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

MODIFICATIONS

So, the build started with the assembly of the engine and gearbox. All the engine parts, like the rocker covers, air filter, cooling fan, sump and such were painted in different metallic colours to make the final assembly look more interesting, compared to painting everything in a single colour. The three pulleys were cut from the one-piece



casting and cleaned. These were then painted and mounted on the front of the engine. The headers were cleaned next, painted aluminium, and stained with clear colours to simulate heat discoloration. The finished engine was put aside.

CLEANING

A lot of cleaning work went into the next part of the build, like the chassis and especially, the roll cage. All the seam lines had to be removed with a sharp knife and a sanding stick. After all parts were cleaned up, both the chassis and roll cage were separately built up. Although both would be painted the same colour, it was better to glue them together after all interior had been installed. A grey primer was then applied, and everything was painted gloss red. Both assemblies were then put aside to dry and await

final assembly.











EIFION DAVIES BUILDS THE 1:24 BELKITS CITROEN C3 WRC FROM THE 'RALLY FINLAND 2017'



BELKITS

his kit is a new release from Belkits from 2021, Craig Breen and Scott Martin's Citroen C3 WRC

from the 'Rally Finland 2017'. They also released the 'Tour De Corse 2018' at the same time, both kits are very similar with different decals and wheels being the main differences that I could see. My first impression of the kit is that it's of a very high standard and all the parts look crisp and clean on the sprues. The addition of a couple of sheets of etched parts added to the quality, and these covered brake discs, grilles, belt buckles and a few various other

bits and pieces. The kit also contained a length of fabric for all the belts and harnesses, hopefully adding some realism to these, rather than just decals.

My first job was to snip all the parts from the sprues and clean them all up ready for priming. This needed minimal effort, confirming my first impression that this was produced to a high standard. As I was removing all the

















Next up was the interior, and again the level of detailing here is fantastic. From a fire extinguisher, a handheld computer, to a digital gear shifter. Decals are provided for these that really brings them to life. Once these were in place and decaled up, I turned my attention to the seats and harnesses. This was quite a challenge as the fabric strip now needs to be measured carefully against the seats and cut into short lengths for the harnesses. I also needed two lengths of straps to hold down the spare wheel in the boot area. This was quite a fiddly job, especially threading the straps through all the tiny etched buckles and clips. I think this was one of the longest jobs of the whole build. Once all the straps were ready, the seats were prepared by fitting on the carbon fibre decals. The decals when applied looked as if

decal to represent the shoulder harness. When I fitted the spare wheel in place, I realised there wasn't much fabric left and

they'd never conform to the shape of the seat, but with a couple of coats of Micro Sol, they adhered perfectly to the seat. Once they'd been left to dry for a couple of days, I then fitted all the straps and buckles, these were really added to by a simple application of a





















licking through the TV channels one afternoon I had a bast from the past when I saw the movie

'Herbie Goes Bananas' was on. Having not seen this film in over twenty years, I just had to sit down (much to the kid's disgust) and watch it. Later that evening I dug through my stash as I was sure I had a VW Beetle in there somewhere. The kit I found was the Tamiya Volkswagen 1300 Beetle. A quick search online and I found some 'Herbie' decals and decided to convert the Tamiya kit into 'Herbie'. Looking into what was needed, it seemed the decals were almost it, except for needing to replicate the opening canvas roof that Herbie had. I decided to build it as

it was straight from the box, having already debated whether or not to cut open the roof to replicate the canvas roof half open, and having decided not to.

SPARES BOX

Before starting the build, I hunted through my 'spares-boxes' for a material that was suitable to use on the roof, but nothing I had seemed suitable. The next day in work, I came across

























A quick search online and I found some 'Herbie' decals

some small plastic wallets for price tags that were torn and being thrown away. Looking at these I saw they had a slight 'dimpling' effect that seemed suitable. Taking some home I found one that seemed to fit the bill and cut it down to size. With the decals on their way, a 'canvas' roof ready, I started on the build. Being a Tamiya kit, this Beetle nearly built itself! The level of detail throughout was exceptional and was a joy to build. As the car was going to be built on off white or cream colour, I decided on dark grey for the interior door panels and floor, with the seats being a lighter grey. For me the one area that lacked details in this kit, is the dashboard, coming in one solid piece, without any decals to enhance it. This was painted an off white to match the exterior, with some details (sparse as they were) picked out in chrome.

