
A warm welcome to all collectors! This issue is something special, as it marks the first time both titles have come together under one cover.

SOLIDO continues to expand its 1:18 scale Formula 1 range with the release of the official 2024 season models. Following the success of previous seasons, this new collection is based on meticulous work to reproduce the official liveries and the aerodynamic details specific to each team. Designed in collaboration with our technical partners, these F1 models combine precision, realism, and accessibility. Solido continues to expand its collection with entirely new models, designed from new moulds. True to its DNA, the brand combines authentic details, affordable pricing, and visual

appeal to satisfy collectors from all backgrounds: classics, youngtimers and legendary sports cars.

Two iconic colours for this legendary 1980s sedan. With its sharp lines and period correct wheels, this model will delight fans of the first 3 Series.

The Porsche 911 was a road and track legend, reinterpreted by Solido in 1:43 scale. This 964 RS stands out with its stripped-down look, discreet spoiler, and silvergrey colour accented by black racing stripes.

The legendary Nissan/Datsun 240Z has been reimagined with a widebody! A cult among JDM fans.



NEW MODELS FROM TSM AND TOPSPEED

TOPSPEED and its sister brand TrueScale Miniatures have just announced several new 1:18 and 1:43 motorsport subjects. The highlight for this selection is probably both 1:18 and 1:43 replicas of the Ford Mustang GT3s that were campaigned in the Laguna Seca round of the 2024 IMSA sportscar championship. Ford ran a colourful one-off livery at this race, commemorating 60 years of its Mustang

in competition. The #65 machine driven by Joey Hand and Dirk Muller placed 8th in the GTD Pro category, while the #64 example of teammates Mike Rockenfeller and Harry Tincknell took the chequered flag one position behind it. TSM have also confirmed the release of the Chevrolet Corvette Z06 GT3 and the Lamborghini Countach 1983 Monaco Grand Prix Pace Car.



RAILWAY MEMORABILIA SALE ACHIEVES £30,000

300 lots of railway memorabilia was sold by Charterhouse Auctioneers in Sherborne, Dorset. The full collection came from one collector who had amassed the objects over nearly 50 years. Following the collector's death, all items went to the auction house. The thousands of items had filled the collector's bungalow! The sale includes items from postwar British Rail as well as the pre-nationalisation era when individual private rail companies operated steam trains. High selling items included Leicester Square underground sign sold for £780 alongside a lamp with the words 'Portsmouth town' went for £800. Also, a Great Western Railway inspector's cap sold for £100. Online bidders came from all over for a piece of this collection, including people from as far as Australia.

The total hammer price was about £24,000, with the auctioneer's premium taking the total sale to £30,000.

LIGHTSABER SELLS FOR A RECORD £2.7M

A lightsaber used by Darth Vader in the original Star Wars films has sold for £2.7m at auction. The prop was featured in the films The Empire Strikes Back and Return of the Jedi. It was said to be the "standout" moment of the first day of sales at the auction held in Los Angeles on Thursday. The lightsaber was said to be the highest priced Star Wars item ever sold at auction. While the auction took place in California, many of the lots are from UK productions including a bullwhip, belt and holster made for Harrison Ford in the 1989 Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade film which sold for £360,000. Also featured was a Platform 9 3/4 sign used in the Harry Potter films which sold for £,102,573. The Propstore auction house regularly sells movie memorabilia and collectables, in their auction house in LA as well as online at propstore.com.


FROM the 4th of November 2025 to the 22nd of March 2026, The Cartoon Museum looks to the future – and to the past – to explore comics that went beyond the final frontier and predicted what humanity would look like in years to come. Will the Daleks invade in the year 2150? Did the space travel of Dan Dare or the dystopia of V for Vendetta come true in the 1990s? what will our future look like? Take a journey through time and space and answer these questions and more?

The Future Was Then features over 80 pages of original comic art alongside other items that tell stories about the future of humans from 1980 to 4000 AD. The exhibition includes original work from iconic futuristic worlds such as Tank Girl, Judge Dredd, Black Mirror, Buck Rogers and Thunderbirds, and original artwork by legendary artists such as Jamie Hewlett, Frank Bellamy and Sydney Jordan. Science fiction and dystopian comics gives us possible visions of Earth's future, imagining what may be in store for humanity.

What did comic creators in the past think the future would look like?

Science fiction is a cornerstone genre of comics. The limitless budget offered by a blank page allows artists to create incredible, detailed worlds before our eyes. Over the past hundred years, artists have conjured visions of future police states, intergalactic travel, everyday cybernetic technology, humans leaving Earth and even – gasp – humans using computers every day. Many creators are influenced by the world around them as they create, leaving imprints of their modern day in their future worlds

We will explore this in the exhibition through never

displayed items from Phoo Action by Jamie Hewlett and Mat Wakeham – a vision of 2004 rooted in the mid-nineties, and a precursor to Hewlett's later work on Gorillaz.

Have any predictions of the future been right?

Creators have explored ideas and visions of the future for over a hundred years in art and comics and have often been influenced by the events that they are living through at the time. Sometimes you can see how this changes an artist's ideas in real time — for instance, as probes sent out across the solar system discovered our closest neighbours were

inhabited, artists moved away from fantastical space beasts living on Mars towards uninhabited planets being colonised or fantastical travel in other universes.

Occasionally visions of the future come true. More often they don't! Either way, comics give us a way to consider threats and opportunities for humans and engage with ideas about our own future.

The Cartoon Museum is located at 63 Wells Street, 5-minute walk from Oxford Circus underground station. Head on down to see and experience what we've been talking about here.

FATHER AND SON WIN HOT WHEELS LEGENDS TOUR

ON 26th August at the NEC Birmingham, a classic BMW 3-Series build inspired by Group 2 race cars won the 2025 Hot Wheels Legends UK Tour at SlammedUK's Gravity Show. The result of a passionate 14-year build, the 900kg trackready E21 was created by a father and son team, Paul and Ethan Foster from Wickford, Essex.

Paul Foster's 1982 BMW E21 3-Series combines aggressive Group 2 styling with bespoke engineering in a true life-size Hot Wheels car. The 345/35/15 rear tyres, fibreglass wide-arch kit, alloy diffuser and deep front splitter give it a muscular stance, while the race livery featuring violet, red and blue accents, is a nod to 80s and 90s BMW touring cars. An original Group 5 rear wing, now with a carbon blade, adds downforce and drama in equal measure, whilst under the bonnet sits a 420 bhp 5.0 litre Rover V8 with twin Jenvey throttle bodies. Other performance features include flame spitting side pipes, DTM Getrag gearbox and Quaife LSD whilst GAZ coil overs and uprated Willwood brakes ensure it handles as well as its looks.

"It's amazing to win the Hot Wheels Legends Tour UK. Built together with my son Ethan, it's part of our family and we'll never sell it. We've both been huge Hot Wheels fans since we were kids. I just can't believe it," says Paul Foster. "Representing the UK at the next round of the competition is so exciting. Thank you to everyone for the support."

Together with Hot Wheels designer Charlie Angulo, judges Nicola Hume (host of Red Bull's 'Talking Bull' podcast), Jordan Clarke (founder of Slammed UK) and influencer Mat Armstrong scored each entry against design, authenticity and garage spirit criteria.

"This year, the UK once again delivered a lineup of jaw-dropping contenders, each brimming with raw garage spirit, authenticity and the kind of imagination that Hot Wheels enthusiasts crave," says Ted Wu, senior vice president and Global Head of Design for Vehicles and Building Sets at Mattel.

Historic race cars, JDM drifters, time attack competition cars and off-road conversions were all considered as Hot Wheels whittled a diverse array of more than 200 of the UK's finest custom car projects down to a shortlist of seven. Two of these, the Jaguar Mark VII and BMW 3 Series, were fast-tracked to the final, whilst the Volkswagen Polo faced four other contenders in the Legends Tour's biggest UK fan vote yet, receiving 37,006 votes. For the third time, the UK final was open to the public, taking place at the UK's largest modified and supercar show; SlammedUK's Gravity Show at the Birmingham NEC.

Paul's BMW will now head to the European final, one









of several virtual regional competitions, the others being the Middle East, Latin America and the United States. At each regional final, one vehicle will be selected to compete at the Global Grand Finale where the winner will be inducted into the Hot Wheels Garage of LegendsTM – a collection of the brand's most iconic and historic vehicles and transformed into a 1:64 scale die-cast, and available

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AUTOMOBILIA AND BARGAINS GALORE

JOHN Goodwin's September sale comprised a good selection of toys, alongside various items of motoring ephemera, tools and allied items. Automobilia is still strong: a Super Shell glass petrol globe with a blue tint was a good example, this realising £,700, plus fees. A BP Motor Spirit enamel advertising sign, despite being very worn, made £,280, and



a Nikki Lauda F1 piston, from one of his 1982 cars, a McLaren MPB4B in which he won the British Grand Prix, made £170.

In terms of toys, a charming item in the shape of a fort, which had been bought from Christies in 1990, stood out. Maker unknown, it featured moving doors and a working drawbridge and came with a hidden underground section. Measuring 60x50x55cm, it sold for £,150.

Some great bargains were to be had at the event. The Lines Brothers No 1 Super Garage came, remarkably, with its original box and was a snip at £25. A Marx (No 2734) tinplate and pressed steel mobile crane truck in green, dark yellow and grey was in exemplary condition and also came with a great box: this made £,75. A tray of



Robertson's Jam Golly figurines, forming a band, sold for £50 and someone took home a complete Subbuteo Continental Club Edition boxed set, with players, nets, ball and accessories for just a tenner. The Matchbox MF1 Fire Station was in good condition, although its box was tired (£,45); while £,160 was

very little money for a well-built Pocher kit of the famous Alfa Romeo racing car: these kits were a fortune in their day.

Finally, for card enthusiasts, the Yu-Gi-Oh Blue Eyes White Dragon and the Red Eyes Black Dragon cards from 1996 were a big draw for some: the pair, near mint, sold for £,220.

COLLECTABLES SHOW HEADS TO THE CAPITAL

LONDON'S Museum of Brands, in partnership with Anderson Entertainment, is to host 'Thunderbirds and Space: 1999 – A Celebration of Sci-fi Toys and Collectables. The exhibition opens on the 13th of September and runs until February 2026. This is to celebrate the anniversaries of Gerry Anderson series 'Thunderbirds' (first broadcast in 1965) and 'Space: 1999' (first premiered in 1975).

Online sneak peeks show a huge collection of items that will be on display from many

Anderson shows. Some of the pieces are on loan from private collections and are rarely seen by the public.

It has been co-curated by internationally known graphic designer Malcolm Garrett MBE; the exhibition features over 300 curated objects from the Robert Opie collection alongside private collectors' items. As well as sci-fi enthusiasts, the exhibition offers appeal to fans of pop culture and design, highlighting the mid-century aesthetics and



bold visual storytelling that defined Anderson's work. With its colourful, imaginative displays and family-friendly format, it also provides an engaging and educational experience for

visitors of all ages.

The Museum of Brands is located at 111 - 117 Lancaster Road, Notting Hill, London W11 1QT. The museum recommends booking in advance. ■



TRAINS, TRAINS... AND TRAINS

THE Popular Trains auction held by SAS yielded no fewer than 681 lots and encompassed a huge range of scales, from petite to massive. There were bargains to be had, also...

If £35 wasn't a bargain price to buy some useful Tri-ang Battle Space items, to wit a R696 Satellite Launching Car, a R216 Rocket launching car with rocket and nosecone, a Well wagon with Minic crane load, an unboxed Well wagon with Minic tank load and a similar well wagon without load, together with a missile launch wagon and a radar wagon, then I don't know what is.

