# CORGI'S TERRIFIC NEWLY-TOOLED BRISTOL FIGHTER IS SET TO BE A REAL HIGH-FLYER

**THE** outbreak of the Great War placed a moral burden on the shoulders of a young Edward, Prince of Wales, heir to the British throne. Desperate to do his duty and be seen alongside the thousands of troops heading for France, he was forbidden from joining his Grenadier Guards regiment at the front by Lord Kitchener, who was concerned about the potential damage his loss or capture would have on a nation at war.

Nevertheless, over the course of the next four years, the Prince would regularly visit the trenches and was extremely popular amongst the fighting men of Britain. An early supporter of the aeroplane, the Prince is thought to have made several flights whilst in France. However, an incident which reputedly occurred in September 1918 is quite

astonishing. Whilst visiting No.139 Squadron in Italy, the Prince was taken on several flights in Bristol F2B Fighter D-8063 by celebrated Canadian ace and friend William Barker and on one such flight, it was reported that the Prince was taken close to the front lines, where he fired the aircraft's Lewis guns on enemy trenches.

On hearing of this unofficial action, the King was said to be furious and chastised his son, telling him "never to be so foolish again". Although the Bristol F2B Fighter would go on to be regarded as one of the finest fighting aeroplanes of the Great War, its combat introduction on the Western Front was inauspicious to say the least. Intended as a replacement for the much maligned Royal Aircraft Factory BE2c, the Bristol Fighter was

rushed into service so it could take part in the Second Battle of Arras in April 1917 and demonstrate the advancement in Allied aircraft design. During its first operational sortie on 5th April, six aircraft from No. 48 Squadron RFC, led by famous VC winner William Leefe Robinson, were bounced by Albatros fighters of Jasta 11, led by Manfred von Richthofen. During the ensuing melee, four of the new fighters, including the one flown by Robinson, were shot down, with another suffering serious damage VC hero Robinson was initially posted as killed in action, but later discovered to have been taken prisoner.

Despite this, once the many qualities of the Bristol Fighter had been appreciated, pilots quickly learned that this large aeroplane could be flown extremely aggressively and was more than capable of taking on the German fighters. With a fixed forward-firing Vickers gun for the pilot and Scarff ring mounted Lewis guns for the observer, the Bristol fighter would enable crews to score victory numbers equivalent

to those claimed by single seat fighters.

Corgi's stunning new tooling has been worth the wait, as it is packed with detail and the finish to the colour scheme is first rate, with the paint having a fabulously authentic matte finish. The graphics are perfectly applied too, really adding to the overall appeal of this great aircraft.

It's quite a size compared to some of Corgi's other World War I aircraft at this scale, but the usual included stand is more than up to its supporting role. A great model with a truly marvellous back story.



**VOLVO** unveiled its first generation C70 at the 1996 Paris Motor Show, introducing it to the European market as a 1997 model, and a year later as a 1998 model in North America. The C70 broke Volvo's decadeslong styling tradition of 'boxy' designs and was the company's first luxury coupé since the 780. Peter Horbury designed the exterior and Mexican designer Jose Diaz de la Vega led the interior team. According to Horbury, Volvo's Design Chief from 1991 to 2002, Volvo "threw away the box, but kept the toy inside".

Developed and initially manufactured in conjunction with two-time Le Mans winners, Tom Walkinshaw Racing (TWR), the C70 in coupé form made headlines when it was chosen as the hero car for a remake of the classic *The Saint* TV series, with Val Kilmer taking over the role of Simon Templar. The choice of a Volvo coupe was natural given the iconic P800's role in the original series. Sadly the remake wasn't such a success.

So now onto DNA's most excellent replication. It's a resincast, of course, with all the finesse and dedication to authenticity that we have come to expect from our passionate Swiss friends. **NOW** here's a model to surely create some possibly heated discussions amongst us collectors. Brekina has been making plastic replicas in mainly 1/87 scale for many years, aimed mainly at the HO gauge continental model railway market. Since the company was acquired by the prolific Model Car World in 2018, it has begun to manufacture subjects that will be of great interest to collectors of UK buses.

This is not its first rodeo in terms of the Routemaster, as this is several releases down the line already. It has been on my radar for some time, but 1/87 is not one of my usual scales. What stands out for me with this release is that it comes in what Brekina describe as "neutral livery", which of course lends itself perfectly for the aftermarket decals industry to create a potentially seemingly endless run of registrations, fleet numbers, routes, destinations

and advertisements front, back and side. A little judicious painting to the grille area could also add variety with black as an option here too.

The interior, moulded in plastic too, of course, doesn't carry the moquette fabric detail. But at this scale you really have to look very closely indeed to notice that, and it doesn't detract from the finished model at all.

Running on authenticallytreaded tyres, the shape is excellent, with some very good detailing indeed, particularly for this diminutive scale.

So what about the material used? Well, coincidentally, this very discussion is the subject of Stephen Paul Hardy's *Signing off* column this month, so not wanting to duplicate or influence his point in anyway, I simply suggest you read page 85 before making your final decision.



# Porsche perfect

Porsche achieved a hat-trick of wins at Le Mans with its 919 Hybrids in 2017, but it wasn't a straightforward race. Ixo has just released Porsche's pair of entries in both 1/18 and 1/43 scales – **Rick Wilson** tries all four models out for size.

aving won the Le Mans 24 Hours in both 2015 and 2016, with its 919 Hybrid prototype, Porsche did not rest on its laurels and was determined to keep its crown from Toyota's grasp. The dramatic events on the very last lap of the 2016 race meant Porsche had luckily inherited the win that year, so it had spent quite a bit of time developing the car over the winter.

The 2017 evolution of the 919 was first seen in public at the pre-season test at Paul Ricard, in the south of France, in late March. With a more rounded front end and larger, bulbous headlights, the new car looked a little different, but there was no doubting how much faster it was.

The cars arrived for race week at Le Mans having only finished 4th and 5th in terms of the fastest times set during the test day a week earlier, making the trio of Toyotas the favourites – the TS050s looking set to finally lay Toyota's Le Mans ghost to rest, especially after the dramatic last lap loss in 2016. During qualifying, Porsche had found a little speed and would start in 3rd and 4th for the race – with Toyotas in 1st, 2nd and 5th. At the start, Toyota quickly established a healthy lead and when the #2 Porsche endured a lengthy pit stop to repair a front axle, things were looking bleak for the German manufacturer.

But Le Mans is rarely predictable and anything can happen during the long 24 hour race. Plus the weather was very hot for 2017 and that always helps

the gremlins. One by one, the Toyotas encountered problems – two had retired before half-distance and the third had been delayed early on, leaving the #1 Porsche with a sizeable lead. Just when the result seemed decided, fate intervened, as it always seems to at Le Mans. Grinding to a halt on the Mulsanne Straight with an unspecified mechanical failure, with just four hours to go, it left one of the diminutive LMP2s in charge of the race – the first time one of these smaller prototypes had ever led here.

Porsche #2 was still some way behind, but had been running faultlessly since its early repair. Being quite a bit faster, the trio of drivers – Timo Bernhard, Earl Bamber and Brendon Hartley – gradually took back the laps required and grabbed the lead with about an hour to go. Bernhard and Bamber had won the race before (for Audi in 2010 and Porsche in 2015 respectively), but it would be the first win at Le Mans for the talented young Kiwi, who would win again in 2020, driving for Toyota.

Ixo has released both of the Porsche entries for the 2017 race under its Limited Edition Series, in 1/18 and 1/43 scales. I've still yet to establish quite how many examples constitute the limited edition moniker, but what is obvious is that the quality of replication is absolutely top notch. This is particularly evident on the larger versions – the level of detailing is really something rather special. The reflective panel on the top of the cockpit and the rear exhaust outlets on the upper rear bodywork are two areas that are particularly worthy of extra praise.

Both model sizes feature diecast bodies on plastic bases. The printing of the colour scheme and graphics on both scales is perfectly reproduced too and that is no mean feat as the striping negotiates plenty of complex curves along its journey from the nose to the rear of the car. Having witnessed both cars at the race, with several photos taken during the event, I can vouch for the level of authenticity that Ixo has bestowed upon these perfect beauties.

After a trio of wins at the Le Mans 24 Hours with the 919 from 2015 to 2017, the board at Porsche decide to discontinue the racing programme, preferring to take an optimised chassis to selected European circuits during 2018 to show what the design could achieve without rulebook restrictions in place. The pinnacle of this would be achieved on 29th June 2018, at Nürburgring's Nordschleife, with Timo Bernhard at the wheel, setting an astonishing lap record of just 5 minutes and 19.55 seconds for the incredibly challenging 12.9 mile track

In addition to the models showcased here, Ixo has also released two other versions of this latest evolution of the 919, in both scales of course - the 2017 pre-season test car, trialled at Paul Ricard (Nos SP919-1819 and SP919-4319) and the 2018 Tribute version that was driven to that new lap record at Nürburgring by Timo Bernhard (SP919-1821 and SP919-4321) – all available for wholesale enquiries through John Ayrey Die-casts at **www.ayrey. co.uk**, or contact your preferred retailer.





# Arriving fast and furiously

In the April issue, **Stephen Paul Hardy** took a sneak peek at Solido's production schedule for 2021 which, as he now finds out, is being delivered both fast and furious.

ew toolings, revised liveries and reintroduced replica favourites are now coming through in very colourful waves of releases as we, already, head into Solido's second half-year catalogue period. Over the past few months the team here at Diecast Collector have tried to keep you updated on many of those releases which I thought I'd supplement with a quick round up of some that are very new or have, so far, slipped through our net.

#### **AMERICAN MUSCLE**

First up has to be a third model to supplement those

I covered in the March issue new model spotlight featuring Shelbys in white and blue with the Ford GT500 Fast Track in Oxford White (S1805904). This modern take on the legendary theme is a must-have display companion to the 1967 Shelby GT500 (S1802901) and 1965 Shelby Cobra 427 S/C (S1804906) showcased that month.

Strong competition on the strip, ready to 'shut down' the GT500 FastTrack, comes in the shape of two of 2021's totally new Solido toolings – a pair of Dodge Challenger SRTs. Manifesting twenty-first century American automotive muscle, this pair are far from just colour variations of a single casting. The separate body toolings are evident from their correctly different bonnet treatments. These two are both heavyweight in charisma and to hold. You get a solid feel from both looking at and then handling them. The clean contemporary widebody lines of the cars are nicely captured and well detailed up to authentically represent their respective

1:1 counterparts. In contemporarily fashionable black detailing over metallic orange comes the Hellcat version, powered by its V8/700hp engine (S1805703)and in attention grabbing green comes

the Scat Pack version (S1805704) with its distinctive black tail striping kit. Clearly aimed at sales to North American collectors, these three models will however no doubt be plentifully sought by many European fans of American cars as well. Like all of the Solido models, they have diecast bodies with opening features detailed out with plastic external and internal trim, and posable front wheels. Shut lines on the opening features, such as to the doors, are getting cleaner and tighter to the extent that Solido very helpfully include a small plastic tool within the model's packaging to prise them open. Fingernails are now obsolete as door openers here! And, whilst admiring the clean shut lines, check out how well the small plastic insets of the North American side marker lights at front and back sit in the cast body panels. Staying with American style lighting, check out the tail ends of these Challenger SRTs too, which stand up very well to comparison with photos of the real thing.

#### **EUROPEAN RALLY**

Staying briefly on the American side of the Atlantic, the endurance testing Press On Regardless (POR) road rally was organised by the Detroit Region of the Sports Car Club of America. In 1972, the event was part of the International Championship for Manufacturers and, in 1973 and 1974, was one of events contributing to the World Rally Championship (WRC). The latter event was won by Jean-Luc Thérier and Christian Delferier in a Renault 17 Gordini #12, as now modelled by Solido's colourfully evocative release (S1803703). As an aside Al Schmit's SCCA (Sports Car Club of America) Volkswagen Super (1303) Beetle, previously released by Solido (S1800506), was also a contender in that 1974 POR event as #49, but was forced to retire before the finish.

This Renault 17 Gordini model illustrates very aptly the current level of detailing Solido are achieving. Look past the crisply defined, extensive, decal laden livery to check out the details such as the front & rear lighting, bumpers and wheels. They are really good and the overall look of the bodywork – in terms of line and proportions look pretty good as well.

Returning to European shores, bringing us up to date, and making a dramatic illustration of how much rally cars have developed over the years comes the Alpine A110 Rally of Francois Delecour and Jean-Rodolphe Guigonnet from last year's Rallye Du Mont Blanc #38 (S1801607). The dazzling livery and subject theme of this model underlines yet again how much effort Solido is putting into coverage of motorsport. Taking us back in time to span between

the two previous models, and to further illustrate the coverage of that motorsport catalogue theme, is the Alpine A310 Pack GT from 1983 (S1801204) in Calberson colours. Now known as GEODIS, Calberson, with its black, yellow and red liveries was a notable rally sponsor in the past, becoming part of French motorsport history as a result.

There is no doubt that Alpine styling over the years has been consistently and immediately recognisable. Idiosyncratic traits seem to have permeated the successive generations of body line whilst at the same time reflecting fashions of the decades from which they came. Whilst the current generation of A110 includes more than a nod towards the classic Giovanni Michelotti A110 of the sixties, with its body line curves that challenged the Ferrari Dino 206 GT and 246 GT GTS in their attractiveness, the A310 was an equally classic example of a flatness, an angularness that permeated automotive design in the seventies and into the eighties. Styling that is highlighted and accentuated by the Calberson livery colours. Solido's Alpine catalogue coverage embraces all three generations with some fifteen models.


Keeping with the 1980s, but moving onwards from France to Italy and in another new tooling comes the robust and very purposeful Fiat 131 Rally, as modified from the standard series production 131 by Abarth. Solido has issued two versions of the 131 Rally so far - the 1980 Monte Carlo winning car #10 of Walter Röhrl and Christian Geistdörfer (S1806001) and this street version (S1806002). Produced in limited numbers in bright paintwork, the Abarth version upgraded the arguably rather plain 131 series production into something that exuded a European take on muscle without falling into boy-racer mode. Detailing of the Abarth/ Bertone modifications laudably sets off the red paintwork, the combined effect adding up to what is, all in all, another really nice 1980s themed model.

#### **NOSTALGIC VINTAGE**

As I mentioned in my Signing off column last month, the Solido Club is back. The previous subscription basis for collecting the re-imagined 1/43 Series 100 vintage models has now been replaced by the much simpler direct purchase, either from Solido dealers or from the Club website online store. Reflecting this,

the range has been added into the Solido catalogue as a new range as *Vintage 1/43e*. The original eight models that can be found on the Club website have now just be supplemented with four of them re-released in second colour versions – 1959 Simca Océane Cabriolet in orange (previously teal) as S1001102, 1961 Citroën Ami 6 in red with white roof (previously pale green with white roof) as S1001142, 1962 Ford Thunderbird Coupe in black with white roof (previously Rose with black Roof) as S1001282 and 1963 Aston Martin DB5 Vantage in British Racing Green (previously metallic dark blue) as S1001302.

As with most other contemporary replica models that we have seen released over the past few years, the Series 100 cars come in period style cardboard boxes thoughtfully packaged first in plastic bags to prevent paintwork rub. The Thunderbird and DB5 feature opening doors and the Océane comes with a female driver figure – the background to this detail being that when Simca launched the Océane at the Paris Motor show in 1956 the intention was to offer a car with a nod to contemporary US styling inspired by the Ford Thunderbird, whilst at the same time having women in mind in the wake of the "BB" (Brigitte Bardot) effect on fashion.

All of the Series 100 releases are, as replica models, enchanting and come with that nostalgia tug effect. Personal favourites include the cabrio models from the series - the Océane in both its colour versions so far in particular. But it is the even more quintessentially 1960s French Ami that I really take to heart. Setting aside its contemporary feel as a retro toy car it is the working suspension of the model has that, under finger pressure, replicates the Ami's typically soft Citroën ride characteristics so beautifully that I could play with it for ages!

