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

amiya Formula 1 kits in both 1:20 and 1:12 have around since the mid-seventies. Only for the last decade or

so have several other brands like Hasegawa, Fujimi, Ebbro and Beemax released several excellent kits in the 'standard' 1:20 scale, massively expanding the market of kits of classic F1 cars. Beemax is a relatively small player on the F1 grid but have some interesting cars in their line-up. One of them is the Brabham BMW BT52 from 1983. There are two versions: Monaco

wings and colour scheme. The one I built is the European version with the huge rear wing and dark blue side panels. As a side note, Beemax also offers a separate detail set. These parts are mentioned in the instructions and can be a bit confusing at times. This set was not used for this build. At first glance, the details on the parts look quite good but not as refined as Tamiya. A bit of a let-down is the very pronounced mould lines on each and every part of the kit. This isn't something you expect from a modern kit.



#### THE BUILD

The build began with the rear section, consisting of the engine, exhaust, gearbox, and rear suspension and a bunch of smaller parts. According to the instructions, almost

everything must be painted either semi-gloss or flat black. This might be correct but boring. By using very dark metal paints on several parts and lightly dry brushing most parts, the small details popped into view, and everything was much more



parts were painted and sealed, everything
was assembled and glued together. The
overall fit is excellent, as long as you clean
up the parts thoroughly.



#### **ASSEMBLY AND PAINTING**

Now it was simply a matter of cleaning, assembling, priming, and painting a lot of parts. The car is more or less divided in several subassemblies like the engine, radiators, monocoque with front suspension rear wing, front wing, wheels and brakes and body shell. As with most F1 kits, everything is mounted onto the floor plate. This part was primed black, and some Bare Metal Foil was placed around the area where the engine would sit later. The next and largest

later. The next and largest subassembly was the monocoque. This, and the parts that make up the front suspension, was primed black and dry brushed gun metal.

The rivets were dry brushed aluminium colour to make them really stand out. Next, the 4 brake assemblies were painted in several different metal colours, again consulting reference photos.

After the paint had cured, they were glued

to the finished front and rear suspension. The final parts to make and will, partly,

#### FITTING THE RADIATOR

With the radiators finished, all painted parts could be fitted onto the floorplate. As mentioned earlier, the fit is excellent. Several smaller parts were painted separately like

conformed nicely into the tiny ribs with the help of some decal setting solution.

the pedals, fire extinguisher, steering wheel, and seat.

Talking about the seat: the kit provides seatbelts in the form of decals. That's a big no-no. Fortunately, I had some etched metal belts in stock. These were painted blue and glued onto the seat. The rims were painted black next, and decals put onto them. The rubber tyres were sanded with a coarse sander to remove the mould line and give them a rubbed in look too.

I expected them to look like stickers, but they look quite convincing instead. The biggest job, for me, was priming, sanding, and airbrushing the body, side panels and wings with a smooth, glossy dark blue finish. A dark grey primer from Alclad was applied to the panels and body first. These were sanded smooth next. The dark blue colour is

my own secret mix of two shades of blue and a bit of black. All paints used are Mr Hobby acrylics.

DANIEL CROKE TAKES A LOOK AT REVELL'S 1:24 1970S PONTIAC CLASSIC



#### **REVELL**

his Revell 1970 Pontiac Firebird is, in fact, a 1991 Revell Monogram reissue in a new box with some

new wheels. Despite its age, the moulding is still very clean, with almost no flash, and there are two sets of wheels and tyres. The decals from Revell are also excellent. Revell car kits are often decent models, and their prices are competitive enough that the

overall value gained outweighs the negatives. So, will this Pontiac fit into this, continue reading and find out.

#### THE BODYWORK

The first steps of any car build are a general disregard of the instructions. The bodywork should be the starting point as the paint and clear process is the most critical. After the bodywork, it's normally a group of sub steps, such as, engine, running gear, interior, then the final assembly can begin and stuff like the clear parts and externals can be added. This build is no different and the bodywork is the starting place. To get the bodywork ready, I like to go through the instructions and sprues to identify any part











that needs to be painted in the body colour. The 'nose' and rear valance are fitted and once cured I can attend to the seams with some Revell Model Filler. Any of the seams on the body are addressed using some Ultimate Modelling Products (UMP) sanders, progressing through the grits to leave a smooth body. At this stage I now have a car body, separate bonnet, rear spoiler, and a pair of wing mirrors. All these parts then received three coats of UMP Grey Primer. For the body colour, I decided to paint with the dark blue shown on the box lid, and for this I followed the suggested paint mix of Revell Aqua Colour Blue 51 with approximately 5% Revell Agua Aluminium added, then thinned this approximately 50:50 with UMP Acrylic thinners. Five light coats were then applied

using a UMP Apex airbrush at around 20psi. This gave a smooth and deep blue finish.

#### DECALS

I let this dry for twenty-four hours, and then some Bare Metal Foil Chrome was added to the window surrounds and all the external decals were applied. The Revell decals are excellent and respond well to UMP Normal Decal Solution. This was all left for a further twenty-four hours to cure completely. The next step was the most critical part of the car build, the clear coat. For this kit I use Gravity Spain's 2K Clear Set, mixed as per the instructions. Three coats were applied, the first a semi-wet tack coat, followed by two wet coats at about 18psi through another

UMP Apex airbrush. The clear parts were then placed in a dust free box and can be left for at least three days before any further sanding and polishing was performed.

#### SUB-ASSEMBLIES

The next sub-assemblies could then commence. The first job was to remove all the chrome parts from the chrome sprue using household bleach to soak the parts for about five minutes. The chassis was painted in a combination of grey, black, and silver from the suggested paint callouts. These are thinned with UMP Acrylic thinners and airbrushed on. The single piece rear suspension and exhaust is overly simplified but once again when painted,

some wet sanding using micromesh 4000 to 12000, followed by UMP Compound and Polish to restore the shine. At this point there are a whole bunch of sub-assemblies completed. These being the body, chassis and running gear, the interior and engine. The only remaining parts to complete were some black details on the windscreen interior, and to rechrome the rear bumper using Molotow Chrome through my airbrush. Once this was complete, final assembly can be performed.