Fifteen Hornby Skaledale kits, all unmade, together with some accessories, achieved $\mathcal{L}130$; and a Trix 00 gauge prewar LMS Princess Presentation Set, comprising a LMS maroon 6201 'Princess' locomotive and tender, LMS maroon coaches, a dining car, First Class and Third with Brake and controller, made $\mathcal{L}160$. The whole was in its original presentation case. Another boxed Trix set, with the Scotsman and Pullman carriages, also in OO gauge,

sold for a bit less, at £110.

The serious money at the event gravitated towards the bespoke end of the market. A Carette gauge 1, 4-4-0 engine and tender, lined brown was live steam and made £1,400; while a single Marklin early gauge 1, 28 centimetre GNR First/Third dining car sold for £,1,100. Finally, a Bing/ Carette (or similar) gauge 1, 4-4-2 locomotive and tender in GNR (Great Northern Railway) lined green livery, bearing the moniker 'Atlantic', really looked the business: this made £,250.

One odd (but useful) item was the model maker's lathe, which was accompanied by various textbooks: a low estimate of £80 was rapidly passed, the instrument achieving £210.





DIECASTS FOR THE DIEHARDS

VECTIS held a number of sales at the start of September (where do all these toys come from?) and there was much to please the diecast collector in its September 4 auction. Sci-fi and spy themes, as ever, did rather well.

A superb Dinky Toys 359 Space 1999 Eagle Transporter, in a mint bubble, and in green and white with chrome rear thrusters, red side thrusters and its decal sheet, achieved £,460; several other Eagle Transporters were sold, but none came close to this one. A Dinky 360 Space 1999 Eagle Freighter, in white and red, closed on £,340. The Corgi 270 James Bond Aston Martin DB5 in silver with a red interior sold for £,240; and a Corgi Toys 336 James Bond Toyota 2000GT, from the film

"You Only Live Twice", was bid to £150; finally, a Corgi 268 Black Beauty from the Green Hornet television series hit £180. An unusual item was the Corgi Toys Juniors E3019 James Bond gift set taken from the film Octopussy: this included a Range Rover in maroon, with the harder-to-find wheel variation; a horse box and a Micro-jet in red, white and blue. On a mint carded blister, it sold for £120.

Away from diecasts proper, the Scalextric C64 Bentley with a black body and a grey tonneau, driver and racing No.4 decal was boxed and made £140; while a group of Matchbox Regular Wheels and Matchbox Superfast carry cases, comprising 11 in all, raised £200.

What's new

IMAGINED OVER 90 YEARS AGO, BROUGHT TO LIFE IN 2024 AND NOW AVAILABLE IN 1/18

t is rare that a forthcoming new model release hits so many interest groups and a highly topical subject all in one hit as AutoCult's massive 1/18 Auto Union-Porsche Typ 52 "Schnellsportwagen" does.

The challenge in reviewing it is knowing where to start. Should it be with the model or the fullsized car first conceived back in the 1930s but not actually constructed until nine decades later?

Maybe, first, it is best to take a step back to 2017 when AutoCult's "Set of the year" (#99117) combining its annual book with an exclusive model, brought us a 1/43 representation of the Auto Union-Porsche Typ 52. At that stage and in celebrated AutoCult style, it was yet another of its models of historic 'never made' automobiles brought forward with a best interpretation of surviving scant historical documentation from the Porsche Engineering design office prepared in the 1930s. Now eight years later AutoCult's second bite at the cherry is exactingly modelled from the real car, commissioned by Audi Tradition in Ingolstadt and painstakingly built by world leaders in their field Crosthwaite & Gardiner, Buxted, East Sussex, England who already had extensive experience with, amongst many other classics, restoration of the mighty 'Silver Arrows' Grand Prix cars of Mercedes-Benz and Auto Union

The hereditary of the Typ 52 is that of Auto

Union's intended sibling to that legendary 'Silver Arrows" series of Grand Prix race cars of the 1930s with a fully enclosed body and an unusual seating layout: the driver centrally positioned, flanked slightly aft on either side by passenger seats. Three seats in total in a sumptuously appointed cabin separated from first a stowage cabin and then, at the rear, the powerful 16-cylinder engine. In many ways it was a layout reminiscent of contemporary aeroplane design but intended for 'flying' long distances by road rather than in the air. As such it was intended to be sold to customers for driving in long-distance races such as the Mille Miglia or in sports car competitions such as the endurance races at Spa-Francorchamps or Le Mans

Appreciation of the interior of scale model saloon cars is often hindered by limited visibility, but make no mistake AutoCult's attention to detail is extensive even if appreciation (and photography!) of it is hindered by the relatively small glazing areas of the Typ 52 "Schnellsportwagen"s windows. AutoCult is best known for its modelling in 1/43 with occurrences of work in 1/18 being comparatively few and far between - its 1/18 model of the Otto Mathé Fetzenflieger released in 2016 in both 1/43 (No 07002, April) and 1/18 (No 80001, November) featured in the May 2021 issue ("Exceptional in every way") being a rare example.

At 300mm long AutoCult's 1/18, Avenue 43 branded, Typ 52 "Schnellsportwagen" is as imposing as it is impressive. Comparison of the model with photographs of the full sized Typ 52 at its presentation and track run

> at Goodwood Festival of Speed during July last year clearly illustrates the degree of authenticity captured

by the model.

Modelled with AutoCult's usual attention to detail and quality it is undoubtedly a significant release from the points of view of both its multiple historical connections and to being a leading contender for "Model of the Year 2025."

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A CLASSIC COMBINE WITH WORKING CHARM

arGe Models' all new Lexion 480 combine, a combine Claas launched in 1995, is a high-quality, detailed model. It's largely metal with detachable C750 grain table and two-wheel table transport trailer. On the table the height and forward/aft position of the freely rotating reel is adjustable. There are red pickup tines on the knife, the main feed auger rotates freely and for connecting to the feed elevator the yellow drive shaft. Two stiff rams support the feed elevator.

Cab access steps swing forward when transporting the combine. There's patterned flooring and red fire extinguisher at the entrance to the cab. Like all MarGe Models agricultural models, the cab door does not open but the interior is beautifully laid out and detailed. The grain tank lids open and as they open the auger inside the tank springs up into its working position. A ram swings the unloading auger from its transport to working position.

At the rear the combine's provided with steerable rear wheels and a drawbar for attaching the trailer carrying the table. There's a silver access ladder, straw spreaders and road signage detailed.

Limited to a 2,000 run, the model is available from Claas and its dealer network only.



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ast month, we looked at 1:43 replicas of all the cars that entered the top class in the 2024 Le Mans 24H, the Hypercars. Those prototypes follow specific rules and are made exclusively to race in the WEC (World Endurance Championship). We had at least one scale model of each team, showing not only the different shapes of all the cars, but also a variety of liveries, entered by both the works and privateer teams. There was only one prototype missing: the Isotta Fraschini, which has not yet been released as a scale model.

This time, we're featuring the third class in the famous French race, the LMGT3. This is the slower class of cars, behind the second class, named the LMP2 and made entirely by privateer teams that all use the same chassis/engine combination. We're not going to give much attention to this second class for now. What we have here are all the LMGT3 cars entered in the 2024 Le Mans 24H race. All of them are either works teams entries or heavily supported satellite teams, proving that this class matters for constructors. It is also very relevant for drivers, both professional, semi-professional and experienced amateurs.

Like the leading class, the LMGT3 class is also ruled by the BoP (Balance of Performance) that changes different parameters in each car, to equalise performance in all of them and give a winning chance to every car entered. This is the theory, at least. Obviously, not all teams agree with the application of BoP every time. The rules also state that this

is a subject that can't be talked about in the paddock or with the Press. Those who break this rule will be fined. So, let's talk about something else, just in case.

HIGH QUALITY RESINCASTS

Following his self-given mission to reproduce all the cars entered in the Le Mans 24H race since the first event in 1923, modelmaker Spark took less than a year to release all the LMGT3 cars entered in the 2024 edition of the race. This is quite a feat, even considering that a few of those models already existed in their back catalogue. In this case, they only need to change the decals and eventually modify a few details.


This is what modelling is all about: details, and here we are facing one of the best model makers in the business. Pick any of these 1:43 scale models and look closely around the body. You'll find an incredible level of detail in some of the pictures João took; it just looks like the real car. Just imagine the level of craftsmanship the workers need to have at the factory to achieve this level of quality in the thousands of models they send to shops

around the world every month.

Looking at the models in these pages, the most attentive of you surely already notice there's a car missing and not a less relevant one: the Porsche 911 GT3 R that won the LMGT3 class in this race. As far as we know, the modelmaker and team owner are still discussing the value of royalties that the first should pay to the second.

JUST ONE LMP2

Just to make sure we covered all types of cars that raced in Le Mans, let's start with a single LMP2, the Oreca 07 Gibson. This is the car that all competitors use in this class, not because it is mandatory, but simply because they believe it is the best option on the market. We chose one of the available models, the colourful number 23. The car has a prototype structure and body, only much simpler to operate than a Hypercar. The model captures the aero vertical fins ahead of each rear wheel very well, plus all the small aerials and sensors around the body. The headlamps also look very realistic, and the wheels have a colour line, pink at the front and red at the rear. At the rear, we can see all the air scoops to let hot air out



from the mid-engine compartment and the extractor for the floor of the car. This one was entered by United Autosports and finished 42nd.

THE LMGT3 CLASS

We begin the LMGT3 review with a pair of traditionally propelled layout cars: longitudinal front-engine and Rear Wheel Drive. The yellow car with number 44 is a Ford Mustang LMGT3, entered by the Proton Competition team that finished in 31st place. Yellow with black stripes always looks excellent in a racing car, and here the theme includes a galloping horse on each side of the car, a big rear wing (with a "Spark" sticker) and a long front spoiler. It looks just great, as almost all Mustangs do. The model has perfect proportions, great wheels, a realistic rear extractor, and a perfect finish, not excess shine as some

modelmakers tend to do. Next to the Ford, we have one of the two Lexus RC LMGT3 F entered by Akkodis ASP Team. This is a much more discreet car, as is the street version. It has nice wheel-arch extensions, good headlamps and the trademark Lexus front grille. All of this and more is perfectly represented in the scale model. Through the windows, we can see the cockpit, featuring a racing seat and an instrument panel. The shape of the rear extractor is particularly interesting, with four big vertical shark fins.

For the next pair, we have a confrontation between a mid-engine car and a front-engine one. The first is a Corvette Z06 LMGT3 R, and the second is a BMW M4 LMGT3. Obviously, the M4 needs to be higher so the driver can see over the engine. Still, it looks sleek in a conventional way and features a livery similar to another BMW that entered Le

Mans in the 1970s. It has big air scoops on the front bonnet to let hot air escape from the radiators and the XXL BMW double kidney front grille that brought some controversy when the street version was launched. The Z06 LMGT3 looks closer to the road car than the M4, probably because the Z06 you can buy is already a very aggressive design. It has a big front grille for the radiator and nicely designed wheel rims. The front splitter follows the arrow shape of the front, which is nice. The model offers a good representation of the LED front lower spotlights. In the rear, the eyes go straight to the double exhaust pipes, over the extractor. Car 81 was painted in reverse to this 82, the yellow swapped places with the carbon fibre finish. The BMW entered by Team WRT finished 28th, and the Corvette entered by TF Sport finished 38th.





FERRARI VS MCLAREN

We are more used to seeing McLaren fight Ferrari in Formula 1 than in the WEC. However, both constructors had cars entered in the 2024 Le Mans 24H race.

Car number 59 had a livery with the front 2/3 in carbon fibre and the rear painted papaya. It featured the same race number as the McLaren F1 that won the race in 1995. That was the only difference between the sister car, number 95 (both entered by United Autosports, the team owned by Zak Brown, CEO of McLaren F1) and the windshield sun visor, papaia in the 59 and black in the other. The McLaren 720S LMGT3 Evo also resembles the road car. Still, it is even closer to the ground, featuring double winglets at both front

corners and a generous rear wing, held in place by a pair of supports from above. It is what aerodynamicists call "swan necks", and apparently, they have better efficiency at higher speeds. From the rear view, we can see the wider air scoops compared with the road cars. It did not finish the race.