As for the 1/18 releases whilst the colourful liveried rally models are all eye catching I found myself surprised by how endeared I was to the green Dodge Challenger SRT Scat Pack version (S1805704) and red street version Fiat 131 Abarth Rally (S1806002). To me they both have a good robust, weighty, feel to them that somehow conveys modern tooling and attention to modelling quality rather than simple material bulk. They both convey to me how hard Solido is continuing to concentrate on upping its game and giving collectors as much value as they can for the money.

# Maltese buses

**Mike Pigott** picks up a pair of souvenirs based on classic buses from Malta.



n a recent trip to Malta, I managed to locate a couple of diecast models of buses that had been designed in Malta and based on the traditional local coachbuilding style. Whilst I have seen Maltese souvenir buses before, many of these had been pirate copies of Corgi and EFE models, or re-coloured American school buses. Corgi had made a number of Bedford OB buses in Maltese liveries, in both 1/50 and 1/76 scales, but these were inaccurate as they used the Duple Coach castings, with British rather than Maltese bodywork. The two souvenir models I bought were based on genuine Maltese buses.

#### **BUSES IN MALTA**

Other than a few ferries, buses are the only form of public transport in Malta and its neighbouring island, Gozo. Bus services have been running since the early 1900s and most buses were based on imported chassis fitted with local bodies. As Malta was a British protectorate until 1964, the majority of buses were imported from the UK, with Bedford, Leyland and AEC being the most common marques. Like the UK, Malta drives on the left, so, even after independence, most buses continued to be sourced from Britain, and many second-hand single decker buses and coaches were sent to Malta. Entry on Maltese-built buses was through an open panel at the front.

Buses in Malta were run by private owneroperators formed into co-operatives. Although the buses were generally well looked-after, they were a fairly rag-tag fleet of different marques and styles, many of which were obsolete models. The owners were very proud of them and the buses were often ▲ A pair of genuine Maltese buses – a Leyland from Malta and a Bedford from the neighbouring island of Gozo.

customised, with intricate coachlining and many after-market accessories such as quad headlights, sun visors, chromed grilles and even tail fins. Older models were updated by fitting later grilles, such as AEC Swifts fitted with Ergomatic cab grilles. However, these classic buses did not comply with European laws of safety and accessibility and, in 2011, they were replaced with modern buses run by a central transport agency. On my recent trip, the only traditional Maltese bus I saw was one that had been converted to a souvenir stand.

#### **BUS LIVERIES**

Traditionally, buses in Malta were painted in different colours depending on the route operated. When the drivers' co-operatives were formed in the 1970s, they were painted a standard colour of green with a white roof. In the 1990s, this was changed to yellow



Packaging is very similar, but the models are from different companies. with a white roof, and a thick orange stripe around the waist-line. In Gozo, the buses were grey with a white roof and red stripe. After the classic buses were withdrawn, modern buses were introduced with a white livery and lime green stripes.

#### THE MODELS

There were a number of bus souvenirs available in Malta. The two models shown here are larger models, and probably the best of the bunch in terms of quality. That's not to say they are accurate scale models – in fact they are not much better than toys – but they are of interest because they are original castings of genuine Maltese buses. Both are based on vehicles built on British chassis – Bedford and Leyland. They are both the same size and packaged in similar boxes, but made by different companies.

#### **BEDFORD BUS**

The model is reasonably accurate, but possibly the wheelbase and length are a bit short. The body, roof and bonnet are made from a single metal casting. Surprisingly, the glazing is flush with the bodywork and has printed chrome window frames. The base and wheel arches are in black plastic, while the semi-detailed interior is in an unrealistic shade of cream plastic. The bumpers and radiator shell are chrome plastic and incorporate the headlights, with the grille touched up with black paint. The wheels are chrome hubs with black rubber tyres. The destination board is printed on the front of the roof. There was a sticker with a route number stuck on the front window – this was typical of Maltese buses, which often had these numbers stuck on the passenger side window.

The model shown is in the livery of Gozo Bus, in grey with a white roof and red tampo-printed stripes and details. It is on route 25 to Victoria, the island's capital. It was also produced in Maltese liveries, including yellow, orange, red and blue. The model was commissioned by a company called Leaf Ltd, a Maltese souvenir wholesaler. A sticker on the base of the model reveals that it was made by Shun Fat of Huiyang, China. The black window box has a header card showing the model bus in Malta and Gozo liveries.

#### **LEYLAND BUS**

The second bus is a Leyland, and is more typical of the bulbous, over-the-top style of Maltese bodywork.

While these buses are not really great models, they are of interest for being locallydesigned replicas of vehicles unique to Malta. They have been bia sellers in the souvenir market, and the variations are widely collected by Maltese model collectors.

It doesn't resemble any Leyland bus, although it may have been based on a truck chassis such as a Comet, as bus chassis were always in short supply in Malta.

This type of bus had a rounded front end with a flashy 'waterfall' type grille, quad headlights, sun visor, and American-style side trim with vestigial tail fins at the rear. There was no passenger door, entry being via an opening where the door would be, and the window frames were squared.

Despite being a fairly crude model, the miniature Leyland bus does capture the spirit of the real vehicle. The front grille and bumper are a single chrome part, but the bars are much thicker and clumsier looking than the real things. The front quad headlights are clear plastic inserts, but without a chrome backing piece only the slots can be seen. A pair of chrome styling strips have been inserted on each side, which are accurately shaped but too thick. There are very stubby rear-vision mirrors at the front, and a chrome bumper and translucent red tail-lights at the rear.

The semi-detailed interior is in black plastic, as is the base. The windows are glazed, but unfortunately there are thick lugs connecting the body to the base, and these are quite conspicuous when looking through the rear windows or open doorway. The wheels fitted are cheap speed-wheels with printed spokes, and are not typical of the shiny chrome hubs of real Maltese buses. The base is marked "Tal-Linja Xarabank", the old Maltese word for bus (from Charabanc).

This model is packaged in a black window box with die-cut header card. On the header card and side flaps, there is information on Maltese buses, which has absolutely nothing to do with the enclosed Leyland model. The Leyland is not designed or imported by the same company as the Bedford. In this case, the importer is Joseph M. Muscat.

The Leyland was also issued in a number of colours, all of which had a white roof. In addition to the most commonly seen yellow bus with orange stripe (as shown), it was produced in red, blue, orange and green – the latter two in almost neon colours. The box gives the scale as 1/40, but it is clearly much smaller; it is not as big as a Corgi 1/50 model, and as it measures only 14cm, a scale of 1/55 is more likely.



# The car that saved Porsche

It's 25 years since the Porsche Boxster was launched onto the market. Francisco Mota looks at how this small roadster saved the company, through a collection of 1/43 scale models representing the major evolutions over the last quarter of a century.

t the end of the eighties, Porsche entered a deep crisis. Sales suffered a big drop, from 40,000 to just 15,000 cars a year and the company, still an independent entity, gets dangerously close to bankruptcy. The drop is directly related to the very cold reaction of the USA market to the newly launched 944 and 928 models. Nobody questions the high quality standards of any of these new models, however, they were expensive to build and generated little or no profit for Porsche. The other perceived problem, at the time, was the 911. What is today a true icon in the industry was then an ageing car. Many buyers looked at it and just saw the result of consecutive facelifts of the original model, launched in 1963. Of course, we know this wasn't the case, in engineering terms the 911 evolution never stopped. But car's looks had changed little since the first generation, twenty years earlier. It

A plan to save the company was in urgent need and the first thing that came to mind, during a management meeting, was to launch another new family of models. The first choice was to build a luxury four-door sedan, to rival other German luxury models such as the BMW 7 Series and Mercedes-Benz S Class.

The project went ahead and a full-scale prototype was built, named internally as the type 989. Last year, AutoCult launched a 1/43 scale resincast model reproducing this Panamera grandfather. It looked like a stretched 911, keeping the same profile and adding a longer wheelbase. It also had a new front end design that would influence all 911 series from the 993 series onwards.

However, the project was canceled after a viability study revealed this was not what the



market was expecting from Porsche at the time. The reasoning behind the cancellation of project 989 was presented in a management meeting in 1988 – if customers were not buying the 928, because it was considered expensive, why would they buy the even more costly 989?

#### **BACK TO ITS ROOTS**

Porsche had to think of something different – and quickly! Another project was thrown on the table – how about going back to the roots of Porsche and make a smaller and more affordable sports car than the 911?

With the USA in mind, the biggest Porsche market, inspiration for a new small roadster couldn't come from any other source than the 550 Spyder, a car made famous by Hollywood star James Dean's tragic death while driving his. The blueprint for the new car followed the same basic guidelines – a mid-

engine two-seater roadster. It was obviously the way to go and the project quickly received the go-ahead. With one condition – the new car would have to share the platform, engine and as much components as possible with the following 911 generation.

To get things started, a dedicated team of 21 specialists from several areas was put together. The idea was to have every department involved at the same time, instead of following the conventional way, where a new project would go from one department to the next to get all the needed approvals.

The new model, still without a definitive name, was developed at the same time as the 996 generation 911, the first with a water-cooled engine. According to insiders that recently revealed interesting details about this program, both cars shared around 50% of components. From the front end to the central roof pillars, almost everything was identical. The differences started with the new roadster being mid-engined, whereas the 996 would have its '+ 2' seats, keeping the flat-six engine in its traditional position, behind the rear axle.

Someone from management, listening to the engineer's presentation, suggested that an even cheaper way of doing this would be to make the smaller car a 911 roadster with only two seats and give it the old 912 model name. However, the other management members promptly refused this idea as it was not enough to give the smaller car its true identity. That would be just another 911 variation, they said. In fact, years later, something like that was actually made, the 911 Speedster, a two-seater roadster that went the other way, positioning itself in the 911 range as an exclusive and more expensive variation.

Early studies for the new pair of cars looked at the possibility of using aluminium for the monocoque shell, but it soon became obvious that steel was more cost-efficient and had greater versatility for the planned different body variants. Regarding the

engine, one of the initial options was to use a smaller four-cylinder engine for the smaller car, leaving the flat-six to the 911. Porsche asked Audi how much it would cost for them to supply such an engine and, to its great surprise, the answer showed it would be more expensive than using the 911 flat-six with reduced capacity.

#### **THE 1993 CONCEPT CAR**

Work was at full speed in the engineering department, with some of the involved personnel working after hours. They felt part of something important that was happening in the company and wanted to help save Porsche. The same enthusiasm ran in the styling studio, where they were busy building the first concept car.

The concept car had the mission to create anticipation among prospective buyers and was made in a very old school way. All the sketches were hand-made in paper and glued to the studio wall. Contrary to what was the norm at the time, no full scale technical drawings were ever made, from where to take all the measurements and transfer that into a mock up.

Grant Larson, the chief stylist of the new car, would show the hand-made sketches to Peter Müller, one of the oldest and more experienced clay modellers in the company. Müller would talk with Larson to get the feel for the shapes the stylist wanted and started to work. "A true sculpture would emerge from his hands" would say Larson later, stating Müller was a true artist, not just a clay modeller.

In the room next door, the marketing department was busy working on the name for the new model. In the end, it was not the output of dedicated software, as it is often the case today. Neither was it commissioned to a specialist marketing company. It actually arose in a conversation held in the studio – how would you join the word "boxer", from the engine configuration with "roadster"? The answer was

spontaneous, "Boxster"!

Looking at the shapes on the concept-car, the influences are obvious - the low front end is reminiscent of the old 550 Spyder, as are the forward proportions of the interior, generous wheelbase, short overhangs and central exhaust pipe.

The original plan was to show the concept car at the 1993 Geneva Motor Show, in March, but it was ready earlier and Porsche decided to unveil it at the Detroit show in January. There were two main reasons for this - the USA was responsible for 60% of Porsche sales worldwide and it was the market that had fallen the most. A demonstration of confidence in the future was needed for American buyers. The public reaction to the new Boxster was so enthusiastic that Porsche ordered the styling studio to stop working on the production version and use the concept car shape, as much as possible, on the final car.

A number of changes had to be made. For cost reasons, the doors had to be shared with the 911, as well as headlamps and front air intakes. The front section of the final car had to be more voluminous, to carry the necessary safety structures, and the windscreen frame was also much thicker, for protection in case of a roll over. The shape created some lift at the rear, so an automatic spoiler was fitted between the rear lamps. All body details were

functional, no unnecessary adornments were fitted.

The 986 generation 911 and the Boxster were developed in parallel, however it was decided to launch the Boxster first, for two reasons. Firstly, there was still some life in the 993 generation 911, while unveiling the Boxster first would underline the arrival or Porsche to a new market segment. The 996 would follow, one year after.

The Boxster was a sales hit, starting in 1996. It captured younger and less affluent buyers to the brand, widening its customer base. Today, after four consecutive generations and more than 357,000 examples sold around the world, the Boxster goes from strength to strength. The fifth generation will come to market in due course and will most probably embrace some kind of electrification. Grant Larson, the stylist responsible for the first generation, still works at Porsche and said recently that he already has a clear idea of how it will look like. Let's hope for the best.

#### **BOXSTER IN MINIATURE**

Over the years, the Boxster has been a subject of many 1/43 scale models, both in diecast and resincast form. Porsche's strategy of launching several variants of its models also applies to its smallest roadster and scale model manufacturers have been attentive of that.

Our Boxster collection starts with the original 1993 Detroit concept car, a diecast by Minichamps, released soon after the real thing was unveiled. It looks much smaller than later productions versions, as the real car did. The rear shape is much closer to the '60s 550 Spyder and perfectly replicated in this scale model. It features a few body details (like air intakes in the front and under both doors) and wheel inserts painted bronze. Those early shape tail lamps look correct, however the exhaust pipe is not so good. The windscreen frame is as thin as the concept car's and the cockpit features all the details in this one-off model. Check the five dial instrument panel and the fully leather covered cabin replica. This has to be considered a vintage scale model now, however it has stood the test of time

The first production version was introduced in 1996 and received the internal code "Type 986". It featured a 2.5-litre flat-six, good for 201 bhp, and it reached 0-62 mph in 6.6 seconds. Schuco made a nice diecast of this early version, with the original five-spoke wheels and small bumpers. General shape is correct, but the painted detail could be better. The cabin has a nice satin finish, painted light grey with the instrument panel and centre console in black. Schuco opted for one of the early Speedster versions, the only difference to the standard car being a hard cover for the hood compartment with streamlined humps behind the rollover hoops. We photographed this Schuco model together with a 2002 restyled Boxster, made by Minichamps. The quality upgrade is the first thing that catches the eye. Everything, from proportions to details is much better in the Minichamps diecast. It represents the first evolution for the base model, when Porsche raised the engine capacity to 2.7-litres and power was increased to 217 bhp. It also features a different wheel design, with double five-spokes, plus some minor changes to the front end and side air intakes. The L-shape headlamps look more realistic on this model, however what really stands out is the cabin

finish. Seats and doors look as close as possible to red leather and all the instruments and knobs are where they should be.

Having a canvas retractable roof, which folded in Z-fashion, to take up the least possible space, one of the preferred optional extras in less sunny counties, was the hardtop. Low cost model maker, High Speed, reproduced a 2002 Boxster with the hardtop. The model also features an aero kit, including a fixed rear wing, re-profiled front bumper and lower sills. It's an unpretentious scale model that fills a gap in this collection. Nothing more, nothing less.

