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








## Welcome to Phoenix Scale Publications!

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# MASCAR Under Caracter and Carac

RENE VAN DER HART BUILDS THE 1:25 REVELL MODEL OF WARD BURTON'S CATERPILLAR GRAND PRIX NASCAR



REVELL

or many years, I have admired the look of the American NASCAR racers, especially those from the

seventies to the nineties. The later models didn't look much like the original street-car anymore, and so were less interesting. I started buying several kits at model shows and from eBay but didn't build any of them for quite some time. Finally, I started with my first kit, which was more a test to learn new skills I never had to use when building aircraft kits.

The yellow and black livery of the Caterpillar Pontiac really appealed to me, so I choose this kit to be my first serious try to build a proper race car. I didn't want to build it straight-fromthe-box but show as much of the internals as possible. The engine looked quite nice, but some parts were moulded to the engine and over scaled. The rubber belts were all cut from the pulleys and these in turn were cleaned, and holes were drilled in them, according to my reference photographs. The pulleys were later glued onto the engine and the 'belts' were made from thin strips of masking tape. The headers were all trimmed and cleaned

next and dry fitted to the engine. When the main parts were complete, small holes were drilled into the engine and distributor for the sparkplug cables. Larger holes were then drilled to fit the cooling hoses added later in the build.

All engine parts were then primed grey and several Alclad metal shades were used for the different parts. The headers were also painted with Tamiya clear paints to simulate heat discoloration. A clear

coat was then applied next, followed by a grey wash. I had already collected a lot of small detail parts before starting this build such as coloured sparkplug cables, a white metal carburettor, resin hose fittings, brake callipers and braided lines. Also, many photographs were gathered from the Internet for reference purposes. The chassis and roll cage went together quite well but a lot of cleaning was necessary to remove all the mould lines from the cage. The front suspension was then cleaned up and glued to the chassis after several parts had been cut off. Since I wanted to show the inside, I also had to pose the hood in the opened position, and as such plastic strips were glued on the inside of the hood to simulate metal bars. As this model was meant to be posed with the wheels attached many details are simplified.

The ventilated disk brakes were made from two plastic disks cut from plastic sheet





No brakes and wheel hubs were present, and the springs and shock absorbers were over scaled and crude. So, I started to remove the parts I wanted to replace or modify. I started with the easy jobs by replacing all round bars and axles with brass or plastic rod. The springs were made from copper wire, wound around a piece of plastic tube. This is not the best material to use, and I will make them from brass rod next time. Next, I made new shock absorbers from plastic and brass rod. These were then attached with small 'L' shaped brackets to the roll cage.

The ventilated disk brakes were made from two plastic disks, cut from plastic sheet, with small plastic strips sandwiched between them.








































in multiple thin coats and left to dry for a couple of days. Then this was masked off to paint the black areas. The black paint had bled a little under the masking tape, but this would disappear under a decal later - lucky for me! Now the fun part began applying all the decals. As this was a 20-year-old kit, I feared the decals would fall apart into small pieces. Fortunately, they went on very well,

of Johnsons 'Future' was then airbrushed onto the body after the decals were all in place. The front and rear windows were inside and, along with the other clear parts, glued onto the car. With all the work done on the brakes and suspension, I didn't want to mount the wheels of course. So, I made four jack stands from plastic rod and strips. These were glued under the car after they were painted and weathered. The final thing to do was to place the body over the chassis to finish off this build. There is much room for improvement but, for my first serious go at a NASCAR kit, I'm quite happy with the look of

largely the same as the previous year's car. However, its development continued throughout the season, and improvements were made to the driveshaft, transmission housing, and steering column, as well as to the turbo-charger and manifold, which was changed from a 4–2–1 configuration to a 4–1 configuration. Savings were also found in some modified brackets, the wiring, and glass and this reduced the weight by some 15kg. Poised to make Subaru competitive,

four-time World Champion driver Tommi Makinen joined the team, driving for the 2002 season. The 37-year-old Finn brought a wealth of knowledge to the team and his standing as the most successful rally driver of the last decade was much appreciated, and as such he took first place in the 2002 Monte Carlo rally. That result gave him an unprecedented record of four consecutive Monte Carlo wins making him the most



## **PREPARATION**

So, I began by cleaning all the parts in soapy water as I do with all my builds. The next step was to clean up the body shell in preparation for painting, as I knew this was the part of the build that required a few paint layers to be built up with some light sanding in-between to ensure a smooth finish at the end. The body shell and chassis were therefore primed using Mr Surfacer 1500, then wet sanded down with fine sandpaper before being painted with three lavers of Tamiva TS-50 Mica Blue, This was decanted into my airbrush to ensure I had more control during the paint process. I then applied a coat of Alclad 2 Aqua Gloss protect the paintwork and prepare the surface for the decals. This is a process you don't want to rush, and I always leave the varnish coat a minimum of 24 hours to fully cure, as a lot of handling is required during this stage and you don't want to ruin the paintwork with a finger print!

## THE HELMETS

While the body shell was drying, I moved on to the painting and detailing of the driver and co-driver's helmets. These were detailed with Tamiya X-8 Lemon Yellow, and I used a mix of Vallejo skin tones to paint the faces and Tamiya XF-8 Flat Blue for their racing coveralls. Their boots were painted with Tamiya XF-1 and the seatbelt buckles were painted with Tamiya XF-11. The figures were then lightly dry brushed with XF-19 to

highlight all the details. Both figures have a lot of decal callouts for their race coveralls and some complex ones for the helmets. I had some issues getting the helmet decals to go on properly, but that was quickly sorted with the use of Micro Set and Sol and some perseverance. I decided to use Vallejo Satin to then tone down the shene on the coveralls, and this

worked well.

