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

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

he Porsche 935 Turbo was based on the Porsche 930 Turbo, a commercial road-car launched in 1974. The engine – famously mounted on the rear – was an air-cooled, horizontally opposed six-cylinder unit that was downsized from a displacement of 2,992cc in the road car vehicle to 2,857cc. By

increasing the boost pressure of the turbocharger, the 935 could generate 590bhp. Although it made his debut win in the opening round of the Mugello six-hour race in March 1976 and won the second round at Barrelunga, the air-cooled intercooler was found to be in violation of the rules and was forced to be converted to a water-cooled type.

IN 1:12 MODEL-FORM

Tamiya's 1:12 Porsche 935 Martini was originally released back in 1977 and it instantly became an object of desire for model car fanatics across the globe. The kit included a full engine with detailed engine bay and, perhaps even more exciting than the engine, a full depiction of the fibre-glass fuel tank up




















front, moulded in translucent, off white plastic that looked supremely realistic and unusual.

The detail included in this huge kit was breathtaking and in 2009. Tamiya upped their game again with the inclusion of photo etched parts for the brake disc faces, intake and radiator grilles, seat harness buckles, body catches and more. This 2020 is a re-issue of that magnificent package, giving modellers a second chance to add this stunning Tamiya classic to their collection.

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

t is eighty years since the beginning of the massive confrontation between the RAF and the Luftwaffe. named the 'Battle of Britain' by Winston Churchill. How should the plastic modeller celebrate this milestone in a human history? I think building Supermatine Spitfire, or rather a 1:48 model of one, is the right thing to do. Due to lack of time, I decided to go for an older (and now, very affordable) kit: there are just two beautiful sprues in the box, what more do you need at this hectic time?

As always, I start by choosing the markings. In the magazine 'Polish Wings' (No.06) I found very interesting photo of Spitfire Mk.I from No.152 Squadron RAF. Following this pattern, I drew and cut masks to spray the markings. I added lead wire cabling to the cockpit, which I then painted with Mr Hobby paints, finishing the details with a brush using AMMO and Vallejo acrylics. For this particular project I used dial decals from MDC on the instrument panel. The scratches were drawn with Prismacolor pencils and AMMO oil paints and further weathering was achieved with a Tamiya weathering set.

I decided to improve riveting detail on the exterior surfaces of the Spitfire to get a better result from the painting stages. For this task I used Tamiya's scriber and Petr Dousek's Rosie the Riveter tool. Then I glued the model together. I used putty only on the **D**






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

• underside side along the joint of the fuselage and wings. I created the overlap on the tank cover from adhesive aluminium foil. Except this, everything fits perfectly - a typical Tamiya kit in a good way. After sanding, I had to re-instate the lost engraving and rivets on the exterior.

To prime the model, I used Mr. Surfacer applied with an airbrush. The priming unifies different materials and is helpful in revealing surface imperfections, followed by a spray of silver colour on the wing/fuselage joint. I sprayed AMMO scratches over the top of this silver colour, then I proceeded with the painting. 'Sky' colour from Mr Hobby was used on the lower surfaces and then I used browns from Mr Hobby and greens from Tamiya on the upper surfaces. Using water and a metal toothpick, I created scratches, referring to photos for accuracy.

For spraying national insignia, code letters and serial numbers, I used the aforementioned masks. I sprayed the wing walkways using PE templates from Atol Hobby. Weathering was created with a combination of airbrushed Tamiya paints, oil paints and 'Grime' Shader from AMMO. Some minor scratches were formed with Prismacolor pencils. The antenna was made from Uschi van der Rosten's 'Rig that thing' elastic rigging. I'm very satisfied with the result. It is quite clear that you can build a decent piece of plastic model even out of this twenty-seven year old kit. I'm lucky to have many more great Tamiya kits in my possession!

ased only on the lower hull and suspension of existing Tamiya Pz.IV kits, the rest of this Ausf.F variant is newly tooled and will come with three excellent figures. The Pz.Kpfw.IV Ausf. F had reinforced armour and updated hull designs, as well as a short-barrelled, KwK37 7.5 cm tank gun. 471 examples of this variant rolled off of the production lines at Krupp-Gruson, Vomag and Nibelungenwerke, serving on the Eastern front as Germany battled with the Red Army in the Soviet Union and in the Western Allies in North Africa. In-depth research at the German Tank Museum in Munster, Germany contributed to this highly accurate kit, which

features brand new parts. with only the lower hull and wheels being existing mouldings. It's very hard to distinguish the difference between these 1990s parts from the new additions, such was the high quality of the mouldings back then. This kit is easy to build whilst being highly detailed and accurate, the perfect combination, surely? Full-build article coming soon to Tamiya Model Magazine! ●



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Robert Riley goes green with the Alpha Models 1:24 Lamborghini Centenario Roadster 770

lpha Model are fast becoming the go-to maker for high-end sports car modelling these days in the multi-media market. They offer an expanding catalogue of sports cars, each superbly cast using conventional and 3D print methods. Most kits also feature large amounts of photo-etched and CNC-turned metal parts to up the detail levels. One of their latest releases is the super-exotic and very limited Lamborghini Centenario Roadster LP770. In the real world, production ran from 2016-2017 with only twenty Coupes and twenty roadsters ever to see the light of day, costing the owner around a cool \$3.7 million. Shall I have four? No, I think I'll just take the 1:24 replica thank you. Let's dive into that blue box and get started... •

After a quick tidy-up, all body parts were dry-fitted and accounted for. Superb casting and sharp design definitely shouts out here

O WHAT'S IN THE BOX?

