



### NORTHCORD UNVEILS NEW HAMPSHIRE BUS

NORTHCORD Model

Company has announced the release of its 22nd Alexander Dennis Enviro400 MMC model, showcasing the iconic Hampshire Bus livery. The latest addition, UKBUS 6535, is a detailed 10.9-metre, single-door, casting of fleet number



10700 (YEL 4T), originally registered as SN66 VVL when new to Stagecoach South in 2017.

The model replicates the bus's retro design, celebrating the 40th anniversary of Hampshire Bus, a company formed in 1983 to serve Andover, Basingstoke, Winchester, and Southampton. Originally part of the Hants & Dorset network, Hampshire Bus was the first National Bus Company subsidiary privatized in 1987 by Skipburn Ltd. It eventually became part of the Stagecoach brand in the early 2000s.

To mark the anniversary, Stagecoach South unveiled fleet 10700 in the heritage livery in March 2023. The UKBUS 6535 model features the red and blue wedge design, paying homage to the mid-1980s original, as well as detailed branding, including "Proud to serve Hampshire since 1983." It also displays route activ8 to Salisbury via Tidworth and Bulford.

Northcord's model boasts great details like square gasket-mounted windows, a tree deflector, and realistic interior handrails. Limited to 1,008 units, this particular model is available for pre-order at www. modelbus.uk (or your preferred retailer) and is expected by late February.

# LATEST BROOKLIN COLLECTORS' CLUB MODEL

**THE** annual model for members of the Brooklin Collectors' Club has been issued. It is the 1957 Packard Clipper Town Sedan, a radically upgraded model based on BRK 171 from the range.

Finished in 2-tone turquoise/ white, the level of detail on the new version is remarkable for white metal (which is considered much more difficult to work with than the more commonly-seen resin), and extends to the tiny motifs in the centre of the grille and on the "C" pillars. The detailed wheel trims are also worthy of note,

and of course the overall level of finish is top-class.

Just 90 models have been made, and virtually all have been issued to the club members who have ordered them, meaning if you'd like one you will need to be quick!

# JAGUAR ON THE PROWL

MATRIX Models has announced the release of its latest 1/43 scale resin creation, due in January 2025. Renowned for their exceptional craftsmanship, Matrix Models continue to deliver high-quality collectibles, and this model is no exception. With meticulous attention to detail and a flawless paint finish, it is set to captivate collectors and Jaguar enthusiasts alike.

The model, which is a beautiful tribute to the Jaguar XJ (XJ40), will be available in three striking color schemes: red metallic, blue metallic, and British Racing Green. Priced at £118.99, collectors might find it for around £90 at selected retailers.

The Jaguar XJ (XJ40) is an iconic full-size luxury saloon produced by Jaguar from 1986 to 1994. This second-generation XJ was designed to replace the Series III and holds historical significance as the last car

Jaguar before its acquisition by Ford. Known for its innovation and refined engineering, the XJ40 is still celebrated as a masterpiece of its era.

The XJR variant, which serves as the inspiration for the Matrix Model, stood apart from standard XJ40 models with its aggressive yet elegant feel. It featured a fiberglass bodycolored body kit, including bespoke front and rear valances and side skirts. A distinctive black grille adorned with a Jaguar Sport badge, and unique Speedline alloy wheels with wider tires, added to its appeal.

By 1991, the XJR underwent notable changes, adopting rectangular headlights from the Sovereign model and a revamped body kit design. With only a few hundred units produced in each configuration, the XJR remains a rare gem in automotive history, cherished by collectors.


# DIECAST BOOKSHOP

#### **DURHAM** Classics enthusiast Bernard

Veale has published a hardback edition of his popular and comprehensive guide to the range of Durham Classics white metal hand-built models.

Whereas the original smaller-format paperback edition, published some four years ago, was designed to be carried around by collectors, this new one is "for the shelf", and for reference at home. Once again it covers every model that Durham Classics has made, with colour photographs of each.

To summarize the history, Durham Classics was started in Oshawa, Ontario, (just outside Toronto) in 1985, by British expat couple Julian and Margaret Stewart. Julian had been involved in the early days of Brooklin Models, as a pattern maker, when they were made in Canada. When that company relocated back to the UK, he set up Durham Classics to make his own range of white metal models in 1/43 scale. The venture was successful and over the next 28 years or so, models of cars and light trucks, many with a distinct Canadian interest. They were manufactured by the Stewarts and their skilled team of artisans, with everything produced in-house and by hand. The quality and finish were universally praised, and the models have stood the test of time extremely well. They are still justifiably popular with specialist collectors today. Numerous variations on the same basic casting were a feature, though quantities were limited, in many later cases to a production of just 60 standard-range models, and with many special commissions, some made in even fewer numbers.

My only criticism is that the history of the company is written in the present tense, leading readers to believe that it is still going, whereas production stopped on Julian's retirement some ten years ago, and this is an important detail for all to note.

That aside however, if you don't have the original edition, this is an excellent guide for all collectors.



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




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### CHICAGO TOY SHOW Charles Barnett went State-side...

**GREAT** sunny weather encouraged dealers and collectors from far and wide to this ever-popular show. The event had expanded to fill all 6 covered halls, the atrium and three covered outdoor pavilions of the Kane County Fairgrounds in the pretty town of St Charles, about 40 miles west of Chicago.

In its 51st year, no less, it retains its popularity by changing with the times and fashions, so the trend toward the popular action figures, Star Wars and

similar, is continuing. However, among the hundreds of tables, there was certainly plenty of diecast and tinplate to be had, as well as the pressed steel toys, plastic kits and promotional cars that are so popular in the USA.

Prices were generally similar to those in the UK, and the good exchange rate for sterling against the dollar, helped as well.

The show was crowded from opening to closing time, and it was encouraging to see so many younger collectors and families







there, though they tended towards the action figures, comic books and similar, reflecting the popular trends.

Next year's three dates are already fixed for 27th April, 27th July and 26th October.

# What's new...

# WHEN A PRIVATEER FRENCH TEAM SET THE OUTRIGHT SPEED RECORD AT LE MANS

erard Welter and Michel Meunier, two of Peugeot's design team (Welter was responsible for the styling of the 205, among many other designs), decided in 1969 to create a racing car in their spare time, based on a Peugeot 204. Over the years, they became more and more involved and, in 1976, the WM team made its debut at Le Mans with a potentially front-running GTP car (a closed-body sports prototype) powered by a very modified version of the production Peugeot PRV V6 engine. The car, built with the help of a team of volunteers, harnessed all the true spirit of the privateers at Le Mans and achieved some impressive results, but struggled to compete with the factory Group C cars that arrived from 1982.

So Welter and Meunier decided to concentrate their efforts and limited budget on a new goal – to exceed the 400km/h (250mph) barrier on the Hunaudières (Mulsanne) straight. The car built for the Project 400 project was a natural evolution of previous designs that had come out of the team's humble base at Thorigny Sur Marne.

For the 1987 race, WM's new P87 comprised the familiar aluminium monocoque chassis with a central backbone. To achieve the aerodynamic efficiency required for this ambitious objective, a new and considerably wider body was created. The two team principals still worked for Peugeot and the car manufacturing giant gave the team some support with continued development of the engine. For the P87, it was now just over 2.8 litres and was fitted with two

turbochargers. Peugeot also gave the team access to its wind tunnel.

PEUGEOT

Just before the race, the new WM reached 416km/h on a new section of highway that was not yet open to the public. The Peugeot-engined machine looked set to set the outright speed record at Le Mans. Unfortunately, 1987 was the year that the fuel supplied to many of the cars was of poor quality, resulting in several engine failures – not even the factory Porsches escaped. The WM P87 lasted just 13 laps, having already achieved 381km/h (a new record).

The team built a new car for 1988, the WM P88, which differed only in a few details – a slightly larger engine and revised rear suspension. The team also entered the P87 fitted with the same upgrades. During the race, the updated P87 retired after just 13 laps with transmission failure and the P88 was experiencing engine management issues. After sitting in the pits for over three and a half hours, the P88 was sent back out with Roger Dorchy behind the wheel. He turned up the turbo boost and he was officially clocked at the radar point at over 400km/h for several laps. Although the fastest run was 407km/h, the official figure was set at 405km/h (253mph), possibly as the race just happened to coincide with the launch of the new Peugeot 405.

Running at the maximum turbo boost, coupled with the earlier problems saw the P88 return quickly to the pits, pretty much cooked! For the 1990 race, two

chicanes had been added to the long straight after an FIA directive, ensuring that the P88 will most likely forever hold the record.

Spark's large-scale resin model of this incredibly significant racing car is simply stunning. The beautifully simple lines of the body are perfectly rendered and the finish is sublime, with the very slight sparkle to the green wonderfully recreated. Everything about this model screams quality, as is to be expected from this most impressive modelmaker.

## NEW MOTORHOME WITH A BRITISH TWIST

hen General Motors decided to build a motorhome, they started with a clean-sheet, and the results were as innovative as the styling suggests.

The powerful 455 cu.in. (7460 cc) engine and transmission from the front-wheel-drive Oldsmobile Toronado and Cadillac Eldorado, produced 265 bhp. The bodywork was made from aluminium and fibreglass to minimize weight, all to facilitate relaxed long-distance cruising. The FWD design also allowed a low interior floor, and the airbag rear suspension made for a comfortable ride. Customers could choose from 15 interior layout options, and all of this meant the motorhome was a good seller, some 13000 being built over the 5-year period.

Not often seen in the UK, one exception was its adoption by the flamboyant and maverick Hesketh Formula One team, famous both for its lavish lifestyle and for launching James Hunt on his path to the F1 World Championship. Their example, finished in White with Red striping and the team logo became a familiar sight at major European circuits at the time.