After going through the instructions, I thought it would be better to approach the rest of the build by breaking it up into sub-assemblies, such as the engine, the front suspension, transmission, steering and interior. First thing I tackled was to pick out all the semi-gloss black parts. These were removed them from their sprues. cleaned up using a hobby knife and sanding sticks and painted with X-18 Semi-Gloss Black, before sealing then with some Vallejo Satin. Then the remaining parts were removed from their sprues, cleaned up and painted as per the instructions. I was impressed with the level of detail on the underside of the engine and transmission housing, but I was disappointed later as it would all be covered up with the protection plates and wheels. Unfortunately, one of my wheels had some damage to the

with Tamiya X-12 Gold Leaf to ensure the colour

sealed with a coat of Alclad Agua Gloss. The interior decals all went down easily

to the wheels and tyres. These were then

except for the carbon fibre ones on the back of the bucket Recaro seats. These needed a little persuasion to get them to conform to the curves. Once all the parts were ready, I then started to build up the interior, which all fitted in seamlessly. I then attached all the smaller parts that were liable to break off during painting such as the engine, the lights, the antennas and such.

## DECALS

With this being a rally car, it's absolutely covered with sponsors decals, which took a bit of time to apply and get them to conform to all the curves. Once all the decals were on, it was time to seal them in with another coat of Aqua Gloss, and once dry I buffed up the bodywork with a lint free cloth. Then I inserted the bug-eye headlights and rear light clusters into the body shell and have to say these fitted very well for such complex shapes. The radiator

and the front mesh were also added, before matting the body shell to the chassis. The protective covers were then added to the underside along with the front

This was truly a great car kit to build, and there was no flash at all on my kit and not more than a couple of inoffensive ejector pin marks. The sprue gates were small and conveniently positioned to enable clean up. I especially liked the added detail that the driver and co-driver brought, which enhanced the overall look, and if you were into dioramas this would enable you to recreate a nice scene. The fit and final representation of the model does capture the look of a truly great sports car, and I can highly recommend

Lancia Delta HF Integrale 16V


In the late 1980s Lancia was the



king of the World Rally Championships with near total domination winning 5 World Championships in a row despite strong opposition from the Japanese manufacturers. This success on the track led to a massive increase in sales of Lancia cars. The Delta HF Integrale was introduced in 1987 and remained competitive for 4 years though evolution continued with a change of engines as the 8V 182bhp version

that Italeri have kitted with its 16V, 197bhp and specifically the two cars racing for Lancia Martini at the 1990 Monte Carlo which placed in 1st (Car 7 A Didier & O Bernard) and 3rd position (Car 1 B Miki & S Tiziano). Sadly, the Delta's dominance came to an end in 1993 when Lancia withdrew from rallying and in the modern age Lancia is now a shadow of its former self with only a small presence outside of Italv.

On opening the box, the first thing that struck me was the sheer size of the kit parts, quickly followed by amazed gasps as I realised the level of detail that Italeri have achieved with this new tool kit. Even better, despite the large number of parts, there is nothing here that would scare of a modeller with a few 1:24 kits under their belt, with not an ejector pin or sink mark anywhere to be seen. The plastic parts are supplied on nine sprues in four different colours as well as a chrome and clear sprue. This is also a kit that should not need the purchase of aftermarket parts as everything you need is in the box, from a selection of different sizes of vinyl and copper tubing and wires to add cooling, hydraulic and electric lines, while a high-quality etched sheet supplies a large number of detailing parts for the interior floor as well as belt buckles, which are used in conjunction with the





supplied red satin strip to produce the seatbelts. The decals take up two A4 decal sheets and are a joy to view. This really is state of the art printing. You also get two styles coloured Kevlar, most of these are shaped to fit

specific areas. These will have to be applied over several nights with plenty of setting solution to make sure everything settles down and I dry before moving on to the next section. Although I would personally paint the part you are applying the decal onto in a similar colour so if there are any mistakes in the application the white plastic does not show through any gap in the decals. The painting and application guide give you full instructions for the body, which will be mainly white with large red areas along the flank, and paint matches for these are supplied using the Tamiya range of spray or bottled paints. A nice touch is that a set of scale paper plans are also supplied to use as a template, and this will help apply the red areas over the base gloss white finish.

The instructions are very clear even down to the exact sizes you need to cut the wires and pipes to during assembly. I would suggest, however, trying to find some good reference photographs of the engine bay so you can see what the completed engine and associated wiring and hoses looks like in real life. Also, if you look at images of these cars while they were rallying in Monte Carlo, they became dusty but not the heavy mud and mess that you see on cars in the UK!

Our thanks to The Hobby Company for giving us the chance to receive one of the first kits in the UK and to enable this 'New View' to feature in our first issue. This kit is something really jaw dropping and will grace the cover of a future issue of Phoenix Scale Modelling.

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














## There are almost 2000 vehicles in War Thunder, and the game is free to play so I would suggest you take a look!

brush and when dried, I carefully sanded it down a little with a Tamiya 2500 grit sanding sponge. I then primed the entire model, as well as rubber tracks, with the best primer you can get in my opinion - Mr Surfacer 1500 (Grey). For the main colour I had added a few layers of Hataka C107 Signal Yellow, and for the white portions in front lower parts of the turret and lower parts of the hull I used Mr Surfacer 1500 White. This gives really excellent coverage and I didn't have to spend too much time spraying multiple layers.