The contents are safely packaged holding various engine components, internal details, brake system parts, a sheet of decals, metal suspension components, an array of photo-etched parts and several instructional sheets to guide us on our way. It's clear that Alpha Model have pulled out all the stops with this one, so I was very much looking forward to the challenge. A dry fit of each area shows very promising results, with

most parts fitting effectively and as they should. Some clean-up – with a bit of jostling about - is required to get the parts to marry comfortably but then that's to be expected when working with this type of medium. Once I had prepped all parts, they received a good bath in warm soapy water to wash away any dust particles and oils remaining on the surfaces. Zero Paints light grey primer was airbrushed over all castings then left to harden overnight.



This is one hell of an aggressive rear diffuser, there's no escaping its presence. Amazingly (apart from two pieces), Alpha Model have cast this large area in one part

Ultra narrow masking tape is incredibly useful for many painting tasks. Cutting perfectly even and consistent I mm strips from wider tape is surprisingly difficult, so having no less than eighteen meters of the stuff to hand is invaluable. Sure, narrow-width masking tape has been available for years, but Tamiya have added discs of protective clear plastic either side of the roll of tape, keep the edges clean and crisp, a genius move. 1 mm (82706) 2mm (82707) 3mm (82708).











Body prep using a 2000-grit Abralon disc pad. These are superb sanding tools to use as they are soft which enables the user to follow panel contours safely whilst minimising the risk of pressure marks

The next stages were crucial as the primer finish will reflect on the paint finish later. So it's always worth spending that extra time on primer, sanding, more primer, more sanding: it doesn't matter how many layers we do, so long as we obtain the best outcome. The final layers of primer were in white to give the base colour a good head start. Talking of colours, it's a Lamborghini, so it's gotta be bold and eye-catching. My choice for this purpose was Zero Paints colour-matched 'Verde Mantis', a bright green with pearl pigment to help catch the light. It's a gorgeous colour that suits the shape of the car perfectly. Several layers

were applied, then left to cure for the next stages.

COLOUR ON...

Masking was the next stop and lots of it too: front window frame with scuttle panel, front bonnet vents, rear engine panel and air scoops, internal rear rests, door runners and finally around those huge lower vents on each side. My colour of choice for this was a black I'd used previously on a Ducati 1199 Nero, a specially-mixed Zero Paint colour with a pearl fleck, as I felt this would compliment the green nicely. This was applied to all other areas where black was called out. Once complete, the nervous de-masking moment came around (I'm always apprehensive at this point). Thankfully – and much to my relief – there was

no colour bleed, leaving a perfect contrast of black and bright green. 🖸



Once the paint was mixed thoroughly it was poured into the paint cup. With its fine pearl pigment, this colour looks amazing under bright light




After base colour work was complete, all areas were masked over leaving the exposed sections to be airbrushed in black. Time consuming, but well worth it

MECHANICALLY INTERNAL

A dry fit of the engine and internal components was next and to help the finer details stand out. combination of metallic colours and various black finishes were employed. The turned metal components included in the kit are for the rear inner shock absorbers and they compliment the area nicely. For some reason Alpha model had designed two coolant bottles for the rear. This is actually wrong as the car (which is built and based on the Aventador SV chassis) only has one and it's on the left. The other side should be a fuse box, so this was cut out and a new part scratchbuilt to represent this component. Aftermarket details added include various sized and styled rivets, self-templated carbon pattern and bare-metal heat shield foil from MFH scattered around the engine bay. The whole area was painted using Tamiya's LP range and Zero metallic finishes.





COMPOSITE INTERIOR?


To carbon, or not to carbon? There's no escaping the visual aspect of the roadster's cabin as the car has no roof. So I felt this is one area I'd really work on. My colours of choice for the leather were Zero's Rubber Black and the gorgeous Ferrari Bordeaux red leather colour. The seat edges and various other leather components would be picked out with yellow piping which are decals included with the Alpha Models kit. Scale Motorsport's Twill Weave carbon-fibre-effect decal was applied to both door cards and various centre console displays to finish up. This was all clear-coated in Zero's Semi-Gloss Clear to neutralise the sheen and seal all the work up.