The new Automodello, in resin, is beautifully moulded and finished, and the level of detail is excellent. All the exterior motifs and louvres are replicated, down to those on the roof-mounted air-conditioning box. Inside, the cockpit detail can easily

be appreciated through the large windscreen, and the internal fittings can be seen through the heavily-tinted side and rear windows.

Besides the authentic Hesketh version there are versions in authentic "Glacier White" with blue striping and "Palm Beach Green" with toning green stripes. The model is a beauty, but only 143 of each version are to be made.

### NEW RELEASE OF FLAGSHIP TRACTOR

endt launched its new award-winning, midrange 600 series tractor range at Agritechnica in 2023 and Universal Hobbies has recently released this model of the 165kW flagship tractor. Like the full size tractor the model sets new standards for Universal Hobbies. The largely metal and newly tooled model has good levels of detailing and many working feature not seen on Universal Hobbies' previous models.

On the tractor's front there is a working threepoint linkage, with rams supporting the lower links and an adjustable length top link. The front wheels steer and the hinged bonnet lifts to reveal engine bay detail. There are work lights, folding mirrors, warning beacons and aerial detailed on the cab. Also, in a first for Universal Hobbies, both the cab doors and rear window open. The excellent detailing continues inside the cab which has grey patterned matting, grey seats and detailed steering column. On the driver's seat armrest there's a monitor with detailed screen.

For attaching at the rear the tractor's provided with a simple pin for attaching trailed equipment and a working linkage with quick release ends. Two rams support the lower arms and a slide under the rear axle locks them in the raised position. The top link length adjusts, it has colour-coded hydraulic connectors and a European style drawbar detailed. **UNIVERSAL** HOBBIES Fendt 620 Vario Tractor

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# JOIN KEN & MARY IN TAKING THIS WILD LBWK SKYLINE FOR A TEST DRIVE

issan's mighty Skyline really needs no introduction, having been around since 1967 when the company merged with the Prince Motor Company, which had first used the Skyline name 10 years earlier.

Fast forward to the 4th generation of the Skyline we see here, which was produced from 1972 to 1977. The Skyline wasn't necessarily a particular type of car, more a concept, so it came in various bodystyles – 4-door sedan, 2-door hardtop coupe and 5-door station wagon. The model we're looking at here started life as a 2-door hardtop, in 2nd-generation GT-R guise, which was unveiled at the 1972 Tokyo Motor Show. A series of TV commercials created to promote the car featured a young Westernlooking couple, named Ken and Mary, who drove it through Japan's most scenic areas. Ken and Mary became Kenmeri, the nickname that's synonymous with this version of the Skyline GT-R to this very day.

Because it lacked major performance improvements, most of the owners of 1st-generation GT-R (3rd-generation Skylines, known as Hakosuka), as well as those thinking about buying a GT-R, avoided the Kenmeri. To make matters worse, the 1973 oil crisis hit Japan hard. So interest in the new version diminished even further and Nissan ceased production after just three months, with just 197 Kenmeris built.

Liberty Works is a hugely successful Japanese customising and tuning outfit, which has grown into a global phenomenon. MINI GT struck up a relationship with the company very early into its new, 1/64-scale venture and many, many LB\*WORKS models have been released so far. This is the first of a short series of three similarly-liveried Nissans, branded as KUMA, which is an incredibly popular cartoon bear that





# THIS SUPERB PAIR OF GOLF CABRIOLETS SEND YOU RIGHT BACK TO THE 1980S...

he Golf Cabriolet, in its original body style, was launched at the Geneva International Motor Show on 27 February 1979, almost 5 years after the original saloon version. Production started at Wilhelm Karmann GmbH's plant at Osnabrück in June that year and ran until July 1993 when replaced by the Golf A3 based version.

Derived from the Golf A1 the first generation cabrio spanned the lifespan of both the A1 and A2 Golf saloons with, outwardly, minimal visual changes. Perhaps two of the most significant alterations being, in 1982, to the hood that enhanced rear visibility when folded and the replacing of the original style black plastic bumpers from the 1988 model year onwards. A 'facelift' that comprised of bodycoloured bumpers, wheel arch extensions, front integrated spoiler and integrated under bumper spoiler. Although utilising the same mechanical and bodywork base the stablemate Rabbit Convertibles were however noticeably different, visually, on account of their North American build specification.

The heyday period for the Golf Cabrio was unquestionably from the 1984 model year through to 1993. A period which saw Volkswagen producing a myriad of Special, Limited and Customer selected options. These included the various 'All White' Editions CC, 'Quartet' custom options, 'Etienne Aigner', 'Acapulco', 'Genesis' and elegant 'Classicline' versions. The latter shared catalogue space also with the 'Youngline' and 'Sportline' options.

Of them it is a pair of 'Sportline' versions that Solido has modelled for its new diecast release in 1/43 that complements OttoMobile's previous 1/18 resin bound variations on the theme. Whilst

and Norev - Solido's version is very much welcomed.

This clean, well proportioned, representation of the original including all the attributes that have marked Solido's current 1/43 range as eminently collectible is a treat. The modelling of that folded hood is very convincing and the degree of detailing over the very good paintwork finish is commendable. Whilst the red paintwork version is an obvious first choice with nicely contrasting black interior inclusive of Recaro seats and black with chrome BBS 15" RA alloy wheels the black paintwork option brings some bonus points. These thanks to that black paintwork showing up some of the details better. Details such as those idiosyncratic early style Golf rear lights that survived through the whole production period of the original body style Cabrio because the bigger versions from the later production Golf saloon couldn't accommodate the narrow boot lid opening - and the accompanying individual "accessory style" rear fog lamp. Impressive also is the small Karmann and 'Sportline' badging found aft of the front wheel arch and fore of the rear wheel arch respectively. The final detail that may mean most to Volkswagen collectors is the "Golf Cabrio" dummy licence plates in exactly the style used by Volkswagen in sales brochure images in the 1980s and early 1990s.

# Into Spring...

t would seem that the dynamics of change that were at the forefront of my mind for much of last year concerning the directions diecast collecting is heading - or at least the influences behind new model releases continues to gather pace. Although I have to admit (and I'm sure that I'm not the only one...) that I am forever confounded by the feelings of virtual time vortex confusion by being involved with magazine publishing. Specifically, right now sat on a cold, dark, wet early January day penning this for the March issue published in February whilst trying to feel Springlike with eager anticipation - traditionally a mood that gets instilled in my thoughts by looking forward to the forthcoming Spielwarenmesse and all the news that it brings.

However...

#### **FAIR - OR NOT SO MUCH FAIR**

Looking back twelve months I wonder if one of the dynamics of change that really started to set in during 2024, and possibly which will be even more evident this year, is how and where scale model manufacturers showcase their forthcoming new releases. Spielwarenmesse 2025 in Nuremberg, runs from 28 January to 1 February and so effectively coincides with the publication of this issue of Diecast Collector. It may sound heretical to say but I can't help but feel that this famous toy fair had its heyday some while back and has now been slowly diminished by, first, the news distribution media that is the internet and then, secondly, the 2020 pandemic which has caused closure on so many patterns of life since.

Last year I got the impression that some

manufacturers were choosing RetroMobile as their alternative venue for showcasing new releases. This year's RetroMobile, again at the Parc des Expositions de la Porte de Versailles, runs from 5-9 February. Conceivably some manufacturers will attend both but I wonder if others will just opt for one or the other. Certainly the success that Solido had last year at Epoqu'Auto in Lyon, followed by sharing a stand with MINI GT at the prestigious Essen Motor Show, suggests to me that some manufacturers at least see more synergy and opportunity with auto enthusiast collectors by direct connection than through the traditional toy trade fairs.

#### **INFLUENCERS AND SHAPERS**

In addition to my increasing awareness of the frequency of generational identity usage in conversations, social media and elsewhere I have become similarly aware of the increasing usage of the popularist terms 'influencers' and 'shapers'. Now they have always been with us but as is so often the case with fashion, their roles seem to have subtly changed with the widening use of social media and in particular video productions accessible through a variety of platforms such as YouTube (...yes you are right, yet another fashionable expression that once upon a time just meant a raised hard standing from which to catch a train!). The relevance of all this to diecast collector's is how sales and advertising reach out to new generations of enthusiasts and collector's. This particularly applies with the embodiment of automotive enthusiasm and scale model collecting on a fully worldwide scale.

Perhaps slightly controversially I have begun




to suspect that the areas of collector interests, traditionally dominant and catered for in the British diecast scene, are fast shrinking circles in a sea of ever enlarging circles of interest on the upcoming international scene.

#### LESS OF THE OLD, MORE OF THE NEW

On our home front we are seeing long established brand names, yet again, showing signs of market place fatigue and stress with consequential "go it alone" and corporate fragmentation sell-offs. With a wider perspective embracing mainland Europe similar stresses are appearing to be increasingly evident. For example the concerns about the long established German company SIKU (which has for years had a dedicated diecast following) appear to have taken another turn downwards with the permanent closing of its doors to the SIKU // WIKING Modellwelt museum on 9th December 2024 due to economic reasons. The museum had over 3,500 model exhibits illustrating the wide variety of miniature scale models from a 100 years of combined SIKU and WIKING history.

It seems a twist of fate that it was SIKU's owner - Sieper GmbH - that saved the legendary German brand WIKING after the death of its founder Friedrich Peltzer in late 1981, but is now the declining partner of the business whilst WIKING appear to continue in a relatively strong market place position. To a large extent long established HO sector manufacturers, like WIKING, who model with injection moulded plastic are outside the interest remit of Diecast Collector. What is pertinent though is that more and more new players are entering that marketplace sector. Players that are established

manufacturers traditionally better recognised for their diecast product ranges in larger scales.

