



EIFION DAVIES BUILDS THE 1:24 REVELL F2003-GA AS MICHAEL SCHUMACHER'S 2003 WINNING RIDE

his kit is of Michael Schumacher's Ferrari, in which he won his 4th World Championship in a row in

2003, claiming his 6th overall. Not much was changed from the 2002 car, the aerodynamics were worked on and a new V10 engine was fitted to it. Driving this car, Schumacher took the title, finishing two points ahead of Kimi Raikkonen. This kit offers the option to finish it as Schumacher's car or as his teammate Rubens Barrichello who finished 4th in 2003.

IN THE BOX

The kit comes on three sprues with four tyres, two clear plastic pieces and the top



half of the car as a separate item. The first task was to cut all the parts from the sprues and clean them up. Considering this kit was tooled in 2004, it contained a fair bit of flash and some seam lines that needed cleaning up. But nothing too drastic that a few passes with a sharp blade and a few sweeps of some sanding sticks didn't fix.

PAINTING

I primed everything in Alclad II Grey Primer and Microfiller (ALC-302-60) and left them to dry for a couple of days. Once I was happy that it had all dried properly, I gave the bodyshell a light sanding, using some fine grit wet and dry to get rid of some dust that had settled onto the primer. I then proceeded to split all the parts up depending on the colour they needed to be painted. As this is an F1 Ferrari, 90% of the parts

























of the wings in white and suspension bits in black. Some parts that were the same colour were assembled at this stage to make painting a little easier, such as the engine and suspension parts. Apart from the main red itself I used Tamiya acrylic paints, thinned down with their own X20-A Thinners. For the striking Ferrari colour, I used Zero Paints Ferrari Red (ZP1007).

DECALS

The kit went together fairly easily, but it needed a lot of decals to be added as it was being built, especially around the suspension area, and here is where a lot of carbon fibre decals were placed. Most of these needed to be applied before assembly, due to the intricacies of the various arms and struts. Most of the other decals, apart from the main body ones, also needed placing before assembly. The ones on the front and rear wing are shaped so that the wing can be glued into place through slots in the





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

very now and then I see a kit advertised, which says to me 'I need one', even though prior to the advert

the subject is one I had never heard of. This little three-wheel van definitely falls into this category. I like to build unusual subjects and this van is that, with the added bonus of being rather cute too. So, after a quick chat with the Editor a sample was acquired, and my build could begin. (I have since purchased the pickup version to enjoy too). So, what do we find inside the top opening box? We have seven sprues of injection moulded plastic, one clear sprue, a cardboard slip case with the photo-etched brass fret and decals and in the bottom of the box is a full colour instruction booklet. I spent some time going through the instruction book to identify as many subassemblies that could be assembled before any painting was needed. To this end I chose to build the all grey Deutsche Reichsbahn version, as the interior and exterior grey were the same.

The cab, minus the firewall/windscreen was assembled and joined to the van body, the cab doors were assembled, but left off and until the end. The rear axle assembly was added to the underside of the van body at this stage too. I also assembled the engine and front 'axle' at this time and glued it to the firewall. The three two-part wheels were also assembled but left off until the end. The bonnet with its etched brass grille and catches was also assembled ready for spraying. With the model in these sections, it was time to think about some paint, I didn't prime this one, but I went straight in with Tamiya German Grey. The seat was then picked out with a suitable leather brown (Vallejo Saddle Brown 70940). Other details were picked out in my 'go to' black for

brush painting, Abaddon Black from Games Workshop. There is one decal for the single instrument dial, which was added, and the glass was simulated with a drop of Micro Kristal Klear. I dry brushed the interior with Games Workshop Mechanicus Standard Grey, which is just a shade lighter than the Tamiya German Grey.

