

▲ GARY BAKER INDIO, CALIFORNIA

To finish a 75mm Spartan noble from Spanish figure maker Big Child Creatives, Gary painted with Vallejo acrylics. Pastels and artist oils weathered and shaded the charging warrior. To expand the small rock outcropping that came with the resin kit, he added groundwork with putty and clay.

How to photograph your models

Want to see your models in FineScale Modeler magazine?

Read our tips and tricks to get the best photos and maximize your chance we'll feature your scale creation in the FineScale Modeler Reader Gallery or Show Gallery. Images are like building models: There are no shortcuts to good ones, and those good ones really stand out. The higher the quality of the image, the more likely it will be published and not passed over in the editing process.



This photo was shot at f/22 with the focal point on the corner of the mantlet nearest the camera. The entire Leopard tank is in focus.

PLEASE DO:

Provide plenty of information: Put yourself in the reader's place. If you see a nice model, what do you want to know about it? Which kit is it? How did you modify it? What type and brand of paint did you use? What does the model represent and why did you build it? The more information you give us, the more likely we are to publish it? Don't forget to give us you name and the place you live.

Use a high-quality digital camera: While phone cameras have come a long way in the last few years, they rely on digital focus and white balance that simply aren't as good as DSLR or good-quality point-and-shoot digital cameras. They're fine for selfies, but not so good for publication. You will need f/11-f/16 to get most subjects in focus from nose to tail, bow to stern, headlight to taillight, or wingtip to wingtip. Set the camera to the highest resolution and least image compression. RAW format images are preferred; and please, don't retouch the images. Use as much light as you can get and an ISO of 60-100. When focusing, find a point about ½ to ½ way along the fuselage, body, or hull.

Vary the camera angle: Send us several shots of each of your models from different points of view. This gives us plenty of choices for publication. Please be sure to show the entire model in the image; don't clip things like wingtips, gun barrels, masts, taillights, and rotor blades.

Shoot on a clean background: A seamless white or light gray background, sometimes called a sweep, is best. If you don't have one, grab a piece of construction paper or thin poster board and curve it — no folds or creases — so what is behind the model has no lines.



This image was shot at f/4 with the camera focused in roughly the same spot. Very little of the tank is in focus, rendering this image unusable.

PLEASE DON'T:

Use a phone camera or low-resolution point-and-shoot: The image quality isn't good enough.

Send us poor quality images: Photos that are dark, blurry or out of focus, or clip parts of the model will be rejected.

Shoot photos on a textured background: Avoid taking photos of models on blue, yellow, red, or textured backgrounds. A plain, white background is best. Do not use paper towels, bath towels, or bed sheets. Remember, you want people to see your model, not your linens.

Don't shoot on your workbench: If yours is anything like most modelers', it is cluttered with tools and splattered with paint. In the worst case, you may be revealing your beverage preferences to the FSM readership. If you want to show your model in its best light, take the time to set up a dedicated space to shoot photos.

Use direct flash: Although many DSLRs and point-and-shoot cameras feature on-camera or pop-up flashes, they make models look flat and boring. If you must use a flash, figure out a way to bounce it off a ceiling or wall. Or better still, use off-camera lighting from the sides or top.

A few minutes of prep work and attention to detail can greatly improve your images. Please review this guide and help us present your models in the best way possible. MIDLOTHIAN, TEXAS


"War Horse" is part of a planned six figures that Lynn is sculpting and detailing completely from scratch. He made the horse head and armor from Magic Sculpt, equipped it with styrene strip harness, a sword made of styrene sheet, and raided his sister's beading supplies for interesting details. "When you're scratchbuilding, you find ways to use all sorts of parts that you might not otherwise," Lynn says.

▼ WAYNE HOLMES

NELSON, BRITISH COLUMBIA, CANADA

Wayne didn't use aftermarket parts on his ProModeler 1/48 scale Curtiss SB2C-4 Helldiver. Instead, he scratchbuilt the bomb bay, folding wings, gear bays, and much of the cockpit. He masked with Silly Putty, painted with Mr. Color lacquers, and weathered with pastels and artist oils.





▼ JOHN EVERETT

LAS VEGAS, NEVADA

This stegosaurus is ready to kick some Jurassic! John built Cretaceous Creations 1/15 scale dino and painted with Tamiya and Vallejo paints sprayed through an Iwata NEO. John says the stego is contemplating his role in the universe.





▲ JACQUES DUQUETTE

BOVEY, MINNESOTA

"No modifications of any kind!" Jacques says of his Tamiya 1/35 scale Type 97 Chi Ha. Jacques wants other modelers to know that older kits "can still be built at a respectable level." We agree! He painted with Polly Scale and Model Master acrylics, with lots of panel shading and washes.

▼ ▶ JOSEPH SIMON

JACKSON, WISCONSIN

Aftermarket details from Pontos, LionRoar, and Artworx helped Joe finish his Tamiya 1/350 scale IJN Yamato built to depict the ship in March 1945. Joe spent more than 2,000 hours over four and a half years on this build, and the care shows. He painted with White Ensign colors and only engaged in a modest amount of weathering before setting it on a base made from his grandpa's cabinets.







◄ CAMERON CORLESS

RIVERTON, UTAH

AK Interactive Real Colors paint dresses Cameron's 1/48 scale F-16 Aggressor in Alaskan splinter camo. He added a metal pitot tube and static dischargers along with resin exhaust and wheels to dress up the Tamiya kit.

