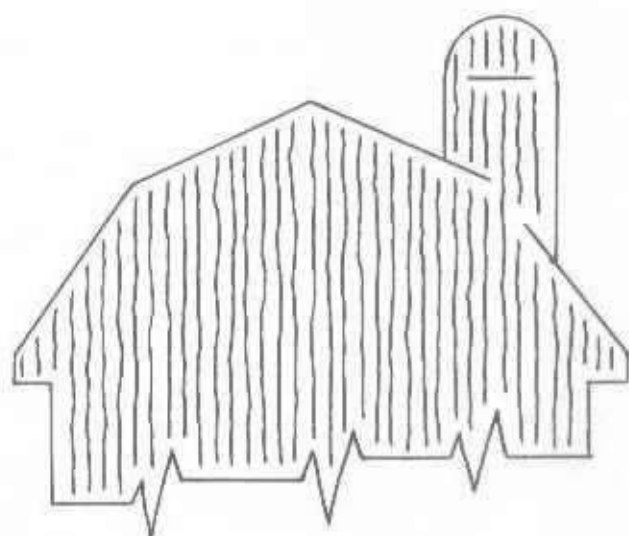
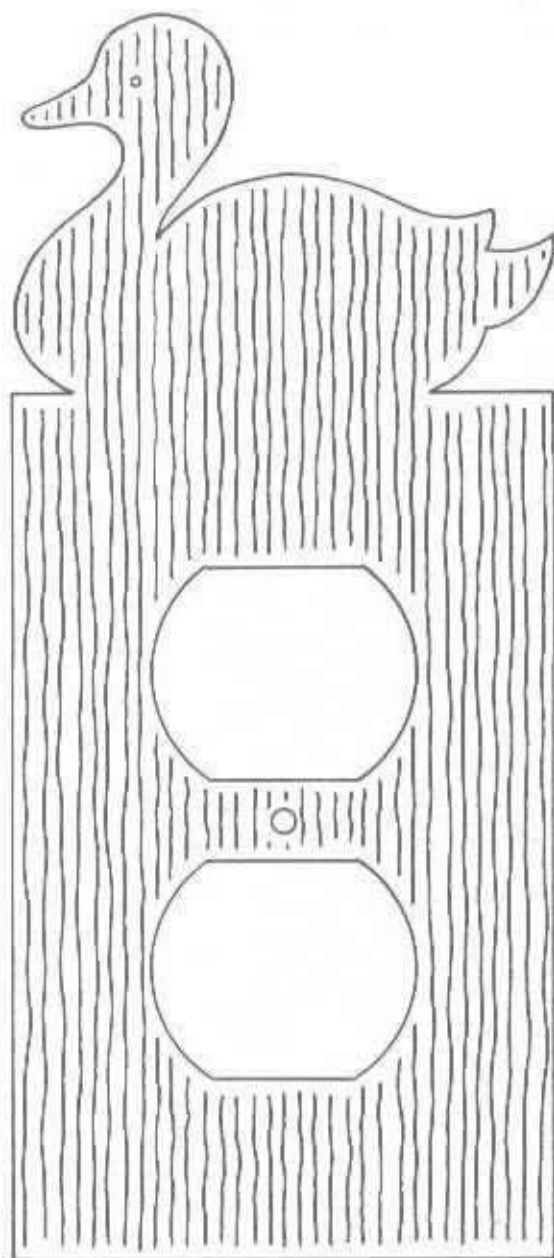
Rear view of a typical two-piece switch plate.