Elsewhere in Europe the Simba Dickie Group, whose portfolio includes several well-known toy and model brands, acquired Schuco in 1999. More recently it joined forces with Minimax Import & Export Co. Ltd (the power behind the Spark brand) planning, in doing so, to concentrate its model car business there in the long term by the integration of Schuco. I would not be surprised then to see tangible changes emerge during 2025 as a result of Spark/ Schuco cooperation in the development, production and marketing of their product ranges.

#### **NOSTALGIA FOR YESTERDAY, NOSTALGIA OF TOMORROW**

I suspect that every diecast collector recognises



nostalgia of one sort or another is a driver in their two. Nostalgia for the toys we had (or yearned for) as children and nostalgia for automobiles that have been part of our past, either as owned or just essential parts of the street scene memories of yesterday. Maybe it is the latter that make me browse longingly at some of the sealed resin offerings from Matrix and Cult Scale models. Similarly, the former that attracts me to the current outpouring of diecast reissues from the Corgi have not succumbed to buying. However, the twist here is a very exciting development due to unfold during 2025 with the announcement that in July the that intention to bring forward reissue examples of hitherto (very) difficult to find, even when new, versions is a fabulous breath of fresh air.

Of course, today's latest thing is also, in time, tomorrow's nostalgia and yesterday's latest thing... already well on its way to being embryo-nostalgia! A thought process prompted by the latest news from Solido, which has been very active during 2024 in attending and assessing interest trends of enthusiasts in the Far East, including Thailand, in addition to China and Japan.

#### A WORD FROM SOLIDO...

Continuing its efforts to reach a wider and younger



audience, Solido will keep developing unique models that align with its new direction ... successfully launched in 2024..

As Clément Rouvière, Brand Manager at Solido, explains: "For 2025, the key word is 'open-mindedness!" This year, Solido completed its shift towards a new generation of collectors. Now, we want to focus on them and collectors worldwide. 

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# MINI GT 007 Collection

Announced at Nuremberg, in January 2024, more details are emerging fast about this exciting new range coming soon. **Rick Wilson** is not shaken, but definitely stirred.

here has been a huge surge in the popularity of 1/64 scale in recent years. And there has always been a massive amount of interest in anything to do with Ian Fleming's James Bond character, particularly the cars and vehicles featured in the films, so it was only natural when the two came together in the MINI GT range.

TSM Models launched its MINI GT range in 2017. It hit the UK in 2019, when Clevelands Diecasts became the sole official UK importer (and it still is today).

TrueScale Miniatures, as it was originally called, was founded in 2006, based in Hong Kong, and began distributing diecast models the following year. Over time, most collectors referred to the company as TSM, for short, and a few years ago, this became part of the new trading name.

On its website, the company's states "TSM-Model strives for a perfect blend of passion and detailed craftsmanship in each model we produce. From our humble beginnings making accessories to accentuate your collection, we have selectively expanded our

offerings each year to offer not only key pieces of motorsports history, but to capture both classic street cars and the newest vehicles you admire on the road today. We are always looking for ways to improve our craft, using a combination of the newest technology and honed technique to get all of the details just right." One of those areas of improvement came to light in late 2017, when the company announced the launch of its brand new range, dedicated solely to 1/64 scale.

MINI GT made the huge announcement about its forthcoming James Bond 007 Collection on 25th January 2024, just ahead of the 2024 Nuremberg Toy Fair... "Celebrating 60 Years of *Goldfinger* – 2024 marks the 60th anniversary of this iconic film which introduced James Bond's Aston Martin DB5! MINI GT is super excited to announce our 007 James Bond 1/64 Model Car Collection.

"This exquisite collection will feature many well-known vehicles from the James Bond series, including the Aston Martin DB5, Lotus Esprit, BMW 750il, and many others. Realising the long-held ambition of MINI GT's director, Mr. Glen Chou, this collection promises high-quality 1/64 scale models of the James



Bond movie series. Collectors can look forward to meticulously-detailed models with unique designs, capturing the essence of the James Bond vehicular legacy."

The announcement was accompanied by a montage graphic depicting a wide selection of both hero and baddie transports used in the movies over the decades. If this is anything to go by, the collection has the capability to grow into a hugely impressive one.

Since the Nuremberg announcement, further specialist trade fairs and hobby shows around the globe during 2024 have seen many teaser images appear as pre-production and engineering samples progress and are displayed. These have gone some way to confirming what the initial release list will look like.

In July 2024, MINI GT confirmed that the first two releases would both be of the iconic Aston Martin DB5 from the 1960s films and there would be versions of each release with packaging backdrop movie poster artwork in various languages. The version from Goldfinger has all the car's special 'Q' features deployed, but the Thunderball version is a 'clean' DB5 with none of them activated. The DB5 really needs little introduction as the most iconic of 007's rides and there will be two further releases, as it appeared in the later Casino Royale and No Time To Die films.






# Sunbeam-Talbot Sports Car

of cars were saloons and easily identifiable as Austins, Fords, Hillmans and others in austere black, grey or other sombre colours. Every so often I would see a coupe which was interesting as something different. However, the ultimate was to see a sports car such as a Sunbeam, Alvis or even a Jaguar. These were the exciting cars of the day! A number of these sports cars were also produced by toy manufacturers including Dinky Toys.

A Dinky Toys model of the Sunbeam -Talbot Sports Car (No.38b) was first seen in the *Meccano Magazine* advert of June 1940. The advert describes it as follows 'A scale model of one of the finest equipped sports cars on the road. Fitted with rubber tyres. Price 1/3 each'. Following on from this advert, the adverts for Dinky Toys in the *Meccano Magazine* for the coming years were much reduced due to the war time restrictions at the time.

The first models were in red with a grey tonneau and they had black wheels. After the war the red continued and there was also a light blue version with a grey tonneau and black wheels. There was also a yellow model with either a green or beige tonneau and

again black wheels. Others came in maroon or dark blue each with grey tonneaus. Some models had the seats also in colours matching the colour of the body. Coloured wheels were fitted to the later post-war models. The first models had solid steering wheels followed by the open spoke type. The early models also had smooth black wheels and some had white tyres and there were some models with lacquered bases. They were sold in brown or yellow card



Trade Boxes of six models and the number designation for the model used the capital B letter.

The model appears in the Dinky Toys catalogue of 1940 and in the later ones of 1951 and 52. The adverts for Dinky Toys Sports Cars in the *Meccano Magazine* did not show the Sunbeam–Talbot after 1948. It does seem that the model was deleted around this time, but definitely by 1950. Following this it was re-issued in 1954 with the number 101 for export. A 1955 American Dinky Toys catalogue illustrates the model.

The real Sunbeam cars had racing and speed trial successes from the early 1900s and in 1926 a Sunbeam achieved 150mph. Fame also came through the success of Sir Henry Seagrave and his world speed record attempts, including the first cars to exceed 200mph as they were also the first to cover 100 miles in one hour. The cars were manufactured in North Kensington, London but then after the war the plant moved to Ryton near Coventry. It had also been part of the Rootes Group since the mid-1930s. The Sunbeam-Talbot name continued to be used for the cars of the 1950s and these continued the racing successes of the company at Jabbeke in Belgium.

he French driver, Jean Ragnotti, signed his first contract as a professional motorsport driver with Opel, where the job was to drive rally cars for the German brand when necessary. He obviously did well as the major car manufacturer in his country, Renault, hired him as a racing driver in the 1970s. This time, he had to drive a variety of cars from different classes and different disciplines. His mission would include test sessions and development, as well as competition driving. He would be a kind of "handyman" at the wheel, ready to drive anything Renault decided to build for motorsport. From production derived rally and track cars, to Le Mans prototypes or even Formula 1, Ragnotti did it all for decades.

In Part 1 (Diecast Collector, February 2025) of this story, we looked at the first part of Jean's driving career, starting in the late 1960s, until the end of the 1980s. This was when Renault released the mid-engined Renault 5 Turbo, a car that would became a large part of Ragnotti's career. He was obviously involved in that car's development until it was officially launched, first in the street version and after that the consecutive rally

versions, until the 5 Maxi Turbo, the Group B machine.

Let's go back to the early 1980s. Renault was involved in the two most important four-wheel championships: Formula 1 and World Rally Championship. Both teams were supported by the manufacturer and there was no big sponsor to speak of, neither in Formula 1 nor in WRC. Obviously, top level management did the maths and reached the conclusion there was too much money involved and one of the operations had to be scaled down. Formula 1 was chosen as a priority for Renault, with WRC relegated to a secondary role.

#### THEY DID NOT RETIRE

Renault recognised the value of rallying, a very popular discipline at the time and one that had a direct link to production cars. So, they decided not to leave the forest roads entirely, and kept a small rally team ready to enter a few selected WRC events from 1981.

The R5 Turbo was now ready to challenge the best cars in WRC, starting in the Monte Carlo, the first event of the season. The little Renault with a powerful turbo engine had to race against cars like the Opel Ascona 400, Talbot Sunbeam Lotus, Ford Escort RS,

Fiat 131 Abarth, Porsche 911 and the first generation Audi Quattro, among others. Jean Ragnotti was not impressed and gave the R5 Turbo its first WRC win.