MARK WALCOTT **SNYDER, OKLAHOMA**

Mark built his Bronco 1/35 scale German Seehund XXVIIB/ B5 midget sub out of the box. He pre- and post-shaded the base coat and weathered with black artist-oil washes and pastels. The base came with the kit, but Mark added a bit of gravel to evoke the sea floor.






◀ RAY ENGINEER GREENVILLE, **SOUTH CAROLINA**

Modeling a replica of a fighter his dad flew, Ray built a 1/48 North American F-86F marked for Nellis Air Force Base in 1965. He used a Quickboost ejection seat and scratchbuilt the turtledeck details. For paint, he chose Alclad II Chrome and Duraluminum and popped the panel lines with Tamiya wash.

▲ DAVID GOLDFINCH

CLYDE NORTH, VICTORIA, AUSTRALIA

"These are really fun kits," David says of his Bandai 1/144 Zaku II. He built his mobile suit out of the box and airbrushed Mr. Color Mr. Metal as an undercoat and went over it with SMS Yellow, using the hairspray technique for a worn effect.

► KRISTY HERMANSON

MANKATO, MINNESOTA

Kristy created this 28mm scene with gaming figures to depict Mera (from the Aquaman comic books) fighting a poisonous blue ring octopus. She painted the figures and coral stones with Vallejo acrylics and used gel pens to create the camouflage on the octopus.

▼ ELDON FLITTON

LEHI, UTAH

Eldon finished an Airfix 1/72 scale P-51D as a Cavalier in Salvadoran service. He replaced the kit wings with resin wings to emulate the Cavalier and airbrushed the camo freehand with Testors enamel through a Badger Krome.







▲ KEN NILES

FAYETTEVILLE, GEORGIA

Sharp-dressed plane! Ken's build of the venerable Heller 1/72 scale Lockheed Constellation in TWA markings made an impression. He replaced the engines and nacelles with resin parts from Fisher Designs, flush-sanded the windows, scribed panel lines, and added full wheel-well detail. Ken used "lots of washes to illustrate the heavy staining from the engines and in the wheel wells."



▲ DUNCAN SCOTT

MONROEVILLE, PENNSYLVANIA

Duncan primed and pre-shaded Black Sun Models 1/72 scale Gunstar 1 with dark green, top-coated with a 50/50 mix of Tamiya Pearl and clear, and sandwiched various gray and metallic colors in between.



MARTIN DRAYTON

PARK CITY, UTAH

Martin was inspired to build a diorama by the movie *Enemy at the* Gates. He combined various model kits and figures from several manufacturers and painted with acrylics and oils.






▲ BRIAN KANEFSKY

STAMFORD, CONNECTICUT

Brian's ICM 1/32 scale Gloster Gladiator Mk.I represents a plane in France early during World War II. He added photo-etched metal seat belts and rigged with E-Z Line and monofilament wire. Brian painted with AK Interactive acrylic paints and weathered with washes, pigments, and pastels.





▲ RICHARD ROBISON

BATON ROUGE, LOUISIANA

In November 1966, Gemini 12 docked with the Agena target vehicle and Buzz Aldrin performed a spacewalk to test handholds, foot restraints, and other harness methods. Richard used Revell and Real Space Models kits to recreate this historic moment in 1/48 scale.



▲ BRYAN KRUEGER DENVER, COLORADO

If you've never seen a T-40 in this camo scheme before, don't feel bad: It was experimental and only a rare few wore it. Bryan built a HobbyBoss 1/35 scale kit for his special tank and brought up the accuracy with a Voyager photo-etched metal set. He airbrushed the 4BO base coat and hand-painted the camo to match references. To weather, he applied a mix of oil and enamel washes and filters and added a bit of dust with pigments.



▲ SCOTT SCARIOT PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA

Scott 3D-printed all the parts for his Mondoshawan seen in *The Fifth Element* from files at Thingiverse.com. He painted with various Alclad II colors with his Iwata Eclipse. Scott used Vallejo washes to pick out details and then lighted the figure's eyes and belly jewel.



▲ FRED BELL

KEENESBURG, COLORADO

Inspired by a photo, Fred converted an AMT/Ertl 1/25 scale Volvo semi-tractor into a tow truck. He built the truck mostly out of the box, adding an aluminum exhaust, and scratchbuilt the tow unit. He painted with Krylon Safety Orange and Safety Yellow over Dupli-Color primer.



Plus Model produced a 1/35 scale kit of the unusual Pavesi P4/100-30A, and Tony finished it for service in North Africa. He added bolts, stowage, canopy, and figures to complete the vignette. He made the groundwork from polymer clay and kitty litter.





BRIAN LEITCH

OMAHA, NEBRASKA

This speeder biker is in hot pursuit of rebel Wookies on Kashyyyk! Brian built a 1/12 scale Bandai *Star* Wars kit and added landscaping to the base and camouflage decals to the trooper. He finished the model with acrylic paints, artist oils, washes, and pastels.

▶ ABE SCOTT

NORWAY, IOWA

Junior modeler Abe constructed a Tamiya 1/35 scale M4A3E8 Sherman "Easy Eight." He built it out of the box, airbrushed it Tamiya Olive Drab, weathered the body with Tamiya pigments, and dirtied the tracks with pigments from AK Interactive.