#### THE SECOND GENERATION

The second generation Boxster was launched in 2005, internally known as "type 987". It had a completely new body, where the "L" shape headlamps were replaced by more conventionally styled units. There were enlarged wheel arches for the bigger wheels, new bumpers with bigger air scoops, taller side air entrances for the engine and cooling, a different rear bumper and double central exhaust pipes. The engine kept the same cubic capacity, however power was up to 237 bhp, lowering the 0-62 mph time to 6.2 seconds. There were many other evolutions, most shared with the 997 series Porsche 911. In modelling terms, we have a pair of diecast models to illustrate this second take on the Boxster theme. The silver grey car is a Schuco release, while the black model is by Minichamps. Having both in the same picture serves to show how diverse the interpretation of each model maker can be.

They are both 2005 Boxster S versions, with the bigger 3.2-litre engine, featuring the same specification. Wheels are of the same design and look great on each model, allowing a good view of the disc brakes and red calipers. Schuco's wheel placement is not as rigorous as in the Minichamps model, however, the first one has turning front wheels and that might be the reason. Side by side, general shape is very close and accurate, but Schuco's model has an exaggerated ride height and too tall and upright a windscreen. Minichamps looks more like the real car and features better detailing, especially inside the cabin, with a perfect dash reproduction. Turning Schuco's model upside down, we can admire nice rear suspension and a lower engine view representation.

For the second generation, Porsche enlarged the Boxster line up with a Spyder version. This one featured a much simpler canvas roof, rear hood with humps behind each headrest and an upgraded flatsix 3.4-litre engine, delivering 320 bhp. Minichamps reproduced the 2011 launch car, painted white with the classic Porsche lettering and stripes on each sill. The car had all the detail changes the range received in its 2008 restyling, namely the new style wing mirrors. The rear hood looks perfect and gives the car a much sportier feel. Minichamps supplies a plastic moveable canvas roof replica that fits perfectly, so the collector has the choice to display it with the roof up or down. There's a nice transparent wind deflector, between the headrests and the rear bumper features a diffuser, each side of the central exhaust

pipe. Wheels are multi-spoke affairs, front bumper features lower black extensions and the cabin is just perfect, with sports seats typical of this Spyder version.

## THIRD AND FOURTH GENERATIONS

In 2012, the third generation arrived with a new flat-six engine for the basic model, keeping the 2.7-litre capacity. The car was internally named "Type 981" and shared as many parts as possible with the 991 generation Porsche 911. The styling was heavily influenced by Porsche's new hypercar, the 918, both in the front-end design and the side view. The side air scoops to the engine compartment started to take shape from the door, empathising the mid-engined stance.

For this 981 generation we've picked another diecast by Minichamps, also painted white as this was one of the most popular colours at the time. The model features open style five spoke wheels and the new rear wing that morphs into the tail lamps at each side. As in other Porsche scale models by Minichamps, it looks as if this model maker has taken extra care when modelling a car from Zuffenhausen.

Boxster's fourth generation (Type 982) came to life in 2016 and was a true revolution in engineering terms. Gone was the flat-six engine, replaced by a new 2.0-litre turbocharged flat-four. Of course, power was up again, this time delivering 295 bhp,

and the name changed to 718 Boxster, a nod to the old racing car that won the Targa Florio in 1959 and 1960. The shape of the car became much more aggressive, with new headlamps and bigger air intakes in the deeper front bumper. Rear lamps were connected by a red LED stripe.

We've sourced a pair of 718 Boxsters from Minichamps. The S model and the Spyder version. They are both red and, when pictured together, give a nice view of the differences between each variant. The Spyder has an even more aggressive front bumper, with a black air scoop on the hood's leading edge. It also features a rear hood with the typical humps and the rear side shows a different exhaust pipe arrangement. Quality is very good in this pair of diecasts.

To commemorate the 25 years of the first Boxster release, Porsche made a special version of the 718 Boxster, with a paint scheme reminiscent of the original concept car. Minichamps has already released it as a 1/43 scale diecast and we couldn't resist adding it to the story. It basically uses the same set of parts seen before in the 718 Boxster, adding differently-styled front and rear bumpers, new five-spoke wheels and all the bronze detail painting that could be found on the 1993 concept car. Side-by-side, these two look superb and close the chapter for the internal combustion engine Boxster. Next month we'll look at the Boxster's sibling, the Cayman coupé, the other face of the same car that has carved its own reputation over the years.





# On guard!

## Alwyn Brice assesses a little-known range of British diecasts.

n this article we are taking a look at some of the products of Kemlows Diecasting Products (or Kemlows, as the company was popularly known), a rare example of a company that still exists today, albeit one that is manufacturing different lines of goods.


The company was founded by Charles Kempster and William Lowe back in 1946, with the intention of producing diecast miniatures from its premises in London. The company made a move to Potters Bar in 1958 and today operates from Hoddesdon.

Although Kemlows made a varied range of miniature vehicles, having links with Wardie and Master Models, amongst others, many commissions seem to have taken the form of sub-contracted work and so the company's name does not actually appear on the finished product. All of which makes life a bit difficult for the historian, of course. However, the firm moved from its original customer base into engineered components and the automotive sector. Of interest to us in this feature is the company's small range of military toys that were retailed under the Sentry Box label.

#### ON THE BOX

Looking back, there was quite clearly something going on amongst toy manufacturers in the

1950s when it came to the subject of packaging. Remember, the window box or the space-age blister was unheard of at that time. Lesney (or Moko) had obviously got the ball rolling in 1953, when it triumphed with the launch of the Matchbox model. A lovely little card box, bearing a simple line drawing with a splash of colour was all that was required to house the diecast. Being uniform and rectangular, these could be easily stacked and fitted into larger boxes, with no loss of space.

Rival Benbros wasn't slow to get in on the act, either. The days of models supplied to toyshops in divided trade packs were past, so it behoved any manufacturer to have something eye-catching, yet protective at the same time. Benbros is arguably best known for its little brown television boxes, which might seem bizarre today as a form of packaging but which would have certainly stood out on the toyshop shelf 70 years ago.

For its part, Kemlows went one better with its sentry box-shaped packaging – finished in a combination of green, red, black and white, it had great shelf presence. As far as I recall, Kemlows' products were to be found in that trusty high street emporium, Woolworths, which was a shop of myriad possibilities and a magnet for any small child. You could browse counters within without

the pressure that came with crossing a toyshop threshold. And good old Woolies must have taken quite a lot of pocket money over the years.

#### **OPENING THE BOX**

If you get bitten by the Kemlows' Sentry Box bug, then the good news is that the range is finite and, in this age of toys fetching four figure sums, remarkably inexpensive. Variations are not really anything to write home about and even the most devoted collector would struggle to come up with much in this output.

Pinning down a production date is somewhat difficult. Matchbox's vehicles, distinguished by their metal wheels and crimped axles, were out and about in 1953, but, by the end of that decade, the company had moved on to the wonder (and greater realism) of plastic wheels and hubs. The fact that the Sentry Box military range never made the transition would incline me towards the belief that they were released around the mid-1950s. What is known is that, by the mid-1960s, the dies had been sold, with some ending up abroad where they enjoyed a fresh lease of life, albeit under different nomenclature.

The most commonly found vehicle today is that of the 3 ton Bedford lorry, a utilitarian mode of transport that saw plenty of army use over the years (Bedford actually introduced its first 3-tonner in 1933 but the Sentry Box model is a later variant). I say common - it may take a little while to track down an example in good condition and with its distinctive box. The model itself is pleasingly chunky and weighty and captures the squarish bulk of the real thing well. Detail is good and it even features a hinged tailgate for a little extra play value. This lorry turns up in matt green as well as a glossy green, if you really agonise about the varieties. Likewise, I think that most were fitted with divisional insignia in the form of a blue and red bisected square decal. However, some of these 3-tonners display red and yellow insignia that, strangely, is usually hand painted. A towing loop is included with this model for purposes that will become apparent. All in all, it's a lovely little small scale replica and fits in well with other manufacturers' wares on the military theme.

#### **GUNS AND ARMOUR**

If you weren't satisfied with just the troop or ordnance carrier, helpfully the Bedford truck could also be purchased as part of a double act. On this occasion it was paired with the 25-pdr field gun, an exceedingly popular (and highly efficient) arm that was used extensively in the 1940s.

However, whilst I have a keen interest in matters military, I am not an ordnance expert – and I and have a couple of niggles over this item. It's well made, and the gun barrel elevates, as might be expected. But is it a 25-pdr? Most people's memory of this gun invariably centre on that large (detachable) wheel that served as a very mobile base for the cannon. In addition,

the Kemlows model is not so squat and is of a significantly differing construction. For my money, it's actually the trusty old 5.5 inch gun. The other minus is the fact that the trail arms are fixed in the towing position. I suppose that small children acting out World War II on the carpet were untroubled by such niceties, as long as the gun was detachable from the truck. None of the above detracts from what is essentially a nicely detailed replica that admirably complements the Bedford.

The nearest that we can get in terms of some identification is found on the third model in the range - Made in England in raised lettering can be detected on the underside of the Armoured Vehicle. This, though, is in essence the Saracen Armoured Personnel Carrier - perhaps Sentry Box didn't have the necessary endorsements or permission to use the correct terminology? Whatever the reason, the Armoured Vehicle is the Saracen and it features a little rotating turret and, in fact, is a dead ringer for the Matchbox version. The latter is arguably a little crisper in its detail (and of course benefits from plastic wheels) but nonetheless the Kemlows example bears close scrutiny. It was retailed like the other models in distinctive packaging, with a printed description on the base of the box providing the only hint to what was within.

#### TANKS FOR THE MEMORY

Made in England also appears on the underside of that great British institution, the Centurion tank. Just about any diecast company worth its salt has produced this tank, which is one reason, perhaps, that small boys were conversant with it all those decades ago.

Sentry Box ran up against the usual quandary with this model, namely what to do about the tracks. Rubber would have added cost to the equation but clearly the tank had to be mobile. The company's solution involved mounting four larger metal wheels underneath that were all but obscured by the rows of bogeys along the skirts of

the tank. Job done! Aesthetically, it didn't look too bad, but when Matchbox's version came out in 1959, this latter set the pace, for it was equipped with more interesting rubber tracks. Yes, half a century on, most have perished, but they added realism on the day.

Of course, the Centurion boasts a rotating turret, but sadly the barrel has no elevation mechanism, although that would have tested the backroom boys, one imagines. This model is a little harder to track down today and the gun barrel is subject to breakages. Indeed, all the Sentry Box range can exhibit fatigue, so bear this in mind with any potential purchase, unless you want to see a mound of metal fragments in your display case at some future date.

Finally (well, almost), Kemlows was more or less obliged to produce something with which to transport the above tank (for, like all tracked vehicles, it suffered link damage if exposed to metalled surfaces, like tarmac, for any length of time). The much-loved Antar was the weapon of choice and this aped the Matchbox version, needless to say. Both are splendid models and really look the part.

The Lesney variety has finer detailing again (to my mind) and better paint, but against that is the Sentry Box clincher - the Antar's ramps can be lowered and raised. A small detail, perhaps, but in my book a great advantage, for it lent the model a high degree of authenticity. The truck cab swivels on a pin so that the trailer can be towed like the real thing and the locating rod is topped off by a spare wheel. It's not too hard to find this model, and once paired with the tank you have an impressive ensemble.

#### **MYSTERY MODELS**

I said "almost". What precedes this last section is the Kemlows Sentry Box range as it is generally known - but there is something else to add. Examples may be few and far between (possibly only one, in fact) but there is, according to diecast author and collector Robert Newson, a triple unit outfit comprising an Armoured Car vehicle, a limber and a field gun. This last item is not the same model as that mentioned earlier on, and whilst the limber and armoured car look the part, the way that they link up (with riveted on semi-baseplates) raises the question of their originality. The wheels are also something of a mixture. Has someone in the past modified these models? Was the factory responsible? I'm not aware of a Kemlows limber like the example shown here either, so this merely becomes more intriguing. Answers on a postcard, please.

A box has yet to surface, it seems, to bear out the authenticity of this set – and that is something that would probably seal the argument. However, it's not for me to pass judgement – but if you spot this trio at a swapmeet, then snap them up!



# **British woodies**

**David Wright** enters the specialist world of the woody wagon, discovering a selection of models and some subjects for manufacturers too!

henever I've visited Classic car shows, woodies really do catch my eye, as something very individual and different. Have you ever wondered how the term "woody" came about, and what the difference is between shooting brake, estate car and station wagon anyway?

Well, let's start with shooting brakes, appearing in the 1920s and 1930s, and either custom built by manufacturers, built onto new chassis, or replacing worn saloon bodies. These were all intended to transport shooting parties around private estates. Before long, their use was widened to include collecting guests from the local station – hence station wagons, and also for transporting supplies, and people generally for the estate, hence estate car.

In the UK, during the early days of car manufacturing, using steel for a body was more expensive than using wood. Wood had been a material that companies knew how to work with ▲ Inver Models' production line of the Bantam.

for many years, and coachbuilders could produce complete bodies that could be installed on a car chassis. Over time, steel became easier to utilise, with wood gradually being phased out as the main design material. Eventually, wood became a luxury material that developed into a specific style called a woody. The style incorporated wood into rear bodywork.

All this coincided nicely with the introduction of purchase tax on new cars in 1940, while commercial vehicles were exempt. Using the skills and cheaper materials of the woodies to create a useful vehicle from a chassis, or a car that had seen better days, was then a very attractive proposition!

While in the USA, big-engined chassis heavy on fuel were often used, here in the UK a wide range of cars received a woody shape. By 1945, post-war Britain retained the purchase tax on new cars, and commercial vehicles were still exempt. With the call to export new cars, some people with the funds to purchase one at home found that there was scope

to obtain a car chassis and have a wooden shooting brake body built for it at a much lower cost.

#### **THE MODELS**

In alphabetical order then, we'll begin with Allard. Known for the Cadillac-engined sports cars, Sydney Allard achieved popularity for his company when he won the Monte Carlo Rally in 1952 in his 4.3 litre side-valve-engined P1 saloon. Earlier a K1 sports, with a 3.6 litre Cadillac engine, built between 1946 and 1948, had been rebodied by a private coachbuilder into a woody. Kenna Models have faithfully created white metal handbuilt models of most of the Allard range, and the K1 features here. In a delightful mid blue, with excellent reproduced woodwork, the model sports chrome handles, lights, grille, and front window frames.

Following Sydney's success, the Allard range was added to with the P2 4-seater saloon, offering a choice of Ford,V8 Cadillac or Chrysler engines. Performance could now be considerably enhanced over the side-valve Ford-engined P1. Altogether 10 Safari, seven-seater woody versions of these lovely cars are believed to have been built by 1955, when they were discontinued. Just four survive worldwide today. The result is a surprisingly quick and agile large Allard shooting brake that has been known to leave a Range Rover Discovery for dust on winding country roads.

With three rows of seats, this very rare woody shooting brake provided stylish transport for parties going to the races. Matrix models has excelled itself with its fine rendition of this rare car, sporting a vinyl roof and superb wood effect side panels, and rear doors. Even the tiny red Allard bonnet badge is picked out.

Alvis supplied separate chassis to a wide range of coachbuilders, for both saloons and convertibles, and when the successful TA14 was made, between 1946 and 1950, companies such as Farnham, AC Cars, Barnards and Caffyns all produced woodies on this chassis. J&M Classics has faithfully reproduced the wood coachwork on its rendition of this old established British company, although the coachbuilder is not known.

Austin was one of the most prolific builders of wooden-bodied estate cars during the popular woody years, and stood out with Alvis. Ford and Lea Francis as firstly providing chassis on which woody bodies would be fitted. While Alvis and Ford chassis received the work of a number of coachbuilding firms, Austin was one of the first car makers to release its own factory made woody, on the Austin 16 chassis. No model of this is known, but a more popular subject for model makers, and often seen around the country shows, is the Austin A70 Hereford woody, and its lesser known predecessor, the A70 Hampshire. Better dubbed the Austin Devon's big brother, this car inherited the Austin 16's 2.2-litre, 4-cylinder engine, and with a lighter body was considerably more powerful than the Devon.

