

NEW ARRIVAL FOR CORGI MODEL CLUB

HAVE you seen the latest addition to the Corgi Model Club range? The Chrysler Imperial (Corgi No.246) was in the original Corgi range for just two years – between 1965 and 1967 – and included a unique and somewhat ingenious 'secret' bonnet-opening mechanism. Operated by applying downwards pressure on the front axle, the bonnet opened just enough to enable it to be lifted. However, this clever method of operation was bafflingly omitted from the box text, giving rise to many believing they had a faulty model!

This classic-era Corgi also featured opening doors, tilting seats, two figures (the female passenger being considerably smaller than the male driver) and a boot/trunk that lifted to reveal a set of golf clubs and caddy. This model is available now via the Club's website – www.corgimodelclub.com

RELEASES FROM ESVAL

ESVAL Models have announced an amended and updated release schedule over the next few months. The bad news for British collectors is that the eagerly-awaited 1958 Peerless GT coupe has been delayed until September, whilst improvements were made.

Due any time now, should be two versions of the 1932 Austro-Daimler ADR 8 Pullman Limousine. Next month will see further American cars, the 1957 Studebakers President Broadmoor and Commander Provincial 4-door station wagons, followed by another Austro-Daimler ADR 8, this time five versions of the 1929 Torpedo Roadster. September should bring us the Peerless G.T., in the four variants announced earlier, a racing version in Silver, and road cars in blue, red and green.

NORTH EAST TO SEE A SCALE RECOVERY!

SEARCH Impex, the customised promotional model truck specialists, has announced the release of a 1/50 scale Scania S540 High (6x4) heavy recovery truck, customised in Alpha Recovery Ltd's livery.

This is the second model to be commissioned by Alpha Recovery. The model has been produced exclusively for Search Impex by WSI Models as a certificated Limited Edition of just 155 pieces.

Since incorporation in 1995, Alpha Recovery has grown steadily and successfully over the years and it now boasts an impressive fleet of more than 36 diverse recovery vehicles. It remains a family run business and has evolved to become the North East's largest specialised rescue and recovery operator, offering a range of services from light recovery through to heavy recovery of vehicles – both on and off road. Additional equipment at Alpha Recovery's disposal includes crane trucks, forklifts, telehandlers, scrap handlers and JCB's – all of which can be deployed to assist with clearing up spilled loads.

With its HQ in Dudley, Cramlington (about 7 miles north of Newcastle) and a second depot at Peterlee, it has good road access to major arterial roads in the north east, including the A1 and A19, enabling swift response times when called out to casualty vehicles. The new Scania – on which the model will be based – is the very latest addition to Alpha Recovery's fleet. The recovery truck will be stationed at the Company's Cramlington depot and as with all Alpha's heavy recovery trucks, it is fully equipped to tow hazardous cargos and operated by drivers who are fully trained to the Institute of Vehicle Recovery standards, as well as having ADR qualifications (ADR being a French acronym relating to the transport of hazardous goods by road).

And just like its real-life counterpart, the 1/50 scale die-cast model will be finished in Alpha Recovery's striking yellow and blue colour scheme, topped off with the fitting registration plate – BU55 SOS – a nod to the operator's specialist involvement with the recovery of buses. As with the previous DAF XF (8x4) model, the new Scania will make for an attractive and interesting addition to any model truck collection.

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

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

IT'S BIN DAY – HERE COMES OXFORD DIECAST'S NEWLY-TOOLED REFUSE TRUCK

ennis Eagle's history dates back to 1907, OXFORD DIECAST Today, Dennis Eagle is the market leader in refuse when the Eagle Engineering Company was incorporated, in Warwick. The company specialised in refuse collection vehicles and road sweepers. In the early 1920s, Dennis Brothers, builder of buses, fire engines, and haulage trucks, began to produce specialised vehicles for municipal authorities. In 1971, Hestair Group bought Yorkshire Vehicles Limited, in Leeds, and Eagle Engineering Co in Warwick. Six months later, Hestair bought Dennis Motor Holdings and thereafter managed the businesses as the Vehicle Division of Hestair Engineering. Municipal bodies were made in Warwick by Hestair Eagle (incorporating Yorkshire Vehicles), municipal chassis were made by Dennis in Guildford, cabs were made in Blackpool. Hestair set up a special Environmental Vehicles Division for its waste management activities. In 1974, the Environmental Vehicles Division was renamed Dennis Eagle.

Dennis Eagle has a long history of innovation in the waste management industry. In 1980, the company introduced the first rear-loading refuse collection vehicle (RRV) to the UK market, which is now the standard type of refuse collection vehicle used in the UK. The company has been a leader in the development of alternative fuel refuse collection vehicles, introducing the first compressed natural gas (CNG) refuse collection vehicle to the UK market in 2004.

collection vehicles in the UK. The company also exports its vehicles to over 40 countries around the world. It is a subsidiary of the Terberg Group, a family-owned company that has been in business for over 150 years. Terberg is a global leader in the production of specialist vehicles for the waste management, port, and logistics industries.

The Dennis Eagle Olympus Refuse Truck is a rear-loading refuse collection vehicle (RRV) that is designed to be efficient and reliable. It is available in a variety of configurations to suit different operational needs. Key specifications include a compaction ratio of 6:1, a bin lifting capacity of 500kg and a payload totalling 11,000kg. Powered by a 5.2-litre turbocharged Cummins diesel engine through an Allison 3000 automatic transmission, the truck also features air brakes, power steering and air suspension, plus a comfort cab with air conditioning and heating.

Biffa was founded in 1912, by Richard Henry Biffa, as Richard Biffa Limited. The company originally specialised in the removal and sale of ashes and clinker from London power stations. In 1958, Richard Henry Biffa's grandson, Richard Charles Biffa, joined the business and began to grow it organically and by acquisition. In 1971, Biffa was acquired by British Electric Traction (BET). BET was a major electricity company at the time, and it was looking to expand into the waste management industry. The company continued to grow under BET ownership, and it acquired a number of other

waste management companies in the UK. It then went through several ownership changes and today it is one of the largest waste management companies in the UK, providing a wide range of waste management services to businesses and households.

Oxford Diecast's 1/76 scale replica of the Dennis Eagle Olympus Biffa refuse truck is the first example of the fabulous new tooling and is resplendent in Biffa's eyecatching red and white livery. With a perfect finish and neatly applied graphics, it also features great attention to detail throughout.

GET DRILLING WITH UNIVERSAL HOBBIES

aunched at Agritechnica last November and now more widely available Universal Hobbies' ✓ new Horsch 6.0m wide combination drill is a good-looking model with accurate detailing and many working features.

There are hydraulic pipes for connecting to the tractor, a folding stand, road blocks and two different tractor attachment points provided on the drawbar. The drill also unfolds smoothly into its working position. Both the outer sections and the hopper platform lower together on two rams. Once lowered the access steps to the hopper platform will swing out from their transport position. Correctly sized handrails are detailed on the hopper access steps and platform.

The hopper has a grey plastic cover but it does not open. Under the hopper the seed and fertiliser metering units are detailed and there are grey pipes to the two distribution units. On the frame there are the two rows of freely rotating tyre packers and two rows of freely rotating serrated discs with sideboards detailed. These are followed by 40 seeding coulters. There's a grey pipe to each coulter from the distribution units and each has an opening disc, press wheel and covering tines detailed.

The drill's also provided with road warning boards and folding bout markers designed to mark the tractor centre line.

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
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
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
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


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CALL IN THE PROFESSIONALS FOR THE LATEST COLLABORATION BETWEEN CORGI AND PROFESSIONALMANIA

The popular TV show, The Professionals, has led to several releases by Corgi over the decades since the show first aired on British television, in 1977, running until 1983. Spanning five series, a total of 57 episodes were made, filmed between 1977 and 1981.

Focusing on a fictitious law enforcement department known as CI5 (a cross between the real life MI5 and CID), the storyline was that it was to use any means deemed appropriate to deal with crimes of a serious nature that fell outside of the remit of the police, but were also not suitable for the security services or the armed forces.

Led by department head, George Cowley (played by Gordon Jackson), his two best agents were Ray Doyle (Martin Shaw) and William Bodie (Lewis Collins). Doyle is an ex-detective constable from a questionable part of London, while Bodie is an ex-paratrooper, mercenary and SAS sergeant.

Tony Buller, of Professionalmania, has already commissioned two replicas from the TV series through Corgi Premiums, both at 1/43 scale. Following on from the huge success of the Doyle's Ford Escort RS2000 (released in 2022) and Bodie's Ford Capri (2023), Tony's latest Professionals release is this twin-pack, featuring the gold version of the Ford Capri Mk3 3.0S in Solar Gold, driven by Doyle in later episodes, and Cowley's Ford Granada Mk2 2.8i Ghia in Midnight Blue.

Wearing the correct registrations used for filming (OWC 822W on the Granada and OAR 576W on the Capri), both models are beautifully finished and feature plenty of detail. Especially worthy of note are the stunning wheels on the Capri, which were specially commissioned and tooled up at great expense by Tony for his earlier Capri release.

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



Marking 60 years of Maiorette

Alex Winson, collector, blogger and now Diecast Collector, went out to Germany to help celebrate a big birthday...

or any brand to last 60 years is incredible. A company taking their first steps in Europe in 1964 would have had to pass the turmoil caused by The Cold War, economic struggles, the collapse of the Soviet Bloc, the explosion of technology and the relentless rise of social media, the COVID pandemic... there's a lot to contend with. To stay on the right side of all that would be hard for any company, let alone one producing something as niche as toy cars.

From 1964 until 2024 many diecast brands have come and gone: Dinky. Tri-ang. Marx. Mercury. Dalia. I could go on. But French brand Majorette is still going strong. A 60th birthday party is a big deal and the company pulled out all the stops to celebrate. As part of this, I was invited over to Germany for the very first Majorette Influencer Event to learn more about the company and celebrate a fine and varied history of diecast. And also to get a sneak peek at what the company is planning for the future. With me I had a

very special model; Majorette number 1.

The origins of Majorette lie not in cars but in model railways. The Véron brothers of Lyon founded the Rail Route company in 1961 to produce scale locomotives and accessories. After seeing the success of England's Matchbox, Emile Veron wanted to begin producing small scale cars. The first Majorette cars were produced in 1964 under the Rail Route name and the "BRM" that accompanied me to Germany (a replica of the P57 Formula One car) was the very first. It was followed by a Porsche 804, a Sovam food truck, Bernard lorry and the nine other vehicles that formed the early Rail Route series. By 1967 the Veron brothers had parted ways (Joseph and Paul Veron went on to found Norev) and Majorette was now a brand in its own right.

By the early 1980s Majorette had become one of the biggest producers of scale automobiles in the world and had taken its first steps in the US. Towards the end of the decade however the company was

struggling. Production facilities in Thailand had opened to counter rising costs in France but quality was declining. By 1992 the brand was liquidated and thus began a series of short-lived takeovers by numerous buyers and a rather sad period in the company history. Simba-Dickie took over the brand in 2010 and began an immediate restructure, effectively rebuilding the company from the ground up. The Thai factories also received huge investments and cuttingedge production technology and the resurgence began.