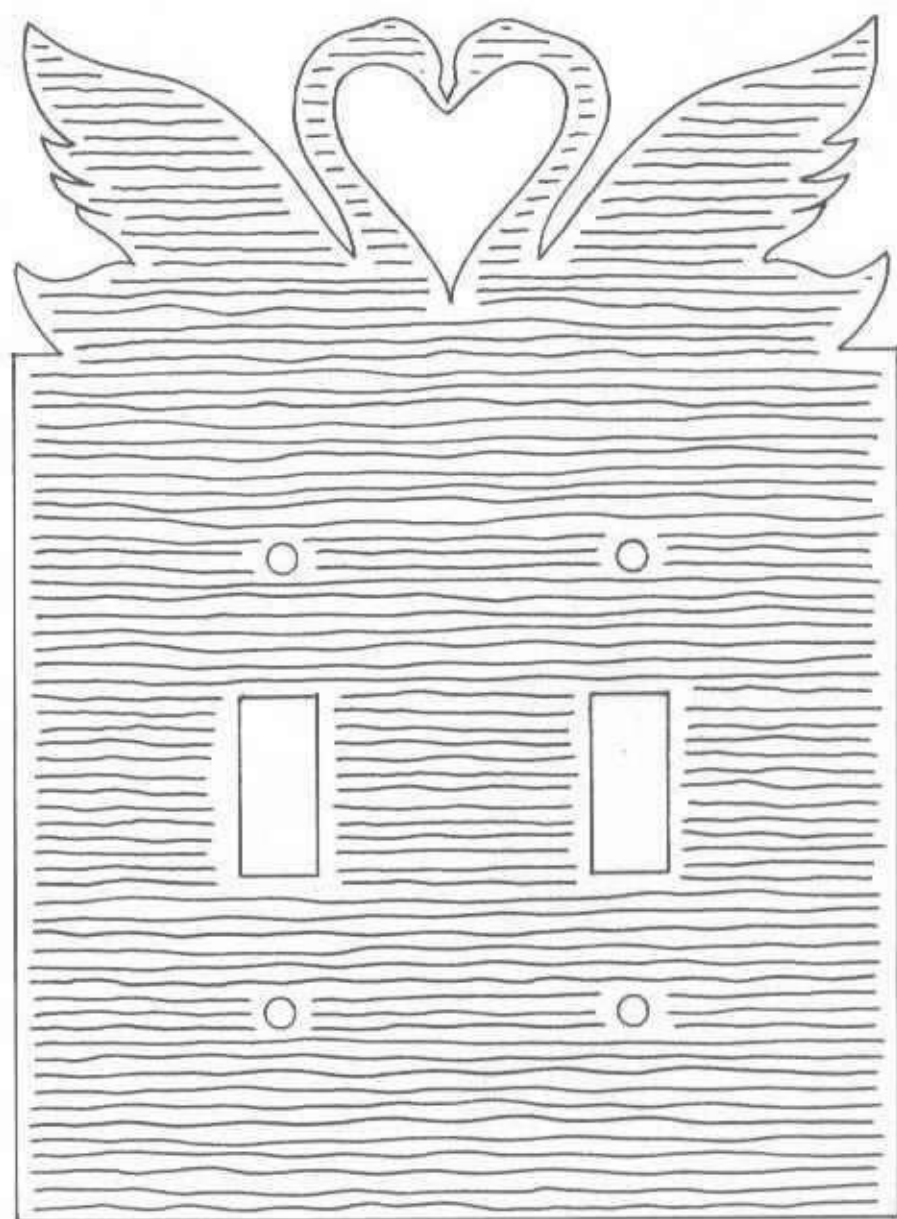


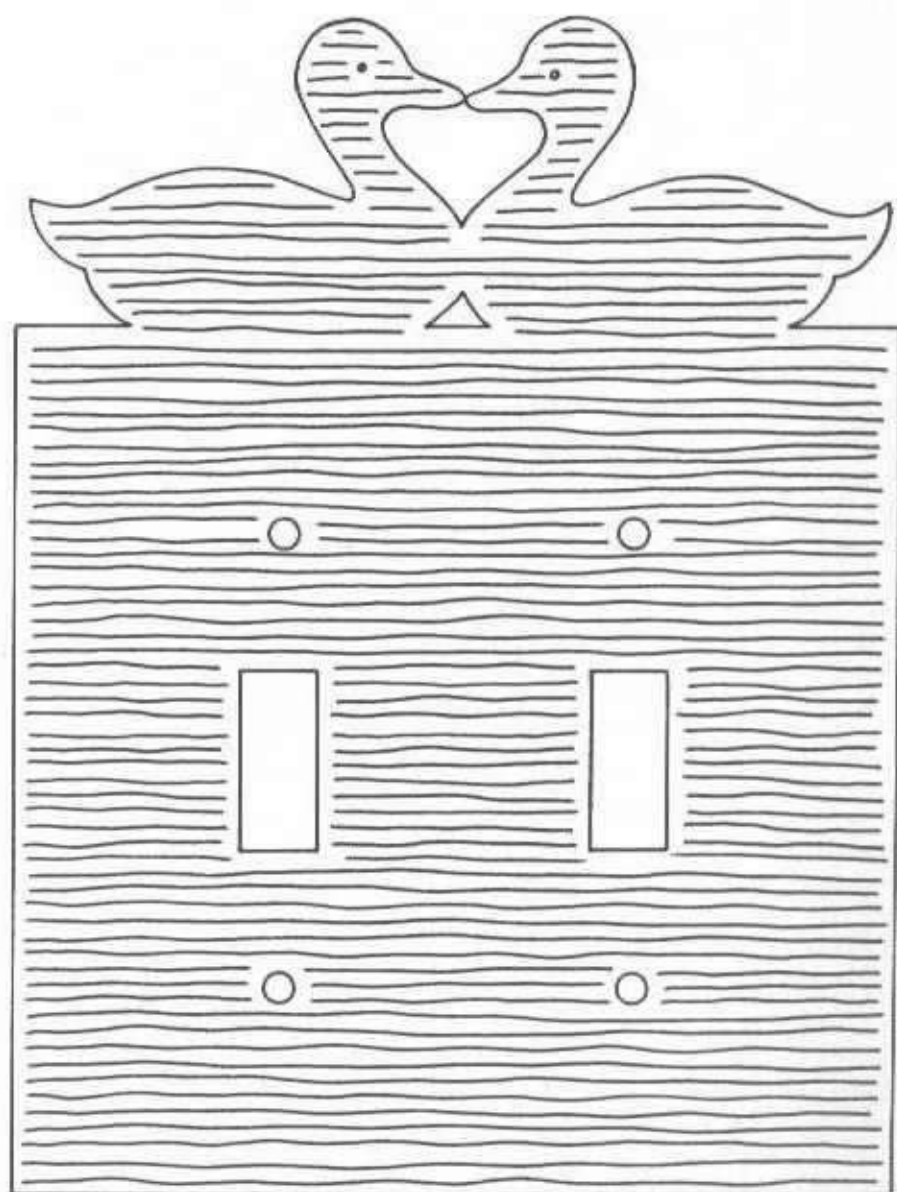

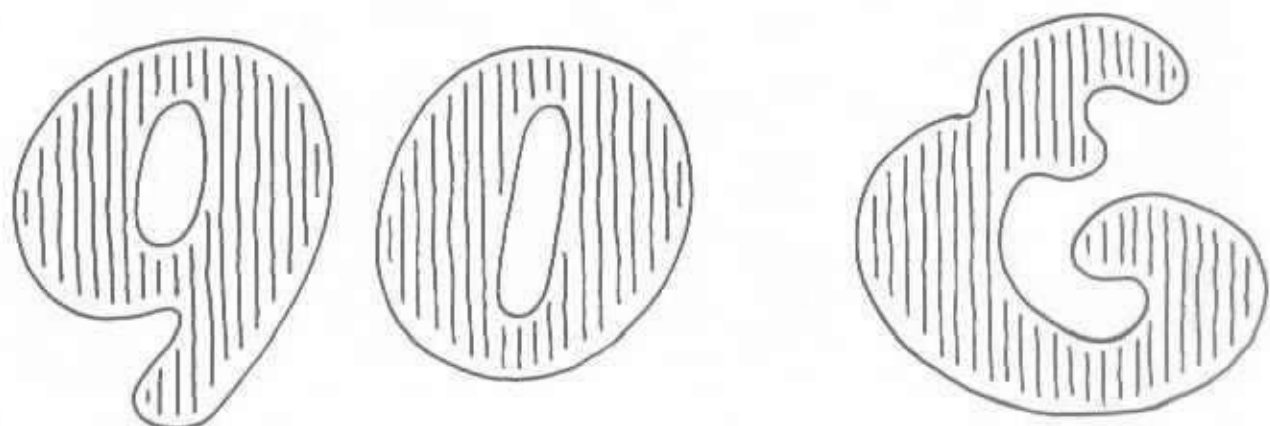