PAINTING

For the exterior paint I used Tamiya X-1 White and added a couple of drops of XF-15 Flesh to darken it down to a cream finish. Once I had what I thought was an adequate shade, the shell was painted. The small rectangle of plastic was treated to some dark grey paint, before being carefully glued into place on the roof, being careful to keep it centralised. The shell was put aside to allow the glue to dry, whilst I went to work on the wheels. These had all been treated to the same mix of white as the body shell, and now the tyres and chrome caps were added on. The next day the whole bodyshell was treated to one more coat of gloss, ready for the newly arrived decals. After this had dried overnight, the decals and clear plastic were placed on the shell. The decals were nice and thin and conformed well with the shape of the car, especially around the bonnet and boot areas. One final coat of gloss and then it was ready to be put together.

CHROME

The final pieces of chrome were fitted, being Tamiya, these were numerous and well moulded. Front lights, wing indicators and such were all then added. For me, the small pieces of chrome as boot and bonnet handles really added to the look. Sitting there at my bench looking at the model, the light caught the big droopy headlights, and bang, I had Herbie sat there looking back at me. My only regret with this build is that the roof decal was quite thin, and I should have painted white underneath before placing this on, as the dark grey colour of the panel has muted down the white in the stripe. I think this build has opened my eyes to the fact that we have objects in our everyday lives that we can use to enhance our models without necessarily going for the expensive aftermarket parts.

Intus series II

MARK THOMSON BUILDS THE 1:24 TAMIYA LOTUS SERIES 2 KIT

TAMIYA

otus is a British manufacturer that was prolific in making cars for the racetrack. The Lotus

Seven grew out of Colin Chapman's sporting interest in the Austin Sevens and was a direct development of the Lotus MK.VI. The early layout had simple body panels attached to a sturdy space frame, motorcycle type fenders and little protection from inclement weather. In the late 1950's England had a heavy tax on new cars, Chapman decided to take advantage of the tax rule. He offered a comprehensive kit which could be assembled in a short time

without any special tools. This meant that a sports car enthusiast could obtain a very highperformance vehicle for a cost of only £526! The philosophy behind all of Colin Chapman's designs was quickness through less weight and simplicity. The Super 7 is a prime example of this concept. It is a real credit to the designers and exemplifies How successful the Super 7 concept was that the same basic design is still in production today more than sixty years since its introduction, and is still being built, driven, and cherished by sports car enthusiasts around the world.

The Lotus 7 will be familiar to anyone with a passing interest in cars. It's been in







This latest Tamiya Super 7 is an enhanced reissue of the kit first released in 1984 and includes an all-new sheet of etched parts, turned-aluminium intake trumpets, and vinyl adhesive seat belts

suspension, and smaller thirteen-inch wheels. Nose cowl and fenders were switched from aluminium to FRP, plus a higher-performance engine was employed in Super 7 cars. The Lotus Super Seven is powered by a Ford Cosworth 4-cylinder 1.3L engine using two dual throated Weber carburettors, which produces 83 BHP at 6,000 RPM. As the years have gone on kit car enthusiast have managed to shoehorn even more powerful engines into the chassis. This engine transmits its power through a four-speed gearbox providing a top speed, at 6,000 RPM of a little more than 160kMh. Front suspension is an independent wishbone using helical coils and anti-role bar. Steering is a very tight rack and pinion system that is quite responsive. The brakes are of the drum type, simple, positive, and effective. Rear wheels are mounted on a rigid axle and damped by large coil springs. The Lotus Super Seven therefore is a true sports car with few creature comforts. If you are looking for a smooth ride in luxurious comfort the Lotus Seven is not for you. If you are looking for phenomenal performance, economical operation and pure fun, then this car will do that, and more. This

car has won more than its share of honours and will go on to win even more.