The example shown here in Austin beige, vinyl roof, hooded headlamps, excellent wood effect panels and superb paint finish is a credit to its

designer and maker, Pete Kenna. Like Austin, Kenna Models then followed this with the more solid and sporty looking Hereford, also in woody form. Amazingly, this car in real life continued using the same engine from its 1950 introduction to 1954 when it was replaced. This car has also been modelled in kit form by John Day models, and in 1/76 scale, it really does look the business.

Although this should be just British woodies, I couldn't resist including a view of the production by Inver models of its American Austin Bantam woody of the 1930s, as the model has been made in the UK. Proprietor Peter Naulls has always had an interest in all things Austin, and began corresponding with Bob & Cathy Cunningham in the USA, editors for the American Austin Bantam Club. He had toyed with the idea of producing Austin Seven models for some time but decided to make an American Austin instead. The Bantam Station Wagon is viewed as an iconic car in the States, being America's smallest woody wagon.

Moving ahead in time, we mustn't forget the hugely successful Mini, which brought woody/ traveller motoring to the masses. Introduced in 1960, the wood frame brought the traditional woody back into the limelight, and these cars are very sought after today. Dinky Toys promoted the Mini with a number of models, and No 199 Austin Mini Traveller in cream was a very successful model. It was perhaps inevitable that this model should be rereleased in the Atlas range, in its rare green livery, as the Morris version. While the wood frame is simply painted, it is still an important example to add to the woody collection.

Ford has had a distinguished presence in the woody line up in a number of ways, through consistency, longevity and royalty. To begin with, it supplied utility chassis to many body builders, and

The V8 Pilot was a Dagenham-built answer to Ford's lack of a large saloon immediately after the war. Ford's ubiquitous V8 had been produced in various guises in the United States, Germany and France as well as the United Kingdom. The Pilot was the last of this pre-war design to remain in production. Although the saloon was produced in large numbers the woody was a rare variant and few survive today, the best known probably being the example built for King George VI in the Royal Household at Sandringham.

A 1952 Ford V8 Pilot Woody appears in the Lansdowne range as LDM 116, and is a clean smart offering, while the SMTS version, a perfect replica of King George VI's car, offers more detail and, of course, the special number plate.

Come 1956, the small family cars built by Ford received a boost by adding a woody in the name of the Squire to its range. Powered by the 1172 side-valve engine, it had seats for four with plenty













of load carrying capacity. Whether the Squire's small amount of wood really qualified for this club is to be debated, but Lansdowne Models made an excellent example quite early in their range, as LDM 20.

In the same year, a 1956 Ford Zephyr MkII Woody was built especially for the Sandringham Estate, seating up to nine people and sometimes driven by HRH Prince Philip. This car was refurbished by the students of Manchester College of Arts and Technology. I used a Corgi Zephyr to create my own replica of this car.

A similar approach to that used with the Squire was taken by Ford in the 1960s in creating the Ford Cortina woody estate. Standard doors and rear panels were pre-drilled to take the decorative wooden panels, which means when restoring a car as a woody, it may be necessary to drill perfectly good replacement doors! It was Corgi Toys, of course, that brought this stylish and now rare version of the Cortina to our toy cupboards. Delivered in three colours – red, blue and metallic grey – it appeared both individually as No 491 and as part of the No 440 golfing set. All three are pictured here, with no golfers in sight! It's really an excellent replica of this quite up-market version of the Cortina.

During the late 1940s, Donald Healey's Healey Car Company built chassis for other coachbuilders to create bodies for. In 1948, to get around Purchase Tax of 30%, Healey Elliott pre-war racer Hector Hobbs commissioned the building of 17 Woody Estates on the Westland Elliott chassis. The creation of the woodwork rear section was undertaken by the coach builders Dibbins of Southampton, and the panel work was by Westlands, the builders of the Elliott and Westland Roadsters. What a great model this would make. Sadly, the creator of superb, handbuilt Healey models in white metal, Mike Rogers of J&M Classics, has retired, so there is no scope there for a model of

this quirky but sporty estate.


Some research on the internet, coupled with having seen an example locally at a classic car show, led me to the Humber company and a Warwick bodied 1952 Super Snipe. What a grand and imposing car this is. Unless anyone has chopped an Oxford Diecast Super Snipe, what a wonderful model this would make too.

The Jaguar Foxbat has already been featured in the January 2020 issue. Briefly, a Jaguar enthusiast and his wife needed a more practical car to transport equipment around with room for their two dogs, so he decided to do his own conversion. This car is made up of two cars morphed together, with the sleek Jaguar XK150 front being matched with the rear of a Morris Minor Traveller. I decided to mimic the construction of the real car, using an Oxford Diecast XK150 and a Vanguards Morris Traveller and created the model you see here. Unorthodox in both real life and as a model, but still a woody!

The real Jensen car featured here was found in a junk yard in Dorking, Surrey, and restored over two years by a Jensen Owners Club member, who was employed as a piano tuner, so knew a lot about wood! This is a 1935 Jensen Ford, and would make a wonderful subject for a model by one of our current manufacturers.

Lea Francis was founded in Coventry in 1895, and soon began creating supercharged road legal racing cars. After the war, it developed a higher spec luxury family saloon and, from this chassis, became one of the first to see the potential of building its 14hp chassis for other coachbuilders to mate with woody bodies. It then advertised them in its range as utility models, to reflect the commercial vehicle designation. Lansdowne's LDM 21a 1950 4-door woody accurately reflects this post-war vehicle, and its bodywork is modelled on that created by AP Aircraft.

Apart from one or two privately-built bodies on early post war chassis, Morris also made woodies alongside the Austin range, and the earliest seems to be the 1955 Oxford Traveller. While this has not been modelled by any commercial model manufacturer, its little brother, the ever popular Minor has. The Series 2 Minor Traveller was introduced in 1952, and featured an external structural ash frame for the rear bodywork, with two side-hinged rear doors. The frame was varnished rather than painted and was quickly a highly-visible feature of the body style. The Travellers were built alongside the saloon model at Cowley, minus their rear bodies. The half-completed cars were then shipped to the MG factory at Abingdon where the Coventry-built bodies were mated to the chassis and final assembly carried out. When the Minor 1000 was released with bigger engine, the woody Traveller continued as a popular estate version.

Models of the Morris Minor 1000 Traveller have been made in many different guises by Corgi, and released under both Lledo and Vanguard names. Minichamps made a beautiful 1/18 scale model too, although the woodwork is, perhaps surprisingly, integrally cast with the body.

The Morris Oxford Series II was released in 1954, and a traveller appeared in 1955. Thankfully, Crossway Models has crafted a superb model of this car, with exceptionally clean, well-proportioned lines, and separate woodwork.

A 2.6-litre, six-cylinder Morris Isis, seven inches longer than the Oxford to accommodate the larger engine, was announced on 12th July 1955, and an aficianado of BMC models, John Quilter, has fashioned this car from the Ixo Hindustan Ambassador, which is similar except for the longer front end. Ixo makes the Hindustan Ambassador in both taxi and police liveries, as well as a standard sedan and, since this is an inexpensive model and readily available, it makes an excellent donor car for conversions, as it is essentially a late 1950s Morris Oxford.

To create the Isis saloon, John had to cut the front bonnet and wings off with a jeweller's saw and extend it with some thin metal bridging inside, finally shaping with an epoxy metal material, which serves as a great glue as well. The grille had to be created as the Hindustan has a much simpler grille. To achieve this, he used photo-etch mesh and wire solder to create the two arched bars.

However, the Traveller project was a bit more complex, requiring the fabrication of a rear roof, body sides and tail gate. The wood sections received final finishing with clear lacquer. I think you'll agree that he has made a fine job indeed.

More recently, of course, we must not forget the hugely successful Mini Traveller. BMC/British Leyland released the Morris Traveller in 1960, alongside its sister car, the Austin Mini Countryman. Both were a great success and now are very sought after. The Morris is represented in model form by the Dinky Toy No 197 Mini Traveller, recently recreated by Atlas.

And finally, while many Rolls-Royce chassis were used to build woodies, unless readers know of other British woody models, there is just one very glamorous and detailed model by ABC Brianza, of the 1928 Rolls Royce Phantom I woody. Altogether, a special and different way of recording our great British coachbuilders and car makers achievements, and a small yet exclusive wing to a collection. And now, over to readers to identify any other woody models of British cars that have eluded me so far. DC



# Code 2 Minis

**David Lynn** investigates a tale of two Minis that were planned, dropped and then reappeared in another guise.



nreleased model liveries always provide a tantalising subject, particularly as exact information is often elusive and may not reveal the full story. This account explores two liveries that seem to have been planned in the early 1990s – the Matchbox-Dinky DY-21 1964 Austin Mini Cooper S, as a white 1966 Northern Ireland police Mini, and the green 1966 Bathurst 500 winning Cooper S. These finally emerged as officially approved Code 2 models from a little-known Australian brand – they were also later piggy-backed by Vanguards for, respectively, a 2012 Atlas Editions partwork issue and a normal retail release in 2004.

The Matchbox-Dinky Collection (MDC) was launched after Universal Matchbox bought the rights to the Dinky trademark in 1987 and, during 1988–91, released 32 models of various British, European and US classic vehicles from the 1930s to the 1960s. Most were cars, but some vans and a 1/50 scale bus appeared as the only exception from a consistent 1/43 format. Many emerged with two or three liveries and were generally well-chosen and executed models for 30 years ago. The MDC range was abruptly halted in 1992, after the Australian-based Tyco Corporation bought Universal Matchbox and switched to a new strategy of selling themed Matchbox Collectibles

series through direct subscription. This trapped at least four known models intended for MDC roll-out, including a Jaguar XK150 (covered in the August 2017 issue) and may have aborted a Black & White Scotch whisky livery for the DY4 1950 Fordson E83W 10cwt Van (August 2013 issue). The context for this account is therefore that several MDC development proposals were well underway, accompanied by the switch in strategy and direction from a British enterprise to Australian management.

DY-21 1964 Austin Mini Cooper S was a 1998 release in cream, with black roof and red interior, and was unusual within the MDC for only having a single livery, although a sub-batch of 1,000 was prepared as a promotional for the 1991 Classic Car Show, with appropriate door transfers. Despite very thick windscreen pillars, the slightly clumsy use of the rear number plate as a socket for the baseplate and fully plated wheel trims belonging to an ordinary Mini Super Deluxe, it was a good 'un with a lot of neat detail, and basically just looks right with the cute Mini appeal well captured.

Moving on to the Code 2 models, there are two parallel definitions - a model completely produced by the primary manufacturer as a commission from a second organisation and sold by that second organisation under its own branding, or a model



which has been altered or finished by a second organisation with the consent and co-operation of the primary manufacturer. This can include supplying plain or even unpainted models for secondary completion.

In practice, these are not mutually exclusive as the difference is basically a process question about who gives the model its final detailing and maybe packaging. The key point is that the model originates from the primary manufacturer, with the second organisation taking all decisions about the livery, fixtures, detailing and branding, and then undertaking its marketing and distribution.

Both these code two Minis were produced in an Australian series called "Code Two Models", which, to avoid confusion, will be abbreviated to C2M. Pulling together snippets from several sources, it seems that C2M originated from a firm called Automodels, which ran a famous model shop in Parramatta, New South Wales. Its initial objective was to produce new versions of MDC castings, using designs that had originally been intended for Code 1 release, but not pursued. The series started in 1994 with model Dinky 001, but after four 'genuine' releases, as shown in the table, degenerated into a sequence of Matchboxlogoed event commemoratives. Trace information was found for 15 of these contrived liveries until Dinky



019, a pastel blue Mustang for the 20thMatchbox International Collectors Association (MICA) Convention in 2005, which seems to have been the point when the shop closed.

The 002 Commer Bentalls van and 004 Austin A40 "Major" van probably represent two further MDC proposals left hanging by the 1992 policy change. Online searching for these vans or subsequent C2M liveries with phrases such as "Dinky 002 Commer" should bring up some results, often from old Vectis auctions and within job lots of other C2M releases.

It is unclear which of the Code 2 definitions outlined above apply for the C2M Minis, and possibly an initial off-the-shelf proposal became 001 as a livery with no obvious Australian significance evolving into the second scenario for 003 with its clear Australian focus. The casting and component set is carried over unchanged apart from a couple of additional fixtures and black interiors – the baseplate references for Matchbox International Ltd and Dinky are retained. Both come in very small yellow boxes marked as printed in England, with individual edition numbers hand-stamped inside an end flap. The box text states that full permission was given by Matchbox Collectibles and Tyco, with 003 adding a reference to

being "Made in China, hand-finished in Australia by Automodels Pty, PO Box 2454, NSW 2151"

#### THE LIVERIES

C2M's Dinky 001 is simply described as a "1964 Mini Cooper S Police", with no further clarification. Apart from its probably undersized roofbox and a large siren on the front bumper, the only changes from DY-21 are an all-over cream livery, the black interior, the deletion of the "Austin Cooper S" boot script, and a new bonnet badge as an imprecise blob of silver paint. However its identity is clearly stated by the registration 6675 PZ, which was a 1966 Belfast plate for a seemingly unremarkable Royal Ulster Constabulary police Mini. This livery was revived in 2012 by Atlas Editions in its Best of British Police Cars subscription series, using 25 models commissioned from Vanguards with mostly new liveries from its existing castings, thereby creating another Code 2 situation.

This Atlas model starts with an Austin Cooper S base, from the long-running Vanguards VA025xx series, with appropriate grille and boot scripts, and reasonably good Cooper S-style wheels. The livery is identical apart from being white instead of cream, there is a much bigger roofbox with light, sirens and a radio aerial, and the front grille now has a spotlight. In production terms it is a mild tweaking of the Mini Cooper from the 2005 Vanguards MP1002 Metropolitan Police Traffic Patrol 75th Anniversary set, with a new roofbox and the deletion of the "POLICE" boot and bonnet boards. As a passing comment, both Minis in that set (PYT 767F and PYT 768F) were actually 1968 Mk2 Austin Coopers with significant differences from the Mk1 format for grilles and rear lights, but these issues do not affect 6675 PZ.

Although the Atlas replica is a better model with contemporary standards of manufacture, it has two problems, with the first being generic for all Vanguards Minis that the casting's front pillar is too thick and its angle too shallow, distorting the appearance. The second is a needlessly irritating policy to prevent removal of the model from its plinth without breaking off a plastic cover to expose the screw heads. The accompanying Atlas information pamphlet contains a fair bit of general narrative about RUC Minis, but gives little specific information about 6675 PZ. The RUC started using Minis in 1964, with a white-with-black-roof Cooper S 1275 as an unmarked Q-car being the first of 31 Minis in total until the mid-1980s. These included 15 Cooper Ss, a solitary Clubman, an assortment of vans and Travellers, and at least three basic 850cc cars. The text suggests 6675 PZ was in fact one of these 850cc models and started service in 1967 for the specific task of escorting abnormal or wide loads, which explains the leaflet's cover photo of the model with a "WIDE LOAD" bonnet board. No other specific information was found about 6675 PZ, so its depiction as a Cooper S is unconfirmed.

The livery for C2M's Dinky 003 is much more easily explained, and despite the anodyne reference to "1966 Racing Version", the box text identifies it as the 1966 Bathurst 500 race winner. To an Australian audience it is possibly the most iconic Mini ever, way ahead of the frequently modelled Monte Carlo winners or any other incarnation, and therefore an obvious choice for C2M.

