Lewis also set a new record of nine victories at a single circuit, breaking the tie of eight that he had previously held with Michael Schumacher.

During the race, Rexy qualified well and was running near the front of the class for much of the race, and was in first place for quite some time too, before suffering a minor mechnical woe in the closing stages that dropped it down the order a little. But in terms of the hearts of the fans, Rexy was definitely the real winner!

NEW HOLLAND IN TIME FOR THE HARVEST

ritains' new combine is the latest in a line of New Holland model combines dating back to 1982. This version of the combine is based on tooling used on the model issued in 2020. Sporting the latest decals it is a well-built model with hinged cab access steps, steerable rear wheels and a folding, two-stage unloading auger. There's no access to the cab interior but now finished in black plastic it has good levels of detailing with seats, steering column, monitor and a window to the grain tank. The grain tank covers are set open and has a white GPS receiver, auger and access ladder detailed. There is also a fixed access ladder to the engine platform where the exhaust and air cleaner are visible. At the rear there are painted tail lights, straw spreader and chaff spreader detailed. There's also a drawbar for attaching a trailer.

The combine has a newly tooled 40ft draper grain table. It has a ground driven, fixed height reel with freely hanging pickup tines. It's also provided with knife detail in silver, black painted draper, freely rotating feed auger, lights and a driveshaft. The all plastic table pushes on to a frame that allows it to be angled on the combine feed elevator. The two feed elevator rams are stiff enough to support the raised table.

LATEST FROM UNIVERSAL HOBBIES

ollowing the launch of its updated Arion 550 tractor on the Claas stand at Agritechnica last November, Universal Hobbies has now issued it fitted with the FL140 front loader.

Individually numbered the model has a production run of 1000, and like the tractor, is only available from Claas and its dealer network.

It's a well-built metal and plastic model with good levels of detailing and many working features. The tractor sports a working front linkage with yellow pto guard, a restyled bonnet with the latest decals and chrome exhaust. It also has new work lights, sidelights and driving mirrors. On the cab roof panel there are two new style warning beacons, an aerial, telematics antenna and GPS receiver. Inside the cab there are two monitors, dark grey floor matting, detailed dark grey armrest and dark grey driver seats. The model keeps Universal Hobbies earlier two-point working rear linkage but has an adjustable length top link instead of the fixed length link on the earlier model. It also has warning boards on the cab C pillars.

Neither the loader nor the combined manure attachment with which it is fitted, detaches but the loader lifts and lowers smoothly on four rams and the attachment tips on two rams. All the rams are piped and the Mach multi-coupling is detailed.

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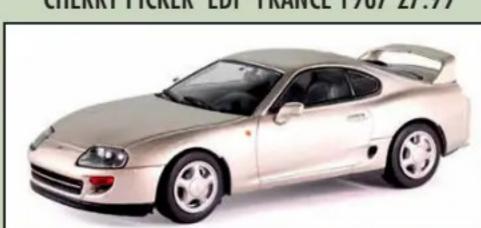




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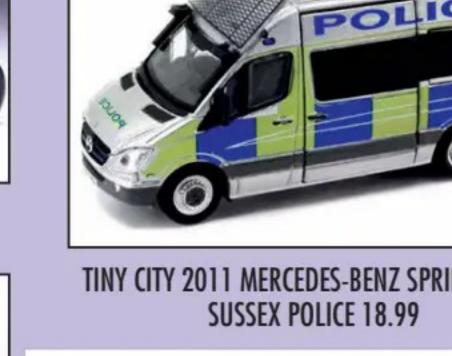
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OXFORD'S BRAND NEW JCB EXCAVATOR WILL HAVE YOU IN A REAL SPIN

he well-known JCB Co of Uttoxeter, and later Rocester, was founded by Joseph Cyril Bamford in October 1945. He rented a lock-up garage and set about making his first vehicle, a tipping trailer. The trailer's sides and floor were made from air-raid shelter steel sheets. The trailers were a success and the company moved to larger premises two years later and again in 1950, to Rocester. The company adopted the now famous yellow paintwork for its products a year after that - reportedly for on-site safety reasons as they were highly visible.

The company's famous backhoe loader first appeared in 1953 and the well-known logo was first used at this time too. The company was incorporated as J. C. Bamford Excavators Ltd., in 1956. By 1961, it boasted a staff of 300 employees the same year that the Mark 3 was introduced.

The JCB 7 crawler excavator was the company's first tracked, 360-degree excavator, originally developed and produced in 1965. It was powered by a 6-cylinder Ford 590E engine and offered a power output of 96hp at 2250 rpm. Based on the American Warner & Swasey Hopto design, the hydraulic excavator was a 12-tonne class machine, capable of a maximum dig depth of 16' 9". Manufactured under licence from Warner Swasey, JCB made the undercarriage and excavator assemblies. The cab interior featured quite basic machinery but that was typical of mid-1960s design. Completing another phase of JCB history, it is interesting to know there are some of these 1960s machines still in use around the world.

In diecast model form, the yellow and red excavator looks equally simple, faithfully replicating the original, as used by JCB itself. The interior of the cab is as per the body colour but with black detailing, The pistons and the exhaust pipe are finished in silver and, to round off the model, the

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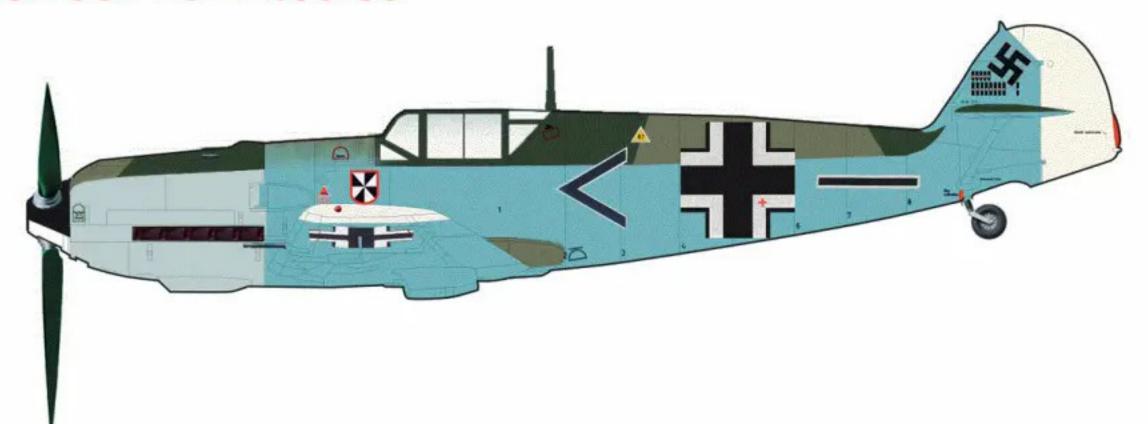
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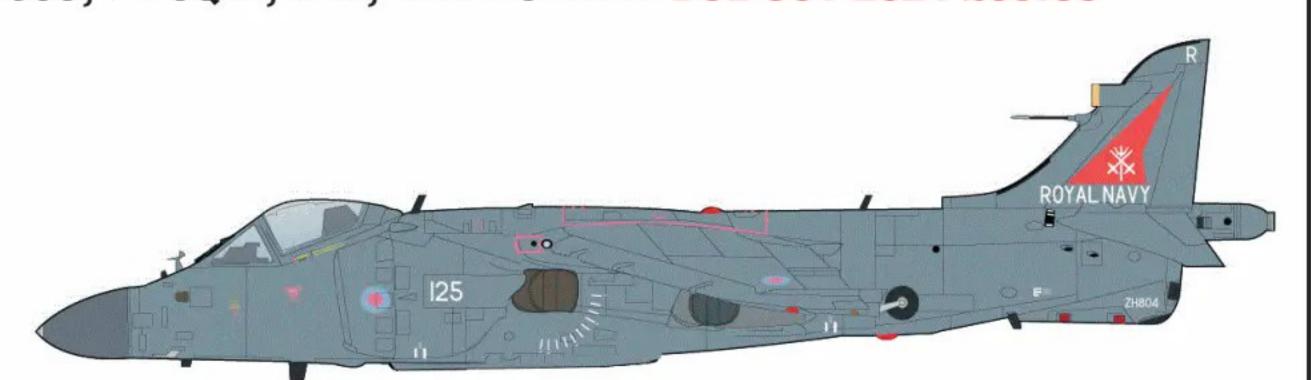

orgi has recently expanded its impressive range of models with the introduction of ✓ the CC96611 Star Trek - USS Enterprise NCC-1701-D, a highly detailed and collectable piece inspired by the much-loved Star Trek: The Next Generation series. This model has quickly garnered attention from both Star Trek enthusiasts and diecast collectors for its precision, craftsmanship, and the nostalgic value it brings.

The USS Enterprise NCC-1701-D, commanded by Captain Jean-Luc Picard, is one of the most iconic starships in science fiction history. Corgi's rendition of this famed starship captures the elegance and complexity of the original design, reflecting the dedication and expertise that has gone into crafting this model.

Upon unboxing, the first impression is a good one! The model is meticulously detailed, with accurate proportions and a faithful representation of the ship's unique shape. The saucer section, stardrive section, and nacelles are all sculpted with precision. Corgi has not overlooked any details, from the intricate panelling on the hull to the placement of the windows and the ship's registry markings.

The paintwork on model number CC96611 is very good. The colours are rich and vibrant, closely matching the hues seen in the television series. The Aztec-style pattern on the hull, a crucial element in Star Trek model design, is skilfully applied, adding depth and realism to the model. Additionally, the subtle weathering effects give it a slightly worn, battle-hardened appearance, CORGI Star Trek - USS **Enterprise** NCC-1701-D (The

further enhancing its authenticity.

Corgi has also included a display stand that allows collectors to showcase the USS Enterprise-D in flight mode, capturing the dynamic spirit of the starship as it explores the final frontier. The stand is sturdy and designed to hold the model securely, making it an excellent centre piece for any display shelf or desk.

One of the standout features of this model is its attention to the smaller details that fans of the series will appreciate. The lifeboat hatches, phaser strips, and various sensors are all present and accurately represented. Even the tiny deflector dish is crafted with care, showcasing Corgi's commitment to delivering a top-tier product.

However, this replica is not without its minor criticisms. Some collectors might find the size of the model slightly smaller than anticipated, which could be a consideration for those looking for a more imposing piece. Additionally, while the model is primarily made of diecast metal, there are some plastic components that, although well-integrated, might not have the same premium feel as the metal parts.

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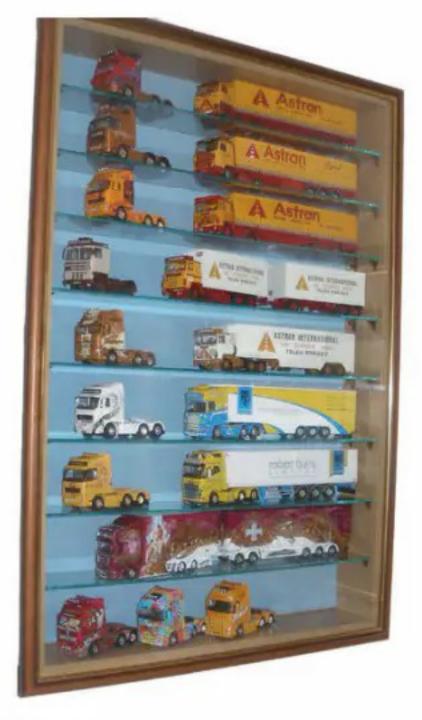

Into Autumn...

Six months on from Spielwarenmesse 2024 **Stephen Paul Hardy** pauses to reflect on more of the first half-year's releases and looks forward to those emerging in the third quarter with an ever-watchful eye on changing trends...

t is a curious reality of the life of a magazine contributor that you often feel as if you are on stage delivering something to an audience that you can neither see, nor hear, a reaction from. After something like 45 years (on and off) of penning magazine contributions that lack of immediate audience feedback still hits me and is a stark contrast to my experiences of an intense ten years of delivering a crazy number of conference presentations in the first decade of this century. For these very reasons just to see readership feedback to any of us contributors in the Diecast Collector "Dear Editor" pages helps me feel that someone out there reads what we write. And I have to say even if there is no holding back in the words that follow "Dear Editor" I for one find the fact that readers have felt motivated to put pen to paper (or key strokes into an email) heart-warming.

It was put to me recently that the whole matter of 'Youngtimers' (and them fading onto old-timers) isn't just a matter of a twenty or so year 'sliding window' in time but also the influences of the slightly deeper fashion and peer trends linked to generational eras...

YOUR GENERATION

That was explained to me in terms of the different sociological and lifestyle attributes of four generational

categories: The "baby boomers" and Generations X, Y & Z (yes there are some awful pop music references woven in this quarter...it's an old habit from my *Model Collector* days that I can't seem to shake off...).

Now if you, like me, hadn't got a clue what those four are all about then take five minutes out to surf the internet. If you do know then read on...

GENERATION X - READY, STEADY, GO

Now, my guess is that the substantive core of *Diecast Collector* readership are Generation X, or Gen X, (born between the mid-1960s and the early 1980s.) Which explains why so many of the current "youngtimer" releases don't necessarily appeal to us. By the same token, with changes in emphasis on lifestyle interest – and specifically how they relate to and are enthused by automobiles of their era – the Gen Y Millennial' and Gen Z Centennial' generations often relate to a different sort of thematic scale model collecting. And it seems, in general terms, scale preferences.

Now that is deep enough for here but I think totally relevant in context right through even to how discussions ebb and flow in our "Your views" pages.

As for me, well "...I'm (still) in love with Cathy McGowan..." or at least her era which I guess is why I also love so many of the automobiles modelled by AutoCult and the scale they are made in.

Following on then from "Into Summer" (June 2024 issue) it was great to see Francisco Mota's in-depth backstory to AutoCult's Lancia Delta S4 Gruppo B Prototipo in "Made to order" last month. I understand also that a more in-depth look at the Masterpiece Edition Ford X 2000 Concept Car - 1958 (#90246) by Andy Saunders will feature in a future issue of *Diecast Collector* (Ed: you are correct, the story will appear next month!).

Despite being frustrated by, amongst other things, ongoing shipping delays on the conflict torn routes from China, AutoCult's hardworking team have continued to deliver a mouth-watering selection of new releases during the second quarter of 2024. Releases not only in its own AutoCult, Avenue 43 and Tractorism ranges but in a wide selection of Exclusive Editions as well.

TRACTORISM

As we are in late Summer and heading into Autumn with its seasonal images of harvesting and then ploughing, I felt that a long overdue mention of the Tractorism range seemed timely. As with its more familiar 1/43 ranges AutoCult produce stunningly detailed sealed resin tractor and agricultural models for sale under its own Tractorism brand as well as Exclusive models for partner clients in the universally preferred scale for such models of 1/32. A browse through both the Tractorism and Exclusive models sections of AutoCult's website is a real eye opener in terms of the wide subject choice modelled - but then that should be no surprise to anyone who has even the briefest knowledge of AutoCult's modus operandi!

So onto latest releases of eclectic subject matter...

AUTOCULT

• Škoda Hispano-Suiza 25/100 PS - 1928 (#01021)

For me Hispano-Suiza is one of those marques that

generates that special tingle factor as one of the all time greats of automotive manufacturing.

First up this month but already unashamedly one of my favourites it captures the Spanish marque's robustly powerful H 6 B as built under licence in Czechoslovakia by Skoda. Around 100 examples are believed to have been made between 1924 and 1929, with the very first having been ordered by the State Chancellery and delivered on 10 May 1926 bearing the registration number "N-1" to be used as President Tomáš Garrigue Masaryk's official car.

• Wanderer W22 "2000 km durch Deutschland" -1933 (#07032)

AutoCult is building up a very attractive back catalogue of German motorsport models from the inter-war years. This the latest is one of the most attractive to date, modelling as it does Wanderer's specially designed and prepared challenge for the 1933 '2,000 km through Germany' long-distance race. Designed by Erich Lüsebrink and with three chassis handed over to the workshop of "Karosserie Hornig" for completion it was in one of these cars that the then unknown Bernd Rosemeyer was inaugurated into motor sport.

• Renault 4CV Zink - 1953 (#03025)

Shown at the IAA in Frankfurt in 1953 by Swabian Renault dealer Zink this beautiful looking little car based on the Renault 4 CV sadly never saw production. It does however make a very attractive, evocative, model that just exudes 1950s era central European take on what sports coupé styling was all about.

• Škoda 979-II - 1957 (#08021)

Another release to delight collectors interested in the history of automotive design and production in the tightly, state controlled, environment that prevailed in

eastern Europe during the cold was era. A welcome release that adds to the now substantial coverage of Skoda's production history in miniature.

• Renault Projet 600 - 1957 (#06061)

An example of one of the things AutoCult excels at - bringing to life the quirky and off-the wall prototype designs from the past as scale models. Here, again, designers thinking outside of the box at Renault based on the substructure of a standard Dauphine model and 845cc engine in the mid 1950s. And another model for fans of Ghia who did the preparation of the Projet 600' prototype in 1957.

• Ford Transit Mk1 Camper - 1973 (#09020)

Decidedly one for British collectors and a companion to AutoCult's Commer Dormobile Coaster -1972 (#09002) released back in August 2016. So quintessentially 1970's British the Mk.1 Transit - here in the lesser seen long wheel base guise - fitted out by Dormobile as its "Freeway" model

• BMW 326 Stromlinie Wendler - 1936 (#04042)

A great one for BMW collectors and fans of the aerodynamic 'streamliner' era of design that challenged contemporary BMW design and styling hallmarks.