Next to it, we have one of the two Ferrari 296 LMGT3s, entered by Vista AF Corse, a semi-official team. Painted metallic grey and red, it is not your typical Ferrari livery; however, it still looks great. The shape is as close as possible to that of a road car, and you can see that there is design even in this race version. Just look at the shape of the rear-view mirrors to see what

I mean. There are small winglets at the front, finished in carbon fibre, and air scoops over the front wheels to allow hot air to escape from the brakes. The rear view is simpler than the McLaren's with fewer vertical fins for the extractor and a simple mesh with a pair of menacing exhausts in rocket launcher style. Car 55 finished in 33rd place overall.

TRADITIONAL VS. ORIGINAL

Once a dominator of the lower class in endurance races, Aston Martin only had two cars running in the 2024 Le Mans edition. Car number 777 was a Vantage AMR LMGT3 entered by the D'Station Racing that finished 36th.











Painted a very traditional dark green with a large black stripe, it looks very good. At first, it seems to look like previous Vantages, but all body panels were revised, and the model reflects it.

The last model in this article is the one with the most original livery. It is not a new car; it has been used by many privateer teams in various races where the GT3 class is admitted. And there are a lot of those races around the world, which was one of the reasons the GT3 was also admitted in Le Mans, replacing the much more expensive LMGTE, which could not be used anywhere else except the WEC.

The Lamborghini Huracan LMGT3
Evo2 with race number 85 was entered by the Iron Dames team and driven by ladies only: Bovy/Gatting/Frey. They finished 32nd. The scale model is probably the most difficult to make in this collection, not because of the typical Lamborghini shapes, perfectly reproduced. The model features a scoop on the roof to capture fresh air for the engine, a feature not typically found in a road car. The rear side looks very dramatic, with the exhausts in the middle. The wheels are very nice, both the rims and the tyres, with markings.

The most striking feature of this model

is clearly the body, which is almost entirely covered in decals, resembling real race cars. This is a highly specialised type of work. Written on each side of the car is the motto, "Women driven by dreams." It's an impressive model of the 2024 Le Mans 24H car, sporting race number 85.

As said at the beginning of this article, let's hope the Porsche 911 GT3 R LMGT3 with race number 91, which finished 27th and won the LMGT3 class, also joins this group in a short time. So Spark can continue its mission of modelling all the cars that ever raced in the most challenging race in the world, the Le Mans 24 hours.





The unsung heroes of the motor racing world

n the fast-moving, high-rolling world of motorsport, it's always the racing cars that get the media attention. But what about the trusty works support trucks and vans that follow the teams, equipped to supply their every need?

The books, films, DVDs, and videos of historic British thoroughbred and sports car club racing are full of wonderful images of the men and their machines, battling against the weather, the track, and, indeed, their own mechanical fallibility.

Even the special coach-built transporters for the racing cars got a lot of publicity and press coverage.

However, the vans and trailers of the smaller companies, which ensured the spares and parts all reached the trackside for the race, rarely got a mention. Yet just occasionally, they were captured on film.

In the early halcyon golden days of the 1950s and

1960s, transporters for racing cars began as humble standard-issue vans, towing a trailer with a single racing car mounted on it.

One such example is the Ford E83W pick-up used by Elva during the late 1950s and early 1960s.

No models of this vehicle existed when I wanted to add one to my collection, therefore, a chop was in order. The Ford E83W pick-up pictured here was originally a Matchbox Dinky Collection Radio Times van, with rear van body cut off, a new cab back formed, and a pick-up body made from a Corgi trailer. Note the towing hooks, which are also Corgi.

The accompanying photograph, by kind permission



of Roger Dunbar, shows the pick-up towing a trailer with Elva on board. I used the trailer from the Corgi Gift set 37, and the car is the resin hand-built Elva from Geoff Sears of South Africa.

The Elva car company also ran their very own Morris Commercial PV support van, which takes us even further back, as this vehicle was first introduced by Morris at the 1939 Motor Show. Although the original van has long gone to the great breakers in the sky, Roger Dunbar, who now owns the Elva name, found a similar van in Hull, which was the same year of manufacture, and had been fully restored. Roger bought it in 2006 and set about the cosmetic work of repainting it in the Elva team's colours. This work was undertaken expertly by David Cooper and Tony Brooks of Gerston Farm, Storrington. The van regularly puts in appearances at the Goodwood Revival race meeting and joins the "big boys" in transporter lineups at the historic motorsport shows at Stoneleigh.

Fortunately, I was able to track down a model of the Morris Commercial PV made in resin by Classic Commercials. With the kind help of Roger, who had sets of transfers for a model project of his own, I have been able to create the model you see pictured.

The Morris J Type van succeeded the Morris PV in 1949, and the J type also had a very full and varied life serving many motoring businesses. Being manufactured by Morris, it was not surprising that it should have connections with the Abingdon built MGs.

To recognise this close association, Corgi issued an atmospheric set no. 97695, known as the Abingdon Set, commemorating the MG marque. It contained

two racing MGAs and a unique Morris J van in British Racing Green, with signwriting declaring it to be from the Competitions Department at Abingdon. Worth about £,30 now, it's an easy way to begin this fascinating theme for a collection.

Pete Kenna's range has for some time included this lovely Standard Vanguard Transporter, produced from original pictures. A replica of the real thing is now being made using a Standard Vanguard van chassis and body, with Pete's model serving as a guide.

John Cooper died on December 24, 2000, but his legacy of a phenomenal success rate in everything from the Indianapolis 500 to Formula 1, and with tuned Mini Coopers, will always be a household name. In miniature, this memory has been commercially kept alive by Vanguards, with a perfect starter model in this group of vehicles of Vanguards 14005, the John Cooper cars Minivan. Made in the days when it could proudly state on its baseplate that it was made in England, its British Racing Green livery and nostalgic, precise lettering in white, with red shading for the Cooper name, stand out as an important van as it goes about its business. With a

Another Matchbox Dinky Toy Collection Ford E83W was

commandeered to create the Ford John Cooper van seen here, complete with its very own trailer. The van just needed a Plasticard header board across the roof and a Corgi tow hook, but the trailer is a converted Corgi Pennyburn trailer, with slab sides of Plasticard again, and a tarpaulin top created from an old handkerchief! However, it is, as always, the signwriting on commercial vehicles that brings them to life. After some patient research with the History of Advertising Trust in Norfolk, I had the colours required for the signwriting from my black and white photographs. I then sought the expertise of a master transfer maker, Paul Robson, to create the signs in miniature. I think the result is quite pleasing and does the vehicles justice.

A recent commission from Allard to build some of Western and Auto Replicas' kits of these lovely cars led me to develop a model of the one and only Allard works van, a Ford E83W, using only one black and white photo of this vehicle, based at the firm's headquarters in Southeast London. Fortunately, a more accurate SMTS cast of the E83W was obtained, stripped of its original livery, and sprayed in Ford Meadow Green, likely the same colour as the Allard company's van. Bespoke transfers were made from the original signage shown in the image, and a delightful memento of Allard's past involvement in competition now resides in the Allard Archives.

From their early base in Cheshunt, Lotus also used a van and trailer to move their racing machinery. One picture unearthed shows a Thames 400E van pulling a substantial 2 axle trailer, with an Indy car. These vans were made by Ford from 1957 to 1965, when they were finally superseded by the introduction of the

with a Plasticard sheet, followed by filler. Next,

the windows were filled in, and the doors glued

In John Player Special Team Lotus days, several wonderfully liveried vehicles appeared — the first being the JPS Team Lotus Dodge Travco motorhome. Spark has reproduced it to their usual superlative standard, with one of the most detailed interiors I have seen. Cabinets, beds, and plush seating are all clearly visible, the paint finish is wonderful, and the gold transfers superb. The real vehicle was used as overnight sleeping quarters for the team during the fantastic 1973 season, when Emerson Fittipaldi and Ronnie Peterson raced to glory for Colin Chapman's JPS Team Lotus.

Ford, of course, has had a Motorsport Division for many years, and its Escorts have an enviable reputation on dirt and track, but what about their support vehicles? Now there may be others, but the only one I have found so far is the recently introduced model of the Ford Transit van of 1979, seen here in the tell-tale Ford colours of blue and

white. The blue oval discreetly appears on the side panels, and the beautifully made photo-etched roof rack is equipped with a complete set of four spare wheels for the racer of the moment. It's a typical Spark creation, with all the detail and accuracy we have come to expect from their range.

So, the evolution of the works support vehicles, from humble beginnings of pick-ups and trailers, became a fertile ground for colossal coach-built leviathans, the subject of another article entirely.

For the duration of this article at least, the "back office" support vehicles that enable the exotic racing cars to take all the acclaim have become the stars themselves. Whether you collect commercial vehicles, have a racing theme, or have just found a new angle that your collection has not covered yet, I hope you've found the background to some of them interesting.

his month's 'Little and Large' features the Jaguar E-type as raced by Briggs Cunningham and Roy Salvadori in the 1962 Le Mans 24-hour race, where it finished 1st in class and 4th overall. This was the first of two Le Mans races in which American entrepreneur Cunningham entered a team of E-types; he returned a year later with a trio of lightweight hardtops. The 1962 car was described as "semi-lightweight" and used the familiar-looking coupe body with what appeared to be very few modifications over the standard road car. However, Briggs Cunningham was a racer at heart and a competitive team owner, so there were many changes made under the skin of the E-type to make it competitive. Representing these cars is a trio of 1:43 scale and an unusual (at least in diecast terms) and only slightly larger 1:32 scale model.

Starting then, with the more familiar 1:43 scale offerings. When placed together, the first thing that you notice is not how identical they all are, but quite the opposite, how different they are from each other. Let's take a look at each in turn. The earliest of the 1:43 comes from Italian manufacturer Model Box. At the time of production, these models were considered quite expensive for collectors, as they featured a high level of detail and often included small (and sometimes unique) additional parts. It does, however, capture the shape of the E-type well. The high level of detail includes triple

windscreen wipers, a missing front bumper (to reduce weight and aid aerodynamics), a missing rear bumper, as well as the correct design Dunlop racing wheels. The door handles are separate items, as are the front indicators and rear lights. It is also worth noting the slanted bonnet number '10' and the lack of stripes at the bottom of the tailgate where another slanted '10' sits. The correct number plate, 1337VC, is fitted to both the front and rear. Although this model is showing its age a little with a lack of detailing around the windows and slightly yellowed decals, when compared to more recent offerings, it is still a superb model.

While known for models of mostly Japanese cars, Kyosho first released their version of the E-type coupe in 1997. In November 1999, they released a 'racing' version (No. 03064A) in the livery of Cunningham's 1962 Le Mans car. This differed from the regular coupe as it was correctly missing front and rear bumpers,

had the additional 'fly screen' a third of the way down the bonnet (something missing from the Model Box version), the small spats just behind the front wheels, and the roof-top fuel filler cap. The interior is also highly detailed, with plenty of dashboard detail included as well as a fitted roll cage. Also, being a more modern model, many of the separate fitted details are finer in their finish. The door handles look less chunky than the Model Box ones, while the rear lights have a chromed edge to them, making them look more realistic. The front '10' is straight on this model, while there is no number on the rear at all, but the twin blue stripes continue down to the lower edge of the rear, just above the number plate. The only minor downside to this otherwise accurate and detailed model is the wheels. While designed to represent the lightweight sports Dunlop wheels, the holes in them are just too big for them to look 'right'.