BMC Australia started assembling the Mini Cooper S 1275 in 1965, with the project number YDO6, although it was pretty much identical to the UK ADO50 model apart from having doors









with quarterlights instead of sliding windows - all Australian Minis in the 1960s were badged as Morris. After three years of Bathurst domination by Ford Cortinas in 1963-65 (August 2012 issue) the homologation rules were changed and Ford withdrew for a year before unleashing the new Falcon GT in 1967. This left the 1966 event open for Mini Coopers, and 24 of the 53 starters were Minis. There were four classes based on the purchase price of the vehicle in Australian dollars, and 17 of the 19 entrants in Class C (\$2,041 to \$2,700) were Cooper Ss. Three BMC Australia cars were entered for Rauno Aaltonen/ Bob Holden, Paddy Hopkirk/Brian Foley and Timo Makinen/John French (although Makinen was replaced by local Mini ace Steve Harvey due to clashing commitments). Aaltonen//Holden totally dominated the race and won, with Cooper Ss filling the first nine places despite the retirement of the other two works cars. 1966 was the last Bathurst win for a four cylinder until 1988 with the turbocharged Ford Sierra Cosworth.

Despite retaining the Austin Cooper grille with thinner bars and lacking quarterlights, the C2M livery is very neatly executed, with recognisably Morris front and rear badges, an Australian EFK 167 rear number plate, headlight tapes, bonnet straps over the grille, twin fuel fillers, lowered suspension and all the appropriate 13C numbering. The seven orange circles around the car were probably an instant recognition device to distinguish it within the swarm of other Minis.

Vanguards released its version in 2004 as VA02518 in an edition of 3,000, alongside No RD4002 diorama set with the 2nd and 3rd place Minis. This was part of a Heroes of Australian Motorsport series of 1960s Bathurst winners that included a Cresta PA, Jaguar Mk2 and the 1965 winning

Cortina. With various New Zealand police liveries at the same time, it seems there was a major effort to penetrate Antipodean markets. The livery is not quite as precise as the C2M model, losing some of the fine detail for headlight tapes and bonnet straps and has only one fuel filler and a generic format rear number plate, although it gains a black tape strip on the boot. A more obvious difference is that the seven orange circles are reduced to only two. With most period pictures and film being black and white, the circles are only identifiable with close study, but the Bathurst Museum has the actual car - or an exact replica - on display that confirms C2M's depiction. So C2M win on points - probably due to the additional hand-finishing in Australia as previously mentioned - but Vanguards don't fall far behind. Neither model attempts the bullet mirrors fitted on the doors of the actual car that, as with all Bathurst entries at the time, were ostensibly dealer showroom spec.

The accompanying diorama set was also issued in 2004 in an edition of 3,000, and both Minis were BMC dealer entries - the green with white roof car #17C was driven by Fred Gibson/Bill Stanley to 2nd place, and is almost identical to the Aaltonen/ Holden livery apart from the racing numbers, the disappearance of the orange circles, and a bright yellow recognition scheme for the front bodywork. The 3rd place #22C car of Bruce McPhee/Barry Mulholland is a simple all-over cream with only an orange triangle over the windscreen. Both have blank yellow rear number plates, which look odd, but race footage shows this was accurate for #22C at least. The diorama is a race track curve used in a few Vanguards sets, with varying advertising hoardings. The selection here looks UK orientated, but the brands might also have been relevant in Australia. DC

# Fun Ho! Midget trucks

Christopher Moor examines a range of British trucks released by New Zealand's Fun Ho! in the 1960s and early '70s.

n the early post-World War II era, British trucks predominated on New Zealand roads.

New Zealand's tariff system in those years of tightly regulated imports favoured goods from Britain. Austin, Ford and General Motors had plants in the Hutt Valley, where the majority of these trucks rolled off the assembly lines.

New Zealand toymaker Fun Ho! made models of Austin, Ford and General Motors' Bedford trucks in its Midget series from 1964. Tanker versions of the Austin and Bedford trucks are included here because they use the same cabs.

For some unknown reason, the Midgets contained no Commer trucks, which Todd Motors assembled in the Hutt Valley, near Petone railway station. Commers were another make of British trucks once quite popular in New Zealand. Fun Ho! Midgets filled a gap in the domestic market when shipments of Matchbox toys were infrequent. Despite lacking the sophistication of the imports, these basic models cast from zinc really took off.

By 1962, Streamlux, an Australian company, had stopped making diecast model vehicles. Underwood Engineering bought the dies, from which it cast the original Fun Ho! Midgets. Some painted parts that came with the purchase appeared on the early Midgets.

Models produced from the Streamlux dies were: Massey Fergusson Tractor (No 1), Holden EK saloon (No 2), Austin Truck (No 3), Mobil Tanker – Austin (No 4), Volkswagen Combi or Kombi Bus (No 5), Mercedes-Benz Racer (No 6), BOAC Bus – Commer (No 7), Austin Tip Truck (No 8) and Volkswagen Sedan (No 9). Sharp eyed collectors will notice that the Massey Fergusson Tractor is actually a Massey-Harris, and the Holden EK is an FE saloon. The inclusion of the Holden saloon would probably date these dies as circa 1956-57. Fun Ho! did not identify what series the Austin trucks were from, although they are probably K2/K4s of the mid-1950s.

were wired together in 'strings' with fine copper wire just behind the cab, the shadow of which can clearly be seen. Later models were barrel plated and don't have this shadow line." (Barry Young, Fun Ho! Repro magazine, Vol. 1, no. 1, March 1989.) The truck, tanker, and tip truck all used the same cabs, and came fitted with black treaded plastic wheels. Streamlux originally cast on the roofs inside their cabs – eventually removed by Fun Ho! tradesmen. Midget Austin trucks originally had a chrome body and copper tray finish. Difficulties with getting the copper plating to adhere inside the tray led to models being sold with tray interiors painted green or red.

Both the Austin Truck and Austin Tanker measured 50mm in length. The tanker had a chromed cab, and a coppered tank with an oval Mobil decal applied to the tank's rear surface. Until circa 1967, a marketing promotion with Mobil saw the models packaged in Mobil petrol pump boxes. A few Austin Tankers actually went into the shops without a chrome mudguard over the back wheels.

At 55mm, the Austin Tip Truck was 5mm longer than the truck or tanker. Again, a chrome finish for the cab and copper plating for the tray. The model would shed its tray after a bit of hard play, and it was soon lost.

An unusual combination is the Austin Articulated Truck (No 18), known as the half-and-half. The cab is the Austin by Streamlux and the trailer die is by Fun Ho! When joined together the cab and the walled trailer have a combined length of 75mm. "Fun Ho!" is cast as one line, with "N.Z" in the line below, on the underside of the trailer.

The Austin Articulated was added to the Midgets in 1966, and deleted with the other Austins in 1972. From 1966-67 the plated finishes on these models



would have been replaced by a brightly painted one with contrasting cabs.

For 1966, Bedford TK trucks appeared in the Midget catalogue, with the introduction of the Bedford Articulated Truck (No 22). This is the first all-New Zealand casting for a Midget truck, assuming catalogue numbers were issued in the order the toys came on sale. A few left the factory with two wheels fitted to the trailer rear instead of four. Other variations include trays or decks without markings, and post-1970 rarer examples of a Ford D cab fitted to a Bedford trailer, and sold as the Bedford Articulated.

A rigid tray Bedford Truck (No 29) followed the Bedford Articulated Petrol Tanker (No 27) into the catalogue in 1966. The tray of this 60mm model was held in place by a rivet through the 5th wheel position. Original castings had more tray markings and no model identification. Upgraded castings had a tray with fewer planks, mounted closer to the wheels. About this time "No 29" was cast in to the underside of the tray.

Bedford TK cab tankers, with their combined total of 636,700 models, made them the most popular of the Midget Bedford castings. The tankers were issued as Articulated Petrol Tanker (No 27), Articulated Milk Tanker (No 40), and Military Tanker (No 71). All three tankers measured 93mm in length, the same length as the Bedford Articulated Truck.

Collectors bought their Midgets in Mobil packaging until at least the introduction of the Milk Tanker in 1967. After the marketing arrangement with Mobil ended, the Articulated Petrol tanker came in Caltex livery for the rest of the model's catalogue life.

#### VINTAGE COMMERCIAL VEHICLES

With the Mobil tie-in ended, the Midgets next appeared in red and yellow boxes, and later Visi-Packs of various sizes, although the toys continued to be sold in Mobil packaging until stocks ran out. The first model sold with Mighty Mover Blister card packaging was the Bedford Milk Tanker in 1981.

Before Fun Ho! made the Ford D series trucks in 1970, a Ford Thames Freighter Pickup (No 26) had been in production for four years. The 1996 'Repro' Midgets issue by the Fun Ho! National Toy Museum includes the Thames Pickup. Blue-tinted plastic windows were fitted during the assembly to the castings of 13 different models that had been in storage since the 1982 factory closure. No other Midget truck discussed in this article was included in this release. An earlier 'Repro' chrome-plated version of the Thames was made by the museum in 1991, minus glazing.

The four D series trucks were the Ford Truck (No 48), Ford Sand Dumper (No 49), Ford Dump Truck (No 50), and Ford Articulated Truck (No 51).

Ford Ds were made in approximately 1/80 scale. Non-articulated cab models had a longer chassis with six wheels, whereas the smaller bases of the artics rode on four. The Fords sold well in the increasingly deregulated market of the 1970s, their brightly coloured bodies and trays appealing to the era's youngsters. Only 100 less castings were produced for the Ford Truck during 12 years manufacture, than for the Bedford truck during its 16 years. The figures were Bedford 134,900 units and 134,800 for the Ford.

Fun Ho! marketed the trailer section of the Ford Sand Dumper with dual rear wheels and a tow bar as the Sand Dump Trailer (No 52). The model didn't exactly rush off dealers' shelves, as long-time collectors remember from the numbers that always appeared to be there.

When the Ford Dump Truck joined the catalogue, competition existed from the White Heavy Duty Tip Truck (No 31) – White was an American truck – and the already discussed Austin Tip Truck. By 1972 the Ford was the only tipper remaining in production. The White left the catalogue in 1971, and the Austin in 1972.

Some collectors found the low loader of the Ford articulated did not easily transport the Caterpillar Bulldozer (No 46). A model that definitely wouldn't have fitted is the Aveling Road Roller (No 37). Mighty Movers blister packs for the Ford trucks suggested other models that would be fun to include in a game with the Fords. Army finishes for the Articulated Truck, known as Army Transporter (No 67), and Dump Truck (No 68) went into the shops during 1977.

The odd model out among the British trucks in the Midget range is the Morris J2 Pickup (No 28), which is referred to in Fun Ho! publications as Morris Pickup. Dominion Motors assembled the truck in Auckland, making the Morris the only British truck in the Midget range not from a Hutt Valley factory. During production from 1966–1971, the Fun Ho! Morris Pickup had a minimum of ten body and four base variations. The term "A challenge for the collector" might have been

invented for this model. Not content with these changes, Fun Ho! issued the truck in a myriad of hues after painted bodies replaced the plated ones, with these colourful little lorries sporting the logo stickers of different companies. Production difficulties could have contributed to the Morris's short duration of five years in the catalogue – 59,100 castings were made, as opposed to 69,900 for the Ford Thames from 1966–1982.

Dealers I contacted by phone or email during New Zealand's Covid-19 lockdown/restrictions, said they had seen no chrome or military finish Midgets in years. They said play-worn models with little paint left made identifying the original paint finish very difficult. I took to the internet for an idea of current availability. No military models were found. Painted Midget Bedford and Ford trucks predominated in these auctions. Those I saw for plated truck listings were all for Austins. A New Zealand TradeMe auction had a combined listing for chromies of the Austin Tip Truck – one complete and one a cab and chassis - and the BOAC Bus (Commer), which sold for NZ\$65 (£,32.50), minus boxes. Photos showed the models to be in excellent condition. Another of the site's auctions had a battered Ford Truck, a play-worn Land Rover (No 19) minus driver, and a chrome Austin Truck in good+ condition that went for NZ\$25 (£12.50).

On eBay, I saw empty Mobil promotion Midget boxes for the Austin Truck and Austin Tip Truck with a Buy Now price of NZ\$41 (£19.99) each. Just goes to show the wisdom of keeping those original boxes, doesn't it?

# **Diecast Gems**

## **Phil Silvester** shares his passion for the hobby that has become his business.

aunched in 2013, almost lifelong diecast collector Phil Silvester retired from his career as an independent financial adviser in 2012 and set about a new venture that would make full use of his extensive diecast knowledge. Now, eight years down the road, Phil is as busy as he has ever been with customers worldwide. This new undertaking officially made its first appearance at the September 2013 Sandown Park Toy & Collectors Fair.

The aim of Diecast Gems is to bring high-quality, obsolete diecast toys by Dinky, Corgi, Spot-On and more to the market. Phil explains "I have been an avid collector of diecast toys, particularly Dinky Toys, since I was a small child and I am excited that I now have the opportunity to share this passion with fellow, like-minded people across the globe, trading and educating about diecast toys. As a child, Dinkys and Corgis were always my favourite toys, more than train sets, Scalextric, soldiers and anything else. The primrose yellow Euclid Dumper truck holds my oldest memory, but my real love was always cars."

Phil brings decades of experience to the industry, having been involved in the past with our very own Ramsay's British Diecast Model Toys Catalogue, completely revamping the Dinky Toys post-war cars and Farm section several years ago. Phil has also appeared on the BBC's Inside Out regional news television programme to share his knowledge and passion, and has written articles for magazines.

So why the name, Diecast Gems? Phil explained this in detail. "Diecast Gems is about sharing my passion for obsolete diecast toys with others. We



have a large range of high-quality vintage diecast toys for sale, specialising in Dinky Toys, Corgi Toys and Tri-ang Spot-on, as well as featuring European manufacturer releases. The idea of the website is multi-purpose – to sell, buy, educate, stimulate and hopefully produce a site that other collectors will enjoy viewing regularly. Also to identify when a special model becomes available, balanced between rarity and condition, it will be flagged up as 'A Diecast Gem'.

"What I believe makes my website unique is that a series of articles has been written about particular models to expand people's knowledge and interests. Articles have diminished in the last 2 -3 years due to increased trade." Phil says that in the early years he was selling around 300 model annually but in the last two years this has increased

to 700-800 each year.

Diecast Gems has a substantial stock inventory and is always on the look-out for further top-quality models to bring to the marketplace. This could be either at auction or by buying collections. In more recent times Phil has introduced the 'Light Test' on every model that is offered for sale. This has exposed some models with touch-ups and Phil will always declare this, even to his loss. It is not foolproof but does go a long way to exposing fraudulent trading. Another crucial point is that the collection retains the integrity and values of Diecast Gems in order to ensure that the site provides what collectors and dealers will expect.

"I have been a keen collector of Dinky, Spot-on and Corgi for many years. In more recent years I have purchased some European brands such as Tekno, Märklin and Solido, and have occasionally bought other models when I have seen a market for them, such as white metal Pathfinders.

"In August 2019, I announced to a few clients that I was willing to sell any of my own vast Dinky and modest Corgi collections. My Spot-on models had all been sold the previous year. As a specialist in Dinky variations and rare colours, I have always had a supply of such models for the serious enthusiast. Do please ask me regarding that missing model, you never know I may have it." Phil's collection is now reducing but the Dinky stock continues with over 1,000 pieces all available.

A common question often asked is "How strong is the model market for vintage diecast?" Phil answers, "Very strong, particularly for high quality and rarity." However, even ordinary models are often way over what Phil is willing to pay at auction. The collecting market continues to be very strong, particularly when able to access the international markets.

The company website (www.diecastgems.com) is neatly presented and very easy to use, featuring sections for Dinky, Corgi, Spot-on, French Dinky and European models in stock. There is also a very useful section that allows visitors to check out previously sold items, helping them to value their own collections.

Grease is the word

**Mike Pigott** looks at a set of models based on the less popular sequel to the smash-hit musical, *Grease*.

veryone remembers the hit 1978 musical film *Grease*, starring John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John, but significantly fewer people are aware of its 1982 sequel, and even less are aware there was a range of diecast toys based on it.