#### COMPLETION

This is the point at which it all should come together and bring a smile to your face. Sadly, on this kit, it is at this point that its problems show themselves. Assembly of the clear parts and interior go well, however, the clear parts themselves are not brilliant and do let the kit down a little bit. The rear spoiler fit is also not good, and the chassis does not sit correctly within the body and that affects the ride height a little. However, the biggest criticism is that the engine intake as once fitted this affects the bonnet and it is impossible to get it to sit correctly. Kits like this one from Revell are relatively inexpensive, and with a bit of work they come out very well, however, this Pontiac is sadly lacking. Thanks to Revell for the build





# American Muscle FORG TOTEMOS

his car must be one of the most iconic standout cars from my early childhood. Who can forget Saturday night TV in the late 1970's with big American muscle cars screeching across the screen? Me as a young child taking nothing in except the roar of the engines and squealing of tyres. Sitting there watching these shows.

muscle cars screeching across the screen? Me as a young child taking nothing in except the roar of the engines and squealing of tyres. Sitting there watching these shows, I would never have imagined being here forty years later writing about building kits of these cars that I adored. This is the kit that turned my head and started me down the route of building these iconic cars from my childhood, which has become a habit of late. So, here we have a Ford Torino from the hit TV series Starsky and Hutch!



This kit from is a new tooling from 2015 and I have the 2017 new boxing. Opening the box and I was greeted with sprues in assorted colours. The shell and interior moulded in red, the chassis and engine moulded in black, with chrome and clear parts. This could lead to a new modeller putting this together without painting and ending up with a nice kit. Decals are plentiful, with the huge white stripe standing out. This decal comes in three pieces to make it much easier to fit. The build was straightforward, and I was pleasantly surprised that I could build it as three smaller kits. Starting with the engine, which is quite detailed. This then leads on to the radiator and fan motor, before moving on to the suspension and chassis details. The chassis was sprayed using Tamiya acrylic paints, the colour being a mix of XF-1 Flat Black, and XF-16 Aluminium. I found this gave it a little more 'sparkle', brightening up the dullness of straight black. Last to be connected to the chassis are the wheels, which come in a nice chrome finish. The second part of the build is the interior, which is very straightforward, consisting

of a floor pan, dashboard, seats, and door panels. The dashboard is quite detailed with decals for each dial and a police radio to fit underneath. Rear seats come moulded to the floor pan with the front seats being a bench style, moulded in two halves. The door panels come moulded in one piece each with decals adding the wooden effect to the trim. This finishes off the interior giving it the classic 1970's feel.

The last part of the build is the exterior. This was primed and finished in Tamiya X-7

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


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

LEE POWELL BUILDS THE 1:35 ICM MARDER I ON AN FCM 36 BASE

he FCM 36 or Char Léger Modèle 1936 FCM, was a light, diesel-powered infantry tank that was

designed for the French Army prior to World War II. A number of these were captured by the Germans in 1940 and German Artilleryman and Engineer Alfred Becker began work on converting the chassis of these to install field guns on them (these later became the special unit Baukommando Becker in 1942). The task of the unit was to install field guns and other weapons on military equipment captured from the enemy. Thus, the mobility of artillery units was significantly

various types of French combat vehicles including the FCM chassis with a Marder I 75mm field gun. ICM released the FCM 36 kit in French guise in 2020, this was then re-released in 2021 with the enlarged turret area and Marder I gun with a choice of three German markings. There are 245 parts on seven grey sprues in the box along with four short lengths of black rubber tracks (two for each side to be joined together). There is also a small decal sheet with minimal markings for the three different schemes.




















#### CONSTRUCTION

Construction started with the lower hull and sides along with pieces that are added to the lower structure, the fit here is all perfect. The wheels are next to be built and wow, the main wheels are small! There are eighteen pairs to be assembled before being put into tandem bogeys (these would not be out of place on a 1:72 vehicle as they really are that small). Over the next few stages, the wheels are attached to the lower hull,

along with various side supports and sponsons around the wheel areas and the upper



track wheel supports. The tracks need to be added at this stage as there is no easy access to add them after the build, although very small with tiny locating pins, the Tracks went together ok with a small amount of CA glue, these do like quite basic but not a lot of them will be visible on the finished vehicle so should be fine. The upper hull assembly is next, the upper hull A1-10 fitting to the lower hull without any problems before starting to add grilles, exhausts and various hinges and tools. The build then moves on to the main weapon, the PaK 40, this goes together

nicely with the main barrel being one piece with no sanding required, this assembly then sits on the crew area base, part A2-21. The gun is designed to be movable, though I stuck mine in place parallel to the ground, smaller detailed parts of the gun mechanism are then added over the next few stages before adding this structure to the lower hull (the fit of this being great apart from a couple of very fine gaps that needed minimal filler). The front armour area between the gun platform and hull is built next from four pieces, this takes a bit of fiddling to get right, though when assembled fits without any issues.

#### FRONT GUN SHIELD

The front gun shield is added next from two parts, before both side panels are constructed with the ammunition racks on both sides. These side panels take a bit of fiddling to get right. I started at the front with both sides, using Tamiya Extra Thin and holding the parts in place until set until both panels were in place. Some filler was needed along the bottom of these panels still though). The grilles were then added to both sides and another front gun shield before the rear gun area panel is added along with the gun Mantlet and more tools and bits along with an MG34 that sits up on top. There are twenty-eight rounds of ammunition to go in the racks, but these were left off to be painted separately and added in at the end of the painting stage. Although the build was over sixty-two stages, construction was a breeze and complete with a three-hour sitting at the workbench.

#### PAINTING

Painting started with Tamiya Fine Grey Surface Primer, after this had been applied and dried, I filled a few gaps that I found before giving it another coat of the Primer. Pre shading was next to be applied, this was using Hataka Orange Line C125 NATO Black and was prayed around panel lines



vehicle. A couple of light coats of Hataka C244 Dunkelgelb was applied over the vehicle and left to dry for a couple of hours between coats. I had decided to paint the first option with the standard German tricolour camouflage, a vehicle used in France in 1943, so I thinned down some Hataka Orange Line C169 Olivegrun and some C147 Rotbraun, and then went to work copying the colour plan until I was happy that it matched as close as possible. When this had dried fully overnight, I carefully painted the tracks in Tamiya XF-84 Dark Iron (thankfully there were no tyres on the tiny wheels to paint!). The tools, exhausts and the MG34 were then painted with various Tamiya Acrylics before