• Ford Ford Ranger II - 1966 (#08022-1 blue, #08022-2 champagne)

Striking and very much ahead of its time Ford's concept study makes a superb companion to the similar dramatic look of the previously released Avenue 43 Pontiac Phantom Concept(#60078). Although releasing models in two colour versions has now become established practice in the Avenue 43 catalogue I believe this is the first time an AutoCult new model has been released in two versions simultaneously.

•Mercury D-528 - 1955 (#60122 gold #60123 red)

Now this one is something special in so many ways the best thing I can do is strongly suggest an internet search on the story of the Mercury D-528, the innovative concept car you've never heard of is well worth while - and may well make you want to rush out a grab this model of it.

• Volvo 66 GL Cabrio - 1980 (#60116 blue, #60117 white)

Ones that surprised me and yes they existed ...

• Wartburg 355 - 1969 (#60112 red) (#60113 green)

Interesting in many ways: a prototype with stying idiosyncrasies that buck against those of stereotypical DDR state utilitarian functionality.

• Chevrolet Corvair Coupe Pininfarina (#60110 green, #60111 red)

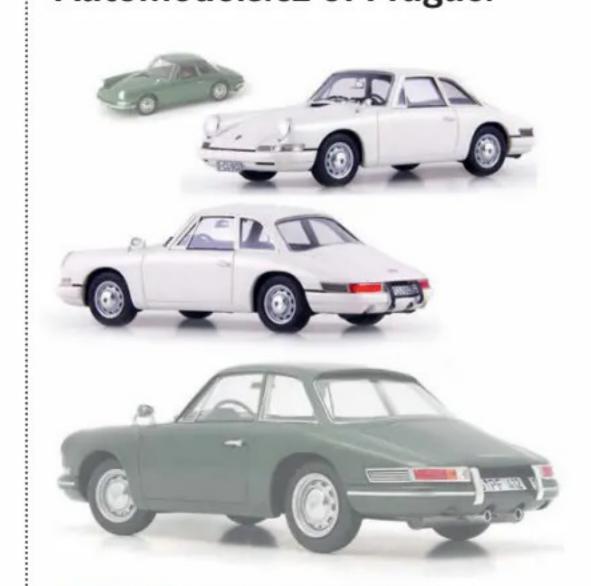
A pair of releases that set my (Gen X) pulse racing: despite there being so many car models having been released over the past few years I remain surprised (and very frustrated) at the lack of good, modern, 1/43 coverage of the Corvair - notably in Monza coupé and convertible form. Announcement of the release came through as I was drafting this and all I can say is I can't wait to see actual examples...

These AutoCult Pinzgauers are just

hat do you think the oldest auto racing series is? Formula 1? Nope. WRC? Not even close. NASCAR? Nah. For the longest running series going you have to look to South America, to Argentina to be precise, and to the Turismo Carretera championship which has been running (give or take a few gaps) since 1937.

A stock car series, Turismo Carretera was initially held on temporarily closed public roads, on a combination of asphalt and dirt, and kept this format until the 1960s. During the late 1960s and early 1970s the series began to attract the attention of the big car brands that were present in Argentina at the time, specifically Ford, Dodge and Chevrolet. Racers were already using the brands' Falcon, GTX and SS Coupe (Malibu) cars respectively, and the prestige of winning

titles drew bigger direct investment. Renault's merger with local automotive giants IKA added another contender in the shape of the legendary Torino model.

And since the 1970s the same four brands (and indeed the same four models) have been competing. Yes, you did

read that correctly: the same four models. The GTX, Falcon, Chevy Coupe and the Torino are still battling on, albeit in the form of spaceframe silhouette racers. The series welcomed Toyota in 2022 with the Camry, and in 2024 made perhaps the biggest shift ever with many teams making a switch to "Pony Cars": the Dodge Challenger, Ford Mustang and Chevrolet Camaro arrived along with a restyled Camry contender. And what about the IKA Torino? The fact that the model is no longer produced hasn't caused any issues. The Asociación Corredores de Turismo Carretera (the governing body behind TC) called for designers to submit their visions of what a new Torino race car would look like and picked the most popular design. "The bull" lives on!

The series is massive in its native Argentina and indeed popular across South America. But to the rest of the world it is relatively unknown and there are certainly not many diecast models of TCR cars out there, especially in 1/64 scale. Thanks to a bit of luck here and there though, I managed to secure this group.

A selection of TCR cars from across the ages from some of Argentina's best and most unique diecast and toy manufacturers, starting with Galgo and the Ford Falcon in the livery of Eduardo Marcos.

Industrias Galgo was one of the most important toy manufacturers in Argentina and was most active between the 1970s and 1980s. They produced diecasts in 1/32, 1/43 and 1/64 scale, as well as a

very popular line of model trucks in 1/90 scale. Despite selling their products in countries across the globe they appear to have all but disappeared after 1985, though a line of 1/32 scale cars was being sold under the "Galgo Max" brand in the 2000s. During the company heyday they made a large selection of racing car models from different series including F1 but for me their best diecast are the TCR replicas. The blue Falcon was my first Galgo and I adore it.

The other Galgo in my collection is a white Chevrolet Chevy SS Coupe finished in a fictional livery adorned with Galgo logos. The hood scoop is missing but I've fashioned a replacement from styrene that looks the part, I just need to fit it! Regardless it looks incredible in my opinion, and it has obviously been very well loved. In terms of scale both the Galgo Falcon and the Chevrolet are around 1/55.

Also, in my hoard and produced by Galgo is the green 1/32 scale Dodge GTX of Juan Antonio de Benedictis complete with a Ford F-150 tow truck and trailer.

Another interesting TCR model I have managed

to acquire is yet another Ford Falcon, smaller in scale than it's Galgo counterpart and with no manufacturer listed on the base. The only text on the underside of the car reads "INDUSTRIA ARGENTINA – FORD". Through a very helpful contact of mine in Argentina, I learned that this was one of a series of promotional models made in the early 1990s for the Autódromo de Buenos Aires. It's been well played with and at some point in its life an Argentine child has stuck random stickers on it, but I've simply left them on. I love the play worn look and the obscurity of it.

Last but by no means least is the extraordinary Chevrolet Chevy SS Coupe of an incredible brand called Claseslot.

I discovered it totally by accident on eBay early last year and jumped at the chance to add it to my collection. Claseslot are very much a small operation bordering on a cottage industry, but still capable of producing some very cool miniatures. Based in the Argentine capital Buenos Aires, the company grew from founder Sergio Blanco's hobby crafting models from wood. They produce primarily 1/32 scale TCR replicas utilising thermo-moulded acetate bodies similar to RC car body shells. The company branched into smaller scale with the Claseslot Mini line which looks to me to be around 1/55 scale. The overall finish is less polished than the company's 1/32 line and the construction is quite basic: plastic is the primary material and printed stickers are used throughout; even the interior is a sticker, like Marx Toys of old! But considering these things aren't mass produced, how unique the subjects are and how rare they are outside of their home nation, I'm really chuffed to have it. It's a replica of the car used by legendary driver Agustin Canapino, who now competes in IndyCar for Juncos Hollinger racing. Canapino is a 4-time TCR Champion who still occasionally competes in the series.

A very cool and unique way to end what I hope you've found an interesting and informative article!



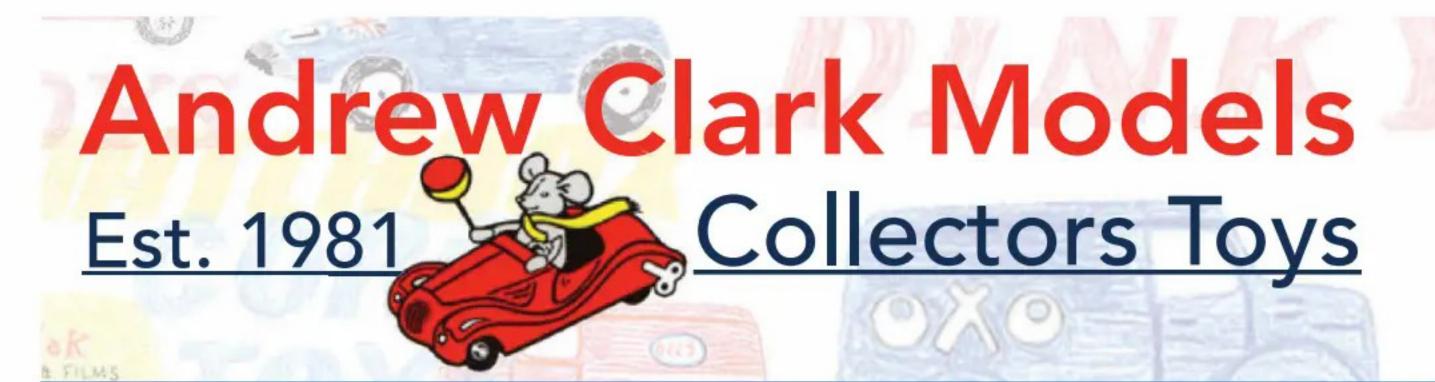

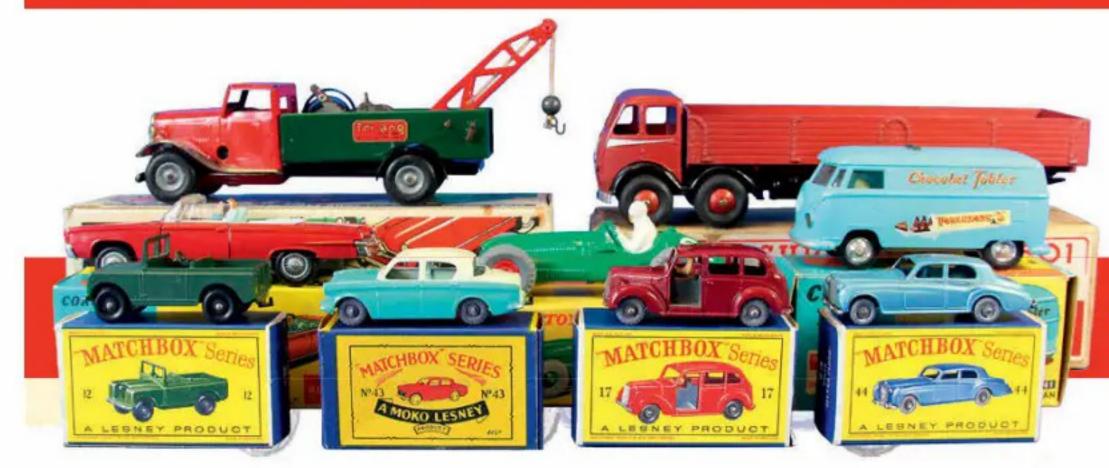
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Last year, the 24 hours Le Man race celebrated its 100th anniversary. Less than a year after, **Francisco Mota** was able to gather a group of 1/43 scale models of all the leading prototypes that entered that milestone race.

ome of the major teams that have been racing in the WEC (World Endurance Championship) for several seasons, had a clear target for the 2023 milestone 24 hours Le Mans race. It commemorated 100 years since the first edition of the most famous race in the world was held, in 1923. Adding this unique win to any team's trophy cabinet would make them extremely proud. A few years before this particular race, some car manufacturers decided it would be the perfect target for a marketing campaign and started working on new projects dedicated to the 100th Le Mans. Toyota had been involved in the sport for longer than others and was ready to jump into a new set of regulations the organizers had prepared. Others, like Peugeot, had designed a revolutionary prototype to try and gain

an advantage. Cadillac came all the way back from the United States, where they had been racing their prototypes with success in their home series IMSA. They were trying their chances this side of the Atlantic, now that GM's premium brand had a plan to return to Europe with a complete range of new passenger cars. However, the biggest story of all would be the return of Ferrari to the championship, exactly fifty years since the last time they took part in the race with a prototype. Until then, the Scuderia was known for playing in both fields, endurance racing and Formula 1, however, after 1973, the company decided to put all their motorsport effort into Formula 1 and no more Ferrari works prototype were seen at Le Mans. If you like statistics, 2023 was also the 60th year after the first time a midengine car won Le Mans, the Ferrari 250P.



HYPER CARS LOOK GREAT

So, there was a lot to commemorate last year and a lot of new scale models to be produced in the following twelve months. Proving, once more, their commitment to the most famous race in the world, Minimax Group decided to roll up their sleeves and get to work with the aim of launching all the models from the top-class cars that raced in the 2023 Le Mans, the new Hyper Cars. And they did it. Weeks before this year's event started, collectors with a weak spot for Le Mans were able to buy all the 2023 Hyper Cars. Irresistible to many of us who have collected Le Mans scale models for ages, last year's cars had the bonus of looking terrific. Long gone are the times when winner prototypes were all about efficiency and not enough about aesthetics. Since 2021, the aerodynamic regulations intentionally put a limit on efficiency, leaving room for the designers to have a word in the final look of every Hyper Car. Prototypes can have a styling connection with street cars from the same brand. That's good for marketing and good for our collector's cabinets too.

The other big story last year was Porsche's return to Le Mans, after a few years absent. The most successful brand in the race history was in search of its 20th win and nobody would bet against them, even if they had a brand-new car. The centenary edition was also the last appearance for Glickenhaus, the independent team that races a car that reminds of Le Mans winners of the past and is always one of the fan's favorites. There was also a brand from the past that tried its chances in a surprising comeback, although with a considerably lower budget, Vanwall. Another great looking prototype that would add colour to our shelves.

THE REGULATIONS

Not going too much into the detail of the new 2021 technical regulations, there's two different approaches allowed to build a Hyper Car. Either a team designs its own car from scratch, or it can buy a chassis ready made from an authorized supplier. There is also the possibility to use different kinds of engines, from large capacity unblown V8's to smaller hybrid V6 turbochargers, and rear wheel drive or four-wheel drive transmissions. Obviously, there's a so-called BoP (Balance of Performance) that tries to equalize all these different technologies, so the end result are cars with similar performance. This is done attributing, at each car, different minimum weight, maximum

turbocharger pressure, maximum fuel tank capacity and other parameters. Maybe not the most 'pure' way of going racing, but that's how it's done these days.

The race itself was dominated by Toyota and Ferrari. Small mistakes by one or the other led to Ferrari taking the title home. A dream race for the Italians and a well-deserved win that Ferrari repeated just a few weeks ago in the 2024 edition. That's something that will surely keep us entertained in a few months.

There's no lack of colour in this 2023 Le Mans Hyper Car collection, neither differs in shape. Some teams decided for the obvious choice of using the same livery in both cars, that was not the case with Cadillac. All three V-Series.R prototypes received a different colour for the front end, making the squad look very dynamic. The US prototypes have unique vertical headlamps that look great, and there are numerous details around the body, for instance the

front corner winglets, on top of the main splitter. The roof has an air intake for the engine compartment and there are several aerials and Pitot tubes. Wheel rims have an unexpectedly simple design, quite the opposite to the side pods complex shapes. For this story we have the yellow and the red cars, the third one had a blue front end and was the best classified at the end, in third position.

TOYOTA AND PEUGEOT

Toyota brought the well-proven GR010 Hybrid, that had won Le Mans the two previous years. This time around they finishing second to Ferrari. The car is painted the same livery as all motorsport cars from Toyota until last year, with a mixture of red, black and white applied in a non-symmetrical geometry. The shape features a black "shark nose" and a wraparound windshield, plus a mandatory tail fin on

the engine cover. There are details unique to this car, like the shape of the rims and the double headlamps in a rectangular fashion. There's a great separation between the front wheel arches and the main body, for aerodynamic reasons and the rear diffusor has four generous Venturi channels. The rear wing is hold from a pair of swan neck mounts. We've photographed the Toyota next to the Peugeot 9X8 Hybrid and the rear view of both clearly shows the innovation in the French prototype: there is no tall rear wing. Peugeot came up with a revolutionary concept, to lower drag, featuring only a pair of small winglets each side of the rear body. The shape is also the one that follows closer some of the styling codes from the company's road cars, like the three vertical tail lights, each side, and the same kind of solution at the front. It really does look different from anything else, however it didn't seem

classic naming that brings back memories. The works team entered a trio of very colourful cars, painted with something similar to a rainbow. There was also a privateer car, ran by the Jota team and painted golden. The car itself features headlamps with four groups of LED lights, reminiscent of some road cars in Porsche's range, but there are no extra winglets at the front. The 963 sits very low and has some nice rounded shapes that gives it something of a classic look. There are interesting aerodynamic pieces on the roof and a very tall tail fin. The rear view is very straightforward, a classic Porsche to all effects. The best 963 finished only 16th.

Apart from the Hyper Cars, there are a second class of prototypes racing at Le Mans in the LMP2 category. Those are less sophisticated racing cars, without any hybrid system and all sharing the same chassis and

engine, provided by Oreca. We selected only one of those Oreca 07 Gibson, just to give a point of comparison to the Hyper Cars.

THE WINNERS

The next pair joins two privateer teams racing in Hyper Cars. The pale blue (anyone thinking Gulf?) prototype is the Glickenhaus SCG 007 LMH, the one that was designed with classic Le Mans cars in mind. The front end is clearly inspired in the 1970's famous Porsche 917K, with its tall headlamps and bulbous wheel arches. There are air scoops over the front wheels that take inspiration from 1970's prototypes. However, the SCG 007 also features modern solutions, like vertical fins on the rear wing. The golden painted wheels give it a beautiful final touch. In the end, the team took honorable 6th and 7th places.