#### **MUSICAL**

Grease originated in 1971, as a stage musical written by Jim Jacobs and Warren Casey. Set in Chicago, it told the story of ten teenagers, of mostly Polish descent, as they went through their last year of high school. Unusually for a musical, *Grease* featured strong language and mature themes. After it performed well in Chicago, the production was moved to Broadway, but with changes. It proved a huge success, becoming one of the longest running musicals in New York and, in 1973, began a run in London's West End.

#### **FILM**

The stage play was adapted into a feature film and the plot mainly followed the romance between the characters played by the two big stars, Danny Zuko (John Travolta) and Sandy Olsson (Olivia Newton-John). The setting was changed to Los Angeles, the filming location, and Sandy was changed to being an Australian exchange student as Olivia Newton-John could not imitate an American accent.

Grease was a huge box office success, and the soundtrack album was also a massive smash hit. Several of the original stage play songs were deleted, and four new songs were written especially for the film, including the title track Grease and the hit song You're the One That I Want.

#### **SEQUEL**

The huge success of *Grease* led the producers to plan a sequel, although by this time Travolta and Newton-John had moved on. Instead, the new film was set in 1961, two years after the original, and featured a new roster of T-Birds and Pink Ladies. This time English exchange student Michael Carrington (Maxwell Caulfield) is the new boy at school, and is smitten with a Pink Lady named Stephanie Zinone (Michelle Pfeiffer). When Michael overhears that Stephanie

dreams of meeting a 'cool' motorcycle rider, he buys a second-hand motorbike and manages somehow to teach himself to soup-up the bike and perform stunt riding. When the T-Birds are attacked by a gang of thugs called the Cycle Lords, Michael appears in disguise as 'Cool Rider' and fends them off. The Cycle Lords invade the school end-of-year party, only for Cool Rider to appear and, superhero style, cause them all to crash into the swimming pool. After this, he removes his goggles to reveal himself.

*Grease 2* was not a good film - it had a ridiculous plot and it failed at the box office. However, it had one thing the original lacked, a range of diecast models!

#### **KIDCO ROAD TOUGH**

Universal Toys of Hong Kong is best remembered for being the owners of Matchbox for a decade from 1982. However, prior to buying Matchbox, Universal had its own range of diecast vehicles. Universal set up the Kidco brand, in 1977, to distribute its products in the USA from an office in Chicago. Kidco also manufactured a lot of models specifically for shops to use as own-brand toys, and supplied Dinky with a range of diecast budget miniatures.

Kidco Tough Wheels also ventured into licensed toys, with ranges based on the military sitcom M\*A\*S\*H, and the road-racing film *The Cannonball Run*. In 1982, Kidco released a triple set of diecast motorcycles based on Grease 2.The original film had no model vehicles based on it, despite there being two custom hot rods called 'Greased Lightning' – a white 1948 Ford convertible – and a bizarre metallic red car with a clear bonnet that was shown in a musical number 'dream scene'.

The three motorbikes were packaged in a wide window box, with pictures from the film on the header card and box back. The models were made to the unusual scale of 1/26, so were noticeably larger



than motorcycles in the more common 1/32 scale. Surprisingly for a budget brand, the models were

quite accurate and well-made. They had diecast frames, kick-stands, wheels and handlebars, although the front forks and wheel arches were in chromed plastic.

#### **COOL RIDER**

The motorcycle used by Michael Carrington (alias Cool Rider) was – appropriately – a classic British model, the Norton Commando 750. Cool Rider performed some incredible stunts on his bike, including wheelstands, driving over the tops of cars, and leaping across

canyons. However, his most amazing stunt was owning a Norton Commando in 1962 - the real bike was not introduced until 1967! It's even more unlikely he'd find a junked example in a scrapyard! The Norton Commando was a powerful and highly-regarded motorcycle made in Wolverhampton until 1977.

The model captures the Commando's shape well. The frame and petrol tank are diecast and painted black. Cast-in details include the rear suspension, chain drive and

tail-light. The saddle is black plastic. The handlebar component is bare metal, and includes the hand-grips and brake levers. This part is attached to the front forks, which includes headlight, gauges, wheel arch and struts. The wheels are bare metal with seven thick spokes, and fitted with black rubber tyres. The 750 cc motor and large exhaust pipes are in chromed plastic, and a diecast kick-stand is attached to the underside. On each side of the fuel tank is a label with red and yellow flames, replicating the style seen in the film.

#### **CYCLE LORDS**

The next motorcycle represents one used by a member of the Cycle Lords biker gang, possibly by the leader Leo. The gang's bikes are only seen briefly in the film. The model is based on a Suzuki GT750, which is an even more amazing find than the Norton Commando, given that it was in production between 1971 and 1977! Unusually for a motorcycle, the Suzuki 750 was water-cooled and had a radiator fitted to the front of the frame. It was a powerful bike with a two-stroke, three-cylinder engine, and is regarded as one of the greatest of Japanese motorbikes. The welldetailed frame casting, which includes the radiator, is painted red with 'devil' labels on the fuel tank. The big engine is in chrome plastic, and includes a pair of huge pipes on each side. The metal handlebars are attached to the front fork which includes the headlight, sidelights, dials and mudguard. The saddle is black plastic, while the wheels are the same as the previous model.

#### **POLICE MOTORCYCLE**

The third model in the set is clearly based on a Harley-Davidson Electra Glide police motorcycle, which is more amazing than the previous two bikes, as no such vehicle appeared in the film. A police car made a brief appearance after the fight between the T-Birds and the Cycle Lords, but there was no police

motorcycle. However, this cycle conceivably could have appeared in the film, as the Electra Glide model was introduced in 1949. What may have happened is that a scene involving a police bike was cut from the film after the models were commissioned – troubled films like Grease 2 often had scenes cut or re-written during or post-production.

The model is quite clearly a Harley Davidson, as can be seen from its V-twin engine and long, straight exhaust pipes. The frame is painted black with a label showing a police sign and gold star. The bicyclestyle saddle is in soft white plastic. The wide diecast handlebars are attached to the forks, which includes the spat over the front wheel. A separate component includes the headlight and sidelights, which are touched in with red paint. The wheels are the same as the previous models. Unusually for an American police cycle, it has no windshield or rear panniers.

Grease 2 is probably not a film most people would care to remember, especially actor Maxwell Caulfield, who claims it destroyed his career (although Michelle Pfeiffer went on to have a successful film career). I had to suffer through the film twice in order to research this article, and I have to say that, actually, the Tough Wheels models are probably the best thing about it!

# Miniature mansions Brian Salter continues his series examining the origins of scales used.

ack in 2018, when the editor was looking at my ideas for this series, the conclusion was reached that pretty much anything goes as long as scales and models feature side by side – any scale, any subject. This month's offering happened as the result of a throwaway type of comment, which, strangely, engendered the instant response of "Ooh, I do look forward to that". Nowt so strange as folk – cheers, Rick!

The truth is, of course, that said personage does like a bit of diorama bashing, and why not. In the diecast world just about every manufacturer has added some relevant accessories to its ranges, whatever the mode of transport. With vehicles, garages, fuel pumps and road signs are a must-have, aircraft need hangers, ships need docks, trains need stations and racing cars need pits. All fine and dandy, but where does everybody live?

We will, this time, take it for granted that said transport related buildings are pretty much in scale with their parent product. A suitable residence can greatly broaden the appeal and add to the ambience of the scene. The more so if the mini-residence is of contemporary manufacture to the transport interest and, even better, from the same manufacturer. This is going to be a tough call!

As far as commercially manufactured toys and models are concerned, things became much more adventurous in the 1930s, mainly due to the growing popularity of O gauge model railways. In the exact same period, new brands of construction (i.e. architectural construction) toys appeared on the market and, guess what? They fitted the O scale scene pretty well. This was no accident and to this

Not surprisingly there was a station and a signal box, but the plus point was a group of ten buildings, nine of which were strictly non-railway. All came with a base landscaped to suit the building's style or purpose. They were vinyl and ready painted.

day many an exhibition layout has a village of Bayko (the favourite), Minibrix or Brickplayer. Scales were not quoted but it is quite easy to achieve a sensible answer by just looking at the front door – garden shed or Victorian town house, it's about 6' 6" or 2 metres tall. They also went well with Tri-ang's Minic clockwork vehicles that were almost exactly O gauge, irrespective of vehicle type.

There were signs that similar systems would develop alongside the new smaller OO gauge, but hostilities slowed that process. When normality returned, it was the turn of the even newer plastic kit to dominate the lineside market – we are now talking of a kit to exactly reproduce a particular building rather than a system of small parts to design and build your own. When Airfix entered this market, from 1957, it made as many, if not more,

town village and countryside subjects than actual railway related ones.

Country folk generally fared better – it's hard to imagine a farmyard without a nearby farmhouse. With most earlier farm vehicles and livestock being to 1/32 scale, we enter the world of the wooden building and even the toy giant Tri-ang offered these. This is close to the doll's house market with its own set of scales – 1/43 is perhaps the smallest seen fairly regularly, 1/32 (farm scale), with 1/24, 1/16 and 1/12 all popular. All diehard diecast collectors will know of Dinky's pre-war sets of furniture and Tri-ang Spot-on's vast 1960s 1/16 scale range.

The model railway world led the way and it still does in all aspects of scenic architectural modelling, but there was once a very bright interlude in the diecast model vehicle scheme of things. Just into the shops for Christmas 1959 were the first few Tri-ang Spot-on model buildings. These were all part of its vehicles and highways system, a collection of no less than 13 separate and authentic Cotswold buildings, all in support of and precisely in scale with the vehicles, roadways and other


The Lilliput range by Britains started life merely as railway station accessories for Trix-Twin OO scale railways. but then added road vehicles, all to scale, in the 1950s. Everything in this view is by Britains, even the Charringtons Ales 'Toby Jug'. It has to be asked was this for real? Also available were a pair of thatched cottages and a barn. All were cast and coloured in papier-mache. Just one building can bring even a basic but historic collection alive.



▲ When most of our best known building construction systems started in the 1930s, they were scaled to broadly match O gauge model railways, i.e. 1/43. To properly match miniature transport back then there was only one real option - Tri-ang Minic. Today it's not a problem, or is it? Plenty of 1/43 stuff about, of course, but you try finding something heavier, in period, to deliver the materials. Here we have a 1920s Volvo delivering to a 1936 Bayko building site.



▲ A classic Spot-on scene, the buildings as important as the vehicles. They were a short lived success, better appreciated now than for many a decade. We are in eastern England hence the immediate postwar American influence and diner, whilst a couple have returned to the scene of the action. Four vehicles, all different manufacturers and periods, plus figures by Omen miniatures - all to scale, of course.







Almost every serious Spot-on collector will include a few examples of their

range was to 1/16 scale and, as with all similar dolls house scales, matching vehicles were, and are even now, a problem. Spot-on did, however, eventually

include an Austin Healey and as long as you did not look underneath (there wasn't one) it's acceptable. Most other ranges were not so helpful.


Even today it is hard to find miniature vehicles truly in scale with most dolls house scales, and the problem gets worse out of doors in model towns and villages. Those that take the matter seriously to heart can make their own and often do. The tables have been fully turned - the vehicles are an accessory to the buildings, the miniature mansions. At Godshill on the Isle of Wight some are, very effectively indeed, based on typical earlier Days Gone models. Something similar happens in-house at Beckonscot with various commercials, but a real gem is a very recognisable BMW that surely owes a little something to the early Dinky 38 series.

accessories. Nothing had ever been seen like it before, all purely to enhance the 1/42 scale diecasts.

At the same time, Tri-ang introduced a similar series in scale with its OO railways, but almost all the buildings were actually different. Neither series was available for more than a few years. After that nobody bothered much and diecast as we know it was soon to be very much in decline. Today it's like it always was, you really have to own up to an interest in model railway where the OO choice is virtually out of this world, just a pity that domestic style new O gauge 1/43 buildings are almost nonexistent. [Soon to addressed by my MINIART Model Works range at www.miniartmodelworks.com – Ed.]

So, what about model building scales generally

and particularly when they are away from any in-scale transport interest? This is where the architectural fraternity have it made. Every 'mansion' will have a door somewhere. Put aside the very low doorways found in some very ancient small cottages, also the grandest entrances old or new, you are almost invariably looking at a door height of around 6'6", otherwise known as 2 metres. Very handy that, the most useful straight conversion known - just measure the miniature door height in millimetres and divide 2000 by it. Once the scale is known, the hunt for a scale correct vehicle can begin which must, of course, be the correct period as well. Many a happy hour lies ahead. **DC** 



# Kitting out your collection

Popular in the 1970s with some of the major manufacturers, **Rick Wilson** has bolstered his collection with many of these over the years. After Corgi's special Grand Prix racer set last month, this time it's the turn of Solido's make-it-yourself range.

or the second part of this three part miniseries, this time we pop across to France, to turn our attention to a past-master of diecast kit manufacture – Solido. The series we're focusing on here started in the 1970s, but Solido was no stranger to producing diecast models in kit form. As early as the 1950s, its 'Jouets A Transformations' set of aircraft components that were interchangeable, took the toy shops of France by storm. Comprising several fuselage and wing components, a sizeable number of design variations could be conjured up. Fast forward to the 1970s and, after the success of its military vehicles in kit form, Solido decided to apply the same thinking to some of its competition cars in 1/43 scale.

The three early releases that you see here actually came to me sort of by accident. I was bidding on a Vectis auction a couple of years ago that included a couple of the Dinky Kits that you will see next

month – they just happened to be accompanied by a trio of these kits. I might have been swayed a little by the fact that one of them was a Porsche 917–10, so my bidding went a little higher that it might have gone otherwise!

Obviously, I was successful and it introduced me to the wonderful world of "Kit métal" by Solido.

The early kits were packaged in a uniform box wearing a CAD-style line drawing of an Alfa Romeo Tipo 33 SC12 (one of the kits that has so far eluded me), with the range depicted by photos of the real vehicles around the sides. The actual contents of the box were printed in words on one end side, along with the kit reference number. Opening these up reveals two polythene bags keeping the kit components safe, plus various leaflets with instructions, a general

guide to completing your model and, of course, the decal sheet. Each of the early kits came with three schemes to choose from.

For the first few years, the range was fairly simple – No 16K Ferrari Daytona, No 18K Porsche 917-10, No 26K Ford Capri, No 41K Alfa Romeo 33SC12 and No 58K Renault 5 Coupé. By 1978, No 54K Fiat 131 Abarth had been added – as can be seen on the 1978 brochure scan. Also seen on this leaflet is evidence that the box style had been updated. The sizing was virtually identical, but now the box was a lot more colourful and actually replicated the style of one of the leaflets that was included with earlier releases.

As the range developed, Solido began to introduce several more models into the range. Taking things further, several of the kits were actually packaged with two versions to complete, adding to the value.

I've recently purchased one of these, as shown here – No 5094 Toyota Celica – but there are many more, some of which actually include two completely different castings, such as the 1930 Bugatti Royale and 1939 Bugatti Atalante. By the time of this release, the box style had evolved again, with a gold background.

Solido was bought out by Majorette in the early 1980s and the kit range was sadly soon dropped. I wonder if the adventurous current owners might consider a return to such a venture?

Next month, in the third and final instalment of this mini-series, we return to the UK and look at the range of Dinky Toys Action Kits that were so popular here in the 1970s. I have quite a collection of these, so it will be a longer article and I promise that there will finally be evidence of me actually building some of these up. **DC**

# Car Culture racers

#### Never lost for things to talk about, Rick Wilson shares another selection from his collection.

n 2020, Hot Wheels began to release some of its 1/64 scale castings in 4-vehicle diorama-based boxes as part of the premium Car Culture range. Branded as a Premium Collector Set, the first of these that really caught my eye was the fourth and final release for 2020, called simply "Car Culture".