◀ MICHAL KANEFSKY

STAMFORD, CONNECTICUT

Reaching for an older kit, junior modeler Michal brought a Testors-imagined 1/48 scale MiG-37B "Ferret-E" stealth fighter to the show. She built it from the box and painted with Tamiya acrylics with her Iwata airbrush and lightly weathered with washes and pastels.

KURT KRANS

TULSA, OKLAHOMA

This model of a pinnacle landing features a Trumpeter 1/35 scale CH-47D Chinook. Kurt made the rocks out of plaster over a wire frame with steel supports. Brass tubes support the heli. He painted with Mr. Hobby colors and weathered with Ammo by Mig Jimenez products.



PAUL CASSATT LITTLE ELM, TEXAS Paul cut his Trumpeter 1/350 scale USS New York at the waterline, added Master Model metal gun barrels, but otherwise built the kit out of the box. He painted exclusively with Mr. Hobby lacquers, and it was the first time he'd used the brand. It depicts the ship retrieving one of its Kingfisher scout planes.



ANDREW WHITE

HOLLYWOOD, MARYLAND

Andrew tucked HobbyBoss Mk.20 cluster bombs under the wings of his Hasegawa 1/48 scale AV-8B Harrier II. Painted to represent a Harrier operating out of Saudi Arabia during Operation Desert Storm in 1991, he used Mr. Hobby acrylics.



◀ STAN SPOONER

BOERNE, TEXAS

Stan's Zvezda 1/35 scale K-17 Bumerang IFV was brought up to current operational standards with scratchbuilt updates, including suspended smoke grenade launchers, anti-personnel frag grenade launchers, additional armor plates, light guards and steps, electronic armatures, and forward and rear TV cameras. He finished it in Ukrainian service.

► ALEXANDRE BIGEY **PAPEETE, TAHITI**

Alexandre made his own clear parts for an Aircast Resin 1/72 scale Cessna H21C Golden Eagle and cut open the door in back. He painted with Tamiya lacquers decanted from the spray can. A light wash accented panel lines.

▶ JIM CLARK

SCOTTSDALE, ARIZONA

Jim converted a Tamiya 1/32 F-15C Eagle into an Israeli Defense Force F-15I. He painted with Mr. Color lacquers and masked and airbrushed all the markings.



▶ BOB STEINBRUNN

PHELPS, WISCONSIN

Bob's Wingnut Wings 1/32 scale Bristol R.2B fighter is pulled by a laminated cherry-wood prop and rigged with white E-Z Line colored with a silver Sharpie. He airbrushed khaki drab, masked the wing ribs, the airbrushed a light coat of Tamiya Smoke, and repeated the process for the underside. He lightened the khaki drab and painted that between panels to indicate fading.



IAN DOW

LIVONIA, MICHIGAN

Here's the whole deal: a 1/72 scale M26 Dragon Wagon hauling a landwasserschlepper! Combining Academy and HobbyBoss kits, lan created this amazing scene, adding Eduard photo-etched metal details, chains, blocks, stowage, and a scratchbuilt interior. He painted with Tamiya paints and weathered with Ammo by Mig Jimenez pigments.







◀ MATT JACOBSON

LAWRENCE, KANSAS

Stay out of the water! Matt started this model as a Monogram 1/48 scale AV-8B Harrier, but then quickly changed it. He flipped the kit over, moved the vertical stabilizer to the top, moved the horizontal stabilizers forward, and brought in parts from other kits to make what Matt calls the "Terminator Shark." Two red LEDs light the eyes, and it wears a white LED spotlight in the nose. This model won gold at WonderFest USA 2022.

▲ KIM SHELDON PENSACOLA, FLORIDA

Flying in with a Grumman-Columbia Aircraft OA-12 Duck, Kim built the 1/72 scale Airfix kit, but needed to get dirty and make some modifications to the plastic. He sanded off overscale rivets, substituted a vacuum-formed canopy for the kit plastic, installed a True Details resin pilot's seat, and ran rigging.



▲ FRED BOGS

WINTERSET, IOWA

Fred modeled an M4A1 during the Normandy Breakout in August 1944. He used an Asuka 1/35 scale kit as a base, modified the hedgerow cutter, added photo-etched metal tool tie-down straps and fittings, and made sandbags with two-part epoxy putty. A variety of paints and techniques went into finishing Fred's Sherman, including Tamiya lacquers, acrylic paints, and oil washes for highlights.



A DAVID WAPLES WESTMINSTER, COLORADO

To model his MikroMir 1/350 scale USS James Monroe at sea, David made a base from foam insulation and used the Chris Flodberg water method demonstrated in the April 2016 FineScale Modeler magazine.



▲ STEVE SCHAFFER HASTINGS, MINNESOTA

Turned on to Zoukei-Mura kits by a friend, Steve modeled his 1/48 scale F-4EJ Kai straight out of the box. The scheme replicates a Japanese paint job used for the aircraft's retirement from service.



■ DOUGLAS LEACH BELLEVUE, NEBRASKA

For his F/A-18E marked for VFA-81 Sunliners, Doug began with a 1/48 scale Revell kit and added a resin ejection seat and ordnance from Hasegawa weapons sets (the GBU-12s are mounted on resin racks from Reskit). He base-coated the fighter black, painted with Tamiya and MR Paint colors, and added Flory washes and artist oil paints for detail and a bit of weathering.