My love with the brand began strapped into a shopping trolley in the early 1990s during trips to Morrisons supermarket with my parents. I was car mad even by the time I had said my first word, and my earliest Majorette car was a VW Beetle which I adored. I'd pester my forever patient mother and father for others on our shopping trips and later with pocket money I was able to build up a small collection of Majorette which saw many races, stunts, and collisions with skirting boards. As I got older the brand remained



close to my heart as I took my first steps as a collector and then a blogger.

In 2019 I joined the diecast blog Lamley Group as a contributor and chose Majorette as one of my "go to" topics. I reached out to the team in Germany and began a relationship that has allowed me to see first-hand the huge progress the brand are making, and one that led me on a Thursday morning in April to the doors of Simba-Dickie HQ in the Bavarian city of Fürth, accompanied by some of the world's best diecast bloggers and figureheads of the Majorette presence on social media.

The immediate thing that struck me was just how passionate the team at HQ are about their work, and how grateful they are of their fanbase. We were treated to an introduction of the team and a presentation on the history of the brand developed by Majorette expert Marc Des Pouy, who had also brought along a small selection of the 25,000+ Majorette in his collection, accompanied by advertisements and

packaging spanning the entirety of the brand's sixty years.

It was evident just how proud the staff at Fürth are of this history and the immediate evidence was right in front of us in the showroom in the form of the new models released to celebrate the 60th anniversary.

They include an exact replica of the very first Majorette. Now minus the BRM license, the "Racing Car" is available in the same colours the first Rail Route cars were finished in. Various other releases appear in the 60th anniversary range including the superb Citroën HY, Volvo 240 GL, and Citröen DS 21, the latter two also forming part of the 60th Anniversary 5 pack featuring cars adorned with Majorette logos from across the years.

The new Racing Car casting provided some great company for my Rail Route BRM (including during a later trip to the Norisring Circuit) and in a neat touch made an appearance as place holders at the French style dinner put on for us. Each car had been personalised with our names engraved locally by volunteers at a disability charity that Majorette donate to.


Across the two days of the event we were shown every process of the Majorette diecast, from design to finished product. We were treated to an insight into the Thailand factory, which even in the age of automation still requires a human hand to fit small parts and make the finishing touches. It was pleasing to see there is still a human element in the production process and the efforts being made to minimise environmental impact, with by-products of the casting processes going immediately back into the system via recycling.

It is very apparent that there are diecast collectors and real car enthusiasts behind the scenes at HQ, right up to the very top level. Conversations about real vehicles, diecast finds and personal collections flowed not just from my fellow social media folk, but from the mouths of management. They're passionate about cars and their miniature versions. They want to get things right, and if I needed any proof of that the new Japan Series gave me more than enough evidence.

The development team took a long time to ensure the colour shades of each of the five cars matched an actual shade available from the factory. And knowing how much excitement can be caused to fans of Japanese cars by the words "Midnight Purple", they

made the unique Nissan shade the colour of the R34 Skyline GT-R chase car in the set. Now that is cool.

After a long time spent taking in the new castings being presented, we had opportunity to provide suggestions and feedback to the team and believe me, they do know about the wheel issues on their models! They're constantly monitoring social media, and through such fantastic representatives as Damian Nicholas (head of the Majorette Australasia Instagram and Facebook page) they have valuable insights into the wants of collectors. They're also keen to keep growing with brand and event collaborations and I'm pleased to say the UK is a very important market to them going forward. After a bumpy start in Asda



stores there's been a refresh at the UK distributor, and I can already say there are positive steps being made to engage collectors here and provide more opportunity to get hold of Majorette.


So, what of the rest of 2024, and further on, 2025? Well, I've got to remain tight lipped on some of the things I saw but let's just say there's a lot of cool metal on the way. The French Touch series (with liveries based on the culinary specialties of France) is a recognition of Majorette's home nation and will bring two new Citroën HY colours affixed with a new wheel design. The aforementioned Volvo 240 and Citröen DS 21 will slot into the Vintage Cars range in some very neat new colours. And speaking

of the Vintage Cars line-up, British collectors will surely appreciate the upcoming Ford Escort Mk2, sitting on Schmidt TH-esque 5 spokes.

Like your metal to be a bit more modern? Majorette can do that too. From the array of Stuttgart legends in the Porsche series to the Alfa Romeo Giulia Quadrifoglio and Bugatti Chiron Pur Sport via the Alpine A110 to the current crop of US Muscle cars, there's something for everyone.

This all may sound like lot of hyperbole and over praise but honestly I think it's deserved. There's a lot to be excited about if you're a Majorette collector, and a lot to reassure any future collectors. Sixty years after the first car the future looks brighter now than ever.



Majorette Müller Volkswagens

Mike Pigott looks at a pair of promotional Volkswagens produced by Majorette for a German drugstore chain.

igh streets in Germany are dominated by three large drugstore chains: Müller, Rossman and DM (Drogerie Mart). Despite being called drugstores, these shops do not sell medications or fill prescriptions, which are handled by Apotheke stores (pharmacies), instead selling cosmetics, hygiene products and health foods, like the UK chain Superdrug.

Müller & Co was founded in Ulm in 1953, and grew to become one of the largest chains in Germany, with over 500 stores there and many in neighbouring countries such as Austria, Switzerland, Hungary, and Croatia. In addition to perfumes and hygiene items, Müller stores also sell groceries, drinks, stationery and toys. Stores in bigger towns and cities are often very large, and can have as many as five floors, selling CDs and DVDs, electrical goods, and books. Some of the larger stores have enormous toy departments, and sell a good selection of diecast items including Siku, Schuco, Herpa and Majorette models. Like many major diecast retailers,

Müller has commissioned promotional models in its own livery.

MAJORETTE

Majorette was founded in France in 1964, and initially produced good quality diecast vehicles that were similar to Matchbox toys. However, in 2010 German toy manufacturer Simba-Dickie acquired the Majorette brand. The earlier tooling was discontinued, and Majorette was re-launched as a direct competitor to fellow German company Siku, with solid, realistic models that sold at a higher price than Hot Wheels or Matchbox. In fact, little of Majorette's French heritage is evident as most models in the range are of German and international vehicles.

VOLKSWAGENS

The promotional models produced for Müller were quite appropriate for a famous German company, being a Volkswagen Beetle and a Type 1 Bulli van. These models were already in the Majorette range

and were not exclusive castings. The two models were finished in the company's colours of white, orange, and black with printed logos, and were packaged in standard Majorette short blister cards without special branding.

BEETLE

The first model issued was of the iconic Volkswagen Beetle. Judging by the oval rear window and the small taillights, it was based on a 1950s version. It is a very accurate casting, capturing the look of a classic Beetle. The body is painted white, with Müller logos printed on the sides, and a very bright orange imitation fabric sunroof. The front luggage compartment lifts up, but only reveals a bare metal ridge over the front axle. Printed details in silver highlight the headlight bezels, chrome strips, handle, and VW badge on the nose, while the taillights are touched in with red paint. The interior is in black plastic and includes the running boards, while the glazing is clear and incorporates the headlights. The base and bumpers are in orange plastic and the wheels, which are of a silver, six-slot design, are not particularly accurate, they are of a realistic width. Scale is given as 1/64.

BULLI VAN

The second model was the Type 1 Transporter Van, known as the Bulli in Germany. This was one of the new Majorette's most popular models, and several different body styles were produced, including the Transporter, Kombi Van, Samba station wagon and pick-up. The Müller version is again painted white, with an orange roof. The VW logo on the front is printed in orange, as are the sweeping V-shaped trim lines that continue along the body sides. Müller logos are printed on the sides and on the rear cargo door, which opens. The interior is in beige plastic, but is actually the mini-bus interior, as it includes

rear seats that can be seen from the opening rear door. The glazing is clear and incorporates the headlights. The base and bumpers are in orange plastic, and the realistically narrow wheels are of a chrome disc style. The scale is larger than the Beetle, at 1/59.

Whether these models are based on real vehicles is uncertain, although other manufacturers including Wiking and Schuco have produced promotional Müller vehicles in the past, which had very similar liveries. Certainly, the Volkswagon Van would have been appropriate for making local deliveries, and transporting stock to smaller branches. The role of the Beetle is perhaps less obvious; although in the days before digital photography, fleets of Volkswagens were often used for collecting rolls of film to be processed from pharmacies and delivering prints.



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






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Post-war British clockwork cars

For a relatively short period after World War Two, several British toymakers combined diecast construction with clockwork mechanisms. Andrew Ralston finds out more...

ast time (Diecast Collector, June 2024) we saw how Mettoy, Wells-Brimtoy and Chad Valley - three of the larger British toy companies known for making clockwork tinplate toys - had a go at fitting similar mechanisms to diecast cars after World War II. All three were in the big league of toymakers, but in the early post-war years the pent-up demand for new toys was such that many smaller makers briefly found a niche with metal products that were often simple and crude but found buyers nonetheless. Extensive research carried out by the noted collector and author Robert Newson has revealed that numerous workshops of this kind operated in London and largely faded away when better quality toys became more widely available on the home market. This process was hastened by the restriction on the use of metal for toys resulting from the 1951 Korean War. This month we'll look at a selection of the more interesting of these ephemeral products, in roughly chronological order.

SCAMOLD

It is hard to find many British diecast clockwork cars made prior to the second World War but there was

a small range of racing cars sold under the Scamold name (a contraction of Scale Models Ltd) launched in 1939. The box states that they were manufactured at the Brooklands race track which soon afterwards concentrated on wartime aircraft production and toy production moved to an address in Malvern, Worcestershire. The 1/35 scale Alta, Maserati and ERA were quite sophisticated for the time, with features such as working suspension and a removable

mechanism wound up by a starting handle at the front. The box carried the logo of other cars such as Bugatti and MG suggesting that further models were planned but Scamold did not last beyond 1950.

GAIETY/CASTLE ART

Birmingham-based diecasting business Castle Art Products was founded in 1946 and made racing cars in three sizes (3.25, 4.25 and 5.25 inches respectively), the larger two being fitted with clockwork motors. These are loosely based on Brooklands-style racers, though much chunkier

and toy-like than the Scamolds. Yet Gaiety was also capable of making quite accurate replicas, as can be seen from their clockwork-powered three-wheeled Morgan sports car (c. five inches long). These models exist in both painted and plated finishes and carry the maker's name underneath.

L.D. ABRAHAM

From time to time a mysterious clockwork Vauxhall coupé turns up, simple in style but with the characteristic 'fluted' decorations on the side of the bonnet picked out in silver. The base consists



of a central strip of tinplate, open on either side. This model has been attributed to various makers without any real evidence; even a boxed one gives no clue, as the packaging is simply a brown card box with a drawing of the car. Once again, it was Robert Newson whose study of 1940s toy trade journals positively identified the model as being advertised in 1948 by L. D. Abraham and Company, of London EC1. This company, which dates back as far as 1890, was originally a distributor of Far Eastern sourced textiles and fancy goods under the 'Telsalda' name which in the 1960s was often found on plastic toy cars imported from Hong Kong. Presumably Abrahams had the Vauxhall made for them by someone else.