The underdog in the centenary Le Mans race was the Vanwall Vandervell 680. Painted British Racing Green with a dayglow green nose, it features a very elegant face and side profile with complex shapes. Wheels are part painted green and the rear diffuser has a shape different from the other Hyper Cars. Front suspension arms can be seen from above, in what is a fine modelling detail. The car did not finish the race.

For the last page, we saved the winner team, Ferrari and the pair of 499P prototypes. While all the other scale models in this article are sold under the Spark brand, the Ferraris are Look Smart editions. All resincasts made by the same company and with the same quality level. It's difficult not to feel something special while looking at this pair, as much as for how they look, as for what they represent. Fifty years after, Ferrari was back to Le Mans and won. The Italians made a beautiful prototype, with a front-end design

familiar to some of the brand's supercars. There are small fins over the front wheels and others on the cockpit. Compared with the other Hyper Cars, side pods are fairly simple, while the rear wing features original side mounts. The rear view discloses a very wide diffuser and full-size wing. The colour scheme is very simple, with yellow stripes that reminds me of those seen in the 312PB's bodies from 1973. Car #51 won the race after running 342 laps, while car #50 finished in fifth place.

The race of the century will stand as one to remember, however, this year's editions had even more Hyper Cars from famous brands like Lamborghini, BMW, Alpine and Isotta Fraschini. The next few months may well be busy...

ver the past few years there have been several partworks that have issued recreations of classic diecast vehicles from the past. Currently the most well-known of these is the Corgi Model Club which is releasing reissues of classic Corgi Toys; but previously there have been several series of classic Dinky Toys from Britain and France, as well as Mercury from Italy.

With other partworks which are not based on classic toys, it is possible for the manufacturers of the models to re-use the tooling for their own retail ranges. This has been the case with manufacturers such as Ixo, Norev, Eligor and Starline, which have many models in their lines which originated as partwork models. In the case of reproductions of vintage diecasts, there are less options for re-using the tooling, as the items are based on old toys that may have less appeal to the general public due to the dated styling or simplistic construction.

NERVASPORT

The reproductions of classic Dinky Toys issued by Atlas Editions, in the various Dinky partworks in Britain and France, were all made by French company Norev. Rereleasing these classic models in Dinky packaging would not be possible for Norev, as it does not own the Dinky trademark. The brand was acquired by Mattel when it took over Matchbox in the 1990s. However, Norev was able to reuse one of its castings for a set of retro-style models commissioned by the Renault Boutique in Paris.

One of the classic Dinky Toys reproduced by Norev was a replica of the Renault Nervasport record car from 1934. This was a powerful, streamlined car which set a new land speed record at the Montlhery race circuit. Dinky produced a very simple casting, consisting of only a one-piece body without a base, plus wheels, axles and tyres. The model was produced in various colours, although the Norev

reproduction was finished in red with a white stripe along the top.

The Renault Boutique is a shop that sells new Renault cars, plus a wide range of Renault models, clothing and merchandise. Located in the prestigious Champs-Elysees, not far from the Arc de Triomphe, the shop also has several classic Renault cars on display. Many of the Renault models sold there are in exclusive colours and packaging, ranging from basic toys through to high quality collectors' models in diecast and resin.

One range exclusive to the shop is a set of four racing cars based on the Dinky reproduction Nervasport. Although the original vehicle was not a racing car, the models have been re-purposed as vintage racers. The four models are produced in assorted colours with different racing numbers. All have the bonnet louvres, manifolds and exhaust pipes picked out in silver, while behind the cabin is a racing number roundel on one side and a Renault logo on the other. The grille aperture is painted black with four inset yellow lamps printed on it.

Car #1 is in French blue, with black wheels and a yellow Renault logo. The second car is red with light grey wheels and a silver insignia behind the cockpit. Car #3 is grass green with grey wheels and a yellow badge. And #4 is yellow with black wheels and a silver logo.

All models are packaged in very Dinky-esque boxes in the familiar yellow shade. The front panel has a drawing of the blue car and a new Renault logo, but there is a colour spot on the pack to indicate which model is enclosed – just like classic Dinky Toys!

A model update

David Lynn updates his 2017 review of 1/43 Mini Clubman miniatures with a round-up of the subsequent releases.

everal years ago, my previous article (*Diecast Collector*, February 2017) explored every modern Mini Clubman and 1275GT model then available in 1/43, covering ranges from Vanguards (Clubman and 1275GT saloons), Spark (Clubman saloons and estate, 1275GT) and two estates by Kess; these gave a selection of 14 different models, which increased to 18 with two Vanguards A/B twinned liveries, a spiked Vanguards 1275GT lined up for an Atlas Editions partwork series which never happened, and a subtly enhanced Code 3 upgrade by Steve Tibbenham of a Vanguards rally 1275GT which corrected various detail errors.

The intervening years have produced enough new releases to warrant an update; while there has been nothing new from Spark or Kess, Vanguards have added another trio of a Clubman saloon and two 1275GTs, Atlas have issued a, so far, solitary new casting of a 1275GT racer to duplicate an earlier Vanguards livery, and Matrix have thrown their hat into the ring with three Clubman estates, and these are explored here, along with comparisons to their earlier counterparts. Additionally Trax in Australia have launched a family of six models of the Leyland Mini 1275, a locally-built 1275GT with several differences from the British specification; sadly these never arrived on these shores

so are described from online sources.

The first model to explore is the Atlas partworks model of Richard Longman's British Touring Car Championship (BTCC) racer, repeating a Vanguards livery but using a new casting, probably created within the IXO/Altaya group. Putting these twins together enables a side-by-side comparison, and while the Atlas model has some shape issues, it highlights how the Vanguards casting has serious flaws when critically studied, which are unfortunately endemic to all their releases.

The Atlas model was released in late 2016 in the British Touring Car Champions series, and like its Vanguards counterpart has a vivid and intricate racing livery. Many 1970s BTCC champions won by dominating smaller capacity classes rather than through overall victories. Bill McGovern's Sunbeam Imp achieved a Championship hat-trick in 1970-72, followed by Bernard Unett's Hillman/Chrysler Avengers in 1974 and 1976-77, and then Longman's Mini 1275GT in 1978 and 1979. This debuted in 1977 with sponsorship from the Patrick Motors dealer chain and "encouragement" from British Leyland; Corgi's information blurb claims that a new car was built for 1979, but this is contradicted by a 2016 Coys auction description of what was apparently the sole Longman Mini and therefore the champion car in both years.



Equipped with 1293cc and twin carbs producing 116bhp against the standard single carb and 59bhp, it/they sported wide arches and intricate large alloys.

Longman ran with #60 through both seasons, and the complex model liveries are identical down to the smallest sticker detail, despite Atlas claiming theirs as the 1978 version and Vanguards the 1979; online photos show the Coys car at various events following its re-emergence from storage in 2008 and match almost exactly with the models. The only differences seem to be the omission of a small sticker within the white bonnet Vee and some script in the driver helmet logo on the nearside front wing, both commemorating the 1978 victory so would have been present through 1979.

The Vanguards Longman livery and fittings camouflage the shape flaws, which include very thick screen pillars which are too shallowly angled so lower the roof, squared instead of rounded body edges for the extended Clubman front, and a smooth rear outline without much profile change below the rear window. I've always had an unresolved doubt why the normal Vanguard Mini Mk1 casting - or castings if there are different sets for the ordinary Austin Seven and for the various Cooper versions - does not visually jar to the same extent, despite sharing these characteristics for the pillars and cabin, until eventually a lightbulb moment arrived. The Clubman casting has been reworked to include a bigger rear window - matching a full-size modification introduced with the Mini Mk2 facelift in October 1967 - but while praiseworthy that this change was recognised and executed, it has been clumsily translated with sharp top corners and has broken the profile change below the window into a now smooth curve. Other slight distortions are introduced by the (correct) loss of the vertical line for the Mk1 sliding door windows which because the roof is too low now look too

long in Clubman guise, and some 1275GT issues with competition wheels sit too high at the rear, pitching the model forward into a nose-down stance. None of these are individually conspicuous, but their cumulative effect gives an irritatingly "wrong" look across the whole Vanguards collection, and this Longman issue also has mediocre solid wheels in matt silver which only approximate the intricate alloy format of the real car.

It seems reasonable to expect a new interpretation 2–3 years later to benchmark its predecessor and ensure it is an improvement. However the Atlas model introduces several quirks of its own, including a bulging roof profile with exaggerated overhangs which look slightly mushroom-like, undersized but improved wheels, incorrect sliding door windows and horribly thin rear lights. Part of the problem is no doubt the need to share as much as possible with the normal-front Mini Mk.1 in the same BTCC series representing Alec Poole's Austin Cooper S 970cc 1969 winner, and this bodging is very evident, particularly from the rear. So

despite some neat fixtures such as the unusual wing mirror and an exhaust outlet under the driver's door, it's not as convincing as it could have been.

Three newer Vanguards can be added to those described in the original article.VA13506 emerged in mid-2017 with an edition size of 1000 and shows a 1978 Clubman 1100 in Reynard metallic (dark orange) with a tan interior, brown vinyl roof and optional Denovo wheels.YMO 461T survives in pristine unrestored condition with a mileage of only 12,000, and is well known within classic Mini circles. It is a straightforward re-colouring of previous issues, and is the first with a vinyl roof and the permutation of a Clubman with the Denovo run-flat wheels previously seen on some 1275GTs. With three shades of orange-brown, its livery is a distinctive reminder of prevailing tastes in the 1970s.

VA13507 arrived in July 2018 and depicts an Aqua green 1275GT with a complex history. SOH 956H left the Longbridge assembly lines on 9 September 1969 as the sixth 1275GT made and is now the oldest survivor. It was allocated to BL's press office and received the first published 1275GT road test in Autocar's 13 November 1969 issue, before being passed to Leyland Special Tuning (ST) in Abingdon and becoming a demonstrator for their performance kits. It re-appeared in Autocar's issue of 7 January 1971 alongside ST-tuned examples of a Clubman 998cc (SOH 886H, another refugee from the initial launch fleet), a Maxi 1500, a Morris 1800 and an MG Midget.

ST then prepared SOH 956H to Group 2 rally specification with a big-valve 1293cc engine and loaned it for a dealer entry driven by Phil Cooper in the 1971 RAC Rally, but it retired with a blown gasket. It was then sold off to another BL dealer, Lathams of Leicester, who entered it in the 1972 RAC Rally, again driven by Phil Cooper and retiring, this time after suspension failure. After a

long career in club rallies, it was restored to 1972 RAC specification as depicted on the model. Despite the bland base colour, the full livery with black bonnet, sponsor stickers and a wealth of added fittings is impressive. These include an interior roll cage, a bullet door mirror, extra front lights, a sump guard, a rear fog light and even a rear wiper, although the Clubman grille and retained front bumper seem incorrect from online photos of the real car. It makes a neat companion for the earlier Vanguards model (VA13501) of the red works 1275GT XJB 308H in 1970 Scottish Rally livery.

VA13508 was announced for Winter 2020-2021 as a normal 1275GT in Black Tulip – a very dark aubergine shade – portraying KNG 581L, a January 1973 car which has recently been fully restored to create one of the best original specification survivors, but it vanished off the schedule until popping up as a surprise release in September 2023 in an edition of 1000. This is another evocative colour scheme which works well on the model.

Trax's Australian family of six resin Leyland Clubman models started in 2020 with a pair of 1978 Mini 1275 LS and was followed in 2022 by a second pair backtracking to the 1973 Clubman GT and in 2023 a unique 1976 Moon art car livery, and in 2024 a third 1973 Clubman GT appeared. Trax models tend to be nicely produced with good detail and reasonably priced in their native land, but buying from the UK attracts high shipping costs and import duties, so these intriguing cousins have remained out of reach, and these comments are derived from online sources and photos.

Clubman-fronted Minis were only produced outside Europe in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, with the latter two staying fairly close to UK formats alongside normal Mini production. However Australia took a more radical approach, switching entirely to Clubman fronts in 1971 with brief Morris badging before rebranding as Leyland in 1972. Their

extensive range even included Clubman-fronted vans, and distinctive door modifications which retained external hinges with a unique wind-up window and quarterlight format plus recessed door handles, but always retained the Mk1-style bootlid.

The Clubman GT initially appeared as a Morris in 1971, differing from the UK 1275GT by carrying over the full-spec engine and twin fuel tanks from the previous local build Cooper S and adding Australian format doors and fibreglass wheelarches. The rebranding to Leyland in May 1972 brought a distinctive waist-level black boyracer side stripe which continued across the bonnet, unlike anything used in Britain but also adopted by the South African Clubman GTS, and an extrovert colour range. This incarnation seems only to have lasted a year with about 1000 made, being replaced by the more luxurious but less sporty Mini Clubman S with 1098cc. Trax's initial pair come in lurid colour choices of Cadiz (yellow-orange) and Gambier Turquoise, with the third release being a more subtle dark blue. Online pictures look spectacular, but many details such as the smaller 10" pressed steel wheels, normal seats and black grille with GT badge are familiar from the UK 1275GT.

The Mini 1275 LS was a 1978 run-out edition as Leyland ended Mini production, fairly similar to a late British 1275GT with a mild 55 bhp engine and 12" wheels and sporty plastic covers (no other Australian Mini had 12" wheels apart from some Moke versions), but fitted with knee-height black side stripes, an enlarged 34-litre fuel tank, tombstone front seats and a natty roof aerial. Trax offered Hi Ho Silver and Nugget Gold versions.

Their remaining livery is the one-off 1976 Leyland Moon Mini art car in dark blue with picture graphics, as commissioned by Leyland Australia for a display centrepiece at that year's Melbourne and Sydney motor shows. Sadly despite receiving much attention, this unique creation was repainted and sold off afterwards to an unknown fate. However it seems to have inspired a spectacular model which is definitely on my "I Want One Of Those" shortlist. The livery is fascinating with a rich deep blue base festooned with abstract celestial designs, blue-centred Minilite alloys, a plain black grille without badging and a red/brown interior with tombstone seats.

The final models for this update are a trio of Mini

Clubman estates, released by Matrix through their Mini Mania sub-brand at the end of 2023. This batch brings the estate choice to six, alongside Spark's cheerful early depiction and the Kess pair of final version 1981 Mini 1000 HL estates which dropped the Clubman name. The new batch are all based on real 1979–80 survivors from the last year or so of Clubman-badged production and were traced online to various restoration features and sales ads.

MXMM430171 comes in Vermillion red with gold side stripes, and its JYA 71T plate was issued in June 1979 which is the earliest date of the three. Strangely it is the only one depicted without a central bar to the black grille, so is actually the 1000 HL format from a couple of years later. MXMM430172 comes in Denim Blue metallic, again with gold side stickers, and its TYC 859W plate from October 1980 was the final month of Clubman-badged production before the 1000 HL; it has the correct central grille bar from before the changeover. Apart from colour (Snapdragon Yellow with black side striping) and plate (DVJ 410W from Aug 1980) MXMM430173 is identical.

Individually and collectively, these are excellent renditions with cheerful colours and very accurate detail, such as the roof aerial and longitudinal roof ribbing, very precise wheels, contrasting seat panel trim in the otherwise all-black interiors, rear mudflaps, and as a finishing touch delicate AA badges in the grilles. A couple of trivial niggles are the black instead of chrome finish for the sill and arch trim, which unfortunately can be a bit wobbly, and the black plastic mirrors should be chromed. All have non-standard front wing indicators for some reason.

These are the best Clubman estates among the six,

with the solitary Spark in its vivid Limeflower yellow/ green scheme handicapped by too short a rear body and a non-ribbed roof, and the exquisitely detailed Kess pair of final 1000 HLs having shape flaws with oversized headlights, too shallow windscreens and severely undersized windows in the rear doors.

With now two bites at the Clubman cherry on these pages and two dozen models on my kitchen table, some overall thoughts can be crystallised. The real Clubman is a neat and endearing design with a cheerful character, which should be evident when miniaturised. All the models reflect this to various extents, despite some basic flaws; one key attribute is the vibrant colour schemes most of them depict, alongside for the rally/race schemes some very intricate and fully detailed liveries.

For me the Sparks range are the best executed saloons, whether the normal road cars or the competition liveries - they all just look right; as a bonus the rare Japanese special described in the first instalment (KBS048, for Kokusai Boeki Store) as a dressed-up 1275GT course car for the 1996 Monte Mini 25 retro-event is a work of art and must be a candidate for the most complex 1/43 Mini livery ever issued. I've chuntered on about the disappointing Vanguards casting, but this is balanced by a focussed choice of liveries and schemes, capturing a wide range of intriguing cars across a varied colour palette. Sadly I can't offer solid comment on the Trax offerings, beyond that their choices look an imaginative selection with some very desirable colour schemes. Turning to the various estates, this is possibly an even more endearing shape than the saloon, and the Matrix trio are pretty well perfect, and even though the Kess twins and the Spark singleton have jarring hiccups, all six are very nice models.

Corgi's Marham Tornado Trio

After almost four decades of operational service the Panavia Tornado GR.4 was retired from the RAF in March 2019. Jarrod Cotter looks at the three Corgi 1/72 scale models of the jets from RAF Marham which were repainted to mark the occasion.