◄CHAD RICHMOND

PINSON, ARIZONA

Built box stock, Chad painted his Tamiya 1/48 scale Bf 109E-3 with MR Paint colors through an Evolution airbrush. He masked for the Swiss markings and added very light Flory washes for weathering.

▼IAN KEIZER

NARRE WARREN, VICTORIA, **AUSTRALIA**

Building a Copper State Models 1/35 scale Autocar Canadian armored machine gun carrier, lan drilled out the gun barrels, opened the side door, and added tread to the tires. He mixed Mr. Hobby paints for custom colors. "The model depicts a warweary car and crew that just want to go home," lan says.





▲ CALEB LEVONAS

LONGMONT, COLORADO

Caleb built his Eduard 1/48 scale Spitfire Mk.Vc/Trop out of the box and marked for service with the Royal Australian Air Force. He painted a natural-metal base, airbrushed the camo freehand, and then chipped to reveal the metal underneath. Caleb weathered with artist oils, enamel washes, and AK Interactive colored pencils.

> JARROD BOOTH

DESOTO, KANSAS

Holy bling, Batman! Jarrod built his Italeri 1/24 scale Scania from the box — except for a single antenna. He draped it in Testors Wet-Look enamels, but painted the cab panels separately, polished them, placed decals, and then put it all together. Spectacular truck!




Mad City Modelers 26th Annual Show and IPMS Region 5 Convention

HAROLD PARSONS

INVER GROVE HEIGHTS, MINNESOTA

Harold describes the Copper State Models 1/48 scale Caudron G.4 as an excellent kit; his only additions were Uschi van der Rosten line for rigging and beading wire pushrods for the engines. He painted the model with acrylics and enamels.







▲ JEFF BOBELA

GLADSTONE, MISSOURI

To model a loaded U.S. Navy jet, Jeff built a HobbyBoss 1/72 scale A-7 Corsair out of the box, added aftermarket decals, and painted it with Ammo by Mig Jimenez acrylics. Washes popped the rivets and panels lines, pastels mixed with water added streaks.





▲ JOHN W. TOKAREWICH **BARTLETT, ILLINOIS**

John performed major surgery to improve Revell's 1/320 scale USS John Paul Jones from 1958! He removed and corrected some molded-on parts to make room for aftermarket details. John installed Gold Medal Models photo-etched metal, Monkey Models gun mounts, directors, hedgehog launchers, and a number of other aftermarket and scratchbuilt additions. He painted with Testors Model Master and LifeColor acrylics.

◀MATT STOWELL

HUNTLEY, ILLINOIS

Matt isn't sure who made this bust of a Sleestack from the 1970s TV show Land of the Lost. He painted it with Vallejo acrylics over Badger Stynylrez primer; the initial layers were airbrushed and the details were dry-brushed.

◀ BOB MADERICH II MINNEAPOLIS, **MINNESOTA**

Having some fun, Bob took Revell's 1/48 scale Stearman for a spin to model a barnstorming aerobatic plane. He painted it with Humbrol enamels, and his only addition to an otherwise out-of-the-box build was rigging.



▲► MICHAEL GOSDA

MADISON, WISCONSIN

What is it? Diesel punk hover buildings, according to Michael, who scratchbuilt the small eatery, the customer's hover car, and the neighboring mechanical building. He hand-painted the structures with acrylics.

After Tom finished an Academy 1/200 scale New Bedford whaler as the *Charles* W. Morgan (now a museum ship at Mystic Seaport, Connecticut) with craft acrylics, he launched it on a sea of aluminum foil and gauze.

◀ MAREK ROGAL MADISON, WISCONSIN

To build an Indian MiG-27M that served in Kashmir in 1997 and 1998, Marek added armor plates alongside the cockpit. He painted the ground attacker with Mr. Color lacquers over Badger Stynylrez black primer. Washes and color modulation weathered the finish.

► STEVE BACON **NEW WHITELAND, INDIANA**

Re-imagining a "paper panzer," Steve extended the hull of a Trumpeter 1/35 scale E-10 Jagdpanzer. He made room for the turret from a Puma armored car and scratchbuilt a launcher and X-7 guided missile. Steve painted the what-if German vehicle with Tamiya acrylics and weathered it with artist oils and AK Interactive pigments.



► BRIAN N. STANLEY **GLENWOOD, IOWA**

To build a Soviet vehicle in Berlin in 1945, Brian detailed a Tamiya 1/35 scale ISU-152 with an RB metal barrel, Friulmodel tracks, Eureka tow cables, and crew figures from Stalingrad Miniatures. He painted the big self-propelled gun with Tamiya acrylics, postshaded the vehicle for visual interest, and weathered with washes and pigments.



BILL NICHOLS

SUN PRAIRIE, WISCONSIN

After dressing up Pegasus' 1/144 scale Nautilus with LED lighting and a detailed interior, Bill placed it (and the Kraken it came with) on a base populated with aquarium supplies. To paint the scene, he used acrylics; the corroded finish on the sub was achieved with Modern Masters Metal Effects oxidizing iron paint and pigments.