The final 1:43 scale is a resin offering



from Spark. This is highly detailed, as you would expect from Spark and is also highly sought after. The shape is good, but it is the level of detail that sets this model apart from the others, as you expect at a higher price point. The additional fly screen is there, albeit further along the bonnet when compared to the Kyosho. I particularly like the tiny air intakes at the rear of the 'A' pillar, the sliding and part-open door windows and the open rear side windows. A tiny tax disc, which expired in September 1962, is on the front screen – which is a neat touch. This one, like the Kyosho, features a straight '10' on the bonnet, as well as a not-slanted '10' on the lower part of the tailgate and the twin blue stripes.

So, despite all three being based on the same real car, the details of the number positions and stripes differ for each model. Period photos of the real thing are hard to come by, so it's difficult to say conclusively which is the most accurate.

Slightly larger in size is Saico's 1:32 offering. Although this scale is widely recognised as the uniform scale for slot car racing, it is still relatively unused in terms of diecast models (with the exception of popular farming models). The basic shape of this model is good, and being a larger scale has the added 'bonus' of opening doors and boot. The thing that sets this model apart somewhat is that it is clearly a





'road-going' E-type that's been produced in the livery of the '62 Cunningham Le Mans cars. It still retains the spoked wheels from the Saico road versions, as well as keeping the chrome front and rear bumpers and front grille. It is also missing the spats behind the front wheels and the roof-mounted filler cap, as well as having the wrong number plate fitted. I'm sure with a little work and sourcing some more accurate wheels, this could be 'improved'.

Which is best? That is not so easy to

answer. The Spark is the most realistic, whereas the Model Box has possibly the most charm (these two could have almost featured in a 'Then and Now').

Outside the scope of this feature, but maybe still relevant, I have created several code 3 models of Cunningham's 62 racer. Two Matchbox (one original Lesney and one modern 1-75 size) and a 1:18 Bburago sit alongside these four in my cabinet — quite possibly the most 'Little and Large' examples of a single car I have!

MG 1100

A real favourite from the regular wheels days was MG 1100. The real car was a fabulous little thing with its pretty looks and zippy tuned lump, and the Matchbox was just as appealing.

Painted in a beautiful shade of green, that's the colour that was kept for its Superfast launch, although this quickly changed to a rather marvellous metallic blue. Thankfully, it kept its doggie on the rear seat feature too.

Only ever being produced with narrow Superfast wheels (the wider versions would have looked ridiculous unless it was for a really souped up version), it lasted in the range long enough to get two box styles but was gone from the range by the time the 1972 catalogue came around.

SLINGSHOT DRAGSTER

Catalogue: 1972-75 Box Styles: H

The real car was a fabulous little thing with its pretty looks and zippy tuned lump, and the Matchbox was just as appealing.

Slingshot Dragster was loosely based on a top fuel dragster, but with a pair of the standard Matchbox V8 engines with their flamboyant exhaust system. It had a driver figure that was mostly obscured by a slightly over-scaled cockpit and a flaming "9" decal along the nose, although some have appeared with the star and flame decal from Guildsman I.

For a model that was only in the range for four years, it came in three distinct colour schemes. It was first issued in hot pink, with a black painted baseplate and black exhaust pipes. This was followed by a very short run in orange, which is considered really rare - although two distinct shades are known, a very vibrant orange and a much lighter shade. The final colour was an unusual metallic steel blue, with red pipes.

FIRE CHIEF CAR

Production: 1976-80 **Catalogue**: 1976-80 **Box Styles:** J

Fire Chief wasn't a particularly attractive vehicle, being a generic muscle car type with a long bonnet and very small boot. It was, of course, painted fire engine red, with a 'Fire' label on each door. The base and grille were bare metal, the glazing and roof light were blue tinted, and the interior and hood scoops were chrome. There were no real variations.

CATERPILLAR TRACTOR

Production: 1980-82 **Catalogue**: 1981-82 Box Styles: L

Painted the regulation Caterpillar yellow, with a bare metal base and engine and a yellow plastic blade, the removable cab was in tan plastic. Unlike Atlas Excavator, it had working rubber crawler tracks.

Since its introduction, the model has been almost ever present in the Matchbox range, wearing a variety of colours.

he Silverstone Festival, one of the world's largest historic motor sport gatherings, once again underlined its place at the top of the tree over the three-day August Bank Holiday. The main feature, of course, was the racing, with 20 races over the weekend, many featuring full grids, and all showcasing full-on action despite the rarity and value of the machinery. The full spectrum of historic racing was covered, from early post-war 500 cc cars and Formula Junior, through 1950s - 70s sports and GTs, touring and saloon cars, to more recent Formula One and Endurance prototypes.

Celebrating 75 years of World Championship racing, this year's centrepiece display was of 34 cars representing each of the drivers who won the Championship over the years, right up to the present day.


For model enthusiasts, this year the main attraction was once again RM Toys' huge marquee. Besides the vast range of modern models in all scales from 1:64, including thousands of Hot Wheels, to 1.8, there were dozens of large trays filled with older diecast, generally in good condition, and all at £2.00 each or 3 for £5.00. Again, a massive choice, from classic Dinky, Corgi, and Matchbox of all ages, to older Solido, CIJ and other brands from the past, not seen so often, even a few early handbuilt models. Plenty of temptation, and I admit to succumbing!

The other area of interest to model enthusiasts was in the automobilia section of the traditional car auction by Iconic Auctioneers, albeit at rather more exclusive prices. A set of 16 1:43 competition cars, as driven by the late Ayrton Senna

throughout his career, in a custom-made display cabinet, sold for a healthy \pounds 1,140. Most other models were larger-scale and included a beautiful replica of Juan Fangio's 1957 Maserati 250F by Midland Racing Models, which sold for £,774. A similar 1954 Ferrari 553 Squalo, the car driven by Froilan Gonzales at the French Grand Prix, also sold for \pounds 774. For those of us with

larger display space and deeper pockets still, there was a fine 1:5 scale Ferrari F430 from the "Challenge" series in its display case, which sold for £,3,120.

So, something for the pocket of every model collector, if we could be tempted away from the racing. The other emphasis of the festival has always been on fun for all family members, and the list of other attractions this year was no exception, with a traditional funfair and carnival rides, games and child-friendly challenges, a wide range of foodie-related events, demonstrations and tasting sessions, the Silverstone Museum and the "Shopping Village".

Next year, the Bank Holiday weekend will see Silverstone host Chris Evans' "Carfest", but there is already talk of a historic racing event taking place, maybe earlier in the year. Watch this space!



nce hailed as the sleek successor to VHS, the humble DVD first arrived in 1995 and quickly reshaped home entertainment. With crisper visuals, deeper storage, and a treasure trove of bonus content, including director commentaries and deleted scenes, DVDs didn't just play films, they invited fans behind the curtain.

By the early 2000s, they'd turned living rooms into mini cinemas and helped usher video rental stores toward extinction, especially with services like LoveFilm delivering titles straight to doorsteps. Blockbuster, once a Saturday night staple, closed its final UK store in 2013.

In the age of streaming dominance, DVDs are making a surprising comeback, much like vinyl before them. But for savvy collectors, it's not just about nostalgia. Hidden among charity shop shelves and car boot bargains lie rare titles that can fetch serious cash. For those in the know, spotting a collectable DVD isn't just a thrill, it's a potential windfall.

If readers have a library of DVDs gathering dust, now might be the perfect time to search for hidden gems.

DVDS AS COLLECTABLES: HUNTING FOR RARITY

Browsing eBay reveals a thriving market for DVDs, particularly those featuring limited edition packaging, anniversary releases, or out-of-print titles.

Several factors influence a DVD's monetary value, including rarity (such as how many were produced) and Anniversary

releases, where special editions are tied to film milestones. Hammer Films, which re-releases many of its classic vintage Sci-Fi and Horror movies, recently celebrated the 50th anniversary of its cult fantasy-horror film 'Captain Kronos -Vampire Hunter' in a stylish box set that includes artwork and a promotional poster to appeal to Hammer fans. Whether the DVDs of classics are new releases or decades old, the collector's packaging, such as unique box sets and those linked with exclusive merchandise, is an important factor. A prime example is the classic horror movie The Exorcist. Over the years, the 1973 global hit has seen multiple anniversary re-releases, including a 25th Anniversary Edition and, most recently, a 50th Anniversary restoration, which was limited to only 2,000 copies.

While streaming has largely taken over the home entertainment market, a niche but strong collector's market still exists for DVDs and, increasingly, Blu-rays and 4K UHD discs. The value of these items is typically driven by rarity, limited editions, unique packaging, and nostalgic appeal, rather than just the film itself.

WHY ARE DVDS STILL **COLLECTABLE?**

In an era dominated by streaming platforms and digital libraries, the enduring appeal of DVDs might seem surprising. Yet for cinephiles like myself, physical media offers something streaming rarely can, such as extra features, whether it's the director, producer and actors' commentary tracks, or original cinema trailers and behindthe-scenes mini documentaries that are included on the disc. One of my favourite DVD Box Sets in my personal collection is the Ealing Studios DVD Collection, which unfolds into a stylish book strip containing



four Ealing movie classics, embossed with stunning artwork, and featuring a series of postcards promoting Ealing classics. It is these kinds of 'goody-bag' additions that offer the DVD viewer more than digital downloads.


There's a tactile joy in owning a film you love. The physical presence of the movie, captured in DVD format with its artwork, can conjure memories of first seeing the film in the cinema and the events associated with that experience. Even though the 1972 Bond movie 'Live & Let Die' may not be the best in the franchise, owning the DVD and occasionally glimpsing it while browsing through my collection rekindles my childhood memories of first seeing it at the Odeon cinema in Bradford with my mother.

OBSCURE, BANNED AND DISCONTINUED

Some vintage classics or niche titles are unavailable to be streamed, such as the TV cult hit *Twin Peaks: The Entire Mystery*, which includes the long-lost "Missing Pieces" footage, essential for fans and only available on Blu-ray. In other cases, certain movies are unavailable on streaming sites and rarely, if ever, shown or repeated on TV channels. Film critic Maxine Kershaw, who has a personal collection of nearly 500 movies and TV shows on DVD, explains how she searches for her favourite films on disc, which she would otherwise never see again.

"One of my favourite movies is the British cult comedy *Eat The Rich* made by Ch4's *Comic Strip Presents* team in the early 80s. For some reason, it has never been repeated on television, possibly due to legal issues, and it's not available in full on YouTube. It's only in existence as a DVD import, although difficult to get hold of. It's definitely one I'll search for to get hold of both for personal pleasure of watching, and also as an investment due to its cult status."

Maxine believes that rarity is the primary reason why movies on the DVD format are so sought after and can increase in value over time. "Finding an old DVD of a film that is no longer available to be seen on any platform really adds to its value. My one regret is that a few years ago I gave away a then two-decade-old VHS cassette of the controversial British flick Straw Dogs, which was distributed just at the time the movie was banned by the BBFC (British Board of Film Classification) on video. Of course, today the Dustin Hoffman and Susan George starring violent thriller is available on DVD/Blu-ray, but a VHS copy, no matter how ropey with that unique history, would be a rare collectable."



Whether you're a seasoned collector or rediscovering your nostalgia for DVDs, there's no doubt that physical media has carved out its own dedicated fan base, resisting the digital tide and proving that old-school entertainment still holds value. Ryan Toomey, editor of *Film Geek*, rather succinctly summed up the appeal.

"Collectors and cinephiles prize DVDs for their nostalgic value, the desire to own a piece of cinema history, and the joy of collecting. Rare DVDs become popular auction items because they offer collectors the chance to own something unique and often irreplaceable."

TOP-PRIZED DVD COLLECTABLES: For serious collectors looking at DVDs as investments, here are some highly coveted titles that readers should keep an eye out for, or in their own collections.



his year marks the 80th anniversary of Meccano's return to toy making after the Second World War. Mark Nolan re-assesses the impact, success and decline of the iconic 'Dublo' brand of model railways.