> hen the Panavia Tornado GR.4 was retired from RAF service in March 2019, several aircraft were repainted to mark the occasion. Three of them were from RAF Marham and in this article we'll look at those aircraft and the subsequent Corgi models of them. First though, let's have a quick recap of the Tornado story.

TORNADO SERVICE

The Tornado is a variable geometry, two-seat, day or night, all weather strike aircraft which was the backbone of RAF offensive operations for several

decades. All this came to a close with its final return from operations and a series of flypasts over key relevant locations in the UK during mid-February 2019, and the news that it would be retired by the end of that March.

The Tornado was developed and built by Panavia Aircraft GmbH, a tri-national consortium consisting of British Aerospace (previously British Aircraft Corporation), MBB of West Germany and Aeritalia of Italy. The prototype of this variable geometry ('swing wing') aircraft first flew on 14 August 1974 and the type was introduced into RAF service from 1979. A tri-nation training and evaluation unit operating from

RAF Cottesmore, the Tri-National Tornado Training Establishment, maintained a level of international cooperation beyond the production stage.

The first operational Tornado GR.1s were delivered to No.IX(B) Squadron at Honington from January 1982. The Tornado, later upgraded to GR.4 configuration, was capable of delivering a wide range of weapons and could fly automatically at low-level using terrain following radar, and by using its forward-looking infrared systems and pilot's night-vision goggles was a very capable platform for night-time operations.

It was in service with the RAF for nearly 40 years, although a combination of major upgrade programmes and numerous continual enhancements kept the aircraft amongst the forefront of British attack aircraft.

The Tornado was on almost continuous operations since it deployed on Operation Granby in 1990 returning to home bases on 2 March 1991. They deployed on Operation Jural, the southern Iraq No-

fly Zone, in August 1992 and maintained a presence in the Middle East until withdrawn from Iraq on 31 May 2009. There was then a short break before they redeployed to Kandahar in Afghanistan as part of Operation Herrick on 6 July 2009 until their end of mission and return to the UK in November 2014.

The Tornado was also used in Kosovo in 1999 and in March 2011 it flew against targets inside Libya on Operation Ellamy. Flying 3,000 miles from its base at RAF Marham in Norfolk these missions were described as "the longest-range bombing missions conducted by the RAF since the Falklands conflict". The Tornado's deployment on Operation Shader began with the first aircraft arriving in RAF Akrotiri in Cyprus on 12 August 2014, and the first operational sortie was flown over Iraq the following day. After over four years on Operation Shader, on 5 February 2019 the aircraft finally returned home from operations for good. The Tornado had flown 185,603 hours on operations from 1990 until its final mission.

THE RETIREMENT TRIO

RAF Marham was one of the two bases where operational Tornados were stationed and chose three aircraft to be specially repainted. These were ZD716 which was repainted into a commemorative 31 Squadron scheme, ZG752 which was repainted into a wrap-round camouflage scheme and ZG775 which was given a IX(B) Squadron commemorative scheme.

ZD716 retained most of its familiar all-over grey paintwork but was given a black spine and tail. On the spine was written '31 Squadron Tornado 1984 – 2019'.

On its tail it was given the silhouette of a Tornado and on top of that was the squadron's gold star badge. At the top of its tail were the words 'Panavia Tornado GR'.

ZG752's wrap-round camouflage paintwork marked the earlier period of Tornado operations during the Cold War, when several squadrons operated the type in West Germany as it was then. Interestingly, on this jet's spine were painted the badges of all the RAF units which had flown the Tornado. On the top of its tail were the words 'Tornado GR 1982 – 2019'.

Finally, ZG775's new paint scheme was similar to that of ZD716 except that it wore a large green bat symbol on its tail for IX(B) Squadron's badge and featured the years '1982 - 2019' on it spine.

CORGI'S TORNADO

The Corgi Aviation Archive model of the Tornado is to 1/72 scale. This gives it a length of approximately 91/4 inches, a wingspan of approximately 7 inches (when fully opened) and a height of approximately 3 inches.

The first thing to mention is that the model has a working swing wing mechanism so that the collector can pose it as they wish. The model comes with an array of separately fitted parts including underwing fuel tanks and stores which can be rotated to suit the angle the wings are set at.

The model features a detailed cockpit and crew figures. The canopy is removable and can be positioned either open or closed.

Parts are also supplied to represent the model with wheels down or retracted, giving the collector the full choice of how the aircraft is modelled – either on the ground with canopy open and wings open or as speeding through the air with wings fully swept back

and placed on the supplied stand.

Another moveable part of the model are the tailplanes. These can be rotated up and down to represent the aircraft being put into a climb or descent.

Paintwork on the Tornado is up to Corgi's usual high standard. This is especially so with the fine detailing which includes squadron badges, no step stencils, ejection seat warning symbols, yellow rescue arrow markers and even aircrew names on the canopy frames.

Over the years numerous models of the Tornado have been released, and these were all listed in a column with my previous article on the Corgi Tornado in the May 2019 issue of Diecast Collector. However, these three models were added to the range after that article and for the serious collectors the Corgi Aviation Archive reference numbers are AA33619 (ZG752), AA33620 (ZG775) and AA33621 (ZD716).

The models are readily available on the second-hand market. You should be able to pick up a good example for around the £60-£70 mark, though mint models of these three can fetch more.





The Austin Metropolitan

Alwyn Brice takes a look at another real life vehicle to see how well it translated into miniature.

ithout doubt, the 1950s were an exuberant time across the Pond. There, where the power struggle that had absorbed Europe from 1939 to 1945 was comfortably remote, the post-War years saw a quickening of the nation's pulse. In particular, car manufacture benefited, and some of the most flamboyant creations ever to roll on tarmac hail from this era. Fins, lavish chrome, two tone paintwork and boots (or trunks) big enough to swallow the kitchen table were all par for the course.

Over here, the British car industry naturally felt the ripples, and acted accordingly. Ford was arguably the front runner, with cars like the bold new Zephyr, Zodiac, Consul and Classic, although Vauxhall (with the VX4/90, the Cresta and the Victor) also sought to emulate transatlantic fare. Such cars were of more modest proportions, however; after all, US cars were not quite so manoeuvrable when transposed to narrow Blighty roads...

But size wasn't everything, which is why in the early 1950s US carmaker Nash spotted a potential gap in the marketplace for a smaller runaround – a second car or, dare I say it, something for 'er indoors.

The Metropolitan was the net result of its studies but tooling up for the venture came at an awkward time, prompting Nash to outsource production. Over here, Austin and Fisher & Ludlow won the contract to manufacture – the first ever case of an American car being produced outside the United States. Initially labelled a Nash, it later became more familiar as the Austin Metropolitan.

The Metropolitan was an oddball, to put it mildly. Intended primarily as a dollar generator, most cars went States-side but some were retained for the home market. The vehicle was manufactured as a coupe or a soft-top, could seat four and made use of an Austin drivetrain. As a sop (maybe) to the main market, transmission was three speed, mounted on the steering column (more of which anon).

By the end of its production life, around 1962, the car had gained an opening boot and quarterlights, although with the 1500cc engine and ancillaries remaining the same.

A MINI METROPOLITAN

In terms of the miniature, several manufacturers have seen fit to offer this strange hybrid. Part of the



attraction has to be the colourful two-tone paintwork possibilities; early (Nash) cars were monotone whereas the Austins made use of rather more interesting combinations. All colours contrasted with the Frost White lower portion: Berkshire Green (a turquoise) was the classic choice but Mardi Gras Red, Sunburst Yellow and Caribbean Blue were just some other options. And, variety being the key here, I've plumped for the Vitesse range for the purposes of this feature.

Why Vitesse? Well, the company went to town on the colour front (pale blue, yellow, beige, orange, red and even black were available), and grouped together, these schemes look simply stunning. The models are quite weighty and, at first sight, are excellent replicas. However, you really need to have owned the real thing to comment further.

I've had two convertible Mets and the first thing that comes to mind are the doors. On the miniature they don't open (a sensible, and cost-saving decision) but they are precisely modelled. By that, I refer to the real thing: Met doors were symmetrical, the view being that they could be swapped over if necessary. In fact, Nash tried to engineer other, interchangeable elements when designing the Metropolitan but it was the doors that made the final cut. On the Vitesse, they look perfect.

Less perfect, though, is the interior. Whilst the dash is a masterpiece (the radio, speedo and other switches are all quite clear), for some reason the gear lever is absent. The Met made use of a four speed Austin box with fourth blanked off, but it's nowhere to be seen inside. Perhaps it's just as well, for mastering the Met's column change is an art in itself: getting from first to second was always a gamble when I was driving mine. All too often the car would start to coast as I'd missed the slot. You would think that, with just three gears, it would be a doddle. Not a bit of it...

The Metropolitan model from Vitesse is an earlier car (the giveaway being that it has no opening boot - owners had to pull down the rear seat panel to gain access to the space) and the fact that it has no quarterlights. The strikingly patterned upholstery (a decal printed to represent the houndstooth fabric) is commendable save that the 1:1 car would have had the pattern in black on white. Vitesse has largely opted

to use a bodywork colour instead – a huge pity, since this fabric pattern is a defining feature of the real car. But for all that, the interior is well modelled, down to the familiar split bench seat – and there's even printed fabric in the rear.

ON THE OUTSIDE

Externally, the models mostly look the part. On the coupe, a minor niggle concerns the lack of two vertical strips on the rear glass (not hard to have added, one feels, although from what I have seen, not all Met coupes had them); and someone appears to have stolen the coupe's sunvisors (for these are faithfully modelled on the convertible). Incidentally, this latter boasts a realistically sculpted tonneau cover, which is a definite plus. Vitesse went to the trouble of executing a hollowed-out exhaust pipe for the rear (good) and added a radio aerial (bad, for this latter in scale terms is far too thick). Whilst it's pleasing to note the stylised M on the car's hubcaps, each of these ought to be in red – but at least the M is there. An aberration, though, concerns the distinctive Metropolitan chromed script; for reasons best known to Vitesse, this is reproduced on both front wings whereas, in reality, it was only ever attached to the wing opposite the driver's side.

Whitewall tyres adorn the Vitesse creation; along with the left hand steering wheel, they suggest that a US car was used as a model for the range. It's interesting to record that whitewalls would have been an option back in the day, whereas the radio and cigar lighter (different times!) set the scene in the 1950s in terms of luxury items.

Ultimately, it's hard not to like the Vitesse rendering, for all its niggling faults; given the cost of these models when new, they were terrific value in my book. Today, in the UK at least, the real cars are seldom encountered, as fewer than 100 are reckoned to be about; but drive one, and you'll certainly attract attention!



Ford Fiesta MK1

In which Steve Coles compares models of the same car... but in differing scales!

suppose one of the most frequently asked questions by those 'outside' the hobby must be "what makes us collect?" There could potentially be as many different answers as there are collectors. However, one of the most popular answers must have to be memories; memories of a time long ago, when life was simpler, slower. Or when you had to wind your own windows up and down, or pull over to extend your radio arial to get any kind of reception. Memories of loading Dad's old Rover or Ford up and heading off for a fortnight by the coast. There are so many possibilities for triggering off memories, but perhaps none more so than our first car. The freedom it gave made it such a treasured possession. No wonder then, at classic car events, you hear similar conversations time and time again; and they usually start with "I remember when I had one of those...".

The original, Mk 1, Ford Fiesta was launched to the general public in September 1976 across Europe, although in the UK we had to wait until February 1977 for it to be available. The Fiesta was to be Ford's answer to the rising popularity of small front wheel drive hatchbacks. Project 'Bobcat' had a vast array of engine and trim level combinations ensuring they had a sales success. By the time it was replaced in 1983 by the restyled Mk2 version, Ford had sold over 2 million Fiestas worldwide. Although I only owned my Mk1 Fiesta for 6 months, the fascination and interest has stayed with me. The Fiesta, primarily in its original

Mk1 guise, has formed the basis for my current collecting.

My own interest in the Mk1 Fiesta began, rather curiously, four years before I could actually drive. I read a series of magazine articles about the French Dinky range and included in the final part of the series were brief details about a light metallic blue Fiesta (No.1541), made in Spain by Auto-Pilen, but also sold as a Dinky. This was the first toy version of the original Fiesta I had seen and knew I had to find one.

Modelled to approximately 1/43 scale, the Pilen/ Dinky version captures the rather angular shape of the Fiesta really well. It is a crisp, clean casting that also boasts opening doors. Both Pilen and Dinky were produced in the same colour, the only one offered on the Dinky version. Pilen released their Fiesta in several other liveries. The light metallic blue colour used is reminiscent of 'Cosmos Blue' used by Ford during most of the Mk1 Fiesta's production and is not only evenly applied but also not too thick so shows off the casting's crispness. At the front, the cast-in bumpers, grille (complete with Ford badge) and headlights are picked out in silver and at the back the bumper is also silver with the taillights picked out in red. Both really lift the appearance of the model. The Ford oval, albeit blank, and Fiesta badge (in the correct typeface are both cast neatly into the boot lid and whilst the 'Fiesta' lettering is oversized, it appears to use the correct typeface. A cream interior

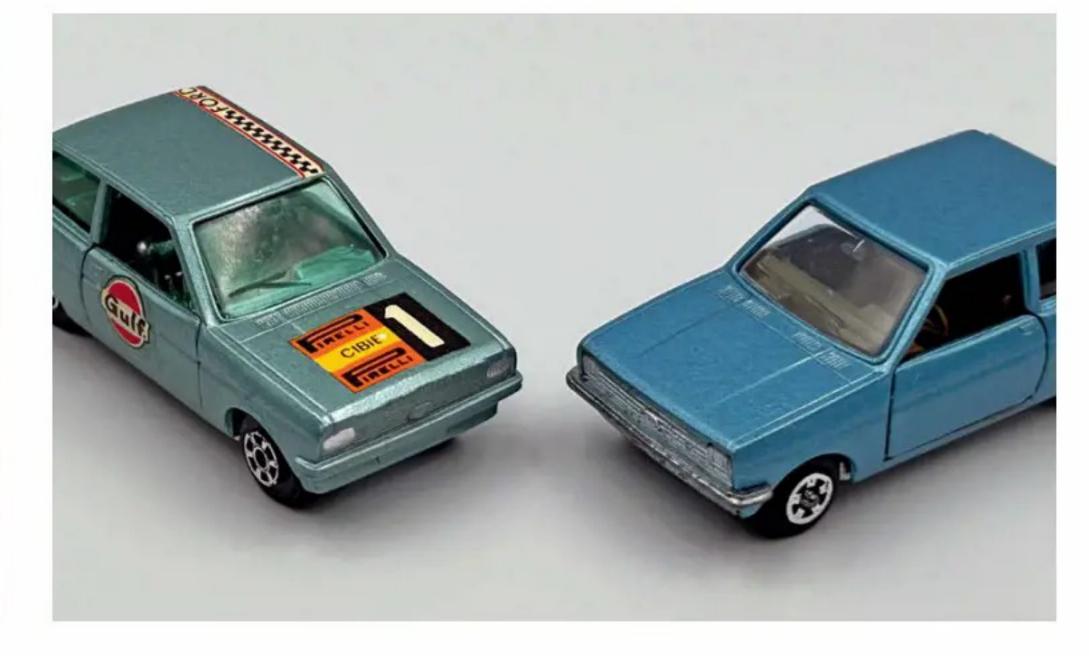

has seats of roughly the correct pattern and a crude representation of the dashboard design. Apart from manufacturer names on the bases the main difference between the both Dinky and Pilen versions concern the boxes. The Dinky version came in the traditional style Dinky card box whereas the Pilen version used a hard clear plastic 'showcase' – typical of many Spanish diecasts of this period.

Paired with my first Mk1 Fiesta are two smaller, Spanish examples. I shall begin with the smaller Pilen model. On first appearance, it looks like a scaled down version of Pilen's 1/43 scale offering, which is no bad thing. My example is numbered M-815 and labelled as Ford Fiesta Rallye; I am including it here as, despite the stickers, it is otherwise very similar. It is finished in a slightly lighter shade of metallic blue and being a 'Rallye' version, also has some quite neat stickers that are well applied and have aged well. Apart from opening doors to add some play value, the body is a single piece casting. The bumpers and lights are all part of the body casting, with only the headlights picked out in silver. There is the name 'Fiesta' once again cast in oversize capital letters on the boot lid as well as a blank oval shape. Its only curious feature is the interior; instead of the more usual separate plastic item, the interior is cast into the base of the car, meaning it is silver and the dashboard is part of the body casting. Pilen offered this small-scale Fiesta in a number of liveries. As well as my 'Rallye', they released a deep metallic red version and

a police version, as well as one in the same shade of metallic blue as the larger example.

My second small scale Fiesta is made by Mira. When placed side by side with the Pilen, it is a little longer, a tiny bit wider and a little taller than Pilen's casting. It also sits on wheels that look a little small. Despite their differences in size, both look well proportioned, although for me the Pilen seems to get it spot-on. Numbered 2145, my first Mira is also finished in metallic blue. Once again this is a crisp casting with some fine details; most notably perhaps is the 'Ford' badge and 'Fiesta' lettering on the tailgate. As the metal base also forms the front bumper, grille (complete with tiny Ford badge), headlights and rear bumper on this example they are finished in a shiny silver. Two later examples I own show not only is the tooling becoming tired, but the metal base has been replaced with black plastic, making the front view look slightly odd. Both Pilen and Mira toys came in a plastic style presentation cases, screwed to the yellow plastic base part; a far cry from the Matchbox 1-75 and Corgi Juniors cardboard window boxes that we were more used to in the UK.