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












a few car kits now, I have a process and I know that cleaning up the body shell in preparation for painting is a sound plan. The bodyshell, nose and bonnet painting are a part of the build that you need to take care with. This is part of the build that requires a few paint layers built up over time with light sanding in-between, to ensure a smooth finish at the end. The body shell had a minor seam lines and high spots that I marked with a with board marker and were taken care of by sanding. There were some large ejector pin marks on the underside, which I managed to fill and sand smooth using Flory Sanding Sticks. The body shell and chassis were then primed using Mr Surfacer 1500, 50:50 through my H&S Infinity airbrush using Mr Colour Self Levelling Thinners at a low air pressure. This was then wet sanded down with 6000 grit to check for any imperfections before re-priming. It's critical that the bodywork is perfect so any imperfection you don't take care of is multiplied with every layer added afterwards. Once again, I wet sanded with 6000 then received three layers of Midnight Blue paint with the last coat being a wet 50:50 mix. The bodyshell was then wet sanded with micromesh 12000 grit, to remove any imperfections. After it had been left for twenty-four hours, the Midnight Blue areas were all masked of using Tamiya tape, and with the use of the Infinity models masking boards I was able to cut out some curves as well. The underside and the interior were then painted as per the instructions for Tamiya paints.

I approached the decaling differently to my previous car models, because I was planning on doing a 2K lacquer finish, which is a new process to me. So, I ensured the bodyshell node and bonnet was properly wiped down and ensured all dust and grease was removed. With this being the race car version, the decal call out is a bit more complex. So, time was taken when applying the decals, and they went down without any issues, using Micro Set and Sol. Once all the decals were on and conformed to all the contours of the car, it was time to apply the 2k Pro to seal them in and give the paint work a great finish. 2K is an advanced process which I wouldn't recommend for airbrushing

blemishes of dust in the finish. Once the paint work has been left for a good few days under a plastic box to prevent dust particles landing on the finish, I then took care of the blemishes. The body work had three small dust blemishes in the finish that was easily taken care of again with wet sanding with some 8000 and 12000 grit Micromesh. Again, the paint work was cleaned before adding a polish and wax with standard Auto Glym car products, and then buffed up with a micro fibre cloth. The clear parts were removed from the sprue using a fine-toothed razor saw and care was taken to clean them up with Flory Sanding Sticks. All the edges of the clear parts were then painted chrome to achieve a good finish. I masked the clear parts up using Tamiya tape strips cut using the Infinity mask cutting boards before airbrushing.

While the painted 2k parts were drying, I went through the instructions for the rest of the build breaking it up into sub-assemblies, such as the engine, front suspension, transmission, and interior. The first thing I tackled building was the engine, cleaning up all the parts with a hobby knife and sanding sticks. The parts where then put together with Tamiya Extra

Excavation

BY SCOTT TAYLOR OF THE SCALE MODELLERS SUPPLY (SMS)

was recently in a local hobby store where I saw the 1:32 Fujimi Mini Excavator kit on the shelf

and just due to its uniqueness alone, I bought it with the aim to make a small scene with it. Once I got home from the store, I grabbed some tools, sat down, and got straight into the build. The kit itself was very straight forward to assemble. Everything fit together well and best part is that the digging arm moves

didn't fix the tracks and mounts to the body with cement, so I pulled it apart into three subsections for painting. I did, however, fix the moving parts on the arm into the final position I wanted them in to make the painting easier.