## **TIGER STRIPES**

For the 'tiger stripes' I was really thinking hard about how to tackle them, as the pattern was too sharp to use the Blu-Tac as a masking medium, and too complicated for a masking tape. So, I summed up some courage and brush painted them. I painted the stripes carefully by looking at my monitor screen trying to recreate the exact pattern seen in the game. Another thing that I spent time on was choosing the right colour for these stripes. For some the obvious choice would be to just paint black or super dark grey, and this was what I was thinking at the beginning. However, when I got closer to the paint job in game, I noticed that it had a black/brown tone, so i decided to use my favourite for painting chipping, Vallejo German Camouflage Brown. The gun barrel was hairspray chipped. So, first I sprayed on a coat of Ammo by MIG Rubber and Tires, then added their Chipping Fluid on top. Then

he Typhoon is a family of MRAP vehicles, manufactured by the **Russian truck maker** 

Kamaz, as of 2021 there were roughly 330 Typhoon-K serving with the Russian Armed Forces. These vehicles have an operational range of 750 miles and a top speed of 65mph and can survive under chassis explosions of up to 8kg of explosives and are fully bulletproof against armour piercing rounds. Zvezda released this kit at the end of 2021, and it had been on my radar as soon as it was announced as it was such a

great looking vehicle and coupled with how well Zvezda kits went together as of late, I really couldn't wait to build it. When the box arrived, it was packed with plastic there are six sprues in light grey, a clear sprue, metallic

stickers for the mirrors, some net for exhaust areas and six nice looking and well detailed rubber tyres. There is also a small but nicely printed decal sheet that covers two options both from Syria, a Military Police vehicle and a Special forces vehicle.

Construction began with the rear and then front interior, but as I was waiting for some Quinta Studios 3D Seatbelts and internal details set, I decided to shift things

round and started on the chassis at stage 17 and assembled this all the way through to stage 22. This built up perfectly with an excellent fit and was primed with Tamiya Fine Grey Primer. When dry some Tamiya TS-18 Semi-Gloss Black was then applied. The wheel hubs were also sprayed at the same time with the same paint and the tyres sprayed with Tamiya XF-85 Rubber Black, when they had dried, they were assembled and added to the chassis with all six wheels sitting perfectly on the ground. The fuel tanks, front bumper and chassis attached storage boxes from stages 23 through to 27 were assembled and primed as well at this point. After much checking for the correct shade of green to paint the vehicle (to my eye anyway), so I settled on Hataka Orange Line C085 Polish AFV Khaki Green. These parts were then sprayed with this colour, before adding to the lower chassis.























# WAR NEVER ENDS QUIETLY

ROBIN GILBY BUILDS A DIORAMA BASED ON THE MOVIE 'FURY' USING THE 1:35 ITALERI M4A3E8 AND A HOST OF EXTRAS

ike most armour modellers I quite enjoyed the 'Fury' movie from 2014 and have always fancied building an

interpretation of the main star attraction. After I recently re-watched the film the Italeri M4A3E8 had reached the top of my to do pile! The model itself is a mixture of Sherman parts, but with some improved moulds, better detailing and the inclusion of two types of rubber band tracks. The kit consists of just five extensive green sprues, and these of course include new additions with all the relevant Fury detail parts and stowage. Some thin

cotton to use for the tie downs is present too. The decals cover three late war vehicles from 1945 as the option is also there to build a standard Easy Eight if you should wish and the build is shown complete in just twenty easy to follow stages. There are no figures included but there are several resin aftermarket sets, which represent the crew from the film and look very nice. For my build though I would be using the commander figure from the Tamiya Easy Eight release who may, or may not hold a passing resemblance to Brad Pitt!

Things started as expected with the running gear and the lower hull. This was all

easy enough, with some decent if not great detail on the wheels and suspension parts.



place next, and then the headlights, brush guards and additional detail parts around the vehicle. The next stage was the fitment of the multi-piece side fenders, and again they went together with no issues.

The turret was up next, and again this was very straightforward with the inclusion of a decent one-piece gun barrel with a split

















muzzle brake. The hatches were assembled next, along with such items as the lifting eyes, .30 and .50 cal mountings and other ancillary parts. The mantlet detail for fitting the canvas cover was called up here too, but according to all my reference pictures, this was not present on the movie tank, so that was not fitted. With all that in place the basic build is complete, and I looked at fitting the tracks. Two rubber band style types are supplied here, T66 and T84E, and after selecting the correct set they fitted well, although a little tight across the idler rollers, which I found needed a bit of careful adjustment. With all that in place the build was ready for the next stage, all that movie star make up and stowage!

I had put together quite a few reference images to help me get things right, including a brilliant on set photo shoot in Military Vehicles Magazine from 2015, several stills

taken from the film and some walkaround pictures I took of the actual vehicle on one of my trips to Bovington Tank Museum. (Although be advised the tank has undergone several makeovers in the years since filming finished and it was returned to the museum). Armed with this lot I attempted to recreate most of the features required with extra grab handles, tie downs, several stowage sets from Red Zebra, ValueGear, Tamiya, other suitable aftermarket parts and some of the kit supplied details too. This was all good fun and fitting all the stowage was a very enjoyable part of the build. With further parts in place and then some spare track links fitted around the vehicle the build was nearly complete and ready for paint. Before priming I decided to apply a coat of Mr Surfacer across all the relevant areas, this dries quite quickly and gives a great rough effect to all those smooth plastic surfaces.