There are several 1/43 scale models replicating this historical win, the first all French (car, tyres, driver and co-driver) victory since 1973. We choose the latest release, made by Spark as a resincast. It features the early style front bumper, with a very small lower splitter and four big spotlights, featuring the white plastic covers with the Cibié branding, plus a pair of yellow rectangular spotlights. It also features two roof aerials, one at the middle and a tilted one that looks much like a standard radio antenna. Unfortunately, they are both too short, due to the small height of Spark's regular acrylic cases.

Renault had a tradition of organizing one make series and so they pursued with the R5 Turbo. Ragnotti entered a few races in 1981, with a blue car sponsored by Elf, the national petrol company. Compared to the 1981 Monte Carlo winner, this Spark release features different style Gotti wheels, no aerials, no spotlights, standard style rear view mirrors and a metallic plate under the rear bumper. Inside the cabin, there are a pair of seats, even if only one was used for this track series. The livery uses the colours of the French flag to great effect, particularly on the bumpers.

#### **R5 TURBO AND GROUP B**

Even if the Group B was now full steam ahead, Renault kept the R5 Turbo almost unchanged for the 1982 season. Ragnotti was entered in very few events, however, that did not prevent him from winning another one. This time he was the first at the finish of the 1982 Tour de Corse Rally de France. Spark did not have to change much of the Monte Carlo winner scale model. The livery is similar, only with fewer stickers on the doors and different rally plates, race number 7 and license plates. There's only one central aerial on the roof and, at the front, a single pair of round spotlights and a pair of rectangular ones, with Cibié covers. Wheels have the same Minilite design, although they are painted a darker shade of grey. Inside the cabin, both racing seats are black, contrary to the Monte Carlo's which features a red one, for the driver and a blue one, for the co-driver. From the back view, we can see the exhaust is larger in the 1982 car and was moved from the right to the left. This was a sign there were mechanical changes in this evolution of the R5 Turbo.

Jean would win another major event with a R5 Turbo, the 1984 Tour de France rally. The car was a new evolution, now officially called the Tour de Corse. For this one, Spark had to do a few more changes. The front bumper featured smaller and

vertical positioned indicators and two big spotlights inserted. There's also a deeper splitter, bigger wheels with a different design and painted white and, in this TDF model, there are mud flaps behind each wheel. The rear bumper also features some minor detail changes. Again, the roof aerial is too short. Livery also received some changes with more white surfaces and less black. The car featured rally number 3.

The regular R5 kept being used in competition, namely in track racing. The front engine R5 Alpine Turbo was a respectable hot hatch in street version, more so when prepared for competition. We have a 1984 example released by Spark with some interesting features. The car has race number 6 and is painted red, orange and black, the Calberson typical livery co-sponsored by Elf. Compared with the street car this coupé version has semi-covered rear wheels, a small roof wing and a very deep front bumper. The front grille is also taller, while the wheels and tyres are wider. It looks quite dramatic for such a small car.

#### **ONE MAKE SERIES**

The following year, 1985, Renault Cup changed to the then new Alpine GTA, a rear engine sports coupé inspired by the older A310, however with much better styling. The race version has special white rims and not much more is changed from the street car. The rear hatch window allows a great look to the rear engine, nicely reproduced by Spark.

In the same season, Jean drove the ultimate R5 Turbo for the first time in the WRC; the R5 Turbo Maxi developed under Group B regulations, as much as the base car would allow. It looks great in that iconic blue and red Philips livery. Skid did a great job with this diecast. The general shape resembles the previous R5 Turbo Tour de Corse, however, all the body panels look different. Wider, with a big roof wing that connects to a pair of deflectors, each side of the windscreen and wider front wheel arches, it

shows Renault spent some time in the wind tunnel. Unlike most of the other Group B cars, that had separated light pods that would be put in place only for night stages, the R5 Turbo Maxi has all six spotlights integrated in the front bumper giving it a menacing look. Wheels are multi-stroke affairs and there is a different type rear hatch. For a diecast made decades ago, this one resisted the test of time.

When Group B was abolished at the end of 1986, for the following season manufacturers were limited to Group N and Group A regulations, respectively, almost standard cars and lightly modified cars. Renault started the 1987 WRC season with a group A version of R11 Turbo hot hatch. Not much was allowed to change on the outside, only small details, like extra windscreen and front hood latches, extra spotlights and wheel size and styling. Still, the R11 as driven by Jean in Rally Portugal still looks purposeful. Keeping the traditional white, yellow and black Renault Sport colours, with a new design, made the job. Ragnotti was racing against the mighty Lancia Delta HF 4WD, but he still managed a second place overall with his front wheel drive R11 Turbo.



In the same 1987 season, Renault developed a new version of the R5 Turbo, now called 5 Super, to race in the French Super Touring championship. The shape, modelled by Spark, differs from the rally version mainly in the front bumpers that resembles a little more the new generation R5 Super road car. Front wheel arches are also a different shape and there's a large roof wing. Wheel size is much bigger than in the rally R5 Turbo. The Philips livery uses blue as a base colour and red for the bumpers, sills and stripes in the sides. The 55 was Ragnotti's race number in a team of three that Spark has modelled.

Renault also explored the Group N regulations with the second generation R5, the R5 GT Turbo. Ragnotti was also involved in whatever fine-tuning this almost standard version was allowed to receive and he also drove it in the WRC a few times. One of those was in the 1990 Tour de Corse Rallye de France, where he did not finish due to an engine problem. Spark has a few R5 GT Turbo in its back catalogue, apart from different liveries they look substantially the same. That does not mean they do not look very good. The shape is perfectly reproduced and all the details in the real car can be found in this scale model. Front grille and bumper have all the slots painted black and the headlamps look realistic. The standard five spoke wheels are also very well rendered and the livery has all the needed stickers.

By the mid-1990s, regulations changed again with the introduction of an intermediate class for frontwheel drive "maxi" cars. They were allowed many more changes compared with the base car. Much

wider suspensions, 2.0 litre non-turbo engines capable of much higher RPM and much more. They were also light and in the right conditions, like dry tarmac and twisty roads, these cars were able to challenge the four-wheel drive Group A leading category. In 1995, Renault developed such a car based in the first generation Clio, the Clio Maxi. Ragnotti was getting near the end of his career but that was no obstacle to him. This class of cars suited Jean's driving style perfectly, as we can see if searching the internet. Altaya produced the Clio Maxi Ragnotti drove to seventh place overall in the 1995 Monte Carlo. For an inexpensive diecast, it looks great. It should come as no surprise, because it was produced by Ixo. Super wide tracks with big wheels lead to enlarged wheel arches and big bumpers. The view from the rear looks aggressive, with its roof wing. Open windows give a great view inside the cabin, complete with most of the details needed in a rally car.


The following year, Renault changed the formula to the Megane Coupe Maxi and it looked even better with its fastback rear and lowered rear wing. The new Diac livery changed from grey to French blue with yellow, white and red areas. White multi-spoke wheels look perfect and the cabin shows the same level of detail Altaya by Ixo used for the Clio Maxi.

At 51 years of age, Ragnotti decided to reduce his motorsport activities, but he never really retired. Until recently, he still participated in road shows and other Renault led events, showing his spectacular driving style.

### In which Steve Coles compares models of the same car... but in a variety of differing sizes and scales!

've always been a bit of a fan of the MGB, particularly in chrome bumper form. One of my first 'collectors' models was the blue MGB GT from the Matchbox Dinky Collection launched back in 1988, which I still rate as one of my favourite models. I recently acquired, at a very good price, a pale-yellow convertible MGB from the Matchbox Collectibles range. I thought this would be a fun comparison with the earlier Blue GT until I realised the castings were not at all related. I then stumbled across the tiny 1/148 Oxford in my local model shop, thinking it was a good match with the Matchbox I bought it. I had a hunch that Oxford might make a larger 1/76 version too as many of their releases are duplicated across both scales. After a little searching on their website, I found that Oxford Diecast also made a 1/76 MGB convertible, also in Primrose Yellow, and so the hunt was on.

When sat together, these three look adorable. As this is a Little and Large feature, we need to take closer look at each model in turn. As mentioned, the Matchbox is a totally different casting to the MGB GT from 1988. This one comes from Matchbox's period of selling models by mail order only and possibly uses tooling from Vitesse, as was common for many of their 1/43 cars during this mail order period. I reckon it's a good casting too, despite its age. The cast-in details are good and crisp and it is leaps ahead of the original Matchbox Dinky MGB. While my example is a little tired in

places, it is missing the small boot mounted MG badge, it still displays well. There are some neat touches with things like the front grille, which looks like a separate metal part. I do like the MG badge on the grille too, a really crisp touch. All the lights are separate clear/ coloured plastic parts. Even the tiny front sidelight and indicator unit. The door handles, boot lock and rear mounted fuel filler cap are also all separate chromed parts. Even the spoked wheels, often difficult to replicate effectively in small scale models look good. The only omission is the reversing lights. The small, square lights were introduced in 1967 and this model wears an 'L' registration making it a 1972 model.

Inside, the seats look good enough to sit on. Behind the accurate steering wheel are tiny silver rimmed dials and all the switches and knobs on the dashboard are moulded into the plastic dash and have a tiny silver dot on them, which lifts the otherwise black interior. A tall silver gear lever and separate hand brake complete the details. It's a shame the model comes with the hood in the closed position and unlike the more modern Vanguards MGB, this hood isn't removable.

The two smaller Oxford Diecast models are well up to the standards we have come to expect from them. The larger of the two is well proportioned and captures the shape of the chrome-bumpered MBG. Naturally in this scale, the grille and bumpers are moulded as part of the body but carefully picked out in silver. The grille even has a miniscule red MG

badge. Round the back, the MG octagonal badge is clear, as are the painted rear lights. And although there is no front number plate, the rear shows an 'E' registration, making it a 1967 model so fittingly has the reversing lights picked out in silver. The wheels are not the best, even at this scale, not really looking like the wire spokes you would expect an MBG from 1967 to wear.