To begin the painting, I primed the Excavator with SMS Surfacer Black. The Surfacer will fill in small scratches and imperfections created during the assembly. I wanted the main colour to be similar to most earth moving equipment you see around,

that mustardy yellow. For this, I used the colour Ochre from the new water based Infinite Colour range from SMS. The Ochre was thinned at approximately 20% water to paint and sprayed through a 0.3 airbrush at 20 psi. As yellow pigmented paints can be very translucent, it took four coats to get full coverage over the black. Black was chosen in particular for the base coat to give the Ochre a darker, dirtier tone. Once that was finished, it was left for twenty-four hours to dry before moving on to the detail painting.

















I used paints from all three of the SMS ranges on this build, which goes to show how compatible they all are

Using SMS Infinite Colour Black, the first detail painting was done on the levers, the tracks, the rear cover, and the bolt heads. The next step was more detail painting, this time with SMS Advance Acrylic Lacquer Silver. Handles, pistons and then scratches and chipping were painted on with the Silver before switching to Gunmetal and repeating on the bucket, blade, and tracks. I had originally envisaged a small base with a bit of dirt and rocks for the Excavator to go with but decided to take it one step further. I found a 3D print STL file on 'Thingiverse' as a free download of some Dinosaur skulls, so fired up the Anycubic Mono X and printed off a Triceratops skull scaled to a similar scale as the Excavator. Once it was printed and cured, I needed to come up with a way to embed it to give it the appearance of being semi excavated from the bed rock. For this, I used some soft foam to create a rough shape for the skull to sit on and then coated the foam with Incredifill UV Curing Putty.

With that sorted, I then began to work on the base. I wanted it to be two tiered so as to show that the skull was in the ground deep and the Excavator had been used to dig it out. A basic frame for the base was made using 4mm MDF board, including a sloping front. With that built, I placed the Excavator and the skull on the base in the locations that I felt were best. The skull was then fixed into place at the front using CA Glue and the Excavator was put aside until later. Using the Incredifill putty again, I coated the entire base and then applied a decent amount of fine dirt and stone. I let the dirt soak into the putty for a few minutes and then exposed it to UV via a

UV LED torch, which instantly hardened the putty and made a solid base to work with.

To create the mound of excavated dirt, I did the same as I did with the skull and created a mound using soft foam. The foam was then coated with the Incredifill putty as well and then given the same dirt treatment as the base proper. Once hardened, it was placed at the rear corner of the scene and then added some more putty and dirt to tie it to the base. I also added on some larger rocks to give the impression that they were also removed during the excavation process. With all that in place, I started airbrushing the ground and skull using SMS Premium German Dark Brown, German Sand Yellow, Buff and Brown. As with a lot of fossils found in real life, they are generally a much darker colour than the ground around them, so using Black and German Dark Brown, airbrushed on a much darker tone. With all the groundwork painted, I then hand brushed smaller stones using SMS Advance Neutral Grey, Charcoal, Graphite and Brown. I like to do this on the bases I create to help give it more colour and more things to look at when viewing the scene.



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The Excavator was then attached using CA glue to the top section, and then grass tufts were added to give the top part a more natural look with a little colour. To tie this to the base, the Excavator was weathered further using SMS Dark Earth Weathering Pigment and Dark Brown Wash. The scene was coming together well but it was still lacking something. It needed something to give it life. I found some more files to print off Thingiverse, this time some hand tools. These were again scaled to fit the rest of the scene and printed on the Mono X. They were painted using SMS Advance colours Gunmetal, Black, Red Oxide, Brown, and Silver, via hand brush and then placed on the scene around the skull. The scene still was lacking something else, so I found another 3D print STL of a construction worker figure on the 'CGTrader' website for purchase. I paid for and downloaded the file and then rescaled it

in 4 different sizes and printed them out. Once they were cured, I took the four figures and compared them to the Excavator and selected the one closest in scale.