being allowed too fully dry. A filter was then applied using Ammo by Mig Tan for Tri-Tonal Camouflage, while the finish was still flat, and this was left to dry overnight. Next followed a coat of Tamiya TS-13 clear was applied overall and when dry, the 6 decals were applied to the vehicle. Another coat of Tamiya TS-13 was applied before a pin-wash of Modellers World Earthy Grime Oil Wash was applied around the vehicle. Then a coat of Tamiya TS-80 Flat Clear was next to be applied to flatten down the surface. A final wash over the tracks Using AK Interactive Track Wash was applied and left to dry before dusting on some Modellers World Rubble Pigments around the tracks and on random areas of the vehicle. The final touch was a light rub over the raised areas of the tracks using a standard HB Pencil to bring some of the detail out. This is a fantastic little kit of an unusual subject and not one I would usually have picked up, but it is a goodlooking little vehicle and credit to ICM for picking these more unusual subjects to bring to our attention. I recommend this highly (as with most of the ICM Armour range!), and I look forward to future releases from them. Thanks to ICM for the build sample.

painting guide for which three options are offered, theses being Pz.Jg.Abt.49, Eastern Front, Winter 1943/44, 'Kohlenklau/Coal Thief' 3./Pz.Jg.Abt.561, Geschützführer Uffz. Helmut Kohlke, Eastern Front, Spring 1943 and 'Friedel', Unknown Unit, Eastern Front, Autumn 1943. Despite the age of the original issue, the moulding is still sharp, with no significant flash and the plastic appears to hold detail well, although there are some unsightly knockout marks on the inside of the fitted to the inside of the casemate sides, including various weapons, periscopes and



radio rack. The hull and superstructure can be built up at this point before fitting the road wheels and tracks and the gun can be left separate until the end. Before assembling the sides, I'd painted everything with Tamiya XF-60 Dark Yellow, and following a thin gloss coat, shaded with a wash of Burnt Umber oil paint, and dry brushed with lightened XF-60. The gun is typical for a PaK 40, with a twopart barrel, carrier, mount and sighting gear added first, then the two-layer splinter shield and cheek extensions fitted around it, before it can be fitted into the front of the crew compartment. The travel lock is in two parts




with a tubular brace on the glacis plate and a short latch on the engine lid which engages with the tail of the breech. The running gear and tracks are very nice with separate road wheels, return rollers and lengths of track which are malleable enough to be bent around the drive sprockets and idlers, - a useful improvement on rubber bands and less fiddly than link and length. The tracks are long enough that a realistic degree of sag can be introduced between return rollers.

Much of the internals and outside had already been painted with Dark Yellow which was added to the external parts where necessary. The road wheel tyres were painted by hand with Vallejo Black Grey and a faint camouflage scheme sprayed on using very thin Tamiya XF-64 Red Brown and XF-13

Green. An overall wash of Burnt Umber added some dirt which was enhanced with muddy residue made up of Vallejo Weathering Powder mixed with their binder resin. Since I wanted to show the model in a wintry Eastern Front setting some accumulated snow was tucked into corners using Deluxe Materials Snowflakes stuck on with PVA glue. To add interest an air-recognition flag was made up from lead foil sprayed red and white with a swastika decal from my (aircraft!) spares box and a figure in winter uniform from a Black Army Modells set.

This is an excellent rendition of the Marder if you're a fan of 1:72 armour, and a testament to Mk72's original tooling. The kit is straightforward to build, with no significant pitfalls, and has a great level of detail for the scale. Thanks to Special Armour for the review sample.

in one bag that can realistically replicate various surfaces. For the bottom of the pond, I used another base ready product, Arid Earth and both were fixed with a use of Matte Mod Podge Glue. The same glue was later used to fix some rocks and a WWS Summer Blend Static Grass with a WWS applicator. The Torii gate, found in many places in Japan such as outside shrines, was built with some wooden sticks I found in my local hobby store.

I built a small pier from balsa wood, painted it with Vallejo Wood Grain and attached this with Mod Podge. Various plants were later added, from various sources. The water was made with clear resin. First, I masked out a frame with Tamiya masking tape and fixed temporarily a bit of a clear plexiglass to hold the resin in. This helped to

prevent damage to the frame when removing the plexi later when resin had fully cured. I used Epideco Procast Max Clear Resin dyed to a specific colour using a few drops of acrylic paint. I then made a cherry blossom

tree with crafting wires, twisting them from the bottom adding branches as I went. Next, I used Das Clay to cover the tree and left it to dry for a day. I then applied some Vallejo Acrylic Mud to create the tree texture. I added more Gaugemaster Seafoam and fixed them with super glue. The tree was later painted with a spray can. Deluxe Materials Scenic Spray Glue was then used on branches, and I then sprinkled on some Geek Gaming Bright Green Tree Foliage, and later airbrushed on some Vallejo Pink to change the colour of the leaves. When the resin had cured, I made some ripples on the water surface with Gloss Mod Podge and blowing air from airbrush to create small waves. Lastly, I placed my Type 3 and some MiniArt figures to complete the scene! modeling

his winter scene depicts some forward elements of a **US Armoured Division** regrouping and

resupplying before heading towards Bastogne to help to relieve the encircled Airborne troops trapped there during the winter of 1944. I chose the Tamiya 105mm Sherman and M8 Armoured Car with a host of various accessories for my build so let's see how I got on. I began with the Sherman build, and things start as expected with the running gear and the lower hull. This is all

easy enough with some decent, if not great detail at the wheels and suspension parts. The upper hull is called up next and here we add the hull MG, some crew tools and start detailing around the engine deck. The two hull halves can now be mated together, and things fitted very well here with just liquid cement holding everything in place. The front hatches can go in place next and then the headlights, brush guards and additional detail parts around the vehicle.

The turret is called up next and again this is very straightforward and here I added a metal barrel to lift the detail. The hatches can be assembled next along with detail parts such as the lifting eyes, .50 Cal mounting and other ancillary parts. With all that in place the basic build is complete, and I looked at fitting the provided rubber band tracks. They fitted just fine and looked the part when in place. With all that done the build was ready for the next stage, adding the all-important stowage.

I used stowage sets from Value Gear and Tamiya, some other suitable aftermarket parts and some of the kit supplied details too. This was all good fun and fitting all the stowage

was a very enjoyable part of the build. With further parts in place and then some spare track links fitted around the vehicle the build was nearly complete and ready for paint. Before priming I applied a coat of Mr Surfacer across all the relevant areas, this dries quite quickly and gives a great rough effect to all those smooth plastic surfaces. I now decided to build the M8 so I could paint both the models in tandem when complete.