For me, these make a most charming and attractive set, and not just because they model my first car. The colour, the proportions and the level of cast in detail each has makes them a most delightful trio. If only I could track down a small plain metallic blue Pilen one.



New Horizons

Being a Dinky collector, I had actually seen one or two UFO diecast models at a vintage collectors meet. I have to say that they didn't really fit in with my other Dinky models. I did say to my wife, who, as already mentioned, is sceptical about aliens, that I

rather liked the UFO models. My wife didn't really say much, other than a slightly raised eyebrow, which is normally reserved for suggesting that my choice of a new item of clothing is not suitable.

One Christmas, I opened a present from my wife and could not believe it when a bright green UFO Interceptor appeared out of the packaging. Naturally I did a few circuits of the living room with this wonderful model. Then for my birthday, my wife got me the Shado 2 mobile. This was followed by a Spectrum Pursuit Vehicle from Captain Scarlet. You

Corgi TV & Film

After the highs of the 1960, 70s and 80s, in the final part of this series **Paul Lumsdon** guides you through the various TV and film models released by Corgi throughout the 1990s.



he popularity of James Bond's Aston Martin DB5, The Batmobile and Chitty Chitty Bang Bang during the 1960s are the stuff of legend and have also helped to drive the collector market that we all enjoy today.

There can also be no doubt that in the modern era of specialist collectable diecast models, TV and film related models have a more populist appeal and help to bring diecast to a broader, younger mass audience. This was never more so than in the 1990s when the adult collector market was growing to its peak. Let's take a look at some of Corgi's fabulous TV and film related models from that period...

SOME MOTHER'S DO 'AVE 'EM MORRIS MINOR SALOON (NO.96758)

In one episode of the classic 1970s comedy, the hapless Frank Spencer is given the use of a Morris Minor Saloon for his job on a chicken farm. He decides to take wife Betty for a picnic by the coast and true to form Frank ends up driving the car to the cliff edge where it dangles perilously, hundreds of feet above the English Channel. Michael Crawford (Frank) and Michelle Dotrice (Betty) both performed their own stunts during this daring but hilarious scene which was watched by 15 million viewers. The Morris Minor achieved its own celebrity status and

was released by Corgi in 1/43 scale in 1995.

CHITTY CHITTY BANG BANG (NO.C98751/05301)

First under Mattel ownership and later as the independent Corgi Classics, TV and film related models were constantly featured and it is rather neat that the decade started and ended with very different releases of one of the most famous cars of all – Chitty Chitty Bang Bang.

In 1991 to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the film, Corgi produced a superb, limited edition version of the car (C98751) moulded from the original 1968 (266) tooling. It incorporated all the original features including the four figures, popout red and yellow wings and clip-on front and rear stabiliser wings. The model was presented in a beautiful sealed blue box, on a wooden plinth and had a numbered certificate.

The 1998 release (05301) was billed again as a 'Corgi Original' but sadly suffered from being an expensive model to produce. So much so that this release only featured one figure, Caractacus Potts, the pop-out wings were single colour red only, whilst the front and rear stabiliser wings were left out altogether. It was presented in a colourful window display box. This 'economy' version was all to hit a margin at a certain price point. Corgi may have been



independent again but the financial backers were constantly scrutinising the profitability!

SPENDER FORD SIERRA (NO.96012)

Jimmy Nail played gritty Geordie detective Freddie Spender in this Newcastle upon Tyne based cop show from the early 90s. Spender's car in the series was a Ford Sierra Sapphire Cosworth provided by the Ford Motor Company. When the first car provided was stolen from the set and later found burnt out, a new vehicle was provided and it then had to be allocated its own security guard for the third and final series. Corgi's model was an existing toy tool with opening front doors and bonnet. It was produced in 1995 in 1/43 scale.

THE PROFESSIONALS FORD CAPRI (NO.57401)

Aired between 1997 and 1983, *The Professionals* was an all-action drama about a fictional British law enforcement department, CI5. Bodie and Doyle (Martin Shaw and Lewis Collins) under the control of Cowley (Gordon Jackson) became a huge hit, as did the cars they used. Foremost amongst these was the Ford Capri 3.0S MkIII. Initially Bodie drove a silver version but in later series Doyle also had a gold Capri. Corgi's 1/36 scale model produced in 1999, was in silver and was another 'Corgi original' using the 342 tooling from 1980. Bodie and Doyle figures were also included but sadly not a Cowley figure.

STARSKY AND HUTCH FORD TORINO (NO.57402)

Running from 1975 to 1979, Starsky and Hutch were two street-wise southern California cops who bust criminals with the help of their their red-and-white Ford Torino and a police snitch called Huggy Bear. The Ford Torino, nicknamed 'The Striped Tomato' became as big as the central characters of the show. Corgi's 1999 1/36 scale model was billed as a 'Corgi Original', meaning it was produced from the original 1970s tooling. It also featured two nicely sculpted Starsky and Hutch figures.

MOVING STORY BEDFORD PANTECHNICON (NO.18302)

Moving Story was a comedy drama that aired over two series between 1994 and 1995. It followed the adventures of a team of removal workers. The Corgi 1/50 scale Bedford Pantechnicon released in 1995 was only loosely based on the vehicle used in the series, which wasn't actually a Bedford at all. Still the series quickly disappeared without trace so is anyone really that bothered? I suspect not.

INSPECTOR MORSE JAGUAR MKII (NO.01803)

First broadcast in 1987, *Inspector Morse* (title character played by John Thaw) was a rather grumpy but highly intelligent CID officer with the Oxford Police Force. The show was almost as famous for the stunning location scenery around Oxford and for Morse's famous Mk II Jaguar, as it was for the plots. Corgi's 1/43 scale model was launched in 1998.

LOVEJOY MORRIS MINOR CONVERTIBLE (NO.96757)

Lovejoy, a comedy drama about a roguish East Anglian antiques dealer (played by Ian MacShane), ran from 1986 to 1994. During the second series Lovejoy borrowed a car from his love interest, Lady Jane Felsham, and 'Miriam' a Morris Minor Convertible

became his trusty transport thereafter. Corgi's model was produced in 1995 from the existing 1/43 scale tooling, even though the real car used in the series was actually a saloon that had been converted to a convertible.

ONLY FOOLS AND HORSES RELIANT VAN (NO.05201)

Probably the most famous Reliant Regal Supervan III there has

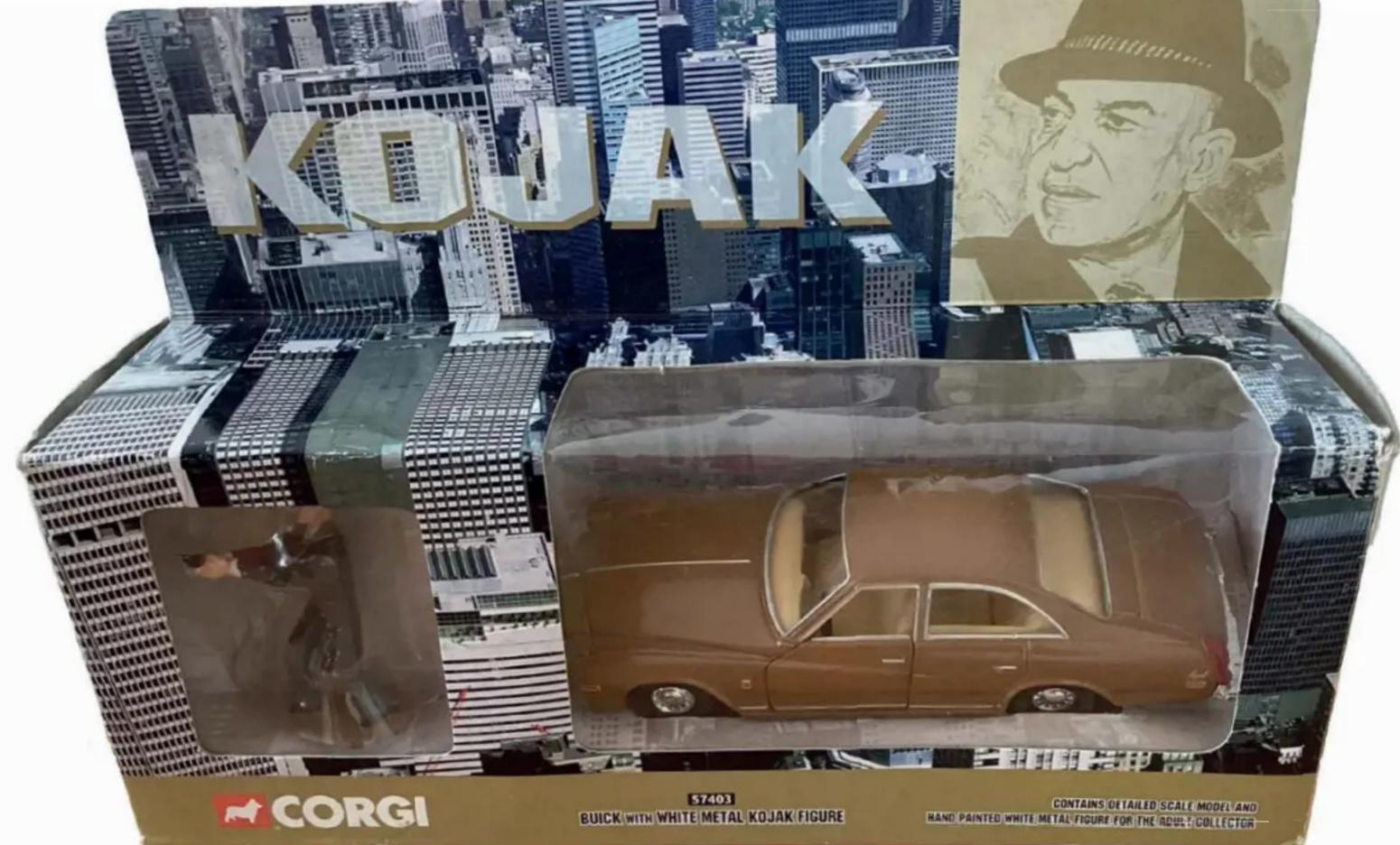

THE ITALIAN JOB MINI SET (NO.05506)

Who can forget this classic comic caper from 1969? Charlie (Michael Caine) and a bunch of hardened crooks try to steal a consignment of gold from the streets of Turin. The getaway cars are three Mini Coopers in red, white and blue. It is probably fair to say that the Minis made the film and the film made the Mini Cooper! The 3-car set from Corgi featured the 1/36 scale Mini with additional bonnet mounted spot lights and was first released in 1998.

ever been, Corgi rushed this 1/36 scale model out for 1999 having been beaten to market by Lledo with a 1/43 scale version. The larger Corgi model featured opening front doors and rear door, plus an opening suitcase for Del-Boy's swag! Ironically shortly after this model was released Corgi acquired Lledo and its tooling, so they inherited their version of the Reliant as well.

JAMES BOND TOMORROW NEVER DIES **ASTON MARTIN DB5 (NO.04302)**

The iconic Aston Martin DB5 first appeared with agent 007 in 1964's Goldfinger and went on to make further appearances in Thunderball, Golden Eye, Tomorrow Never Dies, Casino Royale, Skyfall and Spectre. This Corgi model was released in 1998 to mark the DB5's appearance in Tomorrow Never Dies and is based on the original 1/32 scale (271) tooling from 1978. It has the original working features of ejector seat, flip-up bullet proof shield and pop-out guns on the front bumper.

KOJAK BUICK REGAL (NO.57403)

Kojak was a 1970s US cop show featuring Telly Savalas as the tough, New York cop, Theo Kojak. In





THE AVENGERS BENTLEY (NO.00101)

Airing from 1961 to 1969, The Avengers was a slightly 'off-the-wall' Spi-Fi series. It starred the suave John Steed (Patrick McNee) alongside a succession of attractive and assertive female assistants. Steed drove a number of Bentleys throughout the series. Corgis 1/43 scale model from 1998 was a remake of the original model from the 1966 Avengers Gift Set (GS40) but in green and with a standing Steed figure.

DAKTARI LAND ROVER (NO.01704)

The popular 1960s series Daktari followed the adventures of vet Dr Marsh Tracey looking after sick animals in Africa. This Corgi model is based on the 1/43 scale Series 2 Land Rover tool and is a replica of the vehicle originally issued as Gift Set 7 (GS7) in 1967. It appeared in 1998 with Judy the chimp and Clarence the boss-eyed lion figures.

MR BEAN MINI (NO.04419)

Rowan Atkinson's brilliant Mr Bean followed the adventures of a grown man with the mind of a

child. His hilarious exploits ran as a TV series from 1990 to 1995 and there have been two subsequent films. Bean's 1976 Mini has starred throughout and was nicely reproduced in 1998 by Corgi in 1/36 scale. The standard Mini tool was even modified to feature the bolt and padlock locking system on the driver's door.

SOLDIER SOLDIER BEDFORD DROPSIDE LORRY (NO.18901)

Soldier Soldier was a hugely popular Army drama that aired between 1991 and 1997. It made household names of Robson Green and Jerome Flynn, the two lead actors, who also developed a singing career as an offshoot of the show. The 1/50 scale Corgi Beford High Dropside truck released in 1997, was typical of those used in the British Army at the time and the set was completed with the addition of two hand painted uniformed figures.





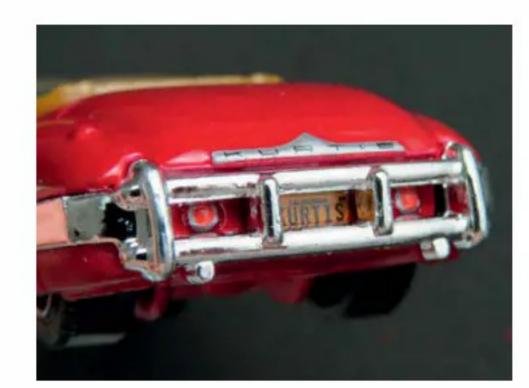

A rare sight

Paul Brent Adams looks at a modern Matchbox casting...

he Matchbox 2022 range began appearing in the shops in late 2021 – among the first wave of new releases being this 1949 Kurtis Sport Car.

Designed by Frank Kurtis, and made by Kurtis Kraft of California, who are best-known for their racing cars, it had a very short production life, ranging from 1949 to 1950.

An aluminium-bodied, two-seater convertible, it used many Ford components, including a V-8 engine. Even so, it was an expensive car to produce, and only a handful were made. In addition to factory-built vehicles, it was also offered as a kit-car, with only a few surviving today. Despite the low production numbers, the car seems to have made a considerable impact, and influenced several later designs. That explains why such a seemingly obscure vehicle as the Kurtis has made it in to the Matchbox line-up.

Over the last few years Matchbox has gone back to its roots, producing well-detailed models of real vehicles, after several years of making weird fantasy vehicles. Along with modern cars and trucks, there is a strong emphasis on older vehicles, from the 1930s to the 1970s – great for me, as I prefer these older vehicles. They are also among the best of the modern castings.

The 2022 Matchbox range contains 102 models, the Kurtis being number 28/102, although the models are never released in numerical order. This is a beautiful model of the car. Sleek and well rounded, with a massive chrome grille, just typical of its era. Only the upper body is metal, painted red in this case. The base and lower body are red plastic, which is an excellent colour match for the painted upper body.

Trapped in between is a chromed part, that provides

the front bumper and grille, wide side strips, rear bumper, and floor. With the top down, the brown plastic interior is clearly visible. The steering wheel is part of the interior moulding, and is a solid disc, but it does have the correct three spokes. The clear windscreen has a slightly smoked tint, while the base includes underside detail.

Also present are the model name '1949 Kurtis Sport Car', the Matchbox and Mattel names, model number MB1294, 'Made in Thailand,' and the usual tiny Thai elephant. The copyright date is 2021. Due to the rear wheels being enclosed, these have a slightly narrower track than the front wheels, but this is not really obvious.

Tampo printing provides the chrome strip across the front of the bonnet, carrying the KURTIS name; the headlights, boot strip (which also includes the KURTIS name), rear lights and rear number plate – which again reads KURTIS, with California in even smaller lettering. The standard of tampo printing is outstanding, with everything being clear and readable. Overall length is 69mm. Given that the length of the real Kurtis was 169 inches, that makes the model 1/62 scale.

The model comes inside a plastic bubble, glued to a mainly orange backing card, with a white panel behind the model itself. The artwork shows the car in what could be a museum or car showroom, rather than out on the open road. Copyright date on the back of the card is again 2021.

The Kurtis is a welcome, and unexpected, addition to the range of 1940s and 1950s cars from Matchbox, and makes an interesting comparison to such British cars as the slightly later Aston Martin DBR1 or Jaguar XK140. Doubtless, we shall be seeing the Kurtis in other colour schemes in the future.