First, I applied an all over coat of AK Interactive Fine Primer from a rattle can, which gives a lovely uniform finish across the model and shows up any areas which require attention. Next up I used my airbrush and added some Ammo by Mig 2005 Black Primer to apply some pre shading at the running gear and any recessed areas. Painting was Olive Drab overall which was modulated with several lighter buff tones using my airbrush to give some colour variation. This gave a very nice finish and base colour, and when dry I could start to pick out details such as the crew tools and the MGs and then I fitted the supplied division marking decals and next it was time to

at the turret, the Fury never carried them). The famous logs were now added too, and I replaced the plastic kit ones with some nice wooden plant support sticks, they were the right diameter with a lovely texture and really looked the part. Tying them in position was a little fiddly but definitely worth the effort.

To start the weathering, I went with various Ammo by Mig Oilbrushers which I thinned down to create my own dark green and brown washes and effects, and these were applied around the vehicle as appropriate. With that done the black camouflage pattern was applied and the Fury name was hand painted at the gun barrel. Now some more detailing could be added, including a large tarp made from Greenstuff Putty at the engine deck, some Tamiya ration boxes, the stretched sprue antenna and tie down, and finally some scratch-built cartridge shells were placed around the turret. Some light dusting was added next with my Tamiya weathering pastels and then a light misting with XF-57 Buff was blown across all the surfaces to blend everything together and I could look at getting things muddy!

For my mud mix I turned to AK Interactive Dark Earth Terrain and added in some fine soil and grass flock which matched the groundwork on the base. This was applied at the lower hull and running gear and while still wet I dabbed on a couple of different pigment shades in a few areas which would dry to give some colour variation. This was then all dry brushed with some light earth tones to show the raised detail. With the tank now complete I could turn to the figures and diorama base.

The base was a plywood storage box I had, which suited my needs, and after a matt black coat of paint I built up the inside with some packing foam until the correct height was met. If you are familiar with the film then you may well recognise the scene that

I was going to set, as Fury leads the charge across an open field to attack a dug in German anti-tank gun position with supporting infantry. The first layer of groundwork was some household filler with some add some weathering. (don't follow the instructions and fit the white stars small stones mixed in. Whilst still wet I ran some track links along the surface where the tank was going to sit. When all dry I cut out the trench section and then added more filler, stones and debris as required. The whole scene now got a black undercoat to act as

## Bushmaster PMV

SCOTT TAYLOR OF THE SCALE MODELLERS SUPPLY (SMS) DETAILS THE 1:72 DRAGON BUSHMASTER

## **DRAGON**



he Bushmaster Protected Mobility Vehicle (PMV) was developed in the 1990s for the Australian Defence

Force to provide the ADF with an armoured vehicle to transport infantry. Over the

years since its inception, the Bushmaster has been used in multiple conflicts, primarily in the Middle East and in the Australasian region. It is currently used in active service by the Australian Army, Royal Australian Air Force, Royal

Netherlands Army, British Army, Japan Ground Self Defence Force, Indonesian Army, Fiji Infantry Regiment, Jamaica Defence Force and the New Zealand Army. In mid 2021, Dragon Models announced that they were releasing a 1:72 kit of the Bushmaster, which is the focus of this build.

## THE BUILD

Building the kit itself was very easy. Being 1:72, there wasn't a large amount of overly complicated parts which meant the build time was only around forty-five minutes to get it assembled. This kit at one stage was designed to be a diecast model, and this

was very noticeable when assembling the kit. The design of the chassis, the axles being metal rods and then the lack of rear cabin interior clearly showed the origins of this kit.

Whilst the kit itself is a great build, there were a few parts that were missing from the design and some that needed to be changed to give it a much better feel. First was to replace the windscreen wipers from the plastic ones to the included etched ones. The plastic windscreen wipers were very chunky and way off scale so switching to the etch was a must. Once that was remedied, I turned my attention onto some other details that needed to be changed on the kit, namely the spare wheel cover, the seats in the cabin and also the lack of a steering wheel. Using my Anycubic Mono X resin printer, I printed out some newly designed seats, a new steering wheel, and most importantly, a more realistic and natural looking spare wheel cover to replace the flat one included in the kit. These were attached to the kit and then it was ready to paint!















For the painting, I left the top and bottom sections of the kit separate so I could paint the interior but also leave the windows out until the final assembly steps to remove the need to mask them off. In our Premium Range of Acrylic Lacquers, we have the three colours of the Auscam pattern available in an airbrush ready formula (PL31, PL32 and PL33 respectively), but for the release of this kit in Australia, we teamed up with the importers of Dragon Models to release a special 10ml concentrated version of the same colours. For this build, I used these new versions of our Auscam colours to paint the pattern. With the Auscam pattern, the references I used were all very similar in pattern style but were ever so slightly different. This fact coupled with the camo edges looking slightly feathered, suggests that these are all painted free hand on the

real vehicle. Taking this into account, I decided not to mask off the pattern on the vehicle but in fact do it all freehand.

#### ADDING SOME COLOUR

The painting process started with the entire kit primed using SMS Surfacer Black, sprayed at 15psi using a 0.3 airbrush. After about ten minutes, the model was given the first colour of the Auscam pattern, the Camo Brown. That was left to sit for half an hour or

so and then I returned to do the next colour of the pattern, Camo Green. Another half an hour later, the Camo Black was applied. Now that all the pattern was down, I cross referenced it with the references I had and returned with the Camo Green and Camo Black, both thinned down a little further, to tighten up the camouflage and fix any imperfections in the pattern. Once that was completed and I was satisfied with the look, attention was turned to the spare wheel cover and the hexagonal pattern.