► STEVE HUSTAD

EDEN PRAIRIE, MINNESOTA

The title of Steve's 1/72 diorama aptly describes the reaction of U.S. soldiers when they discovered three Natter rocket fighters abandoned in a field in Austria at the end of World War II. The Natters come from Brengun and the figures are from Preiser; the rest of the scene was scratchbuilt. Humbrol enamels, Vallejo acrylics, artist-oil washes, and pigments finished the scene.





◀ RICK RASMUSSEN

DECORAH, IOWA

Looking to pose a HobbyBoss 1/35 scale V-100 Commando at a U.S. Military Police checkpoint in Vietnam, Rick fitted machine guns on the roof. He replaced the kit parts with DEF.Model wheels, piled on Tamiya and Legend stowage, and scratchbuilt the siren at the front. Rick painted the armored car with Testors Model Master enamels, first airbrushing white over the upper section and black on the lower reaches to preshade the camouflage.

DAVE MEZERA HOBART, INDIANA

Dave used a White Ensign resin hull to improve Trumpeter's 1/700 scale HMS Renown. He painted the battlecruiser with Vallejo acrylics, applied pastel weathering, and then posed the ship underway on a sculpted styrene foam seascape.






◀ ROGER SAMS **BELLEVUE, NEBRASKA**

▲ RICARDO SALAMÉ BURLINGTON, ONTARIO, CANADA Typically a builder of real-space models, Ricardo went out of his comfort zone to build this Gunze Sangyo 1/35 scale vignette of a crashed Bf 109G-10 among sunflowers. He



Poste Militaire's 90mm Timurid Emir figure, as Steve finished it, stares commandingly at viewers. Primed in black, it wears AK Interactive 3rd Gen colors, artists oils, and pigments for dust on its boots and base.

TORONTO, ONTARIO, CANADA

Dave upgraded his Copper State 1/35 scale Lanchester armored car with oil cans and a tarp. He airbrushed with Tamiya lacquers and weathered with pigments, oil paints, and enamels.







▲ ROB TREMBLAY

MOUNT HOPE, ONTARIO, CANADA

ICM's big 1/32 scale AH-1G Cobra is center stage in Rob's build. He detailed the cockpit with Quinta Studio 3D-printed decals. The base is a combination of 3D-printed and resin parts. He weathered with Flory washes, artist oils, and picked out details with Tamiya Panel Line Wash.

◄ ARIELLE MERRITT-MURRELL

OAKVILLE, ONTARIO, CANADA

An anime and manga fan, Arielle, 13, showed off her Bandai 1/144 scale Schwalbe Graze Gundam piloted by McGillis Fareed in the Mobile Suit Gundam Iron-Blooded Orphans TV series. She painted details with Tamiya colors and mildly weathered with Ammo by Mig Jimenez products.



▲ ROBIN FINDLAY

These are the droids you're looking for! Ross built the vinyl Kaiyodo 1/6 scale C-3PO and R2-D2 but upgraded the details. He added wires to the protocol droid's belly; on R2, he installed rollers in all the feet, springs for hoses on the left and right feet, and custom decals on the dome. Ross dressed R2 in Tamiya Gloss White with an AK Interactive Xtreme Metal dome; 3PO was painted Createx Gold.

◀OLIVIA GERMANN

ELMIRA, ONTARIO, CANADA

"Revealed! Penguin orchestrates *Titanic* sinking!" Olivia, 8, finished her Meng egg-scale RMS *Titanic* with Vallejo acrylics and used an airbrush to do it. She placed the ill-fated passenger ship next to a 3D-printed iceberg and penguin. Olivia says she painted "very carefully" and used pigments for the smokestacks.







▲ VICTOR CONSTANTINESCU

PICKERING, ONTARIO, CANADA

Looking to model a very worn, amphibious tank, Victor settled on the Dragon 1/35 scale Japanese Special Type 2 Ka-Mi. He sprayed a Tamiya Dark Gray base and went over it with Light Gray and provided some chipping. Further weathering came in the form of artist-oil washes and pigments.

▲ CHRIS CHAPMAN

NORTHBROOK, ILLINOIS

The Show's Over diorama features the classic Monogram 1/24 scale Dragon Wagon. Chris heavily modified the kit and added a Doozy gas pump, oil drums, and beer cans to set the scene. He painted with Tamiya and LifeColor acrylics and used the hairspray method for chipping.





▲ SIMON LAM

MARKHAM, ONTARIO, CANADA

Simon painted this Scale75 75mm figure of a medieval knight as a tribute to the *Ultima* computer game franchise he enjoyed as a child. He employed Scale75, Vallejo, and AK Interactive 3rd Gen acrylics for the work. "A lot of research was done to replicate the art and style," Simon says. This character is ready to begin his quest of the avatar.





ALLISTON, ONTARIO, CANADA

Jonathan modeled an atmospheric launch crawler from the Macross (Robotech) saga. The 1/72 scale model incorporates a Valkyrie fighter from Hasegawa and resin parts for the launcher. Jonathan scratchbuilt the engines in the boosters and painted and weathered with Tamiya products.

From the J.J. Abrams Star Trek universe comes this Moebius Models 1/1000 scale USS Kelvin. Shawn added lights to the model, hiding the batteries in the base. He painted the Aztec paneling with Tamiya acrylics and used Frisket paper for masks.