With the internals all painted, the cab was then fully assembled. The top half of the cab doors are clear plastic, so this needs to be carefully masked to represent the door frame. Prior to masking the clear parts I had

TRUMPRIE

he Flakpanther is an odd piece of history. There is much argument on whether this was indeed a real

planned German Armour, aka a 'Paper Panzer' – something that was designed but never realised fruition due to the end of the War, or whether it was just a 'What If?' design. Essentially, it is a Panther hull with a Rheintochter launcher and missile attached on top. Either way, it is an interesting design, and I was up for a new challenge!

THE KIT

As per most kits by Trumpeter in this scale, the kit went together well. The lower half (the Panther portion of the build) was very fast to assemble but things slowed right down once I got into the upper half. The launcher itself is very detailed with lots of levers, wheels and small parts that take a long time to assemble. Most of the assembly time was spent on this section but was worth it in the end as the detail is well presented. With this kit, you get a copper wire tow cable, but in my case, it was missing from the box. I had some thin gauge wire that I cut to length and then twisted together to create my own. This was then shaped around the hull and fixed into place using CA Glue. The final part of the assembly was the tracks. The tracks that

> come with this kit are plastic and individual links, so I gave it a go and assembled them in a

track jig. About halfway through the second length, I knocked over a bottle of Extra Thin Cement that I was working with and fused the length together much to my chagrin. Frustration got the better of me and I then opted for a much better solution, aftermarket resin tracks that clicked together. So instead of spending hours cutting out and assembling the kit tracks, I had two sets assembled within ten minutes. With all the assembly done, it was time to paint.

PAINTING

The colour guide in the instructions depicts a standard late war three colour camouflage pattern used by the Wehrmacht. To begin with, everything was primed with SMS Surfacer Grey and then followed with a layer of German Red Brown. The German Red Brown acts as the red primer colour to

help give a slightly warmer tone to the next layers, in particular the German Sand Yellow layer that was applied next. With that done, the next two colours, German Dark Brown and then German Olive, were all done free hand using the airbrush, following the colour guide as a reference to where the patterns of the camouflage would go. Once those two colours were on, I went back again and went over the edges to tidy them up. To do this, I thinned the paint down an extra 20% and dropped the PSI to 10 and sprayed in close to get fine, sharper lines to make the pattern look more natural. The Rheintochter was painted using close matching colours in the supplied colour guide, with Dark Brown 6K used for the fins, and with Barley Grey, Marigold Orange, and Dark Bronze for the body. As I could also remove the tracks, they were painted separately to the tank itself, with a base of Camouflage Black and

then Gunmetal on top. The Gunmetal gave the tracks a bare steel look which would be covered up with weathering in the next part of the build.

WEATHERING

For the overall look, I wanted the Flakpanther to appear worn and used, but not damaged. To do this, I utilised several weathering techniques. First up, using a small piece of foam, I applied chipped paint around the edges using the German Red Brown that was used earlier for the base colour. I decanted a small amount of the paint from the bottle and left it sit for ten-minutes or so to allow some of the carrier thinners to evaporate and thicken up the paint. I then dipped the foam into the paint, dabbed it onto some paper towel to remove the excess, and then carefully and strategically dabbed the sponge to areas

that would have most likely seen wear and tear just from general everyday use. With that done, I then repeated the chipping process, but this time using a fine tipped brush and Silver. I carefully went around and randomly painted on the silver inside the Red Brown chips. Doing this gives the impression that the paint has not only worn through to primer in some sections but also down to bare metal in others. At this point, the Silver looked very bright in comparison to the rest of the chips, but that would be toned down in the next weathering steps.

DETAILING

A general wash was applied all over the kit using SMS Brown oil-based Wash to highlight the recesses and details. The same Wash was then applied more carefully and thoughtfully around some of the edges and chipped areas and then pulled downwards using the paint brush to simulate a build up of dirt and grime that has been washed

away with rain, leaving streaks and stains behind. The final part of the weathering required the Flakpanther to be mounted in place on it's base. I wanted something very simple for the base, so opted for a small board which was coated in air drying clay. With the

clay still soft, I used the plastic tracks that I had accidentally ruined earlier in the build as a texture stamp and pushed them down into the clay to get the track imprints. With that done, it was set aside for a few hours to dry.