For this, I used the SMS Bushmaster Spare Wheel Mask Sheet that was designed for us by Clayton Ockerby of Workbench Hobbies on Facebook. To begin, the wheel cover was base coated with Camo Green first. Using the reference photos again, I lined up the spots that needed masking for the green hexagons and then sprayed on Camo Black.



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The next patterns were added, again as per the references, and then was painted with Camo Brown. The pattern on the spare wheel cover also had random dots painted all over it, so once the masks were removed, I applied dots of all three colours matching them to the references as best I could.

For the interior of the driver's cabin, the seats themselves have a camouflage pattern on them, so with a paint brush, I applied a pattern as best I could. The size of the seats and pattern made it difficult, it is just enough that they can be seen through the window, and you can notice there is a pattern there. The floors and rear wall sections were painted with Seafoam Green, the paint colour used on interiors of ADF vehicles. The remainder were all painted in black as per the refence images. As the windows were being installed, I remembered that they have the 'bottle green' look as they are bullet proof glass in real life. To get this effect, I applied a couple of light coats of SMS Clear Green through the airbrush to ever so slightly tint the clear

plastic. I needed to be careful with this stage as too much solvent-based paint on clear plastic parts can cause the clear plastic to craze and fog. Once that was done and the paint had dried, the windows were all installed and then the top and bottom halves of the model were glued together.

At this stage, I realised that I had forgotten completely to add in the antenna on the sides. So, I carefully cut away a small section of the mounting points with a sharp blade and then made some rigid antenna using some wire. These were fixed into place using some super glue and then painted black. The final step was to add the decals that were included in the kit. They were applied using Mr Softener decal solution and then it was finally ready for the base to be made.

#### THE BASE

The idea of the base was to create something simple to show off the kit but also make it clear in what sorts of situations it would be used in real life. Using styrene sheet, I built a rectangular box slightly larger than the model when it was placed on an angle. Whenever I create small based like this, I never like having them flat and boring, so using

some off cuts of styrene, some raised areas were created at the rear left corner and the front right corner so give the impression of a well-used desert road that the Bushmaster was on. The entire top was covered with some very fine grit plaster filler which gives the impression of a sandy surface in small scale. The kits tyres model were used to create the tracks in the road by rolling them along the

used to create the tracks in the road by rolling them along the surface whilst the plaster filler was still wet. That was all then left to dry and then given a rough sand back to remove any jagged and lumpy areas that would look out of scale. Then using SMS Brown, German Sand Yellow, and IJN Deck Tan, the ground was airbrushed in random patterns to get varying tones in the sand.

small stones were picked out to give some interesting features to the scene and then some dry looking grass tufts were added to simulate some desert grasses. The model was then glued to the base and then using SMS Dust Weathering Pigment, was given some final weathering to tie it all to the base and give it that dusty look.

#### FINAL THOUGHTS

This kit was a fantastic build from start to finish and whilst it has its shortcomings, these are easily remedied by the modeller with some simple scratch building or 3D printing. If Australian subjects interest you, I thoroughly recommend building this kit.















2014/15 Greek F-16 solo display team. So, if you fancy building a replica of the Zeus F-16, then the first port of call has to be the 1:48 ModelMaker decal set. This comes in a nice box with a patch, a little book about the display aircraft, the instructions and, most importantly in this scale, a pair of resin conformal fuel tanks and new parts for the fin. The decals have been printed by Cartograph and are perfect. I would also highly recommend you get the excellent Bilmodel colour sets for this aircraft, in fact there are two of them. One is for and with the camouflage colours and one is matched to the colour of the ModelMaker decals. I would also highly recommend the 'Have Glass' varnish by Mr Paint. I also purchased the Master Model metal pitot and angle of attack probes and of note here is

that the decals are designed for the Tamiya F-16 with the small intake. I have not tried to fit them on the Kinetic kit, but with a few changes that should be possible.

So, as you may have gathered, this build features a Tamiya F-16, and assembly began with the cockpit. I always display













my cockpits closed because I don't want to destroy the aerodynamics of the aircraft. So, here I just hand painted all the details. The next step was to fit the intake to the lower fuselage, and as always with these parts, car must be taken, or you could be left with a lot of putty being needed and a lot of sanding.

Before I put together the lower and upper fuselage it was very important to fit the fin including the aforementioned resin bits parts and the CFTs. Again, you need to be really careful with these parts as one wrong move will result in the decals not fitting correctly and ruining the entire project.

So, pay close attention to the instructions! Also another thing to look out for are the 'Smokewinders' on the wingtips. You can either make these yourself by checking out the many images available online of source some from the Academy T-50 kits. The rest of the assembly was trouble free, as you would expect from a Tamiya kit. I then dipped the canopy in some Johnson's 'Future' to give it a nice sheen. The I sprayed the entire airframe with Alclad Black Primer and Microfiller as and then using the paint set, I began to apply

the Greek camouflage in thin layers, slowly building up the colours. Once I was happy with the look, I added a coat of Johnson's 'Future' to seal the colours in.