Hornby-Dublo, launched in 1938 by Meccano Ltd, stands as one of the most influential developments in model railway history. It not only established standards that are still in use today but also reshaped expectations of detail, scale fidelity, and electrical operation in toy trains. Across its lifecycle (1938–1964), Dublo evolved from a robust three-rail system to finely detailed two-rail models, reflecting advances in manufacturing, materials, and electrical engineering, while also succumbing to economic and competitive pressures.

ORIGINS AND STANDARDISATION

Meccano's launch of Hornby-Dublo drew on decades of expertise. The firm had dominated the interwar toy market with Meccano construction sets and Hornby O gauge trains. Supported by an unrivalled distribution network and the influential 'Meccano Magazine', the company had the means to introduce a smaller, more sophisticated railway system.

The system's core standards proved pivotal: OO scale at 4 mm to the foot, running on 16.5 mm gauge track, became Britain's de facto standard. Equally important was the choice of direct current (DC) electrical operation, allowing simple polarity reversal for forward/reverse running. This avoided the complex mechanical reversing units required by

earlier alternating current (AC) systems, such as those used by Trix.

Though two-rail DC would later become the industry norm, Meccano initially favoured a three-rail tinplate system.

The centre rail provided reliable current collection, with the return via both running rails. This offered robust electrical pickup and low maintenance thanks to self-cleaning shoe collectors, whereas two-rail systems demanded cleaner track and wheels. For operators at exhibitions, three-rail Dublo stock often still runs more reliably than two-rail equivalents.

ENGINEERING AND DETAIL

Hornby-Dublo models were revolutionary in fidelity and engineering. Locomotives and rolling stock were produced with diecast metal chassis and bogies, while wagon and coach bodies used tinplate. This hybrid construction balanced robustness, weight, and affordability.

Detail fidelity was striking for massproduced models; locomotive wheels were fine and spoked rather than solid. Brake gear and underframes were moulded in detail, even if strengthened with webbing. Prototypical proportions ensured recognisable models.

Two flagship locomotives launched the range: the workaday N2 0-6-2T tank engine, and the streamlined Gresley A4 pacific, supported by teak-finished articulated coaches. Both were offered in clockwork and electric versions. This precision engineering, combined with new permanent magnet technology for efficient motors, gave Hornby-Dublo a decisive lead over rivals like Trix.

POST-WAR ADJUSTMENTS

World War II production halted model development, but the hiatus proved useful. When production resumed in 1948, Meccano streamlined its range: Clockwork drives were abandoned, focusing solely on electric operation.

Coupling systems were redesigned.

Pre-war sprung automatic couplers proved fragile and lacked automatic uncoupling.

Post-war Dublo adopted Peco's simpler, reliable design, enabling mechanical or remote uncoupling.







Accessory development also advanced, with tinplate signals, buffer stops, and modular wooden station buildings forming part of an expandable system. However, shortages of metals during the Korean War (1951–53) delayed repainting into British Railways liveries and slowed development. Once restrictions eased, Meccano accelerated expansion.

THE GOLDEN AGE:

The period 1953–1958 marked Dublo's technical and commercial peak. Standout locomotives epitomised Meccano's diecasting mastery. The BR Standard Class 4 2–6–4T (1954) boasted excellent proportions, detailed valve gear and versatile operation in passenger or freight roles, while the GWR Castle Class 4–6–0 (1957) featured precise rivet detail and was celebrated as a benchmark in diecast locomotive modelling.

By the mid-1950s, Dublo offered a mature system: comprehensive locomotives, coaches, wagons, accessories, and a robust three-rail track system. Yet external pressures were mounting.

TWO-RAIL CHALLENGE

Though three-rail offered operational reliability, scale modellers increasingly demanded two-rail realism. The absence of a central rail was visually compelling, and competitors such as Tri-ang capitalised on this shift. Meccano hesitated, reluctant to abandon their loyal three-rail base.



When they finally committed in 1958, the transition was costly. A complete two-rail system was introduced virtually overnight, while continuing to support three-rail, doubling production complexity. Locomotives were updated and included a Bulleid Pacific and an EMU set. The EMU, while realistic, suffered from limited play value but is now highly collectable.

The track system highlighted Meccano's engineering ideals but also their missteps. Nickel silver two-rail track was well proportioned, but the use of 'live frog' turnouts demanded complex wiring, deterring average users. Self-isolating points had to be rushed out later, under the name of 'Simplec'. Geometry was also overly complex compared to Tri-ang's simpler solutions.

Despite technical brilliance, Dublo's tworail products were expensive to manufacture, reliant on costly die-casting at a time when competitors used cheaper injection-moulded plastics.

DECLINE AND COLLAPSE

Commercial difficulties compounded technical challenges. Meccano's ethos of uncompromising quality, such as die-cast over plastic, and live frog points over simpler geometry, meticulous liveries, left them with premium products priced beyond the reach of a shifting market. Overproduction, declining sales and institutional inertia created a perfect storm.

In February 1964, Lines Brothers (Triang) acquired Meccano Ltd. Remaining stocks of Dublo were liquidated. Clearance bundles included locomotives that today command high collector values. The Hornby name survived only through rebranding as "Tri-ang Hornby," with Dublo's incompatible couplings and track largely abandoned. A few Dublo wagons and locos lived on under Wrenn and later Hornby ownership, but the original system was effectively extinct.

TECHNICAL LEGACY

Hornby-Dublo's influence is enduring OO/16.5 mm standard remains dominant in UK model railways. Its DC electrical system set the norm for polarity-based reversing. Die-cast engineering gave models longevity; many Dublo items survive in working order. Super Detail wagons remain benchmarks, with some moulds reused for decades. The modular plastic buildings such as the Terminal/Through Station, still inspire admiration for their modular design.

Collectors value early pre-war models and late-period rarities most, particularly two-rail versions with unique running numbers. Idiosyncratic items, such as the six-wheel passenger brake van or the electric loco with working pantographs but no accompanying overhead catenary system, exemplify Dublo's eccentric but ambitious engineering spirit.

COLLECTABILITY

Hornby-Dublo's trajectory illustrates the tension between engineering perfection and market pragmatism. Technically, it set standards for fidelity, robustness, and electrical operation that shaped the hobby for generations. Commercially, its reluctance to embrace plastics and two-rail operation early enough, combined with high production costs, proved fatal in the face of nimbler competitors.

Yet Dublo's legacy remains profound. Its products bridged the divide between toys and scale models, embodying both robust play value and technical sophistication.

Today, collectors and enthusiasts continue to celebrate Dublo not only for its role in standardising OO gauge, but also for the extraordinary craftsmanship and technical ambition that made it one of the most iconic names in railway modelling.


hilst we tend to think of playthings as goods that equate with peaceful periods in the history of mankind, it's a fact that some only made their entrance once hostilities broke out. Whether belligerent actions were seen as a jingoistic conduit for the launch of a new toy, or whether the manufacturers concerned saw war activity merely as an alternative string to their corporate bow, is a moot point. Certainly, materials shortages were felt by all, which inhibited toy production. Games, then, tended to be simple affairs - and there's a whole subset that owes its creation to animosity between countries.

LOOKING BACK

The First World War has been described as the conflict to end all wars, but that didn't stop Germany from treading a similar path a couple of decades later. The Great War, one that saw stagnant trench warfare and long periods of inactivity on the part of troops, is well documented. Post and parcels were enthusiastically received by troops, and whilst it would be tempting to imagine the distractions covered in this article being sent by well wishers, that would be rather more fanciful than factual. These curios were probably aimed at the youngsters back home who (mercifully) were spared the full picture of what was happening in France and elsewhere.

Thus, during WWI, handheld games lent themselves to an audience that was aware of the ongoing struggle, yet aside from the odd Zeppelin raid or someone coming home on leave, arguably had little else to relate to. For the makers, the general lack of raw materials probably curtailed full-blown manufacture - but clearly wood, card and glass were available, and so the puzzle containing ball bearings found favour. Whilst the concept of the handheld dexterity game wasn't new (its origins go back to the latter part of the 19th century), the themes themselves most definitely were; and by linking the puzzle to the ongoing conflict, the makers touched a chord that resonated with many.

Whilst it's very difficult to date these puzzles, the subject matter does help enormously. Hence looking at the examples here, it's easy to attribute the Sky Pirates and the Trench Football puzzles to the 1914-1918 era. WWII was more mechanised but again the images or the wording helps: Rafie's Rollicking Trip to Berlin encourages you to take the RAF on a bombing mission to Hitler's heartland - and there's even a cartoon image of the Führer himself to reinforce the message.

Strangely, the two World Wars contributed some very specific games to the marketplace. Alwyn Brice has more.

THE MAKERS

In terms of British manufacturers, two names stand out. R Journet was exceedingly well known as a purveyor of small, pocket-sized puzzles: trading as far back as 1891. This London company produced over 100 different puzzles and dominated the marketplace. Most puzzles were small but it did venture into a larger format. The above-mentioned Rafie puzzle is an example; the other shown, that of

Air Raid, is more standard in size, and comprises a movable aircraft that carries ball bearing bombs, with targets waiting below. It's an infuriating game to play, though!

Arguably the most famous WWI games, though, are bigger, and hail from the R Farmer & Sons company, about which I have been able to find virtually nothing, save that their wartime output ended with the Treaty of Versailles. The Silver Bullet

(or The Road to Berlin) takes the player through various cities in order to reach the coveted destination, whilst Trench Football (which surely must have been a good seller, given its theme), requires the player to outfox all the WWI German top brass, evade the Kaiser's gaping mouth and score the winning goal. On the reverse of the game (if you are lucky) is a label denigrating, one by one, the German staff who appear in the maze.

The Zeppelin games shown have different rules: one requires the airships to be shot down in sequence via the ball bearing whilst for the other, avoiding the holes and hitting the Zeppelin is the object. Both are fantastic examples of a manufacturer's ingenuity in cashing in on the reality of the infrequent airship raids experienced during the Great War: Sky Pirates is from R Farmer whilst the Anti-Zep, unfortunately, bears no maker's name.


Over in the USA, such games were probably fewer, since Americans as a nation were mostly far removed from the actual war zones. That said, some "doughboys" were involved – and one or two companies saw fit to commemorate their deeds with these dexterity puzzles.

Tin, as opposed to wood, seems to have been more common for the structure of the puzzle here. Again, I've turned up a Zeppelin game (albeit a very simple affair); and the other example shown can only serve to accentuate the grim humour engendered amongst the PBI (or Poor Bloody Infantry): delousing, personified in a game that involves manoeuvring little capsules into a netted enclosure. Charming...

COLLECTING TODAY


If you decide to collect these artefacts, bear in mind that they are now considered antiques by the marketplace. Many have survived, despite their simple construction;



equally, many have perished, since damp and card don't mix too well. Aside from eBay, it pays to take a look at specialist auction houses; and remember that militaria fairs can also throw up these oddities. Prices vary, with the rarest puzzles commanding three figures. If cost is a factor, the now defunct high street retailer Past Times produced its own Trench Football game, which apes the original although some of the German names have been slightly altered (possibly for copyright reasons).

This article, ultimately, has only scratched the surface of the subject; I'm sure that with a bit of diligence, you will find other interesting puzzles out there.

>>> STAR WARS

was recently looking back at some old copies of the Gazette and was reminded of an article I wrote a couple of years ago about the Star Wars Empire Strikes Back Stormtroopers in Hoth Battle Gear, my favourite figure. I'd noted it was my favourite figure from the original trilogy of films, despite these soldiers only appearing for 28 seconds and not having any dialogue between them!

This got me thinking again. Which were the most obscure characters and creatures that Kenner chose to add to the original series of 96 figures? That's 96, including the Rebo Band and not including any variations of the same figure, hair colour, paint variations, etc? I should also add that I totally understand why obscure characters were chosen ahead of those who actually played a more significant role in the film. I believe this was one of the key reasons for the action figure line's success, both at the time and in subsequent years of collecting. Kids loved the weird and wonderful alien creatures, more so than old men or women characters who lacked action features and playability. Governor Tarkin (Peter Cushing) was a key character who never got an action figure in the original series, but perhaps Snaggletooth was a better action figure choice? Let's discuss. So here are my thoughts on the most obscure characters to make it to the figure range. You might disagree, let's see.