All carbon-fibre areas on the chassis were masked off, leaving the exposed portions to be airbrushed in the Bordeaux Red. This was



masked off along with all adjoining parts, leaving the exposed areas to be covered with fine flocking material from the Scale Production

team. The interior and engine component-work came out really well and I couldn't have been happier, so it was now time to marry it with the body. The red/ black leather interior worked nicely along side the Verde Mantis body colour, a match made in Italy!



One of the main colours of choice for the interior was a Zero Paints Bordeaux Ferrari red leather mix. A nice deep shade with a satin finish



After all the previous colour and carbon work was complete, it was time to mask everything over again and add the carpet. Scale Production's Anthracite Flocking Powder was perfect for the job and gave convincing results



Cabin work progress. The black, red leather and carbon covered panels contrast nicely with yellow accents and centre console detail



Seating arrangement: black gloss backed seats with Bordeaux red leather trim and yellow edged piping to finish up. The piping were decals included with the kit



All components from engine to cabin were now fitted into their respective positions. The door cards would be glued into place after the body shell was married to the chassis

WHEELS, BRAKES AND ANYTHING ELSE

I wanted the wheels to stand out and work well with the bodywork, so I opted for silver centre spokes, an anthracite main hub and gloss silver outer edge. Peering in through

the wheels is usually a dark place so felt I some bright red brake callipers would do the trick to help an otherwise bland area stand out. I say 'bland' area, but in reality, each wheel hub on all four corners holds a huge carbon ceramic brake


disc so hardly bland.. These were detailed using the photo-etched parts included in the box and painted in Zero's carbon ceramic grey colour for added realism. Once the brake set-up was complete, the whole system, plus wheels, were fitted to all corners. To finish up, final details including radiator faces, window frames, the windows themselves, wipers, plus marrying the front and rear bumpers to the main body, wheels, mirrors and logos were applied and all was finished!

The whole section is now complete and ready for the final fit. The supplied synthetic rubber tyres are moulded beautifully, adding that final touch to a really fun area to work on



These wheels are great, a superb design from Alpha Model. The real car has these in carbon too so maybe, a good challenge for those of you out there to add your own twist



This is my second Alpha Models build and one that was thoroughly enjoyable! It's a comprehensive kit with all major areas covered, from engine to interior, using a range of media. The curves and angles are captured beautifully by the Alpha team. Also available is the Coupe version of the this car and is definitely worth a look too. For me, the only negative aspect are the windows and was the same for the previous 1:18 version. Although they are nicely pre-printed, they are pretty thick and were frustrating at times to work with. My advice and what I found worked best. was to really heat them up and manipulate to shape. Overall I'd definitely build another Alpha Model as they are a great challenge and cover some interesting subjects.

n June 22nd 1941, on the eastern frontiers of the Teutonic Empire, the conquest of 'living space' for the Germanic people began: the operation was codenamed 'Barbarossa'. However, for the Soviet people it was the beginning of the 'Great Patriotic War'. After the successes of the Blitzkrieg in Poland and Western Europe, the German tankers were to experience an unpleasant surprise in

the territory of the Great Bear. The first was, of course, the T-34 medium tank, while the second was the KV-1 heavy tank (KV: Kliment Voroshilov, the tank's designer). The vehicle was built in 1939 and was produced at the Leningrad Kirov Plant, as well as at the Chelyabinsk Tractor Plant.

The construction itself, as in the case of the T-34, was kept strictly secret, which later surprised the German tankers. Despite the fact that it was not made in the same numbers as its smaller companion (it is estimated that about 4,786 tanks were built), it still entered the pages of history as a truly successful vehicle and in many aspects superior to the German tanks from the beginning of the war. So I will move on to the miniature of our hero, in the most pleasant scale for me: 1:35, launched this year by Tamiya. 🖸

Sidecutters are the safest and easiest way to remove kit parts from the moulding sprues. The flat side should be pressed up against the part, making a clean cut and only a quick clean-up with a file or foam-backed sanding stick will be then needed

○ 100% NEW MOULDS

I will not mention models from other manufacturers, because KV models of all versions were issued in a great number, the leader here being Trumpeter. So there will be no problem with making a specific version. The Tamiya model is completely new and has nothing to do with the old releases from this manufacturer. I built the model without any upgrades, so that everyone can have an honest view of what can be achieved, straight from the box. The only exception were tow cables from Eureka XXL.

Assembly was a pure formality and a pleasurable one too. The hull was closed up with the front armour plates and during the whole process of assembling the hull, it was not necessary to

use any putty.


From the exterior, we are instructed to grind off the sockets of the towing cables brackets. Such solutions suggest that Tamiya may have some other version of the KV-1 planned. After a rapid assembly of the hull, the time came to build up the turret. As in the case of the hull, this one was also split into separate plates. The rest of the work with this section is a pure pleasure and another confirmation of the old modellers' saying: "Tamiya builds like LEGO blocks".