Here, it should be mentioned that the best way to start with the decals, and there are a lot of them, is on the wings, right behind the cockpit and then work clockwise through the rest of the airframe. Also, its advisable to keep the model wet and match all the decals together in one sitting. I used Microscale Decalset to help them conform to the surfaces. The next step was to blend in any decals that would not fit absolutely perfectly, and this is where the Zeus paint set from Bilmodel came into its own! Once I had applied some touch ups there was no noticeable difference in any

area. However, for the record, this was not the fault of the decal sheet but was my inability to read the decal instructions correctly!

MK first announced they were developing a new tool, state of the art, F-14D Tomcat some years back.

After the amazing standard of their previous releases fans of the 'Tomcat' were to say the least excited by the prospect. We waited and we waited, then along came the beautiful Tamiya F-14A kit. It was not until late 2019 that this first issue of AMK's F-14D arrived here in the UK. As soon as it arrived it was snapped up by hungry modellers keen to discover if the wait had been worth it. Unfortunately, this delivery was all we got,

The biggest plus for this kit is the price point, given what you get in the box there is no other kit that comes close.

and the kit has again been out of stock for nearly two years. The good news is that we are once again going to see this superb kit back in the UK very soon. This time with new dynamic box art, showing an F-14D about to be catapult launched from the deck. There have been a number of the original boxing built and reviewed over this last two years and the results look spectacular, and I have not heard that the kit has changed in any way other than the new release has different markings.

A number of high-quality aftermarket detail sets have been released and I have employed pretty much all of them onto this model. The first thing that astonishes you when opening the box is the amount of plastic

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

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

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

# **New Technology...**



s with many facets of this hobby, the progression of new technology and equipment now spawned

the advent of 3D printing, which is something a lot of seasoned modellers are discovering and is fast becoming the medium for creating such things as accessories, or this case a figure. So, here we have something that was created from a downloaded file on my recently purchased Elegoo Mars Pro 2, 3D printer..

After a few days learning how to use the required software on my laptop, which was not as difficult as I first thought, I set up the machine to print. After searching the Internet for files to use and let me tell you there are thousands upon thousands of them, you can find some that are free to download or others that cost as little as a cup of coffee. So, what did I choose as my very first print? Well, for me there was only one real choice, and as I am a huge Star Wars fanatic, I stumbled across a file of a memorable figure from Star Wars - Return of The Jedi, non-other than Salacious B Crumb who sat upon the throne of Jabba the Hut in his

Once I had set of the printer off, I was then faced with a lot of pacing around as I waited for my first print to finish, but finally after roughly four hours my wait was over. I opened the printer and much to my surprise. I had successful print! After removing the object from the build plate and then removing the all-important supports

that were added in the print software prior to sending to the machine, I set about the clean-up, which took no time at all. As this model was printed as a onepiece affair, there was no need for any gluing, filling or sanding of any of the joints. After a few minutes in the UV curing

station, the resin was ready to paint.

So, to begin I
applied nice even coat of
black primer followed by
some white from above in
the direction of the light
source, known as zenital
shading. This helps in
the painting process, as it
adds highlights and lowlights
creating subtle shading when

applying the base colours to the model. For the main body I airbrushed on various sandy brown shades starting with the darkest colours first working though in very light coats to the lightest, until I was happy with the overall look. A few dark patches were applied to add a little texture and a mottled look to the stomach and back area of




















the figure, and this was then unified with a very light coat of skin tone to bring everything together. With the main body painted it was time to bring a little life to the face. Here I used some reference pictures to paint the black areas around the mouth and face freehand, using my airbrush.

Eyes are always a critical

out was to apply some clear yellow, as this deepened the colour and gave a nice glossy, wet look to the eyes. Finally, I applied a wash to add some shadows to the details, followed by a drybrush to add more highlights to the raised areas. Finally, the entire figure

The water looked very nice in clear blue but needed a touch of colour variation to bring it to life, so I sprayed a light coat of Tamiya TS-72 Clear Blue on the lower half, before setting this aside to dry for an hour. When this had dried, another light coat was sprayed on further down towards the bottom of the base to give a variation of the clear blue. Finally on the water, a coat of Tamiya TS-13 Clear was applied to give a wet effect. When this was dry, a light dry-brushing of Tamiya XF-2 Flat White was applied to the tips of the waves to finish the water off, this was then attached to the small black circular base.

Painting of the figure began by blocking in all the main colours, and here I used Citadel Retributor Armour for the upper torso, the trident head, the belt, the side panels and the detail on the trousers. When this had dried Citadel Waaagh Flesh was used for the trousers before Citadel Dryad Bark was added for the boots. The face and hands were next, and or this I used Tamiva XF-15 Flesh, I also painted the hair and beard/moustache with Tamiya XF-85 Rubber Black, before painting the trident handle with some Citadel Steel Legion Drab. With these main areas



#### **HISTORICAL MINIATURES**

he Decima Flotilla MAS also known as 'La Decima' or 'X MAS', (Italian for 10th Assault Vehicle Flotilla)

was a commando frogman unit of the Regia Marina (Italian Navy) and was active during the Battle of the Mediterranean and took part in a number of daring attacks on Allied shipping. The X MAS (Small Boat Raiders) was always considered an elite corps, and for this reason, thousands of young people who wanted to volunteer. Therefore, it was possible to organise an entire division as a land force, and as such the Fulmine Battalion was created.

#### PRIMER

After the usual removing the parts from their resin plugs and cleaning up the seams, I began by applying a thin layer of grey primer from an aerosol can. By doing this in thin layers and from a sufficient distance, it is easier to prime and therefore obtain some good coverage.