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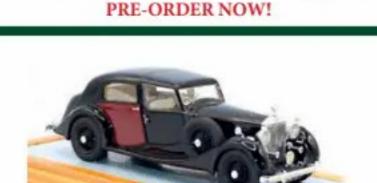
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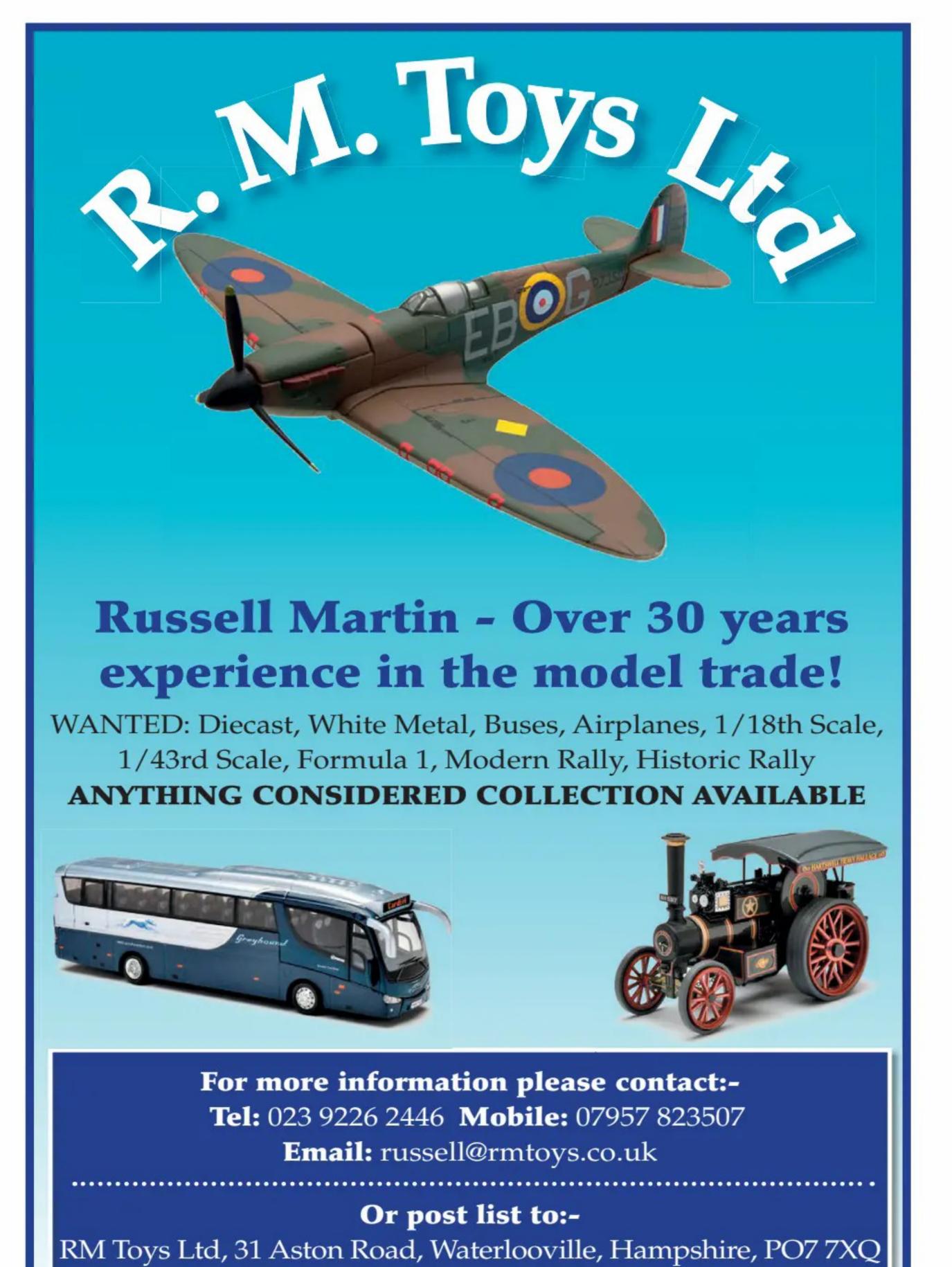

Corgi through the years

Rick Wilson continues his series of year-by-year articles from the beginning of the brand in 1956. We continue the series with models released during the second half of 1975.

ontinuing on from the releases for the first half of 1975, as detailed in the August issue, there was still plenty yet to come before the end of the year. Featuring another 1/18 scale racing car, and more of the 900 series military releases, there was plenty to appeal to all.

The second half of the year kicked off with a very summery feel, in the shape of Gift Set 24 Mercedes-Benz 240D and Touring Caravan. The car was a new variant of No.285 Mercedes-Benz 240D that had been released in March. Now painted a darker metallic blue, it was paired with a brand-new caravan, which would be released on its own as No.490 early the following year. Produced in white with a blue stripe on the sides to match the car, it also featured a slide-out red/ white canopy and a hinged opening door. The set last until 1979, and for its last year, the colours changed to bronze/cream for the Merc and bronze, dark tan and cream for the caravan.

Also released in July was another of the superb 900-series military range. No.907 Sdkfz Rocket Launcher was a dark grey, 6-missile semi-track unit

with a trailer, which carried a supply of red plastic shells. No.401 Volkswagen 1300 Motor School Car was essentially a reissue of No.400, released in April 1974, but now with a set of bollards to navigate.

August saw another summery gift set released as part of a bumper month – GS28 Mazda B1600 with Trailer and Dinghy featured a recoloured No.493 Mazda B1600 pick-up, now painted orange with side graphics, pulling an orange trailer with a red and yellow plastic dinghy. No.804 Noddy's Car was a reworking of the popular, but controversial original No.801, but this time with just our main hero driving solo.

A new helicopter also landed during August, in the shape of No.921 Hughes 369 Police Helicopter. At 1/48 scale, it represents an excellent likeness of the real thing and came initially in white, appearing with either black, red or blue plastic blades, which rotated courtesy of a plastic thumbwheel above the fuselage. It also appeared in GS18 Emergency Services Gift Set, launched at the same time. This featured No.402 Police Cortina, with sign and cone accessories, and No.482 Range Rover Ambulance alongside the new helicopter. No.314 Fiat X1/9 was another new 1/36 scale release.

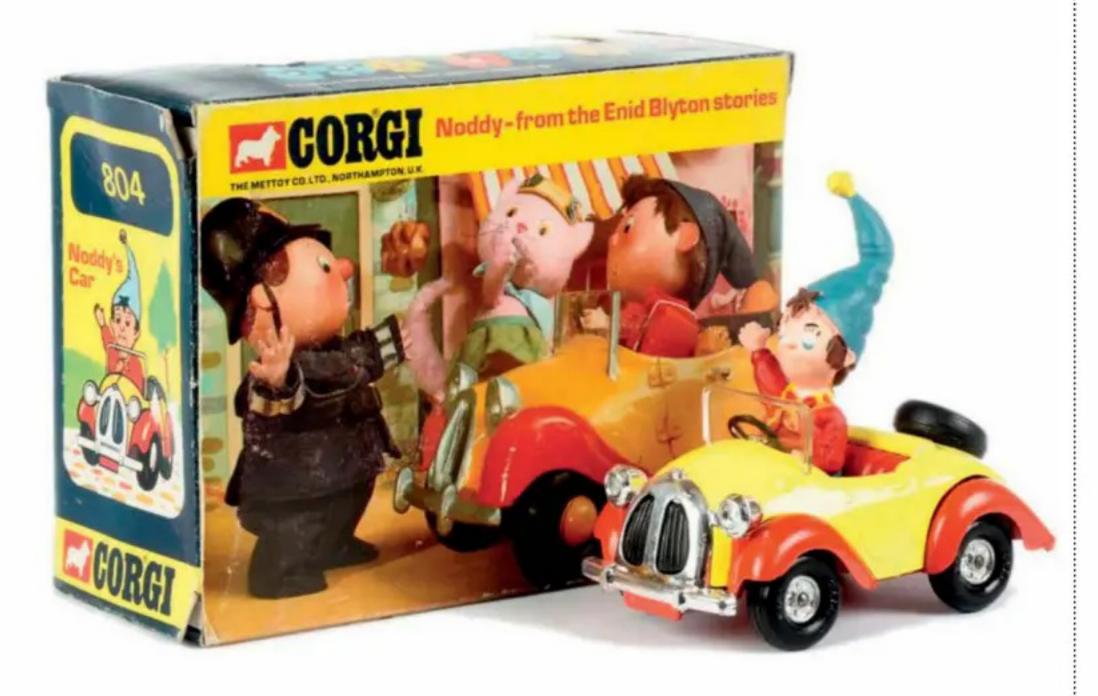

A wonderful replication of this popular Italian sportscar, it was released in silver, metallic green or metallic blue, all with a black roof panel. Finally, the impressive No.1155 Skyscraper Tower Crane featured a tracked base with a rotating body mounted on top. The long yellow booms folded for transportation and carried a red sling with building blocks when extended. Not a real vehicle, this model was made in Hong Kong.

Moving into September, the second (and sadly last) of Corgi's superb large-scale Formula 1 racers arrived in the shape of No.191 Texaco Marlboro McLaren F1 Racing Car. Replicating Emerson Fittipaldi's 1974 championship-winning M23, this car featured removable wheels too, but only a brief initial production run had a driver figure. There was also another new construction vehicle – No.1101 Warner & Swasey 4418 Hydraulic Crane. Yellow and black, the American design had plenty of features, including a rotating cab and an extending boom which could be raised and lowered as desired too.

Finally, for September, No.923 Sikorsky Skycrane US Army Helicopter was cast as a good likeness of the real aircraft, but was at a much smaller scale than the rest of the range at 1/145 scale. The plastic cargo pod, slung under the body, was moulded in plastic and can be released and reattached. The pod features an opening door and the blades rotate courtesy of a notched wheel to the rear of the fuselage. A second version was released the following month in civilian emergency livery as No.922 Sikorsky Skycrane Casualty Helicopter, with a red body and white pod.

As well as the second Sikorsky, October served up another gift set – GS17 Military Gift Set – which featured No.900 Tiger Tank (1/60 scale), No.906 Saladin Armoured Car (1/57) and No.920 Bell Helicopter (1/100). An interesting set, given the variety of scales – although the two ground vehicles were fairly close in this respect. Bell Helicopter could

be excused here, though, if it was flying a little way away, offering some sort of perspective. But I didn't care about this back then, it just offered super play value. One more release for October was a further addition to the 1/36 scale racing cars series. No.160 Hesketh 308 F1 Racing Car replicated the popular car well, as driven by James Hunt. White with patriotic blue and red stripes, the famous Hesketh Bear featured on the bespoke box too.

And to round out the year, December provided us with two more models. No.414 Coastguard Jaguar XJ12C, at 1/36 scale, added to the use of the lovely Jaguar casting, this time in white with roof-mounted sirens and blue stripes along the sides. No.703 Hi-Speed Fire Engine was another fanciful design, but a very attractive one nonetheless. Painted red, of course,

any (or indeed all) of these appeal, then you need look no further than Guisval.

Arguably not so well known over here in the UK, this Spanish company dates from the early 1960s and, in common with Gisima, was founded in Ibi, in Alicante. I gather that three Spaniards, namely Francisco Guillem, José Luis Serralta and Ramón Valero all had a say in its formation (and nomenclature); furthermore, it seems they were formerly affiliated to the Paya company, which has had

a long history in tinplate toy production.

o, what's your fancy? Are you into 1/64,

1/43, 1/24, 1/18 or 1/12 scale models? If

Early output centred upon toy watches and typewriters, but the company went on to produce model vehicles in the afore-mentioned scales. Today, the 1/87 scale seems pretty popular but as ever, 1/43 is not overlooked. In terms of period, you can go right back to the 1920s for truly vintage model cars – or be bang up to date with something like a roadgoing Ferrari. Quality is acceptable, but then these models are really marketed as toys: they are generally inexpensive and in the smaller scale, tend to ape the likes of Matchbox in terms of finish, wheels and so on. That said, some of the older output seems to be gaining a following, with the inevitable result that values are on the rise.

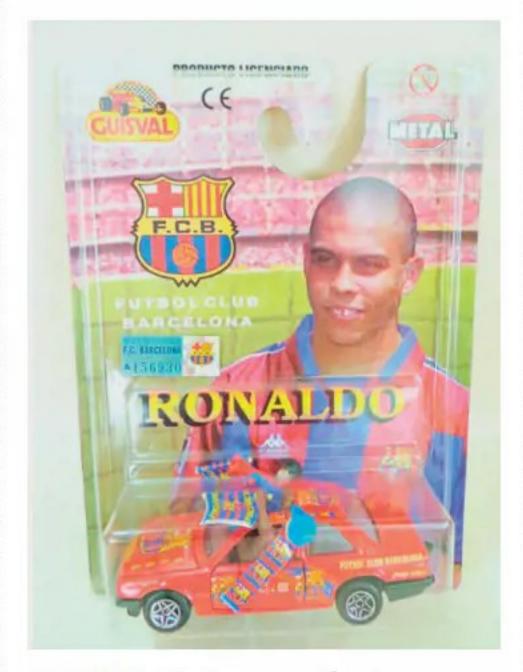
BEST LEFT?

In my book, you'll need to overlook an awful lot to want to start a collection of the Spanish range of diecast vehicles produced by Gisima.

Ibi (see above) was where it all started, although the company had but a brief lifespan of just two decades, finally closing its doors in 1998. In the early days, the enterprise was producing its own castings although copies of Hot Wheels and Matchbox toys have also been attributed to this company.

Its diecast offerings in 1/64 scale often turn up on internet auction sites and take the form of pencil sharpeners (yes, really), along with similar fare in the larger 1/43 scale.

In the bigger scale of 1/10 you can find bicycles (without riders), a slightly odd departure from road vehicles proper.

Quality, though, is what sets these artefacts apart. Expect peeling chrome, detaching transfers and a generally simplified appearance, all of which means that the range will appeal, perhaps, only to the most diehard collector of the obscure or arcane.

But at least your crayons will be sharp.

HOT STUFF!

H is for Hot Wheels – of course. Well, to be precise, Mattel, but rather than wait until the letter M, I thought I'd drop this range of vehicles into the series sooner, rather than later.

What can I say about Hot Wheels that has not already been said? Precious little, if I'm to be totally honest.

The year was 1968. The story goes that when Mattel's co-founder Elliot Handler saw his son playing



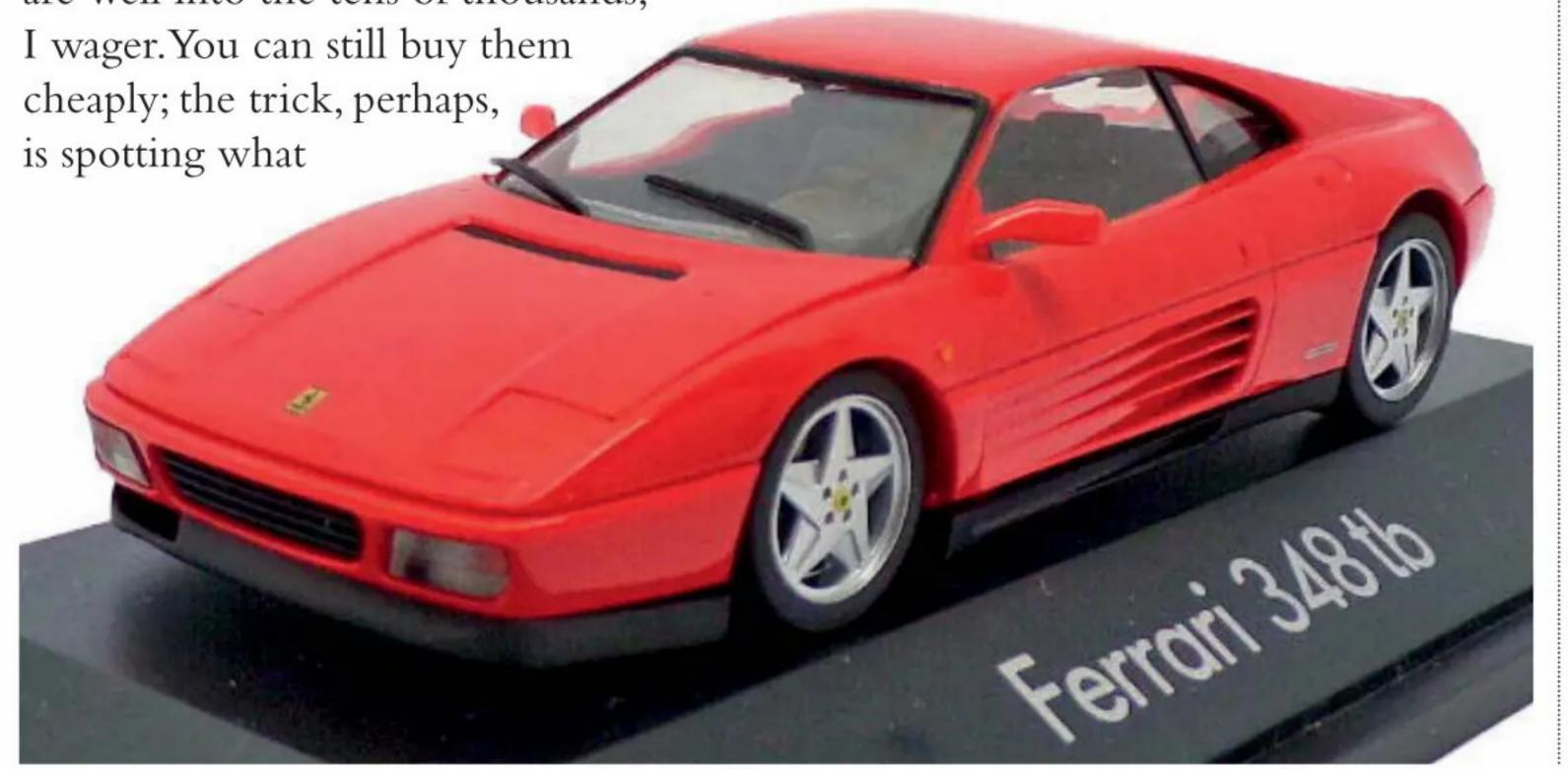
with some Matchbox toys, he felt the time was right to introduce a newcomer to the marketplace. But merely adding to the miniature diecast population wasn't the answer: something extra was required. Freely rolling wheels, proper suspension and colour schemes that had never been seen before were all mixed together – with the result that most readers know only too well.