The worker was cleaned up and primed using SMS Surfacer White. I needed to use white this time as I needed to have a white base underneath the orange fluorescent for the safety vest. For the vest, I used the water based Infinite Colour 'Lava Glow' for the fluorescent orange. The Lava Glow was

thinned 20% with water and airbrushed on at 20PSI. Once dry, the fluorescent nature of the paint came to life and then I used multiple Infinite Colour paints to hand brush the rest of the figure, mixing and blending colours as I went. The final detail added was the silver reflective stripes which were hand brushed on using SMS Advance Silver and a Size 0 brush. Once done, he was attached to the base using CA Glue and then dirtied up using some pigments and washes. So, with that last addition, I was finally happy with the scene and put the finishing touches to it including a final topcoat airbrushed on with SMS Premium Flat Clear.

This build was a great testing ground for many different techniques and products. I used paints from all three of the SMS ranges to complete it, which goes to show how compatible they all are, with water based and solvent-based paints being used on top and underneath each other. I had a great time with this one, the uniqueness of the Excavator paired with the creative freedom of 3D printing made it a much enjoyable build.

CONSTRUCTION

As with most armour



wheels and lower hull. Here all I did with the wheels was to put them together, but I would be leaving them off until later for ease of painting. I then continued with fitting the rest of the small parts, exhausts, and tools. attention onto the top hull, where I continued fitting, the engine grilles, hatch handles and other parts. Once all these parts were in place, I glued the top and bottom sections together, with no issues and no filler needed anywhere. The next task would be the turret, which built up with ease. When I looked at the parts at the beginning, I saw the barrels were not very well detailed, so I sourced some metal replacements, which just dropped into place and looked so much better. These were then fitted with the rest then all the major assembly work done other

PAINT

So, next it was on with some paint, and I began by giving the hull an all over coat of H408 including on the wheels and exhaust. I decided that I was going to do a typical German three-tone camouflage pattern on the bottom hull and the turret would be in

red primer. These colours all came from AK Interactive sets. On the exhaust, I used a small bit of sponge and with some AK Interactive Chipping Medium and dabbed it firstly on a tissue to remove some the paint and then on the exhaust to get a random effect that wouldn't cover all he under laying paint. Once this was dry, I did the same with a few of AK Interactive Rust shades to get a good rusty look, mainly concentrating from the top down towards the middle of the exhaust.

TRACKS

Then it was time for the tracks! So, after painting the rubber on the road wheels, I started to glue together the links using Tamiya Extra Thin Cement and carried on till I had two sets of different lengths. After an hour or two leaving them to dry, I put all the wheels back onto the chassis then started to put the track sections together to get right shape and curves. I also allowed for the correct amount of sag on the top. Again, using Tamiya glue these were then fixed and left to dry overnight. The next day I removed the tracks had to admit it was not as bad as I thought! I painted the tracks with a mix of Ammo by Mig Dirty Tracks and Rusty Tracks as I like the combined results. Once dry I added some weathering and then fixed them around the wheels.

WEATHERING

I then started weathering the lower hull and running gear using a new method I recently picked up from a YouTube channel I follow. So, armed with AK Interactive Dry Ground, I started to place this around the underside, the front hull and all along the bottom half. This was also added under the top hull just above where the top of the tracks were, and all around the suspension. Next, with a brush dipped in water and constantly repeating this process, I kept wiping away at areas where dirt would be less and wiping it into areas it would collect. I then carried this on all over the lower half and on the front and rear areas. I also used other pigments along

the edge of the top of the chassis to simulate thrown up dried dirt. I continued this on the wheels, but more like a heavy wash in this area. Next, I made up a dust colour using Tamiya Buff and a bit of German Grey to get a sandy grey colour and sprayed this over these areas to tie them all together.