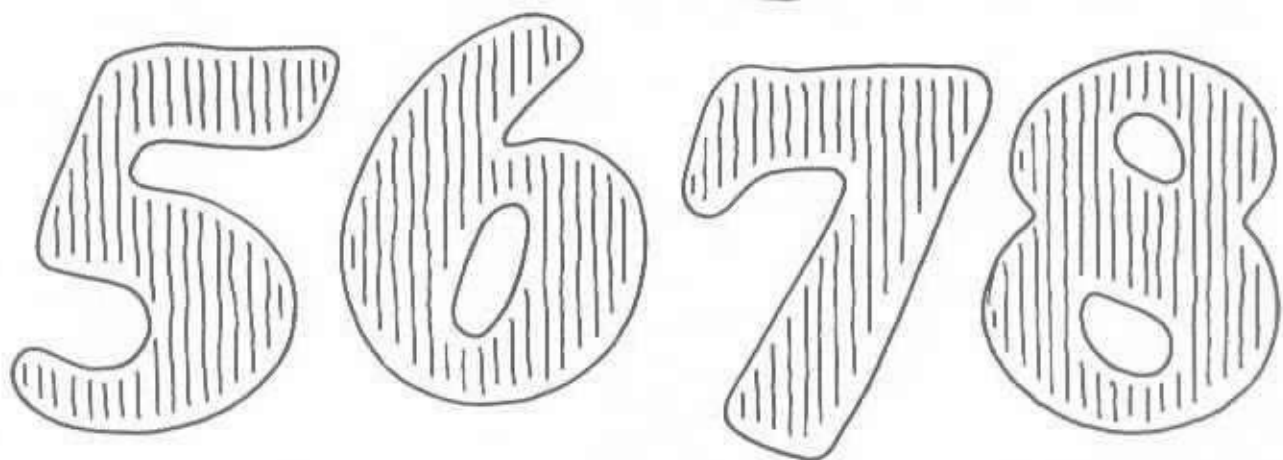
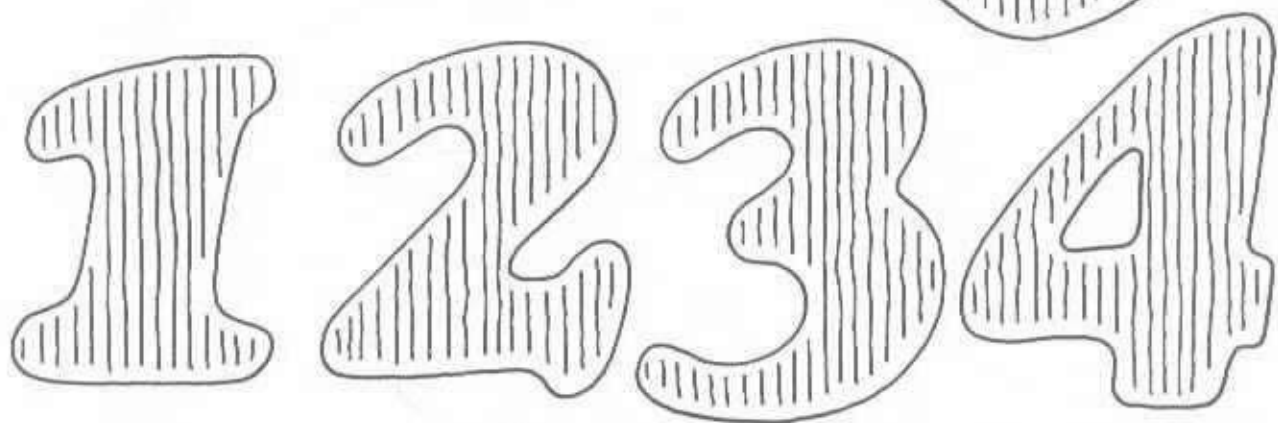