The M8 in this Combat Patrol Set is a quite recent re-release packaged with lots of extra accessories, ration boxes, new decals, and a figure from the recent Tamiya tank crew set. It is a well detailed kit with a decent functional interior which can be further detailed if required. I finished it pretty much out of the box, I just decided to omit the fenders as shown in many of my reference images

I used stowage sets from Value **Gear and Tamiya** as well as some other suitable aftermarket parts

on a whitewash finish across the M8 to add some further variation and decided on MIG Washable White Camouflage, which would change the look of the vehicle. This is a great product which I brushed on by hand and virtually straight away you can begin thinning it on the model with tap water or acrylic thinner. This gives an interesting look which can be adjusted as required, thinned

further, or removed in places with a cotton swab. The colour variation you are left with gives a great effect and is good fun to use. When I was happy with the result it was left to fully dry and then I applied some mapping with Vallejo Off White, which gives further variation and depth to the paintwork. For my mud mix I turned to AK Interactive Dark Earth Terrain and added in some fine soil

which would match the groundwork on the base. This was applied at the lower hull and running gear and while still wet I dabbed on a couple of different pigment shades in a few areas which would dry to give some colour variation. This was then all dry brushed with some light earth tones to show the raised detail. With the vehicles now complete I could turn to the figures and diorama base.

The base was a pre-cut piece of MDF I had which suited my needs and after a matt black coat of paint I built up the groundwork, the first layer was some household filler with some small stones and fine sand mixed in. Whilst still wet I ran some track links and a spare tyre along the surface where the vehicles were going to sit. When all dry I added the Italeri building ruin and then added more filler, stones and debris as required. The whole scene now got a black undercoat to act as a primer and to unify all the different elements and then various light earth and sand tones were airbrushed across the base for some nice colour variation. The figures came from Dragon and Tamiya and were only slightly adjusted to suit my needs. They were then finished with Tamiya and Vallejo acrylics and pinned in place to the base when I had fixed the vehicles and accessories in position. The finishing touches were the addition of some snow effects from Vallejo around the scene, a few touch ups around the wheels and tracks and I was happy to call this one done! motern

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

inetic's still recent RAF GR.1/3 version from their 'Gold' range, is the latest (with the identical AV-8A)

kit from a whole range of Harrier versions released over the years. The box is full of delicious plastic and all sprues are separately sealed in their own plastic bags. The decals look very good, as can be expected because they are printed by Cartograf, and one option contains the famous 'Welsh Wildcat' emblem of the Harrier Operational Conversion Unit. Since this is still quite a new kit, you might expect not many aftermarket parts are available yet. Surprisingly though, I could find much more than I expected. It was only a year ago I built the AV-8A version of this kit, and no aftermarket parts were on the market yet. I used a Master pitot tube, Eduard details, seatbelts, and masking sets, and Quickboost air scoops.

Starting with the cockpit, I added a few plastic strips to act as guide rails for the ejection seat and a few other small details I could vaguely identify on a few photos of the real aircraft. The cockpit was then primed black and airbrushed grey. The raised instrument details were all removed and sanded flush before painting and replaced with

the coloured placards from the Eduard detail

set. The seat looks quite nice but could use something extra, and some texture on the cushions was made by putting a bit of Tamiya putty on them and dabbed with a toothbrush. A few small improvements were made to the seat frame too. After painting, the Eduard seatbelts were fitted. A dark wash was applied next to give the seat a used look. The surface detail of this kit is very good and didn't add any extra rivets this time. Two vents on top of the aircraft were



For the armament, I used Mk.20 'Rockeye' cluster bombs from Hasegawa's Weapon Set 2 and kit's AGM-45 'Shrikes' for era specific loadout

print. So, I printed the artwork onto clear decal paper with my laser printer. A tip here if printing your own decals, make sure that you use the correct decal paper for your printer and be careful when using laser printer as it can melt your decal paper and ruin your printer.

After applying the decals, I sprayed the entire model with another layer of clear to level the edges of the decals, and then sealed everything with a coat of matt to remove the sheen. I highlighted the panel lines with a bespoke mix of diluted black ink with a drop of liquid soap for capillary action. Minimal weathering was done, because for me, less is more and realistic. I posed my Corsair on Coastal Kit Bases and added Hasegawa's figures and mule with my own resin printed items to add more effect, and of course did some 'aerial' shots using Photoshop!























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
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

dioramas, however, when you have a 3D printer there are so many new things to discover, and you just have to go with the flow! The STL file for this beautiful looking Predator figure, along with many more beautiful 3D models can be found on Gambody website. For printing this figure, I decided to use Elegoo Mars 2 Pro 3D printer loaded with Elegoo Grey Resin. This printer is very affordable, and I was really excited to see what it was capable of, so after setting up the printer, printing some test prints and changing a few settings I decided to not waste any more time and print one of the largest parts first, the head and body. Success! It looked really amazing! The plan was simple, pick up my paintbrushes and airbrush and just dive in and have fun.

After removing all resin supports and doing a little clean up by filling a few holes and bit sanding, I fixed all the resin parts together with



VMS Black CA glue. I really should have left the sword y until I finished painting because I broke it three times! The next step was to spray the model with my favourite primer, Mr Surfacer Black, thinned with Mr Levelling Thinner, I also did some zenithal highlights by spraying on some Mr Surfacer White from above. This is a pretty cool technique to use when painting with super thin layers later on. For the first base coats I used my airbrush and lacquer paints from Hataka. First, Hataka Dark Brown 7K with a little Hataka Sand 6K was used. I then started spraying this on in thin coats over the skin, overing a little more where the shadows were. Next using more Hataka Desert Beige I worked on the highlights and strongest points of the figure. Predators have dark patches on their skin, and to imitate that I chose Hataka C230 Dark Grey

Time to test new Hataka Violet Range paints designed for figure painting. Currently Hataka has released two sets, with basic colours but when I need a different tone, I would mix up the shade I needed. I always get a bit nervous about brush painting, as I mostly used an airbrush. So out came my Army Painter Palette, and the fun began. After a little bit of painting, I really started to like these new Hataka colours a lot. The consistency was really nice, and I managed not to leave any brush strokes! The Hataka Blue Line colours are ideal for brush painting, but this coverage with these new sets

was really fantastic! For the

armour bits I used Hataka

Blue Line Gunmetal. For the hair and gun ornaments I used Citadel Auric Armour Gold. The same paint was later used on the base. For the pistol I just wiped the paint off, so only a little was left on the side of the brush and I then gently stroked the brush against the raised detail, just when dry brushing. This worked well. Next the entire skin was painted with Citadel Plaguebeared Flesh Contrast. However, I felt this was a bit too 'green' and I later fixed that with a coat of another shade, Guillemin Flesh Contract, again from Citadel. Contrast paints are a lot of fun, and the idea is to make a darker shade and some highlights all in one step, so when you have the right contrast colour, you don't really need to be an

experienced figure painter to do some pretty decent job! I would suggest you look out for these paints! Another cool contrast paint I used was Cryptek Armourshade Gloss.