...which came out very well

TURRET

This was then put aside to dry. While waiting, I picked up the turret and looking at pictures, I noticed that most turrets were left in their primer and had chalk marks on them. So, I carefully drew a few of these to add some interest. This was all sealed in with a coat of Johnson's Klear ready for some oil washes. Here I used a combination of colours to try to get a used grubby look using various Ammo by Mig and AK Interactive products such as

he Bushmaster Protected Mobility Vehicle or Infantry Mobility Vehicle is an Australian-built four-wheel

drive armoured vehicle. The Bushmaster was primarily designed by the then governmentowned Australian Defence Industries (ADI). The Bushmaster is currently in service with multiple nations including the Australian Army, and Air Force, the Royal Netherlands Army, the British Army, The Japan Ground Self Defense Force, and the New Zealand Army. The role of the Bushmaster is to provide protected mobility transport, with infantry dismounting from the vehicle before going into action. tracked armoured personnel carrier. The highhard steel specified for Bushmaster meant that it offered better ballistic and IED protection than existing aluminium alloy clad ASLAVs and M113. Later the Bushmaster's designation was changed to Protected Mobility Vehicle (PMV). The British Army have 24 Bushmasters, used vehicles are fitted with additional armour, Anti IED Electronics and a .50 calibre machine gun, this is the subject of this release from Dragon.

This Dragon kit was first released in 2021 with the option of two Australian vehicles, the SAS version was released shortly after with markings for a standard vehicle and two vehicles that were serving in Syria between 2016 and 2018. Inside the box are two grey sprues, a grey upper and lower body, one clear sprue, a small etched fret, two metal axles for the wheels and four rubber tyres. These are all crisply moulded with lovely levels of detail















tiny decal sheet with four tiny decals for the body with one of these being a number plate and also a decal to sit on the windscreen to simulate dust marks made by the provided etched windscreen wipers.

The build was very simple, happening over just six stages, I wondered how simple the build may be having so few parts, but was happy to go with it as it should make for a quicker build. Stage 1 deals with the assembly of the weapons station with the .50 Calibre machine gun, this was fiddly but looked effective when assembled. In stage 2, the windows are supposed to be added along with the four interior parts to the upper and lower halves before sealing this up, but I assembled the four interior

to the lower chassis

to paint this up along with the interior of the upper half. The windows were also given a coat of clear blue at this point while still attached to the sprue as was seen with the effect of the toughened bullet proof glass on pictures I found of the type (and indeed the box image). Tusken Raider

JEZZ COLEMAN DETAILS A 3D PRINTED STAR WARS FIGURE

SAND PEOPLE

usken Raiders or as they are lesser known 'Sand People' are fictional creatures from the Star

Wars Universe. They are characterised as a nomadic race who live on the planet of Tatooine They first appeared in the 1977 film 'A New Hope' and have popped up in many of the sequels throughout the years, latterly in the 'Book of Boba Fett'. As a big Star Wars fan and also an avid modeller, and the owner of a 3D printer, I have been able to download and print a range of subjects from the Star Wars series. For me the original movies are

the best, and growing up in the 1980s, one iconic image sticks in my mind, that being a Tusken Raider standing alone on a rock with arms held high above his head and his shrieking cry echoing though the canyons of Tatooine.

So, on with the build, and I came across the file for this print on Etsy one evening for less than the price of a cup of coffee! It was quickly downloaded and immediately sent across to my printing software. I then set about adding the printing supports to the various pieces, that once printed would make the completed Tusken Raider. The file comprised of an upper and lower torso with separate pieces for the feet, forearms, staff, and head. One of the great things about 3D printing is you can scale a model to whatever





















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







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in wilderness conditions. On opening the box, don't be confused with the small number of parts in this kit, as trust me that where there might be a lack of parts, Revell has packed a lot of details into what you are given. The first area to tackle was the cockpit, which comprises of four sides, with walls and floor and a separate seat with controls. This was all painted using Tamiya Dark Grey, and some highlights were added with slightly

allowed the pilot to land on uneven ground or

lighter shades of the base colour on the side panels. The switches were all picked out using a fine detail paintbrush. There were also a number of decals

that needed applying, although, despite the glazing, a lot of the cockpit details would not be visible once the model was complete. However, this can be rectified if you leave the hatch open. Revell also supply a pilot figure, which I chose not to add as I am not a great fan of seated figures in models.