BETAL

Betal was a trademark of J. and H. Glasman who were active in the toy industry as far back as 1929. After the war Glasman operated from premises in Plaistow Road, London E15, and at the 1947 British Industries Fair exhibited a wide range of toy products under the Betal name such as carpentry sets, forts, table tennis sets, a bus conductor's set and metal mechanical toys, the best known being a tinplate

clockwork trolleybus. They also made or distributed a diecast 'Mechanical Midgi-car'. A forgotten batch of these turned up in a warehouse in the late 1970s and for a time the Betal car was often seen at toy fairs. Some have detected a resemblance to a Packard at the front, but essentially the car is a generic forties shape. Maybe that's why Betal just decided to call it a 'Midgi-car'...

KEMBO

Yet another obscure maker of a handful of diecast models, Kembo was a name used by a company called Lovell Bros and Jardine of Reigate, Surrey. Like several other firms, their main business lay in industrial diecasting, with the toys being merely a sideline. In addition to some non-motorised lorries, Kembo made a vaguely Packard-like car, both as a saloon and police car, available with or without a clockwork mechanism.

TOY PRODUCTS LTD

Identified by the initials 'TP' or the brand name Robin Hood, this company operated in Walsall in the West Midlands until going into receivership in 1955. TP are known to have made a group of diecast cars and commercial vehicles, the best-known being an American-style saloon car, a 'Razor Edge' saloon, a hardtop coupé, a sports car and a 'Midget Sports Car' which was such a caricature that it has sometimes been thought to represent a fairground dodgem car! These are mostly generic in style, though various attempts have been made to identify them. Some collectors think the coupé might be a Bentley or a Lea Francis; the suggestion that the saloon is based on a Mercury sounds plausible, while the 'Razor Edge' car is clearly a Rolls Royce. These are all heavy castings of around five to six inches in length, and are generally freewheeling, with covered-in wheelarches and cast metal one piece wheels suspended from within the body rather than on axles. However, the coupé, Razor Edge and American saloons also came with wind-up motors and these have open wheelarches and solid rubber wheels for better traction. These models have

no base plates: the tightly-wound spring and gearing is exposed underneath and safety concerns would certainly rule them out as children's toys today!

RIVER SERIES

Dating from 1953, a little later than most of the toys considered so far, the River Series was a sideline of a metal casting company called Jordan and Lewden of Homerton, London E9. The series consisted of both cars, which are highly sought-after now, and oddly-shaped trucks which have less appeal. The cars will not be discussed here as they have friction rather than clockwork motors, but the forwardcontrol lorry sometimes had a clockwork mechanism, fitted flat under the chassis. After a few years, Jordan and Lewden gave up toy-making to concentrate on industrial casting work and, as is well-known, some of the River Series tooling went to Israel and reemerged under the Gamda name.

CONCLUSION

Both major and minor British toymakers offered quite a selection of diecast clockwork-powered cars after the war but the appeal of this type of toy proved to be short-lived. However, various European diecasters such as Solido in France and Schuco in Germany did continue with clockwork diecasts for longer, and they reached their highest level of development in the sophisticated mechanisms fitted to the German Prämeta range of cars in the mid-1950s. Schuco's Micro-Racer series survived longer, production being restarted in the 1980s by an ex-Schuco employee called Werner Nutz and continued by the revived Schuco company in the 21st century. These models are, of course, now aimed at adult collectors rather children.

One explanation for the longevity of German clockwork toy production might be that Germany had a very long tradition of producing mechanical toys, whereas in the UK the diecast market evolved in a different direction with the expansion of choice in the form of Matchbox (1953 onwards) and Corgi (1956)

onwards), in addition to the ever-growing Dinky range. The smaller players fell by the wayside and in any case clockwork diecasts were probably more expensive to produce, with the mechanisms generally being bought in from specialist makers.

Even today, it's surprising how many of the British toys discussed in these pages turn up at toy fairs in well-played with condition – a fact that is surely testimony to the robustness of their construction. Whatever they lacked in realism, they made up for in play value for children who must surely have cherished them in that bygone era of post-war austerity.

>>> SKODA IN RALLYING



In recent years, Skoda won several national and international rally series around Europe. Francisco Mota looks at the Czech brand's evolution in the sport, through a collection of diecasts representing rally cars produced by the company. Photos: João Carlos Oliveira

> koda, the car brand from Czech Republic, is one of the top players in international rallying around Europe. The brand produces a special rally version of its hatchback Fabia and sells it to any rally team that wishes to enter rallying in Rally2 class. In several national and international series, this is the top level in the sport. Only the World Rally Championship (WRC) features cars of a higher level, the Rally1 hybrid class. The Rally2 cars are made from a volume-produced car, however, the result is almost a prototype, as only the basic monocoque is retained from the street version. The rally car has a complete roll bar that also works as a secondary chassis, a much more powerful engine and four

wheel drive, as well as a complete aerodynamic package, rally suspension (gravel and tarmac) and tyres. Skoda has been particularly successful in putting together the Fabia Rally2, the car being the first choice for many privateer teams and drivers, always with close support from Skoda's Motorsport department.

This is recent history as the company's Motorsport involvement started as early as 1905. The Voituretta A was the first car made by the company, then known as Laurint & Klement, and it was winning races from 1908. If we count motorcycle racing, the beginning was even earlier, in 1901. There's a lot to be said about Skoda in motorsport for the following seven decades, but our focus is rallying so let's fast forward to the 1970s.

A small rear-wheel drive, rear-engine two door coupe was entered in national and international rallies. Featuring a 1.3-liter engine, it became known as the "Porsche of the East" and was a regular class winner. Their most famous win was in the 1977 Monte Carlo rally, where the 130 RS clinched first and second places in their category. A small sedan, the 130 LS would follow from 1984, featuring the same mechanic layout, fighting successfully for class honors in the following seasons.

The biggest turn of events arrived in 1991, when the Volkswagen Group bought Skoda. By this time, the rally team was using Favorit 136L, a small front-wheel drive supermini and still aiming at small capacity class wins. They entered the WRC for some events in 1993 and a full season the following year, winning the World Cup in their class. A new model, called the Felicia, followed with something that was broadly speaking an evolution of the previous Favorit, now entered in the Kit Car category, a higher-level class.

Ambition was up for the 1999 WRC season, when Skoda homologated the Octavia WRC, this time it was a car for the top class in the sport. As a medium

sized family car, it was relatively big for the task, so Skoda replaced the Octavia for the Fabia WRC in 2003, still fighting for leading places, unfortunately without great overall results. That made the company rethink their strategy from 2009, abandoning the top class and focusing on the second level rallying, at the time known as the S2000 class. The secondgeneration Fabia road car was the basis for the 2009 Fabia S2000. Rally results in the following seasons showed the new strategy was right, with Skoda dominating their class in several WRC events. No other car had been as successful in this category before. Fabia S2000 achieved 50 national and international titles worldwide, making it the most successful rally car ever made by the company, until then. It was the model that opened a new business within Skoda, as this specialized rally car was the first sold to numerous privateer rally teams around the world. At the end of production in 2015, 63 cars had been built.

This was something that changed the brand's approach to rallying and was further amplified for the following third generation Fabia. Launched in

2015, the new model was now named the Fabia R5, according to the new technical rules for class 2 rally cars. The governing body would subsequently change the name of this category to Rally2, in 2020 and that still stands today. Regulations imply a lower price tag for this type of car, compared with the former S2000 and that was one of the reasons for the Fabia R5 success. In 2019, a new evolution version was homologated, known as Rally2 evo. That year, customers driving this rally car won a total of 19 national titles and further four won continental championships, including the world championship for privateer teams. The following season, drivers at the wheel of a Fabia Rally2 won another 14 national titles and a second world title. Skoda launched a new version, called the Fabia RS Rally2, in 2022, based on the fourth generation road car. Better aerodynamics, higher stiffness, more complex electronics, a new stronger engine were part of the improvements. Since 2015, more than 470 Fabia Rally2 cars were sold to privateer teams around the globe. Since 2020, Skoda no longer has a works team, leaving their customer teams to handle rallying activities. However, the Motorsport department improved customer support, not only by selling spare parts, but also providing technical support whenever

SCALE MODELS

Skoda in rallying is a theme that diecast model maker IXO found interesting

enough to invest in. The brand offers almost all of the different cars the manufacturer entered along the years. In this article, all except one are 1/43 scale models issued by IXO. The exception is the oldest model, the red 1975 200 RS, marketed by Foxtoys, but looking exactly as a Spark resincast release. This was a prototype made by Skoda based on the 130 RS, with a bigger engine and wider body. The scale model looks stunning, with its wide wheels and enlarged body, six chromed spotlights and exposed rear exhaust system. There's a lot of detail to be seen inside the cockpit, including two red crash helmets, complete dash and racing seats. This 200 RS entered the Czech national Sumava rally, however it was never homologated for international rallying. Nine

years latter, Skoda was still using the same concept of 2+2 rear-wheel drive and rear engine coupe in the 1984 MTX 160 RS. There was a new body styling and further developments in terms of aerodynamics for this car that raced in the national Valasska rally. The Agroteam sponsored car modeled by IxXO looks very close to the real car, looking at period pictures found in the internet. Front end features extra spotlights, wheels look realistic and the exhaust system under the rear bumper is a very nice touch, as well as the tilted rear mud flaps.

The next car Skoda homologated to go rallying was the small sedan 130 LR, a car that remained faithful to the rear engine and rear-wheel drive layout. IXO reproduced the 1986 version as entered in the WRC Sanremo rally where Skoda finished an amazing sixth overall, in the last year of the Group B era. This is another well executed diecast, featuring exact proportions, a very complete livery and good details, like roof aerial, great looking wheels, rear wing and four mud flaps with the brand engraved. Front bonnet has catches on the right side only, that's because it opened sideways.

In the late 1980s, Skoda changed their street cars to a more modern front-wheel drive and front engine layout. The first one was the supermini Favorit, that IXO reproduced as the 136L version, entered in the 1993 Monte Carlo rally. This is a very interesting diecast that captures the essence of this small and humble rally car. The Favorit's basic shape in very well rendered, with excellent headlights and those small wheels. Wing mirrors are race items and the

cabin features racing seats and not much else. The simple livery of the real car is closely reproduced making this diecast look great. Next to it, the Felicia Kit Car seems a full-fledged rally machine, with much bigger wheels, slightly enlarged wheel arches and a more modern styling. The body looks great and features details like the sump guard, mud flaps, metallic catches for the rear hatch and much more inside the cabin. IXO choose the 1996 RAC version, with rally number 27, the driver was no less than Stig Blomqvist, the 1984 world rally champion that finished the event in an incredible third place overall.