The set comprises four vehicles – three racing cars and one transporter truck, the latter features a tilted rear deck that can carry any of the cars, one at a time. Packaged in a very stylish and attractive presentation box, the inner plinth depicts an excellent race track background that extends to the wrapped-around ends.

Starting from the left of the packaged display, first up is the transporter truck, called "Carry On". Designed by Mark Jones, this is the casting's fourth and most recent release. Previously paired with a Nissan Skyline and then a Lightweight E-type in Team Transport mini-sets, Carry On was then included in the Fast and Furious 4-vehicle set. It is an original Hot Wheels design, based on a highly-customised show transporter that bears resemblance to the 1990s International 4700 Series Medium Duty truck. The angled ramp on the back features indents for the rear tyres, to stop the loaded cars from rolling backwards. The body

and base are both diecast, and the rear body is

Then we have the Jaguar Lightweight E-Type, another design for Hot Wheels by Mark Jones. This is the second of its, so far, three releases having appeared with Carry On in Team Transport 14 (as mentioned earlier) and as one of the five single-release British Horsepower set, as reviewed in the June issue. For this incarnation, the model is left in bare Zamac, wearing just blank racing roundels. The bare finish is something I always enjoy seeing as it allows maximum appreciation of the casting's detail. This doesn't depict a specific racing car (unlike the two that follow here), but

does replicate fairly closely the imagery from the Jaguar Heritage 'relaunch' series of six cars that were to be made from 2014. When the Lightweight was first crafted in the early 1960s, it was intended that 18 would be built, but only twelve were. This batch of six was to complete that commitment. Fully diecast (both base and body), this is a particular delight. And as for the wheels, these are probably the best wheels I have ever seen on a Hot Wheels miniature.

Moving along, we find the whole reason that I wanted this set - the Gulf-liveried Porsche 917KH, wearing race number 20. The depicted car is famous for two things - racing in the 1970 Le Mans 24 Hours and starring in Steve McQueen's 1971-released movie, Le Mans. The 917KH (sometimes suffixed just K, as is the case with the real car - they both stand for Kurzheck, which translates as short tail) was originally designed for Hot Wheels by Larry Wood in 1999 and has been re-tooled twice - this is the first release of the newly updated tooling. Early versions featured a lifting tail section, but these days it is sadly cast shut. Nevertheless, I am very pleased to have this in my collection at last. I have 1/43 and 1/18 scale models of the same car to go with this, and have just started building Ixo's incredible and huge 1/8 scale partwork. Together, they will make an interesting display once the Ixo is finished.

Finally we come to the beautiful Mercedes-Benz 300 SL. A Manson Cheung design, the 300 SL was new for 2020 and this is its second outing of three so far. Wearing an attractive dark grey and the number 417 to the bonnet, boot and doors, the model replicates the car driven to fifth place on the 1955 Mille Miglia by John Fitch. It's another stunning little model, with some excellent detailing painted on.

Hot Wheels seems to keep getting it right with its Car Culture premiums. They might cost a bit more than the standard releases found in supermarket grab bins, but I think they're most definitely worth the extra pennies.

or a young boy growing up during wartime, good toys were at a premium. I happened to be very fortunate through a friend of my father, who was a dental surgeon and I suppose quite wealthy, although that would not have occurred to me as a young boy. I had a complete Hornby Dublo pre-war train set with Sir Nigel Gresley and the N2 tank, plus track, a Schuco Mercedes Racing Car, Dinkys and some lovely (not Dinky) Battle Ships.

However, the RAF and aeroplanes really took my interest and, each Christmas, I was given the Hutchinson *Aircraft of the Fighting Powers* and I still have all seven volumes. Over the years, my model collecting would probably be best described as eclectic, ranging from early post–World War II Dinky, and later Corgi, sports and racing cars, racing cars by Brumm, Quartzo and others. Models of Yesteryear took a turn for a time.

Then, model buses took over thanks to an enthusiastic local shop owner, Colin. Eventually some 300 or so models had been acquired, of which only a handful could be displayed. So, relaistically, a decision was made to re-group and I sold most to a dealer.

#### HAWKER TYPHOON - CORGI AVIATION ARCHIVE

I saw a model in a local shop that must have been professionally hand-built and I craved it. Eventually I was able to buy it, I cannot remember where I got the money, or how much it cost, but I loved that model – so beautifully finished. Like nearly all of my toys, it was disposed of, with my agreement, when I went to university.

My mother saw that they went to a deserving family, a work colleague of my father with a large family. Much later, when Corgi produced its version, I had to replace my lost love.

So this is my first choice to have on my desert island. Perhaps I could ferment some coconuts into alcohol and fire up the 24-cylinder Sabre engine and fly back to freedom.

#### **ERA C-TYPE - SCAMOLD**

The war had ended. I had grown up in a garage environment so, as a teenager, my thoughts turned to cars. In the mid-forties, exciting cars started to appear in my home town as events at the Bugatti Owners Club hill climb site at Prescott opened up again – an easy bike ride away for me and my teenage friends. If you behaved, no-one then sent young lads packing, so we had the sights of racing cars and exotic sports cars, the unmistakable smell





of Castrol R, burning Dunlop rubber, wailing superchargers and heroes in cloth helmets. So a lifelong interest in motor sports was kindled. I cannot remember how I bought the ERA - my school friend Douglas bought the Scamold Maserati 6C from the same shop. I think they might have been in kit form, unpainted. I believe that Scamold made models of other racing cars, including Alta, but I have never seen them. The ERA led to the wonderful 'Bira' books and other motor racing works, and eventually cycling to Silverstone in 1948 for the RAC British Grand Prix.

#### **BEDFORD OB COACH - YELLOWAY** - SUN STAR

The OB brings back all sorts of memories. An uncle, by trade a machine tool setter, drove at weekends for a local coach company. In 1951 we went with him to London to visit the Festival of Britain on the South Bank. On another occasion, much later, my wife and I went to the wedding of the daughter of one of my closest friends in an OB - it seemed so much smaller than I had remembered. Yelloway was the coach link from the city where I settled down after marriage and the place of my birth, so the attractive livery on this OB brings back memories of returning to the family home before car ownership. The Sun Star model is very detailed, quite fragile and too large to display without it getting dusty.

#### **ALFA ROMEO TIPO P2 - POLISTIL**

My wife and I had had holidays abroad before we had a family, but, in 1976, we went to Italy as a family with two young children and my motherin-law. All very exciting to go abroad as a family to Sorrento with the Cosmos Group flying by Dan Air in a de Havilland Comet 4. While we were there I saw two Alfa Romeo models in a shop - the P2 and the Tipo 158 Alfetta. I chose the P2, but now I regret not having bought both because I have never seen them for sale in the UK. The Alfa P2 was a top car in its era at the point of changeover when riding mechanics were being phased out. Tyres were

getting more reliable and it was often that the poor mechanic who was killed or injured in a crash. As an aside I believe the Alfa Tipo 158 to be one of the loveliest racing cars ever built as well as a highly successful one.

I met Jeff Sharrock at a Chester swapmeet in 1989, where he was selling his new Pathfinder models alongside Brooklin. These white metal models were a revelation to me - the finish and especially the weight in the hand compared to the diecasts I had. I became hooked. Jeff told me about the Brooklin Collectors Club and I joined straight away, just in time not to get the club's first special model. Later I was able to rectify that on the second-hand market. The early club models had the member's number cast into the base. As I have had to leave all my Brooklins, Pathfinders and Somervilles behind, I must have one on my island as a reminder. My other main collection is Ixo Le Mans diecasts, to finish the story of some 75 years of model collecting. DC

umber 13 provides another interesting mix of vehicles – the three castings offering a tow (or wreck) truck, a fantasy beach buggy and a fire appliance. The first and last of these offer little in the way of variation, but the beach buggy can be found with many variations – some obvious, some not so.

#### **DODGE WRECK TRUCK**

Catalogue: 1970-71 Box Styles: G

This is another regular wheels favourite that made the transition into the Superfast era and had a good couple of years in the range too. Keeping the traditional BP colour scheme was an obvious decision with the cab and booms yellow and the rear body and ▲ From left to right: Dodge Wreck Truck, Baja Buggy and Snorkel Fire Engine - with their relevant boxes to the rear. deck green. Not many variations exist, the main one being the shade of yellow used. Some have appeared for sale without stickers, although this is difficult to prove if this was a genuine factory error or they've either fallen off or simply been removed. The same can be said for a handful of versions that have turned up over the years sporting the Esso label from No 71 Ford Heavy Wreck Truck. The biggest, and most valuable, variation is the transposition of the body colours – very rare indeed.

#### **BAJA BUGGY**

Catalogue: 1972-77 Box Styles: H

Making the most of No 30 Beach Buggy's appeal, Baja Buggy was first introduced two years after



its sibling. Despite a nearly complete makeover, it retained most of the front section. The sloping roof was gone though, replaced by a squarer version, presumably inspired by the roll cages found on many of the buggies adapted for use on the famous Baja Rally, which was won on its first running in 1967 by a Meyers Manx Buggy. However, the engine on this new Superfast was completely unrealistic as it featured a high mounted exposed V8 — it does look 'racey' though.

It was always painted green but the hue varied over the production run – there are four different shades shown here. Other externally visual variations seen during production were the different coloured exhausts (originally black, later red), the occasional appearance on later models of the sunburst sticker

from the No 47 Beach Hopper or Police emblem from No 55 Mercury, and either orange or red interiors (although neither of these featured a steering wheel!).

One variance that's not so easy to spot is the change to the mountings for the engine. Presumably this changed as the same engine unit was used in several other models over the years (No 2 Hot Rod Jeep, No 8 Mustang Wild Cat, No 36 Draguar, No 62 Mercury Cougar Rat Rod and No 64 Slingshot Dragster) and tooling was modified accordingly to standardise production and minimise costs.

All told, Baja Buggy was part of the 1-75 range for an impressive six years and is still in plentiful supply today, although it's highly likely that a few went astray at the seaside over the years.

These can be found fairly easily in good condition, frequently with a good box too and, as a result, prices are fairly reasonable most of the time – although any with an alternative sticker do command a bit of a premium.

New to the range in 1978, Snorkel Fire Engine offered lots of play value and it really looks the part with its extended front bumper that is home to a water pump and rear-mounted plastic boom that can be raised and rotated with a scissor-action, just like the real thing. At the end of the articulating boom is a bucket with a plastic moulded fireman permanently fixed in place.

Always painted red, of course, it had a silver base and blue window unit that obviously incorporated the blue roof lights too. The boom arms and resident fireman were usually yellow but examples in white can be found.

## Petrol tanker

#### DTCA Chairman, Michael Driver, finds some fuel for thought.

t was quite common to see petrol tankers from different oil companies on the roads in the 1950s. Many toymakers modelled these types of tankers and provided some extra colours and identities to one's toy collection of commercial vehicles. The majority of the real tankers used British chassis with familiar radiators such as A.E.C., Foden or Ford by way of examples. Bearing this in mind, it at first seems odd that Dinky Toys produced an American style tanker, but then it was the post-war time of export or die.

A Studebaker tanker was introduced to the Dinky Toys series in May 1950, as the Dinky Toys Petrol Tanker (No 30p). The first models were in red, or green, and had "Petrol" on the tanker sides. These models were sold in trade boxes of six and were deleted in 1952.

The replacement for the plain petrol models echoed the pre-war models with advertising and was a red Esso Tanker (No 30p). This is illustrated in the July 1952 *Meccano Magazine* amongst other pictures of Dinky Toys. Then came the Mobilgas tanker with a red body. It had the same 30p reference number and is shown in the 1953 Dinky Toys catalogue. These early models were sold in yellow trade boxes of six models.

Both these models were renumbered in 1954. The Mobilgas Tanker was given the number 440

and the Esso Tanker was now number 442. A third tanker was added to the range in December 1954. This was a Castrol Tanker, number 441 in light green, and is pictured amongst other Dinky Toys in the *Meccano Magazine* of that month. These three tankers are all illustrated together in the Dinky Toys catalogue of 1956.

In the January 1957 *Meccano Magazine*, a new tanker was announced. This is the Tanker National Benzole (No 443) finished in yellow with the name in black. The tanker replaced the deleted Esso Tanker. The renumbered tankers all came in illustrated yellow card end flap boxes and then the plain red and yellow boxes.

To finish this rather confusing array of tankers, National Benzole was deleted in 1958 and Mobilgas in 1960, although it appears in the Dinky Toys catalogue for 1960. A further element to the tankers is that the transfers on the Mobilgas tanker came as a white background with blue letters, or with white lettering outlined in blue. One final twist to the story is that due to material shortages during the Korean War of the early 1950s, some of the number 30p Tankers were cast in aluminium, as were certain other Dinky Toys.

Studebaker started out with horse drawn wagons in the mid-1800s, then moved to electric vehicles in the early 1900s, followed by petrol-engined trucks around 1913. Heavy trucks came in the late 1920s. During the war, it produced various military trucks and in the late 1940s came the 2R16A trucks with the modern cabs. These were the basis for the Dinky Toys tanker model.

#### **GRAHAM HAMILTON ULTIMATE MATCHBOX PICTURE BOX COLLECTION WOWS AT VECTIS**

**AS** we teased on these pages in the last issue, shortly after we went to press, a series of sales to be held by Vectis Auctions commenced, inviting bids on Graham Hamilton's mightily impressive Matchbox collection. Covering the entire Lesney Matchbox Picture Box era, from 1962 – 1982, the collection covers every possible genre of Matchbox collecting. The estimates that we shared all fell short of their respective final prices, with one truly astonishing result in particular. Figures in brackets shown with the images are the final price including the buyer's premium.

Although the weather outside was miserable, the atmosphere inside Vectis Auctions was bright and optimistic. This was the first day that the auction room had been open to the public for 14 months, and what a sale to open with. The Graham Hamilton Ultimate Matchbox Picture Box collection had drawn interest from across the world, with some even braving the North East weather for their chance to bid in the auction room and feel the excitement first hand. The room was abuzz with chatter before the sale, with many of the attendees meeting up for the first time since lockdown, a few pictures were snapped and stories swapped. But they were all here for one thing - the finest Matchbox collection to be auctioned in recent years.

Graham and his wife were also in the auction room, watching as his collection was sold to eager collectors. There was interest across both the internet terminals, telephone bidders from across the world, and of course many

commission bids left before the sale even started. The sale started well with Lot 4003, the third lot in the sale, achieving £2,640, to one of those commission bidders. The sale progressed with many lots achieving four figure sums. However, the first lot to achieve five figures, was Lot 4218, the Matchbox Regular Wheels 13d Dodge Wreck Truck in reverse colours is an interesting and much sought-after piece on its own, however this model came with a fantastic provenance, including a letter and photograph of Ed Fosdick who was Chief Engineer of Design and Safety for Chrysler, which ensured it sold for a fantastic £12,000, and received a round of applause!

Another lot with interesting provenance was Lot 4258, the colour trial Matchbox Regular Wheels 15d Volkswagen Beetle Rally Car, previously sold as part of the Peter Smith Collection (prototype model maker for Lesney) at Stacey's on 22nd July 2015. This undoubtedly helped it to achieve a fantastic £6,000. A very rare Matchbox Superfast 10f Plymouth Gran Fury Police Car (Lot 4176) with 5-arch wheels that match the box artwork achieved £3.600. against an estimate of £200-£260.

Lot 4251 a Matchbox Regular Wheels 15c Dennis Refuse Truck pre-production provided a rare opportunity to buy a relatively early colour trial model, with not only a casting difference to the container hatch but also fitted with smaller diameter 20-tread black plastic wheels, interest in this model meant the £400-£500 estimate was destroyed at

with factory spun front base rivet but un-spun rear rivet, Lot 4362, a Matchbox Superfast 22c Pontiac GP Coupe, more than doubled its lower estimate of £2,000-£3,000 to achieve £5,280,and Lot 4396 is another of the five models sold as part of the Peter Smith collection (ex-Lesney Model Maker & Designer) at Stacey's on

22nd July 2015, the Matchbox Superfast 24d Team Matchbox Racing Car pPre-

production trial model, which had an estimate of £600-£800, sold for £10,200.