THE BASE

Painting the base was very quick and simple. The entire base including the edges, was painted in Camouflage Black. I then masked the edges and applied German Dark Brown all over and then highlighted with Dark Brown 6K, a lighter shade of brown. With the base done, the tracks were glued to the running wheels and then to the base

itself using 5-Minute Epoxy Glue, making sure that the treads sat inside the imprints made on the base. To dirty the wheels. I used SMS Dark Earth Weathering Pigment along with the SMS Brown Wash to create a slurry that

could be brushed and splattered on to the running wheels, gears, and lower guards. Then using SMS Pigment Fixer, created larger clumps of mud on the underside of the tank and guards. I sat the pigment onto the model where I wanted it to be, and then used a pipette to transfer a little bit of Pigment Fixer to the pigment. The Fixer then soaked into the pigment and once it was dry, the pigment held strong and kept the shape of built-up mud and dirt. As a final step for the weathering, static grass was applied around the edges and into the tracks along with an extra application of the Pigment/ Wash slurry to give the look of wet mud trapped in the tracks with the grass which is why I needed to have the tank fixed to the base so I could weather them together. And with that, the Flakpanther was complete!

I generally build smaller scale military subjects, so going larger and build something in 1:35was enjoyable (even though the Rheintochter

launcher was a pain to assemble!). This build ended up on display at the 2020 Australian Toy Fair (a trade only exhibition) at the stand of the Australian distributors of Trumpeter and now resides in their offices!

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

The completed model was now primed with a base coat of Tamiya Fine Primer from a rattle can and then pre-shaded with some Ammo by Mig Black Primer. I chose the

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The SAAB JAS 39 Gripen

he Saab JAS 39 'Gripen' or 'Griffin' forms the primary fighter wing of the Swedish Air Force along with a several other nations. The Gripen is a highly-advanced multi-role aircraft utilising the latest in digital controls and weapons delivery, all the while being produced in a modestly sized and highly streamlined package to strict Swedish Air Force requirements. The JAS 39 has been in operational service since 1997 after a relatively long development period and over 240 of the type have been produced in single-seat and twin-seat forms. The Gripen remains one of the most potent advanced lightweight fighter designs, and is able to undertake a variety of mission roles from air defence to interception, ground attack to armed reconnaissance as well as training. By the end of the 1970s, the Swedish Air Force found itself looking to advance their frontline fighter capabilities over that of the aging Saab Drakens and Viggens. The Draken, with its unique double-delta wing and single-engine design, was introduced in March of 1960 and managed a successful, if modest, existence with several air forces, being produced in 644 examples from 1955 to 1974. The Draken was developed to replace the outgoing Saab J29 Tunnan fighters. Comparatively, the Viggen made its presence known in June of 1971 to which 329 examples were produced from 1970 to 1990. The type was developed as a broader solution to undertake interception, strike and reconnaissance roles and sported a more conventional delta wing profile with forward canards and a single engine design. Work on their replacement began in 1979 with studies undertaken in 1980 to produce a modern end-product worthy of Swedish Air Force needs that could undertake a plethora of required battlefield roles. In 1981, a consortium was formed that involved Saab, Volvo Aero Corporation, Ericsson/GEC-Marconi and FFV Aerotech to design, develop and produce various portions of the aircraft. The end result became produced the JAS 39A Gripen fighter and the JAS 39B two-seat trainer, and then the updated JAS 39C, followed by a redesign producing the F39E/F. The Gripen has a very sleek design incorporating a large-area, rear-set delta-wing configuration, removing the need for horizontal tailplanes while increasing internal fuel loads and external weapons-carrying capabilities. The wings were low-mounted on a slab-sided tubular fuselage frame to which the gently sloped nose cone capped the front end. Under the nose cone was the powerful search-and-tracking facility that allowed for 'look-down/ shoot-down' capability and multiple target 'track-while-scan' and target assessment, all delivered to the pilot in real-time. The Gripen can carry a huge variety of air to air and air to ground variety of weaponry as well reconnaissance pods and is currently in service with the Swedish Air Force as well as the air arms of Hungary, South Africa, Thailand, and Brazil, with other potential operators on the horizon. This 100-page full colour 'Blue Series' book looks in detail at the history and employment of the Gripen, with photographic references, walk arounds, and as the 'Real to Replica' title suggests there is a section on how to model the Gripen in popular scales, making this book and ideal resource for both the enthusiast and scale modeller alike.