From here, Skoda decided it was time to play with the big boys and developed their first top level rally car, the 1999 Octavia WRC, complete with four wheel drive and 2.0-liter turbocharged engine. IXO reproduced several versions of this one: here we have the 2003 Monte Carlo car driven by Didier Auriol, the 1994 world rally champion. He drove the Octavia WRC to a credible 9th overall in what was his last year in the WRC as a works driver. This is an older scale model by IXO, however the quality level was already very high and comparable to what this model maker did later. Overall shape looks correct and detailing includes three roof aerials, plus a TV camera facing forward. The intercooler under the front grille is very realistic and the same can be said about the wheel rims and all the rally accessories inside the cabin. A very nice effort from IXO, just like the second top level car made by Skoda, the Fabia WRC. By 2006, WRC technical regulations had evolved and allowed much bigger rear wings, just like the

one we can see in this MKI Fabia, perfectly detailed. The wide body gives the Fabia a menacing stance, perfectly represented by IxXO. The three colour livery adds to the effect and there are very good details, like the roof aerials, one is event finished in chrome. Works driver Kopecky drove this one to 5th place overall in 2006 rally Spain.

When Skoda decided to downgrade to the second division in the WRC, they launched the Fabia S2000 and IXO followed with a great diecast, declined in several liveries. We have the car driven by Ogier in the 2012 rally Sweden that finished 11th and first of its category. Ogier had already signed for VW, but the Polo WRC was not ready until the following year. So, the team decided to run a Fabia S2000 for Ogier in the championship, while testing and developing their future WRC car. This is one of the best diecasts in this collection, not only because the overall shape looks perfect, but also due to some details like the

narrow snow tyres and wheels, only used in Sweden, complete with blue mud flaps. The livery is very simple, but IXO did not fail to notice the pale yellow side sills and front black stripe under the front bumper.

IXO released many Fabia Rally2 versions, with different attractive liveries and specific details for each rally. We have a selection of four, starting with the 2016 rally Barum winner, driven by

Kopecky. An unusual red and black works car that makes great use of this excellent set of parts. This one features wide tarmac wheels and tyres. Next to it, we have the 2017 Monte Carlo car driven by Mikkelsen to 7th overall and class win, featuring a white car with blue stripes, an homage to the 1977 130 RS Monte Carlo class winner. The model comes in tarmac specs, with golden wheels and a single roof aerial. The last pair of models features cars painted the traditional Skoda white and green colours. The 2017 rally Portugal car has gravel wheels painted green and black mud flaps, while the 2021 Monte Carlo has a different livery and white tarmac wheels. They were both class winners, the first one driven by Tidemand and the last one by Mikkelsen. Skoda in rallying probably isn't an obvious collection theme, however sometimes the opportunity to build a small collection comes from what model makers have to offer and this is just the case.

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
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
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Feathers Particular in our cap

Now it's the turn of the heavyweight Guys; the Goliath, the Invincible and the Warrior. **Nigel Robertshaw** takes a look at the contemporary 1960s and 1970s toys and models inspired by these mighty machines as they roared up and down Britain's roads.

art 1 of this series (*Diecast Collector*, May 2024) focused on the classic Guy Motors exposed radiator, square cabbed lorries and buses with just a glimpse of the Guy vehicles with concealed radiators and rounded cabs that replaced them from the mid-1950s. Now it's the turn of a new generation of Guy lorries and the toys and models they inspired back in the day.

In 1958 Guy stunned the commercial vehicle world with the introduction of its brand new cab, designed and built by the company. This was carried by the new Mk.II Invincible and was also fitted to the lighter-weight Warrior chassis. The striking cab featured distinctive beefed-up bumpers, a large wrap around windscreen, four headlamps and an export-style sun visor with the interior boasting various driver mod cons. A much rarer and even more exuberant bonneted version was also produced, primarily for overseas markets. This rather less-successful design might not have received a mention here were it not for the two

superb examples which appeared in the toy world, and in amazingly differing scales, as we shall see!

The largest bonneted model might just be one of the biggest diecast toy vehicles ever produced. It was the first of this new generation of Guy lorries and appeared in the toyshops around 1960 but let's leave the biggest and best until last. Instead, we fire-up our Guy story with a somewhat smaller but high quality piece of die-casting from the "Matchbox Series Major Pack" range.

MATCHBOX MAJOR GUY WARRIOR CAR TRANSPORTER

This excellent Car Transporter with its drop-down top deck and loading ramp hauled by a Guy Warrior tractor unit, featuring the striking new cab, first appeared in 1964. The delicately cast front grille carried a slightly later design of front bumper and featured both the "Guy" and "Warrior" names on the front together with a tiny representation of the Indian Head emblem. The turquoise and orange livery





carried "Farnborough Measham" and "Car Auction Collections" lettering which continued through a change in Matchbox branding from the original "Major Pack" (M-8) to the then new "King Size" (K-8) range in 1967. For the final two years of production in 1968 and 69 the colour changed to all yellow although the decals were unaltered. There are some quite rare transitional versions that had the early turquoise cab married with the later yellow transporter body. The model was also the key component in the G-2 Transport Gift Set along with four cars. Catalogues quoted a scale of 1/73 for the Guy Warrior which was deemed to be "OO" scale.

This classic model inspired no less than three distinct interpretations of this Guy Warrior lorry from different Hong Kong makers. The first is to the exact same scale and colours and at first glance it's difficult to distinguish this much rarer version from the Matchbox original.

GORDY MITE CAR TRANSPORT

The model is simply marked "Made in Hong Kong" and carries "Gordy Car Transport" side stickers. The Gordy name together with the brands "Gordy Mite" or "Mini Mite" relate to the US-based importer/distributor. Like most Hong Kong copies of British-made diecast



toys the Hong Kong makers shied away from using the actual vehicle and model names so there is no "Guy" or "Warrior" wording cast on the front or underside of this lorry. One other missing item is the slender central window pillar, there on the Matchbox model and the full-size lorry, but not modelled on this version.

This US brand is better known for its extensive range of British-built Dodge lorries, again copied from the Matchbox (1–75) Series. It's therefore possible that this Guy model also appeared in other versions although I've only seen the Car Transporter, blister packed on a backing card and complete with a load of four different cars.

The next replica is rather different. This time the Hong Kong maker copied the Guy tractor unit from the Matchbox Car Transporter, again to the same scale although with a lengthened wheelbase, and then added at least six different lorry bodies; although there was no artic car transporter in this line-up.

PETREL TOYS GUY LORRIES

This Petrel branded range again omitted the "Guy" and "Warrior" name from the front panel but surprisingly there is the merest representation of the Indian Head as found on the original Matchbox model. This Hong Kong model does have the central windscreen divide although, as with all three Matchbox copies reviewed here, there was no friction motor.

The early versions had solid plastic wheels and crudely applied silver trim to the bumpers, lights and grille area. From around 1970 this embellishment was deleted and the wheels gained plated hubs and wide rubber tyres. The range boasted a huge variety of colours as the four separate sections used to create some versions generated dozens of potential colour combinations.

The six applications mounted on the Guy Warrior chassis were a Tanker, Concrete Mixer, Flat Truck with crates, Break-down Truck, Dump Truck and Girder Truck. The Guy was also used as a tractor unit hauling a low-loader trailer. These models were available individually packed on blister cards or were sold in Gift Sets sometimes featuring all six versions or alongside a selection of other related models.

The third copy of the Matchbox Guy Warrior is a little smaller than the two reviewed so far.

NATIONAL TOYS GUY LORRY

I've not seen this National Toys version sold individually but it was part of at least two different Hong Kongproduced Gift Sets. Both these sets featured other vehicles including another Matchbox Major Series copy, the impressive Cooper-Jarrett liveried US-style Inter-State Double Freighter. The Guy Warrior appeared as a simple open wagon or as a much more complex tractor unit attached to a large car transporter trailer complete with a six car load. The tractor unit is a direct copy of the Matchbox model but the transporter trailer was possibly inspired by a Norev model as surprisingly it is not a reproduction of the Car Transporter trailer seen on the original Matchbox version.

These fragile and rather charming little Guys were sold as cheap throw-away items and are now very difficult to find. A good deal more plentiful on the collector's scene is an extensive range of British-made Guy lorries.

HUSKY GUY WARRIOR TANKERS

When a Shell-BP liveried 6-wheel Tanker joined the Husky range in 1964 no-one could have predicted that this would be the forerunner of a large and complex series of Guy Tankers that were to appear over the next decade and more. The Husky brand was produced by Mettoy (the makers of Corgi Toys) and was sold in the UK exclusively through the Woolworths chain of high street shops.


The first Guy Warrior Tanker casting had an oval tank with the front lights and bumpers formed as part of the plastic chassis/baseplate of the model. In 1965 a Milk Tanker and a less-authentic looking US Army Tanker joined the original fuel Tanker (now with Shell decals) in the Husky line-up.

Within a couple of years a new updated, and slightly larger, Husky casting was introduced which had a squarer tanker body and a more robust die-cast base, still incorporating the front lights and bumpers. Although relatively well detailed for such a small model neither this casting nor the earlier one featured the "Guy" or "Warrior" name on the front panel although these names were specified in the catalogues and on some of the packaging. Esso branding replaced the Shell liveried tanker and right at the end of Husky production much more realistic wheels with separate rubber tyres were

added which significantly enhanced the appeal of these models. We're now moving into the late 1960s; a period of great change in the toy world...

CORGI JUNIORS GUY TANKERS

The exclusivity arrangement with Woolworths ended in 1969 and the Husky range, including the fuel Tanker (the US Army and Milk Tankers had been dropped from the line-up), were rebranded as Corgi Juniors. This must have been a hastily arranged change as many models in the new range, including the Tanker, were issued with makeshift "Corgi Juniors" adhesive stickers attached to the bases. Unfortunately, and in a very short space of time, these authentic looking toys were no longer what your average Corgi Juniors buyer wanted!

The new Corgi Juniors range was almost immediately impacted by the invasion of Mattel's Hot Wheels and out went accurate scale models in favour of futuristic go-faster vehicles mainly designed to run on flexible

track systems. Corgi reacted by significantly revamping its Juniors range, including the Guy Tanker casting which received wider wheel-arches to accommodate its six much larger Whizzwheels. A little later a new plastic baseplate was added which significantly changed the front-end appearance as this only incorporated the headlights (and not the bumpers and grille). A little surprisingly the "Guy" name reappeared on the new baseplate of these models. These Whizzwheels versions of the Tanker were issued in various fuel distributor liveries. The last of this British-made line ended in the early 1970s but this still wasn't the end of these Guy Tankers.

KIKO CORGI JUNIOR GUY TANKERS

It appears that the tooling for various Corgi Juniors models was subsequently shipped to Brazil and produced under the "Corgi Junior, Kiko" brand name. The Tanker, still with "Guy Tanker" lettering on the underside was produced in a colourful assortment of fuel company liveries, many unknown over here. The models moved away from the blister packs associated with UK production and were packaged in traditional and rather colourful card boxes. These Brazilian Kiko toys seem to attract prices well above their British-made counterparts.

Let's now go back to 1964 as Husky released two Guy Warrior based models in that year; the Tanker that we have just seen and a very different looking bonneted model which appeared in two versions. Fortunately the subsequent story of these models is not as long and complex as seen with the Tankers.