This one was really spot on, and what I really wanted this armour to look like, very old and weathered. Next, I used Citadel Agrax Earthshade Wash and this caught all the deep recesses and gave some strong shadows.

Time for some dry brushing now along edges of the raised details, using Hataka Gunmetal on the weathered armour along with some brightened red on the fabric that holds the arm gauntlets. The next step was to apply VMS Satin Varnish to tone down the skin and everything except the armour.

I also created some more deep shadows, mostly underneath the armour using a couple of Ammo by Mig Oilbrushers. These were applied, left for a few minutes, and then blended in. For the base, I wanted a

rough stone texture, so I used some Mr Surfacer 500 and an old brush. When dry, I sprayed that stone parts with Mr Surfacer 1500 Grey and weathered it with Ammo by Dark Sea Grey Wash. I also Ammo bt Mig Modern Military Vehicles Wash on the gold parts,

leaving the top a bit more weathered by not wiping off the excess. Finally, I created my own wash using Tamiya XF-18 Medium Blue mixed with X-20 Thinners (not X-20A). Then with a sponge I this all over the grey areas on the base and that was it, finished my full figure complete! I was very happy with final result, and it was a lot of fun!



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## Ahsoka Tano

purchased this Ahsoka
Tano, Star Wars Jedi
character, STL file from
Indy Model 88 and chose to
print it at 1:6 scale. This model itself is made
up of fourteen pieces that required a lot of
printing time, in fact some forty hours in
total. The two light sabres were printed in
translucent baby blue resin to give them

painted entirely in acrylics.

To give the figure its correct colours,
I used as my reference the 'Clone Wars'
version of Ahsoka as this matched the 3D
print, I had. I've started painting the skin
tone with red oxide, a warm base, with my
airbrush for more uniformity. I then studied
the shadows, adding a washed blue tone at
base colour using a dot spot technique. This
kind of process consist in micro splashing
colour onto the skin tone, thereby giving
realism, colour transition and texture, plus
adding volume to the finish.

more realism and the figure was then

The next step, spotting was to add some highlights, and here I used white and yellow as a base colour. The lips and eyes were brush painted, making sure to give the Jedi a



focused expression. I also used a warm skin tone and cold eyes to give more contrast. Giving her more feminine touch led me to glaze her eyes with Tamiya Gloss, making her face more magnetic and voluptuous. I then used a plain white for her warpaint, almost straight from the bottle, thereby giving more contrast to her gentle skin tone and glossy eyes and lips. These little details on large scale models, beside any research on rendering different materials, makes an

interesting project.

Painting Ahsoka's unique scalp was a great challenge. Her three 'tentacle shaped' appendixes sweetly lean onto her shoulders and are adorned with tattoo-like stripes.

So, here I played around with a lot with different colour thicknesses, airbrushing on a base colour of white, then grey and finally baby blue was brush painted on for the stripes and scalp marks. The rest of the figure was then painted with my airbrush, keeping clothes smooth. Various textures were then added, plus slight marks and scratches applied. The leathers areas were painted with brownish acrylic washes.

I was careful with how the light source fell onto the model as I didn't want her clothes, light sabres and metallic areas to divert attention from her face. I enjoyed painting the metal areas, keeping them glossy on the highlights and dull in the shadow areas using black. This kind of technique was also used for leather boots too, giving them a worn look with additional scratches and weathering. On the base, again I kept the pigments and paints rather dull to ensure I kept the realism balanced so they did not detract the focus from Ahsoka.









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

# Bounty Hunter Boba FETT























During the journey, Fett stopped on the moon of Nar Shaddaa in order to make sure Solo would survive his time in carbonite. but he lost the smuggler while he was away as part of the return of the Crimson Dawn, kicking off a war between bounty hunters for Solo. Ultimately, Fett regained Solo and delivered him to the impatient Jabba.

So, after that introduction, I present to you my 3D print of one of the most feared bounty hunters in the Galaxy. If you have a good look around on the Internet, you will come across a plethora of Star Wars fans who are creating their favourite characters from the big screen in a 'fan art style', and this print is one such example. This is a fantastic bust of Boba Fett, and credit goes out to the guys at 3D Star Wars Models. You can find on the social media platforms and also on Patreon, where you can subscribe and obtain this file along with many other amazing builds to allow you to print your favourite fan art characters from the big screen.

After printing of the file, which consists of several parts such as the base, helmet, and jet pack it was just a case of cleaning off the supports from the printing process and applying a black primer coat followed by some white zenital highlighting. For those that are thinking 'wait a minute, what is Zenital highlighting?' Well, this is a way to reproduce the light and shadows with an imaginary light source, by applying the paint directly over the subject from one position thus creating a forced shadow. So, now with the preparation work complete, it was time to tackle the paintwork. Now I am by no means an expert in the figure painting, however, I approached this as I would do a painting a weather-beaten tank or aircraft. First up was to get some colour onto the armour, and for this I used Tamiya Dark Green as a base coat. I followed that with a variation of lighter and darker shades of the base colour. Finally, I hit the armour with a contrasting yellowish green though a mottled stencil, held slightly away

from the figure in order to bring some life into the all-over green shade.