and schemes, so much so, I will buy a set of decals, then buy a kit to suit said decals. So, this build is of the HobbyBoss 1:48 Antonov AN-2/AN-2CX Colt, with Bombshell Decals set named An-2 Colt Warsaw Pact, 'Girls Gone Wild'. I also added a Yahu instrument panel, Armory Models resin wheels, Quickboost resin engine, air intake and oil radiator, exhaust, cowl flaps and SBS Model flat rigging wires.

THE BUILD

The build started with the cockpit, making control yokes, foot pedals and seats. I added some aluminium foil for harnesses. I painted the cockpit section Mr. Hobby H56 Intermediate Blue as per call out. The centre

instrument panel was painted black, other colours were hand painted in. The Yahu instrument panel was added last. The build then shifted to the cargo section, so a floor, rear bulkhead, and a ceiling. There is an option for the seats in the rear to be stowed or out. I put them out. This section was painted Mr. Hobby H58 Interior Green, some dry brushing was added with a natural steel colour for wear on the floor. The cockpit

section and the cargo section were than glued together.

FUSELAGE

The fuselage halve interiors were painted, then the porthole windows were glued in. I decided I would glue the cargo door in the shut position as the hinges on the door did not look right for an open display, so yes, all that interior work won't be seen, but as modellers like to say, 'I know it's there', I also have the pictures of it. The fuselage was glued together, and pleasantly, no fit issues were experienced with that large interior section. The engine cowl section was made up next, replacing the kit cowl flaps and

engine with the resin replacements. The engine was painted with AK Interactive Xtreme Metal Dark Aluminium. The cowl section was added to the fuselage, and I then used Tamiya White Putty to take care of seam lines that needed tending to. While this dried, I made up the tail section and lower and upper wing pieces.

TAIL SECTION

Once I had cleaned up the seam lines, the tail section was added, leaving of the stabiliser struts for easy painting. I added the lower wing to the fuselage, here I had a step at the front wing to fuselage. Scraping and sanding was applied here to get a flush surface. The upper wing pieces were left off for painting as well as the wing struts. The

canopy comes in two pieces, I masked them with Tamiya tape, and glued them in position, they were a great fit. Worth noting



right!" It was way off from the illustration on the decal sheet, although decal sheets are often out with pictures. I went to Google, and looked up East German AN-2 Colts, and fortunately I found two pictures of this aircraft. Here, total guesswork was used. The grey looked more like a black green to my eyes, so Mr Color C18 RLM70 Black Green was used. On the tail, there is a band of Field Drab either side. AK Real Color RC085 Field Drab was used here. The engine cowl has an antiglare panel of black, and another black panel is on the bottom. Tamiya XF-69 NATO Black was used for these.

decals were applied. These went down well using Micro Sol to set them. I gave the model a wash of Flory Models Dark Dirt Wash, wiping it right back so it highlighted panel lines and rivet details. The upper wings were glued in place, struts were glued on, all fitting well. I painted the flat rigging wires on their sprue, cut to length, using CA glue to set them in place. There is no mention of rigging in the instructions,

so I used online photos to get positions and

in the navigation lights, bringing the build to conclusion. Although I got a little frustrated with the paint

scheme, I enjoyed the build. The kit goes together well and is a large model with a wingspan of 38cm, so it will take up some room. I have no doubt that I am off somewhat with my colours, I can live with that, it is definitely

an eye-catching scheme, standing out on the display shelf amongst more traditional camouflage schemes.