With the cockpit painted and assembled there was also a small area of the inner fuselage that needs painting. This was done using a little red brown, as if you leave the hatch open the inner walls will be visible. With all this painted I could now















attach the cockpit section and close up the fuselage halves, not forgetting to insert the front glazing and rear engine bulkhead first. Next was to assemble the four separate side panels/wings, and these comprised of two halves, one was the main panel itself and the other part was the inner framework surround. At this point you have three, yes three options as to how the panels can be configured for display. Perhaps the most common TIE Fighter poses show the panels fully open or partially folded, or my favourite pose fully folded with the undercarriage extended. A

quick note here for those of you, that like me can't decide which configuration to stick with, if you are very careful when assembling these parts, you can get away without gluing the different attachments in place, and you can alternate between all three options! The final part of the assembly was to attach the undercarriage legs, again these can be installed without glue, depending on your configuration options. As I mentioned before, with few parts in the kit construction was easy, but I spent most of my time masking and painting the model.

So, I masked off the front glazed areas first prior to adding some black primer over the entire model. I then set about the task of masking the wing panels, and let me tell you that was very tedious, but once painted up it was well worth all the effort! With everything masked up it was time to start to add some colour. Firstly, I applied a coat of Tamiya Ocean Grey, followed by several layers of the base colour, slightly lightened

with each pass. This was applied in a random fashion to add some tonal differences to the surface of the model. I then masked up some of the panels and around the frame of the cockpit glazing and then applied some dark grey to these various areas to add a little more visual interest.

Now it was the moment of truth to see if all those hours spent masking the wing panels had paid off, and I am happy to report it was worth the time and effort! With the paintwork almost completed all that was left to do was to paint the inner areas of the undercarriage bays with the same red brown I used on the inside of the cockpit walls. I then applied a pin-wash all over the model to pick out the details. A matt coat was then applied and with the final bits of masking tape removed from the cockpit glazing, and I could finally enjoy seeing this mean and menacing ship in all its glory.

TAMIYA he Velociraptor was a mid-sized dinosaur with adults measuring up to

2.07m long, 0.5m high at the hip, and weighing up to 45kg. The skull, which grew up to 25cm long, had jaws lined with 26-28 widely spaced teeth on each side, strongly serrated more on the back edge than on the front. Velociraptors had large hands with three strongly curved claws, which were similar in construction and flexibility to the wing bones of modern birds. The first digit of the foot, as in other theropods, was a small dewclaw. However, whereas most theropods had feet with three digits contacting the ground, Velociraptors walked on only their third and fourth digits. The second digit, for which Velociraptor is most famous, was highly modified and held retracted off the ground. It bore a relatively large, sickle-shaped claw, typical for that type of dinosaurs. This enlarged claw, which could grow to over 6.5cm long around its outer edge, was most likely a predatory device used to tear into or restrain struggling prey.

Well, that was a little on the Velociraptor. A dinosaur that has been made famous by 'Jurassic Park', where it in the early movies they were portrayed as bad guys, but in the later movies served as a somewhat unstable helper for the good guys. I bought a couple of sets of Tamiya Dinosaurs from a friend thinking it could be something to do for me and my youngest



daughter but like with many things they were forgotten until they were rediscovered in the far back corner of a cabinet. I thought about what I could use them for. As my daughter had lost some of her interest in modelling for now, I decided to have a look and see what I could use them for. Having seen the Jurassic Park movies a few too many times, an idea quickly formed in my brain. I realised I would have to locate a suiting target for my raptors and having had the opportunity to acquire a 3D printer a couple a months ago, I just needed to download a file and print it. Those resin 3D printers are a formidable ally, especially if you need extra stuff like that in somewhat of a hurry! I mean it may take a few hours to print, but you can just print one instead of buying a box of four or six figures and the results are amazing.