HUSKY GUY WARRIOR COAL TRUCK AND SAND TRUCK

This model is based on the unusual and quite rare normal control (bonneted) version of the 3-axle Guy

Warrior more associated with export markets than with use in Britain. Both these Husky models used the same lorry casting featuring a high-sided body and the only difference related to whether there was a black insert to represent the load for the Coal Truck or a brown one for the load on the Sand Truck.

In line with the Tankers described above the original Husky versions, later fitted with realistic wheels with cast hubs and rubber tyres, were rebranded as Corgi Juniors around 1969. The final issues of the Sand Truck from the early 1970s went on to receive Whizzwheels although it's likely that the Coal Truck had been deleted from the range before this final change.

It seems that the tooling for these bonneted Guys did not make it over to Brazil which is a shame as this style of large bonneted truck would have been much more appropriate in this part of the world.

For our final Guy lorry we stay with the bonneted Guy and also with Mettoy (the owners of the Husky and Corgi brands) but move up massively in scale to meet some monsters of the diecast world.

METTOY GUY INVINCIBLE HEAVY TRUCKS

Back in the late 1950s Mettoy were enjoying significant success with its recently introduced Corgi Toys range. Quite why it wanted to expand its diecast operations into a series of massively larger toys, which were significantly more expensive and were always likely to have limited sales potential, is a little unclear. Nevertheless around 1959 Mettoy launched a range of large-scale diecast Heavy Duty Trucks based on the rare and unusual bonneted Guy Invincible lorry. These models seem to have been developed from similar US-made Buddy L large scale trucks (based on Diamond Ts) which were marketed (and perhaps manufactured for a short period) in Britain by Mettoy immediately prior to the introduction of the Guy range. The three new models, all featuring an accurate representation of the newly introduced Guy cab, were the Heavy Recovery Truck,





the Heavy Duty Tipper Truck and a variation of this version, the Sit-n-Ride Heavy Truck which featured a large steering wheel, childs seat and a working horn. All boasted opening bonnets with a detailed engine, a tool chest complete with miniature tools and a front metal panel displaying the "Guy" and "Invincible" names together with a well detailed Indian Head emblem.

By 1961 the Recovery Truck was the only version illustrated in the catalogues. Given the giant size of these models the two Tipper Trucks featured a rather flimsy tipping mechanism which may have contributed to their early demise.

The design and development work undertaken on this unusual bonneted Guy model most likely resulted in its later inclusion into the much smaller Husky range. There was a change of name from Invincible for the large scale model to Warrior for the Husky version but both these types of Guy lorries shared the same cab design.

THE BUSES AND COACHES

We've ended with some massive Guy lorries but as in Part 1 we conclude our review of Guy commercials with a look at the bus and coach toys and models of the period. Guy buses and coaches were reasonably commonplace on Britain's roads back in the 1960s and some provided standout memories in my youth.

There were the distinctive 6-cylinder Guy Arab double deckers with their radiators protruding well ahead of the driver's cab and giving them a rugged no-nonsense style all of their own. There was also a local independent that operated a former Guy Arab demonstrator which still retained its "GUY 3" registration; what might that be worth today? Moving to slightly newer Guy buses that were operating in the 1960s my memories relate to the infamous Guy Wulfrunian double deckers. Sadly

this vehicle was something of a disaster for both Guy and its main bus operator, Wakefield-based independent West Riding. Suffice to say that I used to have a 15 mile each way daily commute on a Wulfrunian so imagine my surprise when one day I climbed that (dangerous?) forward facing staircase only to find my coveted front seat (and many others) railed-off and permanently out of use. The Wulfrunians were experiencing massive engineering problems and the premature end of these remarkable vehicles was nigh.

Unsurprisingly there were no Wulfrunian models in the toyshops and there appears to be only one model of a Guy bus or coach available during the 1960s/70s. Once again, and sadly for Guy, the full-size version was also a major disappointment.

SPOT-ON GUY WARRIOR MULLINER LUXURY COACH

Spot-On was innovative with its choice of toys but modelling a brand new vehicle that was making its debut at a Commercial Vehicle Show was always going to be a risk. Unfortunately this Guy Warrior coach fitted with Mulliner coachwork was an unsuccessful combination which did not go into volume production. It featured very large glass and Perspex domes fitted both front and rear which proved difficult to represent in miniature giving the model a less than pleasing appearance. Having said that, this is now a rare, desirable and expensive model with some of the four or more colour combinations fetching some serious money on the obsolete collectors market.

Like many Spot-On models (all built to 1/42 scale) it was short-lived, lasting from 1961 to 1963 only. Spot-On was part of the Tri-ang Toys Empire evidenced by the

"Tri-ang Tours" decal fixed to the rear of the coach. Triang also produced another version of this unusual Guy coach...

TRI-ANG SIT-"N"-RIDE TOYS COACH

This large scale Coach, "made from a new type of moulded plastic" to quote the catalogue joined Tri-ang's Sit-'n'-Ride Toys range as the stablemate to the much better known Routemaster Bus. Designed "for kiddies to sit astride and learn to steer" it featured in the Tri-ang catalogues from 1964 to 1966 only. Although the double decker Routemaster is well known I've not seen this substantially scaled-up version of the Spot-On Guy Coach; is there one out there?


TOUGH GUYS

The current collectable scene features a huge number of Guy vehicles, both lorries and buses, from brands such as Corgi, Lledo, EFE, Britbus and Base Toys, not to mention the replicas from Atlas Dinky and Dan Toys. Most versions are produced in a wealth of different colours and liveries and the variety currently available would truly overwhelm the classic old toys reviewed here. This two part review of the toys and models available when Guy vehicles cruised along (or in many cases slogged up and down) Britain's roads has been a little more manageable. There's been a varied and interesting selection of old toys and models, some well-known, others less so, but by its very nature there must be a few items that have been missed. Come on guys, have a think and let me know?



Stamp cover for

Fun-HO!

Christopher Moor discovers that the reach of Fun-Ho! went further than just diecast toys. Here he looks at postage stamps, and the First Day Covers they appeared on...

oys have always featured on postage stamps, and diecast favourites are no different. This large Racer (No.80) is the second Fun Ho! diecast aluminium toy to appear on a New Zealand postage stamp. In 1999, the first, the Fire Engine fixed ladders (No.161) was depicted on the 40c denomination stamp from the Nostalgia series. The 190mm racer has the top right position on the miniature sheet of nine x \$2 stamps in the Midcentury Toys issue, introduced by NZ Post this past southern hemisphere winter.


NZ Post promotes the stamps as toys made in New Zealand and loved by children in the years after World War Two ended in 1945, when toy imports were often scarce.

On the top row, seen above right, are a homemade wooden hospital ship (built in World War Two when toys could have a war theme), a Hercules brand pressed steel tractor, and the Fun Ho! racing car, while row 2 has a tinplate tip truck by Lines Bros., a 'Luvme' brand teddy bear, and a wooden train built from toy blocks. Row 3 has a paper doll (once owned by a girl living in Wellington), an H E Ramsey wooden Mary Lou doll from the firm that made Buzzy Bee, New Zealand's most famous toy, and a Pedigree brand Maori doll from the 1960s.

On the stamp, the Large Racer is called 'Fun Ho! racing car', and in mid-1940s Fun Ho! advertised it as the 'Racing Car'. The model debuted in the Wellington factory during 1942, before manufacture at New Plymouth and two sites at Inglewood. Original models were produced for 23 years until 1965. During the model's catalogue life, it came with solid metal, solid rubber and plastic wheels. Records show 15,000 units produced between 1947 and 1951, and have the 1947 price as 4/11d (49c).

The Fun Ho! National Toy Museum at Inglewood provided the image of the original Large Racer, circa







1950, which featured on the Mid-century toy stamp.

Since 1996, the museum has produced reproduction models of the Large Racer and other toys from the original moulds. The toys are labelled 'Repro' on the underside, and have a baked enamel paint finish and more hand detailing than the originals.

When the TVNZ1 crew recently filmed a segment at the museum for the programme Seven Sharp, Richard Jordan, one of the toymakers, told New Zealanders the Large Racer is his favourite Fun Ho! toy.

The Large Racer stamp from Mid-century Toys is available on the miniature sheet and a First Day Cover.

In which Steve Coles compares models of the same car... but in differing scales!

over had, during the post-War years, developed a reputation for making upmarket, sensible, if rather conservative, cars. The P4 became known as 'Auntie Rover', while the P5 was a logical development of this formula. That, however, all changed in 1963 when Rover launched the P6, known as the 2000. It was not only advanced for Rover, but was also considered 'cutting edge' within the motor industry at the time with a de Dion tube suspension at the rear (a kind of more complex non-independent suspension), disc brakes on all four wheels and a fully synchromesh gearbox. The chassis design featured non-stressed panels bolted to a structural frame which was inspired by the Citroën DS. All these advancements won the Rover 2000 the inaugural 'Car of the Year' award; not bad going considering they were still making the very traditional design P4 at the time! During its lifetime the P6 received two significant updates; in 1968 Rover launched the V8 engined 3500 and a mid-life facelift in 1970 to create the series 2 cars; easily identified by the black front grille and air intake, as well as revised dashboard layout. Production lasted until 1977 by which time over 320,000 P6s had been made.

This month's Little and Large feature focuses on two groups of the same vehicle.

IN THE BLUE CORNER

One of my favourite Vanguards castings from the LLedo days is the Rover P6 in both 2000 and later 3500 forms. I can still remember how pleased I was with the Zircon Blue 2000TC (VA27002) I bought at the Classic Motorshow at the NEC, Birmingham a few years after it was released. The '100th anniversary of Rover' 3500 V8 model in Zircon Blue from 2004 also looks superb, and highlights the changes made



that became the series 2 cars. This model shows off the additional chrome trim well against the dark blue paint. In terms of details, the badges are accurate and well-proportioned and the lights, despite being painted on their chromed bases on the rear, are really well done. The matt black used to replicate the vinyl roof and C-pillar is really well applied, as is the fine silver edging to it. The wheels are also very neatly finished and are correctly of the type used on the 3500 model (as opposed to the brighter stainless steel Rostyles of the 3500S model). I've also included the Corgi Vanguards release from 2015 of the German specification 3500S in Scarab Blue (mostly as I'm fascinated by the very subtle differences between the two very similar models). Apart from a slightly different shade of blue and the representation of the rubber end-caps for the rear bumpers the most obvious differences are the bootlid mounted Rover badge, used to cover the fitting for the boot mounted spare wheel option and the slightly different shades of the interiors. With these two Vanguards Rover's I've put Oxford Diecast's neat little 1/76 Rover P6, finished in Corsica Blue. The first things that you notice about this trio is how similar these three different shades of blue are; something that was typical during the life of the P6. This one also has a black as opposed to cream/tan interior. Despite its much smaller size, the details are great! I'm particularly impressed with the model's badges, even the tiny wing 3500S badges, and the Viking Longship Rover badges. The front grille is also worthy of note with its fine silver finish, as are the wheels that look like scaled down versions of those found on the two Vanguards models.