All these helped day 1 end having achieved a fantastic £125,000 and had no unsold lots. What would day 2 bring?


Day 2 started with just as much excitement and anticipation. The friendly vibe continued as did the bidding. With the same group in the room, as well as internet and telephone buyers, the appetite for Graham's collection was great. Graham is a well-known in Matchbox circles and his collection is highly sought-after - buyers know the models are authentic and have confidence in what they are buying.

The Graham Hamilton effect ensured that even common models such as the "Desert Dawg" Superfast 20f 4x4 Jeep achieved 10 times its bottom estimate. The model that would normally sell at its £10-£15 estimate achieved £120 (Lot 4341), which our auctioneer estimates should be a world record for this model.

There were many other lots that achieved world record prices on day 2 of the sale. Lot 5090 a rare transitional Regular Wheels 31c Lincoln Continental model sold to an internet bidder for £9,600 and Lot 5091 provided a once in a lifetime opportunity to acquire a pre-production trial model 31c Lincoln Continental. This elusive model is in outstanding condition and sold to a room bidder for £15,600, so a cup of strong sweet tea was swiftly sent his way.

It's not always the model that brings the interest though, Lot 5401 sold for a fantastic £6,240, however the model is quite common, what is rare, and possibly unique about this lot is the box it comes with. This "New" 1971 copyright type I printers proof box was never actually released, with one end flap tab being used by Bowaters for print registration purposes having the numerical sequence 1 through to 56. Although a number of sheets of these boxes would have been printed it is unknown how many have survived and this is possibly the only opportunity to acquire one of these very rare boxes. The lot also had fantastic provenance, as it was formerly the property of Ron Jobson, who was responsible





for the majority of artwork, both on the boxes and within the catalogues during the late 1960s and 1970s. It was sold as part of the Ron Jobson Collection at Astons Auctioneers in 2011.

Another suspected world record was achieved for Lot 5315, the Regular Wheels 44c GMC Refrigerator Truck, which was a factory pre-production colour trial, having "No.44" cast rather than "GMC" and, despite having three scratches to the windscreen, it realised a fantastic £9,600 against a £1,000-£1,300 estimate.

A further model from the Ron Jobson Collection, Lot 5430, was a Matchbox Regular Wheels 50c Ford Kennel Truck. The excellent model does have factory paint flaws to the hood & cab roof however the "New" type F1 box is signed by the artist Ron Jobson, this undoubtedly helped the lot achieve £6,960, over ten times its £400-£500 estimate.

Graham is over the moon with the result of the first two days of his auction. Vectis' specialist and auctioneer Julian Royse had estimated the collection in total to achieve £250,000, but Graham achieved this, and more, in the first two days. The total from the first two days of the sale is £281,000, and, with the two remaining days expected to achieve a further £100,000 in September, this is possibly the highest grossing single

owner Matchbox collection to be seen.





# Camping it up

# Andrew Ralston gets ready for a summer trip on a budget.

he ongoing difficulties with travel abroad make it likely that camping and caravan holidays within the UK will be more popular this year. That's a theme with plenty of possibilities for the model collector, and well-known classics like the Corgi Thames Airborne caravan and the various Dinky caravan trailers immediately come to mind.

However, in the spirit of this column, two more unusual subjects are pictured this month, both dating from the early days of the Chinese diecast industry in the 1990s (though it's hard to realise that's around three decades ago). At that time, Chinese toy companies had children rather than adult collectors in mind, and the notion of producing exceptionally detailed 1/43 scale models at low cost was still some way off, though companies like Maisto were making models to collectors' standards in larger scales.

Both the holiday items shown here are fitted with the feature common to most Chinese toy cars of the period - a pull-back friction motor. The 'Vacation Pick-up' is 6.5 inches long and consists of a plastic camper body fitted on top of a diecast pick-up casting. It is not a direct copy, but there are some clear echoes of the Mazda camper introduced by Corgi in 1976, although this had a removable rear that could stand alone on four collapsible legs. According to the box illustration, the Chinese version came in four colours - white, blue, red or yellow.

The 'Sport Caravan' set similarly combines diecast and plastic. The body of the caravan is plastic,

attached to a black diecast base, with the car being constructed in the opposite way – a diecast body on a plastic chassis. It has opening doors and the ubiquitous pull-back mechanism that rather spoils the proportions as the wheels stick out too far. The four rings at the front indicate that the car is meant to be an Audi, but the set was also issued with a BMW 3 series, Mercedes estate car or a Ford Sierra, towing either the caravan or a cabin cruiser.

These simple playthings are typical of what could be bought in any bargain store or newsagent back in the nineties. But who made them? With a few notable exceptions such as May Cheong Toys (trademarked MC Toy and, later, Maisto) Chinese toymakers at this time followed the Hong Kong practice of not putting their names on their products but simply a logo. In fact, these companies were based in Hong Kong, but had started to transfer production to China, where labour costs were much cheaper.

The logo on the back of the box identifies the maker as the Shing Fat Diecasting Factory, whose head office was in the King Win Industrial Building, Kwun Tong, Hong Kong. The company is still in existence, making similar diecast playthings.

The camper van and caravan set might not come into the category of collectors' items, but as the years pass, someone is bound to remember having them as a child and will look back on them with nostalgia.

**HAVING** read the article by Roger Bailey on the Corgi Metro in the May issue. I just thought I would flag that there are even more variations between the Metro HL and the HLS. The first other variance is that the casting on the HL doesn't have the body strip down the sides of the vehicle, where has the HLS version has this strip. The second is that the tailgate on the HL doesn't have a tab/lip cast in to lift the tailgate as seen on the HLS version. I also have a variant of the HL that does not include the simulated heated rear window, it just has the wiper, whereas all the other versions of HL and HLS have the heated rear window and wiper. I have all the original sales literature from the 1980 motor show on the launch of the Metro, the five models on launch were 1.0, 1.0L, 1.0 HLE, 1.3S and 1.3HLS, nothing is listed in the brochure about a 1.3 HL version as depicted by Corgi. Perhaps the 1.3 HL was a pre-production model that Corgi originally modelled and then had to modify to the HLS version.

As a fellow Mini enthusiast (I've owned four over the years), I have a fair collection of them too, but sadly there are no Travellers by Matchbox. The closest we can come here is to take one of the modern Matchbox Mini Vans and modify it - come to think of it, I have one in a box somewhere, so might have a go at converting it myself! The 'modern' Matchbox casting was first released in 2007 and is based on the 1965 Mini, so even has external door hinges. A slightly less-detailed retool has just been released, in 2020, so it would be best to aim for the earlier casting. Some judicious wielding of a Dremel-style tool could be used to take out the side rear upper paneland replaced with some clear plastic/acetate sheet cut to fit. Then the wood-effect panels could simply be attached to the outside. I'll let you know how I get on, if I take the plunge.

# **OUT OF C-QUENCE?**



I have been collecting OOC buses for some time now, in particular, model 40403 AEC Regent II in the livery of Eastbourne Corporation (pre-Stagecoach). I have quite recently noticed an anomaly with numbering on the Limited Edition Certificates the certificates quite clearly state the

number of models is 5,000 (4 digits) yet all the certificates I have for this particular model, show numbers containing 6 digits, all beginning with "0" (see photo), and I don't know why this is. Do you think the original number of models was to be 10,000 or more and, for whatever reason, Corgi decided to reduce the model run? I also collect the guides that cover EFE & OOC buses (and other makes). I have been searching everywhere for a copy of "EFE & Corgi OOC Model Bus Collectors Guide 2014" - I believe this was the last one published by the author, Anne Letch. If you or anyone out there know where I could get one, please let me know. I have all the editions before 2014, so I'm really keen to add it to my collection.

Hi Graham, a very good observation about the numbering and my only thoughts are similar to yours in that perhaps these were templated in the days when a larger run might have been the thing, so for reduced runs the numbers were prefixed with a "0". Regarding the 2014 edition of Anne's guide, that is something that would seem to be non-existent, as there don't appear to be any references online for this edition. The closest I can find is on the excellent www.modelbuszone.co.uk, which states "The next full edition of the guide will be published in July 2014, however, a 13th edition supplement will be produced in July 2013 listing all the new releases since the 12th edition" alongside an entry for the 12th edition.

# **CODE TWO MINI MIX-UP**

I'M looking forward already to my August issue, No 286. Issue 285 barely had time to drop through the letterbox when, prior to giving it a more in-depth read, I came across page 85, advising readers of the contents in the next issue. Accompanied by a picture, a headline announces an article entitled, "Minis by Code Two Models", and states that it's, "A small but intriguing range of unreleased Matchbox-Dinky Minis from a little-known Australian brand". Intriguing it certainly is, for a number of reasons. First of all, I'm wondering, who are Code Two Models? Secondly, I've had the set shown for quite some time, the single car, #13C, even longer. They're not by Code Two or Matchbox-Dinky. Car #13C is not part of the diorama. Regular readers may be aware that Australian diecasts have long been a passion of mine, dating back to around 2001. Models by Biante, Classic Carlectables, Trax and one or two others, now total over two hundred in the three most popular scales. Of the genres I've collected, one is every winner of the famous Bathurst road race held every October in the hills of New South Wales from 1963 until the present day, and number 13C is one of them. Just three models up to 2020 are needed to complete the set. Car #13C is the 1966 winning Morris Cooper S, and numbers17C and 22C, also in the diorama, finished second and third. For the record, the first

nine finishers were all Morris Mini Coopers. The tenth and eleventh placed cars both had a V8 engine and were six and eight laps adrift of the winner, respectively. The winning car was driven by Finnish rally star, Rauno Aaltonen, partnered by Aussie driver, Bob Holden. This identical two car set was released many years ago by Lledo Vanguards as one of its "Heroes of Australian Motorsport" series. The model of the winning Mini is also a Lledo Vanguard. The others in the series that I'm aware of are a Vauxhall Cresta, a Mk II Jaguar and a Mk I Cortina GT. Are there any others? The Cresta was the first car home in 1960, when the 500 mile race, as it was then, in the pre-1963 Bathurst years, was held at Phillip Island off the coast of Victoria, near Melbourne. The Jaguar is Aussie legend Bob Jane's Mk II 3.4, with which he was 1962 Australian Touring Car Champion, while the Cortina replicates Bob Jane's 1964 Bathurst 500 winner, and was the second of three consecutive wins at Bathurst for a Mk I. The car was also modelled by Classic Carlectables and is by far the superior of the two. The 1966 winning Mini was released many years ago in 1/18 scale by Biante Auto Art. This model can command big money, if you can find one. I await issue No 286 in anticipation. One final question. Will the mysterious Code Two be releasing the Cresta, the Mk II Jaguar and the Cortina GT?

I also have the cream and Datapost racing issues in the special flip top boxes as well as a set of 36 red HLS Metros in flip top boxes, all in a shop counter top dispenser box. They all have £1.99 price tags and have the name 'Merretts' which I presume was a toy shop or department store. I bought this set from Vectis Auctions in 2014 so I presume this was unsold stock from when the shop closed down. I never knew the HL version was also produced in red for sale at the 1980 Motor show so thanks for Roger for detailing this. This is another variation for me to track down. # A material consideration

Whilst avoiding being judgemental, **Stephen Paul Hardy** solicits views on the question "Is it the subject or what it is made of that is important?"

e it a passion or a pastime, collecting inevitably prompts debate and, occasionally, controversy amongst participants. Issues of originality, authenticity and, above all, fidelity to the spirit of the collectable theme quite often head up debate agendas.

As I see it, when it comes to scale models, there is an eternal triangle that inextricably links a miniature's standing as a collectable, the material it is made from and the purpose for which it was made. Each facet is subject to a range of (often) deeply ingrained preconceptions or biases, themselves subject to changing fashions over time.

Then there is the curious dichotomy between that of something being a cheap toy, or a valuable adult's collectable - the travel of any item from one perceived category to the other generally being just a factor of a number of decades.

It is a reasonable presumption that a magazine with the title *Diecast Collector* primarily caters for collectors of miniatures made from diecast metal. The subject matter of that miniature being

secondary to the material that it is made from. There seems to be a historical British prejudice in favour of metal as the preferential modelling material. Plastic it would seem being traditionally relegated on the basis that it was what cheap toys were made from – and injection moulded construction kits. I defy anybody though to argue that the now long obsolete Mercedes W180 220S Pontons of Faller's 1/43 'Memory Cars' range is not one of the best models of the vehicle ever made – a perfect example of a well-detailed scale model, even though it is plastic.

Some subjects, in all their material combinations – notably trains, aeroplanes and figures – have always been well represented on the magazine racks of British newsagents. Yet, to my mind, inclusive coverage of scale model automobiles in all their material guises has always been the poor relation in this respect. Diecast (and now resincast) automobiles get a fair crack of the whip, but plastic automobiles have no magazine champion in Britain. I guess, though, the fact speaks for itself that the material and not the subject is probably the collectable focus.

have been flicking through a small book, which, in its small way, tries to explain English usage.

When it doesn't confuse me with terms like "intransitive verb" or prompt a snigger at "dangling modifier" (cover your eyes, Felicity), it can be very useful. I can't remember why I picked it up this time, but I came across the grammatical distinctions between first, second and third person in normal speech, which seems to apply equally well to writing.

Currently, I (first person) am talking/writing to you (second person) and could well begin telling you about him (third person). I always sense something sinister about the third person. Third anything is often unwelcome – third place, third class, the third degree (torture) and, of course, the shadowy third man in the Orson Welles film. Also, let's not forget that "two's company, three's a crowd". Watch out for the third person singular, chaps, he's trouble.

The little book goes on to explain that third person can include they, them and it, so we can forget about that singular third person for now and consider more uplifting matters.

Look across the road at the hotel. The group of people by the doors have recently dined and await their car – a distinguished elderly man, a woman in an evening dress and, in front of them, a child. On the pavement, no doorman, but a watcher nevertheless in overcoat and hat. He arrived with a large group of men and women, but remains outside, looking up and down the street, sometimes walking to the corner. He can't see us.

Two members of our team, a convincingly affectionate couple, are already in the restaurant and witnessed the noisy arrival of the group. They report that the central core of three men and two girls appear to be enjoying themselves, but the fit-looking

younger men in dark suits on each side of them are tense and their eyes scan the large room constantly. Hands slide inside jackets whenever a waiter approaches or a door opens. They eat with their forks, but do not drink.

So who are these people? You don't ask. And anyway, money talks so they don't have to. We do know the large man in the centre who laughs readily and slaps the table. His name, for now, is Ivan. He will tell you he is a businessman. Import, export. The cars in which they arrived in close convoy are now in the high-security car park beneath the hotel - first a white Mercedes-Benz, not new, but surprisingly quick, then Ivan in his Lamborghini with one of the young men. A new Jaguar carried the rest of the party. We know all of them by various nicknames. All except the man who sits on Ivan's left and to whom Ivan talks in heavily accented English, peppered with loud obscenities and laughter. We know this man by his real name because he is one of our own. Or he was. We are surprised to be told he is here.

The Rolls-Royce that shelters us from view has been lent to us. A Rolls is unlikely to be asked to move and, in any case, it wears diplomatic plates. At a given signal, it will reverse, then drive along the side of the hotel to a fire exit where two men in dinner jackets will be supporting a third who looks unwell. Possibly he had a fall when visiting the men's room. As the trio get in the car, we walk casually to our car and follow the Rolls.

At the large table in the hotel restaurant, the chair beside Ivan is empty. Two of the young men go to find out why. The Rolls-Royce glides away from Mayfair and quite soon stops outside one of the tall narrow houses in Belgravia. This is where we will talk to our third man.