Thus the Hot Wheels 1/64 scale Custom Camaro was released in May 1968, and was followed by 15 more vehicles. These first edition (Redline) models achieved fame as the "Sweet 16", and today some command huge premiums when found in good condition or in the more unusual colour variations.

Innovation was a driving force at Mattel. Not content to hide away these new toys in the depths of boxes, it decided to use the blister pack, itself a stroke of marketing genius, for it made the models stand out on the racks where they were suspended. And those wild colour schemes (with the moniker Spectraflame) would woo many a child looking to be relieved of his pocket money. That, and the occurrence of some customised designs, (a typical American affectation), the likes of which were not to be found in conservative, homegrown manufacturers' ranges, simply added to the appeal of Mattel's brainchild.

Hot Wheels is still flourishing today and has not limited itself to the small scale: its 1/18 models are not particularly cheap but are of good quality, and embrace some prestige marques as well as Formula One transport, with Ferrari a firm favourite. Added to these are some media vehicles, such as James Bond's Aston Martin and the Batmobile.

I couldn't tell you how many different small scale Hot Wheels vehicles are out there but the numbers are well into the tens of thousands,

will become collectable a few years down the line. As for those early models, time has taken its toll on some, so a degree of paintwork and baseplate toning is not unusual.

WINGS AND THINGS

Herpa is well known for its aviation model output and this German company has almost cornered the market in terms of small scale diecast commercial airline models: five scales are entertained, so there is something for every pocket (and indeed, shelf).

Founded in Dietenhofen, just after the Second World War, Herpa has a long history in toys, but it wasn't until 1980 that it introduced a range of trucks to the world. It initially worked with small scales (1/87, 1/160 and 1/220) for these, but went on to larger offerings, such as 1/50 and 1/43. As might be expected with German output, quality is high and finish is good on its models.

Road cars and rally cars can be found; buses and vans, too. And in 1/43 there are examples of showroom dealer models to seek out (such as Porsche, Audi and the like). Cars don't always boast opening features like bonnet, boot and doors but then this is atoned for by the quality of the castings and general level of detail. And for the money involved, they cannot be considered expensive collectables.

Really, though, road transport takes something of a back seat with this particular manufacturer, for its huge array of aviation models is what attracts the cognoscenti. Here, it's an extremely vast choice: first, choose your scale and second, your theme. Civil or military? Then check your cabinet space...

Car Carrier

n the 1950s and 60s newly designed cars were appearing on the roads and car showrooms had the latest models on display. I visited a number and managed to acquire the car brochures. At the time I was unaware of how the cars had been delivered and then one day I saw a car transporter in a side street unloading some new cars. As a collector of toy cars, I thought that there should be a model of a car transporter and then in 1953 the Dinky Toys Pullmore Car Transporter arrived. Other toy manufacturers also produced car transporters.

Following on the Dinky Supertoys Car Carrier (No.983) arrived in July 1958 finished in red and grey with grey wheels and has the transfer 'DINKY AUTO SERVICE' on each side of the Carrier and Trailer. You could also buy the items separately with the Car Carrier No.984 and the Trailer No.985.

The model is reviewed in the *Meccano Magazine* of July 1958 and is described as 'an excellent reproduction in miniature of a typical Carrier and Trailer used by car manufacturers for transporting new cars from their works to distributing agents or to docks for shipment overseas'. The back page colour advert states that 'the handle on the side of the Carrier lowers the top deck for easy loading'.

Using this mechanism, the Car Carrier is placed in front of the trailer, the top deck is lowered and the cars are driven up the ramp onto the top deck of the trailer. The next cars are then placed on the ramp and the handle



raises it. Unloading is done in reverse order.

They were sold in blue and white striped Supertoy card lift of lid boxes with packing pieces before deletion in 1963.

That year, 1963, the model reappeared with new colours but no trailer and was given the new number 989 and is still called a Car Carrier. The colours are now yellow for the cab and light grey for the back. The ramps are in blue and the rear ramp is in yellow but some are in all blue plus there are red wheels. The transfers on the sides

are now for 'AUTO TRANSPORTERS' in red. It is shown in the 1964 Dinky Toys Catalogue and was sold in a yellow illustrated card lift of lid box plus the packing pieces. It was also sold in the gold card and cellophane Visi pack export boxes.

The Leyland company was founded in 1896 and produced a number of steam wagons. In the early 1900s they turned to petrol engines and then later diesel engines. During the 1930s they produced the Bison, Beaver, Hippo, Bull and Rhino models often referred to as the 'Zoo' range of trucks. The Beaver chassis in particular was suitable for hauling trailers. Hence the Dinky Supertoys Car Carrier was based on this type of 'real' Leyland and possibly someone at Meccano had seen the 'real' Leyland Land Rover carrier and trailer carrying Land Rovers.

Carrying on from its regular wheels origins, Kennel Truck was, like No.6 Pick Up, based on the Ford F-Series. Painted in various shades (all fabulous) of metallic green, the rear of the casting was divided into four sections that each housed a different breed of dog in white plastic. These were protected for the journey by a clear plastic canopy.

Initially fitted with the narrow Superfasts, the wider versions were fitted once appropriate modifications had been made. At the same time, the paint job changed to a rather splendid non-metallic lime green.

Various colours of grille and base can be found from its extended production run.

ARTICULATED TRUCK

Production: 1973-80 Catalogue: 1974-80 Box Styles: I, L

This was another new release largely based on an

existing model, in this case Freeway Gas Tanker from the previous year. The tractor cab was exactly the same, but the tanker section was now replaced by an open cargo trailer. The cab was painted yellow with a black plastic base and grille, while the trailer was light blue with yellow base. Early versions had a striped label along the top of the trailer, although this was soon dropped. The cab windows were normally purple, but could also be red-tinted.

Like Freeway Gas Tanker, Articulated Truck was also used in the Two-Packs range. In this guise, it was fitted with a towing hook and accompanied by a new Articulated Trailer.

HARLEY DAVIDSON

Production: 1980-82 Catalogue: 1981-82 Box Styles: L

Based on a Harley-Davidson Sportster, this chunky model bike featured fine spoked wheels that had originally been used in the Models of Yesteryear range. It had an accurate chromed representation of a Harley V-Twin engine, although the turning front forks and handlebars were only ever made in black plastic.

The model was only produced in the one colour, a metallic brown, although some examples had a much more coppery finish. Some later versions included a rider figure in the box.

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WHAT'S IN A NAME...

I WAS very pleased to see the latest release from the Corgi Model Club, Corgi No.246, a beautifully executed, finely detailed model from surely Corgi's golden period and a most welcome addition. The only issue I have is that it is not a Chrysler Imperial, nor even a Chrysler "Imperial" as written on the box: it is a model of the 1965 Imperial Crown. Imperial was the Chrysler Corporation's luxury brand from 1955 to 1975 (with a slight return from '81 to '83) to compete with Ford's Lincoln and GM's Cadillac divisions: the Imperial name had been previously used for a Chrysler model but by 1955 it had become a marque in its own right. So, while yes it was built by the Chrysler Corporation, it would be no more appropriate for Corgi to call this the Chrysler Imperial than it would to name their Lincoln Continental a "Ford Lincoln" nor their (Rockets) Cadillac Eldorado a "General Motors Cadillac".

Funnily enough, Corgi actually made two models of the Imperial Crown, though I suspect unwittingly, because the very similar 1966 Crown was the basis of the Green Hornet's Black Beauty. But all this got me thinking about the many other mis-named models from not just Corgi but seemingly all the other toymakers of the period, and wondering why they found it necessary to "deviate from the script". Why, for example, did Corgi's Gift Set 10 feature, along with the trailer and boat, a Marlin Rambler when the car itself was a Rambler Marlin (or AMC Marlin from 1966)? Admittedly the original release was titled Marlin by Rambler but why go to that much trouble when Rambler Marlin is perfectly sufficient? You would hardly expect the #252 to be termed a "2000 by Rover". And why name their Ferrari 250LM as a Ferrari Berlinetta 250 Le Mans? It can't be denied that it was a berlinetta, nor that the LM stood for Le Mans but the actual car was never referred to thus so why not just 250LM? And as for their model of the De Tomaso Mangusta, why on earth waste all that ink incorrectly naming it the "Ghia 5000 Mangusta with De Tomaso Chassis". Again, it has truth in that it was styled by Giorgetto Giugiaro at Ghia but the car itself was never called the Ghia Mangusta any more than the Lotus Elan was called a "Ron Hickman S2 Elan with Lotus Chassis". I wouldn't be surprised if a child got bored halfway through it and went off to buy something else!



As I say, it wasn't just Corgi who did this. Matchbox referred to their model of the Ferrari 250GT Lusso as the Ferrari Berlinetta, probably confusing kids of the day who had bought the aforementioned Corgi. Again, not incorrect as it is also a berlinetta but why did they feel the need to change it? When it came to their #45 which they termed the Ford Group 6, that is admittedly confusing as this car had two names, being Ford P68 or Ford F3L but this seems to have baffled them so much they just reverted to describing it by the category in which it raced rather than using either correct appellation. At least these examples had some basis from which to fabricate their own names but when Dinky attempted to revise their Ford GT – as the first 12 prototypes of the GT40 were labelled by Ford – into the 1966 third iteration, how did they come up with the fictitious name "Ford 40-RV"? As far as I am aware, Ford have never built a car called a 40-RV and if they have, it didn't look like this.

My point is, what was wrong with calling all these what they actually were instead of inventing new names? There are so many more examples that I'm sure a whole magazine article could be written on the subject, or maybe a series, if someone wanted to devote their time to it.

REGISTRATION NUMBERS

IN his "Feathers in our Cap" article in July's Diecast Collector Nigel Robertshaw wrote, "There was also a local independent [bus company] that operated a former Guy Arab demonstrator which still retained its 'GUY 3' registration; what might that be worth today?" I have been doing some research on the history of this number. Guy Motors had the registrations GUY 1-7 on various company vehicles. GUY 3 was originally put onto a 1948 Guy Arab 35-seater demonstrator in that year. In 1951 the mark was transferred to a 40-seater Guy Arab demonstrator. This was sold off to West Wales Motors complete with plate – I guess at some point the demonstrator had been used as a public service vehicle, so under the rules then applying the mark could not be transferred so Guy Motors could not keep the number. It passed through the ownership of a couple of independent companies

before being acquired by Samuel Ledgard of Leeds in 1957. They withdrew it in 1967. The number is now on a Jaguar XKR Coupe transfers involving public service vehicles are now permitted. I would

not like to speculate how much the number is worth.

JOHNNY LIGHTNING

■ I ALWAYS enjoy Mike Piggott's articles – he covers the obscure and arcane corners of the diecast world. As a Johnny Lightning collector, I was very interested in his coverage of the "Truckin' America" series in the February 2024 issue – 10 vehicles issued in four series, 421-01 to 421-04, yielding 40 variations. Here is some extra information. I know Mike knows about the limited White Lightning issues – essentially what are commonly referred to these days as "chase" cars. These are "deliberate rarities" and do not appeal to everybody. Some part(s) of a White Lightning issue will be in white, be it interior, body, base, wheels or tires, or a combination thereof. I was surprised that he did not mention the White Lightnings, since there was one for every regular issue, which means there are actually 80 variations for the Truckin' America series. Although the White Lightnings look similar, there were differences in each issue. My Truckin' America interest is limited to the "59 El Caminos. In the photo below, top to bottom, are issues 421-01 to 421-04 with corresponding White Lightnings beside. As Mike pointed out, the five-spoke mag wheels changed between the second and third issues. Tires also went from plastic to rubber and included whitewalls. All White Lightnings have the later mags with rubber tires but no whitewalls. 421-01 and 02 had raw cast bases. 421-03 and 04 had chromed bases. This information may clear up any confusion for someone taking an interest in the Truckin' America series.

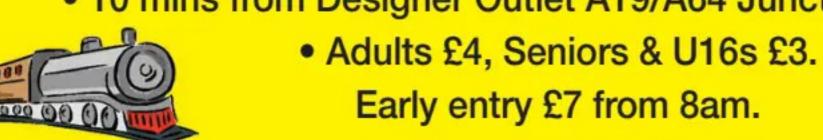
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A FEMALE PERSPECTIVE

Hazel Ralston considers the world of model collecting, through different eyes...

Women in motors sport

or my birthday, I received a gift voucher for an experience which I was really looking forward to: a chance to drive six laps at the wheel of a Ferrari California at Ingliston race track near Edinburgh.

It has to be said that I was one of relatively few women trying out the cars – and I have to admit, definitely the oldest! It was, perhaps, not the best experience, as I hadn't accounted for the other five drivers racing round the track and I'm afraid I didn't break any speed records. Lewis Hamilton and Max Verstappen have no need to worry!

I began to consider the number of women in motorsport and, although it doesn't attract as much publicity as, for example, women's football, there are in fact plenty of ways in which girls are competing in motor racing today. The 'Iron Dames' have been entering all-female driving teams in the FIA World Endurance Championship and at the 24 Hours of Le Mans since 2020. Former driver, Susie Wolff (wife of the Mercedes Team Principal Toto Wolff) runs the F1 Academy dedicated to bringing women into motor sport and in the current season there will be all-female series running alongside F1 races on seven of the world's circuits.

Nevertheless, it remains true that no female driver is currently competing on equal terms with the men in Formula 1. Yet, a look back into motoring history shows that there's been no shortage of pioneering women in motor sport, of whom the most remarkable was a French woman called Hélène Delangle. Using the name Hellé Nice, she achieved world-wide fame in the 1920s and 1930s, not only by repeatedly winning the women's Grand Prix title, but driving for Bugatti and Alfa Romeo in major events where the other competitors were all male. After World War Two she found it difficult to get sponsorship and gradually sank into obscurity. Her story is told in a book by Miranda Seymour

entitled *The Bugatti Queen*, which traces her sad decline from superstar status to death in poverty in 1984.

There's a 1/18 scale model of the Bugatti from CMC (which stands for Classic Model Cars, a German company founded in 1995 by Herbert Nickerl) and this comes with a figure of a female racing driving who is clearly based on Hellé Nice. This is very much a high-end specialist product, made up of a total of 926 separate parts to ensure that no detail is overlooked, from the 'fully functional compound springs on front and rear axles' to the wheels with their 'flange mounted

finned drums'. The seats are even made of real leather. Obviously, all this doesn't come cheaply: this particular version of the Bugatti was originally listed in 2019 at a price of 373 Euros (nearly £320) and was produced in a limited edition of 600.

While Corgi Vanguards and others are to be congratulated for making various models of rally cars associated with well-known female drivers such as Pat Moss and Ann Wisdom, I would say there is still potential for model manufacturers to explore the historical role of women in motor racing, particularly as far as more affordable 1/43 models are concerned.