IN THE GREEN CORNER

The very last P6 off the production line was a 3500S painted in Avocado Green. This car was registered VVC700S and, having been displayed most of its life, has covered less than 13,000 miles and has never been restored. It has also been the subject of two models; in 1/43 by Corgi as part of their Vanguards range and by Oxford Diecast in 1/76.

Like their blue counterparts, both models capture the essence of the P6 well and there isn't really anything between them in terms of exterior details, even down to the tiny badging. The larger scale of the Corgi provides a more detailed front grille and the air scoop below the bumper is a little more accurate in terms of scale. The only small difference is Corgi's has the boot lid mounted Rover badge, used to cover the hole made by having an externally mounted spare wheel. In fact, the only notable difference is the colour. When compared with the real thing, Corgi seem to have got it pretty much spot on. The Oxford model is too, well, green! When compared together, this looks a little odd as it's the same car, with the same registration plate but it is a totally different shade of green. Despite this obvious difference, they do make a lovely pair of models.

Despite this obvious difference, the Avocado Green cars do make a lovely pair of models. But for me, the quintessential colour has to be the blue. It really looks spot on, suits the shape of the P6 and just seems to remind me of Rover P6s I remember seeing as a child.

(No.258) that was released in the spring of 1965. Roger Moore, the archetypal English gentleman, played the role of The Saint in the very popular TV series with the same name. Corgi used the basic Volvo P-1800 (No.228), painted it white, added a driving figure with a tuxedo and the logo of The Saint on the bonnet. Three variations of this logo exist: in black on a white bonnet, in white on a red bonnet and in white on a blue bonnet. The last version is scarce and in total 1,159,000 (+ 1969 sales) cars were sold. A huge success for a relatively simple car.

In October 1965 Corgi released the even more successful James Bond Aston Martin DB5 No.261). Using the existing Aston Martin body (No.218) which was actually a DB4, Marcel Van Cleemput and his staff cramped the model with three features not shown before: ejector seat with flip-up roof, rear bullet-proof shield and flick-out overriders and hidden machine guns. The figure of James Bond

nicely resembles Sean Connery who drove this car in *Goldfinger*. Also "the baddie" appears to have walked in directly from the picture: an Asiatic gunslinger in a blue overall. A total of 3,974,000 (+ 1969 sales) were sold.

In January 1966 *The Avengers* set was released as Gift Set 40.

A great set of two cars that were already available in the Corgi range and could be converted with

little modification into a new TV related Gift Set: the 1927 3 litre Bentley (No.9002) and the Lotus Elan S2 Roadster (No.318). The figures of John Steed (Patrick Macnee) and Emma Peel (Diana Rigg) were of course included. Emma in her very '60s white trouser suit and French beret, with John in a classic Saville Road outfit and bowler hat. A wonderful diorama offers ample room for both cars, Emma Peel standing next to her car and Steed's 3 umbrella's. On the back of the diorama there is an "in depth" story telling that the cars of cinema and TV heroes and heroines were chosen with great care to fit the characters. 190,000 (+1969 sales) passed the counter.

By already having a basic model at hand that could be re-engineered to fit a special edition, the Oldsmobile *The man from U.N.C.L.E.* (497), released in August 1966, showed once again Corgi's prowess. The pre-existing Oldsmobile Super 88 Sheriff Car

(No.237) and standard saloon version No.235) formed the basis for this "Trush-buster" as used in the successful TV-series that started in September 1964. Napoleon Solo at the wheel and next to him Ilya Kuryakin, both firing their guns from the side windows. Of great detail are the 3 bullet holes in the front screen. According to the text on the diorama U.N.C.L.E. stands for United Network Command for Law and Enforcement, an "organisation pledged to protect the welfare and interests of people and nations anywhere in the world from the forces of evil". So you could say the armed wing of the United Nations. The Headquarters of U.N.C.L.E were situated a few blocks away from the United Nations building. A blue and a more scarce white version of this car are known. Total sales: 1,479,000 (+1969 sales).

Another TV and film related blockbuster was the Batmobile (No.267), released in October 1966. Around 5 million Batmobiles were sold, becoming the best selling car for Corgi. The figures of Batman (alias Bruce Wayne) and Robin The Boy Wonder are included. The first version of the Batmobile had gold hubs and red bat emblems. The diorama coming with this first type is full of action, the Batmobile racing

through the cave, slashing a chain with the blade up front, at the same time firing its rockets from behind the cockpit. On the back of the diorama the Batman story is summarized in English, French and German.

February 1967 saw the release of the The World of Wooster Bentley (No.9004), identical to the Bentley in the Avengers Gift Set. There is some doubt whether Bertie Wooster and his manservant Jeeves who played the leading parts in the famous books by P.G. Wodehouse, drove a Bentley. In any case, a Bentley was used in the BBC TV series The World of Wooster and Corgi happened to have one in stock. Marcel Van Cleemput considered the model somewhat of a flop as sales in 1967 only reached 34,000. Nevertheless a clever extension of the production life of this wonderful Bentley!

With some small modifications Corgi generated another nice Gift Set from existing models like Batman's Batmobile and Batboat (Gift Set 3), issued in June 1967. Take the original Batmobile (No.267), fit a tow hook, add the hull of the Dolphin 20 Cabin Cruiser (No.104) with a new superstructure, large fin and Batman logo, use the Wincheon Trailer in a shortened version, equipped with square mudguards

and two springs to clip on the Batboat, paint the trailer gold, add some operating and secret instructions and a new Gift Set is born. With sales figures over 1.5 million to boot!

The James Bond Toyota 2000 GT (336, October 1967) was again a wonderful film related model. This time from the Bond film You Only Live Twice in which a young Sean Connery is rescued by Aki Wakabayashi of the Japanese Secret Service, from Osato's gunmen in a cream white Toyota 2000 GT Convertible. The Toyota only existed as a saloon, two convertibles were especially made for the picture and one is still surviving in the Toyota museum. The special feature is of course the rocket firing mechanism in the boot. It sold a total of 768,000 (+1969 sales).

Daktari was a big success on British television and November 1967 saw the release of the Daktari Set (Gift Set 7). Once again it appeared a lucky coincidence that Corgi had the Land Rover (No.438) used by Dr Marsh Tracy already in the range. It only needed some restyling with zebra striping and the addition of figures of the doctor, Judy the chimpanzee, a tiger on the bonnet instead of the spare wheel and the doctor's assistant Paula sitting astride Clarence, the lion. The box has an appealing top card showing Clarence, the doctor and Paula. On the back Judy shows an elephant with a dental problem the way to the Wameru Sub-district hospital.

The Green Hornet's Black Beauty (No.268), released in November 1967, and selling 345,000 (+ 1969 sales) was based on an American TV series. Although the Green Hornet had the lead in the series, in real life the actual hero turned out to be Kato, played by Bruce Lee. It was the first time that his Kung Fu fighting style was seen outside the movie theatres of Chinatown. The masked figures of the Green Hornet and Kato are seated in the back and behind the wheel. The Green Hornet fires his gun from the open window. Together with the rocket firing platform behind the grill at the front, the boot with

a launch pad for plastic radar scanners, green windows and an enormous Green Hornet logo on the roof. This is a great, but possibly somewhat underrated, model.

The second version of the famous James Bond Aston Martin DB5 (No.270) was issued in February 1968. It now had the correct silver spray and with added features compared with the first issue of October 1965 (No.261). It had sales of 1,172,000 (+1969 sales). The added features were the three-sided revolving number plates at the front and the rear, and the fitting of tyre slashers in the rear wheels.

Another make-over of the Land Rover (No.438), was in the style of the Daktari Set. Now white with the same black striping, brought the Lions of Longleat as Gift Set 8 in August 1968, with 357,000 (+ 1969) sales). Included are a warden standing up from the cabin through a manhole and a lions den in which we find Clarence from the "Daktari" Set, be it without his glasses and 2 other new lions who would re-appear some months later with the Scammel Chipperfield's Menagerie Transporter (No.1139).

Chitty Chitty Bang Bang (No.266, November 1968) was modelled after the car that starred in "The most

fantasmagorical film ever made", based on a children's book by Ian Fleming. A complicated model with a lot of nice details like the serpent horn, the exhaust system, the bonnet strap and of course the flip-out wings operated by the handbrake.

Included are the four figures from the film, Caractacus Potts played by Dick van Dyke, his two children and Sally Ann Howes as Truly Scrumptious. Packed in a very nice box, the car rests on a platform that gives the impression that it is flying through the clouds. Also included was a diorama with the castle of the wicked Baron and his balloon. 776,000 (+1969 Sales) were sold.

The Monkees Monkeemobile (No.227, December 1968) copies the dragster type of car used by the American pop band The Monkees in the popular TV series. The band was composed of Americans Micky Dolenz, Michael Nesmith and Peter Tork and Englishman Davy Jones, hence Mike, Davy, Pete and Micky. The Monkees scored a number of international hits, including *Last train to Clarksville* and *I'm a Believer*. Although it is a detailed model there are not the usual gadgets that Corgi included in its earlier TV and film related issues. 82,000 (+ 1969 sales) Monkeemobiles were sold.

The Beatles' Yellow Submarine (No.803, February 1969): originally written by the Beatles as a children's song, turned out to be a big hit and inspired a United Artist animation film in 1968. Corgi was asked to reproduce the submarine on small scale, using numerous stills from the film and adding John, Paul, George and Ringo popping up from two hinged hatch covers. The first version had a yellow and white hatch cover, the second two red ones like in the film. In total a meagre 44,000 (+ 1969 sales) were sold. Apparently the market was not waiting for this type of model, notwithstanding the many Beatles' fans all over the world.

Noddy's Car No.801) was released in July 1969, and although it includes some nice figures from Enid

280,000 (1969 sales) were consumed by the market. In the Giant Daktari Set (Gift Set 14, May 1969) we find again a clever combination of previous models, with some modifications. The Land Rover with the same "menagerie" as the earlier Daktari Gift Set (7), the Bedford Giraffe Transporter No.503) now repainted in jungle colours and decals of the "Wameru sub-district" like on the Land Rover and the Dodge "Kew Fargo" Livestock Transporter (No.484), having changed its load of pigs for a mother and baby elephant and also a jungle "Wameru sub-district" livery. Included is a diorama that can serve as a background for the models. 110,000 (+

We finish this decade of TV & Film related releases with The Hardy Boys' Rolls-Royce (805, June 1970). Marcel Van Cleemput admits that this psychedelic update of the Classics Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost 1912 (No.9041) should never have been. It is not clear whether he said this because of disappointing sales figures or tarnishing of the original model. After the Monkees Monkeemobile (No.227) and the Beatles Yellow Submarine (No.803) this was the third rock band that received its own Corgi status. The box tells us a little more about the background of The Hardy Boys. Joe and Frank Hardy (saxophone and guitar), sons of the famous private eye Fenton Hardy, are teenager detectives, using their rock band as cover for their war against crime. Assisted by the other band members Chubby Morton (drums), Pete Jones (guitar) and Wanda Kay (vocals) they solve. 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


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
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TOY TALES

Ed Karswell ponders the wonderful world of model collecting.