At least with the hood down, it is possible to get a good view of the interior. Just like the larger Matchbox, it is all black. A reasonable attempt at dashboard detail is there, along with a gear stick. The saving grace is the correct steering wheel which looks really neat.

Even the harshest critic has to admire the amount of detail Oxford manage to add to their tiny 1/148 models. They give almost nothing away in terms of details to their bigger brothers and this MGB is no exception. All the comments about the 1/76 details apply here; even down to the odd-looking wheels. Ok, so the front grille badge is possibly missing (certainly my eyes couldn't make one out!) but it does have a front number plate. The interior is a simpler version of the 1/76 mould, with just a generic three spoke steering wheel. The windscreen surround looks out of proportion at this scale; looking far too thick but I don't imagine there would be a better solution to this without making the screen a thinner separate part and far too fragile.

Worthy of a brief mention are the two larger 1/18 MGB roadsters that have previously been produced by Corgi and Kyosho. The Kyosho looks particularly impressive but commands a price premium over the Corgi. As neither are in my collection (space limits which 1/18 I purchase) I felt it best to avoid too much detail of these.

What has struck me while writing this month's feature is just how common this 'little and large' idea is. Indeed, so much so that I find myself now actively looking for a larger or smaller version of a model that really catches my attention. I wonder how many readers have started noticing how many of these pairs or sets they own, or have since started to buy similar looking models in different scales. Long may the hunting continue!





# Jaguar E-Type

### In this article, Alwyn Brice gets high on E...

'm not going to bore you here with the history of the E-Type – there are already enough books out there in the marketplace on this truly iconic example of British automotive engineering.

Every classic car enthusiast will know that Malcolm Sayer's creation was displayed at the 1961 Geneva Motor Show and this evocation stunned the press and public in equal measure. It was a car like no other; and for many, with hindsight I suspect, it marked the apogee of Jaguar's heritage.

According to the statisticians, the Series 1 ended production in 1968, with some 33,200 examples of all

types produced. Initially running with a 3.8-litre engine, roadster, coupe and, in time, 2+2 body styles were all offered.

In my book, you simply cannot beat the first of any car series. Faired in headlamps added a degree of smoothness to the bonnet that would never be replicated once uncovered; the flat dashboard, with its flick switches, looked

functional and right; and those delicately curved indicator and brake light assemblies suited to car's front and rear flanks to a T. Sadly, later examples gained in weight, made use of a V-12 engine, often were fitted with automatic transmission and lost the beautiful lines of the early cars; but then they were invariably exported (notably to the US), where market demands differed.

But here, the E-Type back in the 1960s was every boy's dream car. However, if you had wanted to stand out from the crowd in that swinging decade, and you were possessed of sufficient funds, then transport with the Italian underpinnings of Bertone, Pininfarina, Gandini or Vignale would have been the order of the day. The E-Type, though, arguably trumped all those because here was a car that might be sighted any day of the week, with a little luck. It was identifiable (and, dare I say it, accessible) because of this. Mind you, with a release price at a smidgeon over £2,000, this wasn't a car for the masses: the average annual wage then fell just shy of £800...

#### **IN MINIATURE**

Just about every manufacturer of model diecast vehicles has seen fit to include the E-Type, in one guise or another, within its range. That's hardly surprising; this was, after all, the automobile (apocryphally) described by Enzo Ferrari as the most beautiful car in the world. So, if you are enamoured of this particular stylistic

triumph, you are well catered for.


I had plenty of choice, therefore, in singling out a contender in small scale for this article. In the end, I plumped for Corgi. Why? That question is easily answered. Corgi had jumped on the Jaguar bandwagon at an early date, and released its E-Type drophead in 1962. This was a charming model, displaying thoughtful attention to detail and taken to the next level by the addition of a removable hardtop. Any purchaser effectively got two cars for the price of one. However, I've moved on a few years to 1968, which was when Corgi brought out the Jaguar 2+2.

Now, purists will tell you that the 2+2 is a bit of a compromise and cannot hold a candle to the two seater coupe. That's debatable – but Corgi's take on the "family E-Type" was, in hindsight, a good idea, since these days, if you do happen to spot an E-type, there's a sporting chance that it will be a 2+2, as these have become the most affordable E-Type derivative. Over 18,000 were made between 1968-1970 and they benefited from the uprated 4.2-litre engine. Ask any E-Type owner about their practicality and the answers will be unanimous: the 2+2, thanks to revised bodywork, is easier to get in and out of compared to the coupe.

So, how does the 1968 model shape up? The 2+2 model was available in red or metallic blue although to be fair, neither Corgi shade actually replicates the palette of the day, as used by Jaguar. However, to Corgi's credit, the model is stuffed with features that must have delighted any young recipient. Most notable is the huge, forward tilting bonnet (on the real thing bonnets were never simply attached: they required a lot of fettling before fit was deemed satisfactory). This tilts just far enough to reveal a detailed engine, finished in chrome, as was the case with so many of Corgi's engines of the period. It's all there, insofar as the

designers were constrained, and the iconic straight six, dual overhead camshaft engine certainly looks the part.

Aside from the bonnet there are opening doors which, again with forethought, actually include some wound-down window glass for added realism. Take a peek inside and you'll be rewarded by tipping seats (necessary for access to the rear); whilst the rear seats also slide forward to increase stowage space. The interior is not over detailed but is adequate in my book. Another bonus is the opening rear hatch, which was a distinctive feature of both coupe and 2+2 variants. As a final finishing touch, Corgi also saw fit to add imitation chrome script to the back of this hatch, announcing the car's 4.2 power unit.

Enough of the opening bits: shape-wise, the 2+2 looks a trifle stubby to my eyes, but that might be down to the paint, which is generously applied. You cannot really fault Corgi here, for its models needed to be reasonably well painted to stand up to youthful wear and tear. The wire wheels are a little bit of a compromise (in common with other Corgi models wearing them), but suffice for the model. The incorporation of bullet wing mirrors is a true period touch: any driver seeking to elevate his transport above the humdrum would have been tempted by them at the time. The underside exhaust system is also a delightful addition, though rarely on show, one suspects.

Downsides? Well, the painted headlights are a cop out (on the earlier 3.8 drophead they were beautifully done by comparison); and a touch of paint on the indicators wouldn't have gone amiss, as would have a streak of silver under the side windows. However, the next generation version (released in 1970) would acquire awful wheels, was bereft of opening doors and forwent some of the finer detail. Such is progress (or costcutting, depending on how you want to look at it).

All in all, though, the 1968 model ticks a lot of boxes; and it's not hard to find today, thanks to healthy sales at the time.

onth by month, *Diecast Collector* reports record sums achieved for diecast toys at specialist auction houses. Invariably, the highest prices are paid for items in mint and boxed condition, and when something out of the ordinary surfaces – a Dinky Toy in a non-standard colour, for example, or a one-off Matchbox colour trial – then prices go sky high. This is all very well if you are a seasoned collector who knows what to look for and has the funds available. But what if you have other claims on your budget (like a family or a mortgage) and can't justify major expenditure on toys? And what about younger people who love cars and are just starting to collect miniature versions of their favourites?

Don't despair: one of the great advantages of the collecting hobby is that you can enter it at any level and there are plenty of interesting diecasts around that won't break the bank. In this article, we take a look at various models which are cheap to buy and fun to collect – and the good news is that many of them, for various reasons, are now considerably cheaper than they were a few years ago. Quite a few of the items pictured here cost between  $\mathcal{L}1$  and  $\mathcal{L}5$ , and you might be surprised to learn how much choice exists even within that price range!


#### **GETTING STARTED**

You don't even have to go to a model shop or a toy fair to start a diecast collection; the hunt can begin in the aisles of your local supermarket where Hot Wheels will almost certainly be on sale. The company that makes them, Mattel, claims to have a following of some fifteen million 'avid collectors' worldwide. Ten percent of these are males in their fifties and sixties who are prepared to pay large sums for the early Hot Wheel products with

'redline' wheels made from 1968 onwards – in other words, serious collectors motivated by nostalgia for the toys they had in their youth. However, the other 90% are buying more recent issues, which are very widely distributed and sell for around  $\mathcal{L}2$ . Obviously, production numbers are huge but some of these are bound to increase in desirability if kept in their sealed packaging – though it should be emphasised right from the start that the golden rule in collecting is to buy what you genuinely like rather than speculating on what you think might be valuable one day.

When Hot Wheels first came out, they were competing with the Matchbox series and Matchbox's management panicked when they saw how quickly Mattel's products were capturing children's imagination. This left Matchbox little alternative other than to spend millions on a hasty transformation of their range into 'Superfast' cars which had similar low-friction wheels to the Hot Wheels. So, it's a bit ironic that, after numerous changes of ownership over the years, Matchbox is today owned by – you guessed it – Mattel!

Both brands have loyal followings and developing the Hot Wheels and Matchbox ranges side by side means that, one way or another, Mattel can't lose. In recent years the USA has enjoyed much better access to Matchbox on retail shelves than we have in the UK but this is starting to change with Tesco in particular often selling a selection of Matchbox cars either individually or in packs of five. Sometimes these will be displayed on pegs in the toy aisle but quite often it seems that a trade box is simply put on the shelves and you can rummage through it to find the ones you want, adding a bit of anticipation to the process. A box will appear one day and will soon be raided by collectors, with the most attractive pieces being snapped up quickly. Recent Matchbox lines to look out for

include the 2023 70th anniversary specials in silver and, for 2024, the 'European Streets Series' which contains modern cars like the quirky Citroen Ami electric city car and – of particular interest to UK collectors – a series of Minis from the classic 1960s Mini Cooper to the 2011 Countryman. Matchbox currently makes a big thing of the 'Moving Parts' range fitted with opening doors or bonnets – features common enough on diecast cars from the early sixties onwards, but not seen so often on modern diecasts which instead prioritise finish and detail to appeal to adult collectors.