The gun elevating mechanism, due to the fact that it is a completely invisible element, was neglected and I did not care about its clean-up. The whole thing ended up inside the turret anyway. The barrel, on the other hand, is moulded in one piece. I scraped off the mould seam



By this stage, hull assembly was finished, so work was started on the wheels. First, the author removed everything from the sprues, cleaned them up and then glued them together. Of course, everything is thought out and fits perfectly. "Perfection" is the correct terminology: a simple "very good" would be an insult to the creators of this miniature







Then, I was time for the tracks. They are recreated in the form of strips and individual links for the idlers and sprockets. Importantly, the characteristic sag is very clearly depicted in the upper sections. The main work here was to remove the ejector-pin marks, which were fortunately very shallow. For this, a rounded scalpel blade was used to simply scrape off the unsightly-looking marks

with a scalpel, then sanded the whole thing with the above-mentioned abrasive blocks and polished with a polisher for nails, of course. It's great that the fenders are separate elements and as you can see from the photos, this greatly facilitates the fitting of the tracks. The fenders themselves have a total of six brackets per side. To this we attach two stowage boxes for tools and equipment, plus a saw.

This is where we finish the assembly of this miniature. The model is easy to assemble with

very good, sorry – perfect fitting - parts and I didn't notice any problems, even a tiny one. During the construction, I did not use a gramme of putty. In two or three evenings, it can be easily assembled straight from the box, ready for painting. Of course, for a beginner, I would suggest following the assembly instructions carefully and focus on individual sequences. As for me, it is a great base for upgrading and superdetailing, which will certainly tempt advanced modellers.

PAINTING THE KV-1

I wondered for a long time how to finish the assembled KV-1. The initial option was to paint it all green with strong modulation, but after looking through dozens of photos, I chose the tricolour camouflage. To be precise, the presence of such a paint scheme is not confirmed on the ZiS-5 cannon machine that Tamiya offers here. Certainly the tricolour camouflage was worn by the vehicle of the 220th Armoured Brigade in Leningrad in the spring of 1942, but it was a KV-1

armed with an F-32 gun. Nevertheless, I decided to colour my model this way.

I practically always start with a black background and here I reached for AMMO by Mig's One Shot Black Primer. This undercoat was applied to all elements, including the tracks. It is worth leaving the paint to dry properly for twenty-four hours. The next step was to apply the base colour of Russian Green 4B0, by AMMO. This should also be left for twenty-four hours before applying the next colour, but I must admit •

The author almost always starts with a black background. Here, he reached for AMMO's One Shot Black Primer again (2023). This Spanish maker must be praised because they have finally improved the dispenser in the bottle. The primer was applied with an airbrush with a 0.3mm nozzle at a pressure of about 2.5 bar. This material is not diluted and it is worth wiping the nozzle from time to time during application

Colour number two is 7K Russian Tan. For masking, the author used 'Masking Putty' from AMMO. It forms very well and does not deform quickly. When painting individual patches of colour, it will not droop at all. The entire operation took about an hour



It is worth leaving the model twenty-four hours to dry properly. The next step was to spray the base colour, Russian Green 4B0, also by AMMO.
The author applied the paints at a pressure of 0.6 to 1.0 bar. It would be worth leaving the miniature for another twenty-four hours to dry before applying the next colour, but it was actually masked and painted after thirty minutes!



The next step was to simulate scratches and damage to the paint coating, made with a piece of kitchen sponge and a brush. This technique requires a bit of practice and you can achieve interesting results after some time. As you can see, two AMMO colours were used here: 042 Old Rust and Light Green 082

A huge plus is a very fine pigment



◆ that I masked and painted after thirty minutes. After proper application, the surface itself should be slightly satin. Therefore, the paint should be applied in thin, transparent layers: don't try to cover everything with one stroke. It is also very important to mix the paint well.

The next step was to slightly brighten the colours. In the case of the green, I added a bit of white and yellow to the base colour and white to the others. The brightening itself is a kind of a panel lightning i.e: the centres of individual panels were lightened. In this case, I diluted the paint a little more and painted it at a pressure of 0.5 bar. The result was quite subtle which is what I wanted. Thanks to such a treatment, the colours are no longer uniform, and therefore the whole thing has been diversified to some extent.

I painted the exhaust pipes with AMMO Old Rust (042) and I treated the interior of the reflector with a Tamiya X-11 Chrome paint marker. Thus, the hull and turret were coated with Tamiya X-22 Clear, as all work with oils etc., was performed over a gloss surface. As the saying goes, "so many modellers, so many ways"! Similar to the hull and turret, I painted the wheels first with 4B0 and then lightened their centres. •





The author mixed Dark Earth (3007) and Europe Earth (3004) pigments and with a round brush, flicked this over the mixture previously applied to the hull



In the case of wheels, the colours and technique are the same as the hull. Additionally, the author used Chipping Colour (044). Although the sides of the lower hull were meant to be very dirty, they were not treated neglectfully

This is the moment to put on the fenders permanently and start weathering the upper parts of the vehicle. The whole operation started with ordinary soil. It was sprinkled on the model with a small spatula, with corrections made with a brush



Then, it was fixed with Sand & Gravel Glue (2012). The whole thing looks like wet slush, but after drying it looks fine

After these treatments, I started the colour washes. I used the so-called 'pin-wash', which means that I did not pour the 'wash mixture over the entire model, but only around the protruding elements and into recesses, such as panel dividing lines, etc. For this purpose, I used AMMO's ready-made products, in this case, Dark Brown Wash (1005). I then had to prepare the only elements that did not

come from the Tamiya box: the towing cables, as the included nylon string did not look like them. I used a Eureka XXL product cut to the right length here.