The first 12 figure releases all seemed pretty logical to me. The curiously named Death Squad Commander was perhaps the weakest, but he was a good 'army builder' imperial figure and close enough to the troopers on the Death Star. So, the second wave is the best place to start. We (I was one of those kids!) needed a Luke pilot for our X-wing. But the other seven figures, in my mind, mostly seemed to cater for the Cantina playset and the Land of the Jawas playset. Four aliens: Greedo, a good choice after his altercation with Han Solo, who, incidentally, did shoot first; and Walrusman, who had a pop at Luke at the bar but ultimately came off worse when Obi-Wan stepped in, equally worthy! So our first two obscure figures in this study are Snaggletooth and Hammerhead! Snaggletooth, do you even remember him in the film? My original VHS copy of Star Wars didn't even feature him in its 16:9 made-for-TV format! It was only in a later widescreen format that I obtained in the 90's that you could see him on the far left of the screen while Han and Chewie chatted at their table in the bar. Hammerhead - we did see him sitting at another table for a few seconds. Did he warrant a figure, though, ahead of, say, a Cantina Band member or Walrusman's mate Dr Evazan ("He doesn't

like you, I don't like you either!")? For variety of colour and alien species, I guess so, but obscure, he sure was. As for the aforementioned droids, R5D4 (blew a gasket after Uncle Owen bought him) is good. The Power Droid would later have a cameo in all three films, and the poor fellow got tortured in Jabba's dungeon in Return Of The Jedi, so in retrospect, yes, fine. Death Star Droid, though? Debatable, since this silver version only appeared sat down in the Jawa Sandcrawler. The version we actually saw walk down a corridor in the Death Star was black, wasn't he?

Next, the Empire Strikes Back series one. Bossk - only got a few seconds but did speak at least. Bespin Guard – whilst I don't recall this specific mustachioed character, like Rebel Soldiers and Ugnaughts, we let him pass as he represents an army or group of guards who did get exposure, generally speaking. But I give you.... FX-7! Really? A motionless Dalek wannabe droid with multiple arm-probing-things, and a big claw! He appears for two seconds, giving Luke's Bacta Tank a wake-up jolt. Kenner couldn't even find a suitable photo of it for its card back. They had to use some made-up space scene. Playability 1 out of 10, screen time two seconds! Did he really warrant being one of the first 11 figures from the world's most eagerly awaited sequel?

The next two Empire series then brought us Cloud Car Pilot. Presumably chosen



by Kenner to help push their poor selling Twin Pod Cloud Car, but in the film itself, you only see the profile of his head in the cockpit for one second. Again, the card back had to use a still from the archives, not a movie scene. Then we have the other Bounty Hunters. Most of us will forgive Kenner this, as IG88, 4-LOM, Zuckuss, and Dengar, who all appeared alongside Boba Fett and Bossk and did nothing more than shuffle from foot to foot (or was that my imagination?) for a few seconds, did have cool playability and weapons. These guys also provided two free figure promo options for Kenner (4-LOM) and Palitoy (Dengar).

Then we have Return of the Jedi. This is where Lucasfilm, and subsequently Kenner, went into a little bit of an alien/ Muppet/teddy bear overload. Let's discuss Ewoks! Wicket was a key character. Paploo and Teebo did memorable things in the film, for example, stealing a speeder bike and pointing a spear at our Rebel heroes, respectively. But the other five Ewoks we were offered? There's my 'army builder' theory, I guess, but out of 96 figures, did we really need eight different Ewoks? Answer $= N_0.$

Then in Jabba's palace, Bib Fortuna and the Gamorrean Guards, 8D8 and EV9D9, they all did stuff. Weequay got involved in the Sail Skiff scenes. Most of the others were just filler, though. Klaatu (in two versions!), he barely appeared in the film but did feature quite prominently on a Jabba's Palace jigsaw puzzle I had. Ree Yees, screen time four seconds, I remember getting quite excited in the film when Luke was dropped into the Rancor pit by Jabba. Squid Head, Yak Face, Amanaman, Barada, Nikto, like I say, filler. They all had a playability factor, though, and that's what we keep coming back to. Collectable representations of key film characters, they aren't, playable action figures for kids, they





most certainly were. A-wing and B-wing pilots: the latter was particularly obscure in the film but suffice to say that Kenner would then release both a B-Wing and, in its death throes of the Droids series, an A-Wing vehicle, so they must have seen the added value of more pilots.


And finally, I present you with my last two examples. Both are quite different, and both extremes of playability. Our penultimate character is Imperial Dignitary. The most useless character in the entire run! If he had fought with our Rebel droid FX7, I would have wanted them both to lose! A wrinkly, Emperor-likefaced, Cardinal-type character in a purple gown. His hands couldn't even hold a weapon. Useless! One of the few examples where Kenner lost the playability plot.

And last but not least, (or as far as film seconds go, perhaps he is least?) I give you Prune Face! In 1984, my schoolmates and I actually thought this guy was a new Bounty Hunter, for a fourth film, maybe? But no, he was actually a Rebel Commando and sat in the shadows of the Rebel briefing room prior to the Endor mission. He wasn't even in focus! But he was a pretty cool figure! Army fatigues, eye patch, cloth cape, rifle. All the ingredients of a playable action figure, and a weird alien face. Shame about the name, though!

And that concludes our study of obscure characters from the original trilogy films. If we were to examine the 21st-century

figure releases, including all 11 Star Films and the spin-off TV series, we could take action figure character obscurity to the next level. We'd also need a book to cover the topic, not 1300 words. But in this article, I think we can conclude that about 25% of the Kenner's original 96 figures played no significant role in the films whatsoever! Yet as kids then, and collectors now, we absolutely love them all!



i folks. Now I'm retired there's so much more time for me to potter about at home and really enjoy my toy collection. I've also revived my passion for building model kits from plastic and white metal, and there's nothing I like more than creating unique Code 3 models from scrap bits I find lying about.

There's also more time to get out and about. I often pick a place and trundle slowly around the charity shops, antique centres and weekly market stalls where there are usually a few toy sellers. I can't afford to shell out big bucks these days, but as long as I unearth a few interesting bits and bobs, that's all I hope for.

Another great hollowcast discovery was a walking boy Jonathan of Cadbury's Cococub fame. I snapped it up for £,40 as it was in slightly better condition than the one in my full set of Cococubs. All real

characters and all with great names.

Speaking of characters, I also found a Milky Bar Kid Sheriff's badge for a fiver at a huge flea market in Worcestershire. These were sent out as part of a Nestlé marketing promotion back in the 1960s. If I remember rightly, you had to collect Milky Bar wrappers and send them off.

Just as luck would have it, at the same show I picked up a Lone Star Cub pistol in its original holster. It was the perfect accompaniment for the badge. It was fresh off a house clearance van and I was more than happy to hand over a tenner for it.

Lone Star produced a wide range of toys beyond guns. A nice little badge I found in a local charity shop for £,1 highlighted this. It was worn by members of the Lone Star Flyers Racing Club. The Flyers came from the old Impy Toy Series, with Impy cars given new faster wheels and screw-on base plates. This was Lone Star's response to the instant success of Mattel's Hot Wheels.

A Matchbox SF-1 Superfast Speed Set

seemed like a good buy for a tenner at the local car boot sale, if only for the lovely box artwork. It now looks great alongside my Superfast collection. This was one of several track sets released in the 1970s to complement the Superfast series.

At an antique fair I also picked up a BR whistle for £,20. It evoked visions of another form of speed, as I imagined it being used to whistle off some of those fabulous Deltic diesel locomotives of the 1950s and 60s. I had a great time at a Diesel Gala event recently where two mighty Deltics were put through their paces. What a sight, and what a sound.

On the diecast front, I couldn't resist a Matchbox 18d Caterpillar in great condition and still with its original tracks. This was the fourth and largest version of the Lesney Matchbox Caterpillar bulldozers, made from 1964. I went through a few of these as a kid, the blade usually breaking after rugged play in our miniature clay quarries in the back garden. Happy days.





The asking price of £30 seemed really reasonable, especially when you think a round of drinks costs not much less these days.

Another swapmeet buy was a Dublo Dinky Austin Loadstar, which reminded me of the lorry that delivered coal to our house in the 1950s. I snapped it up for £40 at a Toy Fair to add to my collection.

We used to undo the cellar grate for the coal man to tip the sacks down, and I remember their sooty faces being more than a bit scary, though I was only about four at the time. I also fondly remember my grandma buying me one of these Dublo Dinkys for my birthday in the early 1960s when the original price was 1/6d. The Loadstar was later adapted for the British Army as the 4x4 Austin K9, another wonderfully reliable vehicle.

Finally, I struck a deal with a fellow tin collector to get my hands on a Mackintosh's Toffee windmill I'd wanted for years. It cost me some good cash plus a couple of tins, but at least I got it in the end. The sails are attached to a clever mechanism and rotate when the handle on the side is turned. These toffee tins were meant to be played with as toys once the sweets were gone, and were mainly produced for the Christmas market.

Well, that's all for another month folks, as it starts to become noticeably cooler at the car boot fairs and markets. Dig out those winter woollies once again, keep yourselves warm while you're out hunting for goodies, and as always, be lucky.


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
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






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Remembering the land that time forgot


Ed Karswell ponders the wonderful world of model collecting.

t seems to me there are two types of nostalgia: Popular and personal. It's a collective nostalgia that everyone's meant to know and share. I'm sure it steers the audience into believing they experienced things that they never actually did. 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














ife living in a city meant that I did not often go out in the countryside. However, on occasions while out with my parents, we would pass tractors working in the fields. But I did not know what the makes were. I had, of course, my Dinky Toys Massey-Harris and Field-Marshall tractors and assorted trailers for them, plus farm tractors by other toy manufacturers.

The Dinky Toys farm gained another tractor, the David Brown Tractor No. 305, in October 1965. It is seen in the Meccano Magazine of that month in the colour advert on the back cover, which says that it is "With 'hydraulic' lifting gear that really works!". In the review it states: "Turning to the Dinky Toys model, this sports so many fascinating features that I hardly know where to start. Perhaps most important, however, is the unique feature I mentioned earlier, which is the steering system. This is 'working' in the sense that the position of the front wheels is controlled by the driver's steering wheel in the cab." The review also noted: "The front axle, incidentally, not only swivels for steering,

but also tilts for travel over rough country."

The model is in red with a removable yellow cab and yellow wheels. There are David Brown 990 labels on the engine cowling sides and a paper radiator label. It came in an illustrated card end-flap box and also in yellow card and cellophane Visi-Pack boxes.

Two years later, in 1967, it was replaced by a white version of the model with the same working features. This had David Brown Selectamatic 990 labels on the engine cowling sides and a red and silver radiator label in the modified plastic radiator. This came in a plain card end-flap box with a picture of

the tractor. A later model had a red engine and red wheels and was sold in a blister pack before deletion in 1972.

The Meccano Magazine of July 1966 illustrated the "New! D.B. Tractor and Disc Harrow" on the back-page advert as No. 325 with a price of 12/6. This set was reviewed in the September issue, which stated that it was a new version of the original tractor: "The David Brown people have completely re-styled the full-size machine and this latest Dinky Toy is based on the modified version."

During 1967 the Dinky Toys catalogue illustrated the David Brown Tractor and Disc Harrow as No. 325. It shows the tractor in white with the brown engine and the Disc Harrow in white with red rear panels. The set was contained in illustrated card end-flap boxes with an internal packing piece, and was deleted in 1973.