Hot Wheels and Matchbox may be marketed simultaneously by Mattel but their style is completely different. If you like flashy performance and customised cars with flame decals and vibrant colours, you'll go for Hot Wheels, whereas Matchbox cars have a more straightforward and realistic finish. A welcome feature of Matchbox in recent years has been a deliberate policy of balancing classic and modern vehicles in the range, which means you can find a contemporary Tesla or a Lexus LX alongside a classic MGB GT or Morris Minor. In short, the Matchbox range offers what is surely the cheapest way of building up a collection of genuinely interesting vehicles.

Also, in this sector of budget cars suitable for both children and collectors is the French equivalent of Matchbox: Majorette. Distribution is patchier in the UK but some Asda supermarkets have these models in stock and, as with Matchbox, you'll find plenty of simple replicas of contemporary cars. Typical offerings from the 2024 'Street Car' series, for example, include the Renault Twingo, Fiat 500e, Suzuki Swift Sport and Ford Focus ST.




found in lines which have now become obsolete. We're all familiar with the well-known High Street bakery chain which runs 'outlet' branches where you can buy second day produce that's still perfectly acceptable but costs a fraction of yesterday's price. It's a bit like that in the diecast collecting market too. The business model used by most manufacturers in recent decades seems to have been to introduce large numbers of new releases in rapid succession, cashing in on the popularity of a range until sales peak and it goes out of fashion. This is what happened with the Matchbox Yesteryears and the Lledo Days Gone range when endless variations of vintage vans appeared until the market was saturated. Judging by recent swapmeets, the price of many Lledo models has now dropped to as low f,1 apiece and while multiple liveries on Ford Model T and other vintage vans no longer seem to have much appeal, a careful look through the clearance boxes often found under the vendor's table might throw up some of the more interesting pieces such as the Morris Minor van, Morris Traveller or Austin 7 Mini.

The Matchbox Dinky Collection and the early Corgi Classics of the 1990s avoided the pitfalls of overproduction and for a time the old Dinky/Corgi rivalry of the 1960s was replayed, albeit with adult collectors rather than children as the target market. Buyers could choose between Corgi Classics, based on popular cars of the 1950s and 1960s, and Matchbox's attempt to exploit the nostalgic appeal of the Dinky name. While the pace of new releases was more tightly controlled than was the case with Yesteryears, stocks of the new-generation Dinky and Corgi models are still easy to find and obtainable for less than their original prices. This is also a result of people buying up 'limited editions' in the belief that they will one day be valuable. However, as all these items were purchased and stored in mint and boxed condition, the rate of survival is practically 100%, meaning that they're no scarcer now than they were twenty or thirty years ago.

EFE created a new collecting theme from 1989 onwards with their range of 1/76 scale buses, followed by the Corgi OOC (Original Omnibus) and the Oxford Omnibus ranges. All of these expanded rapidly and, for the first time in mass-produced diecast form, bus fans could enjoy collecting models in their favourite local and regional liveries. Model bus collecting is a hobby within a hobby and those who know their way around it are aware that some EFE and OOC models can fetch very high prices today; on the other hand, plenty of others can be picked up for a couple of pounds.

#### **ATLAS DINKY TOYS**

A development that has now run its course is the Atlas Dinky Toys collection which started in France in 2008 with the launch of an exact replica of the Dinky Citroen DS19 at an artificially low price, the idea being to get collectors to sign up to collecting the full series which was sent out by mail order at regular intervals. This was very popular but UK collectors could not subscribe. It was not until 2013 that a British series was launched starting with a Morris Mini Traveller costing just £, 1.99, followed by a further series of commercial vehicles, the launch model being the Dinky Supertoy Esso Leyland Octopus tanker offered for an even more remarkable price of £,2.99. This briefly sparked of a period of wheeling and dealing in the collecting world, with British collectors selling to French collectors on eBay and vice versa. Those who were in at the start could sell the Mini Traveller or Esso tanker for £,20 or more. Naturally, all that fizzled out after a short time, and unfortunately since then the increased postal and customs fees since Brexit have impacted severely on buying and selling models between the UK and European Union.

A further UK Dinky replica series distributed under the De Agostini name in 2016 was less successful. This was simply a marketing ploy, as De Agostini is the parent company of Atlas, and many of the models were recycled French Dinkies from the early series, albeit in different colours.

Several years have now passed, the dust has settled and stocks of these Dinky Atlas replicas are now plentiful at toy fairs, having mostly dropped in price. Some of the De Agostini issues such as the Triumph TR2 and Bedford Van in Kodak livery were recently offered at just £3 and £5 apiece. Many have sold online for even less, though in practice the gain is wiped out by the cost of postage. Replicas of the rarest originals, notably the Guy Warrior van 'Heinz', Leyland Octopus with chains, Guy vans with advertising and French Dinky Studebaker 'Nestles' truck can command a higher price but with patience these too can be found in the £10 - £15 range.

Of course, these Dinky recreations (not, strictly speaking, reissues) do not appeal to the purist collector of originals, but to many collectors they are very

acceptable substitutes for the price. A Volkswagen fan, for instance, might not want to shell out around £500 for that most desirable of Dinky Beetles, the first issue Swiss Postal Car, when he or she can have the Atlas version for about £7.50. An unintended reason why some collectors buy these models is that they are cheap enough for those who like to dismantle them and create their own hybrid models (or 'chops' as they have been called) such as putting a rear body on a different chassis or refinishing a van in different colours or liveries.


#### **PARTWORK SERIES**

The Atlas Dinky Toys represent the culmination of the 'partwork' phenomenon which spread through France and Spain, and reached as far away as South America, but has now largely peaked. Publishing houses such as Altaya and Hachette commissioned companies with factories in China, especially Norev and Ixo, to produce models that went on sale at regular intervals with accompanying magazines, the idea being to encourage the purchaser to complete the whole set or series. About twenty years ago, this caught on and made a significant contribution to the growth in popularity of the model car collecting hobby. In France there was hardly a vintage vehicle theme that wasn't exploited: Citroen 2CVs, taxis of the world, vans with advertising logos, camping cars, fire vehicles and innumerable others. In the UK, Del Prado's "Ultimate Car Collection" and Hachette's "A Century of Cars" were among the earliest, the latter comprising existing 1/43 scale castings from Corgi and Solido. This was followed by numerous Atlas collections such as Classic Sports Cars, the Jaguar Collection and the Best of British police cars. The Eaglemoss James Bond collection was one of the most popular partworks, and almost any form of transport from the Bond films was modelled, allowing the series to extend to around 135 issues.

Excess stocks of these series started to turn up on the toy fair circuit which for a time was awash, not just with European collections but with unlikely subjects from further afield like Eastern Europe, Russia and South America (though the models, of course, were made in China). These were piled high and sold cheaply in plastic bubble-packs without the magazines. Supplies are not quite as extensive as before as much stock has now been moved on, but you can still find a good selection of these models at £,5 or under. This is a specially fruitful collecting area if you're a fan of a particular car, such as the Citroen DS 19, or a theme, such as vehicles in 'Michelin' livery. There are some great finds to be made, like a model of the Siam de Tella, a car from Argentina unheard of here which is in fact a version of a BMC Farina saloon!

#### CONCLUSION

These are just a few suggestions to get you started if you're new to collecting. As a generalisation, Atlas Dinky Toys, partworks and many diecasts of the 1990s/2000s are currently at the lower end of the price curve; this may (or may not) change as the years go by, but you can be sure that by collecting these models you'll end up with some attractive and displayable pieces without feeling guilty about how much you've spent on them!





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# Bobblag With Bond

As the weather remains cold and frosty outside, we delve into the archives and revisit Eric Bryan as he pops on his ski goggles and shoots down the slopes with Corgi's 007 bobsleighs.

ne of the high-action points of the film On Her Majesty's Secret Service was a bobsleigh chase in which Bond pursued Blofeld down a mountainside from the latter's Swiss alpine hideaway, Piz Gloria. Shooting for the film began in October 1968 in Switzerland. Eon Productions initially intended to use St Moritz's Cresta Run, but instead hired bobsleigher Franz Capose to construct a two-mile sled run near Mürren. Capose's track incorporated a stillextant run, which had been condemned in 1937 for being too perilous!

The Corgi bosses had been busy behind the scenes consulting with the filmmakers, and created a number of excellent models based on vehicles in the film. For 1970, Corgi introduced the Bond and Blofeld bobsleighs as numbers 1011 and 1012 in the Corgi Juniors line.

The Bond sleigh was in a bright yellow with a checkerboard label with '007' across the cowling. The Blofeld bobsleigh was orange, with a SPECTRE label on the cowling. Both models featured helmeted, goggled driver figures, were fitted with WhizzWheels instead of runners, and had plated metal chassis. Each model included a clip-on plastic fender which allowed the sleigh to use the Corgi Rockets track as a bobsleigh run.