IT'S TIME FOR THE DIRT!

I started with the sides and the hull's undersurfaces. For this, I used a really minimal amount of products: AMMO Heavy Earth (1704) on the sides and the nooks and crannies with Liquid Dark Mud (1405). I mixed Dark Earth (3007) and Europe Earth (3004) pigments together and with a round brush, flicked the mixture onto the hull. Here and there, I also applied some AMMO Fresh Engine Oil enamel (1408). I tried not to cover the entire chassis with mud, so as not to completely hide its details.

The wheels on both sides were treated in the same way. I'll remind you my

motto until you get totally bored with it: "we paint everything"! The wheels were ready to be fitted, so I was able to tweak the back, front and bottom of the model with Dry Steppe (1751) from AMMO's Splashes series. I imitated splashes of mud with a brush and a toothpick.

And when everything was dry, I was able to remove the BluTack protection from the control arms, so I didn't have

he Messerschmitt
Bf109 has long been
one of my favourite
aircraft, but until
recently I've only been
collecting kits and am finally
getting around to building
them. I had a huge stash
of Hasegawa kits but sold
them all off years ago in
anticipation of Eduard's
release. Disappointed

with the initial tooling, I continued to wait for the 2016 retool and now, four years later, they are finally making it to my bench. For my first ever Gustav I picked 'Gelb 6' that served daytime defence duty for JG53 and also ran nightfighter missions at night for JG301.

When I sold off all of my

Hasegawa kits I kept a good bit of aftermarket sets that I thought might be adaptable to the Eduard kit. I'm glad I did, as I was able to use parts from the Aires cockpit set (4251) with minimal effort. I pieced together a more detailed cockpit than the kit offering by using the Aires sidewalls with the kit floor piece. I grabbed other


parts from the Aires set like the gun-breech cover, control column, gunsight, and PE trim wheels, along with some wiring to detail up the floor section of the cockpit. The cockpit was painted with Tamiya Acrylics, details picked out with Vallejo acrylics plus a few placard decals from Airscale for added interest. •

○ SAVE THAT DETAIL!

The Eduard '109s are a joy to build and assembly was a breeze with no hurdles. The most difficult part is preserving the delicate surface detail during assembly. The gear legs are a little long making the kit stance a little too 'proud' so I shortened the main gear a bit and added brake lines from 0.2mm lead wire. I also chose to replace the kit gun barrels, exhaust, and wheels

For paint I've been using AK Real Colors lately with excellent results. They are as easy to spray as Tamiya paints and dry to a nice satin smooth finish like Mr Color lacquers, but without the offensive odour. The only issue I've had is the RLM02 is quite green so I mixed in a little RLM75 to bring it to a shade I prefer. All of the insignia were sprayed on using Montex masks and for the specific 'Gelb 6'





We didn't have an instruction sheet or decals, but it is clear that it features swing-wings as per the real aircraft. The cockpit is superbly well detailed as are the undercarriage bays and engines, of which two of the latter are provided. We will bring you more

information on this kit as we receive it, but for now, check out the photos!

A LITTLE TORNADO HISTORY

The Tornado Gr.4 arose from a collaborative project between Italy, Germany and the United Kingdom for the production of a multi-role high-performance combat aircraft. The primary requirement however was to develop a 'state of the art' modern aircraft able to perform low-altitude penetrating strike missions. This need was met by the

development of a twin-engine combat aircraft with a variable-sweep wing. The Tornado IDS (Interdictor/ Strike) was the first version to be deployed by the British Royal Air Force and designated GR.1. In 1996 the Tornado was upgraded to the GR.4 standard which was characterised by improved operational capabilities, new avionics systems for navigation and the adoption of new 'on-board' technologies. These systems enabled the effective identification and

tracking of targets and also the weapons management of the newer generation of weapons such as Paveway IV bombs and Storm Shadow cruise missiles.




MATERIALS: IM, SVT, PE, WS ITEM NO.24357 It is extremely difficult to believe Tamiya first released this kit back in 1984, but the yearstamps on the sprues don't lie. The detail and precision incorporated within the model's components is as sharp and punchy as a new-tool kit: well of course it is, it's Tamiya! It hasn't been re-issued for a long time and now, and with this edition the little Lotus 7 comes with a sheet of photo-etched nickelsteel that carries the front grille, front and rear radiator matrices, carburettor plate, brake-disc faces and buckles for the racing harnesses. The belts for the latter come in the form of a colour-printed, self-adhesive sheet, with belts in black, red and blue. As these are made from thin plastic film, a coat of flat varnish will improve their final appearance. Also new to this edition are four, tiny engine intake-trumpets formed from machined aluminium: a very neat finishing point for the car's four-cylinder Ford engine. All the modeller needs to add are ignition cables and perhaps some battery leads: references for these details can be found online. The decals have been



redesigned and include racing numbers for the Clubman racer

Tamiya standard.