#### FVF

I always start by painting the eyes as this always draws attention. I recommended not to use pure white but a very light flesh colour to avoid the idea of dolls eyes.

#### FACE

I give the face a base colour of Vallejo Red Beige 804 until it was completely covered with a few thin layers. I then used different to paint the face. For applying the lightest shades, I created four different hues going progressively lighter up to the lightest colour Light Flesh 928. Then I made another three mixes for the shadow colours, using Black Red 859 as the pure shade. Into each mix I then put a very small amount of Tamiya X-21 Flat Base to make the paint a little more matt, and to extend the processing time I added some Vallejo Retarder.

#### HELMET

Here I used Russian Green 894 in much the same way as some of you do on tanks. The anchor and the X were painted freehand.

#### **SWEATER**

The sweater is painted with Vallejo Neutral Gray 992, with some Black 950 added for the shading and Light Gray 111 for the highlights.

#### **CAMOUFLAGE PATTERN**

First I created a base colour using German Uniform Green 920 + Russian Uniform 924. To lighten this mix I used the

base shade with a little Yellow Ochre 913 and Basic Skintone 815. By adding a little more Basic Skintone 815, I created second and third lighter shades.

For the brown pattern I started with Chocolate Brown 872+ German Camouflage Black Brown

822 as the darkest shade, and then painted the pattern on with that. To this mix I then added Red Leather 818, which I painted over the dark spots as a base colour. To lighten the brown, I added some Old Rosé 944 + Basic Skintone 815 to this mix. By adding more and more Basic Skintone 815 I made the second and third lighter shade variations. For the sand yellow pattern, I used a mix of Khaki 988 with a touch of Chocolate Brown 872. This was then lightened with Khaki 988 + Yellow Ochre 913 + Basic Skintone 815. The decals were painted with Silver 997.

#### **CARTRIDGE BAG**

Here I used a mix of German Camouflage Beige 821 and Chocolate Brown 872. The flap was the Italian version of black leather, for which I mixed Black 950 with some Chocolate Brown 872.

#### **EOUIPMENT**

The knife, hand grenade and the leather straps were painted with severakl brown, black and green shades, considering as much as possible to use of the same colours as on other parts of the bust.

#### THE BERETTA 1938 SUBMACHINE GUN

Here I used a Lifecolor set and some pigments. This combination took some getting used to but I was quite satisfied with the result.

### **Rising Phoenix**



he Mandalorians were some of the most feared warriors in the galaxy. As proud warriors, they hold

combat as the cornerstone to their culture, their individual identity, and spirit. They also use the Rising Phoenix training to enable them to use their jetpacks to enhance their abilities. The Mandolorian share a strong code of honour that could be invoked to settle disputes with one-on-one combat that would conclude with the death of one opponent. Mandalorian armour developed a legendary reputation that was feared across the galaxy and was visually distinctive with its honeycomb plate patterns and menacing T-shaped visors. The armour was made of Beskar, a metal extremely resistant to damage and malleable enough to be forged into armour. An ancient tradition and vital part of Mandalorian culture was forging the Beskar into armour, which was carried out by Mandalorian Armourers, who could also forge the Beskar into other gear like the Whistling Birds'. On top of the fabled armour, Mandalorian warriors were equipped with anti-Jedi tools such as jetpacks, magnetised

boots, tactical displays, and armed gauntlets, that featured weaponry and tools designed to combat the abilities of the Jedi.

Some of this weaponry not only helped combat but outright mimicked Jedi abilities, such as their wrist-mounted sonic repulsors that knocked objects away like a Force push would. They generally favoured Westar-35 blaster pistols and Z-6 jetpacks, which could also project missiles

Being a fan of the Mandolorian series of Disney+ I decided to have a go at Gambody-3D Printing Mando and Grogu set inspired by the TV series. This was purchased as an STL file for 3D-printers, and made up of some forty-four pieces, and you can choose one of two types. 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

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### LEE POWELL TAKES A LOOK AT A TRIO OF REVELL/BANDAI STAR WARS KITS

#### **REVELL/BANDAI**

tar Wars Model Kits have been around for years, starting with MPC in 1978, through the Airfix re-boxings


of these in the early 1980's and the Finemolds kits of the early 2000's. Revell started producing Star Wars kits around 2005 with some basic models in various scales, and an Easy Kit/Build and Play range targeted at younger modellers, and my son loved clicking these together and playing with them as he got interested in Star Wars. Bandai produced a fantastic range of kits as well, I regularly imported these from Japan, so when Revell started re-boxing some of these kits I was over the moon at being able to get hold of them a lot more quickly and easily!

There is a great selection of Star **Wars models** available for all abilities, from the most basic toy offerings, all the way through to the top end Bandai kits

The Revell Star Wars 1:100 Rogue One, Build and Play U-Wing Fighter was released in 2016 when the film came out and became a favourite of mine amongst Star Wars ships. There are only thirty-four parts to build up in the box, and while it's not the most detailed of kits, it appeared to be pretty accurate. There was a light in the cockpit, along with various sounds available when a button on the top of the body was pressed. This is a relatively large kit for 1:100 scale, with the wings being poseable when assembled. I filled the screw hole on the lower hull where the batteries go and then laid out all of the parts to work out a painting plan. First off, all the grey plastic parts were painted with Tamiya Fine Grey Primer before painting and adding the two small figures in the cockpit area using Tamiya

Acrylic Paints. The engine exhausts and guns were also painted at this stage using Citadel Leadbelcher paint. I like the Tamiya Grey Primer as a base colour for Star Wars vehicles, so I proceeded to mask off the areas that would be blue and yellow and then I applied some Humbrol Maskol randomly over these areas to peel off after painting. Tamiya XF-3 Flat Yellow and Tamiya XF-8 Flat Blue were then both thinned and a couple of coats of each was painted in the relevant areas. When these had been left to dry overnight the Maskol was removed giving a pleasing weathered appearance. The kit was then assembled, and I immediately loved the look of it. The joints were tidied up and resprayed and finally a panel line wash was applied all over. I then called it done!