IAN GASKELL HAS FUN WITH THE FREEDOM MODELS MIG-21 DUO SET

FREEDOM MODELS

've discovered that the rise in Egg Planes, Toon Tanks, and other caricature type models, seems to have

divided modellers opinions. Love them or hate them, there are an ever-increasing number about, and from an increasing number of kit producers. Personally, I like them. I also love MiG's. So, when Freedom Models released a MiG-21 duo set, for their Compact Series, I had to get them! The set comes with a pair of MiG-21's, an MF/Bis looking variant, and a UM 2 seat variant. They also come with caricature pilots too. As these are a bit of fun, don't expect huge amounts of accurate detail. The cockpit is very sparse, but you do get decals for the main instrument panels. You also get a choice of fuel tanks, missiles, and rocket pods. The cockpits were painted with Akan's Emerald Green (for MiG cockpits), and the decals applied. A little bit of Ammo wash helped just to give some dimension to the tubs.

BUILDING

Now the fuselage halves were cemented together. The fit was very good, just some filling and sanding on the underside was required. There are two different tail sections included, one for the MF/Bis, and one for the UM. These were glued, along with the wings, and the horizontal stabilisers. The undercarriage was also glued, as the struts are quite basic looking, so they could be brush painted toward the end. Next the pilot figures were assembled, although I did find that their legs needed 'shortening', in order to get seated right.

MiG-21 Duo Set

Their flight suits were painted olive drab, and their helmets white. They were then given a coat or two of Alclad Aqua Gloss, and a light oil wash. The excess was cleaned off, once dry, and some matte varnish was applied. Lastly, a light dry brush with some of Ammo by Mig Light Green Dry Brush Paint finished them off. The pilots were cemented in place within the cockpits. The canopies were masked using Tamiya tape, then glued in place. I used some Mr Hobby masking fluid to cover any gaps in the tape, just to be on the safe side.

PAINTING

Now it's time to start the painting stage. Firstly, I primed the fuel tanks (for the UM) and missiles (for the MF/Bis) and put them to one side. Then I primed the two airframes, using Alclad's black primer, with microfiller, and left them to dry until the following day. I then used some fine micromesh cloth to gently wipe over the




























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

3D PRINTING AND PAINTING

After waiting for about seven hours the printer hadn't let me down, and it had done its thing and I was greeted with a complete bust of Uncle Fester, and the resemblance to Christopher Lloyd was uncanny! Painting the model should be quite straightforward, and firstly I primed the model with black and then followed with a very light mist coat of white directed from above this creates an imaginary light source which will help when painting highlights and shadows. I started the painting process proper around face, and firstly I applied a medium skin tone over the entire area, as I wanted to face the to be quite pale in comparison to a normal skin tone. I then added varying amounts of white, and ivory layers of the base skin tone which helped to create some contours to the very pale one. Once I was happy with the overall look, I then dry brushed on some ivory and white to really make the folds and creases in the facial expression even more prominent.

I then turned my attention to in the dark patches around the eye sockets. So, using my airbrush at a very low pressure and trying to keep as neat and tidy as possible I built up in several layers until I had the desired look. All that was left for the facial features then was

paint the eyeballs. For this I used a slight off-white shade, as I felt pure white would be too intense, especially for the whites of the eyes. Using the finest paintbrush, I have I carefully hand painted the pupil and iris of the eye and added a small dab of white to add a glint to the eves. His overcoat was simply brush painted using black this was then dry brushed with several shades of grey to highlight the creases and folds.

FINISHING OFF

The base was painted in a dark grey with a light dry brushing of bronze to pick out the raised details on the name plaque and the sharp edges of the base. This is a nice contrast I think to the overall look. The model received a coat of gloss varnish

washes. I then applied a reddish-brown wash to the creases and crevices of the face; the coat also received some dark brown washes in the creases to add some shadows. A final matt varnish was applied to the entire model, I then added some clear varnish to the eyeballs to give them more of a realistic look with a piercing stare. As far as 3D printing goes for me, I think this was a great success for my first FDM print from the new Elegoo Neptune 2S I look forward to my next weird and wonderful project off this machine and I hope you do too.