BRENGUN, CZECH REPUBLIC MQ-8C FIRE-X

The Northrop Grumman MQ-8C Fire Scout - known as 'Fire-X' during development - is an unmanned helicopter, developed by Northrop Grumman for use by the United States Navy. The MQ-8C also has autonomous take-off and landing capability and is designed to provide reconnaissance, situational awareness, aerial fire-support and precision targeting-support for ground, air and sea forces. The MQ-8C airframe is based on the Bell 407, while the avionics and other systems are developed from those used on the MQ-8B Fire Scout. It first flew in October 2013 and achieved initial operational capability on 28th June 2019. History edited from Wikipedia. Brengun's new kit of this peculiar machine is cast entirely in grey resin, supplemented by a fret of photo-etched brass parts, copper rod, 3D-printed rotor head and waterslide decals. The Bell 407 is a nice size in 1:48 and, as this is an unmanned drone, all windows are blanked off which obviates the need for clear parts and, of therefore, interior detail! The tail-boom, rotor blades, fins and sensors are all formed from resin and sport some superb detail. The skids must be bent to shape from the copper rod and Brengun thoughtfully provide a jig - also cast from resin - for this purpose. This is an unusual but interesting subject and the kit is very nicely executed.





This is the latest release in the very welcome line-up of Revell/ Bandai Star Wars kits and it's one of their more modestlysized presentations. But don't be fooled by the diminutive size of the models within the box: the detail that covers the mouldings is extraordinary and rather mouthwatering. Just two sprues of grey plastic and one in clear (for the display stands) are provided but they're enough to carry the parts for a Death Star - at the crazy scale of 1:2,700,000 - and a Star Destroyer at the far more sensible (!) scale of 1:14,500. The Death Star is the incomplete (and thus, far more interesting) version as seen in Return of the Jedi and as such, a great deal of internal layers and structures are left open to remain visible. These parts are executed with typical Bandai aplomb and the effect is staggering for such a small model: imaginative paint effects will be the key in getting the best from all this clever engineering. The Star Destroyer hull may only measure 110mm in length, but, as with the Death Star, the kit parts are buzzing with ultra fine detail which will benefit from a creative approach to painting, although really, just flat white overall will suffice at this size! These little kits really are gorgeous and they represent an affordable way of getting your hands on the Revell/Bandai Star Wars kits. And you only need a



tiny display cabinet too!


















ZOUKEI-MURA, JAPAN F-4E PHANTOM II

No less than fourteen sprues of grey polystyrene (plus one of clear) are housed within the stocky box of this latest masterpiece from Zoukei-Mura of Japan, which immediately tells you that this is no quick build. But why should it be? ZM have created a highly detailed replica of this iconic jet-fighter that has been designed to be savoured over weeks and maybe months of leisurely modelling, not rushed. The kit depicts the early version of the F-4E Phantom II which was modified to carry an integral M61 Vulcan cannon and AN/APQ-120 within its elongated RF-4C nose. The F-4E was powered by J79-GE-17 engines and later variants of the 'E I received leading-edge slats to improve manoeuvrability. Just one set of markings is provided here to represent F-4E-35-MC (67-0308) 'Betty Lou' of the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing, 469th Tactical Fighter Squadron, USAF. This machine was stationed in Thailand during the late 1960s and flew combat sorties over Vietnam. Notwithstanding the single marking scheme, the decal sheet - printed by Cartograf of Italy - still measures an impressive 21cm by 30cm and much of that real estate is covered by data stencils for the airframe exterior. A very useful, four-page guide is provided for their application but set aside several days for the process! Detail within the moulded parts is exquisite, in fact it's so refined that no photo-etched parts are

provided and none are needed.















FROM THE WEST END TO THE WESTERN **FRONT**

Wayne Symons builds MiniArt's 1:35 B-Type Military Omnibus of the 91 Army Service Corps MTC as it would have appeared at Ypres in the spring of 1915

ntroduced in 1910, when most buses were still horse-drawn, the London General Omnibus Company (LGOC) B-type was London's most successful mass-produced motor-bus. At the end of production approximately 3,500 B-type vehicles had been built. The chassis consisted of ash planks sandwiched between steel plates which gave the structure strength and flexibility. A 32hp petrol engine gave power to the rear wheels via a worm drive and a chain-driven gearbox, the wheels themselves being made from pressed steel fitted with solid rubber tyres.