Black, NATO Green, and NATO Brown unevenly in blotches here and there using a brush. The weapons were painted Night Black. The side arm holster and all the straps were painted Israeli Sand Grey, and all the buckles and the boots had a coat of Rubber and Tyres. The face was painted Warm Skin Tone with a splash of Red Leather for hair. When all the paint was dry, he too got a coat of Aquagloss and was set aside to dry. The dinosaurs were treated to a wash, using Starship Filth to bring out all the skinfolds and scales, while the soldier had a Pacific Dust wash all over. When the washes were dry, any excess was wiped off and some matt varnish was applied. The figures were now ready, and all that was left was the base. A base like this was quite

an endeavour. Firstly, a piece



of wood was cut to size, then it was spray painted using clear lacquer from a rattle can. Next up was masking the edges, before mixing sand, brown primer, plaster, PVA and water together, then this was laid on and smoothed out. When dry I brushed on a mix of PVA and water before adding some grass using a static applicator. With the grass applied, the next step was to add some brush and a rock. The brush was premade like the static grass. The rock was just a pebble picked in the garden. I just glued them down with superglue, before adding the figures and gluing them too. As a finishing touch I added a drop of Aqua Gloss to the dinosaurs' eyes to make them sparkle in the light. So, what can I say about this build? It was simple, easy, and effective! And as an added bonus when I turn off the lights and shine a UV flashlight around the room, six eerie green eyes look at me from a shelf in my model cabinet!

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


The Grumman E-2 Hawkeye

he Grumman E-2 Hawkeye was designed and developed during the late 1950s and early 1960s for the US Navy as a replacement for the earlier, piston-engine E-1 Tracer, which was rapidly becoming obsolete. The E-2 was the first aircraft designed specifically for its role, as opposed to a modification of an existing airframe. The E-2A Hawkeye entered US Navy service in January 1964 and in April 1964 with VAW-11 at NAS North Island. The first deployment was aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk during 1965. Since entering combat during the Vietnam War, the E-2 has served the US Navy around the world, acting as the electronic 'eyes of the fleet'. In August 1981, a Hawkeye from VAW-124 Bear Aces directed two F-14 Tomcats from VF-41 Black Aces in an intercept mission in the Gulf of Sidra that resulted in the downing of two Libyan Sukhoi Su-22s. Hawkeyes from VAW-123 aboard the aircraft carrier USS America directed a group of F-14 Tomcat fighters flying the Combat Air Patrol during Operation El Dorado Canyon, the joint strike of two Carrier Battle Groups in the Mediterranean Sea against Libyan targets during 1986. More recently, E-2Cs provided the command and control for both aerial warfare and landattack missions during the Gulf War. Navy E-2Cs have been upgraded with eight-bladed propellers as part of the Hawkeye 2000 program, and the first squadron to cruise with the new propellers was VAW-124 'Bear Aces'. The Hawkeye 2000 version can track over 2,000 targets simultaneously while also detecting 20,000 targets to a range greater than 400 miles and simultaneously guide 40–100 air-to-air intercepts or air-to-surface engagements. In 2014, several E-2C Hawkeyes from the 'Bear Aces' were deployed from USS George HW Bush as flying command posts and air traffic controllers over Iraq during Operation 'Inherent Resolve' against the Islamic State. During Operation 'Enduring Freedom' and Operation 'Iraqi Freedom' all ten Regular Navy Hawkeye squadrons flew overland sorties, providing battle management, close-air-support coordination, and combat search and rescue duties. VAW-120, the E-2C fleet replacement squadron began receiving E-2D Advanced Hawkeyes for training use in July 2010, and on 27 March 2014, the first E-2Ds were delivered to VAW-125. The E-2D will play a larger role than that of the E-2C, with five E-2Ds aboard each carrier instead of four C-models. In smaller numbers of E-2s have been sold to the armed forces of Egypt, France, Israel, Japan, Mexico, Singapore and Taiwan. This 100-page full colour 'Blue Series' book looks in detail at the history and employment of the Hawkeye, with photographic references, walk arounds, and as the 'Real to Replica' title suggests there is a section on how to model the E-2 using Kinetic kits, making this book and ideal resource for both the enthusiast and scale modeller alike.



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















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