An AeroMaster resin pilot's seat dresses up the cockpit of Lorenzo's Tamiya 1/48 scale P-47D Thunderbolt No Guts, No Glory. He primed the fuselage with Airspeed Silver, mottled with MR Paint Dark Grey, and finished with Tamiya Bare Metal Silver. Flory washes provided some dirt.



▲ ROBERT TETERUCK

OAKVILLE, ONTARIO, CANADA

Real-space models are a rarity at model shows, but Robert made sure to bring his Hasegawa 1/200 scale Atlantis space shuttle and Hubble telescope. He made a custom decal to replicate the tiles on the orbiter's belly and detailed the telescope, payload bay, and doors with Bare-Metal Foil.



BOB BURGAR RICHMOND HILL, ONTARIO, **CANADA**

The ICM 1/32 scale Gloster Gladiator Mk.I builds like a dream, and Bob does the kit justice with his model marked for Royal Air Force No. 112 Squadron in Summit and Port Sudan in June 1940. He primed with Mr. Finishing Surface 1500 white, masked, and then went to work with Tamiya paints and an airbrush.







▲ CHRISTOPHE CLAVIÈRE

LAVAL, QUEBEC, CANADA

Christophe finished Airfix's 1/144 scale Vickers VC10 in Ghana Airways livery. He applied aftermarket decals over Tamiya White and Gray spray paint.

◀ ALEX GREKOV

MONTREAL, QUEBEC, CANADA

After paying \$2 for a Masterkit 1/144 scale Beriev Be-12, Alex realized he got what he paid for. The aircraft required a ton of work, which included filling and correcting panel lines, cutting open the water-tank doors, replacing the engines with 3D-printed ones, and designing and printing new decals. He installed the model on a clear rod mounted to a birch slab and simulated water with polyester fiber.

"These are Black Watch soldiers fighting a French lancer at the Battle of Waterloo," Geoffrey says. He airbrushed the horse and painted the kilts by hand. Acrylic colors were used throughout.

He drew masks and made them on a Silhouette Cameo 4 cutting machine for the scheme.









Rick used a 1/48 scale Revell kit and covered the exterior with panels of aluminum foil. He painted the plane olive drab, weathered it with pastels.

GRANT PARK, ILLINOIS









▲ WILLIAM WALLACE CARY, ILLINOIS

William built his Bandai 1/100 scale Gundam Double X out of the box, without paint or primer, relying on the colored plastic to do the work. He did darken panel lines with a finetipped black pen.

▼FELIX GONZALES

CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

Felix built a Bandai 1/12 scale Star Wars General Grievous. He painted with Tamiya and Vallejo colors, weathered the cyborg with pastels, and dressed him in an aftermarket cloth cape.

Building a Revell 1/72 scale kit, Gregory modeled PT-109, changing the position of the depth charges to match his research. The front rails are 3D printed, and other details come from photo-etched metal and resin aftermarket sets. He used Tamiya primer and Mr. Color paints to finish everything.

▲ BOB CLIFT

MILTON, WISCONSIN

Bob had a vision for a vignette of an abandoned tow truck. To get there, he raided AMT kits for donor parts, scratchbuilt the hoist, fuel tank, and seat, and then based it on foam insulation. The dirt and stones are real, and Bob made all the grass and leaves.



There's a lot packed away in Scott's classic single-car garage. He scratchbuilt the building from basswood and covered the roof with sandpaper shingles. Inside is an AMT 1/25 scale '63 Nova waiting to have an engine dropped in from a scratchbuilt hoist. Scott made the boxes from paper and wood and raided his spares for tools and other dressings to round out the scene. Well done!







WAUKESHA, WISCONSIN

This honey of a hot rod from Ronald is a Monogram 1/25 scale 1930 Ford Model A phaeton. He added a distributor with wires, coil, fuel pump, and fuel lines. The brake booster came from another kit, and he ran brake lines. Ronald also upgraded the model with hose clamps, a six-sided die for the shifter, and seat belts, all under Dupli-Color auto paint.



▲ BOB SHEEHAN

ELMWOOD PARK, ILLINOIS

Bob painted a 1/8 scale Gamora from Marvel's *Guardians of the Galaxy* movie with acrylic and oil paints. He pre-shaded and then airbrushed the basic colors before detailing by hand.

▼ MARK DANKO

VALPARAISO, INDIANA

Mark put Eduard photo-etched metal parts, Brassin wheels, UltraCast resin exhausts, and fairings, and LlfeLike decals into a Tamiya 1/48 scale P-51D Mustang to model *Contrary Mary*. He primed with Mr. Surfacer, painted with Mr. Color Silver, and weathered with inks and pastels.





► ANDY KEYES

WEST BEND, WISCONSIN

Andy built this Tamiya 1/48 scale F4F Wildcat out of the box. He added seat belts made of tape to the cockpit. Not a fan of Tamiya decals, he persevered, pre- and post-shaded with Mr. Color paints and weathered with an acrylic sludge wash.





◀JOHN ANTON MIDLOTHIAN, ILLINOIS

Have you ever wondered what Batman's car would look like if Bruce Wayne had a sense of style? John answers with his 'lux 1/25 scale Batmobile, dripping in high-gloss color-shift paint and boasting gold-plated wheels, machine guns, and trim. We don't care about practicality, just that it looks cool.