The design and production techniques meant that the vehicle was not only rugged but also easy to maintain, making it ideal for use in the harsh conditions of London's busy streets and consequently the Western Front. To comply with the Metropolitan Police speed limit the engine was fitted with a governor to keep the speed below 16mph. Although in war service, maintenance of the governor was often 'neglected' allowing the bus to •

• achieve speeds of 35mph on good roads, however when in convoy the average speed was only 10mph.

The body of the buses were of wooden construction and local regulations required that the paint work was to be 'properly' applied and maintained which resulted in at least twelve coats of paint and six of varnish. In peace time there was room for eighteen passengers on the upper deck and sixteen on the enclosed lower deck, giving a total of thirty-four. In war service this was reduced to twenty-four to allow for the soldiers' equipment. After the outbreak of war in 1914, London buses, along with their drivers and mechanics, were requisitioned for the war effort. The crews became soldiers of the Army Service Corps and due to the constant need for mobility, were never off duty. They were not given sleeping quarters and had to sleep on their vehicles stowing their belongings in wooden boxes.

Over 1,300 B-Type vehicles went on war service, mostly to France and Belgium, with some travelling as far afield as Egypt. The buses were used to transport troops to and from the front line and were also put to use as ambulances and even mobile pigeon lofts. A number of these buses went to France still in their LGOC red livery and after a few weeks they were painted in a more suitable colour by their crews. It seems likely that this was a khaki-green although contemporary

witness accounts describe a wide variety of colours. It was also observed that quite often the khaki paint would be chipped and worn through and the old red colour would show, bringing back memories of when these buses had travelled London's streets. The windows would often get broken by the soldier's rifles and equipment so in the end they just removed the glass and placed wooden boards on the outside.



MiniArt's kit comes on seventeen sprues of grey plastic parts, all of which come tightly packed into one plastic bag. One of the rear fenders had snapped as a consequence and considering how delicate some of the parts are, I was surprised that there wasn't more damage. Separately packed are three clear sprues, a small sheet of photo-etched brass and a decal sheet which provides five markings-options.



There are many delicate parts such as the linkages and handrails that have a multitude of attachment points. making clean-up very difficult and breakages are almost inevitable. Here, the author had to make a new hand rail from brass rod





I have to say that the quality and detail of the mouldings is exceptional and apart from one sprue that obviously had a mould issue, there appeared to be no flash or ejector-pin marks. The highly detailed instruction booklet is twenty-eight pages long, with colour plates at the beginning and end pages depicting the five options. Construction began with the engine, which soon built up to a nicely detailed replica. Using images and videos gathered from the internet of the London Transport Museum's restored 'Battle Bus' as a reference I felt that there really was nothing that needed to be added. Maybe the valve springs could be improved upon but to be honest once installed very little will be seen even with the bonnet raised. The builder is required to provide wire for the HT leads and the instructions give the measurements for the length to which they must be cut. There are photo-etched clamps for attaching the leads to the spark plugs but these seem somewhat over-scale so I decided to omit them.

The chassis is next and consists of the two main beams plus ten cross members and care must be taken to ensure that each of these is in the correct order and orientation and that the whole thing is kept square whilst the glue sets. Various sub-assemblies were then assembled and painted before adding to the chassis, including suspension springs, axles, gearbox and a beautifully detailed radiator.





Some stencils were from the scanned decal sheet using the excellent Silhouette Portrait desktop cutting machine and the markings were sprayed on. The author prefers this method where possible to avoid the risk of carrier film showing. This method means that one doesn't really need to apply any extra layers of varnish. The markings were then sanded back slightly to give a faded appearance



The author used some microscope cover-slips to replace the plastic windows. You can see from the photo the difference in the thickness. The original plan was to use them only where the broken windows would be but, in the end, all were replaced. Using the originals as

a template the glass can be gently scored using a tungsten tipped engineers scribe and then snapped to size. The windows were then glued in place with VMS's Transpa Fix




Breaking the glass was a little harder than anticipated, but after a couple of attempts though the author got a result that he was pretty happy with. It would be easy to get carried away with smashing windows but in the end, it was decided just one would be broken and one cracked



The floors and benches were painted a wood colour and then given a top coat of a glossy red brown. This was then gently sanded back to reveal the wood in areas of wear. Oil washes and earth pigments were applied to give a dirty but dry appearance. The poster is included in the instruction sheet and the author thought it might add some interest but it can't really be seen on the completed model








The author has a photo of a couple of these buses carrying a bicycle on the front platform. I thought this might make an interesting addition so he purchased one of the Masterbox kits. Although the bike is from WW2, they probably hadn't changed too much. The spokes were especially bothersome hence the odd bent one if you look close enough. The only modification made was to make some springs for the seat and add a lens to the light. It's actually a really nice little kit although it did reaffirm the author's love/hate relationship with photo-etch!