I then masked up the shoulder pads with a bright yellow, and once the masking had been removed, it was time to start to the clothing, and for this I thought brush painting was the way to go. A mixture of Vallejo Black and Mid-Brown was applied to the clothing, and this was then given a very subtle dry brushing of Vallejo Stone Grey, as the print had some really nice surface detail. Next up was to paint the visor and the red banding around the helmet using a fine detail brush. Finally, Ladded the metallic details using Tamiya Titanium Silver and Gold. With the bulk of the bust complete all that was left to do was paint up the base in its respective colours. The

nameplate was a separate part and a very nice addition to the overall look. This was glued into place once painting was complete. I wanted to add the shoulder markings, but rather than paint them on I opted for a homemade decal. So here I masked off the cream-coloured section and after a quick search for the shoulder emblem on the Internet I found an image that would be suitable. This was then imported onto my laptop and printed onto clear decal paper.

Next, I sprayed a coat of Johnson's 'Future' over the decals prior to applying them in order to seal in the printer ink and stop it from bleeding when the decal was placed into the water before applying it. With all the paintwork complete I gave the entire print a quick coat of Alclad Aqua Gloss prior to adding some subtle oil washes to really make the details pop out. I then added some scratches and scrapes onto Fett's armour. Finally, a matt coat was applied to seal everything in, and the bust was glued onto its display base. I have to say that the world of 3D printing really does have it place in any modeller's workspace. Especially when you can easily obtain files like this for less than

Everything received a primer coat first using SMS Surfacer Black. This helps lay down the foundations for the next paint to adhere to and fill in small imperfections left over from the construction process. I left it dry and then checked over everything to ensure that it was nice a smooth before moving onto the next stage. For the main body, I wanted a black look but slightly more appealing than just straight Black. In the SMS Advance Range (a concentrated version of our airbrush range), we have a beautiful metallic Black called Obsidian. This has a nice metallic fleck through it but get it on the right angle, and blue/green/silver flakes shimmer and give an awesome effect. For the body, I thinned the Obsidian down 1:1 using Acrylic Lacquer Thinner and applied it generously at 15PSI using an 0.3 Dual Action Airbrush. For the main armour, I applied SMS Jet Black over the primed parts to get a deep black, high gloss finish – almost a piano black look – so as to have the best possible surface for the Colour Shift to lay on.

#### COLOUR SHIFT

I left that cure for around twenty-four hours, then moved on to the Colour Shift. For this one, I chose to use Colour Shift Extreme 'Supernova'. Colour Shift Extreme is a high-end colour shift that are different to our standard colour shifts in that they use a super fine, 'mirror' style of pigment. I began by applying a very light dusting coat over the parts at 15PSI with the 0.3 Dual Action Airbrush again. Once that had dried for about ten minutes, I came back in again a little heavier and applied another coat. I repeated this process and built up six layers

to get a super smooth finish. Once that had cured, I applied a few coats of SMS Super Clear to give the final paint finish a high gloss, glass like look. For the side pincers, SMS HyperChrome Cold was applied over the Jet Black painted pieces to give a high shine silver look to them. I had initially wanted to go for a full mirror look which is possible with HyperChrome but decided to go for the high shine look instead which I felt gave the kit a much better look alongside the Colour Shift.

Underneath the model are six rubber parts that slide on the underside of the legs. With these being a soft rubber material, the paint itself would most like crack and flake off when dry. To combat this, I added some SMS Flex (a flexible additive designed to give our paints some flexibility for use with RC cars and the like) to the Jet Black and then topped

with Colour Shift Extreme 'Hyper Space' to give a contrasting look compared to the main armour. To finish up the painting, small details were hand painted using SMS Advance Silver and Rich Gold such as the pistons on the legs and body and the eyes were painted using SMS Deep Blue Pearl. Now that all the painting was done, the final step was to add on some etched details using some detail sheets from Japanese company Ocean Spirits. These parts were designed mostly for Gunpla but can be easily used on other subjects to great effect. Using PVA Glue, I stuck on the etched parts over sections where there would be moving parts to help simulate gears.

#### THE BASE


For the base, it only needed to be simple. A while back, I found sheets of adhesive backed wall tiles at a local hardware store that were a brushed metal hexagonal pattern. The hexagonal pattern was a good fit for the mechanical design of the Zoid, so I removed each hexagon off the backing sheet and stuck them into a pattern on some styrene sheet that would allow the Zoid to be mounted to. Once the pattern was complete, I cut down the styrene, so it matched the pattern and then airbrushed on black then some more Colour Shift on the edges to match the model. The model was then fixed into place with a drop or two of CA Glue on the underside of the feet. While this wasn't an overly complex model to build and complete, it was still a fun painting project that shows off how awesome Colour Shift colours really are. If you haven't tried Colour Shifts before, give them a go on your next project - it's always amazing to watch them change colour on your models!

## PREDRIFF The Grumman E-2 Hawkeye

he Grumman E-2 Hawkeye was designed and developed during the late 1950s and early 1960s for the US Navy as a replacement for the earlier, piston-engine E-1 Tracer, which was rapidly becoming obsolete. The E-2 was the first aircraft designed specifically for its role, as opposed to a modification of an existing airframe. The E-2A Hawkeye entered US Navy service in January 1964 and in April 1964 with VAW-11 at NAS North Island. The first deployment was aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk during 1965. Since entering combat during the Vietnam War, the E-2 has served the US Navy around the world, acting as the electronic 'eyes of the fleet'. In August 1981, a Hawkeye from VAW-124 Bear Aces directed two F-14 Tomcats from VF-41 Black Aces in an intercept mission in the Gulf of Sidra that resulted in the downing of two Libyan Sukhoi Su-22s. Hawkeyes from VAW-123 aboard the aircraft carrier USS America directed a group of F-14 Tomcat fighters flying the Combat Air Patrol during Operation El Dorado Canyon, the joint strike of two Carrier Battle Groups in the Mediterranean Sea against Libyan targets during 1986. More recently, E-2Cs provided the command and control for both aerial warfare and landattack missions during the Gulf War. Navy E-2Cs have been upgraded with eight-bladed propellers as part of the Hawkeye 2000 program, and the first squadron to cruise with the new propellers was VAW-124 'Bear Aces'. The Hawkeye 2000 version can track over 2,000 targets simultaneously while also detecting 20,000 targets to a range greater than 400 miles and simultaneously guide 40-100 air-to-air intercepts or air-to-surface engagements. In 2014, several E-2C Hawkeyes from the 'Bear Aces' were deployed from USS George HW Bush as flying command posts and air traffic controllers over Iraq during Operation 'Inherent Resolve' against the Islamic State. During Operation 'Enduring Freedom' and Operation 'Iraqi Freedom' all ten Regular Navy Hawkeye squadrons flew overland sorties, providing battle management, close-air-support coordination, and combat search and rescue duties. VAW-120, the E-2C fleet replacement squadron began receiving E-2D Advanced Hawkeyes for training use in July 2010, and on 27 March 2014, the first E-2Ds were delivered to VAW-125. The E-2D will play a larger role than that of the E-2C, with five E-2Ds aboard each carrier instead of four C-models. In smaller numbers of E-2s have been sold to the armed forces of Egypt, France, Israel, Japan, Mexico, Singapore and Taiwan. 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