ELGIN, ILLINOIS

The 1/48 scale Creole Queen steamed in under David's command. Measuring 48 inches long at the keel with a 10-inch beam, the model has custom searchlights, rails, radar units, a horn, a power winch, funnel tops, and stairs, all made from a combination of brass, wood, and cardstock. The base features 3/4-inch dowels wrapped in rope.



◀ MARK MILLER SUN PRAIRIE, WISCONSIN

Mark replaced the tracks on his Tamiya 1/35 scale Jagdtiger with Scale Colors' 3D-printed workable tank tracks and made his own vision blocks, too. Again, turning to Scale Colors, he airbrushed primer, modulated with white and black before base-coating.

Choosing a scheme inspired by the classic Gulf Racing team livery, Rob painted ALB-LAB's 1/35 scale Markov Antigravity Racer with Tamiya lacquers and artist oils.



▲ ERIC GONZALEZ HIALEAH, FLORIDA

To improve GeoMetric's 1/4 scale bust of the Invisible Man, Eric hollowed out his head and removed the molded-on glasses to make way for scratchbuilt replacements. He painted the depiction of the Claude Rains character with Tamiya, Testors Model Master, and Vallejo acrylics. "I'm just glad his head didn't explode while I was Dremeling it out!" Eric says.



▲ ALEX SILVIA

LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS

Alex added parts from other kits to a Bandai 1/144 scale RMS-116H and painted the Gundam mobile suit with Tamiya spray-can lacquers and Vallejo acrylics. He says he painted it in NASCAR colors to show a mobile suit modified for paintball games.

Deviating from the standard black for Star Wars GNK power droids, Michael painted JPG Productions 1/12 scale model yellow using Vallejo acrylics. He added details with spare parts and wires. "He's a power droid that has seen better times," Michael says.




Scott's scratchbuilt insectoid model, appropriately named The Bug, is a three-man surveillance vehicle he describes as "an advanced version of a helicopter that operates with antigrav technology." He painted *The* **Bug** with Tamiya acrylics.





▲ CHUCK HOMOLKA PARMA HEIGHTS, OHIO

Chuck says E2046's 1/6 scale Punk Asuka was his first serious attempt to do an anime figure. He improved the model with solder bootlaces, rebuilt the guitar with his own details and strings, and painted everything with Tamiya acrylics.



▲ ANNYA SHETININA FRIDLEY, MINNESOTA

Annya painted a 3D-printed bust of Sylvie from Loki by online designer Wicked with airbrushed acrylic base coats, pastel shading, and hand-painted details. "I used Rub 'n Buff for all of the metal parts," she says.




▲ TOM CLARK TONEY, ALABAMA

Converting Tony Cipriano's bust of the Iron Giant into an average working robot, Tom gave it a distressed multicolor paint scheme. He painted the model by hand and used hairspray to weather the finish.





Oggie's build of Faye Valentine from Cowboy Bebop started as a 3D-printed kit designed by EdyTheCross3D at CGTrader.com. He painted the 1/8 scale bounty hunter with Vallejo acrylics.

After building a StannArts 1/12 scale "The Search for Luke" that depicts Han Solo on a Tauntaun out of the box, Lou painted it with Tamiya acrylics, including plenty of dry-brushing.







Fascinated by a starfighter on the cover of Ammo by Mig Jimenez's Star Defenders paint set, Kenny scratchbuilt it using styrene and Aves Apoxie Sculpt. He painted it with Vallejo, Ammo, Apple Barrel, and Pactra acrylics and marked it as a fighter from the Battletech universe with decals from Hasegawa and Fighting Pirhana Graphics.





◀ KIP PELTON

CRESTWOOD, KENTUCKY

After building a Moebius 1/25 scale Batman Tumbler out of the box, Kip airbrushed a stealthy digital camouflage using satin black and flat black. The gloomy Gotham base is made from foam and topped with corkboard and weathered plaster Jersey barriers.

For an accurate 1/1000 scale *Deep Space Station K-7* from the classic Star Trek episode "The Trouble With Tribbles," Steve vacuum-formed the domes and window cones and connected the components with PVC pipes. The whole thing slowly rotates on a stand and is lighted with LEDs.





▼PAUL RATHBUN BOTHELL, WASHINGTON

Paul painted this dramatic bust of Wolverine with acrylics using pre- and post-shading and pastels to bring the rabid Marvel superhero to life. Alclad II lacquers shined his adamantium claws.



John's model of Moya, the sentient Leviathan spaceship from the TV show Farscape, started as a four-part 3D-printed kit, which he hollowed out to make room for fiber-optic lighting. After detailing the outside with styrene rod, he painted with Vallejo acrylics, starting with a black base and gradually adding metallic colors to produce shading.

ROCHESTER, MINNESOTA

Combining 1/72 scale kits from RPM, Edward modeled a U.S. Army Mack AC truck hauling a Wisconsin National Guard 6-ton tank in 1927. He improved the tank with Steelworks resin tracks and detailed both vehicles with styrene and wire before applying Tamiya and Vallejo acrylics and Humbrol enamels.

HASTINGS, MINNESOTA

Going big, Steve finished Bandai's Perfect Grade 1/60 scale RX-78-2 Gundam with MR Paint lacquers over Mr. Finishing Surfacer 1500 Black. To weather the mobile suit, he applied Tamiya pastels and washes.

Bob built Special Hobby's 1/48 scale F2G Super Corsair race plane out of the box and painted it with Tamiya colors. Because it is a racer, he omitted weathering, preferring to keep it clean and fresh for the starting line.