Corgi sold its bobsleighs on blister cards, each of which had a collectors' card which could be cut out. These had colourful artists' renditions of the real machines on the front, with similarly vivid text on the reverse. Bond's card told us:

'The downhill dash on frozen snow on toboggan or bob is one of the most exciting and dangerous of winter sports. On the twisting Swiss Cresta Run, with its icebank corners, speeds of over 80 m.p.h. are common among the experts. James Bond demonstrated yet another of his skills in the film On Her Majesty's Secret Service when he managed to keep his bob under control while struggling with his arch-enemy, Blofeld. Olympic champions would not care to share the experience! This model of his machine reaches very high scale speeds.'

Those familiar with the film will recall the race in which a number of interestingly-matched cars competed on an ice track. Tracy di Vicenzo, with Bond in tow and driving her Mercury Cougar, joined the race in an effort to escape SPECTRE agents.

Corgi made the two bobsleighs available in a set with a model of one of the stock cars, a Volkswagen 1300, released as No.3004. The Beetle was nicely-made in citrus orange, with lemon interior, WhizzWheels, and Corgi Toys labels on the roof and the racing number '5' on the doors. This was a boxed set, but each model was packaged inside on its own blister card. The Volkswagen was sold alone as No.1010.

You could capture the race scene of the movie with Corgi's gift set, No.978. This included a Ford Capri, Ford Escort, a black Mercedes 280SL with 'S.P.E.C.T.R.E.' labels, and Tracy's Cougar with two sets of roofmounted skis.

The Capri was in white, with a sporty checker board label on the roof, twin black bonnet stripes and number '6' labels on the doors and bonnet. The

Escort was likewise in white, with light-blue stripe labels on the roof and bonnet, and racing number '7' on the doors.

The Cougar had a rich red body, black top and plated chassis and grille. With the Volkswagen, you

had competitors five through seven, plus the SPECTRE and Tracy cars. Each of these cars was also sold separately, the Escort as No.923, the Cougar as No.924, the Capri as No.925, and the Mercedes as No.928. These four were part of the Golden TuneUp

series, each of which included a special key that enabled removal of the chassis and axles. This procedure allowed a tune-up of the vehicle with Corgi Rocketlube, via a felt-pen-like applicator (with Mattel's warnings to not oil its Hot

Wheels cars, this Corgi feature was a brainwave and must have been appealing to kids who wanted to tinker with their model cars).

All of these individual packs and sets featured splendid artwork showing the ice race portrayed in a richly evocative Swiss Alpine night scene. Some of the individually-packed cars had labels which read, 'Competitor in the Stock Car racing scene on ice.'

If you embark on Her Majesty's Mission to collect

the above vehicles and sets, you'll discover that these *On Her Majesty's Secret Service* models are among the most coveted of all Corgi and Bond collectables. The following is a round-up of some auction results. Please be seated and set down your cup of tea, in the event that either you or your tea — or both — should go careening to the floor as you make your way through this list:

- No.923 Ford Escort: from £70 for near-mint with no card, to £500-700 for a mint-on-card George Lazenby-signed copy.
- No.924 Mercury Cougar: from £80 for near-mint with no card to £,190 for mint on good-plus card.
- No.925 Ford Capri: £500-700 for good-plus on Lazenby-signed card.
- Both Nos.923 and 925, from £50 for a good-plus pair with no packaging; to £700 plus for the pair on good to very good cards.
- No.928 Mercedes: £30 for near-mint with no card to £250-300 for mint on good-plus card.
- No.1010 Volkswagen 1300: estimate £,500-700
- No.1011 Bond Bobsleigh: from £35 for good-plus, to £,350-5000 for mint-on-card.
- No.1012 Blofeld Bobsleigh: from £45 for good (retouched), to £,600-700 for mint-on-card.
- No.978 Rally Gift Set: £4500-5500 for a complete mint-in-box set.
- No.3004 Gift Set: £6,000-7000 for excellent to mint in very good to excellent package.

### This month sees Alwyn Brice continue with the letter L.

f you've reasonably deep pockets and you like the larger scale of diecast, then LCD Models should appeal to you. Having said that, the company also produces in smaller scales (1/43 and 1/64 for vehicles), and goes up to 1/12 for its motorcycles – but it's the big stuff that impresses the most.

Looking at the larger scale models, one can well feel the passion and feeling that has gone into their construction. Only the Italians, one suspects, are capable of this! Oddly enough, though, there's no Ferrari in the line-up...

If you can stump up the necessary folding matter, then I think you'll enjoy the result. It's a limited palette in terms of car manufacturers and it's somewhat eclectic: so count on Land Rover as well as Toyota, Suzuki and Lexus road cars, with some supercars thrown in for good measure, too.

Quality is what the brand is all about, though. Take the Honda Civic Type R, for example. Every boy racer's dream transport, it comes with opening bonnet and hatch, as well as all four doors. Its engine bay is a delight and with black paintwork featuring red accents, the car looks pretty mean.

For lovers of the (real-life) unaffordable exotics, LCD's McLaren 600LT also has opening features and comes in a range of striking colours; there's also the Pagani in three guises, all of which look the bee's knees; again, some wild colours single out this particular marque.

LCD Models is a relative newcomer to the quality diecast scene (it was only formed back in 2006) but it seems to have gained in prominence, thanks to its models' detail and overall finish.

#### **STAR TURN**

I would imagine that had Lone\*Star decided to set up shop in more recent times, its demise would have been quite rapid. Why? Well, as anyone of a certain age will know, this particular British company, which grew out of Die Cast Machine Tools Ltd (DCMT) in 1950 (or thereabouts), majored in small arms. And of course today, gun making is frowned upon. Admittedly, it turned out toy small arms – but the company's name for its earlier metal toys, that of Slikka, didn't really capture the essence of what was going to prove to be a burgeoning market: that of the Wild West.

Initially fuelled by the big screen, and later by television, the cowboy wave in the 1950s and 1960s struck a chord with most youngsters. Consequently, today, if you pick up a diecast pistol or rifle at a


swapmeet, the chances are that it will bear the Lone\*Star moniker. Simply put, the company was prolific in this particular area.

But Lone\*Star wasn't only about guns and all their necessary adjuncts. The company also made its mark in the 1/43 (or 1/50?) arena (which had historically been the preserve of Dinky), as well as in the small scale diecast vehicle world, the one that Lesney tended to dominate.

Founded by one Aubrey Mills, the company's Lone\*Star brand initially focussed on 000 scale locomotives and accessories. Looking back, these push-along trains might smack of the modern Brio concept but needless to say, they were far more detailed. By 1956 the competition from Dinky and Corgi (the latter having just arrived) spurred its Roadmaster series. Although cruder when compared to the aforementioned makes, Roadmasters offered some interesting British and foreign (notably American) models.

It would be a decade before Lone\*Star's Impy series appeared in the toyshops; a couple of years later the Tuf-Tots line was introduced. The Impy series tried to out-perform Matchbox to a degree, in that several opening features would typically be incorporated in a model, all of which led, however, to a sacrifice in aesthetics. The tiny Tuf-Tots range, in contrast, aped the American Tootsietoys line and were bereft of opening features, presumably as a cost-saving exercise. However, faced with increasing competition from the Far East, the Lone\*Star lines finally folded around 1987-88.

Finding the larger scale models today in good condition requires a lot of patience, as invariably they



isn't as good as that of Lesney, but then neither do they command the huge premiums of the latter.

#### LITTLEST....

China is responsible for the Little Toy brand and in 1/64, it's an apt moniker for these petite vehicles.

I confess to being a little vague about the company in question; the only models that I've spotted are the Ferrari F12 and the Ferrari 812, which can be found in various colours. The quality is reasonable, given the tiny scale, and an opening bonnet gives the vehicle a degree of extra interest. Costing around  $\cancel{\cancel{\xi}}$ , 40, they are not exactly cheap but the detail is there, nonetheless. I get the impression (rightly or wrongly – possibly both) that these models are aimed at youngsters, rather than adult collectors. If that's the case, then kids today are getting more pocket money than I thought...

#### **LEAVING LESNEY**

We end the L category with Lledo. If Leslie Smith and Rodney Smith were the force behind Lesney, it was Jack Odell who was responsible for putting the models into the toyshop. A talented engineer, he took the blueprints and translated them into reality; the rest, as they say, is history.

Reversing his surname, and following the demise of Lesney, in 1982 he launched the Lledo line, primarily concentrating on commercial vehicles of the 1920s and 1930s. Initially some old Matchbox moulds were utilised but the range was quickly expanded. The "Days Gone" models (Odell could hardly have used the "Yesteryear" moniker, could he?) soon proliferated: advertising on these 1/43 vans and lorries, coupled with a low market price, meant that they were popular with those who enjoyed colourful displays within their cabinets or those in business who saw promotional possibilities with these miniatures.

Lledo Vanguards appeared in 1994, and these were rather more selective in terms of subject matter (and better detailed, and less toy-like into the bargain). As such, they gained traction with the more discerning 1/43 collecting market. The 1950s and 1960s eras proved a good hunting ground for Jack Odell in this venture. The range would continue production until 1999, at which point Corgi took over the reins. The Lledo name was retained until 2004, however.



# Corgi through the years

Rick Wilson continues his series of year-by-year articles from the beginning of the brand in 1956. We continue the series with the models released during the first half of 1979.

nother year and another batch of interesting releases to explore. The dominant theme for the year would be TV & Film, with a huge 18 releases related to various US-related, comic book-based TV shows and the latest James Bond film, Moonraker. But the year, as a whole, would see a dramatic downturn in the company's profit margin, reduced by about 80% in comparison with the 1978 figures.