espite the first YF-16A being rolled out in 19 in December 1973, the F-16 Fighting Falcon is still in demand today, whether this be new Block versions or onward sales of aircraft retired from US or other nations inventories. Once the F-16 was selected by the US Air Force, it was further decided to form a partnership between the USAF and nations of the NATO alliance who had a similar need for a lightweight fighter, to begin development of the plane for service. Four such nations chose to join the development effort, becoming involved in production and sub-contracting work. The four European partners, collectively known as the European Participating Governments (EPG), these being Belgium, Denmark, the Netherlands, and Norway. Many F-16s have since been sold under the aegis of The United States Foreign Military Sales (FMS) Program or by part of any Security Assistance Program authorised by the Arms Export Control Act (AECA) between the US and an authorised foreign purchaser. F-16 user countries include Bahrain, Belgium, Chile. Denmark, Egypt, Greece, Indonesia, Iraq, Israel, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Pakistan, Jordan, South Korea, Morocco, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Singapore, Taiwan, Thailand, Turkey, USA, Venezuela. The F-16 continues to be a modern, highly capable, affordable and supportable fighter. The program is healthy, with a strong likelihood of new orders that will extend the production lines for several more years. This 144-page book looks in detail at the history and employment of the F-16 with the nations listed above in detail, highlighting the various differences in avionics, equipment and weaponry. The book is full colour, with photographic references, walk arounds, and as the 'Real to Replica' title suggests there is a section on how to model the F-16 in popular scales, making this book and ideal source for both the enthusiast and scale modeller alike.

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

#### ARMA HOBBY 1:72 BY GRANT DALZELL



y first impression on inspecting the sprues was that the spue gates were large for the scale, and

some gates went onto the surfaces as well as edges. Also, there were parts that suffered from some significant flashing. This may not represent all Arma Hobby kits of course, but I couldn't help being a little disappointed as I had heard such great things about this brand. The build started with the landing gear bay. The bay walls then fit into the upper wing section. The landing gear legs go in at this stage as well, and due to the engineering of the kit I put them in although you could probably put them in at the end with some modifications. This section was painted with AK Interactive Xtreme Metal Aluminium before gluing the bottom wing to upper wing.

Next was the cockpit area, Hurricanes have a tubed cage style cockpit, which sits on the upper wing. The rudder pedals and control yoke were glued onto a floor piece that was in turn glued on to the upper wing. There are two tubed sections that attach to left and right fuselage, as well as another piece that glues to left and right. There are some male/female attachment points here, but I had to drill these out as the male pins were too large to fit. These pieces were painted separately with Vallejo Metal Color Aluminium before fixing them in. The fuselage halves were painted up as well with the same aluminium shade as well. The side wall areas were masked and painted Tamiya XF-71 Cockpit Green. The pilot's seat and bulkhead were also painted up. Before painting the seat, I added some aluminium foil tape




















# Polikarnov

ICM'S 1:72 POLIKARPOV IJ-2/PO-2VS REVIEWED BY DANIEL CROAKE



he Polikarpov Po-2 was one of the most produced aircraft in history, with estimates of up to 30,000

airframes being built, yet there is a surprising lack of good and recent models of this type in 1:72 scale - until recently. This ICM kit comes not many years after a previous ICM tooling. I did not build the old version, but I can say that the kit presented in this box is a new tooling and looks fabulous. The components are well moulded in grey plastic with finely engraved details. A total part count of 102 parts is included with the

cockpit alone needing approximately twentyfive individual parts.

There are four decal options across three colour schemes included in this kit. I have chosen to build the Po-2VS of the 46th Kamansky group. The addition of the decal for the markings on the fuselage adds an amount of interest but it is also the significance that this was an all-female piloted group nicknamed the 'Night Witches' by the German military.

The build itself is not that typical as the fuselage halves can be joined with only some of the cockpit installed and the seats and controls mounted to the bottom wing and inserted from underneath. The inside of the fuselage is painted using Ammo by Mig 228 Intermediate Blue, which is a close match for the interior colour of these aircraft. The details are picked out with a variety of Revell Aqua acrylics as dedicated by the instructions. An

application of Ammo by Mig Interior Wash was used to add grime to the appearance. My only criticism of the cockpit is that the parts are extremely fragile due to their small size so care must be taken to not damage them.

The wings are moulded as individual pieces tip to tip. This makes them very thin and look in scale as a result. The bottom wing attachment needed only the smallest amount of filler on the join, and this was the extent of filling needed for this kit. The top wing will not be added until the end to aid the painting stage. The engine is made up of several parts - once again - delicately moulded, but also designed so that it can remain unattached until the very end.

It is now that the painting stage can commence on the main fuselage/bottom wing and top wing. An overall coat of UMP Grey Primer is used first. This primer also has the benefit of allowing any flaws to be visible. The underside and three-tone camouflage were painted using AK Interactive Soviet Aircraft Colour Set. All this paintwork was done with an H&S Infinity airbrush with 0.15 needle. The camouflage pattern was laid out using Blu-Tac as a guide and to give a soft

nyone who has built one of Special Hobby's Vampire F.3 or FB.5 kits will be very familiar with this kit, as all

the kits share the same basic moulds. Inside the standard end-opening box are two sets of runners in soft-ish grey plastic, plus a clear runner; there is no PE in this kit. Parts are cast very well with nice detail and no flash or moulding flaws. The major differences of the FB.9, compared to the Mks.3 or 5 are all present – the extended undercarriage legs, squared off wing tips, 3" RPs, and the most

obvious difference, the extended starboard air intake. The twelve-page instruction and painting manual contains runner maps, paint call outs with Gunze numbers, and full colour four-views of each of the five markings options. These include - WR120/U, No.213 Squadron RAF, Deversoir, 1954, WR266/B, No.607 Squadron RAF, Ouston, 1950's, 1 Squadron Royal Jordanian AF, Amman, 1958, L158, Lebanese Air Force, Beirut, 1954, 75 Squadron RNZAF, Tuaranga, 1969.