To mimic the original 5-foot filming miniature of the Millennium Falcon as it appeared in later movies in the original Star Wars trilogy, Andrew added custom landing, running, and headlights to a Bandai 1/72 scale Perfect Grade kit. He painted the modified YT-1300 freighter with Tamiya and Testors Model Master acrylics and weathered it with Tamiya pastels, fine markers, and watercolor pencils.

MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN



Military Miniatures Society of Illinois Chicago Show







▲ FELIX GONZALES CHICAGO, ILLINOIS





Sand and tufts from Gamers Grass and Woodland Scenics helped Michael base his 75mm Savage Beauty figure from Black Sun Miniatures. He airbrushed the skin tones and refined them with acrylic glazes and a paintbrush.



A Russian BMP-2E is on the losing end of a confrontation with a Ukrainian T-64BM Bulat in Mike's diorama. He lighted the muzzle flash with an LED, placed the scene on a picture frame, and made the base with matboard and papier-mâché.



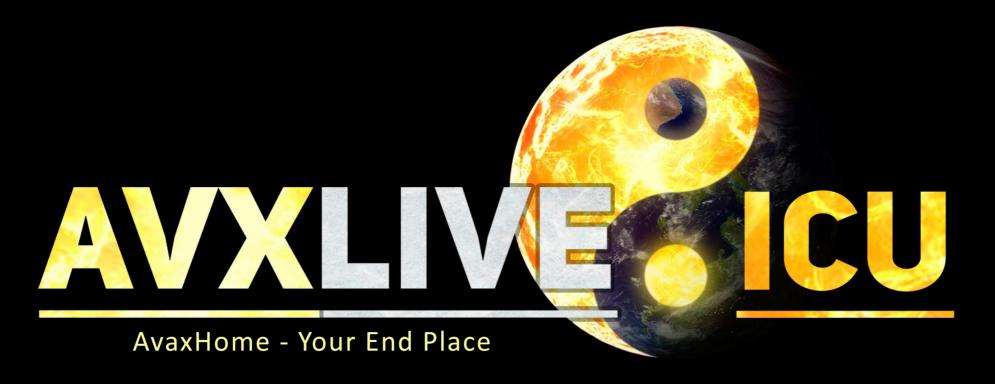

The mech being repaired in Karl's diorama comes from Soda Pop Miniatures. He painted it, the robot helper, Tamiya tools, and scratchbuilt oscilloscope with P3 acrylics using a pink base coat topped with transparent yellow to produce the orange armor. The base was cast in plaster.

After hand-painting a Pegaso 90mm Norman knight with Vallejo acrylics and artist oils, Mike put it on Aves Apoxie Scuplt groundwork.



GUS AUGUSTIN ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, ILLINOIS

Wanting a first-rate ship for his collection, Gus scratchbuilt HMS *Prince William* circa 1719 with boxwood planking over cherry frames. He spent 1,500 hours on the 1/192 scale model that includes more than 2,500 treenails and a figurehead he carved from boxwood.

Jerry modified the pilot of Bandai's 1/72 scale A-wing to resemble Hera Syndulla, the Twi'lek revolutionary seen in Star Wars Rebels. He painted the starfighter with Tamiya colors and used aftermarket decals.

OTTAWA, ILLINOIS

Brant, 7, built this Monogram 1/32 scale Screamin' Mimi Sherman that carries a Calliope rocket launcher on the turret with his dad. The model was hand-painted with Tamiya acrylics.







▲ RICHARD ROMANIAK

DES PLAINES, ILLINOIS

The hull of Richard's 1/96 scale USS Constitution comes from the venerable Revell kit, but he replaced or modified just about everything else, including wood for the decks, deck furniture, gratings, railings, fife rails, knightheads, masts, yards, blocks, and deadeyes. The kit figures were repositioned to show more action.

ALGONQUIN, ILLINOIS

The weathered finish on Dave's 1/48 scale PV-1 Ventura replicates the wear and tear experienced by these U.S. Navy patrol aircraft in the Pacific during World War II. He painted the Revell model with Tamiya acrylics and applied an enamel wash.

▼ RICK HAMBEL

WINFIELD, ILLINOIS

The Nieuport IV.M was derived from a prewar design and served in the French air force in early World War I as an observation and reconnaissance plane. Rick modified a Planet Models 1/48 scale resin kit of the aircraft by scratchbuilding the cockpit coaming and adding UMM-USA spoked wheels. He painted the doped linen airframe with Tamiya and Vallejo acrylics.







▲ MELISSA KAPPES BATAVIA, ILLINOIS

The Batmobile is most at home on the gritty streets of Gotham at night, so junior modeler Melissa built just such a base for an AMT 1/25 scale kit of the Caped Crusader's ride from the 1989 Batman movie. She used foam board for the street and building, applied washes and graffiti to the walls, and even lit the streetlamps.



▲ GEORGE LOCOCO **ALGONQUIN, ILLINOIS**

Modeling a German tank in Normandy in 1944, George applied Zimmerit to a Tamiya 1/35 scale Panther using wall filler paste. Other additions include a scratchbuilt crew and stowage. He used Vallejo acrylics for the camouflage and weathered with artist-oil dot filters, preand post-shading, pinwashes, and powdered pastel dust.