The Dinky Toys models are based on the David Brown Selectamatic 990 tractors. The company was founded in 1936 and was a joint project with Harry Ferguson to build the Ferguson-Brown tractor. In the 1970s they were sold to Tenneco of America, and in the late 1990s to Textron.







nto Autumn

s I write this at the point August turns into September the leaves are, seemingly early for the time of year, already starting to fall. Those autumnal colours of them prompting thoughts of Halloween not being far away and a nagging subconscious awareness of being haunted..

A PROPHESY (DIE)CAST

Haunted by my own words from mid 2022 in my former, tail-end, column Signing Off .. where the imminent and potential Corgi Model Club releases were the topic of conversation. Until last month I had held out against tumbling down that slippery slide of temptation so well known to collectors. Perhaps foolishly although immersed in pangs of nostalgia and one of my own specialist subject interest areas I had mentored myself not to fall for the

re-released East African Safari and Polizei Beetles unless, that was, an unforeseeable third release happened - and then (maybe) buying all three.

Maybe then I was tempted - or was it provoked? - fate three years ago by taking about potential of the Politie Kever variation of Corgi's model #492 because it has haunted me ever since. And particularly so since the announcement in January that it was scheduled as a forthcoming 2025 release.

Being serious though several things occur to me. Firstly: as I'm sure the majority of readers know anyway the original Dutch Politie version had such a significant rarity

factor its reissue was sure to attract many one-off online buyers who were not Corgi Model Club subscribers. That in itself raises the interesting issue of how many more similar restricted market livery models might now follow its success? Ones such as the Corgi #416 Land-Rovers for the Belgian market in T.S. ('Touring Secours') livery?

Secondly: that the vast majority of those 1960s era castings now being brought back to life are first and foremost beautiful scale models with some superb detailing that just happened to be toys. Those VW Beetles are perfect cases in point. One of the reasons we had them as kids back in the mid 60s was that the base model, enhanced by having



the extra cost factory option "American bumper" rear wing stone guards and VW embellished mud flaps, was exactly of our first family car. A brand new 1966 VW Beetle.

collectors.

That brings me to my third and final point. I have fallen for new scale model cars in the past on a nostalgia driven yearning for the real car but never before have I bought one, let alone three, replica toy cars driven totally by the comforting pure nostalgia for the toys of my childhood. These three Corgi VW Beetles #256 - Volkswagen 1200 in East African Safari trim of 1964 and the pair of #492 - Volkswagen European Police Cars of 1966 are then the first - and highly probably the last - I have fallen for. Yet they bring me back full circle to where I started. Being interested in model cars as miniatures rather than toys now almost six decades ago. Maybe that is as good a place as any to end on.

THE DYNAMIC MARKET

In addition the current roll out of those Corgi Model Club releases underlines what I think is one of the important current trends in the world of diecast collecting. A world that is expanding and diverging exponentially. They demonstrate that there is still undoubtedly a market hunger, driven by nostalgia, for diecasts that were former childhood toys. Similarly, as illustrated by many recent releases, there is a nostalgic hunger for models of cars that we spotted on the street during our childhood, teens or early adulthood. New releases for example from Oxford Diecast's 1/76 range through to Cult Scale Models 1/18 range underline exactly that point and with a noticeable nod to the former halcyon days British motor industry.

Which raises another fact: choice preferences through identifying with the buyers home market marques.

Throw into this kaleidoscopic range of marketplace choice the ongoing diversification by model manufacturers to cover more and more scales within their ranges. At the same time the level of detail that once upon a time could be anticipated in the smaller scales is being totally rewritten. For a simple illustration of all of this we need to look to the Asia's Far East where there are scale models appearing in the fast growing Chinese home market

of incredibly detailed 1/64 models from a similarly fast growing number of emerging model producers of cars only manufactured in China. An apparent shift from 1/18 to 1/64 also seeming to be the favoured manufacturing scale in China adding an additional dynamic which I anticipate we are going to see a lot more of as we head towards 2026.

However diecast model manufacturers trying to cover the significant automotive markets – notably North America and the most nationally distinctive ones in Europe – with targeted subject releases is nothing new. A quick check back to the Corgi Model Club catalogue proves that point for the 1960s. Yet probably one of the leading manufacturers currently (overtly) courting markets in this way is French manufacture Solido which has, over the recent past, distinctly sectioned its catalogue by differing national emphasis – and fashion themes.

SOLIDO SNAPSHOTS

A sample then of recent 1/18 releases in the wide ranging coverage from Solido

■ Honda Civic (EG6) – 1991 (S1810405 Aztec Green Pearl) A nice capture of this smoothly styled, very popular, Honda Civic EG6 in Japanese market RHD guise with good detailing over a glossy, sparkly, paintwork.

In RHD this typifies the contemporary far eastern led fashion in customisation on a Japanese marque donor car.
- Mercedes Mercedes-Benz 190 (W201) EVO II -1990 (S1801012 Black) Glossy and very, very, black this is another recent release in the Solido WORKS collection portraying contemporary eastern led fashion in customisation on with a Euro' twist.
- Subaru Impreza S5 WRC99 2001 (S1807409 Tap Rally Portugal #38 Heath/Lancaster) Something totally different to the Solido WORKS collection this release from Solido's Competition collection makes a striking contrast to the already well represented range of rallying Subaru's from Solido. The dazzling finish makes a dramatic change from the more usual Sonic blue and yellow Subaru motorsport liveries. A bonus is this is another release having distinct British connections.

And my pick of the crop ...

- Volkswagen Golf IV R32 2003 (S4313604 Tornado Red) One of the latest releases in Solido's excellent current 1/43 series comes this Golf IV R32 this time in perfect Tornado Red. It just looks so good with superb finish and very good detailing it really does beg the question as to whether 1/43 done well is actually really better for this sort of car than 1/18.
- Porsche 911 (993) Turbo 1997 (S1810102 Arena Red) To be fair this one has been to hand and waiting to get a look in since earlier in the year. Porsche is consistently one of Solido's more prolific themes (with a lot more new toolings coming next year it would seem...). This is

one of the very best this year - it just looks fabulous and the excellent paint finish, carefully matched to the factory shade, vies with GT Spirit finishes.

■ BMW E21 323i - 1980 (S1812801 Saphirblau Metallic, S1812802 Kastanienrot Metallic) Without question my 1/18 Solido choice of the month goes to this pair. With several manufacturers currently focusing on BMW styling of the 1970s through into the 1980's the choice is wide and competitive but this new tooling from Solido is right at the top of the list. With its traditional kidney grill and sharp edge line styling carried over from the 1960-70s "Neue klasse" models everything from overall proportions down to small details about this one looks superb.

Renault 4L GTL (S1200201 'Clan' **Red)** Usually 1/12 scale has become associated with (expensive) highly and intricately detailed museum quality hand built models or limited production runs of exotic or super-car automobiles from some of our prestige range manufacturers. This one bucks all those trends in delightful fashion marking Solido's recent excursion beyond 1/18 scale.

I hope very much that Solido announce further companion models at Spielwarenmesse 2026 because the model and the concept behind the subject choice is

a breath of fresh air. Whilst 1/12 brings it's challenges on display cabinet space it does afford the opportunity of proportionally better model detailing quality than with 1/18. Something that Solido have taken full advantage of and what is very interesting for example is just how well that quintessential Renault grey plastic trim comes through the modelling process.

OTTOMOBILE SNAPSHOTS

It's a while since I dipped into the OttOmobile catalogue even though the regular monthly releases of its superb quality releases just keep coming.

Whilst OttOmobile's equivalent of the Solido's WORKS collection is its PROJECT CARS collection. With a wildly vibrant growing selection of tuned and heavily customised creations the collection has a dedicated and growing following. Instead of highlighting some of the most recent Project CAR releases though I thought that I'd focus on three examples of OttOmobile's

superb portrayals of factory produced top-end versions. So with traditional teutonic engineering and build quality captured in high quality 1/18 sealed resin:

■ Mercedes-Benz E55 AMG W210 - 2001 (OT459 Brilliant

Silver) It may be a classic example of a wolf in sheep's clothing but believe me there is absolutely noting sheepish about the look of the W210 with its AMG makeover. It's true much of the AMG enhancements are "under the skin" – like the 354 bhp 5.5-litre V8 engine (E55) but even so the exterior exudes an unmistakable air of engineered high performance in a tastefully subtle exterior.

The traditional metallic silver paintwork is classic choice of finish. Modelled flawlessly it makes an excellent setting to the modest amount of chrome work detailing fronted by a perfect, filigree, reproduction of the Mercedes-Benz bonnet badge. Superb automotive engineering perfectly captured

Rather more overt that the

AMG E55 - partly because it is based on the two door coupé instead of Mercedes-Benz's use of a four door, three box, saloon - the M3 GTR flaunts itself through it's styling enhancements. Look past those and all the traditional BMW finishing touches are there authentically modelled in excellent quality. A stylish head turner with engineering to match the image conveyed sat on eye catching replicas of those fabulous BMW alloy rims.

■ Volkswagen Golf GTI VIII - 2024 (OT1137 Moonstone Grey) And so to the third of the trio and where personal taste threatens to intrude on an objective opinion thanks to the Volkswagen Group's infatuation with solid grey paintwork right across its passenger car range. For me the GTI, in any of its generation iterations, is a car that looks at its best in red, white and other vibrant, visible,

'sporting' colour paintworks. Having got that off my chest and accepting the fashion conscious probably disagree the grey is, like the two silver metallics, flawless with a deep gloss finish of consistent depth of colour – well you know what I mean. A feat that I reckon is probably more difficult to achieve than even with black.

Authentically portraying the current generation Golf perfectly by way of its excellent modelling this is surely a 'must have' for many GTI fans and recording as it does an apparently current buyer preference choice of finish.

Of the three its probably no surprise given my Solido choice (and overriding my personal subject area bias) its the BMW M3 GTR that takes first place.







t's been five years since Lansdowne collectors had a fresh release to get excited about — but the wait is finally over. An all-new Lansdowne model has appeared after that long hiatus, following the release of the previous Lansdowne model, the Ford Consul Mk.I, and the announcement that the Lansdowne Collection was to be discontinued. Fortunately for Lansdowne collectors, and those who collect models of British cars, that wasn't to be the case. Early in 2025, the first all-new Lansdowne model became available, and what a success it has been — one colour selling out almost immediately, and the second colour down to the last two at the time of writing.

That model is the 1984 Austin Montego 1.6L, available in two colours: Clove Brown and Moonraker Blue Metallic. Hot on the heels of the saloon, Lansdowne released the estate version in August 2025. As with the saloon, two colour choices were offered: Champagne Beige and Oporto Red. Production was limited to 50 pieces of each colour of either model.

But what about the real car? Austin Rover had been searching for a longoverdue replacement for the Morris Ital and the Austin Ambassador, as well as a competitor for the Ford Sierra and Vauxhall Cavalier. British Leyland's need to develop a mid-sized saloon for the 1980s was pressing after the demise of the Marina II

and Triumph SD2 (the planned Triumph Dolomite replacement), and the failure of the Triumph–Morris joint project. The only design left on the table was the LC10 (Maestro) saloon.

The decision was taken to develop a full range of medium cars from this single platform to save costs. The Montego design, therefore, was a hybrid effort involving several designers, including David Bache and his replacement, Roy Axe. Using the compact S-Series engine meant the Montego would feature a lower bonnet line and a longer, more tapered nose. The Montego was a classic three-box design; the styling of Roger Tucker's saloon (boot and bonnet) was grafted onto the centre section of Ian Beech's Maestro design. Because the Maestro's doors were retained, the longer Montego required a sixth window to be

incorporated — resulting in a rather fussy appearance at the rear of the car. With a few minor tweaks, Roy Axe approved the design for production in 1981.

On 25 April 1984, the Montego (code LM11) was launched, initially as a four-door saloon, alongside the MG Montego 2.0i. This came just two months after the Morris Ital was discontinued, although the Ital Estate remained in production until August 1984. The British Motor Show of 1984 also saw the launch of the Montego Estate.