Straight into January and the first two (of four) TV and comic book-related releases for the first half of the year came at us straight out of the blocks. No.435 Superman Van was a new version of the 1/36 scale Chevrolet Van that had been released in the same month the previous year. Painted silver and with colourful graphics depicting our flying superhero on both sides of the body, it also featured a new Superman-specific cardboard interior, visible through the four roof panels. It would be withdrawn the following year, but not before over a quarter of a million units had been sold. To go with it, also released this month, was another

Superman-related release, a new version of No.416 Buick Police Car, now with a second roof lights bar and painted a wonderful shade of metallic blue. The roof was white and there were Police markings to either side, plus an eye-catching "City of Metropolis Police Dept" badge motif adorning the bonnet. Lasting a little longer in the range, until 1981, this model also sold well, with a final sales figure of nearly 350,000.

The following month saw a further three releases. These were all individually-packaged examples of models sold as part of GS48 Jean Richard Circus Set, which had been launched only three months previously, in November 1978. The models were unchanged from the gift set versions: No.426 Circus Booking Office Van, No.1163 Circus Human Cannon and GS30 Land Rover and Animal Trailer. None lasted a long time in the range as all were withdrawn the following year, with sales figues of just 27,000, 77,000 and 61,000 respectively.

March would see updated versions of three previously-released, 1/36 scale road-going cars: No.300 Ferrari Daytona, No.301 Lotus Elite and No.302VW Polo. What would turn out to be the last hurrah for the

Ferrari Daytona casting came nearly six years after the first releases. There was no change to the model apart from the rather garish green chosen for the main colour and some rather snazzy mirror-effect stickers adorning the bodywork – the full bonnet sticker extended on to the front wings on both sides, similarly the bootlid and rear wings, and even the number stickers on the opening doors featured the effect. The moulded-plastic

The plastic wheels were the same design as found on the later Duckhams and Spindrift releases. It sold well and lasted in the catalogue until the end of the Mettoy-owned era, in 1983, bringing Corgi's Ferrari Daytona journey to and end after 10 years.

The Lotus Elite was now a similarly garish yellow and the VW Polo was painted in a rather more subtle gold finish, but both of these now featured the same style of whizzy, mirror-effect sticker graphics that the Daytona had. All three sold well, with sales figures well over 200,000.

Moving into April, a marvellous piece of brand new tooling came along in the shape of No.1116 Shelvoke & Drewry Revopak Refuse Lorry. This incorporated plenty of play value and had three working features – the rear section tipped up and locked into place through a notch in the rear roof, a rotating knob on the kerbside of the lifting rear section would mimick the scraping bar, and a sliding bar on either side would bring all the collected rubbish to the rear when it was time to unload. Available with either an orange or, latterly, a red cab/chassis unit, both versions had a silver rear body. Understandably, it was a popular model and had sold close to 300,000 units by the time Mettoy relinquished control.

Also this month, the Chevrolet van was to get yet

another appearance, this time in a dark metallic blue and bearing Spiderman allegiance, as No.436

Spidervan. As with the Superman version unveiled in January, this latest variant had yet another bespoke card interior. Like its sibling, it only lasted until the following year and sold slightly less, just failing to make the 200,000 sales mark.

With nothing new forthcoming for the month of May, another Supermanrelated release, the third of the year, came in the shape of No.929 Daily Planet Jet Copter during June. Based on No.926 Stromberg Jet Ranger, which had been released exactly a year earlier, it was painted red and white, with "DAILY PLANET" graphics to

this month, No.440 Mazda B1600 Custom Pick-up was yet another variant of No.493 Mazda Pick-up, now painted an orangey-yellow with a red roof and a "Truckon USA" stars and stripes bonnet graphic. Both only lasted until the following year, selling 137,000 and 74,000 respectively.

The final release for the first half of 1979 was another version of the 1/36-scale AMC CJ-5 Jeep that had been first released in February the previous year. No.441 Golden Eagle Jeep was painted in a rather fetching metallic brown, with a tan-coloured plastic hardtop. In this guise, it lasted until the end of the Mettoy era, in 1983, and sold in excess of a quarter of a million units.

Looking at the current prices of these releases from the first half of 1979, the comic book-related issues command quite high prices in mint, boxed condition – usually into triple figures. At the other end of the spectrum, the marvellous Shelvoke & Drewry Revopak Refuse Lorry can easily be picked up incredibly cheaply. The near mint example photographed here was snapped up recently for just  $\cancel{\cancel{L}}$ ,6 and came with a pretty good box too.

**BMC 1800 PININFARINA**

Unveiled at the 1967 Turin Motor Show, the BMC 1800 "Berlina Aerodinamica", styled by Pininfarina, was an extremely handsome concept. Unfortunately, BMC, being BMC, didn't take it any further and the British motorist had to endure several more years of Austin 1800s and Maxis. Thanks goodness Lesney saw fit to put it into production.

Launched in 1969, as one of the three brand new castings made specifically for Superfast, BMC 1800 Pininfarina was a huge hit and would continue in production up to and including 1974 - the casting has never been seen again since.

The model featured opening front doors and initially, it was painted a lovely metallic gold colour, with a white interior, clear windows and an unpainted base and headlights. These versions were fitted with the early narrow Superfasts

From 1972, wider wheels were fitted and this had necessitated some work to the wheelarches to accommodate these. At the same time, the body colour changed to orange, although this could vary to a light peach colour.

It was also included in the Racing Specials gift set, alongside its fellow 1969 débutants, Lotus Europa and Lamborghini Marzal, so examples appear with racing labels on the doors and a Gulf logo on the bonnet from this set.

#### **HI-TAILER**

Production: 1974-79 **Catalogue**: 1975-79 Box Styles: |

Hi-Tailer was loosely based on a Can-Am racer, a popular two-seater sports car racing series during the early seventies. While it captured the streamlined shape of a typical car well, it was clearly a single-seater and had no doors. It was painted white, with a bare metal base, plus a chrome plastic engine and windscreen. The driver figure was blue, later changed to yellow. Hi-Tailer was covered by a very large decal in the fictitious blue and orange livery of Team Matchbox with a smaller, matching label on the rear spoiler.

A second version of Hi-Tailer was released in 1979, exclusive to the K-7 Super Kings Racing Car Transporter set. This was in white with a red base and



a more realistic Martini Racing livery.

The Hi-Tailer model lasted well, remaining in the range until 1979.

#### **MERCEDES 450 SEL**

Mercedes 450 SEL features opening doors and a towing hook, and was painted metallic mid-blue, with a bare metal base and grille with a tan interior.

This was a very short lived model though as it was about to undergo a little surgery...

#### **MERCEDES 450 SEL TAXI**

Production: 1981-82 **Catalogue**: 1981-82 **Box Styles:** L

For the 1981 catalogue range, the short-lived Mercedes 450 SEL was modified into a taxi. Reportedly, it was originally planned to release a taxi version of the 450 SEL as a separate model, but instead it simply replaced the saloon version instead.

Still with opening doors and a tow hook, it was painted the typical beige colour of a German taxi, with a tan or brown interior. The base was now painted silver-grey and there was a red plastic "Taxi" sign on the roof, requiring a new, larger box as a result of the height increase.





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

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
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
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## A FEMALE PERSPECTIVE

Hazel Ralston considers the world of model collecting, through different eyes...

# It's a long story

t is impossible to turn on the TV or look through a magazine without being bombarded with advertisements offering products promising to turn the mundane into the glamorous. There are plenty of wonder creams and potions that claim they'll transform you into a beautiful female or handsome male but often, because the model has been airbrushed, we never see the reality.

Airbrushing, manipulation of images, photoshopping... these all sound like modern concepts but there's really nothing new in advertising that flatters a product by making it look better than it really is. That thought occurred to me recently when I was looking through some publicity material from the 1950s motor industry. Take the image shown here of a British saloon car, the Humber Hawk. Judging by this, the Hawk was exceptionally long and low. As for the people who own one, they are impossibly tall, thin and elegant. They don't use it for mundane things like going to their work or shopping, but spend their lives in evening dress attending parties and functions.

Sometimes you wonder whether toymakers were influenced by these flattering images rather than by the actual cars. True, most of the bigger companies like Dinky and Corgi toys aimed for accuracy, but some of the smaller makers would freely enhance the look of a car, changing the proportions to make it look better and not bothering about whether it representing a real vehicle.

Here are a couple of rather extreme examples where the makers have elongated the car to make it look sleeker and faster. The pale green roadster has a very long bonnet which gives the impression that it must have a

hugely powerful engine inside. The toy carries no name, being marked simply with the number 861 and Made in England. It is in fact one of a group of four diecasts sold as Toby Toys, made by Louis Marx (UK), the others being a saloon car, fire engine and breakdown truck. One quirky feature that appeals to me is the inscription at the back which reads "tank capacity 14 gallons".

A similar model comes from an American maker called Manoil, founded in Manhattan in the 1930s by two brothers called Jack and Maurice. They made metal toy vehicles and figures such as soldiers, cowboys and farm items. Production lasted until 1959

and apparently one explanation of the company's demise was that it did

not manage to follow the trend away from metal towards the use of plastic. Described simply as a 'roadster', the Manoil

exists with two different grille designs, one a bit like a pre-war Auburn and the other resembling a post-war Buick. Pictures of the real-life Auburn suggest it was a pretty long and impressive car but Manoil's roadster is stretched still further.

Both of these are typical of their era: simple castings, quickly sprayed in one colour with the addition of rubber wheels. They might have been basic but such toys met the need for cheap new toys in the austere post-war years until better finished, if more expensive, items were more easily obtainable.

Toys like these weren't meant to be scale replicas but were designed to catch the buyer's eye. So, like the 1950s advertising artwork, is this a case of being deliberately misleading or simply 'artistic licence'? I leave that to you, dear reader, to decide.



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