The Revell re-boxings of the Bandai 1:48 AT-ST and Snowspeeder were both built in parallel, initially for a small diorama on Hoth, but I decided against this in the end. I had



already built a Bandai boxing of the AT-ST, so I knew how good the kit was (my first build was in Endor guise with a great little 1:48 Chewbacca figure in the turret hatch!). For this build I decided to do the AT-ST grey again, but with a deep red primer colour on the leg, like it has just recently been repaired from a battle! The Revell/Bandai kits can be snapped together and

require no cement or filling, and the fit is fantastic! Construction

I said, this could be snapped together, but I opted to glue it for extra strength. There is a complete interior with two x pilot/driver figures (and one Wookie!). There are also two clear red parts that fit in the end of the chin guns to replicate the flash from the guns firing if required, although I don't personally like these myself. I built the AT-ST within an hour, though I left off the left leg to paint separately in the red primer. Everything was then coated with Tamiya Fine Grey Surface Primer, and the left leg was then sprayed with Tamiya TS-33 straight from a rattle can. When the paint had dried on all of the parts, the left leg was attached. I really liked this effect, bringing a touch of colour to the otherwise grey Walker. Some Humbrol

Acrylic 64 Light Grey was then mixed up with some Humbrol 34 Matt White until the shade was slightly lighter than the base grey. This was













to give a very slight contrast. When this had dried the AT-ST was given a coat of Tamiya TS-13 Clear and once dry I added a wash in all corners and recesses using Ammo by Mig Sky Grey Line wash and then tidied up this up before applying a couple of the supplied decals randomly. Another light coat of Tamiya TS-13 Clear was applied to seal the decals in, and finally when this had dried overnight, a coat of Tamiya TS-80 Matt Clear was sprayed on to flatten the finish. As this was to be on the snowy environment of Hoth, I decided to apply a coat of Citadel Valhallan Blizzard Texture

Paint on the base, this worked really well, and I

was pleased with the final result. The Snow Speeder followed a similar pattern with comparable paints being used, along with some extra Tamiya Acrylics for the crew and cockpit details. There are a lot more decals to put on though (close to seventy including the ones inside the cockpit and on the pilots' helmets!), although these settled down really well with some Micro Set and Micro Sol.

In summing up then, there is a great selection of Star Wars models for all abilities, from the most basic toy offerings, all the way through to the top end Bandai kits, including the stunning 1:72 Perfect Grade Millennium Falcon. So, go out and grab one and no matter what you may choose, 'May the Force be with you!'



# Razor Crest

JEZZ COLEMAN BUILDS THE 1:72 REVELL KIT FROM THE MANDALORIAN TV SERIES



he 'Razor Crest' was originally built as a gunship known as a ST-70 Assault Ship at some point before

the formation of the Galactic Empire. The vessel eventually fell into the hands of The Mandalorian Din Djarin, who lived and worked from it as he hunted bounties in the Outer Rim Territories in the early years of the New Republic, and or those of you that hasn't seen the TV series here is a brief rundown about the Razor Crest. It has two large laser cannons

mounted at the front of the ship, two large engines, and a hyperdrive. The ship can be piloted by one individual and has room for two others in the cockpit area. It also contained an astromech interface socket, however due to Din Djarin's distrust of droids, this remained unused. A variety of equipment in the cargo hold could be found, including a vacc tube, (space toilet) a weapons locker, and a carbonite freezing chamber to freeze any captured bounties. Djarin can also initiate

#### COCKPIT

The first area to tackle was the cockpit, and this comprised of several parts, which made things a lot easier to paint separately and detail. The main interior was painted black, and the side walls and control panels were all detailed by picking out the many switches and buttons with a fine paintbrush. Also, there were several decals to apply, which really helped to bring the cockpit to life. The seats were painted with a red brown and glued on, and you also get a seated Mandolorian figure, which I chose not to add.

#### **CARGO AREA**

Next up was to work on the cargo area, and again this came as separate pieces that needed painting prior to assembly. All the parts were given the same treatment as the cockpit, painting up all the various panels and features in both the cargo hold and living quarters. Many features are 'screen accurate' like the vacuum tube, the weapons locker and the carbonite freezing chamber along with several hangers for the transport of the frozen bounties. With all the interior parts painted up these were put to one side while I worked on the rest of the build.

I built up the two front cannons and both engine pods, as these would need a seam clean up once the glue had dried. While these were drying, I glued into place the two side sponsons on the lower hull and the undercarriage legs were also assembled ready for attachment later. The way that Revell have designed this kit means you can paint easily pre-paint all the main airframe parts separately and assemble them at the very end of the build. With sub-assemblies completed and primed, I could finally get some paint onto the model. As this would be a natural metal finish, I wanted to get that weather-beaten heavily stained piece of space junk looking just right. So, for the base colour I used an aerosol can

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
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## Scale Modelworld 2021 Competition