The Montego was available with a range of engines: 1275cc (1.3, saloon only), 1598cc (1.6, 1.6L and 1.6HL), 1994cc 2.0HL (aspirated and fuel-injected, generating 100 bhp and 115 bhp respectively), and 1994cc 2.0HLS. There was also a luxury Montego Vanden Plas and an MG Montego. Dieselpowered Montegos were introduced in 1998.



A CLOSER LOOK

The model is described as an Austin Montego Saloon on the box and on the ID plate on the underside, but as an Austin Montego 1600L on the Brooklin website. On closer inspection, the boot badging identifies the model as a 1.6HL — which has a higher specification than the L. Similarly, the 1.6L has a higher spec than its 1.3 counterpart, and it is here that confusion arises. The 1.6HL sports a silver radiator grille and chrome door handles, whereas the Lansdowne model grille and handles are painted body colour in both cases (as per the 1300). The hub caps, however, are correct for the 1600.

Such discrepancies are not uncommon, especially when restored full-size cars have been fitted with incorrect replacement parts, or due to the scarcity of authentic spares. Aside from this, the appearance of the model is excellent. Every detail is captured — from the small reversing light separated from the brake lights and indicators in the rear cluster, to the tiny "blip" on the roof where the radio aerial fits. The estate is designated a 1.6L according to its boot badging, though otherwise the comments remain the same apart from the door handles, which are picked out in black.

The windscreen wipers are finely cast, and the model sports correct door mirrors on both sides. The black window surrounds, windscreen trim and rubbing strips are all finely applied, and appear to be painted rather than separate castings. All lights (front and rear) have clear lenses, correctly coloured, and all badging is applied as transfers. A departure from Brooklin tradition is the use of printed number plates bearing the model number, rather than an authentic registration plate (e.g., the Estate wears a "B" plate instead of an "A").

The interior is an accurate rendition of the real car, complete

with patterned seats, headrests, steering wheel, dashboard and fascia. Although the instrumentation is cast in rather than separately detailed, everything is represented. The door panels are also part of the casting but feature full detailing. Peer into the rear of the estate and you may even glimpse a couple of black suitcases.

The Clove Brown Montego and Champagne Beige Estate feature pale beige seats with brown door panels, parcel shelf and dashboard, while the Moonraker Blue and Oporto Red Estate versions have pale grey seats, with the remainder finished in mid-grey.

Unlike previous Lansdowne models, the base is plain, with only the tail end of the exhaust pipe showing. This is more in line with SMTS models than traditional Brooklin/Lansdowne examples.

How does the Lansdowne measure up dimensionally? By my measurements, compared with official dimensions, the model is a little overscale, but not enough to be obvious. The Lansdowne Montego measures a scale length of just over 15 feet, compared to the real car's 14¾ feet. The model's width is much closer at 5¾ feet against the actual 5½ feet. The wheelbase is near enough spot on.

Despite the minor discrepancies noted, the Lansdowne Montego is more than an acceptable addition to the Lansdowne Collection and will no doubt be welcomed by loyal collectors of the brand, and by enthusiasts of British car models — particularly those who prefer white metal over other mediums.

One omission worth noting is the lack of a rear-view mirror. This is the most visible interior feature from the outside, and including it would enhance the model's realism. Small quibbles aside, this is exactly the kind of handbuilt release that shows why Lansdowne still holds a special place in many collections.

f you are a regular visitor to swapmeets, then you'll have come across the odd example of diecasts from Shackleton. They tend to stand out, these lorries, for they are often wearing colourful liveries, and are sometimes accompanied by a trailer.

Clockwork-powered creations, they were the brainchild of one Maurice Shackleton, who traded under the moniker of James Shackleton; based in Cheshire, this enterprise actually started off with wooden toys before moving into the diecast scene.

Partly because Foden lorries were a common sight in the years subsequent to WWII, this was the choice for the owner; added to that was the fact that he had actual experience of working at the Foden factory. The venerable Foden flatbed FG6 formed the basis of the range and production appears to have lasted until about 1952, a time that saw other diecast manufacturers begin to suffer materials shortages, brought about by the Korean War.


Much attention was paid to these lorries in their design and assembly: upwards of 65 parts were used in their construction and, since everything was done in house, their overall cost reflected this. Initially retailing at £2 19s 6d (almost £3), these models were definitely not for the impecunious. The Dyson trailer appeared after the war, in 1949, and subsequently a tipper lorry was added to the range. This is now a highly sought after model because of its short production run; equipped with steering and a working tipper body, unfortunately its inherent fragility has occasioned a shortage within collecting circles: typically they sell for anything from £300 upwards.





An offshoot of the parent business that has been involved in the construction and building sectors, along with that of real estate, the company launched into the model vehicle sector in 1989. Some years later it would acquire the European manufacturer Vitesse, which sits well within its portfolio, adding the popular 1:43 scale to the proceedings.

To say that the company's range is colossal would be the understatement of the year. Just take a look at the website - there are pages and pages and pages of vehicles from which to choose. In terms of era, it's all there, especially in 1:18 scale, from the humble early American highway pioneers (like the Ford Model T and 1904 Buick) through to 1960s classics and right up to modern times, with both road and race-liveried transport.

Whilst the 1:12 scale range is more finite, it does offer a mouth-watering selection of Morris Minor and VW Beetle and VW campervan variants: buy one and you'll probably want another. Attention to detail is most evident: on the Morris Minor convertible, for example, the distinctive gap between the side windows and the hood frame is accurately captured. (Admittedly, the car's side pinstriping might be a

little too thick - but at least it's present). Then again, there's the 1949 VW Beetle cabriolet: not only does the fabric top unlatch and fold down but you can also jack the car up and remove a wheel (and its nuts), just like the real thing. Opening doors, bonnet and boot all add to the appeal of the model. The highly-regarded split screen Samba minibus with its plethora of windows is also to be found within the range.

In the 1:24 scale you can delight in good old London Transport in the shape of the Routemaster bus from the 1940s and the 1950s: choose from town or country livery and a selection of evocative advertisements. Even more interesting (to this writer, at any rate) are the 1940s Bedford OB coaches, which always put me in mind of the St Trinians films of the era; you can almost picture them bursting with yelling girls and hockey sticks protruding from the windows.

It goes without saying that these models are created with care and with precision. In 1:12 scale, oft-skimped details like wipers are carefully modelled, which gives each model a huge lift. Paint finish is excellent and you'd be nit-picking to find much wrong with these vehicles. Consequently, they are not exactly cheap, with as-new examples commanding £250 upwards.




On to the letter T: and we'll start with Tremo. Nothing to do with four (or even two, come to that) wheels, Tremo was the model name arising from the company Treforest Mouldings, which operated out of Wales, and was one of a tiny number of toy makers historically based there.

Production of the company's waterline ship range dates back to the years prior to WW2 and whilst at the cessation of hostilities in 1945 it recommenced manufacture, this was short-lived because of a factory fire. The company was also known for other lines that included lead figures, a small selection of WW2 British aircraft of Dinky size and, bizarrely, garden gnomes.

Founded by an ex-employee of the respected Wiking factory in Germany, the company's output was prodigious, and ran to several hundred waterline models. Tremo was a rival to Tri-Ang in the shipping stakes and it looked not only at the Royal Navy for inspiration but further afield, too.

Submarines, destroyers, battleships, cruisers, minesweepers, trawlers, corvettes... you name it, the company produced it. Hand-painted and retailed in





plain, utility card boxes, these ships were very much a product of the time. Groups were also available in small sets within lidded display boxes. Quality was acceptable (an interesting feature was that of the swivelling gun turret), although today they might not bear too close scrutiny.

The company of Julius Kohnstam (better known as J Kohnstam) was a principal retailer of the Treforest Mouldings output (and under Richard Kohnstam, rose to fame with the Moko brand); this enterprise had various fingers in various (toy) pies and it was only when Lesney awakened to the fact that its Matchbox range was going to take the world by storm that it ended the business partnership with that company, and invested in its own distribution network.

Readily available today (although you might struggle to find every model), they vary enormously in price. Boxed examples command a premium; and where unboxed models are concerned, not all are readily identifiable because markings on the hollow underside can be so faint as to be illegible.

hristopher Moor, from New Zealand, shares his story. "I sold my collection in 1965 and thought that was the end of it. My mate Graeme had moved away, and I'd lost contact with the collectors I knew from school, so I sold the models to a family friend.

Thirty years later, one Sunday morning in 1995, I detoured into a diecast swapmeet on the way to the supermarket and walked out a 'born again' collector.

At first, I set myself a strict rule: my new collection would only contain 1/43 scale models of cars currently in production. I ordered a few modern Minichamps from sellers at the fair and thought that would be enough.

I kept to that plan until eBay came into my life in 2000. While browsing the listings, I found an almost perfect salmon pink Dinky Cadillac Eldorado which I just had to have. It was a model I'd owned as a teenager, and holding it again felt like no time had passed. The Cadillac started a chain reaction.

Soon my 'fab four' 1960s Corgi Toys joined the collection: the Bentley Continental, Jaguar Mk X, Rover 2000 and Mercedes-Benz 600 Pullman. Each still had the clever features and sheer presence that had won me over back in the 1960s.

From there, more favourites followed. I picked up a Dinky Nash Rambler at a fair, tracked down my childhood favourite Morris Oxford in green, and added a Rolls-Royce Phantom V with opening windows. Earlier pieces such as the Triumph 1800, Rover 75 and Armstrong Siddeley reminded me why I had fallen for Dinky in the first place.

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
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
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ne of the ongoing themes of this column is to explore the traditional division between "toys for boys" and "toys for girls," and quite often it emerges that the distinction isn't quite as rigid as might be thought. It wasn't quite as simple as "cars for boys and dolls for girls"! What about G.I.Joe - "America's Moveable Fighting Man" - and his British equivalent, Action Man, for example? In spite of their macho image, they were essentially dolls for boys, though makers Hasbro in the USA and Palitoy in the UK strenuously avoided the suggestion, as this would certainly not have helped sales.

If boys could play with action figures, then girls who liked Mattel's hugely popular Barbie doll could get an archetypal boys' toy to put her in – in the form of a toy car. Launched in 1959, Barbie was the inspired creation of Barbara Handler, who, with her husband Elliot, had founded Mattel Inc. Barbie was claimed to be the first mass-produced doll in the USA to have adult features, and 300,000 were sold in the first year. In 1962, she took the wheel of her first car, an open-top Austin Healey 3000, though it was not named but simply called "Barbie's Own Sports Car." Mattel themselves were so busy churning out the dolls that they subcontracted the car to another big American toy company, the Ideal Corporation, who had been one of the pioneers in the use

of plastic in toys in the post-war period. These early plastic cars were usually cheap and cheerful playthings, but the Healey was a much more detailed and sophisticated model. It had to be pretty big, of course, to fit Barbie inside, so it measured eighteen inches in length. The larger dimensions made it easier to fit detailed features, such as a separate windscreen and plated grille, bumpers, dashboard, and imitation 'wire' wheels, enhanced by whitewall tyres. Most examples were moulded in a kind of salmon pink shade with turquoise seats, but other colours, such as lilac, do turn up from time to time. The Austin Healey inspired various related products as well. You could buy a 100-piece jigsaw showing Barbie sitting on the bonnet, touching up her make-up while her boyfriend Ken goes into a diner and comes back triumphantly brandishing two ice cream cones.

A second vehicle quickly followed in 1963, described as "Barbie and Ken's Hot Rod." Modified vehicles of this type were fashionable among young American speed merchants in this era. The catalogue tells us that "Now Ken can take Barbie and Midge [her friend] for a ride in his Hot Rod". If Barbie was previously quite capable of handling a powerful Healey, you might wonder why she suddenly needs him to drive her. However, in the early sixties, Mattel was probably less interested in conveying messages about female independence than in widening the market and selling more toys.

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