Construction is relatively straightforward – while Special Hobby have previously been regarded as a 'limited run' company, their recent kits have been much more polished. The cockpit is nicely detailed, though the very nice, raised detail on the IP is let down

by a very poor decal – it might be better to paint the part. The fuselage halves join very nicely - don't forget to add as much weight as possible as this is a determined tail sitter. I added some behind the cockpit rear bulkhead and under the floor, and it was barely enough. The fit is very good, with a minimum of filler required, except in one area. The tail booms are often a bugbear of Vampire kits and this one is no exception. The fit is poor - even after clean-up and fettling, they required quite a bit of filler to blend them in. This is not aided by the fact that they are joined to the wings right at the trailing edge - it is a mystery why they weren't designed with a join further back on the booms, as on the new 1:48 Airfix kit. A little slack in the join means care will be needed to get them properly vertical.

The wing tips are cast in clear plastic, which is a nice touch. The smaller parts are cleanly moulded and attach very positively, including the gear doors, gear legs and the elevator mass balances. The model was primed with black primer, which went down well enough for me to

his is anoth airliner mo Unusually, with three

his is another fine civil airliner model from Zvezda. Unusually, this one comes with three configurations,

gear up, gear down and in landing or takeoff mode with undercarriage, flaps and
leading-edge slats all extended. That
made the choice easy – this last being
an unusual and always interesting
configuration. Zvezda also provides a
stand for their airliner models, a rather
nice touch which used to be normal.
I like that. The kit includes fuselage
window transparencies, however for
small windows like these I prefer to
add the window glazing later using
Kristal Klear or a suitable clear setting
PVA. That simplifies masking. A

and notional panels, plus a simplified front fuselage entry area in case the modeller wishes to have the crew entry door displayed open. This is the only door which can be posed open. The cockpit glazing is provided

as a complete upper fuselage section,

which avoids awkward insertion problems for the screens but adds another joint which needed careful work to disguise or eliminate. At least most of the sanding and filling was well away from the glazing itself. This was one of the longer more irritating tasks in this build. Once this was satisfactorily smoothed, I sprayed the fuselage overall white. I also sprayed the lower wing centre section white in readiness for later assembly, although I decided to ignore the instructions



the end of the build, just before adding the undercarriage. That made fuselage painting and wing flap and slat assembly easier. That worked well, though I should have done more test fitting early on to ensure a good clean fit first. This kit comes with that unusual and very welcome option. The slats and flaps can be extended to model an aircraft on approach. That is terrific. An aircraft with the landing gear down but slats and flaps all retracted is fine for a parked model, but looks half finished, rather sterile, so that was why that option was immediately decided on. I had some difficulty with the rather minimalist instructions, until it dawned that, for the slats, a section had to be added to the front of the wing before attaching them, while the flap sections shown were alternates, without inserts required. The assembly is quite delicate, so I chose to assemble and paint the wing in pale grey while still separate from the fuselage and without the slats and flaps which I attached later. Since the inner flap sections hinge off the rear of the engine pylons, I also attached the engine cores and pylons before spraying the main wing colour.

Attaching the slat sections was straightforward, whereas the extended flaps needed careful handling, their attachment being quite delicate. The engine cowlings for the Condor scheme are painted yellow. I tried pre-painting these before assembly; this worked in part, since it did give me clean top edges where the cowls and pylon meet. I still had to sand and fill then respray a final coat after much careful masking off. It is worth noting that two complete engine sets are provided in the kit, so I suspect the A321ceo can also be built from the box. Options are also provided for winglets or for wing endplates, to allow for differing A321 variants.

The Condor scheme has an all-white fuselage with yellow and two tones of grey wrap around sections at the rear of the fuselage. As mentioned earlier, to produce this I spray painted the whole of the fuselage

windows. The curved yellow fuselage sections are provided as decals, but the other colours need to be masked and painted. To ensure I masked the paler grey correctly, I cut a paper stencil of the decals and traced the decal outline around the fuselage before masking down the centre of the future yellow area and painting. This was possibly a mistake but allowed some tolerance in the masking process. The fin and rudder are a darker grey colour. I hand sketched the curves for that and lightly painted an outline. I was happy with that by my third attempt. Drawing a consistent double curve onto a round fuselage is difficult. The winglets also were painted darker grey. Once the fuselage painting was complete, I assembled the wing and fuselage, after some gentle filing to ensure a better fit. With hindsight, I should have done a better check fit before doing all the wing detail work.

Two sets of landing gear are provided, for extended shock absorber struts for an aircraft on approach and compressed for a landed aircraft. This is a nice touch that goes well with the extended slats and flaps. As with previous Zvezda kits it was important to take care when removing the gear legs and struts from the sprues. They are finely moulded and some of the sprue gates are quite substantial. I found a fine-toothed saw was the best tool for cutting free the legs without damage or distortion. I added the landing gear and doors to the assembled aircraft and attached various aerial to complete the build. The decals provided by Zvezda are thin and flexible. Care is needed to avoid them folding up, as they don't slide as easily as some, but once in place they settle down well. The rear fuselage curved yellow decals were not quite opaque enough to hide the delineation between the white of the main fuselage and the pale grey of the rear, so some careful overpainting was required. Generally, the fuselage window surround decals went on well, though a little adjustment was needed







on one length. These decals seemed more rather more resistant to decal softener than previous Zvezda sets, so a second round of Micro Sol was used.

Overall, I found this a most enjoyable build, with some painting challenges which might make it a bit tricky for a new modeller. The fit of the parts is excellent, and the end result pleased me. I originally intended to pose the aircraft as if on final approach though, as my wife pointed out, the flaps are not fully down, so a climb out pose on the stand works well. I am tempted to cut the nose gear main doors apart and open them, so I can show the nose leg folding away as the aircraft climbs out.

Modern airliners do tend to start the gear travelling as

Thanks to Zvezda for this review sample of an intriguing new airliner. Of course, within two days of my finishing this kit and review, Condor announced a new colour scheme, in various colours of vertical candy striping. That looks a lot harder to paint, with lots of masking, or a really challenging set of decals sometime in the future. Meantime, this scheme is now rapidly being consigned to history.