"Sorry, it wasn't He, Hultst...

eing a long-time eBay fan I'm fascinated with how the site influences peoples buying behaviour, particularly when it comes to collectables. By 'collectables' I really mean obsolete items, unlike currently produced goods one can order at any time. The very nature of obsolete goods make their purchase a singular experience.

Just take into consideration knowledge. Knowledge really is power on eBay. For example, if you spot a mis-described model you have the opportunity to bag it for a song. Conversely, if you decide to buy outside your comfort zone you could end up landing a lemon, and paying over the odds to boot. The key is trying to work out if the descriptions match up with the photos which is rarely as easy as it sounds.

The whole process would appear to be an exercise in planned jeopardy. There is a lot of gambling going on, on all sides here, and for some mind boggling reasons to boot. Some individuals bid on items they don't want just for the thrill of it. They either like the idea of running the other person up or for the danger that they may actually win on a whim. We can blame this state of affairs on dopamine, a chemical released into the body when we experience pleasurable situations. It gives us a high which leads us to seek another hit as soon as we hit a low. However, I'm not sure this will explain why you have 16 identical Dinky Toy taxis on your shelf. "Just one more"... that's what they all say!

Then there's the FOMO factor, otherwise known as the 'fear of missing out'. This being the reason nobody under 30 can go more than two minutes without looking at their phone. Checking what's just come onto eBay is very similar. One keeps looking at the listings either to jump on a bargain or just to see what's on offer. I liken it to the people at

toy fairs who start to rummage through your stock whilst you're still setting up your stall. It's rude but strangely understandable.

All these observations aren't to damn eBay though, far from it. I well remember first going on there and seeing toys I didn't know existed and things I'd only seen in books... and all for sale! Far from killing the hobby as some predicted, it opened it up to far more people, and presented them with many more possibilities. Gone were the years one would spend trailing around toy fairs hoping to find that certain model. Now you could have your pick from say, five or so that were on offer at any given time.

The knock-on effect for the hobby would prove far reaching, what with previously

Corgi through the Vears

Rick Wilson continues his series of year-by-year articles from the beginning of the brand in 1956. We continue the series with the models released during 1974.

ith a total of 19 new releases throughout 1974, this is another year where we can just about cover them all in one go. As mentioned at the end of last month's instalment, the new range of racing cars dominated proceedings this year, but that doesn't mean that there wasn't a good variety of subjects released.

The year started with the first new releases landing in February. These were two models of a similar futuristic, attractive, fantasy style – No.700 Motorway Service Ambulance and No.701 Inter-City Mini Bus. Both lasted until 1980 and sold very well throughout their lives (865,000 and 453,000 respectively).

Fast-forwarding to April (no new releases during

March), Corgi moved into the big-time with its first ever 1/18 scale model, and it was a real beauty! No.190 JPS Lotus Formula 1 was basically a doublesized version of its incredibly popular, 1/36 scale No.154 release. With a lot more detail, the model also featured removable wheels, with wheel nuts spun off by an included wheel jack. Oh my! Lasting until 1977, this black and gold masterpiece sold nearly 350,000. Also in April, we got No.400 Volkswagen Motor School Car. At 1/43 scale, based on the same tooling as the earlier VW releases, this attractive Beetle featured a golden steering wheel on its roof, which turned the front wheels. Another good seller, it sold well over 350,000 in its one year on the shelves, before it was replaced by itself as No.401 in July 1975, in a larger box and with a set of bollards to

drive around.

The following month, in May, No.54 Massey Ferguson MF 50B Tractor with Shovel was released, which was based on the No.50 tractor released in 1973, but with a newly-designed shovel attachment. This was usually yellow, with red wheels, but can also be found in orange and white. It sold well, passing 600,000 units before its withdrawal in 1981. Also released in May was the first of the 'Major' for the year, in the shape of No.1102 Crane Fruehauf Discharge Dumper. At 1/48 scale, it made for an impressive vehicle and featured a Berliet cab attached to a long diecast trailer, Fitted to the latter was an orange plastic dumper body. Underneath the trailer

chassis were two doors that could be opened to discharge the dumper load by turning a wheel on the side of the body.

June saw three new releases, two of which were identical 1/36 scale racers in differing liveries. No 155 UOP Shadow (black) and No.156 Graham Hill's Embassy Shadow (white with red striping) replicated real cars. The boxes for both were very attractive - No.155 reflecting the US-based sponsorship of UOP and No.156 carrying the colours of its sponsor, the red, white and gold of Embassy cigarettes. Later in the production run, No.156 was called just "Graham Hill's Shadow", although the box retained the Embassy colours. Both last until 1976 and sold around the 300,000 mark each.

Following on from the success of the first military releases in the series, in 1973, another three appeared in the early summer months of 1974. The first of

these was a very popular and more modern-looking British tank. An all-over Drab Olive paint job was not so visually appealing as the earlier releases but was, nevertheless, a realistic one. For the first time, a different firing method was employed – the barrel was still pushed back in to load, but this time the firing action was activated by pushing a red plastic button at the rear of the rotating turret.

As summer progressed, July brought a further four newbies. Gift Set 4 Country Farm Set, which comprised No.54 Massey Ferguson MF 50B Tractor with Shovel coupled to the Tipsy Nipper trailer, now painted red. The set also included a plastic hay load, with figures on top of the pile, plus plastic fences, two sheep and a sheep dog. Yet another racing car released was this time an American Indianapolis racer, No.159 STP Patrick Eagle Indianapolis Racing Car, complete with the victorious Gordon Johncock inside the cockpit, waving to the crowd, having just won the 1973 Indy 500. A different direction for the next release, moving into the world of construction with No.403 Thwaites 'Tusker' Skip Dumper. At 1/36 scale, it had a tipping dumper section, released by pulling the steering column. It sold well, with over 400,000

leaving the shops before it was withdrawn in 1979. The second of the year's military releases, No.902 American M60A1 Medium Tank in US Army livery, was modelled at 1/60 scale with the usual excellent finish and fireable shells.

For September, there were four new releases. No.158 Elf Tyrrell-Ford was another 1/36 scale Formula 1 car, replicating the racer that Jackie Stewart had used to clinch his third World Driver's Championship, in 1973. It was a popular model, lasting until 1978 and selling well past the 350,000 mark. The second new military release, again at 1/60, No.905 SU 100 Russian Tank Destroyer, had an extra feature that none of the others did – these were activated by

a push-button to the rear of the body. Pushing it the first time made the soldier pop up (assuming he had been pushed down into place) and a second push then fired the shell. Marvellous! I wonder how many hours of my early life I spent playing with this one? The diminutive No.906 Saladin Armoured Car, the third new military model for 1974, was manufactured at a slightly larger scale, but the difference is not really obvious and it certainly adds a degree of variety to the series. Firing action is of the push button at the back of the turret variety. The final release for the month was a biggie! No.1103 Chubb Pathfinder Airport Crash Truck, at 1/48 scale, made for a hefty casting and it even had a working water pump feature and a batter-powered siren. Resplendent in red with silver flashing and chrome details, it had epic play value, which goes a long way to explaining why it lasted until 1980, selling over 200,000 units.

Jumping to December now (no new releases during

the intervening months), we finally had our first 1/36 scale road cars of the year. No.286 Jaguar XJ 12C came in a variety of colours – red with a black roof, tangerine with a black roof, metallic blue with a black roof, all-over red, or all-over blue. A really lovely model, with opening doors, it proved popular selling nearly half-a-million before its withdrawal in 1979. No.287 Citroën Dyane was another multicoloured release, being available in yellow (varying shades), green or bronze, all with a black sunroof panel. Lasting until 1978, it too sold well, with sales figures approaching 400,000.

Looking ahead to the next instalment, covering the releases during the first half of 1975, there was a good variety of new releases to come. With more military and racing releases, plus a rather fabulous commercial vehicle, the first half of the year proved a great success, but there was much more to follow in the second half (covered in two issues time).



A-Z of diecast

In which **Alwyn Brice** takes at look what's available under the letter F.

h, que c'est belle, cette gamme!
I'll come clean - I'm a Francophile.
Part of this love of all things French
stems from a degree in the language,
coupled with extensive travels
throughout the land of Gauloises and garlic, although
an early interest was sparked by those fantastic
Historex plastic kits of the Napoleonic period.

Whilst homegrown Dinky Toys need no introduction from me, as they were considered a couple of issues back (*Ed - May 2024 issue to be precise*), their French counterpart does. French Meccano began production in Paris in the early 1930s to capitalise on a construction product that, in all fairness, had been around for a while; and this manufacturing initiative would in time lead to the decision to fabricate Dinkys, albeit under a French moniker. According to what I've read, by the mid-1950s the French company at Bobigny was churning out Dinky toys at the rate of 24 models a minute – so clearly demand was there.

Needless to say, French Dinky toys were primarily, er, French in their outlook; that said, the company gave more than a passing nod to what was happening across the La Manche. Much of the French production was geared to the domestic market, naturally reflecting French cars and commercial vehicles of the period (although not exclusively French vehicle makes), but a percentage of the range did take a trip across the Channel (and indeed, elsewhere), and consequently served to whet the appetite of the foreign collector.

Thus for many years the two Dinky ranges coexisted in a peaceful manner: entente cordiale at its best. Any British Dinky collector seeing the French counterpart for the first time could not but help be impressed by their quality, I feel. There's something about French Dinkys that makes them just that little bit better than the homegrown product. In particular, the company's military range was certainly more exquisite than that of the British army, as modelled by English Dinky. Paint finish was excellent and several of the vehicles benefited from additions, such as a camouflage net or a detachable aerial. And the French designer's imagination was very evident in the output: just take a look at the fully functional AMX scissor bridge tank (way ahead of its time) or even better still, the desirable Brockway Bridge Carrier set, which included ten bridge elements, two inflatable pontoons and even a paper terrain base. How's that for value?

Whilst the olive-green tint may not be to everyone's taste, there are plenty of other French Dinky models to tempt the Euros from the wallet.

Ultimately, it was an unusual scenario, that of one company operating at two locations in different countries (although, of course, Dinky did explore Indian production with its Nicky Toys range). French Dinky production ceased in the early 1970s, so there's a finite age span, should you want to start collecting.

FORGOTTENTOYS

If you've not come across the initials FGT before, then don't worry – for you are most probably in good company. I must confess that I hadn't either, until quite recently. A small range, with only token wheeled transport, has meant that this particular









company is almost unheard of today, and is yet another example of a manufacturer whose products have slipped down the back of the sofa of time.

One Fred Taylor gave his initials to the brand and he, as some readers may already know, was half of the famous Taylor & Barrett company, whose diecast ABOVE Bentley 8-litre from Fulgurex: this was the archetypal super car of the inter-war years.

One of the two companies formed on the breakup of the Taylor and Barrett partnership in 1945 by Fred Taylor was F G Taylor & Sons, with FGT also being used to represent "For Good Toys" (or so it is believed). The company shared out the old Taylor & Barrett moulds with Barrett & Sons and, where they didn't have a suitable mould, they simply re-made their own version. FGT was particularly well-known for detailed tradespeople sets, including such olde worlde models as a brewer's dray. The company, like many others of that era, converted to plastic products in the 1960s and finally closed its doors around 1980.