> The wooden trunk was finished with oil paint over an acrylic tan base and the tools heads were given a metallic appearance using graphic powder. The stairs hand rail was rubbed back to reveal the brass



a major chunk of the time taken to build this kit. Once the firewall, cab floor and bonnet parts were fitted, the chassis really begins to take shape. I wanted to have the bonnet open to show off the engine and this does require a degree of filing and sanding to get the panels to

sit correctly.



HANDLE WITH CARE

After the delicate and somewhat fiddly nature of the chassis the assembly of the bus body made for a welcome change of pace. The lower and upper deck along with stairs were all built, painted and we athered separately. These vehicles operated in a harsh environment and were in constant use throughout the war so I wanted to show a fair amount of wear and tear. I thought the best way to do this would be to paint the vehicle in various layers and then chip and sand away through the upper layers to reveal the original paintwork, wood or metal beneath.

The dirt, dust and grime were applied with various earth-coloured pigments and oil washes. Although the side windows were removed the front, back and upper windows remained and I wanted to show a couple of these cracked or broken. Using the original plastic windows as templates, I made replacement ones from microscope cover slips. Being extremely thin glass, once fitted it was just a case of tapping the glass with a sharp point to break them. The wood grain on the plastic window boards provided in the kit are a little overdone for my liking and in most of the photos I could find they seemed to use five boards rather than the six on the plastic items, so I used some wood veneer **stri**ps instead.

The completed body was attached to the chassis along with the wheels and a few detail parts. At this point the model is very delicate and difficult to handle. I managed to break the **upp**er railings a couple of times. All that remained to be done was the final bit of weathering, again using pigments and oils and some paint for mud splashes. •

Just be prepared to spend a lot of your time cleaning up parts. I really hope that MiniArt do decide to produce the pigeon loft version to sit alongside this one.

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
Book Reviews

IMAGES OF WAR: M29 WEASEL TRACKED CARGO **CARRIER & VARIANTS**

We can always rely on David Doyle to come up with the goods when it comes to the photographic examination of a military vehicle and with this recent volume in Pen & Sword's 'Images of War' series, we are treated to some superb imagery on the peculiar little M29 Weasel tracked cargo carrier. Within the 150 pages of colour and black/ white photographs we have walk-around photo-studies of several examples including a Studebaker Light Carrier T15 Weasel (later M28) with its bizarre, outward-splayed roadwheels. The photos of this immaculately restored, white-washed vehicle are superb. We then move on to the second set of modern-day images which examine an equally well-preserved Light Cargo Carrier T24 (M29) in great depth. Further images of M29s follow and accompanied by a selection of wartime photographs of Weasels in action (although perhaps the most famous M29 image of 'St Lo Special' in Normandy bocage is oddly omitted) the book makes an excellent reference resource for this endearing American tracked carrier. Now all we need is a new 1:35 kit!










IMAGES OF WAR: THE FALL OF BERLIN IAN BAXTER, PEN & SWORD MILITARY www.pen-and-sword.co.uk

This crown-quarto format book comprises 130+ pages and takes a pictorial approach to its subject, hence its inclusion in Pen & Sword's 'Images of War' series. Despite its smaller format, the wartime photographs are generally of good quality but others are still-frames lifted from newsreel footage and thus inherently less sharp, but interesting nonetheless. While these images are fascinating (and inspiring for modellers) and the main text reasonably informative, the photo captions need more research/refinement. One of the first captions in this book (page 11) states "German troops pose along the front standing next to one of their defensive positions" when in fact the photograph shows the Maus super-heavy tank prototype stuck in the mud in March 1944 and another caption (page 31) describes an Sd.Kfz.251/10 as an Sd.Kfz.251/17. The captions alternate frequently between the muddled and the generic and are of limited use to the history scholar. Purely as a book of images that document the fall of the Third Reich in the East however, it's a good value addition to a scale modeller's bookshelf.











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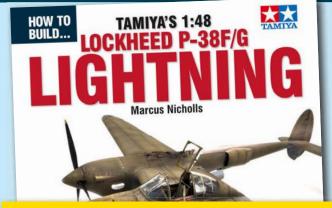

How to Build... TAMIYA'S 1:48 LOCKHEED P-38F/G LIGHTNING

The Lockheed P-38 Lightning is an iconic US fighter from the Second World War. Its twin Allison V12 engines were mounted in booms to free-up the nose so it could house a fearsome array of four M2 Browning machine guns and a 20mm cannon. The twinboom airframe became a sight feared by enemies wherever it served, with good reason.

In 2019, after several years of painstaking research, Tamiya released an all-new kit of this sleek aircraft and it has taken its place proudly in the 1:48 Aircraft Series as No.120 in the range.

In this new 'How To Build' book, Tamiya Model Magazine's Editor, Marcus Nicholls, presents no less than four built-up examples of Tamiya's fantastic model; one Lightning each from Brett Green and Spencer Pollard, plus two from Marcus Nicholls. The second of Marcus's models incorporates resin and photo-etched super-detail sets from Eduard, showing how they can be used within the build to take the detail to an even higher level. - · Alternative decal sets