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Space Marines

ADAM CHALLINGER TAKES A LOOK AT THE MCFARLANE TOYS WARHAMMER SEVEN-INCH SPACE MARINES RANGE

MCFARLANE TOYS

n my younger days I loved the Space Marines from the Warhammer 40K world. I remember I had the board game 'Space Crusade', but I was never into actually playing the game, but was always interested in the figures! So, I guess I was just more into the modelling and painting side of things. In 2020 it was announced that McFarlane, a company well known for making action figures, would work with Games Workshop and their Warhammer brand to bring some seven-inch scale Warhammer 40K action figures to market. This new line would feature fully painted standard figures and also some unpainted artists proofs that could be taken apart and hand painted by collectors, very much aligned to the hobby and the painting of the original 25mm miniatures.

In this article, I'll be taking look at three of these figures, and first up is a 'Primaris Assault Intercessor Space Marine'. To start, I must admit I was surprised how heavy the figures actually were, as the main bodies are cast in a solid grey, somewhat flexible plastic. I watched a quick YouTube tutorial for tips on how to take the Marines apart, and I had to soak them in hot water to make the plastic more workable. They then came apart using some moderate force. Most of the pieces had ball joints, as you would expect from action figures.

Once they were disassembled, there was a little bit of clean-up of mould lines needed, then I was able to prime all the parts using UMP Grey Primer. I then had to decide what colours to paint them, as there are out of the hundreds, possibly thousands of chapters to choose from with so many different colours! For the first one I chose the Imperial Fists, with their bold yellow colour with black trim. I mainly use Citadel colours, which do require thinning quite a bit when used































For the painting of the main colours and used Averland Sunset for the yellow. After that, and with some careful masking for brushwork, I painted all the black parts with Abadon Black.

I then shaded some of the parts with a very thinned down dark orange colour, and then highlighted the edges of the parts that would catch the light, and then painted the detail parts such as the eyes. I printed out some Imperial Fist logos and to paint onto the shoulder pads. I also decided I would only do some minimal weathering and battle damage. That was pretty much it, a very quick job, which made a nice change from my usual projects! Once I'd put the marine together it looked really good, and I was happy with how it came out. I then bought a round wooden base off eBay, painted it black and used the Citadel technical paint called Astrogranite to


shoulder pads, the skulls on the backpack and chest piece, and a new Bolter rifle, which i preferred the look of. It can take a bit of searching for the right files but being free, they were certainly worth it. The shoulder pads have raised details, which made painting easier and was a bonus not having to mask the chapter logos. The main colour was Macagge Blue with Liberator Gold highlights. For the base this time I used The AK Interactive Terrain Sandy Desert. Gives a really nice desert sand effect.

For the third and final Marine, I chose one form the White Scars, and did the same as above for prepping for painting but added a base coat of Tamiya XF-2. I upped the game again on this one and printed a rather large banner, which some Marines have attached to their backpacks. It took a few tries to get the print right, but I think it was worth the time and effort. I also printed a sniper rifle; this time and I also

wax skulls with the scroll hanging off). I then went back to the previous figures and added some of these too. For this base I used Martian Ironcrust from Citadel. It looked similar to a Mars base, which suited the red on the Marine.

McFarlane have started releasing more Warhammer figures lately, including Chaos Marines and Orcs, and I'll certainly be revisiting these and painting more in the future. If you have even the slight interest in Warhammer, then these figures are really nice projects to work on and look great when finished.