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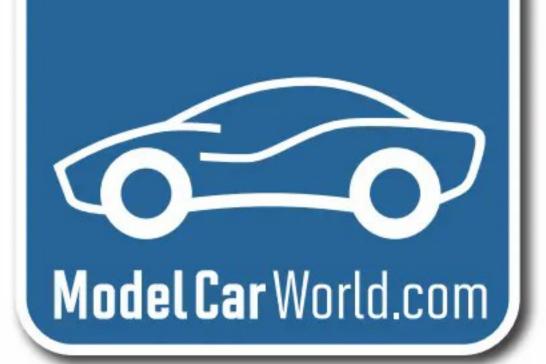

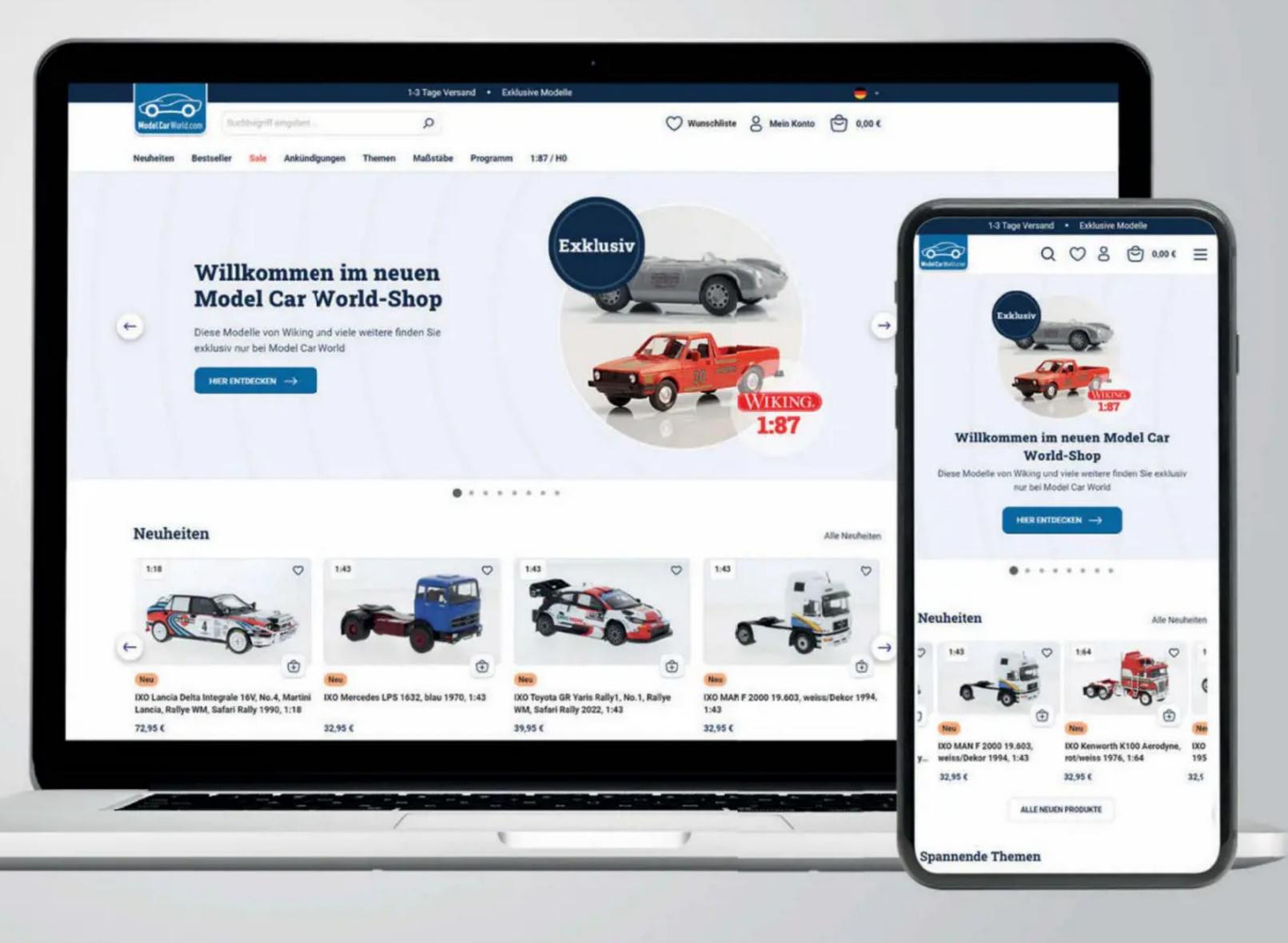

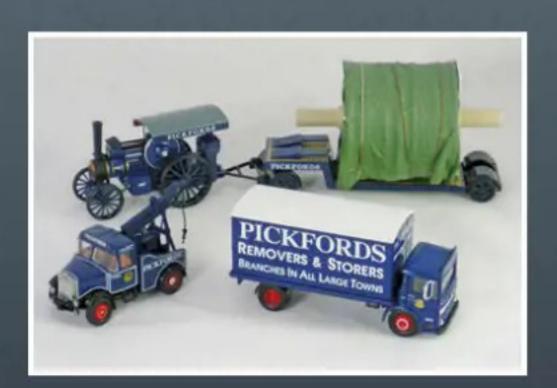

Corgi TV&Film



One of the successes
of the Corgi Toys range

t all started with The Saint's Volvo P-1800 (258) that was released in the spring of 1965. Roger Moore, the archetypal English gentleman, played the role of The Saint in the very popular TV series with the same name. Corgi used the basic Volvo P -1800 (228), painted it white, added a driving figure with a tuxedo and the logo of The Saint on the bonnet. Three variations of this logo exist: in black on a white bonnet, in white on a red bonnet and in white on a blue bonnet. The last version is scarce and in total 1,159,000 (+ 1969 sales) cars were sold. A huge success for a relatively simple

In October 1965 Corgi released the even more successful James Bond Aston Martin DB5 (261). Using the existing Aston Martin body (218) which was actually a DB4, Marcel Van Cleemput and his staff cramped the model with three features not shown before: ejector seat with flip-up roof, rear bullet-proof shield and flick-out overriders and hidden machine guns. The figure of James Bond nicely resembles Sean Connery who drove this car in "Goldfinger". Also "the baddie" appears to have walked in directly from the picture: an Asiatic gunslinger in a blue overall. A total of 3,974,000 (+ 1969 sales) were sold.

In January 1966 The Avengers Set was released as Gift Set 40. A great set of two cars that were already available in the Corgi range and could be converted with little modification into a new TV related Gift Set: the 1927 3 litre Bentley

(9002) and the Lotus Elan S2 Roadster (318). The figures of John Steed (Patrick Macnee) and Emma Peel (Diana Rigg) were of course included. Emma in her very '60s white trouser suit and French beret, with John in a classic Saville Road outfit and bowler hat. A wonderful diorama offers ample room for both cars, Emma Peel standing next to her car and Steed's 3 umbrella's. On the back of the diorama there is an "in depth" story telling that the cars of cinema and TV heroes and heroines were chosen with great care to fit the characters. 190,000 (+1969 sales) passed the counter.

By already having a basic model at hand that could be re-engineered to fit a special edition, the Oldsmobile "The man from U.N.C.L.E. (497), released in August 1966, showed once again Corgi's

prowess. The pre-existing Oldsmobile Super 88 Sheriff Car (237) and standard saloon version (235) formed the basis for this "Trush-buster" as used in the successful TV-series that started in September 1964. Napoleon Solo at the wheel and next to him Ilya Kuryakin, both firing their guns from the side

was used in the BBC TV series *The World* of *Wooster* and Corgi happened to have one on stock. Marcel Van Cleemput considered the model somewhat of a flop as sales in 1967 only reached 34,000. Nevertheless a clever extension of the production life of this wonderful Bentley!

With some small modifications

Judy the chimpanzee, a tiger on the bonnet instead of the spare wheel and the doctor's assistant Paula sitting astride Clarence, the lion. The box has an appealing top card showing Clarence, the doctor and Paula. On the back Judy shows an elephant with a dental problem the way to the Wameru Subdistrict hospital.

The Green Hornet's Black Beauty (268), released in November 1967, and selling 345,000 (+ 1969 sales) was based on an American TV series. Although the Green Hornet had the lead in the series, in real life the actual hero turned out to be Kato, played by Bruce Lee. It was the first time that his Kung Fu fighting style was seen outside the movie theatres of Chinatown. The masked figures of the Green Hornet and Kato are seated in the back and behind the wheel. The Green Hornet fires his gun from the open window. Together with the rocket firing platform behind the grill at the front, the boot with a launch pad for plastic radar scanners, green windows and an enormous Green Hornet logo on the roof. This is a great, but possibly somewhat underrated, model.

The second version of the famous James Bond Aston Martin DB5 (270) was issued in February 1968. It now had the correct silver spray and with added features compared with the first issue of October 1965 (261). It had sales of 1,172,000 (+1969 sales). The added features were the three-sided revolving number plates at the front and the rear, and the fitting of tyre slashers in the rear wheels.

Another make-over of the Land Rover (438), was in the style of the Daktari Set. Now white with the same black striping, brought the Lions of Longleat as Gift Set 8 in August 1968, with 357,000 (+ 1969 sales). Included are a warden standing up from the cabin through a manhole

windows. Of great detail are the 3 bullet holes in the front screen. According to the text on the diorama U.N.C.L.E. stands for United Network Command for Law and Enforcement, an "organisation pledged to protect the welfare and interests of people and nations anywhere in the world from the forces of evil". So you could say the armed wing of the United Nations. The Headquarters of U.N.C.L.E were situated a few blocks away from the United Nations building. A blue and a more scarce white version of this car are known. Total sales: 1,479,000 (+1969 sales).

Another TV related and blockbuster was the Batmobile (267), released in October 1966. Around 5 million Batmobiles were sold, becoming the best selling car for Corgi. The figures of Batman (alias Bruce Wayne) and Robin The Boy Wonder are included. The first version of the Batmobile had gold hubs and red bat emblems. The diorama coming with this first type is full of action, the Batmobile racing through the cave, slashing a chain with the blade up front, at the same time firing its rockets from behind the cockpit. On the back of the diorama the Batman story is summarized in English, French and German.

February 1967 saw the release of the *The World of Wooster* Bentley (9004), identical to the Bentley in the Avengers Gift Set. There is some doubt whether Bertie Wooster and his manservant Jeeves who played the leading parts in the famous books by P.G.Wodehouse, drove a Bentley. In any case, a Bentley Corgi generated another nice Gift Set from existing models like Batman's Batmobile and Batboat (Gift Set 3), issued in June 1967. Take the original Batmobile (267), fit a tow hook, add the hull of the Dolphin 20 Cabin Cruiser (104) with a new superstructure, large fin and Batman logo, use the Wincheon Trailer in a shortened version, equipped with square mudguards and two springs to clip on the Batboat, paint the trailer gold, add some operating and secret instructions and a new Gift Set is born. With sales figures over 1.5 million to boot!

The James Bond Toyota 2000 GT (336, October 1967) was again a wonderful film related model. This time from the Bond film *You Only Live Twice* in which a young Sean Connery is rescued by Aki Wakabayashi of the Japanese Secret Service, from Osato's gunmen in a cream white Toyota 2000 GT Convertible. The Toyota only existed as a saloon, two convertibles were especially made for the picture and one is still surviving in the Toyota museum. The special feature is of course the rocket firing mechanism in the boot. It sold a total of 768,000 (+1969 sales).

Daktari was a big success on British television and November 1967 saw the release of the Daktari Set (Gift Set 7). Once again it appeared a lucky coincidence that Corgi had the Land Rover (438) used by Dr Marsh Tracy already in the range. It only needed some restyling with zebra striping and the addition of figures of the doctor,



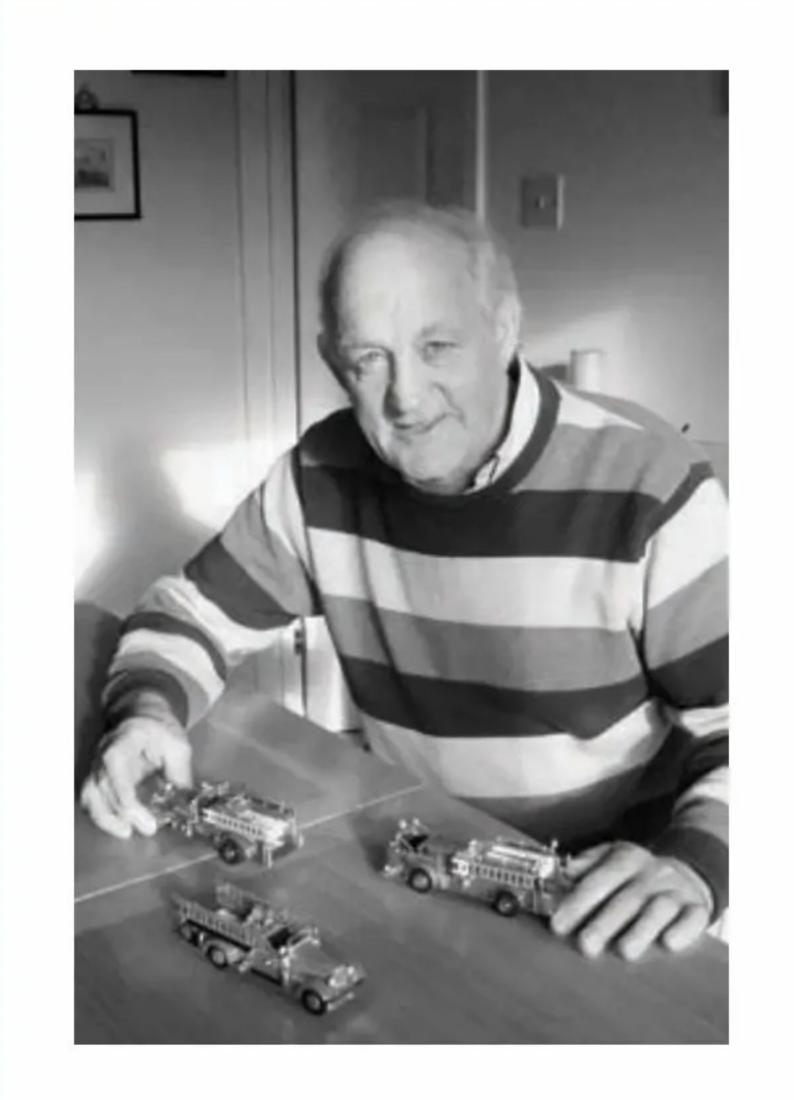
Shaping the Diecast Hobby Paul Lumsdon meets the man who spent 50 years designing for Corgi

o my mind one of the keys to the success of any leading brand is good product design. Here, Corgi has been uniquely lucky. From its conception, and throughout the decades, Corgi has been known for innovation in diecast design and has led the way for others to follow. It is no coincidence that for nearly 50 of those 60 years, there was one constant factor underpinning the excellence of Corgi design – and that constant was Terry Fox!

I recently caught up with Terry at his home in Northampton, where he is now happily retired and enjoying more time travelling (he has a son in Canada), walking, gardening and generally enjoying life!

Terry started working on Corgi Toys as a young apprentice in September 1963. He was employed by Corgi's parent company, Mettoy, at their design offices in Northampton. It was a five year apprenticeship which saw Terry initially working in the tool room and progressing through various other departments as he learned about all aspects of toy production. For his final six months he was moved to the drawing office and introduced to product design.

His first job was to design moulds. As Terry says; 'you really need to understand how moulds work in order to be able to design successful toys'. After successfully completing his apprenticeship Terry remained

in the drawing office and started working on full product designs. His mentor at this time was Corgi's Chief Designer, Marcel Van Cleemput, who taught him all aspects of diecast model design, from initial research, measuring and photographing a vehicle, right through to individual component design.

The 1970s were challenging times, not only for Corgi Toys, but for all of Mettoy's

brands and in 1981, after posting record losses, the Northampton site was closed as all production moved to the company's Swansea factory. Rather than re-locate Terry and a small group of designers set up their own office in Northampton and continued to work independently, but exclusively on Corgi toy design work.

At the end of 1989 Corgi was bought by US toy giant Mattel and the offices were moved to Leicester whilst production was transferred to China. At this point Terry decided to move on and work for himself. He set up his own design studio at home and through his contacts he was lucky enough to be invited to work as a freelance designer for Mattel on Corgi's new ranges.

Further change came in 1995 when Chris Guest, head of Corgi within Mattel, led a successful management buyout and set up Corgi Classics, based in Leicester. He immediately contacted Terry and persuaded him to join the new venture as his Design Manager. Terry accepted and began the next phase of his career.

With production offices in Hong Kong and factories based in mainland China Terry's role became split. Research and design work was completed in the UK and then the design 'packs' were handed over to the far east team. To ensure everything was properly interpreted and actioned, Terry made regular trips to Hong Kong and into the factories to check the designs and product quality. This threw up some new



challenges for Terry as he explains; 'In China the factories were very labour intensive so assembly times became critical. It was therefore essential to ensure designs were as simple as possible to maximise efficient production and keep the costs down'.

In 2000 Corgi established a new team in the USA and again Terry took on a key role in the design of the bespoke new US ranges. He made several trips to the Corgi Chicago offices and

travelled to various parts of the USA researching primarily US fire, bus and truck ranges.

In 2008 Corgi was sold to Hornby Hobbies. Terry remained as part of a small Leicester based team working on Corgi designs for three more years until in 2011 Hornby moved the brand to its Margate offices. Terry was made redundant, just one year short of his official retirement, and having worked on the Corgi brand for 48 years in total.

AA27603 Hawker Hurricane Mk.I V7357/SD-F, Sgt. J.H 'Ginger' Lacey, RAF No.501 Squadron, Gravesend, Sep 1940

The exploits of the glorious 'Few' during the Battle of Britain are the stuff of legend and standing right at the head of this illustrious group of men was James 'Ginger' Lacey, Hurricane pilot and proud son of Yorkshire. Flying throughout the Battle of Britain, Lacey was credited with eighteen aerial victories, making him the second highest scoring British fighter ace of the Battle – each of these victories was gained whilst flying the trusty Hawker Hurricane. This latest Hurricane release

is an essential addition to any Battle of Britain collection.

The Hawker Hurricane is arguably the most important aircraft in the history of the Royal Air Force, specifically as it heralded the development of the modern, monoplane fighter. It combined the finest construction techniques already in place with the best biplane aircraft and was relatively easy to manufacture - the Hurricane was certainly the right aeroplane at the right time and in Britain's hour of need, proved to be absolutely crucial. During the savage dogfights of the Battle of Britain, the Hurricane accounted for more Luftwaffe aircraft destroyed than all other British aircraft combined. A magnificent gun platform, the Hurricane could also absorb significant battle damage and still bring its pilot home - this was critical in Britain's eventual success and was rather reassuring for the Hurricane pilot.

AA36012 BAE Hawk **RAF Red Arrows**

Providing advanced pilot and weapons delivery training for a new or converting student pilot is perhaps one of the most important duties undertaken by any of the world's air forces. For Royal Air Force students, this means many



hours spent in the cockpit of the British Aerospace Hawk advanced jet trainer, which has now been in service for forty years. Replacing the diminutive Folland Gnat trainer, the Hawk proved to be a highly adaptable and extremely reliable aircraft in service, with large numbers serving with the RAF and many overseas air forces. Perhaps the Hawk is most famous for its association with the world famous Royal Air Force Aerobatic Display Team, the Red Arrows, who enjoy a reputation for excellence the world over.