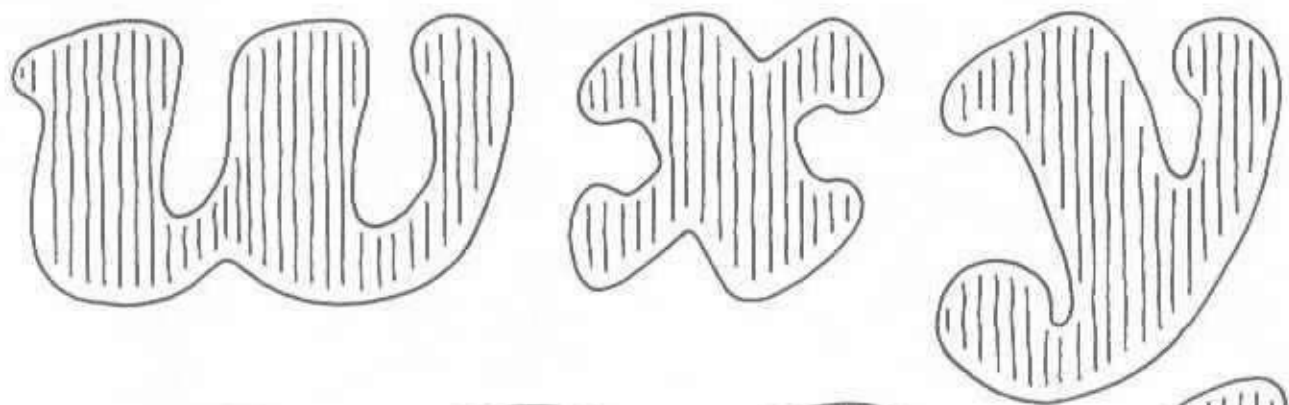
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About The Authors