The fire engine shown here is typical of the FGT output and the overtones of Taylor & Barrett are quite evident. However, I confess to being at a loss when it comes to stating quite how many vehicles you'll find bearing the FGT initials on the underside; and for those completists out there, you'll need to know that the moniker wasn't confined to vehicular output, either, since it can be found on a range of countryside castings, for example. A very common item here is the hen coop, with its folding down access door. However, a bit of patience may well yield other wheeled transport.

FULGUREXCEPTIONAL

I'm sure that there are *Diecast Collector* readers out there who know a lot more than I about Swiss manufacturer Fulgurex. I've gleaned a little from the internet but, despite having contacted the company in my best French, I have not been able to add anything new by way of information.

The company started up just after the second world war and was based in Lausanne; one Antonio Coluzzi was the brains behind the enterprise, whose interest in tinplate trains is thought to have prompted the decision to get into manufacturing. A collaboration in 1962 with Tenshodo led to brass model output – but of trains and rolling stock, not cars. HO/OO, O gauge, I gauge and N gauge models soon established the company's credentials within the scale model railway world. The quality was (and indeed still is) exemplary, which led Fulgurex in the 1970s to investigate the production of pre-WW2 model cars in 1/12 scale.

Sadly for the collector, this branching out didn't get very far. In the event, three models (perhaps more?) were on the drawing board: a Bentley 8-litre, a Mercedes SSKL and a Bugatti Type 59. Only the first two saw light of day, the Bugatti being shelved through, it is thought, sheer cost.

Whilst I have been unable to unearth actual numbers, the cars were certainly limited edition models, constructed from nickel and brass parts, and featuring fully functional steering and suspension. With an opening bonnet to reveal a detailed engine, each miniature benefited from leather seats and a finely finished dashboard. The Bentley was about 42cm long, giving it great presence when displayed. And, being limited, Swiss and precision made, both models were very costly when released. When they (occasionally) turn up at (typically at auction these days), they command much interest. Perhaps not strictly diecast, but worthy of inclusion in this series, I feel.

DODGE DUMPER TRUCK

Production: 1970-72 **Catalogue**: 1970-72 Box Styles: G, I

Changing from its all-over red regular wheels colour, Dodge Dumper Truck, with its working tipping action, sported a new colour scheme of mid-blue cab and chassis with a bright yellow dumper body.

Appearing initially with narrow wheels, these later changed to the wider variety and this suited the look of the truck even more. Another useful commercial vehicle, it finally made way to another fanciful car creation in 1972.

PI-EYED PIPER

Production: 1972-77 **Catalogue**: 1973-77 **Box Styles:** I

Pi-Eyed Piper was a companion model to Big Banger, and used most of the same components. The main difference was the engine, which featured eight huge

pipes (rather than the blower of Big Banger) plus four big exhaust pipes on each side. This presumably accounted for the "Piper" in the title.

It was painted metallic dark blue, with amber windows and a decal with number 8 over a stars and stripes motif on the roof.

In 1977, the casting was yet another of the ones used for the American limited editions. Called White Lightning, it was white with red and orange tampos, and with black (rather than chromed) pipes, as shown in the centre above.

SAMBRON JACKLIFT

Production: 1977-82 **Catalogue**: 1978-82 Box Styles: K

Sambron Jacklift was a strange-looking, angular forklift truck with an offset cab. Made by a French company, Sambron, it was more of a telescopic loader or equipment handler than a forklift, and could be fitted

with various tools besides lifting forks.

The model was painted yellow with a black base. Unfortunately, the cab was unglazed, which spoilt the overall effect. The fork and lifting arm were initially in yellow plastic, but could also be found in black. The cantilever-arm lifting function was quite well reproduced, and it lifted containers convincingly.



The B.E.V. Electric Truck



very day it seems we need to move something and carry it to another room or outside. This is of course part of life in the world of work were products and equipment, needs to be moved. When I was young, I used to pass factories and would see trucks and trollies loaded with goods on their journeys through production or ready to take for delivery. These flat bed trucks were electric powered and operated by a worker standing on a platform at the front and would sometimes come outside to a waiting lorry. This type of vehicle was captured by Dinky Toys.

The Dinky Toys model was the Electric Truck (No.14a) which was introduced in July1948 and in the August *Meccano Magazine* it is then designated as the B.E.V. Electric Truck. In that issue it is described as 'The Dinky Toys model is a life like reproduction of the B.E.V. platform truck in which every important external feature is clearly displayed. There is a wide platform of ample length, providing the maximum space for a load; underneath is a representation of the battery box; and at the front is the driver's platform, where the driver himself has one foot on the brake pedal and controls the power and steering by mans of the

levers provided.'

The model was in grey with red wheels, blue with blue wheels and some had red wheels and dark blue with light blue wheels. The driver is in beige overalls and there is a tin plate tow hook at the rear. In the Dinky Toys colour catalogues it is always illustrated in blue with blue wheels. The model was sold in yellow trade boxes containing six models and the first boxes had the number 14a and then the boxes had the 14a and 400 numbers.

As with all the other Dinky Toys it was renumbered to number 400 in 1954. It now came in an illustrated yellow card end flap box and was then deleted in 1960.

Interestingly a factory drawing of 1948 was made for a trailer for the Electric Truck with the title 'Platform for B.E.V.Truck Trailer' but no model reference number is given. Unfortunately, a model was never produced. However, some years ago I came across a modified Dinky Toys Electric Truck which had had the front platform cut off and a wire tow bar fitted for towing by the Electric Truck. It would have been a good Dinky Toys addition!

The company started out as British Electric Vehicles in 1905 in Southport at the Churchtown works. In 1925 they were bought by Wingate & Rogers who's special controllers they had been using. A further takeover in the 1990's was by the Pikrose Group based in Oldham using the name of the Ferranti Engineering Company until 2005 but still under the BEV name. They also exhibited at the 1924 British Empire Exhibition and included the small battery truck with a tight turning circle suitable for industrial use.

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ELMER'S AUTO AND TOY MUSEUM COLLECTION SELLS WELL AT MILESTONE AUCTIONS

Last October antique and vintage toy fans added a new chapter to the legend of Elmer's Auto and Toy Museum, which closed its doors in 2022 after 28 years of operation. Stoked by intense media coverage and toy-hobby chatter, bidders worldwide set their sights on rarities from the Wisconsin museum's archive of 25,000 toys and paid estimate-shattering prices at Milestone's first of a series of sales. After the event, collectors clamored for more and asked when the next auction of museum treasures would take place. The answer was, on May 11 at Milestone's suburban Cleveland gallery.

The museum's vast and storied collection of American, European and Japanese toys was built over 50+ years by an inveterate gearhead and visionary of the toy hobby, the late Elmer Duellman. "Everybody knew Elmer, or if they lived overseas, they knew of him. He had an army of pickers from coast to coast, and if necessary, he would drive through the night in a blinding snowstorm just to pick up a toy, motorcycle or car that he wanted. He was

the king of all toy networkers, with a reputation for tracking down rare toys that was second to none," said Miles King, coowner of Milestone Auctions.

The 774-lot May auction traverses scores of categories, such as diecast cars, tin windups, battery-operated toys, pressedsteel trucks, Japanese tin cars, Dooling gas racers, and both automotive and character toys from Germany's pre-war era.

All a child of the boomer generation needed in order to feel like a worksite foreman was a junior-size hard hat and a Tonka pressed steel toy. Tonkas were built to last, and many have, but because kids often gave them a workout in dirt mounds of mud puddles, they incurred a few battle scars along the way. Elmer's collection boasts a number of beautiful examples that managed to avoid rough play, including some hard-to-find boxed sets. A 1955 Tonka #775-5 Road Builder Set that consists of a semi with lowboy trailer, steam shovel, road grader and dump truck comes in its original, correctly partitioned box. Its presale estimate is \$1,500-\$2,000 but finally sold for \$5,000. Also,





a 1959 Tonka #B-207 Hi-Way Construction Set with a lowboy truck and trailer, dragline, road grader and dump truck in its original box was entered with an \$800-\$1,200 estimate. The hammer fell at \$1,650.

"What collectors love most about the Elmer's museum archive is the variety. Elmer was a nonpartisan toy buyer. As long as it was in excellent condition, and especially if it had its original box, Elmer was interested. American, European, Japanese – he liked it all," Miles

King observed. "Based on how geographically diverse the bidder base was for our first offering of the museum toys, we're expecting that many from outside the United States will return for round two on May 11th, especially for the Lehmann, Gunthermann and other German toys."

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


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A FEMALE PERSPECTIVE

Hazel Ralston considers the world of model collecting, through different eyes...

Dinky Toys & the woman driver

he subject has been debated endlessly: are men better drivers than women? *Harper's Bazaar* (which, for those of you who don't know, is a ladies' fashion magazine) reckoned that women were safer drivers, quoting statistics from 2017 which state that 79% of motoring offences taken to court in the UK were committed by males.

A look through the adverts in old motoring magazines sheds some light on bygone attitudes to women behind the wheel. Often women are pictured beside the car to enhance the impression of style, but generally it's a man who is driving. From time to time there's an acknowledgement that women did drive cars, but the tone is often condescending. A 1957 advert for the Reliant Regal three-wheeler suggests that a husband should purchase this as a second car for his wife. "Who takes your children to school? Who carries home that heavy shopping? Your wife, no doubt – but not in your car. Give her a second thought – buy a second car...". Not the kind of sales pitch that you'd find today.

All this led me to wonder where the woman driver fits in to the world of miniatures. As toys and models reflect the real motoring scene, we would expect to find some female drivers behind the steering wheel of diecast cars. In September 1963 the *Meccano Magazine* hailed "the most exciting month since Dinky Toys began" thanks to the launch of the Triumph Spitfire with two new features: a lady driver in blue with headscarf to protect her hair from the wind, and a removable seat belt, reflecting the growing emphasis on safety in the car industry.

Three years later, the same lady had decided to go to France where the French Dinky factory put her behind the wheel of a DAF, a car which at the time was often

seen as ideal for women drivers thanks to its 'variomatic transmission' system which made driving easier. But she also drove something a bit more glamorous in the shape of the French Dinky Peugeot 404 convertible. While the originals are now of course rare, replicas of both these French Dinkies appeared in the Dinky Atlas series a few years ago.

One reason why French Dinky borrowed the female driver from the British Binns Road factory might have been that the rival diecast range from Solido had already put a woman at the wheel of some of the sports cars in their 100 series introduced a few years earlier. The series included popular European open cars of the era such as the Alfa Romeo Giulietta Sprint, Mercedes 190SL, Renault Floride and Simca Océane. Both male and female figures were available and it is quite easy to swap them around, but it seems that most examples of the Floride and the Simca that come up for sale have the female driver, possibly because both these cars were seen as suited to fashionable women at the time. Conversely, Solido's more muscular and high-performance American V8-engined Ford Thunderbird generally has the male driver in charge.

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