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


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Jagdpanther Tank Destroyer


he Consolidated B-24 Liberator was almost certainly the most versatile Second World War Bomber. Apart from its bombing role in all theatres of operation, the B-24 hauled fuel to France during the push towards Germany, carried troops, fought U-boats in the Atlantic and, probably most important of all, made a vital contribution towards winning the war in the Pacific. Its most famous single exploit is possibly the raid on the Ploesti oilfields in August 1943. The B-24 ended World War Two as the most produced Allied heavy bomber in history, and the most produced American military aircraft at over 18,000 units, thanks in large measure to Henry Ford and the harnessing of American industry. It still holds the distinction as the most produced American military aircraft. The B-24 was used by several Allied air forces and navies, and by every branch of the American armed forces during the war, attaining a distinguished war record with its operations in the Western European, Pacific, Mediterranean and China-Burma-India theatres.

Built around the chassis of the Austin K30 light truck, the casualty compartment was developed in conjunction with the Royal Army Medical Corps and therefore proved to be highly functional. Able to carry either four stretcher cases or ten seated casualties, one of the main reasons why the K2/Y was so successful was because it was so rugged and reliable, requiring only a minimum of maintenance - an ambulance should always be ready when you need it.


The rear cabin was typically constructed of painted canvas on a timber frame, with the highly visible red cross on a white disk

positioned prominently on all sides to hopefully ensure the vehicles occupants didn't come under fire.

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The SAAB JAS 39 Gripen

he Saab JAS 39 'Gripen' or 'Griffin' forms the primary fighter wing of the Swedish Air Force along with a several other nations. The Gripen is a highly-advanced multi-role aircraft utilising the latest in digital controls and weapons delivery, all the while being produced in a modestly sized and highly streamlined package to strict Swedish Air Force requirements. The JAS 39 has been in operational service since 1997 after a relatively long development period and over 240 of the type have been produced in single-seat and twin-seat forms. The Gripen remains one of the most potent advanced lightweight fighter designs, and is able to undertake a variety of mission roles from air defence to interception, ground attack to armed reconnaissance as well as training. By the end of the 1970s, the Swedish Air Force found itself looking to advance their frontline fighter capabilities over that of the aging Saab Drakens and Viggens. The Draken, with its unique double-delta wing and single-engine design, was introduced in March of 1960 and managed a successful, if modest, existence with several air forces, being produced in 644 examples from 1955 to 1974. The Draken was developed to replace the outgoing Saab J29 Tunnan fighters. Comparatively, the Viggen made its presence known in June of 1971 to which 329 examples were produced from 1970 to 1990. The type was developed as a broader solution to undertake interception, strike and reconnaissance roles and sported a more conventional delta wing profile with forward canards and a single engine design. Work on their replacement began in 1979 with studies undertaken in 1980 to produce a modern end-product worthy of Swedish Air Force needs that could undertake a plethora of required battlefield roles. In 1981, a consortium was formed that involved Saab, Volvo Aero Corporation, Ericsson/GEC-Marconi and FFV Aerotech to design, develop and produce various portions of the aircraft. The end result became produced the JAS 39A Gripen fighter and the JAS 39B two-seat trainer, and then the updated JAS 39C, followed by a redesign producing the F39E/F. The Gripen has a very sleek design incorporating a large-area, rear-set delta-wing configuration, removing the need for horizontal tailplanes while increasing internal fuel loads and external weapons-carrying capabilities. The wings were low-mounted on a slab-sided tubular fuselage frame to which the gently sloped nose cone capped the front end. Under the nose cone was the powerful search-and-tracking facility that allowed for 'look-down/ shoot-down' capability and multiple target 'track-while-scan' and target assessment, all delivered to the pilot in real-time. The Gripen can carry a huge variety of air to air and air to ground variety of weaponry as well reconnaissance pods and is currently in service with the Swedish Air Force as well as the air arms of Hungary, South Africa, Thailand, and Brazil, with other potential operators on the horizon. This 100-page full colour 'Blue Series' book looks in detail at the history and employment of the Gripen, with photographic references, walk arounds, and as the 'Real to Replica' title suggests there is a section on how to model the Gripen in popular scales, making this book and ideal resource for both the enthusiast and scale modeller alike.



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
